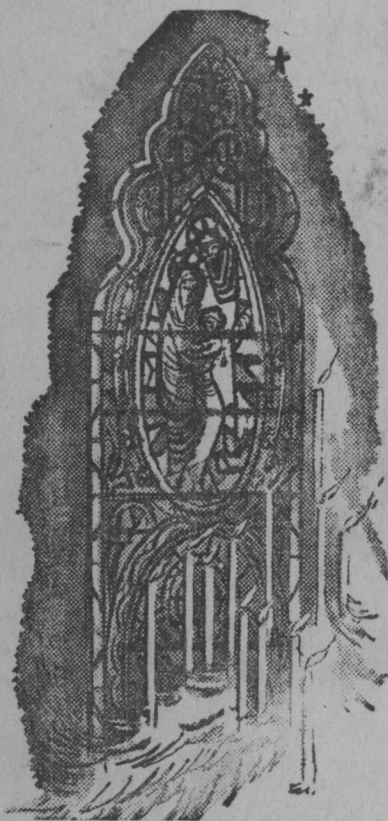

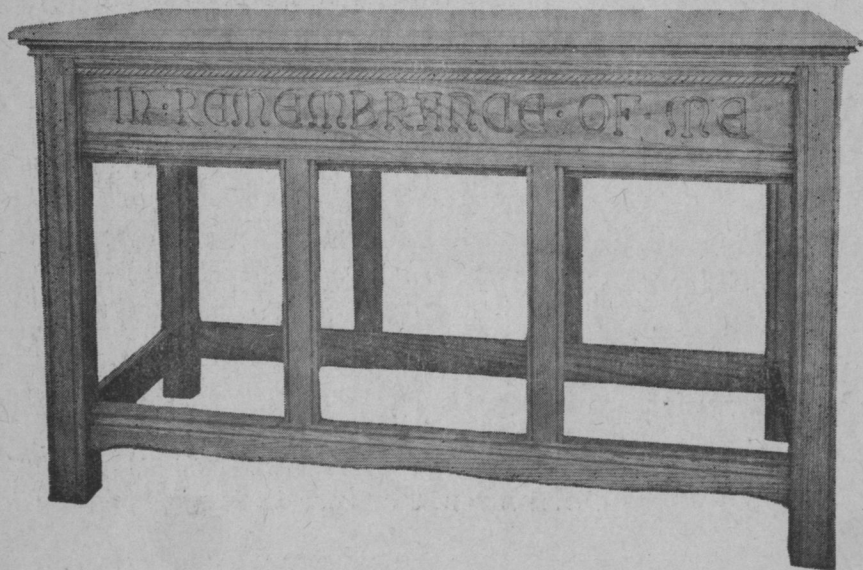

BOARD OF MINISTERIAL TRAINING AND QUALIFICATION: The following request from the Board of Ministerial Training and Qualification was presented by James R. Hughes, President and adopted by the Conference.

"The Judicial Council of the Methodist Church by two recent decisions has made it incumbent upon the Board of Ministerial Training and Qualifications to interpret literally that part of the Discipline dealing with the use of tobacco by Methodist Ministers. In view of this we hereby present the following statement to this Annual Conference.

This Board calls to your attention the fact that the Methodist discipline includes a provision that Methodist Ministers not smoke or otherwise use tobacco.

This provision applies to ministers who entered the Methodist Protestant Church, the Methodist Episcopal Church, and the Methodist Episcopal Church South, as well as those who have entered the Methodist Church since unification in 1939.

The attention of this Board has been called to the fact that some ministers of the Peninsula Conference are setting a poor example in this regard, thereby establishing a bad precedent and raising questions in the minds of young men who are candidates for ordination and conference membership.

The Board of Ministerial Training and Qualification respectfully calls to the attention of the Conference our concern in this matter and suggests

that all of those who are setting a bad example be alerted to the difficulties they are causing this Board in the execution of our responsibilities."

Furthermore, because of the minor importance and basic irrelevance of the provision in the Discipline concerning the use of tobacco, this Board strongly recommends that this provision of the Discipline be eliminated by the General Conference.

Bishop Lord and Members of the Conference:

Freeborn Garrettson, whose place is secure in Methodist history, made this last entry in his diary: "God is good to me." I have had a "merry Oldsmobile" instead of a horse; Delaware highways instead of wilderness trails; a few arguments with pastoral relations committees instead of being shot at; Kent and Sussex dinners and a district parsonage instead of a knapsack and the saddle bag for a pillow. Who am I to complain of rough going and opposition and hardship? In view of the pioneering souls who gave Methodism to this nation, I am truly sorry that I have not been better to God. It may well be that we need further identity with the Cross to make the pulpit once again a power in making history. Neither the early Methodists nor the early Christians found their faith to be a light matter of ease and comfort.

Our beloved dead this year are: W. G. Barlow who continued to preach in his eighties, and Mrs. W. G. Barlow who went home a bit earlier to prepare for her companion's coming; Mrs. Edith Budd remembered by many as Mother of the campus, and O. Lloyd Townsend out fishing and not knowing that his Lord stood on the shore to beckon him. Shirley Katherine Johnson was born October 28, 1960, the daughter of the Rev. and Mrs. Hugh Johnson. And so, life goes on in both worlds. God has a design on life, and those who are in His love and keeping will come to know the perfect pattern of His purpose.

The quadrennial emphasis of the Methodist Church is: "Jesus Christ is Lord." We do not make Him so. He is! We do not acknowledge Jesus Christ as Lord for all of life, but He is! The nine thrusts of our movement begin with Personal Witness and Evangelism. Unless we know what God has done for us we cannot tell what God can do for others. We need to be as much interested concerning the space in man as we are concerning the man in space. Life is empty for want of God. We need to put our pulpits in orbit around Jesus Christ. We need to launch our prayers as well as rockets. We need guided men as well as guided missiles. An age of astronauts and cosmonauts is dangerous as long as God is plain naught. Rehoboth has consecrated its new sanctuary. It is a beautiful testimony to God whose way is in the sea. Next Sunday ground breaking exercises will be held for the new sanctuary at Milton. A new educational unit is at Townsend, and a new parsonage at Smyrna. Smyrna also plans a new educational unit, and the remodeling of the sanctuary.

Encouraging increases are noted in General and Annual Conference Benevolences, \$120,172; Wesley College Capital Improvement Fund, \$32,301; Advance Specials, \$20,170; Mother's Day (Methodist Country House), \$5,068. Other offerings were: World Wide Communion, \$1,296; Rally Day, \$2,014; Methodist Youth Fund, \$842; Board of Child Care, \$3,944; Student Day, \$984; One Great Hour of Sharing, \$810; Race Relations, \$241. The Bishops' Appeal for Africa met with a district response of \$2,359.

The Woman's Society of Christian Service continues to go forward under the leadership of Mrs. Edgar Timmons and her competent staff. The amount raised this year was \$16,189, and the pledge was increased \$1,000 for the new year. There is a membership of 5,718. Five Lenten Breakfasts were attended by 1,135 men, and offerings amounted to \$801. John Rogers retires as the district lay leader. Our own bishop was the speaker at the annual lay banquet attended by nearly 400 men.

The Peninsula Conference is a great conference. Yet we have not realized our possible greatness as a committed people. The fire is on the altar, but we need a flame. J. Wallace Hamilton tells this story: A Russian peasant, after worshipping at his church on Sunday, carried his altar candle home with him. He used the candle to give him light for his chores, and to guide his plowing on Monday morning before the sun was up. It is imperative that we take something real from our worship out to the world around us. Our lives must shine in the darkness of our times until the daybreak. Your light. My light.

A friendly and enthusiastic welcome to Bishop and Mrs. John Wesley Lord, my joy expressed in belonging to the firm of Cooke and French and Green, my thanks too for the ministers and their wives and the laity of Dover District, an increasing appreciation for her who remains loyally at my side, and my own grand awareness that "God is good to me."

Bishop Lord, Members of the Conference, and friends, any report on the work and devotion of 17,000 people in 95 churches under the care of 40 pastors can only partially reveal the fruitage of their labor, faith and love.

The death angel again has passed by the families in our parsonages and no serious or prolonged illness has hampered the work under our care. Babies came to brighten and enrich the homes of Rev. and Mrs. Charles Barton, Jr., Rev. and Mrs. Mearl Henley, Rev. and Mrs. Donald J. Hurst, and Rev. and Mrs. Romie Payne. One pastor, The Reverend G. H. Wheatley, who has faithfully served as pastor of Greensboro for the last 12 years, is asking retirement this year.

The first of July, J. Lake Church, an approved supply, was released from the pastorate of Bayside Church, and Robert J. Knapp, a student at Wesley Theological Seminary, was appointed in his place. In February, Robert Osborne, a student pastor, was released from serving St. Thomas Charge and The Reverend Thomas J. Turkington, a retired member of this Conference, has faithfully served in his place the rest of the year. I am deeply grateful to him for the willingness with which he responded to this need and for the most effective Christian witness he has given in service and life to these worthy people.

I am indebted to so many people that it would be impossible to name them and if I tried some of the most deserving would be omitted. There are a few, however, without whom the Conference program could not have been as effectively presented. Mrs. H. F. Chandler, the President of the Woman's Society of Christian Service of the Easton District, and her staff of workers have greatly increased the effectiveness of their work at home and around the world. Only one church on the District does not now have a Woman's Society and I believe this church will organize a Woman's Society of Christian Service this year. Dr. Vincent O. Eareckson, our District Lay Leader, has given a great amount of his time to organizing Methodist Men, planning for five Communion Breakfasts, a Layman's Banquet, and sponsoring Child Care offering at Christmas, and a Mother's Day offering for The Country House. In addition he conducted a class of instruction for the Commission on Stewardship and Finance at each of five group Quarterly Conferences. At these same Quarterly Conferences, Jason Blundon led a Seminar on Christian Social Concerns, Edwin Thomas on Education, Harold Nunemaker on Missions and William Dore on Membership and Evangelism. These classes were for the members of local church commissions. They were well attended and the end results accomplished in several fields attest to the value of this instruction. Others? Yes, many, but I can only express my joy in the increasing spirit of cooperation on the part of our pastors and the members of their churches and to each one who, by Christian witness, has hastened the coming of the Kingdom of our Lord, I am grateful!

Our primary task is to make Christ Lord of all. To achieve this our people must prove their loyalty to Him and His cause. Large numbers of our people do not belong to the church, their children do not attend church schools, and so far as Christ is concerned, they are content to receive all the

benefits of our Christian culture without sensing any obligation for its preservation or enrichment.

Most of our pastors and members are zealous in seeking new converts and in making more effective our instruction in the Christian faith. The church is a redemptive fellowship, and as long as any child or adult is not a part of it our task is not done. Together we have brought 1,205 into our membership. This is good, but not good enough. It is inconceivable that a pastor or a church during twelve months could not persuade at least one child to love Christ and unite with the church. A religious census, even a school census, a search of the telephone directory, a list of gas and electric users, a review of the membership of local fire departments, farm bureaus, lodges, service groups, scouts, etc. would reveal that in the smallest and most rural of our communities there are people who could be reached if we really cared. It is not enough to hold our services, preach well, and even have office hours for counselling. The pastor and the church members must go to the homes of these people and show their interest in them and their concern for them. People respond to personal appeals, but will continue to down-grade the church and its work and in reality have nothing to do with it until they can be made to feel that they, with all their weaknesses, are wanted and needed. My Brethren of the Conference let's at least go to them in their homes, or wherever they are, and tell them that we care for them.

The list of churches and the number of accessions will be recorded in the Conference Journal and I do not single out any one for praise for in one community it is easier to have 100 accessions than to have one in another. We need to remember that each one is precious in God's sight and that we are to be judged for our stewardship, not by our successes, but by our faithfulness.

We have been concerned about our Conference and world problems and have earnestly tried to respond as a District to all the special appeals which have been made. On our askings for Administration and Benevolence we have paid \$95,392.00—Wesley College Capital Improvements \$24,486.00—Advance Specials \$4,597.00—Rally Day \$1,483.00—World-Wide Communion \$1,201.00—Hour of Sharing \$494.00—Race Relations \$185.00—Student Day \$725.00—M. Y. F. Fund \$1,104.00—The Country House \$1,707.00—and for Child Care \$4,544.00.

At home we have been concerned with providing for our educational, worship, and social needs. St. Paul's, Cambridge, has consecrated a new educational unit costing \$128,000.00, and in addition has purchased for future expansion three houses next to the church property at a cost of \$30,000.00—Zion Church, Cambridge, installed a 75-bell carillon costing \$9,000.00, a Phillips Memorial gift, and purchased a parking lot costing \$7,000.00—Christ Church, Chestertown, added two bedrooms, bath, and closets to their parsonage—First Church, Chestertown put a new ceiling on their Fellowship Hall—Church Hill built and furnished a new parsonage costing \$32,000.00—Concord repaired its parsonage—Dorchester bought a lovely new parsonage at the unusually low price of \$15,000.00—East New Market built a new parsonage and greatly enlarged their educational building at a cost of \$44,000.00—Goldsboro spent \$4,618.00 on its parsonage and furnishings for its educational unit—Greensboro consecrated a new social

hall costing \$30,500.00—Harmony opened an addition to its educational building costing \$20,000.00—Hooper's Island bought and paid for a site for an educational building—Kent Island greatly improved its parsonage—Royal Oak purchased a new organ—Hillsboro repaired its church at a cost of \$2,235.00—Ridgely brick-veneered its church and painted its parsonage at the cost of \$9,600.00—Queenstown provided room for central heat at a cost of \$3,500.00—Tilghman added an educational unit costing \$14,200.00. In addition, St. Mark's, Easton, has arranged for a mortgage of \$250,000.00 and expects to erect its sanctuary this year. Centreville has secured a mortgage of \$100,000.00 and will begin its educational unit this summer. Plans for a new church at Kent Island are progressing well and we hope to soon announce a financial campaign to secure this project.

During the year we have had increasing proof of the wisdom of Charge readjustment. The two churches at Denton have merged and all legal details have been concluded. A new church building is needed and this was agreed upon in the plan of union. Our churches are proving by gains in membership, in benevolence giving, and ministerial support that the elimination of over-lapping and competitive ministerial leadership is a wise policy. I know nothing sadder than to see two brother ministers forced to serve churches in the same small community where there is need for only one, while other growing communities are deprived of proper leadership. How can we secure men for the ministry with a world in mortal danger if we cannot at least undergird them with a united Christian witness where they are asked to serve?

The indebtedness on our churches is still large totalling \$461,350.00, and new indebtedness, due to construction now in process, will greatly increase this amount. We have paid this year on debts \$127,245.00. Charges paying \$1,000.00 or more are Zion, Cambridge, \$28,215.00—Centreville, \$.....—Chestertown, Christ \$5,200.00—Chestertown, First \$9,119.00—Church Creek \$1,250.00—Easton, St. Mark's \$19,158.00—Galena \$2,479.00—Goldsboro \$2,403.00—Greensboro \$3,000.00—Harmony \$2,763.00—Hurlock \$5,400.00—Preston \$4,286.00—Queenstown \$8,839.00—Rock Hill \$3,568.00—St. James \$6,862.00—St. Thomas \$1,032.00—Sudlersville \$2,143.00—Trappe \$2,209.00—Vienna \$6,700.00.

The problem of shortage of ministers is still with us and apparently there is no immediate solution. We need as ministers and laymen to make this need a constant subject of prayer, and as parents and Christians we need to encourage our children to give themselves to the ministry and other Christian vocations. The need is staggering and our areas of opportunity wide. We must find capable and consecrated young people and then help them to secure adequate training in preparation for these tasks. The church is able to provide the money for their Seminary years at least, and I believe that the church would if sufficiently informed. Our laymen are increasingly recognizing the need for better support of our pastors and are showing their willingness to cooperate by providing better homes and more adequate salaries each year. In thinking of pastors' salaries we must not forget that we require a college degree and a seminary degree before we admit them into our Conference. This is seven years of formal training at great cost which leaves most of our young men with a family and heavily in debt when

they are admitted. To maintain their good names, debts must be paid and to render their best service they must be free from worry over their families needs. Our people have increased the support of their pastors by \$11,320.00. Of this amount \$6,800.00 is for salary, \$600.00 travel expense and \$3,920.00 for utilities. Bishop Lord and Members of the Conference:

In one of her famous lines, Pearl Buck speaks of being "born under the shadow of a great creed." I have appropriated her phrase as providing the atmosphere for recording the birth of three new members of our parsonage families. Daniel Greely Higgins III came on May 13, 1960; Lauren Ann Stapleton on September 13, 1960; and Jon Milton Lewis Todd on March 13, 1961. They are at home with their parents at Crisfield, Pocomoke City, and Princess Anne.

On the afternoon of February 4th, The Reverend Howard L. Gordy, Jr. took Miss Beverly Etta Clow as his bride, and she returned with him to their parsonage home at Quantico where she had lived as a little girl when her father was pastor of the charge.

Last November, Brother Orlando M. Shockley of the Bishopville Charge, a local preacher for more than a quarter of a century, passed from this earthly life. And in April, Mrs. Norman Dennis, mother of The Reverend Louis R. Dennis our beloved missionary to Malaya, went from her home in Powellville to be with her Maker. "Not born for death," they have joined the ranks of those immortal souls who live again in minds made better by their presence.

Membership and Evangelism

One year ago the conference statistician reported that there were 17,594 members of The Methodist Church belonging to congregations on The Salisbury District. During the year we have added 641 new members on profession of faith; 270 by transfer and 69 from other denominations, providing a total increase of 980 members. Corresponding losses from death, transfer and all other causes reduce the net gain to 205, and places our present membership at 17,799. Two of our charges in the city of Salisbury report membership in excess of 1500 each; seven charges in the larger towns of the district have 500 or more members; but the vast majority of our work is in rural communities with churches or charges whose membership ranges all the way from 156 to 479 with an average of slightly more than 300 members. Most of the charges have participated in the total gain by receiving from one to 95 new members each, but seven charges have earned distinction by reporting net gains of more than 20 each. Ocean City has 32; Trinity, Salisbury 30; Bethesda, Salisbury 23; Pocomoke, Salem; and Pittsville, Ayres each have 22. Mt. Olive, Delmar, whose pastor, the Reverend L. Colvin Randall will retire at this session of the annual conference, has a net gain of 47 members. Fruitland, St. John's, where the Reverend Robert P. Whitlock is completing his first year in that pastorate, leads the entire district with 93 accessions, a net gain of 78 members representing approximately 20% of the congregation.

Christian Education

During the last quadrennium our churches reported having spent \$806,312.00 for building and improvements most of which has gone into construction of new church school facilities. To this amount we have added this

year, the sum of \$217,081, bringing our total expenditure over a five year period to \$1,023,393.00. Our church schools continue to grow and the quality of the work and program is steadily improved. Our support of connec-tional programs is indicated by offerings taken on Methodist Student's Day with offerings of \$715; and on Rally Day when thirty-seven charges gave \$1,576 for educational work within the conference.

Wesley College

The churches on the Salisbury District have a fine record of support for all of our educational institutions. We have met our apportionments for Wesley Theological Seminary, the Wesley College operational fund and the Wesley Foundation. In addition, we have given to the Wesley College Capital Improvement Fund, this year, the sum of \$34,884 which represents 96.7% of our conference asking, and brings our total giving for this cause over a three year period to \$97,539. Only one charge is failing to participate in this program. Thirty-seven of our forty-two charges accepted and met their askings in full. The table below will indicate the standing of each charge on the district, and will set forth the record of contributions by each charge to this fund over the entire period of three years:

As superintendent, I wish to express gratitude to Dr. Wilbur Devilbiss, President of Salisbury State Teachers College and to Dr. John Taylor Williams, President of Maryland State College, Princess Anne, for the help and cooperation they have given in assisting our ministerial students who prepare for the Christian ministry at these institutions. The excellent quality of instruction is heightened by a genuine Christian spirit manifest in all their relations to us and to our work.

World Service and Conference Benevolence

Notwithstanding the relatively large increase in the apportionment for World Service and Annual Conference Askings, we are happy to report that our district accepted and paid 99.4% of an apportionment amounting to \$110,152.00. Thirty-nine of our forty-two charges accepted and paid their apportionment in full; three accepted and paid in part, making a grand total of \$109,482.00, only \$717. short of our goal. It should be noted that only half of our congregations have reported their offerings for the Congo. I have reason to believe there will be a very substantial increase here.

Church Extension

In the area of church extension, I am happy to report that the new Asbury Church in Salisbury is now being erected on the new site on Camden Avenue Extended. More than five years of capable planning and sacrificial giving began to come to fruition when the million dollar project was begun in April.

Atlantic Church, Ocean City, will tear down its present edifice, and rebuild on the same site. Much has been accomplished during the year in the matter of constructional and financial planning and it is expected that the project will soon be underway.

On the advice of leaders from our National Board of Missions and following a survey of the territory east of the city of Salisbury, we will soon undertake the organization and building of a new church in that area. A pastor will be appointed at this session of our annual conference to serve the new church which will be erected on the Philip Morris Drive in this new and rapidly developing area. I am happy to announce that Trinity Church, Salisbury, has made an initial gift of \$25,000 toward the project; and that a small group of business men from Asbury Church, Salisbury, have made available a new and lovely home in Crestwood Manor as a residence for the pastor. Other congregations in the city have assured me of active support financially and otherwise. Our resident Bishop, John Wesley Lord was asked to name the church, and at his suggestion it will be called Christ Church.

In five years our people have raised the level of ministerial support in the district by \$53,786. They have generously provided salary increases and expense allowances where needed, and thirty-three charges have accepted all or a substantial portion of the cost of parsonage utilities. This year, our over-all increase amounts to \$9,700.

Other

Our Methodist Men, in addition to their regular work, have undertaken a wonderful project which has brought great satisfaction to all of us. They have employed a full-time Chaplain who serves the patients at our hospitals in Salisbury. The Reverend John W. Townsend has reported to me that since September he has made more than 3,400 calls and carried on a program of many other services to the sick and to the members of their families who need his help.

At the close of this year, Mrs. Milton Pope will conclude four years of faithful service as District President of The Woman's Society of Christian Service. One crowning witness of her leadership and service in this area is seen in the district giving of \$12,812 for the cause of missions, and a continuing pledge of \$12,500 for the ensuing year.

Our interest in the work of The Board of Child Care is reflected in a Christmas offering amounting to \$4,751.00.

One year ago, when the Methodist Country House was new, and before any guests had been received, our churches gave \$2,036 on Mother's Day for its support. Only four days ago our second Mother's Day offering was received. All contributions are not yet in, but on the basis of reports telephoned or mailed to me within the last two days we can now report a minimum offering of \$2,915.00.

Conclusion

There are many more things to write about, but remembering Voltaire's comment that, "the way to be a bore is to say everything," I shall come quickly to a close.

With a word of gratitude to our beloved Bishop John Wesley Lord for his leadership, and most of all for the inspiration of his life and character as he lives and works among us; with warm appreciation to each of my colleagues in the Cabinet who share with me the joys and the burdens of my work; with profound respect and undying love for those faithful ministers and lay people who serve with me, and without whose support I could not hope to succeed; and to my Dear Heavenly Father who gives me life and strength and who showers me with love and forgiveness I can make no answer but to say thanks, and thanks and ever thanks.

Bishop Lord, my colleagues of the Cabinet, and members of the Peninsula Annual Conference:

It is a real privilege to report on certain of the activities of the Wilmington District for this Conference year.

May I first indicate changes that have affected parsonage families during this year. We must report 3 deaths: Mrs. Mabel Beecher Briggs, beloved wife of our retired brother, the Reverend William H. Briggs, died on July 8, 1960; Mrs. Myrtle Mason VanCleaf, beloved wife of the Reverend Robert E. VanCleaf, pastor of Eastlake Church, died on October 31, 1960; The Reverend Dr. Thomas J. Sard, honored retired member of our Conference, died on May 8, 1961, after a lingering and confining illness. Our love and sympathy go out to the members of these families even as we rejoice in the good examples which have been set for us by these who have gone before and wait for us in the place of God's preparing.

There have been three marriages of district personnel. The Reverend David G. Paul, pastor of Warwick Charge, was married on July 9, 1960, to Miss Margaret A. Maxton. The Reverend Irvin R. Pusey, pastor of Red Lion Charge, was married on November 24, 1960, to Miss Dolores Williams. Miss Jennie Propert, parish worker and deaconess at Union Church, Wilmington, was married on April 15, 1961, to Douglas G. Braun.

During this year we have welcomed into parsonage homes the following children: Cynthia Lynn Boyer, daughter of the Reverend and Mrs. Richard M. Boyer, Bayview, Maryland, who was born on May 19, 1960, and Timothy Ralph Ellis, son of the Reverend and Mrs. Ralph A. Ellis, Jr., at Holly Oak Church, who was born January 11, 1961.

At this Conference session two of our ministers will seek the retired relation. The Reverend Henry T. Caldwell, pastor at Rising Sun, Maryland, and the Reverend Ira E. Crum, pastor at Cecilton, Maryland. To both of these men we express our appreciation for their devoted service through the years and wish them many days of pleasant and meaningful retirement.

Several changes in appointments have been necessary during the year. The Reverend E. Ray Carlson, pastor of St. Georges Charge, surrendered his credentials and withdrew from our ministry a few days after the adjournment of our last Conference session. The Reverend Dr. Essel Parks Thomas, retired minister of Easton, Maryland, served as interim supply pastor through the summer months. The Reverend Everett C. Isaacs, an approved supply pastor who had been serving in the New Jersey Conference, was assigned as pastor at St. Georges in September, 1960. The Reverend H. Kirby Krams, pastor of Brandywine Church, Wilmington, entered the chaplaincy of the Youth Services Commission of Delaware on September 1, 1960. He had received the full endorsement of our Methodist Commission on Chaplains and was duly appointed by Bishop John Wesley Lord. Mr. Krams continued to serve Brandywine Church until January 1, when the Reverend Willard L. Robinson, Jr., was appointed as his successor. The Reverend Robert G. Kelly was appointed to succeed Mr. Robinson as an interim supply pastor at Ebenezer Church for the remainder of the Conference year.

Membership and Evangelism

Accessions have been reported in all but one of the charges on this district. We have received on profession of faith, 1,147; by transfer from other Methodist Churches, 760; from other denominations, 291; making a total increase of 2,198 members this year. We must report 1,476 members have been lost for all causes, which will give us a net gain in membership

of 722, or a present district total of 26,874 members. The Reverend John Edward Jones has served during the year as district Secretary of Evangelism. Under his leadership we have conducted a pilot project on district evangelism at Kingswood-of-Brookside Church near Newark. Some twenty-five ministers and laymen from across the district gave a Saturday afternoon and evening to visitation evangelism working with an equal number of laymen from the host church. Approximately 150 calls were made that day resulting in a number of decisions for Christ and His church. The inspiration of this event encouraged the local laymen to continue intensified visitation evangelism upon some 150 additional prospect families. We have at the present time requests from three other churches for a similar program of visitation evangelism and we expect to continue this in the fall.

World Service and Benevolences

36 of our 52 charges have paid their World Service and Conference Benevolence asking in full; this in view of an average increase for the Wilmington District of 26.3% over last year's askings. The district has paid a total for this cause of \$157,955. 39 charges have participated in Advance Special projects totaling \$32,873. 27 charges responded to the appeal for Chilean Relief with a gift of \$2,220. 35 charges responded to the Bishops' appeal for the Congo contributing \$3,953. Reports indicate that there will be additional contributions to this appeal from charges that had not been able to take the offering on Sunday, April 30, which was the last day of the Conference year. Since both the Chilean Relief offering and the appeal for the Congo are to be listed as Advance Specials, we can report that 51 charges have participated to a total of \$39,066 for the Advance—an increase of \$5,076 over last year.

The Reverend D'Arcy A. Littleton has served very faithfully as District Missionary Secretary and has given us excellent assistance in the promotion and cultivation of World Service and Advance Specials.

Christian Higher Education

33 charges have paid in full their current asking for Wesley College Capital Improvement. 15 charges have paid in part, while 4 of our charges made no contribution this year. The district has paid a total of \$43,150 which represents an increase of \$7,458 over last year. We are pleased to note that most of our charges indicate their intention to honor this obligation though it may require more than the suggested five years. We are delighted at the progress being made at our college under the inspired leadership of its president, Dr. Robert Parker.

General Contributions

Our people have responded to the following special offerings in the amounts indicated: Fellowship of Suffering and Service, \$2,556; Rally Day, \$2,223; One Great Hour of Sharing, \$1,879; Methodist Youth Fund, \$1,372; Child Care, \$5,661; Race Relations, \$742; Student Day, \$1,454; Methodist Country House Mother's Day Offering of 1960, \$4,683.

We have been given excellent assistance on the district this year by Mr. Gilbert S. Scarborough, Jr., chairman of the Conference Commission on

World Service and Finance, and Mr. John F. Kelso, Conference treasurer. These men have spoken at Group Quarterly Conferences and have accepted invitations to speak in numerous Official Board meetings across the district telling the story of our financial needs and undergirding the cause of stewardship.

Organizations

Just a word of appreciation to Mrs. Joseph B. Dickerson, retiring president of the District Woman's Society of Christian Service for a very fine program and sound leadership during her term, and a word of welcome to Mrs. Arthur Benjamin, our new district president. The Woman's Society of Christian Service on the Wilmington District has had a very good year. The programs have been helpful and projects have met with great success and I have found them always most cooperative in the program of the total district.

Our district Board of Lay Activities under the leadership of Mr. Thomas S. Lodge, district lay leader, and his associates, Messrs. Lawrence Gibson, Richard Farmer, Samuel Craig, and LeRoy Horne have done much to encourage our Methodist Men's groups and in providing excellent leadership in support of the Child Care and Mother's Day offerings this year. Our Layman's Banquet in the fall was our best yet with a great increase in attendance and a wonderful spirit. Bishop Lord brought a heartwarming message.

Christian Education

The Wilmington District has promoted three successful leadership training schools during the year—one for Cecil County at Port Deposit, one for the city of Wilmington at McCabe Church, and one at Peniel Church, Newport. These were organized under the chairmanship of the Reverend C. Edwin Lasbury, district Director of Christian Education. The deans of these respective schools were the Reverend Messrs. C. H. Squires, Joseph B. Dickerson, and George W. Goodley.

I would like to express appreciation, at this time to the members of our district Staff of Christian Education—Miss Mary Graham White, district Director of Children's Work, the Reverend H. Kirby Krams, district Director of Youth Work, and the Reverend George H. Moore, district Director of Adult Work. Under their capable leadership we have had a most effective program of Christian education. Because of their leadership and encouragement we have been well represented in the various Conference educational programs and at our summer camp program at Pecometh.

Christian Social Concerns

The Reverend Ralph L. Minker, Jr., is our district director of this newly organized Board. We appreciate the efforts of this Board to educate our people in regards the varied concerns of a social, economic, and moral nature. They have given us firm support in our desire to make every Methodist church an inclusive church for peoples of all races. They have from time to time alerted us to matters before our state and national legislatures that we might express opinions to those who represent us. We

have been happy this year to note the organization on each charge of a Commission on Social Concerns.

Without a doubt the outstanding achievement in the field of Christian Social Concerns in the Peninsula Conference this year has been the completion of the Methodist Country House. In this lovely setting the aged and aging find not only kindness and care, but also a new meaning for life. We wish to express our gratitude for the generosity of those who have supported this project and those who direct its daily operation. Our sincere thanks to the Reverend George H. Pigueron, Jr., Director, and the Rev. William H. Owens, Associate Director.

Buildings and Improvements

The total expended this year on the Wilmington District for building and improvements is \$429,436. At the same time we have paid on indebtedness \$325,938. The following charges have been engaged in major building or improvement programs during the year:

Aldersgate Church has purchased a new parsonage for their associate minister at a cost of \$23,000. They also plan to break ground in a few weeks for a new sanctuary and education unit to cost approximately \$500,000.

Bayview Church has constructed a new church kitchen costing \$3,856.

Baldwin Church on the Cherry Hill Charge has paid in full the debt on the new education building and is drawing plans now for a new sanctuary.

Cherry Hill Church has completed a new education building using a former schoolhouse which was moved to the church lot and remodeled at a cost of \$16,000.

Christ Church, Roselle, burned the mortgage on their new sanctuary on January 15, 1961, and the building was dedicated by Bishop John Wesley Lord. Final payment was made in less than six years from the time the sanctuary was started. Within this Conference year they have also completed an education wing of 14 classrooms at a cost of \$133,000.

Christiana Church has completed a second floor on its education building and considerably enlarged its sanctuary.

Claymont has made extensive alterations on existing buildings to complete the project begun a year ago when the new education unit was built.

Delaware City has occupied its new sanctuary and paid over \$12,134 this year on this project.

Leeds Church of East Cecil Circuit has been redecorated.

Hillcrest expects to complete a new sanctuary in June of this year which will cost \$264,000.

Hopewell Church is erecting an education wing to cost approximately \$30,000.

Newark has purchased additional property adjoining the present church. Plans are being drawn for significant expansion of facilities.

New Castle Church has spent \$10,751 this year for a complete renovation of its sanctuary.

North East Church has conducted a highly successful building fund campaign and is now drawing plans for a new education building.

St. Mark's Church, Stanton, broke ground recently on its new site for the first unit of its new church which is expected to cost \$290,000.

Rosebank Church on West Cecil Parish made final payment on their debt and dedicated the new church on April 9, 1961.

Brandywine Church, Wilmington, spent \$6,049 on major renovation and remodeling of the parsonage.

Harrison Street Church has installed a useful kitchenette and other improvements at a cost of \$3,822.

McCabe Memorial Church is in the midst of planning for an extensive building and remodeling program that will cost approximately \$700,000. Steps have already been taken to secure additional land. Other plans include a new education building, a new parsonage, and an enlarged and remodeled sanctuary. During this year a trust of \$790,000 was received from the estate of Mr. Clarence Fraim. Mr. Fraim was a layman with real love for his church and great vision as to the mission of his church to this city.

Pastoral Support

For the new Conference year 31 charges have increased the support of their pastors by \$23,885 in the following manner: 21 have added \$17,280 as salary; 5 have added \$1,520 to the travel expense fund; 17 have increased parsonage utilities by \$5,085.

Only two of the charges do not now provide their pastor with a travel expense allowance. All of our charges assumed some responsibility for parsonage utilities, the majority of them now paying all the normal parsonage utility expense.

Recruitment

One of the major emphases of this quadrennium is upon Recruitment for Christian Vocations. We are pleased to report that ten young people of this district have made such decisions and are preparing themselves for Christian service. Six of these are for the ministry including John E. Taylor of New Castle Church, who will be entering Wesley College in the fall. Mr. Taylor will be appointed to work at this Conference. Alan Lumpkin of Hillcrest Church is a junior at Dickinson College; William Tweed of Brandywine Church will enroll in the University of Delaware in the fall; Harold C. Williams, Jr., Union Church, is a freshman at Asbury College; Clifford Armour of North East is a junior at Duke; Lloyd R. Foard of Mt. Pleasant Church, Colora, is now attending a Junior College in nearby Maryland.

Three young people are preparing for the mission field. William Thomas Carter of Newark Church is a student at University of Delaware; Garry Parker of Holly Oak Church is studying at Taylor University. Miss Linda Marie Churn of Richardson Park Church is soon to begin her training as a nurse in Sibley Hospital, Washington, D. C. Miss Amelia Ann Dunkle of Grace Church, is doing graduate work at Drew University preparing for work in Christian Education.

There are a number of others who have registered interest in such vocations, but these listed are those who have begun formal training. Most of the young men have been recommended for Local Preacher's licenses or have already been licensed. We are very proud of these fine youth and

appreciate the interest of the laymen and pastors who have encouraged them. We covet your prayers that we may find many more like them.

Two years ago the assets of Scott Methodist Church were invested as the Scott Memorial Scholarship Fund. The first income from this Fund was used this year to provide scholarships for seven young people from this district preparing for Christian Vocations. A total of \$1,500 was available and scholarships ranged from \$100 to \$300. I would like to take this means to express the appreciation of these young people and of the superintendent of the Wilmington District for what this fund has meant this year and what it will mean through the years.

General Notes

We face many and varied problems in the Wilmington District. Problems relating to rural countryside; problems of rapidly growing vacation resorts on our lovely rivers where throngs gather during the summer. We are taking a careful look at these needs and are making plans to provide help for some of our charges. It is expected that a Conference on Rural Church will be held next fall in Cecil County to be sponsored by our Conference Commission on Town and Country work.

We plan to assist at least one of our churches this summer with a student assistant to work among the summer people.

Some of our problems relate to suburbia—where population growth opens new fields and causes rapid expansion of existing churches. We are looking for land for new churches on two sides of the city of Wilmington and are using Conference and district funds to aid several of our suburban churches in building projects.

A most serious problem is an adequate ministry for the city itself, especially the inner-city. I have met with many pastors and planning committees through this year as many of our churches are seriously examining their mission to their communities and their role in a changing city. For some it will mean new or modified facilities; for most it will mean the development of new program emphasis. The results are not always spectacular but miracles are being wrought in changed viewpoints and attitudes and great good will come as the Holy Spirit leads us to find more adequate ways to minister to all of God's children.

One of the most thrilling things to happen this year is just beginning. In the past few weeks I have met several times with the leaders of the major protestant denominations in this area to discuss a new cooperative strategy for Christian work in the metropolitan area. We agree at the outset that the problems of the city and its environs are greater than the resources of any one denominational group and that the needs invite us to work cooperatively. We feel that there are many projects in which we can work together and many ways in which we can avoid unnecessary duplication of effort. This concept will be developed under the guidance of our Wilmington and New Castle County Council of Churches with the promise of encouragement and aid from the National Council of Churches and the Denominational Boards. It is too early to give details, but I want to say that I am enthusiastic about the possibilities I can envision in such a venture.

Such interdenominational cooperation as we have enjoyed in this area, especially in our Council of Churches and through the United Church Women, gives encouragement to the belief that the proposal of Dr. Eugene Carson Blake in San Francisco for Protestant merger is not an idle dream, but a genuine possibility. This certainly can be a goal worth cultivating.

Now, in closing, may I express my gratitude to the ministers and the laymen of the Wilmington District for their loyal support, to my colleagues in the Cabinet for their cooperation and kindness, to Bishop Lord for his ready counsel and Christian leadership, and to Almighty God for His love and patience but above all for the privilege of serving in His church.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF CHILD CARE

Our beautiful children's center at Rockdale, Maryland, has been a glorious dream for thirty-seven years. Step by step the dream emerged into reality on the following important dates:

September 27, 1923: Bishop William Frazier McDowell appointed a committee to consider the legal possibilities of a merger and the wisdom of the consolidation of the three Conference homes under one Conference management. These homes were The Kelso Home for Orphan Girls, The Strawbridge Home for Boys, and The Swartzell Methodist Home for Children. This committee was also to explore the advisability of a united Christmas appeal.

The minutes of The Strawbridge Home for Boys, March 20, 1924, indicate that a committee was appointed to visit the Wilmington Conference and ask that three trustees be appointed on the Strawbridge board. Subsequently the names of T. J. Sard, C. Wilson-Hughes and Mrs. Melville Gambrill appear in the minutes of the meeting. Thus the Peninsula Conference, the successor to the Wilmington Conference, has been officially related to the child care program for thirty-seven years.

On **June 6, 1942**, nineteen years later, the Baltimore Annual Conference authorized a conference-wide appeal at Christmas time for the three children's homes.

On **June 2, 1943**, upon recommendation of a joint committee of the three homes, the Board of Child Care was created and appointed by the Baltimore Conference, "to supervise the operation and management of the three children's homes." The Board was organized on June 22, 1943, nearly twenty years after the appointment of a committee by Bishop McDowell.

On **June 6, 1953**, the Baltimore Annual Conference adopted the report of the Conference Merger Committee (pages 60 and 61, Conference Journal), which proposed an administrative merger of the three boards—The Kelso Home for Girls, The Strawbridge Home for Boys and the Board of Child Care. The Swartzell Methodist Home for Children elected to continue its work under its own Board of Trustees and Woman's Guild.

On **March 28, 1960**, the Woman's Division of Christian Service considered the recommendation of the Baltimore Conference Woman's Society of Christian Service and approved the closing of the Swartzell Methodist Home for Children and the discontinuance of the program. The Board of Trustees was instructed to transfer to the Board of Child Care of the Baltimore Annual Conference children as are not placed elsewhere and the sum of \$120,000 for the erection of two cottages on the grounds of the Board of Child Care, the cottages to be known as the Swartzell and Hynson Buildings. Thirteen boys and girls were transferred.

On **October 1, 1960**, as one of his first official acts in the Washington Area, Bishop John Wesley Lord dedicated eight buildings and twenty acres "for the loving care of children in the name of our Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ." After thirty-seven years Bishop Lord performed the act that completed the dream of Bishop McDowell.

Land, buildings, furnishings and landscaping represent a total amount investment of \$770,000.00 as of March 14, 1961. There are additional items of furnishings yet to be purchased.

The sources of the funds covering these expenditures are:

1. From the invested capital funds of the Board of Child Care including the Howard N. Baldwin Estate, a gift of \$25,000 from Mr. Joseph T. Singewald, Jr., as a memorial to his parents, and special gifts for furnishings	\$250,000.00
2. Advanced by the Trustees of The Kelso Home for Girls under a Deed of Trust executed with the Board of Child Care	200,000.00
3. Advanced by the Trustees of The Strawbridge Home for Boys, including the Estate of Mr. Jesse P. King, under a Deed of Trust executed with the Board of Child Care	200,000.00
4. Gift from the Trustees of Swartzell Methodist Home for Children	120,000.00
TOTAL	\$770,000.00

On this new site is the Albaugh Administration Building, containing the offices of the Board of Child Care; the Singewald Memorial Cottages, the

residence of the Director of Cottage Life; The Kelso Activities Building, where children worship, play, and are entertained, where visiting groups assemble, and the location of the central kitchen; the five cottages where the children live—Memorial, King, Swartzell, Hynson, Carroll—the first three for boys, the other two for girls—each accommodating twelve children, who live under the supervision of a man and his wife, substitute parents.

About the middle of August the children from Kelso, Strawbridge and Swartzell moved into their brand new quarters at 3300 Gaither Road, Baltimore 7 (Rockdale), Maryland. Since that time 53 different young people have resided at the center. Some have moved out, others entered. Gradually new children are being admitted with careful study and processing. It will take a little time to bring together in a well adjusted group, new children and old children, new house parents and old house parents, along with social work staff.

Over the past 37 years literally hundreds of youngsters have found a haven of security, a healthy group living experience, and have gotten a good footing on the pathway of life.

As the future years unfold the number of children who will benefit from the loving care of Methodism, through its Board of Child Care, will be greatly increased not only through the group living at the beautiful child center at Rockdale, but in the foster homes where many of the children will be placed and through the child adoption program whereby babies are placed by the Board for adoption by young couples active in the Methodist Churches of our two conferences, all of which is part of the four-fold program of the Board of Child Care.

The next conference year, also our fiscal year, will provide the first full year of experience in the operation of the program of child care services in the new setting. Much of what has been done has been in the nature of finding our way.

The Christmas offering amounted to \$20,482.09. The continued support and interest of the Methodists of the Peninsula Conference is deeply appreciated and helps extend our services to needy children.

Through this report we introduce to you, Mr. John H. C. Lassahn, the Board's new Director of Public Relations. He is available to speak to any group in the churches of our two conferences. We cordially invite all church groups, as well as individuals, to visit. Groups are asked to arrange a date for their visits so some one will be present and ready to conduct a tour through the buildings. The Board of Child Care has as its next GOAL the total legal merger of The Kelso Home for Girls, The Strawbridge Home for Boys and the Board of Child Care, with consolidation of all invested funds or endowments in the new merged corporation. This will be facilitated by the Board of Child Care receiving bequests and donations of capital funds equal to the amount advanced by the Kelso and Strawbridge Homes, namely \$400,000. These gifts can be made as memorials. Then, back of our substantial plant will be an increased endowment whose income will assure an expanding and effective program for needy children for many years to come.

BOARD OF CHRISTIAN SOCIAL CONCERNS

I. Introduction

By action of the 1960 General Conference the former three Boards of Social and Economic Relations, Temperance, and World Peace were united into one board to be known as the Board of Christian Social Concerns. This Board was elected at the Annual Conference of 1960 and was organized shortly thereafter. The following officers were elected: Richard C. Stazesky, chairman; Wilton H. Keene, vice-chairman of the Division of Human Relations and Economic Affairs; J. Thomas Churn, vice-chairman of the Division of Temperance and General Welfare; Howell O. Wilkins, vice-chairman of the Division of Peace and World Order; Fletcher H. Condit, secretary; and Preston M. Adkins, treasurer. The District Directors who were appointed to guide the work of the Board of the various districts were: Frank Lucia, Dover; A. Jason Blundon, Easton; Howard L. Gordy, Jr., Salisbury; and Ralph L. Minker, Jr., Wilmington.

Before embarking on its work the Board sought to discover the theological basis for its task. The Board believes that the word WHOLENESS provides the key to the understanding of this basis.

(1) The Christian faith affirms that God is the Creator of the whole world. "The earth is the Lord's and the fullness thereof, the world and those who dwell therein" (Psalm 24:1). God loved the whole world—persons as individuals, persons in society, nature itself. "For God so loved the world that he gave his only Son . . ." (John 3:16). But not only does Christ reveal God's love for the world, He also reveals God's Lordship over the whole of life. Thus, Jesus in His earthly life, was concerned not only with the failure of individuals to fulfil God's will for their lives but also with the failure of institutions to express God's love and justice. His words and actions in regard to the family, religious institutions, economic practices, and political leaders and institutions testify to this social concern. Jesus is the Lord of all of life, such as, personal, social, economic, political, industrial.

(2) The Judaeo-Christian tradition has always insisted that man must be seen in his wholeness—body, mind, spirit, a member of society, a part of the natural world. Jesus demonstrated this understanding of man in His concern not only for the welfare of the soul but also in His concern for the health of the body and for the practice of mercy and justice in the social structure itself.

(3) Therefore, it is impossible truly to help a person—to save him—without at the same time helping him in the context of all his social relationships. Salvation is for the whole man and therefore it is for society also, for man is truly man as he is in relationship with other men and with God.

(4) The Church, then, must be concerned for this whole man in the whole world. Ours can never be an exclusively individual work because man is never exclusively an individual; he is a social being and he must be dealt with as a social being. This Board, therefore, will labor to make real the Lordship of Jesus Christ in the life of the whole man in the whole world.

II. 1960-61 Activities

The Board met seven times during the conference year. Its central emphasis has been on planning for the whole quadrennium rather than seeking to come forth in the first year of its existence with a full-blown program. However, it has not all been planning for the future; some things were done in the present conference year.

(1) Training was provided for local church Commission on Christian Social Concerns members at either group quarterly conferences or at district conferences on the Dover, Easton, and Wilmington Districts.

(2) The new manual for the Commission on Christian Social Concerns was sent to every pastor.

(3) A Legislative Committee was set up and functioned in Delaware. However, the Board recognizes that it must do a much more effective job here than it has yet done.

(4) Mailings in regard to matters of social concern before the Delaware State Assembly were sent to Delaware pastors.

(5) Seven members of the Board attended the Northeastern Regional Briefing Conference for members of the conference Boards of Christian Social Concerns held at Buck Hill Falls, Pennsylvania in November, 1960. The chairman of the Board and the vice-chairman of the Division of Human Relations and Economic Affairs attended the Quadrennial Planning Conference on Race Relations which was held in Louisville, Kentucky, in March. Ten members of the Board attended the National Convocation on the work of this Board which was held in Washington, D. C. in April. Attendance at these various conferences is very helpful to the members of the Board as they plan for work in this area of Christian social concerns.

(6) Resources for the church-wide study on alcohol were made available to the local churches.

(7) The Board chairman met with the officers of the Delaware Conference Board of Christian Social Concerns and after this the two Boards met together. Ways in which our two Conferences can work together were discussed.

(8) Literature was sent to the pastors in regard to the observance of Race Relations Sunday and World Peace Sunday.

(9) A visual aids library relevant to the work of this Board has been maintained as a service to the local churches.

(10) A questionnaire was sent to all pastors of the Conference to determine what is now being done in the area of this Board's responsibilities and what the Board can do to aid the local churches. The questionnaire sent out was answered and returned by 178 of the 189 pastors of the Conference which means a 94% response. Some of the facts revealed were these:

- a) There were 58 charges with an active Commission on Christian Social Concerns in 1960-61, but in 1961-62 it is expected that there will be 144 charges with an active Commission. Thus 81% of the 178 charges reporting will have active Commissions.
- b) In regard to the observance of special days relative to the work of this Board, the following days were observed by the given percentages of the charges reporting: Labor Sunday 75%, Race Relations

Sunday 57%, Commitment Sunday 43%, World Order Sunday 41%, Christian Social Concerns Sunday 18%, and Church and Economic Life Sunday 5%.

- c) A School of Alcohol Studies was held by 49 of the 178 charges reporting.
- d) Local church Commissions that are active are involved in many kinds of programs: welfare work; educational programs in regard to economic, social and political problems; leading in efforts to oppose the extension of gambling and the licensing of new liquor outlets; seeking to discover community needs; arranging for political forums during the election and working to get the voters to exercise their responsibility as Christian citizens; arranging for local church field trips, as for instance, a visit to the state capital. It is very encouraging to see that so many of the Commission are approaching their tasks with such vigor and imagination.
- e) The local churches expect the Conference Board to provide training for members of this Commission, to guide the Commissions on social and political issues, to keep the local Commissions informed on relevant legislative matters, to make available helpful literature and audio visual resources, and to suggest programs and studies that can be carried out in the local churches.

III. Future Plans

In addition to providing training opportunities for members of the local church Commissions on Christian Social Concerns, making available to pastors and churches various kinds of resources relevant to this Commission's work, urging the observance of the special days for which the Board is responsible, setting up an effective Legislative Committee for both States covered by our Conference, and speaking to the churches in regard to pressing social problems, the Board will carry out particular programs in the three main areas of its work.

A. Division of Peace and World Order

No program for world peace has been pursued in our Annual Conference for some time. It is, therefore, necessary that an extensive program of education begin at once. There has been some exposure to this area of concern through the Woman's Societies of Christian Service, the Conference Youth Council, and trips to the United Nations. The Board proposes to support all these, and to supplement them if interest should develop. The mailing of materials for use on World Order Sunday, which was begun last year, will be continued annually.

The proposed new programs for 1961-62 are as follows: (1) The conducting of a conference-wide, full-day seminar on the theme "World Peace and World Order" with discussion groups on various aspects of the subject, such as, the effect of the missionary movement on world order, disarmament, international agencies, etc. (2) The securing of a speaker for one session of the annual conference who would be a person of such stature as Phillip Noel-Baker. (3) The holding of district training sessions to prepare speakers who would be available to visit the churches and present the Methodist concern for peace and world order. Such speakers could especially be invited to the churches on Layman's Sunday or World Order Sunday.

B. Division of Temperance and General Welfare

It was gratifying to learn that about 50 of our churches carried out the mission study course on "Alcohol and Christian Responsibility," using the book "Stumbling Block." It is to be hoped that from the use of this study a greater knowledge of the problems connected with beverage alcohol has been gained and that there has been sufficient incentive created for our people to go beyond the study itself to consider a program of action for the local community, particularly in the area of alcoholism.

The fact that about 50% of our churches make no observance of Commitment Day in any form speaks for a need to revise our thinking about the use of this day. Alcoholism ranks fourth as a national problem affecting the lives of millions of our citizens. Few of our churches are untouched by this problem with its accompanying disturbances in persons, families, and society. The educational task needs to be done again and again in the face of persistent and carefully planned efforts on the part of the alcohol industry advertising. Let this be a day when we shall educate our people to the facts concerning this problem. Churches in Maryland would do well to make use of the Speakers' Bureau now connected with the Baltimore Area Council of Alcoholism.

Our local churches can also encourage the educational work being done in the public schools on alcohol by the Temperance League of Maryland and Delaware. This can be done by helping to secure opportunities for a speaker to talk to the students and by the financial support we can lend to the League. The executive of the League is also willing to preach at Sunday worship services and he brings a constructive and helpful message. (For information write to Robert R. Stephens, Delaware-Maryland Temperance League, 411 North Charles Street, Baltimore, Maryland.)

In Delaware there continues to be the need for vigilance and concern in the area of legislation on such matters as prison reform, gambling, law enforcement, penal treatment, and education. The pastors are urged to call the attention of their people to the dog racing bill, the measure to extend the hour of closing for tap rooms, and to the threatened restoration of the whipping post to the end that people may oppose these measures. But, let support be rendered for such measures as would tighten enforcement of gambling laws and which would adequately finance the state prison system. It is a matter for statewide shame and concern that the prospects of Delaware doing something truly constructive in regard to the penal system and treatment are so slim that the State's well known and capable Director of Prisons, Chester Looney, felt led to resign his post.

In the conference year 1961-62 the Board will conduct a conference-wide, all-day seminar for pastors on the theme "Counseling the Alcoholic." The pastors' attention is called to an excellent book on this subject by Howard I. Clinebell, Jr. entitled "Understand and Counseling the Alcoholic," published by Abingdon Press. This seminar will have as its leaders men who are qualified in this special area of counseling.

C. Division of Human Relations and Economic Affairs

This Division of the Board of Christian Social Concerns has responsibility for a great number of social and economic issues. The Board has

decided, however, to place particular stress upon the matter of race relations. Such a decision hardly needs to be justified since it should be apparent to all that the problems involved in the relationship of races in the United States compose together our most profound and far reaching domestic problem. This matter of race relations is also a major international concern. This is an issue to which the Christian Church should vigorously address itself for the Church is committed to the Lord who "is our peace, who has made us both one, and has broken down the dividing wall of hostility. . . ." (Ephesians 2:14). In the Christian Gospel is found the only real and lasting solution to this problem of divisions and hostility among men, regardless of what are the causes—race included.

As the Board prepares to lead the Peninsula Conference in this matter it does so in harmony and cooperation with the national emphasis on race relations being made by our Methodist Church. The initial conference held to plan for this emphasis was attended by two of the Board members, as reported previously. From this Orientation Conference for the Quadrennial Program on Race Relations came forth many practical suggestions as to how local churches, districts, and conferences can deal with the problem. These suggestions will be given wide publicity in the denominational publications, especially that of "Contact." Another result of the Conference was the formation of 39 regional committees commissioned to serve in this area of race relations. Our Peninsula Conference is represented on this committee which is made up of persons from the Baltimore, Delaware and Peninsula Conferences. Our Board will cooperate with this committee in promoting the program on race relations in this quadrennium.

Another activity of the Board, in this regard, entrusted to it by the 1960 General Conference, is a study of the problems and relevant factors involved in the merger of white and Negro churches comprising the geographical and racial jurisdictions. In particular, as far as we are concerned in this Conference, this means the merger of our Peninsula Conference with those parts of the Delaware Conference that are in our area. The Board will be actively engaged in the year ahead with such a study and will report its findings at a later time. The movement in the Methodist Church in regard to race is toward a complete merger of the geographical and racial jurisdictions, which means merger on conference, district and local church levels. It is a movement that cannot and ought not to be stopped and we must prepare for it. This Board, as part of its delegated responsibility, will seek to lead the Conference in this period of preparation.

The major project of this Division of the Board in 1961-62 will be two conference-wide and full-day seminars, one for laymen and one for pastors. The one for pastors will deal with "The Role of the Pastor in Race Relations in the Local Church," and the one for laymen will deal with "The Local Church and the Race Question." It will benefit both laymen and pastors alike if they will obtain and study a booklet on this subject entitled "Methodism's Challenge in Race Relations, A Study of Strategy" by J. Philip Wogaman, Public Affairs Press, 419 New Jersey Avenue, S. E., Washington 3, D. C., \$2.00. The Board will also seek to keep this matter before the churches by use of helpful literature which will be furnished to the pastors and Commission chairmen. The Board will also be prepared

with guidance and program suggestions to assist those churches that are seeking to deal with this problem locally.

The Board calls upon the pastors and churches to begin now in working on this matter by doing the following elementary, practical, but highly significant things: (1) Every pastor is requested and urged to become acquainted with the Negro pastor or pastors in his area, especially with those of the Delaware Conference churches. (A list of these churches and pastors will be sent to every minister of the Conference.) (2) Members of our churches are asked to visit in the worship services of our sister Negro churches and to ask them to reciprocate. (3) Churches are requested to arrange for various kinds of interracial and interchurch activities, such as, inviting the Negro churches to special evening services, joint Woman Society and Methodist Men meetings, youth meetings, and joint meetings of officers of the respective churches. (4) Local churches are requested to promote studies of this matter of race relations in their churches, especially with members of the Official Board. Guidance in setting up such studies will gladly be given by the Conference Board and suggestions as to these studies will later be sent to all pastors and Commission chairmen.

One of the real signs of progress being made in the area of race relations is the number of public places, such as restaurants, that are now serving all people, regardless of race. We commend the recent move, in this regard, on the part of proprietors in Salisbury, Maryland and Wilmington, Delaware and other towns and cities of our Conference. We further commend those persons and groups who by their Christian influence assisted in making these moves possible. And we vigorously urge the Methodist people to patronize those places of business which are seeking to serve all people who come to them.

As a step in this same direction we urge our churches and institutions to employ staff personnel strictly on the basis of merit, without regard to color. This applies to church secretaries, choir directors, organists, soloists, teachers, pastors and assistants as well as to sextons.

We also urge our church members to support every move that is being made in providing equal opportunity in housing for all people, regardless of race. Individual Methodist families can make a true and noble Christian witness when they let it be known that they will welcome any new neighbors into their areas, regardless of their color or national background.

Here, in this area of race relations, with the corollary problems of justice and equal opportunity the Christian Church has one of its finest openings to bear witness to that love in Christ which has made us one and which makes us vitally concerned for one another. This Board of Christian Social Concerns believes that given leadership by the Bishop, District Superintendents, this Board and the pastors, the local churches will respond to the challenge and will be the most potent force on this peninsula to bring about a society that is pleasing to God and which will allow every person to fulfil his own life in the highest possible way.

IV. Recommendations

(1) The Board recommends the establishment of a central office for our Conference in which there would be provided centralized bookkeeping for

all Conference agencies, a central depository for visual aids and other resources used by the churches, a centralized mailing system, and a suite of rooms available for various kinds of Conference meetings. It is, therefore, recommended that this matter be referred for study and a report at the next Annual Conference to a standing agency of the Conference or that a special committee be appointed to study it and report back.

(2) The Board recommends that the Peninsula Conference endorse President Kennedy's bill having to do with federal aid to education. In regard to the question of providing public funds for private and sectarian schools we stand firmly behind the position stated in the 1960 "Discipline," paragraph 2028, and the position taken by the National Council of Churches of Christ in America. These positions both affirm that public money must be used for public schools and not for the support of private and sectarian schools.

(3) The Board recommends that the Conference go on record as opposing the extension of gambling in Delaware through the legalizing of dog racing. And we call upon the officials of Delaware and Maryland to be even more rigorous in the enforcement of laws having to do with gambling.

(4) The Board recommends that the Conference go on record as opposing Senate Bill number 151 of the State Assembly of Delaware which would make mandatory the whipping of persons convicted of crimes involving robbery and rape.

(5) The Board recommends that the Conference go on record as opposing House Bill number 239 of the State Assembly of Delaware which would make possible the conducting in Delaware of a state lottery for the purpose of reducing the bonded indebtedness of the State.

(6) The Board recommends that the Conference go on record as endorsing the intention of House Bill number 248 of the State Assembly of Delaware which would make illegal the possession or consumption of alcoholic liquor by anyone under the age of 21 years.

(7) The Board recommends the adoption of the following resolutions in regard to peace and world order:

(a) With the danger of accidental war increasing as man's technology develops, it is even more imperative than in the past that a program of complete universal and enforceable disarmament be developed. We urge our church groups to continue to study, and we urge our government to strengthen the permanent agency on disarmament, our congress to provide sufficient funds for the same, and that we continue a spirit of relentless pursuit of this objective of national policy.

(b) The United Nations being our one hope of international cooperation, we urge our church groups to continue to study and develop means for further support, and that we find ways of further financial participation in international cooperation through such means as UNICEF.

(c) With further scientific studies indicating the absolute danger of radiation to human existence and normal growth, we urge our churches to study a permanent policy of banning nuclear bomb testing.

(To assist our church groups in the study of these and other aspects of international peace and world order, we commend to them the publication of "Peace and Power." This is available from 100 Maryland Avenue, N. E., Washington, D. C.)

REPORT OF THE MARYLAND COUNCIL OF CHURCHES

As Executive Secretary of the Maryland Council of Churches, it is my pleasure to bring greetings to this Conference from the 23 denominational judicatories with churches cooperating in the work of the Maryland Council. We rejoice that your Bishop is a leader, not only of the Methodist Church, but also of the ecumenical movement. With such leadership, this Conference will certainly continue to grow in every aspect of church life.

The Peninsula Conference has approximately 152 churches in Delaware and 228 churches in Maryland. These 228 churches, with nearly 40,000 Methodist, are an important part of the Protestant voice in Maryland. It is through their efforts, being united with churches of the other denominations, that effective cooperative church responsibilities will be projected on the Peninsula and throughout Maryland. The financial support from the Conference of \$1000 for the Council and \$500 for the migrant ministry in Maryland is deeply appreciated. It is the equivalent of about 3½ cents per Methodist. As the interdenominational work grows, it is our hope that your contribution will also be expanded.

Our work with the Salisbury television station, the only one on the Peninsula, has been progressing with additional religious programs being directed through that Channel as well as through the Baltimore stations which serve a large section of this Conference. Training of camp leaders, vacation church school workers, recreation leaders and others have been strengthened much by your leadership. The migrant ministry continues to be carried out in cooperation with the Delaware Council and has been expanded this year to include many needy areas. In the department of legislation, the Maryland Council recognizes the importance of a total state-wide approach. If our individual voices cannot be heard, then Christians must speak together on matters related to our schools and other moral and social concerns. Our representatives in Annapolis and Washington are in need of this voice.

To enable our Maryland Council of Churches to truly serve more effectively, a new Constitution has been prepared. It makes the Council denominationally constituted by enabling each to name representatives to the governing bodies of the Council. The ratio would be five representatives plus one for each 15,000 members in Maryland. Representatives from the Peninsula Conference have been participating in forming this Constitution. It is hoped that by our annual meeting in November, 1961, a sufficient number of denominations will have passed on this document to justify ratification. The Executive Committee of the Council requests that this Conference take action on the new Constitution in keeping with their past support of the Council.

We voice appreciation to your clergy and laymen who continue to serve you through their efforts on our Board, departments, and committees.

The Maryland Council of Churches seeks to enable our Protestant Church to do those things which can best be accomplished cooperatively. By so doing we manifest the essential oneness of the Christian Churches in Maryland in Jesus Christ as Lord and Saviour.

- (d) a successful campaign for \$10,000 to enlarge the cooperative work with Maryland for migrant laborers and their families, especially by establishing a pilot school with the State Board of Education and a Spanish-speaking Protestant Chaplain in New Castle County for Puerto Rican laborers.

3. is providing an ecumenical opportunity in growing proportions on a statewide basis and looks to ever closer cooperation among the denominations of Delaware.

THE PENINSULA CONFERENCE BOARD OF EDUCATION REPORT TO THE ANNUAL CONFERENCE

Early in the Conference year, your Board of Education met to organize for the responsibilities of the present quadrennium. After due consideration the Board determined that its role would be more than that which concerned itself with the establishment of policy, but considered its part as one which included active participation in the fulfillment of the broad purposes and plans envisaged in a comprehensive program of Christian Education. Plainly, its task is seen as a working board enlisting not alone its membership but many additional persons for the numerous enterprises to be undertaken.

Committee Work

In line with the decision that members of the Board would share directly in the work, the following division of committee responsibilities was made: Certification of Directors and Professional Standards; Camp

Operations and Program; Finance and Budget; PeCoMeth Development; Christian Higher Education; Publicity; Music; Family Life; and PeCoMeth Farm. Membership on the various committees is not limited to Board members but includes persons having special skills which serve the interests of the total program.

Leadership Training

Christian teaching in the Methodist Church is the responsibility of a whole host of people—ministerial and lay, professional and volunteer. In the 380 churches of the Peninsula Conference hundreds of Church School teachers go about their task with children, youth, and adults. To this number must be added officers and administrators, the Youth Counselors, the workers in weekday activities, the leaders in camping, the musicians and other specialists. The church's ministry of teaching is to fulfill its purpose, the work of Christian nurture must be in the hands of capable leadership. Recognizing the trained teacher as the key person, we realize at once the necessity for such training to take place. During the year approximately 121 churches have been involved in training opportunities. Included in the above and by special arrangement with the General Board, Miss Evelyn Tripp of Nashville, directed and taught in eight schools during the months of November and December. So successful were these efforts that plans have already been made for a return engagement in the coming year.

On the District and Conference level, special note should be made of the following enterprises. The Field Workers' Conference held July 30-31 with 35 in attendance at which time plans were made for the Conference Program of Leadership Training. A Laboratory School for Children's Workers at Newark July 10-15 and Vacation Church School workshops were held in each of the four districts. The Annual Church School Superintendents Weekend July 9-10 was a source of much inspiration under the able leadership of Dr. A. Merritt Dieterich, Executive Secretary of the Baltimore Conference Board of Education. So enthusiastic was Dr. Dieterich's reception, by nearly fifty in attendance, that he was immediately requested by the Superintendents of our Church Schools that he might return as the resource leader for the coming year and to this he has agreed.

An important instrument in recent years for the discovery and training of teachers to instruct other teachers in Christian Workers Schools is what is called a Coaching Conference. Such a Conference was held December 9-10 at Wesley College in Dover attended by about fifty persons. Dr. Irving McDonough and Miss LaDonna Bogardus of the General Board at Nashville and Dr. Robert R. Powell of Wesley Theological Seminary of Washington, D. C., served as our faculty for this important means of securing additional instructors with proper accreditation.

A highly significant new development in the Board's program is related to our new men entering the Conference Fellowship. A Day of Introduction to the Work and Program of Christian Education within the Peninsula Conference and the General Board was held at the Board's office on February 20 for the men received last May into the Conference. By this endeavor, which present planning wishes to continue, it is our hope that the work of

this Board which relates so directly to the task of the minister in our churches, may be more clearly seen as well as the Board's earnest desire to be of assistance. It should be added that those who are no longer new are likewise cordially invited to share the study and fellowship of this day.

Training experiences **beyond the Conference** boundaries were also a part of the year's opportunity. The Visual Aids Seminar at Hartford, Connecticut, was attended by 3 who received such instruction as will be of assistance in helping many of our people to be more aware of the advances being made in this field. The Christian Education School at Lycoming College, Williamsport, Pennsylvania, August 15-20, under the direction of the General Board, was supported by 13 persons and the Middle Atlantic Adult Convocation at The Inn, Buck Hill Falls, Pennsylvania, with 37 representatives; were also inspiring experiences in the development of Christian leadership for our churches.

While encouraged by these many occasions for leadership training, most of all we are impressed by the increasing number of churches which are using **The Workers Conference** as a continuous plan for the development of Christian Education in the local church. Such a conference which brings together the Commission on Education and the Church School Staff for worship, study, and fellowship, strengthens the total effort in every way. Let us urge even wider acceptance and use of this practical resource. Whenever it can be arranged, the Executive Secretary and his associate, as well as members of the Board, are ready to help in these plans. Frequently, it is out of such conferences, the need for training schools emerges in the thinking of the people concerned.

Music Institutes

On April 15 and 16, Music Institutes were held at St. Mark's Church, Easton and in Wesley and Grace Churches, Georgetown, with **269 registered persons** participating.

National figures as well as highly distinguished persons of our own area, joined in making this one of our most successful ventures. Among our leaders were: Professor Allen C. Lannom, Chairman of Applied Music and Performance, School of Fine and Applied Arts, Boston University; Dr. V. Earle Copes, Music Editor of 'Music Ministry' magazine; Mrs. Sigurd S. Swensson, Minister of Music, Mt. Olivet Church, Seaford; Dr. William F. Dunkle, Jr., Grace Church, Wilmington; and Dr. Ivan Trusler, Jr., Department of Music, University of Delaware.

'Music and Christian Education' was the theme given major emphasis. Effort was made to bring to focus **relationships** as music is used in various departments of the church.

In this emphasis, we are basically concerned that music shall be a vital part of the whole process of Christian Education and through the worship of God with our musical best the rising generation committed to our care may continue to be singing Christians in the midst of congregations who sing from the heart unto the Lord.

Youth Work

Your Conference Director of Youth Work, the Reverend George C. Godfrey, has tried to work with the Conference Youth Council in helping to stimulate better programs which will interpret our youths' role in their

own lives, their Church, their community, and their world. He has tried to help in the training of Adult Workers with Youth in the local Church through Christian Worker's Schools, Sub-District meetings, and local Church meetings. He answered the request of ten Christian Worker's Schools by teaching one of the following courses: Guiding Youth, Guiding Junior Highs, Guiding Seniors, or Missionary Education of Youth. The work of the Camp in its development and training also means many local Church contacts and informative meetings.

One fails to realize the number of hours that must be consumed in planning, discussing and carrying out effective programs. Along with these, your Director has tried to help counsel youth, MYFs, and adult workers. He has visited local Churches to help in the use of materials, to advise age groupings, to counsel on improving equipment, to help with the program planning, and to organize the MYFs.

The Director has given much time to the planning and training of adults for the Camping Program at PeCoMeth. He has assisted with Retreat Groups from local Churches at Camp. In addition, he has had the oversight of the 275 acres which compose the extent of our property. Since a new home was provided in June, more complete care and use of the facilities has been made possible.

New opportunities of serving youth through local, Sub-District, and Conference programs offer a challenging new dimension in serving future generations.

The first activity for our youth was the Annual Youth Conference held at St. Paul's Methodist Church, Wilmington, Delaware, under the direction of Reverend C. Edwin Lasbury. The Conference has a three-fold purpose; orienting youth on Conference Youth Council, and providing inspiration for a more complete commitment. Dr. Lowell Hazzard, Professor at Wesley Theological Seminary, gave an inspiring address on youth's responsibility in today's world.

In addition to the regular programs for junior and senior highs, the Conference Youth Council sponsored a senior work retreat. This new experience was enthusiastically received and accomplished a great deal of work. Reverend H. Kirby Krams and his staff helped to build two shelters and to make the barn area ready for the rustic camping program.

The Fall Youth Conference was held in St. John's Methodist Church in Fruitland, Maryland, under the direction of the Reverend Omro Todd. Dr. Ernest Griffith, Dean of the School of International Service, American University, spoke on 'A Christian's Responsibility in International Relations'. This helped the youth to see and assume their own responsibility in International affairs.

The Reverend Charles Covington was the leader of the United Nations Trip sponsored by the Conference Council. Sixty-six youth and adults attended. The group gained a better understanding of the work of the United Nations as well as visiting several large churches in New York City.

Since the Conference Youth Council voted to raise finances for the renovation of 'The Barn', this project has been of interest to young people in the churches and in sub-district activities. 'The Barn' area provides a small camp for 24 - 36 persons and may also serve as a retreat center for local

church MYFs. The goal for this project this year is \$3,000. Projects that have been held to raise this amount include: Bakes, Banquets, Fashion Shows, Candy Sales, Fruit Cake Sales, Religious Dramas, PeCoMeth Night, and the serving of dinners. The barn includes space for group meetings, dining area, kitchen, washroom facilities and sleeping quarters.

Camp Work

This summer we will observe our fifteenth year in Camping sponsored by the Peninsula Conference Board of Education of the Methodist Church. Only as we consider the 81,000 Methodists on the Peninsula can we begin to realize how many children, youth, and adults are unable to enjoy the experience of Christian Education out-of-doors which PeCoMeth offers. This year there will be over thirty-one planned sessions of camp that will give opportunity for training, fellowship, spiritual enrichment, and recreation. Continually we turn away persons who want to come to camp. Because of the lack of space and facilities we must say 'send in your registration early next year so that you will be sure to get in'. Requests come from local churches for the use of the camp for church picnics, but we have no facilities. Requests come for weekend retreats, but we can only take so many on a fall and spring basis as we have no winterized facilities. Plans have been drawn for the available 275 acres but the support of individuals, organizations of each church, and of the Conference is needed to meet the challenge of serving Christ and His church through the out-of-doors.

Adult Work

The Conference Director of Adult Work met with the District Directors at the Field Worker's Conference at Camp PeCoMeth, July 30 and 31. There it was agreed that our major emphasis for the year would be the training of leadership in the field of Adult Education. We made plans to recruit potential leaders and teachers to participate in the Coaching Conference on Leadership Education. Attendance of leaders at Worker's Schools and training opportunities to be held in the Conference during the coming months would also be encouraged.

We were fortunate in obtaining Dr. Robert R. Powell of Wesley Seminary to lead the adult workers leadership course on 'Understanding Adults' at the Coaching Conference. A very enthusiastic group of about 15 workers attended the course. Most of these workers have continued their preparation for teaching in district, sub-district, and local Christian Worker's Schools. Good reports have been received from courses they have taught. They will continue to form a pool of teachers and leaders for training schools.

The Young Adult Fellowship has been active on the Conference level and has given good leadership to District Work. Regular meetings of the Conference Young Adult Council have been held through the year, seeking to give effective leadership and to promote fellowship on district and local levels. The Wilmington District Council has been especially active and available for help to local groups.

The Young Adult Council is actively promoting the Annual Young Adult Weekend at Camp PeCoMeth, June 23-25. The theme will be 'Our

Role as Young Adults'. Bishop John Wesley Lord will speak to the group on Saturday. This weekend opportunity should be fully supported by local churches as they select and send representative young adults.

Great efforts are being made these days towards an understanding of adults, their needs and problems. National Conferences on the aging are bringing the best minds of the country to deal with needs and problems of growing old. We are increasingly recognizing the importance of using the facilities and resources of Christian Education in ministering to adults of all ages.

Our Conference educational program has only scarcely begun to touch these fields of opportunity and challenge. Your Conference Council of Adult Workers seeks your suggestions and help, and we want to become increasingly helpful to adults in the local Church.

Wesley Foundation

The Wesley Foundation program is Methodism's special ministry to students on college and university campuses, mainly at those institutions not church-related. No greater ministry challenges Protestantism today. In the Peninsula Conference your Board of Education, through its Church and Campus Relations Committee, is trying to meet this important challenge at three centers.

At the University of Delaware, in Newark, our interim chaplain, C. Chapman Herrman, Jr., has administered a varied program of worship, study, and fellowship at Wesley House. At Washington College in Chestertown, the Reverend William P. Kesmodel, has given substantial time and leadership to Wesley Foundation affairs. Your Board is steadily retiring the indebtedness on an excellent half-block of land immediately across from the college campus where a student center is to be erected eventually. At Salisbury State Teachers College, Mrs. Margaret Bloodworth is our Wesley Foundation counselor. It is expected that the new facilities which Asbury Church is erecting very near the campus will be of great assistance to the student work.

Many hundreds of young people from this area are attending these state-supported institutions, and to them our churches must look for leadership in the years ahead.

It is highly gratifying, therefore, to observe what a splendid record Peninsula Conference churches have established in recent years in paying so fully the thirty-cents-per-member apportionment for Wesley Foundation work. Few Conferences do as well and even fewer do any better. Methodism's interest in student work is not simply a concern to preserve future lay and clerical leadership when students return to their home parishes, but it remembers that like the rise of the Reformation under Luther, it was first born on a campus in Wesley's Holy Club. Through the Wesley Foundation, Methodism pays its debt to history and sows the seed of new revival for the years to come. Wherever minds are being stirred with truth, the greatest hope for new spiritual stirrings also lies.

The Board of Education Office

During recent months, the office of the Board of Education has undergone extensive renovations and improvements. The staff which makes its headquarters there is grateful for the improved conditions under which our work is done. A concerted effort has been made to encourage our ministers and laymen to visit the Board's office as there is much to be gained in this way. There are printed resources, the existence of which may not be generally known, which may prove to hold the very suggestions needed to solve a persistent problem. It will provide an opportunity for consultation on many matters related to Christian Education out of which significant results may occur. Let us urge you to write, call on the phone, or (but best of all) make a visit to the office of YOUR Board of Education. It is as you call upon us that we can render the fullest service.

Commission on Education

A recent conversation with one who has long been a leader in the affairs of another Conference in the field of Christian Education, made this highly significant statement: "Not much happens in a Church in Christian Education until the Commission on Education goes to work". Experience confirms this observation. We therefore urge greater effort at this point in the work of the church. Many Commissions are functioning well and are achieving important results. Far too many exist, however, in name only. Two documents published during the past year and already in the hands of our people need careful study as a basis for action. The manual for **The Commission on Education and Foundations for Christian Teaching in Methodist Churches**. Both of these are highly important for a good understanding of our task and we urge a thorough-going study of these materials.

Rally Day Offering

The Rally Day offering for Christian Education is the one appeal to the Churches made by our Board of Education during the year. While the Board may receive gifts for its work, dependence upon Rally Day remains the principal financial emphasis of the year. By arrangement with the Commission on World Service and Finance, the first six thousand dollars is allocated to the work of the Board of Education. All over six thousand is to be directed to the development of the facilities at Camp PeCoMeth.

Your continued support of this vital part of our work is most important. Increases would aid the development of our Camp and make possible an even wider program of camping and training of leadership. **One wonders if any Conference interest offers more return of direct aid to the local Church than the plans involved in the development of our Camp PeCoMeth?**

Full realization of what the foregoing means could have far-reaching results upon the investment the Church will make in the Rally Day offering.

The Fairmont Plan

A pilot project of the General Board of Education in Evangelism through the Church School called the Fairmont Plan has been in operation in the West Virginia Conference during recent months. The arrangement has been under study in the Peninsula Conference by representatives of

both the Boards of Education and Evangelism with the thought that these two Boards might jointly propose a similar undertaking in this Conference.

A study of the figures of our Peninsula Methodism should be sufficient to stir all of us to the need of awakening to the task of Christian Nurture and Evangelism. Though full of vitality and power, large areas of our Conference life are not awake to Christian responsibility and action. Many situations are 'sleeping giants' which need to be awakened to the full meaning of the Christian mission.

Evangelism and Education may have their own points of emphasis, but in reality they are a part of a whole. Evangelism must lead to Education, Education must lead to Evangelism. Personal commitment to Jesus Christ and His way in all of life must be the ultimate aim and goal of both Christian Education and Evangelism.

"Your Conference Board of Education, therefore, recommends that we adopt such a program as The Fairmont Plan as a Conference-wide effort in Evangelism through the Church School and that a joint committee of the Board of Evangelism and the Board of Education prepare the plans to be undertaken during the months of February, March, and April of the coming year."

INTERBOARD COMMITTEE ON CHRISTIAN VOCATIONS

The need to awaken ministers and laymen to aggressive action in support of a program of "Christian Vocation" is upon us. The urgency is revealed in the fact that the world-wide effective operation of our Church is threatened by the lack of qualified persons to fill the vocational opportunities already pressing us. Clergymen, Missionaries, Christian Educators, Administrators, etc. are needed in large numbers to fill the vacancies made by retirements, and the new offices created by the process of growth.

The above need is dependent upon an even greater need to awaken all Christian people to the principle of Christian Vocation operative within the life of every person committed to the Christian Faith. We all are called by God to give ourselves to the service of mankind in whatever way we can. Based on this prior call, qualified persons among us are asked to give full time to a vocation within the Church.

The Interboard Committee on Christian Vocations of The Peninsula Conference exists to satisfy the above needs, and works faithfully to enlist clergymen and laymen in recognizing the needs and their responsibility to work at the task of providing for them.

Through the cooperation of the District Superintendents, every local Church has been requested to set up a local Committee on Christian Vocations as provided for in the Discipline. Material outlining the work and function of this committee has been made available.

With the help of The Conference Board of Education, records are kept of all young people who have made commitments to some full time Church vocation. Some attempt is made to follow up these young people but the difficulties are great. It would take a full time guidance counsellor to do an effective job here. The best we can do is to alert the Pastors of these young people and furnish guidance and help through the Conference youth program. Mr. George Godfrey deserves commendation for his efforts in this area.

The Board of Ministerial Training and Qualifications cooperate with our Committee by providing a program of guidance for ministerial candidates. When persons come under the jurisdiction of this Board, they are removed from our records.

A Career Clinic for persons interested in Church Vocations was held in Harrington in April of this year. Sixty-three youth attended this Con-

ference-wide career workshop. Thirty-three of these committed themselves to full time Church work and planned to take the necessary training to qualify.

Career Clinics of general and specific nature have been held on district, sub-district and local church levels. The directory of church vocations entitled "Methodist Service Projects" has been widely distributed throughout the Conference. In some instances, copies of this directory have been placed in the hands of Public Education Vocation Guidance Counsellors.

We are certain that progress in the whole area of Christian Vocation: teaching the basic philosophy of Christian Vocation, enlisting a proper response from the people, and providing sufficient numbers of persons to study and train for full time positions within the Church, will be made when the local church officials take this matter seriously and work diligently at the whole task. We suggest, therefore, that on the local Church level some study be given to the following provoking questions:

1. In what way is a vocation within the Church different from one outside the Church?
2. Can young people be recruited for a Church Vocation or is this strictly a matter of a personal direct divine call?
3. How much direct influence should a clergyman or layman exert to persuade young people to commit themselves to a vocation within the Church?
4. At what age should such influence be brought to bear upon young people?
5. What are the factors of influence which lead persons to the point of decision?
6. What factors of influence cause young people to reject a Church vocation even though they may have the needed qualities?
7. What is the relation of professionalism among those in Church vocations and secularism among lay officials to the scarcity of candidates for Church vocations?
8. Does it take a special kind of family, local church, clergyman, etc. to produce ministers, missionaries and others needed to keep our Churches effective in their mission?
9. Does a clergyman have any responsibility to recruit young people for the ministry? For other Church vocations?
10. Do a local Church and lay officials have any obligation to find qualified candidates for the ministry? Missionary and Education personnel?
11. How concerned should each of us be about this problem?-
12. What steps can each of us take to solve it?

When our ministers and laymen find the right answer to questions like these and take action accordingly, we shall see a new day in the life of the Church. Laborers will be found for the harvest and an abundant life will be the fruit thereof.

Our deepest appreciation is given to all who have been helpful in working with us to develop an effective program of Christian Vocation.

REPORT OF THE CONFERENCE BOARD OF EVANGELISM

"Renewed Evangelistic Fervor"

There are signs of renewed evangelistic fervor among the Methodists of the Peninsula Conference. More inactive members are being won back to an active participation in the life of the Church, instead of being dropped from the rolls. More youth are being won to Christ, and many to full-time Christian vocations. More persons are being won to Christ, and to membership of His Church. There is an increase in the number of prayer and study groups. There seems to be a renewed interest in revivals and preaching missions. Some of the outstanding examples of unusually large attendance at such services were Sharptown, Red Lion, and the Dover District Preaching Mission in Laurel. And there are other signs, all of which are causing us to take a more optimistic and positive approach to the years we want to call "Decade of Dynamic Discipleship".

In the last decade, 1950 to 1960, the population of our geographical area rose percentage-wise almost three times as much as our Church Membership. It took us almost 20 Methodists to win 1. It is no wonder that we were disappointed with our record.

During this present decade, 1960 to 1970, we shall see the population of the United States rise to over 219 million people. Just to keep our present percentage of the population we shall have to gain over two million people. However, Methodists want to gain faster than the population. "Dynamic Disciples" will not be satisfied with a mere "holding their own", but will seek all the world for the glory of the Redeemer.

Some specific things the Board of Evangelism has done this past year to encourage evangelism are: the circulation of General Board evangelistic literature to ministers and Membership and Evangelism Commission Chairmen as far as our budget would allow. The General Board at Nashville no longer makes mailings to the local church of sample material. We have had representatives at certain important conclaves on evangelism: The Conference on Evangelism of the Northeastern Jurisdiction at Drew University; the National Council of Evangelism at Bloomington; and the Conference on Spiritual Life and Growth, sponsored by the General Board of Evangelism, at Ocean City, New Jersey. Also, we cooperated in the visitation by laymen and ministers at the Kingswood of Brookside Church, and in the Vocational Workshop conducted by the Board of Education at Harrington. The Board encouraged attendance at the Washington Area Conference in Washington, D. C., and through a conference-wide mailing to ministers and Commission on Membership and Evangelism Chairmen, emphasized the "Three Great Weeks for Christ" during Lent.

With cognizance of world tension and turmoil, and with some understanding of the awful threat to world peace posed by the inimical forces of East and West, the Board of Evangelism is sponsoring a Prayer Vigil for world peace during this conference session. The details will be announced from the conference floor.

At this conference session the Board of Evangelism has on display the newest materials from Tydings, The Upper Room, and Methodist Evangelistic Materials. It is hoped that ministers and laymen will avail themselves

of this opportunity to get better acquainted with these materials for devotion and evangelism. A member of the Board will be on hand to answer any questions about the material.

GOODWILL INDUSTRIES OF WILMINGTON

Bishop Lord and Members of the Conference:

In many respects, the past twelve months represent the best year in the long history of our local Goodwill Industries. Continuing the pattern of steady growth which has been characteristic of our work in recent years, good gains and increases were recorded in practically every phase of the agency's basic operations. In turn, the progress made in these operational areas was reflected in a larger and more effective service for handicapped people.

A total of 85 persons were employed during the year. As of the last payroll period of the year 65 persons were being employed on a regular daily basis. Ages of workers ranged from 18 to 80 years; 52 were male and 33 were female. Employment and training services were provided without regard to race, color or creed.

Handicapping conditions encountered during the year included a wide variety of both physical and mental disabilities. In many instances, the handicapping condition was the result of multiple physical disabilities or a combination of physical and mental disorders. In the largest majority of cases, the type of disabling condition was of such nature and degree of severity as to make employment in regular industry either non-feasible or completely impossible. Most workers employed during the year were considered to be either terminal cases or such as to require long term service. In a few cases it was possible to encourage and effect placement in regular competitive industry.

\$91,923 was spent for wages to handicapped workers during the year and represented 63% of the agency's total earned income. Opportunity wages to workers formed the most tangible and most readily measured benefit provided by the agency's program and, of course, were the chief concern of the handicapped persons served. Other benefits provided in-

cluded free life insurance, vacations with pay, sick leave and five paid holidays.

Continuing a long established emphasis on the importance of spiritual values in the lives of our handicapped workers, Chapel services were conducted three mornings each week from 8 to 8:30 a. m. Attendance at the services was entirely voluntary on the part of the workers and on many occasions visiting ministers and laymen representing various denominations participated in the services and brought our people helpful messages.

If the function of Goodwill Industries in the community and the hopes of the handicapped people the agency tried to serve during the past year could be summed up in one word, perhaps that one word could very well be "responsibility." Nothing finer can be said of a good citizen in the community than to say that he or she is a responsible person. Handicapped people too, despite the heavy physical and mental burdens they often carry, have every right to achieve for themselves the highest possible degree of responsibility as individuals, as parents, and as citizens in their communities. The true purpose of Goodwill Industries is to provide opportunities for as many such persons as possible to maintain themselves as responsible people. Useful and gainful employment is the basic element utilized by both agency and handicapped people in striving to reach this mutual goal.

Rather than being tax burdens on the community, Goodwill workers were taxpayers themselves during the past year. They paid a total of \$8,500.78 in Federal Withholding taxes; \$2,998.46 in Social Security payments; and \$582.80 in Delaware State income taxes. They not only supported themselves without help from welfare agencies but also, in many cases, provided support for large families as well.

Goodwill Industries was about 92% self-supporting during the year and about 99% of its total budget of \$148,000 went right back into the community in the form of wages and operating expense.

In concluding our report we would like to express our sincere thanks to the various Church groups in the Peninsula Conference who supported our work during the year with contributions of materials and other evidences of helpful interest. With the continued interest and active support of our large Church membership Goodwill Industries will continue its efforts to provide a bigger and better service during the year ahead and more nearly meet the ever increasing needs for its services.

HISTORICAL SOCIETY

As the Peninsula Conference Historical Society closes its fourth year as an incorporated body, we are pleased to make the following report.

The preservation and care of Barratt's Chapel has involved much of our attention. During the year, many activities have centered around the

Chapel. On November 13, we held a 176th Anniversary Service commemorating the administration of the Lord's Supper by legally recognized Methodist ministers in North America. Bishop John Wesley Lord was the guest speaker. Several fraternal orders have used the Chapel for worship services. In each case, a Methodist minister was in charge. Many church membership classes have visited the Chapel. An examination of the guest register reveals that we have had visitors from Europe, Canada, Mexico, Hawaii and practically every state in the nation.

We are pleased to report that the American Association of Historical Societies, through a grant from the Virginia Conference, has made available \$1,000 per year for the maintenance and preservation of Barratt's. The first stage of restoration has been completed. The interior has been completely redecorated; the walls and woodwork are restored to original colors. As money is received, the floors will be refinished and the exterior will be painted.

Further study has been given to the construction of a museum and small home at Barratt's. The need, as stated in last year's report, is just as pressing. Further studies have revealed that the joining of the two buildings as was suggested last year is not practical; therefore, the Board of Directors has approved an alternate plan which would separate the two buildings. The estimated cost of this structure constructed of brick will be \$25,000. The World Service and Finance Commission made a grant of \$5,000 in 1959 to be paid at a rate of \$1,000 per year for five years. This Commission earmarked the use of such monies for the construction of a house and museum.

Many attempts are being made to collect manuscripts, books, journals, Conference Minutes and other materials of historical interest. We are particularly desirous of obtaining a complete collection of the Maryland Conference of the Methodist Protestant Church and the Virginia Conference of the Methodist Episcopal South. Manuscripts, sermons, letters and old church records are quite welcome additions to our library.

A committee of three persons have been appointed to study the role of Peninsula Methodism in the Civil War. The members of this committee are Dr. Idabelle Thomas, the Rev. Charles Burge and Mr. John C. Darby.

A postcard depicting Barratt's Chapel is being prepared. This will be placed in the Chapel for distribution in the summer.

The president of the Society has been requested subject to the approval of the District Superintendent to appoint a research secretary for each district.

We submit the following recommendations:

1. We recommend that church membership records of closed churches be presented to the Historical Society for preservation and reference. We find that many records of closed churches are being lost.

2. We recommend that the Directors of the Historical Society be granted permission to construct a combination museum and home at Barratt's Chapel not to exceed \$25,000 in cost. Also that final plans be subject to the approval of the Bishop, cabinet and the executive committees of both the Historical Society and Commission on World Service and Finance.

3. We recommend that the Society be empowered to create an auxiliary group to the Historical Society to be known as "Friends of Barratt's" with a five dollar annual contribution for membership. Proceeds of sale of memberships to this group would be used toward the needs of the Chapel and the construction of the house and museum.

We request the approval of the above recommendations.

We close this report by saying that your guidance, suggestions and help are always appreciated.

HOMES FOR THE AGED OF THE PENINSULA ANNUAL CONFERENCE OF THE METHODIST CHURCH, INC.

We cannot begin this report without giving thanks to our Heavenly Father for his providence and guidance. We are also deeply grateful to our fellow clergymen and to hundreds of laymen who by their deep concern, generous gifts and services have made possible The Methodist Country House. To some of us the creation of this house designed to provide a Christian Home for our aged is a miracle in our time. Much has been accomplished but there is still much more yet to be done. We covet your prayers, your constant concern and your continued support.

On March 6, 1959, ground-breaking exercises were conducted and on September 26, 1959, the cornerstone was laid. On September 7, 1960, with an appropriate but simple ceremony the doors of The Country House were opened and fifteen guests were received. An impressive consecration service was held in the Danby Memorial Chapel on September 30, 1960. Our own Bishop John Wesley Lord made the consecration address, consecrating The Methodist Country House to the purpose for which it was created.

The General Board of Hospitals and Homes has been most helpful in the growth and development of The Methodist Country House. We deeply appreciate all they have done for us, and they rejoice with us that The Country House is now filled to overflowing. By faith we ventured forth raising the first dollar; by faith we ventured forth to find our first guest, and the Lord has rewarded our many efforts. We now have a sizable waiting list of those who want to join the 161 happy people who call The Methodist Country House their home.

During the last eight months we have had a large number of visitors. Some came out of pure curiosity; some came because they thought the reports they had heard of The Country House were highly exaggerated. They have all beheld that which the Lord has made possible and many of them have stood with us in awe and reverence. When we think back over these last two years of actual construction, we are completely amazed at the faithfulness of our Heavenly Father. We say amazed at His faithfulness . . . we, of course, should not be amazed, for His promises never fail.

Finances—The treasurer's report indicates that there is a balance due on our mortgage held by the Wilmington Savings Fund Society of \$1,467,883.69. This obviously represents a reduction from the ceiling of

\$1,500,000. We wish that we might have reduced the balance to a greater degree, but up to the present that has not been possible. We have in unpaid pledges \$160,770 and \$80,323.67 in Founders' Gifts. Thus, when these items are received, our indebtedness can be reduced by a like amount.

The Endowment Fund—The Finance Committee has deemed it the part of wisdom to begin even in a small way, an Endowment Fund. A small sum of money is currently being deposited each month in a savings account, which monies are received from payments on mortgages held at the present by The Methodist Country House. We have recently learned of some monies that will be left to us through the medium of wills, not only from non-residents of The Country House, but from guests as well. There has not been, nor should there ever be any pressure put upon our guests to remember us in their wills. What has been done to the present has been the result of gratitude to The Country House.

Anticipated Deficit—When The Methodist Country House was planned, it was anticipated that we would operate at an annual deficit, this deficit being caused by the fact that we would adjust downward the continuing monthly expenses of a fairly large percentage of our guests. This has been done. Instead of adjusting downward 25% of our guest capacity as we anticipated, we have cared for approximately 40%. Herein lies a major part of our ministry. Surely no one wants The Country House to exclude from membership those without sizable incomes. We feel that we have a very definite command from the Lord, not only to preach, to teach, to heal, but to help bind up the wounds of life and to render a ministry to many in the sunset years of their lives. However, there is a limit to the ability of any organization to give and give without refilling the coffers.

Through the **Mother's Day** appeal the Board of Lay Activities hopes that the offering this year will amount to at least \$25,000. Last year the giving was very disappointing, having resulted in only \$10,060.58. While \$25,000 would be a tremendous increase over \$10,060.58, it is still not enough to take care of the ministry of The Methodist Country House. Realizing the need for increased revenue, we have discussed with Bishop Lord and with the District Superintendents the methods used in other annual conferences to care for our type of ministry. It is hoped that an organization could be formed by the representatives of the Board of Hospitals and Homes in each local church so that through the year emphasis could be placed upon the need of The Methodist Country House, including perhaps an annual roll call, all becoming part of the Mother's Day Offering. If we could realize an average of \$1.00 per member for each member of the Peninsula Annual Conference on Mother's Day, we would then be able to care for our guests who have been accepted on an adjusted basis.

Ministry of The Methodist Country House—As one walks the corridors of The Country House and meets its residents, it is quite obvious that within its walls are to be found some very happy people . . . people who have come from various backgrounds but who have adjusted beautifully to a new situation and who we believe feel that they are important and

necessary to the success of The Methodist Country House. We remember what our Resident Bishop said at the consecration services in the Danby Memorial Chapel, September 30, 1960, "The administration must constantly endeavor to keep foremost in its thinking the health and happiness of the guests."

Our guests are happy and radiant persons. Some came to The Country House with heavy burdens but through the warmth and friendliness, the care and consideration of others, they have found new joy and peace. This did not just happen by chance but through the planned and thoughtful efforts of those who day after day share the responsibility of management.

At the very center of the ministry of The Methodist Country House is its spiritual emphasis, which centers in the Danby Memorial Chapel. As the staff and guests gather from time to time in this lovely sanctuary there is felt the presence of the Holy Spirit, faith is renewed, hearts are uplifted and joy and peace is received. In the very lovely Brinton Memorial Dining Room, our guests enjoy excellent meals served in a most attractive environment. The Woodcock Memorial Library, the lounge rooms, the cook nooks, game rooms, all lend to enjoyable gracious living in The Country House.

Infirmary—One of the most important areas of our ministry is that of medical care. Doctor John W. Barnhart, who heads the Medical Department of The Methodist Country House, is with his staff doing an excellent piece of work. He has the ability to make people feel at ease, and the nurses are giving all necessary care. The Infirmery, although operated as economically as possible, is nevertheless an expensive department. We are sincerely appreciative of the fine services rendered by Doctor Barnhart.

The Future—When The Methodist Country House was planned, it was thought that some day we might like to have a family of perhaps 200 members. With this in view, wise engineering provided a large enough boiler and power capacity to add, if and when needed, an additional wing. Just when that time shall come we cannot now be sure. We are sure that it will come. We simply wish you to know that forethought in the original planning will make it possible. At the present we are concentrating on rendering an effective ministry in the lovely building which by the grace of God we now have and also in the continuing task of reducing the mortgage and balancing the operating budget. We need your prayers and your financial assistance.

We are grateful for the fine service of our Executive Director, the Reverend George H. Piguero, Jr., and our Associate Executive Director, the Reverend William H. Owens. Through their constant labors, foresight and wise planning, The Methodist Country House is adequately and well managed. Their loyalty, their fine spirit and their many acts beyond the call of duty merit our appreciation.

We are thankful for a fine Board of Trustees, for our Honorary Trustees, for our Special Consultants and for many others who have contributed service and financial aid to The Methodist Country House.

We appreciate the fine work of our Standing Committees, and their chairmen, Mr. J. Wallace Watson, Mr. Carroll W. Griffith and Dr. John N. Link.

We are grateful for our treasurer, Mr. Ernest du Pont, Jr., who has given generously of his time, his talent and his possessions to a cause to which we believe he is so totally committed. We should also like to thank Mr. Arthur S. Reed, Jr., who works with Mr. du Pont as our accountant.

We are indebted to our Conference Board of Hospitals and Homes, the Reverend Hartwell F. Chandler, Chairman, and to our General Board for their guidance and assistance. We wish to thank our Conference Board of Lay Activities for their promotion of the Mother's Day Offering.

We are thankful for and greatly indebted to our Resident Bishop, Bishop John Wesley Lord, for his wise counsel and the many services he has rendered to The Methodist Country House. During the past year as in other years the District Superintendents have been most helpful and encouraging.

We are also mindful of many men and women who across the years have been helpful in making possible a ministry for our aged. Our thanks and gratitude to them and to all who now and in the future share in the continuing task that is ours.

Most of all, we are grateful to our Heavenly Father. We pray that His will may be known to us and that we shall be faithful to Him.

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BOARD OF HOSPITALS AND HOMES

The Board of Hospitals and Homes of the Peninsula Conference officially organized for the Quadrennium at its meeting in Wesley Methodist Church, Dover, Delaware, June 28, 1960. Officers elected were: Rev. H. F. Chandler, Chairman; Rev. A. B. Golden, Vice-Chairman; Mrs. Milton C. Manlove, Secretary.

This Board represents the healing and helping ministry of our Conference and is constantly seeking ways and means of promoting the institutions that are so engaged. From the Annual Report of the Executive Secretary of the National Board of Hospitals and Homes comes the information that the Methodist Church has seventy-six hospitals, one hundred and twelve homes for older persons, forty-nine agencies for childrens care, representing a total investment of \$534,994,863.00. These are just cold statistics, but they represent the channel through which thousands of consecrated workers can exercise their efforts remembering that Jesus has said, "Greater love hath no man than this that man lay down his life for his friends". Your Conference Board has studied matters that have been called to its attention regarding the health of our people and the care of our children and our senior citizens. As an advisory group we have sought to promote the interests of our Board of Child Care and the Methodist Country House through the Christmas and Mother's Day Offerings. It is our feeling that more support for both of these offerings should be secured. It is the place where every Methodist in our Conference can directly participate in this good work. Even \$1.00 per member as a gift to the Methodist Country House is not too much to ask or expect from our Conference. This should be our goal. A minimum of \$25,000.00 should be the goal for our Christmas Offering for the Board of Child Care. Let us try to do this this Conference Year.

We recommend to the Conference that:

1. Every church designate one steward as a Hospitals and Homes Steward. (This is required by the 1960 Discipline—Paragraphs 143. 14; 278. 3; 274. 1 and 3).
2. This Steward as an ex-officio member of the Commission on Social Concerns, or as Chairman of the Local Committee on Hospitals and Homes, together with the Lay Leader, assist the Pastor to develop strong support in each church for both the special Conference Offerings.
3. Continued and increased sharing in the Christmas Offering for the Board of Child Care and the Mother's Day Offering for the assistance of those unable to pay their way at the Methodist Country House.
4. Local churches seek to inform their people by arranging for groups of their members to visit both the Children's Center at Rockdale, Baltimore County, and the Methodist Country House in Wilmington, Delaware.
5. That a separate listing be made in the Conference Journal of the Trustees of the Methodist Country House and the Peninsula Conference members on the Board of Child Care.

REPORT OF THE CONFERENCE BOARD OF LAY ACTIVITIES

In the first year of the quadrennial period 1960-1964, the Board of Lay Activities has endeavored to accept its responsibility in the many areas of concern, but with particular emphasis on a program of information to the laymen of the local churches, with regard to their duties and responsibilities. A further effort has been made to strengthen the leadership of Methodist Men's organizations in the local church through the means of periodic visits by the District and Associate District Lay Leaders, who will confer and offer suggestions to the officers, and advise them concerning the real purpose of Methodist Men. This being to enlist the manpower of Methodism and thus become a clearinghouse for the talents of men in the program of the local church.

The ultimate goal is a Methodist Men's organization in every charge in the Conference. However, only 58% of the charges as of this date, are now organized. Only four new groups have been chartered during this Conference year. However, it is our belief that the definite activating of the existing groups into a more realistic purpose for their existence will be very beneficial in the years ahead for the organizing of new groups.

The Twelfth Annual Retreat for Methodist Men was held again this year at Camp Pecometh, September 10 and 11, 1960. The program was directed toward informing the laymen of the local churches the various Conference interests, plus additional information concerning Methodist Men. The attendance was encouraging and we believe that each person left the Retreat a more informed and dedicated individual with regard to his duties and responsibilities within the local church.

Laymen's Day was observed in the local churches again on October 16, 1960. We believe this is becoming an annual occasion in many of the churches, however, there are still those who have not yet joined in with this nationally recognized day. May we please urge that the pastor and laymen cooperate toward the objective—a layman in each pulpit of Methodism on Laymen's Day in 1961.

The Ninth Annual Assembly, Northeastern Jurisdiction, Board of Lay Activities, was held in Atlantic City, New Jersey, October 21, 22 and 23, 1960, at The Ambassador Hotel. A total of eighteen were in attendance from our Conference. These assemblies are for Conference, District and Associate District Lay Leaders. Church Lay Leaders and Officers of Methodist Men's Organizations also attend. The wives are also invited to accompany their husbands to these assemblies, as the program is so arranged that they will not feel left out. Workshops and discussion groups were held on many subjects of interest to all that had a desire to become more informed about their duties and responsibilities in whatever capacity they may be serving the church, either on a local or district level. The Assembly Theme was "Christ Leads Into The New Quadrennium". Plan now to attend the Tenth Assembly which will be held again in Atlantic City, New Jersey, Ambassador Hotel, October 20, 21 and 22, 1961.

It was the good fortune and privilege for the Four Districts of our Conference, to have as guest speaker, Bishop John Wesley Lord, of The Washington Area, on the occasion of their Annual Laymen's Banquets. All those in attendance will long remember the challenging message, and the

manner in which it was directed toward the laymen. It is my firm belief, that as a result of some twelve hundred laymen throughout the Conference having the opportunity to hear this challenge, that our program of Lay Activities has been accepted and moved forward with a greater degree of enthusiasm and interest.

The Board of Lay Activities accepted a new challenge this year. The need was called to our attention for an increase in the free-will offerings that are taken in the local churches for the Board of Child Care at the Christmas Season and on Mother's Day for the Methodist Country House. Thus recognizing our responsibility to the Board of Child Care of The Baltimore Annual Conference, which is the Official Child Caring Agency of The Peninsula Conference, we accepted the challenge to promote the Christmas Offering, and established as a minimum goal \$25,000.00. We likewise established a minimum goal of \$25,000.00 for our promotional efforts of the Mother's Day Offering. The details for the promotion of both these projects were completed by an appointed committee from The Board of Lay Activities, meeting with the Executive Director of the Board of Child Care and The Methodist Country House. The results of our efforts are not known at the writing of this report, however this information should be available at the end of the Conference year, April 30th. Also, it may be possible to render a preliminary report concerning the Mother's Day offering at the Annual Conference session.

Yearly a series of Communion Breakfasts for the laymen are held in each of the counties of the Dover, Easton and Salisbury Districts. The total attendance is approximately 2,500. The offering from these breakfasts is given as direct contribution to the Board of Child Care from the laymen of the Peninsula Conference. The Wilmington District Communion Breakfasts are held in a different manner, in cooperation with the Federation of Men's Bible Classes.

The Third National Conference of Methodist Men will be at Purdue University, Lafayette, Indiana, July 14, 15 and 16, 1961. The purpose of such a conference is to inform, train, encourage creative thinking, and deepen the spiritual life of the laymen. The Theme, "Manpower With God's Power Builds The Church". Fellowship with the expected 5,000 Men of Methodism will make you more fully aware of the great power The Methodist Men can become in the life of the laymen and the program of the local church. Complete details necessary for registration are available at this Conference session.

This report could not be concluded without expressing our sincere thanks and appreciation to Bishop Lord for the interpretation and presentation of our responsibilities as laymen in the church. It was done in such manner that it generated a most urgent desire to cooperate and carry forward with enthusiasm the Lay Activities program. Also, the wise counsel and participation of the District Superintendents in our activities has been most gratifying. Our grateful thanks is extended to the District Lay Leaders: John Rogers, Dover District; Dr. Vincent Eareckson, Easton District; Maurice Hancock, Salisbury District; and Thomas Lodge, Wilmington District. Also, to the Associate District Lay Leaders much credit must be given. Together these gentlemen have accepted the challenge and have

been responsible for the presenting of the Lay Activities program in the district, county and local church level.

Finally to the laymen and ministers of the local churches we are most appreciative of their cooperation and the spirit of enthusiasm with which the Lay Activities program has been accepted. Any accomplishments that we have made could not have come about without their wholehearted support. No, our work has not been finished. All objectives have not been completed, nor have all goals been reached. Likewise it was with the Master when He was among us, His work was not finished. Into our hands he placed a trust and responsibility—that is to take His message into all parts of the world.

We dedicate ourselves to a continued effort in this most privileged opportunity.

THE BOARD OF MINISTERIAL TRAINING AND QUALIFICATIONS

The vitality of the church is completely dependent upon the commitment of our young men to the call of the ministry. A burning zeal and earnest desire to face the challenge of this age head on and attack the corrupted values of a social order unable to rise out of a senseless routine are essential characteristics of a good minister. H. G. Wells in the "Croquet Player" gives vivid portrayal of a complacent age, "I don't care. The world may be going to pieces. The Stone Age may be returning. This may, as you say, be the sunset of civilization. I'm sorry, but I can't help it this morning. I have other engagements. All the same—laws of the

Medes and Persians—I am going to play croquet with my Aunt at half past twelve today.” To this world the Christian minister must bring a message that lifts people from the common place to the pinnacle of divine service.

Your Board of Ministerial Training and Qualification feels under heavy responsibility to see that every man entering this Conference be encouraged to live up to his fullest potential. We are aware of the heavy demands that will be made on each man. Demands that require emotional stability, intellectual alertness, and spiritual maturity. In order to assure these qualities your Board has established certain procedures and policies for all the men under its supervision during their period of candidacy. The purpose of this report is to bring these items to your attention for your evaluation and constructive criticism.

I. The Disciplinary Requirements

Thanks to the work of the previous Board of Ministerial Training and Qualifications, these disciplinary requirements are presented in the booklet “Steps Into The Methodist Ministry.” This booklet has been edited in accordance with the 1960 Discipline and is available from the office of our Registrar.

II. Candidate Interviews

Every candidate will be interviewed by the entire Board. Notices will be sent as to date, time, and place. The general scope of the interview will include the educational plans of the candidate, his personal philosophy concerning education and general preparation for the ministry. The Board is interested in the development of the whole personality in terms of leisure time activities, special interests, and hobbies. Other phases of the interview include the interpretation of the call to preach, the definition of the mission of the church and a brief description of the individual's personal devotional experience.

III. Candidate Counseling

The Board feels under obligation to be constantly available to these men as a friend and counsellor. We are not an examining board as much as we are a training board. Each man has been assigned a sponsor from the board membership to be the confidant and guide to these men as they serve the local parish. Problems can be shared and solutions sought as the more experienced men guide the candidate through some of the difficult areas or unique situations that might exist in the local church.

If the candidate has personal problems that are beyond the understanding of the individual sponsor, the Board has arranged for the services of a consulting psychiatrist who will be available without charge to the candidate. All findings or counseling given through this program will be confidential and will not be a part of the candidate's record. We suspect that this service will be used rather infrequently, but we feel that the Conference should be aware of its availability.

IV. Candidate Examination

Each candidate will be required to have a series of psychological tests which will be used to evaluate his fitness for the Christian ministry. The tests will be given by a competent psychologist who will turn the results over to the Board's psychiatric consultant. This consultant will then determine the need for further interviews, additional counsel or any other course of action that might be deemed necessary. Once again all these procedures will be administered in the frame of one specific goal, namely, the desire on the part of this Board to help every individual candidate receive the best in guidance and instruction in order that his fullest potential will be a part of the ministry of this Conference.

V. Candidate Orientation

Each year at Annual Conference there will be a banquet for the Board members, the candidates and their wives and other guests who will be vitally interested in the progress of these men. The emphasis will be two fold, inspiration and fellowship. Speakers will be chosen who will give additional incentive to our candidates. Secondly, we feel that there is an important need to interpret to these men the great Christian fellowship of the clergy. Too often in the busy parish life we forget the human need for friendship and understanding. The clergyman's life by its very nature can be lonely and frustrating. Yet within this fellowship these men will develop long-standing friendships and sympathetic appreciation for each others problems. We desire that these candidates are warmly welcomed into the creative fellowship of Methodist clergymen and that they might realize we are all together in the great task of the Christian church.

VI. Candidate Recruiting

Every minister in this Conference is by his relationship to his community a recruiter for the church. The minister's attitude toward his people, his church and job will either win young men to the church or alienate them. Too often the ministry is painted as an unrewarding, never-ending job with the minister battering his people with endless complaints about how hard he works, how busy he is, how many problems he has, and how underpaid he is. Yet all of us who know the ministry in its real sense are aware of its challenges and opportunities. Challenges to change the lives of people and opportunities to change the world. God forbid that self-pity or self-indulgence would ever prevent any minister of this Conference from interpreting in enthusiastic radiance the joys of the Christian ministry. This Board will have no function unless you challenge your young people to face up to the call of the Christian ministry.

VII. Conclusion

This first year for your new Board has been stimulating and exciting. Thanks to the fine work of John Bunting, past president, and William Revelle, past registrar, the transition between the two Boards has been made without problems or complications. We hope that all members of

this Conference will feel that we are truly representing you in this important function. If you have any constructive suggestions please make them to any member of the Board, for we want to do the best in the task that has been set before us.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF MISSIONS

The Board of Missions has met three times during this past Conference year, and there have been three additional meetings of the Executive Committee. The president and secretary of the Board have met frequently in order to keep in touch with developments. There have been many major challenges during the year and we have seen the need for expanding operations in many areas. But as usual we have been attempting to do big things on a small budget. Not only have we been concerned with things here within our own Conference area, but we are cognizant of our responsibility in the matter of world-wide outreach of the Gospel of Jesus Christ.

1. Cultivation

The responsibility of missionary education and cultivation falls largely upon our Conference Missionary Secretary, the Rev. Ira E. Doyle, and his four capable District Missionary Secretaries, the Rev. John Irwin, Dover; the Rev. Harold Nunemaker, Easton; the Rev. James Von Hagel, Salisbury; and the Rev. D'Arcy Littleton, Wilmington. As usual, these men, under Mr. Doyle's leadership have done an outstanding piece of work. They began to plan at the Silver Bay Conference last Summer when they met with the District Superintendents, officers of the Conference Board, and members of the General Board. In the Fall of the year the active work began in the Group Quarterly Conferences and the District Conferences. Here some member of the Cultivation Team was busy either training members of the Commissions on Missions in the local church or presenting some aspect of our work.

Later in the year Missionary Rallies were held which were very well attended and did a thorough job of informing and inspiring our people.

In January three Missionaries from the Belgian Congo were in our Conference and spoke to nearly 4000 persons in various church meetings in addition to valuable contacts made in the public schools. We cannot begin to estimate the impact of these contacts.

Also under the work of cultivation, the film library service is an integral part. The conference missionary secretary also has charge of this work and as he has reported, it is an increasing thing, and very helpful.

So, you can see, as far as this phase of our task is concerned, we are moving forward. The men involved are doing a marvelous job, and real progress is being made.

2. Special Projects

We are still maintaining our interest and concern for the church within the city, the Inner-City church. As we know, while growth in suburbia has been tremendous and the movement of the church to these areas is vital, we still must not neglect the people still residing within the city. Your Board of Missions has an Urban Life Committee which is aware of these matters, and especially under the leadership of the Wilmington District Superintendent and this committee, we will be working on these matters. For instance we will have our representatives at the Urban Life Convocation at St. Louis next year.

We continue to have other special projects carried on through the years and still necessary and important in various areas of the Conference. An example is our aid in the Migrant Ministry in both Maryland and Delaware.

3. Church Extension

In the past few years the Board has been vitally concerned with the acquisition of new sites for churches. One of the items that should be in our budget is a sum ear-marked for the purchase of land as needs and opportunities arise. Sometimes opportunities arise where we should secure some valuable site, but we often have no funds available for such a purchase. Time is often of the essence in these matters.

You are aware that we have been aided, or will assist in the purchase of sites at East Salisbury, Centreville, Stanton, Denton and other places as well.

Under our leadership, last Summer an extensive survey was taken in the East Salisbury area to discover the potential available for a new church. What our surveyor found was staggering—more Methodists than any other group, and the majority of them interested in attending a new Methodist Church in that area. As a result of this survey, guess-work has been eliminated. We know what is there, and that a new church is needed there. At this session of our Conference a minister will be appointed there, a parsonage has been secured which at first will double as living quarters and a meeting place. And the Methodist churches of Salisbury have been asked to support this new project in every possible way.

We are all very much aware of the strategic place occupied in these situations by the District Superintendent. He sees the situation and its possibilities first, and then with the local pastor and laity the project is begun. Your Board of Missions then comes on the scene to help wherever possible.

I do feel, as was suggested in last year's report, that the time has definitely come when we must reduce our out-right grants to all of these expanding situations because our funds are so seriously limited. We need very definitely to pursue the matter of making loans now instead of out-right gifts.

We very definitely need some type of work to be developed in the Fenwick Island area, particularly in the Summer-time. We feel that if some kind of a building or tabernacle could be developed there, it would

be serving many people who are there for say three or four months in the year. This work could very well be placed under the jurisdiction of one of the nearby charges, namely Selbyville. And it would have wonderful value in public relations for the Methodist Church, but chiefly would be advancing the cause of Christ in a needed area.

Some of us on this Board feel we should form some kind of an organization to which people all over the conference could belong and pay, let us say, \$10.00 per year, letting this money be used to help start new churches of the area as they are needed.

And the writer of this report, your chairman, very definitely feels that the Board of Missions should be authorized to purchase some kind of a prefabricated Church or Chapel that could be used on various sites in the Conference as new churches are needed. This would enable a congregation to get started by having some place at once to meet instead of having to meet in an ill-located place with not enough attractiveness about it to draw the people. Something like this could be secured for \$25,000.00 or under, and be available as the need would arise. And believe me, that need is here now in several locations, and new ones are constantly arising.

4. Recommendations

1. That the month of February be designated as Missionary Cultivation Month.
2. That the Rev. Ira E. Doyle be appointed Conference Missionary Secretary.
3. That we reiterate our belief and support of the 1954 Survey Report printed in last year's Conference Minutes.

5. Conclusion

This is my first year on the Board of Missions. I feel I was rather set-upon by the members of the Board as last June I went into my first meeting and wound up as president before the meeting was over. As you have seen, there is much I have to learn about these matters. I sincerely appreciate the patience and courtesy of the Cabinet and the other members of the Board. I shall try to learn the work and be of better service. Suffice it to say that because I believe in Christ, I know the necessity of Missions in all of its aspects. We ask your prayers and support.

THE REPORT OF THE BOARD OF PENSIONS

The Board of Pensions met regularly during the past conference year striving to maintain the high standards previously established for its stewardship.

Under the guidance of Lionel D. Edie Company, our investment counselor, our diversified portfolio of high-grade securities has experienced a very gratifying market performance.

As required, a copy of the audit of the year ending April 30, 1960, will be published in the Journal. Our very efficient Treasurer, Mr. Ira S. Pruitt will present his report for the current conference year, subject to audit.

To correct an inconsistency created by the fact that some retired ministers are receiving a quarter of a year credit for services rendered prior to Methodist unification, pensions of other eligible ministers have been adjusted so that all eligible for this credit are receiving it. In adopting this report, it is assumed that the Conference approves of this action and authorizes this procedure as its policy.

We report with deep appreciation the receipt of the following legacies: \$1,000 from the Estate of Peter H. Overdeer; \$300 from the Estate of Ella N. Yingling, and \$237.05 representing the final distribution from the Estate of Edgar F. Haynes.

Pursuant to the instructions of the previous Peninsula Annual Conference an important responsibility of the Board during the year was obtaining the details of the hospital and medical expense program for ministers and lay employees of The Methodist Church being formulated by the General Board of Pensions. Through the excellent co-operation of Dr. Calkins your Board was kept on notice constantly as the plan progressed. Immediately upon adoption, the details of the plan were presented to your Board by Rev. Lyle A. Weed of the General Board of Pensions in person. The plan, as outlined by Rev. Weed, was approved in principle by your Board for recommendation to The Commission on World Service and Finance. At a joint committee meeting, attended by two appointed representatives of Board of Pensions, two members of The Commission on World Service and Finance, and a representative of the Cabinet, the General Board of Pension Plan was presented with your Board's recommendation and compared with an alternative plan. The two plans were compared later at a special meeting of your Board and their recommendation was reaffirmed.

We recommend for approval of the Annual Conference that the Rev. Larry Renner be granted an annuity for nine years service in our conference and also recommend that the widow of Lloyd Townsend be granted an annuity for the years of service of her husband when his years of service have been verified.

On the basis of studies made of anticipated income from all sources for the coming year an increase of \$4.00 in the annuity rate to \$67.00 for the conference year of 1961-62 is recommended to the Conference.

THE REPORT OF THE RADIO, TELEVISION & FILM COMMISSION

Perhaps one of the most notable achievements that has been accomplished this year by the Radio, Television and Film Commission of the Peninsula Conference is simply the fact that we have been able to organize, elect officers, meet regularly and become active.

The officers are: The Rev. Olin J. Shockley, Chairman; The Rev. Walter Stone, Vice Chairman; and The Rev. Frank Lucia, Secretary and Treasurer. The Commission consisted of the following members: The officers. The Rev. R. Jervis Cooke, The Rev. Ira Doyle, Mrs. Walter Palmer, Dr. Gene Adrian, The Rev. Roland Ferris, The Rev. Joseph B. Dickerson, Mr. Thomas Maguire and Mr. John W. Downing.

During the year each Radio Station in our Conference area has been contacted in person or by letter offering our services as a Commission in their Religious Programming, making known to them the available prepared programs and requesting from them a detailed account of their religious programs.

The following is a list of the stations in our Conference area: WBOC—Salisbury; WJDY—Salisbury; WETT—Ocean City; WSUX—Seaford; WJWL—Georgetown; WKSB—Milford; WDOV—Dover; WKEN—Dover; WILM—Wilmington; WTUX—Wilmington; WAMS—Wilmington and WDEL—Wilmington.

We found that by and large each of the stations were willing to incorporate more religious programming into their schedules but had found a lack of interest and support on the part of responsible clergymen. The Commission sincerely hopes that more of our Methodist clergy will catch the spirit of the tremendous opportunity that is ours to witness for Jesus Christ through the medium of radio.

This past summer the Commission sent the Rev. Richard S. Bailey, the Rev. Roland Ferris and the chairman to Hartford, Connecticut, for a four-day training session in Audio-Visuals. These men are available for Leadership Training Sessions, that are sponsored by the Board of Education, to teach the course on A-V in the local church.

The 1960 General Conference has given permissive legislation providing for a local church A-V Committee. Once this commission is activated in each local church, then its chairman and the pastor will be the contact between the Conference Trafco and the local church. Helps for this local church A-V Commission can be found each month in The Methodist Story. The names of the local church A-V chairmen should be forwarded to the Reverend Frank Lucia in Camden, Delaware.

The ten-week series of messages for the Methodist Protestant Hour this year were delivered by the Rev. Dr. Robert Goodrich, Jr., pastor of the First Methodist Church in Dallas, Texas, and was heard over Station WKSB in Milford, and WAMS in Wilmington.

Perhaps our major concern this coming Conference year will be a dinner meeting, sponsored by the General Trafco, early in the fall to present the plans for a new Children's TV Series that is ready to be produced as soon as General Trafco can receive necessary funds from the local church. It has been suggested that each local church could as an extra give an equivalent of \$.05 per member towards this work. It has been further suggested that perhaps an offering at each local Vacation Bible School could be taken and used for this missionary evangelistic cause.

Secondly, we will seek to place Talk Back on a TV Station in our Conference area or in cooperation with the Baltimore Conference on a station in that area that is able to serve both Conferences. It may be of

interest to the local A-V Commission that the Talk Back Program as a series or singular program is now available to the local church through your local Cokesbury Store in Baltimore.

Thirdly, to appoint a representative of Conference Trafco in each district to serve as a liaison officer between our Conference and the local radio stations and to be available in aiding the local church A-V Commission in the field or in the realm of Radio, Television and Film.

Fourthly, to place Church World News on each local radio station under Methodist sponsorship.

Finally, to hold a one-day training session at some centrally located spot for ministers in the field of radio and television presentations and Audio-Visuals. Resource personnel from Nashville will be available.

As members of the Radio, Television and Film Commission, we covet your prayers, suggestions and support. In turn, we offer our services and pray that they may be used to tell others of Jesus and His gift of salvation and abundant living and that through these mediums of communication the on-going work of Christ and His Kingdom and the Methodist Church might be enhanced.

TOWN AND COUNTRY COMMISSION

The Town and Country Commission has given thoughtful study to its role and responsibility in the guidance of our rural churches on our four districts. We continue to seek information which can be relayed to our town and country churches to aid them in the promotion of stewardship, education, evangelism, and a new awareness of their important roles in the changing patterns of civilization on our Peninsula and throughout the entire world.

The Commission made another mailing this year to church lay leaders: a copy of the pamphlet "Peninsula Conference Standards for the Parsonage Home." These pamphlets are being used by laymen as a guide for parsonage improvements. The Commission is pleased with the results of this mailing.

On October 4th, 1960, 3 of the Commission members attended the Jurisdictional Town and Country Workshop at Sky Lake, N. Y. These members will be available as resource people to any Town and Country church in our Conference. The next Jurisdictional Conference will be held in the West Virginia Area in 1962.

The Chairman of the Town and Country Commission, Harold E. Nunemaker, has been invited to speak to the Wyoming Conference at Kingstons, Pa. on May 11, 1961. He has been asked to share his experiences and

observations gained during his 5 years as Associate Pastor and Pastor on the Cecil United Parish. This particular plan of the Group Ministry has created a great deal of interest in the Wyoming Conference and it is possible that our success here will be repeated there. The present Chairman and the former chairman, Perry O. Hill, also appeared before the Cabinet of Baltimore Conference a year ago to discuss this Group Ministry Plan with them. We feel that much of the value of Jurisdictional Conferences comes from this type of discussion and the adoption of these plans by other conferences. We are happy that our Commission is able to give guidance to the other conferences. We believe that this type of Group Ministry or some other type of Group work may well be the answer to some of our own problems in some areas of this Peninsula Conference.

During the coming year the Town and Country Commission will continue to explore possible programs designed to strengthen our town and country churches. We will also continue to contact any local churches that are interested in such projects as the Lord's Acre Plan, The Lord's Hour Plan and other plans which will strengthen our stewardship.

The Town and Country Commission recommends the appointment of Willard Robinson, Jr. as the Secretary of Town and Country Work for the coming year.

The Town and Country Commission also recommends that the addresses of all laymen on Boards and Commissions of the Conference and the addresses of all Lay Leaders be published in the Official Journal of the Conference.

REPORT OF TRUSTEES OF THE PENINSULA ANNUAL CONFERENCE

During the past year the Board of Trustees has increased its efforts to dispose of properties declared abandoned or closed by the conference. With an accumulation of these properties over the years this task is going to take considerable time.

The property known as Grace Methodist Church, Milton, continues to be dealt with by the court, and while we have been told that a decision will be forthcoming in the near future, we can do nothing further but wait the pleasure of the court.

Ruthsburg parsonage, through the help and cooperation of Rev. Donald Hornung, Minister of Centerville Church, has been sold and the proceeds given to Centerville Church to aid in their relocation program.

The property known as St. Paul's, Dover, has been sold to Wesley Methodist Church, Dover, for the sum of one dollar, and deed for same has been given to Wesley by this Board.

The property known as Union Church has been offered to Wyoming Methodist Church for the sum of one dollar. As yet, the transaction has not been completed.

In attempting to sell the property in Middletown, Del., acquired from the Charlotte Caswell Estate, the validity of the title was questioned by the attorney for the buyer and this matter has been referred to the courts for a decision.

The income from the Poole Estate was distributed in the following manner—\$500.00 to Kingswood of Brookside Church, \$500.00 to Bethel Church, Lewes, and \$2,100.00 to Whatcoat Church, Snow Hill (to be paid in three installments of \$700.00 each).

During the year a bequest was received from the Estate of Miss Willis Adele O'Neill in memory of Rev. W. J. O'Neill. The Board of Trustees decided to use the income from this bequest to provide scholarships for divinity students and administer the fund through the Conference Scholarship Committee.

The Board has the task of administering many trusts, ranging from the upkeep of cemetery lots to such trusts as the Poole Estate and the Scott Memorial Trust Fund. This latter trust is used for scholarships and is under the direction of the Superintendent of the Wilmington District, in whose report will probably appear a detailed account of the disposition of the trust income.

The Board of Trustees is confronted by many problems in disposing of the properties entrusted to its care and the investment of monies which come into its possession. One by one these problems are being solved and policies formed.

In connection with the disposing of abandoned church properties, we wish to express our gratitude for the cooperation and good efforts of the four District Superintendents in helping us dispose of these properties.

The members of this Board feel we have been granted a real privilege in being allowed to serve in this capacity and continue to covet your patience and your prayers as we pursue the task which is before us.

REPORT—WASHINGTON AREA METHODIST INFORMATION

I have been asked to make a brief report on the Washington Area Methodist Information Commission. This is a small commission consisting of eleven members representing the Baltimore and Peninsula Conferences. The resident bishop of the Washington Area is chairman.

The Commission is responsible for the Washington Area Methodist Information Office located in the Methodist building in Washington. The Commission is expected to select the office personnel, approve its budget and program, and interpret and support its work within the two Conferences of the area.

The work of the Washington Area Information Office can be listed under four major headings:

1. News dissemination to daily and weekly newspapers and to religious publications,
2. Education in public relations for ministers and laymen,

3. Question-answering for the general public, and
4. Cooperation in the communications fields with other denominational and ecumenical groups.

Specific responsibilities include (a) editing of the Area Supplement to **Together** magazine and reporting Area news to church magazines and news services. **Together** magazine alone reaches an estimated 30,000 homes in this area; (b) news coverage of major activities within the area such as Annual Conferences, Convocations, etc.; (c) Cooperation in inter-church activities, National Religious Publicity Council, and Council of Churches; (d) Consultation on church publications; (e) Planning public relations seminars.

Mr. Lee A. Ranck served as director of this program until February 1 when he joined the staff of the new Board of Christian Social Concerns. While the Commission is seeking a new director, Mr. Ranck is able to give some aid in editing the Area Supplement, but most of the work is being carried on by Miss Ruby Jefferson, our very capable and personable secretary in the Washington office.

We ask your support for the work of the Commission and request that you write or phone any newsworthy information to the office promptly for proper release. We suggest that you give advance notice of events of unusual significance that they may be adequately covered. We invite you to use the information service of the office in securing biographical information and news mats or cuts when prominent Methodists are to be involved in your district or local church activities.

We have somewhat modified the job analysis of the position of director for this office. It is our desire that in addition to reporting Methodist news, we may be able to interpret Methodist views to our own people and the public. We are seeking a qualified person who will continue the basic activities of this office but who will be able to go beyond that which has been done in representing the Methodist position on matters affecting our area and nation.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF WESLEY COLLEGE TO THE PENINSULA ANNUAL CONFERENCE

May 19, 1961

Academic Emphasis

The academic program of Wesley College has been strengthened from three aspects. The potential ability of the student body has been strengthened through a careful screening of the incoming freshman class. The growing public respect for the college has directed more students toward fulfilling their educational goals on Wesley's campus. The admissions office now is able to accept only one student in four who applies. The freshman enrollment was closed to girls a month ago, and we can anticipate closing admission for boys within a week, or not later than June first. (In previous years we received students until September).

The academic standards have been advanced through a careful selection of faculty replacements. Where an instructor has seen fit to resign, the replacement has been selected with a mind to increase both educational preparation and greater experience. The reduction of the student-faculty ratio has been accomplished through the addition of two new faculty members for the coming year. The faculty has been strengthened with an increase in master and doctoral staff members.

The student preparation has been increased through a more careful supervision of the individual student load. The faculty advisor is now required to limit the course load of the average student.

Much attention has been directed for several years to course offerings. This has resulted in a strong academic program. The college has now turned its attention to the needs of its students and the community at large. The immediate need of the student was for an adjustment in degree requirements. It is necessary for the student to meet the local requirements and at the same time receive adequate preparation to continue on in his junior year at a senior college. Such adjustments have been accomplished in the case of the engineering student, the liberal arts, and physical education majors. New programs of study are being offered in pre-dental and pre-veterinarian medicine and elementary and secondary education. Already numerous prospective students have inquired concerning our offerings in preparation for teaching. The teacher education program can be of invaluable help in meeting the growing shortage of qualified teachers in our public schools.

Plans are formulating for an evening school to begin in September, 1961, if proper preparation can be made by that time. It is here that the college can best serve the adult needs of the church and the community. The exact offerings are to be established from the expressed needs of the community. Here the members of the church can add their guidance.

Wesley College will serve approximately 400 students for the school year 1961-62. Ever-increasing numbers are from the churches served by this Peninsula Conference. These students will be under the educational direction of twenty-eight highly qualified instructors. The faculty will be strengthened through the addition of the following—either new instructors or replacements:

Enrollment

The president reports that this year 378 students were enrolled with the opening of the fall term. This again indicates an increase over previous years. Of this number, 147 are Methodist students, and 16 are preparing for church vocations. The college is still maintaining the ratio of two boys to one girl. This large enrollment, with limited facilities, has caused a number of problems to which the faculty and administration have had to give a great deal of time during the year. It has been necessary to adjust schedules, buy extra supplies, secure additional instructors, and create new program and activities for this increased student body.

Building Program

The statements concerning the enrollment of students at the college certainly indicate that buildings are needed if Wesley is to take full advantage of its opportunity for growth. This lack of facilities is plaguing the staff and faculty as they try to do a good job academically. Two years ago the gymnasium burned, which means that the school is without a physical education building. We are making use of every available place for the physical education program, staying outside until the snow blows and getting out again in the spring as soon as possible. This means that the physical education staff will not stay at Wesley for any length of time because of the lack of buildings and equipment with which to work.

Our dining hall is housed in the Richardson Mansion, where we feed our students in two shifts.

The erection of three new buildings in the last four years has brought Wesley a long way in the field of education. Dormitories, housing 130 men and 84 girls, have helped our housing problems. We are still using old facilities, however, to take care of the great demand for enrollment. Two buildings are needed immediately—a dining hall, and the building which will house the auditorium-gymnasium, pool, and student union. A dining

hall seems assured. The government has tentatively approved a loan of \$335,000 toward a \$425,000 expected expenditure. Final papers will be submitted in a few days. If this is given a final approval—and this is expected—it will be necessary for us to secure approximately \$125,000, and then the dining hall can be constructed this winter. The second building, the auditorium-gymnasium-pool-student union, must be underway within a year. We have students at Wesley preparing to become physical education instructors, and we have no gymnasium in which to give them proper training. The physical education program of the school is suffering, and I am certain that the accrediting committee of the Middle States Association will not close their eyes to this problem very much longer. Nearly 400 students on a college campus without a building where they can have proper recreational or social facilities causes both disciplinary and social problems. They must stand out in front of the dormitories, on the pavements, or anywhere they can on the campus. There are no large lounges or other rooms in which students can meet. It is my hope that the dining hall and the auditorium-gymnasium-student union building will be completed within a two-year period. This can only be done by the Methodist Church continuing to stand back of its school and seeing that it secures the facilities that are now necessary to make it one of the best two-year colleges anywhere in the East.

The next building to be erected will be the science building. It is impossible for us to accept any more students than we are now receiving until the science building is built. Our present laboratories are in the basement of Old Main. They are antiquated and inadequate. When we have the science building completed, it will give us additional classroom space, and then we should move into building more dormitories. This will leave the chapel and the renovation of Old Main. Within a period of six to ten years, this program could be completed.

Cultivation and Public Relations

The president has been on the move ever since arriving at the college. He has made an effort to visit as many churches, community groups, and organizations as possible, to tell them the story of Wesley College. He has spoken in thirty-six churches of the Peninsula Conference. He has talked with six other groups of the Conference. His itinerary has taken him to fifteen community groups, where he has presented the Wesley story. He has spoken in six churches outside of the Peninsula Conference. This makes a total of sixty-three engagements since the first of September. He is making an excellent impression for Wesley.

The dean of the college has also made himself available to speak. He has spoken in nine churches in the Peninsula Conference and before six other groups in the area.

A number of the members of the faculty and others have also presented Wesley to as many groups and organizations as possible. Besides this, the director of development and the president have been visiting the heads of industry, business, banks, and organizations in the interest of the college. They have been sowing the seed wherever possible concerning the need of Wesley and the academic program that is being developed on the campus.

Several members of the Board of Trustees have been assisting in this program and rendering very fine service. It is expected that, as the months and years go by, this whole program will bear fruit.

Finances

The Peninsula Conference is to be congratulated on its support of Wesley College. Very few churches are not paying their part of the capital funds campaign. We are overjoyed with the response this year to the Capital Improvement Fund. This has enabled us to make the terrific strides in improving the physical facilities at Wesley. The continued support of the current budget by the churches is helping us to develop our academic program. We know that you want Wesley to be a good college, bearing the name of the Methodist Church. With the financial backing that you give, we are able to move ahead. Our budget is a little over \$600,000 this year, and there is every indication that we will more than meet it. This has been brought about by strict economy measures and increased enrollment. It is my hope that we will have funds in the future to improve our facilities and our academic program. There is an increase in the budget for next year, most of which is in faculty salaries. Our salaries are low and must be increased every year in order to bring them up to an acceptable level. We cannot secure qualified faculty members, nor can we keep them after they arrive, unless we pay a wage comparable to other colleges.

The budget for the next college year will also be balanced. At the present time the students pay almost the entire cost of their education at Wesley. In many ways, this is good. However, we cannot operate an institution of higher education entirely on student fees. It is necessary that Wesley build up an endowment and that we secure additional income on an annual basis to help us expand our program and to do many of the things which need to be done. I am certain that in the years to come there are many who are going to remember Wesley College in their wills, and there are a number of others who are going to make grants to the school.

Attached to this report is a statement by the treasurer concerning the development and scholarship funds.

The future is very bright for Wesley College. The great needs are immediate. Opportunities are knocking on our door right now. The increase in the number of young people who want to go to college, the desire of youth for an education, and the great need for colleges today make it imperative that we do something at once to meet this need as a Christian institution. A church-related college is needed today more than ever before. With adequate funds, Wesley can make a name for itself and render a great service to the Peninsula Conference and the area about us. The continued support of the churches and individuals of the Peninsula Conference will enable us to do our task well.

WOMAN'S SOCIETY OF CHRISTIAN SERVICE

Bishop Lord, members of the Peninsula Annual Conference and friends:

It was with a feeling akin to adventure that we began the new quadrennium even though we felt a little reluctant to part with the theme and goals of the previous one. However, we soon realized that we were not parting with the old ones but were building the new theme and emphases on those of the last quadrennium. Our Woman's Society of Christian Service is becoming aware of the need of personal participation in "Our Mission Today." If we are familiar with the program that unites us in witness and service, with a faith that compels us, we will be able to work toward the attainment of our other two emphases.

We know that the Woman's Society of Christian Service is built on a spiritual foundation, otherwise its advancement would have been of short duration. During the year, we have been led to spiritual heights by the means of special observances of worship. In October, local societies all over the Conference observed the Week of Prayer and Self-Denial. These meetings resulted in gaining spiritual inspiration as well as offerings amounting to \$3,477.34 to be used for urban work in the U. S., and audio-visual and literacy-literature program around the world. There have been spiritual "Days Apart" both in the Conference and District Woman's Society of Christian Service. Local societies, all over the Conference, cooperated with the "World Day of Prayer." Each year, we are having an increased number of Prayer Groups, more Prayer Calendars are being used and we are reading more in spiritual books.

Our thinking during this year has been along the line of "The Word in Our Midst," which has been the theme of our program material. We realize that a lifetime could well be spent in seeking to grasp and to make this theme real. Strides have been made in program building. Local Societies are seeing the importance of presenting at meetings of the general Societies and Circles—programs that advance the total program of the Woman's Society and that bring to each person present a spiritual uplift, as well as mental stimulation and concern for people, far and near.

We are fortunate to have the resource material for the programs that is available to us through the office of Literature and Publications of the Woman's Division of Christian Service. We are grateful for the Methodist Woman (our official magazine), the World Outlook and the Together magazine. At the last reporting period, there were 1,188 subscriptions to the Methodist Woman, 490 combinations to the Methodist Woman and the World Outlook, and 105 subscriptions to the World Outlook. The sale of literature at the 1960 School of Missions surpassed that of 1959 by \$50, making a total of \$627.

Seven of the Conference officers and secretaries of lines of work and the four district presidents attended the Jurisdiction School of Missions at Pembroke College last June. Everyone took a study course for credit, in addition to attending clinics every day. In every way possible, we tried to gain knowledge of the work to help our work in this Conference. The study themes were: Home, "Heritage and Horizon," Foreign, "Into All the

World Together," CSR, which was Church-wide, "Alcohol and Christian Responsibility," and Spiritual, "Christian Basic Beliefs."

Eleven officers and secretaries and the four district presidents will attend the Jurisdiction School of Missions at Dickinson College June 11-16. In March, the WDCS trained fifty women in the work of the WSCS. Two of these women will be at the Jurisdiction School in June and two will be at the Conference School in July. The object of this training is that district officers and secretaries will know the work and will pass it on to local officers and secretaries in the late summer or early fall. This specialized training will also be given in 1962.

We had a successful School of Missions at Wesley College, Dover, last summer, however, we regret that more women do not take advantage of this opportunity. There were 72 resident students and a total attendance of 257 for the week. Thursday, of the week was designated as Visitors' Day, with a registration of 143 visitors. The new buildings were a great improvement over the past. We were grateful for the fine cooperation of the College President, Dr. Robert Parker. This School is scheduled for July 17-21, and we are hoping for the largest attendance in its history.

As an outgrowth of our Conference School of Missions, four Educational Seminars were held in September, reaching 887 women. As a result of these Seminars, study courses for jurisdiction credit were taught in local Societies. Jurisdiction credit courses are advocated, not for the honor of receiving credit, but because the courses will mean so much more if they fulfill requirements for such credit. These courses are for the purpose of making Methodist women inspired and informed to do witnessing for our Master.

One of the most worthwhile projects that we support is the Girl's School of Missions that is held at PeCoMeth every June. The 13th Annual School will be held June 25-30. There are always more applicants than can be accommodated, which is unfortunate, when one realizes that this is one of the most effective ways of recruiting Christian workers. The teachers were excellent. A Bible course was taught and there were capable leaders for the interest groups. There were 118 girls present with 14 adult—besides the regular camp staff. There were 3 "nationals" in attendance, 2 from the Philippine Islands, and one from Japan. Ten girls made decisions for full-time Christian service, others re-dedicated themselves and 18 received certificates for 3 year attendance. From this School, no doubt, will come our missionaries, deaconesses and other Christian workers.

Our Youth Secretary is the Chairman of the Girl's School of Missions. The reports that she receives from local youth secretaries indicate an increase in giving to the M. Y. Fund. A barn at PeCoMeth, which is being reconstructed to make additional rooms, is a project of the M. Y. F. One of the members of the Camp Council Committee will attend the Regional Conference at Williamsport, Pa. this July at the expense of the Conference Woman's Society. The Jurisdiction Secretary of Youth Work, Mrs. Adam Minnich, spoke at the 4 District Meetings in March. She included problems of youth work in the "Frontiers That Call Us" in her message.

The Secretary of Missionary Personnel keeps in touch with girls who indicate a desire for full-time Christian service and also their pastors.

Christian vocation material is sent to the girls and their names are on file with the Conference. They need the prayers and interest of the adults of the church.

Miss Elizabeth Dalbey, a former missionary and a former minister, succeeded Miss Genevieve Poppe as a director of the Conference Homes in Wilmington. We support these homes through the WDCS. These two homes continue to serve more than 300 boys and girls in the area of our centers with an aggregate average monthly attendance of approximately 1,200. One nursery group and 18 clubs for boys and girls are being conducted in whom Christian attitudes are being instilled. The securing of a new or used building, which will allow a more adequate program, of which the staff is capable, is in the thinking of the committee. Great credit and praise is due the dedicated and efficient services of the Director, the staff, three full-time and two part-time, as well as the Chairman of the Projects, who is a member of the Conference executive committee.

The Secretaries of Student Work on all levels, are feeling a deep concern and responsibility that the students of today understand the mission of the Church and find their places of service in the total program of the Church. In each district, there is a Wesley Foundation program on the campus. Student Day is being observed in many Churches each year. Two special challenges have been given the Secretaries of Student Work, first to participate in the christian ministry among international students, and second, to inspire students to christian service and church-related vocations.

Missionary Education for children is a unified plan of our Methodist Church. A cooperative program on all levels is resulting in a strengthened program of Missionary Education. The primary children, through additional studies, have had "Here and There With the Bible" and the Junior Children, "Adventure with the Bible." They have had other additional materials. The amount sent to the Woman's Division from the additional sessions was \$90.65. Many children participated in "Trick or Treat" for UNICEF. Offerings from children's giving were also directed in other channels.

Woman Societies all over the U. S. celebrated the 20th anniversary of the organization during the past year. It was a time when founders and charter members were given special recognition and when the future was considered in the light of increased membership and advancement along all lines. We shall celebrate our 21st Birthday this year. We are looking over the past to see how much we have grown in respect to study and action, our christian life and the fulfilling of the purpose of the Woman's Society of Christian Service.

At present, our Woman's Society membership is 21,683 and our Wesleyan Service Guild membership is 65, making a total of 21,748. The Woman's Division is making plans to start a membership drive September 1, 1961. We have 350 organized Societies, 3 district members and 15 unorganized Churches.

There are 5 organized Wesleyan Service Guilds in the Conference. Ten Guild members attended the Jurisdiction week-end at Buck Hill in March. Plans are being made to hold the first Wesleyan Service week-end ever held in our Conference, following our Conference School of Missions in July.

In the Christian Social Relations Department, our women are realizing that this field is a large and a live one, covering the whole life of each woman, beginning at home and extending to the farthest corners of the world. Stress has been placed on the United Nations and the part that each should play to strengthen and preserve it. There has been an emphasis on better race relations between the overlapping conferences. The church-wide study, "Alcohol," received good support but not good enough. Cooperation of the CSR department with the Annual Conference has benefitted us. A "Register, Get Out the Vote and Study Issues" campaign preceded the national election.

The District Presidents and their Officers, Secretaries, and Chairman deserve credit for their accomplishments during the year. Well attended Fall and Spring district-wide meetings, Officers' Training Sessions (some of which were held in zones), in addition to the meetings already mentioned, were held. The Presidents have encouraged the visitation of officers and secretaries into local societies, which has helped to advance the work. Dr. Clara Nutting, retired missionary from Southern Rhodesia, Africa, and China, itinerated the four districts last fall, and Miss Sarah Quillen, field worker for the WDCS, itinerated the four districts during the late winter. Dr. Nutting was invited to speak to two groups of school children.

Each year, the Recording Secretary compiles and has published the Annual Report of our Conference WSCS. The Peninsula Conference News, which does much to promote our work, is printed three times a year. A historian has compiled records of our organization since its organization in 1940. A Standing Rules Chairman and her Committee keep our Conference Standing Rules up to date so that they will agree with the official ones.

The total amount sent to the WDCS this past year was \$72,514.27. On the basis of missionary pledges made by local societies at the 4 Annual District Meetings, our Conference Woman's Society Pledge to the missionary work of the WDCS for 1961-62 is \$58,000, an increase of \$4,000 over the past year. \$58,414.15 was the actual amount paid in missionary pledges last year. The increase last year made it possible for us to support a new missionary, Miss Barbara Reynolds, who is in Korea. The increase this year was more than enough to support her sister, Miss Ruth Reynolds, who has been accepted by the Woman's Division and who will go to Korea in early August. These lovely, Christian girls are daughters of Rev. and Mrs. Paul Reynolds, of the St. Luke's Church in St. Michaels.

In addition to supporting the two Missionaries, Miss Barbara and Miss Ruth Reynolds, we are supporting Miss Maude Goff, who while at home from Korea on furlough, is attending Hartford Seminary Foundation, (she will help with the School of Missions), and Miss Eunice Sluyter, who while on furlough last year studied at the New York University and in March returned to Lucknow, India, where she is the All-India Director of Literature. Miss Rosalie Jenkins, formerly of Salisbury District, had her leave of absence extended a year so that she can finish her doctoral degree by June, 1962, when she expects to return to Brazil.

The sixth Assembly will be held in Atlantic City, May 15-18, 1962.

We had a successful Annual Meeting of our Conference Woman's Society May 11th. The highlight of the day was Bishop Lord's address. Already our women are expressing the desire that we invite him to speak to us next year.

My appreciation goes to Bishop Lord, our four District Superintendents, our Ministers, Co-workers and everyone who has helped to promote our work. My appreciation also goes to our Heavenly Father who gives us this wonderful opportunity for service.

"Our Mission Today" will lead us into many paths of service as we strive to advance the Kingdom of God in a world that is weary and troubled, but a world with infinite possibilities for peace and joy when all nations have the opportunity to know the love of Christ.

COMMISSION ON WORLD SERVICE AND FINANCE

As a layman who had previously only participated on the local church level, this past year has been a truly rewarding experience. The privilege of working together with our Bishop, the Cabinet, ministers and laymen throughout the Conference has been inspirational. After observing the leadership in the Peninsula Conference and having had the opportunity to attend the three-day District Superintendents Quadrennial Convocation in Chicago last November, I am satisfied that the Peninsula Conference in particular and the Methodist Church in general has a tremendous future in doing its share in advancing and enlarging God's Kingdom.

It is recommended to the Peninsula Conference that the attached budget be adopted at the 1961 Annual Conference with the effective date being May 1, 1962. This will enable the Conference Treasurer to have in the hands of each Charge by October 1, 1961 the apportionments and askings to be effective May 1, 1962. On the attached sheet, the recommended budget for 1962-63 is compared to the 1961-62 budget which was approved at the 1960 Annual Conference.

In accordance with the adoption of a two year budget last year, Administration and Benevolence apportionments and Wesley Jr. College Capital Improvement asking for the year, beginning May 1, 1961, will remain the same as for the 1960-61 Conference Year. The four items based on pastor's salary must be adjusted currently.

The basis for apportionments to the local charges for the total budget attached shall be as follows:

(Using statistics appearing in the 1961 Conference Journal)

$\frac{1}{3}$ —Based on Membership of each Charge.

$\frac{1}{3}$ —Based on Total Giving of each Charge, less amounts paid on the following: Debt, Interest on Debt, Building and Improvement, World Service and Conference Benevolences, Advance Specials, and Wesley Jr. College Capital Improvement asking.

$\frac{1}{3}$ —Based on amount apportioned in previous year for World Service and Conference Benevolences.

Benevolences are divided as follows:

If any surplus is realized on Conference Benevolences, it shall be allocated to the Conference Board of Missions for Church Extension. If the budgeted amount is not realized, each Conference board and commission shall take a proportional loss.

In view of the increased cost of printing the Conference Journal, it is the recommendation of this Commission that the purchase price be increased to \$1.00 per copy effective immediately. The increased purchase price will not cover the cost of printing and distribution, however, it is the feeling of this Commission that part of the cost should continue to be underwritten by the Conference to encourage wider distribution. We urge each church to purchase sufficient copies for each member of their Official Board.

The Minimum Salary Schedule has been carefully reviewed and it is the opinion of this Commission that no changes be made at this time.

It is recommended that the Methodist Country House be permitted to enlist a representative in each local church to work in conjunction with an auxiliary or other group to promote the interests of the Methodist Country House.

The salaries of the District Superintendents shall be the average of the highest ten pastoral salaries in the Peninsula Conference and shall be adjusted during the year, if necessary, to conform to this average. District Superintendents' salaries as heretofore provided, travel and administrative allowances as determined by this Commission, and District Parsonage utilities, shall be provided by the District Superintendents' Fund.

The following items are based on the pastor's salary for the percentages indicated and must be adjusted currently:

VII MEMOIRS

WALTER GILBERT BARLOW

Walter Gilbert Barlow was born in Ohio October 22, 1876. He slipped away from us February 8, 1961. His services were held in Georgetown, Delaware and were conducted by Dr. Thomas C. Mulligan assisted by Rev. William O. Hackett. He is buried in West Laurel Hills, Bala Cynwyd, Pennsylvania.

Brother Barlow, after having started his career as a chemist, was restless in this field and turned to electrical engineering. Still restless he found his true calling in the ministry.

His first appointment in the Wilmington Conference was on Smith's Island in 1923. He served in Bishopville, Pittsville, Cherry Hill, Tilghman's Island, Galena, Beckwith and Wye Mills. He was retired in 1942. After retirement he supplied Ellendale and Hebron Church, Georgetown.

Two years ago the health of this servant of God began to fail. In spite of his sufferings he ministered to and cared for his invalid wife until she passed away. He joined her in that Happier Land three months later.

I ministered to Brother Barlow in his last illness and was cheered by his smile, his faith, his hope. Two of his favorite Scripture verses were "Who shall separate us from the love of Christ? Shall tribulation or distress or persecution or famine or nakedness or peril or sword."

"Nay, in all these things we are more than conquerors through Him that loved us."

JAMES EDWARD BOND

James Edward Bond was born in Nesquehoning, Pa., on April 5th, 1879. The son of Martin and Elizabeth Ann Bond, he was the last of a family of eleven children. Three sisters survive him; Mrs. Rachel Cox, Mrs. Elizabeth Dunstan and Mrs. Anna Pauff.

He worked his way through Williamsport Dickinson to a B.S. degree in 1902. He was graduated from Drew Theological Seminary in 1905 with a B.D. degree. Oskaloosa College granted him the D.D. degree in 1919. His fraternity was Kappa Delta Pi.

The following charges were served with distinction by this gifted and dedicated minister of Jesus Christ: Safe Harbour Circuit, Pa.; Mt. Hope, Pa.; Searle's Memorial, Pottstown, Pa.; Grace Church, Philadelphia; First Church, Lancaster; Ebenezer Church, Philadelphia; Holy Cross, Reading, Pa.; First Church, Elyria, Ohio; McCabe Church, Wilmington, Delaware. After retirement he served as supply pastor at Kennedyville Methodist Church, Kennedyville, Maryland.

Edward Bond's pastorates were marked by careful executive leadership, tender pastoral care and winsome preaching of the Gospel. Holy Cross Church, during his Reading appointment, emerged in strength and beauty to engage the attention of the entire Conference. In Elyria, Ohio, laboring there as a pastor during the depression, he restored confidence to a large

but discouraged congregation, proving to them the historic truth that the real Church can not only get along well but can thrive during hard times. In McCabe Church, Wilmington, Delaware, a persistent debt of long standing, in the amount of \$46,000, was paid off, and his pulpit power and attractiveness kept this Church in a growing relationship with Protestantism in that city. I am sure he looked upon his pastorate at Kennedyville as the climax of a happy ministry. He went to this small congregation as a supply pastor immediately after retirement with enthusiasms and expectations at tip top. Having served many of Methodism's largest congregations, no one saw or felt any semblance of condescension. He was as proud of this Church as he had ever been of any other. The people soon discovered that at long last they would have the kind of leadership that would challenge them weekly with the "joy of elevated thoughts," and daily in their homes have a great man in a simple way bring them the consolations and the inspirations of the Master.

On November 19, 1941, in McCabe Church where he was then pastor, Edward James Bond and Adda A. Smith were united in marriage by the District Superintendent of the Wilmington District, Reverend Oliver Collins. For twenty years their companionship was increasingly rich in devotion to each other and to the causes and people of Methodism. Mrs. Bond survives her husband, with thankfulness at having been his companion for all those years and with confident expectation of renewing their relationship upon a day that is to come.

God called Edward Bond home to heaven Monday, August 1st, 1960. Funeral services were jointly conducted by Reverend John N. Link and Reverend Essel P. Thomas, at Wilmington, Delaware, August 5th. Interment was at Grace Lawn Cemetery.

CHARLES IRVING FLORY

The Reverend Charles Irving Flory died February 7, 1961 at his home in Glen Dale, Prince Georges County, Maryland. He was born in Reisters-town, Maryland, March 8, 1876, son of Charles and Margaret Coat Flory.

In 1897 he was graduated from St. John's College, Annapolis, Maryland, and later studied Theology at Vanderbilt University, Nashville, Tennessee. In 1900 he was admitted into membership of the Missouri Annual Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, serving in that area until 1908, when he transferred to the Baltimore Conference of the M. E. Church, South. For the next thirty-three years, Brother Flory held pastorates in Maryland and Virginia, being appointed to Royal Oak on the Eastern Shore of Maryland, now a part of the Peninsula Conference, at the time of the unification of Methodism.

He retired from the active ministry in 1941, and moved to Waynesboro, Virginia, where his son lived, and where he built his home. While there, he was active in the affairs of the Waynsboro Methodist Church.

In the Fall of 1960, in order to be closer to their son and daughter, who live in Washington, D. C., Rev. and Mrs. Flory moved to Glen Dale, Maryland.

Mr. Flory was a man of varied talents and interest. He had a great love for music, and promoted good music in all of his churches. He was instrumental in helping to design and build six new churches during his ministry. He is remembered by his parishioners as a good pastor, whose prayers often lifted them to the very throne of God. He was kind, gentle, generous, and possessed a deeply humble spirit. As one who knew him and his family for a number of years, it is a privilege to pay tribute to this humble, devoted servant of God.

He is survived by his wife, Alma Patterson Flory, a daughter, Margaret E. Flory, of Washington, D. C., a son, Maurice P. Flory, of Seabrook, Maryland, three grandchildren, and a great-grandson.

Funeral services were held on February 10, 1961, at the Little Church in Fort Lincoln Cemetery, Washington, D. C., conducted by Rev. J. Lee Williams, pastor of the Lanham Church, and the Rev. Stanley Bice, of Perkins Chapel, Glen Dale, Maryland. Interment was in Fort Lincoln Cemetery.

THOMAS J. SARD

'And David, after he had served his own generation . . . fell on sleep.'
Acts 13:36.

While this verse is descriptive of David, it befits my late brother and father in the ministry, Thomas J. Sard, who was born at Secretary, Dorchester County, Maryland, August 27, 1875 and was called from labor May 8, 1961.

He asked for the hand of Katherine Murphy, also of Dorchester County, to be his partner and helpmate. They were united in holy wedlock February 17, 1898. God blessed this union with four children, two of whom survive him, Mrs. Marjorie Cooper and Mrs. Audrey Schreiber. Mrs. Sard preceded him in death by 14 years.

In his early manhood, he was engaged in carpentry with his father and two brothers. While he was building houses with his hands, his mind was preoccupied with thoughts of building the Kingdom of God in the hearts of men. He accepted the call to the ministry in 1908 and served as supply pastor to fill a vacancy for part of that year at Beckwith and Spedden's Charge, Dorchester County. At conference time, he was appointed to the Burrsville Charge. Following this appointment, he served the following churches during the 45 years of his active ministry, the last seven being served after his retirement.—Armory (Dover); Tangier Island; Scott (Wilmington); First (Chestertown); Asbury (Crisfield); Union (Wilmington); and Bellefonte.

Yes, he has served his generation in the name of Jesus Christ and has fallen on rest. This does not mean that his testimony will cease; for, there are multitudes of men, women, and young people who will continue to witness to the truth that he lived and taught. He was a good man and full of the Holy Ghost—a man of deep convictions and of a loving spirit.

To know him was to love him. A striking evidence of this fact was witnessed especially during the last seven and one-half years that he lived. While he was confined to his bed and wheel chair, he enjoyed a constant flow of visitors, many of whom had had their lives transformed by the love

and power of his ministry. They came to bring comfort and joy to him, yet left with a greater blessing than they had brought, not because of what he said—for he had been rendered speechless at the beginning of his illness—but by the spirit of Christ which radiated in his face. Further evidence of the lasting impression that he made upon the people whom he served was the fact that on the occasion of his birthday and all special seasons of the year, he was showered with cards and gifts, many of them coming from people whom he had served many years before.

Thus, we conclude this memoir with the account of his funeral which had been prearranged by him. He had requested that it not be a dead service, but one where those present would be conscious of the presence of the resurrected and living Christ. I believe that this was experienced by many who attended, according to their testimonies. By his request, those who had gathered to pay their last respects were invited and participated in that glorious hymn, "O, That Will Be Glory for Me." We know that he has gone to join that "great cloud of witnesses" about whom he so often preached.

By the fact that Thomas J. Sard lived, many of us feel that we are the better able to live the Christian life and preach the Gospel of Jesus Christ. "And Thomas J. Sard, after he had served his generation . . . fell on sleep." In Grace Noll Crowell's poem, entitled "Tribute," I shall substitute the name of my beloved brother for the name, David, which appears in her poem.

No finer tribute ever could be given
Than that brief simple utterance of praise.
God asks no greater service than this leaven
To raise the standard of men's earthly days.
Thomas J. Sard, the servant, "had served his generation"—
Straightforward words that shine in his behalf,
More challenging in their adulation
Than any chiseled-marble epitaph.
To serve one's generation, to be giving
New strength and courage to one's fellow-man,
To tread life's highroad bravely, ever living
With one clear purpose, one exalted plan,
Will rear for any man a shaft so high
Its climbing peak will reach and pierce the sky.

OTIS LLOYD TOWNSEND

The making of a life is Divine Cooperation; God and man working together. The making of a Minister is likewise Divine Cooperation. It is a wonderful privilege to observe an humble servant of God make Godlikeness the compassion of his soul. With a consecrated life, Otis Lloyd Townsend sought to make Godlikeness real to others through the Sermon in Life and Word.

Otis Lloyd Townsend was born on September 3, 1901, near Shad Point, Wicomico County, Salisbury, Maryland. He was the son of Littleton M. and Ida Belle Malone Townsend. He was educated in the public schools of

Wicomico County and the Conference Course of Study. He married Maude Elizabeth Dydes of Fruitland on February 23, 1929. There were two daughters born to bless this happy home: Elaine, who married Grayden Marsh, Rhodes Point, Maryland, and Ruth Ellen, who married George Donoway, Powellville, Maryland.

Lloyd united with the Washington M. E. Church South, at Shad Point, February, 1930, under the pastorate of The Rev. R. P. Edwards. He later received Exhorter's License from the Virginia Conference. Dr. J. J. Bunting, Superintendent of the Salisbury District, recognized the making of a Minister in Lloyd Townsend and asked him to serve Riverside Church, Salisbury. He received his Local Preacher's License in April, 1938, and became an Active Supply Pastor serving Riverside. He completed the Conference Course of Study, and was ordained Elder on the 20th day of May, 1945. He served the following Churches—Riverside, Willards, Secretary, Smith Island, Powellville, Deal Island, Nanticoke, St. Thomas' Charge and Seaford Circuit, Seaford, Delaware. He served the Methodist Church 24 years as minister.

ELIZABETH S. CAMPERSON HENVIS

On July 3, 1892, Elizabeth Stanton Camperson, second child of Samuel George and Maria Sapp Camperson, was born in Wilmington, Delaware. At the age of five she had an almost fatal attack of what has since been believed to have been rheumatic fever which impaired her heart for life. During the crisis her saintly mother told her that she was soon going to Heaven to live with Jesus. She answered, "O no, mama, I can't go to Heaven yet. I haven't any stars in my crown."

As a girl she joined Harrison Street Methodist Church, becoming a teacher in the Sunday School at an early age. The friendship between her and Edmund W. Hervis began while both were attending a teacher training class taught by Dr. Twitmyer, Superintendent of Wilmington Public Schools. They were married on September 7, 1918 by the Reverend J. Richard Bicking. Their children are Samuel C. Hervis and Esther S. Hays.

In the original, literal meaning of the word methodist when the members of the Holy Club were so called, Elizabeth Hervis was a methodist not only in her devotional life but in her daily use of time. Like Susanna Wesley she was a patient, persevering teacher. She so scheduled her day that she found time to teach both children and a nephew who sojourned one year in her home a full kindergarten and first year course. All entered public school in the second year and went on to complete college.

Because she was methodical in her habits, she found time to keep a beautiful and orderly home, while taking an active part in many forms of church work. She could always be counted on to offer a prayer, conduct a pageant, preach a sermon or help prepare a church dinner. In one summer canning season, almost unaided, she put up some 500 quarts of canned fruits and vegetables which she donated to the Methodist Hospital in Philadelphia. At the same time she put up three times as much for her home use and for sale to help with the children's college expenses. She was an artist of no mean talent, brightening her own and many other homes with her oil-paintings.

With a crown not wanting in stars awaiting her, she went home to live with her Lord on September 16, 1960. The funeral was conducted by the husband of her sister Miriam, the Reverend Harry Strickland, formerly of Richardson Park. The interment was in the cemetery of Shelemiah Methodist Church, in Bayview, Cecil County, Maryland.

IDA MATTHEWS JONES

Miss Ida Matthews was born at Horntown, Virginia on October 27, 1866. Most of her early life was spent at Chincoteague, Virginia, where she taught school for several years and was active in Church and Community Life. There she met the young Reverend George P. Jones, pastor of the Methodist Church. They were married in that Church on June 10, 1894.

Mrs. Jones immediately dedicated her time and talents to the life of the ministry and became the strong support of her husband. They served Cherry Hill, Md., 1895-98; Townsend, Del., 1899-1901; Hurlock, Md., 1902-1903; Brandywine, Wilmington, 1904-06; Milford, Del., 1907-08; Middletown, Del.

In 1909 Dr. Jones was appointed Superintendent of the Salisbury

District, serving the full term of six years. His appointment to Elkton, Md., was in 1915 where they remained four years and then returned to Townsend, Del., a former pastorate, serving three years.

We can never forget the consecration of these two servants of our Lord to the Conference Claimant Endowment in which field Dr. Jones labored as Field Secretary for six years raising funds for this worthy cause.

Retiring in 1929 they went to make their home in Mystic, Conn., where Mrs. Jones had attended school in her youth. They were again called to minister to the Baptist Church in Groton, Conn., until failing health forced them both to become less active. Dr. Jones went to his Heavenly Home on October 14, 1944.

Since that time she continued to live with her son, Mr. Edward M. Jones and family in Mystic, Conn. She was active in the church life of the community until about ten years ago, since which time she was confined to her room under the strict care of her physician.

She passed away on October 1, 1960 and was laid to rest beside her husband in the family plot in the Cemetery at Mystic, Conn.

Besides her son who survives, she leaves also a daughter, Miss Martha Jones, one grandson, Edward M. Jones, Jr., a career man in the U. S. Air Force, stationed at Okinawa, and two great-grandsons, George Phillip and Edward M. Jones, III.

Mrs. Jones visited within the Conference when she was able to do so and it was the writer's privilege to see her in Smyrna some twelve or fourteen years ago.

She was a true Christian lady and the work of the Master was close to her heart. She made the parsonages in which she lived the center of activity for the youth of the churches. It may well be said of her that Christ was above all else in her life.

MRS. WILLIAM J. McKEE

Mrs. Martha A. McKee, wife of Rev. William J. McKee, was born October 10, 1879, in the County of Fermanagh, Ireland. She was reared in a Christian home. Early she fell in love with Christ and His Church, and later chose to share this abundant life with a Methodist Minister of the Gospel.

Soon after their marriage, September 17, 1913, she and her husband, William J. McKee, came to America. They served the Methodist Church in the Minnesota Conference in the Mid-west for nineteen years. She took an active part in the work of the churches, rendering valuable help in the ministry of music, sharing her talented singing voice. She shared her Faith working with young adult women and high school girls through Sunday School classes.

The Mid-Western climate did not agree with Mrs. McKee's health. They sought and obtained a transfer to the old Wilmington Conference, now the Peninsula Conference, in the spring of 1932. Soon her health broke and again required a change, and both returned to Ireland. After the war she rejoined her husband, who had returned to America after the United States had entered the war.

In 1950 Rev. McKee reached the age of retirement, and both again returned to Ireland to make that country their permanent home, in Omagh, 48 Hospital Road. During the greater part of her remaining eleven years of earthly life in Omagh, Mrs. McKee was failing in health and was suffering from a fracture of her leg. She was confined to the house during these later years.

On Friday, February 10, 1961 she passed on into her eternal home. The funeral was held in her home on Sunday, February 12, with several ministers taking part. It is reported to have been the largest seen in Omagh for some time, and was attended by many from near and far. Graveside services were conducted in the family burial ground at Clogherney.

As the writer of this memoir, I feel there is nothing more fitting than to close with the words of the Hymn writer, whose words are now singing in my soul and heart:

"Blest be the tie that binds
Our hearts in Christian love;
The fellowship of kindred minds
Is like to that above.

Before our Father's throne
We pour our ardent prayers;
Our fears, our hopes, our aims are one,
Our comforts and our cares.

We share each other's woes,
Each other's burdens bear;
And often for each other flows
The sympathizing tear.

When we are called to part,
It gives us inward pain;
But we shall still be joined in heart,
And hope to meet again."

Myrtle Elizabeth Mason, daughter of Harry R. Mason and Jane Elizabeth Dicus Mason, was born August 10th, 1913, at Lauraville, Baltimore County, Md. She was baptized at the home of her parents on Sept. 14th, 1913, by Rev. Dr. C. C. Day, Pastor of Lauraville Methodist Protestant Church. She attended Church School at this same church and was received into full membership on December 7th, 1921. Miss Mason graduated from the Eastern High School of Baltimore, Maryland, and then attended the Peabody Conservatory of Music. On July 10th, 1935 she was married to Rev. Robert

E. Van Cleaf. God blessed this union with two fine boys, Robert Edwin Van Cleaf, Jr., born on May 18th, 1945 and Harry Luther Van Cleaf, born on July 10th, 1947. For over a quarter of a century she served with her husband in the Christian Ministry, in charges of the Peninsula Conference. Among these places were Grace Church of Georgetown, Asbury Church of Harrington, and they were at Bethesda of Middletown immediately prior to coming to Eastlake of Wilmington. She was removed from the ranks of those whose joy it is to serve Him by her untimely death on October 31, 1960.

I have known the Mason family for over thirty years. Myrtle was a very young girl when I was the Pastor of Lauraville 1927-'29. I have naturally followed her with interest down through the years and have been happy to note that her training in a fine Christian home was being expressed in love and loyalty to the King's business. Her outstanding talent as a pianist and organist was always available for the Church. She would play for the Choirs or direct them or sing in them as the occasion required. This does not mean her service was exclusively in the musical field, for she was willing to serve where ever she could make some contribution. Quiet and unassuming, her gentle spirit made itself count for Christ wherever she walked. The angelic Chorus now has a sweeter tone since she has been transferred to be with those who sing His praises in the heaven of the redeemed. She has passed to us the torch of high fidelity and would have us keep it burning brightly.

Dr. Roy Lawson Tawes sends this comment:

Myrtle Van Cleaf had rare qualities of soul, and her Christian witness was radiant and strong. She excelled as wife and mother in the parsonage, was much loved as friend and neighbor, and gave unselfishly of her talents in the community life. She was quiet and unassuming, attractive and humble, agreeable and kind. Her fine sense of humor was without a sting, and she was never hesitant in speaking the word of praise. She loved life and people and flowers, and, although dead at an early age, she lived her days to the full. Her heart was big and warm with gratitude, and her faith overcame the trials she could not understand.

Services were held in the McCrery Funeral Home and were in charge of Rev. Jervis Cooke, The Superintendent of the Wilmington District. Interment was in Parkwood Cemetery, Baltimore.

MISCELLANEOUS

(a) CONFERENCE RULES OF ORDER

- Rule 1. The Conference shall meet at 9.00 A. M. and adjourn at 12.30 P. M. But the Conference may, in its discretion, alter the time of meeting and adjournment.
- Rule 2. The President shall decide all questions of order, subject to an appeal to the Conference; but in case of such an appeal the question shall be taken without debate, except that the appellatant may make a simple statement of the grounds of his appeal.
- Rule 3. All resolutions and motions shall be in writing, if the President, Secretary, or any two members request it.
- Rule 4. When a motion is made and seconded, or a resolution is introduced and seconded, or a report presented and read by the Secretary, or stated by the President, it shall be deemed in possession of the Conference; but any motion or resolution may be withdrawn by the mover, with the consent of the Conference, at any time before amendment or decision.
- Rule 5. The motion to Lay on the Table, or to Take from the Table, and for the Previous Question, shall be taken without debate.
- Rule 6. No new motion or resolution shall be entertained until the one under consideration has been disposed of, which may be done by adoption or rejection, unless one of the following motions shall intervene, which shall have precedence in the order in which they are placed, namely:
 - (1) To fix the time to which the Conference shall adjourn.
 - (2) To Adjourn.
 - (3) To take a recess.
 - (4) To lay on the table.
 - (5) For the previous question.
 - (6) To postpone to a given time.
 - (7) To refer.
 - (8) To substitute.
 - (9) Amendment.
 - (10) To postpone indefinitely.

A motion to amend shall be in order, and a substitute for both amendments may be received, which substitute may be amended only once, and if a substitute be accepted, it shall operate as an amendment to the original proposition.
- Rule 7. When a member is about to speak in debate, or to deliver any matter to the Conference, he shall rise and respectfully address the President, but shall not proceed until recognized by him.
- Rule 8. No member shall be interrupted while speaking, except by the President to call him to order when he departs from the question, or uses personalities or disrespectful language; but any member may call the attention of the President to the subject when he deems a speaker out of order, and any member may explain when he thinks himself misrepresented.

- Rule 9. When a member desires to a question of privilege, he shall briefly state the question; but it shall not be in order for him to proceed until the President shall have decided it a privileged question.
- Rule 10. No person shall speak more than twice on the same question, nor more than ten minutes at one time, without leave of the Conference; nor shall any person speak more than once until every member choosing to speak shall have spoken.
- Rule 11. When any motion or resolution shall have been acted upon by the Conference, it shall be in order for any member who voted with the prevailing side to move a reconsideration; but a motion to reconsider is a non-debatable motion and shall be decided without debate.
- Rule 12. No member shall absent himself from the sessions of the Conference without leave, unless he is sick or unable to attend.
- Rule 13. No member shall be allowed to vote on any question who is not within the bar of the Conference at the time when such question shall be put by the President, except by leave of the Conference when such member has been necessarily absent.
- Rule 14. Every member who is within the bar at the time a question is put shall give his vote, unless the Conference, for special reasons, shall excuse him.
- Rule 15. It shall be in order for him to move that the question be taken without further debate on any measure pending, except in cases in which character is involved, and if sustained by two-thirds, the question shall be taken.
- Rule 16. The motion to adjourn shall be taken without debate, and shall always be in order, except, (1) when a member has the floor, (2) when a question is actually put, or a vote is being taken; (3) when the question is pending on seconding the demand for the previous question; (4) when the previous question has been called and sustained, and is still pending; and (5) when a motion to adjourn has been negatived and no business or debate has intervened.
- Rule 17. All reports of the Boards, Commissions and Committees, shall be published and mailed to the Members of the Annual Conference ten (10) days prior to the date of meeting of the Annual Conference. Reports to be included in this mailing must be in the hands of the Secretary thirty (30) days prior to such Session.
- Rule 18. No report shall be received or adopted by the Conference until a copy has been placed in the hands of the Secretary.
- Rule 19. These rules shall not be suspended or amended except by a vote of two-thirds of the members present and voting.
- Rule 20. All materials to be published in the Journal shall be in the hands of the Secretary not later than ten (10) days after adjournment of the Annual Session or it shall be excluded unless specific permission for further delay is granted by the Conference.

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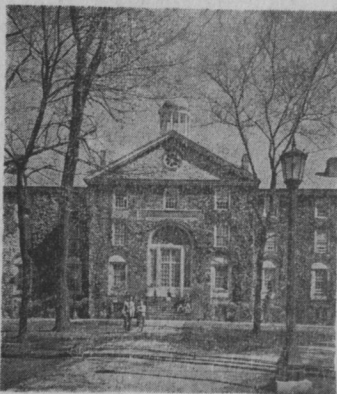
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
