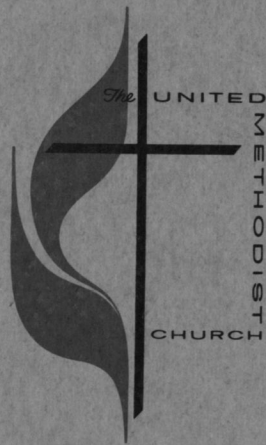

Others may want to take this route and we outline here the steps involved in case they may not be aware of the procedure.

These are:

- (1) All salary and conference apportionments are removed.
- (2) The church drops out of the listing of churches to which pastors are assigned. (We urge the conference to begin a listing of such churches in the Journal with the charge conference where they are to report each year. This will

- allow for proper records and continue the historic continuity of these churches.)
- (3) The only services to be held are weddings, funerals, or special occasions.
 - (4) One or more special services a year may be held with the offering received to be used for the upkeep of the building.
 - (5) The remaining members are transferred to a nearby United Methodist church for regular worship and church involvement.
 - (6) The remaining members become a special committee under the charge conference to plan with the pastor for weddings, funerals, and special days. They also present a written report each year as to services held, money received and how expended, etc.
 - (7) This allows the possibility that should population shifts bring people into the area we would simply resume regular services.

WEDNESDAY — MAY 22, 1974

2:15 p.m. Bishop James K. Mathews called the Conference to order and asked Rev. Paul E. McCoy to lead us in prayer.

Bishop Mathews introduced the Honorable Reynolds du Pont, chairman of the Board of Trustees, Wesley College, who then convened the Corporate Session of Wesley College. He referred the members to the report as printed in the pre-conference journal, and proceeded as follows:

WESLEY COLLEGE, INC. Dover, Delaware

MINUTES OF THE CORPORATE SESSION Wednesday, May 22, 1974

The annual meeting of the Corporate Session of Wesley College, Inc. was held in the Middle School Auditorium, Dover, Delaware, at 2:15 p.m., May 22, 1974. Bishop Mathews called the delegates of the Peninsula Annual Conference to order and requested The Reverend Paul E. McCoy to offer the invocation. Following the invocation, Bishop Mathews recognized Senator Reynolds du Pont, chairman of the Board of Trustees of Wesley College, who convened the Corporate Session. Mr. du Pont formally presented the Report of Wesley College as published in the Annual Conference Bulletin. In commenting on the report, he emphasized the needs of the college and the dependence the college must place upon the members of The United Methodist Church. Mr. du Pont also advised the delegates that a trustee committee to select a president has been appointed with The Reverend Howell O. Wilkins as chairman. The Board of Trustees of Wesley College will welcome suggestions from any member of the Peninsula Conference who may have input relative to this most serious matter.

Mr. du Pont presented the chairman of the Nominating Committee, The Reverend David W. Baker, who submitted trustee nominees, as presented in the attached official letter, to the Peninsula Annual Conference. Mr. Baker moved the acceptance of these nominations, the motion was seconded by The Reverend Fredrick Seyfert and unanimously passed.

Mr. du Pont presented Dr. Parker, president of Wesley College, and requested that he give the annual president's remarks to the conference members. Dr. Parker opened by introducing the members of the Wesley College staff present for the corporate session. He publicly thanked all for their many efforts in keeping Wesley College a strong and viable institution. Dr. Parker also offered his appreciation to the members of the Board of Trustees for their assistance and

guidance. Dr. Parker advised the members that in this era of change in society, it is essential that colleges, such as Wesley College, be prepared to meet the needs of these changes. Wesley College is actively studying the requirements of today's society and intends to make every effort to make adjustments as may be necessary. Although the college has experienced a decrease in enrollment this year and projects a continued decrease next year, we have every confidence that this tide will be turned in the following year. He emphasized that the help of each member of the Peninsula Conference of The United Methodist Church is necessary if Wesley College is to continue as a vital force in Christian Higher Education. We hope that at some future date, financial support from the Conference may be returned to the initial figure of \$140,000 per year. More immediate help is needed in securing students who may benefit from an experience at Wesley College. Dr. Parker advised the members that in the near future all churches will receive a letter requesting them to appoint an ambassador for Wesley College in each church. This person will receive all correspondence relative to the college and be the emissary for the college among his fellow church members.

There being no further business to come before the Corporate Session, the session was adjourned at 2:40 p.m.

Resolution sponsored by Union United Methodist Church, Bridgeville, Delaware

SUBJECT: Method of Determining Conference Apportionments

Whereas, the present system of determining Conference apportionments to the local churches is theoretically based upon the principle that more funds should be raised from those most able to pay and less funds should be raised from those least able to pay; and

Whereas, we believe that in most cases the membership of a church is a vital and real factor, among other factors, in determining the ability to pay; and

Whereas, the Program Council of the Peninsula Annual Conference, after considerable research, study, and the holding of hearings involving 600 people throughout the Conference, adopted in 1971 a new formula which made membership one of several factors in determining apportionments and submitted it to the (then) Commission on World Service and Finance; and

Whereas, a statistical study (appended) shows that the 1974 per member expectation of some churches is as much as twelve times the per-member expectation of other churches; and

Whereas, the highest per-member expectations (\$35 and above) come from thirteen churches, whose highest membership is 34, whose average membership is 22, and which therefore do not reflect the "ability to pay" principle in operation; and

Whereas, the statistics reveal many apportionments deviating vastly from the average per-member expectation in all congregations combined of \$17.91; and

Whereas, the continuance of the present formula makes the inequitable distribution greater every year in many cases by its 10% factor; and

Whereas, more equity in distribution would enhance the attitudinal factors in the payment of Conference apportionments, and increase the spirit of loyalty to the Conference and our connectional system, and aid all members to be diligent to maintain the unity of the Church, both local and general; and

Whereas, the Conference should not receive advantage of the consecrated loyalty of many churches who have consistently paid relatively high apportionments or use it as a reason for maintaining the present method,

Be It Resolved, that the Peninsula Annual Conference take appropriate action to insure that the present inequities in allocating apportionments be remedied as hastily as possible; and

Be It Further Resolved, that the Peninsula Annual Conference take appropriate action so that the present formula will be modified to effect a more equitable distribution of apportionments to the churches on the basis of real ability to pay, and that a consideration of membership as one factor among others be carefully weighed; and

Be It Further Resolved, that a quadrennial review of the formula be made and such changes effected as will contribute to the continuance of equity and fairness. The Section voted 4 in favor 80 against 30 not voting and therefore recommended Non-concurrence with the resolution. The Conference upheld the Non-concurrence 181 to 136 in a hand vote.

The Conference voted approval.

Parochiaid

Whereas, Parochiaid is tax aid for private and parochial schools, be it in the form of purchase of services, tax credits or tuition vouchers, violates the principle of separation of church and state;

Whereas, Parochiaid would weaken and tend to destroy the public school system which is the foundation of our democratic way of life;

Whereas, Parochiaid would help to stratify, fragmentize, and ghettoize society along economic racial and creedal lines;

Be it resolved that the Peninsula Annual Conference of the United Methodist Church go on record as opposing Parochiaid in any form and convey our corporate opinion to the Governor of the State of Maryland and the people in our churches.

Section voted to recommend concurrence:

For: 62 Against: 3 Not Voting: 0

Howell O. Wilkins moved to amend the resolution by adding "and the Governor of the State of Delaware" after the word Maryland.

The amendment was carried. The Conference voted approval of the resolution as amended.

The Bishop called for the order of the day since it was 11:00 a.m. Edwin C. Thomas chairperson of the Board of Ministry and Jerrold W. Knotts, Registrar of the Conference presented the report of the Board of the Ministry. (For Report see the Disciplinary Questions).

The report was accepted by the Conference with one amendment by William Hemphill, Jr. He moved that the names listed under Question 22 of the Report of the Board of Ministry with the addition of Robert Seals under section "b" be approved for pension credit."

Bishop James K. Mathews called the Conference Plenary Session to order and Rev. John R. Shockley led us in prayer.

Study and Review Section No. I Report was continued by The Honorable J. DeWeese Carter and Rev. Haswell G. Young.

Prayer in Public Schools

We being members of Peninsula Annual Conference are in favor of returning voluntary prayer to public schools by amending the Constitution of the United States of America in the following fashion:

"Nothing contained in the Constitution shall abridge the right of persons lawfully assembled in any public building which is supported in whole or in part through the expenditure of public funds to participate in voluntary prayer."

The Section voted: For: 5 Against: 35 Not Voting: 15 and recommended nonconcurrence.

The Conference approved the recommendation of the section

Records and History of the Former Delaware Conference

It is recommended that the Peninsula Conference Committee on Archives and History immediately obtain possession of all materials related to the former Delaware Conference and further that the Committee commission to have the History of the Delaware Conference be written by May 1975, and further that both the written history and all related materials of the former Delaware Conference be deposited in the Barratt's Chapel Museum, and further that a report of all actions taken be made at the next Annual Conference.

Section voted to recommend concurrence.

The Conference voted to approve the recommendation of the section.

Amnesty

The Section reported a resolution on Amnesty and Mr. Clyde W. Eilo introduced the following substitute:

As Christians called to a ministry of reconciliation, it is appropriate that the Peninsula Conference:

- 1) Reaffirm support for those persons who conscientiously choose to serve in the Armed Forces, or to accept alternate service;
- 2) Reaffirm support for those persons who conscientiously oppose all war or any particular war, and who therefore refuse to serve in the Armed Forces;
- 3) Recognize the need for reconciliation to God, family and country of those who, because of their conscientious opposition, are in legal jeopardy or under legal disadvantage and find themselves outside of the legal and territorial bounds of their country, and away from their families, and
- 4) Ask leaders of our government, who are likewise ministers of God, and who alone have legal rights to make such declarations as amnesty, to search their hearts to provide gracious means for such reconciliation of those who wish to return; and

5) further, we assume the pastoral responsibility for amnesty to Vietnam Veterans and their families, as well as those in need of amnesty.

The Conference voted to accept the substitute as it was amended by Ronald Arms by adding in the third paragraph the words "who are in legal jeopardy or under legal disadvantage . . ." and by Hubert F. Jicha, Jr. by adding 5 above.

Homosexuality

The study and review section presented a resolution which after several amendments was adopted by the Conference. It reads as follows: Whereas a person's desire and need to accept Christ and communicate with God is not restricted to their sexual orientation and,

Whereas Christ believed that the potential and wholeness of all human beings is important,

Be it resolved that the Peninsula Annual Conference recognize homosexuals as persons of sacred worth and extend our ministry to them though we do not condone the practice but consider this practice incompatible with Christian teaching.

STUDY AND REVIEW SECTION IV report was presented by the Chairperson, Mrs. J. William Wills and the secretary, Rev. Alvin J. Willink.

The section voted to recommend consent to the report of the Council on Ministries. Section voted:

For: 90 Against 0 Not Voting: 0

The Conference approved.

The following Recommendation for Lay-Clergy Balance was adopted by the Conference as a Conference Rule after the recommendation by the section was amended by Rev. P. Thomas McKelvey. It reads as follows:

Therefore, be it resolved: "that in order to achieve balanced membership in the Annual Conference, the Conference secretary shall report quadrennially the number of lay persons required to preserve equality of membership, and that the Peninsula Conference adopt the following:

1. The Associate Lay Leader for Lay Life and Work, the four District Lay Leaders, the four District Presidents of the United Methodist Women, all United Methodist Deaconesses active and retired within the bounds of the Peninsula Annual Conference, all certified Directors of Christian Education employed by Churches of the Peninsula Annual Conference, and all other voting lay persons of the Conference Council on Ministries, shall be members in the Annual Conference with vote.

2. The following formula shall prevail: Each pastoral charge enrolling more than 500 members, but having only one clergy member appointed to it, may elect one additional lay member, and further, that a pastoral charge having more than one clergy member appointed to it may elect one additional lay member, provided that more than 1,500 members are enrolled.

3. The Conference Council on Youth Ministries shall elect as many youth members as are needed to maintain balance, divided equally among the districts.

Committee on Journal Resolution:

Whereas, the Conference Council on Ministries is required to report back to the Annual Conference on all matters referred to it by the Conference and to report the

approved program goals and projects for all the program agencies, which reports require more than three pages; therefore, be it

Resolved, that the Conference Council on Finance and Administration and the Council on Ministries be exempt from that Conference rule which requires that there be a charge of \$50.00 per page for each page over three in a report.

WHEREAS, the National Farm Worker Ministry reveals a budget of \$224,000 contributed by 29 denominations and church groups and United Methodist Church Board of Global Ministries has voted a grant of \$25,000 to Church Hispanic Advisory Commission to support families of United Farm Worker boycott organizers in the cities, and

WHEREAS, in the March 8, 1974 COMMUNICATOR - The United Methodist Reporter - the board of the National Council of Churches affirmed its support of Chavez and the United Farm Workers of America and urged church organizations and individuals to boycott all lettuce and grapes not picked by the UFW as well as Gallo Wine,

Be it therefore resolved, that the Peninsula Annual Conference endorse the

above action as a direct Christian missional thrust to alleviate the suffering of mankind.

Section voted to recommend referral.

For: 36 Against: 16 Not Voting: 9

The Conference voted approval.

After the vote was announced, questions were raised about the original resolution. Everett Isaacs moved to reconsider the Resolution: Support of families of United Farm Workers Boycott Organizers. The motion was passed. The original resolution was read to the Conference:

WHEREAS, the National Farm Worker Ministry reveals a budget of \$224,000 contributed by 29 denominations and church groups and United Methodist Church Board of Global Ministries has voted a grant of \$25,000 to Church Hispanic Advisory Commission to support families of United Farm Worker boycott organizers in the cities, and

WHEREAS, in the March 8, 1974 Communicator - the United Methodist Reporter - the board of the National Council of Churches affirmed its support of Chavez and the United Farm Workers of America and urged church organizations and individuals to boycott all lettuce and grapes not picked by the UFW as well as Gallo Wine, and

WHEREAS, the churches are asked to boycott food which God has provided through individual's efforts to grow and feed the many hungry people in the world, and

WHEREAS, the use of secondary boycott by farm labor unions to force unionization of farm workers without the benefit of a free and secret ballot is a violation of basic Constitutional rights and cannot be justified by any legal or moral precedent;

Now, therefore; be it resolved; we in agriculture are entitled to the same rules of fair play that the law provides for labor-management relations in business and industry under the National Labor Relations Act which prohibits the secondary boycott;

Now, therefore; be it further resolved; that the Congress of the United States provide the laws by which we live. Monies from our churches must not be diverted to a labor struggle between unions, and must be used to spread the gospel to the ends of the earth.

Everett Isaacs moved that the original resolution and the resolution from Study and Review Section IV, be referred to the Board of Missions. The motion carried.

Wesley Foundation Campus Ministries

Kendall McCabe, chairperson of Study and Review Section III, introduced the following resolution which is a substitute for C 8 d & e of the recommendations of the Commission on Higher Education which are found in the COM report.

Whereas, the Peninsula Conference has maintained strong effective ministries to Delaware State, Maryland State and Washington College, through financial support and the committed work of local pastors on a part-time basis, and,

Whereas, the Conference Commission on Higher Education in response to a directive from the Council on Finance and Administration did study and evaluate the campus ministry situation of our conference and did conclude the campus ministry programs were effective and worthy ministries, and did recommend the continuation of these programs, and

Whereas, the Conference Council on Ministries did recommend the discontinuation of these campus ministries at Delaware State College, Maryland State College and Washington College, effective January 1, 1975, but the Council on Ministries did not present any supporting evidence or information to substantiate that these ministries are no longer needed, or information that would negate the findings or recommendations of the Commission on Higher Education, and

Whereas we are concerned that the Peninsula Conference continue to maintain a strong ministry to all our college campus, and not just the University of Delaware and Wesley College,

We therefore recommend that those Wesley Foundation Ministries, located at Washington College, and the two predominately black colleges within our conference: Delaware State and Maryland State be continued, and continue to receive financial support at the same level of support that was received in the preceding year (1973).

VII REPORTS

(a) District Superintendents

Composite Report — 1974 Presented By Dale L. Ruth

Bishop Mathews, Members of the Conference, Friends;

Our effort will be, in this report, to reflect the stance and policy of the superintendents in relationship to local churches, appointments, conference program, and local and conference structure as each relates to the mission of the church. We shall not report here, facts that are reported in district reports or by other committees.

First, let me indulge, to express the mutual thanks of the cabinet members for the good fellowship and fine spirit of cooperation which has been evidenced during the year together. Bishop Mathews, we are grateful for your pastoral leadership to our church, for your vision and Christian concern. We are indeed fortunate to have as our Bishop one who has evidenced Christian concern and warmth as he travels and teaches throughout our Conference. We are glad for the sharing of his rich store-house of knowledge, and confident faith. May God richly bless you and Mrs. Mathews in the years ahead.

Our first major concern is the mission of the total church. It is clearly indicated as we look at our united church, that it is now a strong church, that the very reason for union was that we might more adequately fulfill our purpose of mission.

As we ask the question, what can the church do for people, we need to remember that people are the church, and need to be committed to Christ in such a way that they respond to God's call, to wonder at the beauty, the mystery, the glory and the greatness of the church. Maybe we need to ask, is the church an effective instrument of mission? Does she speak with a clear vision to those threatened by change, uncertain about the meaning of life and its supreme values?

A word needs be said here on program and structure, especially since we are becoming increasingly aware that these are only meaningful as they relate to flesh and blood people. As we have said before, we of the cabinet are committed to the idea of council on ministries because we believe in principle of wholeness, and even so much more now four years later since we have seen that it works. The unification of program, rather than fragmentation; coordination rather than duplication. As we meet together to establish priorities and set goals, we begin a line of communication that reaches into every work area of the conference as well as into every geographical area. In this way we become aware of each other's needs and aware of his strengths. Christians of the early church found spiritual strength and sustenance as together they faced a pagan world, sharing their hopes, their dreams and mingling their tears. In our society many issues can only be confronted effectively and resolved through corporate concern and action. This we believe will be the effect of our concerted effort. We became aware of this as district workshops and leadership courses became a major concern and interest.

A third major concern is that of integration. We have begun but only begun, to reach out into all areas, as we have made the attempt to become aware of other's

needs and presence. It has been four years since we said we look forward to development of an all inclusive fellowship. We are indeed proud but not happy with the progress we have made in mergers, consolidation, relocations and realignment of charges, but quoting a proponent of integration of a few years ago, that "we must recognize the need for, and right of self-determination by all charges involved," therefore we have not made the progress we hoped by 1974. Much preparation on the part of people and pastors need be done before we can make some moves that at least have the possibility of success, for failure would lead to, "I told you it wouldn't work." We urge each pastor to prepare his people for the newly appointed pastor. We ought to work toward a church that is able to sustain itself through pastoral changes without interruption. This can only be done if we have the help of the present pastors. We look with hope to a future where God will have his way in all things even us.

A fourth major concern is in the relationship of annual conference and district to local churches. Under our now existing structure the program should develop from the grass roots with the assistance of conference, district and commission members serving as resource people. These officers exist for the sake of local and regional endeavors, to coordinate and implement. We also believe the pastors and churches need to become better informed in general procedures in making appointments and in the role of pastor-parish relations committees in relation to superintendent to church and pastor. The district pastor parish relations workshops were very effective as revealed by lively interest and good attendance. We strongly recommend that within a month following the annual conference, that the pastor-parish relations committee sit down with the pastor and come to an understanding as to what they expect of one another especially where a new pastor has been appointed. Likewise other district commission and committee meetings served to enlighten and encourage a better understanding of our common goals. Pre-Conference briefings, monthly mailings, district newsletters, the new newspaper, will serve to narrow the communications gap.

We have looked forward to conference and local churches working together. Now we have seen a measure of success with the participation of council on ministries and churches together come to assess problems shared by all. We indeed look forward to better understanding, better communications, cooperative efforts, and learning, to effect a real church with mission as her goal, where people are not fighting one another, but the problems of our society and world.

Let us say this final word about the local church which is the very life blood of the whole. There is much uncertainty in the small local church as to its future. Costs are up. Pastors are too few. Salaries are not commanding. We are aware that there are situations where merger or realignment ought to take place. It isn't a question of realignment or merger. The only question is, when? We see the necessity for pastors to serve people rather than churches with the aim of at least 350 members per pastor. The day of the station church is gone. Small churches need your help, and you of the large churches need theirs.

It is encouraging to note that United Methodists are taking part in the dialogue taking place in the Christian community. The principle of ecumenicity gives a sense of participation, not in uniting of denominations but in the uniting of people to do the common tasks of discipleship that can be better done together. Christ prayed for unity as he walked the earth and yet twenty centuries later we can scarcely be impressed by the way we have carried out his intentions.

The impact of Christianity has not made great strides against atheism and secularism, perhaps because Christians haven't kept the basic command to love

one another. There is little love and concern manifested when small groups form and shut out all others. As Willy Brandt said recently, the time for "yammering" is past. It is a time for dedication. We can only survive if something more than selfish interest is present.

Stewardship is our final all-consuming concern. We are all aware of the financial burdens facing our annual conference and churches. Many of our churches carry a great burden, however a large proportion do accept and achieve their goals because they accept responsibility as churchmen. We wish to commend those pastors and people who walked with us during the past months, to the goal of 100% churches and to others who worked hard but because of circumstances beyond their control did not quite arrive. The disturbing factor is the few who were able, but unwilling to support their Christ and His church. Stewardship has another facet, that of doing what God wants us to do all along the line. We have a commission to invade our culture, our society, to get involved, to be thermostats not thermometers. We have a reason for being. We are a servanthood. Possibilities are here beyond our greatest dreams and fondest hopes. We know the church with all her potential depends heavily upon an adequate development of stewardship responsibility. Christian stewardship is more than the 10% man gives to his church. Christian stewardship involves a man in the manner he uses all his money, his time and his talents.

Here, we as the church get involved in our vows.

- will you make diligent use of the means of grace?
- will you share faithfully in worship and services of the church?
- will you give of your substance as the Lord may prosper you?
- and give your whole heart to the service of Christ?

(From Book of Common Worship)

Turning now to our relationship of local church to broader church structure of which we are a part — the church that is part of the Peninsula Conference and the world. Let us note that the pastor is a member of that conference and not the local church which he serves, and is committed, along with the congregation to the whole mission of the church. Our new structure with its great degree of flexibility naturally involves openness to meaningful change. When change comes, it calls for scrutinizing of every program in order to determine how essential it is to the total ministry of the church. This means shared leadership, clergy and laity, so it also means work and participation. Participation in local, conference and world mission.

To mention a few broader aspects of the church, think seriously of our mission advance giving, to India, to Africa, our special home mission projects, our own colleges and seminaries and homes for the elderly. We are justly proud of our Wesley College, meeting needs of our youth with its expansion program and scholastic advance to a place where it is one of the finest of its kind. The Country House and Manor House facilities which provide a full range of services to meet physical, psychological, spiritual, social and economic needs of the aging are the finest in the land. These institutions provide care from tender youth to the rich experience of the elderly, and richly deserve our support.

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SUPERINTENDENTS' REPORTS

DOVER DISTRICT

Olin J. Shockley, Jr. District Superintendent

In this, my first annual report to the conference on the affairs and activities of the Dover District, I wish to express gratitude to all who have had a part in the successes and experiences of this great district. My family and I will long remember the warm welcome that the people called Methodist on the Dover District extended to us.

During the year our district bid farewell to four members of our district family. The four colleagues were: The Reverend Charles H. Atkins, The Reverend Conrad Hamer, The Reverend Joshua W. Mickle and Mrs. Joshua W. Mickle.

This has not been a prolific year on the district for births but there are evidences that this may all change in the coming year. However, the district had the opportunity to extend congratulations to The Reverend Hubert Jicha and his new bride, Ellie.

In spite of the tight economic conditions many of our churches have granted substantial salary increase and travel allowances. We hope to obtain even greater salary increases in the coming year for all the pastors, plus additional fringe benefits for books, continuing education and the two per cent assessment to ministers' salaries for pensions.

Some of the more notable building projects occurring on the district are: new educational building at Epworth, Rehoboth; new class rooms at the Blades Church; a complete refurbishing of the Centenary Church in Laurel; new parsonages at Milton, Georgetown, Lincoln, Rehoboth and a fully refurbished parsonage on the Laurel Charge. I'm engaging in serious conversations with several other charges regarding their parsonages and am planning an inspection of two or three this summer.

I am grateful to report that the state of the church on the district seems to be good. Attendances and offerings are up but more importantly there seems to be a breath of new life and hope and joy stirring in most of our congregations. The anti-conference feeling seems to be fading and one senses a spirit of cooperation as one travels through the district.

One of the major functions of the office of district superintendent is to be the connectional link between the local church and the conference and general church but just as important, it is to be the pastors' pastor. I am grateful for the numerous opportunities the parsonage families, both active and retired, have allowed me to be their pastor. I am grateful to the many churches that have allowed me to be one of their pastors not only from the pulpits but through participation in some of their retreats and seminars.

Let each of us give careful attention to our stewardship for the sake of Him who called us to serve.

EASTON DISTRICT

Otho G. Brewer, Jr. District Superintendent

Words cannot express the deep sense of satisfaction that exists on the Easton District because of our having been the only district in the United Methodist Church in the entire United States to accept and pay our apportionments 100% for the year 1973. This was no easy effort and the 62 pastors and the 167 churches are to be commended for this splendid achievement. The amount paid was \$359,827.84.

However this is but more evidence of our movement toward a higher goal. When your superintendent was appointed to the district five years ago he observed that a majority of the 167 churches, both large and small, were simply engaged in the struggle for survival and most of their energies and talents were channeled in this direction rather than toward the real mission of the church which is to proclaim the gospel of Jesus Christ.

A real strong effort has been made to get the churches to build a sound financial basis in order to stress the energy and talents toward the real mission and work of the church. Evidence that this is a success is to be seen in the various reports elsewhere in the journal.

These show 100% payment on apportionments in 1973, less indebtedness than any other district, a majority of churches making monthly or quarterly payments on apportionments just as they do any other obligation, and a faster increase in pastoral support than the rest of the conference.

It is my prediction that the above facts will soon have the Easton district not only leading the conference financially but also leading the conference where it really counts — in membership, church attendance and changed lives.

SALISBURY DISTRICT

Dale L. Ruth, District Superintendent

On behalf of the ministers and laypersons of the Salisbury district, I am privileged to make this, my sixth annual report, and in appreciation to the pastors, laypersons, the superintendents, the conference staff and secretaries, my wife, and especially to Bishop James K. Mathews for his teaching and his pastoral care and inspired leadership.

As I complete my six years on the district, I wish to express my thanks to all my colleagues, ministerial and lay, who have worked so diligently and cooperatively with me. With you and our Lord rests the credit for effectiveness.

I pray that God's blessing may rest on my successor and all of you in the years ahead.

I commend the people and pastors for their response to the district and conference programs. At the close of our year we had paid 96% of the amount apportioned to the District for missions, conference projects and administration. 130 churches paid 100% of apportionments with 6 churches paying 75% or better and with only 7 paying less than 75%. Forty-nine of the fifty-seven charges have seen the need to raise pastor support the sum total of \$30,000. Only eight charges will be receiving some type of aid as of June 1st.

In addition to this, many churches have made significant renovations and improvements to buildings, contributed to community projects and also paid off old

indebtedness. Several new projects, large and small, have been begun and others completed.

Responding to the report of a year ago that seventy-three churches received no persons into the fellowship, I report that there is improvement. Only forty churches received no persons this year.

On the positive side, our district for the second year had no loss, but a net gain of 207. One hundred-three churches received into membership a total of 856.

Our District United Methodist Women gained in membership to a total of 4,585 and expended for local work a total of \$66,344. I must say however we are the lowest district in giving to missions through the conference. Under the inspiring leadership of our new president, Mrs. Robert Thomas, we hope for improvement, and may God's blessings be with you.

Church School average attendance showed a significant improvement over last year.

Three well-attended communion breakfasts were held on the district for laity

and ministers. Our offerings were given for scholarship at the Seaford Manor House. The laity banquet was one of the largest and for the first time we had a layman as speaker. A word of appreciation to Mr. Robert Taylor, District Lay Leader, and his associates, for their cooperation and friendship.

It is said that the work of the church is to make God real in every generation. We pray that our efforts have contributed something worthwhile toward that goal.

Our thanks to the people of the Salisbury District whose consecrated efforts have brought us to this hour.

Finally, to the wonderful parsonage families, I express my appreciation for their loyalty and consecration. It has been a joy to serve with you.

WILMINGTON DISTRICT

SECTION I

I. CHURCH AND SOCIETY

BOARD OF CHURCH AND SOCIETY

The Board of Church and Society was reorganized in June, 1973, and has spent most of the year revising goals and budget for 1974 and projecting our program goals and budgetary needs for 1975. After two board meetings, two executive committee meetings, and five committee meetings, we feel we are ready to begin the work of helping the districts and churches of our Conference fulfill their social obligations remembering how Jesus said, "You shall love the Lord your God with all your heart, and with all your soul, and with all your strength, and with all your mind; and your neighbor as yourself." (Luke 10:27)

ACCOMPLISHMENTS

1973

There are six items to which I would like to refer under the general heading of "accomplishments." First, the Board drafted "A Proposal to Facilitate the Peninsula Conference Response to the Bishops' Call for Peace and Self-Development of Peoples" and presented it to the Conference Council on Ministries where it was adopted and implemented. The proposal calls for a multi-faceted approach through the appointment of an inter-disciplinary task force of which Dr. W. Richard Turner is chairperson. Financing task force activities is through the Board where one thousand dollars (\$1,000) has been budgeted for the Task Force and one thousand dollars (\$1,000) for Pacem in Terris, a Task Force of the Delmarva Ecumenical Agency working in the area of peace education.

Second, the Board drafted another proposal asking the Conference Council on Ministries to establish a Task Force on Merger to make a thorough study of the ten year history of the merger of the Peninsula Annual Conference with that part of the Delaware Conference that was located within the bounds of the Peninsula Conference. The proposal was adopted by the Council on Ministries and the report is to be given to the Conference in May, 1975, on the 10th anniversary of the merger. The purpose of this study is to consider origins, goals, effects, successes, failures, and unfinished business with a view to considering where we go from here.

Third, the Peninsula Annual Conference is one of eight conferences to be included in a pilot project relating to District Directors or District Committees on Church and Society. This project was initiated by the General Board and involves a direct mailing to each of our District Directors on the 15th of each month for the period of one year. Copies of the material are also coming to each of our District Superintendents and the chairperson of the Board. The General Board will be asking our men for periodic evaluations of the material they are receiving and for suggestions as to what kind of literature would be most helpful to them in their work.

We were pleased to be asked to participate in this project and hope it will help us do a better job of supporting local churches in their Christian concern and social action.

Fourth, the Board has promoted two special days, World Order and Human Relations Sundays. The broad observance of these days was encouraged through the writing of letters, distribution of materials, and the writing of articles for the Conference Communicator.

Fifth, the leadership of the Board worked diligently at the task of preparing for the four district training workshops which were held in January of this year. We were most pleased to be able to come face to face with one hundred leaders from the local churches and give them some basic training and material for the work to which we have been called. May we never forget the words of our Lord who said, "Truly, I say to you, as you did it to one of the least of these my brethren, you did it to me." (Matthew 25:40)

The Reverend Warren R. Ebinger, Office of Leadership Education, General Board of Church and Society, helped us prepare for these workshops which were conducted by our District Directors.

Finally, one of our District Directors, The Reverend F. David Weber, recognized a special area of concern on the Wilmington District, New Castle County, and organized a workshop for ministers on the subject of "Desegregation — Busing." The workshop, which was very well attended, provided an opportunity for our

ministers to begin to understand their own thoughts and feelings on the subject and produced a task force to work on a similar program for lay people. The purpose of these programs was to emphasize the fact that regardless of how the impending court case is decided there are problems to be faced which will require informed minds and committed spirits.

Mr. Weber is to be commended for the leadership he provided in making these educational programs available on a topic of broad public concern.

ACTION GOALS

1975

May I take a moment to balance Board accomplishments in 1973 with action goals for 1975. You will find them outlined in detail in the report of the Council of Ministries and I invite you to turn to them there. You will notice we are planning to work in the areas of peace and self-development, community rehabilitation of criminals, welfare payments, housing, inter-racial understanding and biogenetics.

The Board is charged with the responsibility of developing program resources and offering services to districts and local churches. We not only intend to do these things but plan to offer at least one training opportunity for the local church leaders on each district.

REPORT OF THE PENINSULA CONFERENCE COMMISSION ON RELIGION AND RACE

The Conference Commission on Religion and Race continues to participate in the evaluation of all requests for financial assistance to the National Commission on Religion and Race originating in the Peninsula Conference.

There has been one additional ethnic minority organization funded by the National Commission during this last conference year, the Latin American Community Center, Wilmington, Delaware. To date three projects have been funded by the National Commission on Religion and Race. Capital Green Community Center and Whatcoat Community Development Corporation, a project to provide a recreational program for the Whatcoat Housing Project, have been completed.

As a result of the efforts of the Conference Commission on Religion and Race, the position of Community Developer for the Spanish Speaking community of Wilmington, Delaware has been created, and partially funded through the Conference Board of Missions. The main thrust of the work for the first year has been study and research. Continued funding of this work for the coming conference year is uncertain; however, efforts are being made on both the Annual Conference and General Conference level.

At the last Annual Conference a proposal was approved, stating that an evaluation on "merger" be conducted and the results reported back to the Annual Conference. The Commission on Religion and Race, believing that we should be an integral part of the Study Committee requested to be a part of the Study Committee. This has been accomplished and will represent the major thrust of activity for the next Conference year.

COMMISSION ON ARCHIVES AND HISTORY

The 193rd Anniversary of Barratt's Chapel was observed on Old Armistice Day, Sunday, November 11, 1973, in the newly restored Chapel. The guest speaker was the Rev. Edwin Schell, Executive Director of the Commission on Archives and History of the Baltimore Conference, Baltimore, Maryland. Seven members of the local commission, plus the Dover District Lay Leader also participated in the service. Music was provided by the Chancel Choir and the Children of the King of Asbury United Methodist Church, Smyrna, Delaware. After the service refreshments were served in the Museum.

The Peninsula Conference Board of Laity, under the direction of Dr. A. Frank Chapman, conducted a series of Sunday evening Worship Services in Barratt's

Chapel during July and August. However, due to the shortage of gasoline, the evening services for the summer of 1974 have been cancelled.

Since June of 1972, the Rev. and Mrs. Harvey B. Flater have served as Curator of Barratt's Chapel and Museum. The complex is open daily, except Monday, from 9:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. during May to September; by appointment during the fall and spring, and closed from Christmas through February. However, since Barratt's Chapel has been placed on the National Register for Historic Places, articles about it have appeared in such history publications as "The National Guide to Historic Places," and the American Heritage Society's "Great Historic Places." These publications and those issued here in Delaware present to the public an altogether different schedule for visitation hours. In light of the Commission policy, and in consideration of the visitor's information, the Commission will seek to resolve such differences in the near future. All requests for the use of Barratt's Chapel must be coordinated with the Curator or the President. Gratuities for the use of Barratt's Chapel for weddings is \$25.00.

The Commission on Archives and History has a subordinate Historical Society which has open membership to individuals, families, churches, and church organizations. The annual dues are \$5.00. We urge that as many United Methodists as possible become affiliated with this society. The funds received will be used to promote interest in the study and preservation of the history of the United Methodist Church and its antecedents; to cooperate with the agents of the Church to promote historical interests of the Church; to promote Methodist history in general and the history of Methodists on the DelMarVa Peninsula in particular; to preserve Barratt's Chapel, and to maintain Barratt's Chapel Museum as a repository for church records, artifacts, appointments, and other paraphernalia for posterity.

The major accomplishment of the Commission on Archives and History was the completion of the restoration work on Barratt's Chapel in December of 1973. During the process of restoration a study was made on the pulpit wall to determine the former existence of a "high pulpit." After careful study, the examiners found no structural evidence of a high pulpit. While removing the stucco from the wall facing the cemetery the workmen uncovered a Flemish bond wall with blue header bricks. This architectural find indicated that this "fancy side" was the original front of the building. When the project was almost completed, it was learned that a new roof was an absolute necessity. Realizing that all the funds for the painstaking restoration would have been in vain without the addition of the needed roof, the Commission reluctantly authorized its "redoing." The approximate cost for the additional work was \$10,000.

At the 1973 Peninsula Conference session the Commission on Archives and History sought and received authorization to borrow an additional \$10,000 to complete the restoration of the Chapel. Bids were let, and Taazelaer Roofing Company of Dover, Delaware was awarded the contract for \$4,100.00 for a new shake-shingle roof. Therefore, because of the low bid, the Commission did not, at that time, borrow the additional money. The total cost of the Restoration Project was approximately \$52,225.00. Of that amount, \$17,000 has been paid. This latter sum is representative of money on hand from the Commission, individual contributions, and gifts given by local congregations, and members in response to a letter sent in November, 1973. In February, 1974, a follow-up report was issued to the Minister, the Conference Lay Delegate of each charge, the Lay Leader, and the President of the United Methodist Women. This communication was not only a "thank you note for work well done," but it was also a reminder that in order to

discharge an obligation the Commission on Archives and History must have continued financial support in order to liquidate a mortgage.

Gifts may be given in memory of, or in honor of loved ones or friends, as Memorials for either the Building Fund or the Endowment Fund. Two books of Memorials will be maintained at Barratt's Chapel in which all donors — churches, organizations, and/ or individuals — will be carefully recorded.

TRUSTEES OF PENINSULA ANNUAL CONFERENCE

The function of the Trustees is to hold title to property retained by the Conference for its uses, to dispose of property declared abandoned or otherwise authorized to be sold by the Conference in session, and to disburse money in accordance with trust agreements and by Conference actions.

The funds managed by the Trustees are invested through the Trust Department of the Bank of Delaware. The return on these investments is handled by the Conference Business Office at the direction of the Trustees and an annual audit thereof is incorporated in the report of that office.

During the Conference year the Trustees have acted upon the following matters:

1. Executed and attached the corporate seal to a joint quitclaim deed from The Conference Board of Trustees and The Board of Trustees of St. John's United Methodist Church, Seaford, Delaware, to Naticoke Post No. 6, American Legion, to clear the title to the property in Seaford, Delaware on which the Post's building is located.

2. Completed the sale of the Matthewstown Church property declared abandoned by Conference action, and in accordance with the Conference directive, turned over the proceeds of the sale to the Hillsboro Charge, within whose boundary the property is located.

3. Completed the sale of Little Ebenezer Church property declared abandoned by Conference action in 1973, and in accordance with the Conference directive, turned over the proceeds of the sale to the John Wesley United Methodist Church, on Liners Road, in Crapo, Dorchester County, Md.

4. In response to an emergency request for funds to repair the swimming pool at Camp Pe-Co-Meth, made a grant of \$1,500.00 to the Camp and Retreat Center Committee for this purpose. The grant was made from the General Fund Account.

The status of the property problem of The Epworth United Methodist Church on the Blades Charge is the same as this time last year.

At the 1973 session of The Annual Conference we were directed to sell the property on The Easton District, known as Kesley Chapel Methodist Protestant Church. We had this property appraised by a reputable agency. The property was offered to an interested buyer, through an attorney, for the appraised value. This was rejected and at the writing of this report we are placing said property in the hands of a realtor for sale. The Conference directed the Trustees to give the proceeds from the sale to Salem United Methodist Church in Fairlee for the purpose of it being applied toward the mortgage on its educational building.

We plan to have at this session of the Annual Conference a form to be used in the future for action taken on all church properties being abandoned, sold, or listed as a limited service church. These forms will be prepared in triplicate, one copy to the Conference Secretary, one to the Secretary of The Board of Trustees and one kept by the District Superintendent presenting such action.

Our appreciation is extended to Mr. Theodore Briggs, Conference Business Manager, for his faithful service and cooperation. In addition to Mr. Briggs, the Cabinet Representative, The Reverend Dale L. Ruth and The Conference Council Director, The Reverend R. Jervis Cooke, have also attended our meetings. We likewise appreciate their counsel and guidance.

II. DISCIPLESHIP

BOARD OF EDUCATION

The primary concern of the Board of Education is the local churches of our conference. The major emphasis of our programs this year has been training for local church leaders.

National leaders have been brought into the conference for a number of training events. Members of our conference leadership team have also participated in many training events for local churches. Eleven persons were trained through the laboratory process during the year. A major portion of the training is paid for by the Annual Conference through the Board of Education. In return these leaders agree to share their learnings with the local church leaders.

Local Church Leadership training

Conference-wide training events sponsored by the Board of Education were:

1. Two Vacation Church School Workshops held in Wilmington and Salisbury.
2. Youth counselors and teachers from across the conference were offered three training events to which 230 persons responded and worked to improve youth leadership skills.
3. A weekend of training for persons who work with special children was held in Dover in November conducted by Ladonna Bogardus of the Board of Discipleship.
4. The Teacher Learning Center designed a program for the conference entitled "What's Wrong With Our Church

School?" Seventy church school administrators from more than fifty of our churches took advantage of this training opportunity.

5. Local church teacher-training workshops have been held throughout the conference. A new eight-hour one day format for teacher training is receiving enthusiastic response from participants. Several churches have held individual workshops and others have joined with neighboring churches in this training enterprise.

Exis

This year the Board became a member of Exis (Experimental Information Service). A computerized information system for gathering and reporting data on church programming, this service can bring answers to problems of any church in the conference. Information on successful programs used by churches across the country and summaries of articles on a wide variety of subjects are available. Any local church may use this service by calling the conference office.

Church Leader's Weekends

A dedicated group of lay persons continue to direct weekend programs at Drayton Manor under the sponsorship of the Board. This year the theme was "Making Task Forces Work in Your Local Church".

Board Services

In addition to training opportunities the Board provides a number of other services to the Conference. Curriculum resources, reference books for teachers and counselors, and films and filmstrips can be seen at the conference office.

The circulation of information on new resources is another part of our task. Samples of most of the new resources developed by the church can be seen or borrowed from the conference office. For example, thirteen films on Bible stories have been added to the conference library in recent months and two new Bible studies samples are available free to local churches. All ministers receive such information through the Minister's Coordinated Mailing.

Staff Services

Staff services are available to any local church from all members of the conference staff in many areas of training.

Your Board of Education is a resource to the local church. If you share your needs with us we will do everything possible to help you meet those needs.

2. A convocation, sponsored by Baltimore and Peninsula Conferences on Christian Experience -. August 8-11, 1974, at Wesley College.
3. The World Methodist Council Evangelism Congress in Jerusalem, November 16-24, 1974.

There was one New Life Mission held so far this year at the Whatcoat United Methodist Church in Dover, Delaware. Bishop Noah W. Moore was the missionary.

BOARD OF LAITY

A Conference Program Board or Agency should be judged on program quality. We believe that your Conference Board of the Laity rates well program-wise.

Last year, the Lay Banquet at the Peninsula Annual Conference was a sell-out. Dr. Tracey Jones' talk was well received by both clergy and laity. The Good News Gals from Aldersgate United Methodist Church in Wilmington gave an excellent program of contemporary music. Their selections were from GODSPELL, which is based on the Gospel according to St. Matthew. All those attending had a good evening. The 1974 Lay Banquet speaker will be Dr. David Randolph, one of our own Peninsula "boys". We are proud of Dr. Randolph, and pleased to have him participate in the Lay Banquet.

Again, as in the past several summers, the Conference Board of the Laity was responsible for Sunday Evening Vespers at Barratt's Chapel. In many instances, these services have brought our own people as well as tourists to Barratt's Chapel and to the Museum there, for the first time. The publicity concerning these services appears to have encouraged visiting at times other than Sunday. The participation of lay persons in the programs was good experience, as well as a source of satisfaction for them.

Camp PeCoMeth was filled to capacity for the Annual Retreat of the Men of Methodism in September. The churches that did not have participation in this fine retreat led by Bishop Mathews are the losers. The Saturday night seminar, WHAT

IT MEANS TO BE A CHRISTIAN - OTHER DAYS THAN SUNDAY, was stimulating to us all. Don't YOU, as an individual or as a church, be a loser in September, 1974!

Over-all, attendance was poor at the Northeastern Jurisdictional Board of the Laity Annual Assembly in October. Our small Conference had the largest attendance of any of the Conferences. What would be the influence in the Peninsula Conference if all of us believed and put into action the theme of that assembly - GO YE AND BE DISCIPLES?

The District Lay and Clergy Banquets were well attended in October and November. We are happy to report that the ladies are beginning to attend these events. That is good, for after all the Board of the Laity includes all persons!

In January, we participated in the four District Leadership Training Workshops. Our specific responsibility in these workshops was for the training of the Lay Leaders in the local churches. All indications are that these training sessions were well received.

In the spring, several Communion Breakfasts took place in each of the four Districts. Here again, it was gratifying to note that many laywomen were in attendance, along with the laymen and the ministers!

Your Conference Board of the Laity looks forward with enthusiasm to the new conference year, with the leadership of Bishop Mathews.

COMMISSION ON WORSHIP

The Conference Commission on Worship seeks to strengthen the liturgical life of the church by providing training and resources for persons responsible for worship in the parish. During the past year, a number of special opportunities have been planned and carried out.

On October 28, 1973, a conference on worship was held in Newark, Delaware, with workshop sessions in four basic areas: creative use of hymns, resources for the Sunday service, the Black experience in worship, and the meaning and practice of the sacraments. The conference concluded with a contemporary eucharistic celebration. A similar conference is planned in the southern portion of the Annual Conference within the next year.

In January the Commission cooperated with the Conference Council on Ministries in providing training sessions on each district for local chairpersons in the work area of worship.

The Conference Music Committee, formerly under the Board of Education, is now a part of our Commission and within the past year has been reactivated under the capable leadership of Mrs. Conrad Cohen. The enthusiasm of this group has been most gratifying. A church music workshop is planned for May 19, 1974, at Aldersgate Church, Fairfax, with a similar workshop to be held in the southern half of the Conference late in 1974 or early in 1975.

The services of Holy Communion and ordination as well as the daily devotional services of the 1974 Annual Conference session are planned by the Commission.

The Music Committee has provided an evening service of sacred music during the Conference session.

The chairman of the Conference Commission currently serves as a member of the Division of Evangelism, Worship and Stewardship of the General Board of Discipleship; he is chairman of a subcommittee of that Board designated to prepare new alternate rites for baptism and confirmation in our denomination. By making a request to him in writing, interested persons may receive for study and comments the position paper on baptism and confirmation recently released by the general Board subcommittee.

SECTION III

**III. HIGHER EDUCATION AND MINISTRY
THE COMMISSION ON HIGHER EDUCATION**

The Peninsula Annual Conference Commission on Higher Education was organized in September, 1973. John T. Randolph was elected Chairperson and

Edward R. Wilkins was elected Secretary. In response to a directive from the Council on Finance and Administration, the Commission began immediately to study the campus ministry situation in our Conference.

Part-time Wesley Foundations: The Directors of our three part-time Wesley Foundations — A. Jason Blundon at Washington College, W. Hayward Greene at Delaware State College, and Carroll Scott at the University of Maryland, Eastern Shore — attended one of our meetings and reported on their respective activities. Members of our Commission visited Wesley Foundation programs on these campuses. Staff members of the General Board of Higher Education and Ministry, Section on Campus Ministry, visited these campuses and evaluated their programs and personnel. On the basis of favorable reports and impressions, our Commission recommended the continuation of the part-time foundations through the year 1975.

The Peninsula Conference Council on Ministries, however, decided that another course of action was desirable. The Council voted to discontinue the three part-time Wesley Foundations as of January 1, 1975, and to initiate an alternative mode of ministry which will seek to minister to the students on all thirteen college campuses within the bounds of our Conference. The alternative plan will make two hundred dollars per year available on voucher to thirteen local churches, yet to be selected, which are located near to these campuses, for the purpose of campus ministry. A statement by F. Thomas Trotter in the January, 1974, issue of THE INTERPRETER is appropo as one considers such an alternative: "We have responsibility to work with local churches in the interpretation and support of campus ministry. . . we haven't begun to tap the resources and responsibility of local churches for nearby campuses" (p. 20).

(The information in the two preceding paragraphs is intended to report on a situation which presently exists; it is not a request for Conference action.)

University of Delaware: Our Commission has been deeply involved in the work of David Riffe at the Wesley Foundation at the University of Delaware. Two years ago, the Peninsula Conference endorsed the idea of an ecumenical ministry on that campus. Six Protestant denominations are represented in the present United Campus Ministry. Two questions have been wrestled with this year. (1) To what extent should the identity of The United Methodist Wesley Foundation be "absorbed" into an ecumenical effort? (2) Should the Wesley House at Dealware be turned over to the Trustees of the United Campus Ministry? Discussion on such issues is continuing in our Commission, but no specific recommendation on the matter is being offered at this time.

Wesley College: Our Commission has talked with Dr. Robert Parker and members of his staff concerning our relationship, and the relationship of the Peninsula Annual Conference, to Wesley College in Dover. Our Commission feels that Wesley College, one of the finest schools in the country is worthy of the Peninsula Conference's pride and support. We can support the college through our financial gifts and through encouraging our young people to enroll there.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF WESLEY COLLEGE TO THE PENINSULA CONFERENCE

In the April edition of WESLEY TODAY magazine, there is a short story entitled, "It Is In Your Hands" by William R.M. Osborne, vice president for financial affairs — treasurer of Wesley College. This short story is being reprinted here for three reasons.

First the fall enrollment for Wesley College is now projected to be approximately 600 students, or 221 less than in 1970. Secondly as a result of projected lower enrollments, faculty strength is being reduced from the September, 1973 total of 48 to the September, 1974 total of 41. Thirdly, Wesley College may have a deficit budget for the 1974-75 academic year.

It Is In Your Hands

In one of my college courses, I once read an Indian Folk Tale which impressed me greatly, It goes as follows:

In a small village, there was an old man who seemed to know the answer to every question. A group of young men set out to confuse him. One of the youths was to hide a bird behind his back and ask the old man whether the bird was alive or dead. If he said it was alive, the youth would kill it; if he said it was dead, the youth would let it fly. So they came to the old man and asked, "What does he have in his hands?"

"A bird," the old man answered. "Is it alive or dead?" And the old man answered, "It is in your hands; it is in your hands."

May I suggest to you who read this that, in part, the future of the independent college such as Wesley is truly "in your hands." These schools emerged from the 1960's flushed with success, bulging with students and planning for a future that seemed to herald continuing success.

Suddenly, there were clouds portending turbulent weather. Enrollments began

to decline, gifts and grants to shrink, costs to skyrocket and faculty and students to become restive. At best, the line between deficit and surplus has always been very fine — and quickly deficits reached five and six figures, endowments were tapped or liquidated and some fine colleges either went “state” or closed their doors.

But what has this to do with “in your hands?” Simply this. Some of you are or will become legislators. Listen to the needs of the independent college and be considerate of how you allocate the budget dollar. All taxpayers contribute to this dollar—not just those who attended state universities. Some of you are or will become industrial leaders. Help direct your support and encouragement to independent colleges that encourage free enterprise in the same manner that brought about your success. All of you espouse a religious heritage and are endowed with the spirit and tradition of our ancestors. Let it be awakened to a need that looms large.

We are not suggesting that Wesley is faltering or liquidating its small endowment. Nor do we beg support because of either tradition or mediocrity. If this were the sole reason for our survival, best that we admit failure and cease the struggle. Rather we join many Americans in seeing some danger signals that could endanger the private independent college in America — one of our needed ways of life. Here is a “human energy crisis” that we can recognize and do something about before it becomes too late.

It is in your hands.

These few words by Mr. Osborne very aptly portray the current problems facing Wesley College and every church-related college in the country. Perhaps more importantly, the article points to the help and guidance we must solicit from the members of the Peninsula Annual Conference.

The Board of Trustees, faculty and staff know that you can and will help us.

In the March issue of the Methodist Conference Communicator, a full news page concerning Wesley College appeared. The first paragraph of the lead story stated the fact that 8 out of 10 Wesley graduates who attend a senior college, earn a Bachelor's degree. This 80% success factor reflects the academic program and professional staff that teaches the Wesley students. You can help by “talking up Wesley College” to high school students, their parents or veterans.

The College has thousands of friends as was demonstrated with the success of the Second Century Fund. One million five hundred thirty-six thousand dollars will be made available by Wesley supporters to ease the College building debt service and various endowments. This, of course, reduces interest payments and assists the general operating budget in that manner.

Wesley President Dr. Robert H. Parker praised the hundreds of workers and participants for their support and assistance at the Second Century Fund Victory Dinner held February 28, 1974. John R. Ryan, vice chairman of the Wesley College Board of Trustees, also expressed the Board's gratitude for the tremendous effort and success of the campaign.

As the Second Century Fund looks toward the future, so must the Wesley Board of Trustees. Today, a graduating high school senior is in a buyers' market. The war is over, the draft is over, and the surplus of students trying to enter college is over.

Major Ivy League schools are reported to have lowered their ACT or SAT board scores. Major varsity and state colleges are on the road recruiting students to fill half-empty classrooms and dormitories. Here are some facts and figures taken from the Chronicle of Higher Education, January, 1974:

University of Wisconsin cut faculty positions by 88.

Southern Illinois University Cut faculty positions by 104.

Nebraska State Colleges (4) cut faculty positions by 50.

Indiana State University cut faculty positions by 73.

Antioch College cut faculty positions by 33.

As was mentioned earlier, Wesley College has reduced faculty positions by 7.

In the near future, the Board members will again look at the question of two-year, three-year, and four-year programs. What advantages are there in a four-year program as to cost? What is the potential of a three-year degree program as to the total utility of the College faculty? And perhaps most importantly, what is the role Wesley College will play on the educational mix of the future?

As the Peninsula Conference makes plans, we welcome and encourage any suggestions or guidance you have for the College.

COMMITTEE ON THE LAY WORKER

The Peninsula Conference Committee on the Lay Worker has addressed itself to three major areas this year:

1. Preparing and distribution of a Lay Worker's brochure, outlining who is a Lay Worker, advantages of being a Lay Worker, and steps towards a Lay Worker relationship.

2. Designing, testing, and tabulating data from a questionnaire sent to all local churches in the Peninsula Conference regarding employment of church lay employees.

3. Circulating information about medical-term life insurance, pension and social security benefits available to local church lay employees.

In 1973, the Committee established as one of its goals to be the conscience to affect every church's examination of its practice in the employment of lay employees. Items two and three, listed above, were the outgrowth of this goal.

The major portion of this report deals with our findings and recommendations regarding employment practices in the Peninsula Conference churches:

Local churches are employers. Because of this, the Lay Worker's Committee of the Peninsula Conference is interested in helping local churches consider their Christian responsibility in being an employer.

July 1973, questionnaires were sent to all ministers and/ or Pastor-Parish Relations Chairpersons in the Peninsula Conference to learn of present employment practices. Eleven percent of the churches responded. Our samplings include responses from all four districts and all size churches.

The percentage of response by size of church was as follows:

Membership	1-125	2%

Five churches of 1-500 membership have no lay employees on the staff.

Our Findings

1. The first person to be employed by a church is usually the custodian. Positions in music and church secretary are then filled. As the size of the church increases in membership, persons in more specialized skilled fields (such as education, business administrator, etc.) are employed.
 2. When employing lay employees, concerns are basically job analysis and abilities needed, with lesser importance placed on personal characteristics, time schedule and supervision.
 3. Local churches tend to engage in verbal contracts rather than written. However, it was noted that of all the lay employees, the organist and choir directors have the highest percentage of written contracts.
 4. The wage basis by jobs is as follows:

5. Factors determining salary change for all lay employees are ranked in following order:
 - cost of living
 - increased responsibility
 - merit
 - years of service
 - training
 - ability to relate to others
 6. Eighty-two per cent of the churches responding have no tenure policy.
 7. Other benefits in addition to salary, provided to lay employees were:
 - most employees receive paid vacations
 - 16% of employees receive medical insurance
 - 5% of employees receive allowance for continuing education
 - 5% of employees are on a pension plan
 - less than 1% receive life insurance.
 8. When positions in local churches are open, members of the church are eligible.

9. Information and opportunities for church employment are made available to congregations.

10. Policies for lay employees in a local church are determined by:

- Pastor-Parish Relations Committee - For 30% of the churches
- Administrative Board - for 30% of the churches
- Personnel Committee - For 19% of the churches
- Trustees - For 14% of the churches
- Pastor - For 5% of the churches

BOARD OF MINISTRY

This report contains paragraphs by several Key Committee Chairpersons and a concluding paragraph by the Board Chairperson.

Counseling Elder Program

The Counseling Elder Program is designed to assist persons in the process of coming into the ministry by assigning a full member of the Conference, an ordained Elder, to become a counselor for each such person. It is hoped that the counselor will give encouragement for both spiritual and academic growth, and wherever possible, be a resource person in practical affairs for the person in process. A hopeful by-product of the program might be a deepening sense of "koinonia" throughout the Conference.

On September 24, fifty-four persons who had been appointed Counseling Elders by their District Superintendents were invited to Drayton Manor for an orientation, and forty-five of them did attend. Follow-up has been attempted through reports which they have submitted to the District Superintendents and to the Conference Board of the Ministry Registrar.

A special stress has been given this year to the relationship of the Counseling Elder to the men in their Probationary Year following the completion of seminary. Several additional suggestions have yet to be implemented in this aspect of the program, but the Board is grateful to all who have been involved in the development of this phase of our work.

Scholarship Committee

During 1973, the committee approved 19 scholarship-loans for a total sum of \$11,850 to ministerial students. Two changes in committee policy should be noted. One is that the maximum grant-loan has been raised from \$800 per year to \$1,000 in recognition of increased costs of tuition. The other is that we are now providing

some aid to college students who are serving student appointments within our conferences.

Committee On Psychological Testing & Counseling

This year the committee on Psychological Testing and Counseling with the aid of Dr. Andy Hayes and Mr. Joe Dunn, have tested twenty-three (23) candidates applying for conference membership. The following instruments have been used:

- a. Personal Orientation Inventory
- b. California Psychological Inventory
- c. Sixteen Personality Factor Questionnaire
- d. Orientation Inventory
- e. Study of Values

These tests were given at Wesley College, Dover. Over one hundred (100) ministers from our conference have taken the tests to give us a norm for understanding the makeup of a person for the ministry.

Under the direction of Dr. Hayes and Mr. Dunn, the committee also sponsored a workshop for new candidates on Communication and Interpersonal Skills. This was held on January 14, 1974 at Wesley College and proved to be a most helpful workshop to our men for their own awareness, enrichment and sensitivity.

CONTINUING EDUCATION

In the area of Continuing Education, we are attempting to make resources available for local pastors. This past year, two workshops were held at Drayton Manor focusing on the matter of communication and interpersonal skills. Our resource leaders for both courses were Dr. Andy Hayes and Mr. Joseph Dunn, both professors at Wesley College and on the staff of the counseling center there. Some 18 ministers of the Conference participated in the workshop and follow-up.

In addition, a number of grants were dispensed to help local pastors participate in continuing education programs. We are currently in the process of developing guidelines for allocating funds to local pastors where funds are not available in their churches.

Finally, we are also making plans to support the Bishop's program for study leaves for ministers in the Conference. More information on this program will be published later. All in all, there is much that needs to be done in the field to help pastors improve their skills. Our program is limited strictly by the funds available. We do, however, encourage each local church to make this a matter of priority in their church budgets. It will not only help the pastor, but pay dividends to the church.

These are but part of the areas that could be dealt with by this arm of the Board of the Ministry. Lack of funds as with all areas of our work is a major stumbling block.

At this meeting we also made some revisions of the scholarship application that may prevent late arrivals.

BOARD OF PENSIONS

The Peninsula Conference Board of Pensions herewith submits its report for the year 1973. At the outset, let it be affirmed again that our board's primary function is to perform a ministry to persons. A function that was not only established, but also given a position of primary importance in the beginning days of Methodism. As a result of this Board's stewardship and the generosity of the "people called Methodist" of the Delmarva Peninsula, our claimants, their widows and orphans, are able to have some of their physical needs met after they are no longer able to serve in the active relationship.

During the year 1973, retired ministers received \$245,739, widows received \$169,071, associates and their widows \$67,446, Clearing house \$84,000, children \$4,181, for a total of \$570,438. Even in cases where these received benefits under social security, their gross was below the poverty level.

The sources for this total are: Peninsula Conference \$436,300, Necessitous funds \$7,500, gifts \$1,260, mortgage interest, \$1,442, dividends \$66,173, bond interest \$53,069, miscellaneous \$2,949, for a total of \$570,776.

The value of our invested funds follow: book \$2,495,224, market \$2,612,165, a decline of book value \$15,536 and market value \$428,514, over the preceding year. Let it be noted that we are advised regarding investments by the Bank of Delaware. Let it be further noted that this decline is in line with other portfolios of similar size and purpose in other institutions. Our investment policy has been approved by this conference and our investments are diversified in accordance with the "prudent man theory" and the guidelines of the General Board.

During the year, we received a bequest of \$50,000 from the estate of Mrs. Disston W. Jacobs. To encourage additional bequests, we have prepared a brochure which is being made available to attorneys, clergy, and for distribution in churches.

Again, we request Conference members to have their service record verified as soon as possible. And further that members keep current in the payment of the 2% of cash salary assessment. Ministerial indebtedness to this item is \$117,665, and is subject to 8% per annum interest. Student assessment is 1½% of cash salary.

The Board presents the following resolutions:

- A. Be it resolved that the Peninsula Annual Conference shall make available the following funds: Annuity payments \$475,000, Necessitous funds \$2,500, Special Appointees \$12,840, Endowment fund \$50,000. (Total \$540,345 for 1975)
- B. Be it further resolved that the annuity rate shall be \$110.00 per year of service in 1975.
- C. Be it further resolved that the first \$1800.00 of claimants income from our source shall be housing allowance, in 1975.

There has been a great deal of concern on the part of our Board and Conference about the security of future pension for our claimants.

The Board of Pensions of the Peninsula Annual Conference of the United Methodist Church has been paying for its pension liability out of current income, following a pattern that was established by its predecessor structure, the Wilmington Annual Conference.

In all matters the board has acted with integrity and concern for the claimants of the Conference. As a result, our rate has gone from \$5.00 per year of service in 1920 with no endowment fund, to a rate of \$107.00 per year in 1974 with an endowment fund of two and one half million dollars. During this period, our Board has absorbed the responsibility of members of the former Delaware Conference after that merger.

The discipline of The United Methodist Church requires us to be ever diligent and obedient to the "prudent man principle" in the management of these matters and so we offer the following resolutions for consideration of the conference.

Whereas: The Peninsula Annual Conference Board of Pensions is one of 13 Boards out of the 72 in the denominational church which still uses the current income policy for paying pensions, and

Whereas: The liability is continually increasing each year, and

Whereas: The Board has admitted in principle the necessity of funding its liability load against financial crisis and/ or disaster, and

Whereas: All conference agencies by our connectional relationship must share in this decision.

Therefore, be it resolved: that this session of the Peninsula Annual Conference authorize a committee, chaired by the Board of Pensions and composed of 3 members from the Council on Finance and Administration, 3 members from the Council on Ministries, and 3 members from the Conference Board of Pensions and 1 Cabinet Representative, to propose possible ways of funding the pension load,

And be it further resolved: that this committee be asked to report its findings and/ or recommendations to the 1975 sessions of the Peninsula Annual Conference.

COMMISSION ON EQUITABLE SALARIES

During the calendar year of 1973 the salaries of pastors were supplemented by \$22,605.21 of minimum salary funds. The salaries of nineteen pastors were supported.

As of January 1, 1974 the minimum salary guidelines were raised to \$8,000 for conference members, probationary members and associate members and to \$6,500 for students and full-time supply pastors. We are at present expending \$1,683.61 per month, if this continues after conference appointment changes we will expend \$20,203.53 in 1974.

The Commission makes the following recommendations:

1. The minimum salary guideline figures for 1975 be:
 - (a) \$8,500 for conference members, probationary members and associate members.
 - (b) \$7,000 for student pastors and full-time supply pastors.
2. The maximum amount to be expended in 1974 shall not exceed \$40,000.
3. Minimum salary eligibility should be linked to the upgrading of skills in the following manner.
 - (a) The District Superintendent can recommend specific needed training for pastors being supported from minimum salary funds.
 - (b) The pastor will be expected to take such training whenever financial arrangements can be made so to do - (from conference or local church funds.)
 - (c) Should the pastor refuse to take the training the minimum salary commission will review the continuing eligibility of the pastor to receive minimum salary support.

COMMISSION ON ENLISTMENT FOR CHURCH OCCUPATIONS

The Commission on Enlistment sees its primary task as being to assist the local pastor and the Secretary of Enlistment in counseling and supporting youth and adults who are asking the question "What am I going to do with my life?" — and confronting those who are not asking that question with a similar one "What are you going to do with your life?" With this task in mind the Commission set some specific goals for the year. These include: 1) sending each minister a booklet entitled "Church Occupations and Voluntary Service" which provides a good survey of jobs available in the church. These booklets were to be read and then passed on to the Secretary of Enlistment; 2) holding workshops for Secretary of

Enlistment on the four districts during January, 1974; 3) Previewing and purchasing new Audio-Visual Aids concerning vocation for use in the Conference; 4) participating more actively in the summer program at Camp Pecometh by assisting in staff training, presenting a program on vocation during Junior High Week, and helping to set up a Camp on Vocation during the Summer 1975 season.

In addition to the goals stated above, a Guidance Consultation and a youth retreat are being planned. The Guidance Consultation will involve public school guidance counselors, local pastors, and Secretaries of Enlistment discussing how best to serve our youth in counseling for life style and occupational choices. The retreat, for high school students, will center around the theme "What are you going to do with your life?"

Hopefully the Commission in accomplishing these goals will be of assistance to the local pastor and the Secretary of Enlistment as they counsel, support, confront and challenge our youth to see themselves as having a Christian vocation or "calling" and then helping them fulfill this "calling" in a meaningful occupation.

IV. GLOBAL MINISTRIES

CONFERENCE COUNCIL ON MINISTRIES

The Council met five times this year. One of the sessions was a retreat at Drayton Manor. The officers are: Chairman, James C. Hardcastle; Vice-Chairman, Robert P. Whitlock; Secretary, William H. Revelle, Jr. and Treasurer, Robert Powrie. There have been no changes in staff during the year.

I. Matters Referred By Annual Conference

1. A request for a supplemental grant of \$2,000 for support of the Call For Peace and Self-Development of Peoples was approved by the Council and forwarded to the Council on Finance and Administration. Two thousand dollars was granted from contingency funds of the Conference.

2. A concern for financial assistance for refugees in Southern Africa was supported by the Council and was referred to the Conference Board of Missions for further implementation. Some gifts of clothing and money were directed to the United Nations High Commissioner For Refugees.

3. The Conference newspaper authorized by the 1973 Annual Conference began as a monthly publication in September and became a weekly on January 1, 1974. It is known as the *Peninsula Conference Communicator*. Richard Bailey is the Editor. There are 5,535 subscriptions as of March 7, 1974. The paper is published in conjunction with *The Texas Methodist/ United Methodist Reporter*. The Council on Ministries has carefully monitored its publication and is assured of its solvency. Its operation is underwritten by subscriptions, contributions from Conference Boards and Agencies and the Communication item in the Council budget. The following persons in each church receive a free subscription: Pastor, Lay Leader, Lay Member of the Annual Conference, Chairperson of Administrative Board, Chairperson of Council on Ministries, a Youth and the President of the United Methodist Women. The four district communicators are: Dover District, Robert Starrett; Easton, Douglas Ridley; Salisbury, Robert Thomas; and Wilmington, Robert Helms.

II. Other Significant Action Of The Council

In the fall of 1973 the Council sponsored four district workshops for members of local church committees on Nominations and Personnel. (Attendance 245)

We cooperated with the Superintendents in four workshops for committees on Pastor-Parish Relations. (Attendance 450)

We held four district workshops for leadership of local church Councils on Ministries. Training was offered for twenty-one local church officers in seventeen classes. (Attendance 1,376)

A Laboratory School on Council on Ministries and Administrative Board involved 75 persons in February and included a followup session six weeks later.

The Staff is regularly involved in local church and cluster group consultations related to local Councils and Boards, Church Schools, program planning, budget building, interpretation of the benevolent program of the church and all aspects of leadership training.

Our plans for the remainder of this year include: promotion of the General Church Insurance Program; Workshops on Wills; Workshops for local church Trustees; and District Laboratory Schools for Councils on Ministries and Administrative Boards. We expect to continue local church consultations and plan a major local church leadership training event in January, 1975.

The Committee on Research and Planning is currently reviewing the progress made by the Conference Council under the priorities established in 1972. Any revision of or addition to those directives will be studied by the Council and brought as a recommendation to the 1975 Annual Conference.

The Council this year established a task force with broad representation from Boards and Agencies, age levels, and minority groups to recommend response to the Bishops' Call for Peace and the Self-Development of Peoples. Dr. Richard Turner, Chairperson of the Task Force reports as follows:

"Significant progress was made in 1973 towards implementing the Call for Peace in our Conference. The Task Force was formed and has met for three planning sessions. Most notable was an all-day workshop held at Drayton Manor with Bishop Mathews, Ms. Carolyn Wilhelm of the Womens Division, Board of Global Ministries, and Charles Zoeller of Delaware Pacem in Terris. The Task Force is planning to hold district workshops in September 1974 to train local church representatives in ways of implementing the Call for Peace in local congregations. Resource materials are being assembled and study-action programs relating peace and self-development with worship, education and mission will be explored with the appropriate boards and agencies.

"It is our goal to have each local church undertake some activity relating to the Call for Peace by the end of the Quadrennium, December, 1976."

Our participation in Key 73 was guided by a Task Force chaired by the Rev. Everett C. Isaacs. This group cooperated with the major Key 73 effort in Wilmington and in the remainder of the conference worked through local church Key 73 representatives. Wide use of communications channels and regular mailings to these representatives advised of materials, programs, possible

projects and desirable goals. The Council sponsored four half-hour television programs over WBOC-TV Salisbury on the theme "You Can Be More Than You Are Through Christ." The results of the year-long emphasis are very difficult to measure because participation was voluntary and varied from church to church, and from town to town. Many enthusiastic reports have been received indicating ecumenical and spiritual experiences of high quality.

The Council Committee on Camps and Retreat Centers reports as follows through its chairperson, The Rev. John W. Simpser, Jr.:

"This committee is in the midst of its second year of supportive service to Drayton Manor and Camp Pecometh. The following information on both institutions identifies the committee's concerns and objectives.

Drayton Manor

During 1973 the use of Drayton Manor reached a new high with 7,173 recorded people days, an increase over 1972 of more than 600. For the third successive year a favorable financial position has been maintained with a final balance showing \$2,156 as of December 31, 1973. The Friends of Drayton Fund, established in 1971 to provide additional support increased to \$6,622 in the year 1973. A "Family Swimming Association" was formed which proved to be highly successful because of its appeal to local residents and also because of the funds derived from this venture in community service.

Drayton Manor continues to see its "growing edge" in group experiences and individual commitments of those who avail themselves of this retreat center. One of the highlights this year has been the Christmas Week meeting of 54 persons considering the call to the ministry sponsored by the Boards of Ministry of the Peninsula and Baltimore Conferences.

Camp Pecometh

For the first time in several years, Camp Pecometh finished the year in sound financial condition and camper registrations began to climb upward again. We are pleased to report that early registrations for the summer of 1974 are well ahead of last year's registrations at this time. Total attendance for 1973 was 8,440 as against 6,442 in 1972, and total "camper days" in 1973 was 18,318 as compared to 16,233 "camper days" in 1972.

Many improvements to the property have been realized this year, particularly with regard to the swimming pool and to cabins. However, there is still much work to be done and maintained on a continuing basis. Adequate funding is the key to a well-maintained camp facility.

A new statement called "Guidelines for Camp Pecometh" was formalized by the committee and adopted by the Conference Council on Ministries.

Our greatest source of concern at this time is to increase the

number of children coming from the charges of the Peninsula Conference.

The Committee wishes to express its appreciation to Rev. Walter H. Stone, Director of Drayton Manor, and to Rev. C. Jackson Robinson, Director of Camp Pecometh, for their faithfulness to their duties this year.

Recognizing the opportunities for extended ministries at both of these institutions, the following three objectives demand attention for the coming year: (1) To expand our programs and innovative ministries to the people of our Conference; (2) To cultivate increased support in attendance and financial aid to both institutions from our local churches; (3) To complete and activate a "Maintenance and Replacement Schedule" for the properties and equipment of both institutions."

The Council has directed its Committee on Research and Planning to work with the Conference Commission on Religion and Race in making an internal, self-study of our ten years as a merged Conference. Special attention is to be given to the attitudinal, spiritual, social and economic aspects of the merger. Since 1975 will mark the tenth anniversary of the merger of the Peninsula and the Delaware Annual Conferences such a study should be invaluable in determining our next steps and new priorities.

III. Recommendation

The Council, with full participation of the Board of the Laity, has studied the new General Church Legislation in regard to a balance of lay and clergy members of the Annual Conference. The following report ends with a recommendation for Conference action.

Whereas, there exists a marked imbalance in lay-clergy memberships in the Annual Conference due chiefly to the number of ministers in special appointments and those on the retired list for whom there are no lay counterparts.

Whereas, the General Conference has passed, and the required number of Annual Conferences have ratified, an amendment to the Constitution of the United Methodist Church which allows each Annual Conference to develop a plan to add additional lay members.

Whereas, the present legislation relating to basic membership, Paragraph 67, Amendment VII, Page 38, **The Book of Discipline**, states

"The Annual Conference shall be composed of ministerial members as defined by the General Conference, together with a lay member elected by each charge, the conference president of United Methodist Women, the conference president of United Methodist men, the conference lay leader, the president of the conference youth organization, and two young persons under twenty-five (25) years of age from each district to be selected in such manner as may be determined by

the Annual Conference. Each charge served by more than one minister shall be entitled to as many lay members as there are ministerial members. The lay members shall have been for the four years preceding their election members of one of the constituent churches forming this union of The United Methodist Church, and for one year next preceding their election as a member of the charge they are to represent."

Therefore, be it resolved: "that in order to achieve balanced membership in the Annual Conference, the Conference secretary shall report quadrennially the number of lay persons required to preserve equality of membership, and that the Peninsula Conference adopt the following:

1. The associate lay leader for Lay Life and Work, the 4 district lay leaders, the 4 district presidents of the United Methodist Women, and all other voting lay persons of the Conference Council on Ministries, shall be members in the Annual Conference with vote.
2. The following formula shall prevail: Each pastoral charge enrolling more than 500 members, but having only one clergy member appointed to it, may elect one additional lay member, and further, that a pastoral charge having more than one clergy member appointed to it may elect one additional lay member, provided that more than 1,500 members are enrolled.
3. The District Boards of Laity shall elect as many members as are needed to maintain balance, divided equally among the districts.

Be it further resolved that the first elections for additional members be held in the fall of 1974 and that such persons shall serve for two years (to the end of the quadrennium) and that membership statistics reported as of December 31, 1973, be used in computing eligibility for additional members. Persons elected subsequent to this shall serve for the quadrennium.

Be it further resolved that all requirements for lay membership required of basic members in the Discipline will apply to additional members elected or serving ex-officio under this formula."

VI. Program Recommendations Of The Council On Ministries

The Boards and Agencies of the Conference, as prescribed by the Discipline, have submitted program and budget proposals to the Council on Ministries. The Council has forwarded its recommendations of program budget to the Council on Finance and Administration. - c-Develop effective means of recruitment with special emphasis on need for Black Ministers and on opportunities for women in the ministry.
- d-Expand the scholarship and loan program as funds are available.
- e-Develop a program of in-service training in the Conference for ministers.
- f-Support Study Leave program being developed in conjunction with the Bishop and the Area Extended Cabinet.
- g-Expand and develop programs for ministers in areas of general counseling, career counseling, extreme financial crises, retirement and death.

D-To Be Considered In Study And Review Section IV

11-Commission on Ecumenical and Interreligious Affairs

- a-Provide training through materials and workshops for local church work area leaders.
- b-Promote Week of Prayer for Christian Unity.
- c-Keep ministers and other leaders aware of ecumenical opportunities, progress in C. O. C. U., etc.
- d-Participation in Delmarva Ecumenical Agency and recommend participation in task forces, projects, etc., of DEA.

12-Board of Health and Welfare Ministries

a-Continue study of needs of Black Community for services related to this field with special reference to our retirement homes.

b-Provide promotional and educational materials and training opportunities for local church leaders in Health and Welfare.

c-Continue support of the Board of Child Care, the Methodist Country House and the Methodist Manor House.

13-Board of Missions

a-Encourage support of Advance Specials at all levels, Annual Conference, National and World. Special emphasis on District projects in India.

b-Continue involvement in mission projects such as Methodist Action Program and Neighborhood House.

c-Develop a program of Parish and Community Development.

d-Continue a program of Church Extension when the need exists and funds are available.

e-Continue support of Ecumenical Mission projects with Delmarva Ecumenical Agency such as Migrant and Beach Ministries.

f-Encourage local churches to support missions everywhere and to be in mission where they are.

COMMISSION ON ECUMENICAL AND INTERRELIGIOUS AFFAIRS

The past year has been a time when the Commission on Ecumenical and Interreligious Affairs has focused on ways and means to inform, encourage, and motivate local congregations regarding cooperative ventures with other churches. There have been highlights which have emphasized this cooperation but the day by day experiences have been very significant.

Three broad expressions of action will be reflected in future developments in our churches:

1. The National Ecumenical Workshop gave encouragement to the Jewish Christian Dialogue as well as to local church participation in a variety of ecumenical experiences.

2. The Memphis Plenary of the Consultation on Church Union in addition to making plans for study and reworking various items in the Plan, focused attention on cultivating a select number of "generating communities" where experimental work toward church union can be carried out. A special program dealing with the

results of this Plenary session was sponsored by the Conference Commission in Wilmington on April 29, 1973. Rev. Howell O. Wilkins, a Plenary representative of our denomination, was the speaker. The next Plenary will be November 4-8, 1974.

3. Key '73, an expression of Christian cooperation, will be reported on fully in another report to Annual Conference.

The Commission gave support to local church participation in the Week of Prayer for Christian Unity. This involved Catholic and Protestant Congregations in such activities as worship services, pulpit exchange, fellowship, study groups and other cooperative programs. The 1974 emphasis on the Delmarva Ecumenical Agency during this Week of Prayer resulted in the publishing of a full page of information, pictures and reports on various Ecumenical Task Forces in the "Communicator," the Catholic Diocese Paper "Delmarva Dialogue," and distribution of copies to congregations of other D.E.A. member denominations.

To assist local congregations in their ecumenical endeavors periodical inserts were made in the Ministers Coordinated Mailing and the "Communicator." Full cooperation was also given to the District Workshops planned for 1974 to give personal instruction to local chairpersons of Ecumenical Affairs.

It is well that we do not lose sight of a number of expressions within our own conference boundaries that portray our working with other denominations. These are very real expressions of the ecumenical spirit and deserve our full support:

1. The Delmarva Ecumenical Agency, fifteen denominations participating.
2. The Glasgow Project, Episcopal, Presbyterian and United Methodist.
3. The Chesapeake City Parish, Presbyterian and United Methodist.
4. The Church Home Foundation, Inc. and the high-rise building being constructed at 11th and Franklin Streets, Wilmington, Delaware.
5. The Methodist Manor House and the Methodist Country House where approximately 600 older persons representing Methodist, Presbyterian, Episcopalian, Baptist, Lutheran, Catholic and other denominations worship, study and have fellowship together.

The Delmarva Ecumenical Agency

The Delmarva Ecumenical Agency (DEA) is an organization of the Christian Churches on the Delmarva Peninsula (Delaware, Eastern Shore Maryland and Virginia) expressing and experiencing practical Christian unity. The administrative staff is a catalyst and facilitator of the fifteen member Protestant and Catholic judicatories (including Peninsula Conference, United Methodists) to coordinate and develop ministries together, and with other religious bodies, local ecumenical groups, community organizations, private and public agencies. The Rev. Donald E. Leiter, Executive Director, meets with these groups in their local community settings or in one of the DEA offices located in Wilmington and Dover, Delaware.

Ecumenical ministries of 1973-74 include serving YOUTH vacationing and working on the ocean beaches, FARM WORKERS migrating as they plant and harvest, CONGREGATIONS with multi-media and personnel resources for religious learning, attitudinal change and social action, AUDIENCES with religious radio and TV programs, and URBAN & RURAL SOCIETY MEMBERS caught in the bonds of poverty. The ecumenical ministries are planned and implemented through task forces composed of persons from denominations, congregations, community residents and private and public agencies interested in that particular ministry.

The Rural Ministries Coalition has set its sights upon improving the health care

and housing needs of resident and migrating rural poor. The RMC office is a coordinating network for many peninsula efforts in providing services for the nearly 12,000 farm workers migrating through the Delmarva Peninsula.

The Ocean City, Md. and Rehoboth Beach, Del. communities each have an active task force of persons conducting youth ministries with thousands of youth through coffee houses, study seminars, worship experiences, crisis hot line, personal and legal counseling, and emergency services of temporary housing, meals, etc.

The Resources Center is expanding its available services to include information and referral of available denominational and ecumenical personnel and programs for congregational development in addition to the AV resources.

The Pacem In Terris task force conducts public lectures, congregational seminars, and distributes a thoughtful and informative monthly newsletter on the issues of peace and world justice.

The Racial Attitudes And Perspectives (RAP) group of trained persons work with specific groups of people in congregations, agencies and businesses to examine their personal and institutional racism through experiential learning events.

An Urban Ministries Consortium is in early stages of formation. The members representing denominations, religious agencies and neighborhood ecumenical clusters will plan, coordinate and monitor the urban efforts of DEA in Wilmington. The DEA Executive Director will then work with local ecumenical groups in Salisbury, Cambridge, Easton and Dover to develop similar urban strategies.

The Crime & Justice task force has provided subsidized bus transportation for family and friends of inmates at the Smyrna, Delaware Correction Center. The task force is developing strategies to involve the Churches in reform of the criminal justice system for increased local community efforts in rehabilitation.

A Social Services task force, with sub-committees in Md. and Del., is organizing to initially develop ways in which welfare recipients might receive adequate grants for livelihood.

The Communications task force has been charged with the task of creatively utilizing mass media (TV, radio, press) to communicate the aims and spiritual values of the Church. TV and radio programs have been produced and programmed. Plans include expanding efforts through the employment of a Communications Coordinator in 1975.

The Emergency Preparedness task force interprets and coordinates the clothing drive with CWS and Peninsula Congregations. The Lenten Services task force plans and conducts the annual services in Wilmington. A Women's task force is being organized to strengthen and expand the role of women in the Church.

Suggestions For Local Congregations

The Commission recommends that congregations (1) support DEA and its Task Forces and plan to emphasize DEA during the Week of Prayer for Christian Unity, January 18-25, 1974. (2) Initiate and cooperate in ecumenical programs in their areas of influences and interests, (3) give financial support and volunteer services to the Church Home Foundation, Inc. as it develops facilities and programs for the care of the elderly, (4) consider possible parish structures which may lend themselves to additional unions of congregations, (5) activate the local church Task Force on Ecumenical Affairs to implement the above.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF HEALTH AND WELFARE MINISTRIES

I would like to express sincere appreciation to members of the Board who have supported our programs.

Our goal for the year was to educate local church leadership in ministries of health and welfare. As a means to accomplish this goal, workshops were planned for the year 1974, to train our local Health and Welfare Representatives. This goal was realized by cooperating with Conference Council Ministries in a series of workshops. Sixty Health and Welfare Representatives from the local churches of the four districts attended these workshops. Information materials were distributed and knowledge to do their jobs was obtained. The response was enthusiastic.

A mailing plate for all the local church Health and Welfare representatives was compiled and placed with the Conference Office.

Our board is working with the Associate Director for Black Ministries, Reverend John Shockley and the Executive Director of the Peninsula Conference Board of Homes and Hospitals, Inc., Mr. Wallace Watson, in determining how to best meet the needs of ethnic minority groups.

Another concern was our relationship to the Board of Trustees of the Peninsula Conference Homes and Hospitals, Inc. A recommendation was made that there should be equal representation from our Conference in each new class of nominees to the board. District directors promote Health and Welfare Ministries and work closely with the local representatives.

Our plan for the future includes:

1. Improving the agency-church relationships. Our role will be to encourage the churches of our Conference to become better acquainted with their Health and Welfare Agencies, and to discover ways of helping to undergird and support the ministries presently offered.
2. Lifting the level of leadership. This may be done through various training enterprises. Through participation with other boards and agencies and by participation in the National Association of Health and Welfare Ministries.
3. Beginning new ministries as needed. Already underway are two projects related to the Board of Trustees — Church Home Foundation in Wilmington and the proposed Cokesbury Village, a retirement facility for New Castle County, Delaware. We will further explore ways of serving the black community and one idea that has been projected is the satellite homes form of ministry.
4. Strengthening our commitment to Health and Welfare Ministries. We seek to find ways to directly serve the people of our Conference at the point of their needs.
5. Encouraging support of our agencies. We will continue to do this by programs of annual giving through wills and bequeaths and through funds provided through our Conference budget.
6. Developing a unified program of Health and Welfare within the Annual Conference through the Conference Council on Ministries.
7. Strengthening local church leadership of Health and Welfare Ministries through training enterprises and seminars, etc. The strength of our Conference program will depend largely on the board itself. The Board sees its role as that of inspiring, educating and leading the church to new and more effective ministries.

PENINSULA UNITED METHODIST HOMES AND HOSPITALS, INC.

ALWAYS ONWARD - This is the hallmark of the Trustees of Peninsula United Methodist Homes and Hospitals, Inc. Onward as servants of Christ and His church in direct service. Onward as proliferators of HIS love through care and concern for the elderly. Onward as champions for the cause of social, religious, health and human needs of all elderly regardless of affluence or the lack thereof.

The Methodist Country House and The Methodist Manor House are stimulating purpose and vitality in the lives of more than 500 persons who are living in modern, beautiful buildings. Notice we said "living." They are not just sitting out the years in desperation. They are inspired mentally, spiritually, physically by professional workers who do not let the word "professional" impede their primary concern — loving care and interest in and of each individual.

We deal with complex issues as we provide total care for the elderly. Operating as we do, retirement facilities with supportive health centers, we face the necessity of dealing with person and patient. We must discover the difference. Of course we recognize that all aged patients are persons and all aged persons are sometimes patients. We were quick to learn that there is, however, a functional difference between them in relation to the length, character and intensity of a pathology and the restorative potential. There is also a difference between person and patient in that dimension of living, in life's style and life's satisfaction.

The understanding of such problems in total care is what makes our homes different. Our homes (residents) are a therapeutic community, each resident having a therapeutic effect on the total home - much of which is made possible by the knowledge that we are a part of the Christian community and supported by the church.

New Health Care Center

The George H. Piguero, Jr. Health Care Center was consecrated on July 22, 1973. Bishop Mathews, in his address, likened its use to the extension of Christ's healing ministry — a ministry of love, an all inclusive love, the kind of love that mends the body and the mind. This facility, modern in design and services rendered, has operated at near capacity and is truly a ministry of Christian healing. Through the enlargement of nursing possibilities, we have been able to serve short-term nursing for many elderly from the community, some of whom could not afford the high cost of nursing homes. We are grateful for this new dimension. The total cost of the building was just under 1.5 million dollars and the remaining indebtedness stands at \$940,000.

Many persons have shared through direct gifts and memorials. Forty patient rooms have been furnished by residents and family members as "living memorials." We praise God for these acts of sharing and appreciation.

Serving - Community Outreach

We have accepted the mandate of the United Methodist Church as expressed in the goals of the Division of Health and Welfare Ministries - "to serve and seek to serve." Our homes are not islands; they are an oasis for service in and for the community.

Sussex County Home Services, a community outreach program attached to The Manor House, continues to grow in quality and quantity of service to the elderly in

their homes. Since June of 1971, over 2,000 elderly have been provided with a variety of services. Over 300 persons, both volunteer and paid staff, have shared as nurses, housekeeping aides, companions and in delivering hot meals. Through this program, we are serving very critical needs in an area of our Conference which, from statistical data, has greater need for services of these types than any area in our State. Requests from individuals in need average about 100 per month, and it continues to increase.

An agreement with the state for a federally funded nutrition and transportation program was finalized in early February. Some \$169,000 has been made available to Sussex County Home Services to provide hot meals and transportation to feeding sites for the year 1974. This program is specifically designed to serve the low income elderly - the blind and the crippled.

No one will be turned away, but those who can afford to pay will be required to pay a nominal amount. Reverend Nathaniel Miller and Reverend John Shockley have been working with the Board of Sussex County Home Services to establish feeding centers in our Methodist churches and other strategic locations. "Serve and seek to serve" is also the motto of Mrs. Dorothy Keene, coordinator.

Each of our Homes continue to serve as clearing houses for directing services of all types to persons in the community.

Serving Or Not Serving

Over the years we have tried to serve both the "have and have not." We know that many of the elderly became poor after retirement because of a rising economy and reduced income. In the year 1973, we provided \$564,000 in free care, including \$210,000 in scholarship aid. We, like the elderly, suffer as a result of "changing times," but our faith in the future remains strong. In spite of the economic squeeze, we continue to assist persons on our scholarship waiting list — certainly not to the degree we would like, but always to the maximum of our financial capabilities.

The Trustees are grateful for the maximum support of the Peninsula Conference. We feel it is the call of the total church to be in mission. An instantaneous result of the Christian experience at Pentecost was the fantastic and unprecedented sharing which began among Christian believers. There evolved a depth of concern for the sick, the destitute, the bereaved, the outcast and the lonely which necessitated the setting apart of persons and/ or groups whose responsibility it was to give faithful and accountable ministry for the goods shared from the church congregations for the welfare of those in need. The church is primarily concerned with the spiritual, but certainly a generous part of the spiritual concern inspired by the memory of Christ is for those who stand in want, whether of love, food, sympathy, clothing, medicine, nursing, shelter, or whatever. Since the church is called to be the agent of God, it delights us to be the agent of our Methodist churches in compassionate involvement with the lives of His people. Together (Conference and Agency) with God's grace, we will "SERVE AND SEEK TO SERVE."

Serving - New Horizons

Last fall saw the beginning of a new high-rise retirement building at 1010 Broom Street, Wilmington, know as "The Ingleside Home." It will provide beautiful facilities for congregate living, although without an infirmary. This project is

sponsored by the Church Home Foundation, Inc., whose Board of Trustees is comprised of equal membership (Methodist, Episcopalian, Presbyterian), and is an ecumenical endeavor formed for the express purpose of serving the lower income elderly. We are committed to this theology and wholeheartedly support this new effort to reach persons who might otherwise wait a number of years to be received into our homes. There will be federally subsidized rent supplement to assist those with low income. The building will be completed in early 1975 and will become home for 263 elderly regardless of race or religion. Applications are being received for processing through the office of Church Home Foundation, Inc., P.O. Box 1925, Wilmington, Delaware.

Under the leadership of the Church Home Foundation, a major capital fund drive has been in progress for several months to supply necessary needed funds to complete the new retirement facility at 1010 Broom Street, to complete our obligation of \$940,000 for the new Health Center at The Country House, and to enlarge the Episcopal Ingleside Nursing Home. These three facilities, working together in Christian service, will enlarge the health and welfare potential at a time when it is most needed.

Satellite Homes

We continue to promote the concept of satellite homes in towns throughout our Annual Conference. There is a great deal of merit and acceptance for this type local involvement for housing for the elderly, but housing without a program and planned total care does not meet the human and social needs of the elderly. We have done research in this area, developed some basic plans and stand ready to assist any local church. One such involvement in housing for the elderly has been started in the Easton District. We are working with Ezion-Mt. Carmel Church in developing a very meaningful full service facility and there appears to be interest in other areas of the Conference. This is a good sign - local churches can become involved, but we feel that it could, and in fact should, be a coordinated effort with this Agency. They must have Conference approval.

Cokesbury Village

At this reporting period, the trustees of Peninsula United Methodist Homes and Hospitals, Inc. have approved the concept and land use design of a new retirement community in New Castle County. It will be named "Cokesbury Village" and will house in cottages, apartments and studio rooms between 375 and 400 elderly. This is an exciting adventure into serving the elderly by adopting varying life styles and living facilities that will promote complete independence with full supportive services for life-time care. It will be a totally open community. As planning and zoning is finalized, it will be presented to Annual Conference through the prescribed channels.

Serving - The Future

History would indicate that a great deal of Monday morning quarter backing and crystal ball gazing has been used over the past twenty-five years in trying to identify future needs of the increasing numbers of the elderly. We are accustomed to accepting the fact that changes in corporate retirement benefits will permit one to buy and pay for necessary services. The natural conclusion, often sub-

consciously arrived at, is that by the time one has reached senior years, life's lessons should have been learned and a sense of assurance and self-sufficiency should characterize the aging. But these conclusions are grossly in error. Each period of life brings on its fresh battalion of disquieting confrontations.

We believe that the Christian faith, with its glorious Gospel of God who cares, is essential to real health of mind and body. We know the importance of Christian involvement in the planning for a meaningful life. We, therefore, must impart this belief. We must in our church agencies, be demonstrating that plus factor in our quality of Christian service. If projections (double the number of persons over 65 in ten years) are only half true, there is a tremendous opportunity for us to assist vast numbers of people in pre-retirement planning. This is an area of coming emphasis for the total church, but we hope to lay the foundation for its beginning in Peninsula Conference.

Gratefully, we acknowledge God's goodness. We have felt the power of prayers offered. Daily our financial capabilities to serve are tested, but each tomorrow - with all its problems - becomes another opportunity. We will continue to direct our efforts toward Christ's earthly ministry of teaching, helping and healing as we "SERVE AND SEEK TO SERVE."

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF CHILD CARE

Swartzell Assembled Families, designed specifically to provide homes for children of Junior Village and District of Columbia, is in its fifth year of operation. Forty-two children, representing sixteen families have lived in the program. Their age range is three to seventeen. The children, living in seven homes, are doing well and are actively engaged in Scouting, church and school activities. Enough cannot be said of the Assembled Family "parents" who live with the children, providing for their daily needs.

For the second time a grant has been received from The Kendall Foundation. This will be a partial down payment for an additional Swartzell Assembled Family house, and will be home to five more children.

Fifteen children in eight homes are in "regular" foster care. Some of these children have physical handicaps, and have come to Board of Child Care through other rehabilitative services for physically and/or emotionally handicapped. With great pleasure we report that one parsonage family has opened its doors to a foster child. It happens to be a ten-year-old girl who relishes the wholesome, affectionate atmosphere of this family. Are there others who might wish to consider becoming foster parents?

Any pastor is free to refer an unwed mother for counseling and placement of child for adoption, should adoption be desired. We can make arrangements for referral to a maternity home or to other community resources as they are needed. Counseling to married couples is available if they wish to question possibility of placing their child for adoption. The program is a very flexible one because of the diverse nature of social problems which sometimes accompany pregnancy. As children are available, we place them for adoption. Through the Council on Adoptable Children, of which Board of Child Care is a member, it is sometimes possible to match a handicapped child with an adoptive couple. Board of Child

Care has begun several home studies for international adoptions, and will cooperate with any agency placing foreign children for adoption in this area.

Operating at capacity, the Child Care Center in Rockdale is home to teenage boys and girls. These young people are in public school, but come "home" each evening to the Center, where a skilled and compassionate staff await their return. Thanks to efforts of the Woman's Auxiliary, they spent a week in August in West Virginia State Parks. Two of last year's graduates have entered college: one in Delaware State, Dover, Delaware; another in Shepherdstown, West Virginia. Another recent graduate is working as a nurses aid. Two who completed college are teaching school.

The following services were performed during 1973:

- 15 Adoptions completed and finalized
- 15 Infants placed in adoptive homes (not final)
- 15 Infants cared for in study homes
- 38 Children in Assembled Families
- 17 Unwed mothers counseled and served
- 94 Youth cared for in Child Care Center

1974 is Centennial Year for Board of Child Care. January, 1874, after donating a home for the care of orphan girls, Thomas Kelso, age 90, founded the Home in his name. May 10, 11, 12 and 17, 18 and 19 a Centennial Celebration will occur at the Child Care Center, 3300 Gaither Road, Rockdale.

The Baltimore and Peninsula Conferences can be proud of services offered by their Child Care Agency. Fully certified by the Certification Council of the National Board of Health and Welfare Ministries, licensed by the State of Maryland Department of Social Services, and by District of Columbia Department of Human Resources, the Agency has been commended for resourcefulness in meeting needs of children throughout the two Conferences.

With hope that it will be possible to extend this Christian service to additional children, the Board of Child Care has acquired 26 acres at the northeast corner of Harford and Reckord Roads in Harford County. Direct access to this site is available to population centers in both Conferences. If and when financing is available, we expect to construct an additional center for sixty children. Operating budget will be provided by purchase-of-care agreements with public agencies as well as by other sources of operating income such as Christmas Offering, endowment, but without asking from the Conferences.

BOARD OF MISSIONS

The thrust of missions for this decade is to remove all signs of paternalism and develop visible networks of partnership within and without the Church of Christ around the world. We seek to take the whole gospel to the whole world stressing interdependence and mutuality.

I

Board Of Reorganization:

There are three standing committees of the Board of Missions:

1. The Executive Committee

2. Committee on Education and Cultivation
3. Committee on Parish and Community Development

During the past conference year the committee on Parish and Community Development was established by the Board of Missions with the concurrence of the Annual Conference Cabinet. A chairperson will be selected by the Board of Missions not later than the 1974 Annual Conference. The Committee on Parish and Community Development is mandated to consider the following: (Paragraph 1183-84, The Book of Discipline, 1972 United Methodist Church)

1. The committee shall be composed of clergy and laity currently involved in significant types of urban ministry, including metropolitan strategy and action, action training, community development, (community organization, economic development, etc.), local church community outreach, specialized ministries (ministries to business and industry, youth and young adults, joint urban-university ministries, and other emerging mission opportunities in specialized areas), and special issue-oriented social justice programs; representatives of such church agencies as church extension and research committees, city (metropolitan) and district missionary societies, Board of Discipleship, United Methodist Women, and Commission on Town and Country Ministries; at-large community representatives, including both indigenous target area group leadership and agency leadership involved in such metropolitan sectors as education, employment, and economic development, housing and urban renewal, health, welfare, law enforcement, and criminal justice, government and politics, arts, culture, and recreation.
2. The committee may work with lay and clergy leaders on the conference, district, and local-church level to: (1) help initiate and participate in urban coalitions and other associations with leaders in business, finance, industry, labor, education and welfare in cities all across the nation; (2) help develop effective community organizations of residents in inner-city communities and the suburbs to the end that people may share in the decision-making processes on matters which vitally affect them and will open and use more channels of communication between all people in the metropolitan areas; (3) participate in new creative forms of planning, living, working, and worshiping under new concepts which can be made possible through the development of federal, state, and local efforts facilitated by Revenue Sharing; (4) develop the special ministries and new structures, including recruitment, training, and use of lay persons and clergy, appropriate to new metropolitan needs; (5) encourage provisions on the Annual Conference district, and local-church levels for substantial new funds with which the above-mentioned and other desired measures may be undertaken; and (6)

cooperate with representatives of other churches and faiths in developing and implementing plans, programs, and funding for these new efforts.

- The functions of the committee shall also be to work with the conference and its agencies in program areas of town and country responsibility in all places of less than fifty thousand population. It shall conduct surveys and research studies of town and country areas within the bounds of the conference; develop cooperative procedures between the Church and social and governmental agencies, and with the town and country departments of state councils of churches, and with the churches of other denominations in local communities; work to improve the effectiveness of town and country churches and pastors; recommend a program to coordinate the work of the participating boards and agencies in this program area; lend support and involvement to creative ministries through the church and community program of the National Division; and outline a program of town and country ministries to be presented to the participating agencies and to the conference. In program areas of town and country ministries, the conference shall consult with the committee or its executive committee.

II

Advance Specials:

We regret to report that we did not reach our stated goals for 1973 in regards to Sierra Leone — "The Freetown Project" and the Appalachia human development project "CORA." The Board discussed the fact that Advance Specials had always been chosen by the Board and considered a conference-wide campaign. Our low performance indicated the need for a change in Advance Special promotion. For 1974, the Board selected an area of concern and asked each district to choose a project within that area. The results are as follows:

The Board hopes that each District will consider the selections made as a challenge and make every effort to reach the stated goals.

The Methodist Action Program:

The Board wishes to commend the President and Board of Directors of MAP for their splendid work in the area of program development and fund raising during

the seven-month absence of an Executive Director. During December 1973 the MAP Board secured the appointment of a new Executive Director, Reverend James M. Young. Mr. Young transferred into our Conference from the Maine Annual Conference.

Ms. Mary Ducey resigned her position as staff associate in December 1973. Under capable new leadership the MAP program is once again prepared to give direction and answers as to attainable goals dealing with human needs wherever they may be found within the community.

III

The Goals Of The Methodist Action Program

- To work for SOCIAL CHANGE toward the goal of a more just and humane society in which each person will be free and able to find the resources to realize his full potential as a child of God.
- To strengthen the LOCAL CHURCHES, urban and suburban, for a joint mission of outreach, evangelism and service in order that individuals might come through them to a fuller life in Christ and the churches may become stronger forces for justice and Christian fellowship in the local communities.
- To meet HUMAN NEEDS as they are manifested in the communities where the churches are located. The Central Office should address itself to human needs that are not being met by local churches or community agencies.

IV

Glasgow Ecumenical Ministry:

Our involvement in this ecumenical ministry is a significant mission effort for our church. A recent newsletter from this new church stated the following:

"This ecumenical ministry is three denominations united in serving one Lord - Jesus Christ.

While being faithful to each tradition in worship and teaching, we will always strive to unite our efforts in common mission for the sake of the world for which Christ died and is living now.

WORSHIP will be both traditional and experimental.

TEACHING will be both biblical and related to contemporary events and issues.

The founding pastor is The Reverend James C. Blackburn - an Episcopal Priest, a minister of the United Methodist Church, and a minister of the United Presbyterian Church. Services of worship and other meetings will be held in the homes of parish families.

Plans are firm to have worship and other meetings in the Glasgow High School when we have a large enough congregation."

Program money from this board helped to find a staff person in developing an Education Department — with special responsibility for coordinating tutors, teachers' assistants and provide a study hall. The Neighborhood House Staff reports:

"We have attempted to enhance our tutorial program by assigning paid staff to coordinate the program with the school, home, and volunteers . . . The youth enrolled in the program which meets two evenings a week is manned by volunteers from the Atonement and Hillcrest-Bellefont United Methodist Churches plus the University of Delaware."

VI

Delmarva Ecumenical Agency:

This annual conference supports the DEA through the Board of Missions in a shared funding of the following projects:

Rural ministries; and Ocean City and Rehoboth Beach ministries.

We are pleased that Peninsula Conference women again paid their pledge of \$96,000.00 in full. The total paid to the Division was \$101,818.02.

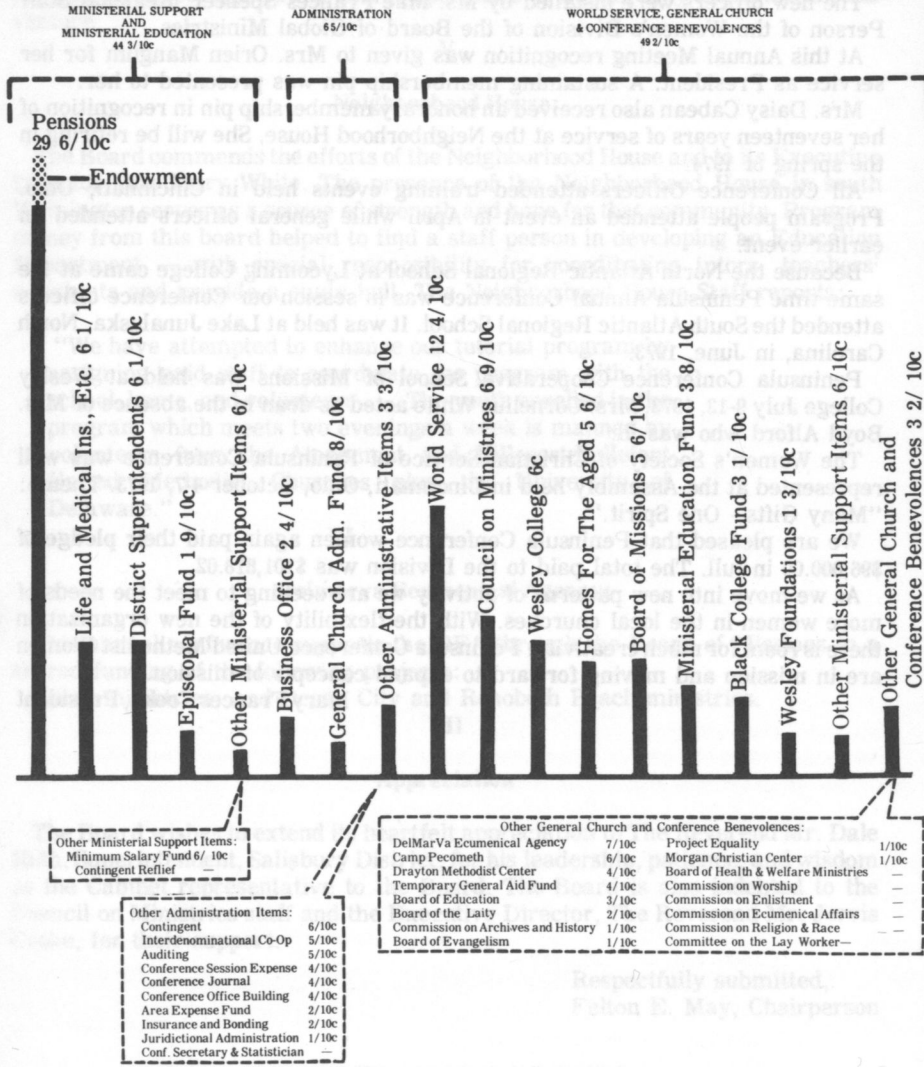

Cash

All cash receipts, as recorded in the record of cash received, were traced to their deposit in bank. Checks issued were examined for signatures, endorsements, etc. and traced to their entry in the disbursements records. Cash balances shown were reconciled with amounts reported by the depositaries as of December 31, 1973. We

did not test the ministers' contributions to the Endowment Fund, nor did we inspect the individual record of payments to annuitants.

VII MEMOIRS

BISHOP EDGAR AMOS LOVE

EDGAR AMOS LOVE was born in a Methodist parsonage at Harrisonburg, Virginia, on September 10, 1891. He was the son of Methodist ministers. His father, the Reverend Julius C. Love was an honored member of the Washington Annual Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church until his death in 1927. His mother, a licensed minister in her own right, was the first woman graduate of Morgan College.

Bishop Love graduated from the academy of Morgan College in 1909, and from the college, with the bachelor of arts degree, in 1913; from the Divinity School of Howard University in 1916, with the bachelor of divinity degree, and from the Boston University School of Theology, in 1918, with the bachelor of sacred theology degree. He did graduate work at the University of Chicago, and received honorary doctorates from Morgan College in 1936; Gammon Theological Seminary, in 1946, and Boston University in 1956.

His pastorates were at the following churches: Grace, Fairmount Heights, Maryland; John Wesley, Washington, Pa.; Asbury, Annapolis, Maryland; Simpson, Wheeling, West Virginia, and John Wesley, Baltimore, Maryland. For eight years he was superintendent of the Washington District in the Washington Annual Conference (Methodist Episcopal). In 1940, following the elevation of the late Dr. W. A. C. Highes to the bishopric of The Methodist Church, Dr. Love was appointed to succeed him in a key post with the Methodist Board of Missions. Thus, for 12 years he was superintendent of the Department of Special Fields in the Division of National Missions, New York City. This led to his election to the episcopacy, on June 22, 1952, at Philadelphia, Pa. Assigned to the Baltimore Area, he served 12 years, retiring on June 21, 1964. Called back to active service to head the Atlantic Coast Area, he served there, with headquarters in Atlanta, from November, 1966 through June, 1967.

While active in the episcopacy, Bishop Love served on the following Boards and Agencies of the Methodist Church: The Board of Missions; Board of Evangelism; Board of Christian Social Concerns; Commission on Chaplains; Coordinating Council, and the Methodist Corporation. He was assigned by his denomination to visit mission stations in Malaysia, Hong Kong, the Philippines, Japan, Burma, India, seven countries in Africa, England, France, Belgium, Switzerland, West Germany, Italy, Lebanon, and the Holy Land.

He was serving as trustee of the Morgan College Corporation, Gammon Theological Seminary, Wesley Theological Seminary (Washington, D. C.), Bennett College, and Morristown (Tenn.) Junior College. He was a 33rd degree Mason, Southern Jurisdiction, and a life member of the NAACP.

In addition to his assignments in his church, he has held also the following positions: Teacher at Morgan College, Baltimore, two years; Chaplain, U. S. Army, two years and three months (14 months overseas); Delegate to the first American Legion Convention, Minneapolis, Minnesota, representing the State of Maryland; one of the founders of the Omega Psi Phi Fraternity, and its first Grand

Basileus for three years; member of the Maryland Interracial Commission; president of the Interdenominational Ministerial Alliance of Washington, D. C.; president of the Alumni Association of the Howard University School of Religion; president of the Christian Conference Educational Fund (eight years), and president of the Methodist Federation for Social Action (10 years).

On June 16, 1923, he was united in wedlock to Miss Virginia Louise Ross of Staunton, Virginia. They have one son, Jon E. Love, and two grandchildren, Virginia Elizabeth and Jon E. Jr.

Bishop Love lived in retirement with Mrs. Love at their home in Baltimore, 2416 Montebello Terrace (21214). He has served his church, his country, and his race nobly, and well earned the time of rest and reflection which he enjoyed. Those of us who have known him through the years were blessed to be privileged to call him brother and friend.

*You bid no one a last farewell
You said goodbye to none
Your loving heart just ceased to beat
Your stay on earth was done.*

THE FAMILY

CHARLES HENRY ATKINS

Charles Henry Atkins, son of David T. and Anna Frances Atkins, was born on March 2, 1882, at Milton, Delaware. He received his early education at Milton and in the public schools of Sussex County, Delaware. In September of 1907 he enrolled at the old Wilmington Conference Academy and began his preparation for a ministry that was to cover a span of forty-two years in active service and take him to the pastorate of eight or more congregations in the states of Maryland and Delaware. He was first appointed to the Canterbury Charge by Bishop John Hamilton. In 1910 when he had completed his work at The Academy he began what was then known as "The Conference Course of Study" and upon the completion of this work in March, 1917 he was admitted into full membership of The Wilmington Annual Conference of The Methodist Episcopal Church. While at Canterbury he met and married Miss Minnie D. Peter, a public school teacher at Viola, who shared his ministry from the time of their marriage on December 19, 1912, until his death on February 13, 1974. To this marriage was born one daughter, Gladys May, who survives and lives with her mother at the old family homestead in Viola, to which they returned to reside following his retirement from the active ministry in May 1952.

In his early youth he had learned the trade of paper hanging under his father and brother. He never lost the art of craftsmanship and became a skillful artist in wood and cabinet work. He enjoyed the reputation of being one of the finest workmen of the trade and shared the fruits of his labor and avocation with his friends everywhere. Many of the congregations he served continue to worship at altars he built and to receive the elements of The Holy Sacrament from Communion tables

made by his own hands. At his funeral, his District Superintendent, The Reverend Olin J. Shockley, referred to his avocation and likened this service to that of The Master Carpenter of Nazareth from whom he had learned even the greater art of helping to build the Kingdom of God.

On February 13, 1974, Charles H. Atkins died in Dover following a brief illness. He had lived for nearly ninety-two years and had been active all his life. Funeral services were conducted at the church in Viola by his District Superintendent, The Reverend Olin J. Shockley, who was assisted by the Reverend John A. Massimilla and the writer of this memoir, and his body was laid to rest in the family plot at Odd Fellows Cemetery, Camden, Delaware. As I left the cemetery that day I recalled something I had read about another preacher. It said that when Dick Sheppard died a certain famous newspaper had a cartoon. It showed a pulpit, and on it an open Bible, and beneath it the sentence: "Here endeth the reading of the first lesson."

CONRAD HAMER

The Rev. Conrad Hamer was born in Baltimore, Md., September 1, 1898, son of Adam and Rebecka (Ritter) Hamer. At an early age he made his home with Mr. & Mrs. Lee Morris on a farm near Reliance, Md. In boyhood he was converted at Wesley M. E. Church near Eldorado, Md., and, feeling the sacred call to the ministry was given guidance by The Rev. Melvin E. Wheatley. He graduated from W. C. I., Dover, Delaware, in 1925 and from Drew University, Madison, N. J. in 1931.

While at Drew Seminary he served as minister at Thiells, N. Y., and Letchworth Village Hospital.

Joshua Wesley Mickle [1902-1974]

Clyde Woods Mickle was born in Wilkesboro, North Carolina, October 7, 1917. She and her twin brother Claude, were the youngest of five children born to the late Avery Caldwell and Ella (Ella Cundiff) Woods. Rev. Woods was a local minister in the African Methodist Zion Church.

She spent her childhood in the Wilkesboro area, where she was educated in the public schools. It was here also that she was to meet and later marry, Joshua W. Mickle, who in time would be assigned a church there.

As a young woman, her Christian training and beliefs began to manifest

themselves in her desire to aid and comfort others, despite her own troubles. A very outgoing person, it was her childhood dream to become a beautician and she studied at the LeMay School of Beauty Culture, in Winston Salem, N. C. until poor health, even at an early age, forced her to discontinue her studies. This truly was God's will, for she was to go on to greater work in his service as a wife and mother.

Having lost her parents at a very young age, she was faced with hardships and trials in her life, which served to strengthen an already unshakable faith and trust in God. It was during this period in her life that she developed many of the characteristics which were to serve her well in later life as the wife of a minister and in her relationships to others.

She truly loved children and it seemed that they almost instantly loved her, for she was able to understand them and their problems. This understanding and loving nature was to make her an ideal mother and source of strength for those who were to know her. Though never a physically strong person or well person, she was to become a tireless servant in God's service.

Joshua Wesley Mickle was born in Charlotte, North Carolina June 2, 1902 to the late Caley and Rachel Mickle. He never talked much about his early childhood because it was a very difficult period for him. As a very young man he felt the call to enter the ministry and as a result he left home rather than be dissuaded.

Being a determined young man and knowing he would not have any help, he worked at various night jobs as he completed high school and later became a student at Clark College and later at Gammon Theological Seminary. His was a struggle, familiar to many of the young men of his era, who, with little more than a burning desire in the hearts and a deep and abiding faith in God, set out to prepare themselves for the ministry.

Despite the many obstacles he was to face along the way, he began a long career in God's service, when he entered the North Carolina Conference in 1934, with his first appointment at Newport News, Va. He also was to serve many years in the old Delaware Conference, as well as in the Peninsula Conference of the United Methodist Church. He was officially retired in 1970, after 38 years of dedicated service, though he continued to pastor for two more years before his health forced him to stop completely.

It was during his service in the North Carolina Conference, while assigned to a church in Wilkesboro, N. C., that he met and later married the former Clyde Cundiff Woods of that city. They were united in marriage in Winston-Salem, N. C. on January 6, 1943 by the Rev. Coy N. Williams.

From this union two sons were born, Leonidas Wesley and Claude Woods Mickle. They were destined to be raised by two loving, dedicated parents in a Christian home and environment where discipline and respect for others was very strongly stressed.

Having known much hardship and suffering in their early lives, it was the constant prayer of both parents that their lives be spared only long enough that their sons could finish their educations and could take care of themselves.

On October 29, 1973, Mrs. Clyde Mickle, after a long bout with cancer, entered into eternal rest and peace, at the Milford Memorial Hospital, Milford, Delaware. Private services were held for her at the Reese Funeral Home, Milford, with interment at the Slaughter Neck Cemetery. The Rev. Nathaniel L. Miller was the officiating minister.

Rev. Joshua Mickle followed his wife in death two months later on January 5, 1974 at the Milford Manor Nursing Home, Milford, Delaware. Services were held at

St. Paul's United Methodist Church, Milford, Delaware, January 12, 1974, with interment also at the Slaughter Neck Cemetery. Rev. Nathaniel L. Miller was also in charge of the service with assistance from the Rev. O. H. Spence and Rev. W. E. Stanley.

CONFERENCE RULES OF ORDER

- Rule 1. The Conference shall meet at 9:00 A.M. and adjourn at 12:30 P.M. But the Conference may, in its discretion, alter the time of meeting and adjournment.
- Rule 2. The President shall decide all questions of order, subject to an appeal to the Conference; but in case of such an appeal the question shall be taken without debate, except that the appellant may make a simple statement of the grounds of his appeal.
- Rule 3. All resolutions, motions, amendments and substitute motions presented to the Annual Conference shall be submitted to the Secretary in writing at the time they are made or as soon thereafter as possible.
- Rule 4. When a motion is made and seconded, or a resolution is introduced and seconded, or a report presented and read by the Secretary, or stated by the President, it shall be deemed in possession of the Conference; but any motion or resolution may be withdrawn by the mover, with the consent of the Conference, at any time before amendment or decision.
- Rule 5. The motion to Lay on the Table, or to Take from the Table, and for the Previous Question, shall be taken without debate.
- Rule 6. No new motion or resolution shall be entertained until the one under consideration has been disposed of, which may be done by adoption or rejection, unless one of the following motions shall intervene which shall have precedence in the order in which they are placed, namely:
- (1) To fix the time to which the Conference shall adjourn.
 - (2) To adjourn.
 - (3) To take a recess.
 - (4) To lay on the table.
 - (5) For the previous question.
 - (6) To postpone to a given time.
 - (7) To refer.
 - (8) To substitute.
 - (9) Amendment.
 - (10) To postpone indefinitely.

A motion to amend shall be in order, and a substitute for both amendments may be received, which substitute may be amended only once, and if a substitute be accepted, it shall operate as an amendment to the original proposition.

- Rule 7. When a member is about to speak in debate, or to deliver any matter to the Conference, he shall rise and respectfully address the President, but shall not proceed until recognized by him.
- Rule 8. No member shall be interrupted while speaking, except by the President to call him to order when he departs from the question, or uses personalities or disrespectful language; but any member may call the attention of the President to the subject when he deems a speaker out of order, and any member may explain when he thinks himself misrepresented.
- Rule 9. When a member desires to a question of privilege, he shall briefly state the question; but it shall not be in order for him to proceed until the President shall have decided it a privileged question.
- Rule 10. No person shall speak more than twice on the same question, nor more than ten minutes at one time, without leave of the Conference; nor shall any person speak more than once until every member choosing to speak shall have spoken.
- Rule 11. When any motion or resolution shall have been acted upon by the Conference, it shall be in order for any member who voted with the prevailing side to move a reconsideration; but a motion to reconsider is a non-debatable motion and shall be decided without debate.
- Rule 12. No member shall absent himself from the sessions of the Conference without leave, unless he is sick or unable to attend.
- Rule 13. No member shall be allowed to vote on any question who is not within the bar of the Conference at the time when such question shall be put by the President, except by leave of the Conference when such member has been necessarily absent.
- Rule 14. Every member who is within the bar at the time a question is put shall give his vote, unless the Conference, for special reasons, shall excuse him.
- Rule 15. It shall be in order for him to move that the question be taken without further debate on any measure pending, except in cases in which character is involved, and if sustained by two-thirds, the question shall be taken.
- Rule 16. The motion to adjourn shall be taken without debate, and shall always be in order, except, (1) when a member has the floor; (2) when a question is actually put, or a vote is being taken; (3) when the question is pending on seconding the demand for the previous question; (4) when the previous question has been called and sustained, and is still pending; and (5) when a motion to adjourn has been negatived and no business or debate has intervened.
- Rule 17. All reports of the Boards, Commissions and Committees shall be published and mailed to the Members of the Annual Conference ten (10) days

prior to the date of meeting of the Annual Conference. Reports to be included in this mailing must be in the hands of the Secretary thirty (30) days prior to such Session.

- Rule 18. No report shall be received or adopted by the Conference until a copy has been placed in the hands of the Secretary.
- Rule 19. These rules shall not be suspended or amended except by a vote of two-thirds of the members present and voting.
- Rule 20. All materials to be published in the Journal shall be in the hands of the Secretary not later than three (3) days after adjournment of the Annual Session or it shall be excluded.
- Rule 21. The Nominating Committee shall distribute mimeographed copies of its report to the Annual Conference on the day before the report is to be voted on by the Conference.
- Rule 22. Recommendations as to the change in format and policy regarding data to be included in the Journal shall be referred to the Conference Council on Ministries for study and recommendation before action by the Conference.
- Rule 23. That no member of any Board, Committee, or Commission shall serve more than two consecutive quadrenniums on said Board, Committee or Commission and shall be ineligible to be re-elected until after one Quadrennium has elapsed except members of boards, committees or commissions elected for three year terms may serve three consecutive terms and shall be ineligible to be reelected until after one term has lapsed and except that when a member is elected to fill an unexpired quadrennium or term he may complete the unexpired quadrennium or term and serve not more than one additional consecutive quadrennium or term. No member of the Conference, lay or ministerial shall be elected to serve on more than two Boards, Committees, or Commissions concurrently, except the committees elected or appointed for the Annual Conference session only, district committees whether or not elected by the Annual Conference and the quadrennial committee on the local church. The distribution of membership shall be according to Districts three laymen and three ministers as nearly as possible to each District.
- Rule 24. Lay members of the Annual Conference will be elected quadrennially. A lay member may be re-elected for another quadrennium, but must wait one quadrennium before being eligible for election for a third time.
- Rule 25. In order to achieve balanced membership in the Annual Conference, the Conference Secretary shall report quadrennially the number of lay persons required to preserve equality of membership, and that the Peninsula Conference achieve the desired equality by (1) the associate lay leader of Lay Life and Work, the four District Lay Leaders, the four District Presidents of the United Methodist Women, all United Methodist Deaconesses active and retired within the bounds of the Peninsula

Annual Conference, all certified Directors of Christian Education employed by churches of the Peninsula Annual Conference, and all other voting lay persons of the Conference Council on Ministries, shall be members in the Annual Conference with vote; (2) each pastoral charge enrolling more than 500 members, but having only one clergy member appointed to it, may elect one additional lay member, and further, that a pastoral charge having more than one clergy member appointed to it may elect one additional lay member, provided that more than 1,500 members are enrolled; and (3) the Conference Council on Youth Ministries shall elect as many youth members as are needed to maintain a balance, divided equally among the districts.

Rules And Guidelines For The Conference Nominating Committee

A.
Be it Resolved, first, that the Peninsula Conference once again record its firm faith in the Principle of Rotation and adherence to the provisions of the BOOK OF DISCIPLINE OF THE UNITED METHODIST CHURCH.

SECOND, that the Nominating Committee be composed of the Cabinet, the Conference Lay Leader, and the Lay Leader of each District, a representative selected by the U.M.W. Executive Committee, a youth selected by the Conference Youth Council, and one minister under appointment from each District to be elected by the respective District Ministerium.

THIRD, that, since the quadrennial system is an established part of Methodist economy, all boards, commissions, and committees shall be elected for a term of four years unless restricted by disciplinary, charter, or other legal requirements. In the event of such legal restrictions, the Principle of Rotation is to be observed.

FOURTH, that the date of election to any board, commission or committee be clearly indicated in the Journal.

FIFTH, that no member of any board, committee, or commission shall serve more than two consecutive quadrennia on said board, committee or commission and shall be ineligible to be re-elected until after one quadrennium has elapsed, except members of boards, committees, or commissions elected for three year terms may serve three consecutive terms and shall be ineligible to be re-elected until after one term has lapsed and except that, when a member is elected to fill an unexpired quadrennium or term, and serve not more than one additional consecutive quadrennium or term.

SIXTH, that no member of the conference, lay or ministerial shall serve on more than two boards, commissions, or committees, concurrently. Ex-officio membership on conference boards or agencies shall not count toward the total of two unless such membership exceeds two. In cases where a member is an ex-officio member on more than two boards or agencies, all excess of two shall count toward the total of two. The following shall not be under the conference rotation system nor counted in the above total: district committees or secretaries, Wesley College Trustees, Board of Directors of the Wesley Foundation, Board of Trustees of the Peninsula Methodist Homes and Hospitals, Inc. In the case of the Board of the Ministry, the Nominating Committee is to request the courtesy of the bishop in-

forming them as to those persons who will be named to the Board of Ministry, in order to assist the Nominating Committee in equal distribution of responsibility on the part of conference ministry members. The Nominating Committee will consider membership on the Board of Ministry as one of two memberships permitted to each minister. It is understood that this is not a legal requirement, rather a requested courtesy, the purpose of which would be to seek the broadest amount of leadership in the total Conference organization.

SEVENTH, that an age limit of 72 shall be established for both ministers and laymen. If a ministerial member shall retire before the age of 72, he shall then relinquish his privilege to serve on conference boards, and agencies.

EIGHTH, that a conscientious effort shall be made to distribute membership geographically. No fixed number shall be assigned, however, to any one district, since this could become artificial and impractical. The Conference Nominating Committee should be dedicated to the principle of the best leadership, keeping in mind the geographical concept of the conference.

NINTH, that ministerial membership on Annual Conference boards and agencies shall be limited to active full-time conference members and associate members. Ministerial members of conference boards and agencies shall be members of the Peninsula Annual Conference in order to serve on conference boards and agencies; laymen, in order to be eligible to serve on the conference boards and agencies, shall be members of a local church within the conference; the Conference Nominating Committee may select other persons as affiliate members.

TENTH, that it is the intention of the Cabinet to select only one representative from the Cabinet to serve on conference boards, committees and agencies as an ex-officio member.

ELEVENTH, that, recognizing again the belief in the principle of rotating in order to involve greater leadership, all district committees and offices shall be elected to two-year terms with a maximum of four years, and persons shall be ineligible for re-election until after a two-year term has elapsed.

TWELFTH, every case of a nominee to any board, commission or committee shall be notified before his name is placed before the conference.

B.

Concerning the report of the Nominating Committee and the securing of talent:

FIRST, that the report of the Nominating Committee at the Annual Conference session will reflect a complete adherence to all the guidelines established by the Annual Conference.

SECOND, that new nominations shall be circulated prior to the Annual Conference session, in order to be studied by all conference members previous to the opening of the session. If possible they should accompany the mailing of the pre-conference reports.

THIRD, that forms prepared by the Conference Program Council shall be circulated for both ministers and laymen in local churches to indicate areas of interest, thus creating a Talent Bank. In addition, the same form shall be sent to members of the Cabinet, Board of Lay Activities, Conference U.M.W. Executive Committee, and Conference Youth Council in order to obtain names that might otherwise be overlooked. These forms shall be reported to the secretary of the Conference Nominating Committee.

FOURTH, that a complete file of all ministers in the conference should be kept indicating where each man is serving in terms of conference boards and agencies. Laymen should likewise be listed on a similar file. A third file would be divided

between ministers and laymen as part of the Conference Talent Bank.

C.

Miscellaneous.

FIRST, that failure to attend the particular board or agency to which one is assigned for at least one called meeting during the year, without written explanation or statement of intended activity to the chairman of that board or agency, will be subject to automatic removal in the next nominating report. A report of the board or agency chairman to the secretary of the Conference Nominating Committee by March 1st will include the attendance record of his board, committee or agency.

SECOND, that a minimum of four meetings per year should be held by the Nominating Committee (it may be advisable that the committee meet more often, since its influence is so broad; whenever the committee approaches a new quadrennium, this latter need for additional meetings may be more evident).

THIRD, that the above adopted guidelines for the Nominating Committee of the Annual Conference shall become a printed part of its report at each Annual Conference session.

At the beginning of a new quadrennium a complete and open look at membership on all boards and agencies shall be initiated by the Conference Nominating Committee.

FIRST, All personnel shall be eligible for re-alignment. The exception would be that any member with a total of two quadrennia of service or three 3-year terms shall be ineligible to serve on that board or agency until the expiration of either a quadrennium or a 3-year term.

SECOND, Quadrennial boards shall have two even classes; triennial boards shall have three evenly divided classes.

The following were adopted:

1. The council director, associate council directors, district superintendents, and the home administrators, not be elected to boards and agencies under the conference rotation system but serve only as ex-officio where mandated by the Discipline or the Annual Conference.

2. Dissolve the Conference Education Society and replace with a Scholarship and Loan Committee composed of 4 elected members - 2 laymen and 2 ministers; 5 ex-officio members - 4 from Board of Ministry and Wilmington District Superintendent.

(4) Conference Council Director, be made ex-officio member of Conference Nominating Committee and Committee on Conference Program and Entertainment.

(5) Conference and District U.M.W. Presidents be made ex-officio members of Council on Ministries.

(6) Membership on Committee on Investigation shall be exempt from total number of Boards where one may serve.

(7) Two (2) high school youth (preferably 10th and 11th grades) shall be ex-officio members of Boards 1, 2, 3, 6, 8, 10, 12, 14, 15, 17, 24, and 25. These shall be selected by the Conference Youth Council each year, and the names shall appear in the Journal.

(8) The Council on Ministries appoint a rules committee to study the Conference Rules of Order and make recommendations to the Conference for any changes or additions. These recommendations shall appear in the Pre-Conference report

beginning in 1973.

(9) The Scholarship and Loan Committee be composed of 7 elected members - 5 laymen and 2 ministers; 3 ex-officio members - 2 from the Board of the Ministry and Wilmington District Superintendent.

"In coordinating all scholarship assistance programs for students of the Peninsula Conference, this committee shall not interfere with the responsibility given to the Board of Ministry by the Discipline to administer the Ministerial Education Fund, or with legal restrictions associated with the administration of Trust Funds for scholarship purposes."
