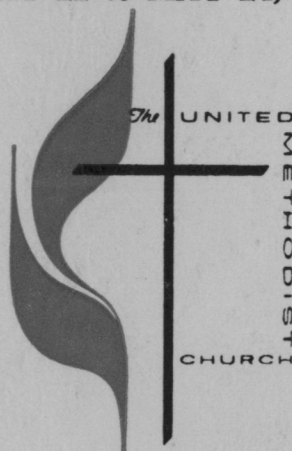

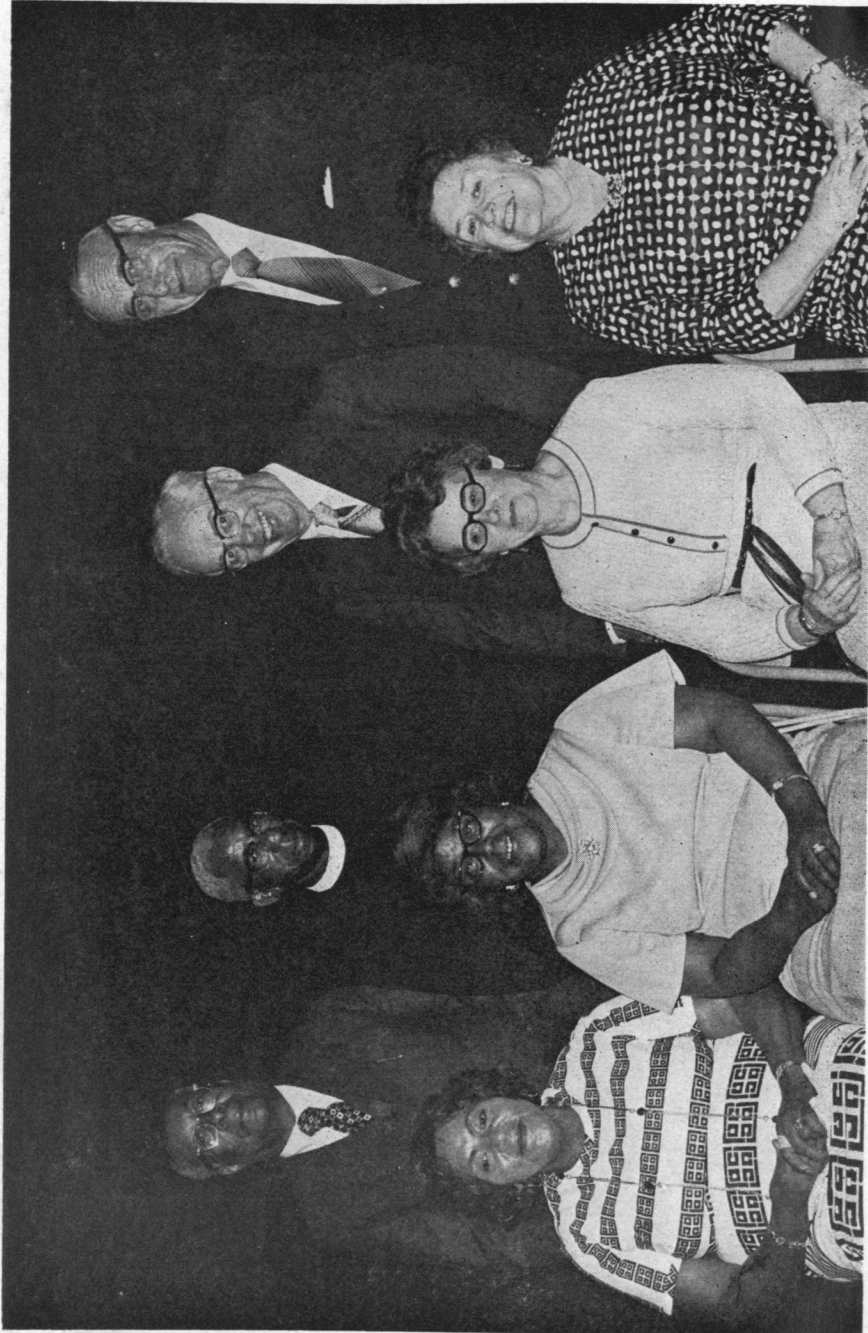

**MINUTES, SPECIAL SESSION**

SATURDAY, OCTOBER 21, 1972

2:05 p.m.—Opening Service of Worship—The Rev. Dr. Kenneth R. Rose, liturgist; The Rev. Mr. Jerrold Knotts, soloist.

2:35 p.m.—The Rev. Mr. Otho G. Brewer, Chairman of Peninsula Conference Cabinet, introduced and welcomed Bishop James K. Mathews to the Peninsula Annual Conference.

Mrs. James (Eunice) K. Mathews was escorted to the chancel by the Rev. Mr. Dale Ruth, Superintendent of the Salisbury District, where she was introduced and welcomed to Peninsula Annual Conference.

Mrs. Clifford A. Armour, Jr., President of the Salisbury District Ministers' Wives Association, presented Mrs. Mathews with an orchid corsage from the Salisbury District Ministers' Wives Association.

Bishop and Mrs. Mathews spoke a few words of greeting to the Conference.

**OPENING:** Bishop James K. Mathews convened the Special Session of the Peninsula Annual Conference in Bethesda United Methodist Church, Salisbury.

Bishop Mathews announced that the Conference Secretary, the Rev. Mr. Clifford A. Armour, Jr., was not able to be present at this Session and asked for Conference approval that the Rev. Mr. George L. Stellges be named Acting Secretary. It was so moved, seconded and approved.

Motion by the Rev. Mr. George Stellges that the Rev. Mr. Gary Meekins be Assistant Secretary, seconded and approved.

**ORGANIZATION MOTION:** The following motion was presented by the Rev. Mr. George L. Stellges, Acting Secretary:

1. The special session of the Peninsula Annual Conference is called to consider the restructure proposal presented by the Conference Council on Ministries.
2. The bar of the Conference include the main floor (the Nave) of Bethesda United Church.
3. The roll call be taken by all members signing cards to be collected by the ushers.
4. Richard D. Bailey be named reporter for TOGETHER, other church papers, and press contact with the secular communications media.
5. The Conference minutes be made the official journal of the Conference and the Secretary be authorized to edit and condense the same.

6. The Secretary send greetings to all members not able to attend the Conference Session on the report of such cases by the Superintendents.
7. Members may be excused from the Session upon report to the Superintendents or the Secretary.
8. Motions, resolutions and recommendations for action must be presented to the Secretary on forms provided for this purpose, prior to, or at the time they are presented to the Conference. Forms will be found on the Secretary's desk and are also in the hands of the ushers.
9. That Kenneth M. Dickey be named Chairperson of the Ushers and Doorkeeper of the Session, and Carroll Scott be named his assistant; that they be assisted by the following members for this Session:

He moved its adoption. Seconded and approved.

**ROLL CALL:** Present: Ministers 173, Laity 128.

The Rev. Mr. Howell Wilkins, Wilmington District Superintendent, was granted personal privilege and announced that the Rev. Dr. Roy Tawes would be undergoing serious surgery in San Francisco, California, and he called upon the Conference for its individual and collective prayers for Dr. Tawes. The Rev. Mr. Dale Ruth, Superintendent of Salisbury District, under personal privilege announced the serious illness of the Rev. Messrs. Elmer Shield, Howard Truitt, and Carroll Justis, and called for the Conference prayers.

Bishop Mathews led the Conference in prayer for these men.

Dr. James Hardcastle, Chairperson of the Conference Council on Ministries, spoke briefly on the procedures involved in bringing the proposed restructure of Peninsula Annual Conference to its present form. He noted that the plan of restructure has the approval of the Conference Council on Ministries. He called upon the Rev. Mr. R. Jarvis Cooke, Conference Council Director, to present the plan.

The Rev. Mr. R. Jarvis Cooke presented the proposed restructure of the Peninsula Annual Conference and moved its adoption. Motion seconded. (Copy of restructure proposal attached to minutes.) The Rev. Mr. Cooke noted that the word Boards should read Work Areas.

Dr. Frank Chapman introduced the following amendment:

Your Conference Board of Laity recommends that the Conference Board of Laity report directly as a Board to the Conference Council of Ministries. We shall be glad to cooperate with the Work Area of Discipleship in their program discussions. We shall have our own program, however.

Seconded and approved.

The Rev. Mr. Otho Brewer, Jr., introduced the following amendment:

I move the addition of the Mutual Relief Association to the chart under Conference Committees.

Seconded and approved.

The Rev. Mr. Charles Barton introduced the following amendment:

I move that the Peninsula Methodist Federal Credit Union be indirectly related to the Program Area on Higher Education and Ministry.

Seconded and approved.

The vote on the original motion as amended was taken. The amended restructure proposal passed.

The Rev. Mr. Robert Kelley asked to be put on record as opposing the motion for restructure of the Peninsula Annual Conference.

The question was asked if copies of the amended chart would be made available. The Rev. Mr. Cooke answered in the affirmative.

There being no further business the Special Session of the Peninsula Annual Conference was declared adjourned at 3:40 p.m.

**PERSONAL PRIVILEGE:** Mrs. Orien Mangum requested personal privilege to thank the Conference for their support and honor they have given to her while she served as Conference President of the United Methodist Women. The Conference gave her a standing vote of thanks. A. Frank

**SECTION I CHURCH AND SOCIETY:** Bishop Mathews called for the report of the Study and Review Section Church and Society. Mr. Harold E. Owens, Secretary of the Section, presented the following report:

**BOARD OF CHURCH AND SOCIETY:** The Section voted to amend the recommendation to read that our funding and support for Project Equality be for a one-year period and that the sum of \$10,000 be in the budget for this purpose.

Charles E. Butler introduced a motion to delete the first paragraph of the report of the Board of Church and Society. After much discussion Bishop James K. Mathews ruled the motion out of order because the Conference cannot change the body of a report.

Bishop Mathews introduced the District Superintendents from the Baltimore Conference.

**ORDER OF THE DAY WAS CALLED SINCE IT WAS 10:30 a.m.**

Otho G. Brewer, Jr., certified the character of all the ministers. He spoke for the Cabinet.

**BOARD OF THE MINISTRY:** The report of the Peninsula Annual Conference of the Board of the Ministry was given by Edwin C. Thomas, Jr., and Jerrold Knotts. (For Report see the Disciplinary Questions). The report was accepted by the Conference.

**RECOGNITION OF RETIRING MEMBERS:** The following ministers and their spouses who are entering the retired relationship were presented to the Bishop and the Conference:

Each minister addressed the Conference and was presented with an appropriate certificate.

The class entering the probationary membership was presented to the Bishop and the Conference and were asked the disciplinary questions. Appropriate answers were given.

The class entering Full Conference Membership was presented to the Bishop and the Conference. Bishop Mathews asked the disciplinary questions. Appropriate answers were given.

The session was adjourned with prayer by Bishop Mathews. 2:00 P.M. Bishop James K. Mathews called the Conference to order with the singing of a hymn. The Rev. Mr. Charles B. Hart led the group in prayer.

Otho G. Brewer, Jr., Easton District Superintendent, presented the following resolutions:

**WHEREAS**, there is a piece of property on the Asquith Island Road, Crapo, Dorchester County, Maryland, formerly known as the Little Ebenezer Methodist Church, and

**WHEREAS**, both the church building and fellowship hall have both almost completely rotted away, and

**WHEREAS**, the United Methodist people of the area are more than adequately cared for by other nearby United Methodist Churches,

**THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED**, that the property be declared abandoned and be sold by the Trustees of the Conference with the proceeds from the sale thereof being given to the John Wesley United Methodist Church on Liners Road to Crapo, Dorchester County, Maryland.

**WHEREAS** there is an old cemetery in Landing Neck, Talbot County, Maryland which is on land formerly used as a place of worship for the Union Methodist Episcopal Church, and

**WHEREAS** this site was abandoned and the church building destroyed by fire many years ago, and

**WHEREAS** there has recently been formed a new corporation known as Landing Neck Cemetery Association, Inc. that desires to maintain and care for this old cemetery.

**THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED** that this land be declared abandoned and be sold for \$1 by the Trustees of the Conference to the Landing Neck Cemetery Association, Inc.

**WHEREAS**, the Trustees of the Trappe United Methodist Church have been responsible for the Upper Bambury Cemetery located approximately 2 miles East of the town of Trappe in Talbot County, State of Maryland, and

**WHEREAS**, there being no buildings on the property for the past 60 years, and

**WHEREAS**, the organized Upper Bambury Cemetery Association, Inc. have requested title to the property be passed to them in order to keep the cemetery in perpetual care.

**BE IT RESOLVED** the Trustees of Trappe United Methodist Church be granted authority by the Trustees of the Peninsula Annual Conference to grant title to above named Association for the cost of \$1.00.



Above request ordered and approved by Trustees of Trappe United Methodist Church in meeting 5/23/73.

WHEREAS there is a piece of property in Broad Neck in Kent County, Maryland, which formerly housed a place of worship known as the Kesley Chapel Methodist Protestant Church, and

WHEREAS the building and organization so long ago disappeared from the scene until today it is almost impossible to find anyone that remembers them,

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that the property be declared abandoned and be sold by the Trustees of the Conference with the proceeds from the sale thereof being given to the Salem United Methodist Church in Fairlee to be applied toward the mortgage on their educational building.

Each was voted on separately, and were passed by the Annual Conference.

Donald O. Hornung brought the report of the Council on Finance and Administration requested by the Conference on Wednesday afternoon. The Council on Finance and Administration and the Board of Pensions started a study soon after the Annual Conference of 1972. Based on the resolution passed by the 1972 Annual Conference which reads as follows and is found on page 154 of the 1972 Conference Journal,

"That the Peninsula Annual Conference asked the Commission on World Service and Finance and the Board of Pensions to seek a way by which 75% of the outstanding bill at the Nanticoke Hospital incurred by Joseph V. Holliday, Jr., a member of the Peninsula Annual Conference, to be paid by the Conference from necessitous funds or other available funds of the Peninsula Conference."

Our study revealed that the church Mr. Holliday was serving paid his salary for two years during his illness. He then took a disability relationship with the Conference and moved to Barratt's Chapel. This provided him with a house, utilities and a modest income from the Board of Pensions and the Conference paid his premium on the dependent coverage of the medical expense plan during the period of his disability.

It was revealed to us that the following medical expense benefits were made to him during his illness:

1968	\$ 84.75
1969	6,851.54
1970	964.20

	\$7,900.49

The maximum available under our plan at that time was \$7500. Thus, there was overpayment of \$400.49. In addition to the payment by the medical expense plan, there was an unpaid bill incurred by Mr. Holliday in the amount of \$5,359.80 at Nanticoke Hospital.

The Chairman of the Board of Pensions and the President of the Council on Finance and Administration visited Mr. Holliday to discuss his finan-

cial situation. Mr. Holliday received a gross settlement of \$13,000 from Selected Risks, out of which he paid doctor bills, but he did not pay the outstanding bill at Nanticoke Hospital, Seaford, Del. We were unable to determine why the hospital bill at Seaford was not paid from the settlement funds.

On reviewing his present financial situation, however, we could see that he is now unable to pay the bill at Nanticoke Hospital. Therefore, the Council on Finance and Administration, desiring to help Mr. Holliday in his present situation, agreed to pay 75% of the hospital bill, working out a convenient non-interest bearing arrangement of repayment.

The President of the Council on Finance and Administration wrote to the Reverend and Mrs. Joseph Holliday, informing them of the decision of the Council. Mr. Holliday replied to this proposal in a letter on April 4, 1973 as follows:

"We cannot accept the arrangement offered us. We have a better one with the hospital."

Because of the rejection of our proposal and the resolution made by the Annual Conference Yesterday that we report on this matter today, the Council on Finance and Administration met last night to restudy this whole situation. In our study, we reviewed a procedure that was adopted by the Committee on Administration of Ministers' Benefits on October 5, 1971, that was to be used in cases where medical expense exceeds policy limits.

The Council on Finance and Administration recommends that the following procedure be adopted by the Peninsula Annual Conference and be applied in the case of the Reverend Joseph V. Holliday and in all subsequent medical claims of this nature.

**Procedure for Paying a Medical Expense Claim that Exceeds the Progressive Maximum Provision in the Medical Expense Plan:**

1. The Minister's District Superintendent discuss with the Minister all aspects of the situation.
2. District Superintendent discuss with the Cabinet all facts developed and the Cabinet should concur in a recommended supplementary request to be made to the Committee on Administration of Ministers' Benefits.
3. The Cabinet Member on the Committee on Administration of Ministers' Benefits shall bring the recommendation of the Cabinet to a meeting of the Committee on Administration of Ministers' Benefits.
4. Committee on Administration of Ministers' Benefits will evaluate the case on its merits and determine if sufficient funds are available in the Ministers' Benefits account to grant the financial assistance as determined by the Committee on Administration of Ministers' Benefits.

(a) If the Ministers' Benefits account is deemed to be insufficient to handle the required amount, or if it appears that there may be a deficit within the current or following fiscal year if such funds are disbursed, the Committee on Administration of Ministers' Benefits would present its recommendation to the Council on Finance and Administration with a request that a supplemental appropriation be made to the Ministers' Benefits Fund when and if found necessary.

5. After funding is assured, the Chairman of the Committee on Administration of Ministers' Benefits should direct the Administrator to process the claim through the Insurance Company to determine the amount that would have been paid if there were no maximum benefit.

6. When the worksheet is received by the Administrator from the Insurance Company, the Administrator will then forward two copies of the worksheet with his authorization attached to the Business Office for issuance of a check to be charged to the Ministers' Benefit account.

7. The Business Office will forward the check together with a copy of the worksheet and authorization directly to the Minister.

Donald O. Hornung moved the adoption. Since it was from a Committee it carried its own second. After much discussion G. Wayne Cuff moved the question. Question seconded by W. H. Revelle, Jr. Passed. The report and recommendation were then before the Conference for vote. They were adopted as Conference policy to be used on the case of Joseph V. Holliday and all future cases. It was the understanding of the chair that 75% of the Holliday bill at Nanticoke Memorial Hospital will be paid.

**CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS:** The Conference considered the proposed constitutional amendments and the results of the voting are listed after each amendment.

The 1972 regular session of The General Conference of The United Methodist Church held in Atlanta, Georgia, approved the following amendments to the Constitution of The United Methodist Church and submitted them to the Annual Conferences for vote:

No. 1972-7

That the first paragraph of The Preamble of the Constitution be amended by deleting the word "men" in the second sentence and by substituting in its place the word "persons" so that the first paragraph of The Preamble of the Constitution as amended will read:

"The Church is a community of all true believers under the Lordship of Christ. It is the redeemed and redeeming fellowship in which the Word of God is preached by persons divinely called, and the Sacraments are duly administered according to Christ's own appointment. Under the discipline of the Holy Spirit the Church seeks to provide for the maintenance of worship, the edification of believers, and the redemption of the world."

That the first paragraph of Section II, Article I (Paragraph 13) be amended to read:

"The General Conference shall meet at such times and place as shall be determined by the General Conference or its duly authorized committees, but not more often than once in two consecutive years. That Section VII, Article I (Paragraph 36) be amended by adding a paragraph at the end thereof as follows:

"If the lay membership shall number less than the ministerial members of the Annual Conference, the Annual Conference shall, by its own formula, provide for the election of additional lay members to equalize lay and ministerial membership of the Annual Conference."

That Section VII, Article II (Paragraph 37) be amended by deleting the words "with the exception that the lay members may not vote on matters of ordination, character and conference relations of ministers" so that the paragraph as amended will read:

"The Annual Conference is the basic body in the church and as such shall have reserved to it the right to vote on all Constitutional Amendments, on the election of ministerial and lay delegates to the General and Jurisdictional or Central Conferences, on all matters relating to the character and conference relations of the ministerial members, and on the ordination of ministers and such other rights as have not been delegated to the General Conference under the Constitution. It shall discharge such duties and exercise such powers as the General Conference under the Constitution may determine."

That Section VII, Article V (Paragraph 40) be amended by deleting the words "provided that such delegates be at least twenty-one (21) years of age and" and substituting, therefore, the words "without regard to age, provided such delegates" so that the paragraph as amended will read:

"The lay delegates to the General Conference and to the Jurisdictional or Central Conferences shall be elected by the lay members of the Annual Conference or Provisional Annual Conference, without regard to age, provided such delegates shall have been members of one of the constituent churches forming this union or of the United Methodist Church for at least four years next preceding their election, and are members thereof within the Annual Conference electing them at the time of holding the General and Jurisdictional or Central Conferences.

That Division III, Article V (Paragraph 54) be amended by deleting in subunit (2) of the first paragraph thereof the words "he shall have given his specific consent" and substituting in their place the words "that bishop shall have specifically consented" and

by deleting in subunit (3) of the first paragraph thereof the words "he" and "him" and substituting in their place the words "the bishop" and

by deleting in the second paragraph thereof the word "him" and substituting in its place the words "the bishop" so that the paragraph as amended will read:

"The bishops shall have residential and presidential supervision in the Jurisdictional Conferences in which they are elected or to which they are transferred. Bishops may be transferred from one jurisdiction to another jurisdiction for presidential and residential supervision under the following conditions: (1) The transfer of bishops may be on either of two bases: (a) jurisdiction which receives a bishop by transfer from another jurisdiction may transfer to that jurisdiction or to a third jurisdiction one of its own bishops eligible for transfer, so that the number transferred in by each jurisdiction shall be balanced by the number transferred out, or (b) a jurisdiction may receive a bishop from another jurisdiction and not transfer out a member of its own College of Bishops. (2) No bishop shall be transferred unless that bishop shall have specifically consented. (3) No bishop shall be eligible for transfer unless the bishop shall have served one quadrennium in the jurisdiction which elected the bishop to the episcopacy. (4) All such transfers shall require the approval by a majority vote of the members, present and voting, of the Jurisdictional Conferences which are involved after consideration by the Committee on Episcopacy. After the above procedures have been followed, the transferring bishop shall become a member of the receiving College of Bishops and shall be subject to residential assignment by that Jurisdictional Conference.

"A bishop may be assigned by the Council of Bishops for presidential service or other temporary service in another jurisdiction than that which elected the bishop, provided request is made by a majority of the bishops in the jurisdiction of the proposed services.

"In the case of an emergency in any jurisdiction or Central Conference through the death or disability of a bishop or other cause, the Council of Bishops may assign a bishop from another jurisdiction or Central Conference with the consent of a majority of the bishops of that jurisdiction or Central Conference."

That Division III, Article VII (Paragraph 56) be amended by deleting in the first paragraph thereof the words "him" and "his" and substituting in their place respectively the words "the bishop" and "the"

and by deleting in the second sentence of the second paragraph the words "Each bishop shall report in writing annually all his decisions of law" and substituting in their place the words "All decision of law made by each bishop shall be reported in writing annually" so that the paragraph as amended will read:

"A bishop presiding over an Annual, Central, or Jurisdictional Conference shall decide all questions of law coming before the bishop in the regular business of a session; provided that such questions be presented in writing and that the decision be recorded in the journal of the conference.

"Such an episcopal decision shall not be authoritative except for the pending case until it shall have been passed upon by the Judicial Council. All decisions of law made by each bishop shall be reported in writing annually, with a syllabus of the same, to the Judicial Council, which shall affirm, modify, or reverse them.

**ELECTION OF ADDITIONAL LAY MEMBERS:** Amendment 1972-9 calls for equalization of clergy and lay members of the Annual Conference. A. Frank Chapman moved that "this matter be referred to the Council of Ministries in cooperation with the Conference Board of Laity". Seconded and Passed.

**MUTUAL RELIEF ASSOCIATION:** The Corporate Session of the Mutual Relief Association was called to order by Lawrence E. Wimbrow, Vice President. The Secretary, George E. Goodley, made the following report:

The Annual Meeting of the Board of Directors of the Mutual Relief Association was held in Dover, Delaware on May 22, 1973.

During the past Conference Year three (3) claims were paid. Thirty-eight (38) members are now on the roll.

**STUDY AND REVIEW SECTION #1: CHURCH AND SOCIETY:** The Conference returned to consideration of the report of Study and Review Section #1—Church and Society. Harold E. Owens presented the report:

Charles E. Butler moved "that the Peninsula Annual Conference disagree with the action taken by the Board of Church and Society in paragraph one of their report as printed in the pre-conference journal." Seconded. The motion carried 198 to 93.

## COMMISSION ON ARCHIVES AND HISTORY

Study and review section voted Consent:

Conference voted approval.

## COMMISSION ON ARCHIVES AND DISTORY

The Study and review section voted to concur with the following recommendation:

In our Annual Report to the Peninsula Conference we delineated the scope of the restoration and repair of Barratt's Chapel. The contract for the same has been fulfilled and most of the work necessitated by the installation of a new heating system has been done.

On May 15, 1973, the Commission on Archives and History met at Barratt's Chapel to review the contract, to approve work order changes, and to inspect the work completed to date. All work has been performed and completed in the most acceptable manner and the Contractors are worthy of commendations.

In addition we passed the following resolution:

WHEREAS, all work to date at Barratt's Chapel has been done within the mandate of prior authorization of both the Commission and the Conference, and

WHEREAS, both the interior and the exterior, except for the roof, of Barratt's Chapel have been restored, and

WHEREAS, the Commission wants to preserve the present restoration and extend its years of acceptability, and

WHEREAS, the roof of Barratt's Chapel, which last year was evaluated to be functional for a few years, has begun to leak while the restoration is in progress, and

WHEREAS, the present roof has several layers of roofing, making it difficult or impossible to stop the leaks by patching, and according to construction engineers should not have another roof on top because the additional weight will be dead weight on the rafters and will add constant distress to the standing walls, and

WHEREAS, the new roof should be wood shingles in keeping with the antiquity and restoration of the Chapel and wood shingles should not be put over asphalt roofing because there exists the problem of inadequate nailing capability, curling and pulling of shingles, locked-in moisture, poor drying, and rapid deterioration, and

WHEREAS, the present roof must be removed carefully by sections down to the laths and rafters so as not to damage any of the completed restoration and repair;

THEREFORE, be it resolved that the Peninsula Conference authorize the Executive Officers of the Commission on Archives and History to borrow an additional amount, not to exceed \$10,000.00, to replace the roof of Barratt's Chapel with wood shingles for reasons aforementioned.

(Contingent upon authorization of the Peninsula Conference or other appropriate funding the Commission will proceed to remove and replace the present roof of Barratt's Chapel.)

The Commission on Archives and History recommends to the Peninsula Annual Conference that Charles E. Covington be designated and elected as Conference Historian and that he be made an ex-officio without vote member of the Conference Commission on Archives and History.

The Conference voted approval.

## RESOLUTION ON WATERGATE

The study and review section voted to concur by the following resolution introduced by James W. Riley:

Submitted to Peninsula Annual Conference in session at Wesley College, Dover, Delaware, May 22, 1973.

In light of the scandal brought forth through the Watergate investigation, and the possibility of a criminal act having been perpetrated against the American people, and the serious question this investigation raised concerning the honesty and integrity of the office of the Chief Executive of the United States of America:

We recommend that this session of the Peninsula Annual Conference of the United Methodist Church communicate to Richard M. Nixon, President of the United States of America, our deep concern for the rights of the American public to know the truth concerning Watergate and to communicate our detestation of such occurrences.

The Honorable Marvin E. Smith introduced the following substitute:

BE IT RESOLVED by Peninsula Annual Conference of the United Methodist Church that the President of the United States of America be, and he is, urged to pursue his announced Resolve, that all aspects of the Watergate situation be fully and completely investigated to the end that duly constituted authority may proceed promptly to prosecute any persons revealed by such investigation to have violated the law.

The substitute was approved and became the main motion and was approved. The secretary was directed to send a copy to President Richard M. Nixon.

The following Resolution was referred to the Conference Council on Ministries and the Council on Finance and Administration by the concurrence of the section.

In view of the critical urgencies of the Bishop's Call for Peace and Self-Development of Peoples, we ask Peninsula Conference from the Con-

tingency fund of the Conference to appropriate \$2,000 supplement funding for this program for the remainder of this Conference year and that we ask Pacem in Terris to help with this program.

No. Voting—105 Yes—48 No—1 Abstain—1

The Conference voted to refer also.

The study and review section voted to concur in the following.

Follow the lead of various churches all over the country and express concern to corporations involved. Holding of stock in any corporation that does business in Southern Africa should be used to influence policies in any way possible. If improvements aren't made, stock should be sold in protest.

Actions such as the boycott of Gulf Oil should be considered. The address of the Gulf Boycott Coalition is: Box 123, D.V. Station, Dayton, Ohio 45406.

Concerned people in the Netherlands started a drive which resulted in their governments' policy of refusing to buy coffee from the slave-labor camps of Angola. The coffee quota for America comes up this fall. Perhaps an effort to let congressmen know of our concern could bring similar action here. Also coming up shortly in congress will be the SUGAR QUOTA, whereby we guarantee the purchase of a pre-

determined amount of South Africa's sugar crop. As in the case of Angolan coffee, the sugar is harvested under slave-type conditions. In both cases demand can easily be met by purchasing more from other countries.

No. Voting—105 Yes—48 No—10 Abstain—2

The Conference voted to refer.

The Study and Review section voted to concur in:

WHEREAS the Byrd Amendment permits the United States to trade with Rhodesia which is in opposition to the United Nations, and also supports racism in that country.

BE IT RESOLVED that this Conference oppose the Byrd Amendment and be it further resolved that the Conference Secretary request our congresspersons and senators to vote for the REPEAL OF THE BYRD AMENDMENT.

No. Voting—105 Yes—41 No—15 Abstain—8

The Conference defeated the Resolution.

The study and review section voted to concur in the following introduced by John C. Massimilla and Gruce Roberts:

WHEREAS some members of the legislative bodies of the State of Delaware and Maryland have stated that the churches and church members have been silent on matters of legislation which are not in accord with the teachings of the church.

BE IT RESOLVED that the Peninsula Annual Conference urge its churches and church members to make verbal and written communications to the state legislatures of Maryland and Delaware offering a Biblical and Christian perspective particularly upon the issue of State lotteries, and other forms of gambling and the lowering of the drinking age.

The Conference voted approval and directed the secretary to send the resolution to all appropriate authorities.

## VII

### REPORTS

#### (a) District Superintendents

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Bishop Mathews, members of the Peninsula Annual Conference, and Christian friends:

We have been exceedingly fortunate during this past year to have as our resident Bishop, James K. Mathews, scholar, pastor, and Christian gentleman.

Being a continuing student his search for knowledge throughout his life has kept him abreast of the changing currents of intellectual thought. He knows what the best minds are thinking on the important subjects of our day, and from that storehouse of ripe, rich scholarship, confident faith in the eternal God and his salvation through Jesus Christ and extensive travel have come a teaching ministry not only for Superintendents and pastors but also for the Laity.

His pastoral leadership and concern is evidenced by his extensive traveling all over the Conference during the past few months. He has literally met thousands of people and visited at least one church on every charge throughout the Peninsula. His warmth and interest in people has done more to remove the idea of the remoteness of the Bishop from the local church than anything that I have ever seen since I have been in the ministry.

The qualities that make up a Christian gentleman have shown in all of our meetings with him and will be much in evidence during this session of the Annual Conference.

It is our purpose at this time to lift up three pressing and most misunderstood problems that face us on all four Districts and to offer some guidelines as to possible solutions or at least steps in the right direction.

These are:

1. **Realignments**—This is not something new but has been a constant process ever since the first circuit was ever formed. It is an attempt to provide the very best pastoral leadership possible to every single United Methodist Church. This is not the old idea of stringing a series of small weak churches together but is today the goal of combinations in which stronger and larger churches and small churches help each other. This is resulting in better pastoral and lay leadership usually at less cost which is a combination hard to beat. Two facts should be noted:

- 1) Many strong larger churches and their pastors have not realized that it is to their advantage to help strengthen the smaller churches around them. They have too long been hung

up on the prestige idea of a station church. However, a careful analysis of their membership will reveal that a vast majority of these received their initial Christian training in one of these smaller churches. A sudden drastic reduction in these training grounds would show up in declining membership in the larger churches in about ten years and would be drastic in twenty years.

- 2) A charge needs a **minimum** of 350 members if it is to meet its financial obligations without constantly harping about money. A church or charge whose every thought and energy is directed toward raising money is already in a self-defeating situation. It does not have enough time or energy left to proclaim the Gospel of Jesus Christ and to seek to change lives which is its reason for being.
2. **Limited Service Churches**—There are far too many churches in our Districts which have from ten to forty members with an average attendance of from five to twenty people at worship services. They are simply engaged in a struggle for survival and losing the battle slowly but surely as their numbers decrease by death and other causes. In the old days, we would have simply closed them. Today, we try to be more sensitive to the needs and wishes of people. Most of these churches struggle because of their love of the church building and their desire to see it remain. While some would question this as a worthy motive for being, it is a fact that needs to be faced. We believe that the designation of a church as a **limited service church** allows the people to keep the building which is their primary objective.

Over twenty churches have taken this route over the last four years and we outline here the steps involved in case others may not be aware of this procedure.

These are:

- 1) All salary and conference apportionments are removed.
- 2) The church drops out of the listing of churches to which pastors are assigned.  
(We urge the conference to begin a listing of such churches in the Journal with the charge conference where they are to report each year. This will allow for proper records and continue the historic continuity of these churches.)
- 3) The only services to be held are weddings, funerals, or special occasions.
- 4) One or more special services a year may be held with the offering received to be used for the upkeep of the building.
- 5) The remaining members are transferred to a nearby United Methodist church for regular worship and church involvement.
- 6) The remaining members become a special committee under the charge conference to plan with the pastor for weddings,

funerals, and special days. They also present a written report each year as to services held, money received and how expended, etc.

- 7) This allows the possibility that should population shifts bring people into the area we would simply resume regular services.

### 3. Inclusiveness

We are committed to the idea of an inclusive church—black and white working together. We are heartened at the fine level of cooperation and brotherhood at the conference and district level but we are quite concerned when we come to the local church level. We often say and rightly so that it is at the local church level where the action is. It must happen there or it does not happen at all. It is still true that in far too many local communities there is very little real communication between our black and white congregations. If we are to build bridges of understanding and cooperation and combat the ugly fact of racism, we must begin now at the local level. We strongly urge the following voluntary minimum actions be considered by pastors and administrative boards:

- 1) An exchange of pastors at least twice a year and preferably once a quarter.
- 2) Unified vacation church schools.
- 3) Unified study courses by the United Methodist Women.
- 4) Any other ideas that would fit the needs of your specific locality such as prayer groups, senior citizens, etc.

In conclusion, we cannot emphasize too strongly that these three ideas—**REALIGNMENTS, LIMITED SERVICE CHURCHES, INCLUSIVENESS**—pastors, superintendents, and bishop, all need to be involved together in all need plenty of consideration and a meeting of the minds. The people, the decision making **BEFORE** a decision is finalized. This also cannot be done with one meeting but takes time and several meetings. While this will take a lot of work, it may well be the best possible way we could ever spend our time.

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### DOVER DISTRICT

**Sickness:**

Sickness on the Dover District has not been as extensive this year as it was last year, but it has still invaded many homes in the Dover District family. Twelve ministerial homes, and many lay homes have suffered from varying kinds and intensities of sickness. At this report there is at least one person still hospitalized.

**Births and Deaths:**

For the first time, our deaths have outnumbered the births on the District.

One child, a daughter named Christie Carol, was born to Rev. and Mrs. Robert Starrett on Christmas Day, December 25, 1972.

During the Conference year, our hearts were saddened by the deaths of four members of our District family. Those who have gone on to receive their just rewards are:

**Buildings and Improvements:**

Throughout the District, many charges have made significant improvements in their parsonages, church buildings and education building.

Woodland Church on the Seaford-Reliance Charge, and Epworth Church on the Rehoboth Beach Charge both are in the process of planning educational buildings.

Wyoming Church dedicated its educational building and Whatcoat church in Dover is planning to erect a new church building.

St. John's Church in Seaford consecrated its new Church Building with Bishop Mathews officiating.

Salem Church in Selbyville has completed its new parsonage.

**Increases in Pastor's Salary and Travel:**

Many of the charges on the District have attempted to keep pace with the spiralling cost of living, and have given their pastors moderate increases in salary and travel. The total approximates \$12,000.00 for the Dover District.

**Other Pertinent Information:**

Whatcoat's (Dover) Low Rent Housing Development is completed, and at this writing is about 100% occupied.

A "We Care" Evangelistic Program was carried out on the District with encouraging results. This is one of the new forms of evangelism that has proved valuable. Evangelism has been stressed throughout the District with special emphasis being given to the "Key 73" program.

Stewardship, and Every Member Commitment programs have been held on the District also.

No new realignments were effected this year, but there is hope that several will be effected in the coming year.

I wish to express my thanks to the men and women of the District for their loyal support, for without them this report would not have been possible.

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**EASTON DISTRICT**

OTHO G. BREWER, Jr. District Superintendent

It is not necessary for this to be a lengthy report since the accomplishments of the pastors and churches as recorded elsewhere in this Journal show very clearly the healthy state of affairs on the Easton District. Our District usually leads the conference in percentage of apportionment paid, salary increases, cooperation with the conference program, laity participations, etc. Much of this is due to the fact that we are getting away from the idea of how best to get people to serve and build the church and are returning to the early idea of how best for the church to meet the needs of people. Our Lord and Saviour, Jesus Christ, loved people and gave himself for them. His church should do the same. The strange fact is that when a church does lose itself in service to people, it has less problems in reaching its budget, less internal strife, etc. In short, the church is actually strengthened as an institution when it becomes "people centered."

The prediction was made in this report last year that three of the five counties of the Easton District would pay their apportionments in full in 1972.

Caroline, Dorchester, and Talbot counties made this a fact. This is but an example of the tremendous debt of gratitude I owe my brethren in the ministry and laity for their hearty cooperation in all the plans and policies of the District.

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**SALISBURY DISTRICT**

DALE L. RUTH, District Superintendent

On behalf of the ministers and churches of the Salisbury District I present this report, and in appreciation to those who have served in churches as pastors and lay persons, and especially to our new Bishop J. K. Mathews, who has made calls on so many of us, for his concern and devotion.

It has been a great honor and privilege to serve with the people of the District and Conference, working together to see much accomplished for Christ and His Church.

I commend our people and pastors for their response to the District and Conference Program. At the close of our year, December 31, we had paid 70% of the amount apportioned to the District for the mission outreach, conference projects and the administration of the Conference. Last year

we were happy that we had for the second time reached 96%. This year we gained a percentage point.

In addition to this many churches have made significant renovations, and improvements to buildings, contributed to local community projects and also paid off old indebtedness. Several new projects, both large and small, have been started but not yet completed.

Thirty-one of the fifty-six charges have seen the need to raise salary and travel of their minister to help meet the need of increased costs of living. Together they have increased a sum total of \$23,643. Only seven charges will be receiving some type of aid as of June 1st.

Realignments which brought about such an improvement in seven charges last year, in improvement of services, interest, new buildings, as well as increased salaries for pastors, have again seen improvement and increased salaries this year. This has led to others seeking the same kind of arrangement.

Responding to the report of a year ago that many churches had received no members at all during the year, I will have to report the record is not greatly improved this year. Seventy-three churches received no persons into the fellowship.

On the positive side, our District not only experienced no loss in membership this year but had a net gain of 180. This is an improvement over the past three years. Seventy of our churches received into the membership a total of 662 persons.

Our District United Methodist Women is the largest in the Conference (4471) and expended more than any other on Local Work and Community Activities (\$71,159). To our retiring president, Mrs. W. O. Thomas, for her faithful and courageous efforts in promoting the work of the district we extend our congratulations.

Worship Service attendance average and number of youth in Church School activities is the highest in the conference. We have the second largest number of ongoing classes and groups for learning.

A Lay School Speakers course was held and 80 persons completed the course for Certification and Recertification.

A Lay School of Religion was held on the District in cooperation with several other denominations.

Three well attended Communion Breakfasts were held on the District for Laity and Ministers. Our offerings were given for scholarships at Seaford Manor House.

It is with a deep sense of gratitude we come to the close of our fifth year together on the district, for the working together, the friendship and for the difficult things shared together wherein we have grown. Bishop Mathews, we are grateful for your leadership to our church, for your vision and Christian concern, for your visits and proclamation of the word which have won the commendation of both Lay and Clergy of our churches. May God richly bless you in the years ahead.

As we move together beyond the Conference Session let us go, knowing that; ". . . they that wait upon the Lord shall renew their strength; they shall mount up with wings as eagles; they shall run and not be weary; and they shall walk, and not faint."

## WILMINGTON DISTRICT

HOWELL O. WILKINS, District Superintendent

First, let me express appreciation for the support and encouragement I received in serving the Wilmington District. Pastors and families, the lay people, the superintendents, Bishop James K. Mathews, the Conference Staff, my secretary, and my wife all have made possible whatever ministry I have been able to offer.

Many things are happening. Our Bishop's traveling through the district and speaking on several occasions has made the general church more visible. Goal setting and program planning is now becoming the acceptable way for the churches to discover their unique ministry, their own personality, and their way to express it. The District Assembly and the Conference Staff are helping the churches develop clusters of cooperating congregations. Some areas are in a stronger position to minister because of mergers like Ezion and Mt. Carmel, Peninsula and McCabe; cooperative parishes like South New Castle County and West Cecil Parish; and ecumenical ministries like with the Presbyterian Church in Chesapeake City. Other aspects of ecumenical ventures are found in the united campus ministry at the University of Delaware, the congregation to be established with the Presbyterians and Episcopalians later in the year at Glasgow, and the renewal of the DelMarVa Ecumenical Agency, which is developing significant new thrusts.

I am disappointed that we have not yet achieved the goal of inter-racial staffs even though some churches expressed a desire to do so. The Methodist Action Program made significant gains but it again in less than a year without an executive director. The dedication to the task of ministry to the urban area however, has good support and the work will continue.

There was one birth in the district ministers' families. On June 9, 1972, a son, Chad Forrest, was born to Rev. and Mrs. Norman Poultney. There was also one wedding. Rev. James P. Walz and Miss Peggy Clouser were married in Greenwood U. M. Church on December 9, 1972.

It is sad to report one death. Mrs. Ethel C. Wright, widow of Rev. Harry Wright, died February 23, 1973.

Let us follow the admonition of St. Paul when he urged us to be a living sacrifice for Him.

## (b) Boards, Commissions and Committees

### SECTION I

#### I. CHURCH AND SOCIETY

##### BOARD OF CHURCH AND SOCIETY

###### A. Division of World Peace

I. The Board voted unanimously in the month of January to commend the Rev. Ronald Arms for his refusal to pay a portion of his federal income



taxes as a protest against the Vietnam war. The Board recognized this as a courageous act on the part of Rev. Arms and as an authentic Christian witness.

Our World Peace Division Chairman, Richard Turner, stated that at no time in recent history has the need been greater for a searching study of the causes of war and the conditions of peace. Our nation has been torn apart by an unpopular war which has polarized many in our society on the issues of war and peace.

The issues must be seen as more than political issues. They are moral and religious questions which merit serious study by the committed Christian.

In order to implement the Bishops' Call for Peace and Self-Development of Peoples, the following program was adopted by the Board:

- a. Pacem in Terris is to be the agent for implementing a program under the supervision of the Board of Church and Society.
- b. Local congregations will be called upon to examine the causes of war and the forces which work for peace.
- c. Peace-making projects in the local church will be encouraged.
- d. The Board suggests that peace be a central focus in worship services in the churches of the Conference.

#### B. Division of General Welfare

I. Charman C. Edwin Lasbury has labored with the Emergency Services Unit (New Castle County, Del.) in cooperation with "Emergency Preparedness", a DEA Task Force which is related to our Board. The priority needs are aid to families with dependent children, and adequate income maintenance.

II. Liaison persons have been selected for legislative monitoring: Jerrold Knotts for Maryland and Grover Johnson for Delaware. Mr. Knotts maintains contact with a full-time staff person of the Baltimore Annual Conference.

This system will enable the Board to keep local churches and the Conference informed of pending legislation.

III. The division has continuing concerns for programs and projects related to drugs, alcohol, population and ecology.

#### C. Division of Human Relations

I. The Board will continue to support and fund the Inter-racial Retreats held at Drayton Manor for the purpose of better human and racial relations within the Conference.

II. Under the Chairman, Calvin Byrd, the Board will continue its concern in housing discrimination and employment patterns.

#### D. Division of Emerging Social Issues

I. This division is new by action of the General Conference. Richard Stazesky is the chairman. This committee seems to over-lap the other divisions and at the same time undergird the entire program. More study will be given to this division for its future function.

We have moved forward in some areas, but regretfully we have moved slowly during this past year. Hopefully the Board of Church and Society will be in the next quadrennium a contributing force for better life in our church and in our society.

#### Recommendations

I. The Board recommends that our funding and support for Project Equality be extended for a one-year period and that the sum of \$10,000 be in the budget for this purpose.

#### REPORT OF THE PENINSULA CONFERENCE COMMISSION ON RELIGION AND RACE

The Conference Commission on Religion and Race is the newest organizational body in the Peninsula Conference. Authority for its organization was a result of legislation enacted at the last General Conference.

The Annual Conference membership has followed the principle of membership as found in the General Conference Commission on Religion and Race. The majority of the Annual Conference membership represents the ethnic minorities within the Conference. Specifically the Conference Commission is composed of the following: **5 blacks, 1 Asian, 1 Indian, 1 Spanish-Surnamed, 1 Moor and 3 White** members. Among this total are **3 women**.

Much of our first year has been spent in attempting to study our responsibilities and establish some priorities. We recognized the very important responsibilities assigned us, and at the same time faced the reality that we could not do them all at once. Therefore, we elected for the first year's priority two goals which we felt were attainable, and which would provide us with the framework with which to do many of the other tasks with which we have been charged.

#### Goals

- 1) To examine ethnic minority and female representation on all Conference boards, agencies, commissions and committees.
- 2) To provide a channel of assistance to racial and ethnic minority groups as they seek to develop programs of empowerment and ministry to their communities.

This report of our examination of membership represents the committee's best efforts at accuracy. We recognize that there may be some degree of inaccuracy, because in some areas the information was not available, however we believe that any difference is very minimal and would have very little effect on the over-all picture either way.

### **Ethnic Minority and Female Representation on Boards, Agencies and Committees.**

The largest ethnic minority is composed of the Black membership.

There is also one Indian congregation in the Conference as well as one Moor congregation.

We have not identified any totally Asian or Spanish-Surnamed congregations. However, these two ethnic minorities are represented in terms of membership in the other congregations.

The numerical survey was of 703 positions with the following breakdown:

- 479 positions held by Whites
- 125 positions held by Blacks
- 4 Positions held by the other minorities
- 95 positions held by Women

Of the 43 Boards, Agencies, Commissions and Committees surveyed:

- 10 had no female representation
- 1 had no Black representation
- 42 had none of the other minorities represented

The Commission on Religion and Race commends the Nominating Committee for the diligence displayed in this area and encourages their continued consideration be given to assure opportunities for participation by all segments of the Conference on Boards and Agencies.

It is recommended that local churches increase their assistance to the Nominating Committee by submitting names for consideration.

### **Programs of Empowerment and Ministry to Communities**

Thus far, the Commission has participated in the Evaluation of one request to the National Commission on Religion and Race. The Commission is available for consultation and to assist minority groups who wish to develop proposals for consideration by the National Commission.

Much time has been devoted to the study of the needs of the Spanish-speaking community in Wilmington, Delaware. There is an estimated population of between 6,000 and 7,000 in the area. Presently there is very little ministry or outreach to this rather sizable community.

As a result of our study, the Commission has referred our findings and preliminary suggested plans for a program to the Conference Board of Missions for consideration and implementation.

### **Other**

The Commission on Religion and Race is very mindful of the many other very important areas for which we have responsibility, and we plan to give these areas our attention in the next year.

We would hope that local churches would acquaint themselves with the role and responsibility of the Commission on Religion and Race, and utilize our services in any manner in which it is felt we can assist.

### **COMMISSION ON ARCHIVES AND HISTORY**

The 192nd Anniversary of Barratt's Chapel was observed on November 12, 1972, with special services in Trinity United Methodist Church, Frederica, Delaware. The Rev. Dr. Robert H. Parker, President of Wesley College, Dover, Delaware, was the guest speaker. The Chancel Choir of Whatcoat United Methodist Church, Camden, Delaware, sang.

The Peninsula Conference Board of Laity conducted a series of Sunday evening Worship Services in Barratt's Chapel during July and August and are planning the same for 1973. Dr. A. Frank Chapman and the Curator will coordinate the details. Churches and choirs who desire to participate may contact them.

Rev. and Mrs. Harvey B. Flater have served as Curator of Barratt's Chapel and Museum since June 1972. The Chapel and Museum are open daily except Mondays from 9:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. during May to September, by appointment during the fall and spring, and closed from Christmas through February. All requests for the use of and special services in the Chapel must be coordinated with the Curator or the President. Gratuities for the use of Barratt's Chapel for Weddings is \$25.00.

The N.E. Jurisdictional Commission on Archives and History was held October 10-12, 1972, in Harrisburg, Pennsylvania. Rev. Charles E. Covington representing the Peninsula Conference Commission on Archives and History. As a part of the program a bus took the group on a tour of the historic and famous churches of the United Brethren Church in Central Pennsylvania (Neidig Memorial Church, Bohiems Chapel, Hans Herr House, Issac Long Barn, Albright Memorial Chapel, and others) and to Dickinson College, Carlisle, Pa., where we visited the rare books section of the Library and saw the arrangement of the Central Pennsylvania Conference archives. Rev. Earl E. Kerstetter read a paper on Methodism in Central Pennsylvania, Rev. D. Homer Kerdall read a paper on the United Brethren in Christ, and Rev. Earl H. Kauffman read a paper on the Evangelical Association. The next N. E. Jurisdictional session will be held at Mt. Manresa Retreat House, Staten Island, N. Y., in October 1973.

The Heritage Tour of England did not go in the Fall of 1972 due to a lack of interest. The Commission voted not to sponsor future tours because promotional expenses are not recouped unless the response is positive.

The Commission on Archives and History has a subordinate Historical Society, which has open membership to individuals, families, churches, and church organizations. The annual dues are \$5.00. Funds received will be used to promote interest in the study and preservation of the history of the United Methodist Church and its antecedents, to cooperate with the agents of the Church to promote historical interests of the Church, to promote Methodist history in general and history of Methodism on the DelMarVa Peninsula in particular, to preserve Barratt's Chapel and to establish and maintain Barratt's Chapel Museum as a repository for church records, artifacts, appointments, and other paraphernalia for posterity.

Realizing the importance of Barratt's Chapel in the religious and social history of the Peninsula, the directors made application for Barratt's Chapel to be placed on the National Register of Historical Places. In October

1972 the U. S. Department of Interior declared Barratt's Chapel to be a significant part of our American Heritage, worthy of preservation for the enjoyment of future generations, and placed it on the National Register of Historical Places. Old Union M. E. Church near Townsend on U.S. 13 was accepted, also; and the applications of Carey's Campmeeting Grounds and Barratt's Homestead are pending. We are now seeking to have Barratt's Chapel placed upon the National Register of Historical Sites of the American Revolution through the National Survey of Historical Sites and Buildings. This is a more exclusive register and no Methodist Church, to our knowledge, has received such honor; but we feel that Barratt's Chapel has a good chance to be elected.

The Commission on Archives and History of the United Methodist Church, Lake Junaluska, N. C., will print a ten page accordian fold, two color, brochure on the United Methodist shrines to supplement the four color pamphlet, "The 14 Historical Shrines of the United Methodist Church." Our pictures and manuscript for the face and the back section have been accepted.

At the 1972 Peninsula Conference session the Commission on Archives and History was authorized to borrow up to \$35,000 and to proceed with the repair and restoration of Barratt's Chapel. A mortgaged loan was negotiated with the Farmer's Bank of Delaware and a contract was signed with William Nelson Potter, Wilmington, Delaware, according to the specifications of John F. McCune, III, A.I.A., Wilmington, Delaware.

The exterior was restored by (1) removing the stucco on the cemetery side; (2) toothing-out decayed mortar, repairing or replacing damaged bricks, and pointing up all mortar joints on the front and both side walls; (3) removing and rebuilding the entire pulpit wall in brick, bond, and mortar as close as possible to the existing building, using as much brick as practical from the demolished wall; (4) applying two coats of silicone water proofing to all four walls; and (5) painting all woodwork. The interior will be restored by (1) plastering the pulpit wall, (2) sanding and refinishing the floor, and (3) painting all walls and woodwork except the benches. The cost of the above work was \$39,500.00. In addition to the planned expenditures we had to rebuild the heater pit, install a new heating plant, build a new access entrance, and construct new window and door units for an increased cost of approximately \$5,000.00.

In December letters were sent to the Minister and the Conference Lay Delegate of each charge and to the Lay Leader of each church requesting each pastoral charge to make a contribution towards the repair and restoration of Barratt's Chapel. If each of the pastoral charges of the Peninsula Conference will give as little as \$10.00 per quarter for the next four years, we will exceed our need. Letters were sent to visitors and friends who had signed the guest registers in the last two or three years.

Gifts may be given in memory of or in honor of Loved Ones or Friends as memorials for either the Building Fund or an Endowment Fund. Two books of memorials will be maintained at Barratt's Chapel Museum in which all donors—Churches, Organizations, Individuals—will be carefully recorded. We urge you to check with your Church leaders and be sure

you have responded. On March 1st we had received \$3,075 for the Building Improvements and \$85.00 for the Endowment Fund. Please make all checks payable to "Barratt's Chapel" and mail them to the Peninsula Conference Business Office at 44 North State Street, Dover, Delaware, 19901.

Mrs. Mary A. Andrews, Bridgeport, Pennsylvania, bequeathed the sum of \$300.00 to Barratt's Chapel, according to the letter of July 30, 1972.

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## SECTION II

### II. DISCIPLESHIP

#### BOARD OF EDUCATION

In the first year of a new quadrennium the Peninsula Annual Conference Board of Education has reorganized and is moving in new directions. Following the 1972 Annual Conference the Reverend Harold P. Spedden was elected Chairman, Mr. Thomas A. Jeter, Vice Chairman, and the Reverend Kendall McCabe, Secretary. In January of 1973 all office and staff costs were transferred from the budget of the Board to the Conference Council on Ministries budget leaving a clear figure of program monies to be used at the Board's discretion.

The Annual Conference restructuring plan moved Camp PeCoMeth and Conference Committee on Higher Education out of the area of responsibility of the Board of Education. Christian Education Sunday will continue to focus on Camp PeCoMeth with the full support of this Board. The promotion for this event will now be under the auspices of the new Conference Council Committee on Camps and Retreat Centers.

#### Set Free To Minister

In the new structure of the Church this Annual Conference Board has been set free from many of the management details administered heretofore and is now more properly focused on designing and planning for the educational needs of the Annual Conference. In order to more fully facilitate the Council on Ministries concept we will recommend to and receive assignments from the Conference Council on Ministry. The scope of this Board is not limited to the Church Schools of the Conference only, although this remains one of our major concerns. Our attention can now be focused on helping the local church with leadership development, teacher recruitment and training, confirmation training, curriculum resources, long range planning and Council on Ministries leadership. Our Board has structured its committees around these emphases and is now at work in these areas. At present, a study has begun to determine the current needs for training for local church leadership. We have set three immediate goals for 1973 as shown in Council on Ministries report. We also continue as the certifying agency, in conjunction with the General Church Board of Discipleship, for Ministers and Directors and Associates in Education and Music.

### Program Staff

The entire program staff of the Conference Council on Ministries is available for leadership training in the area of Education. One staff member, J. Gordon Stapleton, is specifically assigned to this Board and serves as the Conference Director of Education for liaison with the national Board of Discipleship. Mr. Stapleton is the contact person for local churches in the areas of church school problems, surveys, and designs for educational ministries.

### Some Highlights

During the past year more than fifty of our local churches were visited for consultations and resource briefings. Leadership schools have been designed and organized with conference staff assistance and assistance has been given to churches seeking leader development in the area of the Council on Ministries and Administrative Boards. Five new persons began the process of laboratory certification this year with Conference support to help rebuild our dwindling supply of certified leaders who assist local churches. Vacation Church School Workshops were conducted and two workshops are planned and staffed to assist churches in the coming summer.

In March a special coaching conference for twelve leaders from black churches was conducted by the Board in cooperation with the Black Ministries Program of the Conference Council. The present indications are that most of these persons will become certified as trainers for leadership schools.

New resources are constantly in production and may be seen at the Conference Council Office. When feasible, samples are supplied to ministers through the Conference Coordinated Mailing. Films and filmstrips are being added to the Conference Library in the area of Education and new listings are now available in the Audio Visual Catalogue Supplement.

Two Church School Leaders Weekends were again sponsored by the Board. Most of the design and planning for this enterprise is in the hands of a corps of dedicated laymen selected each year from the participants. Again this year as in the past they produced outstanding programs of training for local church leaders.

New Curriculum is on the way. Plans are now complete to introduce the new adult resource "Our Living Bible" in June of this year. A new youth curriculum will be ready in the fall.

Day-by-day contact with local churches seeking information, resources and assistance with current problems is provided through the Conference office. Many churches are taking advantage of this service. We hope more churches will do so.

### Certification

This year we are pleased to present to the Annual Conference for certification as an Associate in Music one of the first graduates of the training course provided by the General Church Board of Discipleship. She is Mrs. Elbert (Thelma) Green of Christ United Methodist Church, Roselle, Wilmington.

We are also pleased to present Pamela Jane Gose and Cheryl Bornt Johnson to be certified as Directors of Christian Education and Harold Earl Nunemaker, Chaplain, United States Army, as a Minister of Christian Education.

#### REPORT OF CONFERENCE LAY LEADER

Structural changes in our General Church have made this a year of uncertainty in all annual conferences, including Peninsula. To the best of our information, the Peninsula Annual Conference is the only Conference which has to date defined the status of the Board of the Laity in the new Church. Your Conference Board of the Laity appreciates your continued support.

Our laity, both men and women, are diligent. At the annual north-eastern Jurisdiction Lay Assembly, Peninsula had more in attendance than any annual Conference, with Baltimore a very close second. Remember, Baltimore Conference is at least twice the size of Peninsula Conference. Such dedication means a better trained laity and a more informed Conference for the future.

As for several previous years, during July and August, the Peninsula Conference Board of the Laity sponsored evening vespers at historic old Barratt's Chapel on Sunday evenings. This encourages visiting both Barratt's Chapel and the Museum. Of particular interest were the five-minute talks of the Rev. Mr. Harvey Flater. These talks were before the service and concerned some special item from the Museum. These services give people the opportunity to participate in worship at the birthplace of American Methodism.

In September, the United Methodist Men held their annual weekend retreat at Camp PeCoMeth. Sid Nichols of the General Board of Discipleship was our resource leader. The subject involved ways to "breathe new life" into United Methodist Men. This is a serious problem for us, as it is elsewhere. We have much to do here. This year, our own Bishop James K. Mathews will be our resource person. The men are looking forward to a fine week-end!

The annual district Ministers' and Laypersons' banquets were held in October and November. We are happy to report that our ladies are beginning to attend these banquets. Three of our districts were fortunate to have Bishop Mathews as guest speaker. The fourth district could not secure Bishop Mathews because of a scheduling problem.

This year, one of the districts sponsored a much needed Lay-Clergy Dialogue. The same district also promoted a visit by the clergy to an industrial institution. Such activities should result in a better understanding between laity and clergy.

At the moment, three of the four districts have finished their lay speaking training programs. The fourth district will finish the course in about two weeks. We appreciate the time and effort our clergy have spent in teaching these courses. Also, the good leadership shown by the Conference and District directors of lay speaking.

Your Board of the Laity looks forward to the new conference year with renewed enthusiasm under the leadership of Bishop James K. Mathews. Thanks, Laity and Clergy, for your fine cooperation during the past year.

### COMMISSION ON WORSHIP

The Commission on Worship seeks to encourage sound liturgical practice both in local churches and at the sessions of the Annual Conference. In a time of widespread "experimentation" in worship, we attempt to promote a union of creativity and solid historical-theological understanding.

In the hope of stimulating the pastor in his role as liturgist, we have recently instituted through the Coordinated Mailing an insert entitled "Thinking Theologically About Worship." Because initial reaction has been quite favorable, the Commission plans to continue this item in the mailing.

The 1972 Alternate Text for the Sacrament of the Lord's Supper has also been distributed through the Coordinated Mailing together with instructions related to the rite. The use of the new service in our congregations is encouraged. The worship section of the general Board of Discipleship (of which the chairman of this Conference Commission happens to be a member) is planning to prepare and publish alternate texts for other major services during this quadrennium. Baptism, Confirmation, the Wedding, and the Funeral are under consideration for new texts. As these rites are made available, our Commission will distribute copies to pastors and provide interpretation as to their meaning and use.

During the next twelve months, two workshops on worship are planned throughout the Conference. These will be directed both to clergy and laity and will involve exploration of various facets of worship. Tentative plans call for the workshops to be conducted on Sunday afternoon, concluding with a public service of worship in the evening. Dates and details will be announced.

The Commission continues to cooperate in the planning and conduct of services during the Annual Conference sessions. We welcome suggestions as to programming which will be helpful to local congregations; our members are available for local consultation as time and resources allow.

### TRUSTEES OF PENINSULA ANNUAL CONFERENCE

The function of The Board is to hold title to property retained by the Conference for its uses, to dispose of property declared abandoned or otherwise authorized to be sold by the Conference in session and to disburse money in accordance to trust agreements and Conference actions.

The funds retained by the Board are invested through the Trust Department of the Bank of Delaware. The return on these investments is handled by the Conference Business Office, and an annual audit is incorporated in the report of that office.

The Board found itself without any carry over officers and thus was completely reorganized at its meeting held on June 12, 1972. The officers elected (note page 17 of 1972 Official Journal of The Peninsula Annual Conference) wish to express publicly their thanks and appreciation to the officers during the last quadrennium for the diligent performance of their duties and leaving the affairs of the Board in such good shape.

During this Conference year the Trustees have acted upon the following matters:

1. Sale of former Mt. Pleasant Methodist Church, located on Philadelphia Pike between Wilmington and Claymont, Delaware, was consummated in 1961 to Mt. Pleasant Church of Christ with the exception of the cemetery. The present church officials requested transfer of title to the cemetery. This was approved by the Board with the understanding, in writing, that the present owners of the church will care for the upkeep of the cemetery. A sum of \$1,000 was received from the sale and deposited in the General Fund Account.

2. Sale of One (1) acre in Rumbley area of Somerset County, known as Union Methodist Church property, for a sum of \$550. This property was declared abandoned in 1956. The amount received was deposited in the General Fund Account.

3. At the request of an attorney for the Nanticoke Post No. 6, American Legion, Seaford, Delaware, the Conference Board of Trustees agreed to join with The Board of Trustees of St. John's United Methodist Church, Seaford, Delaware, in executing a deed to Post No. 6, for the land on which the present building stands and the land adjacent to it. This action will help cure possible defects in the title to the property. The Boachim Meeting House originally stood on the property.

4. In the audit report for 1971, found on page 308 of the 1972 Official Journal of The Peninsula Annual Conference, there is a list of 16 Funds Held for Investments. At the request of the Board the president and secretary were authorized to review the legal papers concerning these funds and determine which ones had to remain under the supervision of The Trustees. Letters were written to the authorized persons, those receiving the annual interest from each fund, concerning the Board's plan to return the full amount invested to the respective beneficiaries providing no objections were received within two months.

After studying the legal documents we found we are required to keep six (6) funds. They are to be listed with the other regular funds in the audit report of 1973. (note pages 306-307 of 1972 Official Journal). Eleven (11) funds were returned to the respective beneficiaries for their own investment.

The above action was finalized 2/6/73 and this will appear in the Conference Journal of 1974 under the 1973 audit report of The Conference Board of Trustees.

Through the cooperation of The Conference Business Office the secretary was able to supply each member of the Board with a brief summary of each fund held for investment and the balance in the account.

5. In the 1972 audit report of the Board of Trustees, which will be received at this session of the annual Conference, there is a balance of \$21,776.36 in the General Fund Account. This, over the years, has accrued from various monies received by The Board with no stipulations. The Trustees considered carefully making grants to Conference Agencies where a financial need has been determined. Grants were given as follows—

a. \$3,500 to The Peninsula Conference Historical Society. The stipulated amount was to be applied in full toward the renovation indebtedness of Barratt's Chapel.

b. \$1,000 to Wesley College. The stipulated amount was to be applied in full to purchase Books and Media Equipment for The Robert H. Parker Library.

During the year the Conference Journals since 1941 have been studied and all Conference action pertaining to church properties has been noted. A complete list is in the Conference Business Office, and copies are also in possession of the chairman and secretary. Each District Superintendent has a list of the Conference actions taken in reference to properties on his district.

The Trustees are aware of the property problem facing The Epworth United Methodist Church on the Blades charge. Correspondence between lawyers has taken place but at this writing nothing final has taken place toward a solution.

During this year several letters have been received concerning abandoned properties, churches and cemeteries. The Board will consider in the near future recommendations which we believe to be our duty as Methodists in the upkeep and safeguarding of properties. We plan to circulate such recommendations in the coordinated mailing.

Our appreciation to Mr. Theodore Briggs, Conference Business Manager for his services and cooperation. Mr. Briggs has attended our quarterly meetings. Also in attendance at these meetings has been the Cabinet Representative, The Reverend Dale L. Ruth and The Conference Council Director, The Reverend R. Jervis Cooke.

### CONFERENCE COUNCIL ON MINISTRIES

This Council, previously known as the Program Council, has met five times since last Conference with an increase in average attendance and interest. The officers of last year were re-elected and the professional staff is the same as previously reported with the addition of the Rev. John R. Shockley as Associate Council Director for Black Ministries.

#### I. Items Referred by Annual Conference

1. It was requested that we encourage the objective study of religion in the schools of Delaware and Maryland. A Task Force has been appointed and is at work. A representative attended a national convocation on Religion in the Public Schools in Chicago.

2. It was requested that the Executive Director of the Peninsula Conference Board of Homes and Hospitals, Inc. and the Associate Director for

Black Ministries work together to develop facilities and programs which would provide additional facilities and services for the aged of ethnic minority groups. Mr. Wallace Watson and the Rev. John Shockley, with the encouragement and assistance of the Conference Board of Health and Welfare Ministries are engaged in this task. Two separate projects are under discussion at this time.

3. As requested, a committee has been appointed to research the whole question of the use of public money by Church Agencies. Before a recommendation can be brought to the Conference, all ramifications of this knotty problem must be studied. Many of our agencies are already using public funds and their evaluation based on actual experience is most important to the study.

4. Detailed reports have been made by all the persons on the Conference Council on Ministries Staff. The reports included details of their work and an evaluation of their areas of concern. The reports were submitted to the Executive Committee which reported to the Council. This is in accord with the Discipline which makes the staff accountable to the Council.

5. Pacem in Terris. This group has become an official task force of the Delmarva Ecumenical Agency and representatives have been named to it by the participating denominational judicatories. The Conference Board of Church and Society has studied its program and given assurances of understanding and support. The Board of Church and Society has allocated some of its 1973 funds to Pacem In Terris and has received the endorsement of both the Council on Ministries and the Council on Finance and Administration to provide financial support in 1974. The Delmarva Ecumenical Agency has approved Pacem in Terris for funding by the judicatories up to \$2,000 for 1973. (The United Methodists and fourteen other judicatories comprise the DEA.) The council on Ministries and the council on Finance and Administration did not feel it was appropriate or feasible at this time to allocate the \$5,000 requested by a motion at the 1972 session of the Conference.

#### II. Other Actions of the Council

One of the significant actions in which the Council participated this year was the restructuring of the Annual Conference and the organization of the Program Work areas. The special session of the Conference in September adopted the new structure.

A program Convocation was held in conjunction with the special session. Emphasis was given to the Key 73 evangelistic program, leadership development, stewardship, and advance special giving.

We have sought to improve **Contact**, our Conference paper. We now mail two thousand copies each month to those in leadership positions in the local church. A study is being made by the Communications Committee, Rev. Nathaniel Miller, Chairman, in regard to publishing a weekly Conference newspaper.

The Conference Audio-Visual Library is being continually updated. A new catalogue of film resources should be available this spring.

The Committee on Stewardship, The Rev. Dr. John E. French, Chairman, sponsored four District Workshops on Stewardship last fall, followed

by a series of workshops on Every Member Commitment this spring. This is in preparation for a Conference-wide E.M.C. program in the fall of 1973.

A Committee on Camps and Retreat Centers has been organized to supervise the work of Drayton Methodist Center and Camp PeCoMeth. The Rev. John Simperts, Chairman, reports for the Committee:

"This is the first year in which the ministries of Drayton Manor and Camp PeCoMeth have been administered under the responsibility and guidance of the Committee on Camps and Retreat Centers. It has been an interesting and exciting experience.

"Our activities have included (1) becoming acquainted with the past and present history, (2) evaluating and defining immediate needs, and (3) projecting long range goals. Three operational sub-committees have met regularly with our two directors. The subcommittees deal with (1) program and promotion, (2) administration and finance, and (3) property maintenance and development. Able leadership in each of these areas has been given by Reverend Charles E. Barton, Jr., Gilbert S. Scarborough, Jr., and Jerry L. Chapman, respectively.

"It has been a privilege to work with our directors, The Reverend C. Jackson Robinson (Camp PeCoMeth) and the Reverend Walter H. Stone (Drayton Manor), who have shown complete dedication to their tasks. At Camp PeCoMeth, much-needed repairs to cabins and other buildings have been realized this year. Much work on the electrical system has been done to provide safer and more adequate service. The swimming pool has been sandblasted and painted, and filters have been installed. In addition to picnic tables, tents and other necessary equipment, much kitchen equipment has been acquired. The total number of people using the camp was 6,442 or 16,233 camper days. This included 1,052 resident campers, 1,512 persons for weekend retreats, 2,783 persons for picnics, and 891 family campers (more than double the year before). We appreciate and need the growing interest by local churches of the Conference in our camp. Vital needs have been met through work groups, contributions, and other forms of volunteer service by pastors and lay persons.

"At Drayton Manor Retreat Center we have completed our seventh year of service with more than 6,500 people days of usage, which is an increase of 1,500 people days over the previous year and twice as many as in the year 1970. Forty-eight groups have used the facilities during the weekdays in addition to occupancy by numerous groups on the weekends.

"In addition, the Center has completed the year in a solvent position with a balance as of December 13, 1972, of \$2,696. Further, the Walter S. Carpenter Gift of \$22,500 of 1970 has now been matched by individual members and churches of the Peninsula Conference. During 1972, the "Friends of Drayton Fund" received \$4,000.

"The Manor House has received two coats of paint and the Guest House, swimming pool and smaller buildings have been painted. Also, a water conditioning system has been installed.

"In addition to programs offered by the various groups meeting at Drayton, steps have been taken to develop programs sponsored by the Center for the general interest of both the clergy and the laity.

"In conclusion this Committee wishes to thank those individuals and churches of our Conference who have supported the ministries of Camp PeCoMeth and Drayton Manor Retreat Center this year."

The Conference Coordinator of Youth Work, and of Family Life have been moved from a relationship to the Board of Christian Education to a direct relationship to the Council. This is to emphasize the broadened scope of their task.

The Conference Council on Youth Ministries has been organized with Mark Hackshaw as chairman. Youth have been assigned to membership of the Boards and agencies of the Conference. The Rev. Charles Barton is coordinator, who reports:

"The principal thrust in youth work this year has been in organizing for youth ministry. A structure for conference organization was proposed by a group of youth meeting at PeCoMeth in May. Four district councils on youth ministry have been formed as well as a conference council. Youth from the conference participated in the jurisdictional conference and are participating in the N.E. Jurisdictional Youth Caucus. Leaders are being trained to help throughout the conference. One very successful conference with training session was held at Wesley College in the fall."

The Committee on Family Life, The Rev. Donald Hurst, Coordinator, has recommended several persons for special training. District programs have been held by each District Chairman.

The Council is supporting Key 73. A task force, chaired by The Rev. Everett Issacs, is broadly representative of all the Boards and Commissions of the Conference. Local churches have designated chair persons for Key 73. Guides and suggestions are being sent each month through **Contact** and the coordinated mailing. The nature and genius of the program is that each Church must respond in its own way and may be as creative as it wishes in its participation.

Since the program in Black Ministries is new, we should give special emphasis to it. The early months of the year found the Associate Director in the process of looking and listening. He visited each District talking with Superintendents, Pastors, lay persons, and non-church persons. In the fall a pilot project was established in Talbot and Dorchester Counties to secure as much information as possible about human need in the black community and to evaluate the work of civic agencies and the existing Churches. A meeting was then held to share this material with Pastors and church leaders in the two counties. It remains to be seen if local church programming becomes more relevant as a result of the effort.

Two seminars on Stewardship in the Black Church have been held. Frequent visits to local churches and consultations with Church leaders at local, District and Conference level have given excellent opportunities to the Associate Director in his role of interpreter and ombudsman.



### III. Recommendations of the Council on Ministries

We recommend that the following be adopted as the program of the Peninsula Annual Conference for 1974.

Programs to be planned in the area of:

#### 1. Church and Society

##### A.—Division of World Peace.

- Local congregations to be called upon to examine the causes of war and the forces which work for peace.
- Peace-making projects in the local church will be encouraged.
- Each District will be asked to hold a program on peace—a convocation, forum, or workshop—with an address by a major figure.
- It is suggested that Peace be a central focus in worship in our Churches.
- The Board of Church and Society will work with Pacem In Terris task force.
- The Conference will support the Bishops' Call for Peace as the program is developed by the National Committee.

##### B.—Division of General Welfare.

- Legislative monitoring and liaison work in Dover and Annapolis.
- Continued concern for drugs, alcohol, population, ecology, etc.

##### C.—Division of Human Relations.

- Interracial and intercultural experiences such as Retreats at Drayton.
- District Workshops relating to housing and employment.
- Concern for local employment patterns.
- Support for Project Equality.

#### 2. Discipleship

##### A.—Evangelism.

- Utilize national and regional resources for training in Evangelism.
- Hold Conference-wide and rallies and district-wide with evangelistic preaching and music.
- Promote training experiences at District level for local Church chairpersons of Evangelism.

##### B.—Education.

- Train persons for leadership in local church and beyond.
- Encourage use of national leaders and resources to assist us in mission and ministry.
- Provide introduction to and training in use of new curriculum materials for adults and youth.
- Make education skills and processes available to the whole life of the Conference through cooperative planning and programs.

##### C.—Worship.

- Provide workshops or convocations on Worship for Pastors, local church commission members, church musicians and other interested persons.

- Alert the Conference to the revised rituals being provided by the General Church. Help interpret them.

#### 3. Higher Education and Ministry

##### A.—Higher Education.

- Evaluate the whole program of campus ministry with a view of strengthening our Christian witness to persons in college and university.

##### B.—Ministry.

- Develop a program of recruitment to encourage youth, especially Black youth, to enter the Ministry.
- Encourage a program of in-service training for clergy.
- Provide programs of orientation for persons beginning service as ministers in our Conference.

##### C.—Lay Worker.

- Recruit and train persons to serve the Church as Lay Workers.
- Encourage good employment practices.

#### 4. Global Ministries

##### A.—Missions.

- Promote World Service, Conferences, Benevolences, and Advance Specials.
- Observe February as month of missions Cultivation.
- Provide resources and training for local church leaders in missions.
- Give support to those engaged in missions in our Conference.

##### B.—Ecumenical and Interreligious Concerns.

- Work with Delmarva Ecumenical agency.
- Support Week of Prayer for Christian unity.
- Provide training and support for those involved in ecumenical ventures.

##### C.—Health and Welfare Ministries.

- Make training available to local Church persons responsible for this area of work through distribution of information and by workshops.
- Seeks ways of providing increased services and programs for persons of ethnic minorities.

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### REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON RELIGION IN PUBLIC EDUCATION TO THE PENINSULA CONFERENCE COUNCIL ON MINISTRIES JUNE 3, 1973

The Committee has met at call of the Chairman throughout the fall and winter months.

It was determined that the Committee should limit its study of the public school religious studies programs to the three counties in Delaware because the structure of the Maryland school system made it more difficult to secure the kind of information needed.

A survey of the Delaware schools reveals that there is no state approved program, although one by this writer has preliminary approval of the State Board of Education.

The Committee found a growing interest among public and religious educators in objective teaching about religion. This interest stems directly from the Supreme Court decision in the New York Regents Case October, 1961, particularly *The Abington Township v. Schempp* Case October, 1962, and the Maryland Bible Reading Case October, 1961 in which the public schools were prohibited from prescribing a prayer, or requiring the reading of scriptures as religious exercise in the classroom.

In this interpretation Justice Clark explicitly recommended the study of the Bible as literature, the study of comparative religious and related subjects. (*Abington School District v. Schempp* 1962.)

Since these decisions which altered the customary use of prayer in the classroom, and the accompanying reading of the Scripture, the social studies text books being used throughout Delaware have increasingly contained more references to religious history. This has been documented in a letter to the Chairman of this Committee.

A survey of the school districts will show that as yet no district is using the Pennsylvania study materials (Whitney: **Religious Literature of the West**) or the Florida material (Florida State University. Religious Studies Project: **Religious Issues in Social Studies**), but religion is being taught in the Delaware school as it naturally becomes relevant to the curriculum.

Occasionally individual teachers have experimented in building their own elective course or unit. This was found on both the elementary and secondary levels. Some times the administration was aware of this and at other times they were not.

Several school administrators and teachers indicated that:

1. There was no public pressure for such a course at this time.
2. Teachers up to now, have generally avoided religious implications of the curriculum because of a negative reaction to the Supreme Court decisions, or fear of community reaction.
3. Some expressed a definite interest and offered to inaugurate a pilot program if they were presented with suitable material.
4. Some teachers have taken the initiative at the local level with approval of curriculum supervisors.

The Delaware Department of Public Instruction has indicated a continued interest in the pursuance of a program within the Social Studies Department.

The Council on Ministries enable Dr. J. Gordon Stapleton to attend the National Conference on Religion and the Public Schools in Chicago and he reported back to the Committee on the progress of similar programs

throughout the United States. This gave a wider perspective to the Committee.

The Department of Religion and Public Education, Division on Christian Education, The National Council of Churches provides information on programs throughout the United States.

It has been the hope of the Committee to enlist the interest of the Delmarva Ecumenical Agency in creating a continuing Ecumenical Committee of that organization for the further study of the progress here on the Peninsula.

5. This Council confirms that the Conference will pay the Annual Conference expenses for retired ministers and their wives and probationary members, appointed to attend school if they are not serving a church.
6. Delmarva Ecumenical Agency—granted \$1,000 for 1973 supplemental appropriation.
7. Camp PeCoMeth—granted \$11,816.19 to clear cumulative operating deficit at December 31, 1972.
8. Commission on Religion and Race—granted \$500 for 1973.
9. Moving expenses Conference Offices—granted \$600 to relocate Dover Conference Offices.
10. Ministerial Education Fund—granted \$7,796.39 to pay 1972 apportionment from the general Church in full.
11. Authorized up to \$64,679 to supplement 1974 apportionments toward the 1974 budget from unallocated 1972 apportionment receipts and/or reserve funds.
12. Authorized a study on the honoraria paid the Conference Secretary and Statistician.

## III. HIGHER EDUCATION AND MINISTRY

## REPORT OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF WESLEY COLLEGE TO THE PENINSULA CONFERENCE

"But for the people, do we demand an academy." The words sound stilted today, but these words from an 1870 speech on "Our Denominational Institutions of Training" were to give birth only three years later to a new academy . . . one which would struggle, falter and nearly die; but one which would ultimately survive and grow into Wesley College, celebrating the 100th year.

Plans for the Centennial Year began in 1967, when the Centennial Committee was formed. Through the next five years, proposals, suggestions, ideas and commemorative programs were discussed. From these discussions emerged the final plans for the Centennial Year.

In January, 1971, the Statement of Purpose for the Wesley Centennial was approved. . . .

"The observance of 1972-73 as the 100th year of Wesley College celebrates a century of service in education, and dedication of a new century of continued service."

Furthermore, in fulfilling this two-fold purpose, the Centennial Year had six major objectives.

The first objective was to honor the Founding Fathers. To that end, the president of Wesley College, Dr. Robert H. Parker, speaking to a large television audience, praised those early pioneers in education. The event was an interview on the Gary Geers program, WKYW Television Channel 3, Wednesday, August 23, 1972. That Wednesday was the official kick-off for the Wesley College Centennial Year. A dinner that evening gathered together the forty-eight instructors and twenty-two administrators of Wesley College. Dr. Parker spoke on some of the early corporate minutes set down by Wesley's Founding Fathers: the old rules, costs, financial problems and early academic success of this wonderful institution known

then as the Wilmington Conference Academy. In closing, Dr. Parker approached a large, 100-year-old mission clock with its face, hand and mechanical parts altered to tell time in years instead of hours. At the flick of the brass pendulum, Dr. Parker set the clock to ticking off the Centennial Year.

Another event that was to honor the Founding Fathers was the creation of a book Researched and written by Mr. Fred N. Breukelman, who spent hours identifying those principal figures in the founding of the institution, the authoritative work catches the spirit of the Founding Fathers in 1873. "The College That Refused To Die" was published in April of 1973. Three chapters correspond to the three names by which the institution has been known: 1873, The Wilmington Conference Academy; 1918, The Wesley Collegiate Institution; and 1942, Wesley College. It will be the wellspring from which future histories of Wesley College shall be written.

The second objective of the Wesley Centennial Year was to publicize the enduring principles and purposes for which Wesley was founded as a Christian institution. Wesley College Centennial Sunday, designed to meet this goal, was one of the most effective events during the entire year. On October 22, 1972, 35 Wesley College faculty members and administrators spoke at 59 different church services. 157 Methodist churches used more than 37,000 Centennial Sunday bulletins in the Peninsula, Baltimore, Eastern Pennsylvania, and Southern New Jersey Conferences. Centennial Sunday provided the impact that upheld the principles and purposes for which Wesley was founded as a Christian Institution.

Other events publicized those principles. One was a Chamber of Commerce luncheon in Dover on March 8, 1973. Federal, State, County and City representatives extolled the economic, educational and cultural impact Wesley College has had on their respective areas.

Various affairs were directed at both the Wesley student and the local community through Scientific, Educational, Art, Religious and Cultural Happenings known as SEARCH '73. This broad-based program brought to the Wesley campus such notable individuals as Rev. Malcolm Boyd, religious author-lecturer; Dr. Martin Marty, educator, author and lecturer; Jac Smollens, sculptor; and Rev. R. Bruce Poynter, guest for the College's annual Faith and Life Dialogue. These events help to publicize Wesley as a Christian institution.

Another objective was to spotlight the modern private junior college as an important enduring institution on the national educational scene. Highlighted were unusual speakers and events. One of these unusual speakers who is now most notable and probably will be just as notable in the future was Dr. Fred Haise, lunar module commander on NASA's Apollo 13 mission. Astronaut Haise, himself a junior college graduate and former Phi Theta Kappa member, was the principal speaker for Wesley's Honors Convocation. Addressing 1,100 students, parents and friends on January 28, 1973, Astronaut Haise spoke about the future space shuttle and frontiers of space.

In addition to the Honors Convocation, there was the Opening Convocation on August 30th which featured Arthur A. Fletcher, formerly one of the highest-ranking blacks in the Nixon administration and currently

national director of the United Negro Fund. This is written, the Commencement Convocation will feature as speaker Dr. Roy C. Nichols, Resident Bishop of the Pittsburg Area of the United Methodist Church.

The fourth objective was to demonstrate the vitality of the academic life. This included over 21 events during the Centennial Year. From high school Seniors' Day on Sept. 16 to the Wyeth Art Exhibit now planned for April 29, 1973, Wesley's academic life and cultural affairs have been demonstrated. Nationally known speakers such as Pete Seeger, folk singer and outspoken governmental critic; Jimmy Breslin, author and mayoral candidate in New York City; Katherine Bryan, concert pianist; and the James Gang, a nationally sought-after hard Rock group, exposed the faculty, staff, student and community to other views, performances and professional excellence. Wesley's own talented faculty, chorus, band, and administration effectively display Wesley College by speaking engagements and performances on radio, television and at Rotary and similar club meetings. The vitality of academic life is the principle force that will allow Wesley College to continue into the years ahead.

Objective number five is to project the plan of the College into the future. This rests primarily in Wesley's Self-Evaluation Report and continued accreditation. The principles and objectives of the College were closely reviewed by an outside evaluation team from the Middle States Association during the year. This constructive critique complements Wesley's own Self-Evaluation prepared last year.

During the cornerstone ceremonies of the new H.B. du Pont College Center in October 28, 1972, President Parker referred to that new structure as the keystone on which the College future will be planned.

The last objective of this 100th year of Wesley College and perhaps the most important is to encourage alumni and friends in the City of Dover, the Peninsula and beyond to accept the challenges for a new century for Wesley College. Unfortunately, during this year, our Chairman of the Board Mr. O.H.P. Baldwin died. He would have, had he lived, been one to quickly accept the challenge of the second century.

On May 1, a capitol campaign is planned to begin. Professional consultants, Dr Parker and his Cabinet have agreed with the Executive Committee of the Board of Trustees that a goal of \$1,500,000.00 can be attained by January, 1974. The challenges of a new century for Wesley College begins by a rededication to these Centennial objectives, the College objectives, and those of the Peninsula Conference of the United Methodist Church. To foster the wisdom of our founders, to expand our principles and purposes to spotlight the modern institution, to continue academic vitality, to project the future College plan and accept the challenge of a new century are all viable steps in Wesley's history and future. Wesley College has completed a productive, stimulating Centennial Year.

### UNITED CAMPUS MINISTRY—UNIVERSITY OF DELAWARE

The United Campus Ministry at the University of Delaware is a joint effort representing six denominations: The United Methodist Church, The Episcopal Church, The United Presbyterian Church, The American Baptist Church, The Disciples of Christ, and the United Church of Christ. This year has represented a year of experiment and innovation as we have moved from a ministry which has been largely denominational to one which is more nearly unified in character. We are quite excited about the possibilities of such a ministry.

The present professional staff for the United Campus Ministry includes three campus ministers: David Riffe (United Methodist), Robert W. Andrews (United Presbyterian) and Mark Harris (Episcopal). The staff presently meets together weekly in order to work more effectively at a strategy for the common ministry. It is at this point that the value of a united ministry is most clearly evident: the staff can work with each other in a complementary fashion in order to avoid duplication of efforts and to extend the ministry into new areas.

Our program for this year has been quite broad and has touched a number of areas: three retreats; a trip to New York City; a Sunday evening fellowship which has included worship, a meal, and a seminar discussion; two Bible studies; three courses in the Free University; support for a Draft Information Service; a Sunday Eucharist; a weekly Tuesday International Lunch; a weekly coffeehouse; an art gallery; a growth group; a Winterim project in Mexico; and a faculty discussion group. In addition the campus ministers have been involved in counseling with students and other university-related persons.

Our United Campus Ministry Board is developing a philosophy statement on our ministry which will be helpful in giving us direction for the future. We are optimistic as we look ahead. We feel that our united efforts will make possible a much more viable and creative ministry for the community of persons related to the University of Delaware.

**THE COMMITTEE ON THE LAY WORKER**

This year, the Committee on the Lay Worker has met to reorganize and to establish the goals and programs for 1973, as listed below:

1. Our Committee shall be the conscience to effect every church's examination of its practice in the employment of lay employees.
2. To ask certifying agencies and the District Superintendents to help local churches understand that as they hire personnel they should have a written contract with their employees, regarding salary, fringe benefits, and a job analysis as a means of protection and clarification for each.
3. To send a letter and fact sheet listing steps to become a Lay Worker to all eligible Lay Workers in the Peninsula Conference asking them to consider becoming a Lay Worker.
4. To work with certifying agencies in encouraging lay employees in the fields of church music, Christian Education, and business administration to become certified.
5. To contact the Peninsula Conference Board of Education asking them to review standards for certification for education and music

vocations and to publish identical lists in all the Peninsula Conference Journal listings.

6. To study the salary scale, fringe benefits (including hospital insurance), tenure, and guidelines used by the local churches in employing lay employees in such fields as church secretary, custodian, etc.
7. To contact other Annual Conference Committees on the Lay Worker within the Northeastern Jurisdiction to discover what they are doing as a Committee on the Lay Worker.

The task before us now is the implementation of these goals. To this, we direct our efforts.

**BOARD OF MINISTRY**

The establishment of the Ministerial Education Fund by the General Conference of 1968 and the restructuring of the church by the General Conference of 1972 has placed before the Board of the Ministry a challenge and a mandate to develop the resources necessary to aid persons in the Ordained Ministry. The challenge is defined by the scope of responsibility that is now placed on the Board of Ministry and the mandate is expressed through the funds available for work.

Stony Point Conference Center, Stony Point, New York, was the site of a Training Session for Board of Ministries of the Northeastern Jurisdiction on February 12-14, 1973. The Peninsula Conference Board of Ministry was represented by nine persons present. The combination of becoming informed and having horizons, enlarged, together with the interim struggle of operating while waiting for the 1972 Discipline to be finalized and printed, perhaps describes the status of the Board's life at the moment.

**Continuing Education**

Continuing Education is as vital to a viable ministry today as breath is to life. The Board would remind the local churches again that the 1968 Discipline states "the minister shall be encouraged to continue his education throughout his career, including a carefully developed personal program of study augmented periodically by involvement in organized educational activities. In most cases the Ministers Continuing Education Program shall allow for leaves of absence for study at least one week each year and at least one month during one year of each quadrennium. Such leaves shall not be considered as part of the minister's vacation and shall be planned in consultation with his charge or other agency, to which he is appointed as well as his bishop, district superintendent and Annual Conference continuing education committee." (paragraph 355)

The Board would further remind the Annual Conference that each local church is encouraged to provide a minimum of \$250 per year for a continuing education experience that fits within the framework of the

disciplinary paragraph. The Continuing Education Committee of the Board of Ministry is available to serve as an evaluating body, to ministers or churches, or both, who might wish to have the validity of a proposed experience evaluated.

A one day experience has already been subsidized by the Board of Ministry and was held at Drayton Manor on March 13, 1973. There were approximately forty men in attendance, who worked under the leadership of Dr. Ira Zepp, chaplain of Western Maryland College. The experience was considered of significant value by those present. The committee plans to develop other experiences. These will be publicized in the coordinated mailing.

#### Recruitment

The Recruitment Committee at this time is at work developing plans for a major event of an informative-inspirational nature, to be held within the coming Conference Year, for the purpose of reaching "decided" and "potential" and "possible" candidates for the ministry.

The committee, accompanied by a member of the cabinet, will be involved in trips with a special emphasis on recruiting black candidates. A primary question before the committee is the development of black ministerial candidates at the grassroots in our churches.

As soon as the new Discipline is available, an up-to-date copy of "Steps Into The Ministry" will be produced and will be available for distribution.

#### Scholarship-Loan

With the increased income from the Ministerial Education Fund, more scholarship money is available to Theological and Pre-ministerial students. The committee operates with open lines of communication with the Conference Scholarship and Loan Committee and are ex-officio members of that committee. In the 1974 budget there is a specific figure for pre-ministerial students. The Board feels that this is a step toward meeting a very great need.

#### Service To Ministers

A new area entitled "Service to Ministers" is now part of the responsibility of the Board of Ministry. Persons in ministry often find personal needs in areas such as mid-career evaluation, facts and fancy about retirement, when and how, setting goals for development of person and career.

The Board feels that there are many such areas of life, many yet to be defined, where some resource is needed to assist the person in ministry. It is the intent of the Board of Ministry to investigate and make more services available in the future.

The above are samples of the wide scope of responsibility that belongs to the Board of Ministry.

In these and other areas the Board of Ministry will seek to continue its service to the Annual Conference.

#### Recommendations

1. We call upon every local church to observe on September 16, 1973 or the most convenient Sunday nearest that date, Ministry Sunday, when the claims of the Ordained Ministry are emphasized in our local churches.
2. We further call upon every local church to use this day as well as others in the promotion of the Ministerial Education Fund and encourage a minimum goal of contributing 100% of its apportionment.
3. We call upon the lay members and the lay leaders of each charge to encourage the implementation of the intent of paragraph 355 of the Book of Discipline by including a line item in the local budget for Continuing Education of the pastor.

#### SCHOLARSHIP AND LOAN COMMITTEE

Our first meeting was held in May to consider the thirty-three applicants for the Conference Education Society scholarships with approximately \$2,000.00 to allocate for the 1972-73 school year. It was a very difficult task to try to help so many with so little money.

On June 15, 1972 we disbursed approximately \$9,000.00 among the thirteen theological student applicants.

A reorganization meeting was held in Dover on October 17, 1972. Mrs. Cleo Henry and Samuel Sanders were appointed to publicity.

We hope to create an awareness for more generous giving at Student Day Offerings.

#### PENINSULA METHODIST FEDERAL CREDIT UNION

The Credit Union is continuing to help with the financial problems of its members. There are now 108 members who have over \$24,000 invested in the credit union. These members received a dividend for the first half of 1972 at the rate of 5% and for the last half at the rate of 5¼%.

Since the chartering of the credit union in 1968, loans for more than \$60,000 have been made. To date we have had to write off only \$34.09 as non-collectable.

The credit union is now beginning to broaden its lending policies to auto financing and some limited educational loans. Inquiries about membership and about loans should be directed to the treasurer.

The Peninsula Conference Board of Pensions herewith submits its report for the year 1972 and recommendations for the ensuing period. We are constantly seeking ways we can be attuned to the needs and conditions of our pensioners.

We do want it known that our pensioners should immediately contact any officer of our Board if there is any time or any way we can be of assistance.

As of December 13, 1972, the book value of our fund was \$2,510,759.94 and the market value was \$3,040,678.64. This is an increase of \$86,228.86 in book value and \$288,536.59 in market value.

During the year retired ministers in full connection received pensions in the amount of \$215,627; widows received \$175,704; associates and their widows \$65,036; Clearing House \$84,648; children \$4,522; a total of \$545,537.

The sources of these funds were the Peninsula Conference \$422,044, Conference Necessitous Funds \$7,500, Equalization Fund \$8,569.56, other gifts \$1,200, mortgage interest \$2,120.28, dividends \$59,671.76, bond interest \$57,811.05, interest on ministers' delinquency \$1,906.76, Publishing House \$9,035.58, miscellaneous \$10,490.16; a total of \$580,349.15.

The Board of Pensions is requesting the Conference for funds: Annuity payments \$430,000, Necessitous funds \$2,500, special appointees \$12,000, and endowment funds \$35,000.

As a result of a ruling by the National Board of Pensions, our Conference will no longer be able to refund any assessment requested by a minister should he leave the United Methodist ministry.

We request all members of the Conference to have their service records verified as soon as possible.

We request all members of the Conference to solicit bequests for the permanent endowment fund. This is a matter of top concern and priority.

The annuity rate will be on the basis of \$105 per service year in 1973 and \$107 per service year in 1974, the first \$1,800 of which is housing allowance for ministers.

We deplore the fact that ministerial indebtedness to the fund is \$111,000 and is increasing at the rate of \$9,000 yearly. The assessment is 2% of cash salary and any failure to pay for a current year incurs interest on this indebtedness at the rate of 8% per annum. Student assessment is 1½% per annum. No interest is charged on indebtedness while a student. A list of all who are delinquent in this assessment will appear in the Conference Journal.

The Board is grateful for the courtesy of Wesley College and its President, Dr. Robert H. Parker, for making a room available for our meet-

ings; for the genuine interest and concern shown by the 'people called Methodist' on the Delmarva Peninsula; and for the dedication and diligence of our Board members.

The present minimum salary scale of \$7,500.00 for full members and associate members of the conference and \$6,000.00 for student pastors went into effect June 1, 1972. With the realignment of charges and with salary increases granted to pastors by the churches, it has been possible to bring all pastors up to this level and still stay within the limits of expenditures set by the 1971 session of the annual conference.

In light of our present experience the commission makes the following recommendations:

- (1) That the calendar year be the budget year for minimum salary expenditures.
- (2) That the guideline figure for minimum salary for the year 1974 be \$8,000.00 for full-members, associate members and probationary members who are full time.
- (3) That the guideline figure for minimum salary for the year 1974 be \$6,500.00 for student pastors and full-time lay pastors.
- (4) That a maximum of \$35,000.00 be expended in 1974 for minimum salary support.
- (5) If the amount needed to have each pastor receive the minimum guideline figure is more than the amount allowed for expenditure, each eligible pastor shall receive a proportionate amount of what is available as set forth in recommendation 4.

#### IV. GLOBAL MINISTRIES

#### REPORT OF COMMISSIONS ON ECUMENICAL AND INTERRELIGIOUS AFFAIRS

The ecumenical and interreligious involvement of the Peninsula Conference, the local churches, and individual members of our churches has expanded greatly in the past few years. This is an outgrowth of our realization that some of the most creative work done today in the field of religion must cross denominational lines to be most effective.



The Commission does not see its responsibility as being one of containment for all ecumenical endeavors in the geographic area of the Conference. Rather, we are to enable, encourage, offer resources and guidance to those expressions of cooperation which may relate to the Conference and its members.

Many illustrations of the advances in this field are available: The Campus Ministry, the Chesapeake City Ministry, the Glasgow Church, Key '73, Religion in the Public School Committee, Week of Prayer for Christian Unity, local ecumenical and interreligious groups being formed in which our ministers and laypersons are participating, studies of the new projections for C.O.C.U., various religious services in communities which blend the strength of all religious groups toward worthwhile purposes, and many other examples.

An interreligious organization in North Wilmington, the North Brandywine Council of Congregations, in which local United Methodist Churches are a part, has developed a Credit Union, a Housing Corporation, a tutorial program and given support to many other community efforts. This is just another example of "grass root" participation which can be beneficial to our people and their communities.

The Delmarva Ecumenical Agency enables us, on denominational basis, to work with the other churches on the Peninsula. New life has been given to this agency in four ways:

- 1) A new Executive Director, Rev. Donald E. Leiter, was named on August 1, 1972. Mr. Leiter brings to this organization experience, dedication and enthusiasm.
- 2) Financial support for administrative expenses through the "Fair Share Plan" by the fifteen member judicatories. This will give strength to the planning process.
- 3) The formation of Task Forces to help meet the needs for which the agency was established.
- 4) Participation of local churches and individuals in the planning and implementing of the ministries of Task Forces and Coalitions.

Mr. Leiter in as affiliate member of our Commission on Ecumenical and Interreligious Affairs. Two members of the Commission serve on the Executive Committee of the D.E.A. and five Conference persons serve on the Administrative Board. The President of D.E.A. is a member of the Peninsula Conference, The Rev. Mr. Howell O. Wilkins.

Task Forces of the Agency will be established with representatives from those denominations desiring to participate and support the work of a given Task Force. Additional persons will be named to give local churches and groups first hand opportunities to participate in the areas to which they relate. Already at work, or in the process of being established, are the following Task Forces:

Rural Ministry Coalition (Migrant Ministry), Beach Ministries in Ocean City, Rehoboth and Bethany Beaches, Educational Resources, Racial Attitudes and perspectives, Communications, Pacem in Terris, Emergency Preparedness, Crime and Justice, Human Services, and others as may be determined.

### Recommendations

The Commission presents the following recommendations for action by the Conference:

- 1) The Conference encourages local churches and members to further their participation in ecumenical and interreligious activities.
- 2) The Conference recommends to the churches the continued study of C.O.C.U., the materials forthcoming from this expression, and in particular, the paper on local structures for mission entitled "Congregations uniting for the Mission", which proposes eight models of ecumenical relationships for existing congregations (available from the C.O.C.U. office in Princeton, N. J.).
- 3) The Conference recommends that each local church consider the Sunday during the Week of Prayer for Christian Unity, January 20, 1974, or another date if a local church prefers, as a time to lift up the purpose and program of the Delmarva Ecumenical Agency and other ecumenical expressions.

### REPORT OF THE BOARD OF HEALTH AND WELFARE MINISTRIES

A serious question which has been raised before was re-introduced formally in one of the workshop sessions of the National Association of Health and Welfare Ministries Convention when it met in Atlanta, Georgia, March 12th thru 14th.

How the question was posed was, "Isn't it Time for the Churches to Get Out of the Hospital Business?" The answer came from many different people and various levels, including Bishop Paul A. Washburn, who delivered a major address at the Plenary Session.

The argument against our continued involvement in direct service ministries such as, hospitals and homes, is that increased public need and concern suggests that we bandon community services which federal and state governments can handle. Also, that the church ought to consider that its contribution has been made to the various needs in this area of life.

However, the answers given at the convention in Atlanta were not in favor of the view where we would drop church involvement in health and welfare ministries. In fact, the church ought not abandon these ministries if we are to be the Church of Jesus Christ. Years ago, Dr. Howard Rusk in talking about the responsibility of the Church in providing hospitals and home said, "There is no sense in our adding years to their lives unless we can add life to those years." The Church in the future must be as committed to the care of people in the traditional forms of ministries as it has in the past. As we continue to maintain and support our healing institutions we must realize that economics is but one aspect of our involvement and, that while we give financial support we must also

provide an ingredient of life which cannot be bought, namely, compassionate and loving concern for persons regardless of their state in life. This quality is what the Church has to offer to the individuals of our homes and hospitals and which is not always available, indeed it is appallingly deficient, in public supported institutions.

This year your board is concerned that we not only continue the support of our related projects and ministries which have been developed, but also, to pave the way into some new areas or responsibility and needs. We shall endeavor to concentrate on areas of neglect where the local church can have major impact. One of the significant goals for the remainder of 1973 and for the whole of 1974, is to develop programs for the local churches through the Health and Welfare Representatives. To accomplish this, workshops will be planned throughout our Conference. In addition, we will constantly supply these representatives and pastors with pamphlets and other informational materials, promoting health and welfare ministries.

Two task forces have been created to study the matters of (1) meeting the needs of the black community, and (2) the creation of effective health and welfare workshops.

It is the opinion of the board to continue to emphasize our Mother's Day Offering for the support of our homes for the aging, and to not develop the concept of Golden Cross Sunday within our Conference. We also will continue the support of the Board of Child Care through the Red Stocking Offering at Christmas.

Our board wishes to commend the leadership of the trustees of the Peninsula United Methodist Homes and Hospitals, Inc. and, in particular, J. Wallace Watson, Executive Director, who have directed the affairs of our Country House and Manor House in creative and outstanding ways. It is exciting to see what is being accomplished in our institutions to provide the people with a life that is full as well as prolonged. We suggest that every member of our Conference become acquainted with the services that our homes are providing. According to a recent federal inspection team, our homes were rated among the very top in our country. We are proud of our accomplishments in this field of healing.

While we press forward in these church-related ministries, it is important that we provide ministry to the public institutions where needs are evident and where so many of our own United Methodist people are residents. The board feels strongly that local churches and pastors ought to relate to these public institutions and develop programs to meet unmet needs.

The board at a later date will provide the list of trustees of the Peninsula Homes and Hospitals, Inc. to the Conference for their election, after there has been time to review the nominees.

As we anticipate the future, the board does so with a sense of overwhelming responsibility as it tries to provide leadership in the broad and changing field of health and welfare in the name of Christ.

### PRE-CONFERENCE REPORT PENINSULA UNITED METHODIST HOMES AND HOSPITALS, INC.

It is the privilege and responsibility of our Homes for the aging to witness in local, regional and national areas by word and deed, to the self-revelation of God in Jesus Christ and the acts of love by which God reconciles all people to Himself. This is a responsibility we do not take lightly—it is indeed a privilege to serve God through service to His people.

Everything we do—everything we attempt is people-oriented. People need to be served and people need to serve. Gratefully, we acknowledge the dedication of staff and volunteers alike who have made this one of the most productive years of our history. Guided by Christ-like principles, the teaching, helping and healing ministries of our homes have risen to a new high. More persons are being served in an ever-expanding community ministry. Trained staff are now serving in teaching and sharing opportunities, and we are constantly seeking methods to make all local church congregations shareholders in our direct ministry to people.

#### Expansion

Just over one year ago the Trustees of our Homes approved the construction of a new Health Center at The Methodist Country House. This was not just an approval for enlarging our building but an approval to expand capabilities to meet every health need of our residents except major surgery. It also will permit a whole new approach in our care and treatment of the mentally confused. In the past, we have had to depend on local mental hospitals for evaluation and treatment which has been most unsatisfactory from many points. Over the past two years,

staff has been receiving special training in the methods of rehabilitating and reorienting the confused mind. A social psychiatrist has been added to our staff to treat the patient and train the staff with but one aim in mind—to make our home sufficient in every phase of care for the aging and to eliminate the need to move our people from our homes for any type care.

This new facility will serve both homes when the need for specialized service arises. New specialized equipment and procedures in physical and occupational therapy will strengthen our capability to restore usefulness to limb and mind. Nursing and treatment in private accommodations will shorten the stay and add dignity to all health care services. The contract cost of this project was \$1,206,550 and to date, contributions of about one-third have been received.

### Community Services

This is an ever-expanding area of our homes' involvement. We are trying to make our homes clearing houses for directing services of all types to the aging in the community surrounding our homes. We intend this to be a supportive service to all ministers of our Conference as they deal with the many problems of the aging members of their congregations. Volunteer and paid members of the community are trained to serve the aging with nursing, companionship, housekeeping, shopping and transportation in a program conducted by Sussex County Home Services, which is based at The Manor House and directed by Mrs. Dorothy Keene. Over 1,200 persons have been served in varying ways through this program. Over 1,700 meals have been delivered by volunteers who have contributed in excess of 600 hours of their time in order to make a part of the day more meaningful for someone sick or house-bound for various reasons. These valuable services are available to all persons regardless of race or ability to pay.

Regardless of the need—whether housing, counseling, legal advice, food service or just plain loneliness, we attempt to be a friend who is understanding of the plight of the elderly. We constantly champion their cause and seek to protect their rights and human dignity. We see this as direct ministry through the church.

### Ecumenical

Hopefully, at the time of admission, all our residents are church connected. We encourage them to be members of local congregations and supply transportation to churches of various denominations each Sunday morning. The religious aspect of community living in our homes is the focal point for all activities. We are grateful for ministers from various denominations who share pulpits in our chapels each Sunday evening. This not only allows residents to retain their identity as Presbyterians, Methodist, Episcopalians, etc., but emphasizes the fact that our homes are an extension of the church and whose very foundation is built on the principles of Christian love and concern. Represented in our family community are 56% Methodist, 15% Presbyterian, 12% Episcopalian, 4% Baptist, 2% Lutheran, 1% Friends, 1% Catholic and 9% Hebrew and other

denominations. We believe in the one-God, one world concept in serving others. Some four years ago, a movement was started to bring all religious denominations together to provide additional housing for the elderly. Early last year the Church Home Foundation, Inc. was founded with Episcopalian, Presbyterian and Methodist having equal representation on the Board of Trustees. Plans were undertaken to produce a 15-story retirement facility at 10th and Broom Streets. Financed through the Federal government last fall, the contract was approved and construction begun. This facility will be open to all persons and will serve those with limited income through a rent subsidy arrangement with the Federal government. We are pleased to have a part in this enterprise and look upon it as an opportunity to serve many persons who we have not had the opportunity to serve in the past.

### Involvement and Planning

Knowing full well that our homes can never supply the needs of all the elderly of our Annual Conference directly, we have, over the past year, attempted to carry out the mandate of the Health and Welfare Ministries of the Methodist Church to serve all in need, in various ways. We feel that many elderly prefer never to leave communities in which they have spent most of their lives. We also recognize the need for more direct involvement by the local church in serving the needs of the elderly. In order to develop a method through which these could be accomplished, we have developed plans for satellite homes which could be attached to and made a part of any church in our Conference that has available property. This can be an exciting venture for a local church. If need be, it is believed that it can be funded under programs for housing for the elderly. If needed, rent subsidy can be utilized for those below the poverty level, but the most important aspect is the opportunity for a person to be served by those he has served for a lifetime, in his home community. The size or capacity of such a home is predicated on the need of the community and available facilities of the local church, such as lounge, recreation and kitchen areas. It is a known fact that these three service areas are expensive construction cost items, therefore, their elimination in new construction not only reduces costs—it puts to use prime areas of a church that is seldom used. It is hoped that one such satellite home will be started this conference year.

We have also been working with Reverend Felton May at Ezion—Mt. Carmel to assist him in funding a very worthwhile community effort. This church is heavily involved in meeting ordinary needs of aging persons and children with special problems and is deserving of high praise. We are pleased that we have been privileged to work with them and offer our full support, as they continue to develop a very unique and exciting program.

### Home Operations

Certainly, each of us who has the responsibility of paying for our private home expenses, is aware of inflation and resulting increases in food, utilities, and services. Multiply your experience by the number we

serve and you will have some indication of the impact this has had on our operational costs. In spite of excellent control methods, there are many items over which we can exercise little, if any, control. It is never a question of what we can eliminate, because we serve humans with certain basic and special needs. We are obligated to serve until death, therefore, our responsibility remains constant.

We think that Methodists can be justifiably proud of what our homes have accomplished. Last year our homes contributed nearly one-half million dollars worth of free care. Contrast this with a total of 10.5 million dollars of free care given by 185 Methodist homes throughout the country and you can see that we are truly performing a herculean task. While this large amount of free care is indeed a fact, it was not all anticipated or projected. Many of our residents are received on scholarship aid, but the fact that the life span is ever increasing persons out-living their savings and many living on minimum social security income all contribute to the high volume of necessary subsidy. God, working through many persons who have an understanding of our needs and our Annual Conference's concern for our ministry has made possible such a record in compassionate care.

Another point for pride in our homes is the fact that they have been judged superior in quality of programs and facilities by the State and Federal authorities. These homes have withstood many severe and critical examinations and are now models for standard setting in the retirement and nursing home field. This we feel is quite an accomplishment and when contrasted against State-operated homes in our area whose per diem cost is 40% more than ours and whose services do not compare favorably, is a further indication that we do provide the highest quality of care for considerable less money.

The waiting list for entry into our homes is still quite large. In fact, if it were possible to replace every person in each building, there would still be names on the waiting list. If for no other reason than this, we feel compelled to think in terms of satellite homes and other means to meet the ever-growing need.

In the hopes of placing ourselves in a position to meet this recognized need for more facilities in the future, our Board approved the purchase of 42 acres of prime land in the Yorklyn area. It is proposed that it will be a self-contained retirement village type operation with a full mix of various living accommodations and services. Engineering and planning are in progress for submission to the Division of Health and Welfare Ministries of the Methodist Church and the Annual Conference.

We need the prayers and involvement of people called Methodists, as well as others, if we are to continue to serve God's children. 27% of our total budget must come from sources other than resident income. Annually, others must have their income supplemented. Daily new challenges present new strains on our capabilities. We know not what the future holds, but of this we are sure—in the name of and continuing Christ's earthly ministry of teaching, helping and healing—He will continue to direct our efforts. In His name we continue to urge your con-

centrated concern and involvement. You will be blessed as you extend a loving heart and a helping hand.

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**Addendum to Pre-Conference Report  
Peninsula United Methodist Home and Hospitals, Inc. (Page 44)**

The development of the property purchased and referred to in the Pre-Conference Report has progressed to the point that in order not to delay planning and construction, we ask the section on Global Ministries to receive this Addendum Report and to act upon a Recommendation.

As background for your consideration, let me brief you on developments to this point. Discussions with the staff of the Division of Health & Welfare Ministries of the General church concerning the needs of our community, the length of our waiting list and future projections, encouraged us to plan for the expansion of our present programs and the development of a new community to serve the changing needs of the elderly.

In January, Peninsula United Methodist Homes and Hospitals, Inc. purchased 42 acres of prime land in the Yorklyn area and immediately ordered a topography survey to test the land use for varying types of living units. At the same time, a Development Committee began observing and defining the needs.

We are now at the point of zoning the property for Planned Unit Development and securing architectural and engineering services to produce a self contained retirement community with free standing cottages, apartments and a core building for full services and single living accommodations. The community will be completely supported through the sale of living units and monthly service fees sufficient to provide supportive service programs for the residents and maintenance of the property.

Knowing the importance of controlling costs and protecting capital outlay by moving as quickly as possible toward development and, at the same time, recognizing our responsibility to Annual Conference as set forth in the Methodist Discipline (Para. 1117, item 4,) we ask that we be placed in a position to proceed on the project between this and the 1974 Annual Conference by the passage of a Resolution encompassing the following:

We, therefore, request permission from Annual Conference to proceed with the proposal when plans and financing have been approved by the Trustees of the Corporation, the General Board of Health and Welfare Ministries, subject to the concurrence of the Council on Ministries and a review of the financial planning by the Council on Finance and that a program of information and recruit-

ment will be developed and approved to insure a racial, ethnic, and economic mix related to an inclusive community.

### REPORT OF THE BOARD OF CHILD CARE

Through five programs, comprising the Board of Child Care, the Church has and is playing a significant role in the lives of children.

At the Child Care Center in Rockdale otherwise homeless teen-age boys and girls have found a home. The staff at that Center, selected for their ability and willingness to relate to children in trouble, perform all the services a parent would normally perform, plus the necessary clinical help in overcoming tough emotional problems.

A major advance occurred this year with the development of an on-grounds school. We recognize that most young people in care belong in and do attend public schools. A small group, because they have never had the opportunity to attend school consistently, or who were blocked from learning by family breakdown and other things which were happening to them, require specialized remedial education. For example, a 14-year-old who reads on a second grade level; or a 16-year-old boy who says, "I won't go near a school." We, therefore, at this writing provide a full time teacher, with Master's Degree in special education for emotionally disturbed children on our staff. Mr. Bob, as the kids call him, has a class of seven young persons. Two, who vowed they would never return to school, are working on high school equivalency studies. Others are learning to read, do Math, bake a cake, all in addition to tours of such spots as U.S.S. Constellation, Fort McHenry and other sites.

Summer last was an active period and promises to be the same in 1973. It is a time of employment for many of the children, and for others, a period of catching up in summer school. In August, thanks to you and to the Woman's Auxiliary, fifty children spent a week either in the Smoky Mountains of North Carolina or in Pymatunning State Park, Ohio. For either group it was a time of relaxation: fishing, mountain climbing, camping out, cooking in the out-of-doors.

Recreation is important to the social and physical development of young people. Throughout the year we have hiked on the C.&O. Canal, played various sports, camped, and in general participated with boys and girls in an active life.

Two of our alumnae graduated from college; each is teaching in elementary grades. Five others graduated from high school. June, '73 three will graduate from Baltimore County schools.

Through expanding the Swartzell Assembled Families program in 1972, ten additional children, all wards of the District of Columbia and formerly

in Junior Village, were able to have the benefits of family life. A house in Bowie-Belair, Maryland, was purchased in the Spring and staffed by a well-qualified couple. Shortly thereafter five brothers and sisters, ages 2 to 6, were placed. At first, Paulette, the oldest, was a withdrawn, frightened child. Now, after seven months of persistent, reaching out with love, the beginnings of a new Paulette are emerging. A quick smile is often seen, replacing the fearful, pained expression in her eyes.

A few weeks later another family was started. In this instance the foster parents, who live in Baltimore, own the house. Placed with them were four sisters and their younger brother. For these children, this was the first experience living where consistent, reasonable limits were set within a context of love and understanding.

With the addition of these two homes, there are now eight Swartzell Assembled Family homes giving family care to 38 children. Efforts are now focusing on the opening of two more homes by the end of 1973.

Declining numbers of infants available for adoption have forced us to turn away many fine couples who seek children. As children are available we will place them, and we regret the disappointment caused by lack of available infants.

The Woman's Auxiliary, some six thousand strong, with a Key Woman in most of the Baltimore Conference churches, continues to express love for children. Their innumerable projects include handmade quilts, Christmas gifts, a station wagon bought with saving trading stamps, music and art lessons. To them children are grateful.

From the humble beginnings of Kelso Home for Girls nearly a hundred years ago to the founding of Swartzell Home and Strawbridge, Baltimore and Peninsula Conferences have served well the cause of homeless children. With assistance of the Drama Department, Western Maryland College, we are planning for Spring of 1974 a celebration of a Century of Child Care. Participating in the celebration will be people from each District of the Baltimore and Peninsula Conferences.

As the second century begins, preliminary plans have been completed for a program to raise funds for construction of additional facilities for children. We withdrew from the Capital Fund Drive of the Conference because it would have produced only a small portion of the funds needed for a children's home. As quickly as we can proceed without jeopardizing that drive we intend to do so. The needs for children remain very great and very much a responsibility of each person who supports the existing programs of the Board of Child Care so faithfully.

The following services were performed during 1972:

- 22 adoptions completed and finalized
- 14 infants cared for in Study homes
- 39 children in Assembled Families
- 25 unwed mothers were given counselling and service
- 18 children in foster care
- 89 youth in Child Care Center

**BOARD OF MISSIONS**

The Board of Missions has attempted to establish its work through reorganization during this first year of a new quadrennium. The aims of mission as stated in the Discipline of The United Methodist Church (1972) shall serve as source of motivation:

"The wholeness of the Gospel is manifest in the totality of the church. God, Creator, Redeemer, Savior and Life-Giver summons the church to mission in the world. The aims of this mission are to:

Witness in all the world, by word and deed, to the self-revelation of God in Jesus Christ and the acts of love by which God reconciles all people to Himself.

Evoke in all people the personal response of repentance and faith through which by God's grace they may find newness of life in righteous, loving relationships with God and their fellowmen.

Bring God's people together in a Christian community for worship and fellowship and send them into the world as servants in the struggle for justice and meaning.

Respond to the given unity of God's people and to the needs of the world, and advocate and work for the unity of the Christian church in every aspect of the church's life.

Reveal in ministry the love of God for all and manifest the healing of the Gospel to those who suffer.

Move all people to live in awareness of the presence and life-giving power of God's Holy Spirit, in acknowledgment of His rule over earthly history and in confident expectation of the ultimate consummation of His purpose."

**Promotion and Cultivation:**

The Board of Missions entered the Conference year with less than a desirable record of supporting the General Advance Program of the church. In an effort to understand more clearly the Advance Program, the full Board met at Drayton Manor for a one day workshop in the fall of 1972. Resource leaders were secured from the Division of Education and Cultivation of the National Division of the Board, Reverend Donald E. Struchen, Coordinator of Leadership Development, and Reverend Howard T. Brinton, Section of Cultivation, shared with us the great opportunity that is ours to do as much for others as we do for ourselves.

With that thought in mind, the Conference Board of Missions has placed before you the following **Advance** opportunities for the year 1973:

**I. Sierra Leone—"The Freetown Project"**

Conference Administration Building

"Scattered quarters have handicapped national church leaders and the proposed headquarters building will facilitate program coordination as the church moves toward autonomy with greater self-direction." This building will be a symbol of stability, of hope, usefulness and relevancy to a church that has known several traumatic changes in the last 15 years."

OUR SHARE—\$10,000.00

**II. Appalachia—"CORA Cares Regionally"**

Human and Economic Development

CORA'S action is based on the belief that human resources, and the strengthening of the democratic institutions, experiences and po-

litical awareness which can develop them, are the foundations upon which genuine Community Economic Development must be built. CORA works patiently in the knowledge that what is done by the church, to help people help themselves, is an expression of Christ's example."

#### OUR SHARE—\$5,000.00

The Conference Secretary of Missions, Reverend Widmon Butler, Jr., and the four District Secretaries, Reverend John R. Owens, Reverend Samuel A. Snyder, Reverend Charles C. Huffman and Reverend Ronald Bergman, supported the Board's effort to enliven our concern for our Advance projects for 1973. Miss Virginia M. Pickarts, a knowledgeable missionary having served in **Sierra Leone**, and Mr. Howard H. Hoemann, **Appalachia**, itinerated our conference, February 4-16. Mr. Butler reported that all four districts had an opportunity to hear and share with both persons.

#### Methodist Action Program:

MAP began the conference year under the capable leadership of a new Executive Director, Reverend Charles Belcher. Since that time additional staff changes have occurred. Ms. Nancy Osgood, long-time staff member and developer of the Racial Attitudes in Perspectives (RAP) course, is now working with a private social service agency. New staff associates for MAP include Ms. Mary Ducey and Reverend Ronald Norris. Reverend Belcher and his staff are helping the MAP Board through a re-evaluation of goals and programs. The MAP program has extended its thrust to the greater New Castle County Area.

#### MAP'S GOALS

Through the following activities and programs MAP is seeking to realize its three goals:

1. To strengthen the local churches in their ministries of outreach, evangelism and service in order that individuals might come through them to a fuller life in Christ and the churches may become stronger forces for justice and Christian fellowship in the local communities.
2. To meet human needs as they are manifested in the communities where the churches are located.
3. To work for social change toward the goal of a more just and humane society in which each person will be free and able to find the resources to realize his full potential as a child of God.

#### Neighborhood House:

A 45-year-old project involved in a helping and healing ministry under the capable direction of Ms. Mary White. It is their mission to go "beyond the walls" of child care and youth enrichment and help eradicate racism. This program moves into the homes and shares family responsibility where needed.

#### Our Mission Expanded:

- A. We thank God for the Fund for Reconciliation, because it moved us to see and respond to the human and spiritual needs of our brothers and sisters. The Board of Missions has continued to fund some projects initiated by the Fund for Reconciliation:
  1. MAP: Operation (Leaven)
  2. Whatcoat Community Center
  3. Delmar Youth Center
  4. Neighborhood House: Family Worker
  5. Special Ministries: Strengthening the Black Church
- B. We share a great concern with the Delmarva Ecumenical Agency as we work through the Migrant Ministry and Beach Ministry Task Forces.
  1. The Migrant Ministry: The purpose is to meet the physical, social, and religious needs of the farm workers traveling to and residing in the Peninsula.
  2. The Beach Ministry: The purpose of Beach Ministry is for Christians to fulfill their responsibility in meeting the physical as well as the spiritual needs of those who live and gather in that area.
- C. The Board is seeking in a special way to support the courage and Christ-like spirit of the members of the Epworth Church, Blades Charge, Dover District.
- D. The Glasgow project, an ecumenical church extension project in New Castle County continues to advance. The Glasgow Project Committee indicates that a Pastor will be selected by June of 1973.
- E. The Board of Missions will help to sponsor the Peninsula Conference, Cooperative School of Christian Mission, to be held at Wesley College, Dover, Delaware, July 9-13, 1973.

#### A Year of Evaluation:

As the Board moves to fulfill its role it shall also seek to evaluate all programs, projects and church extension commitments. We enter this process to provide the best expression of mission possible. The times in which we live, laboring for the establishment of God's kingdom demands our very best. The Board is appreciative of the support and devotion given it by our Cabinet representative, Reverend Dale Ruth, and our Council on Ministries, Reverend R. Jervis Cooke.

However, beyond that, the Board acknowledges with gratitude your support through the dollars, time and effort given in every local congregation throughout the conference. We shall be calling on you through your local work area chairperson in mission to help with evaluation, program planning and action.

#### Recommendations:

That the Reverend Widmon Butler be reappointed as Conference Missionary Secretary for the Conference Year 1973-1974.

That each local congregation study and share in the response to the Advance Specials.

That each local congregation be encouraged to send the work area chairperson in Mission to the Cooperative School of Missions.

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**WOMEN'S SOCIETY OF CHRISTIAN SERVICE AND WESLEYAN SERVICE GUILD**

During this year of 1972 the women of our church have been challenged to become "United Methodist Women." This is to be accomplished through the coming together of the Women's Society of Christian Service and Wesleyan Service Guild into a "new, inclusive organization." The women of Peninsula Conference have been studying the local and district guidelines for the transition which, hopefully, can be accomplished on the conference level by November, when the new officers will be elected to take office January 1, 1974.

Our record as members of the Women's Society of Christian Service and Wesleyan Service Guild during the past 33 years has been one of growth and interest in the mission programs of our church. While we cannot report any appreciable growth in membership this year, we are pleased to report a continued concern for our financial responsibility. Our pledge to the Women's Division for 1972 was \$95,500.00. We have paid \$97,510.62. Added to this was payment for a new roof on Neighborhood House amounting to \$3,516.00, a gift of \$2,570.83 (supplementary giving) for the work at Neighborhood House, a \$200.00 scholarship to Wesley College and a contribution of \$248.53 to other World and National mission projects; making the total of our financial stewardship for "others" \$104,045.98. We have adopted a pledge of undesignated money to the Women's Division for 1973 in the amount of \$96,000.00.

During this year we have seen a larger number of women elected to serve in places of responsibility on the various Boards of our Conference. Due to General Conference action which calls for equal participation on the Boards of clergy, laymen and laywomen and youth members, we look forward to seeing women taking their rightful places in church affairs.

The new organization—UNITED METHODIST WOMEN—offers a wider and more flexible program which should appeal to all women regardless of their particular interests; however, it is not the intention nor the desire that "clubs" be set up within the church to parallel similar clubs in the community. Our purpose states:

The organized unit of UNITED METHODIST WOMEN shall be a community of women whose PURPOSE is to know God and to experience freedom as whole persons through Jesus Christ; to de-

velop a creative, supportive fellowship; and to expand concepts of mission through participation in the global ministries of the church.

While there has been considerable confusion interpreting the purpose and much concern as to whether or not a "new" organization is really needed at this time, we must realize that this is 1973! The God of history is always on the move and the church that serves Him best must also be willing to move.

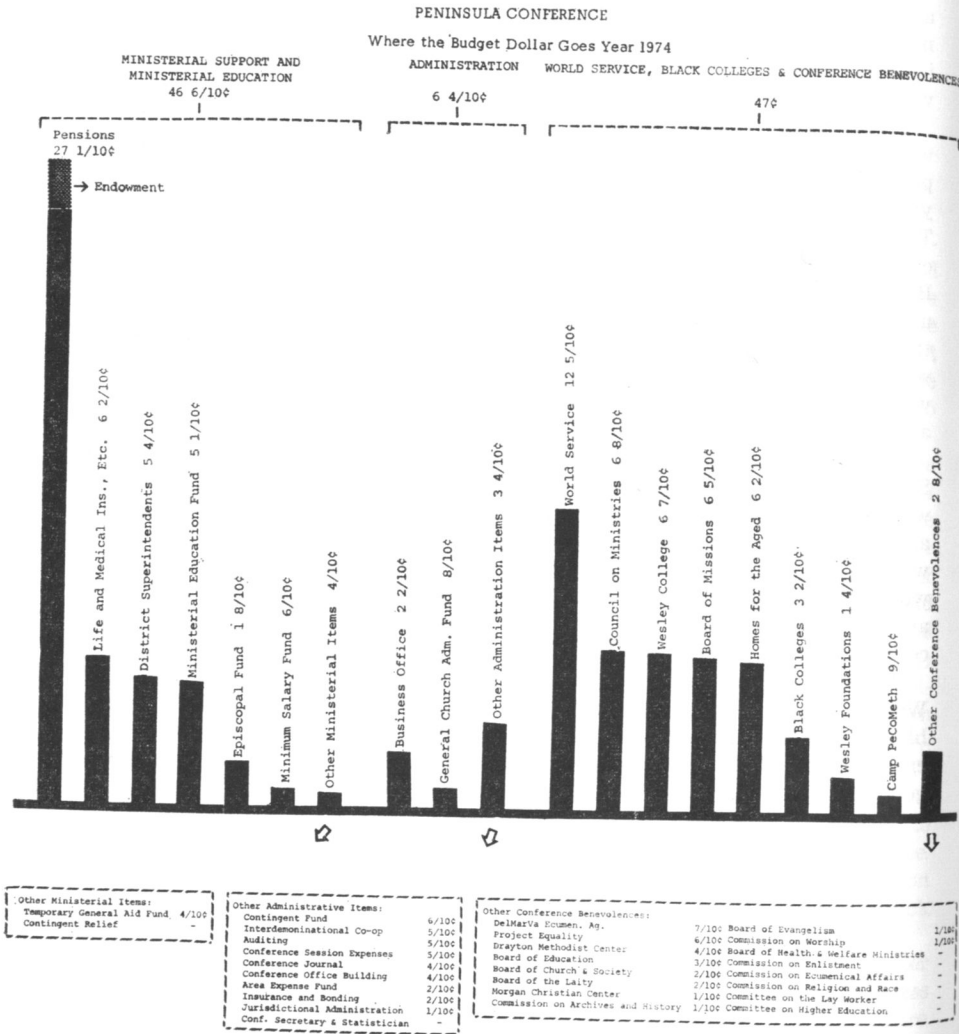
During the week of July 9-13, 1973 our School of Christian Mission will be held at Wesley College. This will be a cooperative school with participation by the Board of Missions and the Board of Education. Last year we met at Salisbury State College with an attendance of 164 women. This, we believe, is the largest attendance ever reported. If there is any credit due for the success of the 1972 session, it must go to the Dean, Mrs. Boyd Alford and her assistant, Mrs. C. B. White. Both women worked under very trying circumstances before the week of the school and during the week (which incidentally was the hottest week of the year and we were housed in dormitories which lacked air conditioning!) Mrs. Alford will again serve as Dean for 1973 school. We are anticipating a large attendance of men, women and youth.

This is my last report as President of the Women's Society of Christian Service and the Wesleyan Service Guild, for as of December 31, 1973, they will be past history. The four years of this administration have gone by all too quickly. I am deeply indebted to many people, namely those loyal women in our local societies and Guilds who are the backbone of our women's organizations. I am indebted to all who have served with me in an executive capacity and to the ministers and laypersons who have encouraged and supported us all.

The next report will come from the President of UNITED METHODIST WOMEN. For her and all who will serve with her I pray God's richest blessings and covet for them the same consideration and support I have enjoyed and shall always remember with sincere gratitude. God has been good to us in many ways, but I believe the best is yet to be!

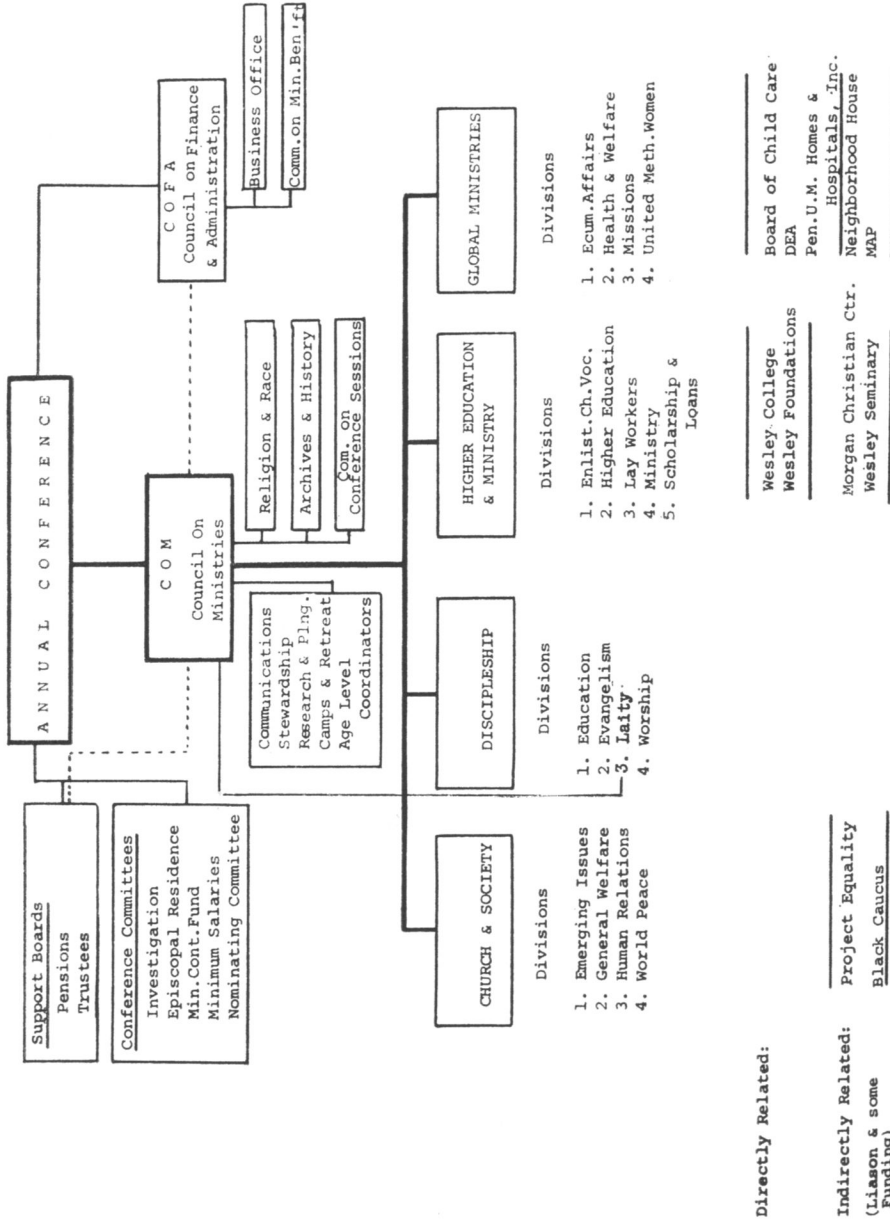

Samuel E. Armstrong, son of Peter and Catherine Armstrong, was born January 30, 1887 in Pocomoke, Maryland. He attended the public schools of that area and moved to Philadelphia, Pa. where he became a member of Haven Methodist Church, serving as trustee for many years.

While a member of Haven Church he was licensed a local preacher. After taking the course of study he was sent out to pastor.

He served the following churches of the former Delaware Conference; Port Deposit, Lewes, Mardela, Stillpond, Centreville, Newark, Deal Island, Cottage Grove, Church Creek, Wittman and Chapel.

Upon his retirement in 1960 he lived at Cambridge, Maryland, holding membership in the St. Luke's United Methodist Church, serving and preaching until his death.

After a glorious ministry the Rev. Samuel E. Armstrong passed to his eternal rest on December 18, 1972 at the Eastern Shore State Hospital, Cambridge, Maryland at the age of 85 years.

His funeral services were held at the St. Luke's United Methodist Church, Cambridge, Maryland, conducted by the Rev. Harvey Chase and the Rev. Otho Brewer. Surviving is one cousin, the Rev. Seldon Dix of Seaford, Delaware.

O'Dell, pastor of the church and Rev. Gerald Henderson gave very well-chosen remarks using as part of his text "And Enoch walked with God."

#### EDWARD CARROLL JUSTIS

Edward Carroll Justis born July 23, 1885 near Bloxom, Virginia to McComas and Martha Parks Justis. His early schooling was at Hunting Creek School, near Parksley, Virginia.

On March 28, 1897, at the age of 12, he became a member of St. Thomas Methodist Church under the Reverend James R. Sturgis. As a young man, he served the Lord teaching in the church and as Sunday School Superintendent at St. Thomas in 1925. Many "cottage prayer meetings" yielded souls for the Kingdom.

One experience he related was when as a young man, he and a brother-in-law, Ernest Byrd, began what they called a "bush meeting" (meaning their only protection from the elements was bush shades) down a nearby "neck", where there was no church. This turned into a spirited revival which they felt they could not handle, so they went to Onancock to recruit an older man to come and help. From this revival, an established church was born and functions to this day.

While living on a farm with his young family he often helped in evangelistic services in various communities. He also served a church on Hog Island, Virginia for six months during the absence of a regular minister.

In 1930, he moved to his first full time ministry at Cokesbury, Maryland where he pastored three churches until 1933.

In 1941, he was ordained an elder (Barratt's Chapel of the Peninsula Conference) while serving St. Martins, Maryland until 1945. While pastoring here he served as district M. Y. F. leader and always had a special love for youth.

From 1946-1951, he pastored at Galestown and was ordained Deacon in May 1949 (Salisbury, Md.) From 1952-1953, he was at Marion Station Trinity, Quindocqua and from 1954-1956 at Bishopville, Maryland, at which time he retired. His retirement residence was Parsonsburg, Maryland until the time of his death.

He married Evelyn Ruth Byrd on December 10, 1905 with the following children born of this marriage:

Fairy Ruth Matthews (deceased)—Reva Byrd Powell (deceased)—Ernest Carroll Justis, Parksley, Virginia—Nancy Justis Downes, Willards, Maryland and John Paul Justis, Wilmington, Delaware.

He always had a great love for people especially young people. He understood much of God's word through what he observed in God's world of nature.

#### RALPH BERTRAM THOMPSON

Ralph Bertram Thompson, son of the Rev. Charles Wesley and Flora Johns Thompson, was born in Hurlock, Maryland, November 15, 1890. He and his brother, Dewitt, spent their boyhood years with their parents in Parkesburg, Pennsylvania, where the father was pastor of the African Methodist Episcopal Church.

After reaching the age of 14, Ralph was practically on his own. He entered Delaware State College at Dover, Delaware, then a secondary school, and graduated four years later as valedictorian of his class. He entered Lincoln University, Oxford, Pennsylvania, and graduated four years later, likewise as valedictorian of his class. He maintained the same academic rating and graduated with honors from the Lincoln University School of Theology three years later. A gifted musician, he helped pay his way through college by cutting grass and playing the organ in churches near the Lincoln campus.

In 1919 he was admitted to the Delaware Annual Conference of the then Methodist Episcopal Church. Early in his ministry he was married to Miss Bertha Roach of Harrington, Delaware, who was a devoted companion until her passing. He faithfully and ably served the following appointments: Port Deposit, Maryland; Cheswold, Delaware; St. Michaels, Maryland; Waugh, Cambridge, Maryland; Mount Joy, Wilmington, Delaware; Whatcoat, Dover, Delaware; Saint Johns, Newark, New Jersey; John Wesley, Philadelphia, Pennsylvania; superintendent of the Salisbury District, six years, and Mount Zion, Philadelphia, from where he retired after nine years of service. He was destined, however, to serve ten years after his official retirement at Lewes, Delaware, and Centreville, Maryland. Heaven granted him his wish: "He died in action, with his armor on"—on February 26, 1973, in Philadelphia, at the age of 82.

On August 5, 1945, Ralph was united in wedlock to Miss Daisy Mulford of Newark, New Jersey, at Whatcoat Church, Dover, Delaware. This was a perfect union: A musician married to a musician; a poet married to a poet; a preacher married to a destined-to-be preacher; two persons in love, consenting in holy wedlock to live together until death should part them—and it happened just that way!

Delaware State College honored this distinguished alumnus by conferring upon him the degree of Doctor of Laws. The Methodist Board of Education recognized his abilities by assigning him to teach in numerous summer youth institutes in various sections of the country. Delaware

Annual Conference sessions were inspired by his leadership in song for countless years before his assignment as district superintendent, during which time I was honored to be the Conference organist.

Ralph Thompson was a man of many gifts and graces; one of the most brilliant persons we have known, and one who bore his gifts and graces with deep humility. He did justly, he loved mercy, and he walked humbly with his God, who required no more of him!

Funeral services were held at Mt. Zion Church, Philadelphia, on March 1. The Rev. Samuel E. Parker, one of Ralph's "sons in the gospel," conducted. A second service was held at Lewes, Delaware, the following day, Superintendent G. Wayne Cuff, presiding. Many fellow clergymen and countless laymen attended both services. Interment was in Hurlock, Maryland, his birthplace. Lovely Daisy survives and carries on Ralph's unfinished work at Lewes.

#### RAYFIELD T. WALLACE

"He has delivered us from the dominion of darkness and transferred us to the kingdom of his beloved Son, in whom we have redemption, the forgiveness of sin."

So the mortal flesh of Rayfield Tindley Wallace was transferred to immortality on Thursday evening, February 2, 1973, in the home of his nephew, Rayfield T. Wallace of Baltimore, Maryland, after a long illness. Born September 27, 1897, he was the third youngest of fifteen children born to the late Mary C. and Isaac Wallace of Deal Island, Maryland.

The family moved to Salisbury, Maryland, when he was a small boy. His christian training was received in the home of his parents of christian faith uniting with the John Wesley Methodist Church of Salisbury. In those years the family attended Sunday School regularly.

His education was received in the Wicomico County public schools. With the desire to continue his education, he moved to Baltimore where he went to night school and worked days to support the family. Although he officially retired from the Peninsula Conference in 1965, he served an additional year as pastor of the Wetipquin United Methodist Charge, giving twenty-three years of service in this profession. In 1947 he received a diploma having completed a four year course of study as prescribed by the discipline of The Methodist Church. In 1948 another diploma for completing

a course in the First Standard Teacher Training Course of the International Sunday School Association of the Department of Education.

Rev. Wallace was dedicated to his work, morally, spiritually and financially. He was one who read his Bible daily, the Upper Room and other Biblical literature. He loved his work, planting yearly vegetable gardens and raising fowl.

He was married to the late Rosie Saddlefield of Denton, Maryland. She passed away in 1962.

He was devoted to his late brother, Rev. Isaac Wallace, who passed away in 1971. His devotion to his children, especially his namesake, "Rayfield" whom he spent his last days with, was his pride and joy.

Those who survive him are: one brother, John Wallace; nieces; nephews and a host of other relatives and friends.

Hester was born in Salisbury, Maryland, and moved with her parents to Philadelphia where she stayed until she finished school. She returned to Salisbury to take up residency with her grandmother, Mrs. Martha Tingle. She joined St. Andrews United Methodist Church where she met Claude Brown. After a two year courtship they were married at St. Andrews on April 10, 1936, by the Rev. Mr. Alvin A. Mason, minister.

In 1958 Claude, with the hearty approval of Hester, made the decision to enter the ministry and the same year was appointed to the St. Martin's Charge. Hester had always been vitally interested in the work of Christ, especially through the church, and she demonstrated that interest by teaching Sunday School for a good number of years. **MISCELLANEOUS**

**(a) CONFERENCE RULES OF ORDER**

- Rule 1.** The Conference shall meet at 9:00 A.M. and adjourn at 12:30 P.M. But the Conference may, in its discretion, alter the time of meeting and adjournment.
- Rule 2.** The President shall decide all questions of order, subject to an appeal to the Conference; but in case of such an appeal the question shall be taken without debate, except that the appellant may make a simple statement of the grounds of his appeal.
- Rule 3.** All resolutions, motions, amendments and substitute motions presented to the Annual Conference shall be submitted to the Secretary in writing at the time they are made or as soon thereafter as possible.
- Rule 4.** When a motion is made and seconded, or a resolution is introduced and seconded, or a report presented and read by the Secretary, or stated by the President, it shall be deemed in possession of the Conference; but any motion or resolution may be withdrawn by the mover, with the consent of the Conference, at any time before amendment or decision.
- Rule 5.** The motion to Lay on the Table, or to Take from the Table, and for the Previous Question, shall be taken without debate.
- Rule 6.** No new motion or resolution shall be entertained until the one under consideration has been disposed of, which may be done by adoption or rejection, unless one of the following motions shall intervene, which shall have precedence in the order in which they are placed, namely:
- (1) To fix the time to which the Conference shall adjourn.
  - (2) To adjourn.
  - (3) To take a recess.
  - (4) To lay on the table.
  - (5) For the previous question.
  - (6) To postpone to a given time.
  - (7) To refer.
  - (8) To substitute.
  - (9) Amendment.
  - (10) To postpone indefinitely.

A motion to amend shall be in order, and a substitute for both amendments may be received, which substitute may be amended only once, and if a substitute be accepted, it shall operate as an amendment to the original proposition.

- Rule 7.** When a member is about to speak in debate, or to deliver any matter to the Conference, he shall rise and respectfully address the President, but shall not proceed until recognized by him.
- Rule 8.** No member shall be interrupted while speaking, except by the President to call him to order when he departs from the question, or uses personalities or disrespectful language; but any member may call the attention of the President to the subject when he deems a speaker out of order, and any member may explain when he thinks himself misrepresented.
- Rule 9.** When a member desires to a question of privilege, he shall briefly state the question; but it shall not be in order for him to proceed until the President shall have decided it a privileged question.
- Rule 10.** No person shall speak more than twice on the same question, nor more than ten minutes at one time, without leave of the Conference; nor shall any person speak more than once until every member choosing to speak shall have spoken.
- Rule 11.** When any motion or resolution shall have been acted upon by the Conference, it shall be in order for any member who voted with the prevailing side to move a reconsideration; but a motion to reconsider is a non-debatable motion and shall be decided without debate.
- Rule 12.** No member shall absent himself from the sessions of the Conference without leave, unless he is sick or unable to attend.
- Rule 13.** No member shall be allowed to vote on any question who is not within the bar of the Conference at the time when such question shall be put by the President, except by leave of the Conference when such member has been necessarily absent.
- Rule 14.** Every member who is within the bar at the time a question is put shall give his vote, unless the Conference, for special reasons, shall excuse him.
- Rule 15.** It shall be in order for him to move that the question be taken without further debate on any measure pending, except in cases in which character is involved, and if sustained by two-thirds, the question shall be taken.
- Rule 16.** The motion to adjourn shall be taken without debate, and shall always be in order, except, (1) when a member has the floor; (2) when a question is actually put, or a vote is being taken; (3) when the question is pending on seconding the demand for the previous question; (4) when the previous question has been called and sustained, and is still pending; and (5) when a motion to adjourn has been negatived and no business or debate has intervened.

- Rule 17.** All reports of the Boards, Commissions and Committees, shall be published and mailed to the Members of the Annual Conference ten (10) days prior to the date of meeting of the Annual Conference. Reports to be included in this mailing must be in the hands of the Secretary thirty (30) days prior to such Session.
- Rule 18.** No report shall be received or adopted by the Conference until a copy has been placed in the hands of the Secretary.
- Rule 19.** These rules shall not be suspended or amended except by a vote of two-thirds of the members present and voting.
- Rule 20.** All materials to be published in the Journal shall be in the hands of the Secretary not later than three (3) days after adjournment of the Annual Session or it shall be excluded.
- Rule 21.** The Nominating Committee shall distribute mimeographed copies of its report to the Annual Conference on the day before the report is to be voted on by the Conference.
- Rule 22.** Recommendations as to the change in format and policy regarding data to be included in the Journal shall be referred to the Conference Council on Ministries for study and recommendation before action by the Conference.
- Rule 23.** That no member of any Board, Committee, or Commission shall serve more than two consecutive quadrenniums on said Board, Committee or Commission and shall be ineligible to be re-elected until after one Quadrennium has elapsed except members of boards, committees or commissions elected for three year terms may serve three consecutive terms and shall be ineligible to be reelected until after one term has lapsed and except that when a member is elected to fill an unexpired quadrennium or term he may complete the unexpired quadrennium or term and serve not more than one additional consecutive quadrennium or term. No member of the Conference, lay or ministerial shall be elected to serve on more than two Boards, Committees or Commissions concurrently, except the committees elected or appointed for the Annual Conference session only, district committees whether or not elected by the Annual Conference and the quadrennial committee on the local church. The distribution of membership shall be according to Districts three laymen and three ministers as nearly as possible to each District.
