



BOARD OF EVANGELISM: Brooks E. Reynolds, Executive Secretary of the Board of Evangelism, presented the report of the Board, which was amended as follows:

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Trustees of the Peninsula Annual Conference of the Methodist Church be and are hereby instructed to pass a fee simple title to said Unity Methodist Church to the Friendship Methodist Church on the Millsboro Charge of the Delaware Annual Conference of the Methodist Church at a cost of \$1.00, with the understanding that all other costs of the transfer are to be borne by the said Friendship Methodist Church.

2. WHEREAS the members of Central Methodist Church, formerly on the Kenton Charge, have requested that said Central Methodist Church be closed, and

WHEREAS all requirements have been met as set forth in the Discipline of the Methodist Church, 1952, for the abandonment of Church property.

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that the Peninsula Annual Conference in session at St. Paul's Methodist Church, Wilmington, Delaware on the thirteenth day of May, 1954 hereby declares said Central Methodist Church abandoned.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Trustees of the Peninsula Annual Conference of the Methodist Church be, and are hereby instructed to sell said Central Methodist Church at public sale, and the proceeds, after all costs are paid be transferred to the Cheswold Methodist Church, Cheswold, Delaware to be used by said Cheswold Methodist Church for plant expansion purposes only.

HOSPITALS AND HOMES: J. Earl Cummings, Chairman of the Board of Hospitals and Homes presented the report of the Board, which was adopted by the Conference.

RESOLUTION: W. F. Dunkle, Jr. presented the following resolution which was adopted by the Conference:

BE IT RESOLVED:

- 1. That when any annual session of the Peninsula Conference adjourns without an invitation having been issued and accepted for the next year's session, the District Superintendents and District Lay Leaders shall constitute themselves a special committee to determine the place where the Conference shall meet next; and
- 2. If between sessions of the Peninsula Conference any invitation should be withdrawn or any emergency arise necessitating a change in plans, that the District Superintendents and District Lay Leaders be empowered to fix another place for the next session of the Conference; and
- 3. It is the mind of this Conference that if possible and feasible at least one annual session during each quadrennium should be held other than in the city of Wilmington, Delaware, and the District Superintendents and District Lay Leaders are so advised to make such arrangements if they can.

- 4. WHEREAS James H. Clow, Jr. has united with another denomination. we recommend that he be listed in the Conference Journal as withdrawn from the Methodist Church under Par. 381.

In view of the fact that Mr. Clow has refused to surrender his credentials, we declare them to be invalid.

CONFERENCE TRUSTEES: Elwood W. Cursey, Chairman of the Conference Trustees, presented the following resolution which was adopted by the Conference:

WHEREAS the Conference Trustees received approval from Bishop G. Bromley Oxnam and the District Board of Church Location under Par. 188-4 to take possession of Bond Chapel at Pomona, Maryland.

WHEREAS the Conference Trustees sold the said Church and Parsonage for \$3500.00 to interested parties with the proviso that in event the present group discontinue the use of said Church it shall revert to the methodist Church; and that the proceeds of this sale shall be invested by the Conference Trustees; the net interest from the same to be applied to the care of the Cemetery of Bond Chapel, when and if needed.

CONFERENCE TRUSTEES: Elwood W. Cursey presented the following Statement of Policy, regarding the action of the Conference Trustees. The statement was accepted and ordered printed in the Journal:

WHEREAS, William C. Poole, by his Last Will and Testament, did provide, inter alia, as follows, to-wit:

"SEVENTH: I give, devise and bequeath unto the Trustees of the Peninsula Annual Conference of the Methodist Church all property owned by me situated in Worcester County, Maryland. It is my most earnest and sincere desire that this land or income from sale of any portion or all of it shall be used by said Trustees for the purpose of establishing Methodist Sunday Schools or Churches on or near that portion of the Maryland coastline of the Atlantic Ocean. Furthermore, I direct that any and all churches now organized and located in or near that territory shall not be beneficiaries of any part of this bequest."

and

WHEREAS, the said Trustees have been advised by their counsel that the language of said Item Seventh is inoperative to create a trust and that,

therefore, the property therein mentioned is held by the Trustees free and clear from any trust; and

WHEREAS, the said Trustees are, nevertheless, desirous of giving effect to the last wishes of Brother Poole insofar as such wishes can be ascertained from a reasonable construction of the language used in said Item Seventh:

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the said Trustees, with regard to the administration of the income from said fund, shall and do hereby adopt the following rules of procedure:

1. All applications must

- 3. The Trustees shall base their determination in each case upon a consideration of the following factors:
 - a. The extent to which the last wishes of Brother Poole are given effect, and in this regard the Trustees believe that Brother Poole was desirous of helping in the following order of priority:
 - New Methodist Sunday Schools and/or Churches on or near that portion (Worcester County) of the Maryland coastline of the Atlantic Ocean.
 - (2) New Methodist Sunday Schools and/or Churches in any other section of the Conference.
- (3) Existing Methodist Sunday Schools and/or Churches located in any section of the Conference other than the portion of Worcester County, Maryland near the ocean.
 - The extent to which the welfare of the Methodist Church will be promoted.
 - c. The amount of accumulated income available
 - d. The jurpose for which the donation is requested.
 - e. The need of the applicant based upon a consideration of its numerical and financial strength, its location and its potential.
 - f. The extent of the applicant's present effort to develop its potential and meet its responsibilities.

WHEREAS, The Peninsula Methodist Conference established The Wesley Junior College at Dover, Delaware, for the Purpose of Providing a Christian Education for Methodist Students in this Conference area, and,

WHEREAS, There was the assurance, at the beginning, that the support of The Wesley Junior College would come from voluntary contribution, and.

WHEREAS, The General Conference in 1952 by its action approved to make an asking of \$.65 per member of the Methodist Church, the said asking to be divided \$.50 for Schools of Higher Education affiliated with The Methodist Church and \$.15 per member for the Wesley Foundation, and,

WHEREAS, the Financing of the Wesley Junior College is becoming increasingly difficult, and many repairs are needed.

Be it resolved that this Annual Conference ask Bishop Oxnam to request the appropriate Agencies of the General Board of Education of the Methodist Church and such other Agencies as might be helpful to make a survey of the Wesley Junior College as to its facilities, and as to the need for such an institution.

EDUCATION

Under the leadership of F. Douglas Milbury, Executive Secretary, and the loyal group of men and women who are his helpers on the District, the program of education has gone forward. Six Christian Workers Schools were held with a total enrollment of 424. Since four of the schools were held during the worst time of the year, weatherwise, it is probable that the enrollment was adversely affected. Even so the total was approximately the same as last year.

Work among the youth seems to have taken on increased vigor. Subdistrict meetings on the whole have been well attended, with marked improvement in the Seaford section.

A daily vacation church school workshop was held at Calvary Church, Milford with 26 in attendance. Reports indicate it was very profitable. The District also was host to a conference on the ministry, held at Wesley Church, Dover, under the auspices of the Committee on Christian Vocations at which sixty were present. The conveners of this conference are to be highly commended for bringing the claims of the Christian ministry to the attention of so many fine young men whose services the Methodist Church needs so badly.

Wesley Junior College, likewise, has had the interested cooperation of the District, reports indicating a contribution coming very near the ten thousand dollar mark.

OUR THOUGHT FOR OTHERS

A full complement of reports from the ministers indicate that once again every charge has paid the World Service and Conference Benevolent apportionment in full.

The item of Advance Specials shows some improvement, notably with reference to the support of the Peninsula Annual Conference missionaries, Robert and Ruth Gilchrist. Although starting this program somewhat late, reports indicate approximately \$1500 has been paid on this cause.

Whatever results have been obtained in these projects are, without doubt, due to the fine program of cultivation which is put on each February by the Conference and District Secretaries. More power to them!

The District has cooperated in every possible way with the Board of Missions, under the energetic and capable leadership of R. Jervis Cooke. This Board has met the challenge of the new day in Peninsula Methodism in a far seeing manner, and merits the appreciation of the Conference for its support of the Conference-wide survey under the direction of Dr. Roy L. Sturm. Facts and trends indicated by the survey report should be useful for many years to come.

OUR THOUGHT FOR OURSELVES

The economic climate in some parts of the District has not been as optimistic this year as in other years. Nevertheless, we are happy to report a number of exceptional building and improvement enterprises.

On March 7, 1954, after being in exile for three years, Calvary Church, Milford held the first service in the new building. \$123,747 have been paid this year by the faithful congregation. The sanctuary is not complete, but plans are now being proposed for its completion which will necessitate the expenditure of approximately \$25,000 additional. The indebtedness on the completed educational unit is covered by cash in hand and pledges.

Georgetown-Grace has paid \$56,641 on its newly completed educational building which is a demonstration of what a group of consecrated laymen can do when the "people have a mind to work." The total cash outlay for this building is about \$71,000 but a fair appraisal of the value of the building and equipment would probably approach \$100,000. The difference is in contributed labor, largely furnished by a very active and loyal men's Bible Class.

The same statement can be made with regard to the addition to the Collins Building, at Harrington-Asbury. A cash outlay of \$33,981 has provided facilities which probably could not be duplicated under \$50,000. The labor of a fine group of men is the difference.

Wyoming completed its new educational unit at a total cost of \$47,021, all of which is provided for in cash and pledges.

Bridgeville has collected \$28,000 toward its educational building, and we trust will be able soon to begin building this greatly needed addition.

Two new parsonages are now the homes of two very proud preachers. The Mt. Pleasant charge has a fine home at a cost of \$15,186, and Camden is the proud possessor of a splendidly designed home at a cost of \$17,200.

Lewes-Bethel bought a property adjoining the Church House costing \$7000 which will be paid for at the end of this month. This charge is now discussing a possible program of expansion costing \$100,000. We wish them every measure of success in this much needed project.

This organization, under the inspired leadership of Mrs. Earle Sylvester, continues to grow and to make an unusually meritorious contribution to the work of the District. The statistics for the three year period of this President and her loyal corps of officers will indicate such growth:

The quarterly and annual meetings continue to be attended in large numbers, and the District Society was the first in the Conference to meet the request for \$1250 for the Anniversary Fund of the Board of Conference Projects (Deaconess Home) in Wilmington.

THE BOARD OF LAY ACTIVITIES

The District Lay Leaders, Fulton J. Downing, Paul M. Powell, and William E. Matthews, have produced what is probably the best year of the three of their administration of this important work.

The annual dinner for lay leaders and their ministers had 143 in attendance and a fine program, the speaker being Mr. Carl Walton, Lay Leader of the Newark Conference.

Four Communion breakfasts were held with a total attendance of 802. There are now 8 units of Methodist Men where there was only one three years ago, and the special project of the Board of Lay Activities; namely, the support of the work of The Board of Child Care, has had splendid response from the Charges. The reports of the Pastors indicate a total offering for this cause of \$3,143, an increase in two years of approximately \$1,700.

METHODIST FOUNDATION FOR THE DOVER AIR FORCE BASE

During the months of August, September, and October, 1952, a committee raised by the Mayor of the City of Dover was acquainted with the plans of the Air Force to develop and expand the Dover Air Force Base. The extent of the expansion at that time was indefinite, but it was indicated that the military personnel would number approximately 6000, in addition to a large number of civilian employees, probably numbering 2000. This did not include an estimate of the number of families which would be coming into Dover and vicinity.

The writer of this report was asked to serve as Chairman of the Religious Activities Sub-Committee. It soon became apparent that there would

be little, or no need, of additional churches to care for this influx, but it also was apparent that the Methodist Church would have a responsibility to minister to the families of both military and civilian personnel which the regularly established churches would not be able to meet without assistance. Therefore conversations were instigated with the pastors of neighboring Methodist Churches to discover, if possible, some way to solve the problem. Advice was sought from every possible source, including the Conference Committee on Relationship to Chaplains, the General Commission on Chaplains, the Chief of Chaplains of the Air Force, other sections of the country which had been faced by the same opportunity for service, the Cabinet, and Bishop Oxnam who made available to the project a substantial sum from the Camp Activities Fund which he controls.

Finally, on October 22, 1953, the Conference Board of Missions voted to support the project to the extent of three thousand dollars on the following basis: That a Board of Directors be set up composed of the Pastors of the Wesley Methodist Church, Dover, Whatcoat Methodist Church, Camden, and the Wyoming Methodist Church, plus a layman from each of those churches, one representative from the Board of Missions, and the District Superintendent of the Dover District. This group has been organized with Dr. John A. Trader as Chairman, and Mr. Frederic Brown, a veteran from Wyoming as Secretary-Treasurer. Until some one can think of a better name, the project is now called THE METHODIST FOUNDATION FOR THE DOVER AIR FORCE BASE.

The concensus of opinion indicates that the best type of person to become the Director of this project is a Chaplain recently returned from active duty. Through the General Commission on Chaplains, efforts have been made without success to find such a man. It is hoped that this very important project may be underway in the near future.

A PERSONAL WORD

It is my firm conviction that a report of a District Superintendent should not include personal matters. In spite of this, I feel I must digress to the extent of writing this brief paragraph, which I hope will do what I have wanted to do, but did not know how. The past twelve months have been difficult ones for my family. As most of you know, about a year ago, my car and I had a battle to determine which side up was the right side up, and I came out second best. Then on October 1, and again on March 23, my wife was compelled to undergo serious surgery, and out of these experiences has come to us such a flood of cards, and flowers, and telephone calls, and expressions of good will, as well as the offer of prayers, from both ministers, their families, and laymen as well, that I could not close this report without saying: "Thank you, and God bless you all."

Bishop Oxnam, Members of the Peninsula Annual Conference, dear Brethren:

Whatever honor there is in presenting a report in which are related some of the significant events of the Easton District is indeed tempered by the serious responsibility one feels. Acts of kindness, deeds of faith, are beyond the limit of human words. Only as we see the spiritual in what we report, do we approximate their worth.

The District Parsonage Families

Three children were born in our District Parsonages; a daughter to Rev and Mrs. C. W. Hanners of Bozman, a son to the Rev. and Mrs. G. H. Moore of Sherwood, and a son to Rev. and Mrs. Charles R. Leary of Church Creek

On September 20, Lucian L. Powell, while on his way to his Sunday service in the Eldorado Church, met with a very serious accident which proved fatal. On October 2nd., the body no longer able to withstand the physical shock, his spirit left us. Funeral services were held in the Christ Church, Monday, October 5th. His memoir will be included in our Conference Minutes.

Some District Information

Immediately following the last session of the Annual Conference, the District Board of Church Location, acting under Paragraph 188, Section 4, recommended, with the consent of our presiding Bishop, that the Annual Conference Board of Trustees take possession of Bond Chapel and the parsonage at Pomona and sell the same to a group of its members. The Conference Trustees will make a further report.

On August 1, with the consent and approval of the Bishop, Crumpton charge was divided. W. H. Revelle, Jr., was appointed pastor at Crumpton. Manuel Barque continued to serve the churches at Union and Double Creek.

The officials of Thomas Chapel on the Marydel charge, after several years of very serious difficulties, voted to close. The quarterly Conference of Marydel affirmed this action, transferring the remaining members to the church of their choice or to Marydel.

Significant District Events

Our District has included in its program opportunities to promote those activities which contribute to the well being of the local churches.

In October we had four Leadership Training Schools at Church Hill, Denton, St. Michaels, and Cambridge. Those schools had a total enrollment of 258, showing a substantial increase over the previous year. During the month of February, designated by our Conference for Missionary Cultivation, we had the Rev. William F. Rogers, missionary to Brazil, with us for a

period of six days. His itinerary, arranged by Rev. William Hemphill, and the Sub-District Secretaries, included fourteen engagements, during which he spoke to approximately 1165 persons. His enthusiasm gave missions a wonderful lift. The Rev. Robert Gilchrist, our Missionary to India, to be supported by the Advance Special gifts, spoke twice in the District, and was very well received. His support from 21 charges of the Easton District is \$922.00. The M. Y. F. District work, Rev. Dale L. Ruth, Director, is an important part of our total youth program. The five Sub-Districts have met with characteristic success. The District Women's Society, under the leadership of Mrs. F. Baynard Harper, held two very fine District-wide Conferences. The Board of Lay Activities, with Horace M. Morgan and the County Association Leaders, planned the Lenten Communion Breakfasts for Men, holding a meeting in each County on five successive Sundays. They had a total attendance of 579. The offering amounted to \$320, which, after expenses were deducted, has been sent to the Board of Child Care.

Some Personal Items

First, the visit of our Bishop and his wife to the District Ministerial Association Meeting, held in Zion Church on Monday, November 30, at which Bishop Oxnam spoke to our ministers and their wives.

It was also a privilege to join with a host of members of the Kennedy-ville Church and friends of Doctor E. J. Bond, when on Sunday, April 4th., following the morning service, that church recognized his completion of fifty years in the ministry at a dinner served in his honor by the Kennedyville Church.

Some Unusual Local Church Achievements

Two new parsonages have been acquired during the year. Christ Church, Chestertown, Rev. W. H. Revelle, Jr., Pastor, this year provided a new parsonage at a cost of \$30,000. The location and appointments of this home are such as to tempt some of you, if I were to amplify, to break the commandment on covetousness. Of course, no pastoral change is contemplated. The Sherwood Church, long feeling the need for a new parsonage, had an opportunity and purchased for \$8000. a very comfortable and desirable home for the pastor of the Bayside charge.

In September of this Conference year, the members of Zion Church, Cambridge, moved into the Educational Unit of their rebuilt church plant. Total costs of this rebuilding were \$350,000. The present indebtedness is less than \$60,000. The difference, save \$110,000. received from insurance, has been raised by the loyal members of this church, led by their popular and hard-working pastor, the Rev. Alton S. Miller.

An event which attracted considerable attention was completed at Grasonville when under the leadership of Rev. James R. Hughes, the two Methodist Churches of that community were moved together, and under the guidance of a competent architect, were united with an additional building. The entire exterior of both the old buildings and the new addition are veneered with brick,—easily the outstanding building of the community, and ville, this achievement ranks among the most significant.

MAY

The Church at Secretary, under the leadership of the Reverned Miss Muriel Smith, long dreaming of adding to their plant, this year made the dream come true; added a wing to their church and then refinished the interior and exterior of the total building. The Chestnut Grove Church on the Concord circuit have done exactly the same, but they have paid the cost in full. Rev. Guy H. McWilliams is the energetic pastor there. Trinity Church, East New Market, Union Church on the Union-Double Creek charge, and St. Paul's Church, Ingleside, have each this year completed the erection of their Educational buildings, and have each raised a substantial amount of the cost.

Many of our churches have made extensive improvements and renovations,—to mention a few: Bozman \$3800; Denton, Grace \$3300; Federalsburg, Christ \$9500; Federalsburg, Union \$6300; Goldsboro \$3000; Greensboro \$4500; Rock Hall \$3000; Vienna \$6000.

Two significant building programs contemplated now on the District are; first, that which is being proposed by the officials of First Church, Chestertown, in the form of an additional Educational unit to cost approximately \$60,000; second, the building program at Church Hill. In connection with the Church Hill project, of interest from Connecticut to Florida at least, and undoubtedly more distant points, have centered around the newspaper publicity of their selling of a church for \$4.00. It is true, that is exactly what they did. The remainder of the story that was not reported is that the estimated cost of removing that church, upon which site they intend to build their new \$63,000 unit, would have been \$1200. Instead of doing this, they sold it for \$4. providing the purchaser would remove it. They are \$1204 ahead. Their plans call for a fine brick colonial church.

Mergers

I am sure the Conference will likewise be glad to know,—first, that under the leadership of the Rev. Hartwell F. Chandler, in Easton, St. Mark's Church has been wonderfully united in spirit. They are concluding a financial campaign in which they have raised in pledges, payable in three years, the sum of \$267,628. in order to provide them with the church unit which their architects have suggested, and which has been approved by the District Board of Church Location, the Quarterly Conference, and the Congregation.

It is a matter of great delight for me to report to this Conference that in St. Michaels the Sardis and Southerland Churches, under the leadership of the pastor, Rev. Elwood W. Cursey, who associated with a group of fine laymen whose vision is not impaired by allegiance to the past, have merged their congregations into the St. Luke's Church. Their Parsonage has been renovated at a cost of \$4000. The Southerland building will be remodeled to be used as a Church House. Methodism in St. Michaels is now one unit. Every phase of their church activity has prospered by virtue of this action, coupled with the spirit of the pastor and the people.

At Hurlock the year has been one of almost daily challenge. This is not the place to review these events. Suffice it to say that the overwhelming

majority of our Methodist people there have insisted that what was agreed upon a year ago would be done. Step by step they have moved toward the objective of a united church. Statistically this year has been one of the finest in the history of Methodism in Hurlock. Our people there are determined to have a great united church.

The Survey

In February of this year, Dr. Roy L. Sturm, Executive Secretary of the Division of Survey and research of the Methodist Church, spent three days in this District. He was here at the invitation of the Conference Board of Missions. He made his report to that body and to the Bishop and Cabinet. Some results of his work will be observed when certain re-alignments of the circuits are announced with the reading of appointments.

World Service and Conference Benevolences

In the matter of Benevolences I am glad to report that out of the 55 charges of this District, 47 have paid their World Service apportionment in full, 42 have paid all apportionments in full. 36 charges of the District contributed \$1460 to the Board of Child Care.

In the matter of the Advance Special, 30 charges have this year contributed a total of \$2679. While we are thinking about Benevolences, it seems to me two charges have done remarkably well, and should be recognized. Crapo has contributed \$150 more to World Service than they were apportioned. Harmony has contributed \$716 to various Advance Specials in which they are interested, \$60 of which is for the Gilchrists.

Evangelism

The final item to be reported is surely the most important. In the area of Evangelism, 51 charges of the Easton District report 895 accessions. Those with 20 or more are as follows: Cambridge, Grace 47; Cambridge, St. Paul's 62; Cambridge, Zion 64; Church Hill 27; Denton, First 35; East New Market 41; Easton, St. Mark's 78; Federalsburg, Union 30; Ingleside 35; Oxford 20; Queenstown 34; Ridgely 29; Sudlersville 28.

First of all, before beginning my report, I have been asked to list for the record in the Minutes the following pastoral adjustments which were made during the year—The Rev. Roy L. Tawes to Peninsula Church, Wilmington; The Rev. Robert E. Green to Avenue Church, Milford; The Rev. Leslie E. Werner to Asbury Church, Crisfield; The Rev. H. Kirby Krams to Brandywine Church, Wilmington; The Rev. Owen Mercer was transferred in from West Virginia Conference and appointed to Marshallton; The Rev. R. H. Collis as an Associate Pastor to Grace Church, Wilmington; The Rev. Arthur S. Walls, a retired member of the Philadelphia Conference to supply the Mt. Salem Church, Wilmington until the end of the Conference year. The Rev. John D. Patterson from the Wampum Methodist Church in the Erie Conference was appointed to serve as Student Supply at Cecilton; Robert G. Hanby, local preacher in McCabe Church supplied Wesley Chapel, DuRoss Heights until November 1 when he was inducted into the armed services. He was followed by T. J. S. Warfield, local preacher in Grace Church, Wilmington until February 1. And it is now being supplied by The Rev. Brooks Reynolds and P. R. Schauer. Dr. T. J. Sard at Bellefonte suffered a stroke early in the year and a number of local preachers supplied the Church for several weeks when The Rev. Ralph H. D. Hughes, local preacher in the Claymont Church, was appointed Supply Pastor for the balance of the Conference year. On the Dover District The Rev. John A. Irwin was appointed as Student Supply at Farmington in place of Dennis Shaffer who accepted a student appointment in the Philadelphia Conference.

This year on the Salisbury District has been marked by a very fine spirit among the churches and achievements along many lines. The devoted leadership of the ministers and the generous response of the lay people have made this possible. I am grateful to report that there have been no deaths in the parsonages of our District this year. And we have had the joy of welcoming two new members into parsonage homes: Janeu Minker, daughter of The Rev. and Mrs. R. L. Minker, Jr., of Fruitland, and Dale Ernest Evans, son of The Rev. and Mrs. Howard Evans of Mount Vernon. Two of our ministers, The Rev. N. C. Clough and The Rev. A. A. Turkington, have had operations on their eyes to remove cataracts and the indications are that their vision has been greatly improved. The Rev. Robert W. Hastings, who has been living with his family in Blades, Delaware, will continue in the retired relation as his doctor's report indicates that he will not be able to resume his work in the pastorate. He has our sincere sympathy and is assured of our help in every way we can.

Membership and Evangelism

We began our work on the Salisbury District this year with laying plans together for a United Evangelistic Mission. The three pastor and three charge plan of evangelism was followed with good results and sustained interest. After the planning sessions on a sub-district basis which were held during the summer, the fall emphasis on evangelism was begun with a "Day Apart." This was for the ministers and their wives, for their own spiritual enrichment as they entered upon this special period of securing new commitments to Christ and bringing new members into the fellowship of the church through visitation and preaching. Because of the impetus given by this evangelistic emphasis during September and October, the total number of new members received this year by profession of faith was 713 and by transfer 375 making a total of 1088 which was 165 more than

is also an important part of the work of evangelism.

last year. Twenty-two of our pastors held church membership training classes for boys and girls and young people during the lenten season, which

Many thanks to all our pastors and their laymen whose concern and consecrated work throughout the year so greatly helped to make this splendid achievement possible.

Methodist Men

In our 14 chartered Methodist Men's groups the membership has increased and the men continue in their interest and support of the work of the Board of Child Care. Three exceptionally well attended Communion breakfasts were held during Lent and the offerings on these occasions went for this most worthy cause. Our Conference Lay Leader, Mr. Granville Hooper, and our District Lay Leader, Mr. A. L. Fleming, deserve special mention for their devoted service to the church and for their leadership contribution to the Layman's work of our churches on the Salisbury District. One of the very profitable things which was done this year to increase understanding of the Methodist's Men's Work was to include in the Leadership Training School in Wicomico County a course on Laymen's Work in the Local Church. New Methodist Men's Groups were organized in the following churches during the year-Bethesda Church, Salisbury: Pocomoke: Salem; and one is planned in Pocomoke: Bethany in the near future. This brings the number up to 16 and we hope to be abreast of our goal of 21 by next Conference time as set by the General Board of Lay Activities.

Christian Leadership

The Committee on Leadership Education, again this year, planned four Christian Worker's Training Schools in order to be within reach of the largest number of people. These were held in Asbury Church, Crisfield; Antioch Church, Princess Anne; Grace Church, Salisbury; and Stevenson Church, Berlin. Extremely bad weather interfered with the attendance in these schools since several snowy nights made travel very difficult. But in spite of this the well-qualified teachers and those who braved the stormy weather had a very profitable time together. Twenty-five churches reported 1788 children enrolled in Vacation Church School. And an increase of approximately 200 is reported in attendance at the evening session of the Methodist Youth Fellowship.

The District M. Y. F. program has been carried on this year under the leadership of The Rev. Otho G. Brewer, Jr., The Rev. Willard L. Stevens, The Rev. D. O. Hornung, and The Rev. Clarence Fox. The meetings have

been unusually well attended and the programs each month were built around the new program areas of our Methodist Youth Work. These monthly explanations and demonstrations of the available resources for meeting the religious needs of our young people have played a definite part in bringing about the increase noted in the total membership of our M. Y. F. groups on the District. And many thanks are due the pastors on the District, together with the faithful officers and adult counsellors in our local Methodist Youth Fellowships, for the progress made this year.

We wish to express sincere appreciation to The Rev. F. Douglas Milbury for his leadership and for his notably fine spirit as he goes about our Conference and District in our churches and church schools in the interests of the Christian education of our children and youth and adults.

The Woman's Society of Christian Service

The Woman's Society of Christian Service continues to render exceedingly vital service not only to the missionary program of the General Board of Missions through the Woman's Division of Christian Service, but also to the life and work of the local church as well. Last Conference year, for example, the total amount reported as contributed by the Woman's Societies to local church work was approximately four times the amount reported as sent by them to their District Treasurer for their missionary work. In any evaluation of the work of the Woman's Society it should be remembered and gratefully appreciated that in many of our smaller churches the W. S. C. S. is responsible for their very ongoing. The District Woman's Society of Christian Service under the leadership of its President, Mrs. W. Frank Daugherty of Immanuel Church, Crisfield, has helped to strengthen the work and increase the vision of the churches on the District, generally, by its strong District W. S. C. S. meetings and its annual officers' training Day.

Ministerial Support

The following charges have increased their pastoral support since last Conference: Berlin \$400; Crisfield: Mt. Pleasant \$200; Deal Island \$200 plus \$300 Expense; Delmar: First \$200 Expense; Delmar: Mt. Olive \$200; Fruitland \$200; Galestown \$375; Hebron: Nelson \$120; Hebron: St. Paul's \$100; Mardela \$200; Mt. Hermon \$275 plus \$300 Expense; Nanticoke 100 plus 200 Expense not previously reported; Ocean City \$250; Parsonsburg \$200 plus \$200 Expense; Pittsville: Ayers \$100 Expense; Pokomoke: Bethany \$300 Expense not previously reported; Pocomoke: Salem \$100 plus \$400 for utilities; Princess Anne \$250; Salisbury: Grace \$500 including the \$300 previously paid on Expense converted into salary; Salisbury: St. Andrew's \$250 Expense; Salisbury: Trinity \$300; Sharptown: Asbury \$100; St. Martin's \$375; Whaleyville \$200 plus \$400 expense; making a total of \$7295 in increased ministerial support through the coming Conference year.

World Service, The Advance, and Other Giving

I am very happy to report that the churches on the Salisbury District have contributed this year a total of \$37,242 to World Service and Conference Benevolences. This is \$831.00 more than the total last year. The

amount contributed to the Continuing Advance for Christ and His Church as reported to me was \$8,047 which is approximately the same as last year. The churches of the District have contributed more than \$7,000 to the support of Wesley Junior College. And the Week of Dedication Offering was \$1,728 which is \$112 more than last year. This year with all but two reporting, the charges of the District gave a total of \$3720 to the support of some 14 boys and girls from our Conference territory who are being cared for in the Strawbridge Home for Boys and the Kelso Home for Girls. On behalf of our Conference and District, I wish to take this opportunity to express sincere appreciation to every pastor and layman who has had a share in this needy cause.

At the Area Cabinet Meeting held by Bishop Oxnam on October 2 in Washington, Dr. Eugene L. Smith, Executive Secretary of the Division of World Missions of our Church, and Dr. Ernest Tuck, in charge of The Advance in the Division of World Missions, both addressed the District Superintendents on the World Missionary Program of our Church. And, as I understood it, they told us that our Church through its Division of World Missions, needed to carry out its missionary commitments and responsibilities abroad, about as many additional missionary families as there are Annual Conferences in the United States. They asked if our Conference might find it possible to take on the support of one of the needed additional missionary families to help meet this need. This would be an additional Advance Special. When the matter was presented to our Conference Advance Committee it was felt that the churches of our Conference would want to do this. Consequently, Mr. and Mrs. Robert Gilchrist and their little boy Bruce, 2½ years old, were assigned to our Conference. They spent the first week in February meeting people and speaking in each of our Districts before going out as our missionaries to India. They are now stationed at Missourie, India where he is to teach young people in the Woodstock School which is located there.

The churches on the Salisbury District who have responded so very encouragingly and commendably are happy to include the support of the Gilchrists in their Advance giving, along with our continuing projects in Puerto Rico and the splendid work of our own Louis and Madelyn Dennis on the Island of Borneo in Southeast Asia.

Much credit and appreciation go to our Conference Missionary Secretary, The Rev. William O. Hackett, and our District Missionary Secretary, The Rev. Willard L. Stevens, for the sustained interest and response of our churches in World Service and Advance giving. The course on Missionary Education in The Local Church taught by W. O. Hackett in the Salisbury Christian Workers' Training School was especially well received.

All but three of the charges on the District have met their World Service asking in full again this year. We hope that next year all of our charges may have the joy and satisfaction and spiritual benefit which in the nature of things come from thus sharing in this larger way in the world-wide missionary program of our Church.

Local Church Building and Improvements

Reports in my hands indicate that \$27,665 was paid on old indebtedness on our local churches and \$127,569 was expended on local church

building and improvements. The totals for the Charges participating in these achievements are: Bishopville-Wilson Church \$22,708 on a much needed renovation of their church building into one of the most worshipful little sanctuaries in our Conference; Crisfield: Immanuel \$4,850; Crisfield: Mariners \$1,021; Crisfield: Mt. Pleasant \$1,500; Deal Island \$5,820; Delmar: First \$1,650; Fairmount \$4,300; Fruitland \$3,091; Galestown \$3,643; Hebron: Nelson \$2,715; Hebron: St. Paul's \$2,035; Mardela \$4,650; Mt. Hermon \$2,520; Mt. Vernon \$1,388; Newark, Maryland \$1,080; Ocean City \$2,267; Oriole: St. Peter's \$900; Pittsville: Ayers \$4,752; Pocomoke; Bethany \$4,550; Pocomoke: Salem \$8,700; Powellville \$5,536; Princess Anne \$4,034; Quantico \$2,878; Salisbury: Asbury \$1,208; Salisbury: Grace \$11,725; Salisbury: St. Andrew's \$2,747; Salisbury: Trinity \$4,345; Sharptown: Asbury \$1,500; Sharptown: Mt. To me this is concrete evidence of the deeply imbedded spiritual principle set forth in the old proverb—"Help thy neighbor's boat across and lo, thine own hath reached the shore." To the degree to which a church really tries to meet its world-wide missionary responsibilities beyond the local community to that degree does it receive the money required to met its local church needs. As one pastor wrote on the back of his report—"The more people give to the church the more they become interested." And one might add—the deeper sense of satisfaction and well-being they have.

Appreciation and Gratitude

Bishop Oxnam is a constant inspiration and challenge to all of us to high and noble Christian living and to more efficient work in the service of the Lord Jesus Christ and His Church. I shall always remember his telling us in the 1952 District Conferences of the University of Southern California Professor's advice to him as he was about to leave California for the theological school in which he indicated three characteristics of a successful pastor. They were—"Scholarship and no mannerisms." Then a few days later this old professor came to the depot just before the train for the East arrived and added one more word—"Sympathy." The young theological student, now one of the most distinguished bishops in the Christian Church, exemplifies to a superb degree all three of these characteristics. All the world knows of his scholarship and his simple manner of address. And we who are closely associated with him in the Cabinet can testify especially of his great sympathy, which always includes understanding.

It has been a source of real joy and satisfaction to have been privileged to serve another year with him, with my colleagues in the Cabinet, and with my other brethren and their families in the ministry of our Church.

In conclusion, let me say a sincere "Thank you and God bless you" to these and to the host of Christian laymen and lay women in the Churches of the Salisbury District whose friendship and cooperation and generous response and fine Christian spirit have made possible the splendid achievements of the Conference year which now belongs to history.

Long centuries ago, the patriarch Job declared, "My days are swifter than a weaver's shuttle." Equally as swift has been the passing of the days during my first year as a superintendent. The year's record may be summed up in six words: Changes. Conversions. Contributions. Cultivation. Construction. Courtesies.

Changes Changes

Dr. Jackson has already noted ad interim changes in seven pastorates of the Wilmington District since the adjournment of the preceding Annual Conference. To four of these pastorates came ministers from our own Conference. Three came to us from other Conferences: The Rev. Arthur S. Walls, D.D., a retired minister from the Philadelphia Conference. The Rev. Owen W. Mercer from the West Virginia Conference. The Rev. John D. Patterson from the Erie Conference. All have done effective work and have been appreciated by the people to whom they have ministered.

The Conference year had scarcely begun when the Rev. T. J. Sard, pastor of Bellefonte Church, became physically incapacitated. Loyal laymen of the district supplied the Bellefonte pulpit acceptably for months until it became apparent that its pastor would not be able to resume his work. The Rev. Ralph H. D. Hughes, an Approved Supply and a member of Atonement Church, Claymont, accepted the responsibility of a part-time, supply-pastor relationship and has done much to conserve the constructive work Brother Sard had started.

One retired minister and four ministers' wives were translated from the Church Militant to the Church Triumphant: The Rev. W. A. Wise, D.D., Mrs. W. E. Greenfield, Mrs. M. E. Hungerford, Mrs. R. K. Stephenson, and Mrs. O. B. Walton. Appropriate memoirs have been prepared by selected members of this Annual Conference.

Wedding bells rang out in two of the charges of the district as the Rev. and Mrs. Arthur H. Hastings, and the Rev. and Mrs. Richard C. Staszesky were united in holy matrimony.

New babies blessed four parsonages of the district during the year. A son was born to the Rev. and Mrs. Ralph E. Hughes and a son to the Rev. and Mrs. Walter B. Martin. A daughter was born to the Rev. and Mrs. Willard L. Robinson, Jr., and a daughter to the Rev. and Mrs. Ronald Seibert.

Conversions

Someone has defined Evangelism as "producing spiritual children for the family of God."

Last Autumn, the Wilmington District gave itself whole-heartedly to the "United Evangelistic Movement". Under the leadership of the Rev. Brooks E. Reynolds, Conference Secretary of Evangelism, and the Rev. Paul E. McCoy, District Secretary of Evangelism, a carefully planned program of combined Visitation Evangelism and Preaching Mission supplied much of the inspiration for the increased number of conversions and accessions reported from the district this year.

Last year the total number of accessions was 1,670. This year, 2,502, an increase of 832, or 50 per cent. Especially encouraging is the fact that conversions out-numbered transfers. 1080 persons were received this year by letters of transfer or recommendation. 1,422 were received on profession of faith or from instruction classes.

Contributions

Practically every charge will report that the World Service Acceptances have been paid in full. Several charges failed to accept the total askings but other charges have exceeded the amounts asked of them so that the total reported paid for World Service will exceed the total askings.

General Advance Specials from the district last year amounted to \$7,552. This year the reports indicate \$8,165 in Advance Specials, an increase of \$613.

While many of the charges made their first contributions to "The Gilchrist Fund" this year, a number of other charges placed generous amounts in their budgets for next year. The Wilmington District will far exceed its proportionate share for this worthy project during the quadrennium.

"Week of Dedication" offerings were reported to the amount of \$1,741., an increase of \$211.

The "Methodist Youth Fund" contributions reported amounted to \$1,202., an increase of \$204.

The Board of Child Care received \$2,808 from the district, an increase of \$78.

Increased Ministerial Support to the extent of \$15,040 has been reported for next year. Ten charges have added \$2,250 To Expense Accounts. Thirty-four charges have added increases to pastor's cash salaries totaling \$12,790 as follows:

Cultivation

The District Woman's Society of Christian Service has continued to cultivate the field of women's work with marked consecration, enthusiasm, intelligence and resourcefulness. Educationally, financially and spiritually, the impact of its program has been felt on every charge.

The Reverend Charles S. Clarkson, District Secretary of Missionary Cultivation, has supplemented the missionary emphases of the Woman's Society of Christian Service with equal zeal and success.

Educational cultivation continues with increasing effectiveness. Church School Enrollment and Attendance Reports show a marked increase. Fortyfour Daily Vacation Bible Schools were held in the district last summer with an enrollment of 4,543.

The Leadership Training Schools for Christian Workers were held—one at Port Deposit for the churches of Cecil County. One at Grace Church, Wilmington for the churches of New Castle County. The two schools had a combined enrollment of 317, a decided increase over the enrollment of the previous year.

There are 18 chartered Methodist Men's Groups in the district. Several more will soon be chartered. A number of other churches have men's groups actively functioning under other names. The Chartered Methodist Men's Groups reported 1.005 members.

The Monthly Inspirational Breakfast of the District Lay Leaders, the Charge Lay Leaders and other interested laymen in the Hunt Room of the Hotel duPont is increasingly building up a body of spiritually-sensitive and functionally-cooperative laymen in our district.

Twenty-three charges have Methodist Young Adult Fellowships with reported memberships of 877.

Forty-three charges report Methodist Youth Fellowships with a membership of 1,174.

Another significant medium of cultivation has been the telecast, "The Circuit Rider", which was broadcast for twenty-six weeks over Station WDEL-TV through the services and support of the Reverends George H. Pigueron, Jr., Gerald A. Foster, Mr. Floyd W. Woodcock, and many others. Using guest speakers, brief interviews, short dramas, and inspirational music, it is reported by the manager of the Station, WDEL-TV to have reached more than 85,000 people each Friday evening.

Construction

To help liquidate indebtedness incurred in the past for construction, or re-modeling of Church Buildings, Educational Buildings and Parsonages, twenty-nine charges paid on debts \$152,344, an increase of \$39,608 over the preceding year. Charges paying \$1,000 or more on debt during this past year are:

Opportunities for expansion of existing Church buildings and programs, and instituting new projects, are opening up all over our district. The sale of the Kingswood Church Building to the Kingswood Community Center last month has made possible the securing of a lot, and the purchasing of a parsonage, for a new Kingswood Church in the Brookside Community near Newark. The residue of the money will be applied to the erection of the first unit in this new development to which a pastor will be appointed at this session of the Annual Conference.

The Wilmington Manor Church is in the midst of a financial campaign preliminary to moving to a ten-acre site nearby where there will be abundant room for every activity that should characterize a modern church.

Because of the imperative need for more money to purchase sites for future churches, to assist weak churches in growing communities, to aid in the construction of churches in strategic centers, and to provide a revolving fund for short-term loans in building projects, the Wilmington District Church Extension Society was recently organized with the pastor and lay leader of each charge, together with key district officials, as the Board of Directors. A first-year goal of 1,500 sustaining members at \$10. per year per member has been projected. The Society is now being incorporated. The campaign for sustaining members will be conducted in the district during the next few months.

Courtesies.

I am sincerely grateful to our Bishop, G. Bromley Oxnam, for this challenging opportunity in difficult service which he opened to me a year ago. I accepted it reluctantly because I love the pastorate. I have taken literally Bishop Oxnam's statement that he desired me to be a pastor to his pastors. I have tried to live close to the pastors and churches. I have tried to recognize emerging needs, and problems, and be prepared for them. I have tried to interpret pastors to charges, and charges to pastors, and with good results. The pastors of the district have given me many indications of respect and confidence. The charges have done likewise.

Mrs. Harry A. Menser, president of the District Woman's Society of Christian Service, and Mr. Clinton H. Brown, District Lay Leader, have been invaluable in their ever-ready response to requests for co-operation in district projects, and their helpful counsel. Messrs, T. Blair Ely and Clinton H. Brown, active members of the District Parsonage Committee, Mr. Otis F. Figgs, Chairman of the Conference Commission on World Service and Finance, and Mr. John F. Kelso, Annual Conference Treasurer, have been exceedingly co-operative in the necessary renovation and re-furnishing of the District Parsonage.

Mrs. Link and I deeply appreciate the innumerable courtesies extended us in every part of the district throughout the year.

The fellowship in the Cabinet has been a rich one. Each superintendent has been considerate and a splendid esprit de corps has been maintained.

Indications of respect from civic and spiritual leaders of our city in the several denominational and inter-denominational groups have caused me to believe that they have recognized my goal for Methodism in the Wilmington District: dignified spiritual vitality.

(b) Boards, Commissions and Committees

REPORT OF THE CONFERENCE ADVANCE COMMITTEE

This committee met on November 3, 1953 in Wesley Church, Dover to study its responsibilities for the quadrennium. The Reverend Dr. Ernest E. Tuck, Advance Director for the Division of World Missions was present and stressed the importance of Advance Special gifts. Dr. Tuck pointed out that the Division of World Missions depends for about one half of its income on Advance money. The level of Advance giving must therefore be maintained and if possible increased. The alternative is for the Church to retreat in the face of challenging opportunities.

Information received from the Reverend Dr. Benjamin F. Allgood, Advance Director for the Division of National Missions further underscored the dependence of The Methodist Church upon Advance Specials. A brochure prepared in his office said in part, "World Service is not enough. Methodist Missions must have substantial support over and above acceptance and payment in full of World Service. . . . World Service maintains, and that is basic, but Advance Specials go the "Second Mile." They provide the way for winning America and the world for Christ. Simply to hold what we have, to maintain our present program is not enough. We must advance, or Methodism, like all living things that cease growing, will perish."

The committee gave careful study to the Advance gifts of our Conference during the last quadrennium and passed the following motion: "That this Advance Committee recommend to the Conference Board of Missions that the Peninsula Conference assume the support of the recurring items in World Missions and National Missions plus the Methodist Committee for Overseas Relief to the same extent as previously supported and that we agree to support a new missionary couple over and above what we have done in the past."

The Conference Board of Missions approved this recommendation and the Division of World Missions assigned us Mr. and Mrs. Robert S. Gilchrist as our new missionary couple for the quadrennium.

The Gilcrist family sailed in February for India. Many persons in the Conference had opportunity to meet Mr. Gilchrist when he visited Churches in our four Districts. They may be assured of our genuine interest in their labors and of our loyal support.

The Advance Committee urges every Church to meet its World Service apportionment in full and then to go the "Second Mile" and contribute through Advance Specials to support all the recurring items in World and National Missions begun by our Conference, The Methodist Committee for Overseas Relief, and the Robert Gilchrist family in India.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON CHAPLAINS

The Committee on Relationship to Chaplains was created at the 1952 Annual Conference as the result of a resolution offered by Chaplain Albert M. B. Snapp, who is now serving in Japan. The Committee was enlarged in 1953 at its own request in order to meet the growing needs of closer relationship between the Church and its ministers in uniform.

On September 10, 1954, your Committee held a Conference on Chaplain Relations at Wesley Church, Dover. A panel composed of Chaplain Charles I. Carpenter, Chief of Chaplains, U. S. Air Force; Dr. Sherwood Gates, Chief of Community Services of the U. S. Air Force; and Rev. Fred Heather, of the Methodist Commission on Chaplains, discussed the subject "The Responsibility of the Church toward the Man and Woman in Service." Three phases of responsibility were discussed:

- 1. The Church's Responsibility to Methodists on Military Installations.
- 2. The Church's Responsibility to Methodist Youth from the Peninsula Conference who enter Military Service.
 - 3. The Church's Responsibility to Ministers of the Conference who are in the Chaplaincy.

As a direct result of this meeting, plans have been made to set up a program within our own Conference to minister to Servicemen at Military Installations. It is hoped that a capable director of such a significant venture will be found by the beginning of the new Conference Year. The Committee appreciates the enthusiastic cooperation of our Biship, the District Superintendents, the Conference Board of Missions, and the Methodist Commission on Chaplains in inaugurating this work.

Recommendation:—The Committee on Chaplains recommends that the Committee on Nominations of the Peninsula Conference include men who are serving as Chaplains with the Armed Forces on the several Committees of the Conference.

Your Committee has kept in contact with our Chaplains during the year and has sought to make them feel our genuine interest in their ministry. Many of our Pastors have shared with the Committee their programs of serving local youth who are in the Military Service.

REPORT TO THE PENINSULA ANNUAL CONFERENCE

FROM THE BOARD OF CHILD CARE

May, 1954

Since June 1, 1953, the Peninsula Conference has been officially a part of the total Child Care Program serving both the Baltimore and Peninsula Conferences. At the last session of your Annual Conference you

nominated the following people to be the nine representatives out of 37 members of the Board of Child Care; namely, Mrs. Clinton H. Brown, Rev. J. Earl Cummings, Mrs. Granville Hooper, Mrs. C. A. Schuler, Dr. Russell P. Smith, Jr., Rev. George E. Sterling, Mrs. Earle Sylvester, Rev. J. W. Townsend, Rev. J. J. VonHagel. Your official delegates have represented you well in attending the meetings of the Board and in service on various committees in the program. This Board holds four meetings a year, one of which was held at Denton, Maryland, where we were entertained by the good ladies of the First Methodist Church, and which meeting was very well attended.

Other ministers and laymen of your Conference have served in the capacity of Advisory Members; namely, Mr. Francis W. Baker, Mrs. Wilmer Fell Davis, Mr. T. Earl Ewing, Rev. Essell P. Thomas, and the four District Superintendents of the Peninsula Conference, O. A. Bartley, Arthur J. Jackson, John N. Link and Preston W. Spence.

The program of Child Care has been undoubtedly strengthened and enriched by the broadening of the base of our official organization.

Ever since the founding of The Strawbridge Home for Boys, the Peninsula Conference has been officially represented on that Board of Trustees. However, there has never been any membership on the official body of The Kelso Home for Girls or the former Board of Child Care. By agreement between The Kelso Home for Girls and The Strawbridge Home for Boys and the Board of Child Care, all of these former Boards merged into one. This was an administrative merger. By this is meant that the policies and programs of The Kelso and Strawbridge Homes, along with foster homes and adoption work, are created and supervised under the direction of a single Board of Child Care, with the Executive Director of that Board in charge of complete operations. So now, instead of having four Boards with a responsibility for the carrying out of good services to children, there is just the one Board, totaling 37 persons, the Bishop of the two Conferences being one of this number. Thus, the Peninsula Conference is one-fourth of the total Board. There is one office to which all children are referred for care. There is a single budget, with one Treasurer, to whom all bills go, and who receives all contributions. This organization makes possible. (1) A unified policy and program; (2) a single origin of appeals for funds; and (3) a central authority and management. This new plan has been eminently satisfactory in its operation during the first year of its history. (1) There is a steady increase in understanding of the function of the agency. (2) It has been possible also to effect some economies by a central supervision of expenditures. (3) The channels of authority, administration and service are much clearer in the minds of the people working in each of these areas.

The increased interest of the membership of the churches of the Peninsula Conference is evidenced by the steady increase in giving to the Child Care Program. The amount this year was \$11,479.72.

Too much emphasis cannot be placed upon the commendation of the efforts of the Laymen's organization in this Conference. For two years now this Child Care Program has been especially their project. The Conference Lay Leader and the District Lay Leaders have given excellent

direction in enlisting support from many people throughout the Conference. The first big stride forward was the \$4,359.00 for 1953 as over 1952. The Board desires, also, to express its sincere and deep appreciation for the promotion of this cause by the ministers in the many churches throughout the Conference. An increasing number of charges are observing Christmas time as Child Care Offering time. The objective that has been in the minds of the leaders of this Conference has been to supply to the Board of Child Care as a minimum amount, enough money per year to pay the cost of maintaining the children from this Conference. Of course, this may vary from year to year. The doors are always open and new applications would naturally be received.

One way to visualize the extent of the service is to look at the fact that ten boys lived at The Strawbridge Home at some time during the past Conference year, and that the total capacity of Strawbridge Home is 37 boys. We have more demand for the care of boys than girls. Strawbridge has been filled to capacity for some time now. The population in Kelso this past year was the lowest it has been from this area, there being but one girl, she having been resident in the Home for 6½ years. No one can prophesy what another year will bring forth. There could be a total of ten girls. Again, we emphasize that the door is open and the Peninsula Conference has a resource to use. Your financial support helps to keep it open to meet your needs. The Board of Child Care is the official child caring agency for the Peninsula Conference.

We earnestly urge all groups of the churches of the Peninsula Conference to visit these two Homes of ours—Kelso, at Towson, Maryland; Strawbridge, at Sykesville, Maryland—as well as the offices of the Board of Child Care, located at 516 N. Charles Street, Baltimore 1, Maryland. Any minister, layman or group of any church is welcome at any time. One meeting of the Board of Child Care each year is held in each one of these respective Homes. Your Board and Advisory Members thus get an opportunity to make an official visit.

The Executive Director, members of the staff, and Board members are available to present to your congregation and groups within the church the story of Child Care, either at a Sunday service or a week day meeting. Thus, first hand information of the needs of children, and what is being done by the Church to meet those needs, can be brought directly to your people. We shall be glad to mail our quarterly paper regularly to any and all of your membership. Send us names and addresses.

On behalf of the homeless boys and girls of all sections of our two Conferences, we wish to express our sincere appreciation to the District Superintendents, the pastors, the Conference Lay Leaders and local church laymen and laywomen for their whole-hearted cooperation and assistance in this labor of love for His little ones.

Report of The President

In presenting my fourth annual report as President of The Board of Conference Claimants I shall follow the pattern of previous statements in offering a summary of assets in all funds. The figures used in this report are from the report of Coe, Campbell and Lukens, auditors, and cover the period for twelve months ending April 30, 1953. The report is signed by Mr. Paul Lukens who states that all mortgages, stocks and bonds held by the Endowment Fund were examined and the income therefrom accounted for.

The statement of condition shows that as of April 30, 1953 our total assets were valued at \$716,606.20. Investments were listed at market value and were held as follows:

During the period we received principal payments on mortages amounting to \$151,215.79 and reinvested \$150,800.00 of this amount. (Details of our investment policy were set forth in my report to the annual conference of 1951). Contributions to the Endowment Fund amounted to \$3,662.50. We received \$4,025.00 from the sale of real estate and stock rights, and the sum of \$1,000.00 from The Rev. John J. Bunting in the form of an annuity bond.

Last December, your Chairman, the Secretary and the Treasurer of your Board attended a Pension Study Conference for officers and representatives of the Northeastern Jurisdiction. While there, we discussed many of our own problems with Dr. Charles L. Calkins, Executive Secretary of The Board of Pensions of The Methodist Church. One such problem had to do with inequalities arising from General Conference legislation which changed or nullified agreements made by the Distributing Committee of Conference Claimant Funds, at the time of church union. On April 15, 1954, I received a letter from Dr. Calkins in which he stated "In accordance with our under-

standing at Albany, N. Y., we are making an appropriation of \$10,000.00 to help offset the adverse experience of the Peninsula Annual Conference resulting from the 1952 General Conference legislation extending the Clearinghouse universally across all Annual Conferences." A check in the amount of ten thousand dollars was received and by order of our Board was placed in the permanent Endowment Fund of The Board of Conference Claimants. We desire that the Conference shall express its appreciation to The Board of Pensions, and to Dr. Calkins for their understanding and help.

I have been directed by The Board to report to the Conference its decision to place all funds in excess of \$15,000.00, which may remain in hand at the end of any conference year, in the permanent Endowment Fund of the Board of Conference Claimants.

The last section of my report always brings me great personal pleasure for it is my duty to recommend to the conference the annuity rate for the ensuing year. Each year during my administration, I have been privileged to recommend an increase in the rate over the previous year. By action of the Annual Conference of 1953, the annuity rate for the year now ending was set at \$40.00 and indicated an increase of \$2.00 over the previous year. On the basis of reports received from the conference treasurer and the treasurer of the Board of Conference Claimants, it appears that increased income from apportionments will make it possible for us to increase the rate in the amount of \$4.00 for the year now beginning. Therefore, I am directed to say to the conference that it is the unanimous recommendation of the Board of Conference Claimants that the annuity rate for the year 1954-55 be set at \$44.00, and that the necessitous fund be continued in the amount of \$5,000.00.

CHRISTIAN VOCATIONS

One of the most important responsibilities of the Commission on Christian Vocations is the recruiting of young people for Church-related Vocations. It is our purpose to keep before our people, youth and adults alike the need for ministers, missionaries, nurses, and social workers. However, we have avoided recruitment drives. It is not the "shot-in-the-arm" technique that yields the best results in the long run, but the steady, constant, thoughtful effort that is part of the church's program.

The Annual Conference Commission on Christian Vocations also has the responsibility of standing by every young person within the Annual Conference who has expressed an interest in full-time church work, from the time of his first decision until he has found his field of service within the church, or until such time as the young person has become the responsibility of one of the other agencies of the church. This may involve a sustained personal contact over a four or five year period.

We have tried to meet our responsibilities by holding Vocational Conferences. The purpose of the Vocational Conference was for guidance rather

than recruitment. This year we did not hold a Vocational Conference because the subject of the Fall Youth Rally was Vocations.

We did hold a Conference on the Ministry, on April 26th, at Wesley Methodist Church, Dover, Delaware. The ministers of the Conference brought the young men from their churches who are planning to enter the ministry and also the young men who appeared to be good material for the ministry. A challenge of the Christian ministry was given them by Rev. Jameson Jones, Editor of Concern.

The Commission on Christian Vocation gets its financial support from each of the Boards of the Conference. We are grateful to them for their backing.

CONFERENCE DEACONESS BOARD

The Conference Deaconess Board organized in the fall of 1953. The full Board met in February of 1954 with Mrs. Eula Chandler, Superintendent of the Deaconess Association of New York City as guest. The Rev. Brooks Reynolds, Chairman of the Conference Deaconess Board presided.

The Board was organized and officers elected, and the following recommendations were made:

- 1. That a training school for older girls be held at the Deaconess Home, one week during the summer. The purpose of such a week to introduce girls to the work of the Deaconess and to enlist their aid in the recruitment of new Deaconesses.
- 2. That salaries of the Deaconesses in Peninsula Conference be reviewed with the idea of raising them in keeping with present salary trends. (Deaconesses under the W. S. C. S. of the Conference have already received such a raise.)
- 3. That the film, "Action in Service", obtainable from Mrs. Henry Wonders, Conference Secretary of Missionary Personnel, be used in local, district and conference youth meetings.

Miss Louise Whisitt, Deaconess, is engaged in Parish Work at Scott and Wilmington Manor Churches. She reports an extremely full and busy schedule.

Deaconesses Genevieve C. Poppe and May I. Greer work in the W. S. C. S. Conference Projects, the Riddle Memorial Deaconess Home Settlement and the Mary Todd Gambrill Neighborhood House; Miss Poppe as Director and Group Worker, Miss Greer as Nursery Worker. In these two projects the Deaconesses and Staff serve some 400 childen between the ages of 3½ and 18 years. The average monthly attendance equals approximately 1500. Here children find Christian leadership, love, and understanding to help and guide them in the midst of insecurity and troubled times.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF EDUCATION OF THE PENINSULA CONFERENCE

The Board of Education of the Peninsula Conference has striven diligently to discharge the responsibility placed upon it by the Annual Conference. The Board is a policy making and governing body which functions through the Executive Secretary and his Staff and through the Committees of the Board. Two scheduled meetings were held, at which the entire Board was present and four meetings were held by the Executive Committee.

The financial policy established by the Board of Education in 1953 had been strictly adhered to. This has resulted in a financial system which is working well. The Camp indebtedness has been steadily reduced and monies have been available as needed for operation of the program.

The appropriation of three thousand dollars by the Conference last year for the Board of Education Office made possible the construction of a two room office attached to the home of the Executive Secretary. This has been a happy solution to our need for an office space and will serve the needs of the Board of Education for years to come.

CONFERENCE PROGRAM under direction of the Executive Secretary. The Board of Education of any Annual Conference is confronted with a great task. Education is necessary for every Church, Church School, Organization, and all people. Any improvement we try to make involves a certain use of education. So the role of the Board of Education assistance covers the entire span of peoples lives. Its area of responsibility includes Children's Work, Youth Work, Adult Work, Christian Workers' Schools, Assistance in the field of Materials, and work in the area of Family Life. It is very obvious that the Executive Secretary can not do such a task alone. It has been the good fortune in our Conference that we have had many good conscientious, volunteer workers who have assisted in the carrying out of this enormous and essential work.

There is no doubt but that work with the children is most important and needed. Here is a report from our Director of Children's work, Miss Annie Howie.

We would report the following as our accomplishments during the year.

- In April 1953, we held a Vacation School Workshop in each District with a total of 155 in attendance, many prepared to hold their first Vacation Church School. Reports gave 7019 enrolled in these Schools.
- In March, we published 350 copies of our Annual Children's Workers bulletin.
- Four weeks of Junior Camp, staffed by volunteer workers, with 423 juniors attending and learning how happy a Christian boy or girl can be.
- 4. In August, three of our workers attended the Workshop for Conference & District Directors at Lake Junaluska, North Carolina.
- 5. October 2-3rd, Conference Council of Children's Workers met at Camp Pecometh for inspiration, reports from Lake Junaluska, and planning for the year.

- 6. January 9, 1954, the Council met at the home of the Executive Secretary to complete plans made at the October meeting for the activities of the Spring and Summer.
- 7. Courses for local Church workers with Children were held in several of our Leadership Schools. Miss Mary White taught a primary course in Trinity Church, Wilmington. Mrs. Roy Vernon taught in the Berlin School. Mrs. Albert Matthews taught in the Easton District and the Conference Director taught in the Crisfield, Md. School.
- There were District council meetings held in the Easton, Salisbury, and Wilmington districts.
- 9. Two Pre-Easter Workshops were conducted on Salisbury District in March by the District Director; one in Crisfield and one in Salisbury.
- World Day of Prayer service for children was conducted in several churches in connection with their additional Sessions the first Friday in Lent.

Future Plans

- 1. Vacation School Workshops April 27-30th in each of the four Districts.
- 2. Closer cooperation with Youth and Adult Divisions of the Conference.
- 3. Complete slate of District and Subdistrict workers for this year.
- 4. One course for workers with Children in each Leadership School.
- 5. June 11-12th, at Camp Pecometh, an institute for District and Subdistrict workers to face our program for the next year.
- 6. July and August, four weeks of Junior Camp.
- Sept. 10-11th, in Dover, Wesley Methodist Church, and Wesley Junior College, an Observation School for training District teams of Workers.

Youth Work

The need for real work in this field has led the Council of Bishops to ask our churches to make this one of our major emphases for this Quadrennium. There is so much to be done in this field and every church has a stake in it. Our Conference Youth Director, Howell Wilkins reports;

This year in our Conference there have been two emphases. The first has been the training of more adult leaders in a better way. There was one meeting of our entire staff, and five received special training at Regional centers. In this training we are constantly stressing that the Subdistrict is a grouping of churches to provide a wider fellowship, provide experiences that can be done better than in the local church, and basically to help one another meet their problems. The second is that new projects are being done in cooperation with other Conference agencies. The weekend Christian Witness Mission for youth is being set up for next Fall in cooperation with the Board of Evangelism. There will be a Conference on the Ministry late in April. We assisted the Commission on Christian Vocations in this. Rev. Jamison Jones is our guest speaker.

Here are some of our Youth Activities:

- 1. Youth Layman's Day at Conference.
- A Sharing and Planning meeting of the members of the old and new Youth Councils at Camp Pecometh.
- 3. Work Camp Weekend at Camp.
- 4. Two weeks of Senior Camp.
- 5. Four weeks of Intermediate Camp.
- 6. Five adults and four Youth attended the Regional Training Conference at Lycoming College in June, 1953.
- Fall staff meeting for Youth Conference, District, Subdistrict Directors and the Youth presidents for sharing plans and mapping a program for the Conference.
- Ninth Annual Fall Youth Rally held at Laurel, Delaware with 221 in attendance.
- Christian Witness Mission for Youth held at Wilmington Manor Methodist Church in September.
- Rev. Joseph Bell from Nashville, Tenn. addressed the two sessions of our District Conferences in November on the Youth Emphasis of our Church.
- 11. Youth Courses were given in many of our Leadership Training Schools.

Leadership Education

Leadership Education in the Conference has been given new life in several of our Districts by being increased in numbers so that the School becomes closer to larger numbers of local Church leaders and workers. Dover District had six Schools this year. Two of these happened to strike bad weather so their attendance was cut considerably. The number attending on this District was 402. Salisbury had four Schools during the two weeks of bad weather so its attendance was cut drastically. Salisbury District had 333 in attendance. Wilmington District had a decided increase over last year in the number attending Leadership Schools. This District had 319 enrolled. The Easton District tried holding four Schools this year and had almost one hundred increase in attendance. Easton had 255 people enrolled. These schools have effects which we do not realize. Recently, as I have visited, Church School teachers have told me of things they are trying that they learned in these Schools.

Conference on Family Life

Our great Church is planning a most interesting and helpful National Conference on Family Life to be held at Cleveland, Ohio. This important event is to be held in October 8-10. We have a number of couples who have already indicated that they would like to attend.

News Bulletin

Our News bulletin is designed to give information concerning projected plans of our General Board of Education; to share worthwhile activities which various Churches have tried and found to possess merit (both within and without our Conference); to suggest materials and where they can be found; and call attention to articles that have educational value in them as they are gleaned from various sources. THE WESLEY FOUNDATION

The Wesley Foundation is an organization affiliated with the National Methodist Student Movement which is fashioned to provide opportunities offered by the local church or churches for students' spiritual growth and to assist these with a specialized student program. The Board of Education acts in an advisory capacity to the Wesley Foundation units and is responsible for administering the funds designated for this work. Attached are the reports made to the Board of Education by the Wesley Foundations at Newark and Chestertown.

THE ANNUAL REPORT OF THE WESLEY FOUNDATION OF THE UNIVERSITY OF DELAWARE, 1953-54

The Wesley Foundation of the University of Delaware is an organization affiliated with the National Methodist Student Movement, which is designed to provide the regular opportunities offered by the local church for growth and to supplement these by a specialized student program. While the University offers intellectual education, the Church and the Wesley Foundation seeks to present the challenges of Christian education and increasing under-

standing of the relation of Christian faith to all areas of life. Within the Foundation there is a four-fold emphasis on worship, service, education, and social activities. Beyond the local denominational work, it seeks to relate its members to interdenominational student work and to other Methodist student organizations throughout the country.

The major portion of the Foundation is conducted in the Newark Methodist Church. Every effort is made to help the students feel that this is their "church home away from home." Members of the congregation and the Official Board have been active in the progress and development of the Foundation's program.

III. PROGRAM

Coffee Class, 9:45 A. M. Sundays—Teacher: Mr. William Cooke. This informal breakfast seminar discussed problems of Christian living during the first semester, and engaged in a detailed study of the Gospel of St. Matthew during the second semester.

Tuesday evenings, 7:15 P. M.—Under the direction of the Wesley Foundation Council. These meetings follow the pattern of worship, program, recreation, and refreshments. Outstanding series of fall programs included "The Role of Religion in Early America," Dr. John Munroe, Professor of History at the University, and four programs of Religion in the Arts, with excellent speakers from the University, and Mrs. William Wefer from Philadelphia. Outstanding among the spring semester listings were two panel discussions on "Science and Religion" with faculty members and Mr. Cooke as panelists, and four meetings on the subjects of different ways of worship: Jewish, Rabbi Leonard Gewirtz; Protestant, Dr. Willard G. Purdy; Catholic, Dr. Frank Somers; and Methodist, Dr. W. F. Dunkle, Jr.

A Sunday Evening Fellowship was held for Methodist Faculty and Students. Events throughout the year included a Foreign Students' Supper;

a Halloween Party; an informal evaluation meeting with Miss Elizabeth Willis, traveling representative for the M. S. M.; a roller skating party; the Spring Banquet, with the Rev. Robert Davis, Wesley Foundation Director of V. P. I. as the speaker; an evaluation session with the Rev. Mr. Davis on Foundation work; and a Fund raising activity in May for the benefit of the Methodist Student Fellowship Fund.

Lenten Services were held at 7 A. M. Thursdays, at which basic tenets of the Christian faith were discussed. Students and staff members alternated in leading the sessions. Breakfast was served.

IV. Services Offered

Members of the Wesley Foundation worked in the Church Office, taught in the Church School, ushered, presented a party at the Governor Bacon Health Center, and presented a Christmas drama entitled A Christmas Blessing for the Newark W. S. C. S. Two graduating members of the Foundation have offered their services for Short-term Methodist Missionary projects.

V. Conferences and Retreats

The Wesley Foundation is proud of its record in attendance at these longer meetings. Seven Wesley Foundation officers and two staff members attended the Methodist Student Regional Leadership Conference of one week's duration at Camp Casowasco, N. Y. Six members attended the Chesapeake Region's Fall Meeting at Morgan State College. Those privileged to attend the week-long National Methodist Student Movement Quadrennial Conference in Lawrence, Kansas, during the Christmas vacation were: Grace Bossard, Doris Dukes, Dorothy Ferguson, Kay Kreemer, Betty Whyte, Joseph Harris, and Mary Ann Sherron, Associate Director. The Foundation has been represented at the Christian Citizenship Seminar of the Methodist Student Movement in Washington and New York by Miss Rita Timmons. Miss Grace Bossard attended the Conference on Religious Vocations for Women, sponsored by Union Theological Seminary. Plans are being completed for attendance at the Chesapeake Region's Spring Weekend to be held April 24-25 at Western Maryland College Westminster, Md. The Annual Spring Retreat of the local Wesley Foundation officers and members will be conducted on the following weekend at Dewey Beach, Del.

VI. Interdenominational Cooperation

The Wesley Foundation acted as a supporting member of the University Religious Council in its programs of orientation, vespers, and special events. The Wesley Foundation undertook, with the cooperation of the University Religious Council, the sponsorship of the second Religious Emphasis Week at the University of Delaware, with the theme "The 3 R's: Reality, Responsibility, Religion." We secured as the speaker of the Week, Dr. John Oman, minister of the First Methodist Church of New Jersey. The Week included a vesper service in Mitchell Hall, informal discussions in the men's and women's living quarters, a Methodist student supper, a University faculty Coffee Hour, and a Communion Dedication Service. An Evaluation Luncheon

for all officers and adult advisors of student religious groups under the sponsorship of the University Religious Council, concluded the Week. The luncheon resulted in the approval of a full-scale Religious Emphasis Week under an expanded committee of the URC for next fall.

The Wesley Foundation wishes to express its sincere appreciation to the Newark Methodist Church for its helpful interest in the work of the Foundation and for the use of its facilities. The Newark W. S. C. S. has offered invaluable assistance to the Foundation members, especially in their social activities. We are grateful, too, for the financial support of the General Board of Education, and the Peninsula Annual Conference through its Board of Education and Commission on World Service and Finance. The Wesley Foundation on the Washington College Campus is an organization that, in spite of many difficulties, has shown growth since its inception, and still has great promise yet to be realized. It started several years ago in the form of a campus religious group with very few members and a rather nondescript program, but has since grown in purpose, program, and activity.

At the instigation of the Reverends W. H. Hudson and W. H. Revelle, Jr., a small nucleus was formed under the combined leadership of the First and Christ Methodist Churches of Chestertown and the Conference. The work, so far, has been loyally supported by all concerned. All students of any denomination, and most particularly of the Methodist denomination, are made to feel at home in either of these two Churches. Members of both Churches and the Official Boards have been interested in the development of this Foundation.

Program

After getting off to a poor start, interest was revived. The second and fourth Tuesday evenings of each month were set for meeting, and a program was set that has been followed. The program topics are:

- The interpretations of marriage and divorce within the various religions.
- 2. The requirements of a good Christian.
- 3. The typical life of a Clergyman.
- 4. The danger of mixed marriages.
- 5. What youth are, and can, do for Christ.
- 6. The alcohol problem and the Christian.
- 7. The Confessional and its value in Protestantism.
- 8. Mixed marriages from a sociologist's viewpoint.

Some of these programs were in the form of panel discussions; others were statements by the students themselves; and the remainder were led by the following speakers: Dr. F. G. Livingood, formerly dean and vice-president of Washington College; Professor E. N. Foster, Registrar of the College; Dr. B. S. Anderson, Head of the Department of Sociology of the College; and the Reverends W. H. Hudson and W. H. Revelle, Jr.

In addition to these regular meetings, special events are as follows: a straw ride, square dance, and picnic at Camp Pecometh; a Communion Breakfast; a Sock Hop; and entertainment in various homes of the Church constituencies.

The members of the Wesley Foundation, in addition to regular attendance at Church services, have assisted the Churches in the following ways: the distribution of bulletins and calendars, have sung in Church Choirs, and acted as substitutes at the console of the organ in both Churches, as well as providing the musical background for the Methodist Men's Communion Breakfast.

Due to Lack of funds, the Wesley Foundation has not been able to send its members to any of the regional leadership conferences, but with the limited funds now available, arrangements have been made to send 5 representatives to the Chesapeake Region's Spring week-end, to be held at Western Maryland College, Westminster, Maryland, April 24th and 25th. Three will attend the leadership conference at Camp Casowasco, New York.

The Wesley Foundation has acted as a cooperating member in the Religious Emphasis Day Program on the College Campus in the past.

The Wesley Foundation would like to express its appreciation to the First and Christ Methodist Churches, as well as to many interested members, for the use of facilities and for assistance. The W. S. C. S. has shown an active interest in the Foundation, and we would like to thank them, too. We are appreciative of the \$600.00 that we have received from the Peninsula

Annual Conference, this year, and hope that further support may be forthcoming in order that our program may be enriched in the coming year.

REPORT OF THE PENINSULA CONFERENCE BOARD OF EVANGELISM

The accomplishment of Christ's purpose for people and for the world depends on what the Churches do. He has no agencies through which to work aside from the Churches and the Christian people in them. It is Christian people who limit the love of God and His redeeming power among men.

Evangelism is not the exclusive responsibility of any vocational group. Many would leave this work for the preacher because they feel that ministers are "hired" to win others to loyalty to Christ. Christ did not single out particular persons and lay upon them this special responsibility. If we would take His example seriously, we should feel that the average laymen have the major responsibility since those whom He sent out in the First Century to win all nations to a dedication to God were farmers and the tax gatherers, the housewives and the tentmakers, the fishermen and the merchants. There was not a full-time preacher in the whole group.

The responsibility for evangelism rests upon each Christian within the Church, young and old alike. The entire Christian group, working together as a fellowship, must make every effort to reach the unreached and proclaim the gospel to every person. To do less than this is to fail Christ.

Evangelism is the central task of the Church—the task of taking the gospel to a lost world. Every Christian by definition is an evangelist, a bearer of good news—the news of salvation through Jesus Christ.

What does it mean for the Church to take the gospel to the world? It is more than increasing church membership. The true Church permits itself to be used as a vehicle of God's love for all men. It confronts men with the eternal gospel, a gospel that judges them for their inordinate self-concern and their unconcern for their neighbors. The gospel demands their repentance and conversion. Genuine conversion always hurts. It means a radical change in a person's outlook, his way of thinking and what he considers important. He understands in a new way his responsibility to God and his neighbor. It makes a difference in all his significant decisions—what job shall he take, shall he join a union, how shall he spend next Saturday afternoon, what shall he do about racial segregation, and how shall he

vote? In short, genuine evangelism summons a person to obey God and to acknowledge his sovereignty in all things.

Let all Christians, everywhere, of all age groups, seek to win others to a loyalty to Christ, to an undertaking of the meaning of Jesus for human life, to a dedication to God, and to a determination to become part of the Christian fellowship. Then we will be fulfilling the commission of Jesus, "Go ye into all the world and teach all nations . . ."

The following recommendations are submitted:

Every local church implementing its program of evangelism as follows:

- a. A continuous program of evangelism with observance of World Wide Communion, Layman's Day, Thanksgiving, Christmas, and Easter.
- b. A Spiritual Life Mission in every local church, annually, to activate and to deepen the spiritual life of all members.
- c. A systematic visitation of all members in the local church.
- d. A prayer group in every local church, and the cultivation of a prayer movement.
 - e. Family worship in every home, including grace at meals.
 - f. Making and keeping an up-to-date prospect and constituency roll.
 - g. Every new member trained in church membership and the Christian life.
 - h. Seeking to secure at least a ten per cent net gain in membership during the year.

2. Every District cooperating through:

- a. Some specific and cooperative evangelistic enterprise to be conducted each year (preferably in the fall), with the District Superintendent and the District Secretary of Evangelism responsible for the development of such an enterprise in their respective districts.
- b. A Spiritual Life Mission for preachers to be planned by the District Superintendent and the District Secretary of Evangelism.

3. Further recommendations:

- a. That every minister attend the Pastor's School at the Peninsula Conference Camp to develop deeper spiritual life among ministers.
- b. That a course of evangelism be included in the Leadership Training Schools.
- c. That each pastor in accordance with paragraph 119, 1952 Discipline, notify the District Superintendent or Pastor in community where members have moved.
- d. That the Board of Evangelism in cooperation with the Board of Education and Youth Council conduct two week-end Christian Witness Missions to be held on a Conference basis the week ends of October 29 and November 5.

- e. We commend to all our Churches and people the 1955 Church Attendance Crusade—God Is Our Strength.
- f. We urge all Ministers and Chairmen of the Commission on Membership and Evangelism of the local church to attend the Northeastern Jurisdictional Conference on Evangelism, July 18-23 at Ocean Grove, New Jersey.

Youth can do it!

Some of our most effective evangelistic workers may be found among the young people of our churches. Note the success of the Christian Witness Mission held in August 1953 at The Wilmington Manor Methodist Church.

Exciting results in the number of visits made—669 survey calls—57 evangelistic visits with 10 transfers and 10 first commitments.

It is certainly easy to imagine that the contagion of this type of training program—the inspiration and practical "know-how" that it teaches—could be responsible for the winning of hundreds of young people to the Church. It was the unanimous request of all the young people that another Mission is a "must"!

Concerning Conference Evangelists

No pastor shall engage for an evangelist any person who is not a Conference evangelist or a regular member of the Annual Conference, nor an accepted supply in good standing, without first obtaining the written consent of his district superintendent. (1952 Discipline, P 353)

On the recommendation of the Conference Board of Evangelism, confirmed by a two-thirds vote of the Annual Conference, he (Bishop) may appoint an effective member of the conference as conference evangelist; provided that the appointee shall meet the standards set up by the General Board and the Conference Board for Conference evangelists. (1952 Discipline, P 432,-6-)

Standards for Approved Evangelists

- The individual should believe that he feels a divine calling to this branch of the ministry.
- 2. His adaptability to this field must be recognized to the satisfaction of the Conference Board of Evangelism.
- He should be in full harmony with the teachings of the Holy Scriptures as expounded in Methodist doctrine; with the rules and the regulations of The Methodist Church; and uphold the pastor with whom he is working.
- 4. He should have had at least four years of pastoral experience.
- 5. He should present annually to the Conference Board a written recommendation from one District Superintendent and three pastors who have had opportunity to know him or observe his work.
- 6. He should evidence his acceptability as an evangelist by holding not less than six revivals, or missions, in a conference year, barring the interference of sickness or some serious handicap.

- 7. At the close of each conference year, the Approved Evangelist should present to the Conference Board of Evangelism a written report, upon a blank furnished by the General Board of Evangelism. His report should include:
 - Number of meetings held for purposes of mass, visitation or educational evangelism.
 - b. Estimate of tangible results; such as new professions of faith, restorations, additions to the church, family altars, tithers, or any other encouraging results.
 - c. The evangelist's total income and gifts from his evangelistic services for the conference year.
- 8. He cannot go outside his Annual Conference to hold evangelistic services without permission of his Bishop.
- 9. Each applicant for conference evangelist must appear in person before the Conference Board of Evangelism.
- 10. An application for conference evangelist must first go to the District Superintendent in whose area the applicant is residing, and then it will be forwarded to the Conference Board of Evangelism.

GOODWILL INDUSTRIES OF THE PENINSULA CONFERENCE OF THE METHODIST CHURCH, INC.

Report to Peninsula Conference May 1954

As in previous years, the aim of Goodwill Industries during the past twelve months was to provide employment opportunities for as many handicapped persons as facilities and material resources would permit, and to utilize the agency's employment program as a means of encouraging handicapped employees to help themselves in overcoming, as far as possible, conditions resulting from physical, mental, social and emotional disabilities. It is believed that we can report progress for the past year, not only in the area of basic operations but also in the more important, if less tangible, realm of human values.

63 different persons were employed in 1953, the majority of whom were so severely handicapped that employment in regular commercial industry was, for them, practically impossible. Employment periods ranged from several weeks to the full year and extensions of periods started in previous years. On a weekly basis, an average of 37 to 40 workers were regularly employed; ages of workers ranged from 18 years to the late seventies and placements were made without regard for race, creed or color.

As a Christian service organization, Goodwill Industries is primarily interested in people; and specifically, in filling, as far as it can, the needs of handicapped people. Needless to say, the agency was not equipped to deal effectively with each and every one of the wide variety of needs encountered during the year. Needs, both singly and in combination, calling for medical treatment, physical restoration procedures and psychiatric services were encountered on numerous occasions; such needs were, of course, beyond the limits of our program as presently maintained. As might be expected, the need most often encountered, or at least most frequently expressed by the applicant, was economic in character. Regardless of whatever else may have been indicated, or sensed, as a need, the handicapped applicant's first and primary concern was for an opportunity to work-an opportunity to help himself in relieving, as far as possible, the tensions and problems created by economic insecurity and further aggravated by his physical and/or mental disability. Frustrated and very often completely discouraged as a result of many unsuccessful attempts to find a suitable place in commercial industry, the handicapped applicant, in the majority of cases, viewed his contact with Goodwill Industries as the last stop, the last hope. In response to such needs, the agency furnished employment opportunities in a variety of occupational activities and paid \$45,299.00 in wages to handicapped workers during the

The full measure of benefits resulting from Goodwill Industries' employment program cannot be summed up in the statement that so much money was paid in wages. Galen once said "employment is nature's physician." This principle seems especially significant with regards to handicapped people. Other needs than economic, the social, emotional, spiritual and to some extent, even physical needs of the handicapped people served, were recognized, and it is believed, filled in varying degrees, as a result of daily contact with, and participation in, Goodwill's total program.

Handicapping disabilities encountered during the year included: total blindness, defective hearing and speech, leg and arm amputations, heart disease, cerebral palsy, hydrocephalus, a variety of orthopedic impairments, chronic organic, mental and social, and advance age. 40 men and 23 women were employed. All wages were earned and paid on an hourly basis and hourly rates ranged from a basic agency minimum of 50 cents to a maximum of \$1.43.

With the purpose of further increasing the agency's capacities for servfce, efforts were continued during the year to improve facilities and replace
outdated and worn equipment. Water lines were extended to the rear of the
main building; flooring was repaired and replaced in various areas; insulated
ceilings and new window sash and sills were installed where needed and the
main store was equipped with new and more attractive display fixtures. New
equipment secured during the year included: a 1½ ton van body truck; 3
electric Singer sewing machines; a steam iron; an automatic ironer; an
addressograph machine; and a new gas range for the Nursery School.

Advances were also recorded in financial and operational activities. Total earnings for 1953 amounted to \$66,249.99, about a 13% gain over the amount earned in 1952. Store sales alone, the largest source of income,

THE BOARD OF HOSPITALS AND HOMES

The Executive Secretary of the General Conference Board of Hospitals and Homes, Dr. Karl P. Meister, met with the Peninsula Conference Board on March 26, 1954. Careful consideration was given to all matters within our province.

Recognizing the need for an adequate program of sheltered care for the aged within the bounds of our conference, and aware also of the fact that there are sizable sums of money available to meet the said need if there existed a duly authorized corporation to receive and disburse funds, your Board unanimously passed a motion to present to this session of the Peninsula Conference for favorable consideration the following resolutions:

- 1. That the Peninsula Conference authorize the creation of a corporation to be known as, Methodist Homes For The Aged Of The Peninsula Conference
- 2. That the purpose of the said corporation shall be the study, promotion and development of a program of sheltered care for the aged within the bounds of the Peninsula Conference.
- 3. That the membership of the corporation shall consist of twentythree trustees, nine of whom shall be ministers of the Peninsula Conference of The Methodist Church, nine of whom shall be laymen, and the Bishop of the Area, and the four district superintendents of the conference. Six of said trustees shall be elected for one year, six for two years, and six for three years, for the first term, and thereafter the term of each of said eighteen first mentioned trustees shall be for three years; the Bishop and four district superintendents serving as trustees and members of said corporation during their incumbency of said offices. Said eighteen trustees shall be nominated and elected as hereinafter set forth, and such trustees, when elected and qualified, shall serve for their respective terms and until their successors are elected and qualified. The eighteen trustees of this corporation shall be elected by the Peninsula Conference upon nominations by the Conference Board of Hospitals and Homes at the Annual Meeting of said Board, or by any special meeting of said Board, or upon nominations from the floor of the Conference. Should the number of district superintendents of the Conference be increased or decreased, then the membership of the corporation shall increase or decrease accordingly.
- 4. That the Peninsula Conference Board of Hospitals and Homes be empowered to organize and make effective the said corporation, writing such Articles of Incorporation as may be deemed necessary and advisable, provided the said articles shall be approved by the Board of Hospitals and Homes, the Bishop and the four district superintendents, and the Executive Secretary of the General Conference Board of Hospitals and Homes.

We request the continued voluntary and generous support of the homes and hospitals within adjacent conferences that have in the past and do now minister to the constituency of this conference. We call your attention to the fine ministry of The Strawbridge Home for Boys at Sykesville, Maryland; the Kelso Home for Girls, Towson, Maryland; the Board of Child Care of the Baltimore Conference; and the Methodist Hospital in Philadelphia.

reached a new all-time high and amounted to \$53,161.91, a gain of 10% over store sales for the previous year. Despite a very poor and unsteady market situation which covered the entire year, salvage sales reached \$8,149.63, a gain of some 20% over the amount recorded in 1952. Keeping well abreast of the new high marks established for earnings, opportunity wages paid to handicapped workers amounted to \$45,299.76. Compared with the \$38,258.61 spent for the same purpose in 1952, this represents an 18% increase. A little better than 58% of total disbursements for 1953 went directly into the pay envelopes of handicapped workers.

The agency was 85% self-supporting during the period. Total income amounted to \$78,006.22. \$10,500, or, 13% of the total income was received from the United Community Fund of Northern Delaware and 2%, or, \$1,257.00 was received in the form of donations and miscellaneous income.

The nature of Goodwill Industries' work makes it necessary to place a great deal of emphasis on such things as industrial operations, mechanical equipment, facilities, finances and the like. Much attention is also focused on the physical and mental capacities of the persons served as well as certain of their social problems. It is not the intention of the agency that such practices and concerns shall take precedence over spiritual values but rather that they shall serve as contributing factors in helping the handicapped to achieve the fullest possible measure of more abundant living. In this connection, the agency has earnestly tried to utilize its program as an effective, if sometimes subtle means, of stimulating interest in, and encouraging the development of, spiritual growth. Against an ever present background of spiritual standards, chapel services were conducted three mornings each week throughout the year. The services, one half hour in length, were designed to be interdenominational in character and attendance by employees was entirely on a voluntary basis.

The Goodwill Nursery School continued in full time operation during the year with a weekly average of 20 children between the ages of 2 and 6 years in attendance. One teacher and two attendants were employed on a full time basis in providing day care for the children. Operating 5 days each week from 7.30 a.m. until 5.15 p.m., the school's program included training in religious and pre-public school subjects; supervised recreational periods and a variety of other characteristic Nursery School activities. Helping to make our work possible among the children of mothers forced to take employment in industry, were the following Methodist Church groups: the WSCS of Harrison St.; the WSCS of Eastlake; the WSCS of Scott; the Busy Bees of Brandywine; and the Friendship Class of Grace. We take this occasion to express our deep appreciation to these groups for their splendid and ever dependable support of our Nursery School program.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF LAY ACTIVITIES OF PENINSULA CONFERENCE

The program of the Lay Activities in Peninsula Conference has shown continued progress this past year both in activities and in interest. Our laymen are enthused with the challenge which the layman's work presents and they are striving to reach the goals set for the quadrennium. Ten new Methodist Men's groups have been chartered this year, bringing the total number to 50 chartered groups in Peninsula Conference; Wilmington District leads with 19, while Salisbury District has 16, Dover District 9, and Easton District 6. In each of the districts there are several churches planning to organize very soon, probably before the close of this conference year, but these groups will have to be listed at a later date. The quota of chartered groups for Peninsula Conference by the end of the quadrennium is 96, which will be 24 for each district. The goal is ever forward until every Methodist Church has a chartered group of Methodist Men as provided for in the discipline.

Communion Breakfasts continue to be one of the most outstanding activities among the laymen in all four districts and splendid attendances and deeper spiritual experiences marked each of these observances this year. Offerings received at these services were given to the Board of Child Care and other worthwhile projects. Another activity, an educational one, has been the enthusiastic, well-attended meetings of Charge Lay Leader and the Pastors which have been held in the districts this year and have proved very helpful in promoting the work. In the Dover District Layman-Pastor meeting, under the guidance of Fulton J. Downing, the District Lay Leader, the guest speaker was W. Carl Walton, the Newark Conference Lay Leader. Another educational feature that was outstanding was in the Salisbury District where the Lay Leaders Course recommended by the General Board of Lay Activities was very successfully taught in the Somerset County Christian Workers School by Professor Arthur L. Fleming, the Salisbury District Lay Leader.

The Fifth Annual Layman's Week-End Retreat was held at Pe-Co-Meth Camp on August 29th, 30th, and was well attended and was a time of real

spiritual retreat for the men of our conference. This year the Sixth Annual Week-End Retreat will be held at Pe-Co-Meth Camp on August 21-22, and the guest speaker will be Mr. W. Carl Walton, of West Orange, N. J., who is the Newark Conference Lay Leader. Our own Clinton H. Brown, the Wilmington District Lay Leader will also be our speaker at the Sunday Morning session at the retreat.

Layman's Day was observed in most of the churches in the conference on Sunday, October 18, with many outstanding lay speakers conducting the services and presenting the message from the theme "Christ Calls Men". This recognition of the Laymen of the Churches by the Pastors on this special Sunday each year has helped to develop leadership in the local church, for laymen have filled pulpits in many of our churches when the pastors have been ill or unable to be present. We appreciate this fine spirit of cooperation on the part of the Pastors to help make Layman's Day a significant event in the life of the Church.

The Annual Layman's Meeting during the Conference session will be held in St. Paul's Church, Wilmington, Del., on Friday evening, May 14, at 7:30 P. M. This meeting has been planned by Clinton H. Brown, the Wilmington District Lay Leader and will be one of the high-lights of the Conference. The guest speaker will be Dr. Harry Denman, a great layman and the Executive Secretary of the General Board of Evangelism.

A very important emphasis of the Board of Lay Activities is CHRISTIAN STEWARDSHIP, and the General Board of Lay Activities, at its annual meeting on July 8-11, 1953, asked for the privilege of sponsoring the "STEWARDSHIP OF POSSESSIONS" program soon to be launched in our conference. Dr. John N. Link, the Superintendent of Wilmington District has been chosen to be the Washington Area Director of this program and Mr. Clinton H. Brown, the Lay Leader of Wilmington District has been chosen to be the Stewardship Director for Peninsula Conference.

This summer a great opportunity for Laymen will be the meeting of The National Conference of Methodist Men, at Purdue University, Lafayette, Indiana, July 9-11, 1954. The minimum delegation from each conference consists of the conference and district lay leaders, one superintendent and at least four other laymen from each district and all who go will go at their own expense.

Another year of serving as Lay Leader of Peninsula Conference has again brought me the opportunity to plan and work with devout Christian laymen who are earnest in their desire to do all they can to serve Christ and His Church. My deepest appreciation goes to the local pastors and to the Charge Lay Leaders who have cooperated in the layman's program this year. I am especially grateful for the whole-hearted support of my very efficient district lay leaders, the associate lay leaders, the District Superintendents and Bishop Oxnam. It is a real pleasure to work with them and I assure them of my sincere appreciation for their untiring efforts in this important work.

REPORT TO THE ANNUAL CONFERENCE OF THE LEGISLATIVE COMMITTEE FOR DELAWARE

The Legislative Committee for the State of Delaware, appointed at the 1953 Session, is the successor to the Wilmington and Dover District Committees which are first sponsored by the two District Ministerial Associations. These Committees have performed the very important function of keeping a watch on legislations being proposed in our State Assembly and alerting our Churches to the normal issues involved.

During the 1953 State Assembly Sessions, your Committee had representatives in Dover at least weekly, and oftener when necessary, in the interest of good legislation. We can report that the proposed amendment to the State Constitution to legalize gambling was defeated through the influence of Christian people who were brought to recognize its inherent threat to good government. There is much more involved in the so-called "Bingo" issue than whether or not elderly people have the opportunity to enjoy an innocent game. There are many indications that this issue will be raised again in the next General Assembly and we must be on the alert.

Undoubtedly, there will be several issues, such as the reform of our penal institutions, social welfare and better opportunities for children and youth, in which our Methodist people in Delaware will be interested. We shall be working closely with the Board of Social and Economic Relations in taking positive steps toward greater social and economical justice.

Your Committee has requested through the Committee on World Service and Finance that the Annual Conference grant \$250.00 to the Committee for minimum expenses of mailing, travel, and telephone, so that we may do an effective job during the next Conference Year. We also request that an equal number of laymen and ministers be appointed by the Conference to represent the two districts on the Legislative Committee.

REPORT OF THE CONFERENCE BOARD OF MISSIONS

One of the important and continuing responsibilities of the Board is that of Mission Cultivation. This work is the primary concern of the Conference Missionary Secretary and his assistants. There is much evidence that this has been a record year of achievement for the Rev. William O. Hackett, our Conference Secretary and his aides: The Rev. James J. Von

Hagel, Dover District; The Rev. William H. Hemphill, Easton District; The Rev. Willard Stevens, Salisbury District and The Rev. Charles S. Clarkson, Wilmington District. They report that there have been more than 95 showings of our films and film strips this year; that every minister in the Conference has been given a copy of Christian World Facts; that three missionaries have spoken in some fifty Churches in our Conference under the auspices of the Board of Missions. These missionaries included our own Conference supported missionary to India Mr. Robert S. Gilchrist; The Rev. William F. Rogers, missionary to Brazil; and The Rev. Harry Anker, missionary in the Belgian Congo of Africa. More than six thousand people heard these men speak.

Eight delegates attended the outstanding Silver Bay Mission Conference and four ministers represented us at the Convocation on Urban Life at Columbus, Ohio.

We have participated actively in the work among the migrant laborers who throng each year to our rural areas. One thousand dollars has been directed through our budget to this work and we are represented in the Eastern Shore Migrant Committee which directs this activity for the Council of Churches. We heartly endorse this program and recommend continued support by our Conference for this work among migrants.

The Conference Board of Missions has given its full support to the recommendations of the Conference Advance Committee and would urge our Churches to relate themselves to an ADVANCE project and support it with special gifts. We especially ask the support of the Conference for Mr. and Mrs. Robert S. Gilchrist who now represent the Peninsula Conference in India.

A major project of the Board this year has been the Survey of our Conference authorized at the last Annual Conference session. This survey was made for us by The Rev. Dr. Roy A. Strum, Director of the Department of Research and Surveys of the National Division of Missions of the Methodist Church. The report of this survey has been approved by our Board and now forms a part of our report to the Conference. (The Survey Report is in the hands of the printers. Copies will be mailed to Conference members about May 1st.) We ask your careful study of the full report and urge its adoption by the Conference.

PENINSULA CONFERENCE RADIO AND FILM COMMISSION

The Radio and Film Commission of the Peninsula Conference has worked in close cooperation with the Area Commission throughout this conference year. We have been successful in promoting the work of the church in the following ways:

- 1. The weekly radio series, "Light for Life", featuring Bishop G. Bromley Oxnam, has been presented on two stations in the conference area every week since the program was begun. Three other stations in the conference area have carried this program occasionally.
- 2. Recordings of The Upper Room Radio Parish have been carried on five stations in the conference area.
- 3. The Bishop's Christmas program, "A Slender Yellow Candle", was carried on W.D.E.L.-TV, the only television outlet in the conference. This film, however, was given wide circulation in various areas of the conference.
- 4. We are now circulating the Bishop's latest film, "What Youth Ought to Want," to youth groups in the conference. This will also be available for television.

Because our conference commission was appointed after conference, and because post-conference appointments altered the make-up of the commission, the work of the commission has been largely carried on by the writer of this report who is also vice-chairman of the Washington Area Commission.

It is the intention to exert a greater influence for the church through the media of radio-TV—and films in the next conference year. We have operated without funds this year; however, the work of this commission can neither continue nor expand without financial aid. A request to this end has been submitted to the Council on World Service and Finance.

1954 ANNUAL CONFERENCE REPORT OF THE BOARD OF SOCIAL AND ECONOMIC RELATIONS

"The Church and Rural Life" was the theme of two afternoon-evening seminars sponsored by your Board of Social and Economic Relations as their major project this year. On November 30th, thirty-two persons registered at Snethen Church on the Mardela Charge, the Rev. G. I. Loar pastor, and on December 1st, twenty-six persons registered at Barclay Church on the Ingleside Charge, the Rev. James O'Neil pastor. The Rev. Dr. Glenn Sanford, executive secretary of the Methodist Board of Town and Country Work, was the key speaker for the two programs.

In the afternoon panel discussion, "The Church and Rural Life" was viewed from the several angles of migrant workers, by Mrs. Margaret Ekstrom, Supervisor of Ministry to Migrants of the National Council of the Churches of Christ; the public school, Doctors William Graham, Supervisor of High Schools of Cecil County, and William Simpson, Superintendent of Caesar Rodney High School, Camden; the county 4-H agent, Mr. Stanley Sutton of Kent County, Maryland; the county nurse and health department, Mrs. Cornelia Lumpkin of Kent County, Maryland; and the rural Methodist pastor, the Rev. Henry Caldwell of Rising Sun, Maryland. The motion picture, "On Common Ground," was a feature of the evening program. The seminars were adjourned after a concluding discussion.

While we were disappointed at the lack of interest and attendance, especially from the larger towns, still the results have been most encouraging. There have been follow-up meetings in several churches, and there has also been a timely quickening of interest in the Puerto Rican agricultural workers on the Eastern Shore. The so-called "rural" church has its weaknesses and limitations, as was pointed out at the seminars, but it makes an important contribution to both community and denomination.

Two suggestions growing out of our discussion on these days are worthy of mention: 1st, although the minimum salary legislation is a step in the right direction, there is still much to be done in order to establish an adequate economic foundation for the rural pastor; and 2nd, that we are challenged to use as much ingenuity as state and county agencies use, as in area and county administration on a truly functional basis. The rural church and its ministry should be faced as a challenge, immediately, realistically and thoroughly in the Peninsula Conference.

Resolutions and Recommendations

Man is inevitably both a social and an economic being. We are called to be Christian above and beyond this however, with the love of God (the moral law, the Kingdom) and the love of self and neighbor (my sacred soul, my sacred brother) as the twin imperatives. Believing that Christianity must be clearly distinguishable as "a way of life in action" we present the following points and resolutions:

- 1. The Christian home is of primary importance. We therefore urge our laymen and ministers to increase private and public pre-marital and marital education, and to emphasize the family altar and the regular use of such publications as "The Upper Room" and "The Christian Home." We suggest that our ministers give careful attention to the opportunities of personal counselling; realizing that social problems are accentuated or alleviated in great measure according to their success. We further urge that our ministers proceed with the utmost caution in the marriage of divorced persons, and that study be instituted concerning civil marriages in the states served by our conference.
- 2. The public school is of almost equal importance. The people of our nation are indeed privileged to be able to unite in sending their children to the public school for a common and democratic education, the foundation for an intelligent church laity and national citizenry. But the public school is in danger from such various causes as indifference, overcrowding, false patriotism; inadequate staff, tax support and supplementary facilities; and the attempt to siphon off public funds for the support of parochial schools. We propose to issue a call in the near future for a seminar for ministers and laity of the Peninsula Conference on the theme "The Church and The Public School."
- 3. Believing in the Christian doctrine that "all men are brothers," we appeal to our Methodist people to take the lead in applying the Christian spirit to the steady and increasing solution of America's number one social problem; the problem of race relations. We hereby resolve that one of the requirements which must be satisfied for the selection of a site for the spring

assembly of the Peninsula Conference be that the host church freely extend hospitality to our brothers and sisters of the Delaware Conference.

The doctrine of brotherhood is a world-wide doctrine, and thus we call upon our people to support religious and educational programs for world understanding, and to support all political programs that aim at increasing international consultation and cooperation; such programs as a point four type, the Fulbright plan for the exchange of students and the United Nations organization. Unity in brotherhood is not a doctrine for the surrender of personal convictions however, and we urge the leaders of state and federal governments to be champions of religious liberty, especially making our thoughts known to the people of Italy, Spain and Columbia.

- 4. We are concerned with the tendency toward the anarchy of "pluralism" in contemporary America. We are in thorough accord with man's right to join social, civic, employment and fraternal organizations. But we view with alarm group self-centeredness and the competition with the Christian Church which is often involved. Therefore, we suggest that the Bishop of the Peninsula Conference consider the appointment of a minister-at-large whose ministry it will be to make contact with the leadership of such particular organizations; eg. labor, management, political and civic clubs and fraternal organizations.
- 5. We stand opposed to the whipping post as contrary to the humanity of man and as contrary to the Christian emphasis on rehabilitation in penology. We recommend to the forthcoming session of the Delaware Legislature the study of and favorable action upon a unified penal system in that state.
- 6. We reaffirm the necessity for "the recognition and maintenance of the rights and responsibilities of free speech, free assembly and a free press; and for the encouragement of the free communication of mind with mind, as essential to the discovery of truth." The quarrel with the demagogues who rise up to beset us in every generation is a quarrel both as to means and to ends for "individuals in society."
- 7. We resolve to stand firmly for "the right of every individual and group of individuals to believe in and advocate any peaceful method for the solution of any and all problems that may confront society. We stand upon the single principle of testing every such proposal in the light of the teachings of Jesus." The United States of America is not an example of Christian perfection and, really, the social and economic problem is a problem of world-wide Christian engineering challenging any complacency.
- 8. We unequivocably witness to the opposition of Christianity to the atheistic philosophy, the brutal methods and the false materialism of the goals of Marxian Communism. We just as unequivocably witness to the fact that the best and only sure way of defeating communism is to exert a more intelligent, compassionate and truly vigorous Christianity to meet the social, economic and spiritual needs of mankind. This must have its foundation in the local church. Therefore, we propose for study during the year the possible combination of the program of the Methodist Men and the Board of Social and Economic Relations on the level of the local church, to the end of increasing information and forwarding action in the social and economic phases of local community life.

9. The ministers and lay members of the Peninsula Conference are charged with the responsibility of bringing this report to the attention of our people on the level of the local church. We move that the secretary of the Peninsula Conference be charged with the responsibility of sending a copy of this report to the Governors and members of the Legislature of the States of Delaware and Maryland. In conclusion we would call the attention of the aforementioned political leaders to legislation protecting the sancity of The Lord's Day, and such holy days as Christmas, Good Friday and Easter.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF TEMPERANCE

"Almost half of Delaware's fatal accidents in the first 10 months of 1953 can be blamed on drinking drivers", was the report in the Journal Every Evening of December 19, 1953. This statement is based on figures released by Colonel Harry S. Shew, superintendent of State Police. Colonel Shew is reported as saying in his report, "This should impress everyone that alcohol and driving simply don't go together, and when they are put together, the result is usually death."

This statement is cited as an example not only to illustrate the magnitude and gravity of the drinking habits of America, but also to show that there is an increasing concern on the part of agencies out side of the so called "Temperance Field" to do something about the problem. There is in this, and in other evidences of concern on the part of others, a challenge to the church to throw off the cloak of indifference and to move forward aggressively for the cause of Temperance.

The cause is not popular; the size of the problem is tremendous; the complexity of the solution is enormous. There is no easy and simple answer. Yet every minister and lay worker in all of our churches must not only realize the seriousness of the 'drink habit' but must pledge himself to do all in his power to halt the increase in drinking and eventually to eliminate it from our way of life.

The General Board of Temperance of our church has taken the lead in the endeavor to present a program of Christian Action against the use of alcohol as a beverage. Last October a great three day conference was held in Washington, D. C. for all District Temperance Secretaries from all over the nation. All four District Temperance Secretaries from this conference were in attendance. This conference has projected a great program of study and action for the entire church. We commend for your study and use the booklet "Blueprint For Temperance Action" which has been sent to every minister. Here are practical suggestions to help you in your local church.

The Conference Board has endeavored to lead such a program in the conference. We do now have a Temperance Secretary in each District. We again held our District Temperance Seminars; though disappointed in at-

tendance and interest shown, we do feel that they were helpful. For the first time we had participating in some of our seminars, members of Alcoholics Anonymous and members of the Traffic Division of the Delaware State Police. Reports from the Seminars indicate the program was both helpful and challenging.

We continue to cooperate with Dr. Frederick W. Smith of the Maryland-Delaware Temperance League. We urge every official board of our local churches to consider the matter of including in their regular budget a contribution to Temperance League. This would mean a great deal in helping the total cause of Temperance.

Each year we believe we move a step forward, but at the same time the challenge seems larger. So we propose for your consideration the following program for the coming conference year.

- (1) To continue cooperation with all other Temperance Agencies.
- (2) To again at Christmas and other selected times, insert paid Temperance Advertisements in our newspapers.
- (3) To cooperate with our General Board in promoting Commitment Day, on the first Sunday of December.
- (4) To urge District Committees on Leadership Education to include a Temperance Course in their Leadership Training Schools.
- (5) To send a youth delegate to the National Methodist Youth School of Alcohol Studies and Christian Action at Ohio Wesleyan University, Delaware, Ohio; the youth to be selected by the Conference Youth Council.
- (6) To make available to our churches, through the executive Secretaries office, the very excellent 16mm sound film on Temperance "Power of Decision." Each church using the film will be asked for a free will offering to cover expenses.
- (7) To purchase and erect at least eight (two in each district) roadside billboards at strategic points throughout the conference; these boards to carry the current "Signs for Temperance" poster. Local churches will be urged to also purchase and maintain similar boards in the conference area.
 - (8) To give our District Secretaries some training for their positions.
- (9) To promote among our youth an atmosphere for temperance, by showing that you need not drink to be happy, to enjoy one's self and to 'belong'.
 - (10) To establish a Temperance Committee in every local church.
- (11) To urge our ministers to take positive and constructive action for Temperance in the local parish.

COMMISSION ON TOWN AND COUNTRY WORK

The Commission is an Interboard Commission and its primary function as revealed to the Executive Secretary when in attendance at the Southeastern Jurisdictional Conference of Town and Country workers at Lake

Junaluska, North Carolina last August is to work through the other boards and agencies of the church where possible to see that the work of the rural church receives the proper emphasis.

The Executive Secretary worked with the Board of Social and Economic Relations in setting up and conducting two seminars or "The Church and Rural Life" and appreciates the cooperation of the Board in the fact that it gave it their major emphasis of the year. An account of this project is contained in the report of the Board of Social and Economic Relations.

The Executive Secretary worked in the Commission on Ministerial Training and Qualifications to have the work of the rural church emphasized at the Pastor's School next summer. The results are that Dr. Charles M. (Pat) McConnell of Boston University is on the faculty of the Pastor's School at Camp Pecometh July 5-9. "Christianizing the Rural Community" is the theme. No town or country pastor can afford to miss the school and even a city pastor might learn something from Pat.

The Executive Secretary attended one meeting and had a small part in planning for the great National Methodist Rural Life Conference to be held in Bloomington, Indiana July 22-25, 1955.

The Commission only too well knows that it is an Interboard Commission where it seeks funds on which to operate. It has had no funds in the past two years. The secretary attended the Junaluska Conference on his own. He notes with pleasure the inclusion of the sum of \$25.00 in the budget of the Board of Education for the work of the Commission for next year and requests the Commission on World Service and Finance to make provision for the attendance of one ministerial and one lay delegate from each District to the National Rural Life Conference in 1955.

REPORT TO THE ANNUAL CONFERENCE OF THE WOMAN'S SOCIETY OF CHRISTIAN SERVICE

During this year one of the major activities in the Peninsula Conference Woman's Society of Christian Service has been the observance of the 50th Anniversary of Methodist Deaconess work in Wilmington. This celebration was launched at our Annual Meeting in May 1953 and has had a two-fold purpose: first, to more fully inform the women of the Conference of the work being done by the staff at the Deaconess Home; and second, to secure a fund of \$5,000 to improve our facilities and increase the staff. To achieve these goals every Woman's Society was urged to have an "Anniversary Party" where the story of the work could be told and where contributions might be received. The \$5,000 goal was reached, and exceeded, with a total of over \$5,700 being raised. There is a feeling that the goal of spreading information about the work has also been reached, for, with the many "Anniversary Parties" which have been held in all parts of the Conference, there have been many opportunities to tell of this work.

With money received in the Anniversary Fund the salary of an additional worker has been underwritten. Some necessary pieces of furniture have been secured for the Riddle Memorial Deaconess Home and some major improvements in physical equipment have been made at the Mary Todd Gambrill Neighborhood House, in south Wilmington. Here, at the Neighborhood House, a fire-escape has been installed and the second floor, which was formerly rented out as an apartment, has been prepared and equipped for use in the settlement program. This second floor has provided a kitchen which is now available for the clubs and classes. Another room has been set up as a reading room and chapel. And a third room is a pleasant living room now in readiness for small clubs and committees. Having these additional rooms has already proven its value, as the children have been responding in increasing numbers to the program of the Neighborhood House.

We now have a staff of four workers, instead of three, plus a hostess-housekeeper. These workers live on the second and third floors of the Riddle Memorial Deaconess Home at 307 West Street, Wilmington. They carry on a program of clubs and classes on the first floor there at the Deaconess Home and in the Mary Todd Gambrill Neighborhood House on Heald Street in south Wilmington. The attendance of children in these clubs and classes has this year reached an all-time high.

The Board of Managers of these Conference Projects appreciates very much the co-operation of the many people who have helped to meet the challenge of this highly important work in this Anniversary Year. With the increasing population in south Wilmington due to the new housing development, it is a great satisfaction to know that we are now in position to render a more effective service than in the past.

Although this anniversary observance has been receiving major attention, the other regular activities of the Woman's Society of Christian Service have been carried on as usual and the quarterly reports have indicated advances in all departments.

Our Girl's School of Missions, held last summer at the Peninsula Conference Camp, had the largest enrollment in its history with considerably over a hundred girls in attendance. Plans are underway for an equally fine School in the coming summer from June 28 to July 3.

Our Summer School of Missions and Christian Service planned for adult members of the Societies and held at Wesley Junior College, also, had its highest enrollment last summer with 109 full-time and 154 part-time students. This School offered courses on the following four study books: Jeremiah; Alcohol and Christian Responsibility; Spanish-Speaking People in the United States; and The Life and Task of The Church Around the World. In addition to these courses, work-shops were presented on various subjects of interest, one of special importance being "The Relation of The Woman's Society of Christian Service to the Total Program of the Church." This workshop was in line with the desire of the Woman's Division of Christian Service to spread larger understanding among the women of the total program of the church and to develop increasing co-operation on all levels of our church life and work.

On the basis of pledges made by local societies at the District meetings in March, our Conference pledge to the missionary work of the Woman's Division of Christian Service is being increased by \$1500, making it \$45,000 for the coming year which begins June 1, 1954. It is interesting to note in this connection that the financial reports in the PENINSULA CONFERENCE JOURNAL for the last thirteen years indicate that each year approximately \$4.00 has been raised by our Woman's Societies for local church responsibilities for every \$1.00 sent to the District Treasurers for the missionary work of the Woman's Division of Christian Service.

Through the Department of Christian Social Relations and Local Church Activities, members of the Woman's Societies render countless services to their local churches and communities. They, also, relate themselves to civic and world affairs through study of social problems and pending legislation and through expression of their opinions to their representatives in the government. Among the things reported in this Department this year are the following:

Visits to the sick.

Preparing fellowship suppers in local churches.

Assisting the youth program by serving suppers and refreshments for the M. Y. F., buying basket ball suits, etc.

Parsonage repairs.

Baskets taken to the needy.

CARE packages sent abroad.

Preparing Father and Son and Mother and Daughter Banquets.

Taking parties and religious services to community institutions for the sick, handicapped, and aged.

Organizing "Over Sixty-Five" clubs for elderly people in the church and community.

Discussion of the Bricker Amendment and letters sent to senators on this and other legislation.

Programs on race relations.

Participation in the activities of the United Council of Church Women.

Group visits to the United Nations and study of the U. N. Organization.

Study of the alcohol problem and participation in Temperance Seminars.

As this report indicates, the 50th Anniversary observance, an increase in missionary study and giving, an ever-enlarging service to the local church and community, and a continuation of our perennial interest in the missionary instruction of children and youth have been the things prominent in the thinking and planning of the women of our Conference during this year of 1953-54.

COMMISSION ON WORLD SERVICE AND FINANCE

After diligent planning and consideration of all items in our Budget, your Commission submits the following report and recommendations:

- 1. Episcopal Fund-2% of the Pastor's current cash salary.
- 2. District Superintendents' Fund—6% of the Pastor's current cash salary. This fund to provide salary, payable on a current basis, expense account, and maintenance of the four District Parsonages at \$750 each per annum.
- 3. Conference Claimants—Percentage of the Pastor's current cash salary, as recommended by the Board of Conference Claimants and previously adopted by our Conference.
- 4. Minimum Salary—1/2 % of the Pastor's current cash salary. This will provide the following changes in the minimum salary scale:

Maximum which can be received from this fund shall be \$500.

No Charge receiving funds from minimum salary shall increase their pastor's expense account beyond the amount which they paid during the year 1953-54. All other provisions to remain the same as previously adopted by the Conference.

- 5. Wesley Junior College—50 cents per member for each Charge, totaling \$36,260. The support which the local churches have given our College is most gratifying and is very encouraging to its President and Board. We recommend the continuance of College Day and that the offering received be credited to the asking from the Charge.
- 6. Wesley Foundation—15 cents per member for each Charge, a minimum of \$6,000 to be retained by the Treasurer for Wesley Foundation work within the Peninsula Conference. The Treasurer of the Peninsula Conference shall be Treasurer for Wesley Foundation.
- 7. Methodist TV Fund—The Council of Bishops and the Council on World Service and Finance have authorized a church-wide appeal for a "Methodist Television Fund." Promotion of this fund was committed to the Central Promotional Office and calls for \$296,000 annually for the remainder of the quadrennium. The \$296,000 has been prorated to each Annual Conference on an equitable basis. In order that each local church might have a part in this most important project our share, \$3,219 annually for the next two years, has been included in the budget.

An honorarium of \$200 each for the Secretary and Statistician, and other Conference expenses not provided for in the Budget to be paid from the Contingent Fund.

The basis for the apportionments to the local Charges for General and Conference Administration expenses and for Benevolences shall be as follows:

One-third (1.08) based on membership of each Charge.

One-third (.044) based on total giving of each Charge (less Building and Improvements and Paid on Debt).

One-third (.444) based on amount paid for Annual Conference and World Service.

The above decimals have been computed from the reports as found in the 1953 Journal of the Peninsula Conference, and shall remain the same for two years, in accordance with the action taken by this Conference at its May 1952 session.

The additional \$25,000 for Church Extension will materially affect the percentage division of our Benevolence dollar and should not be allowed to remain after our needs for Church Extension have been met. Our Benevolence dollar shall be divided as follows: 45% for Annual Conference Benevolence and 55% for World Service. If any surplus is realized, the balance due the Peninsula Conference shall be given to the Board of Missions. If the entire amount is not realized, the loss to Annual Conference Benevolence shall be charged to the Annual Conference Board of Missions.

If some emergency arises or any item has been overlooked, the District Superintendents and the Commission on World Service and Finance, acting jointly, may, by a two-third's vote, draw upon the Contingent Fund to meet such need.

We heartily commend John F. Kelso, our Treasurer, for the excellent manner in which he has administered this Office during the past year, and we are happy to nominate him for the office of Treasurer for the next two years.

We recommend that one thousand dollars (\$1000) annually be paid to Westminster Theological Seminary, and that it be paid from the Contingent Fund until a new budget is prepared.

EXCERPTS FROM SURVEY REPORT

The Peninsula Conference Board of Missions presents herewith excerpts from the report of a survey of our Conference made by the Department of Research and Surveys of the Division of National Missions of The Methodist Church. This survey was authorized by the Annual Conference on May 16, 1953.

The urgent need for such a study became apparent when the Board sought to develop a program of Church Extension for this quadrennium. On November 24, 1952 a survey committee was appointed to study the situation and guide us to a better understanding of the problem. After due consideration it was the opinion of this committee that a more thorough and professional study was required.

In the belief that the findings of a complete survey would provide the answers to the basic questions confronting us and provide direction for future action and development, the Board of Missions asked the approval of the Annual Conference for this survey.

After careful study the following report with its findings and recommendations was approved by the Board at the regular Spring meeting, March 23, 1954. It now becomes a part of our report to the Annual Conference and we urge its adoption.

We wish to express our appreciation to Dr. Roy A. Sturm, Superintendent of the Department of Research and Surveys, and his associates for their work in our behalf. We also wish to thank our own survey committee for faithfully carrying through its responsibility. This committee included: The Rev. J. Robert Mackey, chairman, Mr. Floyd Woodcock, Mr. Fulton Downing, The Rev. J. Howard Link and The Rev. Dr. Oler A. Bartley.

The 1953 session of the Peninsula Conference concluded that it felt the need for: "a complete study and thorough survey of the entire Conference area to draw out all the facts to guide us in planning for new Churches and in understanding the building needs of existing congregations." "Such a survey would also aid us in discovering and interpreting the needs in areas such as the east side of Wilmington, where we now conduct Mission work, that such work may be strengthened. It is further expected that such a survey would be of help in solving problems of overlapping where Churches, both urban and rural, are now working in the same geographic areas."

The directive of the Conference was fourfold, namely:

- A. Planning for New Churches and Congregations
- B. Church Extension Needs of an Existing Congregation
- C. Relocation of Churches
- D. Disposition of Two or More Methodist Churches in the Same Neighborhood

Survey Data, Analysis and Recommendations

A. Planning for New Churches and Congregations

The need for new congregations arises most acutely in areas of rapidly expanding population. The standard metropolitan area of Wilmington is

among the areas of the Conference showing great increase. In certain other areas the population is increasing very rapidly. According to the Bureau of Census Statistics for Urban Places, Elkton in Cecil County, Maryland, showed an increase of 49.1% from 1940-1950, and Newark in New Castle County, Delaware, showed an increase of 49.5%.

It is suggested that new congregations be established in the following areas:

1. Wilmington Area

a. Brookside

Brookside is a development project near the city of Newark in the greater Wilmington area. Mr. Burkland, president of the development company, informed us that approximately 1,000 housing units have already been constructed and that all of them are now occupied except approximately 175, which are to be occupied within a few weeks. He also informed us that as soon as weather conditions permit, a construction of a million dollar shopping center will be started. All space in the center has already been rented. The projected plans call for the addition of 500 dwelling units per year until 3,500 units are erected.

Mr. Burkland reported that the average family in the project consists of four persons—a father and mother in their early thirties, and two-children. The assumption is that there will be a total of approximately 3,500 persons living in the area when the 1,000 units are occupied.

We were also informed that a site, 460 x 150 feet, had been reserved for two churches. Each church would thus have a site 230 x 150 feet. If it were not for a planned 1,000 car parking area immediately across the street, which should relieve the off street parking problem, the site would be entirely too small. Apparently it is the intention of the development company to permit two churches on the site, no more, no less.

The site will be given free to the churches. It will be necessary, however, to pay the proportionate share of developmental expenses. This would have to be done under any circumstances. Such an arrangement would give the two churches practically a monopoly of the area. Any other church would be compelled to locate outside. The school is across the street and one block north of the site. Drainage and sewage are such that a basement could very well conserve space which will be needed on so small a site.

The recommendation is that the coming session of the Conference make it possible to appoint a pastor to Brookside. There are sufficient families in the area to warrant the appointment. Moreover, the sooner such an appointment can be made, the sooner a church can be organized.

It will be necessary to provide a parsonage for the minister. The Board of Missions and the District Board of Church Location and Building should proceed to secure a house so that it will be available at Conference time.

b. Northwest section (New Ark Union Area)

The New Ark Union building is a non-denominational church with cemetery in the northwest section of Wilmington. Dr. Link has been asked. to start church and worship services in the building. A religious census is planned.

The recommendation is that the Conference authorize the appointment of a minister to the New Ark Union area and that the Board of Missions be authorized to secure a site in the area for a new Methodist church, provided the religious census warrants the appointment. The building is so small it would be outgrown very soon. It should be ascertained whether or not there are any zoning restrictions which would prevent the erection of a church in the area before purchasing a site. We understood that there were none, however, the fact should be definitely established before a site is chosen.

Whenever the new congregation has outgrown the New Ark Union Building, it will be necessary to move to a larger location. The distance moved should be reduced to the minimum.

2. Hack Point, Maryland

Hack Point is a village neighborhood providing the services needed by a summer resort population. During the past summer (1953) church school and worship services were held in the community building. Representatives from the group have approached the Reverend John D. Patterson of Cecilton, Maryland, the pastor of the Methodist church, requesting him to assume pastoral charge of Hack Point.

The recommendation is that the cabinet and Conference accept the invitation of the people to provide pastoral and ministerial service for them. It is probable this service could best be supplied by attaching Hack Point to one of the adjoining pastoral charges. For the present, at least, no new building will be required. Services may be held in the community building with a fair degree of satisfaction.

Areas to be kept in mind for establishing new congregations or churches:

1. Elkton

There are developments within the Elkton area which need to be kept in mind. At present, it is not believed advisable to attempt starting another church. However, it could very well be that within a three to five year period, such action should be taken.

2. Wilmington

The greater Wilmington area is one of the most rapidly expanding areas within the Conference. The District Missionary Society should study expansion carefully. It should develop a strategy with respect to the location of new churches and also with respect to developing the technique for marshaling the resources of the district for the development of new churches.

3. Salisbury

Although no specific recommendation is made for starting new churches in Salisbury, it is believed the redeployment of our present Methodist forces is of paramount importance and should receive first consideration.

4. Dover and a statistical out at solly as addenous how it surface to

The rapid increase in Dover's population, if continued over a few more years, will create the need for an additional Methodist church. The Board of Missions should be constantly alert to the situation.

5. Bay Bridge Area

While there are three or four Methodist churches now located in the area, it is possible that the population may increase to the point where new churches and/or greatly increased facilities of the present churches will be needed. This area should be constantly under survey. The possibilities of a greatly decreased toll over the bridge may add to the desirability of the area for residence because of its nearness to Annapolis, Baltimore and Washington, D. C.

B. Church Extension Needs Of An Existing Congregation

Some congregations find themselves in the midst of a rapidly expanding population and seemingly do not have the resources to meet the situation alone.

The following is submitted for consideration:

Wilmington Manor

The Wilmington Manor Church was organized about nine years ago. Progress has been sufficient to report 639 members as of the last Conference Minutes. Its membership is such that a larger sanctuary and religious education facilities are badly needed. However, the present site is entirely too small to permit the enlargement of the building, and at the same time provide any off street parking.

The recommendation is that the Conference Board of Missions cancel the present indebtedness and permit the church to relocate to the new site, to be provided by the Annual Conference. With this help it is felt that the Wilmington Manor Church should be able to carry its own responsibilities in the future.

Other Churches

A fund should be set up to be administered by the Board of Missions upon recommendation of the cabinet to meet other needs such as those represented by Kent Island (Stevensville), Rehoboth, Grasonville, Odessa. Burrsville, Delaware City, etc. It is impossible at this time to predict either the readiness of these and other similar situations to proceed or the exact amount which will be needed for assistance. Provision should be made. however, so that assistance may be given when needed with a minimum of delay.

C. Relocation of Churches

It is believed that many churches in the Conference will need to relocate. Specific recommendations have been made to the district superintendents and others. It seems wise to suggest that the Conference grant the Board

of Missions authority to give financial assistance in the relocation of churches which can thereby better serve the denomination and community.

D. The Disposition of Two or More Methodist Churches in the Same Neighborhood

Within the Peninsula Conference there are some churches which are the product of the merging of two or more local congregations. The Unification of two or more churches in the same neighborhood has thus far proved to be a desirable and necessary step in this Conference.

The cabinet has been encouraging churches with low membership potential, located in the neighborhood of another Methodist church to unite as rapidly as circumstances permit. It is the opinion of the Department of Research and surveys that a more definite policy be formulated and adopted by the Conference regarding procedure to be followed in the uniting of two or more Methodist churches in the same neighborhood.

When analysis indicates that two or more churches in the same neighborhood are in too close proximity, have too small a membership for an effective program, and must be placed on a circuit to secure pastoral leadership, then it is suggested that the Conference declare its policy to be the union of such churches.

In order that this objective be achieved the following program is proposed:

- 1. That the Conference request the Bishop to proceed as rapidly as possible to place such churches under one pastor.
 - That the Conference request all ministerial and lay members to lend every possible influence toward hastening the unification of two or more such Methodist churches in the same neighborhood.
 - 3. That the Conference request the Woman's Society of Christian Service and the Board of Lay Activities to assist in the process.
 - 4. That the Conference authorize the Board of Missions to cooperate with the cabinet in encouraging the unification of churches in close promixity by assistance in the purchase of sites, moving of buildings, purchasing or building parsonages and/or erection of new church buildings.
 - 5. That the Conference instruct its Board of Missions to make no appropriation to churches in the above category which refuse to cooperate in achieving the objective set forth.
 - 6. That the Conference request the cabinet in the plan of appointments to arrange circuit appointments so that no minimum salary funds be expended for those churches which refuse to cooperate.
- 7. That the Conference instruct the district superintendents, the District Boards of Church Location and Building, and pastors to withhold their approval to any request for remodeling, improvements, etc., from churches falling in the category of refusing to cooperate with the Conference in achieving the objective outlined above.
- 8. That the district superintendents and the District Boards of Church Location and Building be requested to evaluate any requests for

church building and improvement in the light of possible future uses of the church and/or churches in the immediate area.

In many instances where unification does not seem advisable, at the present time, there is need for cooperative action in order to make a greater impact upon community to build rapport between Methodist churches through cooperative programs, union services, pulpit exchanges, group ministries, Methodist Council with representatives from each church, etc.

Specific Suggestions and Recommendations

Certain situations not falling in the above listed categories were considered in the survey. The recommendations are as follows:

- 1. There should be a constant study of circuit lines, seeking that realignment which will make possible the most efficient ministry to our churches. Moreover, the uniting of two churches, one church becoming a station, etc., will throw the whole alignment of churches out of any given plan. A constant study is therefore urgently suggested.
- 2. Kingswood Methodist Church, Wilmington
 The Kingswood Methodist Church is located in an area of transition
 in the city of Wilmington. Its resources have dwindled to such a
 point that it is no longer able to serve the community.

The recommendation, therefore, is that Kingswood be discontinued and the property, except the parsonage, be sold to the Kingswood Community Center.

It is further suggested that the proceeds from the sale of the Kingswood Methodist Church be turned over to the Wilmington District Missionary Society as the most logical successor to the defunct City Church Extension Society, which has given many thousands of dollars to the Kingswood Church.

It is also suggested that the title for the Kingswood parsonage be transferred to the District Missionary Society. The parsonage and the funds from the sale of the Kingswood Church to be used by the Society for church extension purposes.

3. Asbury Methodist Church, Wilmington

Old Asbury, as it is affectionately called, is the mother church of Methodism in the area. Many Methodist churches, both white and colored, trace their ancestry back to Asbury. In these days of change, however, Asbury has entered upon hard times. It is located in an area of deterioration of the city. The older residents have been replaced by others of different race and religion.

It would seem that the Conference will soon have to make a choice of relocating Asbury or making a Methodist shrine out of the old church.

It should be pointed out that the relocation will entail, in all probability, relocating the adjacent cemetery. A special act of the legislature may be necessary and it will probably be a rather expensive

project. On the other hand, to maintain Asbury as a Methodist shrine, will also involve considerable expense and energy over a period of many years.

It is suggested that Asbury be attached to another church for pastoral care and worship services until arrangements can be made for relocation or for turning it into a Methodist shrine.

4. Wilmington District Missionary Society

It is suggested that the Bishop and the District Superintendent of the Wilmington District give consideration to organizing a Wilmington District Missionary Society. (See: Discipline, Paragraph 1219-1228). This suggestion is made for the following reasons:

- a. It will enable Wilmington Methodism to concentrate and utilize its resources for establishing new churches in this rapid growing area.
- b. The remainder of the Conference will react more favorably if it is known that Wilmington Methodism is doing everything it can to help itself.
- c. A District Missionary Society can develop an overall strategy for Methodism in the area. Goals and objectives for church extension can be formulated. Since the Society will be a continuing body, the goals and objectives can be pursued over a long period of time.
- 5. Specific recommendations have been made to the cabinet by the Department of Research and Surveys regarding certain administrative procedures on the respective districts, especially where two or more churches are in close proximity, with a view to more effective service for the churches of the Conference and the carrying out of the policies set forth in this report.
- 6. The Department of Research and Surveys also recommends that the Conference Board of Missions promote a church extension plan similar to those in operation in other areas known as Methodist Builders, Days Pay, The Thousand Club, etc. Additional encouragement and financial assistance for church extension may be realized in this way. The promotion may be done in cooperation with the Conference Board of Lay Activities and/or other groups, if desired.

Wesley Foundation at the University of Delaware

Certainly the superintendent of the Department of Research and Surveys can do nothing less than to urge as strongly as possible that the Peninsula Conference give every possible consideration to developing plans for providing a strong Wesley Foundation program at the University of Delaware.

The recommendation is that the Conference through its Board of Education study the Wesley Foundation needs of the educational institutions within the bounds of the Conference.

GEORGE WHITE DAWSON

George White Dawson was the son of Jasper Dawson and Mary Ann Richards Dawson. He was born near Ocean View, Delaware, April 24, 1873, lived his service to His Lord and went on to meet Him November 23, 1953. At an early age he gave his heart to the Lord and soon thereafter felt called to the Christian Ministry. He attended the local public schools, Wilmington Conference Academy, Dover, graduating June 11, 1896, and was a graduate of Drew Seminary, Madison, New Jersey, where he prepared for the ministry. He was ordained elder March 24, 1901 by Bishop Daniel Goodsell. He married Adelaide Victoria Corkran of Federalsburg, Maryland at Seaford, Delaware on April 12, 1899. Two ministers officiated—The Rev. Wilbur F. Corkran and the Rev. Louis P. Corkran, brothers of the bride. They had two children: Frances Naomi, now Mrs. Willard J. Stevenson of Pocomoke City and Clinton Goodsell Dawson of Bellefonte, Delaware. His wife passed away April 19, 1922.

September 20, 1923 Brother Dawson married Lydia Terrell Barrett of Elkton and Chestertown, widow of the Rev. Louis E. Barrett, D.D. They were united in marriage at her home in Chestertown by the Rev. Thomas J. Sard, pastor there at that time. He is survived by his widow, the two children of his first marriage, three grandchildren and an adopted daughter, Mrs. Ruby Dawson Calarese. He had been ill at his home in Middletown for a year.

George White Dawson served forty years in the active ministry. His first appointment was at Perryville when he became a member of the Wilmington Conference.—Wil. Conf: 1899-0 Perryville:—01-2 Bethel:—03-5 Mt. Lebanon:—06-8 Wesley, Wil:—09-10 Deal's Island:—11-12 Harrison St.:—13-22 Asbury, Wil:—23-24 Georgetown:—25-28 Cecilton:—29-31 Centreville:—32-34 Greensboro:—35-37 Hurlock:—38 Magnolia:—39-Retired.

His longest service was in Asbury, Wilmington, where he labored for ten years. One of his greatest satisfaction was paying off a long standing debt on the Community House while pastor at Cecilton, Maryland.

Although officially retired in 1939, he continued in many ways to serve. He and Mrs. Dawson built a home in Middletown and took an active part in the official life of Bethesda Church. He ranged far and wide selling Bibles and books as he called himself, "a minister of good literature," Wherever he went he prayed with the people and invited them to accept Christ and come to His church. He never failed to inform his pastor of prospects in or near Middletown.

Although he might be called a typical preacher of the "old school" he was deeply interested in the church as a whole. He was active in the Goodwill Industries, a trustee of Wesley Junior College and campaigned for its

reopening. He and his son became members together of the Masonic Order, Centreville, Maryland 180 A. F. & A. M.

During his illness one thing that always revived his interest was news about churches and men he knew. Prayer always reawakened the warrior of old to desire for new service under the banner of Christ.

Burial services were held at Yeatman Funeral Home in Wilmington by his "own pastor," the Rev. Howell O. Wilkins, and his superintendent, Dr. O. A. Bartley. The following poem was read at the service by Dr. Bartley, who had called on brother Dawson during his illness—

Charles Milton Griffeth, son of Charles K. and Isabel Griffeth was born in Bridgeton, New Jersey on June 6th, 1886. He spent his early years in New Jersey and received his training for the ministry at Drew Theological Seminary located at Madison, New Jersey, from which he graduated on April 25th, 1912.

While a student at Drew, he met and married Edith May Pooley, a teacher from Bloomsburg, Pa. The marriage took place on April 14th 1911. A son, Glen Charles, was born to Rev. and Mrs. Griffeth.

Prior to graduation, Rev. Griffeth preached as a student pastor under the District Supt. at Narrowsburg, N. Y.

In 1912 he joined the Wyoming Conference serving churches at Maple Grove, Centermorland, Rush, and Glenlyon.

In 1919 Rev. and Mrs. Griffeth came to serve in the New Jersey Conference where they were beloved by many. His appointments included,

Leesbury, Dorchester, Bethel-Camden, Tuckahoe, Cedarville, Cross Keys and Downer, Forked River and Lanoka, Lakehurst and Trinity-Camden. In 1943 Brother Griffeth transferred to the Peninsula Conference with Sudlersville, Maryland being his first appointment. His ministry was a wide one; like Jahnny Appleseed, he, too, scattered seeds of good that would grow and blossom for the Kingdom, all the way from Pennsylvania to Maryland.

One must have been impressed with the fine Christian character of Charles Milton Griffeth. He adorned the doctrine of Christ. "No sermon is bigger than the manhood of the minister;" this was the measurement of this man's message. Because of his character and conduct he made a great constructive contribution in his fields of labor. If there was a more conscientious man in the Christian Ministry, I have never had the privilege of knowing him. Charles Griffeth always glorified his master.

Brother Griffeth was gifted in many fields. He gained eminence as a writer under his pen name of Jean Martel. One could read his stories in many of our national magazines. During his years of ministry in New Jersey, he wrote syndicated articles on "Radiant Living." These appeared in many of the New Jersey and other States papers. He organized the larger parish plan which is still in use in the New Jersey Conference.

A preacher, printer, writer and painter, one so close to God was called suddenly to his heavenly home on April 29th, 1954.

Brother Griffeth had been in poor health for several years, and after the death of his wife retired from active work and moved to Baltimore to be near to his son. On December 14th, 1948 he was married to Miss Avis Sheppard, who lives to mourn the loss of a good husband.

The death of a good minister of Jesus Christ begins another history, of his continuing influence, the legend which takes the place of fact. This is not be no further comment, for the fine record he left explains itself.

WALTER ASBURY HEARN

It is only a year since this Conference paused to honor the memory of Susan McKechnie Hearn. Saddened and lonely, her devoted husband was soon to follow:

The Reverend Walter Asbury Hearn, D.D., was born in Edelman, Pennsylvania, September 17, 1885. He attended Lerch Preparatory School, Dickinson College, and Drew Theological Seminary. He was ordained a

deacon and joined the Wilmington Conference at Seaford in 1917 on his graduation from Drew.

From 1917 to 1918, Dr. Hearn was associate pastor of Grace Methodist Church, Wilmington. He then went overseas as a YMCA secretary. While in Paris, he was ordained an elder of the Methodist Church. The same year he was commissioned a first lieutenant and served as a chaplain in the U. S. Army, attached to the 6th. Regiment, U. S. Marines, Second Division, American Expeditionary Force.

In 1919, Dr. Hearn returned to his post at Grace Church where he remained for a year. He was then appointed pastor of the Methodist Church, Newark, Maryland where he remained for two years. Later he held pastorates at Atonement Church, Claymont, 1922-25; Bethesda Church, Middletown, 1925-28; Ebenezer Church, Easton, Maryland, 1928-32, Richardson Park, 1932-35; Centenary Church, Laurel, 1935-38.

In 1939, Dr. Hearn became superintendent of the Dover District of the Peninsula Conference, serving until 1945 when he assumed the pastorate of Elkton Methodist Church which he retained until he was retired at the Annual Conference in Union Church, Wilmington, May, 1953.

He received his doctorate from Dickinson College in 1940. He was a member of the Rotary Club and the Masonic Lodge of Pen Argyl, Pennsylvania, and Pi Chapter of Theta Chi Fraternity. He served as chaplain of American Legion posts at Smyrna, Easton, and Seaford and of the Department of Delaware from 1939 to 1940.

He also was active nationally in affairs of the Methodist Church, having been a delegate to several General Conferences and served on various commissions. Since 1944 he had been a member of the Board of Publications of the Methodist Church. He also was a member of the Commission on World Service and from 1940 to 1948 he was a member of the Federal Council of Churches of Christ in America.

Dr. Hearn's interest in Wesley Junior College dates back to the early years of his ministry. He served as a trustee of the college from 1939 to 1945 and chairman of its building committee in 1940-41. Upon his retirement from the active pastorate, he accepted a unanimous invitation by the President and trustees of the college to become Vice-President. After a summer tour of Europe, when he visited many of the places and people he affectionately remembered since the days he served there as chaplain, he assumed his duties at the college about September 1, 1953. Within a few short weeks he made a place for himself in the hearts of all members of the college community.

His death, which occurred on Monday, December 14, 1953, was caused by an embolism following an otherwise completely successful abdominal operation at the Delaware Hospital in Wilmington. His was the third death in his family within 10 days. A brother, Donald O. Hearn, died at Easton, Pennsylvania, on Saturday, and a sister-in-law, Mrs. George Huey, died at the same place several days earlier. She was a sister of Dr. Hearn's wife, Mrs. Susan McKechnie Hearn, who died on June 25, 1952. They had no children.

Dr. Hearn is survived by a brother, Dr. Raymond E. Hearn, superin-

tendent of schools at West Orange, New Jersey, and a sister, Mrs. Lawrence Young of Nazareth, Pennsylvania.

A memorial service, in charge of the Conference district superintendents, was held at Grace Church, Wilmington, on Wednesday, December 16. Burial followed the next day at Belfast, Pennsylvania.

HARVEY O. HUFNAL

Harvey O. Hufnal was born in Wilmington, Delaware March 29, 1905. His parents were Howard G. and Ethel Hufnal. He attended the public schools in Wilmington, the Conference Academy at Dover, Conference Summer School, and graduated from the Conference Course of Study. His home church in Wilmington was Scott Methodist Church. He left there to enter the ministry.

His first charge was Zoar Circuit in 1927. He then served the following churches: Elk Neck, Burrsville, Marydel, Crumpton, Hoopers Island, Pomona, Church Creek, Hebron, Greenwood, Ridgely, Parsonsburg, Crisfield (Mariners), Mt. Hermon, Friendship and St. Luke, Roxana.

On August 27, 1927, in the beginning of his ministry, he married Dorothy Treaster. Of this union, two children were born; Mrs. Maude Smith, now living in Parsonsburg, Md. and the mother of two children and Mr. Harvey O. Hufnal, Jr., who lives with his mother in Rehoboth, Delaware.

While serving Roxana, Delaware, Brother Hufnal's health failed rapidly until he lost his sight and was forced to retire in 1952. He moved to Rehoboth, Delaware. In a sense, Brother Hufnal just faded away. He went Home while in the Beebe Hospital, May 2, 1954. The funeral service was held in the Parsonsburg Methodist Church, Parsonsburg, Md., May 6, 1954. Interment was in the adjoining cemetery.

The writer met Brother Hufnal in 1933 in an hour of need. Brother Hufnal was a man of a generous heart and was willing to help. He always was a man willing to share. He had little of this world's goods, but always reached out a helping hand.

Brother Hufnal loved the Methodist Church and was a faithful pastor. He had the heart of the Good Shepherd; he was tender and sympathetic. He visited the sick and comforted the sorrowing. DISSTON W. JACOBS

In the Spring of 1913, a tall, gaunt, and very enthusiastic young man knocked at the door of the Wilmington Annual Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, seeking admission to the ranks of the itinerant ministry, and thus began the career of Disston W. Jacobs as a Minister of Christ which did not end until death overtook him suddenly on Wednesday, November 4, 1953, on a street of his much loved town of Rehoboth Beach, Delaware.

Disston was born in Kenton, Delaware, October 11, 1886, the son of the late Jonathan and Ella Greenwell Jacobs. He prepared for his ministry at Drew University and Theological Seminary.

In March of 1913, he married Miss Louise Gee of Wilmington, Delaware who became his constant companion in service to the Church, and is his only immediate survivor.

Dr. Jacobs served the following charges: Blades, Delaware; Rehoboth Beach, Delaware, Bridgeville, Delaware; Milford, Delaware; Newark, Delaware; Snow Hill, Maryland; Cambridge, Maryland; and was Superintendent of the Wilmington District from 1929 to 1934.

In 1942, because of a heart condition, he was placed on sabbatical leave, and retired the following year. Retirement, however, in his case did not mean quitting, for his interest in the Church never flagged, and his community interests expanded to such an extent that he seemed to be at the center of every civic enterprise.

Many honors were conferred upon him both by the Church and other institutions to which he gave such excellent service. Washington College, Chestertown, Maryland conferred the honorary degree of Doctor of Divinity in 1932; he was an active member and officer of the Rehoboth Kiwanis Club; he was Secretary of the Annual Conference for thirteen years; he was a delegate to the General Conference of the Methodist Church in 1932, and of the 1939 Uniting Conference, and in 1953 was appointed Chaplain of the Senate in the Delaware General Assembly.

The funeral was conducted by his Pastor, Rev. J. Howard Link, and the writer, in Epworth Methodist Church, Rehoboth Beach, on November 7, but, because of a heavy ice storm, the burial was delayed until the following Monday in Odd Fellows Cemetery at Smyrna, Delaware.

No finer tribute can we pay to "Jake" as he was affectionately called by his friends, than to quote from an editorial which appeared in the Delaware Coast Press, published in Rehoboth Beach, Delaware:

"HE LOVED PEOPLE"

"We're going to miss Dr. Disston W. Jacobs here at Rehoboth Beach. This man of God didn't end his ministerial work with his retirement from the pulpit ten years ago. Here at Rehoboth he kept his

finger on the pulse of the town. He was always ready with a timely word or deed for the underprivileged, the aged, and any one else who needed a kindly lift, or a word of encouragement.

He loved people and lived with them. . . And he always had a word of advice and suggestion for any civic betterments . . . When he was called upon for delivering the invocation at public affairs, for which he was in great demand, his choice of words and inspired thought were a miniature sermon that people never forgot.

Yes, we're going to miss seeing that tall, sparse figure dashing around the streets of our town in some public interest, or on some mission of mercy."

To these words his friends can add only "Amen" and "Amen".

LUCIAN LINWOOD POWELL

Lucian Linwood Powell, son of Alonzo Linwood and Edith Aydelotte Powell, was born in Accomack County, Eastern Shore of Virginia, on January 7, 1903.

He received all of his early education in the public schools at Chincoteague, Va. After spending two years at the University of Richmond he went on to Washington College at Chestertown, Md. for two years. Later on, for one year, he drove to Philadelphia once a week for one day's work at Temple University.

After finishing his college work, and while serving his first appointment at Powellville, Md., on June 7, 1929 he married Miss Reva Byrd Justis of Parksley, Va. Three children resulted from this union—Donald Linwood now in the U. S. Navy, Carolyn Reva, now finishing first year high school and Ruth Ann, now ready for third grade.

He was converted under the preaching of Thomas J. Sard. He and Thomas J. Rowlenson, contributed much to his desire and decision to become a Minister of Jesus Christ. Mrs. Powell says she never heard him suggest any other wish for his life's work. He felt as truly called to the Chaplaincy as to the Pastorate. He thought and talked the Chaplaincy for two years before entering it. After serving two and one-half years as Chaplain, he returned to the Pastorate.

During his twenty-four and one-half years in the Methodist Ministry, he served in succession the following appointments: Powellville, Secretary, Pomona, Bishopville, Bethel, Mt. Vernon, Cherry Hill, Pittsville (Grace), Chaplain in the Army of the United States, Zion Circuit, Vienna, and Christ Church, Federalsburg.

On Sunday morning, September 13, 1953, while driving to his regular preaching service at Eldorado, he suffered a terrible accident which broke nineteen of his bones and otherwise injured him. He was taken to Nanticoke Memorial Hospital at Seaford, Delaware, where he continually suffered intense agony until death took him on October 2nd. Funeral services were

held in Christ Church, Federalsburg, on Monday afternoon, October 5th. conducted by the Reverends Preston W. Spence, John J. Bunting, Sr., and Dayton E. McClain. The body was interred in the cemetery at Parksley, Virginia.

Our friend was good in many things, but in one thing he and his companion excelled; namely, in the art of bringing up children. Never more than once, and never in any thing but a gentle voice, do the children have to be told to do a thing, and it is done. They are always absolutely sure that what the parents say is right, and nothing else could be right. God give us more children like them.

He was my good and true friend. I loved him as I have loved but few men. I miss him sorely.

Lucian Linwood Powell was a conscientious pastor, faithful in calling upon his people, careful in his sermon preparation, a fluent speaker, and a good preacher. He was a man after God's own heart; a man of a sweet gentle spirit, loving and lovable, brimming over with the milk of human kindness. But in spite of his amiable disposition, he was by no means "a reed shaken by the wind." What be believed, he believed intensely, and would stand like a rock by his convictions. He could love the sinner with a most winsome tenderness, and yet, with prophet-like utterance, denounced the sin for the black and ugly thing that it was. He was a good minister of Jesus Christ. He is now enjoying his reward.

THE REVEREND WILLIAM ALLEN WISE

William Allen Wise was born November 5, 1862 at New Castle, Delaware, to consecrated and Christian parents, Mr. and Mrs. James M. Wise. On December 2, 1953 Mr. Wise answered the roll call of his Heavenly Father, a call which he was adequately prepared to answer.

During his late teens he heard and answered the call to the Christian ministry and, as was the custom in that period, he received special training for the ministry in Newark, New Jersey and New Orleans, Louisiana, under a distinguished clergyman known as Reverend Brewster. He met the requirements of the Church by becoming an ordained elder in 1884. He married Miss Fanny Sherwood on April 5, 1888, who remained a glorious helpmate throughout his entire ministry and who went to her Heavenly Father a few years ago.

A casual glance at the ministerial responsibilities of the Reverend Mr. Wise, will indicate something of his contribution to Methodism and, in particular, to the Methodism of the Peninsula Conference. As he served pastorates in this Peninsula he saw to it that new churches were built wherever they were needed. He built new churches at Cape Charles, Virginia; Silverbrook, Wilmington; and Northeast, Maryland. He retired in 1930 to return to Wilmington and enjoy a long and useful retired ministry.

In his retirement he was closely associated with the remaining members of his family.

The character of this beloved clergyman was a revelation of the results of the best in Christian nurture by good parents, a growing school system and a believing Church. Because of the long years of service which he gave, and his tremendous impact upon laymen and clergymen as a pastor and a District Superintendent, it is fitting to point out some of his characteristics. He heralded a profound evangelical faith into the midst of a materialistic and paganly-inclined era. He handled detail without getting lost or without parading his factual nature. He was courageous and bold in behalf of the Christian gospel which he preached beyond a shadow of a doubt. He was a "man's man" in every respect and overwhelmingly gentle and kind to both men and women. His love for the great out-of-doors, for all aspects and phases of the life of the Church and his tremendous impact upon thousands of lay people and hundreds of clergymen can never be forgotten.

The Reverend and Mrs. Wise were blessed with a wonderful Christian family. The members of his family consisted of: Mrs. Edna M. Wise Melvin, Allen S. Wise, Harold J. Wise (deceased), and Dr. Joseph C. Wise. To know the remaining members of this family is to know something of the beauty of a real Christian family, which was one of the great goals of the ministry of this good man of God.

I would be amiss in this all-too-scanty memoir if I did not mention the fact that the Reverend Mr. Wise remained a great example of Christian influence even unto the end of his life. He was most helpful to me during the three-and-a-half year period he lived during my ministry at McCabe Church and preached a sermon in November of last year on the occasion of his ninetieth birthday, which was wonderfully accepted by the Church.

Funeral services were conducted in McCabe Memorial Methodist Church by the minister, assisted by Dr. John N. Link, District Superintendent, Dr. E. J. Bond, one of the past ministers of McCabe Church, and the Reverend J. L. Sparklin. Interment was at Riverview Cemetery, Wilmington, Delaware. These beautiful and satisfying lines come to mind whenever one thinks of this distinguished servant of God.

ANNA L. BUCKSON

Anna L. Buckson, daughter of Artemus and Ann Eliza Smith, was born in Delaware on July 8, 1867.

She was educated in the public schools of Delaware and in West Chester Normal School, now known as, West Chester State Teachers College, West Chester, Pa. While attending this institution she received the training which helped her as a minister's wife with the children and youth work in later years.

On February 23, 1892 she was married to The Reverend Joseph A. Buckson. This consecrated couple had the call into the great work of Christ through the church. "Joe" as her husband was called, however was in poor health and they located on a farm near Smyrna. Here they worked together in the Smyrna Landing Church. Joe took to farming and Anna taught school.

The call continued to come for service in the greater work and in 1904 they found themselves going to their first appointment and into their first parsonage. During the itinerancy of 37 years she, with her husband, entered into the joys and sorrows of the people with whom they labored. She was a helpful companion in the ministry, a faithful wife, and a devoted mother. She loved her Christ, and her church which she served throughout her life.

During the entire ministry of this parsonage family, we find that she not only was a wife and mother but at times, because of illness of her husband, occupied the pulpit. The people whom they served knew full well that whenever she took her place in the pulpit, the Word of God would be truly expounded. Her efforts with the Junior and Epworth Leagues and Youth Choirs increased the influence the Church had in the early lives of the present church leaders. Truly Christian leaders are spotted throughout our Peninsula because of her Christian spirit and interest in bringing "the little ones unto Jesus." A personal note truly makes her Christian mission more vivid. On Sunday morning, February 28, when the writer of this Memoir was greeting his congregation, one of his members spoke of reading about my officiating at Mrs. Buckson service that afternoon. I inquired as to her association with the deceased. She said it was Mrs. Buckson who led her to the Lord with several other members of the Junior League. This truly was her mission.

At retirement she and her husband lived in Rehoboth Beach, Delaware. It was here that the writer became the pastor to the Bucksons. Their interest continued in the Church and its growth.

After her husband's death, she spent her time living in Rehoboth Beach and the home of her daughter, Rose B. Moore, Ridley Park, Pa. It was here

she shed the shell of mortal life and was clothed with immortality. Life triumphant came to her on February 24, 1954.

Funeral services were held in the Adkins Funeral Home, Lewes, Delaware on February 28th. The services were conducted by the writer, assisted by The Reverend Harry V. Branford. Her body was laid to rest in the St. Georges Cemetery, St. Georges, Delaware. The service at the grave was in charge of The Reverend S. T. Hamblin.

The following poem is expressive of the spirit and life of this servant of God.

"There is a path of peace and rest,
For Pilgrims here below;
The Saviour's footprints mark the way,
The Way I long to go.

It may not lead to wealth and fame,
Nor worldly pleasures bring;
But it will lead some day, into—
The City of the King.

ELLA KEMBLE GREENFIELD

A life so natural, so genuine, so filled with wholesome interests, so marked by a simple but very definite faith—that was Mrs. Greenfield. Her life came to its close just two days before Thanksgiving Day, Nov. 24th. 1953. We say, "Thanks be to God that such have been, Tho' they are here no more!" There in a well ordered room were her Bible, the Christian Advocate, a box of pictures, and some letters from her friends. There were rough places and hills to climb even at the end of the journey. Along with her own ill health came the death of her only son. However, faith and courage were unmistakable. She said that she left with her Heavenly Father what she herself could not control. The light that had followed all her day had a glow at the sunset hour.

Ella Kemble was born in Kemblesville, Pa., not far from Newark, Delaware. She was married to William Ernest Greenfield on April 26, 1888 and shared with him the problems and the joys of the Methodist ministry from the time he began that work until his death in 1936. Dr. W. A. Wise pays them both high tribute in the memoir for Mr. Greenfield in the 1937 Conference Journal.

Mrs. Greenfield's share in the work was not in public speaking nor in having official places of leadership. The place she won was in the hearts of the people among whom she lived. She was not an organizer nor a promoter of special activities but she made you feel that you ought to live and work for the Kingdom. She was not a leader of a choir but she awakened songs in the hearts of those who knew her. It was said of Jesus, "He went about doing good and people heard him gladly." Mrs. Greenfield was like that. People liked to be in her company and listened with interest to what she had to say. Perhaps it was because she so seldom brought herself into the conversation; or perhaps it was because she had such an interest in everyday things. Her mind was alert and she would delight you with an account of something she had observed or some experience out of other days. "She was a lovely lady", was the spontaneous testimony of one thoughtful friend. "She was good company" or "She was a great character" were other tributes not lightly spoken. She might not have had world wide fame but the people who day by day saw her walk along the street, or observed her talking among a group of friends, or standing on her porch greeting a passer-by, or sitting in her living room with some neighbors, knew that here was a choice spirit, like the picture in the thirty-first chapter of Proverbs, "A good woman, far more precious than jewels." She reminded one of Lydia, Paul's first convert in Europe, Lydia, "A Dealer in Purple". She dealt in goods that had quality. She did it in her own dress; she did it in her conversation; and she did it in her every day interests. Borrowing the words of First Corinthians, the thirteenth chapter, she was very patient, very kind. She made no parade,

gave herself no airs, was never rude, never selfish, never resentful. She was never glad when others went wrong. She was gladdened by goodness, always eager to believe the best. She will never disappear from our memories.

Denouncing nor scolding was not her way but, on occasion, she could speak plainly so that all would know where she stood and what she counted right or wrong. She was fearless.

She often referred to her husband and his work in the ministry. It was never too often. You did not grow tired of listening. It was never boastful but the tribute was clear and definite. Surely in this splendid ministry she had a large part. In the early days it was in small charges with small salaries, Mt. Pleasant in Cecil County or Hart's Chapel near North East that she labored with her husband. Then there was a ministry in Perryville, Md. and Berlin, Md. and Silverbrook and Brandywine in Wilmington. The church records in Perryville plainly show careful workmanship and the warm words of the people speak eloquently of the records written in the minds and hearts of the people. The retired years were spent in Perryville and that town is a better town because Mrs. Greenfield lived among the people loving them and being loved by them.

She is survived by her daughter-in-law, Mrs. J. Wilson Greenfield and two grandchildren, Miss Dorothy M. Greenfield and Edwin C. Greenfield, all of Brookside Park, Newark, Delaware. Funeral services were held in the Chandler Funeral Home, Wilmington, Delaware and interment in Silverbrook Cemetery. Otis P. Jefferson and Robert S. Hodgson officiated at the services.

In "Pilgrim's Progress" the final word for Mr. Valiant-for-the Truth was, "So he passed over, and all the trumpets sounded for him on the other side." And Whittier says, "Life is ever Lord of death and Love can never lose its own."

ADA TRUAX STEPHENSON

Born near Smyrna, Delaware, on September 14, 1873, Mrs. Robert Kerr Stephenson lived the faithful life of a Christian gentlewoman in every relationship until her death in Wilmington, Delaware, on September 8, 1953.

JANE GRAVES TAYLOR

Jane Graves Taylor was born December 10, 1871. She was the daughter of Edmond and Caroline Spedden Graves. Her birthplace and the scene of her childhood memories is a small community named Speddens in Dorchester County, Maryland. As a child, she attended Sunday School in the old Spedden's Methodist Church. It was here in the little country Church that she was born of the Spirit of God and joined the Blood-Washed throng in the march toward the Celestial City.

After her conversion, Jane became very active in the work of the Church. In time, she was made a Sunday School teacher, and for years she trained the little ones for Children's Day and other special occasions. Her interest in children, her musical talent, and her ability to inspire the confidence of young people, proved to be a blessing to her home community and to many other places where she was later to serve with her husband in the work of the Christian ministry.

In the course of time, we find Rev. William Prettyman Taylor serving as pastor of Beckwith and Spedden Charge. He was, at that time, a widower with one son. He needed an organist and asked Jane Graves to take the job. As she later said, "I accepted the offer and soon had a double job, that of wife and organist." Rev. William P. Taylor and Miss Jane Graves were married in Spedden's Methodist Church, October 30, 1902. The officiating minister was Rev. J. Harry Wilson.

For 29 years, Jane Taylor labored, side by side, with her husband in the work of the ministry. In every way, she proved herself to be a worthy help mate for one who had answered the call to preach the gospel.

The passing years brought both shadow and sunshine into their lives as they toiled for the Master in many fields of service. Their first child was destined never to see the light of day and his little body was laid to rest in Bethel Cemetery near Cheaspeake City, Maryland in 1906. The next and only surviving child of this union is Cornelius Graves Taylor, who was born at Ewell, Smith's Island, Maryland, May 26, 1908. Cornelius, who has achieved considerable distinction in the field of radio broadcasting, is now living at Tryon, North Carolina. He is an active Church man in that community. William Prettyman, Junior, who was Mr. Taylor's only son by his first marriage, died of pneumonia in 1918, while serving in the Air Corps at Ellington Field, Texas.

Rev. W. P. Taylor was forced to retire from the active ministry in 1931 due to ill health. His wife stood faithfully by his side in the years of re-

tirement as she had done in the period of his active ministry. On December 10, 1933 she said farewell to her beloved companion of the years as he left the scenes of earth for the Land of Eternal Day.

After her husband's death, Mrs. Taylor continued her deep interest in the work of the Lord. The last years of her life were spent in Baltimore where she could be near her beloved sister who has always meant so much to her. There she joined the Walbrook Methodist Church and became very active in the work of the Woman's Society. She maintained an active interest in the work of her beloved Church up to within 24 hours of her death.

The closing period of her life was spent in the valley of affliction, but she bore her sufferings with courage and patience. On the 31st. day of August 1953 while the loved ones watched beside her bed, she quietly left the realm of time to be forever with the Lord.

The funeral service was conducted by the Rev. Asbury Smith, pastor of Walbrook Methodist Church in Baltimore. Her body was brought to Bethel Methodist Cemetery near Chesapeake City, Maryland, and in the afternoon of September 3, she was placed to rest beside the Beloved Companion of the years. The grave side service was conducted by Rev. James Langrall, pastor of Gumboro Methodist Charge who is the writer of this memoir.

She is survived by one son Cornelius Graves Taylor and two grandsons, William and Leslie Taylor, all of Tryon, North Carolina. The only other surviving member of her family is her sister Mrs. Rowena Mitchell of Baltimore.

Mrs. Taylor was active for many years in the work of the W. C. T. U. and in the Order of the Eastern Star Lodge.

There were many elements in her character that helped to make Jane Graves Taylor an outstanding Christian and an ideal preacher's wife. She had the courage to face adversity without flinching. She was resourceful enough to meet the perplexing problems of life and find a Christian solution. She had a heart of tenderness and love that reached out to all people with sympathy and understanding. She had a faith in the Christ of Calvary that held her steady amid the storms of life. Her life, like a beacon of light, helped to guide many a faltering soul to the mercy seat of Christ. Outstanding among her many virtues is her faith in the old-fashioned gospel and her deep concern for the spiritual needs of young people. Always she was the friend of youth.

To the writer of this MEMOIR, she will always be remembered as Mother Taylor, for it was she, together with others who helped to guide our footsteps in the direction of Christ and the Christian ministry.

The crowning tribute to her Christian life may be found in these words of her own son, "One thing characterized my mother's life from its earliest days: Her love of God and a great desire to serve Him in every possible way."

"Servant of God, well done!
Thy glorious warfare's past,
The battle's fought, the race is won
And thou art crowned at last!"

SARAH ELIZABETH SILVER WALTON

On September 24th, 1864, Sarah Elizabeth Silver was born. The place of her birth was Red Lion, Delaware. Here she spent her childhood and girlhood, and, since she was converted at an early age, one might say that she had been a Christian her entire life.

A young minister, Rev. Olin Scott Walton, was sent to the Red Lion charge where he met and admired Sarah Silver. They were married on February 24th, 1891, at her home in Red Lion and this young wife remained faithful to her husband, her church and her God through the years.

In 1906, after serving at Preston, Maryland, the Rev. Mr. Walton retired and he and his family returned to Red Lion to reside in that Christian community for the remainder of their lives. Sarah Walton became active again in the church of her childhood. She brought her wholesome personality and the experience she had gained in the ministry to Lebanon Church and remained active in that church until about ten years ago when her health began to fail.

Mrs. Walton's health failed gradually and she was unable to take part in Church and community activities. Her mind, however, remained keen and she was interested in all of the events taking place in Red Lion. God must have heard and answered many of her prayers, and in the realm of the spirit she was able to do more than her share toward the ongoing of God's Kingdom.

About six days before her death a change took place. Those who knew and loved her realized that the end could not be far off. Her faithful daughter, Mary Walton Case, devotedly and unselfishly waited on her mother day and night until, on the morning of April 3rd, 1954, the twenty-third anniversary of her husband's death, God sent His messenger with the summons "Come home." Painlessly and without a struggle she answered the call, leaving to mourn her death the above mentioned daughter and two sons, William Clarence and Henri Orman Walton. One daughter, Irma, died in early childhood.

The funeral was conducted in Lebanon Methodist Church at Red Lion by Rev. D. J. Moore who had been her pastor during the days when she was active in the church. He was assisted by the present pastor and a former pastor, the Rev. P. R. Schauer. The burial was in the cemetery at St. George's, Delaware.

REGULATIONS OF THE BOARD OF MINISTERIAL TRAINING AND QUALIFICATIONS

For Receiving Local Preacher's License, Annual Conference Membership and Ministerial Orders in The Peninsula Conference.

- 1. It is the policy of The Board of Ministerial Training and Qualifications to follow the disciplinary requirements. Therefore this Board:
 - a. Requires that all necessary documents be presented to the Board before it officially will interview applicants for recommendation for Admission on Trial. However, the Board will always be available for guidance.
 - b. Refuses to recommend any candidate who has not fulfilled all disciplinary requirements according to the rules of the Board.
 - c. Will oppose the election of such candidates in the Executive Session.
- 2. Summarized Procedures required by The Methodist Discipline, 1952; and The Board of Ministerial Training and Qualifications of The Peninsula Conference.
 - a. Procedures For Obtaining A Local Preacher's License:
 - 1) Remember Paragraph 302, The Methodist Discipline: "No member of the Church shall be at liberty to preach without a license."
 - 2) Since The Peninsula Annual Conference holds District Conferences, a person desiring a Local Preacher's License must take the following steps: (Paragraph 303, 1, The Methodist Discipline, 1952)
 - a) Secure the recommendation of the Quarterly Conference of the Church of which he is a member.
 - Appear before, and secure the written approval of, The District Committee On Ministerial Qualifications (Paragraph 672, The Methodist Discipline 1952)
 - c) Pass satisfactory written examinations in the studies prescribed for candidates for License to Preach.
 - d) Be examined on the subjects of Doctrine and Discipline.
 - e) Agree to abstain from the use of tobacco and other indulgences which may injure his influence.
 - b. Procedures For Retaining A Local Preacher's License:
 - 1) Make a report by October 1 to the District Committee on Ministerial Qualifications concerning activities during the past year and desire for renewal of Local Preacher's License.
 - 2) A minimum of four books should be read each year by Local Preachers who are not taking The Conference Course of Study: two in the field of doctrine, two in the field of preaching. The Report to The District Board of Ministerial Qualifications should contain a list of the books read in these fields during the year.

c. Procedures For Receiving Annual Conference Membership:

1) On Trial:

1954

- a) Present a recommendation duly signed by-
 - (1) The president and secretary of The District Conference.
 - (2) Or by the chairman and secretary of The District Committee on Ministerial Qualifications.
- Pass a written examination in Studies Prescribed For Candidates For Admission On Trial.
 - (1) Graduates of Accredited Colleges who are also graduates of Accredited Schools of Theology shall be exempt from examination in The Conference Course Of Study (Paragraph 325)
 - (2) Including examinations in Methodist History, Polity and Doctrine if they can furnish credentials in the same Text, or its equivalent, from their Seminary. (Paragraph 325)
- c) Deposit with the registrar of The Conference Board of Ministerial Training and Qualifications:
 - (1) Approved Permanent Record forms containing satisfactory written answers to questions as to age, religious and Church experience, Call to the Ministry, educational record, educational plans, etc.
 - (2) Approved Physical Examination form. This physical examination must be taken in the Clinic of The Memorial Hospital, Wilmington, Delaware, or with Dr. David Gilmore, Salisbury, Md.
- d) Must be a graduate of an approved Liberal Arts College. Under extraordinary circumstances, The Annual Conference, by a three-fourths vote, may admit a candidate in accordance with the provisions of The Discipline.
- e) Must have had one full year's work in a Theological Seminary accredited by the University Senate.

2) Full Membership:

- a) Must be a graduate of a Theological Seminary accredited by the University Senate. At least one year of Seminary work should be done in a Methodist Seminary. Where it has not been, then special work shall be required to secure adequate instruction in Methodist History, Doctrine and Policy.
- b) Must have had two years' successive appointment-
 - In Itinerant Work on Circuits or in Stations after being received on Trial.
 - (2) Or Instructor in one of our Institutions of Learning after having been received on Trial.

MAY

- c) Must have been elected to Deacon's Orders
- d) Must answer in open Conference the 19 Disciplinary Questions.
- e) Must present a recently issued Certificate of good physical health. (See 1C) 2) above)

d. Procedures For Receiving Ministerial Orders:

1) Deacons:

- a) Have authority to:
 - (1) Preach
 - (2) Conduct Divine Worship
 - (3) Perform the Marriage Ceremony
 - (4) Administer Baptism
 - (5) Assist an Elder in Administering The Lord's Supper.

b) Eligibility:

- (1) Local Preachers:
 - (a) Must have been Local Preachers for four consecutive years.
 - (b) Must present to the Annual Conference a recommendation for Deacon's Orders from The District Conference.
 - (c) Must have completed satisfactorily the Studies prescribed for Local Preachers who are candidate for Deacon's Orders.
- (2) Approved Supply Pastors:
 - (a) Must have been approved supply pastors in regular service for two full years.
 - (b) Must have completed-
 - The first two years of The Conference Course of Study.
 - 2. The Studies indicated for Reception on Trial.
- (3) Members on Trial in The Course of Study:
 - (a) Must have been on Trial in The Annual Conference two years.
 - (b) Must have completed satisfactorily the first two years of the Conference Course.
- (4) Seminary Students:
 - (a) Must have been Local Preachers two full years.
 - (b) Must have completed one-third of Degree Course in Approved Seminary.
 - (c) Must have been Received on Trial.
- 2) Elders:
 - a) Have Authority to:

- (1) Preach
- (2) Conduct Divine Worship
- (3) Administer the Sacraments of Baptism and The Lord's Supper.
- (4) Perform the Marriage Ceremony.

b) Eligibility:

(1) Local Preachers:

- (a) Must have been Local Deacons for two consecutive years.
- (b) Or have served as regularly appointed pastors for two full years after having been ordained deacons.
- (c) Must present recommendation for Elder's Orders from District Conference.
- (d) Must have completed satisfactorily the studies prescribed for Local Deacons who are candidates for Elder's Orders.

(2) Approved Supply Pastors:

- (a) Must have been ordained Deacons.
- (b) Must have been serving as regular approved supply pastors for one full year since their ordination.
- (c) Must have satisfactorily completed the third year of the Conference Course.
- (d) The fourth year in the Conference Course must be completed within two years if the candidate is to be continued as an approved supply pastor.
- (3) Local Deacons: (Who have been Received on Trial)
 - (a) Must be in Full Connection in The Annual Conference.
 - (b) Must have been Local Deacons one year immediately preceding such election.
 - (c) Must have completed satisfactorily the studies prescribed for Local Elder's Orders.
- (4) Conference Members in The Conference Course:
 - (a) Must have been in Full Connection in The Annual Conference for one year.
 - (b) Must also have been Deacons for the same time.
 - (c) Must also have completed satisfactorily The Conference Course.

(5) Seminary Students:

- (a) Must have been received on Trial.
- (b) Must have been elected to the office of Deacon.
- -2 (c) Must have been Deacons at least one year.
 - (d) Must have been admitted into Full Connection.

MAY

- e. Procedures For Ministers Coming From Other Churches:
 - 1) Pre-requisites:
 - a) Must have come from other Evangelical Churches.
 - b) Must present suitable testimonials of good standing.
 - c) Must give assurances of their Faith, Christian experience, other qualifications.
 - d) Must give evidence of their agreement with us in Doctrine and Discipline.
 - e) Must present a certificate of good health.
- 2) Possible Ways of Being Received:
 - a) Quarterly Conference may receive them as Local Preachers:
 - (1) Pending recognition of their Orders by Annual Conference, they are not entitled to administer the Sacraments.
 - (2) The Annual Conference may recognize their Orders as Local Deacons or Local Elders provided they pass satisfactorily the Studies for Local Preachers.
 - b) District Conference may recommend them:
 - (1) Annual Conference may then-
 - (a) Recognize their Orders.
 - (b) Receive them into Conference Membership.
 - (2) At its discretion may require them to take a part or all of the Conference Course of Study.
 - c) Annual Conference may receive their application directly:
 - (1) If they can meet the educational standards required of Methodist Ministers.
 - (2) If their credentials are recognized, they may be received into Membership on Trial, or in Full.
 - (3) Must answer satisfactorily the Disciplinary Questions of Par. 321, 343.
 - (4) Those from other than Methodist Churches must take upon themselves our Ordination Vows without the reimposition of hands.
 - d) Annual Conference:
 - (1) May receive on equal standing preachers who are on Trial in the ministry of another Methodist Church.
 - (2) Before admitting them to full membership, special care must be used to see that their examinations are satisfactory.
- 3. Other Specific Regulations:
 - a. Examinations:
 - 1) At the meeting of the Board of Ministerial Training and Qualifications on March 16, 1953, it was voted that—

- a) All candidates for Local Preacher's License shall be required to send the written work required in the 1952 Students' Handbook to the indicated members of The Board of Ministerial Training and Qualifications, and to take the examinations from those same Board Members at the indicated time.
- b) All studies in The Conference Course beyond the Local Preacher's License Course, covering Admission on Trial, and the studies outlined for the four year course, or their equivalents, shall be taken—
 - (1) In an accredited Theological Seminary if at all possible.
 - (2) In Summer Schools of accredited Theological Seminaries.
 - (3) Or by correspondence through the Candler School of Theology, Emory University, Georgia.
- 2) Books and Examiners for License to Preach: 1954-55.

The Bible: The Books of Matthew, Mark, Luke, John-O. P. Jefferson.

Cherry: The Beliefs Of A Methodist Christian-W. P. Kesmodel.

Martin: To Fulfill This Ministry-J. R. Mackey.

Church: Knight Of The Burning Heart-B. E. Reynolds.

- 3) Place: Wesley Junior College, Dover, Delaware.
- 4) Time:
 - a) Monday, October 18, 1954, 10:00 A. M.
 - b) Monday, March 21, 1955, 10:00 A. M.
- 5) Procedures:
 - a) Written work for each Book, as required by the 1952 Discipline and outlined in the 1952 Student's Handbook—
 - 1) Shall be sent to the Examiner
 - a) Before October 1 if October examinations are desired.
 - b) Before March 1 if March examinations are desired.
 - Failure to meet this schedule forfeits the right to take the examination until the next scheduled date.
 - b) Examinations shall be in writing, both questions and answers.
 - c) The grade of 70 is required for passing. All papers submitted will be examined with reference to the use of English. Grammatical construction as well as the subject matter shall be taken into account in determining the grade in each subject.
- b) Personal Interviews:
 - Each candidate for Admission on Trial, and for Admission into Full Membership, must appear before the Board of Ministerial Training and Qualifications at Wesley Junior College, Dover, Delaware, Mon-

day, March 21, 1955, 10:00 A. M. for personal interviews concerning his qualifications and fitness for the Christian Ministry.

- Notification of intention to appear before the Board of Ministerial Training and Qualifications shall be sent to the Registrar at least ten days before this meeting.
- c) A recently issued certificate of good health shall be required of each candidate for admission on Trial, and another when he applies for Admission into Full Membership.
 - This certification shall be on the comprehensive Form provided by The Commission on Ministerial Training, and may be secured from the Registrar.
 - 2) The examination must be taken through the Clinic of The Memorial Hospital, Wilmington, Delaware or with Dr. David Gilmore, Salisbury, Md. Arrangements for examinations should be made at least three weeks before the March Meeting of The Board.
- d) All under-graduates, and Approved Supply Pastors, are urged to attend the Pastors' School which will be held at the Peninsula Conference Camp Pecometh, Chester River, July 5 to July 9, 1954.
- e) The Methodist Schools of Theology, at the direction of The Commission on Ministerial Training, are establishing Summer Schools for Approved Supply Pastors in the Course of Study. We recommend these Schools. Free Scholarships are available for Approved Supply Pastors who are graduates of High Schools. The one in The Westminister Theological Seminary will be held from June 14 to July 2, 1954.
- f) Probationers in the Conference are reminded that The Discipline allows two years only On Trial for the purpose of annuity upon retirement. Par. 321, 331. Members in full connection should read Par. 345-347. Approved Supply Pastors should read Par. 315-320.
- g) Books for the Conference Course of Study may be purchased at The Methodist Publishing House, 516 North Charles Street, Baltimore 3, Maryland.

XI MISCELLANEOUS

(a) CONFERENCE RULES OF ORDER

- Rule 1. The Conference shall meet at 9.00 A. M., and adjourn at 12.30 P. M. But the Conference may, in its discretion, alter the time of meeting and adjournment.
- Rule 2. The President shall decide all questions of order, subject to an appeal to the Conference; but in case of such an appeal the question shall be taken without debate, except that the appellant may make a simple statement of the grounds of his appeal.
- Rule 3. All resolutions and motions shall be in writing, if the President, Secretary, or any two members request it.
- Rule 4. When a motion is made and seconded, or a resolution is introduced and seconded, or a report presented and read by the Secretary, or stated by the President, it shall be deemed in possession of the Conference; but any motion or resolution may be withdrawn by the mover, with the consent of the Conference, at any time before amendment or decision.
- Rule 5. The motion to Lay on the Table, or to Take from the Table, and for the Previous Question, shall be taken without debate.
- Rule 6. No new motion or resolution shall be entertained until the one under consideration has been disposed of, which may be done by adoption or rejection, unless one of the following motions shall intervene, which shall have precedence in the order in which they are placed, namely:
 - (1) To fix the time to which the Conference shall adjourn.
 - (2) To Adjourn.
 - (3) To take a recess.
 - (4) To lay on the table.
 - (5) For the previous question.
 - (6) To postpone to a given time.
 - (7) To refer.
 - (8) To substitute.
 - (9) Amendment.
 - (10) To postpone indefinitely.

A motion to amend shall be in order, and a substitute for both amendments may be received, which substitute may be amended only once, and if a substitute be accepted, it shall operate as an amendment to the original proposition.

- Rule 7. When a member is about to speak in debate, or to deliver any matter to the Conference, he shall rise and respectfully address the President, but shall not proceed until recognized by him.
- Rule 8. No member shall be interrupted while speaking, except by the President to call him to order when he departs from the question. or uses personalities or disrespectful language; but any member may call the attention of the President to the subject when he deems a speaker out of order, and any member may explain when he thinks himself misrepresented.

- Rule 9. When a member desires to a question of privilege, he shall briefly state the question; but it shall not be in order for him to proceed until the President shall have decided it a privileged question.
- Rule 10. No person shall speak more than twice on the same question, nor more than ten minutes at one time, without leave of the Conterence; nor shall any person speak more than once until every member choosing to speak shall have spoken.
- Rule 11. When any motion or resolution shall have been acted upon by the Conference, it shall be in order for any member who voted with the prevailing side to move a reconsideration; but a motion to reconsider is a non-debatable motion and shall be decided without debate.
- Rule 12. No member shall absent himself from the service of the Conference without leave, unless he is sick or unable to attend.
- Rule 13. No member shall be allowed to vote on any question who is not within the bar of the Conference at the time when such question shall be put by the President, except by leave of the Conference when such member has been necessarily absent.
- Rule 14. Every member who is within the bar at the time a question is put shall give his vote, unless the Conference, for special reasons, shall excuse him.
- Rule 15. It shall be in order for him to move that the question be taken without further debate on any measure pending, except in cases in which character is involved, and if sustained by two-thirds, the question shall be taken.
- Rule 16. The motion to adjourn shall be taken without debate, and shall always be in order, except, (1) when a member has the floor; (2) when a question is actually put, or a vote is being taken; (3) when the question is pending on seconding the demand for the previous question; (4) when the previous question has been called and sustained, and is still pending; and (5) when a motion to adjourn has been negatived and no business or debate has inter-
- Rule 17. All reports of the Boards, Commissions and Committees, shall be published and mailed to the Members of the Annual Conference ten (10) days prior to the date of meeting of the Annual Conference. Reports to be included in this mailing must be in the hands of the Secretary thirty (30) days prior to such Session.
- Rule 18. No report shall be received or adopted by the Conference until a copy has been placed in the hands of the Secretary.
- Rule 19. These rules shall not be suspended or amended except by a vote of two-thirds of the members present and voting.
