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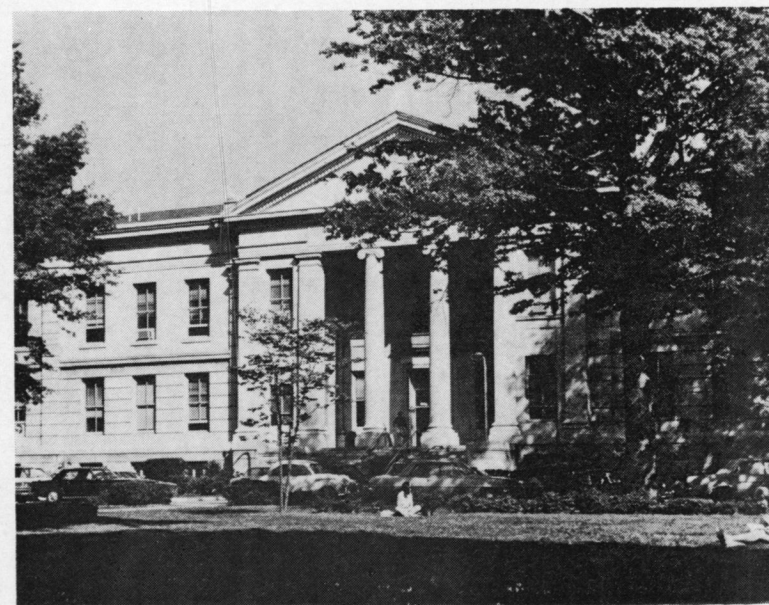
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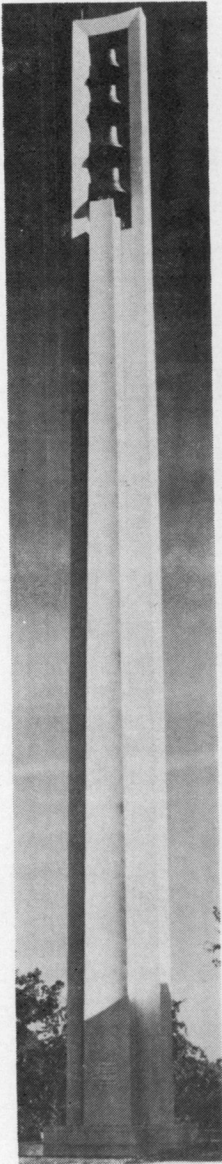
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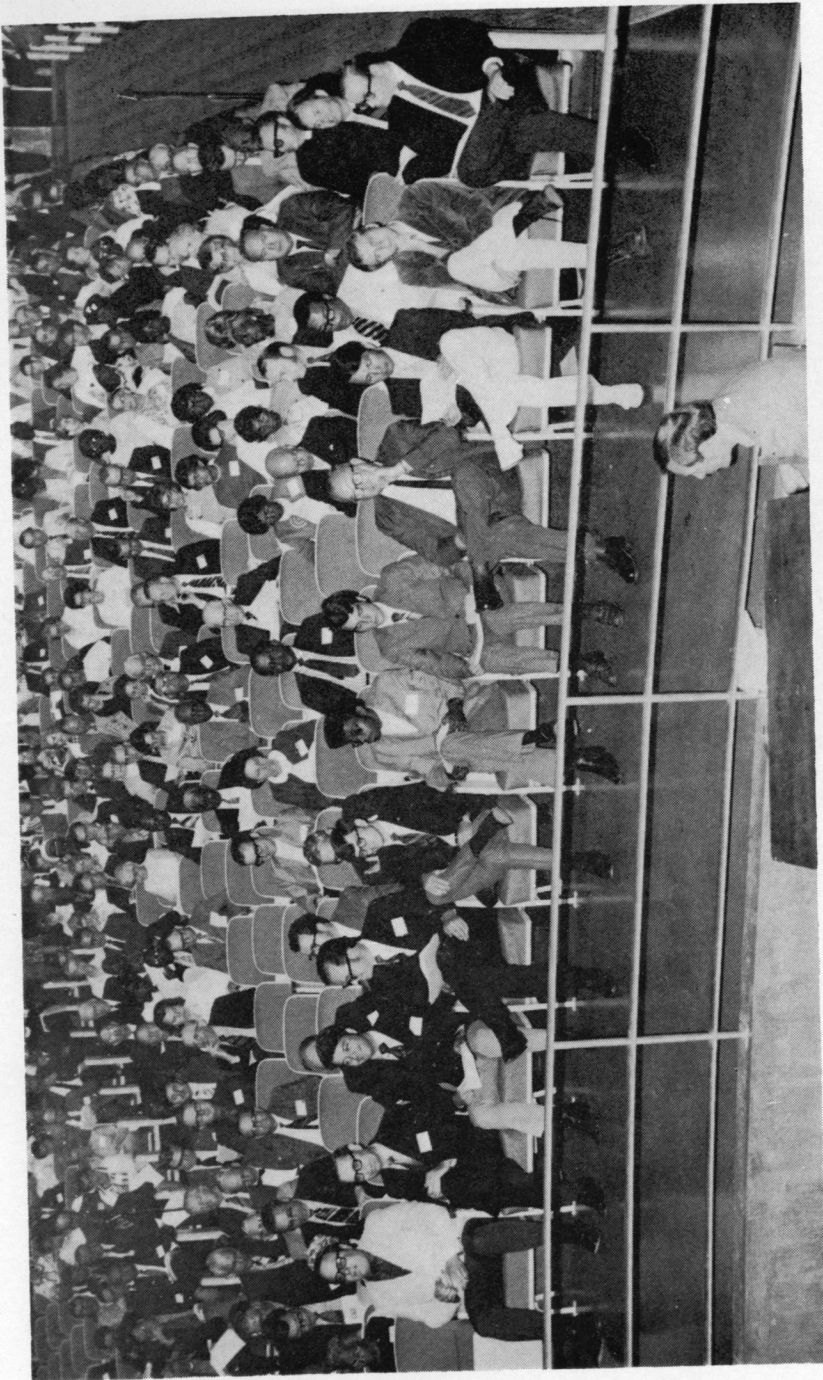

15. **RULES GOVERNING ELECTION OF DELEGATES:** Based upon requirements of Par. 601, 602 and Judicial Council Decision No. 333, the following delegation to the 1972 General Conference is to be elected: Four Ministerial and four Lay Delegates to the General Conference and six additional Ministerial and six additional Lay Delegates to the Jurisdictional Conference.

The additional delegates to the Jurisdictional Conference are the Reserve Delegates to the General Conference in order of their election.

In connection with these elections I now move the following procedure and rules:

1. That after all the delegates to the General Conference have first been elected on a separate ballot, the delegates to the Jurisdictional Conference as reserves to the General Conference be elected by balloting.
2. That there shall also be elected three Ministerial Reserve and three Lay Reserve Delegates to the Jurisdictional Conference.
3. That every member entitled to vote shall be ordered within the Bar of the Conference and those not within the Bar of the Conference shall not be entitled to vote except the treasurer, the statistician and their assistants, whose ballots shall be received by the tellers.
4. That any ballot containing fewer or more than the number of names to be voted for shall be rejected.
5. That where there are two or more members of the same name, only such ballots as containing the Christian name or initials of the person for whom the ballot is cast shall be counted, but such omission of the Christian name or initial shall not affect the other names on the ballot.
6. That a majority of the legal ballots cast shall be required. A majority of the legal votes cast on any ballot shall elect except when a larger number of members receive such a majority than are to be elected; in which case the persons receiving the highest vote shall be elected to the total number of places to be filled. A tie vote between two persons when but one place remains to be filled shall be disregarded and another vote shall be taken.

**RELIGION AND RACE:** The following statement was presented by Bishop John Wesley Lord:

The United Methodist Church—through its official body—the General Conference—has called all Methodism to move toward a truly inclusive fellowship. The Boards, Agencies, and Conferences have been urged to implement this as soon as possible. In keeping with this mandate—we the members of the Commission on Religion and Race—call upon all Annual Conferences to be sensitive to the need for having their General and Jurisdictional Conference Delegations to the 1972 reflect true inclusiveness. We therefore request that all Ethnic Groups be represented in these delegations and have representation on Episcopal Committees, where such Ethnic Groups hold membership in an Annual Conference. Such an act will speak much more clearly than all of the rhetoric that might be proclaimed. We especially ask that the same concept be carried over into the election of Episcopal Leaders. We remind the Southcentral Jurisdiction and other Jurisdictions of the need for the election of a Hispanic member to the Episcopacy. This will speak to our Hispanic Brothers and let them know that we are keenly sensitive to their needs. The time is now—for if our great Church does not demonstrate inclusiveness—then we force the Ethnic Groups within Methodism to look elsewhere for such proof. The Church can and must meet this urgent need—now.

WHEREAS, lotteries and legalized gambling are a risking of money or property for quick gain without work, and

WHEREAS, approval of such "easy money" methods for financing services is irresponsible stewardship on the part of the people of God, and WHEREAS, "the something for nothing" attitude is expecting to gain funds from windfalls such as lotteries and gambling is not good Christian ethics or morals, and

WHEREAS, we cannot have a model state in Delaware if House Bill 131 is passed since legalized gambling leads to organized crime, and

WHEREAS, our answer for the non-profit hospitals or education, or any increased revenue to the state should not come by more gambling.

BE IT RESOLVED that the Peninsula Annual Conference go on record as opposing state lotteries and legalized gambling in any form.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that we as United Methodist abstain from all gambling or participating in the popular attitude of gaining something for nothing.

#### WESLEY COLLEGE ANNUAL CORPORATE SESSION

Thursday, May 27, 1971

The Corporate Session of Wesley College was called to order at 10:00 a.m. at the seat of the Peninsula Annual Conference held at Central Middle School, Dover, Delaware, on Thursday, May 27, 1971, by the Chairman of the Board of Trustees, Mr. O. H. P. Baldwin.

- b. give adequate medical attention to those prisoners in need because of wounds or illness.
- c. furnish a complete list of names to the Republic of South Vietnam, United States or the International Red Cross.
- d. exchange the seriously ill or wounded prisoners of war so they can be given suitable medical treatment and rehabilitation.
- e. insure the treatment of all prisoners of war in a humane manner and to observe the Articles of the Geneva Convention governing the treatment of prisoners of war.

#### ANTI-SEMITISM IN SOVIET UNION:

WHEREAS, the brotherhood we celebrate as United Methodist continually calls us to a deeper awareness of our wider brotherhood with all men, and,

WHEREAS, the discriminating treatment of Jews in the Soviet Union and the suppression of their rights to live in accordance with their cultural and religious heritage is an injustice that summons us to speak in the name of moral and religious principle and,

WHEREAS, the suffering of Jews in the Soviet Union, elder brothers in a special tradition, strikes at the very nerve center of our fraternal consciousness

BE IT THEREFORE RESOLVED that the Peninsula Conference issue an urgent call to the Soviet authorities:

1. to extend to Jews in the Soviet Union the full measure of equality to which they are entitled under the Soviet Constitution and the Universal Declaration of Human Rights subscribed to by the Soviet Union;
2. to permit Jews to live in accord with their cultural and religious heritage freely and openly;
3. to eradicate every vestige of anti-Semitism and to institute a vigorous campaign against all anti-Semitic manifestations;
4. to grant permission to those Jews who desire to do so to emigrate to Israel or to any other country and to insure the unhindered exercise of this right; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that this message be sent to the Soviet Ambassador to the United Nations, the Honorable Yakov Malik, and to the Soviet Ambassador to the United States, Ambassador Anatoli F. Dobrynin; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED THAT A COPY OF THIS COMMUNIQUE be sent to our Secretary of State, Mr. William P. Rogers, and to our representative to the United Nations, the Honorable George Bush, for their information and whatever action they deem appropriate.

B. The Study Section voted concurrence on the following Recommendations which were adopted by the conference as amended:

1. Arising from the Commission on Ecumenical Affairs Recommendation #1. 1. That we encourage each local church to have an in-depth study of A Plan of Union given us by the Church of Christ Uniting and that criticisms and recommendations concerning this Plan be mailed to the Reverend Thomas C. Short by May 1, 1972.
2. The Peninsula Annual Conference enter into a co-operative ministry with the Episcopal Diocese of Delaware and the Presbytry of New Castle to establish a church in the Glasgow area which will be staffed and supported mutually by the three denominations involved.
3. Arising from the report of the Program Council—Rec. #1, 2, 3, 4, 5 and 6. Rec. #7.—The following amendment: Section A—“SPIRITUAL, 1. Goal: Realizing that God created man to be His hands, His feet, His voice in the world; that man was given the responsibility to cultivate and preserve all that God had created; that by man’s sin of disobedience he became self-centered rather than God-centered and others-centered; that only through repentance of his sin and forsaking it, and surrender to Jesus Christ as Saviour and Lord can he regain the right perspective of his responsibility as a co-partner with God, assume his responsibility to conserve and protect the natural world and its resources, whether they be in his own community or on the other side of the world, have the ability to look on the heart of his fellowman rather than the outward appearances, will do unto others as he would have done unto himself, establishing hope for a better world for future generations” was approved. (This text substitutes that printed in the Pre-Conference Report, Heading)—A. Spiritual, Part 1. Goal:

Understanding man’s relationship to God in terms of partnership or co-workship so man’s relationship to and responsibility for all aspects of God’s creation, such as, other people, ourselves, the church, the community, the natural environment can be seen.

On motion of Gilbert S. Scarborough, Jr. recommendation #8 of the report of the Committee on Program and Ecumenical Affairs was deleted by action of the Annual Conference.

9. Whereas the Program Council’s program for 1971 adequately deals with white racism, and, whereas the 1970 General Conference listed “Black Revolution” as a priority program consideration,

Be It Therefore Resolved that the Program Council support the General Conference program theme “Black Revolution” that espouses a three-fold cause—cultural, political, and economic unity by adoption and implementation of the following statement:

There must be a strengthening of the black churches of the Conference to deal with institutional racism and its affects upon our society.—It can be frankly and accurately stated that large numbers of black laymen and ministers of the Conference know that the black churches are going out of existence. We regret this, and we realize that it is not intentional, but we believe that this is not an irrational idea; existing policies and practices give grounds for it. If the Annual Conference wishes to serve its total constituency and evangelize the total population, it must take steps to strengthen its black churches in order that they may be empowered to carry on their unique ministry as part of the total mission of the Conference. We believe that the black churches can best determine the programs and policies which will accomplish this empowerment.

Therefore, we of Section 3 call upon the Peninsula Annual Conference and urge that the Commission On World Service and Finance consider making available \$100,000 a year for the next four years beginning Jan. 1, 1973, for strengthening and empowering of black churches of the Conference, and we ask the Conference to refer this request to the Program Council and the Commission on World Service and Finance. The black members of the Conference Board of Missions, the Conference Program Council, and the Conference Cabinet will be responsible for convening a meeting of the black churches to determine the mechanism for the use of funds and overseeing the expenditure thereof.

10. The following guidelines for the realignment of charges were recommended to be adopted by Conference:

Desiring to maintain as much harmony as possible within the Conference while at the same time making as much progress as possible; and realizing that people and not inanimate objects, are being dwelt with; and knowing that many of these people are at least third and fourth generation in the same church fellowship; and believing that Jesus was concerned with people as individuals as well as the world population as a whole, we make the following recommendations—

That churches that are involved in realignment should be involved in the planning meetings concerning that particular realignment.

That the minimum membership requirement for a charge or church not apply as long as that charge or church will adequately support a minister according to the recommended minimum salary guidelines, meeting Conference apportionments, and actively in mission.

AMENDED: On motion of Larry Butler, recommendation #11 was amended as follows:

“I move that the capsule mailing be sent to the President of the Conference Youth Council and the President of the local Youth Council or the President of the Senior UMYF of each church in the conference.”

12. Resolution from the Quadrennial Emphasis Committee adopted as printed except for a change in wording in #1 to read

"Seeking to secure" instead of "Securing".

The report was adopted by the Conference as amended.

**RESOLUTION:** The following resolution was presented by Study and Review Section #3—Program and Ecumenical Affairs and adopted by the Conference:

WHEREAS the General Conference adopted as the Quadrennial Emphasis, 1968-72, A NEW CHURCH FOR A NEW WORLD and recommended raising a special fund to be known as the Fund for Reconciliation in the amount of not less than \$20,000,000, an over and above contribution from every member and congregation in United Methodism;

And, WHEREAS 50 percent of the amount raised is to be retained by each episcopal area, and 50 percent is to be placed with the treasurer of the Council on World Service and Finance to be used at the direction of the Council of Bishops and the special Quadrennial Emphasis Committee for meeting emergency needs growing out of the crisis in the United States as well as for like emergency needs related to the mission of the church overseas, such as reconstruction in war ravaged areas;

And, WHEREAS approximately \$10,000,000 of this has been raised and paid, with approximately \$6,000,000 additional pledged, leaving an amount of \$4,000,000 of new giving needed to achieve the \$20,000,000 goal:

Be it resolved that the Peninsula Annual Conference reaffirm its participation in and support for the Fund for Reconciliation, and through its members and congregations seek to raise its fair share and more before the General Conference in Atlanta;

And, further, that it will in addition to other processes undergird its commitment by the following:

1. Seeking to secure from each charge a minimum amount of \$2 per member paid in this quadrennium toward the Fund for Reconciliation.

2. Urging individuals who have pledged to the Fund to pay their pledges in full, and if possible to overpay by 50 percent, making payment of this commitment a priority of their stewardship in the 1971-72 conference year.

3. In appreciation for the concern of our Bishop for the raising of the Fund, urging that through the good offices of Bishop Lord and the District Superintendents, the claims of the Fund be brought to the attention of each Charge Conference and the first District Ministers' meeting of the fall with the purpose of involving every member and congregation in the support of the Fund.

4. And in support of this need, making Thanksgiving Sunday, November 21, 1971, a day for emphasizing the Fund in each United Methodist Church, and where appropriate urging all pastors

and churches to use this Sunday for pledge paying and additional giving in support of the Fund.

5. Going on record as an Annual Conference in support of the Conference/Area Quadrennial Emphasis Committee in its efforts to assist the United Methodist Church to fulfill its commitment in this quadrennium to the Fund for Reconciliation.

6. And, finally, reaffirming wholeheartedly its commitment to reconciliation as the mission of the church in the world, and its support of the Quadrennial Emphasis, A NEW CHURCH FOR A NEW WORLD.

WHEREAS, the experience of the General Board of Pensions, all other major denominational pension programs, and leading industrial pension programs, as confirmed by the nations leading actuarial counseling firms, supports the conclusion that the pension functions should be separate from and independent of other boards and agencies in organizational structure; and

WHEREAS, a representative group from all the Annual Conference Boards of Pensions and the General Board of Pensions met in Evanston, Illinois on March 17-18, 1971, to hear and discuss a report with the Structure Study Commission; and

WHEREAS, this group of persons charged with the responsibility for the administration of annual conference pension programs is keenly aware of the necessity for the continuation of the established disciplinary relationship between the General Board of Pensions and the Annual Conference; and

WHEREAS, this group understands and is in sympathy with the need for improving the functional structure of The United Methodist Church. THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED: That the Peninsula Annual Conference, meeting in Dover, Delaware on May 25, 1971 petitions the 1972 General Conference of The United Methodist Church to continue the present relationship of the General Board of Pensions to the General and Annual Conference.

COMPOSITE REPORT - 1971

Presented by Howell O. Wilkins

Bishop Lord, Members of the Peninsula Conference, Friends:

I must for myself and on behalf of the other District Superintendents, express appreciation to our Bishop and his wife. We are grateful to God that Bishop Lord's illness has not diminished his courage, his compassion, or his commitment. We are grateful, too, for Mrs. Lord and her graciousness. St. Paul said he bore the marks of Christ. The Peninsula Conference bears the marks of Bishop and Mrs. Lord—for this we shall be forever indebted.

This session marks the official conclusion of the work as superintendent and active minister of Daniel Lyman Ridout. Fortunately his unique contribution will not be concluded. We will miss him in the Cabinet and the Conference, but his ministry will continue. Maybe we shouldn't call him blond and maybe we shouldn't call him blue-eyed, but we should and do call him **brother**.

I must acknowledge the fellowship, support and cooperation of the Cabinet as we have worked together in attempting to fulfill our duties, to lend support to the goals established by our Conference, and in our own right seek to find the Mind of Christ for our day and time and place. Bridge gap of God and Man—there is another gap—Man and Man. I want you now to listen to familiar music.

In our world, our nation, our peninsula, there is troubled water. I suggest we use, as an analogy, a bridge. The purpose or function of a bridge is to make it possible to get from one place to another—to arrive at a destination. Our purpose may be said to lead people to Christ, to meet Him and become His. To become fully human (our intended selves). A bridge provides a vantage point. We may see over the obstacles which otherwise would be in our way. A bridge also provides an opportunity to bring people together who are separated. As Bishop Lord has said, we must be willing to stand in the middle to accomplish this. Then a bridge to be useful at all must be walked upon. This concept may not sound enticing to us, but it is essential. To see how this may apply, let us look at some of the concerns expressed in the composite report of a year ago.

One of our purposes is to lead people to Christ. Again our church membership, Church School membership, church attendance and Sunday School attendance declined. While the conditions of our society may be a basic cause, we in the church must bring life and vitality to worship that is often deadly dull. We must replace lack of personal concern with per-

sonal evangelism. Conference staff could be a resource to help meet these problems.

The first mentioned is the mission of the total church. I believe we are seeing beyond the limited horizons of our own church. We are supporting the whole church's ministry. However, we do have difficulty freeing ourselves from accustomed ways. In realignment, for instance, we forget that the pattern of churches on this Peninsula was established in the early 1800's. Everything else in private or public life has changed since then. Change in the church is advanced to fulfill the mission of the church in a better way. Sometimes our structure stands in the way of our function. In the local church, the Council on Ministries as well as the Program Council in the Annual Conference are becoming creative centers for finding objectives, marshalling resources, evaluating and creating program. The principle of people from churches being involved in determining their own destiny is now being implemented at the district level with creation of consultative program creating and decision-making groups. These establish the program within a district—and these groups are composed of a preponderance of laymen. In all this, we must constantly ask the question, "What would Christ have us do?" I cannot believe He would be satisfied with things as they are.

The concern for an inclusive church as expressed in the dual efforts of realignment and pastoral assignment has—to put it mildly—received a lot of attention this year. District Superintendents have been criticized by some for doing little to implement these goals and by others for forcing people to do things they do not want to do. "Leave things as they are!" The new church cannot be seen but the foundation has been laid and the walls are rising. In the concern for relationship of our Conference and District to local church we affirm again they exist for the local church—to serve the local church and to provide the means for wider expression to the local church. We are committed to integration of multiple staffs, in the program council staff and in any other experience where people minister together—so long as the right man or woman is in the place where he can minister best! In the process of nominating people for the program council staff, the Cabinet considered over a dozen black people. None was found to be available.

In the ecumenical we have seen the development of proposals for various kinds of ventures—one bringing together Episcopal, Presbyterian, and United Methodist in one congregation. Others include ecumenical studies, sharing ministries, etc. As denominations, we must help each other in renewal. We also see the beginning of the Delmarva Ecumenical Agency—a new style of operation with wider denominational participation and new ventures without loss of those ventures already under way. In this new style we can no longer hide behind a Council of Churches and say "they did it," or "they said it." The DEA will do or say only that which all denominations agree upon. Other action will come through coalitions and task forces.

Further mention was made of pre-conference briefings, realignment and stewardship. I will review these briefly. Pre-conference briefings fit into a series of experiences relating to the Annual Conference decision

making process. Various Conference boards and agencies report on their program and proposals in pre-conference publication to the members of the Annual Conference. You may become acquainted with them and discuss them with your Administrative Board and others. You may raise questions and become more familiar with the issues at the District Briefing Sessions. Sectional meetings at Annual Conference will discuss further and recommend action to the full Conference. Finally, the Conference will take action. All along the line lay and ministerial members of the Conference have opportunity to influence and determine the policies and program which affect us all.

Realignment has already been referred to. But let me add—the whole purpose is to help the churches more adequately become the Church Christ intended—an inclusive fellowship—able to use our resources of property, money, organization, program and personnel most effectively. This is not to satisfy ourselves alone, but to serve Christ. Over 250 ministers serve the United Methodist people of the Peninsula. One may have responsibility for 800; another may have responsibility for 200. Is this an intelligent way to use our trained ministers? As to what happens to churches, look to Ezion-Mt. Carmel in Wilmington; look to St. Mark's, Easton; look to the merged staff at McCabe-Peninsula about to take place. Would anyone say their mission would be better accomplished by remaining separate? I'm not saying we must have only large churches. But I am saying that some of our charge arrangements are only marriages of necessity. Where is love? Love is lost in the idolatry toward a building or a group of associates. Christ said we must love one another. He even said we could not really love God if we did not love each other.

Every congregation of Christians needs to consider whether or not its present relationship with other congregations is the best to fulfill Christ's mission.

In the realm of stewardship we see new possibilities ahead. In 1970 there was a good response from churches financially. It is obvious many churches strained to reach the Conference requests. The long awaited priority study of Conference program should help all of us use our financial resources where they are most urgently needed. Churches are evaluating their programs and establishing goals which will change their ministries. The same must be accomplished in our Conference in 1971. Just as churches are learning that one cannot exist in isolation from others, so are various Conference interests learning of the essential need for wholeness. I doubt that many of us realize how much our money is able to do in helping the disadvantaged, provide camps for children and youth, homes for the elderly and children, youth here at Wesley; the outreach across the nation and around the world. The proposal to exclude expenditures in local benevolences from the apportionment base is an encouragement to mission where people are.

But the Annual Conference is the center of decision-making in Methodism. Some people have been surprised with proposals on realignment brought to churches these past few months. They should not be. We are the Annual Conference. We are elected members whose loyalty is to the

Conference as well as to the people who elect us. We must decide what is best for all—not just the church you now serve as lay member or minister, but what is best for all in the Peninsula Conference and what is best for Christian mission.

Therefore, in terms of the analogy with which I began, we need to lead people to Christ, we need to bring people together, and we must be willing to be used in the process.

### SUMMARY REPORTS BY DISTRICTS

#### CHESTERTOWN DISTRICT

DANIEL L. RIDOUT, District Superintendent

This final report of the phased-out Chestertown District is not so much statistical as it is a document of appreciations, thanksgivings, and, I suppose, sentimentalities.

It will be recalled that the Chestertown District came into being with the merger of the Delaware and Peninsula Conferences in 1965. I, therefore, am the only superintendent the District has had, which makes me have the possible distinction of being the best superintendent the District ever had—or the infamous designation of being the worst—or both!

But these have been for myself and my family memory-filled years, and the ministers and laymen with whom we have worked have become among our dearest friends. Ours has been a genuine fellowship transcending racial and cultural lines. We have broken no records in raising our Conference apportionments. We have consistently maintained an 86% average in this respect. This has not pleased us at all, but our gains in human relationships have more than compensated for this lack. Yet, several new churches and parsonages have been built, and many others have been renovated, on the temporal side of the ledger.

Our District Women's Society has ranked with the Societies on the other Districts, and our men have had capable leaders in our District men's work. Our sub-district youth groups have been particularly active with capable and dedicated leadership.

During this past year death invaded our parsonage homes three times and claimed the following wives of our ministers: Mrs. Hubert (Patty) Jicha, Mrs. D'Arcy Littleton, and Mrs. Henry T. Caldwell.

"A child was born" in the parsonage at Church Hill to Pastor Lester Maloney and his wife, Lucy. The baby is named Lisa Marie.

The Chestertown District is being discontinued at this Conference session as an economic measure. It has been perfectly structured along county lines, consisting of the churches in Kent, Queen Anne's and Cecil Counties, Maryland. The Cecil County churches will go to the Wilmington District, and the Kent and Queen Anne's Counties churches will go to the Easton District. This arrangement is not new, as it repeats the alignments in these Districts before the merger of 1965—with the addition of the former Delaware Conference churches in these respective geographical territories.

"The Lord has done great things for us, whereof we are glad." It has been a privilege for us to serve, and we express undying gratitude and love to all whose lives have enriched ours. We pray God's richest blessings upon Bishop Lord, our colleagues of his cabinet, and to our friends, ministerial and lay, of the Peninsula Conference. We go into retirement glorying in every moment of our ministry and hoping that we have been worthy of the "high calling of God in Christ Jesus."

#### DOVER DISTRICT

G. WAYNE CUFF, District Superintendent

On behalf of the ministers and the laymen of the Dover District, I am privileged to make this my second report:

#### Sickness

Sickness has plagued many of the ministers, their wives, and the good laymen of the District during the year. Some have had extended illnesses, and others have been besieged by short sick spells. On the whole, however, the District remains hale and hearty.

#### Births and deaths

Twice, the proverbial stork has visited the parsonages of the Dover District. Katie Cathleen Kelly was born on January 13, 1971 to Robert and Ann Kelly who are serving the Lincoln Charge. About a month later, the same stork made a visit to the home of Robert and Brenda Rogers where a son, Robert, Jr., was delivered.

Our hearts were saddened with the passing of the Reverend J. E. Parker, a retired minister who resided at Camden.

#### Buildings and Improvements

Union United Methodist Church in Bridgeville has completed its new sanctuary, and has held the Consecration Service. This is a beautiful structure, and one that will allow the church to utilize the many facilities to the glory of God.

St. John's United Methodist Church in Seaford is still making plans for their new sanctuary although ground has not been broken for the structure as yet.

Many other churches have made major renovations to their churches and parsonages in an attempt to make both buildings more serviceable.

#### Increases in Pastor's salary and travel

Thirty-two of the fifty-five charges on the District have seen the need and have raised the salary and travel allowance for their pastors to help meet the ever-increasing cost of living. Together they have given a sum of \$24,399 to their pastors in raises in salary and travel.

**Other pertinent information**

Whatcoat United Methodist Church of Dover has embarked upon an effort to meet a great need that exists in the Dover area—low-income housing. They have begun construction on the first segment of a low-rent housing project. The first building should be nearing completion by the time that this report is read in the Conference Journal.

They are planning to break ground for their new church structure sometime before the beginning of the New Year.

Much has been accomplished this year, but there is oh so much more that needs to be accomplished. However, with the help of Almighty God, we hope to make rapid and giant strides in the work that He would have us continue.

**EASTON DISTRICT**

OTHO G. BREWER, JR., District Superintendent

There is no attempt in this brief report to multiply words, unduly exalt personalities nor quote in great detail statistics which will be found elsewhere in the Journal. Instead we shall lift up the few items not listed in other reports.

There were four deaths in our parsonage families. I do wish to express deep appreciation to all those who work so untiringly for the Lord; to my fellow ministers for their confidence, love, and loyal cooperation; and to the laymen for their willingness as "volunteers" to do their best to advance the Kingdom of our Lord.

**SALISBURY DISTRICT**

DALE L. RUTH, District Superintendent

On behalf of the ministers and churches of the Salisbury District, I present this report:

If one of you is planning to build a tower, he sits down first and figures out what it will cost to see if he has enough money to finish the job. If he doesn't, he will not be able to finish the tower after laying the foundation; and all who see what happened will make fun of him. "This man began to build but can't finish the job!" they will say. If a king goes out with ten thousand men to fight another king, who comes against him with twenty thousand men, he will sit down first and decide if he is strong

enough to face that other king. If he isn't, he will have to send messengers to meet that other king, while he is a long way off, to ask for terms of peace. Luke 14:28-32.

It has been my privilege to serve the District and Conference and working together see much accomplished for Christ and His Church. Let the recorded facts elsewhere speak for themselves as to the successes or lack of successes. The attitude of pastors and people tell me we have succeeded in many areas by the advances in working relationship of all participants.

I commend our people and pastors for their response to the District and Conference Program. At the close of December we had paid 96% of our share of amount apportioned for the ongoing of the Church. In addition the churches have responded by increasing the pastoral support in the amount of \$23,806.

Let me now turn from what we have done to our hope for the future of our church and people as we harken to the admonition of the scripture at the first of this report. I believe we must as churchmen take a look at ourselves to understand our function. What are our values, our desires, our hopes?

I have tried to interpret for the churches the value and worth of planned change and have had a very good response. Many have accepted the challenge to evaluate themselves and attempt to set goals for the near and long range program. Several have begun to ask questions of past procedures and methods. Some have faced up to the basic issues and problems. Under the new structure we are given a great degree of flexibility. This involves an openness to meaningful change. When change comes, it calls for careful scrutiny of every program in order to determine how essential it is to the total church ministry. This makes the task difficult and hard to accept since change is difficult even when the facts are before us.

I tried group Charge Conferences this year in order to bring churches in contact with each other and to explain the process of goal setting and plans for smaller groups next year so that some sharing can be done in order that we may grow. I have attempted to do what I said last year in my report and not let the fact that we have been restructured be our hope of new life and an answer to all our ills, of itself alone.

In our day of rebellion let us remember that Jesus didn't locate evil in the system but in the human heart. Manipulation of externals, we are out to change, without changing the human heart, may be a somewhat worthy goal, but of no lasting significance.

Here is our forte—Christianity is a way of life by which society will be changed, the way of God which is the slow way. So expect no shortcuts or easy methods, but the way of love which melts men down, the cross, the long way. Ye are the salt—work, work, work,—busy in season and out of season if the Kingdom is to come.

May our joy of serving be heightened as we increase our family.

To our people, our pastors and their families I express my gratitude and deep joy in being privileged to serve with you. Margaret and I are deeply indebted to you for the many pleasantries we have experienced.

### WILMINGTON DISTRICT

HOWELL O. WILKINS, District Superintendent

A while ago I said that the greatest thing which has happened this year has to be the merger of Ezion and Mt. Carmel Churches. While we have had significant developments in many of the churches, there is no question in my mind but that this statement is still true. It not only brings together in one congregation the people, the resources, the talents, and the leadership of two, but it has far-reaching implications for future ministries. The lay and ministerial leadership is to be commended for their vision. We now have an enlarged fellowship of joyful and optimistic Christians.

Another dramatic development of similar potential significance for the future is the agreement of the McCabe Memorial and Peninsula Churches to have one staff of ministers serve both congregations. While the concept of a minister serving several congregations is not new, the concept of several ministers serving two large, strong churches has not been experienced very often. It presents possibilities for greater strengthened ministries to the people of the churches and of the community. It presents possibilities of ministers being able to provide more effective service to their people and it provides the possibility of a much better use of facilities.

The Wilmington District Assembly continues to grow in its influence upon the effective ministry of the churches. The decision making process for district program, the gathering to establish goals, and the studies being made to help the churches are now being looked upon as the natural way for the churches to decide the things in which they would become involved. Programs have been developed in the areas of youth ministries, leadership development, and suggestions of things to do to help overcome racial attitudes. A one-day workshop was attended by people from all but two churches on the District. Goal setting was carried into the Charge Conferences to help church planning. An important part is being played by the laymen.

The Wilmington United Methodist Parish has continued in even stronger fashion than that reported a year ago when it first began. The concern for leadership development culminated in a two-week series of sessions involving the ministers and over 100 laymen to help the churches build their own strength and serve their communities. The Reverend Dr. Howard A. Bailey was the resource person for this endeavor. The Task Force on Racial Attitudes has set as a goal the participation of every church in the city in Project Equality by the first of June. The Task Force on Church Relationships has recommended to every church the consideration of some strengthening of relationship with at least one other congregation such as yoking, merging, sharing of program or facilities, etc.. All of these proposals have been developed by task forces which had representation from

all of the churches involved. Much of the growing success of these enterprises has been possible through the staff assistance of the Methodist Action Program—Dick Stazesky especially. This strong arm of our church continues to help many churches and community related programs with a special emphasis upon black congregations and assistance to the disadvantaged. One thing we are beginning to learn is that no church is an island unto itself, but all of us in the whole metropolitan area must work with one another if we are to have any evangelical influence. I would not single out any particular church in the area of financial matters, but say that many churches have had an encouraging up-swing in the matter of financial contributions and are on stronger ground than before. This is reflected in a larger payment on apportionments in 1970 and over \$20,000 increase in salaries for the current year.

I have been invited to and have preached in every church in the District. There was one birth in the District ministers' families. On September 16, 1970, a daughter, Dawn Maria, was born to Reverend and Mrs. Ronald P. Arms. It is sad to report two deaths. The Rev. Harry R. Snead died July 25, 1970, and the Rev. Dr. Sydney B. Bradley died May 10, 1971.

With the many exciting experiences of this past year and the fine cooperation of both ministers and laymen, I express my appreciation. As we seek to find God's will in these times in the new and larger District, we seek His guidance and blessing.

## (b) Boards, Commissions and Committees

### SECTION I

#### I. EDUCATION AND COMMUNICATION

##### DRAYTON MANOR RETREAT CENTER

In reporting for Drayton Center the following areas are included: the extent to which this facility is being used, its financial position, the matter of fees, the need for wider sources of support, the work of the committees and the importance of interpreting the purposes of Drayton to the people of the Peninsula Conference.

##### Extent of Use

Reservations during 1970 included 73 groups and 3,520 people days. Reservations for 1971 indicate that each week-end for the remainder of the year is scheduled with many groups now beginning to fill the week days as well. Records of 1970 reveal that non-Conference groups using Drayton increased slightly. In the same period, Peninsula Conference groups using Drayton was less by 12 in 1970 than 1969. Present trends for 1971 in the number of group reservations, however, indicate increases over all preceding years in both Peninsula Conference groups and non-Conference groups.

##### Financial Position

Drayton's financial position during 1970 was greatly strengthened by two important developments.

1. A gift of \$22,500 by Mr. Walter S. Carpenter, Jr. was received to be used for operating expenses over a period of three years, 1/3 for 1970, 1/3 for 1971 and 1/3 for 1972. In making the gift the donor suggested that matching funds be sought, not as a condition of the gift, but as an incentive to secure a like amount, thereby providing additional income of \$15,000 each year for a three-year period.

2. Our District Superintendents responded to this suggestion and succeeded in raising \$16,000 in cash and pledges during the fall of 1970. Plans are to complete this effort during 1971.

In addition to the above sources of support and the Peninsula Conference apportionment of \$12,750, total receipts from fees and miscellaneous income at Drayton for the year 1970 was \$23,759.

Reservations for 1971 are indicating significant financial increases, so that, if present trends continue, Drayton will move toward greater self sustainment in the present year. An important factor in this may be the introduction of a through-the-week rate of \$8 per person, per day. Other considerations are being studied such as, a lower rate for groups having more than a given number, which may have an influence for greater use.

In this connection the question is frequently asked, "When will Drayton be self-supporting?" After serious study one wonders if this is a fair question or even the right question. Is this the best approach to the subject? What institutions, we should ask, in the Peninsula Conference are self-supporting? And, is this the real question in relationship to any of our institutions? A more pertinent question about Drayton, it would seem for us to raise, is whether or not this facility is contributing significantly to the creative effectiveness of our churches? There are many who would affirm that Drayton has an important role as a setting for congregational planning and spiritual renewal.

##### Search for Wider Support

During the year a search for wider support for Drayton has been undertaken. If the efforts are successful, they may do much to establish what has been so well begun.

1. An effort, initiated in previous years, is being renewed in the endeavor to form a congregation of contributors numbering 100 to 150 persons who would contribute a gift of \$100 or more each year. One hundred persons contributing a \$100 or more a year might well provide the difference between success and failure for this adventure at the growing edge.

2. The search for wider support would include other denominational groups seeking deeper ecumenical approaches to the witness of our shared faith.

##### The Work of the Committees

In all of these matters, the interests of Drayton has had the splendid leadership in the services of the Reverend R. Jervis Cooke, Chairman of the Drayton Center Committee; Mr. Joseph W. Brosius, Chairman of the Property Committee; K. Thomas Everngam, Esquire, Chairman of the Finance Committee; and Dr. Donzel C. Wildey, Chairman of the Program Committee.

##### The Importance of Interpretation

During the year, efforts already made in the past, have been renewed to make further known the purposes of Drayton. This effort, we believe, must be continued until the value of such "a place apart" for study, reflection, planning and prayer can be shared by all within our conference who would strengthen the Christian witness in today's world.

##### BOARD OF EDUCATION

If, as the experts tell us, "learning means changing", then much learning should be taking place in the Conference Work Area of Education. At the



last session of the Annual Conference a new director of education was appointed. In September, the Music Committee was moved to the Commission on Worship. That same month, we also learned that by action of the General Conference the age-level coordinators for children, youth, adults, and families were to be full participants in the Program Council and not directly responsible to the Board of Education. In February came a new director for Camp PeCoMeth. Change has been the order of the day—and through the change we are learning and growing.

What is left for the Conference Board of Education? We have, as the new design for church structure has indicated, "been set free to minister". While the areas of assigned responsibilities have been changing, the scope of education has been broadened. Where in the past we conducted programs, now we are to be designing programs for the Program Council and the Conference boards and agencies. Where in the past we created programs, scheduled them, and waited to see who might come, now we offer programs to local churches and only put them into action when the local church responds. Where we formerly thought of training teachers primarily for the church school, our role now is to train leaders to serve in all the work areas of the local church and Annual Conference. It truly is a new day in Christian education.

#### A Changing Role for the Conference Director

The Conference Director of Education is now an Associate Program Director for the Program Council. In this function he serves under the Program Director to assist in implementing the varied programs which the Council approves for our Annual Conference. In the Work Area of Education he also serves as the executive for that Conference board, and in this capacity he serves as a consultant to local churches, a collector of resources for education and all work areas, as a trainer of persons for leadership, and as a designer of programs for the local churches and Conference boards. One thing has not changed. The role of Conference director in relation to the local church continues to be one of assisting churches to find the best methods for the recruiting and training of personnel for the week-by-week education of children, youth, adults and families.

#### Leadership Development

This area has become one of the central thrusts for the program area of education. This year it has taken some new forms.

**Staff training.** In July the Conference board sent the director to the Northeastern Jurisdictional Training Center at Lycoming College. In October the General Board of Education provided training opportunities for both the director and the president of the Board in Nashville, Tennessee.

**Family Life Materials.** A new curriculum for family study was introduced by The United Methodist Church this year. Our Family Life Coordinator, the Reverend Donald J. Hurst, with assistance from the Board of Education, designed two training events for local church leaders which were conducted at a minimum of cost. In this period of budget transition the Conference Board of Education will provide the funds necessary for such training until the Program Council can budget for the work of age-level coordinators.

The Church Leaders' Weekends were one of the high points in leadership development. Seventy persons met on two separate week-ends at Drayton Manor in October and November. Under the leadership of Dr. Robert Powell local church leaders were trained in the use of the new Resource System and especially for work area and age-level ministries.

**Local Church Ministries** have been provided throughout the year by the Conference director and some volunteers. Leadership schools, resource briefings, and workshops have been conducted in local churches. In cooperation with the Commission on Ecumenical Affairs study workshops on the Plan of Union for COCU have also been conducted. The new Resource System for the Local Church Council on Ministries has been introduced on all five districts with the Conference board providing leadership for four of these. Local Church leaders also continue to turn to the Conference Education Office for help in the work area of Education and for assistance in individual church assignments.

**Council on Ministry Teams** have been trained in a joint effort by the Committee on Interpretation and the Conference Board of Education. Leadership provided by the General Board of Education made it possible to train twenty-two ministers and laymen from all parts of the Annual Conference. These teams are now available to local churches to assist them in developing the work of the Council on Ministries.

**A Design for Ministerial Training** is now ready to train parish ministers of our Annual Conference to serve in interracial relationships. It has been prepared jointly by the Conference Board of Education, Operation Leaven of the Methodist Action Program, the Board of Social Concerns and Cabinet. It is an attempt to prepare men to meet our goal of equality of appointments by 1974. It is expected that the training program will be in operation by Annual Conference.

**Church Library Workshop** will be held in the Robert Parker Library at Wesley College on May 8. This program will offer training for local church workers and ministers in the development and effective use of church libraries.

**Vacation Church School Workshops** will be conducted among clusters of churches in preparation for the summer program.

**Long Range Leadership Development** planning is now under way by a new Leadership Development Committee, chaired by the Reverend Harold E. Walton. Although the first concern of this committee will be to recruit and train leaders who will assist local churches in teacher training, it will be projecting plans for leadership development throughout the Conference.

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#### CAMP PE-CO-METH

On February first the Reverend C. Jackson Robinson was appointed as Assistant Program Director for Education and the Director of Camp PeCoMeth. We said our fond farewells to Mr. Wallace P. Smith at a dinner in his honor on May 3, in the Centreville United Methodist Church. Wally has served us faithfully for ten summers at PeCoMeth, and we wish

him every success in his new assignment. Mr. Robinson's report on PeCoMeth is included here:

"Ernest E. Klein has described the Christian camp as follows: 'Christian camping is the opportunity to practice this life of faith and love in small groups close to nature in the great outdoors, away from distracting influences. It is simple living, purposeful living, wholesome living. It is a religious quest, a shared quest. Just as Jesus took his disciples apart for instruction and spiritual discipline, so the modern Christian leaves his ordinary routines in quest of new perspectives, new faith, and renewed courage for life. This quest for responsible maturity is the golden opportunity of the church. In a more or less primitive environment, the luxuries and artificialities of civilization are trimmed away so that life is seen in its elemental dimension—man, the world, and God. As he contemplates the great drama of nature—growth and decay, birth and death, the beautiful and the grotesque, the camper is confronted with the great question of the meaning of life. Camping becomes Christian when Christ is taken as a clue to creation and when faith in God becomes the decisive factor in personal character and in group relationship.'

At PeCoMeth we seek to fulfill this worthy objective. But we never see ourselves as an independent agent. We are the extension of the local church, working in close cooperation with the pastor, church school teachers and youth leaders to bring our boys and girls, our youth and adults into a vital relationship with God through Jesus Christ.

Total attendance in 1970 was 7,889 or an increase of 32% over the previous year. Increase in the use of the Picnic area and the Family Campground, and the beginning of the Day Camp were significant achievements.

If PeCoMeth is to continue its service and enlarge its ministry, it must increasingly receive your support. In the months ahead you will be asked to become more deeply involved in the life of your camp through your prayers, your gifts and your service. With God's blessing, your help, and our best effort this will be the best year ever at PeCoMeth."

#### Christian Education Sunday

This offering has now become so vital to the future of PeCoMeth that without it the Camp will be in serious financial trouble. Once again this year our local churches have responded generously with \$8,300. Camp costs continue to increase with the inflationary spiral and this offering must keep pace to prevent the necessity of higher fees or budgetary funding.

#### Higher Education

Changes in Board membership at mid-year brought the Reverend Richard Hamilton to the chairmanship of the Committee on Higher Education. The work of this committee includes the allocation of the funds budgeted by the Conference for Higher Education to Wesley College and five Wesley Foundations. Allocations for 1972 are a part of the World Service and Finance Commission report. A study of the part-time Wesley Foundations is one of the projected plans for the coming year.

Campus Ministry Directors have been approved by this committee for four of the five Wesley Foundations. They are: University of Delaware—The Reverend David Riffe; University of Maryland/Eastern Shore—The Reverend Carroll Scott; Washington College—The Reverend Jason Blundon; and Delaware State College—The Reverend Hayward Greene.

#### Certification

This reorganized committee of the Board is now chaired by the Reverend Ronald Arms. Its task is to review the qualifications of applicants from our Conference seeking to be certified as Ministers or Directors of Education, Educational Assistants, Ministers or Directors of Music.

The committee is happy to recommend the certification of Mrs. Conrad M. Cohen (Joanne) to the Annual Conference for certification this year as a Director of Music.

Other persons already certified by the Conference are: **Ministers of Christian Education**—Rev. Clifford A. Armour, Duke University, Durham, N.C.; Rev. Fred M. Bruner, Salisbury, Md.; and Rev. Frederick C. Seyfert, Dover, Del. **Directors of Christian Education**—Miss Olive Cook, Wilmington, Del.; Miss Doris Hoover, Newark, Del.; Mrs. Felton E. May, Wilmington, Del.; and Miss Jessie V. Stevens, Seaford, Del. **Educational Assistants**—Mrs. Conrad Travers, Milford, Del. **Directors of Music**—Mrs. Joanne Cohen, Federalsburg, Md.; Mrs. Wanda L. Ewing, Federalsburg, Md.; Mr. Thomas Mowbray, USN; Mrs. Genevieve Palmer, Denton, Md.; and Mrs. Evelyn D. Swensson, Wilmington, Del.

#### Christian Educators Fellowship

The professional Christian educators within our Conference continue to meet informally. While not officially aligned with the National Christian Educators Fellowship, they keep in contact with this organization through Miss Jessie Stevens who is a member of the national organization and a certified director in our Annual Conference. The Reverend Frederick Seyfert serves as chairman of this group.

#### Audio-Visual Library

The Audio-Visual Library is jointly supervised by the TRAFCO Committee of the Program Council and the Board of Education. It continues to serve as the depository for resources from all the boards and agencies of the Conference. TRAFCO supplies a part-time librarian and maintains the audio-visual equipment. The library is open 5 days each week and answers some 2,000 requests each year.

#### Religion and the Public School

The Board is continuing to study the possibility of the objective teaching of religion in the public schools begun last year under the leadership of the Reverends Walter H. Stone and Howard A. Bailey. Informal discussions with public school administrators and church leaders from the Delmarva Peninsula indicate the possibility of curriculum development to meet this need. We will continue to work with the Board of Social Concerns

and the Delmarva Ecumenical Agency in this area in the hope of providing a program that will be approved by churchmen and public educators.

#### The Future of Christian Education in our Conference

Our knowledge about our world and ourselves grows at a rapid pace. No child is allowed to miss a day in public school unless some emergency situation exists. We are spending vast sums of money to improve our public schools and to train the teachers that are the heart of the education enterprise. We do this because we believe that men and women in our day will lose much of what life has to offer unless they are trained to meet it.

Yet in our churches the educational enterprise continues to decline and too many of us are apathetic about the situation. We talk about the problem but hesitate to take action. In our Conference and in many of our churches funds for educational leadership are slowly being siphoned off for other priorities. Perhaps without realizing what we are doing we are teaching that some forms of education are vital to life, but Christian education can wait for some other time. Can we really believe that in every other realm of life we must have the best training for the mind but that in seeing God we wait for the miracle? Until our passion for educating our people through the church matches our zeal for public education, there is little hope that our situation will be improved.

Christian education will not solve all our problems, but it just may be the key that opens our eyes until we can see in the events of this time not the dawning of the "Age of Aquarius" but the call of God in Jesus Christ. We must begin now to demonstrate in our commitments and practices that we believe the discovery of God's presence in the world is as important as discovering the world in which God has placed us.

#### THE COMMITTEE ON JOURNAL

The Committee on Conference Journal presents the following recommendations and restatement of action for your consideration:

1. We recommend that the cost of the Journal be increased to \$2.50 per copy when ordered by local churches or church agencies; and that the cost be \$5 to all other purchasers; and that it be sent to all full-time retired ministers and minister's widows at no cost.
2. We recommend that the statistical tables be dated by the calendar year; that we continue to bind them in the Journal; and that the page length be increased so that when unfolded all printed matter thereon be visible when the Journal is closed. We also recommend the investigation of the cost of printing the Journal on 8½ x 11 size paper, using larger print.
3. We recommend that each Conference Journal begin with page one, and that this will be effective with the 1972 issue.

4. As a reminder, we restate the action of the 1967 Conference Session as it is recorded in the 1967 Journal, Page 1166, Number 5: that each board, agency, or committee preparing a report for inclusion in the Annual Journal should be charged at the rate of \$50 per page for each page or part thereof in excess of a total of three pages. This action is currently in effect.

#### COMMISSION ON ENLISTMENT FOR CHURCH OCCUPATIONS

This year your commission has taken an in-depth look at a few specific aspects of vocational guidance and recruitment. These aspects of program have been set in motion:

1. A Committee on United Methodist Voluntary Service, that is related to the Annual Conference Quadrennial Emphasis Committee, stands ready to assist in the development of projects in reconciliation and the recruitment of volunteers.
2. A decision has been made to hold a winter convocation on the vocational decision of a Christian.
3. A committee has been appointed to work in the area of vocational guidance with public school, college, and other educational personnel.
4. A plan has been advanced to assist in the work of vocational guidance in the summer program at camp.
5. Materials have been distributed among ministers, local church secretaries of enlistment, and other appropriate personnel, to assist them in their work of vocational counseling and occupational enlistment.

While the Board of the Ministry has been carrying out a Convocation on the Ministry, and the activities preliminary to this, your Commission has remained in the background in order not to conflict or confuse. We have carried out no workshops because of this, because of no money, and because this is not the nature of our work entirely.

We keep reminding ourselves, and keep hoping that you are aware, that the enlistment of persons in church occupations is based on experience in the life of the local church and the individual person. Your Commission can distribute tools, materials, and information, but it must be used by the local minister and Secretary of Enlistment. Your commission can make referrals, but the church members must ask the questions. Camps, convocations, and conferences can be places of insight and commitment, but the local community is the place where Christian discipleship is fulfilled.

In the coming year we will continue to be at hand and as effective as you are willing to make us, and will provide the best possible program with the resources available.

**ANNUAL REPORT OF THE CHAIRMAN OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES  
OF WESLEY COLLEGE TO THE PENINSULA ANNUAL CONFERENCE  
OF THE UNITED METHODIST CHURCH**

In her 98th year, Wesley College has continued to serve young men and women as an effective instrument in education, religion, and social development. During that year 26 colleges closed. Others are facing severe problems with finances, student unrest, and faculty strikes. Private two-year colleges, Wesley included, are haunted by the evaporation of private funding and large foundations declaring moratoriums on grants. Public support of local education has reflected for seven years a hard line, as eight out of ten educational projects are rejected. This lack of support is carried over to higher education as seen in less alumni and parent support. Coupled with this trend is the rising cost of tuition, salaries, and day-to-day expenses. A clear premise comes to the surface; Wesley College has a cornerstone, a foundation which must not crack and break under the financial strain. That cornerstone, the Peninsula Conference, must stand firm against the erosion of this financial dilemma.

The Conference has stood the test in past history, in 1873, 1930, 1945, 1959, a 15-year cycle, and it is here today. The problems have not been insurmountable; solutions have been found. The Wesley College Board of Trustees' decisions, combined with the day-to-day decisions of Wesley's able president, Dr. Robert H. Parker, have continually devised and implemented working solutions.

These solutions are real to the Conference; ten new buildings in 12 years, a new College Center building planned for dedication at the height of the college centennial years, and an increased enrollment of 300 percent causing the most unusual problem, TOO MANY STUDENTS!

As you hear the excited commentary on student dissent, faculty strikes and pending receivership and bankruptcy of non-sectarian schools, feel confident that Wesley is sound. Completely integrated in the student life programs, academic structure and the physical development of the institution itself is the religious emphasis inherent to Wesley College.

While Wesley students reflect today's youth as they seek independence by style identity, it must be understood they are searching for knowledge and involvement at a feverish rate. Their concern with social injustice, environmental problems and pre-occupation with questions of "Who am I? What is truth?" are real and sincere. As the Wesley Student Christian Association reinforces the basic philosophy of the church, another group of students, Volunteers for Community Action, bear their Christian witness. Wesley students are involved with weekly programs by which they help the slow-to-learn, talk with the elderly, entertain orphans, and give companionship to the retarded. All of these projects and many others show that the youth of Wesley are practicing what we preach.

Seventeen Chapel services are held throughout the year. Chaplain Edward R. Wilkins uses an imaginative program to move the students closer

to the church. His Chapel services encompass a traditional sermon, contemporary styles of drama and music, complimented by student choirs, madrigal singers, and band members.

In day-to-day living the Wesley student has a responsibility to a community-within-a-community. This is the Residential Society concept that creates student involvement with college policy, standards, rules and enforcement. Dormitories are not just for sleeping; they are structured physically as well as socially with inherent judicial powers ruling student residents. As a pilot project promoted one year ago by the dean of students, William C. Wright, the Society concept has blossomed into a working solution. Students and groups of students are working to better themselves by upgrading standards through participation.

Students who break rules are prosecuted by other students who are delegated the responsibility and commensurate authority. Procedures also established by students leave protesters, malcontents, and troublemakers without support as witnessed by the orderly presentation of 12 proposed changes to the Wesley Student Handbook. A problem with radically changing times, styles and philosophy has the issues working up the ladder of authority to the Trustees. With fluid communication, solutions are found within the bounds of this established procedure, which is acceptable to students, teachers, administrators, trustees, and parents alike.

The academic development of Wesley has also transitioned with the times. New courses such as Religions of the Western World, and Eastern World Religions, give greater depth to traditional New and Old Testament courses. With the sudden interest in ecology, a new course, Man and His Environment, will deal with the environment as it is today. Whole new curriculums are being developed, not to replace but to add to the institution's overall educational program. The Nursing Program from which the first class of eight was graduated in June, 1969, will have graduated 40 by this June. The transfer program now allows Wesley graduates direct admittance to 24 senior colleges. That number is anticipated to grow by 14 before September, 1971. Innovative equipment, such as the new Dial Access System, uses the most modern technology in audio and visual electronics to expand in time and space confining classroom walls. This system encompasses 84 listening desks where students may select from as many as 28 pre-taped study programs, or view one of four television monitors.

New teaching approaches are now being developed and will begin in September, 1971, as experiments in learning. Even in the higher field of college education itself, Wesley is one of only two colleges in the country that have been selected and funded to pilot educational programs for junior college presidents, development officers, and other administrators.

Obviously, Wesley College has focused on problems and made proper solutions that have been observed and are now sought after. The past support Wesley has received has allowed special programs to help qualified black students and other minority groups receive a college education. Scholarships, grants, and financial assistance to those students will return large dividends to the college, the church, and our basic society.

The college is also becoming more active in the local community. Plans for the College Center building leave special areas open for large meetings, conferences, and other activities. These facilities are needed by community groups as well as for normal college requirements. In her role with Dover, all major Wesley events are open to local area citizens. Lectures by Bennett Cerf and Mark Van Doren, or top music groups, such as the Brooklyn Bridge and Livingston Taylor concerts, are shared with the public. Wesley's athletic program has brought national acclaim to her campus and to the City of Dover. The football team ranked eighth in the nation in junior college polls and played in the Silver Bowl on Thanksgiving Day, 1970.

The overall picture of Wesley is sound. Surveys indicate eight out of ten graduates who go on to senior colleges finish their college education with a bachelor's degree. Overall development is close to completing the 1,000 resident student objective set by the trustees. More local people are taking advantage of Wesley's evening sessions to enlarge their career training and horizons.

Wesley is doing the job and producing results. To continue at the same level of quality, new commitments will be needed, commitments from the students, faculty, administration, trustees, and most important, continued support of the Peninsula Conference.

## SECTION II

### II. MISSION AND SOCIAL CONCERNS

#### THE BOARD OF CHILD CARE

People of the Baltimore and Peninsula Conferences have continued in the past year to extend the work of the Church to deprived boys and girls in the Child Care Center, to unwed mothers, infants awaiting adoption, children from infancy through adolescence in foster care.

Through the Swartzell Assembled Families Program, we continue to bring together children from Junior Village for placement in families. Six homes in operation care for 27 children and other homes will be added. These children include Darleen and Arlean, 3 year old twins; Walter, Michelle, David and Charesse, brothers and sisters age 7 to 11; 4 siblings living with Mr. and Mrs. Henderson, and other children.

Grafton Keeney, Director of Assembled Families, reports "we have been busy just being 'families' ". The children are active in varied activities such as Boy Scouts, a Swimming Club, Methodist Youth Fellowship. Each family was encouraged to take a brief vacation away from the usual routines—they visited friends in North Carolina, Ocean City, Salisbury, Gaithersburg Fair.

Homes for these children are leased or, in some cases, existing homes of the assembled family parents are used. One house was purchased in March, using a grant received from Kendall Foundation as well as a loan from Swartzell Trustees for the initial payment. Formerly used as the parsonage of Mt. Vernon Place United Methodist Church and located at 1330 Holly Street, N.W., Washington, D. C., this structure now houses five children under the able supervision of Mr. and Mrs. Eugene Adams.

The General Board of Health and Welfare Ministries of The United Methodist Church, March 16, 1971, presented the 1971 AGENCY AWARD to Board of Child Care Baltimore Annual Conference "for Innovation, Organization and Dedication to Serving the Total Community, Especially Demonstrated Through Establishment of the Swartzell Methodist Assembled Families Program, Thereby Setting An Example for All Health and Welfare Agencies of The United Methodist Church. In All This Witnessing in Purpose and Program to the Highest Ideals of The Christian Faith".

Harold M. Davis, President, and Claude F. Libis, Executive Director, received the Award in Denver, Colorado, at the Annual Convention of the National Association of Health and Welfare Ministries.

Children in the Child Care Center have benefited from the varied opportunities during the year. A most significant development is the establishment of the Child Care Learning Center, an on-grounds classroom specializing in the education of the child with severe learning problems. Public School programs are inadequate for such children, a few of whom we are called upon to serve. The Learning Center is established in cooperation with the Graduate Division of Coppin State College.

Boys and girls in the Center have camped and camped. In fact, we note three of the past four covers of "Our Boys and Girls" illustrate this most favorite of activities, summer and winter as boys and girls experience that of which the author wrote:

All nature sings and round me rings  
The Music of the Spheres  
This is my Father's world  
I rest me in the thought  
Of rocks and trees of skies and seas;  
His hand the wonders wrought.

Other activities include classes in ceramics and sewing; swimming meets, competition in softball, basketball, and track. The children spent a week in a West Virginia State Park in August (sponsored by the Woman's Auxiliary). During the summer they worked at Social Security headquarters or participated in a program of remedial education. At Christmas they presented their very own version of the Nativity and then sang carols to those who came to listen.

Over and over, they who have grown and moved from the Center come back to visit. Barbara is a Junior at Towson State College; Vickie, a Junior at Bowie College. Frank is a plumbers' apprentice; Billy completed train-

ing in Maritime School and is on a tanker. Ray won a scholarship to West Nottingham Academy. An unknown number of our boys are in the Armed forces, in Europe, the Caribbean, and Asia.

Two hundred forty-two persons received direct service from this Agency. This includes: (As of December 31, 1970)

- 39 Adoptions Completed
- 37 Infants in Study Homes
- 20 Children in Assembled Families
- 50 Unwed Mothers given counsel
- 15 Children in Foster Care
- 81 Youth in Child Care Center

Boys and girls in large numbers are refused a home at the Child Care Center because space is not available. Our Board is greatly concerned, and during the past year has searched diligently for understanding of the best way to serve these children, as well as for insight as to what further responsibility the United Methodist Church can take for children who need a home. Consultants from the community and from the General Board of Health and Welfare Ministries have appeared to document the need. Recommendation of the General Board of Health and Welfare Ministries is that Board of Child Care explore the feasibility of raising adequate funds to develop another child care center; and that we explore the possibility of financing a minimum of two group homes for teen-aged youth. The General Board has further recommended that we give special consideration to specific needs of children within the Peninsula Conference. Consideration is being given to the above recommendations of the General Board of Health and Welfare Ministries.

As of this writing, a declining number of white infants are available for adoption. This is in part the result of increased number of abortions being performed in hospitals.

In contrast, black children are available to eligible couples who wish to open their doors and provide a permanent adoptive home. At this writing, it has been necessary to close intake of couples seeking to adopt white infants. As children become available to us for those couples we have agreed to serve, we will so place them.

The Woman's Auxiliary, under the leadership of its president, Mrs. William Bishop, has completed many projects for children. They helped to furnish cottages; sponsored the summer trips to Tomlinson Run and Ogleby State Parks; purchased tents and camping equipment; sponsored the Christmas Party, with gifts for the children; and in many other ways extended a warm hand of compassion to young people.

An invitation is expressed to individuals and groups who may wish to visit facilities of the Board, in Rockdale just West of Baltimore. Appreciation is expressed to all who helped make these services possible during the past year. Such a list includes the Ministers of Baltimore and Peninsula Conferences; the Woman's Auxiliary; our Board of Directors; Service Clubs and innumerable individual contributors.

Work of the Board of Child Care is made possible by the Annual Christmas Offering, supplemented by funds from Purchase of Care contracts with the public welfare agencies; from endowment and from other small miscellaneous sources. In 1970 the Christmas Offering was increased over the year before. To you who achieved this, we are grateful and we ask again that at Christmas 1971 you do all within your power to promote the Church's work for children within the Baltimore and Peninsula Conferences.

#### PENINSULA UNITED METHODIST HOMES AND HOSPITALS, INC.

As I begin this report to the Conference, I cannot help but reflect on the past ten years with awesome wonder. Little did we realize what God had in mind to do. We have had so many wonderful helpers, board members, staff members, residents, volunteers and members of the community at large who have shown great interest in the work of our Homes. Little did we realize the expanse of our mission in serving the elderly. Little did we realize the many varied and complicated needs of the elderly. Little did we realize that our services and influence would extend far beyond the framework of our buildings.

The vastness of the many areas of service is almost beyond comprehension. In the Conference year, over 550,000 meals were prepared and served, over 600,000 hours for patient nursing was performed, over 500 hours of religious services were held, over 550 birthdays celebrated and over 52,000 hours of housekeeping. Also, our property has increased to over 10,000,000 dollars in replacement value. While all this is true, the end is not in sight.

**Admissions**—45 persons have been admitted to our Homes in the past year. There are over 500 on our active waiting list, and at each Board meeting, an average of twenty-five applications are processed. The total population of our Homes at the time of this report stands at 460. Of this number, 76 are in our Health Centers, many of whom will spend the remainder of their lives there.

**Benevolence**—These homes were built and are being maintained on faith. God has provided through many sources, the means for benevolence work far beyond all dreams. A majority of our residents receive benevolent help to some degree. While the amount of benevolence help decreased \$34,000, over the past year our projected need for this Christian service is \$440,495—for the current year. This means, of course, that about 25% of our budget must be provided by ways other than income from resident fees. By the miracle of the loaves and fishes, \$68,000 in Conference support has helped provide over \$400,000 in benevolence work. Legacies, contributions and income from endowment has permitted us to continue to perform a needed Christian ministry in many areas.

**Our residents**—they are a distinguished group of Godly people. They have great fellowship together, rejoicing with those who rejoice, and

weeping with those who weep. They share in our concerns and assist in meeting our benevolent needs far in excess of their financial ability. Operating as a family unit, the fears and frustrations of responsibility are eliminated and the days in our Homes become a "time for living"—living each day to its fullest and praising God for the quiet moments, security, and love which the family home affords. Their concern and involvement extends far beyond the walls of our Homes. Interest in the community, Conference ministries, national programs of the United Methodist Church, and compassion for the staff that serves them, has produced excellent voluntary financial support. Over \$70,000 has been contributed and dispersed through the Chapel and Christmas funds over the past ten years to support many worthwhile projects.

**Extension of our ministry:** For the past two years, we have tried to meet the needs of the elderly on a community wide basis. The need for housing, social services, companionship and advice among the elderly, in general, is very acute. Knowing that it might be years before some of our applicants would be admitted to our Homes, a program was undertaken to assist in any way possible, to make life easier for them. We have assisted some in obtaining better living quarters. We have directed others to existing agencies for help in many areas. This extension of our services has been strongest in the lower counties of Delaware and Maryland where the need seems to be greatest. Under the direction of Mrs. Dorothy Keene, and through her position as Sussex County representative of the Geriatric Services, Inc., the outstretched helping hand has added life to years, and years to the life for the elderly of all races and denominations. To date, over 300 requests for food service, companionship, nursing housekeeping and other services, have been filled. Under her direction, 137 trained aides are supplying these needs for the elderly in the community, and the number continues to grow. We thank God for her dedication to this much needed program, and we are happy that it is based at The Methodist Manor House.

**Continuing involvement**—Daily, a new area of concern must be faced. In order to meet this challenge, the Executive Director, Home Administrators, and other staff members are constantly attending meetings and classes in order to build the expertise necessary for broadening demands. We are faithfully pursuing Christ's edict to "go forth and serve" and meet the challenge of changing times and the ever increasing numbers of elderly people. If we are to fulfill our Christian ministry—our Methodist commitment—we cannot be content to bask in the sunshine of our past accomplishments. We must increase our involvement in the Health and Welfare Ministries of the Methodist Church.

**Finances:** As we are all aware, the nation has been in an economic recession. We have felt the impact of all the problems facing the business community—higher costs of services and supplies—increased wage demands—high utility costs—reduced investment income—and other monetary factors. Proudly I report that good fiscal controls and continuing excellent support by many faithful community members, who believe in what we are doing, and the continuing support of our Annual Conference, our financial condition is stable. Slight improvement in income from resident

fees and a more business-like approach toward scholarship agreements has helped greatly in the past two years.

The following dollar chart shows the source of our funds and how they were used:

**Projections**—The average age of our residents is 84.6 years. At this age level, the frequency of confinement in our Health Centers, both short and long term, has grown to the point that at times, there are no available beds. Nursing in the resident room is both expensive and impractical. The mental and physical condition of many residents dictate the impossibility of proper care in semi-private rooms.

Knowing these things, corrective measures must be accomplished. To this end, we are projecting a new Health Center for The Country House, containing 70 private rooms, updated nursing service area, improved physical and occupational therapy departments, mental health clinic area and a new dietary service area. This is not a project to just expand the building, but rather a necessary step to meet the needs of our resident in the most economical way.

Mental Health has become an ever-increasing problem in our Homes, and unlike any other Methodist retirement facility, we are preparing to meet this challenge through designed programs. The acutely confused patients will be transferred to a specially designed clinic to be established at The Country House, but an on-going program will be conducted in each Home to deal with this problem. Our attitude is that older people who have senility problems are just as important and their lives just as precious as the well aged. We have a Christian and moral obligation to try and make life meaningful for them.

I am confident that assistance will be forthcoming from private, federal and foundation sources to accomplish this projection.

**Conclusion:** I was somewhat startled recently when we were reminded that we could not supply the needs of, or take care of, all the old people in our Conference area. We know perfectly well that this is true, yet our hearts are often made sad when we must turn those in need away, or not be able to adequately meet the needs of our resident because of space requirements. We have many problems, but not one that cannot be solved.

The direction of our church community is fully stated in the Doctrine of our church. The work of interpreting our faith and direction is never complete. Further, in Isaiah 65:20, it says, "No more shall there be an

infant that lives but a few days; or an old man who does not fill out his days." If we are to be God's co-creators, we must change the world in which we live toward the establishment of the New Jerusalem. In order to do this, it calls for sacrifice which is also the doctrine of our church. We (the church) are called by Christ to perform the ministry of health, welfare and healing, and called to become the flesh of God in reconciling all the disparate parts of the world and man into a wholeness, which is the health and welfare of man.

Simply stated, we draw from the ethics of our Father's, which says, "Today is short, the work is hard, ours is not to complete the task, yet, neither are we free to neglect it."

I do want to express my appreciation to the members of the Annual Conference, the Conference Council and its various committees, and the Board of Health and Welfare Ministries for their understanding support of our ministry. As a team, we have all worked and moved together, and our "Heavenly Father" has added His blessings by working through us.

#### METHODIST MISSION AND CHURCH EXTENSION SOCIETY, INC.

##### A. Program

Previous reports have outlined the basic programs of the Methodist Mission and Church Extension Society, Inc., commonly known as the Methodist Action Program or MAP. They fall under these categories: (1) Local church programs carried on at Brandywine-Trinity, Ezion-Mt. Carmel, Harrison Street, Mt. Joy and Old Asbury churches; these programs seek to meet the needs of people of communities in which the churches are located; (2) Operation Leaven which is an attitudinal change and information program designed to bring about interracial understanding and action, aimed at decreasing personal and institutional racism; (3) Camperships—191 children and youth were enabled to go to Camp PeCoMeth in 1970; (4) Participation by MAP related staff in a number of urban agencies; (5) Social change efforts, especially in regard to housing, education and the criminal justice system; and (6) Work with all the United Methodist Churches of Wilmington through the Wilmington United Methodist Parish. (It should also be noted that Grace, McCabe, Peninsula and Silverbrook Churches provide community oriented programs or services but that MAP has no financial involvement in these programs as it does in the others mentioned above.)

The major development in 1970-71 was the Wilmington United Methodist Parish. The parish is a voluntary organization involving all the United Methodist Churches in Wilmington through which they do joint planning and programming. MAP staff personnel do the staff work for the parish. The two major activities this year were the recommendations in regard to church relationships formulated by the parish task force on church relationships and the decision to have an extensive Christian Education training event involving all the city United Methodist Churches,

Coleman Church, and one United Presbyterian Church. It will be held April 12-25 and will be led by the Rev. Willard A. Williams of the General Board of Education assisted by several other people from across the nation. This pilot project in Christian Education has been planned by the parish task force on leadership development for which the Reverend Howard A. Bailey is the staff person. It is hoped that out of this two-week experience will come the motivation and skill to launch an intensive and extensive Christian education program designed to reach hundreds of people not now related to the Christian Church.

In 1970-71 MAP also extended its service to Mt. Joy Church where it helped to make possible the placement on the church's staff of a community developer and a neighborhood worker.

1970-71 has also witnessed the development at McCabe and Peninsula Churches of an urgent concern for the welfare of the people of the communities in which the church buildings are located and the development of programs geared to the needs of the people of these neighborhoods. The merger of Ezion-Mt. Carmel Churches is another development that portends well for the future service of United Methodism in Wilmington.

Efforts were also made during the year to bring the city and suburban churches into better working relationships. Current developments involve several suburban churches, such as, St. Paul's Aldersgate and St. Mark's. A number of others are especially involved in the vacation church school program that is held in the city and which involves city and suburban churches, black and white children and staff.

Through the Wilmington District Assembly, which is the Wilmington District planning and programming body, the city and non-city churches also work together. One notable project that will be undertaken is that of carrying on an aggressive educational campaign in regard to having the county government assume responsibility for seeing that housing is provided for low and moderate income families. MAP will provide staff work for this effort.

##### B. Finances

In 1970 the total amount raised was \$176,156.60. The Peninsula Annual Conference Board of Missions provided 32.6% of this amount, the Division of National Missions 9.5%, the Reconciliation Fund .6%, leaving 57.3% or \$101,065 to be raised from various persons, churches, foundations and other groups.

As has been pointed out in previous reports, this financial set-up puts the MAP services and activities on a very unstable financial foundation. The decision of just a few major donors not to support MAP in any given year could seriously jeopardize the program. Efforts are constantly being made to broaden the base of financial support in terms of getting the financial participation of more local churches, a greater share of the cost from the Conference, and the involvement of many more individual contributors.

##### C. Conclusion

MAP's many activities are directed toward the realization of three goals: (1) Supporting local churches in their community oriented ministry,



(2) The meeting of personal needs of people through local church programs and services and (3) Social change designed to contribute toward the development of a more just and humane society—the Kingdom of God.

It is good to be able to see some progress during the year in the pursuance of these goals. A major problem still facing us, however, is the ultimate survival of the city churches so they can carry out Christ's mission in the city. The hope for survival lies in being able to draw new church members from the communities in which the churches are located. The greatest obstacles to doing this are (1) racism in all of its many forms and with all of its profound effects and (2) the lack of a sense of mission in regard to the city and its people.

If racism can be overcome and we allow the love of God for His world and His people to control us, then there can be more than hope, there can be assurance that the United Methodist Church will not only remain in Wilmington but will grow in its evangelical, reconciling and serving ministries.

#### BOARD OF MISSIONS

The 1968 Discipline of the United Methodist Church sets forth the aims of mission as follows:

1. To witness in all the world, by word and deed, to the self-revelation of God in Jesus Christ and the acts of love by which he reconciles men to himself.
2. To evoke in men the personal response of repentance and faith through which by God's grace they may find newness of life in righteous, loving relationships with God and their fellowmen.
3. To bring men together into a Christian community for worship and fellowship and to send men into the world as servants in the struggle for justice and meaning.
4. To reveal in ministry the love of God for all who suffer.
5. To move men to live in awareness of the presence and life-giving power of God's Holy Spirit, in acknowledgement of his rule over earthly history and in confident expectation of the ultimate consummation of his purpose. (Paragraph 1277.)

We call the attention of the members of our Conference to these goals by which your Board of Missions is guided in carrying out its responsibilities. We recommend them for careful study and consideration by every local church in planning its programs of world-wide outreach.

**Promotion and Cultivation:** A primary function of our Board is performed by our Conference Missionary Secretary and the five district secretaries. These persons work with district and local church leaders in promoting mission projects and schools of Christian Mission. They were responsible for full use of the missionaries sent to our Conference for

Mission Cultivation month in February. Again the Night of World Vision was a Conference highlight, with Mrs. Dorothy Hauser as our speaker.

**Mission and Church Extension:** The Committee on Church Expansion has reviewed the several projects in our Conference which had received Conference support. We have reviewed and consolidated records and legal papers in the Business Office. Official papers are kept in a locked box in Farmer's Bank in Dover.

We note with satisfaction the completion of the new sanctuaries at Centreville United Methodist Church and at St. Luke's Church in Denton. These edifices will provide adequate houses of worship for these communities for years to come. Other building programs are in progress and will be completed this year.

**Parish and Community Development:** This committee has met several times in an effort to help churches make use of community resources and opportunities. In cooperation with the Program Council, teams have been developed to work with local churches in reaching their leadership potential. We are cooperating with the Delmarva Ecumenical Agency in developing specialized ministries.

**Urban Work:** One of the major concerns of the Board of Missions is the Methodist Action Program in Metropolitan Wilmington. Your Board has increased each year the share which MAP receives from the total Mission budget, since we believe this should be one of the major thrusts of our Conference. One of the weaknesses of the financing of MAP lies in the fact that a large part of its resources must come from private and individual contributions rather than through our regular church channels.

The report of MAP to the Annual Conference indicates the scope of the program in ministering to the city.

**Neighborhood House** renders a continued service to South Wilmington. Its fine ministries are made possible because of a large number of volunteers from our churches which work with the regular staff.

**Migrant Ministries and other Specialized Programs:** We are pleased to note that the new Delmarva Ecumenical Agency will carry on such ministries as Migrant Work, Parks and Seashore Ministries, and institutional chaplaincies through task forces. Through ecumenical support, these programs can be strengthened and made more effective.

#### Recommendation For Action by the Conference:

1. Widmon Butler, Jr. was appointed Conference Missionary Education Secretary for the ensuing year.
2. That the month of February, 1972 be designated by the Annual Conference as the month of Missionary Cultivation.
3. That the Board shall carefully study the possibility of having all or part of the work of the Conference Missionary Secretary given to the Program Council, to be assigned to a staff person. If feasible, this might begin on or before January 1, 1972.

4. That consideration be given by the Program Council for a Conference-wide Methodist Action Program under the direct supervision and administration of the Council.
5. That the work of the Parish and Conference Development Committee be continued in providing leadership to local churches in setting goals and priorities, in cooperation with the Program Council.
6. That the Church Extension Policy adopted by the 1968 Annual Conference be continued until further study is made by the Board on revision of that policy.

In conclusion, let us express our deep appreciation to the churches of our Conference for their faithful support of the Conference benevolence and world service programs. Last year many of our churches supported General and Conference Advance Specials. These are essential responses to the challenge of the total Christian enterprise.

#### CHRISTIAN SOCIAL CONCERNS

The Peninsula Conference Board of Christian Social Concerns has had as its responsibility to consider the direction of social change for the church. We have hoped that we have stepped up our actions, as well as point out some value standards that might condition the movement of society to clearer understanding of human rights, justice, law and order, environmental resources, social changes and values.

We remind each other that the task of the church is to make the possibility of grace available in such a way that it may be accepted as a genuine possibility. Remember the words of Paul in II Corinthians 5:17-18. "All this is from God, who through Christ reconciled us to himself and gave us the ministry of reconciliation." It is this ministry which calls forth Christ committed men to help redeem a present and future society.

The Board voted a new slate of officers: Chairman, George C. Godfrey; Vice Chairman, World Order, Richard Turner; Vice Chairman, General Welfare, Edwin Lasbury; Vice Chairman, Human Relations, Mrs. Boyd Alford; Treasurer, Charles Chipman; Secretary, Sandra J. McCracken; G. Wayne Cuff, Cabinet Representative.

The Board worked with the Commission on Religion and Race to plan the Peninsula Conference Convocation on Religion and Race held Tuesday, September 22, 1970, at Wesley United Methodist Church in Dover, Delaware, with the theme: "In Pursuit of Inclusiveness." The Conference came to grips with questions and discussion on the issue, "Race Problems Within the Church", causes, locations, solutions. Under the effective leadership of the Commission on Religion and Race and leadership from the Conference a day was well spent in developing goals, tactics, strategies not only for the Conference Boards and Agencies, but also for the local churches. Approximately 250 ministers and laymen were present.

It is recommended that a similar workshop be held on each of the four districts in the fall of 1971 with emphasis on laymen becoming in-

volved at discussion levels. Your board will be recommending the time and place in the near future on each district. It is sincerely hoped that each church will make every effort to cooperate in this program that goes hand in hand with the spiritual, as well as, the social problems of our day.

Our board discussed at the September meeting a report by the Vice Chairman of General Welfare, Rev. Edwin Lasbury, on the area of concern: "Welfare". We all must be concerned about the welfare of each other. We call upon each church and the local community to become involved in the welfare of individuals whether it be housing, education, employment or basic benefits of families in need.

In November, eleven persons from the Board attended the Convocation for the Northeastern Regional Jurisdictional Workshop in Washington, D. C. Theme: "Church/Man in Revolution." Caucus groups were held on the subjects: Racial Revolution, Woman's Revolution, Youth's Revolution, Value Revolution. This was a very informative and worthwhile conference.

The Program Council asked the Board to look into the clarification of the bill asking for state funds for non-public and private education. Work was started under the chairmanship of Reverend Richard Stazesky and a coalition group under the name of CAPS started to gather information and develop strategy on dealing with this issue. The General Conference speaks officially for the United Methodist Church and the following statement was adopted by the 1968 General Conference.

"We do not support the expansion or the strengthening of private schools with public funds. Furthermore, we oppose the establishment or strengthening of private schools that jeopardize the public school system or thwart valid public policy."

"Public Schools have often been an important unifying force in modern pluralistic society by providing a setting for contact at an early age between children of vastly different backgrounds."

Since the Conference also opposed the use of state funds for non-public elementary and secondary schools, we felt that it should be brought to the attention of all United Methodists.

As United Methodists, we continue to support the constitutional principle of separation of church and state. We are highly supportive of the public school system and would not want to injure the public school system with aid to nonpublic or parochial schools or a voucher system of payment.

It was encouraged that ministers and laymen write letters, speak out, and assist the efforts of CAPS with their support. Monies from our budget were sent to assist the organization of CAPS to get started.

An Open Forum on Aid to Non-Public Schools was held under the direction of the Reverend Edwin Lasbury at The United Methodist Church in Newark. Dr. George LaNoue was the main resource, with Dr. Robert McBride, President of the State Board of Education, Senator Louise Conner from the legislature of Delaware, and Reverend Richard C. Stazesky, Chairman for Citizens to Advance Public Schools.

Our Board has indicated a concern for Project Equality. It is hoped that the United Methodist Church might be more supportive of this project. 500 businesses have signed up with Project Equality. Last spring the PE staff realized they would need more personnel to review businesses

throughout the state which had shown interest in compliance reviews. There is a need for more cooperation between the PE Office and the United Methodist Church. It is suggested that the district director be the liaison person between the Project Equality and churches in the district who are interested in becoming members.

WHEREAS, Project Equality of Delmarva, Inc., has been able to expand its program significantly for the current year with the hiring of an additional full-time Compliance Review Specialist and a Clerk-typist and has had a positive response from many in the religious community and the business community on the peninsula;

WHEREAS, the United Methodist Church tradition has historically led the way in implementing Christian principles in social issues;

BE IT RESOLVED that the Peninsula Annual Conference reaffirm its endorsement of, and commitment to, the Project Equality program and its goal of equal employment opportunity for minority groups at all levels of employment, and that all local church units and agencies of the United Methodist Church hereby be called to give highest possible priority to their individual commitment to Project Equality.

The matter of Religion in the Schools was brought up and was agreed that the board go on record in supporting this endeavor. The following resolution is recommended:

WHEREAS, general confusion has existed in the public schools since the 1963 Supreme Court decision regarding the teaching of religious practices in public schools;

WHEREAS, emotional reaction has hampered a rational approach to the problem of incorporating the contribution of religious groups to American culture into the educational experience of school children;

WHEREAS, there is now an awareness of legal possibilities for the inclusion in the curriculum of such studies; and

WHEREAS, recent development of curriculum resource materials affords the opportunity to introduce such studies into the curriculum of public schools:

We, therefore, recommend to the Conference Board of Education, and the Delmarva Ecumenical Agency that efforts be made to communicate to the Delaware Department of Public Instruction, the Maryland Department of Public Instruction, and the Wilmington Public Schools our interest in the contribution of religious groups to our culture and to explore with those educational agencies materials and methods which would help to bring about the inclusion of such courses in the curriculum.

Although the six Priority Issues for 1971-72 are the issues related directly to much of every agency of the entire United Methodist Church, we feel that our Board has a direct concern to these responsibilities:

General Welfare . . . . .	Meaning, Value and Life Style Environmental Pollution
Human Relations . . . . .	White Racism and Black Revolution Economic Exploitation
World Peace . . . . .	World Peace and Wars Population Explosion and Hunger

Representatives from our Board attended the Annual Middle Atlantic Convocation held at Buck Hill Falls on the theme: "The Church Coping with Priority Issues in the World".

Special Social Concerns Days in the Calendar Year could provide emphasis on Priorities as follows:

Church and Economic Life Week—Population Explosion and Hunger (third week in January)

Race Relations Sunday—White Racism and Black Revolution (second Sunday in February)

Rural Life Sunday—Environmental Pollution (second Sunday in May)

Labor Sunday—Economic Exploitation (Sunday preceding U.M. Day—October 24)

Drug and Alcohol Concerns Sunday—Meaning, Value and life style (Second Sunday in November)

Let's make these issues truly become the priorities within our church and within our lives. We should all be involved in social nurture, the creation of public readiness for change, and make the church sensitive to the needs of all persons.

#### WOMEN'S SOCIETY OF CHRISTIAN SERVICE

The year 1970 proved to be another eventful year for the Peninsula Conference Women's Society of Christian Service.

In May, a large delegation from our Conference attended the General Assembly of United Methodist Women held in Houston, Texas.

In June, eleven Conference officers, including two Chairmen of the Wesleyan Service Guild, attended the Middle Atlantic Regional School of Christian Mission held in Albright College, Reading, Pennsylvania.

In July, a World Development Seminar for Educators was held in New York City. We were represented there by Miss Jessie Cottman, a Librarian, a member of Mt. Zion United Methodist Church, Pocomoke City, Maryland. Miss Cottman has been invited to attend a "Follow-Up" Seminar in July of 1971 to be held in Cuernavaca, Mexico.

Also, in July, our Conference School of Christian Mission was held in Wesley College, Dover. The study themes were "How The Word Gets Around"—"The Americas—How Many Worlds?" and "The Psalms". An excellent faculty made these studies come alive for the 149 women and 3 men who attended. The School will be held this year during the week of July 12-16, 1971 and an invitation is extended to anyone interested to join with us in a real learning experience. Mrs. M. M. Keen of Wilmington is the Dean and Mrs. C. P. White of Dover is Assistant Dean.

In September, the Wesleyan Service Guild sponsored a Week-End at Drayton Manor under the leadership of Mrs. Sylvanus Browne, Jr., Conference Chairman. Twenty-six women took part in a fine educational program, warm fellowship and above all, a great spiritual experience. The 1971 Week-End will be held at Drayton Manor, September 18-19.

The Conference President was invited, for the second year, to attend the Annual Meeting of the Board of Missions and the Women's Division held in Los Angeles in October. To hear reports of the work being done by the Church under the direction of capable and dedicated Christian leaders in the face of many crises, particularly during the past two years, is at once exhilarating, sobering and challenging. One needs only to read the Annual Report of the Board of Missions if there is any question as to the relevancy of the Christian Church in these trying times.

In November, we held a Conference Women's Society Fall Meeting in the Centreville United Methodist Church with over four hundred women in attendance. The program theme was "The Welfare Puzzle". Rev. C. Edwin Lasbury and Mrs. Boyd Alford spoke on this subject and answered many questions from the audience. The result has been a keener interest in Welfare legislation.

In the area of financial stewardship, this has been a record year. Our 1971 pledge to the Women's Division was \$95,000. We have paid that pledge in full, adding to it other special gifts which count on pledge, sending to the Division \$101,830. For the special projects selected to receive the Assembly offering we sent \$2,759. This was a free-will offering from local Society women. Our Conference Program Materials Chairman reports the sale of \$1,314.80 worth of literature in our Summer School and the Fall Meeting.

There has been no appreciable difference in either loss or gain in membership over last year. However, we can report a number of Societies re-activated this year and at least three new Societies organized.

We close this year's report on a note of optimism. For despite all odds there has been a genuine search for a deeper spiritual dimension in our work and we feel that "we have known the love of God which passeth all understanding and have received abundantly above all that we have asked or thought, and to Him be the glory". We press on, believing!

### SECTION III

#### III. PROGRAM AND ECUMENICAL AFFAIRS

##### DELAWARE STATE COUNCIL OF CHURCHES

During the last full year of its life as an ecumenical instrument, the Delaware State Council of Churches continued a number of familiar services and helped prepare the way for its successor. Both staff and Executive Board members of the Delaware Council were involved in work looking forward to the Peninsula-wide Delmarva Ecumenical Agency. In its twelfth year the Delaware State Council of Churches sought to conserve

the gains of the past while it made ready to encourage the blazing of new trails in a new and more inclusive agency.

Among the ways it helped get ready for a new approach was to work with the Committee On Mission of the Episcopal Diocese of Delaware in a proposal for a year-round Spanish-speaking staff member. This staff person will be expected to work with both permanent and migrant Spanish populations. The Council Executive Board later authorized a recommendation to the temporary Executive Committee of the Delmarva Ecumenical Agency for a Task Force On Peninsula Special Ministries. The latter was proposed as a year-round program on rural poverty to include work with and for migratory agricultural workers.

The 1970 program of the DEPARTMENT OF MINISTRY TO MIGRANTS included the following:

1. The opening of a Farm Workers Center in the basement of People's United Church of Christ, Dover. Due to lack of transportation, the number attending the two nights a week the center was open during July and August was not as great as hoped. This first attempt was considered worthwhile nonetheless.

2. Administration of a United States Public Health Service grant of \$26,258 for a Delaware Migrant Health Project again provided a broad range of services to Delaware's migrant population.

3. Sunday evening services among Dover area churches during July and August had a total attendance of 575 people divided almost evenly between local churchmen and migrant workers. The local people went to area migrant camps to bring seasonal workers to the services and also prepared refreshments for the fellowship period which followed each service.

4. For May and June in south east Sussex county an Episcopal clergyman from the Diocese of Puerto Rico served both permanent and migrant Spanish-speaking residents. His exploratory and pastoral work provided much valuable information.

TRAP POND SERVICES in their sixth season had a total attendance of almost 900 people from 13 denominations. Conducted by lay readers of Episcopal churches of west Sussex County for the past three years, these services at 10 a.m. on Sunday during the summer have drawn campers at the State Park from nearby states and Canada.

CHURCH WORLD SERVICE received over 13,000 pounds of clothing from Delaware churches in 1970. In addition, \$409 was given directly to CROP for food and \$430 was sent directly for blankets. Since 1963, Delaware churches have given almost 100,000 pounds of clothing for overseas relief through arrangements made by the Delaware State Council of Churches.

DELAWARE CHURCH NEWS, the joint radio program of the Delaware and Wilmington Councils of Churches, continued to bring items of constructive nature from the life and work of Delaware congregations and judicatories to the attention of the listening public. Carbons of each week's script to daily papers of the area broadened the public learning about things

of general interest being done by member and non-member churches.

The DELMARVA ECUMENICAL COMMITTEE, set up by official action of the Catholic Diocese of Wilmington and the Delaware and Maryland Councils of Churches in 1964, held an "Overnight" in the former convent of St. Edmond's Church, Rehoboth Beach. Led by Father David Bowman, S.J., of the National Council of Churches staff, it was the first such event sponsored by the Committee attended by lay women. The Committee continued to encourage local observance of the Week of Prayer for Christian Unity.

CONSULTATION ON CHURCH UNION—Council staff helped plan the first state-wide co-ordinated celebration of COCU Sunday. Dr. J. Robert Nelson of Boston University School of Theology spoke at meetings on that day in both Dover and Wilmington.

Church WOMEN UNITED OF DELAWARE marked the 20th anniversary of its organization. Dr. Ruth Laws of Whatcoat Church, Dover, was elected president at the 20th annual meeting of this pioneer among Delaware ecumenical organizations.

Because of the loyal support of the Peninsula Conference, its other member judicatories, and generous individuals, the Delaware State Council of Churches was able to close 1970 with a slight balance in its treasury. Even more important those who gave of their time and energy to its work testified that it had provided a channel for expressing their sense of unity with Christians of various Christian bodies both in Delaware and beyond. Aware that much yet remained to be done by joint Christian effort, those who had given faithful service through the Delaware State Council of Churches were thankful for what had been achieved through it under God's guidance and blessing.

#### COMMISSION ON ECUMENICAL AFFAIRS

The Commission had several meetings during this Conference Year, and these have enabled us to provide leadership in several areas of ecumenical work. We have been instrumental in encouraging co-operative services during the Week of Prayer for Christian Unity. Many such services were held throughout our Annual Conference area.

The Reverend Thomas C. Short represented our conference at the National Workshop for Christian Unity which was held in Houston, Texas, during the month of March and sponsored by the Roman Catholic Church. Our Commission plans to continue to send delegates to such meetings as these.

#### The Church Of Christ Uniting

Leadership was provided by our Commission to help establish opportunities for interdenominational studies of A Plan of Union throughout the

DelMarVa Peninsula. The Peninsula was divided into five areas and each area had a chairman who encouraged interdenominational study of this Plan. Some of these study programs were very successful.

#### DelMarVa Ecumenical Agency

The DelMarVa Ecumenical Agency is a reality. The organization was signed into being on Sunday, January 24, 1971. The Reverend Robert D. Allred was elected as the Executive Director and the by-laws for the corporation were adopted. Currently there are fifteen Judicatories who are officially members of the DelMarVa Ecumenical Agency, Inc. Our Annual Conference sends five delegates to the Administrative Board of this Agency. These are: Bishop John Wesley Lord, the Reverend Otho G. Brewer, the Reverend Howell O. Wilkins, the Reverend Thomas C. Short and Mrs. Oren E. Mangum. These are formative years for this new organization, but we hope and pray for great work in the future.

#### Glasgow Plan Of Union

Plans are being developed for three denominations in Glasgow to join together in one congregation. The three denominations involved are: Presbyterian, Episcopal and United Methodist. These congregations involved will have a mutual recognition of pastors, and they will work together to provide a ministry to Christian people in the Glasgow area.

This may be an exciting sign of things to come. This Union at Glasgow is the "word become flesh". More details will be made available to you as they are developed by the steering committee working out the details of this Union. The Program Council of the Peninsula Annual Conference has already endorsed this Union in principle.

#### Recommendation

1. That we encourage each local church to have an in-depth study of A Plan of Union given us by the Church of Christ uniting and that criticisms and recommendations concerning this Plan be mailed to the Reverend Thomas C. Short by May 1, 1972.

#### PROGRAM COUNCIL

##### A. Meetings

The Program Council met five times during the 1970-71 Conference Year with an average attendance of 47 or 68% of its total membership of 69. At the June 27, 1970 meeting the officers for the year were elected: R. Jervis Cooke, Chairman; Joseph Dickerson, Vice-chairman; James C. Hardcastle, Treasurer; Richard C. Stazesky, Secretary.

**B. 1970-71 Annual Conference Program**

The 1970 Annual Conference session adopted a series of program emphases recommended to it by the Program Council. The emphases were under the general theme of "Stewardship—Man's Relationships and Responsibilities" (see page 911 ff. of the 1970 Journal).

Implementation of the emphases and activities called for in the program were assigned to the various boards and agencies of the Annual Conference as follows:

Spiritual—Board of Evangelism, Board of the Ministry; Personal—Board of Evangelism, Board of the Laity; Human—Board of Education, Board of Christian Social Concerns; Church—Board of Education, Commission on Enlistments; Community—Board of Missions; Ecumenical—Commission on Ecumenical Affairs; Environmental—Board of Christian Social Concerns.

Although all the emphasis called for in the program were not met, a good beginning was made in implementing this multi-faceted program.

**C. Referred Items**

A number of items were referred during the 1970 Annual Conference session to the Program Council for its consideration and action.

(1) 1970 Journal, page 830. Request of Project Equality that its 1971 allocation from the Peninsula Conference be increased 54%.

The Program Council adopted a goal of \$3,500 for an increase in the 1971 amount for Project Equality; the request was for an increase of \$5,400. The Commission on World Service was asked to allocate \$1,000 from the 1971 contingency fund which it agreed to do. The various boards and agencies were asked to allocate \$2,500 from their 1971 budgets; the response to this request totaled \$1,213 (Board of Christian Social Concerns \$500, Board of the Laity \$663, Commission on Ecumenical Affairs \$50). Thus the total increase for Project Equality in 1971 will be for \$2,213.

(2) Page 832. Resolution that the Program Council set up a task force for further study of state aid to non-public schools and to report to the 1971 session of the Annual Conference.

The matter was referred by the Program Council to the Board of Christian Social Concerns. See the report of this board for its findings.

(3) Page 838. Resolution that the Program Council study items 6, 7, and 12 of the "Conference Rules and Guidelines for the Nominating Committee."

Item 6, page 909, 1970 Journal. The section in question has to do with that calling for the exemption of certain offices and groups from the Conference rotation policy and from being counted in the number of boards and agencies on which a person can serve. The program Council voted to concur in this policy.

Item 7, page 909. The question raised was the possible deletion of this sentence, "If a ministerial member shall retire before the age of 72, he shall relinquish his privilege to serve on Conference Boards and agencies."

The Program Council voted not to delete, that is, to concur in the policy as stated in item 7.

Item 12, page 910. The question raised was whether a nominee shall be "notified" before his name is placed before the Conference or whether he "shall have accepted" the nomination before his name is placed before the Conference. The Program Council voted in favor of the latter and therefore voted to recommend to the 1971 Annual Conference that item 12 be amended to read "every case of a nominee to any board, commission, committee, or agency shall have accepted the nomination before his name is placed before the Conference."

(4) Page 842. Resolution that the "Program Council recommend to the Commission on World Service and Finance a system of apportionments, to be presented for adoption at the 1971 Annual Conference and to take effect in 1972."

The Program Council set up a task force to carry out this mandate. It was comprised of the following persons: David Baker, O. G. Brewer, Theodore Briggs, Joseph Dickerson, Ermon Foster, John Kelso, Harrison Matthews, Felton May, Paul McCoy, Lowell Perkins, Herbert Somers, Nathaniel Miller, Henry Price, Gordon Stapleton and Robert Whitlock, Chairman. After considerable research, study and the holding of hearings involving 600 people on all five districts, the task force submitted the following plan of apportionments which was adopted by the Program Council and forwarded to the Commission on World Service and Finance:

**Added Facts**

(1) No apportionment on a charge can be increased or decreased more than 10% in any given year.

(2) Column 35 (Miscellaneous benevolences paid directly by the local church) has been eliminated as the base for apportionments. This will enable the local church to develop and pursue benevolent work within the community and in other areas in addition to its support of the program of the United Methodist Church. This will encourage program building and will not discourage the same in the local community where the church needs to be in mission.

(3) Figures for the fiscal year 1970 should be used as the basis for the 1972 apportionment, thus enabling the apportionments to be given to the

local church previous to the effective date of the same to enable better budget planning on the local church level.

(4) The present plan is designed to become effective January 1, 1972, with the Commission on World Service and Finance assigning apportionments previous to September, 1971.

#### D. Actions

(1) Assigned its staff personnel as follows: Rev. Gordon Stapleton to have primary responsibility with the board of education and the Rev. Walter Stone to have primary responsibility with the Drayton Manor Committee.

(2) Adopted the report of a task force on the Study of a Basic Salary Plan and Its Feasibility which concluded that the need to do something positive about ministers' salaries must be met in some other way than the adoption of the basic salary plan. The task force submitted six recommendations in regard to what can be done and these were all referred to the Commission on Minimum Salary.

(3) Adopted the final report of a Task Force to Plan a Program of Theological Interpretation of the Mission of the Church. The report called for the setting up of a program to assist local church Councils on Ministries to see their mission as churches utilizing outside consultants and the group process. This program has been set up under the leadership of the Rev. Gordon Stapleton, Associate Program Director.

(4) Assigned the following persons to serve as staff personnel in regard to the emphases of the 1970-71 Annual Conference Program "Stewardship—Man's Relationships and Responsibilities": Spiritual, Walter Stone; Personal, Hayward Greene; Human, Gordon Stapleton and the Cabinet; Church, Gordon Stapleton; Community, Richard Bailey; Ecumenical, Thomas Short; Environmental, George Godfrey.

(5) Directed the TRAFCO Committee to review the audio-visual library with an eye to disposing of what is no longer needed and to consider mimeographing the next catalogue.

(6) Requested Board of Education prepare a five-year development program plan for Camp PeCoMeth.

(7) Established January 17, 1971 as Reconciliation Fund Appeal Sunday with allowance for the Wilmington District to set another date for that district if so desired.

(8) Established a task force to study the feasibility of having a major Annual Conference fund appeal. The task force recommended that nothing be done in this regard until the Annual Conference spells out its priorities.

(9) Established a task force to study the feasibility of having a united appeal Sunday for various Annual Conference causes: Homes for the Aged, MAP, Camp PeCoMeth, Neighborhood House, etc. The task force has not yet made a report.

(10) Surveyed the situation in regard to minority employment at MAP, the Business Office, Wesley College, Peninsula Methodist Homes and Hospitals, Inc., Drayton Manor and Camp PeCoMeth and arrived at the conclusion that these agencies are seeking to employ minority people.

(11) Appointed the following delegates: (a) World Methodist Council: Lucille Mangum, Howell Wilkins; (b) World Methodist Conference: Wayne Cuff, Joseph Dickerson, James Hardcastle, John Kelso, Kendall McCabe, Sheila McDowell, Alton Miller, Charles Moyer, Kenneth Rose, Eldridge Waters, Robert Whitlock, Guy Winebrenner; (c) alternates: Charles Chipman, Jervis Cooke, Sarah Garrett, Hayward Greene, Brooks Reynolds, Wallace Watson.

(12) Instructed the Business Office to send out apportionments for the Ministerial Educational Fund for 1971 based on the formula established by the 1968 General Conference.

(13) Requested the Commission on World Service and Finance to make available \$5,000 from the contingency fund for emergency maintenance at Camp PeCoMeth. The Commission on World Service and Finance did this.

(14) Requested the Conference Lay Leader to give the rationale on why women are not actively invited to the Board of Laity retreats if they deal with major program matters. His explanation was that the Board of Laity is seeking to get men involved in the work of the church. The Program Council responded by urging the Board to invite all lay people—men and women—if the subject matter is of general concern to all church leaders.

(15) Decided that the music committee should be under the Commission on Worship and not the Board of Education.

(16) Decided that if an ex-officio member of the Program Council cannot regularly attend its meetings he may designate a substitute in his place provided that the substitute will serve for the entire year.

(17) Appointed Gilbert Scarborough to be chairman of its Task Force on Conference Priorities. No report has been issued.

(18) Adopted the following program director's job description.

(a) The Program Council. The office of Program Director cannot be understood apart from an understanding of the function of the Program Council. Therefore, the following requirements, relationships, qualifications of the Program Director are to be understood against the background of the section entitled "Function" on pages 6 and 7 of the "Manual for the Program Council of the United Methodist Church."

(b) Requirements.

(1) There shall be an Executive Officer of the Program Council to be known as the Conference Program Director. The Program Director shall be elected by the Program Council upon nomination by the Bishop and the District Superintendents (Discipline 841.6), after consultation with the Program Council. The Program Director shall have a working relationship with the District Program Councils.

(2) The Program Director shall be compensated on a par with the District Superintendents.

(3) The person to be selected as Program Director shall be selected without regard to race, sex, present position or geographical

location. The person may be either lay or clergy.

- (4) The work of the Program Director shall be evaluated annually by the Executive Committee of the Program Council and once a quadrennium there shall be a thorough review of his work by a task force, elected by the Program Council, upon nomination of the Program Council chairman.

(c) Relationships.

- (1) The Program Director shall be the Executive Office of the Program Council.  
 (2) He shall coordinate and supervise the Program Council's staff.  
 (3) The Program Director shall be related to all Program boards and agencies, and shall work closely with them in the development and implementation of the program.  
 (4) The Program Director shall have responsibility for the initiation, the coordination, the implementation, and the administration of Conference program. In fulfilling these responsibilities, he shall consult and meet with the Cabinet on a regular basis.

(d) Qualifications.

- (1) The Program Director shall be a person who has considerable experience in the institutional church.  
 (2) Since the position of Program Director will require creativity, leadership ability, expertise in working with others, and administrative competency; and since the Program Director must relate positively to the people of the peninsula who represent a variety of theological and cultural experiences; it will be necessary that the person filling the office of Program Director be able to employ the best techniques of group process; therefore, the candidate shall be evaluated on the basis of training, experience and demonstrated abilities in these areas.

(19) Decided that the Annual Conference program year and the statistical year be the calendar year but that the Annual Conference personnel year be June 1 to May 31 and that local churches determine their own personnel year.

(20) Set January 5, 1971 as the closing day for the 1970 fiscal year.

(21) Decided to set up a talent bank to aid the Annual Conference Committee on Nominations.

(22) Directed the Board of Christian Social Concerns to take immediate action to prevent passage in the Delaware Assembly of proposed legislation to give state financial support to private and parochial schools. This resulted in the formation of a statewide coalition of groups and persons known as CAPS (Citizens Advancing Public Schools) which is carrying on an aggressive program to accomplish this goal.

(23) Heard a request from a group of persons from the Chestertown District to petition the Annual Conference not to reduce the number of

districts from five to four. The Council voted to concur in the action of the 1970 Annual Conference.

(24) Decided that the new director of Camp PeCoMeth shall be known as an Assistant Program Director. An Assistant Program Director will report to an Associate Program Director.

(25) Endorsed the recommendation of the Commission on Minimum Salary which will be presented at the 1971 Annual Conference session.

(26) Endorsed in principle the Plan of Union for the establishment of an ecumenical church at Glasgow, Delaware.

(27) Directed the Conference Business Office to hold the first \$6,000 received toward the asking for the Ministerial Education Fund for the use of the Conference Board of the Ministry.

(28) Developed a proposed 1972 Annual Conference Program Budget and forwarded it to the Commission on World Service and Finance.

(29) Set up a task force to study the means by which laymen shall be elected as General and Jurisdictional Conference delegates.

(30) Recommended that the World Service and Finance Commission reduce the debt payment in 1972 from \$50,000 to \$25,000 and make the remainder available for programs.

(31) Recommended to the Commission on World Service and Finance that the Ministerial Education Fund be included as a line item of the 1972 program budget.

(32) Adopted a report calling for (a) the establishment of a division of communications of the Program Council consisting of a representative from TRAFCO, Interpretation, Public Relations, Publishing Interests and the Cabinet; (b) the employment or appointment of a full-time director of communications on recommendation of the Cabinet; (c) the establishment of the division by June 1, 1971 and the employment of the full-time director January 1, 1972; and (d) a budget not to exceed the present combined budgets of the above mentioned committees for 1972.

(33) Decided to have the pre-conference Journal multilithed rather than printed.

(34) Directed all boards and agencies that need to be reorganized following the 1971 Annual Conference to do so within two weeks following the Annual Conference.

(35) Decided to have a Program Council retreat in September, 1971.

(36) Endorsed a recommendation that the Committee on Nominations will make to the Annual Conference stating that the Program Director, Associate Program Directors, Assistant Program Directors, District Superintendents, and the homes administrators not be elected to board and agencies under the Conference rotation system but serve only as ex-officio where mandated by the Discipline or the Annual Conference.

(37) Adopted as the 1971-72 Annual Conference Program for recommendation to the Annual Conference the 1970-71 Program with a few changes (see item 7 under section F of this report).

(38) Elected the Reverend R. Jervis Cooke as the Program Director.



**E. Recommendations**

(1) Resolved that the Peninsula Annual Conference reaffirm this sentence in Item 6 of the Conference Rules and Guidelines for the Nomination Committee: "The following shall not be under the Conference rotation system nor counted in the above total: District committees or secretaries, Wesley College Trustees, Board of Directors of the Wesley Foundations, Board of Trustees of the Peninsula Methodist Homes and Hospitals, Inc."

(2) Resolved that the Peninsula Annual Conference reaffirm this sentence in Item 7 of the Conference Rules and Guidelines for the Nominating Committee: "If a ministerial member shall retire before the age 72, he shall relinquish his privilege to serve on Conference boards and agencies."

(3) Resolved that the Peninsula Annual Conference amend Item 12 of the Conference Rules and Guidelines for the Nominating Committee to read as follows: "Every case of a nominee to any board, commission, committee or agency shall have accepted the nomination before his name is placed before the Conference." (The point is that he shall not only be notified but that he shall have accepted the nomination.)

(4) Resolved that the Peninsula Annual Conference personnel year (year in which people elected to various positions shall actually serve) shall be June 1 through May 30 but that local churches can establish their own personnel year. (In previous action the Annual Conference established the program and fiscal years as the calendar year.)

(5) Resolved that the Associate Lay Leader of the Annual Conference for Stewardship and Finance and the Associate lay leader of the Annual Conference for Lay Life and Work be members of the Program Council and that the Executive Director of the Delmarva Ecumenical Agency be a member of the Program Council.

(6) Resolved that the Peninsula Annual Conference petition the General Conference of 1972 that Paragraph 925 be revised so that an Annual Conference could more easily put a Basic Salary Plan into effect by requiring two third's vote of two successive Annual Conferences.

(7) Resolved that the Peninsula Annual Conference adopt the following for its 1971-72 Annual Conference Program:

**Foreword**

The Peninsula Annual Conference Program Council recommends that the program emphases and goals for 1971-72, be a continuation of those established by the Annual Conference of 1970-71, under the inclusive theme of "Stewardship—Man's Relationships and responsibilities." This program was arrived at after careful study and planning and over the past year has been implemented with some variations, but still leaves much to be accomplished.

The 1970 General Conference responded to a survey of Methodists across the church and established six priority issues. These issues arose from a response to inquiries at the local church level which Methodists across our country feel are the most pressing issues of the current decade. They have been presented to the church as six priority issues. They are:

1. "Meaning, Value and Life Style"
2. "White Racism and Black Revolution"
3. "Economic Exploitation"
4. "World Peace and Wars"
5. "Population Explosion and Hunger"
6. "Environmental Pollution"

The program that was developed in 1971 encompasses all of these concerns.

It was developed with the following assumptions: (1) There should be an over all conference emphasis to give focus and direction to all aspects of the Annual Conference Programs for the year. (2) The suggested theme and programs should come from the Program Council and be adopted by the Annual Conference. (3) The implementation of the program emphases will be the responsibility of the Program Council with the various boards and agencies of the Annual Conference working as task forces of the Program Council. (4) The various boards and agencies have the right to develop and carry out other programs whether or not related to the Conference theme. But, it is hoped that the boards and agencies will not do this without first consulting with the Program Council. It is expected that the boards and agencies will carry out those programs or tasks assigned to them by the Discipline or general boards and agencies. However, it is expected that priority will be given to the theme and programs adopted by the Annual Conference and to tasks assigned by the Program Council.

Now, after a year of work in this particular area, the Program Council feels that these assumptions are valid and that the boards and agencies of the Conference in general have made every effort to be cooperative and to coordinate their programs through the Program Council.

"Stewardship—Man's Relationships and Responsibilities" is on target for the seventies and we are moving in the priority areas by dividing the work under the seven emphases of our program. With the continued cooperation of the boards and agencies of the Annual Conference, we expect to move ahead with the following program:

**A. Spiritual**

1. Goal: "Realizing that God created man to be His hands, His feet, His voice in the world; that man was given the responsibility to cultivate and preserve all that God had created; that by man's sin of disobedience he became self-centered rather than God-centered and others-centered; that only through repentance of his sin and forsaking it, and surrender to Jesus Christ as Savior and Lord can he regain the right perspective of his responsibility as a co-partner with God, assume his responsibility to conserve and protect the natural world and it's resources, whether they be in his own community or on the other side of the world, have the ability to look on the heart of his fellowmen rather than the outward appearances, will do unto others as he would have done unto himself, establishing hope for a better world for future generations."
2. Method: Retreats, workshops for clergy and laity on the spiritual life, Bible study, lay witness missions, preaching missions.

3. Responsibility: Board of Evangelism, Board of Ministry in continuing education.

#### B. Personal

1. Goal: Gaining personal commitment to God through Jesus Christ which will involve the total use of all that we are and have—work, time, talent, money, influence, etc.—in the light of what God is doing in His world with people as His co-workers.
2. Method: Study groups, retreats, lay witness missions, church school.
3. Responsibility: Board of Evangelism, Board of the Laity.

#### C. Human

1. Goal: Becoming aware of and seeking to correct (a) the personal attitudes, beliefs and behavior patterns and (b) the institutional practices which are racist in nature and which create and maintain the racial problems that plague the nation.
2. Method: A series of consultations on religion and race involving (a) Conference leaders, (b) clergy and local church lay leaders, (c) the Methodist Action Program, (d) The Board of Education, (e) Board of Christian Social Concerns.
3. Responsibility: Task Force on Merger, Operation Leaven, The Cabinet.

#### D. Church

1. Goal: Study the situation of the church school and make recommendations, study situation in regard to Bible related courses in the public schools and make recommendations for action, and establish an aggressive program of enlistment for church vocations.
2. Method: Formal surveys and studies, establishment of an action program on church vocations, enlistment involving workshops, conferences, interviews, etc.
3. Responsibility: Board of Education, Committee on Enlistment.

#### E. Community

1. Goal: Every local church, as part of a larger group of churches, preferably ecumenical in nature, will take part in a parish-community consultation to study in depth (a) its understanding of the mission of the Church, (b) the nature of its own community—its problems, resources, future trends, needs, (c) what the churches together should do in view of the situation and (d) what structures are needed to carry out the adopted tasks.
2. Method: The holding of parish-community consultations under skilled leadership.
3. Responsibility: Methodist Action Program and the Committee on Parish-Community Development of the Board of Missions, Board of Health and Welfare Ministries, Board of Christian Social Concerns.

#### F. Ecumenical

1. Goal: (a) Support of the Delmarva Ecumenical Agency, (b) an in-depth study of the Plan of Union devised by the Consultation on Church Union and (c) the carrying on of planning and programming, as much as possible, on ecumenical bases.
2. Method: Action of the Annual Conference in the new agency, study sessions on the districts and in local churches on the Plan of Union.
3. Responsibility: Commission on Ecumenical Affairs, Commission on Worship.

#### G. Environmental

1. Goal: To understand more clearly the nature and extent of the environmental problems that plague society (air, water, and noise pollution; ecology; waste disposal, etc.) and to devise action programs for helping to solve these problems.
2. Method: Educational programs at conference, district and local church levels; Action programs with other churches and agencies.
3. Responsibility: Board of Christian Social Concerns with other religions and secular agencies.

Staff personnel of the Program Council will be assigned by the Program Director to assist conference agencies responsible for carrying out the above program.

Let us state again that this outline is not meant to be exhaustive and that the boards and agencies at work on this program are free to be as creative as their inspiration and imagination will make them. We ask for the continued support of the total Conference program to be operated through the Program Council and not by the independent action of the program agencies of the Conference. The overall planning, supervision, and evaluation should come from the Program Council and thus unify our program so that all of us may move forward in agreed directions.

#### F. Committee Reports

There are four standing committees of the Program Council. Following are reports on their work for the year.

##### Interpretation

The Committee on Interpretation is the arm of the Program Council which helps to interpret the mission of the United Methodist Church to local churches. Its task is to promote the program of World Service and other benevolences and the work of the Program Council throughout the Annual Conference to ministers and local churches. The chairman of the committee is the Reverend Richard D. Bailey. During 1970 the work of interpretation included:

(1) Minister's Coordinated Mailing. All Conference mailings for boards and agencies are coordinated, indexed and mailed monthly to ministers.

(2) Benevolence Bulletin. Prepared monthly and included in the Minister's Coordinated Mailing. This interprets monthly the financial status of the Administrative and Benevolence giving.

(3) Conference Capsule. A capsule version of the Minister's Coordinated Mailing is prepared and mailed to all Council on Ministries chairmen, District Superintendents, District Public Relation Secretaries and selected Conference leaders.

(4) Fund for Reconciliation. The promotion of the Fund for Reconciliation is handled by the Committee. Cash receipts to February 28, 1971 have amounted to \$51,068.28.

(5) Stewardship Education. Helped Dr. Hilbert Berger with a Stewardship Retreat for our Conference laymen in September. Led workshop in stewardship for the Board of the Laity on each district in April.

(6) Helping Local Church Determine Mission. Worked with Gordon Stapleton in a training retreat for teams to work with local church Councils on Ministries in March.

(7) Assisted when called upon to help the Cabinet, Director of Public Relations, and others in the area of interpretation.

#### Public Relations

During the year this committee has attempted to fulfill its responsibilities to the church in the areas of communications, promotion and public relations.

Through the effective efforts of the Director of Public Relations, Mr. Ted Schiller, and the dedication of our five District Directors, Hubert Jicha, Gary Trail, Willard Robinson, Dale Pruett and Frank Lucia our prescribed work has been performed. Through the use of the news media and district newsletters this committee has disseminated information pertinent to the churches' mission. Promotion has occupied much of our concern this year. The committee has sought in various ways to promote General and Conference benevolence causes including General and Conference advance specials and special days like One Great Hour of Sharing, The Fellowship of Suffering and Service, etc.

Because we see much overlap between our specific area of responsibility and the work of TRAFCO, Interpretation and Publishing interests, these committee chairmen have met several times with the Public Relations Committee and members of the Cabinet to consider possible consolidation. It is recommended that a Division of Communications, comprised of a representative from Public Relations, TRAFCO, Interpretation, Publishing Interests and the Cabinet, be appointed by June 1, 1971 by the Program Council. We further recommend that a full time Director of Communications be appointed or hired on recommendation of the Cabinet by January 1, 1972.

It is suggested that the operating budget of this new committee not exceed the present combined budgets of the four uniting committees into this new Division of Communications. We heartily endorse this joint proposal with the other committees believing that such a combined committee can more effectively serve the best interest of the church.

#### COMMITTEE ON PUBLISHING INTERESTS

Briefly, the Committee on Publishing Interests has attempted this year to speak to the Methodist Publishing House for our Conference and constituency, and to speak to the Conference for MPH. We have sought to discover areas of need in service and materials, and to convey to MPH general and specific instances where attention should be given to more adequate handling of orders. We expect to continue this in the future.

It needs to be said that, while in "good, sound financial condition" according to the now retired President and Publisher, Lovick Pierce, in his recent annual report, the Publishing House suffered a new loss last year of \$1,318,467. Of this total, \$851,222 was operational and \$467,245 resulting from sales of printing plants and related equipment in Dayton, Ohio, and Harrisburg, Pennsylvania.

Most of the operational loss was due to decreasing volume in orders for church school curriculum which reflects and parallels the decreases recorded throughout the church in church school attendance. It should be of interest to note that, according to Dr. Henry Bullock, Editor of Church School Periodicals, research and contacts in the field have prompted the Division of Curriculum Resources to simplify materials, provide more aids to teachers, and give more prominence and visibility to Biblical material.

Dr. Bullock advises, however, that these changes will not be evident for a number of months because of the long period of time required to produce these curriculum resources.

During the year, Abingdon Press issued 107 new books and prepared the way for an "Interpreter's One-Volume Commentary on the Bible." Announcement has also been made that more will be done in the "multi-media" field with audio tapes, Visual aids and posters.

November 1, 1970 brought to MPH a new Publisher, Executive Vice-President, and two divisional Vice-Presidents; and executive team of reputed youth, experience, training and creativity.

Finally, and of interest to us all; despite financial losses in the year ended, \$1 million has been appropriated from reserve funds for distribution to retired ministers, their widows and orphaned children, equalling amounts so appropriated for the past two years. During the session of Annual Conference, a check, representing the share due our Conference, will be presented and placed in our retirement funds.

### TELEVISION, RADIO AND FILM COMMUNICATIONS

In this age in which the mass media are more and more shaping the ideas and actions of people—TRAFCO has felt most keenly the burden of interpreting the church's message. Unfortunately, the financial "crunch" the church has experienced has hampered us from putting on the screens and airwaves of the Peninsula many of the fine audio-visuals that are now available to make Christ competitive with the materialistic philosophy that so dominates much of our society.

As evidence that our teachers and program leaders are calling more and more upon our AV Library to illustrate their messages, we need only compare the 1,935 requests for materials for the calendar year 1970 with the 1,189 requests in 1969.

We are happy to report that our AV CATALOG has now been paid for, and we can make it available free of charge to any one who can make use of it. We hope to have a paste-in supplement ready by June for new items we have been able to secure since the catalog is printed.

1970 was the first full year in which the AV LIBRARY has been under the supervision and control of TRAFCO and contained all the AV's of the Conference. Despite several librarian changes we have fulfilled most of our orders correctly and on time. We apologize for those who suffered the few mistakes. Our current librarian is Mrs. Amelia Dudley.

One of the unforeseen problems in the management of the TRAFCO library in Dover is the fact that the chairman resides in Newark, Delaware. He is therefore extremely indebted to Gordon Stapleton, Associate Program Director, for his oversight of the library in the chairman's absence even though this was not a specifically delegated responsibility of his.

TRAFCO has felt proud to be called upon several times to provide training in audio visual techniques to local churches especially church school workshops. While our time is limited for this type of activity, we are willing to consider all requests. We have also been able to give advice to a number of our Conference boards and agencies in the use of audio visual set-ups for their various programs—particularly the School of Missions. We are currently working with the Commission on Ecumenical Affairs for a presentation of a multi-media program at this session of the Conference.

One of the most rewarding opportunities we had was in teaching the mission study "Image and Impact" at Christ Church, Roselle. This was an ecumenical School of Missions comprising five churches in the Prices Corner area. It was a rare opportunity in which we had a chance to share with a group of about 100 adults the subtle influence mass media makes upon our thinking without our actually being aware of it. A detailed comparison between the philosophy of much of our media and the Christian ethic of the Gospel was made. I recommend this study very highly as both a fascinating course for our church members and a highly useful orientation for evaluating much of the material that floods our eyes and ears.

TRAFCO has been responsible for the fourth consecutive year for producing the "Word and Music" radio broadcast heard every Sunday morning at 8 a.m. over WNRK in Newark, Delaware. This is an excellent broadcast scripted by general TRAFCO and produced to sound like an entirely local origination. We heartily recommend that other communities take

advantage of this contemporary program of music and commentary. We will be more than willing to train any minister or layman interested in this ministry.

TRAFCO has been very active on the ecumenical scene of the Del-Mar-Va Peninsula. Along with the Council of Churches of Wilmington and New Castle County and the Delaware State Council of Churches we have participated with other denominations on the Peninsula in forming the Del-Mar-Va Broadcast Ministry. The committee—appointed by the respective denominations—evaluated religious programming produced by our national denominations and contacted personally the various broadcast stations throughout the Peninsula with our recommendations. We deemed this initial experiment a success and plan to pursue it further through a proposal for a communications task force of the Del-Mar-Va Ecumenical Agency.

For the past several months TRAFCO has been meeting with representatives of the committees on Interpretation, Public Relations, and Publishing Interests to form a Division of Communications. This practice is already in operation in the Baltimore and other conferences. We are strongly recommending this to the Annual Conference following its acceptance by the Program Council in March. We feel we need the wisdom and expertise of each other to do our own job effectively.

We are also strongly recommending jointly with the other four committees the hiring, beginning January 1, 1972 of a full or part-time staff person to be employed by the Division of Communications. We are not asking for any additional funds to pay for this staff person other than what has already been approved by the Program Council for 1972. We do, however, feel that it is essential that this Associate Program Director for communications be employed to handle the very badly needed public relations, broadcast, and interpretation work of the Peninsula Conference. It is impossible for men administering active churches to also do justice by themselves to this Conference work. We are convinced that such a person would quickly pay for himself in the enthusiasm and interest he would generate through good media use.

**COMMISSION ON WORSHIP**

The Commission on Worship, after conversation with the Board of Education, now includes in its sphere of work the Music Committee of the Conference.

The Music Committee, under the leadership of Ralph Ellis, Jr., as Chairman, held in the summer of 1970 a summer music camp for Jr. Hi girls, under the direction of Mrs. Anna Lee Trader of Bethesda Church, Salisbury, Maryland. A similar week is also scheduled for July 18 through the 23, 1971 and twenty-four girls, eighth and ninth graders will be accepted.

A one-day Work-Shop for choir directors and choir members was held at Aldersgate Church under Dr. Austin Lovelace with over 200 attending. At this writing, there is also planned a one-day session under the leadership of Mr. Thomas Flynn for the purpose of trying to expose youth, adults, and choir directors to the possibilities of instruments in worship. Insofar

as the Committee can determine, this is rather a new venture in the area of a Music workshop.

The Commission on Worship has cooperated with the Program Committee in preparing for this Annual Conference and has sought to make each worship experience here a time of learning as well as of worship.

The Commission on Worship makes its members and resources available to the local churches and to the program areas of the Conference in any way that they can be of service and assistance.

IV. MEMBERSHIP AND LAY ACTIVITIES

**BOARD OF EVANGELISM**

This past Conference Year has been very interesting and rewarding. We have seen several proposed aspects of the Board's Conference-Wide Program carried out with an overwhelming degree of success. We set out to discover some new depths and relevance in Evangelism. We have explored many areas of major concern and are happy to report that like St. Paul, "We count not to attain perfection", but we moved forward.

There are those who would find it difficult to equate the goals set forth in the proposal of the Program Council and the Aim of the Board of Evangelism, as set forth in the Discipline, as being one and the same; however, the Board embraces them as such. Our endeavors have been directed to achieve these goals by training board members and providing information and new insights for district and local church leaders, through the following educational events:

1. Five delegates were sent to the School of Evangelism.
2. Five members of the Board attended the Christmas Convocation.
3. Four members attended the Northeastern Jurisdictional Conference.
4. Thirteen delegates were sent to the Congress on Evangelism.
5. Attendance to Conference and District Workshops and Seminars included fifty-four persons, who also attended the Short Term Evangelism Ministry.
6. Twenty-six persons attended the Leadership Training—Resource Personnel and materials, with Dr. Charles Whittle, Leader.
7. Dr. George Outen was the Leader for Contemporary Issues and Ministries, with an attendance of thirty members of the Board.
8. Similar training opportunities were held on the District Level with a total number of four hundred fifty-six attending.

**RECOMMENDATIONS**

We recommend that the District send at least five persons, including the District Superintendent and the District Secretary (by car pool), as

delegates to the School of Evangelism. The expenses for the car pool will be met by the Board of Evangelism with stipends of 10c per mile plus tolls.

1. There will be Prayer Rooms provided during our Annual Session.
2. Prayer groups will be organized for those who remain overnight.

#### CONFERENCE LAY LEADER'S REPORT

The Peninsula Conference Board of the Laity has had a fruitful year. In September, at Camp PeCoMeth, the Laymen's Retreat emphasized stewardship of self and possessions. This was under the able leadership of Dr. Hilbert Berger of the General Board of the Laity, assisted by our own Reverend Richard Bailey. Many of the men feel that this retreat is the best they have attended. Dr. David Self, General Secretary of the Board of the Laity, will be the resource person for the 1971 Laymen's Retreat.

Last summer the church service at Barratt's Chapel that was sponsored by the Board of the Laity was well attended. This year the Board plans to sponsor a service there each Sunday evening during July and August. One of these services will be conducted by the youth of the Conference. Emphasis will be placed on "come as you are" dress, and we hope to particularly attract people returning from the shore.

In the month of April four workshops will be held in the Conference. They will be under the direction of Mr. William B. McPherson, Assistant General Secretary of the General Board of the Laity. Training will be available for local church lay leaders, youth, pastors, and all others—both men and women—who take the responsibility of lay work seriously. Also, at this time Reverend Richard Bailey will give further leadership in the study of stewardship. We laity feel that to be effective, it is imperative that we be better trained.

Bishop Roy Nichols will be the Lay Banquet Speaker at the Annual Conference this year. Bishop Nichols is a very dynamic and inspiring speaker. All who have ever heard him will make a double effort to attend. Laity, don't miss this opportunity for an inspiring and informative evening!

In the fall the District Ministers' and Laymen's Banquets were all well attended. Both laity and clergy enjoyed fellowship together. Also, in the spring our laity and clergy received spiritual benefit from a series of Communion Breakfasts held on a district basis throughout the Conference.

Your Board of the Laity requests our Annual Conference vote affirmatively on the following resolutions:

- A. Lay members of the Annual Conference will be elected quadrennially (Paragraph 146, Section I, 1968 Discipline of the United Methodist Church). A lay member may be re-elected for another quadrennium, but must wait one quadrennium before being eligible for election for a third time.

It is our thought that lay delegates can be more effective if they are elected for a quadrennium instead of annually. Since we soon enter a new quadrennium, it is an opportune time to make this change. It is realized that some charges rotate lay delegates between churches, but we see no other way to improve lay effectiveness. Your Board believes that lay delegate continuity in office will improve the competence of our laity and make Peninsula a better Annual Conference.

- B. Election of Associate Conference Lay Leaders to the Annual Conference Program Council.

Since the two Associate Conference Lay Leaders (Lay Life and Work, and Stewardship and Finance) are very much involved in the Conference Board of the Laity Program, it is felt both Associate Conference Lay Leaders should be members-at-large of the Annual Conference Program Council.

Your Conference Lay Leader wishes to thank Bishop Lord, the Cabinet, the Clergy, and all Laity, both men and women, who contributed so much to make this a successful year.

#### LAY WORKER COMMITTEE

In the contemporary Protestant Church there is an increased number of committed lay people on a full-time employed basis. Many of these persons have met prescribed professional standards for their given area of work. However, it is equally evident that a great portion of these lay people receive little or no recognition of this specialized lay ministry within the church. Because of this, in 1965, a study committee was formed to clarify on the part of the United Methodist Church the relationship between the ordained and non-ordained "career" worker with greater understanding of the abilities of each for the other.

The result—The General Conference of 1968 brought into existence a new "being" the LAY WORKER.

Who is a LAY WORKER? (1) A person, other than the clergy, whose decision is to make a career of work in the employed status in the church or church related agencies (either full time or term), (2) accompanied by standards of excellence in the chosen field of service, (3) certified by the Conference agency related to his career, (4) consecrated by the Bishop.

One might ask what the advantages of being a LAY WORKER would be compared to remaining only in a certified relationship. The advantages are these:

(1) The LAY WORKER relationship places him within the legislative and decision making body of the church since he is now officially seated within the bar of the floor without vote.

(2) Being officially consecrated as a LAY WORKER of the Annual Conference gives him a professional and legal relationship not possible previously.

(3) His name will be printed in the *Journal* as a LAY WORKER.

(4) He will hold a charge conference relationship.

(5) The legislation is saying that "the employing agency shall include the LAY WORKER in a retirement plan".

(6) And insure for the LAY WORKER rights and conditions at least no less than those representative of enlightened and Christian policies now commonly practiced by secular institutions.

The Peninsula Conference Committee on the Lay Worker through its study has found that among United Methodist Churches in this Conference there are lay personnel who have given long years of dedicated service to the church, but when they retire, they will have only their social security annuity and that, in many cases at a low monthly rate. To our knowledge, only three persons in full-time employment of the church, who are eligible for the LAY WORKER relationship, are in a pension program (and each of these in a different plan). We also find a wide variance in salaries. The salary scale seems to depend on who the employing agency is and increases with employment in the metropolitan areas, rather than tenure, educational qualifications, and/or experience of the individual. The same situation exists in the area of benefits.

In light of the General Conference action, and our finds, the Committee on the Lay Worker makes the following

**RECOMMENDATION:** Since the employing agency of a LAY WORKER shall provide a pension program for that person, we recommend that the certifying agency immediately inform the employing agency of this requirement.

**RECOMMENDATION:** We strongly urge all churches within the Peninsula Conference to initiate a pension plan covering any lay employee who has been employed full time for one full year by the employing agency.

**RECOMMENDATION:** That the employing agency of a LAY WORKER shall pay for medical expense insurance coverage on the LAY WORKER, either using the program available through the Conference or its equivalent.

**RECOMMENDATION:** That LAY WORKERS be encouraged to take advantage of the life insurance coverage available to them through the Peninsula coverage.

**RECOMMENDATION:** That a minimum salary be set for LAY WORKERS. That the Program Council appoint a committee to recommend what this minimum salary shall be.

As evidenced in the above recommendations, the Peninsula Conference Committee on the Lay Worker strongly urges you to give serious consideration to the need for establishing good standards and remuneration for this new worker in the church. To date, there is no one who has asked to be considered for the LAY WORKER relationship in the Peninsula Annual Conference, but some certified lay people have expressed interest.

Today, we are called upon to determine guidelines which will make the LAY WORKER relationship and career one to be desired by the laity, now working in the church, and considered by youth as a vocation. Let us join in this task together, realizing its serious implications and potential for the future.

#### BOARD OF THE MINISTRY

The Board of the Ministry of an Annual Conference consists of clergy members in full connection, appointed by the Bishop of the area for a term of eight years.

The Board is responsible for the Disciplinary questions (20-51) in the Annual Conference Journal.

A brief summary of our responsibilities follows:

The Board of the Ministry is the gateway to our Conference. It is responsible for enlisting, examining, counseling, encouraging and recommending candidates for admission to associate, probationary and full membership in the Annual Conference and for ordination as deacon or elder. In addition, it now deals with all matters of Conference relations, including location, withdrawal, disability leave, sabbatical leave, appointment as students, reception of ministers from other denominations, and retirement from active service. It recommends to the Conference persons to be approved as lay pastors, and recommends elders to be assigned by the Cabinet as Counseling elders to lay pastors, to encourage them and arrange for the administration of the sacraments in churches served by unordained ministers. (Par. 665, sub. 4 to Par. 666 of the Book of Discipline)

The activity of your Board of the Ministry is not only defined in the above paragraph but briefly explained in the following report of the committees.

#### 1. Recruitment

This committee interprets its task as that of being sensitive to new directions both within the total church and specifically within the areas of theological education as it enlists students for the ministry as a vocation.

We make every effort to cultivate relationships with those persons who are considering the ministry as a career, searching out the best possible talents. It is our responsibility to interpret current directions within the total church, the success of our task will be very relevant to our awareness

of the tensions now existing between those supporting the present institutional position and those who are critics of it. We must present a structure that is renewing both the church and its ministry.

This Conference Year we have been in contact with potential candidates, both in personal conversation and through communication by mail. We are presently in contact with 101 persons who are at least considering the ordained ministry as a vocation.

On January 2, 1971 a Bishop's Conference on the Ministry was held at Wesley College and Wesley Church in Dover. Dr. Harold Bosley of Christ Church, New York City, spoke on the topic; "The Challenge of the Ordained Ministry in the 1970's". The young people present were involved in rotation groups with each participating in areas concerning: Inner-City, Rural Town, Specialized Ministries and The Language of The Church. Despite the snowstorm there were seventy-two students and forty-nine ministers present. The committee is at present studying the replies from the follow-up letters which were sent to each participant.

Our greatest asset or liability for recruitment rests in the hand of ministers serving in various capacities throughout the Conference.

## 2. Continuing Education

This committee has fulfilled its responsibility to provide the clergy of our Conference with opportunities to increase their efficiency. The problem has been the response from the ministers. All programs planned this past year had to be canceled for lack of interest. The Committee is, however, not giving up and plans are now being made for at least two weeks, one this summer and the other in the fall, to be held at Drayton Manor. You will hear more about these plans in the coordinated mailing.

## 3. Scholarship-Loan

Financial aid in the amount of \$4,000 was given to 10 seminary students. In addition, the committee cooperated with the administrators of the Scott and Riddle Funds in granting \$2,300 of assistance to 5 additional theological students. All funds available were expended. We could have used more. Your support toward the Ministerial Educational Fund will be of great assistance toward providing funds for students in seminary who are in need of financial help.

The Committee presented the following policy changes to the Board which were approved for the year starting 1971.

- a. That the term "scholarship-loan" be used to refer to the assistance given to students since all aid requires either service to the Annual Conference or the repayment of the money.
- b. That one-third of the scholarship-loan be cancelled for each year of full-time service rendered. (In the past, three years of service were required before any of the loan was cancelled.)
- c. That the maximum annual scholarship-loan be raised from \$500 to \$800 per student, provided funds are available and the need is justified.

- d. New application forms will be developed to reflect these new policies. Applications for scholarship-loan assistance for the Fall semester must be submitted to the Committee by July 1. Those seeking help for the Spring semester only must apply by November 1. Although application blanks will be mailed during the latter part of April each year to the students receiving aid, others who may wish to apply should contact the committee chairman:

## 4. Other Items of Interest—

- a. Our Board has provided \$800 to the Cabinet for immediate specialized training in attitudinal change, preparing some of our men for work within the area of their racially inclusive parish.

## REPORT OF WORKSHOP ON RACIAL MINISTRIES

(19 Ministers participating from 5 Districts)

### Proposed Stated Goal:

To prepare ourselves to serve inter-racial parishes and to work together in a bi-racial ministry as we achieve inclusiveness as a free-flow and participating of members in the total life of the church.

### Steps to achieve goal:

1. Parishes be formed on geographical basis.
2. Each individual seek to understand issues and his own pertinent feelings.
3. District Superintendent should allow adequate time—6 months to a year—and meetings for discussion with all pastors and churches involved for a meeting of the minds before action is initiated.
4. District Superintendents, pastors, and other available trained resource personnel should clarify responsibilities in consultation with the pastor-parish committee, and write job descriptions prior to appointments.
5. After realignment, pastors and pastor-parish relations committee should establish open lines of communication between churches and pastors and churches.
6. Every opportunity should be grasped for small groups of churches to share cultural, religious and social experiences on a continuing basis.
7. After realignment of churches and until an acceptable ministry is established, the District Superintendent should hold a meeting for churches involved at least every six months to evaluate progress and project future courses of action.



8. Pastor and associate should set regular meetings for evaluation and planning.
9. In situations of conflict, help should be drawn from persons trained as consultants or resource personnel.

- b. We shall cooperate with the Commission on Enlistment for Church Occupations in conducting a Conference during 1971.
- c. Special recruitment emphasis will be placed upon contacting black ministerial candidates through visits to the seminaries.
- d. This is the first time that the Board of the Ministry has the responsibility of giving recognition to those members of the Peninsula Conference who serve with distinction as civilians and military chaplains.

The Board reports that at this Conference session there are seven Active Duty chaplains, six Reserve chaplains, and three Institutional chaplains within the ranks of our Conference membership.

We are indebted to these men who have taken the church outside its walls into fields, hospitals and other institutions where God's children in the midst of misery and suffering physical, social, and mental, seek for peace within.

e. The Board of the Ministry under the Recruitment Committee and in cooperation with the cabinet, recognizing the problem of securing black men and women for the pastorate of churches within our Conference, has attempted to face the problem and find solutions.

We invited five students from Gammon Theological Seminary to be part of our Bishop's Day program. The transportation expense and housing was to be cared for by our Board.

We have paid the transportation of two students from Gammon to this session of the annual Conference, to be interviewed by our Board and the cabinet for possibly full membership in our Conference.

At the preparation of this report, the Board expects to recommend to the Conference in May, 19 candidates for associate membership, 6 for preparatory membership, 7 for full connections, 6 for deacons orders, and 7 for elders orders.

### Recommendations

1. We call upon the lay and ministerial delegates of our Conference to promote strongly in their Administrative Boards the necessity of paying in full the apportionment for the Ministerial Educational Fund. Full support of this program will provide the Scholarship-Loan committee with additional funds for assisting men in their training.

2. Once again we request that the lay delegate along with the Lay Leader of each charge encourage their pastor to participate in continuing education programs, allowing time other than vacation for such study plus the suggested minimum of \$250 per year. (Note Par. 355 of Book of the Discipline)

3. That Ministry Sunday be observed in all churches on September 19, or another date more suitable.

In closing, I wish to express my personal appreciation as chairman to—the Cabinet, for keeping an open line of communication between themselves and our Board; the chairmen and members of each committee; the Registrar, the Reverend C. Edwin Lasbury, who is kept busy with the records of each man and contacting them during their schooling; the Associate Registrar, the Reverend E. C. Hackshaw.

### SECTION V

#### V. ADMINISTRATION AND FINANCE

##### COMMISSION ON ARCHIVES AND HISTORY

The 190th Anniversary of Barratt's Chapel, the "Cradle of American Methodism," was observed on Sunday, November 8, 1970. The Reverend Dr. Clarence C. Goen, professor Church History, Wesley Theological Seminary, Washington, D. C. was the guest speaker and truly thrilled his hearers with a panoramic view of Methodism and its relationship to other churches, in its beginnings and now.

During the year there have been numerous visitors to Barratt's Chapel and Museum, including school groups, church school classes, youth groups, confirmation classes, and tourists from all parts of the U.S. and several foreign countries. Also, the Chapel has been used for weddings, baptisms, and funerals. Services were conducted throughout the summer season in 1970, and the Peninsula Conference Board of the Laity has been granted permission to conduct Sunday evening Worship services during July and August, 1971. The purpose is to serve the tourists returning from the resorts. People are encouraged to "come as you are." Mr. A. Frank Chapman and the Curator will coordinate the details of the overall project.

Reverend Charles E. Covington represented our Peninsula Conference Commission on Archives and History at the 1970 N. E. Jurisdictional Commission on Archives and History on May 11-12. About forty shared in the two-day sessions. They assembled at Belmont, Mass., and drove as a group to Newburyport, Mass., for lunch and a special service at Old South Presbyterian Church. While there they visited the grave of George Whitefield and the site of his last sermon. Then they went to East Readfield, Maine, for the remainder of the program. A special service was held in the Jesse Lee Methodist Church, observing its 175th Anniversary. Reverend Arnold Dallimore, author of an edition on Whitefield, spoke on the life of George Whitefield, whose death occurred 200 years ago. A bus tour of historic spots along the Readfield Circuit was given, and Reverend B. F. Wentworth presented a paper on Maine Methodism. The 1971 N. E. Jurisdictional meeting will be hosted by the Northern New York Conference at Alexandria Bay, New York, from May 17-19.

The films, "Wesley and His Times" and "Methodism's Living Heritage" have been added to our Conference Film Library. The first deals with the foundations of Methodism in England, and the second presents a general history of Methodism in Colonial America as it spanned the Revolutionary War.

As noted in our reports of 1969 and 1970, a very serious crack has developed in the southeast corner of the Chapel and immediate action was necessary to prevent more damage. We employed the services of Pope, Kruse, and McCune, architects, Wilmington, Delaware, who are competent and experienced in the preservation and restoration of historical buildings to examine the Chapel and to render professional evaluation of present state and future improvements. We followed their recommendations for immediate remedial work to maintain its present state and are happy that we did because a severe wind storm felled some trees and shook the Chapel's structure to the extent that some new faults were opened. We are now considering alternate courses for repair.

The directors of the Historical Society of the Peninsula Conference decided to conform to the 1968 Discipline, paragraph 1407, to change its name to the Peninsula Conference Commission on Archives and History, to organize a Historical Society, and to extend yearly membership to interested individuals and families. The annual dues were set at \$5 and \$8 respectively. Funds received through this medium will be used to promote interest in the study and preservation of the History of the United Methodist Church and its antecedents, to cooperate with the agents of the Church to promote historical interests of the Church, to promote Methodist History in general and the history of Methodism on the Delmarva Peninsula in particular, and to preserve Barratt's Chapel and to establish and maintain Barratt's Chapel Museum as a repository for church records, artifacts, appointments, and other paraphernalia for posterity.

In order to focus attention on the newly formed Historical Society the directors agreed to sponsor a Methodist Heritage Tour of England in October 1971. The tour is not limited to United Methodists but all who participate in the tour must be members of the Historical Society of the Peninsula Conference. The cost as an affinity group is only \$350. Reservations may

be made through the Tour Coordinator, Reverend Charles E. Covington, 36 Baltimore Avenue, Rehoboth Beach, Delaware.

Reverend Paul E. Reynolds was appointed to be Curator by Bishop J. W. Lord in 1965, and he and his wife have served faithfully to the present time. By their request the Directors are considering applications to follow them.

The Chapel and the Museum are open every day except Monday from 9:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. and on Sunday from 1:00 p.m. to 8:00 p.m. during the summer, and opened by appointment on Mondays and Tuesdays during the fall and spring, and closed from Christmas through February.

We sincerely request both churches and individuals to make Barratt's Chapel Museum their repository for items of ecclesiastical and historical value and to contribute to our endowment fund for their preservation.

During 1970 we received several items of interest and our second endowment from the estate of Robert Barratt Johnson "in loving memory of my grandparents, Henry Clay Johnson and Maggie Barratt Johnson."

Our hope for the future is to have a record of the Peninsula Conference written and published for sale; to collect a complete set of Conference minutes for each segment of our church which now composes the Peninsula Conference of the United Methodist Church; to receive endowments and memorials sufficient to protect and to insure excellent care and keeping of Barratt's Chapel, "The Cradle of American Methodism."

#### FEDERAL CREDIT UNION

The Peninsula Methodist Federal Credit Union has continued to serve the financial needs of its members. We now have 81 members who have more than \$9,000 invested. These investors received a 5% dividend for the 1970 calendar year.

In 1970 18 loans totaling \$9,143 were made. Occasionally, some borrowers get behind in payments, but in the three years of our operation we have lost no money in bad loans.

Our investors have life insurance in the amount of their accounts at no additional cost to them. Our borrowers have life insurance in the amount of their loans at no cost to them. We now have every account insured against any possible loss.

### MINIMUM SALARY COMMISSION

This commission has undertaken a study of the salaries paid to ministers of the Peninsula Conference. Since the minimum salary structure for the Conference has not changed since 1966, we find that many ministers have lower purchasing power now than five years ago because salary increases have not kept pace with the rising cost of living.

After careful consideration, this commission makes the following recommendations:

- The minimum support guideline beginning 1 June, 1972 become:
 

Conference Member .....	\$7,500.00
Associate Member .....	7,500.00
Full Time Probationary Member .....	7,500.00
Student .....	6,000.00
Full Time Lay Pastor .....	6,000.00
- The figures in 1. above include salary, travel, and fringe benefits including, but not limited to, insurance, pension fund, etc. paid to or for the pastor.
- Any pastor not receiving the minimum salary and refusing to move to an appointment when requested to do so where minimum salary would be paid shall not be eligible for minimum salary support from the Minimum Salary Fund.
- No more than \$33,000 be expended for minimum salary support from 1 June, 1972 to 31 May, 1973.  
That no more than \$24,000 be expended for minimum salary support from 1 June, 1973 to 31 May, 1974.
- If the amount needed to have each pastor receive the minimum guideline figure is more than the amount allowed to be expended, each eligible pastor shall receive a proportionate amount of what is available as set forth in paragraph 4. (Example: if \$40,000 is needed to bring all pastors up to the minimum guideline on 1 June, 1972 and only \$33,000 is available, each pastor would receive 82.5% of the amount needed to bring that pastor up to the minimum guideline figure.)
- The Cabinet be supported in their efforts to bring each charge up to the minimum workload and minimum salary.
- Implementation of these recommendations will be accomplished if future Annual Conferences approve the continuance of \$12,000 annually in the Conference Budget during the years 1972, 1973, 1974 and 1975, plus the amount on December 31, 1971.

### THE BOARD OF PENSIONS

Your Board of Pensions submits the following report for the year 1970 for your consideration and action.

All communications from our pensioners have been carefully considered, many of which have been cared for by personal contact. Most of the communications are in the form of personal requests for special gifts that are administered through the Necessitous Fund that is reserved for special needs. All special needs are reviewed every year by the Board.

The total assets of the Pension Fund as of December 31, 1970 reveal that the book value of the fund is \$2,323,183.79, and the market value is \$2,445,311.97. This shows a decided increase over last year due to the recent market surge. During the year we paid in pensions to our retired ministers in full connection and to our associate members \$193,109; to widows \$167,274; to our retired lay pastors \$29,976; to widows \$25,224; to all children \$2,286; and to the Clearing House of the General Board of Pensions \$42,324 for a grant total of \$460,193. In addition to this total, your Board has distributed \$8,746 from the Necessitous Fund.

The income to pay pensions for the year was derived from the following sources: Peninsula Annual Conference, \$420,010; Investments, \$109,182; N. E. Jurisdictional Equalization Fund, \$24,455; Others, \$13,495, for a grand total of \$567,142.

Lionel D. Edie and Company continue to serve as the investment counselors for the Endowment Fund of the Board.

For the year 1972, the Board requests that the Peninsula Conference allocate for pensions the sum of \$412,000 and that the amount for the necessitous cases be continued at \$10,000.

Your Board appointed a task force to give some study to the possibility of equalizing the pension rate for all ministers serving in a full-time capacity. That Force has been at work and is making a recommendation in this report that the percentage be raised from 75% to 85%.

The Board urges all ministers having Supply years on their service records to have these years cleared through the Conference Board at the earliest time possible.

A growing concern of the Board is the failure of many of our ministers to pay the 2% of their cash salary to the Board to build up the Endowment Fund. The percentage asking is 2% full members and the associates and 1½% for fulltime lay pastors. As of January 1, 1971, the interest rate charge on all delinquent accounts is 8%—Students serving charges are exempt from the interest, but not the 1½%.

Recognizing the need for increasing the Endowment Fund, a task force has been appointed to prepare an appropriate brochure to be used to encourage Methodists to remember this important work in their wills. We are also investigating the possibility of adopting an annuity plan to increase our Endowment.

8. Vacancy—elected Mrs. James D. Spencer (Delia B.), Easton, Maryland, to fill vacancy due to the death of Mr. Otis F. Figgs.
9. Project Equality—granted \$1,000 for 1971 for their expanded program.
10. Camp PeCoMeth—granted \$5,000 for 1971 for capital improvements.
11. Drayton—paid the salary of Omro Todd for June, July and August 1970 totaling \$2,250.
12. That the apportionment be calculated by churches rather than charges.

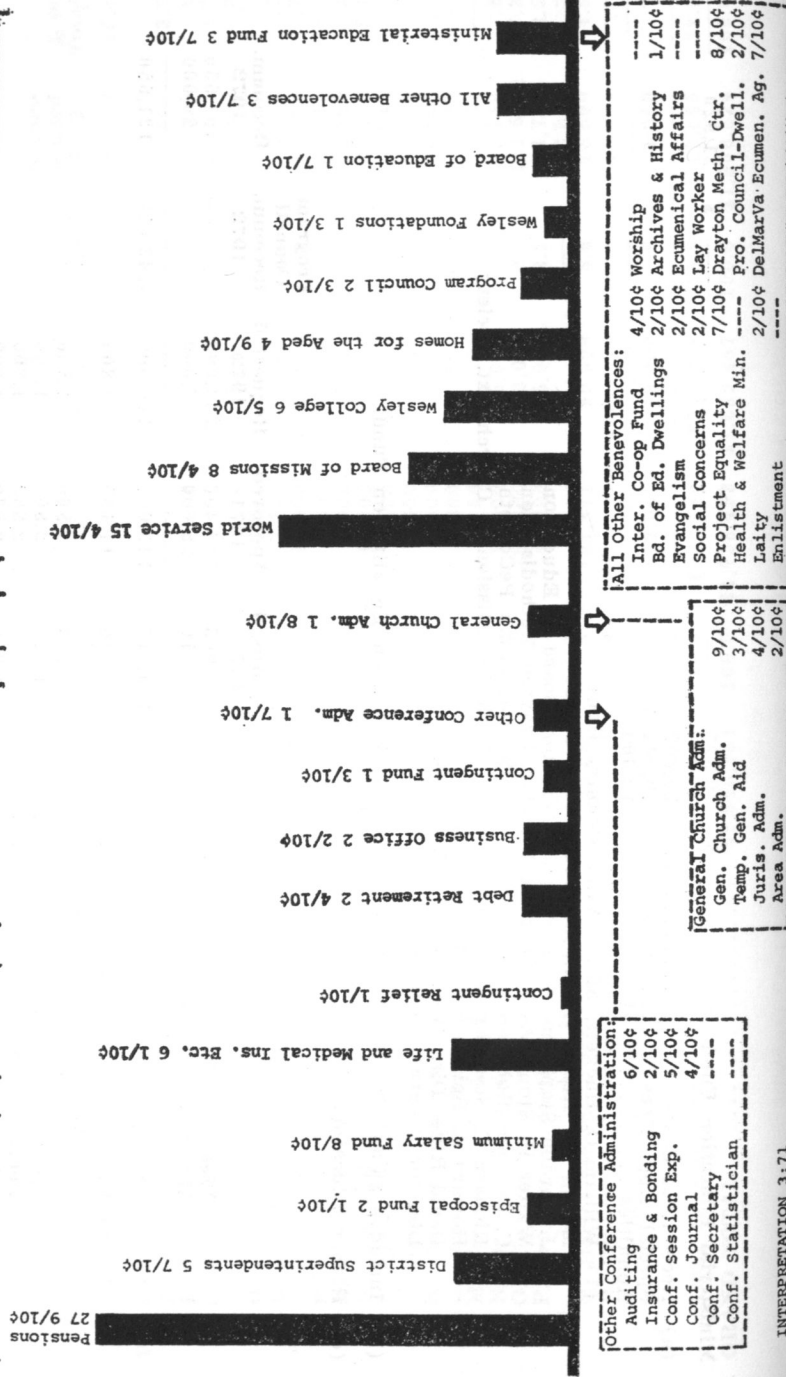

**CASH**

All cash receipts, as recorded in the record of cash received, were traced to their deposit in bank. Checks issued were examined for signatures, endorsements, etc. and traced to their entry in the disbursements records. Cash balances shown were reconciled with amounts reported by the bank as of December 31, 1970. We did not test the ministers' 1½% contributions to the Endowment Fund, nor did we inspect the individual record of payments to annuitants.

**MORTGAGES**

The details of mortgage transactions during the period under audit are presented in Schedule No. 1. We have made a physical examination of the mortgages and other related documents and satisfied ourselves as to their overall accuracy with the exception of the following:

**OTHER INVESTMENTS**

## MEMOIRS

## THE REVEREND DR. SIDNEY B. BRADLEY

1/26/01-5/11/71

The Reverend Dr. Sidney Benjamin Bradley, who served churches in the Peninsula United Methodist Conference for many years, died at his home, 203 South Broad Street, Middletown, Delaware, Monday, May 11, 1971.

The Service of Commemoration was held Thursday, May 14, 1971, in Asbury United Methodist Church, Wilmington Manor, New Castle, Delaware. Participating clergymen were The Reverend Howell O. Wilkins, Wilmington District Superintendent; Dr. Roy L. Tawes, Elkton, Maryland; The Reverend Kendall K. McCabe, Middletown, Delaware; Dr. Brooks E. Reynolds and Reverend Henry H. Schauer of Asbury. Interment was in Stevensville Cemetery, Stevensville, Maryland.

Born January 26, 1901, in Mardela Springs, Maryland, the son of Albert Sidney and Christina Bradley, he attended the public schools of that area, Wesley College, Dover, Delaware, and received a degree in history and government from Washington College, Chestertown, Maryland.

He earned a bachelor of divinity and master of arts degree from Drew University, Madison, New Jersey, majoring in sociology, and received a master of theology degree in church history at Crozer Theological Seminary, Chester, Pa. He did graduate work toward a Ph.D at Burton College and New York University receiving his degree from the latter. He was the author of "The Life of Bishop Whatcoat," published in 1936.

Dr. Bradley's first charge in the Peninsula Conference was at Secretary, Maryland. He also served pastorates at Fruitland, Crumpton and Cambridge in Maryland and in Delaware at Ebenezer, Chester-Bethel, Delmar and Seaford.

He was director of religious education at Asbury United Methodist Church of Wilmington Manor from 1955 to 1958 at which time he completed the work for the degree Doctor of Philosophy in Religious Education from the Evangelical Bible College and Seminary, Chicago, Illinois. He later became a trustee of that institution.

He retired from the ministry, was restored to active relationship and appointed to Asbury as Associate Pastor, serving from 1962-1966.

He taught sociology at Northern State University, Aberdeen, South Dakota, in 1967-'68 and was Assistant Professor of Psychology and Sociology at Chesapeake College, Wye Mills, Maryland, in 1968-'69. He was Dean of Education for the summer session at East Coast University, Dade City, Florida in 1970.

Dr. Bradley is survived by his wife, Mrs. Katherine Gibson Bradley, a daughter, Mrs. Catherine Park Ogburn of Auburn, Alabama, and a brother, Allen, of Cambridge, Maryland.

A gifted author, preacher, teacher, educator and administrator. His ministry was person-centered. He will always live in the hearts of those whom he loved and served.

The energy of these two persons, whose children had grown, was reflected in the building programs, the increase in youth participation, the growth in mission, and membership in every church they served.

Here truly God had called not one, but two, into the main stream of service to Christ and His Church.

After Larry passed away on February 22, 1968, Naomi lived with her daughter and son-in-law, Rev. and Mrs. Donzel C. Wildey in Towson, Maryland. Shortly after moving with them to Wilmington, Delaware and while visiting her son in Lock Haven, Pennsylvania, she was stricken and after a brief illness passed to her reward on August 11, 1970.

Her life had been dedicated to her husband and family and, in the rich later years, to the congregations faithfully served by her husband. She left behind four children, Mrs. Donzel C. Wildey, Wilmington, Delaware, Lt. Col. Richard Renner, Merced, California, Mr. Edwin Renner and Mrs. Charles Cruse both of Lock Haven, Pennsylvania, nine grandchildren, three great-grandchildren, and a host of friends.

She was laid to rest beside her husband, Larry, in Cedar Hill Cemetery, Mackeyville, Pennsylvania.

IX  
MISCELLANEOUS

(a) CONFERENCE RULES OF ORDER

- Rule 1. The Conference shall meet at 9:00 A.M. and adjourn at 12:30 P.M. But the Conference may, in its discretion, alter the time of meeting and adjournment.
- Rule 2. The President shall decide all questions of order, subject to an appeal to the Conference; but in case of such an appeal the question shall be taken without debate, except that the appellant may make a simple statement of the grounds of his appeal.
- Rule 3. All resolutions, motions, amendments and substitute motions presented to the Annual Conference shall be submitted to the Secretary in writing at the time they are made or as soon thereafter as possible.
- Rule 4. When a motion is made and seconded, or a resolution is introduced and seconded, or a report presented and read by the Secretary, or stated by the President, it shall be deemed in possession of the Conference; but any motion or resolution may be withdrawn by the mover, with the consent of the Conference, at any time before amendment or decision.
- Rule 5. The motion to Lay on the Table, or to Take from the Table, and for the Previous Question, shall be taken without debate.
- Rule 6. No new motion or resolution shall be entertained until the one under consideration has been disposed of, which may be done by adoption or rejection, unless one of the following motions shall intervene, which shall have precedence in the order in which they are placed, namely:
- (1) To fix the time to which the Conference shall adjourn.
  - (2) To adjourn.
  - (3) To take a recess.
  - (4) To lay on the table.
  - (5) For the previous question.
  - (6) To postpone to a given time.
  - (7) To refer.
  - (8) To substitute.
  - (9) Amendment.
  - (10) To postpone indefinitely.

- A motion to amend shall be in order, and a substitute for both amendments may be received, which substitute may be amended only once, and if a substitute be accepted, it shall operate as an amendment to the original proposition.
- Rule 7. When a member is about to speak in debate, or to deliver any matter to the Conference, he shall rise and respectfully address the President, but shall not proceed until recognized by him.
- Rule 8. No member shall be interrupted while speaking, except by the President to call him to order when he departs from the question, or uses personalities or disrespectful language; but any member may call the attention of the President to the subject when he deems a speaker out of order, and any member may explain when he thinks himself misrepresented.
- Rule 9. When a member desires to a question of privilege, he shall briefly state the question; but it shall not be in order for him to proceed until the President shall have decided it a privileged question.
- Rule 10. No person shall speak more than twice on the same question, nor more than ten minutes at one time, without leave of the Conference; nor shall any person speak more than once until every member choosing to speak shall have spoken.
- Rule 11. When any motion or resolution shall have been acted upon by the Conference, it shall be in order for any member who voted with the prevailing side to move a reconsideration; but a motion to reconsider it a non-debatable motion and shall be decided without debate.
- Rule 12. No member shall absent himself from the sessions of the Conference without leave, unless he is sick or unable to attend.
- Rule 13. No member shall be allowed to vote on any question who is not within the bar of the Conference at the time when such question shall be put by the President, except by leave of the Conference when such member has been necessarily absent.
- Rule 14. Every member who is within the bar at the time a question is put shall give his vote, unless the Conference, for special reasons, shall excuse him.
- Rule 15. It shall be in order for him to move that the question be taken without further debate on any measure pending, except in cases in which character is involved, and if sustained by two-thirds, the question shall be taken.
- Rule 16. The motion to adjourn shall be taken without debate, and shall always be in order, except, (1) when a member has the floor; (2) when a question is actually put, or a vote is being taken; (3) when the question is pending on seconding the demand for the previous question; (4) when the previous question has been called and sustained, and is still pending; and (5) when a motion to adjourn has been negatived and no business or debate has intervened.

- Rule 17. All reports of the Boards, Commissions and Committees, shall be published and mailed to the Members of the Annual Conference ten (10) days prior to the date of meeting of the Annual Conference. Reports to be included in this mailing must be in the hands of the Secretary thirty (30) days prior to such Session.
- Rule 18. No report shall be received or adopted by the Conference until a copy has been placed in the hands of the Secretary.
- Rule 19. These rules shall not be suspended or amended except by a vote of two-thirds of the members present and voting.
- Rule 20. All materials to be published in the Journal shall be in the hands of the Secretary not later than three (3) days after adjournment of the Annual Session or it shall be excluded.
- Rule 21. The Nominating Committee shall distribute mimeographed copies of its report to the Annual Conference on the day before the report is to be voted on by the Conference.
- Rule 22. Recommendations as to the change in format and policy regarding data to be included in the Journal shall be referred to the Committee on Journal for study and recommendation before action by the Conference.
- Rule 23. Only such motions as are carried and/or passed by the Conference shall be included in the Journal.
- Rule 24. That no member of any Board, Committee, or Commission shall serve more than two consecutive quadrenniums on said Board, Committee or Commission and shall be ineligible to be re-elected until after one Quadrennium has elapsed except members of boards, committees or commissions elected for three year terms may serve three consecutive terms and shall be ineligible to be reelected until after one term has lapsed and except that when a member is elected to fill an unexpired quadrennium or term he may complete the unexpired quadrennium or term and serve not more than one additional consecutive quadrennium or term. No member of the Conference, lay or ministerial shall be elected to serve on more than two Boards, Committees or Commissions concurrently, except the committees elected or appointed for the Annual Conference session only, district committees whether or not elected by the Annual Conference and the quadrennial committee on the local church. The distribution of membership shall be according to Districts three laymen and three ministers as nearly as possible to each District.

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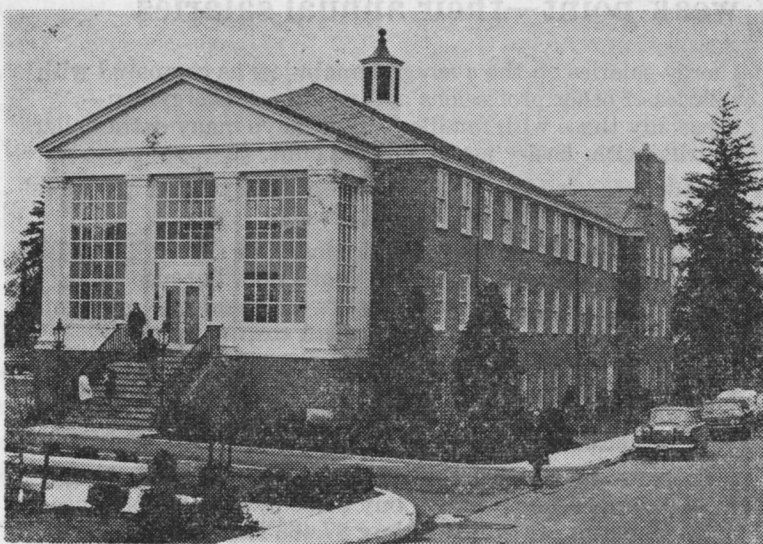
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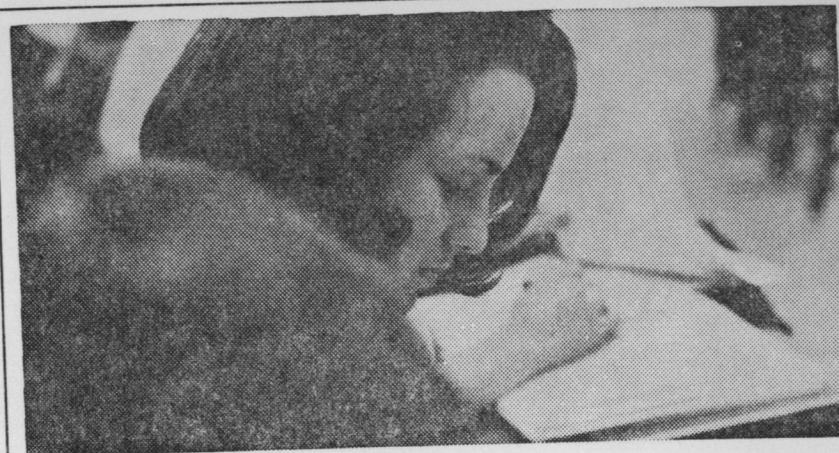
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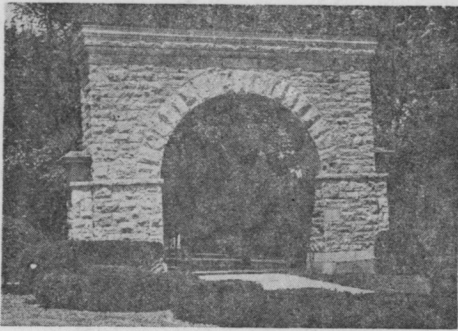
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
