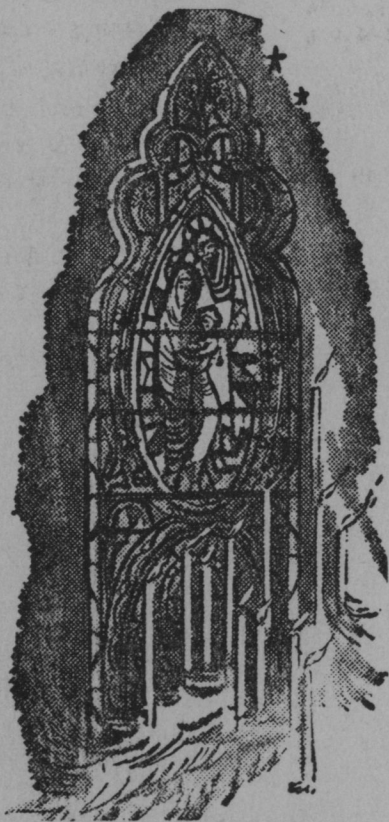

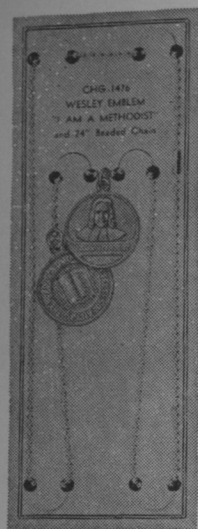

## WESLEY MEDAL—"I AM A METHODIST"



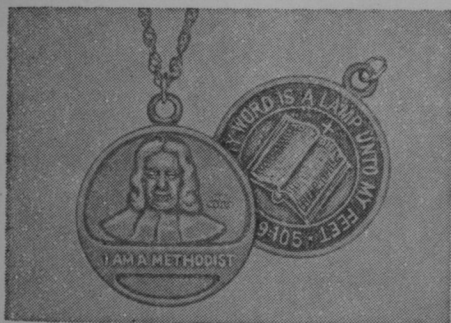

7. The Conference Minutes be made the Official Journal and the Secretary be authorized to edit and condense the same.
8. The Secretary send greetings to all members not able to attend the Conference Session on the report of such cases by the District Superintendents.

9. Members may be excused from sessions upon report to their Superintendents or the Secretaries.

10. The Commissions and Committees as printed in the Minutes become the Commissions and Committees of the Conference with such corrections as need be made.

11. Motions on the floor must be presented to the Secretary on forms provided for this purpose.

12. The Committee on the Journal is to present its report immediately after the morning Devotional service.

13. If and when the customary drafts are received from the Chartered Fund and the Publishing House, they shall be endorsed and turned over to the proper treasurer.

**RULES GOVERNING ELECTION OF DELEGATES:** In accordance with Paragraphs 22-25, 501, 517-18, Discipline of 1956 the Peninsula Conference may elect three Ministerial and three Lay Delegates to the General Conference and five additional Ministerial and five additional Lay Delegates to the Jurisdictional Conference.

The additional delegates to the Jurisdictional Conference are the Reserve Delegates to the General Conference in order of their election.

1. That after all the delegates to the General Conference have first been elected on a separate ballot, the Delegates to the Jurisdictional Conference as reserves to the General Conference be elected by balloting.

2. That there shall also be elected three Ministerial Reserve and three Lay Reserve Delegates to the Jurisdictional Conference.

3. That every member entitled to vote shall be ordered within the Bar of the Conference and those not within the Bar of the Conference shall not be entitled to vote except the treasurer, the statistician and their assistants, whose ballots shall be received by the tellers.

4. That any ballot containing fewer or more than the number of names to be voted for shall be rejected.

5. That where there are two or more members of the same name, only such ballots as containing the Christian name or initials of the person for whom the ballot is cast shall be counted, but such omission of the Christian name or initial shall not affect the other names on the ballot.

6. That a majority of the legal ballots cast shall be required. A majority of the legal votes cast on any ballot shall elect except when a larger number of members receive such a majority than are to be elected; in which case the persons receiving the highest vote shall be elected to the total number of places to be filled. A tie vote between two persons when but one place remains to be filled shall be disregarded and another vote shall be taken.

4. The Board of Ministerial Training and Qualifications submits the following memorial to the Peninsula Annual Conference: 1. That Paragraph 325, Section 3, of the 1956 Discipline be stricken. (This section has to do with what are called "exceptional" cases among Approved Supplies who may upon recommendation "by a three-fourths vote of the Cabinet and a

three-fourths vote of the Board of Ministerial Training and qualifications" be admitted on Trial without fulfilling the normal educational requirements for Admission on Trial. 2. And that Paragraph 343, section 2, also be stricken. (This section, based upon Paragraph 325, Section 3, allows two years of special study by correspondence under the direction of the Department of Ministerial Education as a substitute for the normal educational requirements for Admission into Full Connection.)

5. The John Street Methodist Church submits the following memorial to the Peninsula Annual Conference: To designate a Commission of the General Conference, with power to formulate plans for the appropriate recognition and celebration in 1966 of the BI-CENTENARY OF AMERICAN METHODISM, which will then occur, and to report said plans in detail to the 1964 General Conference for the consideration and action of that body. **SOCIAL AND ECONOMIC RELATIONS:** The report of the Board of Social and Economic Relations was presented by Joseph W. Brosius, Chairman and adopted by the Conference.

**MOTION:** On a motion of Ralph Minker, the Secretary was instructed to print the following statement submitted by Joseph W. Brosius in his report to the Annual Conference:

The Annual Report of The Board of Social and Economic Relations has been printed and there is no need for me to take your time now to read it.

I do wish to take a few minutes to express my personal feelings for this Board, its place in the Church, and of the need to strengthen it.

I quote two paragraphs from The Social Creed.

"The interest of the Methodist Church in social welfare springs from the Gospel and from the labors of John Wesley, who ministered to the



physical, intellectual, and social needs of the people to whom he preached the gospel of personal redemption."

"In our historic position we have sought to follow Christ in bringing the whole life, with its activities, possessions, and relationships, into conformity with the will of God."

We fall far short of this position so many times. This board was established in 1952 for the purpose of directing our attention to our social responsibilities. Many of us try to separate our secular life from our spiritual life to the great detriment of ourselves and the Church.

Last week at the meeting of stewards in one of our local churches, it was proposed that they speak out against a law passed by the Delaware Legislature making the use of the whipping post mandatory. One of the stewards objected and said, "Let's get back to the business of the Church." Is this not the business of the Church? Is this the attitude Christ would have taken?

We need a strong Board to direct this program of human and social rights. We have a Board of twenty-five, six from each District and General Carpenter. In the period from November, 1956, to December, 1958, there were ten meetings of the Board. If every member had attended each meeting, there would have been 250 present. Actually, there were 80 present or 32%.

Nine members never attended, three attended once, one attended twice, four attended four meetings, three attended five meetings, one attended seven, three attended nine, and our secretary attended all ten meetings.

Thirteen members had a representation of five present instead of 130 or 3.8%. I do not criticize these people since they were never consulted as to whether they would or could serve. They may have very legitimate reasons that prevent them from serving.

The other twelve members had an attendance of 75 out of a possible 120 or 62.5%. This, I consider an excellent batting average in any league. Without them, the Board would not exist. I have asked the Committee on Nominations to do something to correct this situation. They tell me that under the present system they can do nothing.

I hope the Conference will take action to correct this for the next quadrennium.

My term on the Board expires in 1960 along with seventeen others. Of the men remaining on the Board, one has attended all meetings since he was elected; the others have never attended a meeting.

I am greatly concerned about this and am firmly convinced that the Nominating Committee must explain the responsibilities and receive the consent to serve from persons before they nominate them. They say this is impossible. I believe it is necessary in order that we may have a strong Board, and I believe a strong Board can be of the utmost value to the building of Christ's Kingdom in this Conference.

MOTION: The following motion was made by J. B. Dickerson and adopted by the Conference:

I move that the Peninsula Conference Nominating Committee be requested to contact all prospective Board members and secure their consent to serve on a given Board before they are elected.

MOTION: The following motion by J. Leas Green was made and adopted by the Conference:

I move that the report of the Board of Temperance be adopted without reading but that it shall be summarized by the Chairman.

The motion was adopted.

PRESENTATION: Milton L. Pope presented Otis P. Jefferson, Chairman of the Board of Temperance, who spoke to the Conference summarizing the main points in our emphasis on Temperance.

It is recommended that the Legislative Committee be merged with the Board of Social and Economic Relations, and that all matters previously referred to the Committee henceforth be referred to the Board.

The report and recommendation was adopted by the Conference.

CHURCH PROPERTY: The following resolution was made by John N. Link and was adopted by the Conference:

WHEREAS all the provisions of Paragraph 188, section 1, the 1956 Methodist Discipline, having been met by securing the approval of our presiding Bishop, G. Bromley Oxnham, and the unanimous approval of the four District Superintendents of the Peninsula Annual Conference, the Wilmington District Board of Church Location and Building, the Scott Church Quarterly Conference, and of the duly authorized congregational meeting of the Scott Church Membership, for the sale of Scott Methodist Church, Wilmington, and for the creation of the Scott Memorial Trust Fund wherein the funds received from the sale of the Scott Church property shall be invested by the Bank of Delaware, the income administered by the Board of Trustees of the Peninsula Annual Conference upon the recommendation of the Superintendent of the Wilmington District primarily for ministerial education scholarships, and secondarily for Church Extension incentive gifts,

BE IT RESOLVED that Scott Church be discontinued as an appointment in the Wilmington District of the Peninsula Annual Conference of the Methodist Church.

MOTION: The following motion was made by Elmer Bennett:

I move that consideration be given to establishing a Bishop's Hour at future Annual Conferences. The motion was referred to the Program Committee.

MOTION: The following motion was made by J. L. Green and adopted by the Conference:

I move that after the reading of appointments tomorrow, this Conference shall adjourn.

PRESENTATION: John E. French presented H. E. Anderson and Charles H. Mack, Pastors of Salisbury Churches.

PRESENTATION: William F. Wright of the Baltimore Conference was presented by J. L. Green.

PRESENTATION: Ralph Minker presented Preston Adkins. Mr. Adkins issued an invitation to the Annual Conference to meet in Ocean City and addressed the Conference in reference to the invitation. The invitation was referred to the Committee on Conference Entertainment.

RECOGNITION OF RETIRING MINISTERS: O. H. Connelly, W. A. Donoway, J. A. Layton, J. N. Link, G. H. McWilliams and L. E. Windsor, who have received the retired relationship this year, were called. A brief service was conducted by Bishop Oxnham and they were presented with certificates and badges in recognition of their loyal and devoted service to the Church.

After the singing of a hymn Bishop Oxnham addressed the two groups welcoming the new members and paying respect to those who had served so magnificently and are now retiring from the active Ministry.

Conference adjourned with a prayer and benediction by Bishop Oxnham.

### (a) District Superintendents

#### DOVER DISTRICT

Roy L. Tawes, Superintendent

Bishop Oxnam and Members of the Conference:

After reading my report one year ago a man said to me: "Well, the honeymoon is over. I want to hear your report a year from now." Here is the second report, and I am still in love with my job. I sometimes tell this story at banquets: Said she: "Dearie, will you love me when my hair has turned to silver?" And he replied: "Why not, honey? I have loved you through five colors already." Love always wins the day. The romance of this ministry never ends. To keep alive a supreme concern for people, to sense eternity in the commonplace, is not to lose the vision splendid. Quoting George A. Gordon: "The minister's calling, to one who is fond of it, is an endless romance." The Dover District has made me a better man. Not all the paths have been smooth, but no place has been too difficult to get through. All the words spoken have not been pleasant, but there was never a time we could not pray. So do we come to the end of another year with a successful report made possible by our being in love with each other.

Newest members of the district family on earth are Susan Estelle Covington, born February 21, 1959, and Jay Arthur Blundon, born October 25, 1958. Newest members of the district family in heaven are the Rev. Charles W. Spry, Mrs. Anna E. Kelly, Mrs. Dorsey Blake and Mrs. D. T. Campbell. We have a fixed faith in the eternal worth of life. Life comes from God and returns unto God. Thought Edwin Markham: "The few little years we spend on earth are only the first scene in a Divine Drama that extends into Eternity."

Retiring this conference are J. E. Layton and L. E. Windsor. They have been good soldiers of Jesus Christ, and have had on whole armor of God. They retire in honor.

Our membership has increased this year by 1512. This is an increase over the previous year. Churches reporting more than ten accessions are:

Zion-Wesley 14; Harbeson 13; Lincoln 13; Odessa 12; Reliance 12; Roxana 10. A word of caution needs to be said concerning the removal of names from the church roll. Every requirement of the Discipline and the conscience should be met. It

is never a light matter to terminate church membership. I kept one church from dropping a long list of names, because not a single effort had been made to locate or interest these people.

One woman, wearing a fur coat and diamonds, and driving a big car, commented on her district superintendent: "He's so mercenary!" Other officials of her church did not agree, and gave their ministers a raise in salary. I am very grateful for those leaders in my churches who see the need for adequate salaries, and this year have increased them to the amount of \$10,800. Additional amounts for expenses and utilities represent an increase of \$4975—a grand total for increased ministerial support to the amount of \$15,575.

St. John's, Seaford, has a new parsonage of colonial brick at a cost of \$29,000 paid in full. St. John's is erecting one of the largest social-educational units in the conference. The building, 65% completed, will cost \$250,000. Mt. Olivet, Seaford, is planning an expansion program. Ocean View is completing its educational unit. New educational units are up at Cheswold and Whitesville, and others are planned at Magnolia and Townsend. Rehoboth is expecting to start work on its new sanctuary in September, and Milton will begin to build in the near future. Rehoboth has \$86,000 in cash and pledges, and Milton has \$69,000. The remodeled sanctuary at Grace, Georgetown, does justice to the name of that church. The cost was \$58,468. A new organ was donated by the Methodist men at Goshen, Milton, and the organ rebuilt at Grace, Georgetown.

The home district has responded well to the Capital Improvement Fund for Wesley College. The total amount given is \$26,266. One church overpaid \$300, ten churches paid in part, and eleven churches did not share. For the Wesley Operation Fund the amount raised is \$9279. The amount raised for Wesley Theological Seminary is \$9087.

Three churches did not meet in full their acceptances on General and Annual Conference Benevolences. Rally Day offerings amounted to \$1679; Wesley Foundation \$5423; Methodist Youth Fund \$992; Advance Specials \$3912; World Wide Communion \$1432; Week of Dedication \$708; Board of Child Care \$4290. To this latter sum is to be added \$700 contributed by 1000 men in attendance at the Lenten breakfasts. John R. Rogers is an effective district lay leader.

Our Woman's Society of Christian Service has gone forward under the capable leadership of Mrs. Granville Tyndall. This year the annual pledge was increased \$1000. The new president, Mrs. Edgar Timmons, of Grace Church, Millsboro, will prove a worthy successor.

Many of the farmers have had the "blues" this year. They have had rough going in the chicken market. Our financial year however in the



church has been better. The chicken market will return to profitable figures. I have tried to cheer my people by saying: Chicken will always be on the menu as long as there are Methodist preachers to set the example. Seriously there have been times when, in my childhood and youth, I saw the waters fail to yield the harvest of the deep. Seamen were often hard up against the fact of existence, but they stayed by God and the Church until winds of the sea made happy music again.

It is told that a certain minister, during the baseball season, closed the morning lesson with "Thus endeth the seventh inning." Here ends my second report. Thanks to Bishop Oxnam, friendly counselor and constant friend, to my colleagues in the cabinet on whose nerves I must have sat hard many times, and to all my friends in parsonage and church without whose patience and understanding and prayers I could not report the triumphs of this hour.

There is this simple entry in Wesley's Journal: "I came into town and offered them Christ." That is what I want to do wherever I go. There is no greater mission on this, or any other, planet.

#### EASTON DISTRICT

Bishop Oxnam, Members of The Conference and friends.

God has been very good to us on the Easton District this year. The death angel has passed by our parsonages and a minimum of sickness has been experienced. We have welcomed with joy the coming of a son to the Liddicoats and a daughter to the Kees family.

I bring to you an accounting of our Stewardship. We have few outstanding achievements but our record is rather one of co-operative attainments. In its total I feel that we can take justifiable pride. Our churches are becoming better organized and our laymen are increasingly sharing in the various phases of our work. In our youth work, woman's work and with men we are definitely showing progress.

In response to Conference askings we have paid to General Administration and World Service \$53,866.00; to Wesley Foundation \$3,899.00; Wesley College operational fund \$6,459.00; Wesley Theological Seminary \$6,052.00; and to Wesley College for Capital Improvements \$12,166.00. In addition we have given to Advance Specials \$3,909.00; Fellowship and Suffering \$1,318.00; Week of Dedication \$478.00; Rally Day \$1,331.00; Methodist Youth Fund \$772.00; Race Relations \$384.00 and Child Care \$3,648.00. In most items we have shown an increase over last year. We have not done too well however on Wesley College Capital Improvements. Two reasons

are offered, First, several of our stronger churches had adopted their budgets before our conference met and secondly, the pressure upon several churches with heavy debts and building programs. We will definitely increase our response next year.

I am happy to report that \$104,714.00 has been paid on reduction of debt. The following churches and the amounts paid by each are: Bayside \$645.00; Grace Cambridge \$4,083.00; Zion Cambridge \$10,000.00; Centreville \$2,629.00; Christ Chestertown \$5,082.00; First Chestertown \$1,060.00; Church Creek \$4,000.00; Church Hill \$4,100.00; Easton St. Marks \$26,676.00; St. Michaels \$1,072.00; Friendship \$1,800.00; Harmony \$850.00; Hoopers Island \$600.00; Hurlock \$8,775.00; Ingleside \$430.00; Kent Island \$500.00; Preston \$7,733.00; Queenstown \$4,320.00; Ridgely \$883.00; St. James \$750.00; St. Thomas \$650.00; Secretary \$1,600.00; Sudlersville \$2,400.00; Trappe \$6,690.00; Vienna \$3,886.00; Wesley Chapel \$2,500.00.

While some churches were busy paying debts other churches spent on Building and Improvements \$283,317.00. These churches are: Bayside \$1,950.00; Beckwith-Spedden \$934.00; St. Pauls Cambridge \$5,978.00; Zion Cambridge \$71,694.00; Centreville \$2,000.00; Christ Chestertown \$1,599.00; First Chestertown \$68,538.00; Church Creek \$2,350.00; Church Hill \$1,536.00; Concord \$678.00; Crapo \$7,916.00; Easton \$43,943.00; St. Michaels \$750.00; East New Market \$556.00; Federalsburg \$5,964.00; Friendship \$700.00; Goldsboro \$8,701.00; Greensboro \$500.00; Harmony \$500.00; Hillsboro-Queen Anne \$1,900.00; Hoopers Island \$800.00; Hurlock \$4,404.00; Ingleside \$1,753.00; Oxford \$589.00; Queenstown \$3,042.00; Ridgely \$2,428.00; St. James \$12,300.00; St. Thomas \$1,802.00; Bucktown \$810.00; Still Pond \$1,938.00; Sudlersville \$690.00; Tilghman \$1,303.00; Trappe \$258.00; Vienna \$2,064.00; Wye Mills \$648.00.

Some outstanding achievements have been attained: Zion Church Cambridge has just successfully completed a campaign for \$150,000.00 which will finish paying the cost of rebuilding the church destroyed by fire nine years ago. The cost was nearly \$700,000.00. For sustained loyalty and generosity I know of no church more worthy of praise. First Church Chestertown has completed an excellent educational and social unit at a cost of \$168,198.00. The present debt is \$70,943.00 which is being amortized monthly. St. Pauls Cambridge is building an addition to its Educational unit expected to cost \$100,000.00. Queenstown is building a new Church. St. James is adding \$44,000.00 Educational and Social hall. Easton has finished the east wing of its Educational Building, expending nearly \$30,000.00, and expects to begin its Sanctuary this year. Royal Oak has erected a \$10,000.00 Social Hall. Preston, through the generosity of two of its members, has completely remodeled its sanctuary making it one of the most worshipful spots on the District. Goldsboro has rebuilt its chancel and provided a study for its pastor. In addition Trappe and Church Creek have secured new parsonages and radical improvements to parsonages have been made or are in process at Ingleside, Crapo, Vienna, Secretary, St. James and Goldsboro.

The shortage of effective ministers is still acute and the necessity of recruiting candidates for the ministry and providing for their training and support is apparent to informed people.



Average salary is far below what is required to properly maintain an effective ministry. Our laymen are facing up to the problem and have responded with a total increase in ministerial support of \$14,160.00. Of this amount \$9,410.00 is for Salary, \$500.00 car expense and \$4,250.00 Utilities. Churches which have increased their support are:

Real progress is being made in the readjustment of overlapping ministry. By charge realignment, union and discontinuance of churches which have become too few in membership to function effectively, the problems growing out of Methodist union and population shifts in farm and water Communities, are being resolved. This year we have achieved the union of Grace and Epworth Churches at Centreville; Trinity Downs and Kingsley and we believe Dominion on Kent Island, Chaplain Memorial and Bethlehem on Taylors Island, Gethsemane and Joppa at Madison. We have also put Hillsboro and Wye Mills together to form one of our most promising rural charges. Secretary and Friendship Charges have been united. The people have been cooperative and in all but one of these adjustments the churches participating have assumed increased pastoral support. On the District we have 19 churches with less than 30 members. Each church is very near

another Methodist church, the hope for growth in membership is gone, in many cases the few remaining members pass other Methodist churches to attend and worse a pastor to provide a worship service for from 7 - 15 people must be absent from the Church School in a growing church. We are recommending the discontinuance of seven of these churches at this session of our conference.

Throughout the entire year we have been stressing our Evangelistic needs and pastors with their Commissions on Membership and Evangelism have earnestly sought not only to increase their membership but to make membership more meaningful. One thousand thirty five have been received into church fellowship. The record by charges is as follows: Bayside 16, Beckwith-Spedden 8, Cambridge Grace 63, Cambridge St. Pauls 44, Cambridge Zion 62, Centreville 15, Chestertown Christ 26, Crumpton 28, Chestertown First 26, Church Creek 16, Church Hill 27, Concord 9, Crapo 9, Denton Grace 22, Denton First 36, Easton 103, St. Michaels 12, East New Market 23, Federalburg 41, Friendship 10, Goldsboro 20, Greensboro 15, Harmony-Grove 2, Hillsboro-Queen Anne 15, Hoopers Island 4, Unity Washington 18, Williamsburg 14, Ingleside 1, Kennedyville 3, Kent Island 81, Marydel 11, Oxford 10, Preston 10, Queenstown 47, Ridgely 23, Rock Hall 11, Royal Oak 4, St. James 40, St. Thomas 8, Still Pond 25, Sudlersville 13, Tilghman 2, Trappe 12, Vienna 44, Wesley Chapel 3, Wye Mills 3.

In closing I would like to make a few observations. First we need a better fellowship among our ministerial brethren. 2nd. We need a deeper loyalty to The Conference program. 3rd. We need an enlarged vision of our potential here on this Peninsula. 4th. We need less uninformed criticism of administrative acts. 5th. We need to give validity to our Christian witness by showing our love for God in our love for and sympathetic understanding of our brethren. We do not all have to agree in what we undertake to do or in the way we try to do it, but we are under compulsion to seek the mind of Christ in our attitude toward these matters.

With gratitude to God for his continuing care and deep appreciation for the assistance of every minister and layman in achieving the measure of success we have attained I respectfully and with humility submit this report.

#### THE SALISBURY DISTRICT

JOHN E. FRENCH, Superintendent

Bishop Oxnam and Members of the Conference:

In his Autobiography, Mark Twain speaks of always having "some half-finished ship on the ways." Coming, as I do, from a long line of seafaring people, it is easy for me to seize upon the figure and to appropriate it for present use. My work is never done! And, today, as I read my third report to the Annual Conference I shall be talking about the same interests which have demanded my labor and my attention from the beginning. It would be easy for me, and indeed a pleasure, to put upon paper all of the little



happenings connected with each and every charge on The Salisbury District. They pour into the mind like a flood, and the monotony of forty-four Quarterly Conferences is overshadowed by the recollection of happy pastors and happy people reciting the gains and accomplishments of their charges. Even when we have made "unwilling progress" we rejoice. For, to use a term of our Founding Fathers, somewhat out of context, progress is often made "very unwillingly" by people and churches. Most of us are forced by necessity to make changes for our continued existence. Very few high hours are planned in advance. And as Dr. McConnell has said, "great events take place, movements begin, lives are changed and long eras of human history get under way unnoticed. At some point a high hour may be registered on a clock or a calendar by a historian."

#### Membership and Evangelism

As the reporter from our district, I wish to speak first of Membership and Evangelism. Our pastors have received 1,076 new members into their churches, 489 of which come on Profession of Faith. For the second successive year no church has failed to receive some. Bethesda Church, Salisbury, leads with a gain of 130 new members. Galestown; Asbury Church, Salisbury; St. Andrews, Salisbury; Princess Anne and Willards each had 50 or more accessions. Berlin; Crisfield, Immanuel; Delmar, First; Delmar, Mt. Olive; Mardela; Ocean City; Powellville; Salisbury, Grace; Salisbury, Trinity; Stockton-Girdletree and Union each received 20 or more members. Our special efforts in this area of our work have been fruitful and the number of accessions reported this year represents a gain of 419 over last year. Dr. Harry Denman of The General Board of Evangelism will be with us next Fall (November 8th to 15th) to conduct a Preaching Mission and lead us in a District-wide campaign now being planned by Chairman Howard Evans and The District Committee on Evangelism.

#### Christian Education

In the field of Christian Education our district has profited by the splendid leadership of The Rev. Donzel Wildey and his Staff. I cannot begin to enumerate the countless activities carried on in our churches, or to appraise the value we receive from their training of our youth and leaders. I want to single out just one activity: This year, Mr. Wildey sent a trained staff of three Christian Workers to Smith Island, where, for the first time, a week-long Leadership Training School instructed one hundred and thirty workers from the churches at Ewell, Tylerton and Rhodes Point. Our churches have given \$1,339 in Rally Day Offerings; \$859 to The Methodist Youth Fund and \$4,020 to The Board of Child Care.

#### Christian Higher Education

In the field of Christian Higher Education we have increased our financial support in every instance. We have given \$8,607 to Wesley Theological Seminary; \$5,100 to the Wesley Foundation and \$8,568 to Wesley College, Dover, on apportionment. A total of \$22,275 represents an increase of \$1,005 over last year.

#### Wesley College

We were asked for \$33,734 for Capital Improvements at Wesley College, Dover. I am delighted to report that in this first year of the campaign 32 of our 44 charges accepted and paid their "asking" in full; two charges, Princess Anne and Bethesda Church, Salisbury have accepted the full asking over a period of five years. Forty-two of our forty-four charges are now cooperating in the program. Only two charges have rejected the request. This year we have paid \$28,491 for Capital Improvements and \$8,568 for operational costs, or a total of \$37,059 to Wesley College. The table below will indicate what each charge has done:

Last year I announced the creation of a ministerial scholarship of \$300 annually by our Stevenson Church at Berlin. This year I am happy to add that two other churches, Pocomoke, Salem; and Stockton-Girdletree have followed that example and have created similar scholarships for ministerial students from their congregations.

#### World Service and Conference Benevolences

Forty of our charges accepted in full their apportionments for World Service and Annual Conference Benevolences amount to \$65,938. Our District Womans Society of Christian Service, under the leadership of Mrs. Milton Pope, has given \$11,000 for missions and increased its pledge for the coming year. Twenty-eight charges gave a total of \$12,699 to General Advance Specials, an increase of \$2,335 over last year; and a total of \$34,830 for the first three years of this quadrennium. Special recognition should go to the following churches for contributing \$100 or more to this cause:

#### Debt Reductions and Building and Improvements

\$52,280 has been paid on debts with 19 charges participating. Forty-three charges have spent \$272,906. for Building and Improvements. New heating systems have been installed at Berlin; Crisfield, Immanuel; Hebron; Mt. Vernon, Asbury; Pocomoke, Bethany; and Snow Hill, Whatcoat, at a total cost of \$47,937.



New organs have been purchased by Delmar, Mt. Olive; and Whaleysville. The Dames Quarter Church received a new organ as a gift. Salem Church, Pocomoke City has signed a contract for a new organ to be installed shortly at a cost of \$21,000.

\$55,697. has been spent for the renovation of Sanctuaries at Delmar, Mt. Olive; Mt. Hermon; Mt. Vernon, John Wesley; Melson on the Pittsville Charge and Bethesda Church, Salisbury.

New buildings have been constructed at Dames Quarter where fire destroyed the church in the summer of 1957. The new edifice costing approximately \$16,000 was consecrated on April 5th. Here is one of the finest examples of cooperation and goodwill I have ever seen. Our District came to the aid of this stricken congregation and completely furnished the church, giving carpet, pews, hymnals, cross, candelabra, communion service, pulpit furniture, Bibles for the pulpit and lectern and \$1000 toward construction of the church.

Siloam Church on the Allen Charge; Mt. Pleasant on the Powellville Charge; and Quindocqua at Marion Station have built new church halls.

New educational units have been constructed by

Whatcoat, Snow Hill has recently completed a very successful financial campaign for an educational building to cost \$112,000 and on which construction will soon begin. The minister of Asbury Church, Salisbury, writes: "We are approaching the \$200,000 mark in cash for our new church. We have decided not to begin until we have \$300,000 in cash. We are seeking to sell real estate which has been given to the church which we hope will help us soon attain this goal."

New properties adjoining present church property have been acquired by several congregations. Pocomoke, Salem Church has acquired a 13 room house valued at \$15,000.; Grace Church, Salisbury has purchased two dwellings for \$12,000. Stockton-Girdletree have sold two parsonage homes and purchased a new one for \$9,000 and Bethesda Church, Salisbury has bought and developed a new parking lot on Division Street near the church. One abandoned church, Ironshire, near Newark, Maryland has been sold by the Trustees of the Annual Conference.

There are many other things which could be said but I have not the time to say them, nor have you the patience to hear them. I shall leave them on the workbench. But before I go I want to thank you who have helped me, and to give you the credit, for, indeed most of it belongs to you. Your prayers and your kindly assistance have meant much to me—more than I can ever tell. And to my Heavenly Father who remembers me even when I forget Him, I offer my humble and my sincere thanks.

### Changes

Four retired ministers resident in the Wilmington District, and the widow of one of our deceased ministers, received the call to enter the Life Eternal during this Conference year: May 30, the Rev. Appropriate Memoirs have been prepared and will be printed in this year's Conference Journal.

Immediately after the adjournment of last year's Annual Conference session, Thomas D. Short, a Certified Lay Speaker of the Perryville Methodist Church and a graduate of Washington College, was appointed Student Pastor of the Bayview-Bethel Charge.

June 14, 1958, the Rev. Thomas D. Short and Miss Mary Hornbarger were married in the Perryville Methodist Church.

March 14, 1959, the Rev. C. Edwin Lasbury and Miss Kaylene McDade were married in the Chester-Bethel Methodist Church.

October 14, 1958, Sherri Lynn was born to the Rev. Charles O. Huntington, pastor of Warwick Charge, and Mrs. Huntington.

### Conversions

2,421 persons were received into full membership in the District Churches this year, a decrease of 181 compared with last year. 1,383 were received on Profession of Faith and 1,038 by Letters of Transfer. ## Contributions

47 Charges accepted and paid in full their World Service and Benevolence Askings. One Charge, Bellefonte, paid more than double its Askings.

41 Charges paid in full the 50c per member Asking for the Wesley College Operating Fund. 10 Charges paid part of their Askings. 6 Charges, most of them of Mission status, paid nothing. The total Asking: \$12,166. Paid, \$10,497, a decrease of \$642 from last year's total.

31 Charges paid in full the Askings for the Wesley College Capital Improvement Fund. 19 made partial contributions. 7 Charges paid nothing. The total Askings were \$48,213. \$35,714 were paid, a deficit of \$12,499. However, it should be noted that several Churches which have heavy building or debt obligations have indicated that they accept their Askings as debts of honor and pledge themselves to pay these deficits when current building and/or debt pressures have been eased.

41 Charges paid in full the 30c per member Asking for Wesley Foundation work. 9 Charges made partial payments. 7 Charges paid nothing. \$7,265 were asked. \$6,241 were paid, a deficit of \$1,024.

40 Charges paid in full the 50c per member Asking for Wesley Theological Seminary. 12 made partial payments. 5 paid nothing. \$12,121 were asked. \$10,341 were paid, a deficit of \$1,780.

While the deficits for the Wesley College Operating Fund, the Wesley Foundation, and the Wesley Theological Seminary total \$3,446, when the total amount contributed for these three causes plus the amount contributed to the Wesley College Capital Improvement Fund are compared with the total amount contributed to them last year, the Wilmington District shows an increase of \$33,722 for Wesley College, Wesley Foundation, Wesley Theological Seminary.

## Cultivation

Christian Education continues to be stressed in all of its phases as is evidenced by the increased expenditures for Methodist Materials; construction or renovation of Educational Units; increased purchase and utilization of busses to reach into adjacent communities to reach the unreached; increasing numbers of Churches having Local Church Leadership Training Schools as well as supporting Denominational and Inter-Denominational Schools. 49 Charges held Vacation Church Schools with 5,777 pupils enrolled—an increase of one School and 451 pupils. Aldersgate Church serves some 2,000 young people weekly in all phases of the Church program: Church School, MYF, Recreation, Scouts, Kindergarten.

During this last year of the presidency of Mrs. Lucille Mangum, the District Woman's Society of Christian Service has continued growing in its informational and inspirational as well as organizational ministry to our Churches. The District Missionary Secretary, the Rev. D'Arcy Littleton, increasingly functions as a resource person throughout the Conference Year for pastors and Churches desiring Missionary Programs and Personnel. He has given much time and effort to helping the refugee family of Dr. Ching Yu Hsu become acclimated to Wilmington and in raising funds for this worthy project. There have been many returned missionaries and student nationals in the District this year. The Second Annual Missionary Workshop was stimulating.

44 Methodist Men's Organizations (an increase of 6 over last year) report 2,147 members, an increase of 260. The District Lay Leader, Clifford T. Foster, Jr., notwithstanding demanding duties as Vice President and General Manager of the Delaware Coach Company, has made his enthusiastic support and direction of this important work felt in every section of the District. The Devotional Breakfast Hour the third Sunday of each month in the DuBarry Room of the Hotel DuPont, started some years ago by the late Floyd W. Woodcock and Clinton H. Brown, increasingly becomes a spiritual power-house for the consecrated Local Church Lay Leaders of the New Castle County section of the District.

24 Methodist Young Adult Fellowships (a decrease of 2) report a membership of 793, a decrease of 69.

54 Methodist Youth Fellowships (an increase of one) report a membership of 1,726, an increase of 280.

An increasing number of District Churches send "Together" into the homes of all of their members.

Scott Church, recently closed and sold by action of its members and Quarterly Conference to Grace A. M. E. Zion Church, henceforth to be known as Scott A. M. E. Zion Church, is setting up a Scott Memorial Trust Fund to be invested by the Bank of Delaware, to be administered by the Board of Trustees of the Peninsula Annual Conference, Inc., upon recommendation of the Wilmington District Superintendent for Ministerial Education Scholarships with any surplus remaining in any year to be applied as Church Extension grants. Starting with \$40,000, it is expected that this trust fund will eventually reach \$50,000.

## Construction, Expansion, Renovation

45 Charges report that during this past year, a total of \$299,828 was paid on indebtedness for past construction, an increase of \$17,198 over the preceding year. Charges paying \$1,000 or more on debt during this year are:

Asbury and Perryville Churches on Perryville Charge have renovated the Sanctuaries, Church House, and Parsonage at a cost of \$7,355.

Baldwin Church, Cherry Hill Charge, is now using the completed first unit of its new building, costing \$20,000, and is laying plans for the new Sanctuary which is the next step in its developing plan.

Bellefonte Church broke ground this past Sunday for a \$35,000 Educational Unit.

Brandywine has installed an electric organ in its Chapel.

Calvary, Wilmington, renovated its Church Kitchen at a cost of \$2,500.

Cherry Hill Church, at a cost of \$5,000, has renovated its Sanctuary, built a glassed-in, sound-proof "crying room" or nursery in its balcony, installed a fire-escape, completely wired the building for a public-address system; installed an electric organ.

Chester-Bethel has secured 1½ acres to enlarge the cemetery; 9½ acres for Church Expansion; construction has started on the \$84,000 William E. Habbart Memorial Building.

Christiana Church is already crowded in the educational unit just completed this year at a cost of \$2,500.

Delaware City's Ebenezer Church has completed re-building its former Sunday School room which has served as a Sanctuary since the disastrous fire of some years ago. The weight of the blizzard of March, 1958, weakened the structure necessitating major reconstruction. Several rooms have been added. Plans are maturing for the reconstruction of the former Sanctuary.

Ebenezer Church near Newark has constructed a new Vestibule at the entrance to its Sanctuary, installed hardwood floors on the first floor of its Church House, and has a Policy Committee studying further expansion.

Galena has completed its Parish Hall costing \$25,000. In addition, it has renovated its Sanctuary, replacing the antiquated chairs with pews.

Glasgow on Red Lion Charge has renovated its Sanctuary, replaced its heating equipment, installed an electric organ.

Kingswood-of-Brookside has built the shell of an Educational Wing at a cost of \$30,800. The men of the Church are finishing the interior.

Kirkwood has placed a new roof upon its Sanctuary.

Mt. Pleasant has built and furnished a Church Office and air-conditioned its Sanctuary.

Newport, at a cost of \$4,000, has partitioned its old Sanctuary into Class Rooms and a Chapel for its Youth Department. The Church Spire has been completed at a cost of \$2,435. A new bulletin board was erected at a cost of \$400.

Principio Church on Charlestown Charge has completed the construction of a Parish Hall costing \$21,300.

Richardson Park has renovated the interior and exterior of its buildings at a cost of \$10,500.

St. John's of Lewisville has made renovations to the extent of \$1,200. In addition, it now assumes the full support of its minister without any assistance from the Minimum Salary Fund.

Summit Church on St. George's Charge purchased a Community Hall, moved it to the rear of the Sanctuary on the Church site, and has remodeled it for a Parish Hall at a cost of \$10,000.

Union Church, Wilmington, has had its pipe organ rebuilt at a cost of \$10,000. In addition, the Sanctuary was renovated at a cost of \$3,000.

Concerning the future, the retiring Superintendent will leave for his successor a list of at least 28 Church Expansion and Church Extension projects which have been started and are uncompleted, or are in the planning stage. Included in this list are:

Aldersgate, a new Sanctuary.

Calvary, Wilmington, will macadamize a part of its site for a Parking Area.

Christ Church Congregation and Quarterly Conference have authorized an Educational Wing to cost \$110,000.

Claymont Congregation and Quarterly Conference have approved plans for an Educational Unit to cost \$137,000.

Hart's, Charlestown Charge, complete renovation is planned.

Hillcrest Policy Committee is working on plans for a new Sanctuary and Fellowship Hall to cost approximately \$300,000.

Hockessin—a new Sanctuary and Educational unit on the 4.1 acres recently purchased.

Hopewell: an Educational Unit and Parish Hall for which plans are now ready.

Kirkwood plans complete renovation of its Sanctuary, two Halls, in preparation for its 60th Anniversary in September.

Mt. Lebanon plans a new Parking Area.

North East needs to erect an Educational Unit on the lot across the street which was purchased last year and now serves as a parking lot.

Red Lion has awarded the contract for a \$70,000 Sanctuary Expansion and Educational Unit. Work will begin this month.

Rosebank Church, Calvert, Cecil United Parish, already finds its new building erected last year too small and is planning another unit to cost around \$30,000.



Salem Church, Christiana Charge, hopes to build a Parish Hall this summer.

St. Georges is facing the building of new Class Rooms or re-locating.

St. Paul's, Wilmington, faces the probability of relocation if the Wilmington Freeway is approved. If this happens, St. Paul's will probably relocate on the 5.75 acres in a strategic location on the Foulk Road purchased jointly by the Wilmington District Church Extension Society, Inc., and the Peninsula Conference Board of Missions.

### Conclusion

The end of this report brings to a conclusion not only six years of superintendency but forty-six years of active ministry. Glancing backward across the six years, the record reveals:

8,258 persons have been received into full membership on Profession of Faith during these six years, and 5,340 by letters of Transfer, a total of 13,598.

\$2,475,435 have been spent on Building and Improvement.

\$1,155,646 have been paid on indebtedness.

\$126,270 have been paid on Advance Specials for Missions.

During the six years, pastors' salaries have increased \$82,839 and Auto Expense allowances \$13,160, a total of \$95,999. If data were available concerning utilities, it would take increases in total ministerial support well over \$100,000 during these years.

3 District Churches closed because of changing population trends, and their properties were sold. Asbury was sold to the Mt. Vernon Colored M. E. Congregation and is now known as Asbury Memorial C. M. E. Church. Kingswood was sold to the Kingswood Community Center for Youth. Scott has been sold to the Grace A. M. E. Zion Congregation which will now be known as the Scott A. M. E. Zion Church.

One new Congregation was started: Kingswood-of-Brookside was made possible by using the proceeds from the sale of old Kingswood to purchase the building site and parsonage in the new Brookside Housing Development outside of Newark. Started less than five years ago without a member, it will report more than 600 members to this Annual Conference. It has raised nearly \$40,000 for all purposes this year.

3 Congregations, Brack-Ex, Rosebank at Calvert in Cecil County, Wilmington Manor, have relocated on larger sites in more strategic situations. Several others, notably Stanton, are planning to relocate.

9 Churches have purchased, or are negotiating for, new sites.

15 Churches have purchased, or are negotiating for, additional land for expansion.

At least 17 Churches have added paved off-street parking lots.

4 new Sanctuaries have been erected.

32 Churches have added, or are planning to add, Educational Units and/or Parish Halls.

18 Charges have installed new organs or rebuilt old ones.

18 Charges have made major renovations.

7 Parish Parsonages have been built or purchased.

With but few exceptions, practically all of the Churches of the District have had a major expansion of some kind. In some of these the Superin-

tendent had no part whatever. In most of them he has had some direct or indirect participation through suggestion, consultation, or supervision. Not a few of them were initiated by him.

On the District Level, six advances are noteworthy:

The District Church Extension Society, organized in 1954, with Sustaining Memberships on a voluntary basis at \$10 per Sustaining Member per year, has made available approximately \$20,000 for Church Extension incentive gifts and assistance in buying new sites.

The District Digest, a four page monthly news-letter, has brought the Conference and District programs nearer to the Local Churches for the past two years.

The District Sub-Division into Sub-Districts—at first nine, now six, has helped.

The District-wide Functional Commissions, although slow to get started, are increasingly functioning in the District programs of Evangelism, Leadership Training, Ministers' Cooperation with Youth Work, Missions, Publicity, Social Concerns, Stewardship.

The District Office and Secretary were real steps forward in efficient functioning not only for the Superintendent but for the various agencies and activities of the District.

The District Parsonage relocation from a deteriorating residential section to Alapocas, from an expensive mansion to a functional house which combines dignified simplicity with adequacy, is a credit to the Methodist Church.

The retiring District Superintendent and his wife desire to express their sincere appreciation to you, Bishop Oxnam, the Colleagues of the Cabinet, the Ministers and consecrated Laymen and Lay-women of the District, for each and every courtesy, word and expression of friendliness, respect and cooperation received during these years. Both will carry into retirement glowing memories that will enrich the remaining years. Both covet for the choice and capable young minister whom our Bishop has indicated he will appoint to the Wilmington District Superintendency, and for his wife, the same courtesy and cooperation we have received.

## (b) Boards, Commissions and Committees

### REPORT OF THE CONFERENCE COMMISSION ON CHRISTIAN VOCATIONS

At no time has the need for dedicated young persons adequately trained for service to God through the many offices of the Church been more urgent than it is today. The Methodist Church faces today the precarious situation of pastorates without adequately trained ministers, schools needing teachers, churches seeking in vain for directors of Christian education, settlements short of social workers, hospitals needing doctors, nurses, and administrators. Overseas, too few missionaries are on the scene to minister to the needs of a world in crisis.

At the present time the annual personnel requirements of The Methodist Church in the United States include the following: 1,800 ministers, 250 directors of Christian education, 350 missionaries, 100 deaconesses, 245 college teachers, administrators and Wesley Foundation directors, and 3,000 doctors, nurses, technicians, and social workers.

The majority of the members of many, if not most, local churches have not yet understood and accepted the doctrine of Christian vocation. And, they neither know of the desperate shortage of workers in the church vocations nor are they concerned about it if they know it.

Christian people rally to the challenge of new insight, and the presentation of need when it is shown to them.

Your Commission on Christian Vocations functions as a possible answer to this unprecedented need by bringing about closer cooperation among the boards and agencies of the Peninsula Annual Conference in (1) promoting the philosophy of Christian vocation and (2) the recruitment of qualified young men and women for church-related vocations.

During the past year the following action was taken to accomplish these objectives, of the Commission.

In September, a Christian Vocation Workshop was held at Camp Pe-Co-Meth. The theme of the workshop was "The Development of a Christian Philosophy of Vocation." Dr. Marcus Birrell, Executive Director of Inter-Board Committee on Christian Vocations, was our platform speaker. The objective of the workshop was to present and discuss the ideas that underlie the Christian philosophy of vocation. No direct effort was made at this workshop to recruit persons for church vocations. Thirty-five (35) delegates and five (5) staff persons participated in the workshop.

"You, The Church, and God's Call" was the theme of the Church Vocations Conference sponsored by the Commission on Christian Vocations at Salisbury, Md., during February. The purpose of this workshop was to provide the youth and students of the Peninsula Annual Conference with the instruction and counsel that is necessary to answer the questions that are foremost in the minds of those who are considering church-related vocations as their chosen profession. The call to the conference was issued to those who were either committed or seriously considering commitment to one of the following church-related vocations: The Ministry, Directors of Christ-

ian Education, Deaconess Work, Missions, Medical Vocations, Higher Education (College Teaching and College Chaplaincy), and Professional Scouting. Sixty-eight (68) delegates and a staff of nine (9) persons participated in the Conference.

With the assistance and guidance of Dr. Marcus Birrell, Executive Director of the Inter-Board Committee on Christian Vocations, a system for securing and maintaining careful records of the vocational decisions of youth was adopted. The Reverend George Godfrey, Conference Youth Director, has been placed in charge of Vocational Records.

Progress has been made toward the goal of a functioning Committee on Christian Vocations for every charge. During February, a workshop was held to train the chairmen of these local church committees. The purpose, composition and program of the local church committee on Christian Vocations were among the topics discussed at this workshop.

The Commission commends the Board of Ministerial Training and Qualifications for the work they are doing, pledges them our full support and urges them to continue to bring together for inspiration, instruction and fellowship, prospective and active ministerial candidates.

A quantity purchase has been made of the 1959 edition of the booklet, **Methodist Service Projects**. Distribution of the booklet will be made through summer conferences and one copy will be sent to each charge in the conference.

Projected plans of the Commission include the following:

1. The establishment in each district of a counselor's bureau to aid local churches in their vocational guidance programs.
2. The disbursement of the booklet, **Methodist Service Projects**, a directory of Christian Vocations, to public school vocational counselors.

This fourth year of the quadrennial emphasis on the local church is on "enlistment." According to the interpretation given it by the Council of Bishops, this is to include enlistment for church vocations. Thus we are justified in calling upon the church for special support of our program.

The Commission, therefore, urges that the following action be taken during the coming year. That there be established in every church an active committee on Christian Vocations, that this committee should be named by the regular nominating committee of the Quarterly Conference, and that this committee reports annually to both the Quarterly Conference and the Annual Conference Commission on Christian Vocations. That each local church hold a vocational conference or develop some other means of presenting the many opportunities in church vocations to their youth.

The Conference Committee on Christian Vocations is happy to report the progress made during the past year. We shall seek to continue to promote programs which will develop within this generation the Christian idea of work.

### PENINSULA CONFERENCE BOARD OF EDUCATION REPORT TO THE ANNUAL CONFERENCE

The Conference Board of Education has developed and promoted a program of Christian education which provides guidance and help for the various agencies of Christian Education in the Conference. Churches, their organizations and members are increasingly turning to the Board for counsel and guidance as they expand their efforts to achieve a significant local program of Christian education. Every effort is directed to help the individual and local church grow and develop to the utmost.

#### Field Work

There are five areas under the general topic of Field Work. They are inter-related in planning and purpose, yet significantly separate in procedures and personnel.

First, the Department of Children's work with Miss Doris Hoover as Director has carefully studied the needs in the area of Children's Work and evolved a program which will meet these needs in the most constructive way. These plans call for the development of a better understanding of Methodist literature as well as increased teaching skills of the teachers responsible for the 31,000 Methodist Children enrolled in our Church Schools. A Laboratory School for teachers is planned for July with other experiences in teacher training and Vacation Church School Workshops being developed. Special observation classes in local church schools will also be added to the on-going program of teacher development.

Second, the Youth Work is being ably directed by the Rev. George C. Godfrey, fulltime worker with youth and the camp. Last year the significant rise in youth enrollment in the church schools—well over 1,000—showed many skeptics the fruits of our increased emphasis on program and personnel in this field. Local, subdistrict, and conference levels showed improved techniques and planning which led to a greatly expanded program. Every activity received increased interest and support from churches and individual youth. In any given month, when our M. Y. F. subdistricts meet, there are over 1,500 youth involved in this beyond-the-local-church activity of training, inspiration and fellowship. The adult and youth leaders of this phase of the youth program deserve our highest commendation.

Third, the Adult Work has been directed by Mr. John Rogers. The slight decrease in Church School Adult enrollment of a year ago caused new approaches to be developed by this department. The Family Camp Weekend was well supported. Five persons attended the National Family Life Conference at Chicago. The Older Adult Convocation gave new vitality to the work with this age group. Two Adult Bible Conferences attracted a total of 637 persons for the six nights of Bible study under Dr. Montgomery J. Shroyer from Wesley Theological Seminary. Thirty-two persons attended the Regional Adult Convocation at Buck Hill Falls. Increased interest and

attendance was also noted at the meeting of lay persons at other training and fellowship sessions.

Fourth, Church Music has been under the direction of the Rev. William Hitchens. The most outstanding contribution was the Church Music Institute with 82 persons in attendance and which concluded with Professor J. Edward Moyer of Wesley Theological Seminary directing a unified choir in an inspirational music Festival. Increased interest in better music has been noted in the church schools and churches. Three persons are now certified as Ministers of Music in our Conference. This number is expected to increase as other local churches and qualified musicians learn of the value of such certification.

Fifth, the program of Leadership Training has provided opportunity to discover and put into action more helpful ways of giving training to our 6,500 teachers and officers in the Church School. This year the emphasis was that each local Commission on Education plan and carry out a training program which would be most helpful for its own situation. The Conference Board provided a Coaching Conference where fifty persons were trained in four areas and then made available for local and subdistrict schools. This instruction was planned to increase the quantity and quality of persons for this important task from our own Conference. Although complete statistics are not available from the local church training sessions, a large number of churches took advantage of this program. About 72 churches continued to cooperate in the beyond-the-local-church schools with about 800 persons receiving training in these schools. The plan for the coming year will again stress local classes but, in addition, make available an increased number of beyond-the-local-church schools, with priority given those areas not reached this year. It must be realized that a well organized church school with trained teachers using Methodist material is a necessity for the welfare of our people and the Methodist Church. This year a new service was offered to churches considering the construction of educational units. Glenn S. Gothard, Building Consultant from the General Board of Education, visited eight churches in the Conference giving guidance on planning, construction and utilizing units for Christian education. His invaluable service was sponsored by the Conference and the General Board of Education.

#### Wesley Foundation

Our work on the college campus, by means of Wesley Foundations, is under the direction of the Rev. William F. Dunkle, Jr. Careful and long-range planning has enabled the Peninsula Conference to contribute considerably to this important work with Methodist students at Salisbury State Teachers College, Washington College, and the University of Delaware. At Washington College the future of the Methodist Student Work has been enhanced by the purchase of a plot of land adjacent to the school which will be used for the

expansion of this work as money becomes available. The Rev. William P. Kesmodel is directing the work at this school. The Wesley House, at the University of Delaware, has become a vital point of student contact with Dr. J. J. Bunting, Director, and Rev. Leland B. Hall as fulltime Co-Director. This effort continues to grow in significance as the University grows and the students from Methodist churches increase in number. The largest number of Methodist students in the Peninsula is to be found enrolled at the University. Top leadership and a dynamic program are essential to meet the ever increasing challenge that faces Methodism here. The importance of our work at Salisbury State will expand considerably as that institution expands. Mrs. Albert Bloodsworth is working with the students under the direction of the Rev. J. Robert Mackey. It is interesting to note the large percentage of Methodists enrolled in this student body. Our program of student work here has been growing steadily during the last few years and will continue to do so. The Methodist work in all three schools has been made possible because the local churches in the Conference have supported it financially by the 30 cents per member plan. This support has helped the church play an important part in the lives of our youth seeking higher education.

#### The Camp Program

New life has come into the camping program of the Peninsula Conference. Last Summer Camp PeCoMeth under the direction of Rev. George C. Godfrey served a total of 1,787 persons in planned training or camping sessions. An additional number of approximately 250 used the facilities in local church retreats. With camp running at capacity it was still necessary, due to lack of space, to turn away many requesting enrollment.

The Camp Development Committee of the Board of Education, with Mr. Thomas Lodge as Chairman, after careful study has approved the plan of development prepared by the nationally known camp architect, Bradford G. Sears of Syracuse University. These plans have been accepted by the Board of Education and are ready to be placed before the people and churches of the Conference. The plan includes increased accommodations for the summer program of Christian education and also facilities for year-round conference, camping, and training programs. Literature is now being prepared giving full information concerning these plans. The vitality for this expansion has grown out of the interest of persons and organizations having the true spirit of Christian concern for children, youth, and adults. Every person in the Conference will be benefited as PeCoMeth is expanded. It is expected that during this Summer the area for Day Camping and church picnics will be completed. Other areas in the program will be developed as quickly as finances are made available.

#### DELAWARE STATE COUNCIL OF CHURCHES

Wilmington, Del., March 17, 1959

#### A Transmittal

A number of the judicatories of Christian denominations serving in Delaware adopted a joint resolution at their respective sessions in the spring of 1958 looking to the establishment of a State Council of Churches in and for Delaware. Representatives were appointed by their respective denominational bodies, and a number of meetings have been held in the First Presbyterian Church of Dover. Consultants from the Maryland-Delaware Council of Churches, the Delaware Council of United Church Women, the Council of Churches of Wilmington and New Castle County and other interested individuals have been invited to help guide the formation of a Delaware State Council of Churches. Those who have been meeting have come from several denominations and from various Delaware localities.

After reviewing the religious, social, and legislative matters in which Christian denominations have cooperated in Delaware or need to cooperate in Delaware, it was unanimously agreed that a State Council of Churches is clearly, perhaps even urgently needed. The group thereupon constituted itself a Steering Committee to effectuate such an organization, and the undersigned were elected officers. The attached Constitution and By Laws represents our study of Delaware circumstances, of similar documents from numerous other state councils, and our unanimous recommendation to our respective denominations.

It is not proposed that a Delaware State Council of Churches will supercede any local or county councils now in existence or likely to be organized nor that there shall be any organic relationship with national or international councils of churches. It is contemplated that a headquarters will be established in Dover, and that professional executive leadership will be secured.

Careful consideration has been given to financing a state council of churches. Recognizing that denominational budgets cannot be adjusted quickly, the following table of askings is submitted for a three year period:

Several factors determined these askings, including ability to give, the ecclesiastical structure of the respective denominations, and their comparative numerical strength in Delaware. It was agreed that no fixed formula is either feasible or desirable. Your representatives are deeply convinced, however, that no organization representing cooperative Protestantism ought to be brought into being abortively and without adequate, assured financial backing. The above yearly totals represent basic, **minimum requirements**. Unless they can be subscribed in good faith, the movements to establish a Delaware State Council of Churches very probably should be terminated for the time being.

The Steering Committee stands ready to call the first General Assembly into session under the terms of Article V of the proposed Constitution and By Laws. Presiding officers of denominational judicatories are invited to send certifications of favorable action to the Steering Committee's Secretary, 301 N. State Street, Dover.

## THE CONSTITUTION AND BY LAWS OF THE DELAWARE STATE COUNCIL OF CHURCHES, INC.

PREAMBLE: In the Name of God the Father, God the Son, and God the Holy Ghost. Amen. In order to discover together and to fulfill more adequately their common Christian purposes, the Churches of Delaware do hereby constitute this Council as follows:

ARTICLE I. The name shall be the Delaware State Council of Churches, Inc.

ARTICLE II. The membership shall consist of those several religious communions whose judicatories most nearly correspond to the State of Delaware in their geographic area which accept this Constitution on behalf of their Constituents in the State of Delaware.

ARTICLE III. The governing body shall be an annual meeting called a General Assembly composed of the District Superintendents or Presiding Elders of Methodist districts in Delaware, the General Presbytery of the New Castle Presbytery of the United Presbyterian Church in the USA, the Bishop of the Protestant Episcopal Diocese of Delaware, the Executive Secretary of the State Baptist Conventions in Delaware, the Dean of the Delaware District of the United Lutheran Church, and the corresponding executive of any other member communion, provided that the communions these officers represent are or become members of the Delaware State Council of Churches; and four (4) persons elected by the respective state judicatories of each member communion, of whom two (2) shall be clergy, and two (2) shall be laity; and for each annual session following the first organizing session, a further number of persons, clergy and laity being equal in number, to be elected by the state judicatories of the member communions as proportionately determined annually by an Executive Board to be constituted as in Article IV.

ARTICLE IV: 1. There shall be an Executive Board elected by the General Assembly to consist of a President of the Council, a Vice-President of the Council, a Secretary of the Council, and a Treasurer of the Council, who shall exercise the duties normal to their offices for terms of one year each; twenty-one (21) Members-at-Large, who shall hold office for overlapping terms of not more than three years; **ex officio**, with full voice and vote, the heads of all departments of the Council which may be organized from time to time with the approval of the General Assembly; and **ex officio**, with full voice and vote, the President or Executive of such local councils of churches as may from time to time exist in Delaware, as the respective governing bodies of such local councils may determine; provided that each member communion shall be represented in the membership of the Executive Board.

2. The Executive Board shall meet at least semi-annually; shall at its first meeting effectuate the incorporation of the Council under the laws of the State of Delaware; shall act on behalf of the Council between meetings of the General Assembly; shall present annually to the General Assembly for its approval a recommended program of activities and a financial budget; shall collect, receive, and disburse the funds of the Council; shall employ and supervise any staff for the Council; and shall give general direction to



the affairs of the Council in administering policies and programs determined annually by the General Assembly.

ARTICLE V. The Delaware State Council of Churches, Inc., shall exist under this constitution upon the acceptance by the judicatories of any five (5) communions eligible for membership under the terms of Article II, as certified by their respective presiding officers.

ARTICLE VI. 1. This Constitution and By Laws may be amended at any regular annual meeting of the General Assembly by a two-thirds ( $\frac{2}{3}$ rds) affirmative vote of those present and voting, provided that any proposed amendment shall have been submitted in writing to all members of the Executive Board not less than thirty (30) days prior to the semi-annual meeting of the Board next preceding an annual meeting of the General Assembly.

2. Additional regulations for the operation and administration of the Council may be enacted from time to time in keeping with the terms of this Constitution and By Laws by a majority of the General Assembly upon recommendation in each case of the Executive Board.

#### REPORT OF THE CONFERENCE BOARD OF EVANGELISM

##### Let's Make the Methodist Church an Evangelistic Church

Evangelism is a matter of spirit rather than of organization. Let us not confuse evangelism with a method, or with a ritual, but let us realize that it is a throbbing experience.

To the Methodist, religion has always been an experience, and the emotions have been a very vital factor. The early Methodist preacher, as he traveled constantly, was primarily an evangelist. He gathered the scattered multitudes into small groups and taught them the Word of God. They believed in a divine call to the holy task of evangelizing under the guidance and power of the Holy Spirit.

John Wesley knew that evangelism was the open door to a new life, a new spirit, and new way; and he expected it to be the spirit behind and in all social service, education, missions, and all other organizations of the life and work of the Church.

Evangelism is now giving expression to the great central truth that the Church has one great mission—to reveal God to man and bring man to God through Jesus Christ. The Methodist Revival in England and the Great Awakening in America not only resulted in the conversion of individuals but became a mighty ethical force for changing society. Slavery was abolished. Prisons were reformed. New laws were passed. Education received the most hearty support it has ever had.

Today with conditions of uncertainty and confusion, a note of defeatism about the world in the voice of the pulpit, a spirit of retreat in the minds of a great many people, it is necessary for us to see that we are facing the most favorable challenge for a period of evangelism in Methodism. The hour has come for Methodism to know that any other than an evangelistic Church will be a failure. We have the finest buildings and equipment, and the most highly trained and educated ministry, the most attractive programs the Church has ever known. But these will not be the means of saving

the world if we lack that something bigger and better. The supreme business of the Church is to reach the people who have never had a change of heart, a new birth, a personal experience with Jesus.

The Archbishop of Canterbury has said, "The man who worships has a standard by which to judge his life; those who do not worship have no conception of sin." Then you will see that millions in America do not have the conception nor the standard by which even to judge their own lives. We need a new emphasis on the fact that religion can never take second place because it is the heart of life. We must drive toward a Christian America in our social, political, and economic conditions.

Any man or Church giving himself or itself to the cause of lifting all of life to our highest and noblest ideals will become immortal.

Suggestions of the Board of Evangelism

1. This Board wishes to inform the Conference that Dr. John L. Sandlin and Dr. Harry Denman of the General Board of Evangelism of Nashville will be at our District Conference on November 10 and 11. The emphasis will be on World Wide Church Attendance Movement in accordance with our Quadrennial program. World Wide Church Attendance Movement involves: Discovering prospective members for the church, winning persons for Christ, strengthening persons in their faith, enlisting persons in the service of the church, increased support of the church, arouses interest in the World Wide Missionary Enterprise, encourages persons to study the Bible, gives persons motivation for social action, reclaims the inactive, indifferent Church Members, leads in a person centered Evangelistic Movement, creates a sense of togetherness, etc.

2. We request that additional funds be allocated to our Board of Evangelism whereby we might become more effective with our work throughout the Conference. With the additional funds we hope to build an Audio Visual Aid Library that will be available to every Church in our Conference. At present we have one sound film strip. We desire to purchase two more sound film strips entitled:

a. Keep Them Faithful kit

b. Volume 11 Evangelism Soul Winning kit.

Both can be purchased from Church Craft, St. Louis 3, Missouri.

3. We propose that every church in our Conference observe the Prayer Vigil, February 12, 1960, on the World Day of Prayer. We strongly urge that this Prayer Vigil be a twenty-four hour unbroken Prayer Watch.

4. We propose that every church have a regular friendly visitation team of dedicated persons visiting weekly the sick, the shut-in members as well as the prospective members.

5. We propose that the Evangelistic emphasis be from Labor Day through Christmas. This will involve Visitation Evangelism, Membership Training Classes, and a concerted effort to keep Christ in Christmas. The Month of December being designated as the Month of Evangelism and Mass Evangelism.

6. We propose to cooperate with the Quadrennial program of the Local Church Emphasis on Year of Enlistment. This began March 1, 1959 and continues until March 1, 1960.

May evangelism in our Conference this year attain these high goals under the blessing of God, the leadership of Christ, and the ministry of the Holy Spirit.

## GOODWILL INDUSTRIES OF WILMINGTON

ANNUAL REPORT TO  
 PENINSULA CONFERENCE OF THE METHODIST CHURCH 1958-59

Goodwill Industries provided employment and occupational training opportunities for a total of 75 persons during the year, the largest majority of whom were handicapped occupationally by physical and/or mental disabilities of such nature or to such a degree of severity, that employment in regular commercial industry was, for them, practically impossible.

Handicapping conditions encountered during the year included: cerebral palsy; infantile paralysis, spinal impairments, arthritis, amputations of limbs, total blindness, heart disease, defective hearing and speech, mental and emotional disturbances, social maladjustments, and the disabilities occasioned by advanced age.

Ages of the workers ranged from 17 to 79 years, with the largest number concentrated in the 50 to 60 year bracket. 49 of the workers were male; 26 were female. 23 were married, with dependent children.

Considering its vocational-industrial program as its basic responsibility, and employment as the most commonly indicated need, Goodwill Industries provided a wide variety of jobs during the year and paid \$69,452.87 in opportunity wages to its handicapped workers, setting a new all-time high for wages paid during a twelve month period.

As in other previous years, Goodwill Industries' interest in, and service to, handicapped people extended further than meeting just immediate eco-



conomic needs. The agency concerned itself with the well-being of the whole individual and with other needs, often unexpressed and perhaps less evident than economic but certainly no less real. Medical needs and those involving physical restoration were obviously beyond the scope of the agency's program, excepting of course, such services as could be given in a referral capacity. Spiritual and social needs, however, continued to be a major concern and an environment built on these values was constantly maintained. Half-hour Chapel services were conducted three mornings each week throughout the year and personal counselling services were available to all workers whenever required.

With a total budget of more than \$109,000.00, the highest in the agency's history, Goodwill Industries was about 88% self-supporting during the year.

Advances were made in nearly every phase of the agency's work; more handicapped people were employed than ever before during a twelve month period; opportunity wages paid to handicapped workers reached a new all-time high; earnings from industrial activities continued to climb; and substantial gains were made in establishing better operating methods and procedures. Gains and advances in its basic operating activities are important to Goodwill Industries because progress in this direction means progress in effecting its real objective—the best possible service toward filling the needs of handicapped and disadvantaged people.

The following few short histories are included in our report as examples of the kind of cases and needs encountered during the year and as a means of suggesting how the agency's program, resources and facilities were utilized in producing its principal product—rehabilitated handicapped people.

Howard, at 29, stands well over 6 feet in height and weighs close to 350 pounds. He is married and has four children. One of Howard's arms has been amputated nearly to the shoulder, but this physical loss has had little, if any, influence on his willingness and determination to work and assume the full responsibilities of a husband and father. All he asked when he arrived at Goodwill Industries was for a chance to use the assets he had left—a stout heart, a capable mind, and one good right arm. He got his chance as one of the agency's truck drivers and it can be said of Howard that he leaves little to be desired in the way of ability to perform the duties associated with his job.

Elizabeth, still young at 28, came off second best in a "bout" with crippling arthritis. Both hands, both arms, and both legs bore the full brunt of the uneven contest but Elizabeth could still walk with some difficulty and could still manage to use her hands and arms to a limited degree. This remaining ability was important to Elizabeth because in 1958 it was necessary for her to find employment as a means of supporting not only herself but also her disabled and bed-ridden husband as well. Weighing less than a hundred pounds, crippled in both arms and legs, and with the signs of undernourishment plainly marked. Elizabeth's contacts with prospective employers were everything but productive. Her search finally ended at Goodwill Industries where she found the opportunity she sought. As a sorter of clothing, Elizabeth works safely, comfortably and happily, using her thin and knotted hands and arms in trying to meet her own particular needs.

Robert is 25 years of age and married. He too, started his work with Goodwill Industries during the past year. Stone deaf and mute, Robert is an excellent shoe repairman and the chief handicapping condition in his case is based only on the fact that his physical disability makes it extremely difficult to gain recognition and acceptance from employers in commercial industry. Certainly, his disability interferes in no way with his ability as a competent worker. Goodwill Industries provides the opportunity for Robert to further develop his skill and gainfully utilize his ability until such time as some employer in industry can recognize him as a capable and dependable worker rather than just another deaf mute.

At 29, Vincent arrived at Goodwill Industries in October of 1958. He too, is married and has three children. Cerebral Palsy has crippled both his left arm and left leg. With the help of another agency, Vincent had managed to complete a business college course in general accounting but since his graduation in 1950 had been unable to apply his training in any commercial situation except for several very brief and temporary periods. His physical disability, the heavy responsibility of trying to provide for his family, the difficult experiences he encountered in competitive fields, all combined to further encourage a natural tendency toward unhealthy introspection. Vincent arrived at Goodwill Industries completely confused and discouraged. Recognizing his basic needs, the agency arranged a work program which provided a measure of economic relief and at the same time instituted a fresh occupational approach. Work and training in upholstery formed the basis of the program designed to help Vincent help himself.

The past year was another in a long succession of years during which Goodwill Industries earnestly tried to meet the responsibilities of its stewardship in bringing something of the more abundant life to handicapped and disadvantaged people. In many ways it was the best and most productive year in the agency's history. The progress achieved, the service rendered, would not have been possible without our Heavenly Father's ever present help. To Him we humbly offer our grateful praise.

#### REPORT OF HISTORICAL SOCIETY OF THE PENINSULA ANNUAL CONFERENCE OF THE METHODIST CHURCH, INC.

The Historical Society is concerned with the past and its records only as they give meaning to the work of the church in this and in future time.

One of the forward steps in the matter of more adequate records is appearing as this year's statistical and financial reports in the Conference Journal are to be completed in the case of each of our churches. The tracing of the life of any one church is now made possible.

The location of Barratt's Chapel in the midst of our conference territory gives us a rare privilege. The administration of its affairs gives the Society a task of importance relating to the whole Methodist Church. Last



year, on the 178th anniversary of the Chapel, Dr. Albert E. Day, Chaplain and Director of Spiritual Life of Wesley Theological Seminary, Washington, D. C., was guest minister. It is the desire of the Society that the anniversary day continue to be of importance and usefulness.

Care of the Chapel property has included repair to the windows broken by storm and the painting of the outside woodwork. Insurance coverage has been increased to \$12,000. A personal liability coverage has been added.

Request has been made to the General Conference of the Methodist Church, through the Commission on Shrines, for the sum of \$1000 per year to be used toward maintaining the Chapel as a shrine.

The Lord's Supper was first administered in the Methodist fellowship in this country at Barratt's Chapel on November 14, 1784. This year is the 175th anniversary. Plans are in progress for appropriate observance of this historic event.

#### Recommendations

The Historical Society recommends:

1. The approval of the request of the Historical Society to the General Conference of the Methodist Church for the sum of \$1000 annually toward the maintenance of Barratt's Chapel as a Methodist shrine.

2. The appointment of a committee of three (3) to plan with the Directors of the Historical Society for fitting and significant observance of the 175th Anniversary of the first administration of the Lord's Supper in the Methodist fellowship in this country (at Barratt's Chapel on November 14, 1784).

3. The binding of the Annual Conference Journal (either annually or quadrennially) for the conference collection of historical materials.

#### HOMES FOR THE AGED OF THE PENINSULA ANNUAL CONFERENCE OF THE METHODIST CHURCH, INC.

For the gracious providence of God, for the love, the labors and liberal gifts of ministers and laymen who are sharing in the work of establishing The Methodist Country House, we, the trustees are truly grateful. Humbly and yet happily we present the following factual report:

At the first meeting of the trustees in this conference year on June 4, 1958, it became apparent to all of us the wisdom of completing the entire project, The Methodist Country House, as described in a previous report to this conference. On Oct. 9, 1958, the trustees unanimously passed a resolution, the substance of which is as follows, "That bids for the total construction of The Methodist Country House be secured, providing adequate F. H. A. financing or its equivalent be arranged." Mr. Carroll W. Griffith, the Chairman of the Building Committee, made the motion. It was seconded by Mr. J. Wallace Watson, the Chairman of the Finance Committee.

On March 3, 1959 at a meeting of the trustees the following resolution was unanimously passed, "That the bid of W. D. Haddock Construction

Company, being the low bid submitted and being satisfactory with respect to all the requirements imposed, be accepted by the Board provided however, that this acceptance shall not be binding until such time as a written contract is approved by the Building Committee and is executed by the proper officers of this corporation and W. D. Haddock Construction Company." Dr. J. Leas Green offered the resolution and it was seconded by Judge William J. Storey.

Meeting again, on March 17, 1959, our attorney, Mr. Arthur J. Sullivan, of Morris, James, Hitchens & Williams, presented the written contract for the erection of The Methodist Country House and explained the various sections thereof. On the motion of Mrs. Granville Hooper, seconded by Rev. Roy L. Tawes, the following action was unanimously adopted, "That the contract to build The Methodist Country House for the Homes for the Aged of the Peninsula Annual Conference of The Methodist Church, Inc., which had been assigned to the W. D. Haddock Construction Company, be signed by the trustees." In the presence of the trustees the contract was signed by the officers of the corporation, President J. Earl Cummings and Secretary Hartwell F. Chandler and President A. Albert Haddock of the Haddock Construction Company. Mr. Erling G. Dollar, our architect of Dollar, Bonner, Blake & Manning, was also present.

Through the offices of T. B. O'Toole, Inc., of Wilmington, contact had been made with lending agencies, governmental and private. On March 31, 1959, Mr. Aldwin I. Jarrett and Mr. H. A. Melick, representing T. B. O'Toole, Inc., the president and the executive secretary of our corporation, called upon the president of The Wilmington Savings Fund Society, Mr. Thomas Tatnall, and discussed with him our application for a mortgage and construction loans. On April 2, we were notified that the above named, long established banking company would grant a mortgage loan up to \$1,500,000 for a period extending over 25 years, this loan to be amortized during that period. And further, that it would arrange for construction loans. The proper papers were signed by the officers of this corporation and the bank in accord with legal counsel on April 20, 1959.

To date we have received in cash and bona fide pledges a total of approximately \$650,000. All bills to date have been paid in full including the purchase price of the land, the cost of drilling wells, the laying of a 1500 foot roadway and the architect's current bills. We now have on hand, \$29,000 in the regular checking account, \$100,000 in a savings account in the Wilmington Savings Fund Society and \$100,000 in U. S. Treasury bonds coming due on May 15.

The bid for the construction of The Methodist Country House was \$2,349,985. We expect to receive through Founder's gifts \$650,000, from the permanent mortgage \$1,500,000, from unpaid pledges \$100,000. The above items with our cash on hand of \$200,000 will total \$2,450,000. During the period of construction, approximately 18 months, additional funds will be received from donors who have not hitherto given and donors who will add to their previous gifts. To date we have pledged in Founder's Fees about \$90,000 with close to 10% of this amount in cash and held in a separate checking account.



We, the trustees, recognize the magnitude of the task in which we are engaged. And yet, all of us have felt the guiding hand of our Lord in the end we seek, a Christian home for our aged wherein they may find peace, security and comfort in the sunset years of their lives.

We wish to thank our resident bishop, Bishop G. Bromley Oxnham, who has been advised of all the steps the trustees have taken and who has ever graciously given his wise counsel and helpful guidance.

The Chairman of the Bishop's Cabinet and every member of that Cabinet have also given wise and helpful aid along the way.

Our executive secretary, Rev. George H. Pigueron, Jr., has given himself whole-heartedly to the task of raising funds as well as attending to the infinite details involved in the proper planning for so large a project as The Methodist Country House.

To all the members of our Standing Committees and their chairmen we are grateful for fine services rendered, to Mr. Carroll W. Griffith, Mr. J. Wallace Watson, Dr. John N. Link, chairmen respectively of the following committees, Building, Finance, Admissions.

Our Treasurer, Mr. John F. Kelso, has served faithfully and efficiently. We do appreciate and are grateful for his fine service.

We are also appreciative of the many fine laymen and laywomen that time would fail us to name but who out of gracious and willing hearts have given of their time, money and energy in order that a dream will soon become a reality.

Again, we wish to thank Dr. John N. Link, the Superintendent of the Wilmington District, for his generosity in sharing his office at 1213 Delaware Ave. with The Methodist Country House.

We also wish to express our gratitude for the fine services of our architect, Mr. Erling Dollar, and our contractor, Mr. Albert Haddock, and the gracious spirit of cooperation they have exhibited on every occasion.

All of the trustees are thankful for all of you throughout our conference who through your prayers and your enthusiastic support have made possible the progress thus far attained. We covet your continued prayers and support and that of others in the days that lie ahead. We particularly request that every minister and every church will do their utmost to aid in the receiving of a generous offering on Mother's Day for The Methodist Country House.

Finally, this report could not be ended without a personal word of appreciation for the fine loyalty and the splendid cooperation in every way by all the members of this corporation and by our Conference Committee on Hospitals and Homes.

#### THE BOARD OF HOSPITALS AND HOMES

The Board of Hospitals and Homes of an Annual Conference has as its primary function the promotion of a religious ministry in the name of Christ to the aged, orphans, or needy children, and to the ill. Hence, your

Board has a great interest in the Methodist Country House, the Board of Child Care, and the Methodist Hospital in Philadelphia.

Out of the Annual Report of the General Secretary to the Annual Meeting of the Board of Hospitals and Homes in January come the following statistics: Affiliated Methodist hospitals and homes cared for 1,528,613 persons last year. The total number of such institutions now numbers 229, or an increase of 16 over last year's directory. This includes 14 new homes or agencies for older persons, one new children's home, and a new hospital.

To staff these institutions required 33,265 full-time personnel; there are 12,124 doctors affiliated with the staff, assets of affiliated institutions increased by 10 percent, to a total of \$415,566,557. There are sixty new building projects under construction representing, upon completion, more than \$37 million in value. Future expansion plans in seventy other institutions total better than \$72 million. To operate the existing hospitals and homes cost over \$150 million last year.

These institutions rendered benevolent services (free or part-pay) during the year to the extent of \$13,150,358; income from churches for hospital and home work totaled \$5,560,109.

Dr. Oeschger issued a plea for more qualified and dedicated individuals to serve in staff positions in hospitals and homes. More than 5,000 persons annually must be recruited, he said. He commended the work being done by the church's institutions of health and welfare, and called them "a bulwark against the inroads of materialism and naturalism . . . a very significant part of the church's corporate means of engaging in acts of goodwill and kindness, in deeds of love and helpfulness."

#### The Methodist Country House

This Board has given its support to the development of this project. Dr. J. Earl Cummings will make a detailed report for the Board of Trustees elsewhere in this book. We commend the Board of Trustees for their zeal in pursuing this task delegated to them by the Peninsula Annual Conference. They have given many hours of thought, service and prayer to this, and God has led to the actual letting of contract and breaking of ground. The Conference should feel justly proud in having a part in this through the Mother's Day Offering and special gifts already given.

This Board through a committee authorized has worked in conjunction with a Committee from the Board of Trustees of the Methodist Country House to develop plans for the Mother's Day Offering. Each minister and church is supposed to have received materials for taking the offering. An estimated report regarding receipts may be ready by the Annual Conference, since Mother's Day is actually in our new Conference Year. We recommend the continuation of such an offering annually by the churches of this Conference for the support of the Methodist Country House.

#### The Board of Child Care

Annually at Christmas time the churches in the Peninsula and Baltimore Conference contribute to the work of the Board of Child Care. In 1957-1958 our Conference gave approximately \$15,000. The Board of Child Care reports that during 1958 it ministered in the following ways to those from our Conference: five boys in Strawbridge; two girls in Kelso Home; use of one home for foster care—more are desired; one placement



in an adoptive home; one unmarried mother was served. It is necessary to keep in mind that the transition period through which the Board of Child Care is going at the present time in relation to the merger and relocation of the Strawbridge and Kelso Homes is retarding free movement of its services, especially in regard to the Kelso Girls.

We would like to remind our ministers that Dr. F. Reid Isaac and Dr. Robert L. Wood are available for preaching opportunities to present this good cause in your churches. They receive no offering and expect no expense money for their services.

We suggest that when problems arise in your parish regarding unfortunate children, you write to the Board of Child Care, 516 North Charles Street, Baltimore, Maryland. Dr. Isaac and his staff are always ready to do what they can for you. We recommend an increasing annual support of this work by our churches through the Christmas Offering.

#### The Methodist Episcopal Hospital, Philadelphia, Pa.

This Conference together with the Philadelphia, New Jersey, and Central Pennsylvania Conference gives support to the Methodist Episcopal Hospital, Philadelphia, Pa. This hospital served last year 6600 in-patients, and over 2600 private out-patients. Over 10,000 patients were treated in the Emergency Ward and over 17,000 in the Dispensary. More than 900 babies were born in the hospital. We commend them for this fine healing ministry and pray God that it may continue. We recommend that our churches encourage their girls to enroll in the School of Nursing there, and that our giving continue generously to the support of the hospital.

Dr. Gerald O. McCulloh in an address to a meeting of the Conference Chairmen of Hospitals and Homes in a National Meeting in St. Louis, observed that "the motivation of our concern for the health and welfare of man is in our Christian Faith grounded in God's purpose to give life, His providence in sustaining life, His plan for the healing and fulfilling of life, and His promise of the victory of life over death. Our supreme revelation of God's will and way is in Jesus Christ".

#### THE BOARD OF CHILD CARE TO THE BALTIMORE ANNUAL CONFERENCE AND PENINSULA ANNUAL CONFERENCE

Services to homeless children are entering a new phase in the Baltimore and Peninsula Conferences. We are standing on the threshold of a new day. The Board of Child Care is leaving the "low vaulted" past to step out into a more fulsome future.

The property of the Kelso Home for Girls, located at Towson, Maryland was sold February 25, 1958 for \$300,000, to the Young Men's Christian

Association. It thus became necessary to make living arrangements for the twenty girls for whom this had been home. The final date at the old home was Monday, August 25, 1958.

- 6 girls moved into residence at Business Girls Lodge, 607 Park Ave., Baltimore 1, Maryland, which space was rented by the Board of Child Care, whose staff continued to supervise these girls in this temporary location. This became headquarters for The Kelso Home for Girls.
- 3 moved to the Strawbridge Home to live with their brother at that location until their new Home could be completed.
- 5 girls returned to live with their own parents.
- 1 was placed with maternal grandmother in custody of, and under supervision of, a county welfare board.
- 3 were placed in foster homes under the same plan.
- 2 found employment and an apartment together, the Board of Child Care providing after care and supervision.

One of the natural results of such a transition is a reduced number of girls living under Kelso auspices. But it is important for our people to understand that the work of Kelso, though temporarily limited, continues to be carried on in these two locations. It will take on larger proportions again when new quarters for girls are built at Rockdale, Baltimore County, Maryland.

On November 7, 1958, the Board of Child Care purchased 20 acres of land at Rockdale, Baltimore County, Maryland. This is to be the location of the new Kelso Home for Girls and the new Strawbridge Home for Boys, as well as the Offices of the Board of Child Care—the home of the total service of the agency. This was the second step in the physical merger of the total program.

Next, the architectural firm of Tyler, Ketcham and Myers was employed to work with the Building Committee of the Board of Child Care, to design a center for the FOUR FOLD Program. Group care will be given in the new Kelso and Strawbridge cottages. Foster care, adoption and service to unwed parents will function through the Social Work staff housed in the Administration Building.

Our plans include five cottages, each for twelve boys or girls. In addition there is a Multi-service Building for food preparation, social recreation and worship as well as facilities for visiting groups from the community and the churches. The Administration Building is for the conduct of business, for promotion, for health and casework services, for board and committee meetings. A residence for the Executive Director will also be built.

Specifications and working drawings will be completed by the time this report is made. Bids will then be obtained. It is hoped that the ground breaking ceremony will take place in early summer with building to follow immediately.

The total physical plan has been shaped by the program. The buildings are fashioned to function in meeting the needs of children, living in group care. Much of the designing has been the result of advice received from our staff, the General Board of Hospitals and Homes of the Methodist



Church, The Child Welfare League of America and the Department of Public Welfare of the State of Maryland.

All of the children living in these cottages will have several advantages.

1. The cottages will be arranged for easy group living and supervision.
2. Brothers and sisters, boys and girls will be on the same location. This put us in conformity with the prevailing practice in Methodist children's homes throughout the nation.
3. Six different schools will be available for our children to attend. Other new schools are planned and will be built. We are also convenient to several vocational schools in Baltimore City on the Junior and Senior High School level.
4. Our location will be more accessible to volunteers, individuals and groups who can give assistance in recreation and school lesson preparation. Also, more easily reached by parents and relatives, whose visits are so very important to the progress a child makes in group care.
5. The most valuable asset will be an administrative unity with the full team of personnel readily available to think and plan for each child:—The administrator, caseworker, group worker and houseparents. Because of this a new child applying can be more easily oriented. The child in residence will also have the sustaining power of these resources to aid him in the development of his utmost capacity.

There will be no fund raising campaign for the new buildings. Capital funds will be available from the sale of the Kelso and Strawbridge properties and these along with other resources will be reinvested on the new location.

But such a step forward requires interpretation to the Methodist constituency of these two conferences. Therefore, the Board of Child Care engaged Dr. Robert L. Wood, a retired minister of the Baltimore Conference to pick up from the shoulders of the Director the heavy load of the public relations program, including promotion. Dr. Wood plunged in, using his gifts, abilities and energy, first, to carry on the Christmas offering campaign, while simultaneously editing the paper OUR BOYS AND GIRLS and giving leadership in furthering the Woman's Auxiliary work. His efforts have been characteristically strenuous and equally effective.

The Christmas offering campaign played the spotlight upon the FOUR FOLD or multiple nature of the services of the Board of Child Care. Unfortunately, our program has been envisaged solely in terms of 20 girls living at Kelso and the 40 boys at Strawbridge. It can't be stated too often or too emphatically that each of the four parts is as important as the others. The 25 babies and other children receiving foster home care, as well as the 22 babies placed permanently in adoptive homes, not to speak of the 22 unwed mothers that have been aided in rehabilitation, should loom as large in our consideration and in evaluation of our work as the children residing in our two institutions.

It is of some real significance that the seventy-four boys and girls in trouble in the courts could count on a Methodist agency to alert their local church to their situation.

The assistance we have given to unhappy, unfortunate and unwise, unwed parents is a truly Christian service to which we have not attached proper importance.

Yes, ours is a FOURFOLD PROGRAM of aid to children and their parents. It involves

1. Group care in Kelso and Strawbridge.
2. Boarding care in foster homes.
3. Placement with a new family for adoption.
4. Assistance to unwed parents.

Dr. Wood has given dynamic leadership in the campaign that drove these facts deeper into the consciousness of our Methodist supporters.

As a result, the churches of the Baltimore Conference contributed \$90,343.53,\* while those of the Peninsula Conference gave \$17,005.69, or a total of \$107,349.22.

This result will enable us to enter this new phase by passing over the threshold of the door that leads away from yesterday into tomorrow.

#### REPORT OF BOARD OF LAY ACTIVITIES TO TWENTIETH SESSION OF THE PENINSULA ANNUAL CONFERENCE

The following report will, in part, show the increasing interest of our laymen in the work of Christ's Kingdom here in our Conference.

##### Methodist Men

Ten more new Methodist Men's Organizations have been chartered this year making a total of thirty toward our quadrennial goal of forty. There being more than 200 charges in this conference, obviously many represented here do not yet have Methodist Men's Organizations. A live men's organization can help your church a great deal. If you need help in getting started call upon your District or Conference Lay Leader.

##### Laymen's Banquets

All four Districts had laymen's banquets. In all, more than 1400 men attended. I was privileged to be present at all of them and with the others enjoyed the fellowship and received great inspiration. These banquets are getting better and better year by year.

##### Communion Breakfasts

One of the finest things our laymen do is sponsoring communion breakfasts. In the Dover District six were held with a total attendance of about 1000 men; in the Easton District five with 700 men attending; in the Salis-

bury District three with 575 men participating. In the Wilmington District we are still cooperating with the Federation of Men's Bible Classes in their annual Communion Service.

#### Laymen's Sunday

About 300 churches out of a total of about 390 in our Conference observed Laymen's Sunday. Again I urge you to observe this important day at the principal service in your church. Use your own laymen if possible. The date this year is October 18th.

#### Laymen's Week-end Retreat

Our outstanding event of the year was the Retreat at Camp Pecometh. Men who were there say it was the best ever, and with Dr. Harry Denman and Don Calame as our leaders it was the best ever. This year we will have at our retreat, Robert G. Mayfield, General Secretary of the Board of Lay Activities. We also plan a discussion group on church finances with our Conference Treasurer, John Kelso, in charge. The Saturday evening session will be directed by the Conference Board of Social and Economic Relations, Joseph Brosius, Chairman. The dates of the Retreat are September 12th and 13th, the week-end after Labor Day.

#### Northeastern Jurisdiction Assembly

We had eleven in attendance at this Assembly at Buck Hill Falls, including three District Lay Leaders and the Conference Lay Leader. These Assemblies are growing in interest and value year by year. The ninth will be held at Buck Hill Falls, October 23-24-25. These Assemblies are for District and Associate Lay Leaders and their wives and also for Church Lay Leaders and presidents of Methodist Men's Organizations. We have been assigned a quota of twenty.

#### Conference Lay Leader

In addition to the many meetings I have attended and the many services in which I have had the privilege of participating, we have been showing pictures of and telling the stories about our tour to Alaska, Japan, and the Hawaiian Islands in connection with the Fourteenth Convention on Religious Education in Tokyo. We have appeared about 70 times before Methodist Men's groups, Women's Societies and others, all at their request. We cannot but exclaim about the things we have seen and heard especially that great enterprise, the Alaska Methodist University and the marvelous International Christian University in suburban Tokyo, Japan.

One of the most helpful events of the year for me was to attend the Conference Lay Leaders Workshop in Chicago. It lasted two full days and I mean full days. We were inspired, instructed, informed and crammed full of every phase of laymen's work. A truly wonderful experience, so good, in fact, that by unanimous request it is being made an annual affair. The closing was a communion service on Saturday Evening in the Sky Chapel atop the great Chicago Temple just beneath the high spire that is the highest church steeple in the world. There in this beautiful chapel, 400

feet above the crowded sidewalk, we gathered in solemn silence. The steel girders have been concealed behind beautifully carved panels of wood with scroll and cross design. Overhead the deep blue ceiling is indirectly lighted with soft lights almost as though you were looking into the blue of Heaven. The floor is heavily carpeted for silence; the benches are backless. The front of the altar across one corner is beautifully carved with a portrayal called, the Christ of Chicago. There, with only the lights of the candles on the altar, we sang a capella, My Jesus I Love Thee, In the Cross of Christ I Glory, Beneath the Cross of Jesus, Bless be the Tie that Binds.

Then we received at the hands of a great Methodist Minister, Dr. Charles R. Goff, of Methodist Men's Hour fame, the Bread and the Wine. We heard him take us back across the centuries to another Upper Room comparing it to this upper room where we were communing and charging us that we were, in effect, responsible for the task laid on the shoulders of the first disciples.

Overhead, but seeming a part of the service, the great chimes struck the quarter hour and the half hour reminding us of time but also of the timelessness of God.

Still under the spell of that service, we went down a few steps out onto a terrace and looking out over the great City of Chicago at night, were awed by its ribbons of light beads; its flashing figures; its great shafts of light reaching upward but far below.

We could not talk for a long time. That night above that great City we sought and found God, and we offered ourselves, our souls and bodies a living sacrifice.

#### THE LEGISLATIVE COMMITTEE

Your Legislative Committee has sought to keep abreast of the issues of particular concern to the churches. Last fall the committee worked closely with the Board of Temperance, the Board of Social and Economic Relations, and the Wilmington New Castle County Council of Churches, in an unsuccessful effort to defeat the Bingo-Gambling referendum. The Committee led in organizing the help of the clergy in the two lower counties.

Through various means of communication, the Committee has sought to keep the churches informed of legislation pending in the General Assembly of special interest to the welfare of the State.

The Committee has also been contacting the members of the General Assembly, personally and otherwise, expressing the interest and concern of our people in the many bills before it.

This Committee was formed by the Annual Conference in 1953 as an outgrowth of the Legislative Committee of the Wilmington and Dover Districts. It was formed because the Conference at that time had no other



organization fulfilling the function of keeping the churches informed about legislative matters. The newly formed Board of Social and Economic Relations authorized by the General Conference of 1952 was just getting underway. Since that time the Board and the Committee have cooperated in matters of mutual concern.

### MINISTERIAL TRAINING AND QUALIFICATIONS

The Board of Ministerial Training and Qualifications has continued its program of interviews and orientation, and has introduced the Training Program For Newly Appointed Ministers which was authorized at the 1958 session of the Conference.

The first Training Program for Newly Appointed Ministers was held at Camp Pe-Co-Meth on June 14, 1958. Twenty-five newly appointed ministers attended this program. Representatives of ten Conference boards and committees presented the work of their groups to the ministers. Comments from those attending indicate the value of such a program for our new men.

A similar program will be held at Camp Pe-Co-Meth on Thursday, June 11. Further information will be available in the near future.

The fourth annual Orientation Program for Ministerial Candidates sponsored by the Board was held on Tuesday, December 30, 1958, at the Newark (Delaware) Church. The theme of the day was "Making Seminary Education More Effective." Dr. Earl H. Ferguson, Professor of Preaching and Pastoral Theology at Wesley Theological Seminary, spoke on that theme in the afternoon, after which the candidates and Board members discussed the theme in smaller groups. At the dinner, to which prospects for the ministry throughout the Conference were invited, Dr. Franz Hildebrandt, Professor of Christian Theology at Drew Theological Seminary, spoke on the subject, "Methodist Emphasis in Theological Training."

Prominent among the subjects discussed by candidates were the pros and cons of being married while in seminary, the role of the church in providing financial assistance to seminary students, and the respective functions of preaching and administration in the minister's work.

Attendance for the day was as follows: 28 candidates, 59 ministerial prospects and 13 Board members. 100 persons attended the dinner meeting.

Interviews have been conducted with twenty-four candidates, and psychological tests have been administered to six. At this writing, five men are scheduled to be received On Trial, and nine are to be received into Full Membership.

The School for Approved Supply Pastors will be held at Wesley Theological Seminary in Washington, D. C., from June 22 to July 17. This school is arranged so that a Supply can complete four courses during one session, thereby securing credit for a full year's work. Scholarships are available

from our Board on a pro rata basis. The Department of Ministerial Education of the Methodist Church, although it still continues the course of study through correspondence, now strongly urges Supplies to secure their training by attending such schools as this throughout the country. The advantages of such training as compared with correspondence work are obvious.

The 1959 edition of the booklet "Steps Into the Methodist Ministry" will be prepared shortly after Conference and one copy will be sent to each minister. This booklet is available to all persons interested in any phase of ministerial preparation beginning with the Local Preacher.

The Chairman, the Registrar, the Secretary and all other members of the Board are available at all times to be of assistance to those seeking ministerial training and advancement.

### REPORT OF THE PENINSULA CONFERENCE BOARD OF MISSIONS

The Board of Missions has met four times during the conference year with two additional meetings of the Executive Committee. As this report will indicate, several matters of far-reaching significance have been considered and policies adopted which should increase the usefulness of this Board to the Conference and make it an ever more efficient steward in the administration of Conference funds.

We have been concerned with those matters relative to World Service giving, Advance Specials and the special benevolent causes of the Methodist Church as well as the specific matters which will be dealt with under the major headings that follow.

#### I. Cultivation

It is our firm belief that when our people are fully informed of the needs for World Service and other mission giving they will respond faithfully and sacrificially. The responsibility for an adequate program of missionary education rests upon our Conference Missionary Secretary, the Rev. William Hemphill, Jr. and his four District Missionary Secretaries: the Rev. D'Arcy Littleton, Wilmington; the Rev. Ira E. Doyle, Dover; the Rev. J. Howard Link, Salisbury and the Rev. John E. Irwin, Easton. The plans for the cultivation work of the year were made in consultation with the four District Superintendents at the Silver Bay Conference on the Christian World Mission early last summer. A program of unusual excellence has been carried to completion and we would express sincere appreciation to these consecrated leaders.



Four District Missionary Rallies were held in the early fall with the Rev. Dallas L. Browning, Director of the Advance Department of the Division of World Missions, as the inspirational speaker. Emphasis was placed on local church Commission on Missions.

January was observed as Missionary Cultivation Month. The Rev. Henry G. Wheeler and the Rev. Elwood Bartlett, missionaries on furlough from the Belgian Congo, were our resource persons. A total of 31 meetings were conducted in our Conference with approximately 2500 people in attendance.

Our missionary films continue to be well used. Our film library is being enlarged each year with the purchase of the latest motion pictures and film strips available on the current themes.

Our Conference Missionary Secretary has given a great deal of time during the year addressing varied groups on Mission themes, advising young people about careers in Christian Missions and corresponding with pastors and local Commissions on Missions on behalf of Advance Specials.

## II. Special Projects

A convocation on the Urban Church was held in St. Paul's Church, Wilmington, on October 20, under the joint sponsorship of the Conference Committee on Urban Life and the Board of Missions. The Rev. Paul E. McCoy, Chairman of the Urban Committee, is largely responsible for the success of this program. This proved to be a most meaningful project, as it brought together not only the ministers and lay leaders of many of our urban churches, but also gave opportunity for representatives of social welfare and educational agencies to present their programs and opened avenues of communication between the churches and the agencies from which should result better understanding and increased cooperation.

We have continued those special projects begun previously in regards to the Dover Air Force Base; the Migrant Ministry in cooperation with the Del-Mar Migrant Committee of the Maryland-Delaware Council of Churches; the work of our deaconesses at Union Methodist Church, Wilmington, and the Wesley Community Chapel at DuRoss Heights.

## III. Church Extension

In addition to those projects for which we have a continuing responsibility, we have made allocation during this year of funds to aid church extension projects at Dames Quarter, Maryland; Cheswold, Delaware; Rehoboth Beach, Delaware; Zion Church, Parsonsburg, and Kent Island, Maryland; Chester-Bethel, Delaware; Red Lion, Delaware; and Stanton, Delaware. Several of these projects are not yet ready to receive financial assistance, but they have been assured of aid when they have completed their plans and met in full the requirements of this Board. Certain other projects are under careful consideration and study by committees of the Board as we seek to remain ever alert to new opportunities.

In recent years, the Board has been studying the possibility of making loans rather than grants to those churches in unusually progressive situations in which it would seem most probable that they would be able to return Conference Funds for other projects. The Division of National

Missions has agreed to handle such loan funds for us and our Board is now ready to consider applications for loans as well as grants in aid. A church extension policy has been adopted by the Conference Board and is herewith presented for the information and guidance of those pastors and churches considering application to the Board.

## "CHURCH EXTENSION POLICY OF THE BOARD OF MISSIONS OF THE PENINSULA ANNUAL CONFERENCE"

- I. Church Extension Aid shall be restricted to three categories:
  1. **Incentive Gifts**, in expanding communities where financially conservative congregational backgrounds require challenging financial priming to get necessary Church Expansion projects started.
  2. **Supplemental Gifts**, when necessary for the success of the projects involved after the local congregation has demonstrated its concern by sacrificial pledging and giving to the limit of its ability but, because of limited financial resources, is unable to undertake the expansion a growing situation indicates as imperative.
  3. **Supplemental Loans**, when funds are available, for emergency Church Extension situations on the basis of a 20-year mortgage (this may be a second mortgage) to run as follows:
    - a. The borrowing church shall pay 1% interest to this Board in semi-annual payments.
    - b. During the final 10 year period, the borrowing church shall repay the principal of the loan in equal, or graduated, semi-annual payments plus 1% interest on the remaining amount due. On this basis, the mortgage will be amortized at the end of 20 years, and the money will then be available to help with other church extension needs.
- II. The Relative amounts of an Incentive Gift (or Supplemental Gift) and a loan in any given situation shall be determined by the Board of Missions after careful study of the factors involved in each situation.
- III. No grant or loan shall be made to any church until the building plans have received the approval of the Department of Architecture of the Section on Church Architecture of the Section of Church Extension of the General Board, located at 1701 Arch Street, Philadelphia 3, Pa.
- IV. This Board is not primarily a lending agency but rather an institution which seeks to assist with the cause of Church Extension within our Conference.
- V. Congregations accepting donations, whether as Incentive Gifts or as Supplemental Gifts have a moral obligation to help other Church Extension projects after they have achieved a position of strength for themselves.

## IV. Missionary Aid

For information and guidance, we present the Missionary Aid policies of this Board which are based upon the Mission Aid procedures of the Division of National Missions of the Methodist Church but modified to meet our Conference needs.



**"Missionary Aid Policies, Board of Missions, Peninsula Conference**

- I. General Principles. The following general principles should guide the District Superintendents in applying to the Conference Board for Missionary Aid:
  1. By these appropriations we hope to aid the administrator to bring the project to self support at the earliest possible date. Appropriations are made for ONE YEAR ONLY AND MUST BE REVIEWED ANNUALLY by the Conference Board of Missions.
  2. Appropriations are not made to a project or to a District because a certain amount was allocated the previous year. It is understood that appropriations are made for Pastoral Support, not for a particular minister or person. Every project must stand upon its own merits.
  3. An Every-Member Canvass for financial support must be made annually and a report of the Canvass made to the Conference Board of Missions.
  4. The local group should be given an increased portion of the financial responsibility each year until it assumes it in its entirety. Very close supervision by the Superintendent should be given to the project and carefully selected leaders chosen.
  5. In all cases where mission aid is given to a church or charge, the District Superintendent shall make known to the Quarterly Conference of such charge, the amount and source of such mission aid.
- II. Projects which qualify for Missionary Aid:
  1. Organization of new churches in rapidly-growing areas where these charges may be brought to self-support in a reasonably short period.
  2. Mission churches ministering to minority groups.
  3. An adequate ministry in isolated sections where churches could not continue to serve but for the support of the Conference Board of Missions.
  4. Provide a ministry for transient or uprooted peoples.
  5. Necessary additional support in low income or blighted areas.
  6. Institutions which are church centered and church related serving needy groups through specialized ministries in urban or rural areas.
- III. Projects which do not qualify for Missionary Aid:
  1. Specific Responsibilities of other Boards or agencies of The Methodist Church.
  2. Churches so located as to be in competition with each other or churches of cooperating denominations.
  3. Support of secretaries, janitors, organists, etc; interest, pensions or taxes; purchasing of property, moving expenses and incidental expenses or bank charges in administering Home Mission funds.
  4. Assistance for Annual Conferences' sustentation or minimum salary funds.
  5. No support will be furnished churches renting or leasing their places of worship to other competitive religious groups.
  6. Charges not using literature approved by The Methodist Church. See the Board of Education approved list.

7. Charges served by pastors giving part time service and who are otherwise gainfully employed.
8. Charges where the total pastoral support from all sources equals or exceeds the average cash salary of the Conference, except under special circumstances approved by the Conference Board of Missions.
9. Charges served by a Retired Minister, if the total pastoral support from all sources, added to the pastor's annuity equals or exceeds the minimum salary adopted by the Conference.

**V. Recommendations**

In concluding our report, we would like to make the following recommendations:

1. That the month of January be designated as Missionary Cultivation Month.
2. That there be a Missionary Rally or Institute on each District during the coming year.
3. That each church have an active Commission on Missions, that each pastor encourage the use of our fine missionary publications and that wherever possible the local church sponsor a School of Missions, utilizing one of the recommended study themes.
4. That the Church Extension policies and the Missionary Aid policies of the Board of Missions be printed annually in the Conference Journal with other permanent records of the Conference.
5. That the Rev. William Hemphill, Jr. be appointed Conference Missionary Secretary.

**REPORT OF THE BOARD OF PENSIONS**

The Board of Pensions is pleased to report to the Annual Conference concerning the administration of the pension program and the prospective annuity rate for the year 1959-60.

Your Board feels that we have achieved a very healthy situation in the investment of pension funds, which will make for continued stability of returns for pension purposes. We note with satisfaction also that there are steady increases in pastor's salaries from year to year, which makes possible continued increases in the annuity rate. We have maintained our place among the top Conferences in Methodism with respect to annuity rate paid. We are confident of continuing to make advances in this time of rising living costs, when our retired ministers and their dependents have great need.

In this pre-Conference report, your Board is not able to make recommendation as to annuity rate for next year. On the basis of full study of receipts from the local Churches for the year ending April 30th, we will make the recommendations on the Conference floor. (An annuity rate of \$58.00 for 1959-60 was recommended and approved by the Conference.) At that time a full report of the financial program will be given by our treasurer.

Again we wish to express appreciation to the capable laymen who serve on your Board of Pensions and who give such valuable direction to the pension program.

We wish to bring the following items to the attention of the Annual Conference:

1. The 1956 General Conference spelled out in detail the responsibilities of the individual ministers to see that pension apportionments are paid in full each year or pro-rated on salary paid. Especially do we call attention of all active pastors and retired ministers serving as supplies to Paragraph 1624, sections 3 and 5, of the 1956 Discipline. Under these provisions, your Board has no other alternative than to deduct pension benefits from retired ministers who have not been careful to see that conference claimants apportionments are paid in full each year on pastoral charges served. This is a responsibility for each individual minister.

2. We are pleased to be advised that the Board of Ministerial Training and Qualifications plans to propose a joint committee at the Annual Conference to study the status of a full-time and part-time supply service. We shall welcome the clarification of the status of many of our ministers.

3. We would remind ministers, laymen and local Churches to keep before our people the desirability of making bequests to our Conference Claimants Endowment Fund. Our pension program has benefited greatly from generous bequests made over the years, and your Board is grateful to those who have remembered this important part of our Christian stewardship. As the Endowment Fund is increased year after year from assessments on minister's salaries and from gifts and bequests we shall have a continuing sound basis for income for the retired minister and his family.

#### THE BOARD OF SOCIAL AND ECONOMIC RELATIONS PENINSULA CONFERENCE

The past conference year has been devoted to encouraging the commissions in the local churches to promote the principles set forth in The Social Creed of The Methodist Church. There are seventy-seven local commissions recorded as follows:

Dover District	12
Easton District	21
Salisbury District	18
Wilmington District	26

Each of the chairmen has been sent literature, a list of visual aids and a suggested program. In an effort to further stimulate interest and demonstrate a program, all chairmen in the Wilmington District have been invited to attend a supper meeting on April 16. It is expected that similar meetings will be organized in the other Districts.



Last October four laymen from the Peninsula Conference attended the First Industrial Relations Conference of The Methodist Church in Cincinnati, Ohio. This was the start of a national program of major significance. We expect to be represented at a similar but regional meeting at Buck Hill Falls in 1959.

We have requested an allocation of \$1,050. for the next conference year. A central office for board and committees, established in Dover, would facilitate the work and probably reduce the overall cost of conference administration. We urge that this conference consider action toward this end.

We respectfully suggest to the Cabinet that they consider an emphasis of the social issues at the District Conferences next fall. Our Board would be very happy to cooperate in developing a program.

This summer the Board will provide the program for one of the sessions at the Layman's Retreat at Camp Pe-Co-Meth. The retreat is growing in attendance and importance. We urge early registration.

Although race relations is by no means the only social or economic interest of The Methodist Church, it is a vital concern among the members of our Conference. At this time the integration-segregation issue is prominently before us. While the Social Creed of The Methodist Church stands for "freedom from discrimination", local applications must be developed by Christian citizens in each community and not all local situations are the same in Delaware and eastern Maryland.

Your Board is convinced that there is no better atmosphere in which citizens can share viewpoints, acquire information, and reach community decisions than in our churches. Rather than recommend a uniform race relations program for the Conference to pass along to all our churches, your Board believes it will be sounder Christian wisdom at this time simply to urge that every Charge have an active Commission on Social & Economic Relations to institute this year in each congregation a prayerful study of this subject. We are confident that prayer and open discussion in every church will insure sensible and practical progress in race relations. When Christian people face their problems honestly and spiritually, they are guided in right action.

But your Board desires to emphasize as vigorously as possible that every local church needs an effective Commission on Social & Economic Relations to be seriously prophetic and to continue in the tradition of John Wesley. Even reluctance to discuss race relations must not prompt our churches to avoid the study of the relations between the Christian Gospel and the many other contemporary problems of life today.

We are approaching the time for election of a president of the United States and other officers and representatives in the Federal and State Governments. Christians should be greatly concerned in the selection of proper candidates for both parties, and should actively participate in the consideration and selection of candidates.

We recommend that this Conference adopt a memorial urging the General Conference in 1960 to make the Commission of Social & Economic Relations mandatory in each Annual Conference and every Methodist Church.

### THE BOARD OF TEMPERANCE TO THE PENINSULA ANNUAL CONFERENCE

Is it nothing to you as Christians and other moral leaders to know what alcoholic beverages are doing to our people in all areas of life? The apparent indifference of our people, including too many church members, is quite appalling. A close study by temperance organizations on the national, conference and local levels reveals the woeful lack of practical and concerted action to combat the bold and misleading action of the more and more firmly entrenched liquor industry in our society.

Your Board of Temperance has faced the fact of this indifference to the ill effects of liquor drinking in our society. We have tried to plan a program, with conscientious and devoted Christians, to combat this bold and misleading action of the liquor industry.

Let us repeat here what your Board of Temperance said in 1951. We quote: "To say the least, we know that beverage alcohol and crime are often found together: That at least some of the screams of horror that come from twisted auto wrecks on the nation's highways are caused by beverage alcohol—there are some boys and girls caught in the web of delinquency and immorality that have been led there because of beverage alcohol—that alcohol is a cause of marital unhappiness in at least some cases—that beverage alcohol will and does dull the spiritual sensitivity of the immortal soul God has endowed man with."

The more your present Board thinks about and works on these cancerous problems in our society, the more we have tried to lift our voices against these evils and have taken practical steps to limit their use. We have emphasized the importance of: **Legislation; Education; Commitments; and Rehabilitation.**

The District Directors, the Reverends William Bundick, A. M. B. Snapp, Howard Evans and Mr. Walter Palmer, have been asked to submit to all our local churches of the Conference, copies of the Board's program outlining suggestions for study and action in each field of work thus indicated. Perhaps too little headway has been made upon the body politic, but we have tried to help our churches combat the cancerous effect of liquor drinking by intelligent and prayerful efforts of concerned remedy.

We strongly feel that our churches must make our people—particularly our children and youth—realize that the drink problem is a moral issue, not just a scientific and legislative one. We have urged, as our predecessors have done before us, our churches to stress the fact that the moral problem is in our human relations. Persons are hurt by drink—this statement has already been proven; and if persons are thereby hurt, our churches must operate strongly against the evil that hurts them.

Years ago, no doubt our churches did not emphasize the scientific and the objective approach in combating the drinking of liquor; the effort was



perhaps made too much from the emotional approach. Still your Board hastens to say that we have done our best to guard against a possible danger of neglecting the emotions in the solution of our drinking problem. There is an obvious need for both methods.

Your Conference Board, therefore, wants to report that we plan to continue during the next Conference Year, the recommendations and goals as outlined by the Board in its report to you last year. We can only re-emphasize the problems facing us **now as then**, and we thus want again, to state our assets with which we have to work.

We quote from last year's report:

"In the Field of Economics—The revenue that our Government receives costs us from two to four dollars for every dollar we receive.

"In the Field of Safety—30% to 50% in some states of the fatalities have liquor involved. Another figure stated that 60% of all arrests involved drinking.

"These are some of the problems—here are some of the assets upon which we have to work:

1. There is a growing receptivity on the part of the public. Newspapers and magazines are concerned about alcohol more and more.
2. We have a receptive church.
3. We have a receptive school system.
4. We have found that there is a 7% increase in abstinence.
5. Our churches' youth are finding it a major interest.
6. There is a growing interest and activity in the field of rehabilitation."

Your Board joins the other Protestant groups in taking effective steps to protect our nation's youth from the brainwashing influence of alcohol advertising which is so misleading to all persons. We shall do all within our power to check alcoholism (approximately five million alcoholics in the United States today) and the fatalities from the drinking drivers (approximately 20,000 dead on the nation's highways annually).

Your Board commends the 200 national magazines that carry no alcohol advertising. In 1957 their total circulation was over 99 million. We vigorously oppose the T. V. network time for advertising beer and wine. We shall work as a Board, individually, and with all other groups who believe as we, such as the Temperance Leagues, W. C. T. U., the Allied Youth, and other groups, to combat the liquor evils in every possible way.

#### Some Goals We Will Continue Striving For

1. Increase the potential of **Education**. We urge all churches to name Temperance Committees and make the initial emphasis in temperance education on the **analyses** of facts. We strongly suggest the teaching of total abstinence by using: (A) Church School literature; (B) Films; (C) Speakers; (D) Discussions, panels and open forums; (C) and our Methodist Literature in the extended service of the Church School, such as, the Daily Vacation Bible School. We shall carefully make adequate preparation for our public school emphases using this means of approach whenever feasible. We shall continue to use the very valuable helps from our National Temperance Board of Washington, D. C. We shall support temperance legisla-

tion nationally and in the states of Delaware and Maryland whenever opportunity affords.

2. In the Area of Commitment, we shall help our Churches face the fact that all persons are either for or against ideas. We shall urge our people to be **against** drinking alcoholic liquors as a beverage by presenting the necessary scientific facts for study.

3. The rehabilitation of the drinker must have our concern and sympathy. Institutions helping persons to become rehabilitated from drink will have our support.

We need help for such study and Christian action. We need every Pastor, all Christians, especially known as Methodists, in our labors combating the evils of the liquor industry. Much more we could say, but just now—may we appeal to you for prayers, concern and creative action for sobriety.

#### COMMITTEE ON URBAN LIFE PENINSULA ANNUAL CONFERENCE

The Committee on Urban Life planned and held a very successful one-day Seminar on the Urban Church in the Fall of this past Conference year. It was held in St. Paul's Methodist Church, Wilmington, Delaware. All members of the Conference were invited.

The committee Chairman and the Rev. Dr. John N. Link of the Wilmington District met several times with the Rev. Dr. Philip Edwards of the Department of City Work, Board of Missions office in Philadelphia, to plan the program.

There were four main facets to the all-day program. These were: "Qualifications for the Urban Church Ministry"; "The Urban Church Pro-



gram"; "Inter-City-Suburban Church Strategy and Cooperation" and "Urban Church Inter-Agency Cooperation."

There were addresses on the first two subjects given by the Rev. Dr. E. Cranston Riggin of Baltimore, Maryland and the Rev. Dr. William F. Dunkle, Jr., of Wilmington. The latter two subjects were presented by a panel, with ample opportunity given for questions and discussion. Such agencies as the Y. M. C. A., the Family Service Society, Council of Churches of Wilmington and New Castle County, Wilmington Housing Authority, Eugene duPont Memorial Hospital, Fierre S. duPont High School and the Wilmington Planning Commission sent their representative who spoke and answered questions.

The Seminar, we feel, met a real need in the life of our Conference. Indeed, we hope there will be others. The Urban Church is facing great problems and great opportunities. This day's program helped us to see that the church with a "changeless Christ" is needed more than ever in our urban centers. By facing up to our problems, by finding out about resources available in our communities, we can do our job.

#### REPORT OF THE QUADRENNIAL COMMITTEE ON THE LOCAL CHURCH

"The Quadrennial Program on strengthening the Local Church" has had its several emphases. The first was a "Self-Study" of the Local Church followed by the emphases on "Full Organization" and "Leadership Training". Then came "Christian Consecration" and "Expansion". Now we come to "Christian Concern—Christ and Our Mission" and "Enlistment".

Our year of Christian Concern is introduced by Bishop Arthur J. Moore's booklet, "Christ and Our Mission". Many churches started this Quadrennial year by distributing copies of it to their members. In this booklet Bishop Moore states, "Our Mission is to see clearly what Christ wants us to be and do, and then, using all available resources and straining every nerve to transform the vision into reality." He continues by saying, "We shall be thinking of our mission in terms of a personal trust in God and a personal dedication to the Church."

The emphasis on Enlistment refers to our reaching, in all areas of the church, new members, leaders and workers for the local church and for the church at large.

However, our churches are urged to concentrate during this year on enlistment through—

1. Church school membership
2. Membership classes for children and youths
3. Evangelism of persons for Christ and the Church
4. Enlistment and training of church and church school workers
5. Christian vocations conferences

Such enlistment needs local church leaders who are trained in the work of the Local Church Commissions. The officers of some of our Conference Boards have discussed this need and one way to help meet it. They have considered a series of interboard training conferences for the members of the Commissions to acquaint them with their work. A suggestion has been made that such training could be given in conjunction with the District Conferences.

We recommend that such interboard training conference be held this year, if possible.

#### WESLEY COLLEGE REPORT OF MEMBERSHIP MEETING

A year ago we reported the beginning of the new day for Wesley. We told of securing advice from the most qualified persons concerning the future of the college. We told of developing plans, securing property, paying debt, raising salaries, providing retirement, increasing enrollment, and preparing a new charter. Receipts from alumni and friends had made possible the beginning of the classroom building, little theatre, and heating plant.

Now, we have moved into the active program of putting the plants into operation. The most tangible, of course, is the construction of the new campus. The new building, housing classrooms, faculty offices, seminar

rooms, auditorium, and heating plant, is so far along it is expected to be finished by July, and the first group to use it will be the Woman's Society School of Missions. Progress is advanced enough on the women's dormitory that cornerstone laying for it and the classroom building will be held at commencement on June 7. Both will be ready for use at the beginning of the Fall term. Work was begun on the men's dormitory this week so that it will be completed a year from now.

In order to see how these things have been possible, let us turn to a report on the Development Fund by Mr. Ira T. Ellis, Treasurer, from June 4, 1957, to May 12, 1959:

The response of the churches in the first year of the Capital Funds program is a matter of rejoicing. This means the entire program can move ahead full speed. This also affects one of the questions raised by the Middle States Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools, when its report looked for assurances of "sustained interest and commitment on the part of the Peninsula Conference." The leadership of our Bishop, his cabinet, pastors, and officials is to be commended.

And now a word must be said about the gymnasium. It has been declared a total loss by insurance adjusters, except for walls. Whether or not it can be used temporarily is being determined by engineering tests. Unfortunately funds are not in hand for the immediate building of a new gymnasium. How soon one shall be erected depends upon the tests and the availability of new money.

Buildings and a sound financial program alone do not make a first-rate educational institution. They do help create a fine setting, but an institution must have objectives and must set out to achieve them. The administration, faculty, and trustees have examined ours. They have been recast and are found in the catalog thus:

**Its Specific Aims**

1. To provide a campus climate conducive to the growth of students in the knowledge, acceptance, and practice of the Christian faith.
2. To offer students an educational program that will challenge their highest abilities and best efforts, and inspire a sustained interest in learning.
3. To afford students an opportunity to improve the techniques of learning and acquire the knowledge and skills essential for the continuance of formal education or the pursuit of a vocation.
4. To assist students in arriving at a true evaluation of themselves in the areas of physical health, academic ability, social attitudes, and professional and vocational interests.
5. To help students evolve a philosophy of life and an emotional maturity to enable them to deal rationally with the constantly changing political, social, and economical factors with which they will be confronted in their family, vocational, and community relationships.
6. To endeavor to enlist students' interest in civic affairs and through the study of the social sciences and opportunity for participation in related activities prepare them to assume their responsibilities of citizenship.
7. To recruit and help to train leaders and effective workers for the Christian church.

To this end the President, Dr. J. Paul Slaybaugh, has carefully chosen members of the faculty to spearhead the teaching of these objectives. The fact that no persons are planning to leave the faculty is an indication of an enthusiastic anticipation of the future. There is a considerable increase in enrollment, and at the same time there is a raising of the admission requirements. The great increase in the number of those who wish to enter institutions of higher education and the fact that more people in a wider area know about Wesley have made it possible to raise standards and still serve more young people.

The Commission on Higher Education of the Middle States Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools conducted an evaluation of Wesley late



this winter. We have been continued on the accredited list for two years. Another evaluation will be conducted then. A number of recommendations have been offered to help strengthen the school. Some have already been put in effect. Others are being studied by the appropriate committees of the faculty and Board of Trustees. All will be given the serious attention they deserve and necessary action taken. We have come a long way, and this has created a sympathetic attitude. There is every reason to believe we shall meet the high standards of excellence set by the Association.

All—alumni, friends, faculty, administration, trustees, Peninsula Conference churches—are carrying their share toward the making of the new Wesley. I suggest two things on which you may concentrate: Keep up the financial support. Pay the Capital Improvement Fund and Operating Fund in full. Send some of your best students to Wesley.

Remember the words of Alfred Tennyson:

Ah, my God,  
What might I not have made of thy fair world,  
Had I but loved thy highest creature here?  
It was my duty to have loved the highest.  
It surely was my profit had I known;  
It would have been my pleasure had I seen.  
We needs must love the highest when we see it.

### WOMAN'S SOCIETY OF CHRISTIAN SERVICE

Bishop Oxnam, Members of the Peninsula Annual Conference, and friends:

I am pleased to submit the following report:

The women of Methodism have a distinct mission in relation to the needs of the world, and to the program of The Methodist Church. This mission has been executed most effectively thru the Woman's Societies of Christian Service and Wesleyan Service Guilds throughout our four districts, whose efforts the Peninsula Conference Woman's Society directs as provided in 1256 Art. 2 of the Discipline, which reads as follows:

"The purpose of the Conference Society shall be to plan and direct the work of the Society within the Conference in accordance with the constitution and by-laws of the Woman's Division."

This we have tried to do, using as our inspiration the Quadrennial Theme—"The Spirit of Christ—For All of Life," and as our guide the seven goals which accompanied the CALL to every member of every Woman's Society of Christian Service and Wesleyan Service Guild.

#### 1. Commitment

The development of the spiritual life of our members is always a center of attention. In addition to the Week of Prayer and Self Denial held in the Fall each year, and the World Day of Prayer held the first Friday in Lent,

168 women sought personally to obtain the spirit of Christ thru attendance at a Retreat, held at Camp Pecometh in September, 1958 while hundreds of others attended Days Apart sponsored during the Lenten Season by the Districts. Practicing the principles of Christ in everyday living, thru the Fellowship of Intercession and Prayer Groups, has been an important factor in enabling our women to communicate to others the joy of discovering Christ.

#### 2. Responsibility

Numbers do not tell a complete story, but they are significant. Our total number of adult members as of February 6, 1959 was 23,035. This figure is subject to correction, however, since accurate figures for the year will not be available until June 1, 1959. It is a deplorable fact that all Methodist Women are not members of the Woman's Society of Christian Service, nor is our Conference Society 100% organized, there still being 14 unorganized churches. It is heartening, however, to observe that the majority of our members do accept responsibility in the total program of the local church, by giving of their time, and talent, sharing in church and community programs, helping train youth and students for Christian responsibility and thru financial gifts to the local church, which amounts to more than four times the amount of our missionary giving which goes to the Woman's Division. The Conference missionary pledge for the past year was \$50,000.00, while the actual amount paid on pledge was \$54,034.55, and the grand total of all funds sent in, for all purposes amounted to \$63,792.48. On the basis of pledges received from local societies for the coming year, an increase of \$1,000.00 has been set as the goal for 1959-1960. It seems timely to suggest that "support" to the total program of the local church, which includes support of the work of the Woman's Society, needs thoughtful consideration. The division of funds for "self" and "others" is all out of proportion.

#### 3. Interpretation

Making known the objectives of our educational institutions and their relationship to the world mission of the church, is effected through the courses of study offered at the Jurisdiction and Conference Summer Schools, as well as the speakers who come to our conference. Mrs. Carl B. Searing, Vice-President of the Northeastern Jurisdiction, spoke at the Fall District Meetings, and Miss Rosalie Jenkins, our Peninsula Conference Missionary on furlough from Brazil, addressed the District Annual Meetings in March. At the Annual Meeting of the Conference Society, held May 7 in McCabe Memorial Methodist Church, Wilmington, approximately 400 women were privileged to hear Miss E. Gwendoline Narbeth bring "Tidings from Africa," while Miss Lillian A. Johnson, Secretary of the Wesleyan Service Guild, spoke on the afternoon theme "Here Am I! Send Me." It was with regret that we learned on the morning of our meeting that the Division President, Mrs. J. Fount Tillman, who was to have been with us, was unable to be present because of illness.

The work of our organization was also presented by one-minute reports supplemented by visual aids, all conference officers, secretaries, and chairmen of committees, participating. Officers were elected for the ensuing biennium.



Other means of promotion employed is thru the many meetings, officers training days and seminars, held on the district level, all of which are designed to interpret and clarify those phases of our work not completely understood by the local woman.

#### 4. Recruitment

With the great need for deaconesses, missionaries and other christian workers, this particular phase of our program needs strengthening. One means of alerting our young people to the needs of the world, and creating an awareness of the diversity of opportunities in missionary service is through our Girl's School of Missions, which was held last Summer at Camp Pecometh, from June 22-27, with 110 girls in attendance. As usual limited facilities prevented the attendance of all who applied. 19 girls received recognition for having attended the School for three years. 14 girls indicated interest in full time christian service. It is at this point that the local church needs to be emphatically confronted with the challenge of recruitment. During the past four years 56 girls have indicated interest in full time christian service; our Secretary of Missionary Personnel has sent this information to the local church and local society, yet, to my knowledge, none have begun preparation. If our girls are to dedicate themselves to full time christian service, they need the encouragement of the folks at home. Perhaps financial assistance should be offered. Thru our Conference Scholarship Fund, which is administered by the Woman's Division, one girl from Peninsula Conference, having met the requirements of the Woman's Division, has received assistance in her preparation for christian service during the past two years. In addition, \$100. is contributed each year, at the close of our Summer School, to Wesley College, which I understand is placed in the Scholarship Fund of that College.

#### 5. Fellowship

Basically, practicing the principles of the Charter of Racial Policies of the Woman's Division—welcoming into worship and service all who seek to follow Christ, and urging persons of all cultures and races into the fellowship and activities of the church, is the goal of the Department of Christian Social Relations. To me, the highlight of my entire four years of service has been the ratification of the Charter of Racial Policies in Peninsula Conference, and the completion of our goal for one Intercultural and Interracial Workshop on World Understanding in each District as well as one on the Conference level. Other activities of this department have included continued interest in the negation of such legislative measures as the bingo bill, use of alcoholic beverages on air-liners, citizenship brunches prior to elections, the sponsorship of UNICEF observances and organizing trips to the United Nations.

Also included here should be the program of service rendered by our Board of Conference Projects, for certainly it strives through its work at the Riddle Memorial Deaconess Home and the Mary Todd Gambrill Neighborhood House, to create a fellowship without barriers. This urban work which is supported by the women of Peninsula Conference, has been supervised by our Deaconess Director, Miss Genevieve Poppe, who this year is

observing ten years of service in this field of endeavor. Miss Poppe with her staff of two full time, and one part time worker does a tremendous job. Several classes have increased to the point where it has been necessary to enlist volunteer help. In fact, the Neighborhood House in south Wilmington is much too small to accommodate the size of groups seeking admission, and our Board, of which Mrs. William R. Davis, is the Chairman, is already thinking in terms of a building project. In connection with this particular work, on May 20, 1958, the Board of Trustees of the Riddle Memorial Deaconess Home, deeded to the Peninsula Conference Woman's Society of Christian Service, Incorporated, the property located at 307 West Street, which had been used many years rent free. On October 15 of last year, the usual Open House and Donation Day was held at the Deaconess Home, at which time the 30th anniversary of our Neighborhood House was celebrated.

#### 6. Identification

One of our three emphases is Missionary Education, and it is thru our Summer School of Missions and Christian Service, that our women are afforded the opportunity to become acquainted with the missionary program, cultivating opportunities to learn of other people of all races and cultures, and studying to know the spirit and principles of Christ. Here she may evaluate her own personal relationship with others, as she learns of their joys and sorrows, needs and achievements. Our School, held at Wesley College last July 13-18, was attended by 67 full time and 198 part time students, making a total of 265 women. 126 study classes using the approved text books have met the high requirements necessary to receive special Jurisdiction Recognition. The number attending educational seminars in the Fall was 837, an increase over the previous year. At our Summer School, the women may also attend workshops and clinics, set up to further knowledge of the missionary program, and the over-all program of the work of the Woman's Society of Christian Service, to the end that she may better identify herself with the peoples of the world.

#### 7. Action

To me, our seventh goal indicates action. "To Speak and Act boldly in Christ's name, for Justice and Peace for all people" requires courage and strength. It requires studying to understand the meaning of justice and peace for all, and the practice of these principles in our daily attitudes.

One year remains in the Fifth Quadrennium. Looking backward, it would seem that our achievements have been few this past year, but the knowledge that the women in the local societies have been tireless in their devotion; that the consecration and team work of the conference and district officers has been demonstrated time and time again—more than compensates.

To the District Superintendents and the Pastors, I would express my appreciation. They have always graciously assisted whenever called upon.

With these remarks I conclude this, my final report to the Peninsula Annual Conference. The past four years have been a wonderful experience. I have performed the duties of my office to the very best of my ability, always with the desire to reflect credit on Peninsula Conference, and honor and glory to Him in whose name I have labored. At times it has been extremely



difficult, but the great joy and satisfaction to be derived from service for such a great cause, more than balances any distress I may have known. With fear and trembling I accepted the office—with a deep sense of humility, I shall turn over to my successor, Mrs. Walter B. Palmer, Jr. of Denton, Maryland, the authority which was vested in me on June 1, 1955. It is my sincere wish that she may receive the same cooperation and loyalty which have characterized my four years of service. Having worked so closely with such a fine group of women, for so great a number of years, it is my earnest conviction that though we may have slowed down a bit during 1958-59, it was only to catch our breath, so that we might go on to a brighter and more glorious future in Peninsula Conference.

There will be no change in the Budget this year. Any additional amounts or new items will be paid from the Contingent Fund. Therefore, the apportionments for General and Conference Administration and World Service and Conference Benevolences and Askings will be the same as last year.

The following items are based on the Pastor's current cash salary and must be adjusted any time there is a change in salary:

- Ep. Fund, 2% of Pastor's current cash salary
- D. S. Fund, 6% of Pastor's current cash salary
- Board of Pensions, Percentage of the Pastor's current cash salary as shown at the end of our report on page 661 in the 1958 Journal.
- Minimum Salary, ½ % current cash salary

## MEMOIRS

## JOHN L. SPARKLIN

The Reverend John L. Sparklin was born October 27, 1870 near Preston, Maryland. He was educated in the Public Schools of Caroline County, Maryland, the Wilmington Conference Academy, Dover, Delaware and at Wesleyan University, Middletown, Connecticut, graduating with the Bachelor of Arts degree.

Following his graduation he served as principal of the schools at Bantom and Roxbury, Connecticut and Federalsburg, Md. During this period he served as a pulpit supply in several churches.

In 1906 he joined the Wilmington Methodist Conference which is now the Peninsula Conference. His several appointments until retirement in 1942 were as follows: Farmington, Del. 1906-07, Cordova, Md. 1908-11, Sudlersville, Md. 1911-12, Odessa, Del. 1912-14, Church Hill, Md. 1914-17, Millsboro, Del. 1917-19, Wyoming, Del. 1919-21, Georgetown, Del. 1921-23, Newport, Del. 1923-30, Madley Church, Wilmington 1930-31, Hurlock, Md. 1931-33, St. Georges, Del. 1933-42.

Brother Sparklin was married in 1898 to Miss Anna Rodriguez of New York City. Mrs. Sparklin died in 1937. After his retirement he and his daughter, Virginia Sparklin, made their home at 622 Geddes Street, Wilmington, Delaware.

He was a member of Union Lodge A. F. and A. M. No. 5 in Middletown, Delaware. His church membership after retirement was at Grace Methodist Church, Wilmington, Delaware.

Surviving him are four children: Mrs. Dorothy Holloway, Selbyville, Delaware, Mrs. Edith McLain, Detroit, Michigan, James D. Sparklin, Rochester, New York and Miss Virginia Sparklin, Wilmington, Delaware.

During his last illness his family surrounded him with loving care until his death in the Delaware Hospital on August 22, 1958. His funeral services were conducted by his minister, the Reverend W. F. Dunkle of Grace Methodist Church, Wilmington, Delaware. Interment was in Hillcrest Cemetery, Federalsburg, Maryland. Reverend Ralph Jones, retired, conducted the service at the cemetery. Many ministers and a host of friends were present at his funeral out of deep respect for a brother minister and friend who had graced the world by his character and work in the church he loved.

## JOHNSON HARRY WRIGHT

The Reverend Johnson Harry Wright exemplified the best attributes of Christian gentility. He was a clergyman of culture, a gentleman of refinement, and a churchman of devotion. Born in Wilmington, Delaware, on May 23, 1891, the son of Alonza and Ann Wright, he died in his native city on May 30, 1958, survived by his widow, Ethel Calvert Wright. Few Wilmingtonians have been more widely or better known in all circles of the community's life.

After business training at Beacom College, Mr. Wright completed the Bachelor of Religious Education, Bachelor of Sacred Theology, and Master of Sacred Theology degrees at Boston University. He joined the Wilmington Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church in 1922 and subsequently served as pastor of Cookman Church in Wilmington, First Church in Chestertown, Ebenezer Church in Easton, Silverbrook Church in Wilmington, and Asbury Church in Harrington. He retired in 1951 to return to Wilmington.

Genial in manner, Harry Wright had the gift of friendliness to a marked degree, and especially attracted the comradeship of men. He was recognized by various honors in ecclesiastical, fraternal, and civic organizations because his fellows trusted him, liked him, appreciated his abilities. He could win the affection of the wealthy and the poor, the distinguished and the disinherited, and move with simple dignity in all levels of the life about him.

To the end, though not in good health, Harry Wright maintained an alert, inquiring mind. To his Christian faith he added a high order of intelligence and was never narrow in his outlook. He kept abreast of the better books as they appeared and knew the trends of contemporary Christian thought.

Few of our clergy have kept a better balance between the liturgical and the evangelical. His zeal was warm and concerned, but he appreciated order and seemliness. His ministry reflected Methodism and the Wesleyan traditions at their best.

Johnson Harry Wright is transferred to the Church Triumphant, and his brethren who remain in the Church Militant offer this certificate of transfer in all fraternity and with abiding love. He was among the best among us.

## DAVID J. MOORE

In the year of 1880 came into the home of Philip Henry and Mary Foreman Moore of Worton, Maryland, a son. He was given the name of David J. Moore.

He received his early education in this area and later attended the Wilmington Conference Academy, now Wesley College in Dover.

On April 29, 1908 he was united in Holy Matrimony to Nellie Frances Casey of Rock Hall, Maryland. At the time of this marriage David was engaged in the mercantile business in Chestertown, Maryland. During the early part of this union David felt the urge and answered the call to the



Christian Ministry. In 1910 he applied for work as a supply pastor and was assigned to Elk Neck Charge in Cecil County, Maryland. In 1911 he joined the then Wilmington Conference.

During the 37 years of his ministry in this area, he served at Christiana, Queenstown, Trappe (twice), Parsonsburg, Millington, Mt. Vernon, Felton, Ridgely, Millsboro, Ocean View, Chester-Bethel and Red Lion. Following his retirement in 1948 he spent a year supplying the Englewood Methodist Church in the Florida Conference.

In 1950 Mr. Moore and his wife moved into their home in Richardson Park and united in Christian fellowship with the members of the Methodist Church. On Sunday evening, September 9, 1951, outside the church, Mrs. Moore was suddenly stricken with a fatal illness. This marriage gave to the churches assigned to their spiritual care a dedicated ministry. They both lived in intimate relationship with their Heavenly Father.

On October 5, 1952, Mr. Moore married a widow, Mrs. Beulah Willey, a resident of Richardson Park. They both gave to each other a faithful devotion and service in periods of serious illness. During the declining years of David's life she was a companion that gave far beyond that which was expected of her. The last few years found his interest in the Church and the Kingdom increasing while his activities were curtailed because of his physical condition.

On November 13, 1958, David J. Moore, after bearing the image of the earthly for 78 years, entered into the Church Triumphant with the image of the heavenly. Services were held on Saturday, November 15th, in the Gebhart Funeral Home, New Castle, with the writer as his pastor, conducting the service with Dr. John N. Link, District Superintendent of the Wilmington District, assisting. Interment was made at Wesley Chapel, near Rock Hall. He is survived by his wife, Mrs. Beulah W. Moore, a brother, John Moore of Fairlie, Maryland, and a sister, Mrs. Mary Berger of Rock Hall, Maryland.

#### CHARLES WHITTINGTON SPRY

Charles Whittington Spry, son of Jonathan C. and Temperance Whittington Spry, was born at Church Hill, Maryland on March 14, 1881. When he was only two years old his mother died, and his Aunt, Mrs. Hannah Peacock, took him and reared him on her farm in Kent County, Maryland between Golts and Massey. After he was grown he assumed charge of her farm.

The writer first met him while serving an emergency pastorate at Golts in 1905. A little later Charles confided to him that he felt he was called to be a minister. He soon closed out his farm business and became a student at the Wilmington Conference Academy, graduating there in 1909.

He then began his ministry, and in 1911 united with the Wilmington Conference and served actively in it and its successor, the Peninsula Conference, until his retirement in 1949. In 1912, Dr. Clarence T. Craig, then pastor of Grace Church in Wilmington, was elected President of Morningside College in Iowa. He induced Charles to go with him as a student. Two years later, when his father was severely ill, Charles returned east and remained here.

On June 30, 1915 he was married to Miss Nellie Majors, who lived near Salisbury, Maryland. Dr. T. E. Martindale, pastor of Asbury Church, Salisbury, performed the ceremony. The Lord entrusted them with five children: Jay F. Spry, who lives at Hastings on the Hudson, N. Y., Mrs. Margaret Spry Cadell, Catonsville, Maryland, Mrs. Charlotte Spry Larimore, Seaford, Delaware, Mrs. Genevieve Spry McGee, Laurel, Delaware and Miss Ruth Anita Spry, Baltimore, Maryland.

The support the family received was very meagre indeed, and the problem of providing an adequate education beyond high school for all five of the children would have been solved with just four words "It can't be done" by many parents, but not by these. Their accomplishments seemed to many of us a miracle—yea five miracles. After years of ingenuity, hard work, and much sacrifice it was done, well done.

He was repeatedly chosen Chaplain of Legislatures, having served full terms in the Delaware House of Representatives and the Senate, and also for briefer periods in the House of Delegates and in the Senate of Maryland.

In 1949, due to waning strength he took the retired relation. It was not until 1954 that a cherished dream was realized. It was then that he and Mrs. Spry moved into their own home in Dover which they had had built. Here God permitted him to spend nearly five pleasant years, relieved of the responsibilities of a pastorate which had become too arduous for him. Yet he engaged in many activities in his home, church and community, to which participation he had eagerly looked forward. Here it was that on September 28, 1958, "He was not for God took him." Funeral services were conducted by his pastor, Dr. John A. Trader, at Wesley Church, Dover, assisted by Reverends E. R. Wilkins, Melvin E. Wheatley, L. E. Windsor and Tilghman Smith. Interment was at Lakeside Cemetery, Dover.

He was intensely loyal to his friends. He was optimistic, courageous and outspoken. He did not recognize defeat nor retreat. A happy warrior was he.

## REVEREND LEONARD WHITE

Leonard White was born in the city of Wilmington on August 13, 1880, son of the Reverend John White, local preacher of the Methodist Episcopal Church, and Louisa White. He was educated in the Wilmington Public Schools, which he attended for only eight years. On June 12, 1901 he was married to Anna Springer Cole of Wilmington, who died in 1936. Into their home came five children, John Harvey, William Herbert, Ruth Edna, Mildred Hope, and Anne Elizabeth, all of whom survive except Ruth, who died in 1957.

It was after he had been married for five years, had settled in industry and to a normal life as a consecrated Christian Layman, that he was uniquely and positively called to the Christian Ministry. He had already received his Local Preacher's License in the Epworth Methodist Episcopal Church of Wilmington. In 1906 he accepted the appointment as Supply Pastor at Bayside, and 1907 to Wye Mills. By now his course was settled and in 1908 he was received into the Wilmington Annual Conference on trial and appointed to Fairlee. He was, in 1910, ordained a Deacon and received into full membership of the Wilmington Annual Conference and, in 1912, was ordained Elder, serving the following appointments until he retired in 1943: Fairlee, 1908-09; Assistant Superintendent, Peninsula Anti-Saloon League, 1910; Cordova, 1911-13; St. Michaels, 1914-16; Centerville, 1917-18; Mt. Salem, 1919-22; Dover, 1923-25; Delmar, 1926-28; Superintendent, Salisbury District, 1929-34; Newark, 1935-38; and Deals Island, 1939-42.

The writer of this memoir first came to know Leonard White when he became the pastor of Mt. Salem Church, in which I was then a lad of fifteen years. I do not claim to have known him better than a number of other persons but I am sure I knew him intimately, and am deeply indebted to him for guidance and encouragement in my youth. As I remember him, of his many fine characteristics two take precedence. He was a man of deep and profound conviction and he possessed unlimited courage.

His conviction was basic to his ministry and life. This was, perhaps, most forcibly expressed in his dealing with the liquor problem. It was no accident that, in 1910, he was sought after by the Anti-Saloon League, for he had rich talent which made him a desirable and forceful speaker at any public meeting. He had seen, first hand in his work at the rolling mill, the effects of alcohol on men. He was its foe as long as he had breath. However, this conviction went far beyond the areas of social concern. He knew his Lord. He knew Him first-hand. His mind, though denied what would be considered adequate formal training, was ever alert. He read the best books and soon became known as a preacher of rare insight and profound understanding of the rich truths of the gospel. Whenever and wherever he preached these great but simple truths, all who heard knew that he believed them with all his body and soul, and were stronger Christians since he had shared with them, his convictions.

His courage was indissolubly linked with this conviction. His courage was what it was, of course, because of his faith. This faith-sustained courage supported him all along his pathway of life. When he gave up his secular work to accept a supply pastorate, he gave expression to this courage.

Across his ministerial pathway his courage marked his decisions, for he sought not to be with the crowd, but where he believed to be the right. This courage sustained him on those occasions when the currents of life ran swift against him. So it was in December 1943, just after he had married in October of 1943, Mrs. Minnette Richardson of Ocean Grove, that he was discovered to have cancer. All around him despaired, but he did not lose courage. Three major operations followed in what seemed to us rapid succession. He directed the Doctors and Surgeons to go deep and get it all. This they succeeded in doing, and he rejoiced that he had been cured. However, part of his left jaw bone and jugular vein were removed and he, who had spoken so fluently, lived the balance of his days with a partially locked jaw.

Then in 1949, after two years of lingering illness, his second wife died. Through these years when she was in a nursing home, he had been living and continued to live with his unmarried daughter, Ruth. Her devotion to him, while she carried her responsibilities as a nurse in the University of Delaware infirmary, will never be forgotten. In 1952, following a period of three years during which he suffered constant lessening of eyesight, he became blind. During this period, Miss Rachel Mitchell had come into the home of the Whites to act as housekeeper and nurse. Her genuine Christian character made her infinitely more than an employee, but in truth, a friend of the family. So she acted, receiving the appreciation of both family and friends. In 1957, after a relatively brief illness, Ruth succumbed to cancer.

A few weeks before his death, I was in his home and expressed to him how much his life had meant to me, particularly the manner in which he conducted himself in the hard tests of life. With a smile, he lifted his face and while apologizing for relying on a thing secular, he stated that his philosophy, he supposed, was expressed in the following lines, which he recited in that rich musical voice which so often had thrilled his congregation.

When you walk through a storm, keep your chin up high,  
And don't be afraid of the dark,  
At the end of the storm is a golden sky  
And the sweet silver song of a lark.  
Walk on through the wind, walk on through the rain,  
Though your dreams be tossed and blown,  
Walk on, walk on, with hope in your heart—  
And you'll never walk alone!

A few weeks later, on June 13, 1958, just one year to the day from the death of Ruth, the earthly career of Leonard White came to its end, quietly and peacefully as he sat in his favorite chair, undoubtedly thinking of her, who had been so kind to him. On June 16th, following appropriate services conducted by the writer, assisted by Reverend George H. Moore, pastor of the Mt. Salem Church, and Reverend W. H. Briggs, a long time honored friend, we took his body and placed it by the side of daughter, Ruth and his wife, Anne, in peaceful Mt. Salem Cemetery, near the Church and parsonage home in which he had served and lived.

Nellie Rosetta Hanson, daughter of Henry Harry and Mary Elizabeth Hanson, was born March 4, 1877, at New Castle, Delaware. She was a loyal Christian from early youth when she united with the Church.

She was married on November 15, 1899, in Old Asbury Church, Wilmington, to Robert Gambrill Conner, a young business man of Wilmington. In 1930 Brother Conner felt a call to the ministry and was accepted as a Supply Pastor by the Conference. Mrs. Conner readily joined him in his decision and consecrated her time and talents to the fulltime work of her Lord.

They served successively: Ellendale, Marydel and Kenton-Hartly charges. An invitation then came to them to become pastor of his home church, Madeley, Wilmington, where they labored for ten years. This good wife rendered valuable service as pianist, singer and teacher in every charge. In the parish visitation she displayed a warm heart that enabled her to enter with sympathy into any home where there was sorrow, death or other distress and give competent counsel, thus bringing a ray of the heavenly sunlight of her own soul to others.

Loss of eyesight forced her to give up much of her former activity, but her home was always open, and she was ready to hear the call of need and bring relief. The day following their golden wedding anniversary she fell and broke a hip, from which time she was confined to her bed. After Brother Conner's retirement they moved into their own home on New Castle Avenue. Brother Conner was in failing health and was soon confined to his bed also. A daughter, Miss Ruth, who was a missionary teacher in Brazil under the Woman's Division of Christian Service, resigned her position and came home to care for her parents. She was ably assisted by a sister and other members of the family.

Five children were born into this lovely Christian home, all of whom survive. They are: Robert Henry of St. Petersburg, Fla., Rev. Harry Hanson, Minister of Calvary Church, Wilmington, John Leroy of Seaford, Del., Mrs. Helen Conner Abbott, wife of the minister of Madeley Church, Wilmington, and Miss Ruth P. Conner, of Wilmington. There are also six grand-children, two of whom reside in this city: Miss Roberta E. Conner and Harry Faulkner Conner.

Deprived of eyesight for fifteen years and confined to her bed for more than ten years, she was a patient sufferer. No word of complaint fell from her lips. She rejoiced always in the mercies of her Saviour and bore testimony to her faith in His Divine Will.

This consecrated servant of her Lord entered the life immortal on February 27, 1959. Funeral services were conducted at the McCreery Funeral Parlors on March 3, with the Reverend John Edward Jones and the writer participating. An important cabinet session kept the District Superintendent from attending. Her mortal remains were placed beside her late husband in the beautiful Riverview Cemetery.

She had been in failing health for a year, and death came at the Peninsula General Hospital, where she was a patient for only one day.

She was the widow of the late Rev. Samuel J. Smith, who served several churches in the Maryland Annual Conference, including Bethesda Church here, where she was a member for the past 21 years.

She was a daughter of the late Elisha R. and Amanda Riggins Shockley, of Whiton, Md. Her marriage, which took place on August 5, 1908, was terminated with the death of her minister-husband in 1913 (March 26).

### MARY ELIZABETH VANDYKE WOODFORD

The history of most ministers' wives is so completely interwoven with that of their husbands one has the feeling it is not necessary to write additional word. The one obituary covers both husband and wife. This is certainly true in our present record. That she outlived her husband and continued her activities for ten years is only a supplement to that united life and work.

Both Dr. Woodford and his wife were born and reared in Queen Anne's County, Maryland; he in Centreville and she on a near by farm. Their love began there, though their marriage was delayed for ten years; after he had completed his education for the ministry. In the meanwhile she and her sister had moved to Baltimore and developed an extensive business of their own.

The story since then is a part of Dr. Woodford's obituary published in the 1946 Peninsula Conference journal. It was a complete blend of service; a record of sterling and dedicated achievement. As in everyone's life, there are usually one or two outstanding periods or events. With the Woodfords it was the founding of a Book Concern in connection with the Board of Publication of the Methodist Protestant Church, he the Agent, which developed into what is now one of the branches of the Board of Publication of the Methodist Church. He remained in this capacity for eight years. In the meanwhile the Woodfords founded the Wilton Heights Church, Baltimore, and much of this enterprise became Mrs. Woodford's responsibility and care.

Yearning again for the pastorate Dr. Woodford resigned from the Directory and after a short pastorate accepted the superintendency of the Pine Ridge school in the mountains of Kentucky, remaining here for seventeen years in conspicuously beautiful and sacrificial service. Because of failing health, he with heart trouble, she with serious eye trouble, it became necessary to retire from the burdensome field. Once again in the pastorate and then retirement to live in Orlando, Florida.

It was while they were in Kentucky I visited the School, which led to this transcript from Tom's obituary: "One day on a visit out there I was talking with Mrs. Woodford about the limitations under which they labored, the sacrifices involved, and asked her if at times she might not yearn for the comforts and life of the back home country. No, she replied. It really doesn't matter. Anywhere Tom and I can work for the Master is all right; I am well satisfied where we are. But those of us who knew their background; their lovely homes, how they had grown up, their fine parentage, what they had been accustomed to, could well appreciate what the difference in material and physical things must mean, but as usual with such people they had meat to eat the world knew nothing about." Bess had abandoned all the lovely things which once she had known in her commitment to the people with whom she had to live; if by any means . . .

After Dr. Woodford's decease Bess continued her residence in Florida and serving in Goss Memorial Church. In her youth she had been interested in elocution and dramatics. Now in retirement she wrote a number of sketches and plays depicting her mountain people, and in their production impersonating each character of the play. Then with eyesight nearly gone she became a member of the Asbury Home at Gaithersburg, Md., Oct. 19, 1953, remaining there until her death, Nov. 9, 1958.

I asked Dr. Wilson, superintendent of the Home for a word:

"Mrs. Woodford was an unusual woman; always bright and cheerful in spite of her handicap. Before she became ill she participated in the activities of the Home, even memorizing and reciting selections at our Home entertainments. In all the time she was with us I never heard her make a single complaint. She was a real asset to the Home and we miss her."

## REGULATIONS OF THE BOARD OF MINISTERIAL TRAINING AND QUALIFICATIONS

For Receiving Local Preacher's License, Annual Conference Membership and Ministerial Orders in the Peninsula Conference.

1. It is the policy of the Board of Ministerial Training and Qualifications to follow the disciplinary requirements. Therefore this Board:

- a. Requires that all necessary documents be presented to the Board before it officially will interview applicants for recommendation for Admission on Trial. The Board will, however, always be available for guidance.
- b. Refuses to recommend any candidate who has not fulfilled all disciplinary requirements according to the rules of the Board.
- c. Will oppose the election of such candidates.

2. Summarized Procedures required by the Methodist Discipline, 1956; and the Board of Ministerial Training and Qualifications of The Peninsula Conference.

a. Procedures For Obtaining A Local Preacher's License:

- 1) Paragraph 305 of the Methodist Discipline says: "No member is authorized to preach without a license."
- 2) Since the Peninsula Annual Conference holds District Conferences, a person desiring a Local Preacher's License must take the following steps: (Paragraph 306, 1, The Methodist Discipline 1956)
  - a. Secure the recommendation of the Quarterly Conference of the church of which he is a member.
  - b. Apply to the district superintendent in writing.
  - c. Appear before, and secure the written approval of, The District Committee on Ministerial Qualifications.
  - d. Pass satisfactory written examinations in the studies prescribed for candidates for License to Preach.
  - e. Be examined on the subjects of Doctrine and Discipline.
  - f. Agree to abstain from the use of tobacco and other indulgences which may injure his influence.

b. Procedures For Retaining a Local Preacher's License:

- 1) Make a report by October 1 to the District Committee on Ministerial Qualifications concerning activities during the past year and desire for renewal of Local Preacher's License.
- 2) A local preacher who is enrolled as a pretheological or theological student in a school, college, university, or school of theology accredited or approved by the University Senate, preparing for the traveling ministry shall present annually to the District Committee on Ministerial Qualifications a statement of his academic progress from the school he is attending.

- 3) A local preacher who is not a student as defined in 1) above shall pursue the four-year ministerial course of study under the Department of Ministerial Education. The course must be completed within eight years after the date of issue of the first license to preach; provided, however, that this shall not apply to those licensed before May 1, 1956.

c. Procedures For Receiving Annual Conference Membership:

1) On Trial

a) Present a recommendation duly signed by:

- (1) The President and secretary of The District Conference.
- (2) Or by the chairman and secretary of The District Committee on Ministerial Qualifications.

b) Must be a graduate of an approved Liberal Arts College.

c) Must have completed at least one fourth of the work required for a bachelor of divinity or equivalent degree in a school of theology accredited or approved by the University Senate. The Board of Ministerial Training and Qualifications shall require a transcript of credits from each applicant before recognizing any of his educational claims.

d) Deposit with the registrar of The Conference Board of Ministerial Training and Qualifications:

- (1) The prescribed form containing satisfactory written answers to questions as to age, religious and church experience, call to the ministry, educational record, and plans for service in the church.
- (2) A satisfactory certificate of good health. This physical examination is to be made by a physician chosen by the candidate. (See 3 c below.)

e) Be approved on the basis of a psychological test and interview administered at the University of Delaware in Newark, Delaware. ((See 3 d below.)

f) Under special conditions the Annual Conference, by a three-fourths vote, may admit a candidate in accordance with the provisions of The Discipline.

2) Full Membership

- a) Must be a graduate of a Theological Seminary accredited by the University Senate. At least one year of Seminary work should be done in a Methodist Seminary. Where it has not been, then special work shall be required to secure adequate instruction in Methodist History, Doctrine and Policy.
- b) Must have served under regular appointment under the supervision of a district superintendent in one of the positions specified in Paragraph 432, Section 1-6 of the Discipline, for at least two years since being admitted on trial.

- c) Must have been elected to Deacon's Orders.
- d) Must answer before the Conference the questions in Paragraph 345 of the Discipline.
- e) Must present a recently issued Certificate of good physical health. (See 1 d 2) above).
- f) Any candidate for admission into full connection on the basis of a bachelor of divinity or equivalent degree whose transcript does not show the equivalent of two semester hours of credit in Methodist history, polity, and doctrine shall be required to pass examinations in these subjects administered by the Board of Ministerial Training and Qualifications in accordance with the standards established by the Department of Ministerial Education.

#### d. Procedures For Receiving Ministerial Orders:

##### 1) Deacons:

###### a) Have authority to:

- (1) Preach
- (2) Conduct Divine Worship
- (3) Perform the Marriage Ceremony
- (4) Administer Baptism
- (5) Assist an Elder in Administering The Lord's Supper

###### b) Eligibility:

###### (1) Seminary Students:

- (a) Must have been Local Preachers two full years.
- (b) Must have been admitted on trial.

###### (2) Members on Trial in the Course of Study:

- (a) Must have been on Trial in The annual Conference two years.
- (b) Must have completed satisfactorily the first two years of the Conference Course.

###### (3) Approved Supply Pastors:

- (a) Must have been approved supply pastors under appointment for two consecutive years.
- (b) Must have completed:
  - 1. The Introductory Studies for the Ministry.
  - 2. The first two years of the Conference Course of Study.

###### (4) Local Preachers:

- (a) Must have been Local Preachers for four consecutive years.
- (b) Must present to the Annual Conference a recommendation for Deacon's Orders from The District Committee on Ministerial Qualifications.
- (c) Must have completed two years of the ministerial course of study.

#### 2) Elders:

##### a) Have Authority to:

- (1) Preach
- (2) Conduct Divine Worship
- (3) Administer the Sacraments of Baptism and The Lord's Supper

##### (4) Perform the Marriage Ceremony

##### b) Eligibility:

###### (1) Seminary Students

- (a) Must have been Deacons for at least one year.
- (b) Must have been admitted into Full Connection.

###### (2) Course of study graduates

- (a) Must have been received into Full Connection in The Annual Conference
- (b) Must have been Deacons for at least two years.

###### (3) Approved Supply Pastors

- (a) Must have been under appointment for two full consecutive years as deacons and have completed the ministerial course of study under the supervision of the Board of Ministerial Training and Qualifications.

###### (4) Local Preachers

- (a) Must have been Deacons for four consecutive years.
- (b) Must present recommendation for Elder's Orders from the District Committee on Ministerial Qualifications.
- (c) Must have completed the entire ministerial course of Study.

#### e. Ministers from Other Churches:

- 1) Ministers coming from other evangelical churches, provided they present suitable testimonials of good standing through the Board of Ministerial Training and Qualifications, and give assurance of their faith, Christian experience, and other qualifications, and give evidence of their agreement with us in doctrine and discipline, and present a satisfactory certificate of good health on the prescribed form, from a physician approved by the Board of Ministerial Training and Qualifications, and meet the educational requirements, may be received into our ministry, as indicated in Paragraph 411 of the Methodist Discipline.

#### f. Other Specific Regulations

##### a) Studies:



- 1) Studies for License to Preach and The Introductory Studies for the Ministry are to be taken through the **Correspondence Office of In-Service Training, Department of Ministerial Education, Post Office Box 871, Nashville 2, Tennessee.**
  - 2) Approved Supply Pastors are reminded of the School for Approved Supplies at Wesley Theological Seminary this year from June 22 to July 17. This school, like others throughout the country, is arranged so that a Supply can complete four courses during one session, thereby securing credit for a full year's work. Scholarships are available from our Board on a pro rata basis to Approved Supplies who are high school graduates. These same courses can be taken through the Correspondence Office, but the Board strongly recommends the Approved Supply Pastors' School for a more thorough program of study and helpful contact with instructors and fellow-ministers.
  - 3) The Student's Handbook, which can be purchased at the Methodist Publishing House, 516 North Charles Street, Baltimore 3, Maryland, is to be used in connection with all courses taken through the Correspondence School. It contains questions which are to be answered on the various books.
- b) Personal Interviews:
- 1) Each candidate for Admission on Trial, and for Admission into Full Membership, must appear before the Executive Committee of the Board of Ministerial Training and Qualifications at Wesley College, Dover, Delaware, Monday, March 14, 1960 for personal interviews concerning his qualifications and fitness for the Christian Ministry. Each candidate will be contacted concerning the hour of his interview.
  - 2) Notification of intention to appear before the Board of Ministerial Training and Qualifications shall be sent to the Registrar at least ten days before this meeting.
- c) A recently issued certificate of good health shall be required of each candidate for admission on Trial, and another when he applies for Admission into Full Membership.
- 1) This certification shall be on the comprehensive form provided by The Commission on Ministerial Training, and may be secured from the Registrar.
  - 2) The cost of the physical examination is to be paid by the candidate.
- d) Psychological tests:
- 1) The date for these tests is being set for Monday, February 15, 1960 and will be administered at Newark, Delaware. Each

- candidate will be contacted concerning the hour of his tests for February 15 or, if necessary, on another date.
- 2) Interviews concerning the tests are being set for Monday, February 29, 1960, and will be arranged by appointment with each candidate for February 29, or if necessary on another date.
  - 3) The purpose of the psychological testing is to provide counsel and guidance for the candidates.
- e) Approved Supply Pastors:
- 1) Any local preacher desiring to become an approved supply pastor must have his character, fitness, training and effectiveness passed by a three-fourths majority vote of the District Committee on Ministerial Qualifications, and by the Annual Conference after an interview and recommendation by the Conference Board of Ministerial Training and Qualifications.
  - 2) Any one wishing to become an Approved Supply for the first time must apply in writing to the Board of Ministerial Training and Qualifications through its Chairman or Registrar at least ten days before the opening session of the Annual Conference in order for him to be considered for that status. Failure to do this shall prevent the applicant from being appointed to a charge at the Annual Conference, although it will not preclude the ad interim appointment of a Local Preacher to a pastoral charge between sessions of the Conference. However, when a ministerial student having an Approved or Student Supply status in another Annual Conference of the Methodist Church is appointed by our Bishop as a Student Supply Pastor of the Peninsula Annual Conference while attending an accredited college or theological seminary, his status shall be recognized by the Board of Ministerial Training and Qualifications of the Peninsula Annual Conference.
  - 3) Any person wishing to become an Approved Supply for the first time shall have administered to him a psychological test to be arranged by the Board of Ministerial Training and Qualifications. The purpose of this testing shall be to ascertain emotional stability and fitness for the ministry. If there is insufficient time for such a test to be administered before the Annual Session of the Conference, it shall be administered during the subsequent year and used as a basis for considering the continuance of the status for the next year. This regulation shall not apply to college and seminary students who are planning for Reception On Trial into the Conference, who shall have the tests administered to them as part of the regulations for Reception On Trial.
  - 4) Full time approved supply pastors other than seminary students, who are giving their full time to pastoral work under

the district superintendents are required to take the conference course of study, including The Introductory Studies for the Ministry, and to complete the entire course within eight years.

- 5) Any approved supply pastor who fails to meet these requirements shall not be appointed by a district superintendent.
- 6) A part-time approved supply pastor shall be required to complete at least two books annually in the Conference Course of Study, until the course is completed.
- 7) An unordained approved supply pastor, only while serving as a regularly appointed pastor of a charge, shall be authorized to administer the Sacraments of Baptism and the Lord's Supper and, if the laws of the state permit, to perform the marriage ceremony within the bounds of the charge to which he is assigned; provided that (a) he shall have passed the introductory studies for the ministry and (b) each succeeding year he shall be enrolled as a regular full-time student in a pre-theological or theological course in a college, university, or school of theology accredited or approved by the University Senate, or shall have passed one full year of the ministerial course of study looking to full ordination. Failure to complete one full year annually shall cause suspension of this privilege.
- 8) A part-time approved supply pastor (other than a student pastor) who completes each year two books of the conference course of study, and continues until he is graduated from the course, shall be authorized to administer the Sacrament of Baptism, and if the laws of the state permit, to perform the marriage ceremony, within the bounds of his pastoral charge.
- 9) As soon as possible after each Annual Session of the Conference, there shall be an Orientation Program for the purpose of providing information and training in the work of the local church and Conference activities for pastors appointed to charges for the first time at the Conference. This shall be considered a part of the training of Approved Supplies and Conference members who are in this category. Plans for this day's activity shall be made and executed by the Board of Ministerial Training and Qualifications.

The program for 1960 is being held on Thursday, June 11, at the Conference Camp.

## XI

### MISCELLANEOUS

#### (a) CONFERENCE RULES OF ORDER

- Rule 1. The Conference shall meet at 9.00 A. M., and adjourn at 12.30 P. M. But the Conference may, in its discretion, alter the time of meeting and adjournment.
- Rule 2. The President shall decide all questions of order, subject to an appeal to the Conference; but in case of such an appeal the question shall be taken without debate, except that the appellant may make a simple statement of the grounds of his appeal.
- Rule 3. All resolutions and motions shall be in writing, if the President, Secretary, or any two members request it.
- Rule 4. When a motion is made and seconded, or a resolution is introduced and seconded, or a report presented and read by the Secretary, or stated by the President, it shall be deemed in possession of the Conference; but any motion or resolution may be withdrawn by the mover, with the consent of the Conference, at any time before amendment or decision.
- Rule 5. The motion to Lay on the Table, or to Take from the Table, and for the Previous Question, shall be taken without debate.
- Rule 6. No new motion or resolution shall be entertained until the one under consideration has been disposed of, which may be done by adoption or rejection, unless one of the following motions shall intervene, which shall have precedence in the order in which they are placed, namely:
- (1) To fix the time to which the Conference shall adjourn.
  - (2) To Adjourn.
  - (3) To take a recess.
  - (4) To lay on the table.
  - (5) For the previous question.
  - (6) To postpone to a given time.
  - (7) To refer.
  - (8) To substitute.
  - (9) Amendment.
  - (10) To postpone indefinitely.

A motion to amend shall be in order, and a substitute for both amendments may be received, which substitute may be amended only once, and if a substitute be accepted, it shall operate as an amendment to the original proposition.

- Rule 7. When a member is about to speak in debate, or to deliver any matter to the Conference, he shall rise and respectfully address the President, but shall not proceed until recognized by him.
- Rule 8. No member shall be interrupted while speaking, except by the President to call him to order when he departs from the question, or uses personalities or disrespectful language; but any member may call the attention of the President to the subject when he deems a speaker out of order, and any member may explain when he thinks himself misrepresented.



- Rule 9.** When a member desires to a question of privilege, he shall briefly state the question; but it shall not be in order for him to proceed until the President shall have decided it a privileged question.
- Rule 10.** No person shall speak more than twice on the same question, nor more than ten minutes at one time, without leave of the Conference; nor shall any person speak more than once until every member choosing to speak shall have spoken.
- Rule 11.** When any motion or resolution shall have been acted upon by the Conference, it shall be in order for any member who voted with the prevailing side to move a reconsideration; but a motion to reconsider is a non-debatable motion and shall be decided without debate.
- Rule 12.** No member shall absent himself from the service of the Conference without leave, unless he is sick or unable to attend.
- Rule 13.** No member shall be allowed to vote on any question who is not within the bar of the Conference at the time when such question shall be put by the President, except by leave of the Conference when such member has been necessarily absent.
- Rule 14.** Every member who is within the bar at the time a question is put shall give his vote, unless the Conference, for special reasons, shall excuse him.
- Rule 15.** It shall be in order for him to move that the question be taken without further debate on any measure pending, except in cases in which character is involved, and if sustained by two-thirds, the question shall be taken.
- Rule 16.** The motion to adjourn shall be taken without debate, and shall always be in order, except, (1) when a member has the floor; (2) when a question is actually put, or a vote is being taken; (3) when the question is pending on seconding the demand for the previous question; (4) when the previous question has been called and sustained, and is still pending; and (5) when a motion to adjourn has been negatived and no business or debate has intervened.
- Rule 17.** All reports of the Boards, Commissions and Committees, shall be published and mailed to the Members of the Annual Conference ten (10) days prior to the date of meeting of the Annual Conference. Reports to be included in this mailing must be in the hands of the Secretary thirty (30) days prior to such Session.
- Rule 18.** No report shall be received or adopted by the Conference until a copy has been placed in the hands of the Secretary.
- Rule 19.** These rules shall not be suspended or amended except by a vote of two-thirds of the members present and voting.

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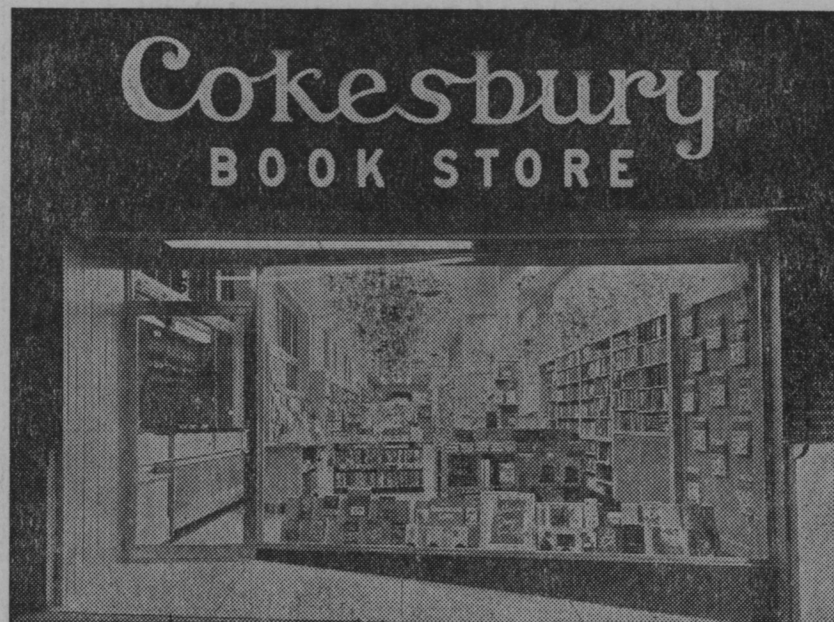
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
