





FIRST SESSION—TUESDAY MORNING

When the preacher finished, Otterbein stood up, clasped Boehm in his arms, and said to him, 'We are brethren.' May this spirit prevail among us."

PRESENTATION: Richard D. Bailey presented Solomon K. Thande, of Kenya, Africa, who is at Wesley College, Dover, under the World Student Scholarship Fund, Conference Advance Special. Mr. Thande addressed the Conference.

CHRISTIAN SOCIAL CONCERNS: The following amendment to the report of the Board of Christian Social Concerns was presented by John N. Link and adopted by the Conference.

"I move to amend the report of the Commission on Social Concerns, in the section titled "Human Relations and Economic Affairs," page 14 of the pre-Conference Reports, by deleting from lines 2 and 3, the first paragraph, the words "hard-heartedness," and "among the 'haves against the have-nots' that aggravate." Also by deleting from paragraph two, lines 2 and 3, the words "to align themselves on the side of the 'have-nots' in their communities and respective states," so that these two paragraphs shall read:

Whereas, in these times of unparalleled national prosperity and affluence there are prevalent attitudes of apathy and unrest that cause despair and militancy among poverty-stricken individuals and families, needy

children and indigent aged. Therefore, be it resolved that the Peninsula Annual Conference call upon the Churches to make a concerted effort to engender compassion and witness as a counter-force to apathy and reaction.

PENINSULA CONFERENCE

The section on Human Relations and Economic Affairs of the report of the Board of Christian Social Concerns was adopted as amended.

PRESENTATION: Howell Wilkins, Chairman of the Board of Christian Social Concerns, presented Dr. Alexander Hunns, Superintendent of the Methodist Church of Estonia. Dr. Hunns addressed the Conference through an interpreter.

CHRISTIAN SOCIAL CONCERNS: The report of the Board of Christian Social Concerns was adopted by the Conference as amended.

PROJECT EQUALITY: The following resolution was presented by Howell Wilkins, Chairman of the Commission on Christian Social Concerns,

"The Board of Christian Social Concerns recommends that the Peninsula Annual Conference endorse Project Equality, along with other religious bodies of the Peninsula, for five years. We recommend that, as a participating denomination, we provide up to \$10,000 a year."

AMENDMENT: On a motion by Gilbert Scarborough, the following amendment from the report of the Commission on World Service and Finance was accepted.

If Project Equality is approved by the 1968 Annual Conference, the costs for 1968/69 and 1969/70 shall be borne by the Contingent Fund and not more than \$10,000 shall be allocated annually on a 1:4 matching basis with the aggregate received by Project Equality from other judicatories.

MOTION: On a motion of Howard Amoss requesting the previous question on Project Equality the resolution was adopted by the Conference as amended.

MOTION: CONFERENCE SESSION THURSDAY.

The following motion was presented by Hartwell F. Chandler and adopted by the Conference. "I move that we have a session of Conference Thursday afternoon at 2:30 P.M."

CONFERENCE TREASURER: Gilbert Scarborough, Chairman of the Commission on World Service and Finance nominated John F. Kelso as Conference Treasurer. Mr. Kelso was elected by the Conference.

WORLD SERVICE AND FINANCE: The report of the Board of World Service and Finance was presented by Gilbert Scarborough, Chairman. On a motion of Charles Hart, Section #2 of the report was tabled.

"That the Conference reduce the number of Districts from five to four effective May 1, 1969."

MOTION: The following motion was presented by R. Jervis Cooke as an amendment to Section 3 of the Report of World Service and Finance.

This section of the report reads as follows:

"This Commission has studied the reports of the Drayton Manor Committee and has concluded that the continued operation of Drayton Manor as a Conference Retreat Center is not economically feasible and that the apportionment to the churches for the subsidy required for its operation cannot be justified. \$70,000 remains unpaid on the line of credit borrowed for capital improvements to this property. It is, therefore, recommended

that Recommendation 3b and 3b (1) printed on page 855, 1966 Conference Journal, be implemented."

AMENDMENT: "I move to amend the Report of the Commission on World Service and Finance, Page 70—Number 3, under Recommendations. Add to Number 3 the following:

"However, if the Committee on Drayton Manor, prior to March 15, 1969 can secure sources of operating funds apart from the Conference Budget and increase Conference and non-Conference use, so as to limit the subsidy required from the Conference Budget to \$15,000 for the Conference Year 1970/71, and the expectation of a reasonable subsidy in this range thereafter, the Commission on World Service and Finance may authorize the continued operation of Drayton Manor as a Retreat Center."

GILBERT S. SCARBOROUGH: Gilbert S. Scarborough is retiring from the Board of World Service and Finance due to the expiration of his term of office. He received a standing ovation of the Conference and the commendation of Bishop John Wesley Lord and his fellow members of the Board of World Service and Finance.

CONFERENCE TREASURER: John F. Kelso, Treasurer, presented his report and it was adopted by the Conference.

BOARD OF PENSIONS: Ira S. Pruitt, Treasurer of the Board of Pensions presented his report and it was adopted by the Conference.

ANNOUNCEMENTS were made and the Conference adjourned with benediction by Douglas F. Milbury.

COMMITTEE ON JOURNAL: C. Chapman Herrman, Jr. reported for the Committee on Journal, finding the Journal to be correct for the Third and Fourth Sessions. His report was accepted and the Journal approved by the Conference.

MOTION: On the motion of C. Chapman Herrman, the Conference granted permission to the Committee on Journal to approve the minutes of the remaining sessions without reporting to the Conference.

MOTION: The following motion was made by Charles B. Hart and adopted by the Conference. "I move that all motions and actions of the Conference be recorded in the Journal, those that are lost as well as those that are passed."

AMENDMENT: The following amendment to the motion of Charles B. Hart was presented by Lawrence J. Stookey and adopted by the Conference. "I move that all the sessions of the Annual Conference be tape-recorded to give the Secretary a full record of all that is said."

DEACONESS: The report of the Deaconess Board was presented by Willard L. Robinson, Jr. and adopted by the Conference.

PUBLISHING INTERESTS: Ralph A. Ellis presented the report of the Publishing Interests, which was adopted by the Conference.

PRESENTATION: Al Choin of the Cokesbury Publishing Company, Baltimore, Maryland, was introduced and presented the annual check of the Publishing Interests to the Board of Pensions in the amount of \$11,865.00. The check was received with an expression of gratitude from the Conference.

CHARTERED FUND: The check from the Chartered Fund in the amount of \$125.00 was presented to the Conference by Bishop Lord and received with appreciation.

PRESENTATION: Daniel L. Ridout presented Dr. Walter R. Hazzard and Dr. Paul Felton, District Superintendents from the Philadelphia Conference. They addressed the Conference and brought greetings from their Conference.

STATISTICIAN: Perry O. Hill announced the appointment of Dale R. Pruett and Alvin J. Willink as his Assistants. They were approved by the Conference.

STATISTICAL REPORT: Perry O. Hill, Conference Statistician, presented his report, which was adopted by the Conference.

MOTION: Charles E. Barton made the following motion, which was adopted by the Conference: "I move that the Conference reconsider the Amendment made by Charles Hart amending Recommendation No. 8 of the report of the Commission on World Service and Finance and defeated by the Conference."

The MOTION of Charles B. Hart, to be reconsidered, reads as follows: "I move to amend Item 8 of the report of the Conference Commission on World Service and Finance by inserting the word "tentative" before the word "adoption". We ask the Conference Council and the Commission on World Service and Finance to continue to study these recommendations and if it is thought advisable by either group that a special session of the Annual Conference be called by February 1st, 1969."

SUBSTITUTE MOTION: The following motion was made by R. Jervis Cooke and adopted by the Conference. "I move as a substitute to the motion of Charles B. Hart that Conference Council be directed to study the Program of this Annual Conference with special reference to priorities of program and financial implications of priorities and to report its findings to the World Service and Finance Commission as a guide to Budget planning, by February, 1969, and to the Annual Conference in 1969."

SECTION 8 of the report of The World Service and Finance Commission, as amended by R. Jervis Cooke, was adopted by the Conference.

THE REPORT AND BUDGET of the Board of World Service and Finance was adopted by the Conference as amended.

Workshops will be established to aid in this direction as soon as possible.

We will be taking action in a little while to complete all the legal requirements toward the merger of the Peninsula Conference and the Delaware Conference which was initiated about three years ago. Much careful planning and labor has gone into this. We thank those who have been responsible for bringing this to a conclusion.

In many ways we have been made better Christians by this action. Certainly all of us have tried to integrate our conference and district boards and committees. The realignments and mergers previously listed in this report reveal a part of this program. They represent an effort to bring us to the place where the conference can be administered within the framework of four districts instead of five. It looks as though the number of charges will be decreased to the point where we might establish these four in 1971 which fits into the original plan of merger.

But not everything has moved in this direction of Christian fellowship. I fear that at the local church level in many of the areas within our Conference, upstate as well as downstate, we have not so much as even gotten acquainted with those of either race. We are still estranged from one another. There are barriers between us, and these need to be broken down. It was the great Apostle Paul who wrote in II Corinthians 5:18 that "God was in Christ reconciling the world to himself and hath given to us the ministry of reconciliation." What are we doing about it? Can we be all that God intended His Church to be without moving together in a new way to become a completely integrated fellowship? Let us open our church doors wide, form interracial study and prayer groups in our communities, face local problems together interracially, and seek to wipe out the last bit of racism, prejudice, and avarice or self-seeking from our churches by the grace of Jesus Christ our Lord.

Many mergers could well take place between Methodist churches, whether black or white, that are too close to one another. Some of our churches are only existing as monuments to the past with very little comprehension of or participation in what is going on around them. I would hasten to add that there is no opposition to monuments to the past. It would be good if many liberals would relate to the past more than they do, and not feel that only that which is changing and new is good, and that he who sees some good in the past is a "square". But when we continue to perpetuate monuments at a cost of many thousands of dollars a year, it seems that we are engaging in a rather costly pastime. This is a day when the Christian Church needs to become truly one in Christ, if it expects the worlds

of science, technology, politics, economics, and social action to listen to its message. We may not be able to answer all the questions, but we ought to try to take society in the direction which Christian love points.

Evangelism and Education

A denominational official in charge of university work reported that when he had finished speaking to some students about applying the Gospel to social problems one of them remarked, "I wish you would first tell us what the Gospel is we are supposed to apply". Is this not a legitimate question for us to consider? Dr. Neimoller spoke at Wesley Seminary not long ago on the subject "The Gospel and Contemporary Christianity". Are they two separate things? I would say not, yet perhaps the Church has been guilty of so considering this in the past. We look to the Gospel as that which presents Christ who reconciles man to God and redeems him from his selfishness and sin, and creates new social patterns consistent with Christian love. A further development of this Gospel is that it changes the person and makes it possible for him to live like Christ in a changed Christian society which we might designate "the Kingdom of God". It is preposterous or inconsistent for us to consider the existence of a Christ-like world without Christ-like people in it. Many professing Christians today may be out of touch with their emotions. It will take the spirit of Jesus Christ in the soul to revive the emotion of love so essential to attack the world's ills and to satisfy the world's needs. To me the personal and social experiences and applications of the Gospel cannot be separated. As Bishop Hughes used to say so often, "Its not a case of either/or, but rather both/and".

Your Boards of Evangelism and Education seek to present such a Gospel. Their work is spelled out in greater detail in the pre-conference reports, and will be presented. I would commend all who have participated this year for the good work done. Rev. Walter Stone and Rev. Howard Bailey have been working together as a team of Christian brothers. They have been active in programming, and in personal involvement in many local churches in our Conference. They have been cognizant of changes in the educational patterns of the day and have constantly developed these changes among our people. Certainly the failure of our church schools to increase membership and attendance has not been because of lack of devotion and activity on the part of these two men. Rather we may well ask ourselves—pastors and laymen—are we as thoroughly committed to Christ in our personal lives as we ought to be, and are we giving proof of that commitment in the way we seek to study and to teach the Gospel to others? Does it really mean that much to us? Are we truly concerned?

Three special projects in relation to Evangelism were attempted within the Conference this past year. They were: The Urban Training Conference, A Venture in Faith, and the Lay Witness Mission. We commend the Board through its members and the Conference Secretary of Evangelism, Rev. Willard Robinson, for giving direction in these efforts. Each of these was successful in the use of new and varied evangelistic methods, and in providing opportunity for cooperative efforts in making true disciples of Christ.

Our report on net gain of new members received during the year is 1082, gross gain 4975. Still a lot of our charges are not realizing the joys of making new disciples. Success in such efforts is measured always by the degree of participation in faith, commitment and action. This is a new day for evangelism when the emphasis is twofold: personal redemption and social renewal. The temporary thrill of a conversion experience must now find its more permanent satisfaction and joy in its endeavor to change our social order to make it Christian with constant personal renewal through prayer, meditation and worship during the process.

Mission and Social Concern

Our evening programs this year, you will notice, are set up under the principal theme "The Church and Community". This speaks to the mission and social concern as our responsibility within the framework of the gospel. The Church has been busy this year trying to cope with the changing scenes of our day. But much more needs to be done.

A few weeks ago at the Annual Meeting of our District Women's Society of Christian Service the speaker presented to us four powers that are prevalent in today's world. They are: Black Power, Poor Power, Yellow Power, and Youth Power. I need not spend any time interpreting these. What is our reaction to these within ourselves and in our churches? Do we wish we could put our heads in the sand and hope like the proverbial ostrich, that these will go away? But they won't! We know it—and we have an obligation to face them, and to do what we can as Christian brethren to face them ourselves.

In my early ministry in a certain charge we had a revival. Nothing seemed to be happening. Those were days when special services were taken seriously. The church seemed to know the reason for our failure. There was a division. People were not speaking to one another—even among family groups. As pastor it became necessary for me to take the direct approach of bringing the people together. I arranged prayer meetings between people who were estranged from each other. In these moments of soul-searching God spoke and repentance and forgiveness occurred. We had a wonderful time together when people forgot their animosities and let God do His "thing" in their hearts. We need this humility—repentance—confession today. Prejudice and avarice may be two of the biggest sins for which all need to make confession.

As Christians perhaps our bitterness, selfishness, resentments, backlashes, etc., are causing a decline in the power of the Church and the Gospel as we face these other powers around us. Gospel interpretation and application has expanded beyond the personal to include the social. Perhaps in love we should be seeking to discover all the things we ought to be doing for others rather than complaining about being disturbed and seeking to maintain the status-quo of an affluent society. Yes, the Church has the greatest power of all—LOVE—SHARING—SERVICE—in the spirit of Christ. This is the total mission and social concern of the Church.

Three things are in the picture to help us in our application of these principles: (1) Apportionments; (2) Project Equality; (3) Reconciliation Fund.

(1) Apportionments. We have failed at this point and missed meeting the Conference budget by %. Why? This means increased borrowing for the Conference or cuts in projects that have already committed themselves. What does this apportionment mean to us? Is it too high? \$1.00 for ourselves and \$.49 for others. Is this too high a ratio for people who have been admonished in the Word "not to think more highly of themselves than they ought" and that "life does not consist in the abundance of things we possess" and "where your treasure is, there will your heart be also"? Perhaps we have been unconsciously guilty of self-interest by neglecting this opportunity of sharing.

I know of a sister denomination that asks an equal amount from its churches for its mission programs as is spent on themselves. My friends, it is very easy for us to become bogged down in the process of self-existence. Those who fail to meet their apportionments may be providing an example that other churches will follow when these say, "Such a charge did not meet its askings, why should we?" To these I would remind you of an incident recorded in the last chapter of the Gospel of John, verses 20-23. Jesus had given to Peter the great task of discipleship—"Feed my sheep". Peter turned and saw John. Then he asked Jesus "What about this man?" The reply of Jesus came loud and clear, "What is that to you? Follow me." It would seem to me that if the Kingdom of God means anything to us it should mean a new vision of service beyond the boundaries of the local church which is here not to be served, but to serve. "Apportionments" is a way provided each local church to do this. The need is great both for the work to be done and for you to give as a faithful steward. Let's take a new look this year and honor God in our stewardship by paying our apportionments in full even at the cost of personal sacrifice.

I simply mention the other two items that are to aid us to fulfill our mission. These are Project Equality which is a challenge to the church to conduct its business with complete Christian consistency and fairness to all people; and, the \$20 million Reconciliation Fund, which is an asking from United Methodists to help meet the economic needs of the underprivileged in every category. These have been approved by our General Conference. Let us carefully and prayerfully give heed to the challenge they present to us.

Conclusion

I know a lot more needs to be said, but I do not have time to say it now. These are days that call for us to face reality. We cannot hide. We will be reached. And God is trying to tell us something too. Let us as United Methodist churches stop looking for ways to escape our obligations. Let us open our hearts to the fuller applications of love; let us stop seeking to save ourselves. Rather let us lose ourselves in the service of the Kingdom of God for the sake of our fellowmen. Only thus will tomorrow be a bright and better day.

Let me quote the words of conclusion given by Bishop Eugene M. Frank in the final message to the Uniting Conference in Dallas. "The structure built at Dallas is 'already burning'. Let the fire burn. Let it consume

every human barrier to brotherhood. Let it consume every human structure that is unnecessary. Let it burn away pride of position. Let it burn away pride of possession and race. Let it loose in the world that God may be God and the whole world be reconciled to Him through our Lord Jesus Christ."

SUMMARY REPORTS BY DISTRICTS

CHESTERTOWN DISTRICT

DANIEL L. RIDOUT, District Superintendent

The pastors and laymen of the Chestertown District have enjoyed another year of fellowship and service, and their labors have made possible this summary report, which shows net gains in matters both spiritual and temporal.

Church Membership: Full members reported last year (figures from Conference Journal)—11,986. Received this year 482. Lost this year 303. Net gain 179. Total present membership 12,165.

Financial Report—Administration and Benevolences, apportioned, \$185,401; paid \$162,073 (87%). Rally Day \$687; Student Day \$408; Methodist Youth Fund \$1,030; Race Relations Sunday \$412; Fellowship of Suffering and Service \$986; One Great Hour of Sharing \$709; Board of Child Care \$2,905; Mother's Day Offering \$1,526; Advance Specials \$2,513; Together Subscriptions \$638; Raised for Building and Improvements \$91,494; Paid on Indebtedness \$79,217.

Significant Improvements

While most of our charges have made some improvement in church or parsonage properties, the following are worthy of special mention: Union Wesley, Chester (Kent Island) is ready to start building its new church to replace the one destroyed by fire last year. Salem Church (Worton-St. James charge) has paid \$10,000 in three years on its new parsonage, and is planning the addition of an educational wing on its church property. The property has already been acquired.

Several rural churches have installed rest rooms, including Aaron's Chapel (Rock Hall-Fairlee charge); John Wesley and Mt. Pleasant (Millington-Pondtown charge) and Warwick. Charlestown has added a new room to its parsonage to provide more adequately for the pastor's growing family. North East has thoroughly renovated its parsonage. Work on all the above projects has been paid for.

The Elkton Church has been beautified with major improvements on the interior, at a cost of \$31,846. Christ, Chestertown; St. Daniels, Church Hill-Mount Zion charge; Union, Still Pond-Coleman charge; and the Still Pond and Betterton churches have all undergone "major surgery". On the Rock Hall charge, Rock Hall Church has purchased a building for its youth and has installed a new heating plant. Raum Chapel on the same charge has installed a new organ as has John Wesley on the Millington-

pondtown charge. Centreville has \$45,000 on its proposed new sanctuary. The Perryville Church has purchased property and excavated, graded and paved it for a children's play area and for parking facilities for church services and other functions. Calvary, Queenstown Charge has purchased a building next to the church which will be removed for a future play area for children and youth and has improved its parish hall.

"Honor" Charges

While all churches that do their best are honor churches, we hereby salute those churches which register 100% in Administration and Benevolences for the year: Cecilton, Charlestown Charge, Christ-Chestertown, Church Hill Charge, Colora, Elkton, Galena, North East, Perryville, Hopewell-Port Deposit, Queenstown, Queenstown-Carmichael, Rising Sun, Rock Hall Charge, Warwick, and East Cecil.

Our sincere thanks to all who have contributed to a happy year in Kingdom building. "The Lord hath done great things for us, whereof we are glad".

DOVER DISTRICT

Church Membership: Received on Profession of Faith, 693; received by transfer or restored to rolls, 468; total received 1,161; lost for all causes, 749; net gain of membership 412. No new members reported in four charges. Those leading in number of accessions are: Dover-Wesley 145; Laurel-Centenary 91; Seaford, St. John's 60; Bethel 58; Milford-Calvary 55. Others receiving ten or more members were: Blades, Bridgeville-Union, Camden-Whatcoat, Camden-Woodside, Cheswold, Clarksville-St. Georges, Clayton, Dagsboro, Felton, Frankford, Frederica, Georgetown-Grace, Georgetown-Wesley, Harrington-Asbury, Houston, Laurel-Christ, Laurel Circuit, Laurel-Delmar, Laurel-Mt. Pleasant, Lewes-Bethel, Lincoln, Milford-Avenue, Millsboro-Grace, Milton, Milton-Nassau, Reliance, Rehoboth Beach, Seaford-Mt. Olivet, Wyoming. Let us maintain a sincere and thorough-going Evangelism in this new day.

Financial Summary: Paid on apportionment \$278,766. 28 charges met their apportionments in full; 10 paid 85% or more; 10 paid between 75% and 85%; 12 paid less than 75%. We appreciate all who are fulfilling their stewardship in giving to others and pray God to lead all of our charges into the joys of sharing in this benevolent giving in His name.

Other contributions were: Advance Specials \$4,135; Board of Child Care \$4,323; Mother's Day Offering \$3,011; all other special days \$6,116.

Other Financial Items: Paid on Building and Improvements \$466,454. Paid on debt \$181,761; Present Indebtedness \$893,327. These projects were completed: Camden-Whatcoat, new sanctuary; Frankford, new educational building; Harrington Asbury, new parsonage; Seaford-Mt. Olivet, new parsonage. Renovations and additions occurred on these charges: Bethel, Bridgeville-Mt. Calvary, Woodside, Cheswold, Dagsboro, Felton,

Greenwood, Gumboro, Harrington-Trinity, Laurel Circuit, Laurel-Delmar, Laurel-Mt. Pleasant, Lincoln, Milford-Calvary, Millsboro-Grace, Millsboro-Harmony, Milton, Milton-Nassau, Ocean View, Seaford Circuit-John Wesley, Selbyville. Dover-Wesley purchased the Old Post Office property which is being reconstructed as the Wesley Educational Building.

Many more things could be said if space permitted. Appreciation goes to all District Directors, District Lay Leader, and President of the District WSCS for leadership. We face the future realizing the enormity of our task, and the greatness of our God to provide us strength for its doing.

EASTON DISTRICT

HOWARD M. AMOSS, District Superintendent

We are grateful to God and to the ministers and laymen of all the churches for this report.

Church Membership: Total members 17,139. Received this year 705; lost this year 626. Zion of Cambridge and St. Paul's of Greensboro lead in the number of accessions, followed by St. Mark's of Easton, Grace and St. Paul's of Cambridge, St. Luke's of St. Michaels and St. Luke's of Denton. Other charges that received 15 or more new members are: Queen Anne, Federalsburg-Union, Oxford-Royal Oak, Sherwood-Bayside, Ridgely-Greensboro and Trappe-Faith Chapel.

Administration, Benevolences, Other Contributions: \$226,359 given to Administration and Benevolences or 95% of Conference Apportionments. 33 charges paid their askings in full. All the charges of Cambridge (Cambridge Circuit, Choptank, Grace, St. Paul's, Waugh, Zion), Church Creek, Crapo, Denton-St. Luke's, Miles River, St. Mark's, Federalsburg charges (Christ, Concord and Union), Galestown, Goldsboro, Greensboro, Hooper's Island, the two Hurlock charges, the two Oxford charges, Preston-Bethesda, Ridgely Circuit, the two St. Michaels charges, the three Sharptown charges, Tilghman, Trappe-Faith Chapel, Vienna-Reid's Grove and Wingate-St. Thomas. Many other charges have labored hard without reaching full payment—we salute them.

Giving to Mother's Day was \$1,629, Advance Specials \$3,394, Rally Day \$871, Child Care \$3,824, Other Benevolences \$4,094.

Payments on Debt: \$92,769 with these churches leading: St. Mark's \$25,200; Choptank \$14,169; Zion of Cambridge \$7,372; St. Paul's of Cambridge \$7,163. Zion of Cambridge burned their mortgage last October. The remaining debt is \$295,366.

Building and Improvements: Expenditures are \$114,147. New parsonages have been provided for Cambridge-Choptank and Wittman-McDaniel. Major parsonage improvements at Crapo, Federalsburg-Union, Ridgely Circuit, St. Luke's of St. Michaels, Union of St. Michaels. Major church renovations at DeShields and McGee (Miles River), Friendship (Dorchester), Henderson (Goldsboro), Mt. Vernon (Sharptown), Sherwood (Bayside), Tilghman and Scott's (Trappe). Major church school improvements at Prospect (Burrsville), East New Market charges, and Oxford-Royal Oak. New organ at Cambridge, St. Paul's. Additional church property secured

by Cambridge, St. Luke's and Federalsburg, Christ. Most of the churches now have the new Methodist Hymnal.

We commend the District Board of Lay Activities, C. C. Chilcutt, the Lay Leader and the District Women's Society of Christian Service, Mrs. Thomas F. Shockley, the President. We are grateful to the District Secretaries, the Directors of Church School work—and all those who have labored for His Kingdom.

SALISBURY DISTRICT

ALTON S. MILLER, District Superintendent

The following report represents the joint effort of the pastors and laymen of the Salisbury District over the past year.

Church Membership: 742 new members were received into our churches during the Conference Year. 758 were removed from the rolls, showing a net loss of 16. The total membership for the District is 19,857. Churches receiving ten or more new members are as follows: Asbury, Salisbury 65; St. John's Fruitland 60; Bishopville 58; Pocomoke 40; Delmar 35; Bethesda, Salisbury 34; Trinity, Salisbury 34; Christ, Salisbury 32; Parsonsburg 25; Bates, Snow Hill 23; Ocean City 22; Grace, Salisbury 21; Whaleysville Circuit 19; Smith Island 17; Immanuel Crisfield, Hebron, Riverside, Salisbury 16 each; Asbury, Crisfield, Pittsville, Wesley Temple, Salisbury, 15 each; Berlin Circuit 14; Mardela 13; Newark, Antioch, Princess Anne, Whatcoat, Snow Hill 12 each; Berlin-Stevenson, Stockton-Girdletree, 10 each.

Various methods of evangelism have been instituted throughout the District. Preaching missions, visitation, retreats and training groups have all contributed to the spiritual growth of our people. St. Stephen's Church, Delmar, has pioneered in setting up a Lay Witness Mission which has proven quite effective. I trust other churches may follow this pattern.

Stewardship and Finance: The total apportionment for the District was \$316,124. Approximately \$300,000 of this amount was paid. Forty-three of the fifty-eight charges report paying in full. The amount paid on debt for the year is \$169,429. Present indebtedness amounts to \$703,899. The amount paid on Buildings and Improvements is \$151,368. Other contributions are as follows: Youth Fund \$659; Advance Specials \$12,698; Rally Day \$993; Student Day \$632; Race Relations \$358; Fellowship of Suffering and Service \$1,416; One Great Hour of Sharing \$1,009; Mother's Day \$1,570; Board of Child Care \$4,188. Pastoral support increased by \$13,279.

Capital Improvements: Significant building improvements have been made on the following charges: Bishopville; Asbury-Crisfield; Deal Island; new educational building on Smith Island; Fellowship Hall at Girdletree; Fellowship Hall at Asbury-Salisbury; Hebron; Parsonsburg; Pocomoke Circuit; Powellville, Quantico; Riverside, Salisbury; St. Andrew's, Salisbury; Trinity, Salisbury; St. Martin's; Bates, Snow Hill; Stockton; and Oakville Cottage Grove. A new organ has been installed at Grace, Salisbury. A new parsonage is being erected at Deal Island. Additional parsonage repairs have been completed at Berlin, Parsonsburg, Pittsville, Upper Fairmount, Upper Hill and Whaleysville.

A special word of appreciation to Mrs. Robert Cleland and her staff of workers who have maintained an active and successful program of the Woman's Society of Christian Service. Also to Mr. Vernon Downes and his associates who have worked diligently in many areas of the Lay program. Their annual Laymen's Banquet was held at the Salisbury Civic Center with over a thousand in attendance. To the district secretaries who have all labored faithfully in presenting the various interests of the church, and helping to make successful our program, we are deeply grateful. Because of the united efforts of the clergy and laymen of the Salisbury District we are able to make this report. To all I express my sincere appreciation.

WILMINGTON DISTRICT

PAUL E. McCOY, District Superintendent

The following brief report is presented on behalf of the ministers and churches of the Wilmington District:

Evangelism-

1,885 members have been received, while 1,457 members have been lost this year. This gives the District a net gain of 428. The total district membership is now 27,899. Charges reporting a net gain of 25 or more are Aldersgate 138; Asbury-Minquadale 128; St. Paul's (Wilmington) 126; Atonement 61; Newark 60; St. Mark's 31; Ebenezer 29; Red Lion-Glasgow 28; Skyline 26.

Financial Summary—

The total amount of apportionments this year was \$440,437. The amount paid was \$380,744. Charges paying apportionments in full are: Red Lion-Glasgow, Christiana-Salem, Hockessin, Middletown Circuit, Asbury-Minquadale, Buttonwood-Christiana, New Castle, Ebenezer, Newark, St. Paul's (Odessa), Townsend Circuit, Aldersgate, Calvary, Cedars, Chester-Bethel, Christ, Eastlake, Ezion, Grace, McCabe, Mt. Lebanon, Peniel, Peninsula, Richardson Park, St. Mark's, St. Paul's (Wilmington), and Skyline.

Amount paid on Building and Improvements; \$229,341; Paid on Indebtedness; \$399,831; Present Indebtedness: \$2,427,254.

New parsonages have been built during the year by New Castle and Ebenezer (Newark). Mt. Joy, Wilmington has purchased another parsonage for their pastor.

Holly Oak has built a new education building.

Let me take this opportunity to express my sincere appreciation to the Wilmington District Women's Society of Christian Service, Mrs. Rachel Keen, president. As usual these women are doing a splendid work in witnessing to the Christian faith.

The same may be said for the District Laymen's Organization under Dr. A. Frank Chapman. Also, the Methodist Action Program under the able leadership of the Rev. Richard Stazesky and those who assist him in so many ways.

I am also very grateful for the able leadership given by the District Youth Staff and those working in the area of Church School work.

(b) Boards, Commissions and Committees

THE BOARD OF CHILD CARE

The Children Served

In increasing numbers, with varying and critical needs, children are referred to the Board of Child Care for a home. For example:

Jack, whose alcoholic father disappeared eight years ago, is now sixteen. The mother, over the years, has done her best for Jack, his brother and sister. Suffering from mental and physical strain, in 1968 she found it necessary to seek help for her family; and Jack is now at the Child Care Center.

Jane, now fifteen, is one of our junior high girls. Jane's father died when she was one month old. Jane's mother is "lost". Jane has lived in four foster homes since she was two. At fifteen, she is described as rebellious and lonely, of superior intelligence. Jane has found a home at the Child Care Center.

To meet varying and critical needs are varying resources at work within our staff. Within the cottage are child care workers who supervise children and who serve as mother and dad to a boy or girl who must be away from his own family. They take children fishing, shop for clothing, see that meals are served on time, greet children before breakfast and say "good night" at bedtime.

Supplementing their work, are the case worker, the consulting psychiatrist, the physician, dentist and other specialists.

A climax of this year's program was our trip to Fontana Village in the mountains of western North Carolina. Sponsored by the Woman's Auxiliary, this educational trip took the children into Cherokee Indian country and to the land of Tennessee Valley Authority. They saw the historical drama "Unto These Hills"; climbed down and through a major hydroelectric generating station; climbed mountains.

Of concern are the requirements of our boys and girls for very specialized educational programs. In cooperation with the Baltimore County Board of Education, arrangements have been made for certain of the children to attend a six-week developmental program this summer at a local school. For other children, home teaching or tutors have been provided.

Results of our influence vary from the commonplace to the dramatic. Because Methodist people care, boys and girls who otherwise would find their way to the training school or mental hospital, leave the Child Care Center and make a go of it. Others do exceedingly well. Linda is a freshman at the University of Maryland. George, a graduate of Johns Hopkins University, is learning to fly airplanes at Pensacola Naval Air Base. In Korea, "Nam", or on their way to "you know where" are Ron Ruddle, Gary Eiker, Doug Neilson, Alan Ross, each a recent alumnus of the Center. Steve Decker is a U. S. Marine.

For thirty infants placed in ADOPTIVE homes by our Board, final decrees of adoption have been issued this year. To be sure, sixty men and women, (the adoptive parents), are blessed by the presence of these little ones.

Sixty-seven UNWED MOTHERS have been served by case workers on our staff; and upon request, we have received their babies for adoptive placement.

Foster Care has been given ten children. For them and their foster parents, a Christmas party in our multipurpose building proved to be a delightful event.

The Community Served

The Board's contribution is broader than the direct services it provides. The executive director and staff have participated in various advisory committees to public welfare departments on services to unwed mothers, adoption, foster care, day care and group care of children. The executive director has represented the National Board of Hospitals and Homes at the Interfaith Consultation on Social Welfare. Sociology majors at Western Maryland College have visited our grounds and are doing field work at our Child Care Center and with our foster children. Likewise, we are accepted for field work placements from schools of social work at Universities of Maryland and North Carolina.

Courses for child care workers have been completed by four of our staff: Mr. and Mrs. Ralph Souder and Mr. and Mrs. William M. Mitchell.

Every effort has been made to keep Methodist people informed of the work which is being done. Church groups are invited to visit and tour the Child Care Center. A staff member is available to go to your church with slides and a lecture. Board members, as well as members of the Woman's Auxiliary, stand ready to visit with local church members to tell the needs of children. OUR BOYS AND GIRLS, with a circulation of 34,000, is distributed quarterly throughout the year.

Woman's Auxiliary Gives Added Service

Members of the Woman's Auxiliary have rolled up an impressive score of achievement this year. They have given Christmas and graduation gifts to the children, purchased furnishings for cottages, and volunteered hours of time. They have sponsored the Annual Open House, the Christmas party, the trip to Fontana Village.

Margaret Moore, President of the Auxiliary, led a workshop at National Association of Methodist Hospitals and Homes in Cleveland.

Responding to the need for a station wagon, the women are now saving trading stamps and respectfully solicit contributions to the cause.

A Challenge

A tally of persons served is:

In residence, Child Care Center .	 80

One hundred thirty-five applications were received for admission to the Child Care Center. Of these, it was possible to accept thirty. Of ninety-four applications for services to unwed mothers, forty-seven were accepted.

Appreciation is expressed to each minister and layman who helped in the promotion of our Christmas offering. Without their help the preceding report could not be. Much has been accomplished. Even more remains to be done.

CHRISTIAN SOCIAL CONCERNS

We will begin with the reports of the Divisional Chairmen.

Alcohol Problems and General Welfare

It has been my pleasure to serve the Peninsula Conference in the above capacity.

A questionnaire and an information sheet concerning the sex revolution of our times was sent to all local church chairmen. This mailing included a list of recommended books that would help to understand the problem, and would give some insights into possible remedies.

I have spoken to several local church groups on subjects dealing with alcohol and general welfare problems in general and the sex revolution in particular. The attendance at these meetings was small, but the interest of the group made up in some way for the sparseness of the group.

I have cooperated with the Easton District in their Church School Workers' Conference, and have worked with them in the course of Christian Social Concerns entitled "Being Christian in a Crazy Mixed Up World".

At the present time, I am coordinating a study of the proposed constitution for the State of Maryland in an attempt to pass on to the local church the benefit of the thinking of some of the members of the Board of Christian Social Concerns, and some of the people who helped to draw up the proposed constitution.

I attended the Regional Strategy and Planning Conference on Christian Social Concerns held in Harlem, N. Y. in October of last year. At that time, I was elected treasurer for the Regional Strategy and Planning Conference for the next year.

The crime rate is climbing higher and higher, and the rate of illegitimate births is ever spiraling upward. If we can somehow come to grips with these two problems, I feel that we will have come a long way in helping to solve some of the problems in the area of Alcohol and General Welfare Problems.

Human Relations and Economic Affairs

Whereas, in these times of unparalleled national prosperity and affluence there are prevalent attitudes of apathy and unrest that cause despair and militancy among poverty-stricken individuals and families, needy children and indigent aged.

Therefore, be it resolved that the Peninsula Annual Conference call upon the Churches to make a concerted effort to engender compassion and witness as a counter-force to apathy and reaction.

Be it further resolved, that the Peninsula Annual Conference support the efforts of the welfare recipients in their actions to have the welfare programs improved so that those who must depend on the program for subsistence shall have a better standard of living, and maintain their human dignity.

The Board of Christian Social Concerns recommends that the Peninsula Annual Conference endorse Project Equality, along with other religious bodies of the Peninsula, for five years. We recommend that, as a participating denomination, we provide up to \$10,000 a year.

Peace and World Order

World events move at such a rapid pace that it is difficult to meet the deadlines of publication for the Conference Journal and still have a report relevant to the issues of Peace and World Order.

Another year has passed since this Board urged the Annual Conference to address itself to the issues of Vietnam. At this writing there are strong and genuine indications that new initiatives are being pursued by both parties to the dispute, as we speak collectively in terms of the nations involved on both sides of the border in Vietnam. No less urgent are the voices from throughout the world and from within our country who are stating, from every corner, the necessity of finding solutions to this world crisis of such horrifying large dimensions. This is not the time for the Church to relax its efforts, it is the time to press on urgently. We should encourage our government to pursue its present initiatives and commend them on the risk of seeking peace and avoiding the risk of pursuing war.

Continuing in the theme of World Peace, we are honored by the fact that the chairman of our Board, The Rev. Howell O. Wilkins, has recently returned from the Christian Peace Conference held in Prague, Czechoslovakia. He serves as Chairman of the Committee on Economic Problems and Developing Countries on the United States Committee. He is now singularly qualified to speak in Churches throughout the bounds of our Conference on the issues of World Peace. He and the Rev. Richard Stazesky and the Rev. Robert P. Whitlock continue to make presentations concerning recent world peace tours.

A recent questionnaire sent to all of our ministers and Churches reveals a tragic lack of involvement of the local Church in the issues of Christian Social Concerns, including World Peace; this is an interesting development and interpretation of the life and ministry of Jesus, which we profess is the foundation of our Christian faith. We would urge these practical steps, within the context of Peace and World Order:

- The observance of Peace and World Order Sunday in October, with appropriate preparations and follow-up discussions.
- 2. Visits to and appropriate studies of the United Nations and other related text books, using local Church study groups as the beginning point.
- 3. Action: Writing to our President, Cabinet members and the members of the Congress, expressing our Christian convictions, thus bringing them to bear upon our national policies.
- 4. The Minister and Laity of the Local Church should be informed in order to "render assistance to the individual who conscientiously objects to service in the military forces." (Paragraph 1823, 98, 1964 Discipline) The film, "Alternatives," which deals with alternatives to combative military services, is available in our Conference film library.

Let us not "look around" and wonder why "someone doesn't do something;" the "something" begins in our local congregations with the presence of, or lack of, leadership provided by the ministers and laymen in these Churches. To these persons we look.

We have provided program help for each of the three areas for use in the congregations. A questionnaire was sent to the churches in January. While some did not answer and some displayed an amazingly simplistic and naive attitude toward social problems, a number of replies indicated a deep appreciation of our present situation. The awareness of our condition as it really is is essential if the gospel is to be applied. We have provided training opportunities for members of the Board at various conferences to make them better able to serve and to expose them to a variety of experiences and attitudes. Materials concerning Vietnam and Project Equality have been sent to the churches. Attention has been continually centered on the concern of our intervention in Vietnam. Following the combined emphasis on Vietnam of the general Boards of Christian Social Concerns and Missions, these two boards will present an emphasis at the Annual Conference Session.

Pastors have already received information concerning Project Equality. Our Board proposes that the Peninsula Conference become a member and Provide our share of the financial requirements (\$10,000 for each of 5 Years). We trust that you will carefully study the material which has been sent. There must be a constructive break-through in the problems of the second class citizen or violence will unquestionably increase in our society. Project Equality will help get at one of the roots of the problem. In view of increasing social problems the program, personnel, and expenditures of

the conference should be reviewed to establish priorities for the corporate ministries of our church.

I was one of 35 American delegates who attended the third All Christian Peace Assembly in Prague this spring. This conference in ten years has dealt with the problems of the threat of atomic destruction, co-existence and other threats to peace. At present the attention is centered upon the conflict in Vietnam and other conflicts such as the Middle East and places in Africa. A second major concern is the problem of the underdeveloped nations and attentions which the unsatisfied people create. The indignation of Christians around the world toward the United States' intervention in Vietnam is overwhelming, but the Christians are anxious to work with Christians in our country toward a resolution of these problems. I appreciate the opportunity to be a representative at this Assembly and the fact that my wife could participate also as a result of the interest of people from our church.

It was a great experience to be in Czechoslovakia during a time of non-violent revolution—a revolution toward a new freedom, new hope and solving social and economic problems.

Change and decay in all around I see; O Thou, who changest not, abide with me.

THE COMMISSION ON CHRISTIAN VOCATIONS

There is a tremendous need today for workers in church related vocations. That such a need exists is generally acknowledged, but the size of the need is often underestimated. Current statistics indicate that every year the Methodist Church needs:

- 2,100 for the pastoral ministry and specialized ministries
- 350 for the missionary service at home and abroad
- 5,000 for the health and welfare services of the church
- 250 for Christian education in local churches
- 1,230 for college teachers and student religious leaders.

A part of this need is felt very keenly at this time of the year when there are usually more pastoral appointments to be filled than there are ministers to fill them.

It is obvious that the shortage of ministers, missionaries, Christian educators, nurses, social and medical workers, and others in church related occupations is not going to take care of itself. To help meet the shortage, therefore, the General Conference of 1948 became convinced that they must set up an Interboard Committee on Christian Vocations, the conference Commission on Christian Vocations, and the local church committee on Christian Vocations. The responsibility of the Interboard on its various levels, was described as follows:

"Its purpose shall be to develop plans and correlate efforts for the more effective enlistment and guidance of persons in vocations in the church and its agencies, and to seek to interpret to the church through its several agencies the total field of vocation in Christian terms. It shall give leadership in developing a philosophy of Christian vocation, always stressing the potential sacredness of all useful work. It shall lead in discovering and making known the various needs of the church at home and abroad, and seek to enlist youth for Christian service through all the appropriate agencies of the church. In overall planning the committee shall cooperate with its constituent agencies in the development of program so that reciprocal interest shall be maintained."

The Conference Commission of Christian Vocations, charged with implementing these aims, is composed of appointees of the Bishop and representatives of almost every board and agency in the Conference.

It must be admitted that the Peninsula Conference Commission has accomplished very little this year. It has continued previous efforts to develop a Christian philosophy of vocations and a job outline for District Secretaries, and has made temporary plans for a two year program of enlistment and training of those who have expressed an interest in a church related vocation. However, very little has been done to put these programs to work! Why?

On the surface, the reason is simple. With a potential membership of twenty, the Commission has averaged virtue of its representative nature, the alone function properly, with this kind of support.

In a world that is crying, even begging, for more workers in church related vocations, why does the one Conference Commission have such poor attendance and lack of support? Have we forgotten the need for vocations to be Christian? Are we so naive that we think that God is going to meet the shortage in church related vocations without our responsible cooperation? Do we really doubt that a Conference Commission such as ours can make a significant contribution in this area of the church's life?

Unless we come up with some pretty good answers to questions like these, there is not any practical purpose for continuing a Conference Commission on Christian Vocations. We must do more than discuss the problems, we must be willing to act ourselves.

We would like to make the following recommendations:

- 1. That each local church establish and work its committee on Christian Vocations.
- 2. That each local church invite its District Secretary to meet with its local committee members.
- 3. That each local church committee have an annual emphasis on Christian vocations through the observance of Ministry Sunday, a Career Day, or study courses in youth groups.
- 4. That each local church committee seek to cooperate with the public schools in Career Days and counseling programs to present the need for church related vocations.

- 5. That each Board or Agency which is supposed to send a representative to the Conference Commission reconsider the seriousness of its responsibility and see that its representative is present at the scheduled meetings.
- 6. That the Conference Commission be included in the budget prepared by the Commission on World Service and Finance (until now it has received its monies only through the generosity of its member boards and agencies, which are usually unable to give because of their own needs).
- 7. That our camping program at PeCoMeth renew its efforts in this area.

We feel that we are involved "from the bottom of our feet to the top of our heads" in one of the most important areas of the Church's responsibility. We need your help and participation in the work of your Commission,

THE CONFERENCE COUNCIL

The Conference Council met in June and October, 1967, and February, 1968, and has a meeting planned for May 11, 1968. There was an average attendance of 32 at the meetings.

The following actions were taken by the Conference Council during the year:

- It endorsed the construction and sale of low cost homes in Wilmington by the Peninsula Homes and Hospitals, Inc.
- (2) It voted to retain the present format of the Annual Conference
- (3) It approved the holding of the Annual Conference at St. Mark's Church, Easton, Maryland, May 21-24.
- (4) It directed the Conference Business Office to send to each pastor and each chairman of a Commission on Stewardship and Finance a monthly report on the payment of apportionments.
- (5) It conducted a study on the feasibility of having an "Urgent Needs" campaign in the conference and on the basis of this study voted against recommending such a campaign; there were several negative votes.
- (6) It endorsed the idea of developing the Wilmington downtown complex project on an ecumenical basis.
- (7) It referred to the Commission on World Service and Finance the matter of the financial situation of the Peninsula Methodist Homes and Hospitals, Inc. with a recommendation for immediate action as well as long range planning.
- (8) It endorsed the plan for having a conference co-ordinated mailing to ministers.

At its June meeting the Council studied the proposed 1967-68 program plans of the boards and agencies of the conference. After considering the plans, the Council adopted the following program emphasis for the 1967-68 conference year:

- (1) Vigorous support of the program of the Board of Evangelism is urged in every local church. It is hoped that special emphasis will be placed on the recruitment of persons for full-time Christian service.
- (2) Promotion of the conference budget (benevolence program). Every local church should utilize the filmstrip prepared on this by TRAFCO.
- (3) A serious effort to make merger more meaningful, with the adoption of the theme "Making Merger Meaningful".
- (4) Parish and inter-parish co-operation in the total program of the conference.
- (5) Faithful support of all local churches of district seminars that will provide training in the work of the various commissions and support of other kinds of district and conference programs to promote urban work, town and country work and Christian vocations.

"Diakonia" in the New Testament means service. Serving as a Methodist deaconess means acting in response to one's . . . commitment to serve Christ as Lord and desire to be in the midst of issues daily affecting and separating the lives of people from God and each other . . . professional competence based on graduate work, specialized training and experience . . . sensitivity to people and situations necessary to service in the midst of conflict . . . good sense of humor, good health and emotional stability . . . availability to serve under appointment of The United Methodist Church; age 23-45 preferred.

Deaconess Reports:

Mrs. Daisy M. Cabean serving at The Neighborhood House, Wilmington, is the only Deaconess working full-time in our Conference. Miss Louise Whitsett, retired, has continued in part-time work at Asbury Church, New Castle. The following human interest story, which Mrs. Cabean shares with us, is the kind that could be retold many times, for it is this meeting of human need that is the work of a Deaconess.

"Two children came to us by recommendation from the welfare department. They were very small in stature and that is the reason one could not go to public kindergarten. They came, and the other children received them, but they did not respond to them in any way. Day after day passed and we had to guess what they might want or need, even to their personal needs or desires. We worked for several weeks before any change came. The first time the little boy spoke, the children laughed and said, 'He can talk, he can talk.' Now they have opened up, and we can communicate. They ask as graciously as the other children, 'may I please' or 'thank you'. They enjoy playing, singing and listening to stories. They are learning to use paints and other materials. It has been a rewarding experience to watch them grow from day to day. At this point we are very hopeful they will be ready for public kindergarten this coming fall."

Changes:

With the coming of the United Methodist Church there has also come some changes in the Deaconess Board. There will no longer be a Conference Deaconess Board. The following two paragraphs explain the Annual Conference promotion of Deaconess service.

- 1. The interpretation of the office of deaconess and the enlistment of women to this office in the Church will be the responsibility of the Annual Conference Commission on Christian Vocations, and the Women's Society of Christian Service in cooperation with the National Division through the Committee on Deaconess and the Joint Committee on Missionary Personnel.
- 2. The National Division through the Committee on Deaconess will work in cooperation with the Conference Committees on Education, Missions and the Conference Board of Hospitals and Homes in initiating, exploring and recommending new channels and fields of service for the Deaconess.

Call:

There is a call to young women to be involved in special ministries as a Deaconess. This call is to where conditions deny people the freedom and right to live and develop as responsible persons . . . where people are searching for personal identity, relationships and meaning in life . . . in the ghettos in urban and rural society . . . on the college and university campus . . . among the physically and emotionally handicapped . . . among the decision makers. The Conference Deaconess Board asks every minister and layman of the Conference to help young women in our churches to hear this call.

DELAWARE STATE COUNCIL OF CHURCHES FOR THE YEAR 1967

Ecumenical worship, inter-faith study and action, legislation program, merger study, ministry to migrants—all of these could be used to characterize the work of the Delaware State Council of Churches in 1967. Most of them were expressions of the widening cooperation which the religious community of Delaware is experiencing. Each has had the potential—if used wisely—of multiplying the impact of the constructive forces in the state. None, however, has realized its full potential because the churches in the

Council are still not quite clear in their minds if they really want to work in partnership. Until we can resolve this crucial question the power of a united witness for Christ will escape us.

In the Second Delmarva Ecumenical Service at the beginning of 1967, pr. R. H. Edwin Espy, General Secretary of the National Council of Churches, was the preacher. Representatives of the major traditions took leadership in the service. 700 people from various parts of the Peninsula attended. The registration of attendance indicated that larger numbers of Roman Catholics were present than of any other church. The decision had already been made in the Delmarva Ecumenical Committee before this service that there was need for moving this feature of the observance of the Week of Prayer for Christian Unity closer to the local level. The services in 1966 and 1967 had served to dramatize the possibilities to be found in such worship.

Towards the end of 1967-in October and November-over 500 people took part in a study and action program of the Delaware Interreligious Committee. This involved months of planning by a committee headed by former Governor Elbert N. Carvel. Jewish, Protestant and Roman Catholic members worked in this period to prepare study materials, set up local discussion groups in 20 communities across the state and organize a state-wide conference. The focus was on "Needy Families With Children in Delaware". The purpose was to see if there were ways by which the cycle of poverty could be broken enough to salvage at least some of the younger victims of poverty for useful, contributing lives. Resolutions from the study groups were considered at the state-wide conference. Those adopted at the conference were then brought to the attention of agencies and individuals including Governor Charles L. Terry, Jr. A few of them have been implemented, most are still waiting action. At least the joint study and action program increased the number of people more vividly aware of the necessity for action to remedy the blight of poverty on American life.

"The working poor" as seen in the migratory agricultural worker continued to be high on the list of Delaware State Council of Churches priorities. A migrant ministry seasonal staff of 6 consisted of 2 Negro and 2 Spanishspeaking field staff plus 2 in a pilot infant care center in a house trailer. The use of the latter was given by the potato grower on whose farm the center operated. A grant of over \$23,000 from the United States Public Health Service made possible a greatly expanded Migrant Health Project. As a result—the first time—the Delaware Migrant Health Project was able to pay part of the costs of in-hospital patient care, out-patient emergency care, and dental treatment. A total of 389 migrant patients were treated under the Project. Of these, the bulk-289-were seen in the offices of cooperating physicians. The 2 nurses on the project staff made 145 referrals and had 260 follow-up calls in migrant housing camps. There were 180 out-patients, 40 in-patients, and 34 patients cared for in clinics. The highly successful Spanish-English Sunday evening services in lower New Castle County continued, rotating among cooperating churches. New activities for Spanish migrants were added in Kent County mainly among Texas-Mexicans at the Green Giant Woodside plant. One of the most interesting was a picnic at

Cape Henlopen so these people from the southwest could achieve their dream of seeing the Atlantic Ocean.

Certain of the established programs of the Council continued to minister to special needs. These included the chaplaincy at Camp Rodney of the Boy Scouts of America, Sunday morning services during the summer at Indian River Inlet and Trap Pond, the Church World Service United Clothing Appeal, the joint Delaware Church News radio program with the Wilmington Council of Churches, and the persistent work of the Legislative Committee. Almost 1,000 people attended the services in the two state parks. A record was set in Church World Service clothing contributions when more than 10 tons were given in Delaware in 1967. Delaware Church News, heard over four stations across the state, continues to give a positive, factual voice to the churches of Delaware.

What may prove to be the most far-reaching action in 1967 was taken at the Ninth General Assembly in November. This authorized the Executive Board to take action to "respond to the racial and economic revolution of our day". In a special meeting following the General Assembly, the Board set up a Committee On the Church's Response to the Racial and Economic Revolution of Our Day.

We are grateful for the cooperation which has been given by ministers and laymen of the Peninsula Conference in the work of the Delaware State Council of Churches in 1967. It is clear to all, certainly, that the times require of us—individually and corporately—the most faithful stewardship so that our Christian witness may count for the meeting of the urgent personal and social needs of our day.

DRAYTON MANOR

One of the outstanding assets of the Peninsula Annual Conference is the Retreat Center, Drayton Manor, at Worton, Maryland. From across our five Districts; from small rural churches; from urban centers and suburban communities people have been receiving real spiritual benefit from programs shared in this beautiful setting.

In our age such as this when we move from crisis to crisis it is imperative that a place be provided where Christians can go apart for a while to gain fresh perspective and renew their faith.

The Peninsula Conference, which has done so much for its children and youth, cannot afford to neglect its adult membership. At Drayton we provide a wide variety of experiences designed to meet the needs of these adults. Most retreats are planned by the local churches using their own leadership, but a number of programs this year have been planned by our Director, The Reverend Omro M. Todd. Use of Drayton is flexible to allow for a wide range of programs.

This year Drayton has been used for approximately 2800 people-days. This has involved 63 groups, most of them from our churches. We have contracts as of this writing with 25 groups involving an estimated 1223 people-days in the new Conference Year.

Weekends at the Center are filled through the fall. There are still open dates for midweek sessions. Reservation requests should be addressed to the Director at Worton, Maryland 21678.

The Committee has met on a regular schedule throughout the year. Maintenance of house and grounds has been a major concern as well as development of program and strategy of promotion. We wish to commend The Reverend Omro M. Todd for his excellent service in this significant ministry. His judgment is sound. His leadership has been a real inspiration through the Center. Mrs. Todd, who has done so much as secretary to assure the efficiency of our operation, and as hostess to provide a warm hospitality to our guests, deserves our thanks and praise.

The Committee urges the Conference to continue the ministry begun at Drayton Manor. The financial crisis in which the Conference finds itself could be solved if all our churches assumed their fair share of our Conference Budget and paid their askings in full. We believe that if careful study were made of priorities for program that it could be demonstrated that the spiritual development of our people requires a facility such as Drayton Retreat Center.

THE BOARD OF EDUCATION

We, the members of the staff, recognizing the responsibility resting upon us to execute the program for which the Board of Education is responsible, present this report of our activities of the year.

Children's Work has been promoted under the leadership of Mrs. G. Steele Phillips, the conference director. Because of the need to be in closer and more direct communication with the local church, effort was made to enlist more sub-district directors. Other activities include: Conducting surveys to discover potential leadership and other resources in the local churches; workshops to develop leaders in Vacation Church Schools; Day Camp Consultation; and a Conference for Leaders of Children with 95 in attendance.

Northeastern Jurisdiction Lab School and Seminar. Our conference was host to one of the 2 regional lab schools and seminars. 50 persons were enrolled—27 from our own conference.

Youth Ministry. The Reverend H. Kirby Krams, director, reports: A Sr. High Week at PeCoMeth was held which became an experiment in youth and adult communication. The Fall Conference was under the leadership of John Randolph. Spring Conference will be held at St. Paul's Church, Wilmington, under the leadership of Mrs. Virginia Norton. The director has visited 14 of the subdistricts during the year and has spoken on the new youth ministry.

He spoke to the district conferences of the Salisbury, Easton, and Wilmington Districts and taught in Christian Workers' Schools. Also, 2 Successful MYF New York Trips were conducted.

A Convocation for Youth Leaders of the conference was held with 90 persons present. Presently, we are conducting a 5 session Coaching Conference for about 30 youth leaders who are seeking certification for the course "Planning For The Church's Ministry With Youth." These persons will be available to Christian Workers' Schools on every level throughout the conference. During July and August, we will hold 27, 2-hour workshops scattered in every section of the conference to help teachers and youth leaders to become acquainted with the new resources to be used in every local church in September.

Adult Work. Not in recent years have adults had such an adventure in Christian education as they have had during the past year preparing for the use of the new curriculum resources. 25 Workshops were held on the use of these resources with 446 in attendance.

Our conference participated in the following: Convocation on Young Adult Ministry, Philadelphia; A Young Adult Retreat Weekend at Drayton Manor; and the Middle Atlantic Adult Convocation at Buck Hill Falls.

General Church School Work. In cooperation with other conference boards, our board sponsored workshops in May 1967, for the purpose of helping local church leaders. 936 were enrolled, 215 in the education section.

The Church School Leaders' Weekends. There were 2 weekends held at Drayton Manor in September. Dr. Mary Alice Edwards and Dr. Harold DeWolf, both of Wesley Seminary, were resource leaders. 70 persons participated in the weekends.

Much of the program is promoted by the district staffs, under the leadership of the Director of General Church School Work. Regular meetings of the district staffs have been held on all districts. 5 District Christian Workers' Schools were held with a total enrollment of 823.

PeCoMeth Activities. Camp director, Wallace P. Smith, reports the use of PeCoMeth during the "off-season" now equals its summer use. On fall, winter, and spring weekends and holiday periods, there were 1,134 campers from 56 churches. During the summer, 1,277 children, youth and adults were enrolled in one of 8 different types of programs. The Main Camp program still accounts for about 70% of all campers with the remaining 30% involved in the barn area, pioneer camping, or trip camping. There was a total of 32 individual programs in these 8 areas. Besides the regular campers, there were 135 family campers and 2,720 picnickers. The grand total for the '67 conference year was 5,036 campers at PeCoMeth for a sum of 13,924 camper days. Camp was used 202 days. Fifty full-time summer staff were employed. Approximately 50 volunteers were used for the Jr. and Sr. High programs. For 1968, the entire staff will become fulltime, salaried, well-trained, in-residence counselors. PeCoMeth is served year-round by Wallace Smith, director; Glen Grimes, maintenance manager; and Marsha Grimes, secretary-registrar. "Wally" is constantly visiting the churches and welcomes every invitation.

Music Committee Activities. Thomas C. Flynn, chairman, reports that the committee has held meetings to coordinate its projects, as well as to stimulate fellowship among the church musicians of our conference. There are presently 26 members on the committee, representing all districts.

committee has sponsored in each district a "Great Day of Methodist Singing" service with the offering in the amount of \$159.27 being sent to the Scholarship Fund of the National Fellowship of Methodist Musicians. Also, a Children's Choir Festival is planned and has an advance registration of 324.

Campus Ministry. Our conference campus ministry is under the general direction of the Committee on Higher Education of which William H. Revelle, Jr., is the chairman. He reports: "The work of the committee has functioned in 2 areas. The first area is the securing of conference funds for schools and colleges. The largest recipient of funds is Wesley College, Dover, and the next is Wesley Seminary. Token contributions are given to American University and Western Maryland College. In giving these funds, peninsula Methodists reveal their dedication to a better trained people for tomorrow.

The second area in which the committee functions is supplying a campus ministry to non-church related institutions. Changes in ministerial leadership have occurred and are continuing to occur. It is difficult to evaluate this type of ministry in terms of statistics. It is firmly believed by all related to this work that a positive and supportive presence on campus serves as a witness to the church's concern for its youth.

Appreciation is expressed to the Newark Methodist Church, Christ Church in Chestertown, Metropolitan Church in Princess Anne, Whatcoat Church in Dover, and Asbury Church in Salisbury for the facilities and assistance provided for the campus ministry. We are grateful to the Reverends Richard Hicks, Jason Blundon, Clayton Hammond, and Mr. John Clinton for the leadership they have given and we extend special thanks to Mrs. Gloria Vanderhoogt, who, in the interim since the resignation of Leland Hall, is providing guidance until the appointment of a new director is made at the University of Delaware.

Special Services to Local Churches. Mrs. Homer Clark from the Board of Education in Nashville spent 5 weeks in our conference rendering special services to clusters of charges in the following locations: Galena, Md.—St. Michaels, Md.—Ocean View, Del.—Berlin, Md.—and Townsend, Del.

In addition to the above, members of the conference staff have served in a variety of ways in LOCAL CHURCHES, such as holding worker's conferences, conducting demonstration classes, delivering sermons, lectures, etc. A total of 205 engagements have been filled during the year.

Interboard Cooperation. More and more we are coming to see that the church's ministry is one. It has been our privilege to cooperate with the following boards and agencies in our common ministry: Boards of Missions, Social Concerns, Evangelism, Ministerial Training & Qualifications, Lay Activities, Woman's Society of Christian Service, TRAFCO, Commission on Christian Vocations and the Commission on Town and Country. In addition, we have worked with the Councils of Churches of Maryland and Delaware in the area of education. Special concern for students has been expressed through the promotion of Methodist Student Day, Student Recognition Day, and Race Relations Sunday.

Word of Appreciation. To Bishop Lord, members of his cabinet, members of the Board of Education, the pastors, and the unnumbered co-workers in the teaching ministry, we are ever grateful. A special word of gratitude is expressed to the Reverend Donald O. Hornung who, for the past 8 years (four of which were spent as president), has provided outstanding leadership to our board. The work of our staff is a challenging one. The task is never done. With God's help we shall seek to meet each day as it comes in the knowledge that if what we do is in accord with His will, our labors are not in vain.

CONFERENCE EDUCATION SOCIETY

Regretfully, the financial trend of the Society continued downward the past conference year—both in receipts and in disbursements. The number of students receiving grants decreased from twenty-seven to twenty-six. The decrease in money allotted was more pronounced, dropping from \$3,475 to \$2.225.

On the encouraging side of the ledger, however, we were able to keep pace with the previous year by sending \$1,000 to Wesley College. Said sum was to be allocated by the administration to deserving students from the Peninsula Conference area.

Two grants, one for \$500, the other for \$250, were made from the Riddle Domestic Fund to applicants from the Conference furthering their

ministerial training at Drew University. Money from this fund may be granted only to those attending Drew.

We very much dislike writing the report of the Society each year in the "poor mouth" vein. On the other hand, we think we have to paint the picture of its activity as it exists. We do not, and cannot, believe that it is in the true Methodist tradition to be satisfied in merely doing a little good. Our worthy students are deserving of our greater support of the Student Day offering. Contributions to it are investments in many of tomorrow's leaders of our church and of our nation.

BOARD OF EVANGELISM

Recently when K. Morgan Edwards addressed The Council of Evangelism Meeting in San Antonio, Texas, he said: "One of the obvious conclusions which must be drawn from the biblical record is that evangelism and mission cannot be separated from each other, nor can they be divorced from the church." It has been the purpose of your Conference Board of Evangelism to work in harmony with this concept in the plans and programs of this past year.

Urban Training Conference:

June 19-30 were the dates of The Urban Training Conference held in Wilmington and sponsored by the Board of Evangelism. Fifty-five pastors, college and seminary students attended the sessions. The participants formed task forces which went out into the community to get firsthand facts. They learned: (1) The suburban churches must be enlisted as an ally, not merely criticized as an enemy. (2) Social welfare is not enough; Christians must involve themselves in community structures that mold the city. (3) The poor do not respond creatively nor appreciatively to handouts, though outright welfare is often a necessity. (4) Involvement of the people of the inner city in planning is essential before creative results can be expected. (5) The Christian Gospel of love, made incarnate, is the inner-city's only hope. (6) God is already at work in the inner-city even though much of His work is being done outside the church. (7) No strategies can be merely handed down. With basic principles in mind, strategies must be hammered out by the people of the inner-city, both in and outside the church.

All was not harmony, of course. The trainees found that adjustments to this new approach in evangelism was not easy to make. Some ministers as well as city leaders were suspicious.

As it turned out, the abrasive moments only served to deepen the efforts of the church to bring the ministry of reconciliation to the innercity by calling its religious and secular structures to their true vocations as servants in the humanizing process.

A Venture in Faith:

This plan was first presented in January 1967, and drew to a close in November. This plan can still be used if for some reason your church has not used it. Its purpose is to give an opportunity for personal spiritual renewal. Although this plan was not universally used by the churches across the Conference, where it was followed there were good results. Clergy and laymen alike came to a deeper understanding of their Christian faith and commitment.

Lay Witness Mission:

On November 1, 1967, the General Board of Evangelism announced the creation of a new department. It is the Department of Lay Renewal, and is headed by Ben C. Johnson. This Department has as its aim the renewal of the laity as a vital fellowship in Christ and the equipment of this lay ministry for service in the world.

In order to acquaint our Conference with this new concept in evangelism several steps were taken. (1) A dinner meeting was held at St. Mark's Church, Easton, to which all the members of The Conference Board of Evangelism, District Superintendents, Chairmen of other Conference Boards, and other key laymen and clergymen were invited. Held on February 2, there were 152 in attendance, and Ben C. Johnson was guest speaker. (2) Tapes describing the Lay Witness Mission were sent to each District Superintendent and booklets outlining the plan were distributed to all attending the dinner. (3) Several pilot missions were set up: St. Stephens, Delmar, May 10-12; Grace, Millsboro, April 19-21; Waugh, Cambridge, May 17-19; Unity-Washington, Hurlock. (4) The film "The Search", which shows a Lay Witness Mission in action, was shown on each District. (5) A Lay Witness Retreat was held at Drayton Methodist Center, April 5-7, to which thirty-five laymen attended.

Besides those named above, twelve other churches from all across the Conference have indicated they are planning such a Mission this coming year. You are urged to obtain the tapes from your District Superintendent, or write the Board of Evangelism, and discover this new concept in evangelism.

Conference on Evangelism:

This year the Conference on Evangelism, held annually at Drew University, Madison, New Jersey, will be July 1-5. The Conference program is designed to contribute to the spiritual and intellectual integrity of local church leaders and programs.

Planning Retreat:

A retreat for planning and inspiration will be held at Drayton Methodist Center, June 14 and 15. This coming year will mark not only the beginning of a new quadrennium, but also the merger of our church with the E. U. B. Church. There will be a large turnover in personnel on the Board as well as structural changes. It is vital that all members of the newly formed Board attend this planning retreat.

conclusion:

1968

An evangelism that does not relate the newly committed Christian to the world in which he lives, nor point the already committed Christian in the direction of the issues of the day, is an evangelism that is dead. Dr. Joseph H. Yeakel, former Secretary of Evangelism of the E. U. B. Church, recently defined evangelism as "a response of the Christian at the point of human need". It would seem that the Conference Board of Evangelism has its work cut out for it in this day in which we are living. We find our challenge phrased for us in the book The Converted Church by Dr. Paul L. "That the church needs to change the direction of its life from the self-centered and cautious piety to costly love for the world to which it has been sent is obvious to growing numbers of informed Christians. The imperative confronting the church is to reverse the direction of its life; to be converted toward the world that it might there join Christ in his liberating work; to be transformed from the unholy worldliness of caution, fear and retreat to the holy worldliness of boldness, courage and sacrificial love for all sorts and conditions of men."

REPORT ON THE 1968 GENERAL CONFERENCE TO THE PENINSULA CONFERENCE MAY 21, 1968

Impressions

If anyone has ever believed that the Methodist Church is dead or is dying, let him go to a General Conference! Out of a long preliminary period of soul-searching and agonizing, out of the travail and gaspings of two week's labor, a healthy, well-formed baby was born. Oh yes, we laughed, we cried, we gritted and cut our teeth. We even went into spasms. We kicked the bottom of our crib, and the more we sensed its confinement the harder we kicked. We flexed our muscles and shook our fists into the face of the world. We bellowed for attention and quite conceivably tried the patience of an indulgent, loving Father. The flashes of new lights and shadows across our eyes were dazzling and utterly confusing. The process of a new baby aborning was marvelous to behold, and caught the attention of all Christendom. The more our witnesses expressed amazement at our convolutions, the more we were cradled in the security of being alive and in the sense that maturity was already advancing. The child will survive; it is healthy, vigorous and already on its feet.

We went through the refiners' fire. We were heated and we were cooled; we were baked and we were doused; we were hammered and we were blasted. We were forged and we were fashioned. Some alloys are said to have been added; but the structure is more durable and more serviceable. Behold! What hath God wrought!

Yes, ours is a new church,—on this there is full agreement. Some of our critics and some of our members will say, "Too new." But is it

too new? Has the church ever been too new? History shows that all institutions, including the church, tend to become too old. Any progress whatsoever, in the name of man or in the name of God, be it ever so slight, when compared to the old to which people cling, is always "too" new. We readily applaud all newness that brings mankind to where we are; we tend to be inert against all further newness.

Of course the church changes. The Mission of the Church never changes, but the concept of that Mission does change. God never changes; his righteousness, his love, his relationship to Man are the same as ever. But the Church, in order to reveal Him, must change with change.

The theme of challenge rang out consistently. We heard it in the Episcopal Address delivered by Bishop Lloyd C. Wicke on April 22; it was a monumental document signed by all the Bishops. We note therefrom one particular emphasis in these words:

"Behold the City, that giant striding across the earth's face. . . . The city, marked by the vast, unescapable clutter of people everywhere: but in whose caverns and towers men find their hiding place of anonymity and coveted lostness. The city, to which men march for freedom from enslavement, for beckoning opportunity; but where so many find captivity, torture and death. . . . The city where princes dwell in regal splendor, quite untroubled by their brother; where paupers languish amidst rancid decay sorely troubled but unheard. The city which is the market place where some find their stake of gold; but where so many find their crushing abyss of relentless, numbing poverty. The city, which is the mecca for the healing and the saving arts; but also the capital of vice, violence and friendlessness. . . . The city, that conglomeration of people, places and things where our schizophrenias ran rampant and all too often we place the item upon tomorrow's agenda, and then refer the matter to a committee or a commission hoping that our generation may outlive the denouement in undisturbed peace. The city, the place so many shun or curse. The city, the place over which He wept. The place where He died! The city, the testing plot for the Gospel. ... Here is a new frontier! And, what is the Church doing in all this world?"

The challenge again rang out during the tremendously impressive Unification Service on April 23. The sermon of Dr. Albert C. Outler, theologian, gave flesh and blood to the goal of all church union: "We seek to be a church truly catholic, truly evangelical, truly reformed." A church catholic is a church requiring unity without uniformity, a church belonging to all followers of Christ to whom all may belong, a church that opens her sacraments to all other Christians and to all who desire to be Christians. A church evangelical is a church whose mission goes far outside itself; a church whose heart remains the heart of the Gospel of God's love, a church that teaches and teaches and teaches. A church reformed is a church that does not become an end in itself, that does not become sectarian, that is intentionally open to creative change, a church that lives by the ever-freshening breezes and appeal of the Scriptures.

On Friday, April 26, we heard yet another challenge from Roman Catholic Archbishop John Joseph Carberry of St. Louis. He quoted John

Wesley as never have I heard any Methodist! He recommended to us our Founder's faith that all people, everywhere, can recognize the Universal call to Holiness. Archbishop Carberry said, "As we draw closer to Christ, we also draw closer to each other. Thank God for the new life between us!"

On the following day Bishop John Owen Smith of Atlanta, Georgia referred to the meeting between Jesus and Nicodemus, and to Jesus' statement, "... the wind bloweth ..." Today the church ought to open its windows wider, and let the winds of God blow through "where it listeth." How often we make Herod, Judas and other Bible characters our scape-goats for failing Jesus. Of course we cannot save the Church by ourselves. "Let God breathe new life into it!"

Many Bishops addressed us and challenged us. Time does not allow further synopses of what was said. But each one spoke from the heart. We can consider ourselves blessed to be associated with these men in God's kingdom.

Conference Action

The emphasis for the Quadrennium 1968 to 1972 is to be "Reconciliation." This is to be implemented by two concurrent programs of the church:
(1) Sacrificial giving and (2) sacrificial service. These will be explained in that order.

A special "Fund of Reconciliation" in the amount of \$20,000,000 is called for. The goal is a pace-setting, "over-and-above" contribution from every Bishop, every minister and every member of every United Methodist congregation. It is not an Apportionment but is in addition to all apportionments. It is an opportunity for a real feeling of sacrifice for Jesus Christ. Before the Session closed in Dallas on May 4, the members of the General Conference had pledged around one-half million dollars toward the \$20,000,000.

The Fund of Reconciliation will be divided as follows:

- (a) 50% of the amount raised in each Episcopal Area will be used by that Area for meeting its needs and opportunities inherent in the current crises.
- (b) 50% of the amount raised will be deposited with the Council of World Service and Finance of the United Methodist Church for emergency and reconstruction needs related to the mission of the church in the United States and overseas.

The companion program will be a United Methodist Voluntary Service to which "persons from age 18 to age 30 may offer themselves for periods of direct service as a part of Task Forces organized for specific works of reconciliation or reconstruction wherever they are needed." They would during such period be supported on a subsistence basis.

The following annual budget was adopted for the Quadrennium ending in 1972:

Out of the above total annual requirement of nearly \$39,000,000, the Episcopal Fund in the amount of \$2,700,000 will be raised on the basis of 2% of all minister's salaries.

The recruitment, training and continuing education of ministers is now receiving church-wide support. This fund will begin in 1970. It will be apportioned @ 2% on the non-capital non-benevolent giving of each charge. The amount collected by each conference will be divided as follows:

- (a) 25% will be retained and administered by the Conference Board of Ministry.
- (b) 75% will be forwarded to the General Board of Education and administered by that Board's Department of Ministry for equitable distribution among the seminaries.

A new Commission on Religion and Race was created. An amount of \$700,000 was appropriated for its use. This will be a prior claim on the portion of the Fund of Reconciliation deposited with the Council of World Service and Finance.

The General Conference endorsed "Project Equality," and recommended that our churches co-operate with other Agencies supporting it. In parallel action, the Conference endorsed the recent action of the National Division of the Board of Missions, which removed an investment portfolio of \$10,000,000 from the First National City Bank of New York, when that institution joined in renewing a line of credit to the Apartheid Government of South Africa.

Church-State Relations were considered. The following conclusions were reached:

- (a) Facts must be faced; there is far less separation of church and state today than we like to admit. Rather, we have interaction and correlation.
- (b) The Church will support conscientious objectors to war, but not on the basis of discriminating between wars.
- (c) The Church will support dissent and civil disobedience, but only where such act is the "deliberate and non-violent disobeying of a law believed to be unjust or unconstitutional" and is undertaken with "the willingness to accept penalties for that violation" of the law.

- (d) No Methodist or Methodist congregation may speak for the United Methodist Church on issues of the day; this right is reserved to the General Conference. The church will support an individual's right, or the congregation's right, to speak in his or its own name.
- (e) Exclusion from taxation of unrelated business income received by churches ought to be discontinued. Where churches are not taxed, appropriate contributions ought to be made for essential services provided by the governments.

The General Conference granted organizational autonomy to Methodists in 14 countries outside the United States. But plans were initiated to develop, if possible, a universally stronger, world-wide Methodist structure. First, a series of Jurisdictional Conferences will acquaint the Church in the United States with the problems of autonomy and interdependence. These conferences will be followed by a world-wide Methodist Structure Conference composed of 175 delegates from the United States and 125 delegates from other countries.

The General Board of Christian Social Concerns was given permission to publish its own periodical. Up to the present time the publication of the magazine "Concern" had been controversial.

More has been said about the stand of the General Conference on tobacco and alcohol than on any other product of that Conference. However, on no other issue is there less understanding. Let me assure you, the stand of the church we now call United Methodist is not diminished. If anything, our stand on all self-indulgences is deeper and more responsible than ever before, for it applies to layman and minister alike. Before we consign our ministers to the barroom and our bishops to the smoking car, let us all read in our new Discipline the earnest policy statements issued at the General Conference by the General Boards of The Ministry and of Christian Social Concerns.

The meaning of Christian Stewardship was broadened. It includes:

- (a) Individual's time and ability.
- (b) Personal and natural resources.
- (c) The church's influence and power.
- (d) All services to world community.

The structure of the local church or charge has been partially overhauled. Transition will occur this Conference Year. A Manual for this purpose will be issued before the Fall, since the publication of the new Discipline will require a much longer period.

A Special Session of the General Conference will convene in the year 1970 in Baltimore. The next Quadrennial General Conference will meet at Atlanta, Georgia, in 1972.

Our Church today accepts the challenge of change. We also note in Jesus' parable (Luke 14) what the master of the house told his servant: "Go out quickly into the streets and lanes of the city, and bring in hither the poor, and the maimed, and the halt, and the blind." He later bade the same servant: "Go out into the highways and hedges, and compel them to

come in, that my house may be filled." Thus, your church and my church refuses to remain in the House by the Side of the Road, and let the crowds of the city and of the world pass by. It proposes to walk in the Road, to travel afar, to lead, to lift, to teach, to suffer and bleed when Man suffers and bleeds, to rejoice when Man rejoices, to share his own blessings, and to remain in that Road, until the last wayfarer has reached his Home. For this purpose, The United Methodist Church deliberately gears itself in structure, in policy and in dedication.

GOODWILL INDUSTRIES OF DELAWARE, INC.

Members of the Peninsula Conference:

During the year, 1967, 182 different handicapped persons were employed and trained for employment by Goodwill Industries. Of the total number, 75 were handicapped by physical disabilities of varying degrees of severity. Forty-five of the total number were mentally retarded to such a degree that immediate placement in a regular competitive work situation was impossible. Thirty-five of the total number were afflicted with emotional disturbances of such nature that opportunities for employment had to be provided in a sheltered environment.

In the largest majority of cases, the workers employed and in training during the year were persons requiring extended periods of service and their employment represented a continuance of service from the previous year. Perhaps in some 12 to 15 instances, workers moved on into regular industry during the 12 month period being reported.

All workers employed during 1967, were paid weekly wages based on hourly rates. Wage rates ranged from 65¢ to \$1.95 per hour with the average hourly wage rate being about \$1.00.

Total wages paid to handicapped workers during the year amounted to \$197,665.77.

The basic work program as maintained during the year was supplemented by medical controls, recreational activities, and other varied social services.

Continuing a long established tradition, half hour Chapel Services were conducted three days each week during the year; the attendance by employees being entirely voluntary. Visiting ministers, representing a wide variety of denominations in the community, responded to our invitation to speak in the Chapel Services.

Goodwill Industries' operating budget for the year, 1967, was \$354,539.40, 5.2% of which was received through the United Community Fund of Northern Delaware, Inc. This means that the agency, by the utilization of materials and articles contributed by the community, realized through its five retail stores and through other industrial channels, 95% of the year's operating funds.

The largest majority of the workers employed by Goodwill Industries during the year were so severely disabled by physical and mental disabili-

ties that employment in regular commercial industry would have been very difficult, if not impossible. Rather than being tax burdens on the community in the form of recipients of public funds, Goodwill workers were taxpayers themselves. About \$32,000.00 was paid during the year in Withholding Taxes, Social Security payments, and Delaware State Income Taxes by Goodwill employees. In addition to the taxes paid, Goodwill workers, through the wages and salaries earned, added to the economy of our local community nearly \$250,000.00 in potential purchasing power.

Goodwill Industries' Board of Directors, staff and handicapped workers take this opportunity to express sincere appreciation to the members of our Peninsula Conference for their splendid support during the past year.

HISTORICAL SOCIETY

The 187th Anniversary of Barratt's Chapel was held Sunday afternoon, November 12, 1967 in the Chapel. The speaker was the Rev. C. Irving Carpenter, minister of Avenue Methodist Church, Milford, Del.

The 188th Anniversary of Barratt's Chapel will be held in the Chapel, Sunday afternoon, November 10, 1968. At this service we will have as our speaker, the Rev. Don A. Cook, General Secretary and Treasurer of The Council on World Service and Finance of the Methodist Church.

Beginning the last Sunday in June 1967 and continuing during July and August, evangelistic services were held in the Chapel. The average attendance was about 40. It is proposed to continue these services in 1968.

During 1967 about 3400 people visited Barratt's Chapel and the Museum, a large increase over the previous year.

Due to the generosity of friends we have purchased fifty of the new Methodist Hymnals for use in the Chapel, and also a leather-bound hymnal for the pulpit.

Our society has authorized the erection of a beautiful monument in the form of a cross, furnished by the Rock of Ages Company, to be placed near the site of old Bethel Church along the Delaware & Chesapeake Canal, not far from Chesapeake City, Md. When completed, this monument will be dedicated with appropriate ceremonies.

We are cooperating with Bishop Nolan B. Harmon by furnishing material and records for the Encyclopedia of World Methodism.

Our Vice-President, Rev. Charles E. Covington, is preparing a film strip of churches and places of historical interest in the Peninsula Conference. We would like to have for our records histories, programs of special events, and pictures of every Methodist church in our conference and also slides of churches and parsonages.

Among items received this year for preservation in Barratt's Chapel Museum were the following which deserve special recognition:

A beautiful carved pulpit chair from the Chesterville M. E. Church, South, now torn down. It had been purchased from St. Paul's Methodist Church, Baltimore, Md. and used in Emanuel M. E. Church, South Chesterville, Md. It was given to the Museum by Mrs. Annie Clements, daughter of David Clements, one of the founders of the Church. The Rev. Henry Caldwell cleaned, refinished and upholstered parts of the chair. Its style is that of the legislative chairs at Williamsburg, Va.

The Rev. John R. Diehl gave a hand-painted, framed picture of St. Peter's Church near Crisfield, Md., the spiritual birth-place of Joshua Thomas, parson of the Islands. St. Peter's is now designated a conference land-mark.

Mr. Charles B. Wingate, Miami, Florida, donated a lovely desk, known as the "Charles Baker Desk", believed to have been made at Duck Creek Crossroads, near Smyrna, Del. by James McDowell, Sr. in the early 1800's. It came into the possession of the Baker family about 1850. This family lived in the vicinity of Barratt's Chapel and many were active members of Barratt's Chapel.

We are grateful for these and other gifts and we request that all individuals and churches having items or records of historical interest donate them to the Museum where they will be displayed and given loving care.

Our Society has one request as follows:

In order that things of interest may be properly preserved we request the Board of Trustees of the Peninsula Conference dispose of no property until the Conference Historical Society is notified and given an opportunity to seek out that which may be of historical interest.

HOSPITALS AND HOMES

The Board of Hospitals and Homes of an Annual Conference has as its primary function the promotion of a religious ministry in the name of Christ to the aged, to the orphans or needy children, and to the ill.

Annually at Christmas time the churches in the Peninsula and Baltimore Conferences contribute to the work of the Board of Child Care. So far in 1967-1968 our Conference has given approximately \$18,000. At this rate we should come out ahead of last year in our total giving for this most worthwhile work.

The Methodist Country House continues to serve as one of the finest retirement homes in Methodism. There is a waiting list for admittance and we are glad to report that the mortgage is liquidated. The Methodist Manor House in Seaford is filling at the anticipated rate. Both the Country House and the Manor House continue to need our support through the Mother's Day Offering. Remember twenty-five percent of the residents in

both homes cannot pay the full monthly operating cost, and the Mother's Day offering is used for the purpose of trying to meet the difference.

In view of the financial situation with reference to the operating costs of both homes, the Finance and Executive Committee of the Homes is thoroughly studying ways of cutting costs. We fully expect substantial savings to result from this study.

We strive as a Board to promote these various causes. But we depend solely on you for the continuing interest and the financial support that we so urgently need.

1. The Board of Hospitals and Homes recommends that the Golden Cross offering and the Mother's Day offering be combined and that one offering be taken on Mother's Day of each year.

THE MARYLAND COUNCIL OF CHURCHES

Each year brings increased expressions of the churches working together in Maryland. The Peninsula Conference of the Methodist Church

has done much for this spirit of ecumenicity by contributions from your members serving on committee, funds for projects and the counsel of your leadership. These, combined with the support from other denominations, have made our accomplishments possible.

Areas of Cooperation

1968

A significant step was taken when the churches of the Maryland Council of Churches and the Catholic Archdiocese of Baltimore shared in a Reformation Service at the Baltimore Fifth Regiment Armory on October 31, 1967. Those sharing in this service demonstrated how advanced the excellent relationship between Protestant and Catholic is in Maryland.

The Week of Prayer for Christian Unity was a time when Catholics and Protestants held ecumenical services with hundreds of churches participating. Services were held in communities throughout Maryland with pulpit exchanges between Protestant and Catholic clergymen for the first time on a statewide basis.

Two other experiences find many Protestant denominations working together. They are the Consultation on Church Union and the Mid-Atlantic Institute of Christian Education. These are either nationwide or regional in scope, with Maryland churches participating, and are symbolic of the climate of the day.

Interfaith participation has been seen on the Constitutional Convention of Maryland and in such other enterprises as Housing and "Project Equality." In these, the Jewish community joins the Protestant and Catholic communities in taking action cooperatively.

New Developments

The Maryland Council of Churches put into full action the work of the Department of Urban Ministry with the Rev. Ronald F. Mease as director. Churches in neighborhoods are being encouraged to work more closely together on projects and activities to meet the community needs. Many are now taking steps to join forces and meet needs which, up to this time, have proven more than any single congregation could cope with. Communication across denominational lines and between the church and the community has already been of great value. As these techniques and tools are proven, they will be used in growing numbers of urban areas in Maryland. The Urban Ministry is also seeking ways to develop continuing education for clergy and a basic training for those lay persons desiring to be more effective to work in the inner city.

The effort to establish an adequate Department of Radio and Television has begun to show results. Already encouragement has come from the local stations and plans are now underway to involve not only the commercial stations but the educational stations. The challenge to communicate with persons beyond the church membership is a growing one. When we realize that one of our regularly scheduled television programs, "Faith to Faith" is being received in over 47,000 homes in Maryland, we begin to visualize the potential of this department. Truly the Church must wisely use this new and expanding ministry to people. Local radio stations,

throughout the state would also be receptive to a creative contribution from religious programming and are a real channel for communication.

Religion and the Arts is being explored by the Division of Christian Education to find ways in which this means of expression may have a larger part in the church's attempt to be understood. Leaders from the churches and the art institutions have been in dialogue and hopes are high as to the constructive results.

Expanding Programs

The Research and Planning Department has published studies on Baltimore City and Baltimore County. Now it is researching Anne Arundel, Howard and Harford Counties. Special studies are also in progress for the Elkton and Salisbury areas. Where specific needs arise there has been an even more detailed study of smaller sections and neighborhoods. The results of these studies have been made available to the denominations and their local churches to help answer questions about the communities. A special task force involving Delaware and Eastern Shore Maryland in planning has been organized.

Intelligent legislative involvement has grown out of the Legislative Seminar, held by the Division of Christian Social Relations. This Seminar had the Governor, the Chairman of the Constitutional Convention, and many State Senators and Representatives presenting their positions and holding discussions with clergymen and lay persons from the churches. An informed church membership makes for better citizens and this goal continues to be one of our objectives.

The State Parks Ministry was expanded this past summer to include three additional parks where our chaplains carried on a Summer Ministry for the thousands of campers. These were Assateque, Shad Landing, Millburn Landing, with a total of 132,289 campers. Our total State Park Ministry included seven parks which were used by 312,780 Campers last year. This summer the work is expected to increase as we seek new and better ways to serve.

The Department of Pastoral Services has expanded to include work with hospitals, homes and institutions. The Council has, in many ways, come to be viewed by our State and City governments as the channel through which they may work with the churches of Maryland. With this relationship, the Council is able to provide a Christian ministry for many of those confined in the hospitals and institutions.

Structural Improvements

The changing times have caused the Council to recognize the need for an ecumenical structure which will protect the representative principle of the Council and still enable the work to be achieved, as the needs arise, without unnecessary delay and confusion. A committee has been formed to study and recommend such restructuring as may be advisable. It is important that we prepare for long-range planning and still be able to respond to crises.

The Maryland Council of Churches is grateful for the continuing support of the Peninsula Conference of the Methodist Church.

MERGER COMMITTEE

A.

The formal, legal merger of the Delaware Conference of The Methodist Church, Inc. and the Trustees of the Peninsula Annual Conference of The Methodist Church, Inc. will be voted upon at the 1968 session of the Peninsula Annual Conference. The purpose of this step is to insure that the Peninsula Annual Conference is legally recognized as the surviving corporation of the Delaware Conference of The Methodist Church after its merger with the various geographical annual conferences. Thus, any future gifts, legacies or bequests to the Delaware Conference will be received by the Peninsula Annual Conference and distributed to the various geographical conferences into which the Delaware Conference merged; the formula for such a distribution is found on pages 531-32 of The Plan of Merger in the 1965 Journal of the Peninsula Conference.

B.

The only other matter yet to be settled according to the Plan of Merger is the transferral of the historical records and memorabilia of the Delaware Conference to the depository of the Peninsula Conference. The Peninsula Conference Historical Society should follow up on this matter. The material is now in the hands of the Rev. Joshua E. Licorish, 3849 North Eighteenth Street, Philadelphia, Pennsylvania.

C.

The actual merger of the Peninsula and Delaware Conferences took place in May, 1965. The past three years have seen this merger working out well in terms of program and leadership at the conference and district levels. It must be reported, however, that there has not been a corresponding success at the local church and community level. At this level we are almost where we were before the merger. Furthermore, it appears that the enthusiasm and fellowship felt among the former Delaware Conference churches through their participation in local, district and conference functions has not been maintained to the same degree in the merged conference; something significant in regard to morale has been lost in the course of merger.

The real test of the merger is yet to be met and it cannot be avoided. The final test of the success of the merged or racially integrated conference is this—is a racially integrated conference, or church, a more viable instrument for God's work than racially segregated conferences or churches? This is the real test and it is the fundamental question with which the Peninsula Conference must deal in the months and years ahead. In a time like ours when Black separatism is being stressed by many voices, including some in the churches, it is imperative that racially integrated institutions demonstrate that they are more viable institutions than corresponding racially segregated ones.

Consider some of the matters that enter into this final evaluation of the success of the merger of these two conferences. (1) Is an integrated

conference evangelistically more effective than a segregated conference? (2) Does an integrated conference deal more positively with pressing urban problems than a segregated conference? (3) Does an integrated conference provide greater support and leadership for the overall development of its neglected rural churches than a segregated conference? (4) Does an integrated conference actually lead to a lessening of prejudice and racist attitudes? (5) Is an integrated conference a better instrument in the hands of God than a segregated conference for the creation of a society in which justice, freedom, equal opportunity, and brotherhood shall prevail? (6) Does an integrated conference provide for deeper and broader experiences for the development of Christian fellowship than a segregated conference? (7) Does an integrated conference provide the financial resources and leadership development to strengthen its Black churches serving in predominantly Black areas better than a segregated conference?

If the Peninsula Conference cannot show that an integrated conference can do these and other things better than segregated conferences then our merger will be a failure and our work to bring about such a merger shall have been in vain.

America knows that she cannot exist with two separate societies—Black and White. Yet she has not learned how to live as one interracial society. It is the great opportunity, more than this, it is the great responsibility of the Church of Jesus Christ to demonstrate that such an interracial society can be developed and maintained and is a better society in which to live than a segregated one.

D.

Three years ago the Peninsula and Delaware Annual Conferences led the way in The Methodist Church in the merging of what had been essentially racially segregated conferences. Now the result of this merger can lead the way again in showing that a racially integrated conference is a more viable conference in every way than its former segregated conferences. This is the great contribution that the Peninsula Conference can now make to The Methodist Church, the Church at large and to the nation. In order for this contribution to be made, however, there must be a conscious effort on the part of every board and agency of the conference, every conference and district official, every pastor and local church leader to show that a racially integrated conference is truly better than a segregated conference in doing God's work.

The Merger Committee ceases to exist at this annual conference session. It requests that the annual conference direct the Conference Council to give special and consistent attention to the questions raised in this document and to report annually on them at the annual conference sessions of the next quadrennium.

METHODIST MISSION AND CHURCH EXTENSION SOCIETY, INC.

as budget of the Socie, was \$25,99

The Methodist Mission and Church Extension Society, Inc. (the Methodist Action Program) is a society of the Wilmington District. The Society is composed of the resident bishop, the district superintendent, the district lay leader, the active ministers of the Wilmington district, lay representatives from each charge equal to the number of ministers appointed to each one, representatives of the Conference Board of Missions and the Conference Women's Society of Christian Service. The Society meets once a year and elects a board of directors of 15 people to govern the work of the Society; the board meets monthly. The executive director is the Rev. Richard C. Stazesky and the assistant director is the Rev. Felton E. May. The office of the Society is located at 407 West Ninth Street, Wilmington, Delaware 19801.

B.

The main thrust of the program is in regard to inner city churches. However, the program also includes church extension planning and aids in the support of the Skyline Church development. The inner city work includes the full financial support of associate ministers at Harrison Street and Brandywine Churches, a director of Christian education at Silverbrook Church, a part-time pastor and two part-time workers at Old Asbury Church, and the partial support of the pastor at Trinity Church. The full support of the director of a program called "Operation Leaven" and the support of the executive director and assistant director is borne by the Society. In addition, the Society provides some program money to the various centers of work. The executive director and assistant director work with the church staffs in program planning and development.

During 1967-68 a week day program and worship services were reestablished at Old Asbury Methodist Church, Third and Walnut Streets. This is the oldest Methodist church in Wilmington. It was sold to another denomination in 1958, purchased back for the Methodists by the Society in February, 1967. Regular Sunday worship services are now held, a Saturday church school has been started with assistance from members of St. Mark's Church, Stanton, and week day program activities are being held. Through the interest of the Greater Wilmington Development Council Housing Corporation a complete renovation of the building is being planned.

Since January the Society has had underway "Operation Leaven", a project working in regard to the urban-racial crisis. It is designed to inform, bring about changes in attitudes and provide channels for action. The program is district wide and is involving a significant number of Methodist people.

In the various churches related to the Society, many and varied programs of service and outreach are carried on to meet the needs of people in the neighborhoods of the churches and to draw them to Christ and His Church.

C

The 1967-68 budget of the Society was \$95,000 of which \$37,570 was received from the Conference Board of Missions. Another \$10,050 was received from the Division of Nation Missions. The remaining \$47,430 had to be raised on the Wilmington District from concerned churches, persons and foundations. The 1968-69 budget is set for \$137,000 of which almost \$100,000 has to be raised from various people, churches and foundations. The increased budget is due to new work that must be undertaken and present ministries that must be expanded. The needs of the people of the city are growing more extensive and urgent yet the financial resources of the city churches tend to diminish.

At the present time the Annual Conference through its Board of Missions is rendering some support but it is insufficient to equip the churches to meet the challenges and demands for services that confront them. It is not likely that the Society can long gain sufficient financial support from individuals and Wilmington district churches alone. The Annual Conference must consider the urgent needs of the inner city Wilmington and decide whether or not it wishes to move in a significant way to carry out its mission in a great mission field that lies within its very boundaries. It is also highly likely that the serious problems found in Wilmington will soon cry out for attention in other cities of the conference area.

THE CONFERENCE BOARD OF MISSIONS

Your Conference Board of Missions is facing a very critical period in the next quadrennium when it is realized that our exploding population growth and the crisis in the city call for bold and imaginative programs. However, in this last four years we have finally reached the point where we have had to deny mission help in church extension grants because of lack of funds and the Methodist Action Program in the Wilmington District has had to move into massive fund raising efforts because our Board has not had the funds needed to meet the crisis in the city. We have this year provided just one third of the funds needed and every year our percentage grows smaller in relationship to the total amount needed.

A report of our stewardship this year is seen in the following reports:

1-Cultivation:

The report of our Conference Missionary Secretary, the Rev. Richard D. Bailey, speaks for itself of the fine work being done in this field.

"The area of promotion and cultivation is made up of the Conference Missionary Secretary and the five District Missionary Secretaries. We plan and work as a team. This includes the promotion of World Service, Advance Special giving, Schools of Missions (Summer, Conference, local

church), and other areas of missionary education. Our District Missionary Secretaries are:

Chestertown District
Dover District
Easton District
Salisbury District
Wilmington District

These men have done excellent work in promoting the work of missions on their Districts. They have traveled 2,742 miles, served as instructors, conducted workshops, mission seminars, itinerated missionaries and have given many hours of their time. A summary of their work follows:

This year our ministry included:

- New audio-visual supplement prepared for the Audio-Visual Guide.
- 2. Twenty-four attended the Lake Junaluska Conference on the Christian World Mission in North Carolina.
- Assisted in planning the two Youth Schools of Mission and the Conference School of Missions.
- 4. Itineration of six missionaries in our Conference.
- 5. Visited the Board of Missions offices.
- 6. I represented the Board of Missions on the Town and Country Commission, TRAFCO, Christian Vocations Committee, Inter-Board Committee on the Missionary Education of Youth, Board of Directors of the Neighborhood House, Planning Committee for the Conference School of Missions, Conference Council, as well as representing the Board at various functions.

World Service—one major area of our work is the promotion of World Service, the basic body of support of all benevolences. Since the film, "AND ON THE 8th DAY" has been in our Film Library it has been used 87 times, 17 times this year. This film deals specifically with the support of World Service.

Advance Specials—without Advance Special gifts one-half of the missionary work of Methodism would shut down—schools, hospitals, medicine, world relief would be cut back. Of special interest to our Conference in the area of General Advance Specials are (1) the Protestant Hospital,

Montevideo, Uruguay, where our monies, \$25,000, will be used to specialize in treatment of burns; (2) the building of a parsonage for a Chinese pastor in Malaysia, \$5,000; and (3) the building of a church and parsonage in the Rio Grande Conference, \$8,000. It is our goal to complete these projects. Conference Advance Specials are: (1) Goodwill Industry; (2) Church Extension; (3) Migrant Ministry; (4) Neighborhood House; and (5) World Student Scholarship Fund. Under the World Student Scholarship Fund, two students are receiving scholarships. Udoka Johnson Udoka is in his third year of studies. He is from Nigeria. Solomon Thande, Kenya, is in his first year of studies at Wesley College.

Audio-Visual Library-All Bookings are efficiently handled by our Conference Business Office. To date 168 16mm. films and 116 filmstrips have been booked.

2.-Urban Work:

This report is given by the Rev. George W. Goodley, Chairman of the Urban Work Committee.

"As your chairman, I have kept in close touch with the Director of Urban Ministry, the Reverend Richard Stazesky, and have consulted with him often about the Methodist Action Program. We are pleased at the way the work is progressing under his leadership and thru the excellent staff and organization he has been developing.

The crisis in the city has deepened in this past year and the need for positive programs is very critical. No one has found the answers, but there is a developing modus operandi of church and community working together. It is only thru the joining of many hands together that we are able to move forward in a redemptive sense.

A major purpose of the Urban Work Committee has been to keep the entire conference informed and aware of the mission of the Church to the city and to the urbanized society in which we all live. We are all a part of

the problem of the city and all are involved in the future of the city. Every church, for example, is constantly sending a stream of its young people to find opportunities in the great urban centers, and the training of these young people to live in the city and suburbs must begin even in the most remote rural area from which they come.

The urban ministry within our conference, thru the Methodist Mission and Church Extension Society, Inc. and the Methodist Action Program, has depended on the Conference Board of Missions for financial support. Increasingly, however, because of the pressing needs of Wilmington, additional funds have been necessary to maintain the work. We are grateful to individuals and churches which have responded to appeals for help and whose response has made the work in Wilmington possible. It is a situation to which the Conference must give much thought. The Conference must recognize and face the problem of providing adequate funds to perform the tremendous task before us. This calls for a thorough study of our priorities as a Conference seeking 'to serve the present age, our calling to

Your Committee has been asked to have charge of the Thursday night program at the Annual Conference, at which time Dr. Philip C. It is also planned that we shall have a room at the Annual Conference for displays of the work being done and for the holding of interest groups

3.—Board Policy:

Our Board is constantly seeking to improve its methods and policies as it endeavors to meet the mission needs of our Conference. It is impossible for us to put in this report all guidelines used by the Board but we believe publication of the following will aid the Conference to understand some of the criteria used by us in determining eligibility for aid.

A-Excerpts From Survey Report Of Peninsula Conference 1954

"The Directive of the Conference was fourfold, namely:

- A. Planning for New Churches and Congregations
- B. Church Extension Needs of an Existing Congregation
- C. Relocation of Churches
- D. Disposition of Two or More Methodist Churches in the same neighborhood

A. Planning For New Churches And Congregations

The need for new congregations arises most acutely in areas of rapidly expanding population. The standard metropolitan area of Wilmington is among the areas of the Conference showing great increase. In certain other areas the population is increasing very rapidly.

It is suggested that new congregations be established in the following areas:

B. Church Extension Needs Of An Existing Congregation

Some congregations find themselves in the midst of a rapidly expanding population and seemingly do not have the resources to meet the situation alone. The following is submitted for consideration:

C. Relocation Of Churches

It is believed that many churches in the Conference will need to relocate. Specific recommendations have been made to the district superintendents and others. It seems wise to suggest that the Conference grant the Board of Missions authority to give financial assistance in the relocation of churches which can thereby better serve the denomination and community.

D. The Disposition Of Two Or More Methodist Churches In The Same Neighborhood

Within the Peninsula Conference there are some churches which are the product of the merging of two or more local congregations. The Unification of two or more churches in the same neighborhood has thus far proved to be a desirable and necessary step in this Conference.

The cabinet has been encouraging churches with low membership potential, located in the neighborhood of another Methodist Church to unite as rapidly as circumstances permit. It is the opinion of the Department of Research and surveys that a more definite policy be formulated and adopted by the Conference regarding procedure to be followed in the uniting of two or more Methodist churches in the same neighborhood.

When analysis indicates that two or more churches in the same neighborhood are in too close proximity, have too small a membership for an effective program, and must be placed on a circuit to secure pastoral leadership, then it is suggested that the Conference declare its policy to be the union of such churches.

In order that this objective be achieved the following program is proposed:

- 1. That the Conference request the Bishop to proceed as rapidly as possible to place such churches under one pastor.
- 2. That the Conference request all ministerial and lay members to lend every possible influence toward hastening the unification of two or more such Methodist churches in the same neighborhood.
- 3. That the Conference request the Woman's Society of Christian Service and the Board of Lay Activities to assist in the process.
- 4. That the Conference authorize the Board of Missions to cooperate with the cabinet in encouraging the unification of churches in close proximity by assistance in the purchase of sites, moving of buildings, purchasing or building parsonages and/or erection of new church buildings.

- 5. That the Conference instruct its Board of Missions to make no appropriation to churches in the above category which refuse to cooperate in achieving the objective set forth.
- 6. That the Conference request the cabinet in the plan of appointments to arrange circuit appointments so that no minimum salary funds be expended for those churches which refuse to cooperate.
- 7. That the Conference instruct the district superintendents, the District Boards of Church Location and Building, and pastors to withhold their approval to any request for remodeling, improvements, etc., from churches falling in the category of refusing to cooperate with the Conference in achieving the objective outlined above.
- 8. That the district superintendents and the District Boards of Church Location and Building be requested to evaluate any requests for church building and improvement in the light of possible future uses of the church and/or churches in the immediate area.

Specific Suggestions And Recommendations

Certain situations not falling in the above listed categories were considered in the survey. The recommendations are as follows:

1. There should be a constant study of circuit lines, seeking that realignment which will make possible the most efficient ministry to our churches. Moreover, the uniting of two churches, one church becoming a station, etc., will throw the whole alignment of churches out of any given plan. A constant study is therefore urgently suggested."

B-Excerpts From Board Of Missions Report To Conference In 1960

"Consequently, it is believed that there is need to reaffirm the policies established in 1954 with certain modifications indicated by experience and the changed situation. It is, therefore, recommended:

- 1. That the conference request the Bishop to continue to place churches located in close proximity, especially those with a small membership, under one pastor.
- 2. That in all situations, regardless of the membership size of churches, there be active cooperation so that the spiritual need of the community be more adequately met and that Methodism present a united witness.
- 3. That the Conference commend the District Superintendents and the Bishop for their efforts to merge Methodist Churches located in the same neighborhood. These efforts to lead the churches to form more efficient units is resulting in a stronger Conference.
- 4. That the Conference authorize the Board of Missions to continue to cooperate with the cabinet in encouraging the unification of churches in close proximity by assistance in the purchase of sites, moving of buildings, purchasing or building parsonages, and/or erection of new church buildings.
- 5. That the Conference instruct its Board of Missions to make no appropriation to churches in the above category which refuse to cooperate in achieving the objective set forth.

- 6. That the Conference request the cabinet in the plan of appointments to arrange circuit appointments so that no minimum salary funds be expended for those churches which refuse to cooperate.
- 7. That the Conference instruct the District Superintendents, the District Board of Church Location and Building, and Pastors to withhold their approval to any request for remodeling, improvements, etc., from Churches falling in the category of refusing to cooperate with the Conference in achieving the objective outlined above.
- 8. That the District Superintendents and the District Boards of Church Location and Building be requested to evaluate any requests for church building and improvements in the light of possible future uses of the church and/or churches in the immediate area.
- 9. It is believed that the time has arrived when the Conference Board of Missions should consider reducing the ratio of grants and increasing that of loans.
- 10. That the Conference suggest that churches give special attention to their present and projected needs for off-street parking. This matter is becoming more and more a serious problem to churches which only a few years ago felt they would never have any need for off-street parking.
- 11. The practice of the realignment of charges so as to provide stronger leadership is to be commended and encouraged. This practice has taken the form of attaching two churches, formerly stations, together thus forming a new and strong charge; attaching a weaker to a stronger church; placing additional churches upon circuits, etc. The ministers of the Conference are thereby provided more adequate salaries. The practice has been carried on without leaving ministers without churches and should continue thus.
- 12. Inasmuch as these are critical years just before a second period of church expansion comes when the so-called 'war babies' reach marriage age during the mid-sixties, it is urged that the Conference Board of Missions hasten as rapidly as possible to bring to self-support all churches now in process of development, to strengthen weak churches, and in every possible way move to be in a position of strength as rapidly as possible. It is hoped that the conference will realize the importance of being prepared and provide increased support to the Board so that the demands of the second expansion period will not find the Board and Conference unprepared."

C—Excerpts From Survey Of Delaware Conference Churches And Peninsula Conference Churches In 1965

This report was entitled "Let's Get Acquainted" and while it was intended to be mainly informational there is one section that points out our responsibility as a conference to the needs of the Inner City. It also points out how we could be the calming and stable force our society needs so desperately today.

"With the transfer of the Delaware Conference churches into the Peninsula Conference, Methodism enters a new era—an era of '100 percent responsibility.' As long as there were two conferences, it was possible to talk about 'their' problem and 'our' problem. Now the Peninsula Conference is responsible for all of the Methodists.

This new, broader responsibility requires a new frame of reference for church planning. Methodist leaders must be responsive to currents in the society, for practically every trend affects 'us.' A decrease in one kind of opportunity often represents an increase in another kind of opportunity. In areas of 'suburban sprawl,' the decrease in opportunity for a quiet, stable rural church is an increase in opportunity for a bustling, busy suburban church. In areas of racial movement, a decreasing opportunity of a 'white church' represents an increasing opportunity for an integrated church or a Negro church.

Sometimes it is comforting to be a powerless minority; we cannot be blamed for what happens. This comfort is no longer open to the Methodists. In many areas of the peninsula 'all of the Methodists' may amount to 30 percent of the population and 75 percent of all of the church buildings. While Methodism cannot, and should not, act without reference to other Christian groups, our burden of leadership is great. Such a significant block of talented, devoted people, dispersed throughout an area, could materially affect the course of the society. As Christians, we believe that that is one of the things we are supposed to do."

D-New Policy

Sometimes we move very slowly in the church while the world rushes on. Items 9 and 12 in the 1960 Report were never carried out and thus have led us to the critical period facing the next quadrennium. Your Board of Missions cannot do anything about item 12. This is up to the Conference. Each year we have requested more funds than we have received. Thus there has been a gradual tightening of loans and grants in the light of our increased needs and our stationary or even decreasing funds if inflation is counted in. The following change in policy is an awareness of the critical period just ahead and a facing up to the recommendation of item 9 in the 1960 report. It was adopted at a meeting of the full Board on March 25, 1968 and is included for your information.

"The Conference Board Of Missions Adopted A New Policy In Regards
To Church Extension Funds, Beginning May 1, 1968.

- a. Requests up to \$5,000.00 may be awarded donations. New Mission projects also may be awarded donations. All other disbursements shall be as loans. (We reaffirm that it is the policy of this board to purchase land for new church projects.)
- b. Churches must comply with formal application procedures and must meet The Board of Missions criteria of eligibility for aid.
- c. Before such a loan is made, a repayment plan and interest rate shall have been agreed upon by the church officials and the Board of Missions.
- d. In most situations, payments of interest and repayment of loan would begin after commercial loans and mortgages have been satisfied.
- e. A trust agreement and mortgage must be duly executed and recorded before any money is made available either as grant or loan."

4—Recommendations:

- 1. That the month of February be designated as Missionary Cultivation month.
- 2. That the Rev. Richard D. Bailey be appointed Conference Missionary Secretary.

5—Conclusion:

It has been my privilege to serve on this Board of Missions for eight years and to serve the last four as President of the Board. The spirit of cooperation between the Board, Executive Committee, and the District Superintendents has been close. While it has been a pleasure to work with everyone, I would especially like to single out the members of the Executive Committee who have worked so untiringly as "volunteers" for the Lord in the work of our Board. Being President this last four years has been the easiest job I have ever held in this Conference because of the able and dedicated members of the Executive Committee. I could say something about them all but I mention only three and then will be very brief. The Rev. Richard D. Bailey, Conference Missionary Secretary, has a special talent in the field of administration and in the translating of an idea into action. He has not only efficiently and ably carried on the routine work of his office but has compiled an outstanding Audio-Visual Guide that has been copied by others within our Conference and in other conferences. He also deserves sole credit for the idea and implementation of the World Student Scholarship Fund under which two students are now in this country. He will be of tremendous help to the new President. Two other out-going members of the Board, the Rev. David W. Baker and Mr. R. Byron Palmer have completely shouldered the administrative work of the Board. The Rev. David W. Baker as Secretary has never ceased to amaze me by the rapidity in which he took care of all correspondence for the Board and would have full and complete minutes of meetings in our hands almost the day after the meeting. A dedicated Layman, Mr. R. Byron Palmer served as our Treasurer and had our financial records on a business like basis long before they were turned over to the Conference Business Office. Truly these "volunteers" have given to the utmost in time, and effort for the work of Christ.

PENINSULA METHODIST HOMES AND HOSPITALS, INC.

At the 1968 session of our Peninsula Annual Conference, your Corporation is able to report that the mortgage on The Methodist Country House is paid in full. To our friends who have made this possible, we are deeply indebted, and to the administration under whose guidance and direction this \$4.500,000 (plus) project has become debt free.

The Manor House at Seaford performs the same excellent ministry as does The Country House in Wilmington. While The Manor House is not yet filled to capacity, it is running ahead of the schedule forecast by the

General Board of Hospitals and Homes. We now have resident in The Manor House 141 people with 25 who have paid deposits, and who will be taking up residency in the immediate future, making a total of 166.

At the request of the Hospital Association and complying with our exchange contract with Social Security (medicare program), we are currently ministering to 12 medicare patients at Seaford. Because of our overloaded capacity in The Country House, there are no available beds for this purpose.

In both of our facilities, the Gift Shops and Beauty Parlors continue to lend a fine touch of interest, activity and service to our people, and to the Junior Board who operates same, we are deeply grateful.

Because of increased costs overwhich we have no control, we found ourselves going through some "deep waters" and are grateful indeed to the world Service and Finance Commission for their cooperation. About eighteen months ago a detailed study was made of our operations by an independent group and such studies continue from time to time. This is obviously for the purpose of keeping costs at the lowest possible figure while at the same time our ministry of compassion and healing remains at a high level.

During the past year your Annual Conference, through this Corporation and with the aid of interested citizens, has been able to construct 24 very lovely townhouses located on Lombard Street between 8th and 9th in center city Wilmington. These modern, three-bedroom masonry constructed homes are now almost totally completed with some five or six families having already moved into their new homes. The houses are well designed with ample closet space and wall to wall nylon carpet as "part of the package." They are selling for \$12,500 with a down payment of approximately \$375.00, and are being financed through F.H.A. The city officials of Wilmington, as well as many other groups, have expressed deep appreciation for the leadership given by the Peninsula Annual Conference in this field of housing. We have but one regret—that we have not been able to generate interest in other groups to engage in a like project. Obviously, anyone who knows the cost of construction today will quickly recognize these houses are being sold for less than our cost, but here again in the providence of God, funds have been made available by some of His people so that our bills are being paid in full. The townhouses, like The Country House and Manor House, are open to all regardless of race, creed or national origin.

BOARD OF THE MINISTRY (Formerly M. T. & Q.)

Calling his Disciples to Him, Jesus gave them authority, sent them out with the instructions, "concentrate on the lost sheep of the house of Israel. As you go proclaim that the kingdom of Heaven has arrived."

"Be on your guard for I am sending you out like sheep to a pack of volves. You must be as cautious as snakes and as gentle as doves." Remember, "The disciple is not superior to his teacher any more than the

servant is superior to his master, for what is good enough for the teacher is good enough for the disciple as well, and the servant will not fare better than his master."

(the following paragraphs taken from "A Letter to The Church" prepared by the Presidents and Deans of Methodist Seminaries.)

"In the midst of sweeping revolution the church has its greatest opportunity, responsibility and challenge. If the world is to know peace and if men are to live together with concern for one another, the Church of Christ must grow in strength and be renewed in vision. It must relate the gospel of Christ to the world and develop leaders who can effectively lead its mission in every area of life.

"The Church must be renewed and updated in all its parts. Since the key part is the ministry, enlarged emphasis must be placed on the recruitment and training of persons for Church vocations. The Church, being responsible for its ministry, must present to young men and women the significance of the work and witness of the ministry, through preaching and teaching, ministerial service and social action. It must encourage and sustain those who respond to this calling.

"God works through the pastor, the home, the home church, the counse of Christian friends and a person's involvement in service to others as instruments to make his call heard. Some persons respond suddenly and with overmastering desire to become ministers, but most arrive at the decision gradually. The influence of parents, pastors and teachers cannot be overestimated in decision making.

"The Church's ministers must be vigorous, competent, disciplined, dedicated, committed to the way of Christ for the Salvation of the world, and educated by the highest professional standards. They must be qualified to relate to the personal needs of others and to communicate the Word of God to the community, the congregation, to individuals, and by means of mass media to those outside the church."

There are several phases of our program which have been active and bear mentioning.

The Committee on Continuing Education for The Ministry, chairman, George W. Goodley, has worked in cooperation with the administration of Drayton Manor, in planning for a week's seminar on preaching for members of the conference.

The Scholarship and Loan Committee, William Dore, chairman, has been kept busy reviewing applications from ministerial students requesting financial assistance. Since its inception a few years ago, this program has been growing steadily, until this year every single available dollar has been utilized, giving assistance totaling \$3500.00 to 7 students.

The Recruitment Committee, Gordon Stapleton, chairman, realizes that they are dealing with the strategic problem within the church, "Man Power". The area of operation is limited for lack of funds, but we believe this committee will get to the grass roots of the matter in the following two ways:

a. They will arrange for a member of the board to go into any church or community and speak on this important subject. They will spend an

evening with a young man or woman and parents, explaining what is expected of both the student and conference, as well as to emphasize the great challenge to serve people.

b. With a member of the Cabinet, visits have been made to 5 seminaries. The representative of the appointive system of our church and the Committee involved in their training were interviewed, and The Peninsula Conference presented. This effort has produced several fine prospects for our conference.

Much more can be done and will be when funds are made available for the purpose of discovering, challenging and guiding those interested in The Christian Ministry. Our total budget for this Man Power Search Project is .3% of our total Conference Budget. If the General Conference acts favorably upon a plan to support The Methodist Seminaries and The Recruitment of Ministers, funds will be forth-coming.

The Committee dealing with Supply Pastors, John W. Simpers, Jr., chairman, has spent considerable time in study on the subject. The need for men to fill our pulpits is great, but lowering standards to accomplish this would be defeating the purpose of The Board of Ministerial Training and Qualification, that being, to provide the best trained Ministry for our day. Today when the business and scientific world demands well trained men in their respective professions the church can do no less if she expects to meet the great opportunities, responsibilities and challenges in a day of sweeping revolution.

The "Counseling Elder" Program has been working much better this year after guide lines were established for the Conference member and his Counselee. A written report is expected from the Conference Advisor concerning the student's scholastic progress and his growth as a pastor. We feel this program can be very helpful to all concerned and we plan to implement new ideas in the future to strengthen it.

The Supply Pastor's School held at Wesley Seminary is required for all Supply Students. The cost of those under appointment who attend is underwritten by the Board.

The 1968 General Conference has made changes concerning "The Ministry" within the United Methodist Church. We propose to publish, just as soon as all information is made available, a new edition of "Steps Into The Ministry". They will be sent to each minister, made available to High School and College Guidance Counselors within our conference, as well as to other agencies interested in this area of the church's life.

As Chairman of The Board I'm sure that I express the appreciation of the full Board along with the conference to Dr. Donald D. Douglass, Dean of Wesley College, Dover, for his services in our testing program.

Interviews have been conducted with 35 candidates and psychological lests have been administered to 9. At this writing, 7 men are scheduled to be received on Trial, 7 men to be ordained Deacon, 8 men to be received into Full Membership, and 12 men to be ordained Elders.

It would be very inappropriate for a report of this board to be printed without recognizing the dedicated and untiring labors of the Registrar, The Reverend C. Edwin Lasbury. It is through his efforts during the past 4 years that men were introduced to our conference, a close contact main-

tained with them through their years of study, and a feeling of someone being interested in their growth was created.

Your Conference Board of Pensions of the Peninsula Conference again has both the privilege and pleasure of presenting its annual report for the Conference Year 1967-1968.

While the Board of Pensions spends much time discussing finances and financial policy, it considers its real responsibility to be a ministering agency of the Church. We are well aware that every action initiated by this Board is reflected in the lives of our annuitants. Consequently, your Board conscientiously and prayerfully attempts to confront every item of business in a manner and method consistent with its faith and Methodist heritage. Due consideration, after full investigation, is given each necessitous case and all emergency situations. To render a more effective ministry along these lines we need your cooperation and we solicit your aid in maintaining a pastoral relationship with our pensioners.

The total assets of the pension fund as of March 31, 1968 reveal that the book value of the fund is \$1,925,212 and the market value is \$2,239,212. This conference year we have paid in pensions to our retired ministers in full connection \$212,321; to widows \$171,582; to retired supply ministers \$24,629; to widows of supply ministers \$22,827; to children \$2,637; and to the Clearinghouse of the General Board of Pensions \$25,522; for a grand total of \$459,518. In addition to this total your Board has distributed \$9,578 from the Necessitous Fund.

The income to pay pensions for the current year derived from the following sources: Peninsula Annual Conference \$367,000; Investments \$95,000; N. E. Jurisdictional Equalization Fund \$24,000; Others \$10,000; for a grand total of \$496,000.

Lionel D. Edie and Company continue to serve as the investment courselors for the Endowment Fund of the Board of Pensions.

For the Conference Year 1968-1969 the Board requests that the Commission on World Service and Finance allocate for pensions \$387,000 and that the amount for necessitous cases be continued at \$10,000.

Recommendations:

- 1. That the Annuity Rate for the Conference Year 1968-1969 be \$87.00 per year of service for retired conference members; 75% of the full rate be paid to widows of conference members and retired approved supply ministers; 75% of the supply rate be paid to the widows of approved supply ministers; and 25% of the father's rate be paid to the surviving children.
- 2. That Mrs. Charlotte Marine, widow of Marion Marine, be re-instated as an annuitant under paragraph 1620.3 of the Discipline.

3. That the rate of the ministers' "Conference Members", contribution to the Endowment Fund be at a 2% of all monies received as salary. "Approved supplies, $1\frac{1}{2}\%$ ". (The present rate is $1\frac{1}{2}\%$.)

4. That the interest rate on all delinquent accounts to the Endowment

Fund (Ministerial) be set at 6% instead of the present 4%.

5. That any minister, serving within the bounds of the Peninsula Annual Conference, who is in arrears to the Endowment Fund in the amount equaling two or more years of his personal assessment shall be referred to the Board of Conference Relations.

- 6. That the present Peninsula Annual Conference policy for the payment of pensions to the approved supplies continue to be the policy for the payment of said pensions. This recommendation is the result of the findings of the study committee as ordered by the Annual Conference of 1967 (see page 1102 of the 1967 Official Journal). The conclusion of the study committee, concurred in by the Board of Pensions, was based upon the following:
- a. In its investigation of the matter of the equalization of pensions the Committee discovered that a large majority of annual conference is paying annuities to approved supplies on an equal basis with conference members. However, because of the high annuity rate of the Peninsula Annual Conference the retired supply ministers are receiving a pension rate which is favorably comparable to the full pension rates paid to supply ministers in other annual conferences.
- b. The Committee firmly believes that the matter of pensions should be considered as a part of the larger question of the relationship of approved supplies to the Peninsula Annual Conference.
- c. The Committee was confronted with the realistic issue as to how the cost of equalization would be funded. The best estimate of the cost for the equalization of pensions would approximate \$18,000.00 not including the supply years of the full conference members.

The Board of Pensions wishes to express its appreciation for the courtesy and generosity of Wesley College and its President, Dr. Robert Parker, in making available one of its fine meeting rooms for our monthly meetings.

Finally, several members of the Board will complete their terms of office this conference year and to them, laymen and ministers, we express heartfelt thanks and appreciation for their time, talents, and efforts which they have unstintingly and unselfishly rendered to the Board of Pensions and its annuitants. To our Treasurer, Ira S. Pruitt, who will be assisted next year by the Conference Business Office, we express our thanks for his usual dedicated work.

PUBLIC RELATIONS

Washington Area Methodist Information met its demise last year when the 1967 Baltimore Annual Conference abolished the Washington Area Com-

mission on Public Relations and Methodist Information along with the Commission on Promotion and Cultivation in order to consolidate the responsibilities of these agencies under the auspices of a director of Promotion and Public Relations.

In November 1967, the Peninsula Conference engaged the services of Ted Schiller, editor of the Together Area News supplement, as director of Public Relations for the Peninsula Conference.

The excellent cooperation of ministers and publicity chairmen throughout the year produced local church news that was conveyed to the area press, broadcast media and featured in the Together Area News supplement. Several promotion and public relations workshops were held on a district level that focused on the need and means for communication of our Christian faith to the church family and the community it serves. Audio-visual aids such as the new film "As Others See Us," tape recordings and a slide presentation were utilized for this purpose.

In order to provide more efficient and effective service, an office was established at the Conference Business Office in Dover for the expressed purpose of news handling and public relations.

Consultations were held with local church groups on specific problems such as the preparation of a newsletter or the role of the local church and the function of its official board and commissions. Certification was granted the director by the General Board of Education following proper preparation and fulfillment of qualifications for instruction in the "Work of the Local Church," for use in leadership training schools.

The office of Promotion and Public Relations has attempted to work closely with all Conference boards and agencies, interpreting how best to meet their needs and the requirements of the people we serve. Promotional efforts were made on behalf of these boards and agencies by church press, newspaper, radio and television coverage.

Traditionally, Bishop Lord would record a Christmas message for broadcast over numerous area radio stations. This coverage has been expanded to include the recording and radio broadcast of Thanksgiving and Easter messages.

Our Bishop and our Peninsula Conference delegates received press, radio, and television coverage while they attended the historic Uniting Conference in Dallas, Texas. Interviews with delegates were tape recorded or filmed for broadcast in their area of residence and through major communication media located in large cities. Press releases and photographs of the delegates at the Uniting Conference were sent to Peninsula Conference newspapers for publication.

The concept of the Co-ordinated Ministers Mailing was presented to the Commission on Promotion and Cultivation and received enthusiastically. By action of the Conference Council this mailing process has become an integral function of the Peninsula Conference. The public relations department continues to work closely with the Commission on Promotion and the Business Office on each mailing.

Since the Uniting Conference held in Dallas, Texas—the choice as to whether or not there should be involvement by the minister and layman in the field of public relations has been almost entirely removed. Our people

must be supplied with interpretive information on the actions taken there. The Quadrennial Emphasis Program will challenge every member of our Conference and bring all of us face to face with the renewal of the United Methodist Church. The Church's continued social involvement will precipitate the need for a public relation's effort of greater magnitude than ever before. Hopefully our joint efforts in the field of Promotion and Public Relations will meet Dr. Ralph Stoody's definition of "making friends for Christ."

PUBLISHING INTERESTS REPORT

For 179 years the Methodist Publishing House, created by General Conference of 1789 as the publishing ministry of American Methodism, has continuously furnished the services of printing, publishing and distribution to the Methodist Church. That the Church has used it is attested by its growth to the largest denominational publishing house in the world.

The impending union of the Methodist Church and the Evangelical United Brethren Church, and the subsequent joining of the general publishing interests of the two churches, will bring our Methodist Publishing House to the threshold of a new day of increased service to eleven million United Methodists. For Publishing House administrators, the year was a year of planning and preparation to put the House in the best possible position to carry forward its responsibilities to the new church.

The accomplishments of our Publishing House during the past year are not paralleled in any other year in Methodist Publishing House history, even though comparisons with other years be on percentage basis. The year's financial success has opened the way needed for expansion of the business to include the opening of new Cokesbury stores in Seattle, Washington, (November 6, 1967) and Birmingham, Alabama (November 30, 1967).

In consideration of the year's success and prospects for the future, the Board of Publication increased the annual appropriation to the Conference claimants to \$800,000. Of this amount the Peninsula Conference receives \$11,865.15.

The Church's reception of the new Methodist Hymnal, published in July, 1966, has exceeded all expectations. As this report is written, more than 3,300,000 copies of the hymnal have been ordered and delivered.

Changes in lithographic and bindery equipment, required to produce the new hymnal, have placed the Publishing House in a position to produce larger quantities of printing and to give better service than ever before.

The new and quite different adult literature, "Man's Search for a Meaningful Faith," was ready for the Fall, 1967, distribution. Plans for additional adult materials in 1969 were crystallized and feasibility, checks are now being made.

During the year, circulation of Together, the general periodical for Methodist families, decreased from 636,893 to 589,914. Every Methodist Church should have a Together agent appointed by the pastor and official board, to promote the use of the magazine as an effective tool in the total

work of the church. The Together area news edition program with Mr. Ted Schiller, the new editor, is in the Conference Business Office, Dover, each Friday. He is anxious to receive news from all of the churches of the Conference. This is an important service of the Methodist Publishing House designated to communicate news and information at the Episcopal area, Annual Conference, District and local church levels of our Church.

Other highlights of the year's activity include the following:

- —Reestablishment of the Abingdon Award, designed to encourage creative authorship of books of outstanding quality for possible publication by Abingdon Press.
- —Publication of 108 new titles by Abingdon Press. Thirteen of these titles were Book Club Guild selections.
- -Largest distribution of trade books in the history of the house.
- —Armed Forces unified curriculum materials experienced an all-time high average circulation of 570,000 units per quarter.

THE COMMITTEE ON RELATIONSHIP TO CHAPLAINS

The daily papers constantly scream at each of us with their headlines of the almost chaotic upheavals within our society. The need for the church to become increasingly involved in the day by day problems of our society is even more evident than in the past. Never has the world needed the peace of mind and enduring strength of God more than in this present hour. Never before has the need for the living presence of a risen Christ been greater within the hearts and lives of men. One way the church and this conference has accepted this challenge is by the appointment of civilians and military chaplains. These men serve, not in the comfort of a well appointed sanctuary, but in the fields of Viet Nam, Korea, in hospitals, in other institutions, where men in the midst of misery and suffering, physical, social and mental, seek for the peace of God within. It is to the glory of God and to the credit of the church that these men dedicate their lives in this particular form of ministry.

At the present time, nine members of our Annual Conference are serving as full time chaplains, one more will be added to the number very shortly. Fourteen members of the Annual Conference serve as part time chaplains to institutions within the boundaries of our Annual Conference.

It is well for us to remember these men, for wherever they may serve, they are a vital part of the traveling ministry of the Methodist Church. We may see them less often than others in our fellowship, but we must always remember they too serve as a part of the same unit, ministerial members of the Peninsula Annual Conference.

Your commission would simply repeat its recommendations of last year with an urgency that they be considered as part of the ongoing program of each local church.

- (1) Take time to write and keep in contact with those of our Conference serving in the chaplaincy.
- (2) Set aside a Sunday to inform your congregation of the work of the Methodist chaplains both military and institutional.
- (3) When an opportunity presents itself, use a chaplain as a guest minister in your church pulpit.
- (4) Send all regular monthly ministerial mailings to chaplains to keep them in touch with their home conference.

TELEVISION, RADIO AND FILM COMMISSION

This was an unusually active year for Peninsula Conference TRAFCO. Our work began even before Annual Conference with the purchase on the first of May 1967 of the latest motion picture to be produced by General TRAFCO, "For Better, For Worse." This much needed film concerns the increasingly troublesome problem of teenage marriage—without taking a dogmatic stand. Purchased for \$195 and now available to all our churches through our Board of Education office, the film vividly points out in dramatic form the tremendous hurdles to happiness in an early marriage.

At the Annual Conference, TRAFCO premiered the locally produced filmstrip "The Almighty Benevolent Dollar." The filmstrip was requested for our conference by the Commission on World Service and Finance. One hundred copies were made to sell at the amazingly low price of \$2. This was done through the volunteer services of local conference personnel and a subsidy by TRAFCO. Seventy-five copies along with accompanying script and sound tape were sold right on the conference floor and another 15 were sold later through the mail.

Most of the response we got was highly favorable. Because the Conference Council feels that this filmstrip is such an effective tool toward educating our people in the purpose and value of good stewardship, TRAFCO has been requested to take a survey of our pastoral charges to find out how the filmstrip is being used in the conference. The Board of Lay Activities in cooperation with the Committee on Promotion and Cultivation is anxious to contact those churches who have not yet shown the filmstrip to see if they can be of assistance.

I might add here that there are still several copies available for sale, plus there are loan-out copies available both from the Board of Education office and the Conference Business Office.

Also at last Annual Conference, TRAFCO initiated our conference's part in the nation-wide TV-VALUATION PROJECT. A resolution was passed pledging the support of the conference in this endeavor to help people become better aware of the influence of television on their lives. From the very beginning the emphasis was on praising the good that is on television that we might encourage more of the same—rather than just condemning the worst.

Locally, the October project began with the showing of the filmstrip "The Medium Is..." (taken from the book "The Medium is the Message" by Marshall McLulan) to every district conference with the exception of Salisbury. Next, order forms were sent out to all churches asking how many TV GUIDES they would be willing to distribute to their members. Sixty churches responded with requests for nearly 13,000 copies. On the national scene, Methodism's first TELEVISION VALUATION PROJECT was so successful that it wrecked the budget for it. Two million 500 thousand copies of materials were printed to meet the requests of pastors and churches—this was more than twice the number for which funds had been budgeted.

As to the direct effect on the television industry, it is hard to say. Peninsula Conference TRAFCO contacted all the television stations in our viewing area, but they said that they did not break down the cards they received according to conference areas. They did, however, take very serious consideration of the responses they received. Bruce Bryant, General Manager of WCAU-TV, was particularly responsive!

"The favorable reactions referred to our family type programs mainly in the comedy category as well as specials and documentaries. The majority of those responding prefer family type programs and specials dealing with true to life situations. 'Family Affair', 'Gomer Pyle', and 'Daktari' and Andy Griffith were the favorites.

"There was a very positive reaction to the CBS Television Network special 'Do Not Go Gentle. . .' starring Melvin Douglas. Everyone referring to this program thought it was an excellent production and appealed for more programs of this type in the future.

"The negative reactions in certain instances referred to specific shows and in general were opposed to violence, drinking and sex. A number of viewers complained about too many commercials and they particularly disliked those advertising cigarettes, beer and wine."

To summarize our conference's participation in this project, I think that we held up our end well, and we wish to thank all those who made it possible. We are particularly grateful to Mrs. Eileen Spraker, Religion Editor for the News-Journal papers, who gave us excellent coverage which drew many interested responses to our office.

Other TRAFCO work that is getting very favorable response is THE WORD AND MUSIC program. This is a script service provided by General TRAFCO for local production. The format is a local personality (usually a pastor) commenting on some particularly relevant issue (LSD, Generation Gap, Poverty, Death Penalty, Incarnation, Death, The Resurrection, to name a few) interspersed with contemporary and traditional recordings.

Nationwide the local stations love it. They say it is the finest religious program they carry of a local nature. Locally, the Rev. Donald Hurst originated the series on WDMV in Pocomoke City, Md. We will be proud to present to Don and WDMV Certificates of Appreciation for one full year of excellent programming at this Conference. On October 8th your chairman was privileged to start the program on WNRK in Newark, Delaware. And we hope in the future to have an outlet in the Salisbury area. The Rev. Edwin Lasbury has made a test tape and is auditioning for an opening.

Let me repeat again the message in last year's report: we will be happy to train and prepare a test tape for any local pastor who would like to use this program in his broadcast area. You will be surprised how willing local radio stations are to carry the program—even on a sustaining (no charge) basis when sponsored by the local ministerial association. Contact me for any further information.

Much of the work of Peninsula TRAFCO is transacted through the Radio Committee of the Council of Churches of Wilmington and New Castle County. Your chairman is a member of this committee and assists them in the production of many of their programs. Currently, we are making available to all the radio and television stations in our conference area three new San Freberg one minute spots. These highly entertaining jibes at the "death of God rumor" have been well received and are reaching the un-churched with the message "Maybe He isn't."

Finally, we are currently working with Ted Schiller, Director of Washington Information, in securing as much local radio and television coverage as possible of the General Conference. We hope to have interviews with our delegates direct from the conference floor relayed to the broadcast outlets in their home area.

We are open, and greatly welcome any other ideas by which your conference TRAFCO can be more effective in broadcasting the Good News of a risen Savior and His message of hope to a discouraged world.

THE TOWN AND COUNTRY COMMISSION

The principal emphasis of the Town & Country Commission has been cooperation. This was the theme of the group quarterly conferences of the Easton District with the Town & Country Commission supplying the speakers. This was also the theme of the Chestertown District Conference with the commission supplying the panel. The ministers of the Dover area have met together with their District Superintendent to explore ways in which the total program in the area can be strengthened by cooperation.

The church's resort ministry has claimed much of our attention. Cooperating with the Delaware State Council of Churches, resort ministries were provided at Trap Pond and at the Indian River Inlet. On a recommendation of the pastor of Grace Methodist Church in Millsboro, and a recommendation by the Town & Country Commission, the Conference Board of Missions is cooperating with the Millsboro church to provide a week-day ministry in the "Neck" area and to provide bus service to both Church School and worship on Sundays this summer.

Rev. George Commodore has been very active in planning the Town & Country total program for the Northeastern Jurisdiction. George is making preparation to lead the Peninsula Conference in training ventures concerning cooperative ministries and parish cooperation.

The Peninsula Conference was represented at the National Consultation on Church and Community Life at Ohio State University in September. This was a national Ecumenical (Including Roman Catholic) consultation placing an emphasis on cooperation of churches from various denominations. Those representing the Peninsula Conference were: Rev. George Commodore, Rev. Wayne Cuff, Rev. Daniel Ridout, Mr. John Riggin, Rev. Thomas Short, Rev. Curtis Smith, Mrs. James Webb.

This commission was requested by the last session of the annual conference to form a credit union for ministers, their families, and other full time employees of churches and other institutions related to the conference. The credit union has been organized, and at the end of March had 41 members. Money is being paid to the credit union for savings, and loans are being made to members. Currently, loans are not being made in excess of \$200.00. The credit union is being operated from the conference business office.

The relationship of the supply pastor to the conference program is a constant concern of this commission. This commission feels that a thorough study needs to be made concerning this relationship. It is our intent to make this study during the coming conference year and report to you concerning our findings at the next annual conference. Our study might very well result in the presentation of major recommendations.

Recommendations:

- 1. That the Peninsula Methodist Federal Credit Union be asked to have its annual report printed in the preconference journal beginning with the 1969 annual conference.
- 2. That George Commodore be the Executive Secretary of the Town & Country Commission for the 1968-69 conference year.

THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES PENINSULA CONFERENCE

The Conference Business office under the good management of Theodore Briggs, together with the Bank of Delaware Trust Department, have made the work of the Trustees very light.

They have handled our principal funds of over \$100,000.00 and our income account of over \$5000.00 with a total cost to the Trustees of about \$500.00. These are round figures as the last month is not completed. This I believe is quite reasonable. We have not contributed to the cost of the Business Office.

During the year the Caswell Estate was finally settled and we sent a check in the amount of \$3,125.88 to the attorney for the New York Conference.

We sold the property and furnishings of St. James Church, St. Georges, Delaware.

The lot at Assateague Island was purchased by the Government and the proceeds, together with the income in the Poole Estate, was paid to the Conference Board of Missions for the purchase of a lot near Assateague.

Christ Church in Dagsboro is for sale. We have some hopes it may be sold soon.

The Official Board of Grace Church, Greenwood, Delaware, have voted to close the Church and recommend Conference declare the Church abandoned and that the Trustees accept the offer of Chesapeake Conference of Seventh-day Adventist to purchase the property. The Trustees have not had an opportunity to act on this, but both Reverend Chandler and Reverend Medzarentz recommend this action. The net proceeds to go to the surviving Church in Greenwood.

This concludes my term as a Trustee and will leave me with an empty filing case. It has sometimes been frustrating, but always a joy to work on the Church's business.

THE WASHINGTON AREA

JOHN WESLEY LORD, Resident Bishop

Bishop Roy H. Short provided for the entire church a Prayer of Consecration as the Quadrennial Program for 1964-68 was adopted:

"Our heavenly Father, if we know our own hearts, our great desire in this destiny-fraught hour in the world's life, it is to hear what the Spirit of God is saying unto the churches. We would be sensitive to Thy will. We would be obedient to Thy commands. We would ask no higher glory than to be lost in Thy service and to be used as Thou wouldst use us."

The hope of the Quadrennial Program, One Witness in One World, was clearly stated: "The achievement of greater oneness in Methodism and its practical demonstration in Christian witness." This report will be made in response to the mandate given by the Program Committee of the general church.

Merger of Conferences

Action was taken by the Northeastern Jurisdictional Conference meeting in Syracuse, New York in June of 1964 making mandatory the merging of the Delaware Conference with the Peninsula Conference, and the Washington Conference with the Baltimore Conference by July 1, 1965. A two year study looking toward the eventual merger of these conferences had already been made. It was this study that was to prove an invaluable aid in fulfilling the mandate of the Jurisdictional Conference. The major areas proposed for study were camping, church location and extension, district boundaries and the itineracy, financial matters, institutions, legal matters, ministerial training and qualifications, organization of the annual conference.

ence, and pensions. From this intensive study emerged a "Statement of Standards" to be considered and voted upon by the conferences and, upon adoption, the uniting of the conferences would fulfill the mandate of the Quadrennial Program of "greater oneness in Methodism and its practical demonstration in Christian witness." Though space is limited in this report, the "Statement of Standards" is here included because of its significance for other areas of Methodism.

Statement of Standards

- 1. It is recommended that a survey be made by the Department of Research and Survey of the Division of National Missions to determine the feasibility of mergers, consolidations, relocations, realignments and church extension needs, and that recommendations accompany this report.
- Districts will not exceed fifty charges in number and new district boundaries will be drawn at time of merger.
- 3. All institutions related to the merged annual conferences shall offer their services without regard to race, color, or national origin.
- Employment policies of all institutions related to the merged annual conferences shall be established without regard to race, color, or national origin.
- 5. The minimum salary schedule in force in the white conferences at the time of merger shall be the schedule adopted by the merged conference.
- 6. All ministers of the merged conference shall enjoy the same status, rights, and privileges.
- 7. After the merger, ministers will be admitted into full connection only if they have college and seminary degrees, with the exception that those ministers on trial at the time of merger shall be admitted into full connection when they have fulfilled the requirements of the rule under which they were admitted on trial.
- 8. Approved supply pastors in either conference at time of merger shall be recognized as approved supply pastors in the merged conference.
- 9. Recruitment for the ministry will be carried on without regard to race, color, or national background.
- 10. The opportunities of laymen in the annual conference shall not be limited in any way due to race, color, or national origin.
- 11. Ministerial membership on annual conference boards and agencies shall be limited to full time, active conference members.
- 12. All claimants against the existing conference, white and negro, will be recognized as claimants against the conference after merger for the years of service rendered within the geographical boundaries of the white conference. The General Board of Pensions shall be the clearing house and final authority in determining the years of service of all persons in the various conferences. The pension rate will be determined by the annual conference after merger, but it is recommended that the rate be not less than the existing rate of the white conference at time of merger.
- 13. The same rate scale (retired ministers, widows, special conference claimants, children) will apply to all claimants.

14. The merged conference shall be mindful of the financial support which the Negro conferences now give toward the various institutions with which they are now respectively related.

It is now a matter of history that the merger has "worked," that we have moved from definition to demonstration, and that many of the fears have been dispelled and the ominous forebodings have not been realized. There have been five appointments made across racial lines at this writing and more are in prospect. We give God the glory for this witness of "oneness" in Methodism.

Petworth Parish

We are to "hear what the Spirit of God is saying unto the churches." Someone has said that the reason history repeats itself is that so many people were not listening the first time. It is hard for us to hear when we do not wish to hear, even when God speaks. But we believe that God has spoken in the life of Petworth Church, and the people have responded under the inspired and committed leadership of Professor Haskell M. Miller of Wesley Theological Seminary and with the enthusiastic support of Dean L. Harold DeWolf and a corps of seminarians. The Washington Post under date line of February 4, 1967 carried a four column headline, Petworth Parish Experiment Works. Indeed it does. But what is the Petworth Parish idea?

It is the creation of shared ideas held by Dean DeWolf and Professor Miller of Wesley Seminary. In conference with the area bishop, they explained that Wesley Seminary was revising its curriculum to build into it an encounter with the world. This new curriculum included an experimental program at an inner city church to see what could be done for renewal of the church while making use of existing structures. The church was to serve as a laboratory for research and study. The pastor in charge, Professor Miller, would occupy the parsonage adjoining the inner city church.

Four goals were set for this experimental ministry:

- 1. To provide Wesley Seminary a training base for the practical preparation of students for ministry in urban churches.
- 2. To strengthen and to serve the existing congregation.
- 3. To serve the community.
- 4. To develop new creative forms of program and ministry.

Serving with the pastor and assistant pastor in this ministry are five Wesley Seminary students on work scholarships, who spend fifteen hours a week as parish "interns", and two volunteer students give eight hours a week. Space does not permit spelling out the types of ministry now made possible in this new experiment, but we dare not omit the evaluation of this ministry made by Professor Miller. In the Petworth Tribune, under the Pastors' Message, we read:

"The work in which we clergy and laity of Petworth find ourselves presently involved is a wedge to the force of mere repetitive history. From the moment a lay committee posed the question, 'What is the future of Petworth Methodist,' our church entered rebirth. Not accept-

ing the old patterns of church 'sell out,' or abandonment, or complete mobilization of the suburban fringes of the city, laity and clergy have chosen together to try to 'be the Church of Jesus Christ' right where we are.

"Seven months have passed since our appointment as your pastors—months filled with success and with failure. We are now in the midst of church and community programs which have greatly changed the profile of the church's life. Our life together is becoming exciting and challenging. Many persons have said 'Yes' to the call to serve God in new and significant ways; many have dared to give a loaf rather than a crumb in the service of God and their fellow man. . . .

"We have come far-but there is still much to be done.

"Someone asked us recently, 'Didn't the church really miss its chance to sell?' We felt like replying, 'No, what is really missed was the chance for a sell-out!' The sale of Petworth Methodist Church would only have been another example of the tragic failure of the church to fulfill its mission. . . .

"Thank God for those who had insight into the patterns of history. Thank God for those who listened and heard the sounds of history repeating itself. Thank God for the God-power and the man-power with which we shall drive a wedge firmly into the life-crushing snowball of deadening history and by which a renewed community of Christians may arise!"

This is an evaluation to ponder in humility and obedience. We thank our God for this evidence of renewal within His church.

Woman's Society of Christian Service

What has this great segment of the Church done to achieve a greater oneness in Methodism? And the answer is more than we had dared to dream. In reports there appear to be advances all down the line in giving, reflecting no doubt the affluence of our society. Attention has been given to the program in leadership development with amazing interest and support of those involved. One conference reports 700 women in attendance at such a conference. Mission studies and seminars are now ecumenical in nature, involving other than Methodist groups.

However, there were some disturbing sidelights in the reports. Fear was expressed that the societies were not "picking up the young women of the churches" in sufficient numbers to offset the deaths of the older members. When asked the reason for this, one president surmised that the "older women held the helm too long." Integration is still a problem. While many of the women are on "speaking terms" across racial lines, there is little social or cultural integration taking place. Negroes fear rejection while whites fear "what others will say." As a solution, the suggestion was made that a person be appointed to study reasons for the failure to integrate and then to provide opportunities for growth in this area of need. It was pointed out that local papers were reluctant to accept copy from Negro chairmen of the Woman's Society Conference news. When a fine and talented Negro was asked to assume the chairmanship of the

Woman's Society Conference newspaper, she declined with the comment, "The color of my skin would hinder the paper."

A third area of deep concern is "rebellion" in some local societies expressed in failure to accept the total program of the Woman's Society and by a refusal to channel monies raised through the designated channels. There is expressed the strong feeling that the women should become "more a part of the total church;" that they be "given the right to work out their own pledge to missions;" that they be permitted to support local needs such as the "pastor's salary, local church benevolences, community centers, etc." In spite of the rules, one small church society gave two thousand dollars to a local church project for which no credit was given or expected. In spite of the increased giving, it may be that we need to hear just what is being said in these report sidelights.

Urgent Needs

At this writing the Baltimore Conference has passed the three million dollar mark in cash received and distributed through this Crusade. This amazing result of increased giving, coupled with an increase in World Service and Conference Benevolence giving is due in no small measure to a faithful and hard working cabinet and to the labors of Dr. Asbury Smith, director of the Crusade. On behalf of the many recipients of these monies and of the entire conference, we thank Dr. Smith and the members of the Urgent Needs Committee for the work they have done. We are now in the final year of the Crusade.

Shepherd of the Streets

"In our era the road to holiness necessarily passes through the world of action," wrote the late Dag Hammarskjold. The most exciting aspect of the S.O.S. program is the development of its new curriculum, devised and taught by those who participate in the program, those drawn from the streets, the gangs, and drop outs. They are now the "in group," acting out their own life story, and serving as the dramatis personnae. Their own lives, their needs and rebellions, are now acted out for all to see. Their fear and hatred of the corner cop is now a part of a new life curriculum together with a portrayal of just what life is like in the ghetto. This program attracts students from neighboring college campusses who, after a summer spent in the program, feel that to return to the campus is a "let down."

In this action program, the statements and protests of the campus are put to the test in heroic action within the worst section of the city. There are no phony answers to real problems. The real focus of this program is now in training leaders and counselors. Last summer 700 children were helped and served by more than 100 paid and volunteer workers. When asked where the children came from, the reply was simply, "The neighborhood supplies the kids." In all such programs, there is the calculated risk that must be taken, but the failures are few.

Methodist Action Program in Wilmington

Methodists are making history in the city of Wilmington and on the Delmarva Peninsula. After two and one half years of research, a corporation known as MAP, Methodist Action Program, is seeking to extend the influence of the church in the inner city. As stated in the purpose of this Project, "Areas of concern in Wilmington need a church guided program to show the way to a better life in the city. MAP is helping to:

- 1. Adapt inner city churches to changing environments.
- 2. Organize new churches and church schools.
- Provide social, educational, cultural, welfare and recreational activities.
- 4. Relate the church to civic and community organizations.
- 5. Develop programs of evangelism and Christian teaching."

Similar plans are in the making for the great city of Baltimore under the leadership of the Baltimore Southwest Parish and the ecumenical ministry of the Midtown Churches' Community Association. In many ways the church today confronts the need of the city.

In addition, Peninsula Methodist Homes and Hospitals, Inc. has announced plans for a two square block housing and service complex in downtown Wilmington. On this acquired tract, there will be constructed a Towne House Center, with living facilities for 150 persons; Christiana House, containing service areas such as dining rooms, health center, recreational areas and shops, a Health Center with 150 beds designed to care for short term and terminal cases with 50 rooms to care for older people suffering from senility; a section for the rehabilitation of alcoholics and research in the field of alcohol addiction; and a Chapel providing for worship "according to one's conscience." Already the land has been acquired and work finished on the first unit of the complex.

The New Day in Christian Education

Every pastor and bishop rejoices in the impact being made by "The New Day in Christian Education in the Local Church." At the very heart of this emphasis is the awareness of the needs of persons living in often frustrating and bewildering circumstances that are a part of a changing world. These persons are searching for the kind of perspective that can be found only in understanding the significance of God's love working in and through us.

We are well aware that the greatest problem we face as church administrators is the problem of arrested spiritual development both in pulpit and pew. We must come of age, and the agency that is charged with responsibility in this area of need is the General Board of Education of the church. We rejoice that the goal has been set of 100 hours of serious study per year by each church member in addition to the hours he may spend in scheduled meetings. Think what might happen in our churches if this goal were to be achieved, and if each minister would covenant with his teachers to share in this experience as a coach-trainer-encourager. We

might be able by teaching and learning procedures to abolish church bosses and tyrants, whether in the pulpit or the pew; to strengthen and renew and, where necessary, reform our adult classes so that they would no longer compete with the church service, but support it; we might become more Christian in our attitudes and relations with others in and outside the church. I am convinced that many good people remain away from the church rather than come into conflict with a kind of church administration that is less than Christian and often ineffective.

Foundation Studies in Christian Faith, the new adult curriculum, will need to be taught by the pastors to the teachers if it is to be used successfully. Theological understanding is required and the pastor is the one best equipped to interpret this material.

Christian education must relate itself to the three great challenges of our day:

- 1. Integration. If we fail here, the danger is that extremists will gain the upper hand, leading to chaos and bloodshed.
- 2. The nuclear challenge. We must do all that we can to save man from a nuclear holocaust. We must place the power of religion behind the peace movement on a world scale.
- Technological arrogance. We must enhance the importance of religious education. Today such education is threatened by technological arrogance resulting in the fragmentation of life.

To these basic and required ends, the great program of our Board of Education is directed. We hail the New Day and pledge our support to its fulfillment in our lives. May God hasten the day when we take this sacred task seriously, for unless we respond creatively, the next decade will be a barren one for Christian education and the whole life of the church.

WESLEY COLLEGE

Wesley College has had a good year. Many people have helped make this possible by their interest and assistance.

The Peninsula Conference has every right to take pride in its College and to feel that the return from its investment has been satisfactory. There are few places where financial undergirding could hope for such successful results. The best part of the return is in the lives of today's young people who will be tomorrow's leaders. We are providing them with an opportunity for higher education which is in accord with Christian principles and academic requirements. We can afford to do no less.

The enrollment of the College increased this year by 14 percent. It was necessary for us to house forty men in homes in Dover.

A new dormitory, Carpenter Hall, accommodates 156 women. It was opened in September, 1967. The modern facilities of Carpenter Hall provide the most enjoyable living conditions for Wesley women students. With its formal and informal lounges, the meditation chapel, and the infirmary, the entire campus is benefited. The dormitory is named after Mary Wooten Carpenter, deceased wife of Walter S. Carpenter, Jr.

After more than two years of careful research and planning, the twoyear nursing curriculum was launched in September, 1967. The program has the support of the Kent General Hospital and the Delaware Tuberculosis and Health Society, and the cooperation of health agencies, and physicians of Dover. Mrs. Elizabeth Roeder, former executive director of the Delaware Board of Nursing supervised the establishment of the program and is now Assistant Professor in Nursing. Over the next five years the associate degree curriculum in nursing should become a strong program. We would urge the ministers and laymen of our churches to let it be known that Wesley College affords this fine opportunity in the field of nursing.

A number of cultural events were added to the campus calendar this year, including four outstanding lectures. Concerts, dramatic productions, and a variety of art exhibits accented the cultural atmosphere of the campus. The new Wesley catalog received the award of excellence at the Delaware Valley annual Printing Exhibit. Only 140 pieces from 14,000 entries were hung at the exhibit, and Wesley's catalog was one of the two colleges so honored.

The student service program continued to be improved under its long-range plan. The first full-time Dean of Women, Miss Myra Kamerer, was hired and the counseling program with women thereby greatly strengthened. The Dean of Students, Mr. William Wright, with Dean Kamerer, have worked diligently and with great imagination to create a pleasant atmosphere and vital program for students. This year, students are more involved in the planning and conducting of college events.

The Methodist University Senate Survey and Report are very important. The following four points from the concluding recommendations are here given as expressing the tone of the Report:

ONE: The senate committee believes that Wesley College should continue as a two-year institution. There are many reasons for this judgment, the chief of which are these: (a) There is a great need for solid private two-year colleges in an educational scene becoming increasingly dominated by public institutions; (b) There are many flexibilities possible in a two-year institution not available to the standard four-year college; (c) The resources required for a four-year college are not now available at Wesley. The choice is therefore between a superior two-year institution, which Wesley is becoming, and a feeble four-year college. None of this precludes the possibility of Wesley's becoming a four-year institution when large enough resources are available. The committee has considered possible merger with a university in the area, but concludes that this would not in the long run prove feasible, nor would it strengthen Wesley. The college now has sufficient strength to stand on its own feet.

TWO: The improvement of faculty salaries is of crucial importance. If Wesley is to be competitive it must depend primarily on the quality of the teaching-learning program. This means that the college must be able to attract the master teachers who make the difference. This will require more money from current sources other than tuition, notably gift income or income from endowment. In any case, faculty salaries must advance rapidly. The committee commends the college on its plans for increasing

salaries during 1967-68. It is not too much to say that upon this point rests the viability of Wesley College.

THREE: The potential sources of funds for a greater Wesley College are, to be sure, a major problem. The senate committee believes that funds for future operation and development must come from a variety of sources, and the very variety will help to keep Wesley independent and strong. (a) The Methodist Church has made significant current and capital support available. Both types ought to be increased as rapidly as possible. This is a day of affluence, and the money can be found. The committee urges that the Peninsula Annual Conference give most serious consideration to a plan to build the needed college chapel. (b) Individuals can be found who would be willing to make Wesley College their chief avocational concern. Such individuals will include potential trustees and also men and women not officially connected with Wesley. All trustees should be sacrificial givers to the college. (c) The senate committee believes that both federal loans and grants should be utilized by Wesley College. The committee sees in such loans and grants no danger to the freedom of an alert institution.

FOUR: Excellent relations appear to exist between Wesley and The Methodist Church, for which the senate committee commends the president and his staff and the leaders of the Peninsula Annual Conference. The work of interpreting the college to the church and the church to the college must go on in still more effective ways. Wesley is, and can become even more, a symbol of effective church-college relationships, with something very important to say to church-related colleges everywhere. The committee urges especially that very careful consideration be given to the meaning of college objectives relating to the Christian faith and their implications for the Wesley program. Wesley is closely related to its sponsoring church, and the committee hopes that this relationship will be strengthened. The point at issue is how this relationship can be more intelligently developed and more clearly enunciated. All that has gone before implies that the church relationship must be taken with increasing seriousness by the church also. It is a two-way street. The church must be encouraged by its leadership to increase its direct support of Wesley. Church leadership ought also to help the administration to identify individuals-Methodists and others-who will take a personal interest in Wesley as an institution devoted to education in a Christian frame of reference. (End of citations from Survey.)

We are studying very carefully the question as to the future size of the institution and as yet are not prepared to make any definite recommendations. It is said wide experience indicates that an economically sound operation of a junior college requires a student body of from 1,000 to 1,200. We are still open-minded in this matter.

The Senate Report was largely complimentary and stated that, "Wesley has made remarkable progress in recent years . . . (and now) borders on excellence."

Following the direction of the Senate Report, the members of the faculty have been studying the College program and developing recom-

mendations aimed at improving the total academic program at Wesley College.

With the Longwood Foundation grant, the erection of the proposed new library appears assured. We hope that by September, 1969, this most important building will be a reality.

We all must keep one thing uppermost in our minds. It takes money to run an educational institution. Salaries of professors and administrative personnel are an immediate concern. We are mindful of the problems facing the Conference in the matter of finances. In these days of challenge we should be looking with confidence, and not with timidity, toward the future. A number of years ago, the chairman made this remark to an official of the Conference: "We have committed ourselves to an educational institution in our Conference; we can do nothing less than support it adequately." That is more true today than ever.

WOMAN'S SOCIETY OF CHRISTIAN SERVICE

The past year has been one of preparation toward the transition from the Woman's Society of Christian Service of The Methodist Church to that of the planned Women's Society of Christian Service of The United Methodist Church, yet amid all the anticipation and perplexity the vast majority of the local societies have proceeded with their respective responsibilities in the interest of mission through the Woman's Division of the Board of Missions, as follows:

Fourteen persons from Peninsula Conference attended the Middle Atlantic Regional School of Christian Mission, held at West Virginia Wesleyan College, Buckhannon, W. Va., in June. Fifteen hours of Leadership Development, instruction in the year's study courses, and plenary sessions accentuating current problems and themes were priorities on the week's agenda.

The Peninsula Conference School of Christian Mission, held at Wesley College, Dover, Del. followed a pattern comparable to that of the Regional School, with Mrs. Cornelius White, as dean. Mrs. Carlos Crawford, team coordinator, after consultation with the team of instructors, planned the plenary sessions around the four study courses, Ecumenicity, Christ and the Faiths of Men, Japan, and Man and Community. Three of the instructors were from Peninsula Conference, namely, Mrs. Randall Blackmir, Rev. Clayton Hammond and Rev. Howell Wilkins. Mrs. Arthur Benjamin, Chairman of Leadership Development, in cooperation with the Conference Executive Committee, offered numerous suggestions for leadership in the local church, including an evening on the Vietnam issue. Literature sales during the school totaled \$626.60. The aggregate attendance was 185.

The Wesleyan Service Guild held a weekend study at Drayton Methodist Center, in September, with a good representation from the local guilds.

During the March Executive Meeting of the guild, Mrs. Sylvanus Browne, Centreville, Md. was elected Chairman of the conference guild, succeeding Miss Sandra McCracken who will complete her tenure of office, this year.

Mrs. Ralph Thompson, Conference Secretary of Christian Social Relations attended the Seminar on Human Rights, in Kansas City, and is presently concentrating on a method of promoting the subject "Human Rights" through the conference in this, the year of the Anniversary of the Declaration of Human Rights.

Mrs. James R. Webb, representing the Woman's Society of Christian Service, along with six other members on the Commission on Town and Country, participated in a four day Consultation on the Church and Community Life, held in Columbus, Ohio. Some 2,100 delegates from approximately 21 denominations attended this ecumenical affair.

The Conference Executive Committee was responsible for two meetings, during October: 1. The Day Apart, held in St. Paul's Church, Odessa, Del., under the leadership of the Secretary of Spiritual Life Cultivation, Mrs. Edward Wilkins. Two inspirational speakers were on the program, Rev. William Archer, host pastor and Mrs. Oron F. Smith, Denton, Md. 2. The World Understanding Workshop, held in Bethesda Church, Salisbury, Md., directed by Mrs. Hermon Dennis of that city, was most interesting. Mrs. William Henry, of Wilmington, Del., a member of the World Understanding Team which toured in Africa, and Rev. Robert Whitlock, of Delmar, Del., who traveled in Africa on a World Peace Tour, presented highlights of their experiences through the use of picturesque slides.

This report is not entirely a paean of praise. There has been a tremendous loss in attendance in missionary educational study. In previous years the Woman's Society Fall Seminars had an approximate attendance of 700 women across the conference. This year, under the church-wide method, attendance totaled 477 men and women. This decrease may not be due to the restructuring alone, but rather to the change in missionary thrust. We believe, however, that by reaching both men and women in the local church that there will be more active participation in missionary education.

The Neighborhood House continues to grow under the direction of Miss Mary White. A program director, Mr. Charles Dent, has been added to the staff. The new Forecast Committee is meeting monthly to study future plans for the needs of the community served by our conference project.

The Call to Prayer and Self Denial offering amounted to \$4,772.81.

The total paid to Pledge to Mission, to date is \$83,253.17. The amount paid to Supply Askings is \$11,783.13. Supplementary giving through the Woman's Division to Neighborhood House, to date, is \$2,644.33.

"All Things New" stressing the year of the Declaration of Human Rights was the theme of the Annual Meeting of the Woman's Society of Christian Service, Northeastern Jurisdiction, held at The Inn, Buck Hill Falls, Pa., where 29 women represented Peninsula Conference. Six persons attended the Annual Meeting of the Wesleyan Service Guild. Mrs. Daisy Cabean, deaconess, was present at the Annual Meeting of the Deaconess Association.

Leadership Development was the criterion in the early fall when each district presented opportunity for education in ecumenicity. In most instances a Roman Catholic Priest was the keynote speaker. Vietnam or Communication, Program Development and Officers Training were chosen as other important emphasis on the agenda.

The district Day Apart Services, Retreats, or Weeks of Prayer were inspirational for the spiritual life of the districts. The attendance at these services was commendable.

Mrs. O. E. Mangum, Vice President of the Conference Woman's Society of Christian Service, along with the Program Committee, is presently engaged in planning the Annual Meeting of the Conference Woman's Society, to be held in Whatcoat Church, Camden, Del., on May 16, 1968. Mrs. Mangum was elected, during the 1967 Annual Conference, as a delegate to the Jurisdictional Conference.

The Annual Meetings of the district societies were during the month of April.

The conference president attended the Annual Meeting of the Woman's Division and the Board of Missions, in Denver, Colorado, during January. She has been in attendance at all conference and district meetings, whenever possible. In addition to the administrative responsibilities she has spoken in a number of societies throughout the conference.

This report is being written just prior to the conference president's leaving for the Uniting Conference, in Dallas, Texas, to which she is a delegate.

It is with gratitude to Almighty God and to all the women of the Peninsula Conference that I present this, my third report, to the Annual Conference.

COMMISSION ON WORSHIP

The formulation of this report on funeral practices began with a survey of the active ministers of the Peninsula Conference. There was approximately a 51% response, which proved to be instructive. The following information was supplied by the returns.

A total of 2,398 funerals were conducted during a year: 42% for members of congregations, 32% for constituents, and 26% for persons completely unrelated to the local church. Of these, only 21% (or 494) were conducted in the church building. 66% of those were for members, 21% for constituents and 13% for persons completely unrelated to the local church.

62% of the respondents stated that they were contacted first about funeral arrangements by the funeral director. Although the question was not specific at this point, the committee wonders whether this also indicates that in the majority of cases the notice of death comes from the funeral director.

Any regulations or guidelines used in the local church for the conduct of funerals are usually prescribed by the pastor himself. However, it should be observed that less than half reported any guidelines at all. There was not one single church that used a funeral pall over the coffin.

There does not seem to be any custom or rule in the Conference concerning the forbidding of Sunday funerals. In one area, grave diggers decline to close graves on Sunday. Also reported, was an increased fee for Sunday openings which curtails Sunday funerals. Many men try to discourage Sunday funerals, many have no feelings concerning them. One individual thought ministers and funeral directors were selfish with their Sunday time. There does seem to be a definite liability to the small rural church as Sunday funerals seem to interfere with church attendance and worship services.

The question concerning the attending of viewings by pastors received a variety of response. Forty attended nearly always, twenty-five most of the time, thirty-eight seldom, thirty-six almost never. Statistically, there was a greater difference of opinion in this response than to any other question.

Reflecting the great variety of traditions that now compose the Peninsula Annual Conference, the figures concerning the length of the funeral service range from ten minutes to sixty-five minutes. 57%, however, reported from 15 to 20 minutes. The majority of men (111 out of 135) report that they use the 1964 version of the funeral ritual. Modifications to the ritual generally consist of poems, hymns, or special requests by the family. 67 said that they nearly always use a funeral sermon, 36 most of the time, 21 seldom, and 15 almost never.

As to the eulogy, fourteen use it nearly all the time, twelve most of the time, fifty seldom, and sixty-six almost never.

Only about one fifth of the men exercise control over use or choice of funeral music. Of those, the majority were encouraging hymns from the Methodist Hymnal.

There were only 165 memorial services represented in the entire ministries of all the men responding, if one man's response is deleted. One man reported 400.

Three questions requested a response of favorable or not favorable to possible recommendations. 113 favored a recommendation encouraging funerals to be held in the church building for persons related to the church. Twenty were not in favor. 129 favored a recommendation that the coffin be closed during the funeral service both in the church and in the funeral home. Nine did not, ninety-eight favored a recommendation that funerals not be conducted on Sunday. Thirty-four did not.

One question was sort of a catch-all category, asking for miscellaneous recommendations. There were dozens of suggestions ranging from the quite rational to the unbelievable. (One pastor suggested that passages from Jessica Mitford's book "The American Way of Death" should be read at funerals.) Here are some of the recurring themes:

Necessity of encouraging options for extended viewings—that they be limited, or that visits to the home be substituted. Concern that all viewing be done before the funeral service begins.

- -Desire for options to giving of flowers-memorial funds, etc.
- —Desire for options to the funeral itself—memorial service instead.
- —Problem of ministerial ethics—former pastors should not return except by invitations of the incumbent pastor and then should not indulge in long eulogies. This problem was raised by a significant number of respondents.
- —A number requested that some official brochure for distribution be provided by the Conference. One even suggested that there might be an official printed order of service for funerals. One person suggested that the pastor might inform people of the existence of "eye banks."

All five districts were represented in the response to the questionnaire in sufficient numbers, that we believe the survey to be valid in the picture that it gives us of the Conference. It also presents a good cross-section of the men serving the Conference as fifteen have been serving under five years, twenty-seven between five and ten, fifty-two from ten to twenty, twenty-seven from twenty to thirty and twenty over thirty. Ninety-one men were Seminary graduates, twenty-eight had some Seminary training but were not graduates, and nineteen had no Seminary training at all.

Recommendations are divided into three groups:

- 1. Recommendations concerning professional relationships with morticians.
- 2. Recommendations to our congregations.
- 3. Recommendations for implementation.

I. Recommendations to morticians directing Methodist funerals.

- We request that when the mortician finds the family of the deceased desiring the services of a Methodist pastor he contact the pastor and arrange for the time and place of the funeral with him and the family. In all cases, the time and place of the funeral must be cleared with the pastor before these items are released to the press or other news media.
- 2. We request that when a family requests the services of a clergyman in addition to the Methodist pastor who is in charge of the service, the mortician should not contact the second clergyman himself; rather in accordance with accepted ministerial ethics, he should ask the local pastor to invite the guest clergyman.
- 3. The Methodist Book of Worship states "the pastor shall not accept an honorarium for this service when the deceased was a member of his parish." In view of this, we request morticians not to include honoraria or fees for clergy services on their bills to families of Methodists.
- 4. We request all morticians to read the brochure on funeral practices distributed to Peninsula Methodists and to use this brochure as a guide when planning Methodist funerals.

II. Recommendations to our people.

The following recommendations are prepared in an informal manner to suggest the meat of the content for a brochure, that are here made as recommendations to the Conference:

The death of a member of the church should be reported to the pastor as soon as possible and arrangements for the funeral should be made in consultation with him. The calling of the pastor should be included in the very first group of telephone calls that are made. Funeral services of the church members should be held in the church sanctuary. We recognize that all local churches are not constructed as to make this feasible, but when and wherever possible your church encourages that this be done.

The custom of viewings is a highly controversial activity. We recognize that this custom may be beneficial to many. However, under no circumstances should our people feel that such an activity is required. It is not. And the bereaved family should feel free to express its desires to the funeral director.

We strongly urge, however, that because of the tremendous strain on the bereaved family, viewing the remains of the loved one should precede the funeral ritual in order to shorten the service and relieve the traumas established by the emotional experience. Whether services are held in the funeral home, or in the church sanctuary, the casket should be closed before the service begins.

We recommend the use of a funeral pall to cover the casket during funeral services.

The funeral music, whether played or sung should be appropriate and in good taste. The pastor should be consulted about all selections. The 1966 Methodist Hymnal is an adequate source for any funeral service. It should be observed that the United Methodist Church encourages its pastors to adapt the ritual to a memorial service when cremation is desired by the family. Oft times there is concern about remuneration for the pastor. Church members should be aware of the fact that the Methodist Book of Worship specifically prohibits an honorarium for the pastor when the deceased is a member of his parish.

When it seems to the family that there are sufficient circumstances to warrant a Sunday funeral, we urge with all our strength that plans for the services be so scheduled that they will not in any way interfere with the regularly scheduled worship services of the local congregation.

III. Recommendations of implementation.

We further recommend:

- That November 3, 1968, All Saints Sunday, be designated as a day when the Ministers of the Peninsula Annual Conference be requested to preach on the subject of "The Conduct of The Christian Funeral."
- 2. That section II of these recommendations be embodied in a brochure to be made available at a nominal sum to local congregations.

- 3. That each local Commission on Worship study the brochure and the Order for the Burial of the Dead some time before November 3 and make the brochure available for mass distribution to the congregation.
- 4. That during the month of October the recommendations under section I be printed and circulated to all morticians within the geographical bounds of the Peninsula Annual Conference along with the before mentioned brochure.
- 5. That the Conference Commission on Worship be responsible for carrying out these recommendations.

COMMISSION ON WORLD SERVICE AND FINANCE

During the past year the following actions were taken by this Commission:

- 1. Temporary General Aid Fund—Granted \$1,901 to pay apportionment from the General Church in full.
- 2. Board of Ministerial Training and Qualifications—granted \$925 for 1967/68 Conference Year.
- Board of Missions—Supplemental budget request of \$20,792 for 1967/68 was not granted because of insufficient funds.
- 4. Supplemented the cost of producing the filmstrip "The Almighty Benevolent Dollar" in the amount of \$192.
- 5. Board of Education—concurred with their request to set up a book library for Conference use. The cost is to be underwritten by the local churches.
- 6. Moving Expenses—authorized a wife of a minister who becomes a widow during the Conference Year while her husband is under appointment, and who has not previously received a moving allowance, receive up to \$200 toward her moving costs.
- Definition of Capital Improvements—A letter was sent to all churches defining capital improvements as follows:
 - A Capital Improvement shall be considered to be those improvements which add to the useful life of the structure or premises and which in a business operation could be capitalized for purposes of depreciation scheduling. They are those types of expenditures which are too expensive to be contemplated for expenditures from the normal current operating expense budget of the church, which budget normally provides for routine painting, decorating, and minor repairs.
- 8. Area Information-granted \$1,000 for 1967/68 Conference Year.
- 9. Peninsula Methodist Homes and Hospitals, Inc.

- A. Granted \$100,000 for 1967/68 Conference Year. These funds had to be borrowed on a line of credit. A letter was sent to all churches emphasizing the extreme emergency financial situation confronting the Country House and Manor House.
- B. Requested a review of the admission policy in light of the following recommendation:

It is suggested that the following be effective March 15, 1968:

- All admissions to the Methodist Country House will be from guests of the Methodist Manor House.
- Each person with a filed application for the Methodist Country House will be offered, based on their present priority of admission to the Methodist Country House, the opportunity to enter the Methodist Manor House on a non-scholarship basis.
 - A. If the applicant accepts residence in the Methodist Manor House, he may request transfer to Methodist Country House when openings are available.
 - This applicant will be given a priority number, beginning with number 1, and be guaranteed admission to the Methodist Country House in numerical order.
 - B. If the applicant declines to accept residence in the Methodist Manor House or requires scholarship assistance, his application shall be placed on a reserve list, if applicant so desires, on a priority basis.
 - When an opening exists at the Methodist Country House and no Methodist Manor House guest desires to transfer to the Methodist Country House, this opening shall be filled from the reserve list of the Methodist Country House on a priority basis.
- 3. All future applications shall be separately filed as to scholarship or non-scholarship basis and each application shall be given a priority number for admission to the Methodist Manor House, except that if a scholarship opening becomes available at the Methodist Country House, admission may be made directly to the Methodist Country House.
- 4. Anything foregoing to the contrary notwithstanding, not more than 35% of the guests in either facility shall be on a scholarship basis and the aggregate guests on scholarship in both facilities shall not exceed 30% nor be less than 20%.
 - A. The filling of openings to maintain the above requirements shall be achieved by accepting applications on a priority basis from the reserve list (2. B above) until such list is exhausted.
 - C. Appointed a committee to work with the Homes for the Aged to study the operation and employ outside consultants with experience in operating similar Homes for the Aged.

MAY

10. Minimum Salary Support—Requested the Cabinet to study minimum salary requirements and make a recommendation to the next Commission on World Service and Finance.

The 1967 Annual Conference adopted the following resolution:

Only those charges which conducted an Every-Member Visitation during the previous Conference Year which included the raising of funds for ministerial support shall be eligible for minimum salary support. It is expected that all ministers receiving Minimum Salary support have been and will continue to comply with this requirement.

This Commission makes the following recommendations for consideration and adoption:

- 1. That all boards and agencies operating under the authority of the Annual Conference be audited by Coe, Lukens & Bumpers.
- 2. This Commission has studied the reports of the Drayton Manor Committee and has concluded that the continued operation of Drayton Manor as a Conference Retreat Center is not economically

feasible and that the apportionment to the churches for the subsidy required for its operation cannot be justified. \$70,000 remains unpaid on the line of credit borrowed for capital improvements to this property. It is, therefore, recommended that Recommendation 3b and 3b(1) printed on page 855, 1966 Conference Journal, be implemented. "However, if the Committee on Drayton Manor, prior to March 15, 1969 can secure sources of operating funds apart from the Conference Budget and increase Conference and non-Conference use, so as to limit the subsidy required from the Conference Budget to \$15,000 for the Conference Year 1970/71, and the expectation of a reasonable subsidy in this range thereafter, the Commission on World Service and Finance may authorize the continued operation of Drayton Manor as a Retreat Center."

3. This Commission recommends that Project Equality be a Conference decision. The absence of the requested funds as a line item in the 1969/70 budget and the following recommendation should be not construed as either a rejection nor an endorsement of Project Equality:

If Project Equality is approved by the 1968 Annual Conference, the costs for 1968/69 and 1969/70 shall be borne by the Contingent Fund and not more than \$10,000 shall be allocated annually on a 1:4 matching basis with the aggregate received by Project Equality from other judicatories.

- 4. Since it will require less funds than anticipated a year ago to meet the Minimum Salary obligations under the approved formula adopted last year, it is recommended that the 1968/69 Minimum Salary item (I. E.) be reduced from \$29,000 to \$16,000 and that the \$13,000 reduction be used to increase the Contingent Fund (I. N.) from \$10,000 to \$20,000 and to increase Public Relations (I. I.) from \$3,000 to \$6,000.
- 5. In view of the need for Scholarship Funds by Conference Homes for the Aged, it is recommended that each item in the 1968/69 Benevolent Budget (Section III) with the exception of World Service (III. A.) be reduced ten percent (10%) and that the aggregate reduction of \$51,518 be used to increase Conference Homes for the Aged (III. Q.) to a total of \$69,518.
- 6. The following shall be the World Service/Conference Benevolence ratio for 1969/70:

7. The recommended 1969.70 budget is \$54,377 or 3.7% greater than the 1968/69 budget. The requested budget was \$199,108 or 13.7% greater than the 1968/69 budget.

The 1969/70 budget is a part of this report, and its adoption is recommended.

 It is recommended that .49 be the factor to be applied to the Net Expenditure Method of apportionment during the 1968/69 Conference Year.

William H. Kohl was born at Phillipsburg, New Jersey, February 25, 1897, the second child of Hespior and Martha Kohl. His early childhood was spent in the place of his birth, but the family moved while he was yet young to Easton, Pennsylvania. There he attended the public schools. Mr. Kohl's life was uneventful until a very intensive religious experience changed the course of his life and work. He immediately began to work in the Methodist Church as a young layman. During the course of his church activities he met a young lady who was just as enthusiastic in church work as he was. Soon a courtship was established which ended happily for both, for he and the young lady, Susan Weiss, were married. Their continued interest in the work of the church took them to the Home Missionary Field on the Trail Of The Lonesome Pine in South-Western Virginia under the auspices of the Methodist Church. During this period their home was blessed by God's gift of a little girl whom they named Virginia. Five years later a boy came to bless them whom they named Delbert.

Mr. Kohl was transferred to the Pitman Center near Gatlinburg, Tennessee in the Great Smoky Mountains where he and his wife, Susan, labored among the less fortunate people of that region. It was during this time that Mr. Kohl felt the need of more adequate preparation for the work of the Kingdom. Thus he attended the Tennessee Wesleyan College at Athens, Tennessee.

Feeling the urge to come back East, during the middle of the conference year of 1930, Mr. Kohl entered the old Wilmington Conference and was appointed to the Pittsville charge. At the following conference he was admitted on trial, passing through the orders of the clergy and was ordained in 1935.

During his ministry on the shore Rev. Kohl served nine charges until his retirement at the age of sixty-five. He loved all the people he ever served, but if it can be said that one place and its people can be loved more than other places and other people, surely that place to him and his wife was Hebron where he served its people ten years. This is where they retired in 1962. The writer was their pastor two years in their retirement. Rev. Kohl exhibited himself always as a fine Christian gentleman and was sincere in his cooperation with his minister. Our relationship was very cordial, and he showed the same spirit to other ministers who were to follow.

Susan by this time was in failing health. She passed away October 7, 1965. The shock was terrific, but Christian that he was, he braved the storm courageously.

It is naturally proper to say that a period of loneliness was to follow. It was easy for him to make and hold friendships. In due course he married Mabel Ellis, a former parishioner. This marital bliss continued little more than a year. His last months brought declining health. The prison of the flesh was exchanged for the freedom of the spirit in the Peninsula General Hospital December 14, 1967 at the age of seventy.

His was a full life. He was always humorous and joyful. He ever found time to help people who needed him. His hobby was travelling. He, in his time, visited and saw much of scenic America. MISCELLANEOUS

(a) CONFERENCE RULES OF ORDER

- Rule 1. The Conference shall meet at 9:00 A. M. and adjourn at 12:30 P. M. But the Conference may, in it discretion, alter the time of meeting and adjournment.
- Rule 2. The President shall decide all questions of order, subject to an appeal to the Conference; but in case of such an appeal the question shall be taken without debate, except that the appellant may make a simple statement of the grounds of his appeal.
- Rule 3. All resolutions, motions, amendments and substitute motions presented to the Annual Conference shall be submitted to the Secretary in writing at the time they are made or as soon thereafter as possible.
- Rule 4. When a motion is made and seconded, or a resolution is introduced and seconded, or a report presented and read by the Secretary, or stated by the President, it shall be deemed in possession of the Conference; but any motion or resolution may be withdrawn by the mover, with the consent of the Conference, at any time before amendment or decision.
- Rule 5. The motion to Lay on the Table, or to Take from the Table, and for the Previous Question, shall be taken without debate.
- Rule 6. No new motion or resolution shall be entertained until the one under consideration has been disposed of, which may be done by adoption or rejection, unless one of the following motions shall intervene, which shall have precedence in the order in which they are placed, namely:
 - (1) To fix the time to which the Conference shall adjourn.
 - (2) To adjourn.
 - (3) To take a recess.
 - (4) To lay on the table.
- (5) For the previous question.
 - (6) To postpone to a given time.
 - (7) Te refer.
 - (8) To substitute.
 - (9) Amendment.
 - (10) To postpone indefinitely.

A motion to amend shall be in order, and a substitute for both amendments may be received, which substitute may be amended only once, and if a substitute be accepted, it shall operate as an amendment to the original proposition.

MAY

- Rule 7. When a member is about to speak in debate, or to deliver any matter to the Conference, he shall rise and respectfully address the President, but shall not proceed until recognized by him.
- Rule 8. No member shall be interrupted while speaking, except by the President to call him to order when he departs from the question, or uses personalities or disrespectful language; but any member may call the attention of the President to the subject when he deems a speaker out of order, and any member may explain when he thinks himself misrepresented.
- Rule 9. When a member desires to a question of privilege, he shall briefly state the question; but it shall not be in order for him to proceed until the President shall have decided it a privileged question.
- Rule 10. No person shall speak more than twice on the same question, nor more than ten minutes at one time, without leave of the Conference; nor shall any person speak more than once until every member choosing to speak shall have spoken.
- Rule 11. When any motion or resolution shall have been acted upon by the Conference, it shall be in order for any member who voted with the prevailing side to move a reconsideration; but a motion to reconsider it a non-debatable motion and shall be decided without debate.
- Rule 12. No member shall absent himself from the sessions of the Conference without leave, unless he is sick or unable to attend.
- Rule 13. No member shall be allowed to vote on any question who is not within the bar of the Conference at the time when such question shall be put by the President, except by leave of the Conference when such member has been necessarily absent.
- Rule 14. Every member who is within the bar at the time a question is put shall give his vote, unless the Conference, for special reasons, shall excuse him.
- Rule 15. It shall be in order for him to move that the question be taken without further debate on any measure pending, except in cases in which character is involved, and if sustained by two-thirds, the question shall be taken.
- Rule 16. The motion to adjourn shall be taken without debate, and shall always be in order, except, (1) when a member has the floor; (2) when a question is actually put, or a vote is being taken; (3) when the question is pending on seconding the demand for the previous question; (4) when the previous question has been called and sustained, and is still pending; and (5) when a motion to adjourn has been negatived and no business or debate has intervened.

- Rule 17. All reports of the Boards, Commissions and Committees, shall be published and mailed to the Members of the Annual Conference ten (10) days prior to the date of meeting of the Annual Conference. Reports to be included in this mailing must be in the hands of the Secretary thirty (30) days prior to such Session.
- Rule 18. No report shall be received or adopted by the Conference until a copy has been placed in the hands of the Secretary.
- Rule 19. These rules shall not be suspended or amended except by a vote of two-thirds of the members present and voting.
- Rule 20. All materials to be published in the Journal shall be in the hands of the Secretary not later than ten (10) days after adjournment of the Annual Session or it shall be excluded.
- Rule 21. The Nominating Committee shall distribute mimeographed copies of its report to the Annual Conference on the day before the report is to be voted on by the Conference.


