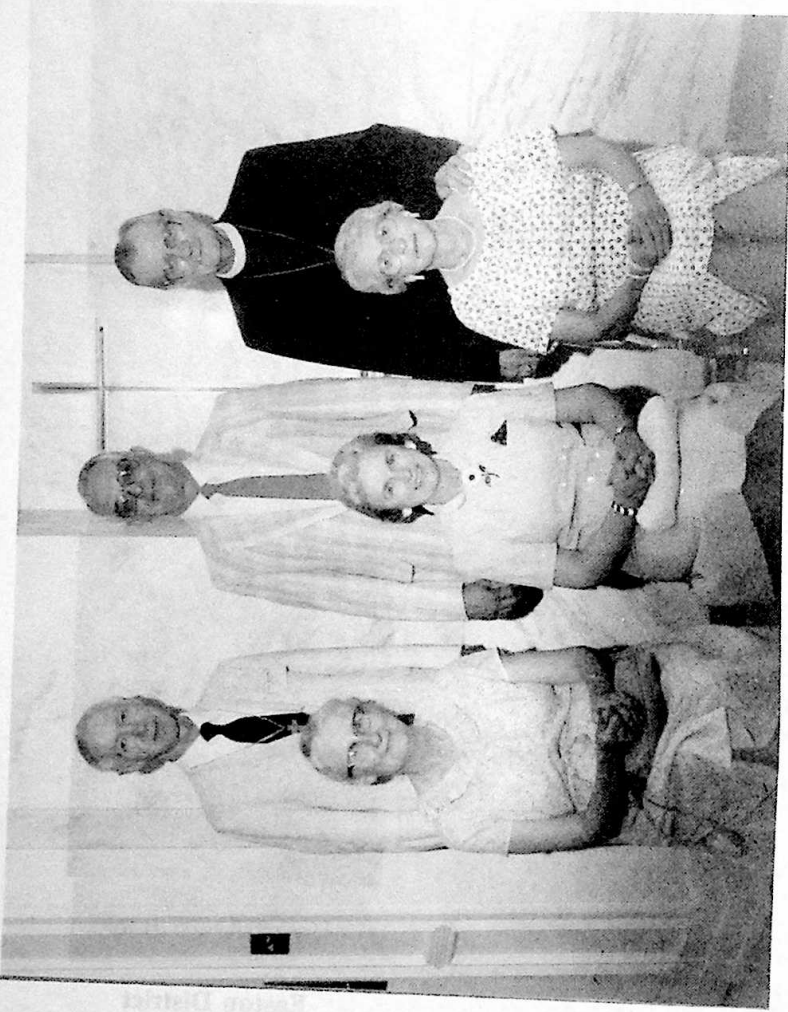

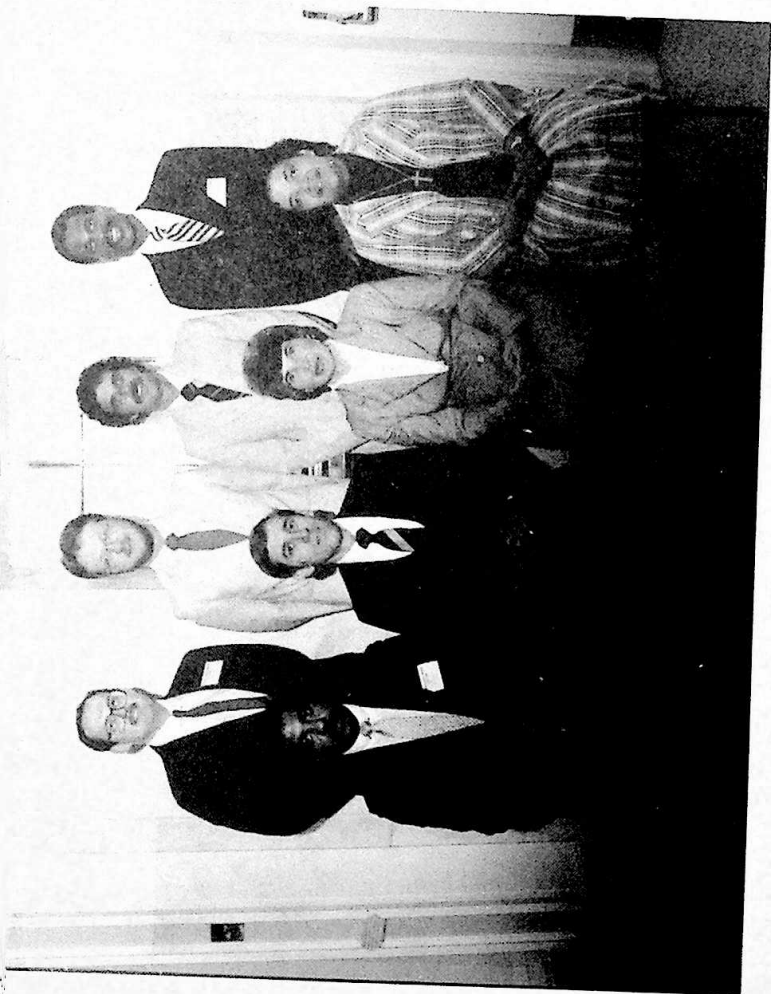

RULES AND GUIDELINES FOR THE CONFERENCE NOMINATING COMMITTEE

A.

1. That the Peninsula Conference again record its faith in the Principle of Rotation and adherence to the provisions of the Book of Discipline of The United Methodist Church.

2. That the Nominating Committee be composed of the Cabinet, the Conference Secretary, the Conference Lay Leader, the Lay Leader of each District, the Conference President of United Methodist Men, a representative selected by the United Methodist Women Executive Committee, the District Presidents of United Methodist Women, a youth selected by the Conference Youth Council, one minister under appointment from each District to be elected for a quadrennium by the respective District Ministerium, and the Conference Council Director.

3. That, since the quadrennial system is an established part of the Methodist economy, all members of boards, commissions, and committees shall be elected for a quadrennium unless restricted by Discipline, charter, or some other legal requirement. In the event of such legal restrictions, the Principle of Rotation is still to be observed.

4. That no member of any board, committee, or commission shall serve more than two consecutive quadrennia on said board, committee or commission and shall be eligible to be re-elected until after one quadrennium has elapsed, except members of boards, committees, or commissions elected for three-year terms may serve three consecutive terms and shall be ineligible to be re-elected until after one term has elapsed and except that, when a member is elected to fill an unexpired quadrennium or term and serve not more than one additional consecutive quadrennium or term.

5. That no member of the Conference, lay or ministerial, shall serve on more than two boards, commissions, or committees concurrently. Ex-officio membership on conference boards or agencies in excess of two shall count toward the total of two. The following shall not be under the Conference rotation system nor counted in the above total: district committees or secretaries, Wesley College Trustees, Board of Directors of the Wesley Foundations, Board of Trustees of the Peninsula Methodist Homes, Inc., the Episcopal Residence Committee and the Committee on Investigation. In the case of the Board of Ordained Ministry, the Nominating Committee is to request the courtesy of the bishop to inform them as to those persons who will be named to the Board of Ordained Ministry, in order to assist the Nominating Committee in equal distribution of responsibility on the part of the Conference ministry members. The Nominating Committee will consider membership on the Board of Ordained Ministry as one of two memberships permitted to each minister.

6. Insofar as possible, the membership on Councils, Boards, and Agencies of the Annual Conference shall include one-third clergy, one-third laywomen, and one-third laymen, in keeping with policies for general church agencies, except for the Board of Ordained Ministry.

7. That ministerial membership on Annual Conference boards and agencies shall be limited to Conference members and associate members of the Peninsula Annual Conference. In order to be eligible to serve on the Conference boards and agencies, lay members shall be members of a local church within the Annual Conference. The Conference Nominating Committee may select other persons as affiliate members without vote.

8. "In recognition of the Rights of the Aging" as stated in the Social Creed of the United Methodist Church (Page 92 of the Discipline), age shall not be a barrier to serve on any board, council, or agency of the Annual Conference. However, the Conference Nominating Committee shall give careful attention to assuring that younger members of the Conference are given full opportunity for service.

9. That a conscientious effort shall be made to distribute membership geographically. No fixed number shall be assigned, however, to any one district, since this could become artificial and impractical. Consideration shall be given to the inclusion of lay and clergy persons from small membership churches.

10. That the Cabinet select only one representative from the Cabinet to serve on a Conference board and all the divisions of the board, and one cabinet representative each on all other support agencies except where the Discipline states otherwise.

11. That failure to attend the particular board or agency to which one is assigned for at least one called meeting during the year, without written explanation, or statement of intended activity to the chairperson of that board or agency, one will be subject to automatic removal in the next nominating committee's report. A report of the board or agency chairperson to the secretary of the Conference Nominating Committee by March 1st will include the attendance record of this board, committee or agency.

12. That the Conference Nominating Committee designate persons to serve as a Nominating Committee for the Boards, Commissions and Committees. The District Superintendent assigned to the agency is the convenor of this committee. The nominating committee shall be prepared at the organization meeting to nominate officers for the quadrennium for any that have not so designated their own by April 15.

13. That the date of election to any board, commission or committee be clearly indicated in the journal.

14. That in every case a nominee of any board, commission or committee shall be notified and consent to serve before the name is placed before the Conference. When vacancies occur in report, nominations may be made from the floor, provided that the nominee is present and agrees to serve.

15. That, recognizing again the belief in the principle of rotation in order to involve greater leadership, all district committees and officers shall be elected to four-year terms with a maximum of eight years and persons shall be ineligible for re-election until after a four-year term has elapsed, with the exception of the District Committee of Ordained Ministry and the District Committee on Church Building and Location which shall serve a minimum of four years and a maximum of eight years.

B.

Concerning the Nominating Committee, its report and the securing of talent:

1. That the report of the Nominating Committee at the Annual Conference session will reflect a complete adherence to all the guidelines established by the Annual Conference.

2. The Nominating Committee shall distribute mimeographed copies of its report to the Annual Conference on the day before the report is to be voted on by the Conference.

3. That forms shall be circulated for both ministers and laity in local churches to indicate areas of interest, thus creating a Talent Bank. In addition, the same form shall be sent to members of the Cabinet, Board of Laity, Conference United Methodist Women, Executive Committee, and Conference Youth Council in order to obtain names that might otherwise be overlooked. These forms shall be returned to the secretary of the Conference Nominating Committee.

4. That a complete file of all ministers in the Conference should be kept indicating where each one is serving in terms of Conference boards and agencies. Laity should likewise be listed on a similar file. A third file would be divided between ministers and laity as part of the Conference Talent Bank.

5. That a minimum of four meetings per year should be held by the Nominating Committee (it may be advisable that the committee meet more often, since its influence is so broad; whenever the committee approaches a new quadrennium, this latter need for additional meetings may be more evident.)

6. That the above adopted guidelines for the Nominating Committee of the Annual Conference shall become a printed part of its report at each Annual Conference session.

7. That at the beginning of a new quadrennium, a complete and open look at membership on all boards and agencies shall be initiated by the Conference Nominating Committee and all personnel shall be eligible for re-alignment in accordance with A-5.

8. Titles such as "Mrs.", "Miss", or "Mr." shall not be used in the preparation of the Nominating Committee report.

Miscellaneous

1. That the council director, and associate council directors, not be elected to boards and agencies under the Conference rotation, but serve only as ex-officio where assigned by the council director.

2. That two (2) high school youth (preferably 10th and 11th grades) shall be members of the following boards, divisions and committees: Commission on Christian Unity & Interreligious Concerns, Division of Education, Division of Evangelism, Division of Health and Welfare Ministries, Division of Missions, Board of Church and Society, Division of Career Planning and Counseling, Division of Worship, Conference Council on Ministries, Board of Laity, Conference Nominating Committee, and Committee on Conference arrangements. These shall be selected by the Conference Youth Council each year.

THE PROCESS OF MAKING APPOINTMENTS

Par. 57 Article X - The bishops shall appoint, after consultation with the district superintendents, ministers to the charges; and they shall have such responsibilities and authorities as the General Conference shall prescribe.

Article X, quoted above from the 1984 Discipline, is the primary authority for itineracy in the Constitution of The United Methodist Church. (The Constitution can only be changed by a 2/3 vote of the 74 Annual Conferences. All other Discipline paragraphs quoted in these pages are in Part IV, Organization and Administration, and require only a majority vote of the General Conference to change.) This constitutional delegation of responsibility and authority cannot be negotiated or modified. All pastors accept this as part of their ordination and Conference membership vows, and all United Methodist churches are by covenant and law so committed.

Par. 436 - The Itinerant System - The itinerant system is the accepted method of The United Methodist Church by which ordained ministers are appointed by the bishop to fields of labor. All ordained ministers shall accept and abide by these appointments.

Par. 529 - Responsibility - Pastors and clergy in appointments beyond the local church shall be appointed by a bishop, who is empowered to make and fix all appointments in the episcopal area within which the Annual Conference is a part. Appointments are to be made with consideration of the gifts and graces of those appointed, to the needs, characteristics, and opportunities of congregations and institutions, and with faithfulness to our commitment to an open itineracy. Open itineracy means appointments are made without regard to race, ethnic origin, sex, color, or age, except for the provisions of mandatory retirement. Through appointment-making, the connectional nature of the United Methodist system is made visible.

Par. 412.2 - Both men and women are included in all provisions of the Discipline which refer to the ministry.

Par. 530 - Consultation and Appointment-Making - Consultation is the process whereby the bishop and/or district superintendent confer with the pastor and Pastor-Parish Relations Committee, taking into consideration the criteria of Par. 531, a performance evaluation, needs of the appointment under consideration, and mission of the church. Consultation is not merely notification. Consultation is not committee selection or call of a pastor. Consultation is both a continuing process and a more intense involvement during the period of change in appointment. Consultation is not negotiation or voting upon the appointment of a pastor. It is information sharing and advice to the cabinet and bishop prior to the bishop's fixing the appointment.

Par. 532 - Process of Appointment-Making - 1. A change in appointment may be initiated by a pastor, a Pastor-Parish Relations Committee, a district superintendent, or a bishop.

Pastor-Parish Relations chairpersons and/or pastors are asked to make such requests by using the evaluation form which is required to be sent annually to the district superintendent by January 15th. (See "Timeline for Appointment-Making" - #2.) The Pastor-Parish Relations Committee is to represent the charge in the appointment-making process. The chairperson is the designated officer through whom the charge contacts the district superintendent, and through whom the district superintendent contacts the charge.

Par. 532.2 - The bishop and the Cabinet shall consider all requests for change of appointment in light of the criteria developed for each charge and the gifts and graces, professional experience, and family needs of the pastor.

Par. 532.3 - When a change in appointment has been determined, the district superintendent should meet together or separately with the pastor and the Pastor-Parish Relations Committee where the pastor is serving, for the purpose of sharing the basis for the change and the process used in making the new appointment.

This meeting will provide the pastor the opportunity, in the presence of the district superintendent, to declare his/her acceptance of the change

of appointment, stating his/her reasons for responding to the new opportunity and thereby to facilitate the grief process for the pastor and for the congregation.

Par. 532.4 - All appointments shall receive consideration by the bishop and the district superintendent(s) and the Cabinet as a whole until a tentative decision is made.

We interpret this to mean that all appointments require the participation of the entire Cabinet. This is to insure that all ministers of the Conference are considered whenever there is an opening.

Par. 532.5 - The process used in making the new appointment shall include: a) The district superintendent shall confer with the pastor about a specific possible appointment (charge) and its congruence with gifts, graces, professional experience and expectations, and the family needs of the pastor identified in consultation with the pastor (Par. 531.2).

Only "open" charges (churches) shall be considered by the Cabinet. A charge (church) becomes open by virtue of its pastor's retirement, change of appointment, leave of absence, sabbatical leave, disability, location, death or withdrawal from the United Methodist ministry. In certain situations the Cabinet, with the written agreement of the present pastor and the knowledge of the Pastor-Parish Relations Committee, may declare a charge "open" for appointment purposes.

Par. 532.6 - The district superintendent shall confer with the receiving Pastor-Parish Relations Committee about pastoral leadership (Par. 531.1).

Par. 532.7 - When appointments are being made to less than full-time ministry, the district superintendent shall consult with the minister to be appointed and the Pastor-Parish Relations Committee regard proportional time, salary, and pension credit.

Par. 532.8 - If during this consultative process it is determined by the bishop and Cabinet that this decision should not be carried out, the process is to be repeated until the bishop, basing his/her decision on the information and advice derived from consultation, makes and fixes the appointment.

Par. 532.9 - A similar process of consultation shall be available to persons in appointments beyond the local church.

Par. 532.10 - When the steps in the process have been followed and completed, the announcement of that decision shall be made to all parties directly involved in the consultative process; that is, the appointment Cabinet, the pastor, and the Pastor-Parish Relations Committee (of both charges) before a public announcement is made.

Par. 531 - Criteria - Appointments shall take into account the unique needs of a charge in a particular setting and also the gifts and graces of a particular pastor. To assist bishops, Cabinets, pastors, and congregations to achieve an effective match of charges and pastors, criteria must be developed and analyzed in each instance and then shared with pastors and congregations.

1. Congregations - the district superintendent shall develop with the pastor and Pastor-Parish Relations Committees of all churches profiles reflecting the needs, characteristics, and opportunities for mission of the charge consistent with the church's statement of purpose (Par. 520.1). These profiles shall be reviewed annually and updated when appropriate to include:

a) The general situation in which a congregation finds itself in a particular setting: size, financial condition, quality of lay leadership, history.

b) The convictional stance of the congregation: theology; prejudices, if any; spiritual life.

c) The ministry of the congregation among its people for the sake of the community: service programs, basis for adding new members, reasons for losing members, mission to community and world, forms of witness.

d) The qualities and functions of pastoral ministry needed to fulfill the mission and goals of the congregation.

2. Pastors - The district superintendent and the pastor shall identify the pastor's gifts, graces, and professional experience and expectations, and also the needs and concerns of the pastor's spouse and family.

a) Spiritual and personal sensibility: personal faith, call and commitment to ordained ministry, work through the institutional Church, integration of vocation with personal and family well-being, life-style.

b) Academic and career background: nature of theological stance, experience in continuing education, professional experience, record of performance, age.

c) Skills and abilities in church administration, leadership development, worship and liturgy, preaching and evangelism, teaching and nurturing, counseling and group work, ability to work in cooperation, and ability in self-evaluation, and other relational skills.

d) Family situation: health and educational needs of the family, and the spouse's career.

Par. 533 - Frequency - While the bishop shall report all pastoral appointments to each regular session of an Annual Conference, appointments to charges may be made at any time deemed advisable by the bishop and Cabinet.

Appointments are considered "fixed" until changed. They are reviewed and reported annually but not "made" annually.

Par. 267.2 f 8 - (The duties of the Pastor-Parish Relations Committee shall include the following:) To confer with the pastor and/or other appointed members of the staff if it should become evident that the best interests of the charge and pastor(s) will be served by a change of pastor(s). The committee shall cooperate with the pastor(s), the district superintendent, and the bishop in securing clergy leadership. Its relationship to the district superintendent and the bishop shall be advisory only.

It is also vital that the committee understand that its relationship to the district superintendent and bishop is advisory only, and that it is to represent the needs of the entire charge. Members of the Pastor-Parish Relations Committee must understand how the itinerant system of The United Methodist Church functions to fulfill their responsibilities faithfully.

Par. 267.2 e - The committee...shall meet only with the knowledge of the pastor and/or the district superintendent. It may meet with the district superintendent without the pastor being present; however, when the pastor is not present, the pastor, or any member of the staff under consideration, shall be informed prior to such a meeting and immediately thereafter be brought into consultation either by the committee or by the district superintendent.

Par. 267.2 f 3 - (The duties of the Pastor-Parish Relations Committee shall include the following:) To evaluate annually the effectiveness of the pastor and staff, based upon criteria, processes, and training developed by the Board of Ordained Ministry and Cabinet (Par. 445), and, where applicable, the Board of Diaconal Ministry.

Par. 445 - Evaluation - Evaluation is a continuous process which must take place in a spirit of understanding, acceptance, and with a genuine desire to embody and carry forth more effectively Christ's ministry in the world lest we create defensiveness and discouragement in the Church or in the person being evaluated. Pastoral effectiveness shall be evaluated annually (Par. 267.2 f 3) by the Pastor-Parish Relations Committee and district superintendent by criteria and processes developed by the Board of Ordained Ministry and the Cabinet. The Board of Ordained Ministry and/or the Cabinet shall conduct an annual training program for Pastor-Parish Relations Committee members to enable them to evaluate the effectiveness of pastors in carrying out the functions of ordained ministry (Pars. 422.1b, 520, 732.2 n, o).

NOTES ON RETIREMENT

Mandatory Retirement - Pastors who attain the age of 70 before July 1 must retire as of July 1 of that year (Par. 453.1).

Voluntary Retirement - Voluntary retirement is available to those who attain

the age of 65 or complete 40 Conference years of service before July 1 (Par. 453.2 c).

- Voluntary retirement is also available at a reduced annuity rate to those who attain the age of 62 or complete at least 37 Conference years of service before July 1 (Par. 453.2 b).

- A pastor may also retire after 20 Conference years of service with benefits beginning the first of any month after the session of Annual Conference in the year in which the minister attains the age of 62 before July 1 (Par. 453.2 a).

ALL MINISTERS WHO QUALIFY FOR VOLUNTARY RETIREMENT MUST INDICATE IN WRITING BY JANUARY 15 THEIR INTENT TO ACTIVATE THIS OPTION; otherwise, the Cabinet will assume their continued eligibility for appointment. The annual self-evaluation form may be used for this purpose.

TIMELINE FOR APPOINTMENT-MAKING

1. FALL AND EARLY WINTER: District Superintendents make an informal inventory and evaluation of their charges (churches) and pastors, including a review of the criteria (Par. 531). They are available for consultation (Par. 530) with Pastor-Parish Relations Committees and pastors, and, in some instances, may initiate such contacts. The official contact person for the charge is the chairperson of the charge Pastor-Parish Relations Committee.

2. JANUARY 15: DEADLINE FOR REQUESTS for change of appointment, including retirement. By January 15, Pastor-Parish Relations chairpersons and/or pastors are asked to make their requests and recommendations to the Cabinet by using the annual evaluation form. The reasons(s) a change appears to be desirable shall be included (Par. 267.2 f 8). Initiating a request for change is not to be interpreted as an automatic guarantee that a change will be made. All requests will be treated with integrity by the bishop and Cabinet (Par. 532.1). Persons planning retirement must also observe the above date. Notification of intention to retire must be in writing. (See "Notes on Retirement")

3. FEBRUARY: Cabinet needs to begin the appointment-making process. Requests for change will be carefully reviewed. When neither the Pastor-Parish Relations Committee nor the pastor has made a request, the Cabinet will assume that both desire the present relationship to continue. The Cabinet, however, has the prerogative of initiating changes of appointment which are deemed to be for the good of the charges or the pastors or the program and missional strategy of the Conference.

a) "Open" charges (churches) will be determined, (see commentary under Par. 532.5) and the district superintendent will meet with the Pastor-Parish Relations Committee to gather all available data about the charge and its pastoral needs (Pars. 531 & 532.2) and present pastoral support including parsonage compliance with Conference policies.

b) The Cabinet determines which available pastor best fits the needs of the charge (Par. 532.2). Note: The present pastor is to remain neutral in all appointment proceedings concerning his/her successor.

c) The district superintendent of the "open" charge contacts the prospective pastor and consults with him/her, supplying essential data and information about the "open" charge, community setting and time frame for the prospective pastor's response.

d) When the pastor-designate is determined, the district superintendent then contacts the chairperson of the Pastor-Parish Relations Committee of the "open" charge and arranges a time for the pastor-designate and the committee to meet. This meeting is an introduction of and to the pastor-designate and not an interview. The district superintendent will preside at this meeting.

The purpose of the meeting is:

1. To aid the district superintendent and the Cabinet, through consultation, in their responsibility to the appointment process.

2. To verify the appropriateness of the proposed appointment, matching local needs and pastoral aptitudes.

3. To initiate the process of getting acquainted with the pastor-designate.

4. To arrange for the moving and receiving of the pastor-designate and his/her family.

The district superintendent will bring the meeting to a close with an appropriate summary of his/her insights and understandings. It is understood that, barring prohibiting factors which may become apparent in the conversation with the Pastor-Parish Relations Committee, the pastor-designate will be appointed to the "open" charge.

e) When the results of the meeting have been shared with the Cabinet and the appointment has been fixed by the bishop, public announcements shall be arranged through the office of the district superintendent (Par. 532.10).

NOTE: The meeting of the pastor-designate with the Pastor-Parish Relations Committee may not always be possible for pastors receiving their first appointment following seminary.

4. FEBRUARY - MAY: Using the above process, the Cabinet will arrange for the appointments to be reported to the Annual Conferences (Par. 532.10). The list of appointments will be published in the Conference paper prior to the Annual Conference session, and publicly announced at the Annual Conference session along with additional changes and corrections.

5. JULY 1: Changes of appointment become effective.

6. POST-CONFERENCE: The district superintendent will meet with the new pastor and the Pastor-Parish Relations Committee for post-Conference role clarification to help facilitate the new shared ministry of charge and pastor. This meeting will be held at a mutually agreeable time.

7. DISTRICT SUPERINTENDENT AVAILABILITY: The district superintendent is available to Pastor-Parish Relations Committees and pastors for consultation at any time it is deemed appropriate.

Others may want to take this route and we outline here the steps involved in case you may not be aware of the procedure.

- (1) All salary and conference apportionments are removed.
- (2) The church drops out of the listing of churches to which pastors are assigned. (We urge the conference to begin a listing of such churches in the journal with the charge conference where they are to report each year. This will allow for proper records and constitutes the historic continuity of these churches.)
- (3) The only services to be held are weddings, funerals, or special occasions.
- (4) One or more special services a year may be held with the offering received to be used for the upkeep of the building.
- (5) The remaining members are transferred to a nearby United Methodist Church for regular worship and church involvement.

- (6) The remaining members become a special committee under the charge conference to plan with the pastor for weddings, funerals, and special days. They also present a written report each year as to services held, money received and how expended, etc.
- (7) This allows the possibility that should population shifts bring people into the area we would simply resume regular services.

VII. Business of the Annual Conference

A. Daily Proceedings

SPECIAL SESSION

SATURDAY, OCTOBER 6, 1984

The special session was opened at 10:00 a.m. on October 6, 1984 with a worship service led by the following clergy members of the Division of Worship: Alfred Taylor, Colleen O'Sullivan, and Laura Martin.

With Bishop Joseph H. Yeakel presiding for the first time, the plenary session was called to order at 10:45 a.m. Bishop Yeakel called on the Conference Secretary, Dr. W. Daniel Rich, who offered the following organizational and procedural motion:

Bishop Yeakel, I move that:

1. The roll call be taken by all members signing cards in the foyer of the Central Middle School or securing same from an usher.
2. Members be excused from the Session upon report to their Superintendent or the Secretary.
3. All motions be presented to the Secretary on forms provided for this purpose prior to or at the time they are presented to the Conference. Forms will be found on the Secretary's desk and are also in the hands of the ushers.
4. Bette McNear be named reporter for United Methodist Information and Publications, other church papers, and press contact with the secular communications media.
5. J. Francis Turpin be named Head Usher and Doorkeeper of the Session.
6. The Rules of Order be those appearing on pp. 453-455 of the 1983 Journal of the Peninsula Annual Conference.
7. The following be designated as Assistant Secretaries: The Rev. Richard E. Green and the Rev. Mildred E. White.

The motion was duly seconded and approved.

POINT OF PERSONAL PRIVILEGE: Bishop Yeakel recognized the Rev. Howell O. Wilkins, Easton District Superintendent. At his request Mrs. Lois Yeakel was escorted to the stage by the Rev. Ewart C. Hackshaw, Salisbury District Superintendent. She received a corsage from her husband, Bishop Joseph H. Yeakel, and was greeted by the Conference with warm applause.

PRESENTATION OF 1985 BUDGET: Bishop Yeakel called on the Rev. Charles E. Barton, Jr., chairperson of the Program and Budget Review Committee, who, in turn, presented the proposed budget for the calendar year 1985.

After some discussion, Mr. Barton moved the adoption of the budget in the amount of \$926,614. The motion was seconded and approved by the Conference.

CELEBRATIONS: Bishop Yeakel recognized the new Council Director, the Rev. Dr. J. Gordon Stapleton, who led the Conference in the following celebrations:

1) REACH - The Rev. Robert O. Wallace, chairperson of the REACH Committee, stated that the purpose of REACH was to help people in their understanding of stewardship and to help make the gospel become flesh all around the world. He observed that apportionment-giving had increased since the institution of the REACH program. He also said that the Conference should rejoice in the \$230,177 which had been given to fund REACH projects over the past two and a half years. In closing, Mr. Wallace presented the following report concerning the current status of the various REACH MISSION PROJECTS:

2) EMLC - Dr. Stapleton introduced the Rev. Vaughn A. Johnson, the new Associate Council Director for Special Ministries and REACH, who stated that ethnic minority local churches have a two-fold ministry - they have much to give as well as receive. Mr. Johnson presented the following format for empowering the commitment to the EMLC priority:

SPECIAL MINISTRIES

THEME: EMPOWERING THE COMMITMENT TO EMLC

Objectives:

- 1) Develop training programs for lay leadership - male/female.
- 2) Train layworkers.
- 3) Develop training for church school ministries.
- 4) Establish stewardship training programs for local congregations.
- 5) Provide training to enable local churches to be intentionally in ministry to the community.
- 6) Enable persons to develop new forms of evangelism for present situations.
- 7) Proposal writing.

Who will do Special Ministries?

Special Ministries Director and four Special Ministries Consultants.

How will it be done?

The programmatic thrust of Special Ministries shall be met on priority of request. This shall be done by the program staff or Special Ministries director. Special Ministries director will deploy Special Ministries consultants based on priority of request.

Priority of request will be made in consultation with consultants and Council Director. Criteria for giving priority will be based on the following:

- A. As it coincides with the programmatic theme of strengthening the missional priority of EMLC.
- B. As it coincides with the existing theme of Trek IV.
- C. As it relates with the statement of need and objectives of job description of the Special Ministries consultants.
- D. In consultation with the superintendent.
- E. Preparation of minister with consultant and preparation of congregation by the minister.

What are some of the current things being done by Special Ministries?

- A. Need assessment of all ethnic churches to determine a cross-section of needs.
- B. Consultation on the ethnic church.
- C. Develop resource centers for the purpose of strengthening the Ethnic Minority Local Church by making available literature and resource personnel of our United Methodist boards and agencies in accessible locations upon each district for the sake of developing leadership skills and effective programming within the local church through key training events sponsored by a local church, the district or the Annual Conference. Recommended sites for resource centers:

1. Salisbury District - Wesley Temple
2. Easton District - Easton District Office and Trappe Church
3. Dover District - Mt. Calvary in Bridgeville
4. Wilmington District - Zion-Mt. Carmel UMC

D. Support ministries for the following:

1. African students and pastors attending Wesley Theological Seminary.
2. Ethnic clergy women.
3. Other ethnic churches and ministries; Asian-Korean and Hispanic.
4. Potential ethnic clergy persons within Peninsula Conference churches.
5. Ethnic clergy.

3) Christian Education - Ms. Elizabeth St. Clair and Ms. Doris Phillips, educational consultants, reported that they had worked in thirty-nine churches across the Conference, attempting to strengthen educational ministries. They offered their continued assistance to the churches and church schools of the Conference.

4) Hunger Workshops - Ms. Phillips also announced the dates for two hunger workshops to be held this fall with Dr. Robert Smith, UMCOR Consultant, as the resource person.

N.E. BOARD OF LAITY: Bishop Yeakel recognized James C. Hardcastle, outgoing president of the N.E. Jurisdictional Board of Laity, who promoted the Lay Assembly to be held October 19-21, 1984, at Reading, PA.

COMMISSION ON ARCHIVES AND HISTORY: Bishop Yeakel recognized Dr. Stanley J. Menking, outgoing associate dean of Drew University Theological School, who spoke briefly about the new U.M. Archives and History Center which opened on the Drew campus in October, 1982. By using the questions, "Where have we been?" and "Where are we going?" he highlighted the importance of such facilities in the life of the church. Mentioning that the center cost 2 and 3/4 million dollars, Dr. Menking solicited the support of the Conference for this project.

TREK IV: Bishop Yeakel recognized Dr. J. Gordon Stapleton, Council Director, who stressed the need for genuine "connectionalism" and presented the following format for Trek IV:

TREK IV: INTO THE THIRD CENTURY

("ENVISIONING AND INVENTING NEW FORMS OF CHRISTIAN MISSION AND MINISTRY")

Moving forward with:

- I. People: As Christ's people, we are concerned about the salvation of humankind (infants, children and adults) at every stage of their lives, and we will demonstrate that concern by providing learning opportunities related to their fulfillment of the gospel message. People live in relationships, and we will seek to nurture and strengthen caring relationships with others in the name of Jesus Christ; at home, in the community and around the world.
- II. Program: Program priorities follow the strategic implications outlined in the Trek III report: "Envisioning and Inventing New Forms of Christian Mission and Ministry: Into the Third Century."
 - A. Peninsula Conference can help local churches become more effective by providing:
 1. A special focus on the small membership church,
 2. Help for improving evangelization skills,
 3. Help for improving stewardship, and
 4. Help for improving morale.
 - B. Peninsula Conference shall sharpen its connectional value by:
 1. Organizing appropriate units of multi-church (sub-district configurations) response to crucial religious, political, social and economic issues in the community, nation and the world, and
 2. Developing new churches (and parsonages) to meet new population movements.
- III. Process: To implement the Program, we recommend the following tools for effective ministry:
 - A. Spiritual formation
 - B. Consultants: EMIC and Christian Education
 - C. Communication System: Print, Video and Audio
 - D. REACH
 - E. Racial Attitudes and Perspectives
 - F. Camp Pecometh
 - G. Drayton
 - H. Leadership Development
 - I. MAP
 - J. Showing and Telling the Good News

Bishop Yeakel then greeted Dr. Stapleton, the new Council Director, the Rev. Edwin L. Ellis, the new Dover District Superintendent, and the Rev. and Mrs. Wilson A. Shearer, the Quadrennial Assistant and his spouse. The Conference responded with warm applause.

The Forty-Sixth Session of the Peninsula Annual Conference opened with a Eucharist and Memorial Service at 1:30 p.m. in the Nave of Asbury United Methodist Church, Salisbury. The celebrant and preacher was Bishop Joseph H. Yeakel. Assisting him were District Superintendents, Dr. Edwin L. Ellis, Ewart C. Hackshaw, Dr. C. Edwin Lasbury, and Howell O. Wilkins. The servers consisted of a cadre of clergy. Bishop Yeakel's sermon dealt with the concept of faith expressed in THE LETTER TO THE HEBREWS.

After a short recess, Bishop Yeakel convened the Plenary Session of the Peninsula Annual Conference.

ORGANIZATIONAL AND PROCEDURAL MOTION: Bishop Yeakel called on the Conference Secretary, Dr. W. Daniel Rich, who moved that:

1. The bar of the Conference include rows A through V of the Holloway Hall Auditorium.
2. The printed program be the program of the Conference subject to necessary changes.
3. The roll call be taken by all members signing cards to be turned in at the registration desk at the time of registration or, if late, registering with an usher or an assistant secretary.
4. Charges with only one Lay Member have the name of the Reserve Member typed on one side of the same badge with the name of the Lay Member, so that when the Lay Member cannot attend the session, he/she will be responsible to see that the Reserve Member receives the badge.
5. Charges with more than one Lay Member will not have any Reserve Member's name typed on the same badge with the Lay Member's name. When a Reserve Member is to take the place of a Lay Member, the badge for the Lay Member will be brought to the registration desk. The attendant there will hold the Lay Member's badge and type another badge for the Reserve Member. Before the Lay Member can go back into the session the Reserve Member's badge must be returned.

8. The Conference minutes be made the Official Journal of the Conference and the Secretary be authorized to edit and condense the same.
9. The Rev. Joseph G. Burris be appointed chairperson of the Committee on Daily Proceedings.
10. The Boards, Divisions, Commissions, and Committees as printed in the Journal become the Boards, Divisions, Commissions, and Committees of the Conference, with such corrections as may be needed.

11. All motions be presented to the Secretary on forms provided for this purpose prior to or at the time they are presented to the Conference. Forms will be found on the Secretary's desk and are also in the hands of the ushers.
12. Resolutions not appearing in the Pre-Conference Booklet be in the hands of the Secretary by Noon on Wednesday. Copies sufficient for distribution to the Conference must be submitted.
13. When the customary draft is received from the U.M. Publishing House it be endorsed and given to the Conference Treasurer.
14. Bette McNear be named reporter for U.M. Information and Publications, other church papers, and press contact with the secular communications media.

GREETINGS AND COURTESIES: The Rev. Dr. C. Edwin Lasbury, Wilmington District Superintendent, introduced Mrs. Lois Yeakel and pinned a corsage on her. The Conference affirmed her with warm applause. Bishop Yeakel then called on the Conference Secretary who shared greetings from the Western Pennsylvania Annual Conference and the Rocky Mountain Annual Conference, both of which were holding sessions concurrently with our own.

POINT OF PERSONAL PRIVILEGE: Bishop Yeakel recognized the Rev. Robert W. Helms, chairperson of the Commission on Christian Unity and Interreligious Affairs, who spoke briefly on the ecumenical and interfaith challenges of the day. He also introduced Dr. George F. Cora, Director of the Delmarva Ecumenical Agency, and a representative of the Roman Catholic Diocese of Wilmington.

At 3:30 p.m. the Plenary Session was adjourned so that the Conference members could convene their respective Study and Review Sections.

With the exception of those absent, each person came to the stage, was congratulated by the Bishop for their particular period of service, and received a Certificate of Appreciation. The Conference affirmed their aggregate ministry with a standing ovation.

A CELEBRATION OF THE CHURCH: Bishop Yeakel then delivered an informative and inspiring address concerning the question: "How well are we living together as a family as the Peninsula Annual Conference?" Regarding the transition between

Bishop Wertz and himself he thanked the members of the Cabinet and the Council Director and his staff for facilitating ministry during this period of change. He stated that REACH is still "alive and well" and still meeting human need on many fronts. He encouraged the parsonage system and said that providing a housing allowance for clergy is not in the best interests of the itineracy. Quoting an address that Bishop Wertz had given to a jurisdictional gathering, he called upon clergy and laity alike to be "peace-makers" and to be more enthusiastic about wide application of the E.M.L.C. missional priority.

Another area of need, he said, is a deeper commitment to cross-racial appointments as well as to evangelism and church growth. He deplored the fact that in 1984 209 churches (40% of the Conference) received no one on Profession of Faith. He stated that every church should have three plans: 1) How to grow, 2) How to give, and 3) How to give it away.

In addition, he challenged the Conference to strengthen lateral relationships, saying: "If you are a true friend, you won't let a colleague fail." He closed his address by drawing attention to the fact that this is the twentieth anniversary of the merger of the Delaware and Peninsula Annual Conferences, an ideal time for pursuing greater spiritual maturity and for strengthening and expanding our mission and ministry.

The Conference responded to the address with enthusiastic applause.

DRAYTON STUDY COMMITTEE REPORT: Bishop Yeakel called on the Rev. Clifford A. Armour, Jr., President of the Conference Council on Ministries, who stated that Dr. Granger Westburg, a nationally-recognized authority on wellness ministries had recommended that Drayton not be used for this purpose.

At the same time, the study committee adopted the following motion which was referred to the Conference Council and approved by that body:

Drayton Manor be retained as a center for Spiritual Renewal* with oversight by a committee of the Conference Council on Ministries, that it be funded through the Conference budget for only three years and that during that time we institute other processes to fund Drayton.

*The Conference Council on Ministries Committee be appointed with the responsibility to:

- A. Implement a ministry of Retreats, Continuing Education Events and Spiritual Formation Events at Drayton Manor.
- B. To plan with the Director of Drayton Manor specific leadership skills necessary to carry out his/her responsibility.
- C. To market and to interpret the facility and the ministry with help such as:
 1. Cadre of local church representatives.
 2. Local church involvement of the director.
 3. Scholarship funds available for those wishing to go on retreat.
 4. Developing programs which will appeal to the widest possible audience.
- D. To oversee maintenance of and improvement of current facilities such as:
 1. Finish the water system.
 2. Install showers.
 3. New mattresses and box springs.
 4. Upgrade electrical wiring.
- E. To consider capital improvements such as:
 1. Large conference room.
 2. Additional beds at ground level.
 3. Rooms for married couples.
 4. Elevator.

5. High Tech Equipment.
 6. Air conditioning.
 7. Handicap Access.
- P. To determine a capital funds goal and develop with CFA a means of attaining the goal.
 - G. To find in consultation with CFA funds for A through F which could include such as:
 1. Conference budget.
 2. Foundation and other grants.
 3. Capital campaign.
 4. Special gifts.
 - H. To develop tools for annual evaluation of usage, including cost per person, per event, and also a breakdown of the kind of groups using Drayton Manor, and also a breakdown between various conferences, and finances.
 - I. To report at the end of the year to the Annual Conference a Progress Report.
 - J. To report by Annual Conference of 1988 a recommendation about the future of Drayton Manor, based on the outcome of attaining capital fund goal, usage, including cost per person per event, and other finances.

Moreover, Study and Review Section #2 agreed with the above position regarding using Drayton as a wellness center by a vote of 99 for, 0 against, and 3 abstaining. Bishop Yeakel put the question to the house and the Conference endorsed this position as well.

However, with regard to the motion to use Drayton as a center for Spiritual Renewal, Section #2 proposed a substitute motion as follows:

RESOLVED that the Peninsula Conference sell the Drayton Manor property, and

THAT a committee consisting of the chairman of the Council on Finance and Administration, the vice-chairman of the Peninsula Conference Board of Trustees, the Conference Business Manager, the Chancellor of the Conference, and the Council Director as chairman, be directed to accomplish said sale, and

THAT the Trustees of the Peninsula Conference be directed to execute the necessary legal papers and documents to effect the sale when so requested by the above committee, and

THAT the proceeds of said sale be invested and labeled, The Peninsula Conference Retreat Ministries Fund, and

THAT the income from said fund on a semi-annual basis, for an interim, shall be divided as follows: the amount of income in excess of the inflation rate be remitted to the Council on Ministries to be used for Retreat Ministries, the balance of the income shall be added to the principal of the fund.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Peninsula Conference direct the Bishop to appoint, upon recommendation by the Conference Nominating Committee, a special Task Force on Retreat Ministries consisting of not less than nine nor more than thirteen persons whose responsibility shall be to study the retreat ministries needs of the Peninsula Annual Conference and formulate a proposed method or methods of meeting those needs during the twentieth century and to present said report and recommendation to the Peninsula Annual Conference. The committee shall report to the Peninsula Annual Conference in 1986.

During the ensuing discussion the Rev. Harold E. Walton moved to amend the substitute by adding the stipulation that the sale be completed by May 1, 1986. The motion was seconded but defeated.

Bishop Yeakel then recognized the Rev. George C. Godfrey who moved that "proceeds from such a sale be invested and labeled for a Retreat Center at Camp Pecometh." This motion was also seconded but defeated.

Bishop Yeakel then recognized the Rev. Garry O. Parker who moved to amend the motion by including a reserve price of \$990,000. The motion was seconded and defeated.

Bishop Yeakel put to the question the "substitute motion" and it was defeated. The original recommendation was then voted upon and approved by the body. Its principal paragraph reads:

Drayton Manor be retained as a center for Spiritual Renewal with oversight by a committee of the Conference Council on Ministries, that it be funded through the Conference Budget for only three years and that during that time we institute other processes to fund Drayton.

WEDNESDAY MORNING - JUNE 12, 1985

At 9:00 a.m. the Conference was led in morning devotions by the Division of Worship and Elise Eslinger from the Board of Discipleship, Nashville.

At 9:30 a.m. Bishop Joseph H. Yeakel reconvened the plenary session in the Holloway Ball Auditorium and called on the Rev. Ewart C. Hackshaw, Host Superintendent. Mr. Hackshaw presented Sen. Joseph Long (Maryland State Senate) and Mr. Robert A. Powell, Vice-President of the City Council of Salisbury, who both brought greetings to the Conference. Mr. Powell also presented Bishop Yeakel with a key to the city and a certificate of welcome.

REPORT OF THE TASK FORCE ON INSTITUTIONAL RELATIONSHIPS: Bishop Yeakel called on the Rev. Edward E. Kester, chairperson, who called the attention of the Conference to two documents: "A Covenant of Affiliation between Peninsula U.M. Homes, Inc. and the Peninsula Annual Conference of the U.M. Church" and the "Restated Certificate of Incorporation of Peninsula U.M. Homes, Inc." In the ensuing discussion the question was raised as to whether the present residents of our homes were all aware of the contents of these documents. In answer to this concern, the Rev. Dr. J. Gordon Stapleton, Council Director, said that these proposed changes would not effect any existing contracts and that all of the residents had been informed that the above documents were being prepared.

The question was called for, the vote taken, and both documents approved by the Conference. The complete text of both documents may be found in the JOURNAL in the section entitled "Reports."

CONSENT CALENDAR: Bishop Yeakel recognized the Rev. Dr. J. Gordon Stapleton, Council Director, who moved the adoption of the following Consent Calendar. The motion was duly seconded and approved.

COMPOSITE REPORT OF THE CABINET: Bishop Yeakel called on the Rev. Dr. Edwin Lasbury, dean of the Cabinet, who read the composite report. The major categories of the report were: E.M.L.C. Missional Priority, Church Development, Evangelism, Stewardship, REACH, Apportionments, and Peace. The Conference received the report with warm applause and the Cabinet for their efforts in facilitating our common ministry during the year past.

STUDY AND REVIEW REPORTS: Bishop Yeakel then called on Robert Powrie, chairperson, Section #1, who presented the following report:

Resolution on Sanctuary

Amendment - "BE IT RESOLVED that the ministry of congregation's agency, which stand in formal support of sanctuary churches, be affirmed and recognized by the Peninsula Annual Conference."

Yes - 49

No - 24

Abstaining - 0

Bishop Yeakel recognized Robert Lee Calvert, St. John's U.M.C., Charlestown, MD, who moved that the Resolution on Sanctuary and its proposed amendment be tabled. The motion to table was defeated and the question called for on the resolution and its amendment. Both were approved by the Conference.

The full text of the resolution, not including the above amendment, is as follows:

RESOLUTION ON SANCTUARY

WHEREAS Central American refugees have fled to the United States from the violence in their own homeland, and

WHEREAS in the Refugee Act of 1980 the U.S. Congress adopted as law the standards of the U.N. convention and protocol of refugees, and

WHEREAS, according to this, the U.S. should accord refugee or asylum status to persons who cannot return to their country of origin because of persecution or fear of persecution for the reasons of race, religion, nationality, or membership in a particular social group or political opinion, and

WHEREAS the U.S. Senate Department has not granted them proper status;

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that the ministry of congregations and organizations providing sanctuary to Central American refugees be affirmed by the Peninsula Annual Conference;

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Peninsula Annual Conference urges all local churches to study the issue and consider the possibility of becoming sanctuaries.

RESOLUTION ON THE DEPORTATION OF CENTRAL AMERICAN REFUGEES

Yes - 68

No - 1

Abstaining - 5

The Conference approved this Resolution which is as follows:

RESOLUTION ON THE DEPORTATION
OF CENTRAL AMERICAN REFUGEES

WHEREAS the Inter-American Commission on Human Rights estimates that at least 30,000 civilians have been killed in El Salvador since 1979, and

WHEREAS Salvadorans flee their own country because of the political unrest that is demonstrated by widespread fighting, destruction and break-down of public services and order, and due to threats to the lives of their families and themselves, and

WHEREAS the United States has a policy of refusing to grant Extended Voluntary Departure status to Salvadorans in the U.S.A., consequently forcing them to return to El Salvador where they face imprisonment, torture and death, and

WHEREAS only 3% of the Salvadoran refugees in the U.S.A. have been granted political asylum since 1981, and

WHEREAS U.S. legislators, religious and human rights leaders have voiced their concern over the plight of Salvadorans in their own nation and in the U.S., and

WHEREAS Congresspersons Moakley and DeConcini have introduced legislation calling for an in-depth study of the problems and conditions facing Salvadorans displaced within El Salvador and throughout the Central American region, with the legislation including a provision which would provide Salvadoran refugees temporary protection from deportation from the U.S. while the study and follow-up Congressional hearings are in progress;

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that the Peninsula Annual Conference direct the Bishop, and encourage congregations and individuals, to write to members of Congress expressing the Annual Conference's support of the Moakley/DeConcini Bill (S377, HR822).

RESOLUTION ON U.S. STANCE ON WAR

Yes - 54

No - 12

Abstaining - 5

The Conference approved this resolution which reads as follows:

RESOLUTION ON ACCOUNTABILITY
TO UNITED METHODIST STANCE ON WAR

WHEREAS the Discipline of our church in its Social Principles rejects war as an instrument of policy on the basis of its incompatibility with the Gospel (par. 74G and 75C), and

WHEREAS the preface of the Social Principles says that the Principles are "a call to all members of the United Methodist Church to a prayerful, studied dialogue of faith and practice;"

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that the Peninsula Annual Conference calls upon each board, agency, and affiliated institution to examine its programs and policies, including investments, in light of the paragraphs from the Discipline cited above; report on how it is implementing those Principles relevant to its purpose and situation; and, if any program or policy is at variance with the Social Principles, report to the Board of Church and Society on action taken to conform to the Social Principles or explain why such a program or policy should remain unchanged, report forms to be supplied by the Board of Church and Society.

RESOLUTION ON PEACE WITH JUSTICE

Yes - 53

No - 19

Abstaining - 4

The Conference approved this resolution which is as follows:

RESOLUTION ON PEACE WITH JUSTICE
Board of Church and Society

WHEREAS the gospel of Jesus Christ calls all persons to be peace-makers, and

WHEREAS we live in a nuclear age which makes this call more imperative than ever, and

WHEREAS our sins of omission weigh on us as heavily as our sins of commission;

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that all churches of the Peninsula Annual Conference actively observe World Order Sunday on Pentecost Sunday or another Sunday in the season of Pentecost, and take a special offering, half of which will remain in this Conference for peace with justice work;

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that each local church designate a Peace Advocate and that this office be listed among others on the Local Church Officers form;

That a "Day Apart" for clergy be held on the theme of Peace with Justice before the next Annual Conference session;

That the Conference support and encourage the use and study of the "Pastoral Statement on Peace with Justice" provided by the Delmarva Ecumenical Agency;

That the Conference wholeheartedly support Peace with Justice Week, October 19-25, 1985.

RESOLUTION ON APARTHEID

Yes - 52

No - 17

Abstaining - 5

During the debate regarding this resolution H. Elroy Hanks, Peninsula-McCabe U.M.C., moved that the words "non-violent civil disobedience" be deleted from the last paragraph. The motion to amend was seconded but defeated.

RESOLUTION ON APARTHEID
Board of Church and Society

The Peninsula Annual Conference wishes to commend those persons of the Annual Conference, clergy and laity, who have participated in civil disobedience activities opposing the sinful system of apartheid in South Africa.

We also wish to commend those Conference agencies which have examined their portfolios for investments and have systematically divested themselves of any holdings in South Africa. Furthermore, we commend Mayor Daniel S. Frawley and the city government of Wilmington, Delaware for voting unanimously to refuse investing in companies with even a minimal contact with South Africa.

WHEREAS these concrete actions of civil disobedience and non-violent protest lead the way in confronting South African apartheid, and

WHEREAS the Peninsula Annual Conference affirms the position of the United Methodist Church as expressed in the 1984 General Conference Book of Resolutions, pp. 409-412.

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that the Peninsula Annual Conference urges all individuals or groups, whether a part of this Annual Conference or not, to continue to follow their Christian consciences in opposition to apartheid in South Africa through acts of non-violent civil disobedience, non-violent protests, prayer vigils, letter writing to elected officials, and personal prayer for change.

At this point the proceedings were interrupted by a medical emergency - the sudden illness of Francis Lewis, lay member from Union U.M.C., Bridgeville, DE. As

medical assistance was summoned, Bishop Yeakel led the Conference in prayer on behalf of Brother Lewis.

INTRODUCTION OF CHAPLAINS: Bishop Yeakel recognized the Rev. George H. Moore who spoke briefly concerning the ministries of chaplains in the armed forces, health institutions, fire and police departments, and higher education. All the chaplains present stood and were applauded by the Conference.

WESLEY COLLEGE CORPORATE SESSION: The corporate session was convened by Thomas C. Roe, President of the Board of Trustees of Wesley College. Mr. Roe thanked churches and individuals for their cooperation and assistance to the college. He stated that the budget had been balanced and that an Ad Hoc Committee had been formed for a self-study of the Trustees.

Mr. Roe then introduced the Rev. Dr. Edwin C. Thomas, Jr., who presented the slate of nominees for the class of 1989:

All of the above were approved by the Conference.

Mr. Roe then expressed deep appreciation to Dr. Reed M. Stewart, President of the College, for his unstinting efforts. In turn, Dr. Stewart spoke of the importance of a college-related church and a church-related college. In addition, he stated that Wesley had recently received a sizable grant from the Longwood foundation and that he expected other grants in the future. In celebrating Wesley College, Dr. Stewart had brought with him the Dean of Admissions, the Director of Development, and the Business Manager. In closing he stressed that U.M. scholarships were being made available to U.M. students of the Peninsula Conference.

INTRODUCTION OF THE BALTIMORE CONFERENCE CABINET: The Rev. Susan Morrison, Dean, introduced the Cabinet of our neighboring Conference and some of their spouses who were present. They all came to the stage and were warmly greeted by Bishop Yeakel and the Conference.

ORDER OF THE DAY: Dr. James D. Glasse

Dr. James D. Glasse, former President of Lancaster Theological Seminary, was introduced by Bishop Yeakel as the Conference preacher. Dr. Glass spoke about his own identity crisis at mid-life, his experience as minister of a Presbyterian mission church in North Carolina (where he was fascinated by snake-handlers and developed the concept of "spiritual snake-handling"), and the need to recognize the fact that no one particular gift is the norm in any community and that God has given each individual unique gifts which are to be used for the upbuilding of the whole community. He closed by referring to I Corinthians 13, contending that "love is where it's at!" At the conclusion of his address the Conference gave Dr. Glasse a standing ovation.

The Conference began its luncheon recess at noon.

WEDNESDAY AFTERNOON - JUNE 12, 1985

Following a luncheon recess the Conference was reconvened by Bishop Yeakel at 1:30 p.m. Elise Eslinger led the opening singing. Bishop Yeakel reported that Francis Lewis, who had become ill during the morning session, had been released from the hospital and was on his way home to recuperate.

Bishop Yeakel displayed a copy of Dr. William H. Williams' book "The Garden of American Methodism: The Delmarva Peninsula, 1769-1820," commenting that copies of this informative and helpful work were available from the author.

Bishop Yeakel then introduced Dr. Clayton Calhoun, the interim President of Morristown College, Morristown, TN, a United-Methodist related institution of higher education. In his remarks Dr. Calhoun thanked the Peninsula Annual Conference for its support of Morristown College through the Black College Fund.

Bishop Yeakel then called on Robert Powrie, chairperson, for the continuation of the report of Study and Review Section #1. Mr. Powrie reintroduced the Resolution on Apartheid, which, after some debate, was approved by vote of the Conference.

Mr. Powrie then presented the following resolution opposing civil disobedience by church, which had not been approved by the section by a vote of 23 Yes, 45 No, and 3 abstaining.

RESOLUTION

WHEREAS, our Bishop and the other church leaders violated the law and were arrested, and

WHEREAS, their cause opposing South African apartheid is worthy, and

WHEREAS, the constitution and laws of the United States and local laws allow for peaceful legal means of expression, and

WHEREAS United Methodists, the youth of the country, and society in general expect respect for the laws by our church leaders,

BE IT THEREFORE RESOLVED, that the Administrative Board of the Peninsula-McCabe United Methodist Church of Wilmington, Delaware, respectfully requests our Bishop and other church leadership to henceforth avoid breaking the law(s) of our governmental units in the United States of America, and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that Peninsula-McCabe United Methodist Church asks that none of its apportionments be used by the Conference to support any civil disobedience cases, and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that Peninsula-McCabe United Methodist Church requests the Peninsula Annual Conference of 1985 to rescind any and all

RESOLUTION ON THE FAMILY FARM CRISIS

WHEREAS, the General Board of Global Ministries has adopted a resolution on the family farm in the U.S.A., stating that:

"The 1980 farmers went out of business each of the last two years and in 1981 to 1982 some say 25 out of business this year;

"The family life of the farmers losing their farms has been seriously disrupted due to the public, greed, and a sense of failure over the loss of their farms; the suicide rate for farmers is higher than for any other single profession (reported by Dr. Ken Campbell at the University of Maryland at Baltimore); divorce, child abuse, and drug use are increasing at a rapid rate among farmers and their families;

"Eighty percent rural land is being lost at a rate of 9,000 acres per week or 500,000 acres annually (reported by Edward J. Penick, Director of the Federation of Southern Cooperatives/Emergency Land Fund); during a six-year period ending in 1974, Blacks lost 57 percent of their active farmland base;

"The United Methodist Church in the 1994 General Conference and Book of Resolutions identifies the family farm as an essential part of rural communities and institutions, calls upon government agencies to "restructure investment and use policies to promote small and moderate-sized family farm operations," and "calls upon the congregations and annual conferences to seek solutions to the special problems of rural ethnic people so as to ensure their access to land ownership."

"Every United Methodist must take seriously Paul's advice: "If one member suffers, all suffer together; if one member is honored, all rejoice together" (1 Cor. 12:26), etc.

WHEREAS, rural life in general and family farms in particular are vital to the economic and spiritual life of the people of the Eastern Shore of Virginia and elsewhere.

WHEREAS, it is recognized, that the Peninsula Annual Conference:

Bishop Yeakel recognized James Baxter of Georgetown who moved to amend this resolution by the deletion of #1 and the insertion of the words "and individual state funds" after the word "institutions" in #2. The amendment was approved by the Conference.

Bishop Yeakel recognized the Rev. Dr. R. Jervis Cooke who moved that the resolution and its amendment be tabled. The motion was duly seconded and approved.

Bishop Yeakel then introduced Dr. Douglas Lewis, President of Wesley Theological Seminary, Washington, D.C., who spoke briefly on trends in theological education today. He stressed the fact that Wesley emphasizes wholistic preparation for ministry - spiritually, socially, intellectually, and emotionally. He also mentioned that continued financial support for seminary education is vital and was concerned about the fact that students are having to pay more and more of the cost of their own education. He congratulated the Peninsula Annual Conference for its excellent record in supporting the Ministerial Education Fund and said that he looked forward to a continuing cooperation between the Conference and Wesley Seminary.

CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS: The 1984 session of the General Conference held in Baltimore, Maryland, May 1-11, proposed by more than the required two-thirds vote the following constitutional amendments and ordered their presentation to the Annual Conferences for vote. The amendments and the action of the Peninsula Annual Conference are as follows:

1984-25

In Paragraph 1 *delete ecclesiastical and legal

The paragraph would then read:

Paragraph 1. Article 1. Declaration of Union. - The Evangelical United Brethren Church and The Methodist Church shall be united in one Church. The united church, as thus constituted, is, and shall be the successor of the two uniting churches.

Peninsula Conference Vote: For - 333, Against - 0, Abstaining - 0

1984-26

In Paragraph 6 *delete automatically vest in The United Methodist Church.
Add be held and administered in accordance with the Book of Discipline.

The paragraph would then read:

Paragraph 6. Article VI. Title to Properties. - Titles to properties in The Evangelical United Brethren Church, and the Methodist Church shall, upon consummation of the union, be held and administered in accordance with the Book of Discipline...

Peninsula Conference Vote: For - 345, Against - 0, Abstaining - 1

1984-27

In Paragraph 36 *add following "together with a lay member elected by each charge," the diaconal ministers

The paragraph would then read:

Paragraph 36. Article 1. - The Annual Conference shall be composed of ministerial members as defined by the General Conference, together with a lay member elected by each charge, the diaconal ministers, the Conference president of United Methodist Women, the Conference president of United Methodist Men, the Conference lay leader, district lay leaders, the president or equivalent officer of the Conference young adult organization,

president of the Conference youth organization, and two young persons under twenty-five (25) years of age from each district to be selected in such manner as may be determined by the Annual Conference...

Peninsula Conference Vote: For - 358, Against - 6, Abstaining - 0

NOMINATING COMMITTEE REPORT: Bishop Yeakel recognized the Rev. Howell O. Wilkins, chairperson, who called attention to the committee's report, which had already been distributed, and reminded the conference that it should be studied carefully before being acting on the following day.

REPORT OF THE STATISTICIAN: Bishop Yeakel recognized the Rev. Boyd B. Etter, Conference Statistician, who summarized trends in church membership, attendance, and church school enrollment. The complete report may be found in the section of the Journal marked "Reports."

STUDY AND REVIEW SECTION #2: Bishop Yeakel recognized the Rev. H. Sterling Green, chairperson, who, in turn, called on the Rev. Jonathan E. Baker to present the results of the discussion of the proposed Code of Ethics for ordained clergy of the Peninsula Annual Conference. That report was as follows:

CODE OF ETHICS

Amendment to #10 of Professional Standards - To read: Use United Methodist Curriculum and other curriculum which is within our Wesleyan and Ecumenical spirit and tradition.

Yes - 104 No - 1 Abstaining - 1

Amendment to delete #9 of Professional Standards

Yes - 87 No - 9 Abstaining - 2

Amendment to delete word "emergency" in #6 of Professional Standards

Yes - 99 No - 1 Abstaining - 2

Original Motion as amended:

Yes - 77 No - 24 Abstaining - 3

The Code of Ethics, as amended, was adopted by the Conference. The text of the original report is as follows:

PENINSULA ANNUAL CONFERENCE

CODE OF ETHICS

FOR ORDAINED MINISTERS

Personal Standards

The call to ministry is a call from personal faith experience and personal desire for the holy life. Therefore a minister shall:

1. Keep oneself physically and emotionally fit.
2. Set apart adequate time for personal intellectual stimulation and for knowledge of contemporary thought and events.
3. Deepen and strengthen his/her personal experience of God's presence, grace, and love.
4. Set aside time to care for needs of the pastor's own family members.
5. In the instance of marital and family discord to seek help in the beginning of the problem, rather than at the point of dissolution or desperation. In the instance of separation or divorce, the clergy-person should give the care and support for spouse and family that Christian commitment demands.

6. Be strictly honest in personal business matters and completely responsible in financial affairs.
7. Maintain the highest moral standards and Christian conduct in all areas of life.
8. Regard all persons with equal respect, concern, and understanding whatever their ethnic or racial background, sex, age, income, or occupation.
9. Be punctual, true to one's word, and faithful in record keeping.
10. Leave the parsonage clean at the time it is vacated.
11. Prioritize one's life such that ministry in service to Jesus Christ always takes priority over salary, prestige of appointment, and personal preference.

Professional Standards

Every minister has entered into a covenantal relationship with every other minister in the Conference and denomination to work toward the whole ministry of the church. Therefore, she/he cannot function professionally apart from or indifferent to the ministry of other ordained clergy. With this sense of shared ministry, one shall:

1. Be loyal to the United Methodist Church and Peninsula Annual Conference: supportive of their programs, informed of their actions, involved in their activities and ministry, and critical of their shortcomings as one who is a member.
2. Deal honorably with the record of his/her predecessor, successor, and colleagues.
3. Abide by Paragraph 221 and 222 in the Book of Discipline concerning baptisms.
4. Develop a Church or Charge policy on weddings and Funerals in consultation with the Pastor-Parish Relations Committee.
5. Exhibit through preaching, teaching, prayer, counselling and personal example belief that inclusiveness is God's will as shown through the life of Jesus Christ: and, therefore, strive to overcome all barriers of racism, sexism, ageism, and classism within the visible church.
6. Understand that the relationship between pastor and parish is crucial in effective pastoring: and, therefore, never return to a former parish in a professional capacity except upon emergency request by the pastor.
7. Accept the responsibility for accurate record keeping in every parish and to leave every parish with accurate, updated membership records.
8. Accept the sacred nature of the trust relationship with parishoners and not violate the confidentiality of any such relationships.
9. Give endorsement only to those movements, agencies, or individuals that are in agreement with United Methodist doctrine and polity, or approved by the District Superintendent.
10. Use United Methodist curriculum in the church schools.
11. Abide by Paragraph 436.1 considering the profession of ministry as full-time.

EPISCOPAL COMMITTEE RECOMMENDATION: By a vote of Yes - 86, No - 0, the Study and Review Section voted to refer the following recommendation back to the Committee on the Episcopacy for further study:

EPISCOPACY COMMITTEE RECOMMENDATION

The purpose of this recommendation is that pastors and the bishop

need to have a day free of meetings when they can attend to personal business, have a time for reflection, etc. Although some clergy succeed in arranging such a day, the committee feels there should be a concerted effort across the Conference to make this possible. The consensus was that Monday would be the best day so lay people and clergy could attend Friday night and/or Saturday meetings.

Therefore, the committee would hope that District or Conference committees would schedule meetings other than Mondays so that this Sabbath Day for pastors and the bishop may be possible.

The Conference, however, disagreed with this action by Section #2 and approved the above recommendation for a "clergy Sabbath."

BOARD OF ORDAINED MINISTRY - CONTINUING EDUCATION: In the "Proposed Plan for the Ordained Ministry," Study and Review Section #2 moved to delete from Paragraph A in Section IV on p. 17 the words "the other 4 can be earned in not less than .5 units." The vote was Yes - 92, No - 3, and Abstaining - 2. This action was approved by the Conference.

Bishop Yeakel then recognized the Rev. Harold E. Walton, who offered the following amendment:

That II D. be added, using the words of III F., adding 'provided that the written results of such research are evaluated by an authority approved by the Continuing Education Committee of the Board of Ordained Ministry.'

The motion to amend was seconded but failed.

Bishop Yeakel recognized the Rev. Dr. Dilio E. Mariotti, who moved to amend Section VII, "Accountability," by adding a new part D., which would read:

That persons without college degrees serving under appointment be encouraged to complete a minimum of 2 credits each year toward a Bachelor's Degree.

The motion to amend was duly seconded and approved by the Conference.

STUDY AND REVIEW SECTION #3: Bishop Yeakel recognized the Rev. Dr. J. T. Seymour, chairperson, who, in turn, called on Guy O. Molock, chairperson of the Commission on Religion and Race. Mr. Molock summarized the section's actions regarding the document entitled **CROSS-RACIAL APPOINTMENTS: POLICY AND PROCEDURES:**

I - Richard Stazesky Amendment:

Delete Section 41 on pages 16 and 17. Duplicate Item 6 on page 19 as the new Section 41, page 16.

Vote: For - 63 Against - 10 Abstaining - 2

Bishop Yeakel recognized Robert Lee Calvert, lay member from St. John's UMC, Charlestown, MD, who moved that "we not include duplicate Item No. 6 of the above amendment on page 19 as the new Section #41, page 16." The motion was seconded and approved. Thus, the Stazesky amendment was not approved.

II - Vaughn Johnson Amendment:

To add Item 8 to Appendix No. 1 as:

8: That representatives of the Missional Priority Coordinating Committee work along with the task force for cross-racial appointments for the purpose of evaluating the effectiveness of cross-racial appointments as they strengthen or weaken ethnic minority local churches.

Vote: For - 51 Against - 14 Abstaining - 1

This amendment was adopted by the Conference.

III - Edward Kester Amendment:

Add Item No. 9 to Appendix I

- 9: The Task Force referred to in #23 of this document will report on the strengthening or other effects on all churches participating in these programs.

Vote: For - 49

Against - 9

Abstaining - 2

This amendment was adopted by the Conference.

The whole document, which may be found in the Journal under "Reports," was then adopted as amended, for study and implementation.

Mr. Molock then presented the following AFFIRMATIVE ACTION PLAN which was approved by the Conference:

AFFIRMATIVE ACTION

The official Affirmative Action Policy of the United Methodist Church is defined in Paragraph 815:

815. Policies Relative to Nondiscrimination. It shall be the policy of The United Methodist Church that all administrative agencies and institutions, including hospitals, homes, and educational institutions, shall: (a) recruit, employ, utilize, recompense, and promote their professional staff and other personnel in a manner consistent with the commitment of The United Methodist Church to ethnic, racial, and sexual inclusiveness; (b) fulfill their duties and responsibilities in a manner which does not involve segregation or discrimination on the basis of race, color, age, sex, or handicapping condition; and (c) provide for adequate representation by laity.

The Commission on Religion and Race and the Conference Council on Ministries recommends the following AFFIRMATIVE ACTION for adoption by the Peninsula Conference.

AFFIRMATIVE ACTION PLAN

It is recommended that there be an affirmative action committee including persons with concerns other than race which should include in addition to representation from the Commission on Status and Role of Women, the Division of Health and Welfare and Division on Higher Education and Campus Ministry, in order to touch the full scope of affirmative action needs.

A work force analysis of characteristics of particular kinds of employment offered by employers and/or opportunities for service offered by boards and agencies according to race and sex of persons involved shall be made with a view to determining whether percentage utilization is commensurate with availability of persons across classifications of race, sex, age, and/or handicapping conditions.

Each board, agency and/or institution head or person to whom responsibility may be delegated shall set affirmative action goals for attaining a reasonable utilization of and inclusion of minorities, women and persons with handicapping conditions, in employment and/or as volunteers for ministry on respective boards and agencies. There shall be regard for reasonable turnover expectations and anticipated personnel changes.

Goals shall include:

- a time table for completing of recruiting and hiring procedures.
- how positions are to be advertised.
- specific person responsible for procedures.

Recruitment efforts shall be made in areas and in contexts where ethnic presence and other under utilized categories of persons are obvious.

Conscious efforts shall be made to compensate for deficiencies that are the cumulative effects of past discrimination by providing opportunities for up-grading skills of minorities, women, and persons with handicapping conditions.

There shall be yearly progress reports from each board, agency, and/or employing institution which should include:

evaluation of goals as to whether they were adequate for the situation and whether there needs to be restatement of goal.

evaluation of employee turnover especially minorities, women or persons with handicapping conditions.

evaluation of reasons for rejecting minorities, women, or persons with handicapping conditions, if any did in fact apply.

evaluation of supervisor-employee relationships.

WASHINGTON AREA LOCAL COMMITTEE: Bishop Yeakel summoned the Rev. Wilson A. Shearer to the stage and thanked him for all that he had done as the Area Quadrennial Assistant before, during, and following the 1984 General Conference in Baltimore. In turn, Mr. Shearer thanked the Peninsula Annual Conference for its cooperation with his plans and arrangements for the General Conference.

STUDY AND REVIEW SECTION #2 (continued): Bishop Yeakel recognized the Rev. H. Sterling Green, chairperson, who reported that the section had voted to refer back to the Board of Ordained Ministry for further study the section entitled "When a Minister Considers Marital Separation or Divorce," pp. 36-39, in the manual **THE ORDAINED MINISTRY: ENTERING, DOING, AND EXITING**. The vote was Yes - 64, No - 19, and Abstaining - 4. This action was confirmed by the Conference and the manual, with the exception of the section on separation or divorce, approved by the Conference.

Mr. Green also reported on the section's action with regard to the following resolution on Local Church Membership Accountability, which had been submitted by the Rev. Donald O. Clendaniel, II, chairperson, Division of Evangelism, Board of Discipleship:

WHEREAS, Paragraph 703.9 of the Discipline states that "The Annual Conference shall have the power to make inquiry into the membership status of the local churches, and where no members have been received on confession of faith during the year, it may require the pastor and the lay member to appear before the appropriate agency and make explanation," and

WHEREAS, the Division of Evangelism recommends to the Annual Conference that not only the pastor and lay member, but also the lay leader and chairperson of evangelism of that church or charge appear before the appropriate agency, and

WHEREAS, the appropriate agency shall consist of the Bishop, the Conference Council Director, the pastor's district superintendent, James Barcastle, the Rev. Don Clendaniel II, Dr. James Morgan, and Dr. Gerald Poster, and

WHEREAS, the responsibilities of this agency would be to hear why no new members have been received on confession of faith; what efforts have been made; what resources have been used;

BE IT THEREFORE RESOLVED, that the Peninsula Annual Conference adopt this proposal with the understanding that this agency desires to be seen not only in terms of accountability, but also as a ministry of opportunity to the local church.

The section approved the following amendments to this resolution which were confirmed by the Conference:

- I) Amendment - 4th Whereas should read: "The responsibilities of this agency would be to hear why no new members have been received on confession of faith; what efforts have been made; what resources have been used; and assist churches in question in developing effective evangelism programs."

Yes - 78

No - 3

- II) Amendment - 3rd Whereas had editorial changes: instead of persons' names, the following positions should be listed: Board of Discipleship Chairperson, Division of Evangelism Chairperson, Associate Council Director on Evangelism and Conference Evangelist.

Bishop Yeakel then recognized the Rev. Dr. Edwin L. Ellis, Dover District Superintendent, who moved that:

Under Be It Therefore Resolved, the following phrase be inserted after the word 'accountability,'...'but also as a ministry of encouragement by assisting the churches in question to develop effective evangelism programs.'

The motion was duly seconded and approved by the Conference, after which the resolution, as amended, was approved.

The entire report of Study and Review Section #2 was then approved.

UNITED METHODIST PUBLISHING HOUSE: Mr. W. M. Birchard, Manager of the Cokesbury Store at 516 N. Charles St., Baltimore, reported that the store will soon be relocated on Rolling Rd. in Baltimore. He also presented a check from the Board of Publication in the amount of \$10,876 to be used for ministerial pensions within the Peninsula Annual Conference. On behalf of the Conference Bishop Yeakel expressed profuse thanks to Mr. Birchard and the Board of Publication for their generosity.

CHURCH WORLD SERVICE: Bishop Yeakel recognized Ms. Eleanor Wilchynski, Director, Mid-Atlantic Region of CROP and World Service, who described the interfacing of U.M. Committee on Overseas Relief and CROP in meeting human need in many parts of the world. She said a special campaign for Ethiopian relief is presently underway to provide food, clothing, shelter, blankets, medicine, and immunizations to persons in desperate need. Ms. Wilchynski thanked all in the Conference who had planned and participated in the various CROP WALKS.

BOARD OF CHILD CARE: Bishop Yeakel recognized the Rev. Edward E. Kester, chairperson, Division of Health and Welfare Ministries, who, in turn, presented a National Association of Health and Welfare certificate to the Rev. Dr. J. Gordon Stapleton, Conference Council Director, as the representative of the Peninsula Annual Conference. Mr. Kester also congratulated the Kent Island U.M.C. for being the first to declare its intention to establish an auxiliary unit of the Board of Child Care in the Peninsula Conference. Mr. Kester then introduced Claude F. Libis, Executive Director, Board of Child Care, Inc. of the Baltimore and Peninsula Annual Conferences, who spoke briefly of the multi-faceted ministry to children and youth being presently implemented by the Board.

PENINSULA U.M. HOMES, INC.: Bishop Yeakel recognized the Rev. Richard C. Stazesky, President, who stated that 1985 marks the 25th Anniversary of our ministry to and with the elderly through PUMH, Inc. In this connection, an informative and inspiring audio-visual presentation, tracing the history and development of these ministries as well as their present components, was presented. At the conclusion of the presentation the Conference responded with enthusiastic applause.

POINT OF PERSONAL PRIVILEGE: Bishop Yeakel recognized the Rev. William Bemphill, Jr., the pastor of Hockessin U.M.C. and a member of the General Board of Global Ministries, who spoke briefly of his recent experiences in Zaire where there are great spiritual as well as physical needs. Mr. Bemphill observed that while we have greatly improved our record of Advance giving our direct support for missionaries in the field is still lacking. He encouraged churches and clergy to share this concern with the Rev. Garry O. Parker, the new Secretary of Global Ministries for the Peninsula Conference.

The session was adjourned with prayer by Bishop Yeakel at 5:15 p.m.

WEDNESDAY EVENING - JUNE 12, 1985

The executive session (elders only) was reconvened by Bishop Joseph H. Yeakel at 9:00 p.m. in the Holloway Hall auditorium. Bishop Yeakel asked the clergy if they were willing to reconsider the matter of associate membership which had been under debate on Tuesday morning. The body agreed to the request.

Bishop Yeakel then recognized the Rev. Dr. Dilio E. Mariotti, a member of the executive committee of the Conference Board of Ordained Ministry, who presented the following resolution:

WHEREAS, the Judicial Council, in Decision #536, has ruled that: "An Annual Conference may not subtract from the disciplinary requirements for

Conference membership, but it may under certain circumstances adopt additional requirements not in conflict with disciplinary provisions or their spirit or intent," and

WHEREAS, long-standing practice of the Peninsula Annual Conference has been to ordain and admit to Conference membership only persons who hold the Bachelor of Arts and Master of Divinity degrees, or their equivalent, and

WHEREAS, current practice precludes the admission of persons to Associate Membership and the deployment of full-time local pastors, and may be in conflict with disciplinary "spirit of intent," and

WHEREAS, the Board of Ordained Ministry proposes that the route to Associate Membership under the provisions of Paragraph 419 be declared open, and

WHEREAS, the goal of educational excellence is consistent with Wesleyan tradition and the intent of the Discipline, as evidenced by the continuing education mandate as a factor in determining eligibility of ministerial members for guaranteed appointment, and

WHEREAS, the profession of ordained ministry should maintain educational standards at least as high as those of other helping professions such as teaching and social work,

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, that the Peninsula Annual Conference adopt the following additional requirement to Paragraph 419 (4) of the 1985 Book of Discipline:

"AN ASSOCIATE MEMBER SHALL HAVE COMPLETED THE BACHELOR OF ARTS OR AN EQUIVALENT DEGREE FROM A COLLEGE OR UNIVERSITY LISTED BY THE UNIVERSITY SENATE OR COMPETENCY EQUIVALENCE THROUGH AN EXTERNAL DEGREE PROGRAM AT A COLLEGE OR UNIVERSITY LISTED BY THE UNIVERSITY SENATE."

After debate the above resolution was defeated by a vote of Yes - 49, No - 53.

Bishop Yeakel recognized the Rev. Dr. R. Jervis Cooke who moved to amend the qualifications for associate membership by substituting 45 years for 35 years as the minimum age. The motion to amend was seconded but defeated.

Following this action, the entire plan entitled THE ORDAINED MINISTRY: ENTERING, DOING, AND EXITING, with the exception of the section on marital separation/divorce, was approved by the elders present.

The session was adjourned by Bishop Yeakel with prayer at 10:15 p.m.

THURSDAY MORNING - JUNE 13, 1985

The Conference met for morning devotions in the Holloway Ball auditorium at 9:00 a.m. Singing was led by Elise Balingier and a stirring evangelical message delivered by the Rev. Donald O. Clendaniel, II.

Bishop Yeakel re-convened the plenary session at 9:30 a.m. The Conference Secretary shared greetings which had been received from Bishop P. Herbert Skeete and the members of the Eastern Pennsylvania Conference whose sessions were being held concurrently at Lebanon Valley College, Annville, Pennsylvania.

Bishop Yeakel recognized the Rev. Donald J. Hurst who moved that:

the Conference Council on Ministries prepare a booklet entitled "How to Receive Persons into Church Membership by Profession of Faith." This booklet will be ready for approval at the 1986 Annual Conference in order that it may be distributed to the local churches by the lay members of the Conference.

The motion was duly seconded and passed.

Bishop Yeakel recognized the Rev. Dr. J. Gordon Stapleton, Conference Council Director, who moved that the Council on Finance and Administration provide the necessary funds for this project. The motion was seconded and approved.

At this juncture, because of an article which had appeared in a local newspaper, Bishop Yeakel explained the meaning of the so-called "trust clause" in The Book of Discipline with regard to church property matters.

STUDY AND REVIEW SECTION #4: Bishop Yeakel called on Elizabeth St. Clair, chairperson of the section, for the summary presentation. Ms. St. Clair recognized E. Kay Seward, chairperson of the Conference Board of Pensions, who presented the following report of the section's actions:

Recommendations for Amendment by The Peninsula Conference Board of Pensions.

Recommendation No. 1

Vote: For - 89 Against - 0 Abstaining - 0

Recommendation No. 2

Vote: For - 91 Against - 0 Abstaining - 3

The full text of these recommendations is as follows:

The Peninsula Conference Board of Pensions recommends that:

1. The Past Service Rate for 1986 be \$195 per year of approved service.
2. Up to 100% of the pension and disability payments received be designated as the permitted housing allowance for 1986. The legal language of this resolution is as follows:

WHEREAS, the religious denomination known as The United Methodist Church has and functions through ministers of the Gospel who are duly ordained or licensed; and

WHEREAS, the practice of The United Methodist Church is to provide a parsonage or a rental allowance for each of its active ordained or licensed ministers; and

WHEREAS, pensions paid to retired ordained or licensed ministers of The United Methodist Church are considered as deferred compensation and are paid to said retired ordained or licensed ministers in consideration of previous active service, and disability benefits are considered payments in lieu of compensation for active service; and

WHEREAS, the Internal Revenue Service has recognized that the Peninsula Annual Conference is the appropriate organization to designate a housing/rental allowance for retired ordained or licensed ministers who are members of this Conference; and

WHEREAS, the disabled minister has the same legal relationship to an Annual Conference as does the retired minister and, thus, this Annual Conference is also the appropriate organization to designate a housing/rental allowance for a disabled ordained or licensed minister who is a member of this Conference:

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED THAT:

1. An amount equal to up to 100% of the pension or up to 100% of the disability payments received during the year of 1986 be and is hereby designated as rental/housing allowance respectively for each retired or disabled ordained or licensed minister of The United Methodist Church who is or was a member of the Peninsula Annual Conference at the time of his or her retirement or disability;
2. The pension or disability payment to which this rental/housing allowance applies shall be the pension or disability payment resulting from all service of such retired or disabled ordained or licensed minister from all employment by any local church, Annual Conference, general agency, or institution of The United Methodist Church or of any former denomination that is now a part of The United Methodist Church, or from any other employer who employed the minister to perform services related to the ministry and who elected to make contributions to the

pension or benefit funds of The United Methodist Church for such retired minister's pension or disabled minister's benefits.

The above recommendations were confirmed by the Conference.

Ms. St. Clair then called on Loren H. Frye, chairperson of the Commission on Equitable Salaries. Mr. Frye presented the following report which had not been included in the Pre-Conference Booklet and not discussed in Study and Review Section #4.

REPORT OF THE
COMMISSION ON EQUITABLE SALARIES
CONCERNING
PENINSULA CONFERENCE HOUSING POLICY

The 1984 Annual Conference authorized the creation of a Task Force on the Salary Structure plan, under the auspices of the Commission on Equitable Salaries. The Peninsula Cabinet asked the Commission to recommend a housing policy on clergy/clergy couples. This request was referred to the Task Force on Salary Structure.

We present the following report with the understanding that the Board of Ordained Ministry and some clergy couples prefer that no action be taken at this session of the Annual Conference. Nevertheless, because of existing situations which need to be addressed, we present the following recommendation as a policy for the current Conference year. We further request that the Annual Conference continue this Task Force for further study and refinement of the policy to be presented for adoption at the 1986 session of the Peninsula Conference.

WHEREAS, the Commission on Equitable Salaries has been requested by the Bishop and Cabinet to develop a policy on clergy housing to be recommended at the June 1985 session of the Peninsula Annual Conference, and

WHEREAS, the 1984 Book of Discipline of the United Methodist Church (Section 256, 3. f, page 139) requires the Administrative Board of the local church to provide for adequate housing for the pastor(s), and that housing shall not be considered as part of compensation or remuneration to the pastor, and

WHEREAS, it is the intent of this Commission to support the itinerant system of pastoral appointment which requires that adequate housing be provided for the pastor under appointment, and

WHEREAS, the Commission has conducted extensive research, review and study on Conference housing for clergy (including housing for clergy couples), and has held a hearing on the subject to which all pastors of the Conference and the chairpersons of the Pastor-Parish Relations Committees were invited to attend and express their views;

NOW THEREFORE, the Commission recommends as minimum standard, the adoption of the following policy:

1. It shall be the responsibility of each Charge to provide housing for its pastor(s) of a quality that is substantially consistent with the minimum housing standards adopted by the 1976 Peninsula Annual Conference (as printed in the 1976 Peninsula Annual Conference Journal, pages 189-192), together with the payment of utility costs that are incurred with the use of such housing. This housing requirement applies solely to full-time clergy, recognizing that housing for student pastors, retired ministers and part-time clergy is subject to variables which best can be negotiated by the District Superintendent on a case by case basis.
2. When a parsonage is not provided, the Charge shall pay the minister a minimum housing and utilities allowance equal to 20% of the minister's salary, but not less than 20% of the DAC in effect.
3. If a parsonage is provided and the District Superintendent determines that it is not habitable, the D.S. shall instruct the minister to provide his/her own housing. In such case, the Charge will be required to pay the minister a housing and utilities allowance based upon the formula in #2 above.

4. In the case of a clergy couple, the housing requirement in the 1984 Book of Discipline shall be considered to be satisfied if one parsonage (plus utilities) is provided for the clergy couple's use. The procedures to be followed are:
 - a. If the clergy couple uses a parsonage supplied by Charge A, Charge B will reimburse Charge A in an amount equal to 50% of the rental value of the parsonage and utilities. If the two Charges cannot agree on the rental value, the value shall be determined by a professional realtor appointed by the district superintendent, the fee for said service to be shared equally by the two charges.
 - b. If no parsonage is provided by either Charge, the minimum housing and utilities allowance for the clergy couple shall be 20% of the higher of the couples' individual salaries but not less than 20% of the current DAC, to be shared equally by the charges.
 - c. If the D.S. should find that the only parsonage available for use by the clergy couple is not habitable the district superintendent will follow set procedure #3 above.

The effective date of this policy shall be January 1, 1986.

Bishop Yeakel recognized the Rev. Edward E. Kester who presented the following amendment regarding the proposed housing policy:

DELETE ALL OF THE TEXT OF NUMBER FOUR IN THE POLICY AND REPLACE IT WITH THE FOLLOWING:

4. IN THE CASE OF A CLERGY/CLERGY COUPLE, considering that "The Judicial Council in Decisions 317, 433 and 422 has stated that Par. 15.14 of the Constitution which prohibits discrimination on the basis of race or status included discrimination on the basis of marital status,"* the procedures to be followed shall be:
 - a. If a clergy person is appointed to a position where a housing allowance is the norm or where a housing allowance would be the norm due to a new or change situation, then that clergy person shall not be denied the housing allowance because of their marriage to another clergy person who may either receive a housing allowance or parsonage with their appointment.
 - b. If a parsonage which meets our Conference standard is offered to any clergy person and they choose not to use that parsonage, then the clergy person loses the benefit such parsonage would provide. That is, a clergy person cannot ask for a housing allowance in lieu of an adequate parsonage which has been provided. The only exception to this would be as outlined in policy "c" (below).
 - c. If a clergy person chooses not to make use of the parsonage and a charge or church financially benefits from such an action, then the church or charge shall be morally obligated to share such financial benefit with the clergy who has chosen not to occupy the parsonage. The analysis of financial benefit and sharing would be worked out with the clergy, the pastor-parish relations committee and the District Superintendent.

Financial benefit shall not include simple relief from the cost of utilities.
 - d. Any clergy/clergy couple may negotiate exceptions in this policy with the cabinet in order to enhance the use of their particular gifts for mission and ministry.

*Judicial Council Decision No. 510

The motion to amend was seconded and a lively debate ensued. Bishop Yeakel recognized the Rev. Leonard Wheatley who moved that:

the last line of 4B and all of 4C be deleted in the Kester amendment.

The motion failed to receive a second.

Bishop Yeakel recognized the Rev. Dr. Bruce E. Cooke who moved that:

the matter of clergy/clergy housing be referred back to a committee of the Commission on Equitable Salaries that would include representation from the Board of Ordained Ministry for further study and a new proposal be presented to the 1986 session of the Peninsula Annual Conference.

This motion was duly seconded and approved by the Conference. The proposed housing policy, with the exception of section #4, was then approved by the Conference.

Mr. Frye then presented the following report of the Task Force on Salary Structure Plan:

The Task Force on Salary Structure Plan has met several times during the past year. We have collected extensive data on the practices and procedures of other Conferences across the United Methodist Church, in particular those within our own Northeastern Jurisdiction. In addition we have studied in depth the compensation practices of our own Conference. However, we are not ready at this time to make a recommendation to the Annual Conference.

Therefore, we recommend that the Task Force on Salary Structure Plan be continued for the next Conference year.

The recommendation to continue the task force was approved by the Conference.

Mr. Frye referred to the report in the Pre-Conference Booklet and the commission's recommendation that the minimum salary for full-time Conference, probationary, and associate members be \$13,475 for the calendar year 1986. Bishop Yeakel postponed the debate on this issue because of an Order of the Day concerning the Centennial of United Methodist Women.

ORDER OF THE DAY: CENTENNIAL OF UNITED METHODIST WOMEN: An informative and inspiring program tracing the development of women's work in the previous Delaware Annual Conference and the Peninsula Annual Conference was presented, complete with period costumes. The program was planned by Alice Powrie, UMW President, who was assisted by the Rev. Mildred White, the Rev. Dr. Edwin C. Thomas, Jr., Cleo H. Henry, Norma Jo Walton, Dorothy Wilkins, Mary Frances Cooke, and others.

Following the program the Conference stood adjourned for a luncheon recess at 12:15 p.m.

THURSDAY AFTERNOON - JUNE 13, 1985

The session was re-convened by Bishop Yeakel in the Holloway Hall Auditorium at 1:30 p.m.

POINT OF PERSONAL PRIVILEGE: Bishop Yeakel recognized the Rev. Dr. Robert M. Price, President, Peninsula Conference Board of Church and Society, who in turn, introduced Omar Centureon, an alien from El Salvador, who was escorted to the stage by the Rev. Mark Palmer. Mr. Centureon spoke briefly of the government oppression and military tactics of torture and oppression which were presently taking place in his country. He stated that people were living under the constant threat of danger and death. He said that the only way he had survived was by being spirited out of the country by his father. He denied that communists were taking over the country, but insisted that the government was guilty of constant violations of human rights.

Bishop Yeakel recognized the Rev. Garry O. Parker, who had served in El Salvador as a missionary pastor. Mr. Parker asked the Conference to carefully evaluate the passion of the speech which had been given by Mr. Centureon, saying that this was only part of the overall picture. He insisted that the incumbent government was not all bad and asked those present not to make up their minds about the situation without careful reflection and prayer.

At this juncture, debate regarding the issue of equitable salaries was resumed. Bishop Yeakel recognized the Rev. George C. Godfrey who moved that we amend the recommended minimum salary of \$13,475 to \$13,000. The motion was duly seconded, but, following debate, defeated. The main motion, with its recommendation of \$13,475, was then approved by the Conference.

Bishop Yeakel recognized the Rev. Thomas W. Blakelock, who moved to amend the recommendation regarding minimum salary for student pastors in 1986 to \$10,120 (a

10% increase). The motion was duly seconded and approved by the Conference, thus increasing this figure from the \$9,200 which had been recommended by the Commission on Equitable Salaries. The recommendation for student pastors, as amended, was then approved.

The following recommendation regarding mileage reimbursement was adopted:

RESOLVED, that minimum reimbursement for travel expense during 1986 shall be 20.5 cents per mile for the first 15,000 miles of business and 11 cents per mile beyond 15,000 miles, said rates being in compliance with IRS policy.

By common consent it was agreed that all pastors would be "encouraged" to use the reimbursement forms supplied by the Conference Business Office, so as to standardize the reporting.

Ms. St. Clair, chairperson of Study and Review Section #4, then called on Calvin H. Webster, President of the Council on Finance and Administration. Mr. Webster reminded the Conference that Recommendation #2 of the report of Council on Finance and Administration (as presented in the Pre-Conference Booklet) called for the Comprehensive Protection Plan to be billed to the local churches effective January 1, 1986. He stated that Study and Review Section #4 had substituted the following resolution for this recommendation of Council on Finance and Administration. He called on the Rev. Dr. Bruce E. Cooke, who presented the substitute resolution:

WHEREAS, when the Peninsula Annual Conference, in 1981, adopted a plan for participation in the General Church pension program, Ministerial Pension Plan and Comprehensive Protection Plan, it was affirmed that the Comprehensive Protection Plan should be included in the budget of the Annual Conference, with two of the reasons given being:

1. Local churches/charges might not make the Comprehensive Protection Plan payments on time, resulting in the loss of important benefits, and
2. The Annual Conference participation in the Comprehensive Protection Plan would help equalize some of the pension program's financial load across the Conference, giving some relief for smaller churches/charges;

WHEREAS, we believe it is important that the Annual Conference continue to be a participant in the pension program through payment of the Comprehensive Protection Plan for those same reasons; and

WHEREAS, while billing the Comprehensive Protection Plan to local churches/charges as of January 1, 1986, is one way to deal with the need to manage an ever-growing budget, we believe there are other, more-reasonable, and more-responsible alternatives for accomplishing a manageable budget;

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Comprehensive Protection Plan continue to be billed to the Peninsula Annual Conference, and be included as a line item in the 1986 Annual Conference budget; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that Council on Finance and Administration be directed to revise the budget proposal based on this resolution and present a new budget for adoption before 1986.

Dr. Cooke stated that the above substitute had been adopted by the section by a vote of:

For - 64

Against - 21

Abstaining - 3

In the ensuing debate, Bishop Yeakel recognized the Rev. Leonard H. Wheatley, who moved to amend the substitute by adding the following:

And be it further resolved that Council on Finance and Administration be directed to revise its budget proposal through budget cuts, apportionment increase, and/or other alternatives and to present a more manageable budget to a Special Session of the Annual Conference in Fall, 1985.

The suggested amendment was seconded but not approved.

The vote was then taken on the Cooke substitute and it was defeated.

The original motion, as submitted by Council on Finance and Administration in the Pre-Conference Booklet, was then approved.

Bishop Yeakel then recognized the Rev. Charles E. Barton, Jr. who moved:

That a series of workshops be held across the Conference in the Fall of 1985 to explain the Comprehensive Protection Plan. These workshops would be similar to the Ministerial Pension Plan workshops held in 1982.

It was agreed that such workshops would help to interpret the new policy regarding the funding of the Comprehensive Protection Plan to the local churches. The motion was duly seconded and approved by the Conference.

The second recommendation of Council on Finance and Administration, that the budget for 1986 be set at \$3,345,667, was then approved by the Conference.

The third recommendation, that .39 be the apportionment factor for 1986, was then before the body. Bishop Yeakel recognized the Rev. Charles Barton, Jr. who moved that the figure be changed to .38. The motion was seconded but failed. The Conference then voted to approve .39 as the apportionment factor for the calendar year 1986. The entire report of Council on Finance and Administration was then received and approved by the Conference.

REACH UP-DATE: Bishop Yeakel called on the Rev. Vaughn A. Johnson, Associate Council Director, who, in turn, introduced some of the people who had directly benefited from the REACH program. The Rev. James W. Kambor, a native of Sierra Leone and a student pastor in the Peninsula Conference, stood to be recognized. Mrs. Angie Miles, a health nurse in Sierra Leone, spoke briefly to the Conference. She expressed profound gratitude for the new medical van which REACH had provided and said that her maternity clinic and immunization program had saved many lives in about four chiefdoms in the country. She also stated that the van was being used in a ministry of evangelism.

The Rev. MacDilla Milton brought greetings from the United Methodist Conference in Liberia. She said that REACH had enabled her to complete her three years of study at Wesley Seminary in Washington. She commented: "REACH has touched many lives in Liberia...thank you from the depths of my heart."

The Rev. Robert O. Wallace, chairperson of the REACH committee, thanked the Conference for its support and stated that REACH would be continuing through the 1985-1986 Conference year.

The Rev. George H. Moore and the Rev. Dr. Edwin L. Ellis then presented a new approach to stewardship called "Concept Barnabas."

The Rev. Dr. J. Gordon Stapleton, Conference Council Director, commended the Rev. Mr. Johnson for his ministry with REACH and in the area of stewardship. The Conference responded with applause.

RESOLUTION ON CHARITABLE GIVING: After being recognized by Bishop Yeakel, Dr. Stapleton also presented the following resolution:

RESOLUTION CONCERNING CHARITABLE DEDUCTIONS
FOR FEDERAL INCOME TAX

WHEREAS, recent tax proposals within the Treasury Department may seek to severely limit or abolish the charitable deduction for federal income tax purposes; and

WHEREAS, it has been public policy for the government to encourage philanthropic giving and charitable work through the maintenance of a charitable deduction from federal income tax since the inception of the federal income tax law; and

WHEREAS, it is reported that among proposals under consideration are the elimination of the charitable deduction for non-itemizing taxpayers originally enacted in 1981, the elimination of deductions for charitable gifts for gifts under 2% of the taxpayers adjusted gross income, and the

limitation of charitable deductions for gifts of appreciated property to actual costs plus an inflation factor, or actual market value, whichever is less; and

WHEREAS, studies indicate that the impact of such proposals would be to decrease the total of charitable gifts, as well as to significantly reduce the leadership gifts to charitable causes, on the order of an \$800 million (27%) decrease in giving to institutions of higher education, and an eight billion dollar (18%) decrease in giving for religious purposes, and an overall decrease in charitable giving of 17% - 20%, or \$10 - \$12 billion; and

WHEREAS, in light of proposals to curtail or cut back government programs in support of education and for the provision of social services, it is expected that churches and other non-profit organizations will move to take on a greater role in these areas; and

WHEREAS, in order to assume such a role, such organizations will need to make greater demands upon their constituencies for financial support; and

WHEREAS, the tax proposals as reported would instead negatively impact upon the levels of such support,

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Peninsula Annual Conference hereby records its strong support for maintenance of the existing rules regarding income tax deductibility for all charitable contributions, continuation of the charitable deduction for non-itemizing taxpayers, and continuation of the current rules concerning gifts for appreciated property at market value.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Peninsula Annual Conference instruct its Secretary to send a copy of this resolution to President Reagan, Secretary of the Treasury Baker and congressional leaders.

The above resolution was approved by vote of the Conference.

NOMINATING COMMITTEE REPORT: Bishop Yeakel recognized the Rev. Bowell O. Wilkins, chairperson, who presented the report. After being perfected by the body it was approved by the Conference and may be found under Section IV of the Journal (Boards, Divisions, Commissions, and Committees).

Bishop Yeakel recognized James H. Baxter, Jr., lay member from Grace U.M.C., Georgetown, DE, who presented the following resolution:

A RESOLUTION TO ELIMINATE
"CARGO PREFERENCE"
IN SHIPPING FOOD TO NEEDY

WHEREAS, we as Christians have and will be concerned about food for needy nations. Even though the United States gives over 52% of the total food given by countries there is much more we can do;

WHEREAS, because of cargo preference legislation that makes it mandatory for United States Department of Agriculture to require all shipments of grain sold by a blended credit program or Public Law 480 program, 50% of all this grain has to be shipped by American ships;

WHEREAS, in terms of U.S. dollars it cost African nations almost 19 million dollars this past year in higher shipping cost. This is sufficient to land in Ethiopia or Sudan or foreign flag ships enough wheat and soybean oil to provide over 480,000 people one pound of wheat and one ounce of soybean oil per day for one year;

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that we of the Peninsula Annual Conference of the United Methodist Church go on record with letters to our United States Representatives and Senators asking their support of legislation to eliminate cargo preference in shipments of grain sold by a blended credit program or Public Law 480 program.

The above resolution was approved by the Conference.

UNITED METHODIST FOUNDATION, INC.: Bishop Yeakel recognized the Rev. Paul R. Wragg, executive director, who spoke briefly concerning the various types of planned giving which the Foundation facilitates and the kinds of seminars which it offers. The complete report of the Foundation may be found in the Journal under "Reports."

NEW HYMNAL COMMITTEE: Bishop Yeakel recognized the Rev. Dr. Laurence H. Stookey of the faculty of Wesley Theological Seminary, a member of the New Hymnal Committee of the General Church. Dr. Stookey described the painstaking efforts that are underway to develop a new hymnal which will meet the needs of all United Methodists everywhere. He said that the target date for publication was 1990.

PRESENTATION OF YOUTH COUNCIL: Bishop Yeakel recognized the Rev. Harvey Manchester, Jr. and the Rev. Charles E. Barton, Jr. who presented the members of the Conference Youth Council who were present and participating in the Annual Conference. The youth came to the stage and were applauded by the Conference.

COMPOSITE REPORT OF THE DISTRICT SUPERINTENDENTS

Members and Friends of the Peninsula Annual Conference:

The year 1984 was an exciting one for United Methodists. It was during that year that the church observed the Bicentennial of the Christmas Conference of 1784 when sixty preachers met to formally organize a church. After one week they not only organized a church but established an ordained ministry, elected episcopal leadership, accepted a liturgy and were fully prepared to be a distinct church in a new nation.

Today we come together with 250 clergy and an equal number of laity. I wonder what we will accomplish by the end of these three days?

Interspersed between Bicentennial celebrations at General, Jurisdictional and Annual Conferences, we said "Goodby" to Bishop and Mrs. D. Frederick Wertz and "Hello" to Bishop and Mrs. Joseph H. Yeakel. One of our own, Felton E. May, was elected to the episcopacy which prompted a short series of moves - J. Gordon Stapleton to Council Director, Edwin L. Ellis to Dover District Superintendent and others. The election of new membership and leadership on our boards, commissions and committees brought us to a new day with a new opportunity in a new quadrennium.

The year 1985 finds us working together with new leadership in exciting and challenging ways with positive direction. Since this composite report has not been a report of the past so much as an expression of current concerns, let us turn to the selected themes of the Missional Priority, Church Development, Evangelism, Stewardship, Reach, Apportionments, and Peace.

THE MISSIONAL PRIORITY

The General Church calls upon the Annual Conferences and the local churches of our denomination to exercise our connective relationship through the missional priority. The 1984 General Conference has directed us to continue the emphasis on the support and expansion of the ethnic minority church. We are to continue unfinished business, but under a new and wider thrust. The call in this quadrennium is to learn from one another. The unique experience of being a part of the ethnic congregation offers new insights that the non-ethnic church needs to hear and experience. Special learnings from heritage and daily living as an ethnic person can provide a deeper understanding of what we mean by the "body of Christ..." Worship and hymns expressed in non-English language can be a new expression of faith in the American Church. In other words, as the new title suggests, we embark on a four-year emphasis of Strengthening the Ethnic Minority Local Church — for Witness and Mission.

Our Conference Council on Ministries has taken unanimous action to make this the priority on a Conference level. Each board and agency of the Council will be expected to report annually on its programs designed to meet this priority. Now we ask, indeed urge, every local church to make this a priority also. Each pastor is asked to study the workbook that has been supplied by the national Missional Priority Coordinating Committee and to share the possibilities for action with the members of every congregation. Let us together make this a priority in this time and in this Conference in every local church.

CHURCH DEVELOPMENT

Our Lord has called us to "Proclaim liberty to the captives" and commissioned us to "go to all people everywhere and make them my disciples." The challenge is to be intentional about the starting of new missional congregations where the invitation can be extended to believe and serve.

To help us know where to begin, the Conference Board of Global Ministries, Council on Ministries and Cabinet have endorsed the plan to conduct a Conference-wide study to determine where new churches should be started and old ministries redeveloped. The goal will be to identify and prioritize these opportunities for ministry within the Conference so that limited human and financial resources can be deployed to best advantage.

With the help of leadership from the General Board of Global Ministries, district teams will be enlisted and trained to carry the major responsibility with a preliminary report due next year at Conference. The work of the district teams will eventually be combined to create a comprehensive Conference plan - including priorities, cost factors, resources, and time lines of implementation.

Please be aware of what's happening and help when asked. Let us all look forward to the specific direction this study will give our work together.

EVANGELISM

Evangelism is what the church does with the message of her Lord. Whatever the idiom that is used, the response to the call is informed, conditioned and motivated by one's sense of obedience. During the past year we have seen several attempts at doing Evangelism programatically, with varying degrees of success. At the level of the local church, we have had our share of revivals and outreach exercises, calculated to do battle with Satan and hopefully to produce some kind of growth in the fellowship. If one is to be honest, we must admit that these attempts have fallen short of our expectation, both in terms of membership participation and projected results. The heartache of a well-planned meeting with top leadership that failed to attract, even a modicum of interest or attendance, is very well known.

Frank Warden, Minister of Evangelism at the 11,600 member Highland Park United Methodist Church in Dallas, the second largest United Methodist Church in the nation, after having tried the usual programs of Evangelism that were available to him, decided that there had to be a better way, there had to be something that could produce more than three or four kids at a Bible study in a church the size of Highland Park. What Warden saw was that practicing evangelism techniques was not the answer. "The Church itself has to be the tool of evangelism." Evangelism was the responsibility of the entire church. The Education people will teach about Christ; the Preacher will preach about Christ; the Choir will sing about Christ; the whole Church becomes excited about Christ and is not ashamed to witness to it. In fact, says Warden, "unless the Church is presenting Christ, and showing people the Gospel in its music, its preaching, its Bible study, and in all that it does, it is wrong to go out and use confrontational evangelism and talk about Jesus without this type of Church commitment." Those coming into the church services could very well be surprised and let down, because church services are conducted usually in a different language and style from that in which the initial confrontation was made.

Growth in membership has been made one of the goals of the General Conference. But this will not happen unless we plan to grow.

STEWARDSHIP

"Everyone a talent - Everyone a Task" is the theme adopted by the Division of Stewardship for its spring training events. Effective stewardship in the Annual Conference must begin with the individual person who recognizes herself or himself as one with whom God has entrusted high responsibility to care for and to manage the resources he has given. It further suggests that the steward is one whom God has endowed with individual talents or gifts in order to respond to this tremendous task. As we fulfill our stewardship responsibilities in the local church and the Conference, it is challenging to be reminded that time, talents, abilities and all resources of life are sacred gifts from God. We participate in the stewardship programs as a growth process which enables persons to be strengthened in the understanding that all of life requires those disciplines which will be more effective in reaching our goals. To this end, planning realistic ways to channel individual and corporate resources is significant to successful stewardship, which necessarily recognizes the fact of the theme "Everyone a talent - Everyone a Task."

REACH

From its beginning, REACH, has been perceived as a program of stewardship education, as well as a means of developing better stewardship practices and responses within the local churches and the Annual Conference. A great effort has been made to avoid seeing this effort as only that of a "fund-raising activity" or "capital fund drive." The original goals were designed with these purposes in view. Although participation has not been 100%, those congregations and persons involved have attested the effectiveness of careful planning. The process from which emerged Treks I, II, and III, where persons across the Conference had the opportunity to share and select areas of mission deemed to be exciting and creative

for challenging the local church and communities to respond with their God-given resources. There were a sufficient number of projects representing a variety of needs affording individual churches the opportunity to choose what seemed exciting to them. As a consequence, many projects have been fully funded. This is indeed commendable. However, there remain many others yet to be funded. For this reason, REACH is extended beyond the original period of three years. With the extension of the program it is desired that congregations which have not yet become involved, will make a decision to contribute so no worthy project will go wanting. Our Communicator of July 10, 1981, printed an article related to the need for REACH. As we continue another year in this vital effort, it is significant that we are reminded... "the local church is the place where God's work becomes incarnate and from which all Christians reach out in ministry to the world. Wherever the local church is strong and vital, lives are changed and the Gospel is known. The 1980 General Conference urged all of us to consider ways we can strengthen the local church for its mission to the world. Good Stewardship is one way this can occur. REACH will help local churches find ways they can be good stewards of God's many gifts and graces."

APPORTIONMENTS

Apportionments represent the means through which local charges respond to the financial needs for the mission and ministry of the church. As the word implies, this responsibility is "apportioned" or divided so every charge may participate or share according to its strength. The fund includes a variety of needs to which the United Methodist Church in general, and the Peninsula Conference in particular, are committed to support. The World Service budget is a major part of our responsibility, and is reflected to a large degree by our apportionments. This budget represents the outreach of the church into the world. Likewise, local and Conference benevolences are included. If we fail to meet our individual assessments for this cause, crucial needs are not fulfilled at every level represented in this figure. More than likely, our own Conference program will suffer the greatest loss. This is unfortunate, because the program budget is indicative of our plans to "make disciples" in every area represented. The year of 1984 ended with a record of sixty-two local churches falling short of meeting the full apportionment obligation. This shortage reflects a variety of circumstances in the local churches and communities. It is obvious that a deficit of this magnitude has had a significant impact upon the ministry and mission of the Annual Conference. Nevertheless, help is available when local churches sense that their ability to pay apportionments may be in jeopardy. The Conference provides consultation for churches facing this circumstance. It is further recommended that monthly remittances may be the best way to avoid falling short at the close of the year.

PEACE

Our nation spends more and more for arms. We have less and less security. The Bible refers to Peace 350 times.

The Roman Catholic Bishops, in their pastoral letter on Peace, have led the way for us in considering what we can do about Peace. Our United Methodist Bishops have prepared a stimulating statement on Peace for us. The Delmarva Ecumenical Agency has prepared a letter on Peace and Justice. All of these give us plenty to think about. They also give us alternatives - things that we can do.

All of these statements provide good guidance to Christian people. They all show that there is an indivisible connection between Peace and Justice. We cannot have Peace and security when injustice is as prevalent as it is in our country, and in much of the rest of the world. As Christians we have, not only the opportunity, but the responsibility to bring about Justice in our nation and in our nation's relationship with places like South Africa and Central America - places where we have great influence and affect those countries.

We call upon the people of the churches to pray more and more, to study the scriptural passages about Peace, to work for Justice in our country and in others where we have great influence, to write our Congress, to think about how much of our tax money we want spent on arms. Before we place the burden of responsibility on others can we begin with less concern for ourselves, and our churches, and have greater concern for the world that Jesus came to save.

CONCLUSION

Let us conclude this report with a word of appreciation and a moment of prayer. The word of appreciation is for Bishop and Mrs. Joseph H. Yeakel who came among us as strangers and have worked at getting acquainted with the clergy and laity and given positive, dynamic leadership.

Finally, in the words of a simple but beautiful hymn, let us pray for the church...

Jesus, with Thy church abide;
Be her Savior, Lord, and Guide,
While on earth her faith is tried:
WE BESEECH THEE, HEAR US.

May her voice be ever clear,
Warning of a judgement near,
Telling of a Savior dear:
WE BESEECH THEE, HEAR US.

May she guide the poor and blind,
Seek the lost until she find,
And the broken-hearted bind:
WE BESEECH THEE, HEAR US.

Judge her not for work undone,
Judge her not for fields unwon,
Bless her works in thee begun:
WE BESEECH THEE, HEAR US.

May she holy triumphs win,
Over-throw the hosts of sin,
Gather all the nations in:
WE BESEECH THEE, HEAR US.

SUPERINTENDENTS' REPORTS

DOVER DISTRICT

Edwin L. Ellis, Superintendent

This year has been somewhat unique inasmuch as the Dover District experienced the leadership of two superintendents. In the second month following the Annual Conference, we had the privilege of seeing one of our own, Felton Edwin May, elected and consecrated a Bishop in the United Methodist Church. This all took place last July at the seat of the Jurisdictional Conference at Lebanon Valley College, Annville, PA. Following this "mountain top" experience, Gordon Stapleton was elected to serve as Council Superintendent of the Dover District effective September 1, 1984. Following the initial period of adjustment to a new state, a new district, a new home, and a new appointment, I found myself sufficiently "on board" to pursue the responsibilities of my assignment. This was only possible with the cooperation and support of my wife, Mary, the Committee on Superintendency, Gordon Stapleton, former superintendent, Ministers and Mates, and people of our local churches.

THE LAITY

The work of the district is strengthened by the commitment of many lay persons who continue to become involved in the life of the local church, and its extension to various programs on the district and Conference levels. Alphonso Stevenson has given excellent leadership in this area. This is commendable inasmuch as the task is new for him. The district clusters were reviewed and reorganized, some for which new leaders had to be recruited. The following programs sponsored by the laity were carried out effectively, and the responses were highly favorable:

Laity and Ministers Banquet - Wesley Church, Georgetown, October 10, 1984. More than one hundred persons were in attendance.

Lenten Communion Breakfasts - Four celebrations were held - St. John's, Seaford; Absury, Barrington; Bethel Church, Lewes; and Whatcoat Church, Dover. Approximately 600 persons attended, and more than \$700.00 in offerings were designated for District Church Extension.

Schools of Lay Speaking: Orme Meade, District Director of Lay Speaking, had the task of organizing and promoting two events: For New Lay Speakers - Saturdays, April 6 and 13, Conference Center, Dover - 15 attended. For Advanced Lay Speakers - Saturdays, May 18 and 25, Grace Church, Georgetown - 37 attended. Resource Leaders were as follows: Howard Walseman, Vaughn Johnson, Doris Phillips, Mary Glick, Jonathan Baker, David Baker, K. Wayne Grier and Boyd Etter.

MINISTERS AND MATES

Willard Russell, the spouse of Dr. Michael Russell of the Greenwood Charge, has served effectively as chairperson of this organization. Along with members of the executive committee, he has shared in the planning of many outstanding programs during the course of the year. Our Ministers and Mates were able to participate in sessions featuring such topics as:

- Cross-racial Appointments
- Annual Conference Insurance and Pension Programs
- Accountability of Clergy Persons
- Peninsula Conference United Methodist Homes
- The Quadrennial Missional Priority
- Church Growth - Reactivating Members

In addition to the above, other matters pertaining to our life together in ministry were presented, and delicious lunches were served by the local churches, and enjoyed by all of us. I am delighted with the high level of Christian fellowship that is apparent in these gatherings.

UNITED METHODIST WOMEN

The women of the district are at work doing a commendable job of organizing new units, recruiting new leadership on both the local church and district levels, and developing programs which are in accord with the areas designed by the Women's Division. Ramona Anderson exhibits untiring efforts and great skill in mobilizing the women as she carries out her tasks of district president. The Fall meeting was held at Epworth Church in Rehoboth, Saturday, October 13, 1984, at which time there was a program featuring the San Francisco House near Milton, and communion worship with David Baker administering the sacrament, assisted by the district superintendent. The Spring meeting was held Thursday, April 25, at Whatcoat Church, Camden, featuring a covered dish supper and orientation workshops for officers. Both sessions were well attended. Our women also assumed their role in

promoting the Conference Centennial Celebration held at Delaware State College, May 4, 1985. Several participated in the program which attracted more than 700 from across the Conference. This indeed was a "Gala Celebration."

UNITED METHODIST MEN

United Methodist Men have become alive on the Dover District under the capable leadership of our District President, John Pitts, of Whatcoat Church, Dover. The men held two breakfasts during the year as follows:

The Fall Breakfast and meeting was held at Whatcoat United Methodist Church, 8 a.m., Saturday, December 1, 1984.

The Spring Breakfast and meeting was held at Wesley Chapel Church, Slaughter Neck, 8 a.m., Saturday, April 20, 1985. Boyd Etter, Conference Statistician, was the speaker.

Two new United Methodist Men's Groups are in the process of becoming chartered. It is hoped that an apparent new interest in the work of our United Methodist Men will stimulate other groups to organize in our district local churches.

DISTRICT COUNCIL ON MINISTRIES

The District Council on Ministries was organized last fall. It listed priorities for the program and work of the district for the quadrennium as follows:

1. Evangelism and Church Growth
2. Promotion of Youth and Single Adult Ministries
3. Strengthening of Lay Leadership in the Local Church and On The District
4. Establishing a More Effective System of Communication

The Council held two meetings with the district superintendent acting as chairperson, and Richard Varell as secretary. All district officers, coordinators, and secretaries are members of the Council. Work has begun on all our priorities, and it is anticipated that some plans will take effect in early fall of 1985.

AROUND THE LOCAL CHURCHES

West Sussex Parish: The Rev. Nathaniel Miller of Laurel Delmar Charge, serves as Director of the Parish. Commendable progress has been made in its structure and program. There are seven churches, and three pastors who are working together to formulate a model for a cooperative rural ministry. The latter was the focus of a workshop held last February, attended by approximately 25 leaders of the churches represented. Tina Miles of Bridgeville Charge, and Victor Harrison of Seaford Charge participated with Rev. Mr. Miller in this event.

New Parsonages: Plans are now underway for building new homes for our Pastors at Lewes Charge - George Radway, pastor, and at Bridgeville Charge - Tina Miles, pastor. If all goes well, they expect to be residing in these houses before our next Annual Conference.

Educational Buildings: New construction is in the works for educational centers at Bethesda Church on the Georgetown Charge, and at Bethel Church on the Gumboro Charge. These projects involve expenditures of approximately \$15,000 each. Programs have increased on these charges making expansion essential.

Resource Center on District: Under the leadership of Associate Council Director, Vaughn A. Johnson, and our Special Ministries Consultants, in cooperation with Pastor Tina M. Miles, a new Resource Center has been initiated and set up at Mt. Calvary Church, Bridgeville. It is hoped that ethnic minority congregations and pastors will use the facility for help in local church programming. A similar center has been established for the other districts of the Conference.

APPORTIONMENTS - NEW MEMBERS - PENSION DELINQUENCIES

In 1984 the Dover District Charges were almost 100% in their commitments to pay apportionments, pension remittances, and to receive new members on Profession of Faith. Our pastors and charges declare that anything less than 100% is not sufficient. Those who were unable to fulfill these obligations are determined to improve this record for the year of 1985.

CONCLUSION

We have worked hard together on the Dover District. It is difficult to cite all of the achievements of each charge. If I have excluded any significant matters related to our local churches, please remember that this is my first report to the Annual Conference. I hope you will accept this rationale as a plausible excuse, looking forward to a more accurate documentation and assessment of those ministries we share together. I covet your support and prayers as we press ahead in the tasks which God has given us. I have no adequate words to express the joy Mary and I have experienced since we arrived on the district. We are looking forward to another great year. May God bless you.

EASTON DISTRICT

Bowell O. Wilkins, Superintendent

Faithfulness is a word that describes rather well, what is happening in the life of the church. Members of the church adapting to different ministerial styles, as the ministers come and go. Ministers preparing sermons, visiting the congregation, counselling, working with committees and organizations, steering the church from institutional maintenance to mission. All of us relating to our new Bishop and his wife, who are helping us continue our journey in covenant with one another, and with God.

Again, the district has done an exceptional job in its payment on apportionments. The District missed full payment by 14. In the Conference, there were \$156,709 in special reductions (adjustments) in apportionments. \$6,559 of that was in the Easton District. In the Conference, there were 63 churches which did not pay in full. Five of these were in the Easton District. The churches in the District performed far better than any others, according to the formula used to calculate apportionments. This is the way, in our church, that we provide for basic missions, administration, pensions, and program in our own Conference.

The District Council on Ministries sets the tone for programming. The emphasis has been stewardship and evangelism. Several churches have been assisted in their desire to help people develop proportional giving. Others are being helped to reach out to the unchurched. Some churches which have had increases in membership are: Kent Island UMC; Hooper Memorial Church, Fishing Creek-Hoopers Island Charge; Bosier Memorial Church, Fishing Creek-Hoopers Island Charge; Ridgely UMC; Hillsboro Church, Queen Anne Charge.

The clergy of the District meet five times a year, with programs to enrich their ministry, to become more aware of the needs of the District, and to provide opportunity for fellowship. Harold Walton is the President, and Helen Burton is the President of the Mates. Ruth Walker is giving leadership to the District United Methodist Women, providing information to church UMWs, District events, and stimulating mission studies. The Board of Laity, under the leadership of Earl Hodil, continues to provide a quality lay speakers program, with nearly 200 certified lay speakers. They also provide Communion breakfasts during Lent, and a laity banquet in the Fall with the speaker this year, Reed Stewart, President, Wesley College. The first of the year, Alex Slonin became the editor of the District Communicator, providing editions packed with information.

Among parsonage families in the District, there have been a number of changes. Ray and Linda Hopkins had a baby girl, Anne Kristan. Jerry and Ruth Devine had a baby boy, Jonathan Robert. Newlyweds are Ted and Barbara Elser and Wallace and Shirley Greene. Joseph J. Tubbs passed away. He culminated his chaplaincy with several years of management responsibility at Wesley College. In March, through the generous efforts of many churches in the District, the Rev. James Kambor, of the Wittman-McDaniel Charge, was able to bring his wife, Cecelia, and three children from Liberia in Africa to join him here. Jerry Devine left Grace Church in Cambridge as Associate early in the year to go to St. Paul's in Wilmington as Associate. Elvin Cavanagh left in December. Dick Hubbard and Jim Morgan filled in for several weeks, and J. Arthur Mott is now serving the Charge (Still Pond-Betterton). Curtis and Rosemary Smith, after many years of significant ministry, are retiring and returning to New Hampshire.

A Cluster of churches in the St. Michaels-Tilghman Island area has developed. They have a confirmation training program, which culminated in a service on Pentecost. The Cluster also has developed a choir, which sings on special occasions.

Numerous physical properties have been improved or added. Among them, a new parsonage at Grasonville, which will become a Charge by itself, after years of anticipation. Union Church in St. Michaels, sold their parsonage and bought two properties, burned down one, and built a new parsonage. Mt. Pisgah Church is building a new structure to replace one that burned in a fire. Mt. Zion, near Maryland, renovated its social hall.

In Charge Conference last Fall, several hundred people saw and heard a presentation of some of the work of the churches of the District, and the work of the Conference. This was done through a slide-sound program, developed by Ray Hopkins, Ruth Walker and Dottie Wilkins. The variety of ministry carried on by the churches in the Conference is cause for rejoicing. There are lines from hymns, which capture some of the imagery of the church: "the hours of Thine abode," "the city of our God," "elect from every nation," "sweet communion with those whose rest is won," "tell all the world." We are alive. Charles Wesley puts it this way, "All praise to our redeeming Lord, who joins us by His grace, and bids us, each to each restored, together seek His face."

SALISBURY DISTRICT

Ewart C. Backshaw, Superintendent

In summarizing the efforts of the Salisbury District at being "The Church" in 1984, phrases like, "Blending tradition with innovation," "keeping the torch lit," "the issue has caught fire," immediately come to mind. There are, however, other phrases that could describe some of the pain and frustration encountered along the way, like "point and counterpoint," "putting gloves on an uncooperative octopus." But more significantly are the words of Charles Wesley, "But out of all, the Lord has brought us by His love."

We, with the other Districts, welcomed our new Bishop and shared his vision for the Church. He soon learned that things are not always what they seem on the Peninsula and that a road map is not always the most reliable travel tool. We also learned quite early in the game, that with this episcopal leader there were to be "no secrets, no surprises, and no subversion."

Any report such as this must chronicle the devoted leadership, both clergy and lay, that is resident in the Churches and Charges that make up the District. Not by any means among the most affluent of society, these folk, by their sacrificial offering of themselves and their substance, have helped to feed the hungry at soup kitchens and food pantries, sheltered the homeless and consoled the battered and abused, built fellowship halls and education facilities, and in one case in which the church was completely destroyed by fire, rebuilt the sanctuary completely debt free. This would be a shining accomplishment for any church, of any size, in any place, but for a small congregation on a small island in the Chesapeake Bay, in one of Maryland's most depressed counties, this was an act of supreme sacrifice, daring and dedication. I would like to introduce these hardy people to the Conference — they are the St. Paul United Methodist Church at Wenona, Deals Island, and their Pastor is a committed servant, brother Ralph Dewey Crockett.

When the District was divided into subdistricts, there was created the type of configuration that enabled groups of people to meet who, hopefully, would better work together because of geographic alignment. Using this model this year was an experiment in group dynamics. Two subdistrict workshops on Stewardship were held and drew together over sixty persons. The lower Somerset subdistrict gathered for two special hymn sings at the Princess Anne Civic Center, and the choirs sang to a crowded hall. The ministers of the Wilcomico group meet once a month for prayer and fellowship, and our "In-Service" day is always a high moment for the clergy. We even tried to do our Charge Conferences jointly this year. Those Charges pastored by students or local pastors had to have special arrangements, but on the six subdistricts we sensed an excitement in coming together and in sharing mutual concerns. It was not, by any means, the most ideal arrangement, but what was lost in the dealing with the individual charges and their local agendas was more than compensated in the fellowship and sense of oneness that was everywhere evident.

Our Lay Speakers training is done in two groups, basic and advanced. This year this program reached an all time high, both in interest and content. Seventy-nine persons worked through the curriculum with an interest and enthusiasm that was contagious. The closing communion service brought a challenge and climaxed a wonderful experience.

Our ministry to the Ocean Pines community has progressed and moved into a new phase. Just over three years ago, this little congregation was started and relied heavily on Conference support. Now they are assuming full responsibility for their Pastor and are in the negotiating stage for the securing of a site for their new church home.

Our United Methodist Men's Fellowship in on the move and has taken its place at the side of our United Methodist Women, the one hopefully complementing the other. These two groups account for a large percentage of the membership of our local churches and could be a force that can be harnessed in the revitalization of our congregations.

The District Council on Ministries has been at the hub of our District Organization, and has met regularly during the year to review our goals, to monitor the programs now in place, to initiate new outreach, and generally to give support to the various emphases that may be important to the work of the Peninsula Conference.

Always on the look-out for new opportunities for ministry, the Wesley Temple congregation opened its doors to the Haitian immigrants in our community. A service of worship, conducted by Haitians for Haitians, with the local congregation as observers, presented a dramatic portrayal of how strangers to our culture feel in our church services. Attempts are under way to shepherd these people by providing counsel and offering accommodation in our churches.

Perhaps the crowning event of our year's work was our Mission Fair. Garry O. Parker actually spoke to a missionary in Korea, and we listened to the conversation. There were real live missionaries conducting workshops; lunch was a sampling "all you can eat" of international foods; and Bishop Mathews was at his usual best. For over one hundred and eighty people, it was a good day.

No year would be complete without its share of exits and entrances. Sorrowfully we said farewell to Waldo L. Dize, John E. McBride, Anna Reiter, and Madeline Wells. We thank God for their life and witness and confidently commit them to the One whose they were and whom they served. Joyfully we welcomed Jonathan Scott, the son of Grant and Pearl Johnson of Pocomoke City, and Amanda Lee, the daughter of Fred and Leila Wood of Parsonsburg. We covet for these parents and their children the very best of the good life and prayerfully surround them with our caring and love.

"What then shall we say to these things - if God is for us, who can be against us." We approach the task of ministry seriously, yet joyfully. We feel that the message is laid upon us and that we have compulsion to present it with integrity and for a verdict. Whether we succeed or not, is unimportant. All we seek is to be faithful to that which has been give to us, and which, though unworthy, we have humbly and gratefully received. And so we commend ourselves to your prayers and to the One whom we serve:

Jesus, the first and the last,
Whose spirit shall guide us safe home;
We'll praise Him for all that is past;
And trust Him for all that's to come.

To the people in the churches on the Wilmington District and the members of the Peninsula Annual Conference:

DISTRICT STRATEGY

As I begin my second report as superintendent of the Wilmington District, may I take this opportunity to outline the strategy developed in the first year, followed in the second and reaffirmed the third. The specific points are:

1. Congregational Strategy - The District has a primary role in encour-

aging congregations to develop effectively responsive strategies to their specific situations.

2. Clusters - The District also has the primary role in creating clusters of churches for cooperating in mission and ministry.
3. Resourcing Team and/or Programs - The District will need to develop specific teams/programs to enable local churches to become more effective.
4. New Church Development - The District will bear the primary responsibility for convening and sustaining the needed cooperation and action.
5. Financial Aid - The district is key to dealing with the dilemma posed by the need for financial aid on one hand and the virtual certainty that providing it will undercut congregational development on the other hand.

Each pastor and congregation was asked and is asked how they might contribute to or benefit from each of these strategic directions.

DISTRICT PROGRAM

The Wilmington District Council on Ministries meets quarterly to think, coordinate and plan. Their evaluation of the program for 1984 included these major accomplishments:

1. Service to welcome Bishop Joseph H. Yeakel.
2. Organization of a District Task Force on Cross-Racial Appointments.
3. Organization of a District Task Force on New Church Development.
4. A Conference on the Holy Spirit.
5. Produced a bulletin insert on gambling referendum.
6. Organized a District Singles Ministry Council and held three major events.

New plans are now underway for 1985 and 1986. The outline of those goals is as follows:

1. Church Secretaries - A luncheon with opportunity for fellowship, information and inspiration for church secretaries.
2. Mission Emphasis - Development of a comprehensive mission emphasis on the District.
3. Missional Priority (EMIC) - Developing a specific strategy for the District.
4. Congregational Development - Organize a team to cooperate in the Conference study.
5. Methodist Men - Plan a strategy for developing Methodist Men's groups.
6. Housing - Support Denominational Executives as they move ahead on this concern.
7. Pre-marriage Encounter - Continue planning and developmet of this concern.
8. Evangelism Emphasis - Implement the "Reach Out and Touch Someone" program.
9. Education - Plan and conduct a workshop on starting new church school classes.

Once again, each pastor and congregation is asked how you may support or benefit from these program emphases.

NEW CONGREGATION/CHURCH DEVELOPMENT

Distinctive accomplishments in the area of new congregation church development on the Wilmington District include the following:

1. Union Church, Bear, consecrated a new church facility on April 14, 1985.
2. Wesley Church, Elkton, dedicated a steeple and broke ground for a new parsonage on July 29, 1984. The new house was consecrated December 9, 1984.
3. Korean Church, Newark, moved to the Ebenezer Church where they renovated the old sanctuary in January, 1985.

4. Hispanic Ministry, Wilmington, moved into the former Barrison Street parsonage which has been completely renovated for their use.
5. Union Church, East Cecil Charge, dedicated a new steeple and carillon on October 14, 1984.
6. Trinity Church, Chesapeake City, sold an older high maintenance parsonage and purchased a newer energy efficient house for their pastor.
7. Aldersgate, Wilmington, sold two parsonages, one too large and the other too small, to purchase two more appropriate homes for their pastors.
8. Rosebank, West Cecil Charge, has had their plans for a new fellowship hall approved by the District Committee on Church Location and Building.
9. Newark is currently in the process of selling the high maintenance Bent Lane parsonage in order to purchase a newer and more economical home on Country Club Drive.

One of the distinctive needs on the District is for a new congregation in the South Forty area, on Route 896 south of Route 40. The public utility people tell me the growth rate in that area is twenty percent per year.

STATISTICS AND GROWTH

Since church growth is essential to counter-balance years of decline, I take this opportunity to lift up the congregations which are growing. The eleven churches receiving the largest number of new members on Profession of Faith or Restored in 1984 are:

While seventeen churches on the district failed to receive a single member on Profession of Faith only four charges or pastors fell into that category. They will be expected to report to a joint meeting of the Division on Evangelism and the Cabinet in September.

The five churches with the largest net gain during 1984 are:

These percentage figures are most interesting inasmuch as an annual growth rate of five percent will enable a congregation to double its size in just fourteen years.

APPORTIONMENTS AND REACH

The Wilmington District has taken the lead in the payment of apportionments and the support of REACH.

In 1984 the apportionments were paid at the rate of 99.6 per cent which enabled the Wilmington District to lead all the other Districts in the Conference. Nearly all our churches are going the second mile by contributing above and beyond their apportionments to the REACH program. You are to be congratulated!

CONCLUSION

A word of thanks and praise —

This has been a difficult year for your District parsonage family. Sickness and death have taken their toll with two funerals in October of 1984. Only the love of God expressed through the District Clergy and laity sustained us through that difficult period. Kaylene joins me in this word of gratitude.

The praise is for you in all that you are doing in the name of Christ for the sake of the Kingdom. When the reports come in, I'm always proud to be your leader.

Finally, may I take this opportunity to express my gratitude to God for the opportunity to serve. It is truly a pleasure to be able to work with Bishop Joseph H. Yeakel and my colleagues on the Cabinet and staff.

THE REPORT OF THE STATISTICIAN

Peninsula Annual Conference

Period: January 1 to December 31, 1984

In 1982, total full membership in the Peninsula Conference increased by 43 after five consecutive years of decline in membership. Unfortunately, in 1983 a decrease of 116 members was recorded. During 1984 our membership experienced an even sharper decline of 370. The most significant reason for this decrease appears to be the removal of members by Charge Conference action or withdrawal. Often this practice is explained as an attempt to accurately reflect the total membership following an audit. Churches are to be reminded of the disciplinary process for removing members (Paragraph 230).

Wilmington District gained 60 members in 1984; Easton District recorded a loss of 75; Salisbury District showed a decline of 232; and Dover District decreased its membership by 123. Final District totals were as follows: Dover - 22,997; Easton - 21,880; Salisbury - 22,830; Wilmington - 30,748. There were 500 full service churches and 27 limited service churches on December 31, 1984.

On a positive note, a greater number of new members were received on confession of faith or restored than in the previous year. However, 41.6% of our churches (209) received no new members on confession of faith or restored. This compares unfavorably with 38.64% in 1983. The majority of these churches received no new members at all in 1984. In 62.5% of our local churches (314) no one was enrolled in confirmation classes. These statistics reflect significant gains in membership in a few local churches.

Average attendance in the principal weekly worship services increased by 4.4% in 1984 over that reported in 1983. As of December 31, 1984, 35.3% of total membership was attending worship, as compared with 33.7% in 1983.

Total church school membership essentially stabilized in 1984, at 34,479. There was a slight increase in church school attendance, from 17,816 in 1983 to 18,249 in 1984, an increase of 2.4%.

There are presently 163 full service ethnic minority churches in the Conference. These reported 14,089 members at the end of 1983, and declined to 13,836 members at the end of 1984.

I am especially grateful to pastors and churches who have submitted their statistical tables in a timely fashion.

CONFERENCE COUNCIL ON MINISTRIES

THE REPORT OF THE PRESIDENT

In the life of the Peninsula Annual Conference Council on Ministries, 1984 was a year of significant change. Since it was the last year of a quadrennium, following the meeting of the Annual Conference new officers were elected:

President, Edwin L. Ellis
Vice President, Clifford A. Armour
Secretary, Cora N. Selby

Vaughn Johnson joined the Annual Conference Council on Ministries Staff in Special Ministries and with responsibility for REACH.

In July at the Northeastern Jurisdictional Conference, Council Director Felton E. May was elected to the Episcopacy. He immediately assumed the office and David Riffe assumed a role as coordinator of activities for the Conference Council. In August, Bishop Wertz and the Executive Committee of the Annual Conference Council on Ministries, following election by the Council, announced the appointment of J. Gordon Stapleton as Council Director and Edwin L. Ellis was appointed as superintendent of the Dover District.

At the September retreat of the Council new officers were elected:

President, Clifford A. Armour
Vice President, Cora N. Selby
Secretary, John F. Mitchell

Later in the fall, David Riffe announced his resignation and was transferred to the Western North Carolina Annual Conference to return to campus ministry. Following advertising and interviewing, Harvey Manchester was elected by the Council at its November meeting and appointed by the Bishop as the Associate Council Director for Leadership Development.

Thanks needs to be expressed to those who have served and moved to new positions and excitement about and support for new staff needs to be shared as the 1985-88 quadrennium is underway.

The September Council Retreat was highlighted by the leadership of Royal Fishbeck from the Staff of the General Council on Ministries. Mr. Fishbeck introduced the Council to the 10 significant changes in legislation for the Conference Council on Ministries and also the following items passed by General Conference that will influence the life of the Church and the Peninsula Annual Conference: Missional Priority: Developing and Strengthening the Ethnic Minority Local Church For Witness and Mission, Television Ministry and Communications, The Future That Can Be, Increase of Membership, Stewardship in the United Methodist Church, Biblical and Theological Language, Ministry to Single Adults, Developing Congregations for Deaf Persons, and the Baltimore Declaration.

Continuing the educational experiences of Council Officers, Staff and Members, 19 persons attended the Northeastern Jurisdictional Training Event in December where all program agencies from the general church offered specific training for their counterparts on the Annual Conference level. Here special attention was given to the Missional Priority.

Other important events and actions of the Annual Conference Council on Ministries include, but are not limited to, the following:

- 1) Special Session of the Annual Conference on October 6 for approving the 1985 program budget and welcoming our Bishop, Joseph H. Yeakel and his mate, Lois.
- 2) Established a task force to study Wesley Foundation and other forms of campus ministry found in the Annual Conference and to determine if there is a need for campus ministry where United Methodists currently do not have any.
- 3) Asked the Structure Monitoring Committee to clarify the relationship and accountability of the Peninsula United Methodist Foundation to the Annual Conference.

- 4) Established a team to conduct the study on Drayton Retreat Center as mandated by the 1984 Annual Conference. (Report to be distributed under separate cover)
- 5) Adopted as the Priority for the Peninsula Annual Conference for the Quadrennium the Missional Priority: Developing and Strengthening the Ethnic Minority Local Church For Witness and Mission.
- 6) Established a committee on the Missional Priority. Ms. Darlene Webb, Chair.

The Council adopted the following recommendations:

- 1) The Congregational Development Committee of the Board of Global Ministries recommends that the Annual Conference Council on Ministries conduct a Conference-wide study to establish a plan for Congregational Development. To implement this study, the Peninsula Annual Conference should contract with the Congregational Development Program Management Unit of the General Board of Global Ministries.
- 2) As those called to be a sign of Christ's love and hope in a broken world and mindful of our special calling to help the helpless, we, The Peninsula Annual Conference Council on Ministries express our urgent concern regarding the famine in Ethiopia. We urge all the people called United Methodists in the Peninsula Annual Conference to immediately unite through their churches in gathering special offerings to help our brothers and sisters in Ethiopia who are dying from starvation. (In response the Council collected \$130.00 at the meeting and the Conference contributed \$115,000 by December 31, 1984)

In conclusion, I would like to express joy for the work of Doris Philips and Liz St. Clair, Educational Consultants, and Ward Greer, Hayward Greene, Harvey Chase, and Charlotte Nichols, EMLC Consultants; J. Gordon Stapleton, Council Director, and the Staff and members of the Council. It has been "good" to be a part of the Peninsula Annual Conference Council on Ministries.

THE REPORT OF THE COUNCIL DIRECTOR

The significant work of the Council Director in 1984 came from the head, heart, and hands of Felton E. May. The fruition of Treks I, II, and III and the resulting REACH program, the new sub-district configurations for training, and the development of the ethnic consultant program, among other things, are examples of his excellent leadership. That such leadership ability was recognized by his election to the Episcopacy as Bishop of the Harrisburg Area is now history.

In the few months of my tenure we have begun to develop working relationships with the new quadrennial boards and their new leaders. The transition to a new Council Chair in the person of Cliff Armour has been accomplished smoothly and his leadership expertise is clearly evident as he has taken charge. The year has been marked with a constant series of transitions. At mid-year Vaughn Johnson joined the staff as Associate Council Director for Special Ministries and REACH. David Riffe returned to the campus ministry in December and Harvey Manchester was selected as Associate Council Director for Leadership Development and Christian Education. We are now involved in building a new team. In this time period the support staff has moved with every change and helped to keep it all together. We are indebted to Shirley Still, Gloria Reed, and Dorothy Saxton. Fortunately, everyone did not change assignments. Jack Simperts at Peconeth, James Morgan at Drayton, and Bette McNear in Communications have adjusted to all the "new folk" while carrying on their own portfolios.

The General Conference has given us a new and revised missional priority: Strengthening the Ethnic Minority Local Church for Witness and Mission. As the full implications of this priority unfold we expect it to correlate with the Trek IV emphasis adopted at the 1984 session of the Annual Conference.

REACH continues its amazing progress of touching lives at home and around the world. Local churches are continuing to develop new programs in this area even as they complete the original goals set in past years. We are grateful to Robert O'Kelley Wallace and his committee who, along with Vaughn Johnson, continue to

monitor and interpret the goals of REACH. In January over 600 persons gathered in two locations to celebrate this successful project.

Three studies are being completed at this session of the Annual Conference as a result of conference, district, and general church actions. You will receive the work of the study committee on Drayton Manor, which has collected the data requested at the last session of Annual Conference. There will also be a report from the Legal Relationship Task Force mandated by the General Conference for Hospitals and Homes. A third report from the Commission on Religion and Race will share the findings of the Task Force on Cross-Racial Appointments.

The challenges are many and the time passes too quickly. These are exciting days to be a part of the church. We will do our best in the days ahead to be worthy of the task.

1986 Program Objectives

Responsibilities - The responsibilities of the Annual Conference Council on Ministries are:

- a) To describe, coordinate, and organize opportunities to respond to the missional priority, should any be adopted by the General Conference.
- b) To assist the Annual Conference and local churches in discovering their mission and to determine program emphases which will enable them to fulfill their mission.
- c) To receive program recommendations from the local churches, the district and Annual Conference agencies, and the Jurisdictional and General Council on Ministries; to evaluate these recommendations; and to formulate a coordinated conference program to be presented to the Annual Conference for consideration.
- d) To provide staff personnel and necessary resources for the implementation and administration of the program adopted by the Conference.
- e) To receive and coordinate the budget askings of all conference program agencies and to determine priorities to make budget recommendations to the Conference Council on Finance and Administration.
- f) To cooperate in ecumenical projects and events which have been approved by the Annual Conference.
- g) To interpret the programs of the general Church, the Jurisdictional or General Conference, and the Annual Conference to the local churches; and to promote all General and Annual Conference benevolences.
- h) To provide two-way channels of communication among Annual Conference agencies, district Councils on Ministries, and local churches.
- i) To provide for relationships with all news media within the Conference; to lead the Conference in making creative use of television and telecommunication ministries; to provide training in communication; and to perform public relations functions for the Conference.
- j) To give leadership in research and planning for the Annual Conference.
- k) To provide guidance and training for district and/or local church leaders.
- l) To provide linkage with general program agencies and provide names of Annual Conference agencies and persons who carry program responsibilities related to each general program agency.

CAMP PECONETH

It is a privilege to report on the work of the camping ministry of the Peninsula Conference for the year 1984. Highlights of our program included:

1. Program/Summer Attendance: Summer camp proved to be an exciting experience for 871 children and youth in 1984 as compared to 798 one year ago. Ninety percent of the summer camp staff came from local churches of the Peninsula Conference.

2. Offerings for World Hunger: Campers and staff once again combined efforts and gifts by giving \$851.00 for World Hunger as compared to \$619.00 one year ago.

3. Camp Usage: 4,862 campers logged 13,655 camper days as compared to 4,492 campers who logged 11,807 camper days in the year 1983. This showed a net increase of 1,848 camper days.

4. Bicentennial Emphasis: Summer campers were issued copies of the devotional booklet, "Proclaiming Grace and Freedom." These booklets were used for daily devotions and all-camp vesper services.

The bicentennial observance was highlighted by a five-day bike hike which included tours and services at historic Dudley's Chapel near Sudlersville, MD and Barratt's Chapel. Dr. Charles I. Carpenter and the Rev. K. Richard Varell conducted the service at Barratt's Chapel.

5. White Water Rafting: Along the Potomac at Harpers Ferry, W. VA, was high adventure for the first time in our program. Our campers used the facilities of Camp Manidokan of the Baltimore Conference, marking the first venture in cooperative camping between our two Conferences.

6. Horseback Riding: Was added to the Barn program and well received by Middlers and Seniors. Basic and advanced instruction were offered at the Bigelow Ranch near Chestertown, MD.

7. Sailing Program: Was given new life with the acquisition of 4 Puffer Sailboats made possible by the REACH Program. Each boat carries four or five campers plus staff which is ideal for sailing instruction.

8. E.M.I.C. Camperships: Increased from 7 to 17 this year to enable more ethnic children to attend camp.

9. Cabin Adoption Plan: Is completing its ninth year of success. We are indebted to the many lay persons across the Conference for donating their time and labor and supplies. Today 22 of the 28 buildings have been adopted for a two-year period.

10. Christian Education Sunday Offering: Continues to be a channel through which the people of the Peninsula Conference express their support of the camping ministry. Financial receipts totalled \$9,217, exceeding our goal of \$6,500.

11. New Administration Building: Is now under construction with projected completion for April, 1985.

12. Finances: Camp Peconeth ended the fiscal year with a balance of \$11,675 in the Operating Budget and with a balance of \$49,579 in the Specialty Budget for Capital Improvements.

13. REACH Program: Received \$26,044.32 for the projected Retreat Center and \$17,462.28 for Camp Improvements.

The Camp Director/Manager attended the American Camping Convention/Seminar in San Diego, CA and the ACA Societal Issues Seminar in Cape Cod, MA. He spoke to 27 churches with 2,029 persons in attendance. He was elected to the Board of Directors, Chesapeake Section, ACA and appointed chairperson of the Council on Religiously Affiliated Camps. He is presently seeking renewal of his status as Certified Camp Director with the ACA.

(Here follows a statement about Formation of Committee on Camping & Retreat Ministries and the Facilities Management Committee.)

Following the '84 Annual Conference the Camp Committee was reorganized. The responsibilities were divided between two new committees. One, the Committee on Camping and Retreat Ministries, of which Willard Robinson is chairperson, has responsibility in three areas:

Program: The sub-committee on Program has the task of working with the Camp Director/Manager in development of the Camping/Retreat program. This may involve upgrading present programs as well as development of new programs. Joseph Burris is chairperson of this sub-committee.

The full Committee has been developing ideas for Retreat Ministries and will make that one of the emphases for 1985-86.

Budget and Financial Development: This sub-committee develops the budgets for the Camp and gives guidance in the expenditures. The Financial Development phase of this sub-committee is to consider the generating of funding for special projects and development of the Camp. Howard Walseman chairs this sub-committee.

Camp Development: It is the responsibility of this sub-committee to assess the program needs in Camping and Retreating for our Conference and in consideration of the Consultant's Report recommend the next stage of development at the Camp.

The other new committee is the Peconeth Facilities Management Committee, with Jack Elliott as chairperson. The responsibility of this committee is to give direction to the general maintenance and improvement of the Camp properties and oversee and assist in development of new projects once they have been approved.

The responsibility of the Facilities Management Committee falls into three areas, namely Budget, Maintenance and Improvement, and Capital Improvement.

This new arrangement of dividing the tasks seems to be working well. Close coordination and communication must continue between these two groups in order to continue to serve our Conference Camping and Retreat needs and meet an expanding program demand.

1986 Program Objectives

1. To continue to implement the consultant's report.

Process: The Committee on Camping and Retreat Ministries will assume responsibility for implementation in cooperation with the Conference Council on Ministries and the Council on Finance and Administration.

2. To develop and encourage the use of the Peconeth "Speakers' Bureau" throughout the Annual Conference.

Process: Through The Communicator, District newsletters, the Ministers' Coordinated Mailings, and the District Ministers and Mates Associations promote the use of the "Speakers' Bureau."

3. To continue to recruit ethnic persons to serve on the summer staff so as to increase by fifty percent those serving in the previous year.

Process: Maintain contact with those who have served as well as the distribution of materials and the holding of interviews at black colleges.

4. To increase the Campership Fund for needy campers by fifty percent.

Process: Promote in the local church, through The Communicator, and the Ministers' Coordinated Mailing.

5. Develop at least one new camping program for the summer camping season.

Process: Discover campers' interests and needs through written evaluations on a weekly basis in addition to consultation with other church camps.

6. Continue to develop and strengthen adult programs.

Process: Discover needs of adults who already use the camp and continue to work through the Conference Coordinator of Adult Ministries.

COMMITTEE ON COMMUNICATIONS

The Committee on Communications, CDC, has tried to be a vehicle to relay the news of God's story in our Conference to the people of the Peninsula and beyond. I trust our attempts have been faithful, and in our steps toward the future we will strive to capture current methods of communication as our tool.

Before I progress any further, I want to say that our Editor of The Communicator, Bette McNear, is leaving us. On behalf of the CDC, I thank Bette for her years of faithful service to the paper and to the people she served. Her efforts toward The Communicator have been loyal; we say "thank you and blessings" to Bette.

I mentioned in 1983's report that the CDC had visions of broadcasting some of our story on television. That vision is bearing fruit as we gain more knowledge of television programming. The CDC has the expertise of United Methodists whose employment is related to television and combined with the graciousness of WBOC-TV 16 in Salisbury, Maryland, the Peninsula Conference will be on television in 1985. Of course, this is all due to the grace of God, and God's patience and prodding us.

In no way will our energy toward television, radio, and video take away our time from The Communicator. The CDC believes the paper is a major means of communication within our Annual Conference and we shall plan to maintain it as such.

In the area of video, our work is set out for us. In a survey of the usage from our Audio-Visual Library in the Conference Center it was discovered that seventy-five percent of the requests were for 16mm films and video cassettes. This is an astounding discovery, but one which tells us what people in our churches want to use as audio-visual resources. The CDC will try to keep pace with the requests and to furnish a variety of films and video cassettes.

1986 Program Objectives

1. **OBJECTIVE:** To lead the Annual Conference in making creative use of communications and opportunities offered by mass media, including newspapers, radio, and television.
GOALS: A. To provide training workshops for use of video equipment.
B. To encourage local churches to utilize newsletters and bulletin boards to communicate news in and around the church family.
2. **OBJECTIVE:** To utilize television programming as a valid means to communicate God's story.
GOALS: A. To produce and air 30-second to 2-minute television spots across our Annual Conference.
B. Where funds become available to increase the television spots and to broaden our coverage through radio and television.
3. **OBJECTIVE:** To encourage all United Methodists, especially our Boards and Agencies, to report news of the Conference to the editor of The Communicator.
GOAL: To broaden our coverage at the local church, District, and Annual Conference levels.
4. **OBJECTIVE:** To continue informing the secular press of United Methodist news by sending press releases.

GOAL: To broaden the coverage of United Methodism in our Annual Conference.

5. OBJECTIVE: To interpret the programs of the General Church and the Annual Conference to the local churches, and to promote benevolent causes.

GOAL: To keep Peninsula United Methodists informed of issues and programs affecting our church.

COUNCIL ON FAMILY MINISTRIES

In the fall of 1984 the Family Council reorganized itself and began to get started on its task of helping local churches minister to families in their congregations.

In May the General Conference had issued a clear call to United Methodists to:

"Act in their churches and communities to strengthen families as centers of CREATIVE POWER, REDEMPTIVE LOVE, SUSTAINING NATURE through ministries the church can provide."

There are four major types of family ministries.

1. Ministries Within Families and Between Family Members. These are the caring, nurturing, and supportive acts that family members provide to each other, so essential to maintaining healthy families, such as family worship, celebrations, marriage preparation and enrichment, parent education.
2. Ministries to Families in Need. All families need help from others at times of normal transitions of growth and change. Among these ministries are: worship, church school, home visitor services, preparation for transitions such as births, baptism, job changes, intergenerational activities.
3. Ministries From Families to Others. Through these ministries, families celebrate and share the benefits they have received — time, abilities, funds.
4. Ministries on Behalf of Families. Where families are directly affected by social, economic, and political forces, churches need to speak out and act on their behalf.

Out of all these possibilities the Family Council decided to concentrate on three specific areas: Family Enrichment, Marriage Enrichment, and Parenting.

To encourage churches to develop these ministries in their congregations the Family Council and E.M.L.C. worked together to plan and hold a Family Festival as a model for local churches. Thirty-seven persons from all age levels met on a December Saturday at Drayton Manor to participate in workshops on Marriage Enrichment, Parenting Skills, Single Parenting, Youth and the Family, Children and the Family. Since enrichment means enhancing and strengthening relationships, there was also time for families to interact together as they practiced and prepared for the closing worship of the day.

In November the Council purchased a new parenting resource to be placed in the Resource Center for local churches to use. Called Active Parenting, it contains video tapes of families dealing with common, everyday problems plus a handbook and a guide book for parents to help them explore new ways of being effective parents in the midst of family relationships. The first step in helping local churches use this resource was to send Liz St. Clair to a training seminar in Philadelphia to learn how to use it in the best way. In the coming spring of 1985, the six-weeks course will be given in a local church to try it out. Then, it will be introduced to local churches.

1986 Program Objectives

1. Family Enrichment Model

To present a model of a Family Enrichment Event as a guide for local churches as they plan intentional programs to strengthen the relationships within families.

2. Audio/Visual Resources for Marriage Enrichment

To provide resources for local churches to use in Marriage Enrichment.

COUNCIL ON MINISTRIES WITH CHILDREN

During 1984 the listing of weekday programs sponsored and/or supported by Peninsula Conference churches was completed. This listing will be used for information sharing and for establishing contacts among pre-school systems.

A Seminar on Children And/In Crisis was planned for presentation in March, 1985 and was to be jointly sponsored by the Children's Council and the Division of Human Relations of the Board of Church and Society. The event was designed to aid pastors, teachers, and workers with children as they ministered with children in the areas of child abuse and understanding death.

Active participation in the Focus '85, National Conference on Ministries With Children, to be held in Nashville, TN was encouraged. Leaders in the area of children's ministries at both the Conference and local levels were encouraged to attend and to share learnings with members of local groups. Ideas and concepts developed at this Conference will be reflected in the Conference programming for children's ministries in the coming year.

This year has been one of change and resulting growth as several members of the council felt called to other areas and new members and new emphases were called to involvement.

COUNCIL ON YOUTH MINISTRIES

The Council on Youth Ministries began the year without a Youth Coordinator but was ably operated under the leadership of David Riffe from the Conference staff working with Dover District Coordinator, William Downing; Easton District Coordinators, Jerry Devine and Pam Lardear; Salisbury District Coordinator, Pat Foard; and Wilmington District Coordinators, Linda and Tom Davis.

Training opportunities provided in 1984 included the four district sessions as part of the annual local church training experiences, a seminar for Adult Youth Leaders with Leo Rippey as the resource person, and a fall training event using the "Catching the Rainbow" series as the centerpiece around which the training was accomplished.

A U.N. Seminar was held at the United Nations in 1984 for the first time in many years. Its success warranted scheduling another similar event for 1985.

Charles Barton was appointed as the Youth Coordinator for the Conference Year and has been working with the C.O.Y.M. in planning and implementing plans for 1985, which include the U.N. trip, the Confirmation Rally, the Reach-a-thon events in local churches, and additional training events.

DRAYTON MANOR

In keeping with the Consultant's Report, adopted in principle by the Conference in 1982, the administration of Drayton was transferred from the Drayton Committee to the Executive Committee of the Conference Council on Ministries. The Chairperson of the Conference Council on Ministries, the Reverend Clifford Armour, is also the Chairperson of the Sub-committee for Drayton. There is also a Facilities Management Committee of which Mr. Edward Spear is the Chairperson. He is also a member of the Drayton Sub-committee of the Conference Council on Ministries Executive Committee. This is the interim move from the old Drayton Committee to a Board of Directors which would be nominated by the Annual Conference. This Board would create long-range financing and capital development strategies which would carry beyond the bounds of the Annual Conference and thus reduce Drayton's financial dependence on the Conference. That step is in the discussion stage.

PROGRAM: True to its commitment to the whole person, body, mind, and spirit, Drayton offered 17 events in continuing education and spiritual formation for both clergy and laity which drew a total of 248 participants. Seven of the events were for the laity and five of those were canceled for the lack of registration. One of the problems is getting the publicity on these programs into the local churches. The Communicator seems to be the major vehicle for that task. It only reaches eight officers in the local church, which means wide-spread information on the events is difficult. Only three of the seminars for clergy were not held and one of those was in preventive health. Some of the areas covered were: Stress in the Clergy Family, Contemporary Theology, Administration, Preaching, Spiritual Formation, and Old Testament Wisdom Literature. There were two programs for singles: a retreat and a fellowship day. The latter, held in August, drew over 140 persons from across the Conference, a sure sign that there is a deep need in that area. Another one is already scheduled for next June.

The Wellness Event, which was canceled, had a physical testing component to be provided by the Cardio-Kinetics Clinic in Newark, Delaware. The cost, which included a stress test, was probably a significant factor in its cancellation. The Wellness Events, "Care For the Care Giver," which were held, received enthusiastic support. A number of participants wrote letters reporting on the changes they had made in their lives.

The medical approach to health has historically been remedial. When the body breaks down, medicine has done what it can to assist in its repair. Sadly, this has also been the Church's approach to health as well. We pray for health when we get sick, trusting God for a miracle. That is a much more dramatic and exciting approach than cooperating with God's will now to stay well. This long-established thinking is difficult to reform.

Given the staggering increases in our Conference Medical Plan over the past three years, which impacts every local church, it would seem then an emphasis on Preventive Health would be essential. It is soundly established that illness and stress are directly related. Programs which renew, refresh, and offer to assist in lifestyle change would directly benefit the Conference in many ways. In this day of high-level stress, some community within the life of the Conference needs to be addressing the issues related to that stress and offering Christ-centered programs to help manage it. The Consultant, Arthur Harrison, pointed Drayton in that direction. The Drayton Committee gladly accepted the challenge.

PROPERTY: The painting of the exterior of the Manor was completed this year in addition to a number of interior rooms. Worn carpet in six rooms and the center hall was replaced and the furniture in the Library recovered. A new chemical has been added to the water system which will eventually clean the very rusty pipes and finally provide clean water. The supplier estimated it would take about one year. A contract has been let to resurface the interior of the water tower, which will also assist in clearing up the water. Several groups came to work on the grounds and do minor painting. We are grateful to them. The new hot water system and furnace improvements significantly reduced the fuel oil cost and improved the efficiency of the heating system. By the end of 1985 the property will be in excellent condition.

FINANCES: The Friends of Drayton are a vital source of encouragement and support. A number of new Friends gave substantial gifts this year. There were overall contributions of nearly \$5,000. Several dinners were held for the "Friends" to acquaint them in an in-depth way with the Consultant's Report and

Drayton's potential in a Preventive Health ministry. There were 33 non-church groups (a total of 1,164 persons) which utilized the facilities and provided over \$40,000 toward the budget. Some of those groups were: The Health Physics Society; NOW; two Training Workshops; Advanced Communication, Inc.; several Heritage Tours; Kinnaird Point Residents; plus other denominations, Baptists, Presbyterians, Unitarians, Lutherans, Episcopalians, and Women's Aglow. There were also some weddings and receptions.

The total number of people days, that is, persons using Drayton for at least two meals and overnight, was 5,521. This is roughly the same as 1983. The year was completed with \$9,691 in the Specialty Budget and \$23,205 in the Regular Budget. Some \$19,500 of that has already been earmarked for projects begun in 1984 and to be completed in the Spring of 1985.

Too much cannot be said for the dedicated part-time staff whose commitment to Drayton enables it to operate effectively. Two staff members each have over 14 years of employment and a number of others work long hours whenever there is a need.

Drayton's presence in the Conference is a clear reminder that spending time in retreat and renewal is a most important aspect of a Christian's pilgrimage. Is it "to dream the impossible dream" to dream that our Conference Retreat Center can become a place where healing and wholeness can happen on a broad scale for Methodists on the Peninsula? Is the vision too daring and the commitment too tentative? Those questions face the Annual Conference this June as the future of Drayton rests on the Conference's decision whether to sell or keep Drayton.

Objective: To work with Commission on Religion and Race examining the implementation of the Missional Priority throughout Peninsula Annual Conference.

REACH

REACH continues to strengthen the missional thrust of local churches within the Peninsula Conference. Evidence of this is clear as churches contributed over a total of \$150,000 to REACH Projects. As a result of this kind of support three students attending Wesley Theological Seminary are being supported: a) James Kambor, b) MacDilla Milton, and c) Robert Otchere. REACH participated in collecting monies for the transportation of the Kambor family to America from Liberia. Many projects in Liberia, Sierra Leone, and Haiti realized their funding. Some of these are: Ganta Hospital in Liberia, Secondary School Scholarships in Sierra Leone, an Agriculture project in Sierra Leone, Christian Institute in Haiti, and the Haitian Work Team. Annual Conference projects have been well supported with a total of \$45,000 going toward Camp Pecometh projects. Local church projects under Category III continue to be supported and some have been underwritten. They include the Goodwill Council, Churches and Families project, Emmanuel Dining Room, Brandywine Drug and Alcohol project.

Three new projects have been added to the REACH mission sheet. Two of them come under Category II: a) Special Ministries E.M.L.C. Mission Project. The purpose of this project is three-fold: Develop supplementary support for E.M.L.C. Church Community Developer program, supplement support for Scholarships of E.M.L.C. second-career persons going into the ministry, and supplement support for E.M.L.C. Resource Centers; b) Neighborhood House Thrift Shop mission project which is to purchase the building being presently rented.

Under Category III - Hispanic Outreach Worker program is a new project. The purpose is to develop an outreach program to minister to the social needs of the Hispanic community serviced by the Hispanic U.M. Church in Wilmington.

The REACH Committee decided that if REACH is going to be even more effective it must do the following:

- a) Personalize REACH Mission projects through intentional promotion.
- b) Develop a high-level of accountability of REACH Mission projects to supporting local churches. In order to meet this mandate, the REACH Committee divided into two sub-committees.

- 1) Promotion and Cultivation
- 2) Monitoring and Evaluation

We wish to thank the REACH Committee and the local churches of the Peninsula Conference for their intentional support of REACH through this part of the Conference year. We pray for their continued support of REACH as our program continues throughout this quadrennium.

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SPECIAL MINISTRIES

Special Ministries is a program constituency of the Peninsula Annual Conference Council on Ministries that particularly focuses on resourcing and developing programs for the Ethnic Minority Local Church. This is inclusive of the Afro-American Church, the Asian-Korean Church, and the Hispanic Church. It serves as a support mechanism for ethnic minority local church concerns. Other related matters include relating to other boards and agencies of the local church, such as Board of Higher Education and Campus Ministry, Board of Discipleship, Board of Church and Society, Commission on Religion and Race, Missional Priority Committee, and Board of Global Ministries, as a program advocate in meeting the program needs of ethnic minority local churches.

Special Ministries seeks not only to be a program advocate but also a developer of programs for ethnic minority local churches. It seeks to do this on three levels: Local Church, District, and Annual Conference. It begins the process by assessing the needs and resources and developing the strategies and action steps for meeting those needs.

Special Ministries Staff

The Special Ministries' staff is inclusive of a Special Ministries Director, the Reverend Vaughn A. Johnson, who has direct responsibility for administering this particular program component. The Special Ministries Director is staff to most boards and agencies listed above and also the REACH Director. He seeks to administer the program of Special Ministries by developing program models that he may personally implement on any of the designated levels (local church, district, and Annual Conference) and also by deploying Special Ministries' consultants. There are four Special Ministries consultants (one assigned for each district). They include the Reverend W. Bayard Greene, Dover; the Reverend Harvey Chase, Easton; the Reverend Charlotte Nichols, Salisbury; and the Reverend H. Ward Greer, Wilmington. These consultants are deployed on each district as priority of need is established by the District Superintendent and the Special Ministries Director.

The goals of Special Ministries for the 1985 Conference year have been:

1. Be a support system to the local church and Conference boards and agencies.
2. Be a program advocate in relating and developing program models of "relevancy" of the Annual Conference to the local church.

3. Enlist and train a cadre of ethnic clergy and lay personnel to serve the local church in areas of mission and ministry.

4. Continue to utilize the Special Ministries consultants in equipping local churches for mission and ministry in relationship to the General Conference E.M.L.C. missional priority.

5. Develop resource centers on all districts.

6. Visit every ethnic charge and do a needs assessment.

7. Have at least one Conference ethnic minority event per year.

8. To include all ethnic minority groups of our Conference in the overall program.

Special Ministries has realized most of its goals for this previous Conference year. The resource centers are in process at the designated areas of Wesley Temple in Salisbury, District Office in Easton, along with Scott U.M.C. in Trappe, Mt. Calvary in Bridgeville, and Ezion-Mt. Carmel in Wilmington.

With most of these goals in process Special Ministries will continue to implement them.

With this in mind the future is optimistic as we strengthen E.M.L.C. for witness and mission.

BOARD OF CHURCH AND SOCIETY

This first year of the new quadrennium found the Board of Church and Society involved in several controversial and challenging issues. Reaction to the Board's study document "Holy Obedience," presented at the 1984 Annual Conference, has been strong and welcome. Our objective of encouraging debate on the matter of civil disobedience was achieved.

In the Fall the Board voted to investigate the relationship between Wesley College and the United States Army which uses the Wesley campus as a site for summer reserve officers' training. That relationship was called into question by the 1984 General Conference's clear stance for peace. A task force was appointed to look into the matter and recommend appropriate action.

Another task force was appointed to recommend action in opposition to the present U.S. administration's foreign policy toward Nicaragua. In the Fall there was a genuine fear that the U.S. was planning an invasion of that nation.

The task force met in Washington, D.C. with a delegation from the Baltimore Conference for a briefing with a representative of the Washington Office on Latin America. While a military invasion of Nicaragua was ruled out, the task force was told that the Reagan Administration intends to squeeze the Sandanista government in a vice of economic reprisals in the hope that the Nicaraguan people will overthrow the revolutionary government. Our delegation agreed to seek to counter the administration's misinformation with facts about the situation there.

While the Division of World Peace, chaired by Charles Walter, was most active in the above areas, the Division on Human Relations, chaired by Richard Green, co-sponsored a workshop called "Children In Crisis" with the Children's Council. Held in Dover in March, the workshop was well attended. The Division of General Welfare, chaired by William Jones, met with Beverly Jackson of the General Board of

Church and Society as the first phase of planning a proposed workshop on alcoholism and other substance abuse.

With the help of a committed group of new members and the continuing support of Howell Wilkins and Jack Simpers, the Board enjoyed an exciting year of preparation in 1984. The new year promises challenges which will test the discipleship of the Board and the Conference. Our prayer is that in Jesus Christ we may be faithful and obedient witnesses.

Division of Education

The Division has begun to plan Cluster meetings to be carried out during 1985. We will be meeting with those persons responsible for education in their local churches to discover how we might help each other do the jobs that need to be done and to expand our efforts to train leaders throughout the Conference in Christian Education.

A very special "thank you" to all of you who have given so generously of your time and talents to this vital ministry of our Conference.

11. Church School Development

To reach four churches per district particularly those without church schools to let them become aware of the services offered by the Division of Education.

12. Education Consultants

To expand the effectiveness of the consultants' ministry by increasing the number of educational consultants by two (2).

Division of Evangelism

The Great Awakening is history. I'm looking forward to the "Greatest Awakening" in these next weeks and years ahead of us in the Peninsula Conference and all across the church. This will be a resource for each church for "Showing and Telling the Good News" of God's presence in our lives.

We also will be sponsoring a workshop with the acclaimed hymnwriter Brian Wren from England. It is entitled "Real Worship in the Real World" and will be held at St. Mark's U.M. Church in Easton on Saturday, October 26. Put this date on your calendar and come and be challenged by this man that Eric Routley said "was the leading hymn text writer since Charles Wesley."

Our goals for 1986 are to continue to provide leadership in Worship, and we also plan to work with the Division of Evangelism in the area of Evangelism and Discipleship for the quadrennium. BOARD OF GLOBAL MINISTRIES

The Board of Global Ministries is the missional unit of the Annual Conference with responsibilities for organizing and deploying human and financial resources for proclaiming the gospel of Jesus Christ in word and deed.

In 1984, as in the two previous quadrennia, special emphasis has been given to strengthening the Ethnic Minority churches both in receiving missional support and in raising mission consciousness.

The Board is comprised of three operational components: the Education and Cultivation Committee with promotional responsibilities for the total Board; the Division of Missions, which includes relating to the Methodist Action Program and Neighborhood House; and the Division of Health and Welfare, which includes relating to Peninsula U.N. Homes and the Board of Child Care. Reports from these groups follow in detail.

At the 1984 session of Annual Conference a Secretary of Global Ministries was elected — the Reverend Garry Parker, who assumes a liaison position between the Annual Conference and the Board of Global Ministries. We express our sincere appreciation to him for accepting this important position and its accompanying responsibilities.

At its fall meeting the Board decided to examine the possibility of reorganizing itself to become more aligned with General Church directives and to become more effective in meeting the missional needs of our Conference. Further study will determine whether or not changes will be made.

Deep appreciation is expressed to all Board members, especially to the Executive Committee, for their loyal devotion to their duties as "laborers in the vineyard."

Hunger Task Force

Working with the Committee on Education and Cultivation the Hunger Task Force focused on sensitizing our churches regarding hunger through educational events and financial appeals. Hunger Crisis Appeal: A special appeal based on a call to each church member to give \$2 for hunger during January and February brought in over \$2,000. While this was a small response, it marked the beginning of a year in which giving was up significantly. The gifts to the Hunger Crisis Appeal were divided between REACH and UNCOR. Hunger Interpreters have responded to requests from our churches for programs during Sunday worship services, Sunday evening meetings, UMW gatherings, Youth Retreats, Church school classes, and district events. In October Hunger Workshops led by Dr. Robert Smith from UNCOR were held in Cambridge for the Salisbury and Easton Districts and in Smyrna for the Dover and Wilmington Districts. A total of ninety leaders and participants took part in these events, which were designed to sensitize and educate our people regarding hunger causes and solutions. An offering of \$158 was given to UNCOR and Emmanuel Dining Room, a REACH project. Several of our local churches participated in local CROP walks. Overall giving was up dramatically from 1983. The December Ethiopia Appeal alone resulted in \$72,415 in offerings from our Peninsula Conference Churches. Total UNCOR giving for all concerns was \$115,584 for 1984, up 467% over 1983!

The Hunger Task Force thanks all who gave so generously this past year. Hunger remains an ongoing problem which must be addressed through emergency relief and long-term development. Let us as a Church continue to respond as sensitively and generously as we have begun.

To provide for administrative costs of committee, mailings, etc.

To keep hunger concerns before the churches through education, interpretation, and appeals for funds; quarterly mailing to local churches.

5. Itineration of Persons in Mission

To provide mission interpreters for our local churches to interpret our worldwide work.

6. Train District Secretaries and Fund Activities

To train District Secretaries to be effective interpreters and fund administrative costs they may have.

7. Clergy Training and Resources for Global Ministries

To assist clergypersons in understanding and interpreting our Global Ministries through providing literature and personal contacts that help them in their growth.

8. EMLC Education and Cultivation for Global Ministries

To assist the Conference Committee on EMLC in understanding and participating in our Global Ministries.

9. District Mission Fairs

To interpret Global Ministries to our local churches and to recruit missional personnel. These events would be designed for children, youth, and adults.

10. Training Labs for Local Church Missions Events

To work with at least one local church in each district in developing an ongoing missions program to be used as a model for other churches.

11. Encourage local churches to support REACH, Advance Specials, African Church Development, and other Second-Mile Giving.

12. Encourage local churches to participate in the Short-Term Volunteers in Mission Program by forming Assistance Teams.

Division of Health and Welfare

As a new quadrennium began, new officers and new expectations for the Division of Health and Welfare meant taking time to get to know about our responsibilities. The 1984 Discipline quickly got us acquainted through the following mandate: "...health and welfare institutions and programs related to the Annual Conference..." and the Conference must "develop a mutual agreement...concerning their relationships. The term 'related to' shall mean any relationship defined by the Annual Conference. The Annual Conference and each health and welfare institution shall have a clearly stated document which describes their legal and financial relationships; provided that no such document shall impose as a party to it The United Methodist Church and/or the General Board of Global Ministries." (Paragraph 730.4 (23))

The study and clarification of our relationship with Peninsula United Methodist Homes, Inc. and the development of a "Covenant of Affiliation," has been an important and timely task. Orientation for this important task and to other new responsibilities came from a meeting with other conferences at the Department of Health and Welfare Ministries of the General Board of Global Ministries in New York.

The tabulation of a survey taken last year of the health and welfare activities of our local churches produced the following witness of ministry in action from the 105 churches responding: Food Pantries, 69; Clothes Closets, 38; Day Care, 19; Pastor's Emergency Fund, 61; Food Baskets for Needy, 94; Ministries to Persons with Handicapping Conditions, 27; Blood Pressure Check, 21; Transportation Networks, 18; Programs with Battered Spouses and Children, 2; Meals on Wheels, 11; Alcoholics Anonymous, 17; Over-Eaters Anonymous, 6; Nursing Home Ministry, 71; Migrant Worker Ministries, 5; Prison Ministries, 19; Ministries for the Mentally Retarded, 19; Exercise Programs, 14; Low-Income Housing, 6; Loan of Hospital Equipment, 10; Ministries to Unemployed, 6; Single Parent Family Ministries, 9; Ministries to Shut-ins, 71.

Other ministries frequently listed were prayer chains, contributions to local charities, and support of Senior Citizen and other community groups. Hospice programs, Assisting Immigrants, C.P.R. Training, and Caring System ministries were also listed as programs of Health and Welfare. The Division of Health and Welfare wishes to commend the churches of our Conference dedicated to these forms of caring and direct service ministries.

Support for the formation of Auxiliary units of the Board of Child Care and a better understanding of this mission was promoted through plans for bus trips in the Spring of 1985 to visit the Board of Child Care facilities.

Continued membership was maintained in the United Methodist Association of Health and Welfare Ministries and ideas and resources for strengthening our ministry were examined as a result of the annual Association meeting in Boston.

Working cooperatively with FUMH in the development consultant's position to assist local churches in their ministry with the aging is a new program. We hope this will extend the health and welfare ministries to new dimensions of caring in local churches. An added hope for this program is for it to particularly reach out and share in the strengthening of the mission to the aging in our ethnic churches.

It has been an exciting year to begin service as the Chairperson of the Division of Health and Welfare and I look forward to assisting local churches wherever needed in developing and strengthening their ministries in this vital area.

1986 Program Objectives

1. Support the United Methodist Association of Health and Welfare Ministries by membership and participation.
2. Support local churches with training of officers, publicity, and consultative resources.
3. Develop and support units of the Board of Child Care Auxiliary and the Christmas "Red Stocking" offering in the Peninsula Annual Conference.
4. Develop, in cooperation with FUMH, fall seminar(s) to assist persons in making retirement plans.
5. Support, in cooperation with FUMH and the national Department of Health and Welfare Ministries, the work of a ministry to the aging consultant.
6. Support the request of FUMH for benevolence assistance for the elderly requiring financial assistance and the Mother's Day offering.

Board of Child Care

A small group of staff at Board of Child Care was asked, "what happened" in 84-85 that could be included in our annual report. As minds began to unwind there developed a potpourri of ideas, most of which would have been dismissed by this writer as mundane or too routine to be mentioned in an annual report. What do staff say highlight 84-85?

We had our second annual sports banquet in '85; our first in '84. Speakers for these events were Floyd Rayford ('85) and Elrod Hendricks ('84), members of the Baltimore Oriole team. Four young people, Ben, Kathy, Tony, and Bill have been inducted into the Board of Child Care Hall of Fame for their exemplary leadership qualities and outstanding athletic ability. Each of these people has participated in six team sports while at Board of Child Care. Thirty-five awards were given to other of our young people for their participation in the athletic events at our Child Care Center.

Roger Burkhead, one of our child care supervisors, has conducted a highly-structured, well-developed training program for child care workers. Roger is a certified instructor in his field, having passed the necessary qualifications at University of North Carolina in Chapel Hill. These training classes are now being offered to child care workers, not only from Board of Child Care, but also from neighboring child care institutions.

Last summer we went to camp with most of our young people. These trips took us to Allegany State Park in New York, Henlopen State Park in Lewes-Rehoboth Beach, Delaware, and to Shad Landing near Ocean City. The trips provide meaningful experiences for boys and girls in a relaxed atmosphere, with staff. Each year, we reaffirm the value of the experiences. In August of '85 we plan to camp with our young people at Henlopen Park in Delaware.

Our full-time on-grounds teacher continues to create dramatic results in helping young people achieve in the public school and in working with that small group who day by day are on our grounds during school hours. We appreciate the efforts of our volunteer tutors who come to our grounds one evening a week and thus provide a very valuable tutorial service to young people who are underachievers in school. Twice during the year we had our Academic Recognition Dinners. During these events those persons who had improved in their academic achievement or who, for some other reason, earned recognition were given certificates and held a seat of honor.

Aside from the summer camping trips already mentioned, summertime activities were manifold. We held a number of high-interest, two-week courses of instruction with children. These included such topics as historical ghosts, bicycle repair, hiking, camping, food preparation, physical fitness, photography. Twenty children passed beginning swimming instruction.

During energy conservation week, a time in mid-winter when the school is closed, we had a cookout, smorgasbord, basketball tournament, and a visit to the Smithsonian in Washington, D.C. Also, during this week, we introduced a new subject, art expression, and noticed some of our boys and girls copying a portrait of, of all people, Tom Kelso.

We urge you to keep sending the Campbell soup labels. Already our academic resource center has two personal computers with varied programs for academic achievement.

We boast of five high school graduates in '84 and are particularly thrilled that one of these has a full-time, athletic scholarship at Howard University.

In various ways, our staff, youth, and buildings were put to use during General Conference. Two of our young people served as host and hostess during the Bishop's Reception. We entertained, on sleeping bags in our gymnasium, a busload of young people from the Duluth, Minnesota area. They were a picnic unto themselves, but brought us joy and we welcomed the opportunity to serve.

Christmas was rich with activities. Our foster children participated with others in a celebration of Christmas. We enjoyed the gifts which were provided and once again the Christmas dance, sponsored by the Auxiliary with Disc Jockey, was a favorite event. The staff were particularly pleased this year with recognition given them at a luncheon held nearby at Martin's West.

We welcomed the opportunity to trade-in two of our motor vehicles. One of the new Chevy Suburbans was a gift from one of our dear friends. The other came from the Auxiliary and was paid for largely with monies collected from the redemption of Merchants Trading Stamps.

So, that is what staff felt important to share with you, of '84-'85. We add that 100 youth, in twelve months, were served in our two emergency shelter units. We continue to be appalled day after day by the abuse which children of our society receive. Those adolescent women coming into emergency shelter, almost without exception, have suffered sexual abuse and often physical abuse as well. Their lives no doubt are damaged permanently by experiences forced upon them in childhood years and we see it as our opportunity not only to alleviate immediate suffering but hopefully to provide an influence which to some extent will be rehabilitative.

We are appreciative to members of Simpson-Hamline Church in the District of Columbia for the opportunity to maintain a small office in their building. From this office, we have serviced a group of foster homes, in which a number of children, mostly from the District, are nurtured. Swartzell Trustees continue to provide financial support for this foster care program. That part of our work is less visible than is the child care center to which many people come and observe; it is no less meaningful, however, to the children who live in those homes under the guidance of "our" foster parents and our staff.

Whenever possible, we place infants or older children for adoption. Always,

our staff is available to counsel with an unwed mother to be, to provide guidance and help in planning with her for the child. More and more, ministers are calling for these services and we emphasize availability for such counselling, and for the placement of the child for adoption if that be the parental choice.

Our great concern is the numbers of children whom we turn away from Emergency Shelter and the Child Care Center simply because there is no room.

Our great love is for you, the Church, to whom we express appreciation for the admirable way in which you support this work. It is because of your love, your influence, your prayers, and your gifts that Board of Child Care remains effective to children.

You have volunteered to serve in many ways:

- tutored children
- baked cookies
- became a foster parent or a visiting parent
- joined The Auxiliary
- helped raise funds

Peninsula United Methodist Homes, Inc.

General Information

According to a recent census there are 893 individuals residing at the Methodist Country House, Methodist Manor House, and Cokesbury Village. Among these residents are 418 (i.e., 47%) who are United Methodist church members. Of special note is the fact that there are eight retired United Methodist pastors, three pastors' wives, 13 pastors' widows, and seven members of pastors' families residing in these three facilities. The average age of male residents at the Country and Manor Houses is 85.5 and 85.4 respectively. Female residents at the Country House average 84.7 years of age while those at the Manor House have an average age of 85.1. Male and female average ages at Cokesbury Village are 79.9 and 79.3 respectively.

Benevolence Assistance

The commitment initiated a quarter of a century ago to provide life care for every resident (regardless of ability to continue paying the full cost of care) has never been stronger. Of the 512 men and women residing at the Methodist Country House and the Methodist Manor House today, 115 are currently paying monthly fees which do not cover the full cost of their care.

Of this number, 90 are very elderly persons who entered our homes in the early 60's when contracts were offered which limited the extent to which fees could be increased. During 1985, the fees these residents pay will fall short of covering the actual cost of their care by \$430,000. While such cost of care short-fall has been significantly reduced in recent years due to the death of some limited fee contract residents, nevertheless it is still with us.

The remaining 25 individuals are residents at the Methodist Country House and Methodist Manor House whose incomes and total financial resources are so limited that financial assistance is needed to enable them to continue living with us. Individual subsidies range from approximately 1/3 to more than 2/3 of the actual cost of care. In 1985 the amount of aid needed for these 25 neediest residents will total \$134,000. (In 1984, there were 20 such residents in these two homes who received a total of \$119,000 in financial assistance.)

Highlights of 1984 Major Activities

In addition to providing the essential benevolent care just noted, 1984 was marked by significant advances in several other areas.

Increased emphasis was placed on developing creative activities programs which motivate and challenge residents to use their physical and mental abilities to the maximum degree possible. An example of this was the initiation of a remotivation therapy program at the Methodist Country House and its designation as a national training center for such activity. In addition, professionally trained activities staff members are now employed at each of our homes. As a further aid to the expansion of activities programs, efforts are underway to increase the volunteer program at each home. Such strengthening of the total activities programs reflects the ongoing implementation of a corporate philosophy that seeks continued and consistent growth in all three facilities of this important means of enhancing the quality of life for all residents.

From a management standpoint there were also several advancements made. Steps were taken to move closer to implementing a computerized preventive maintenance system. The general administrative operations of each home are now supplemented with computers for greater efficiency and detailed record-keeping. The corporation's first published annual report was distributed in 1984 to close to 4,000 persons: pastors, health and welfare representatives, residents, employees, donors, people on the waiting list, and family members of residents.

Major Activities Planned for 1985

A primary focus of activity will be the silver anniversary celebration of FUMH's service. Among other festivities marking the 25 years of service since the 9/7/60 opening of the Country House will be the documentation and publication of a history of the 25 years of service provided by FUMH.

Of prominence in 1985 will be the joint task force effort of FUMH trustees and Annual Conference officials to define the nature and scope of the relationship between the two organizations. This definition process will be carried out according to the following mandate as noted in The Book of Discipline, 1984, paragraph 730.4 (23): "The Annual Conference and each health and welfare institution shall have a clearly stated document which describes their legal and financial relationships;..."

The Board rotation system, adopted in 1977, will take effect in 1985 and involve, as a consequence, some major changes in Board membership. If funding requests submitted to the Annual Conference, Board of Global Ministries, covering approximately one-third of the cost, are approved, a FUMH consultant will be employed and made available in the last half of 1985 and all of 1986 as a resource to local churches to assist in the development of new or expanded ministries with, to, and by elderly persons in their congregations and communities.

The much-needed expansion of the Oakesbury Village Health Center will be undertaken, enlarging the capacity from 55 to 110 spaces, including 30 personal care units and 80 spaces for skilled nursing care.

An effort is planned to increase the participation of Peninsula Conference churches in our Mother's Day appeal for benevolent care for the neediest residents. The following are participation and giving figures (as reported in the Conference journals) for the past four years. We will be attempting to improve upon these figures:

1981 - 250 churches out of 505 gave	\$15,163
1982 - 258 churches out of 505 gave	\$16,324
1983 - 233 churches out of 505 gave	\$15,216
1984 - 263 churches out of 505 gave	\$17,987

Peninsula United Methodist Homes, Inc. is very appreciative of the 25 years of support given it by the Conference as a whole and its individual churches in particular. The continuation and growth of such support is essential if this ministry is to respond to the needs of our ever-increasing elderly population.

Division of Missions

The Division of Missions represents an extension of the Peninsula Conference whose purpose is to reach into the local community to develop and support the Conference Mission goals. Evangelism, support for new churches, and development of congregations is critical to establishing and maintaining our denomination's

position within the community of the Peninsula Conference in order to continue to do God's work. Our overall objective is to use the funds allocated to the Division of Missions in a responsible and orderly fashion to promote the planned and coordinated growth of parishes within the Conference.

We attempt to encompass the missional priority of promoting and supporting the ethnic minority local church in the next quadrennium through use of our funds in the parsonage improvement, congregational development, West Sussex Parish, and Urban Ministries areas as well as other specific areas of the Methodist Action Program and the Neighborhood House, Inc. At the same time, our Division recognizes the need for balance in allocating funds to all churches within the Conference and we are attempting to establish parameters which will apply to all those who request grants or loans through the Division of Missions.

We look forward to being involved in the long-range development of congregations within the Conference through the proposed district study teams and view this as an opportunity to make our organization more effective and responsive to the needs of the parishioners within the Peninsula Conference. Along with our desire to use our funds more effectively, we will also be stressing greater financial responsibility from those requesting grants and/or loans from the Division of Missions. This will include closer contact with those requesting funds and the monitoring of activity and results so that the overall development of congregations becomes as cost effective as possible.

1986 Program Objectives

1. Administration

Administer the office, mailing and program costs for the Division.

2. Town and Country Committee

To aid development of cooperative parishes and rural ministry. Also to develop a finer understanding of the talents and needs of those parishes so that they may join together in cooperative efforts to utilize their facilities to the best possible completion of their objectives.

3. Congregational Development

To provide grants and loans for building projects. This committee of the Division of Missions is one of the most active committees inasmuch as it receives requests for much more in funding than is available through the allocation in the Conference budget. The Congregational Development Committee reviews all applications in detail to determine the basis for their needs and then brings their request to the Division of Missions and then to the Board of Global Ministries for approval.

4. Wilmington Mt. Joy

Pay mortgage payments on behalf of Mt. Joy Church; the agreement between the general church and the Peninsula Conference started in 1973 and is due to expire in 1992.

5. West Sussex Parish

Program money for the function of this cluster of churches and their program director. Specific purchases and expenditures are approved through the Division Chairperson.

6. Leisure Ministries

Funds to help support summer cooperative ministries, and to explore and fulfill funding needs for various types of summer ministries in the resort areas of the Conference.

7. Rural Ministries

To provide ministry in rural areas especially with extremely poor minority persons and to support the ethnic minority local church in the particular area.

8. Urban Ministries - Wilmington Area

To provide program, administrative and training funding for Urban Work Committee.

9. Parsonage Aid

Minor maintenance to parsonages usually divided equally among the four districts. This is used as an emergency fund to be disbursed at the discretion of the District Superintendents at their request. It helps to keep parsonages in habitable condition for those charges that need financial assistance.

10. Parsonage Improvement

The objective of this line item is to facilitate the repair and replacement of parsonages within the Conference which are on the verge of being uninhabitable. Parsonage improvement utilizes grants and loans to help complete its objective of assisting these charges with parsonages in poor conditions.

Committee on Congregational Development

This year past has been a time of change for Congregational Development Committee. Mandates from General Conference have called for new names and designations for this Committee. And an attempt at honest self-evaluation has caused us to see the need for some changes in policy and procedure. These changes are still being studied and implemented.

General Conference mandate has restructured Congregational Development as a committee of the Division on Parish and Community Development. We have further restructured Congregational Development into two sub-committees: 1) Sub-committee on Maintenance will be responsible for working with existing congregations as they seek to improve and maintain their church facilities, and 2) Sub-committee on Congregational Development will be responsible for working with new congregations.

The Congregational Development Committee has continued its work as these changes have taken place. A total of \$48,985 has been issued as grants or loans to improve church facilities. And a total of \$44,294 has been issued or promised in grants or loans for the improvement or replacement of Ethnic Minority Parsonages.

In 1986 we will conclude a Conference-wide study that will be in process during 1985. The purpose of the study is to give information that will aid in the establishment of criteria and set priorities for the development of new congregations and parishes. Results of this study may also be used to help determine for our Conference areas of needed investment of time and finances for the re-development of ministry and mission as well as possibilities for new outreach ministries through existing congregations.

Rather than just giving helpful information it is anticipated the results of this Conference-wide study will give direction for the actual development of ministry. That is, we will be doing the work of church growth and congregational development. To help finance this task we will be working toward the organization of District "Church Planters" clubs, one on each of our four districts.

We will continue the work of Congregational Development and Ethnic Minority Parsonage Improvement as carried out in previous years through grants and/or loans of money for improvement of churches and parsonages. But we will broaden our involvement with local churches and charges by attempting to assist them in an advisory capacity to be as self-sufficient as possible in the area of property improvement. This will be done with guidance in stewardship, financial planning, and helping to locate or develop sources of financial assistance for the local church other than Congregational Development funds.

We will improve the procedure for requesting and granting financial assistance to churches and charges in two ways: 1) On each district two people will be recruited and trained as an investigating team. The District Investigating Team will evaluate through interviews and on-site observation the advisability of funding for a project through Congregational Development Committee, and 2) We will establish priorities and develop criteria to be used as guidelines for the approval of grant and/or loan requests made through Congregational Development Committee.

This brief statement is a description of eight goals set by the Congregational Development Committee for 1986.

Terms and conditions for loans through Peninsula Conference Board of Global Ministries are printed here for your information:

1. The official name of the mortgagee is The Board of Global Ministries of the Peninsula Conference of the United Methodist Church, Inc., a Delaware Corporation.

2. An attorney must be secured by the mortgagor in order to have the necessary papers prepared. After review by the attorney for the Board of Global Ministries, the papers must be recorded in the county of the mortgagor.

3. The note or bond that accompanies the mortgage shall contain terms consistent with the mortgage.

4. No principal payment is due until the first mortgage is paid in full or until the original maturity date of the first mortgage, whichever occurs first. This original date should be included in the papers.

5. The second mortgage is to be amortized over:

- 5 years for loans of \$10,000 or less
- 10 years for loans of \$10,001 to \$15,000
- 15 years for loans of \$15,001 to \$20,000

6. The amortization period may be adjusted depending upon warranted circumstances approved by the Division of Missions. Equal payments, normally monthly, are to be made at an interest rate of 2% less than the then prevailing interest rate on mortgages in the local area of the mortgagor.

7. No interest shall accrue until the first payment is due on the second mortgage as defined in item 4 above.

8. Other terms and conditions may be required depending upon warranted circumstances approved by the Division of Missions.

9. The Chairperson of the Division of Missions is empowered to negotiate minor alterations to these terms and conditions.

Urban Work Committee

The Urban Work Committee is pleased to report that we continue to be involved in developing an "Urban" Strategy for Salisbury, Maryland. This is the first time that major efforts have been established outside the Wilmington District. The process is as follows:

URBAN STRATEGY DEVELOPMENT IN SALISBURY (in process)

I. The Product to be Produced:

- *Over-all identification of the key areas of need for mission and ministry within the city of Salisbury;
- *Identification of the major resources the denomination can bring to bear upon those needs, with priorities for efforts to mobilize the resources;
- *Clear identification by each church in the city of its specific responsibilities in mission and ministry;

*At least initial strategy adopted by each church to meet its specific responsibilities;

*An articulated strategy for the denomination's work in the city, linking the plans of the congregations and the plans of the denomination.

II. The Process to be Used:

A. Review of process with leaders, coaching on their needed roles to complete the various tasks involved, identification of needed amendments to make the process fit the specific circumstances of the city involved.

B. Development of a Preliminary Strategy Overview:

1. Hearings with key groups that would have information and/or concerns to inform strategy development (a series of group meetings of about two hours in length to which participants are specifically invited):
 - a. pastors and other staff of churches
 - b. key lay leadership
 - c. ecumenical contacts
 - d. city/community leaders
2. Additional data-gathering, e.g., community agencies, government offices with planning functions, business and academic data-gathering and planning offices.
3. Preparation of preliminary report on strategic indications from the hearings and other data-gathering.
4. Review Session(s). Report distributed to people who were invited to the Hearings, with invitation to a review session (two may be held if a commonly convenient time is not possible). At the session, the consultant will gather reactions to the preliminary report and any additional information and/or strategic potentials surfaced in the Review Discussion.

C. Local Church Self-Studies/Strategy Development

1. Presentation to pastors and lay leaders from the churches on the self-study/strategy development process, and training of them to conduct the process in their churches (including use of any earlier data-gathering or strategy development work done in their church).
2. Data-gathering by churches.
3. Review of all materials gathered by church, identifying strategic implications and potentials within the information gathered.
4. Administrative Board and/or other key leadership group meets to consider the implications of the self-study and its interpretation for the future direction of the church.

D. General Direction-Setting for Denomination Strategy in the City and Its Environs:

1. Each church submits its preliminary strategic plan, based on the information it has gathered.
2. Use these results of the local church work and any other additional relevant information that has surfaced since the preliminary report was prepared to re-write the report as a report suggesting action for strategy by the denomination and its various churches.

3. Joint review session by the leadership of all the churches involved, perhaps augmented by others who had participated in the original hearings. Local church reports will be distributed in advance to prepare for the meeting. The session should be planned for a full day to permit time for churches to identify ways in which their plans may need to be modified in light of the plans of other churches, to identify the action and strategy directions made manifest by the various studies, to identify ways to facilitate cooperation and coordination for mission and ministry among the churches, and to set priorities for concentration by the District and Conference in their strategy, program, and personnel planning.

Neighborhood House, Inc.

A review of 1984 through the records of Neighborhood House demonstrates time and again how Good Neighbors, in Christian love and faith, can make good things happen. Having built its total program around being Good Neighbors to friends of all ages: Children, youth, adults and the total community, Neighborhood House has realized the benefits of having Good Neighbors who go the extra mile to help - generous church members throughout the Peninsula Conference have shown love and caring in their contributions of tithe, time, and talents. Repeatedly, neighbors in the community who have benefited from our services have responded by volunteering their help to Neighborhood House and its program.

The countless treasured Good Neighbors of Neighborhood House manifested themselves in many ways in 1984 - funding through churches, foundation grants, United Way, the Friends Annual Appeal. Time and talents were valued - almost every operation at Neighborhood House used the help of volunteers at some point. Especially valued, and their numbers grew in 1984, were the Good Neighbors who returned to help others after they themselves had been helped at Neighborhood House.

1984 brought with it many opportunities to be in Mission at Neighborhood House. An expanded emphasis on youth was introduced this past year. We added a position of youth worker who creates and implements our new focus to help youth deal with the many problems of the pre-teen and teenage person. Our program is intended to help youth deal with adjustments in school and in families, and to give encouragement and support to academic achievement. Youth are able to identify, recognize, and achieve personal potential. Toward this goal a successful Junior Achievement program has been implemented.

In the Housing program all ten rehabilitated units have now been completed and sold. We are examining new, exciting housing programs to continue the efforts to insure the availability of low-cost decent housing in South Wilmington.

Under eight major program headings services have been provided to help persons help themselves toward a better life, highlights of which are presented below.

YOUTH: The year 1984 marked the birth of Southbridge Junior Enterprises, Neighborhood House's Junior Achievement company, sponsored by the Brandywine Professional Association. Twenty-five young people gained know-how and experience and have been positively motivated by managing a business under the supervision of adult advisors. Youth have also been served by ongoing programs of tutoring, college/career guidance, and resident camp. In a special motivational summer program staff worked with youth to create a vision of achievement through education. In 1984, 245 youth were served.

ADULTS: Crisis alleviation remained a top priority, as did counseling on problems of unemployment - managing on a minimum income, finding and interviewing for a job, where and how to apply to other social agencies. Comprehensive housing counseling has been a need fulfilled, and during the past year five more families were able to purchase houses. Emergency funds for food and household fuel, Adult Basic Education, and Sewing classes were provided. In 1984, 1,220 adults were served.

COMMUNITY: Being a community-wide Good Neighbor in 1984 involved again sponsoring the annual gardening and beautification contest and producing a fun-filled talent show to meet the Neighborhood House United Way Fund quota. The Thrift Shop, founded in 1983, continued to serve community needs by providing good low-cost clothing and employing several paid workers. Special efforts were made to inform citizens about candidate choices and to encourage all eligible voters to vote in the nationwide elections. In 1984, 3,320 persons were served.

CHILDREN: A fundamental part of the Neighborhood House Good Neighbor policy is its service to children, many of whom have their first contact with the tender loving attention of staff and volunteers in the Child Care program. An inspirational Vacation Church School coordinated by Mt. Joy United Methodist Church, exciting summer camps, character-building/learning clubs - Daisies, Brownies, and 4-H, and a special Christmas were appreciated by enthusiastic children. In 1984, 375 children were served.

During the year several friends received community-wide recognition for their volunteer services to Neighborhood House and others. To all of you, our neighbors, our loyal supporters and funding agencies, we extend our gratitude for gifts of

support and participation in our program. May God's richest blessings be your reward.

BOARD OF HIGHER EDUCATION AND CAMPUS MINISTRY

In "Issues and Choices in Campus Ministry Evaluation" by Allan J. Burry, Assistant General Secretary, Division of Higher Education and Ministry, it is noted that "this is a ministry on behalf of God and on behalf of God's church... Campus Ministry is called to be a community of love and caring where God's love is mediated, where people are affirmed. We are to be the community where a word of hope is spoken at a time when many people sense only truncated futures if they sense any future at all. We are to be a community of hope." He concludes in a detailed paper that "the work of the church at colleges and universities is a significant work, and is worthy of careful evaluation to keep it strong, effective and faithful."

The members of the Board of Higher Education and Campus Ministry of the Peninsula Conference have endeavored to become a strong, effective, and faithful group of Christian witnesses in the arena of ministry and message in Higher Education. We thank our colleagues who have completed their tenures on the Board and wrestled with the concerns and issues of the transformation of campus ministry at the University of Delaware.

The present Board consists of many persons new to the Conference Board, but not new to the challenges and concerns of Higher Education. We will have met seven times since the last Annual Conference in June 1984, the first meeting being held for reorganization and review and defining the role of the Board of Higher Education and Campus Ministry. Other meetings included goal setting for the Board, evaluation criteria for Campus Ministers, budget making, and the role of the Board in encouraging participation by churches near campuses that presently have no Wesley Foundation. In addition, the Board examined budgets and goals of the Wesley Foundation Campus Ministry Programs for 1986. The Board met in an all-day retreat at Drayton Manor led by the Reverend Dr. Alan Burry, Assistant General Secretary of the Board of Higher Education and Ministry, who discussed with us the developing criteria for evaluation for campus ministry, organizational models of the Board, functions of the Board, and the development of specific goals for the Board in 1986.

The Board of Higher Education and Campus Ministry must concern itself with the effectiveness of our ministry to the Students, Conference, Districts, Churches, and the Board itself, and at the same time show evidence of faithfulness in our call to be the Church on Campus on behalf of the Lord of the Church, Jesus Christ.

The Conference Council on Ministries;

GENERAL CHURCH:

The division shall have an advisory relationship to all UM affiliated institutions, including universities, colleges, secondary and special schools, Wesley Foundations..." (Para. 1513.2)

ANNUAL CONFERENCE:

"To evaluate higher education and professional campus ministries with concern for the quality of their performance and the integrity of their mission." (Para. 731.4b1)

"To hold the Wesley Foundation Board of Directors responsible for the direction and administration of the foundation in accordance with the policies and standards established by the Annual Conference Board of Higher Education and Campus Ministry and the General Board of Higher Education and Ministry.

The foundation shall be related functionally and cooperatively through its Board of Directors to the United Methodist local church or churches in the immediate vicinity of the college or university." (Para. 731.8)

Wesley College

At the writing of this report, I am celebrating my second anniversary as President of your Wesley College — a proudly church-related college. This entire past year has been one of celebration, for we have been involved in heralding the fact that Wesley College has always stood as eloquent witness to the fact that men and women are more than the echoes of their feet upon the sidewalk. Wesley gives eloquent witness to the fact that people count — all people count — and Wesley College has always existed, under the leadership of the Church, to acknowledge and to nourish that truth. This past year has been one in which we have celebrated Wesley as an oasis of values — a place to contemplate and explore the state of humankind's existence on this bountiful planet. We have celebrated Wesley as an investment in youth and as an affirmation of our belief and hope that it is still possible to create a better world by molding better and better men and women to live in it. We have celebrated Wesley as a mirror of the diverse nature of our beloved church and our great country. Your church-related college is actually a keeper of lanterns — bright lanterns of conviction and high ideals.

As you know, private higher education today faces many challenges — among them, to be true to its mission, to be efficient in its operation, and to be innovative in its response to the needs of today and tomorrow. Wesley College has always accepted that challenge. To be sure, there have been uncertain days in the journey to the enjoyment of Wesley's current stability and the promise of her future security. Yet, I have no uncertainty that those days have been worth all the efforts of the thousands of persons who have nurtured Wesley over the years. A Wesley education is much more than a preparation to join the labor force. Under the guiding hand of the Church, a Wesley education has always been (and will always be) a preparation to live one's life fully with an understanding of the achievements of our civilization and a notion of the challenges, the dangers, the problems, and the promise which lie ahead.

It strikes me that too many college students in our nation today are beset by anxiety and confusion. They have a feeling of lostness, aimlessness, and frustration when confronted by what is too often an academic merry-go-round. Speaking, as if to this very issue, the venerable Alfred North Whitehead once observed that instead of a single unity, we offer students algebra, from which nothing follows; geometry, from which nothing follows; science, from which nothing follows; history, from which nothing follows; a couple of languages never mastered; and lastly, literature, represented by plays of Shakespeare, with philological notes and short analyses of plot and character to be, in substance, committed to memory. At Wesley College, we regard such unfortunate student experience as chaos. Believe me, at Wesley College, we have it clear and we have it straight that what students in the church-related college are asking for today and what this college is extending today is not a fatal disconnection of subjects, but rather the summary of educational ideal which has been current any time from the dawn of our civilization, namely, an education which inculcates duty and reverence. Or, as Whitehead put it, "Duty arises from our potential control over the course of events, where attainable knowledge could have changed the issue, ignorance has the guilt of vice. And the foundation of reverence is this perception, that the present holds within itself the complete sum of existence, backward and forward, that whole amplitude of time, which is eternity."

Thanks to the Church, there is a Wesley College! And because there is a Wesley College we have been able to offer, in the name of the Master, and in service to the Kingdom, an academic community which has and always will contribute to the common commitment to providing students an intellectual stimulation grounded in the philosophies, the humanities, the social sciences, and the sciences, and aimed at encouraging and equipping the student for active participation in the democratic process and in the democratic community-at-large. Your Wesley College has long been involved in producing graduates who possess culture, knowledge, reverence, and a lasting sense of duty. I believe that the college-related church has been justly proud of the efforts and the mission of the church-related college.

Dr. Paul Bardin, the distinguished president of Drew University, once suggested that he knew of no private church-related college where piety was a substitute for intellectual vigor. Yet, we take religion very seriously on the campus that claims to be church-related. Wesley College and Drew University and other colleges and universities proudly related to the United Methodist Church in this country make, you may be assured, every attempt to live out in their corporate life the values that these institutions derive from their great religious heritage. As Bardin said of Drew, I say of Wesley, namely, we in the private sector wish to impart the kind of learning that leads to wisdom and not just the kind of learning that sells in the American job market. Indeed, the college-related church can be proud of the church-related college.

Basil Mathews once related how, during the fiercest period of the blitz over Britain, he was walking in the yet unbroken calm of the gardens of New College at Oxford, with the famous professor of international relations, Sir Alfred Zimmern. They were discussing the possibility of a new and better world. Turning to the renowned historian, Mathews asked what the great professor regarded to be the greatest obstacle between conflict and the building of enduring world peace. The great scholar's answer, couched in four words, startled Mathews beyond measure. His reply was — "the small scale individual." Mathews subsequently suggested that it all goes to show that perhaps the greatest ministry of the Christian church and, I would add, the greatest ministry of the church-related college, in our time, is to produce truly large-scale, person-oriented, and God-centered individuals. I believe we are meeting our obligation to that mission we hold in common.

As I was privileged to do last year, so am I privileged, once again, to request the continued support of the Peninsula Annual Conference for Wesley College. Such support continues to be important as the College attempts to establish a future of security with dignity for the years that lie ahead. Even though the Peninsula Conference allocation is a small percent of the proposed College budget for the coming fiscal year, that contribution helps in three essential areas, namely, our chaplaincy program, scholarships for worthy students, and the support of academic programs so meaningful to the Church. It is obvious that the United Methodist Church is a college-related church. It is the fervent belief of those who create policy and administer the affairs of Wesley College that both the Church and the College are enhanced by the constant strengthening of the ties that bind together.

On the heels of this renewed request for continued support, I think it is vitally important for you to know that the College, at this time, is at least stable. At the conclusion of this fiscal year just past, auditors informed the Board of Trustees that for the first time in many years the College operated not only with a balanced budget, but also achieved an operational surplus of \$147,138. That, of course, is a modest amount. Nonetheless, it was a surplus. At last, the ink was the right color and on the correct side of the ledger sheet.

As is known throughout the Church, Wesley College does enjoy a \$1.8 million bank loan from the Wilmington Trust and the Peninsula Annual Conference of the United Methodist Church co-signed that note as guarantor. I am very pleased to inform you that, as of this writing, our indebtedness on that line of credit is the lowest it has been since the day it was granted in June, 1983. While we will continue to utilize that line of credit from time-to-time, we believe that we will be able to reduce it substantially and with increasing rapidity. Indeed, as an expression of confidence in the College and its future, the Wilmington Trust has just agreed to modify the terms and conditions of the loan and extend the period of the active line of credit while, concomitantly, extending the period of payback. This, of course, will allow the College to continue its fast-forward stabilization.

Now, there is additional good news for the Church which, for so long, and with so much patience, has nourished its obedient child, Wesley College. On November 1, 1984, Wesley College was required to present to the Middle States Accrediting Association its Periodic Review Report seeking continued accreditation as a comprehensive institution of higher learning. That report, so capably directed by Wesley faculty member, Dr. Weston Donehower, was anything but a "whitewash." Throughout our report candor prevailed, integrity was evidenced, and our own capability at dispassionate self-analysis was amply demonstrated.

Gratifying response of the Accrediting Association was that the Commission agreed to accept our Period Review, to commend the College for its progress, and to simply request that we keep the Commission apprised of developments in planning, finances, and enrollment via an information letter due November 1, 1985. Our next accreditation evaluation will not occur until 1987-88.

Among the remarks made by the Commission on Higher Education of the Middle States Association were the following which may be of particular interest to the college-related church. "There would appear to be a number of positive signs that the College is sincere about making necessary improvements and maintaining a commitment to excellence. Among others, these include: 1) strong leadership from a new administration; 2) restoration of faculty confidence and improved morale; 3) administrative staff reorganization and adjustments; 4) renewal of "trusteeship" on the part of the Board of Trustees; 5) initiation of a capital campaign and improved institutional development procedures; 6) establishment of new academic programs and the elimination of programs which are no longer viable; and 7) renewed activity in the area of faculty development."

These observations by the Middle States Association are indicative of Wesley College goals for the coming year. Chief among these goals are bringing to conclusion a successful asset building program and initiating additional four-year academic programs in order to bring absolute creditability to our designation, by the Middle States, as a comprehensive institution of higher learning.

Wesley College must design its destiny, just as businesses, churches, hospitals, and other organizations must. Yet, as a private, dependently independent, not-for-profit institution, your Wesley College does recognize that money is a necessity for excellence as it is in all organizations. We at Wesley understand that the College must have the financial resources to guarantee its destiny—not just to get by, not just to provide for adequacy—but to provide for the insurance of a quality educational opportunity on a lasting basis.

To that end, the Board of Trustees has authorized and initiated a comprehensive financial resource development program—in short, an asset-building program—assets to guarantee the future of our beloved Wesley. This program is truly a quest for a quality future. This program presents urgent, nondeferrable needs, urgent deferrable needs, and investment gift opportunities.

Urgent needs include the Wesley Fund for current operations, plus funds for faculty, student, library, and general financial needs totaling \$3,650,000, which we anticipate we are going to be capable of securing in hand by 1988 at the latest. Obviously, one of our goals for the current time and the coming year is to bring the concentration of all of our abilities to the achievement of this noble goal. At this writing, we already have in hand \$750,000 in advance "confidence" gifts—\$500,000 of which has already been converted to cash.

In regard to new academic programs, on February 19, 1985, the Wesley College Board of Trustees approved two new four-year programs. Accordingly, Wesley will be accepting in-coming freshmen into a new bachelor of arts program in applied communications in the fall of 1985. In-coming freshmen will also be accepted into a new bachelor of science program of business administration with a major in marketing. These new programs build on two-year programs already in existence. Moreover, we believe that these programs will lead to an inevitable increase in the number of juniors and seniors at Wesley College, and this increase will definitely help give stability to the campus and add to its academic flavor.

We wish the Church to know that our new programming goals also include, potentially, the addition of innovative bachelor degree programs in the following areas: computer science, pre-law, psychology, government/political science, business/science (a double major), and liberal arts with a minor in language. These are currently goals, not realities. Yet, we anticipate successfully unfolding these additional four-year majors in the interest of gaining our fair share of available students for study at Wesley while, simultaneously, bringing greater balance between our two and our four-year programs and greater proof of our comprehensive nature.

Just as sure as we are definitely moving from an industrial to an information society, we will, and must, in the future, use our brain power to create instead of our physical power, and the technology of the day will extend and enhance our mental ability. This, then, is the time for Wesley College to be more heavily utilized and more generously supported than ever before.

Therefore, without hesitation or equivocation, I call upon the Church to continue its philanthropic involvement with the College to which it gave life and nourishment. After all, what is philanthropy except as its roots indicate, namely, the love of humankind. I urge the Church to continue to help those of us who administer the invention of Wesley's future to help us write an insurance policy upon the values that we hold dear for ourselves, our children, and our children's children. Wesley College is truly one of the major repositories of those historic values. The Peninsula Annual Conference can now literally continue to be a part of building a better world by proving, through its continued generosity to Wesley College, the old adage that "That person is not greatest who has the largest number of servants. Rather, that person is greatest who serves the largest number of people."

The Support of the Peninsula Annual Conference Has Been Critical

As the parent body and corporate owner of Wesley College, the Peninsula Annual Conference has provided annual financial support to Wesley College. This financial support has been appreciated and has been critical to the life and continuation of Wesley College as a church-related college.

The financial support of the Conference has always been critical to the life of Wesley College. It continues to be so as the College attempts to establish a firm financial base for the years that lie ahead. Even though the Peninsula Conference allocation for 1985 is less than 2 percent of the proposed College budget for 1985-'86, that contribution helps in three vital areas: the chaplaincy program, scholarships for worthy students, and the support of meaningful programs.

There have been three specific recent indications of the renewed support by the Peninsula Annual Conference for Wesley College — the co-signing of the \$1,800,000 loan guarantee, the REACH Program, and the raising of scholarship dollars. Although the Wesley College REACH projects approved by the Conference had a total of \$192,000 in overall need, the amount received so far has been only \$6,941. The target goal for 1984-85 to provide scholarships for active United Methodist students coming from the four districts is \$40,000. Receipts to date total \$7,714. The reason for pointing out the amounts received in these two special funding efforts, REACH and the Scholarship Drive, is to dispel the notion that Wesley College is already receiving so much support that the support of the Peninsula Annual Conference is not needed. On the contrary, a careful review of the current needs of the College, the financial data along with the demographic projections regarding the declining numbers of high school graduates through the mid 1990's, clearly demonstrates the mandate for continued and, if possible, increased support.

CHAPLAINCY PROGRAM

The chaplaincy program is designed to minister to the pastoral needs of the campus, both students and staff and to provide leadership to the campus organizations in strengthening the religious life of the campus. This expense item of \$49,300 covers salary, housing, office expenses, and program.

FINANCIAL AID

The scholarship request is for a total of \$50,000 broken down into five categories. These scholarship categories are: minority and low income students - \$20,000; nursing students - \$10,000; students planning to enter full-time Christian Service - \$3,000; and dependents of the United Methodist Clergy - \$7,000. A new program to recruit top flight United Methodist scholars is being initiated at a total cost of \$26,300. We come to the Conference seeking \$10,000 to help support this new program. These funds could be expected to assist approximately one hundred (100) students with an average grant of \$500. While financial aid funds do not directly support college operating programs, they do assist the College in a significant way. The additional tuition for the same one hundred (100) students that comes to the College either from family contributions or other financial aid sources is expected to total in excess of \$500,000 in 1986-'87.

The multiplier effect is wise stewardship of Peninsula Conference and Wesley College resources. Furthermore, the kinds of distinctly Christian programs supported by these funds could not be supported by governmental agencies. Coupled with the \$500,000 in governmental financial aid programs and the \$50,000 in College Endowment Fund scholarships, the Peninsula Conference scholarships help to keep attendance at Wesley College within the reach of United Methodist students across the peninsula. The increase in financial aid request is in large part due to the cutbacks in federal financial aid funds.

DIRECT SUPPORT FOR PROGRAMS

The Associate Degree Nursing Program dedicated to the education of nurses engaged in direct patient care is an expression of the ministry of service to which a church-related college is committed. The \$20,000 is necessary to help cover the

costs of the staff and program for this intensive training program.

For library acquisitions for the baccalaureate programs and other critical areas, an amount of \$10,000 is requested.

As the Ministers Continuing Education Fund is important to the professional growth of Ministers, the professional development of faculty and other professional staff is essential to the maintenance of high quality teaching. To provide the funds needed to help the faculty in their professional development, \$10,000 is requested.

In order to meet the demands of a changing society, new programs must be developed. Academic areas such as computer science, accounting, and allied health professions are examples of vital new programs that have been developed in the past few years. The amount of \$10,000 being requested is to provide funds to develop new programs.

To assist all students, including minority students, who bring to their college experience, gaps in their high school preparation, \$5,000 is requested to provide tutorial services.

SUMMARY

The Board of Trustees and the administration of the College are seeking to strengthen and maintain the historic ties with Church rather than to disassociate, as some financially troubled church-related colleges across the country have been forced to do. Wesley College seeks to continue in perpetuity, in the face of major obstacles, to be the Peninsula Annual Conference's church-related college.

Wesley Foundation, University of Delaware

More than 15,000 students, faculty, and staff at the University of Delaware have been touched by the ministry provided through the Wesley Foundation's regular newspaper column "The Wesleyan Witness" which appeared throughout the year in the UD Review. This column was made possible by a grant from the Methodist Action Program.

Bible study groups ranged in attendance from 6 to 35, while fellowship events maintained about the same number in attendance. Worship events had from 6 to 50 persons in attendance.

All 1,335 United Methodist students received a summer mailing to their home address and during the spring and fall semesters students residing on campus received regular mailings of the newsletter.

In late autumn of 1984 the Wesley Foundation director and the four peer ministers began a visitation project designed to contact personally students living in dorms on campus.

Peer ministers for 1984 (students who receive scholarships in exchange for direct involvement in the ministry of the Wesley Foundation) included: G. Gordon Braun (philosophy major and pre-ministerial student who is a member of Union UMC, Bear), Lynn Fields (accounting major and member of St. John's UMC, Seaford), Mark Donovan (mathematics major and member of Grace UMC, Wilmington), and Donna Johnson (health sciences major and member of Janes UMC, Rising Sun). Among their duties were administrative responsibilities, fellowship planning, worship assistance and leadership, retreat planning and coordination, student visitation and recruitment, Hope Dining Room coordination for ecumenical campus ministry involvement, secretarial duties, liaison with student organizations, and other assigned staff duties.

Wesley House, with renovations finally completed in the summer of 1984, has served as a central gathering place for students. Television, a stereo, and tape recorder are available for use by students, as well as laundry and kitchen facilities.

Regular Sunday evening suppers, Bible study, and worship has been augmented by a growing participation of local church groups who provide the meals and have the opportunity to lead Bible studies.

Special events during the year included the Asbury Lecture featuring the Reverend J. Richard Peck, editor of Newscope and The Circuit Rider, as the 1984 guest speaker; a special presentation on "Technocracy's Assault on Conscience" with the Reverend Robert G. White as guest speaker and the Reverend Kenneth Bedell and Professor Juliet Dee as respondents.

A busload and van of United Methodist Women from our Conference attended the Northeastern Jurisdiction Quadrennial Meeting in Boston, March 22-25, for celebration, worship, challenge, and election of officers and nominees for Women's Division. Marie Brown, past-president of our Conference UMW, was elected Vice-President of NE Jurisdiction Core Planning Group. Madeleine L'Engle, a Christian leader and author of many books, in her keynote speech said, "Christ was God's Show and Tell." She challenged us to also be God's "show and tell" in all we do.

General Conference met in Baltimore in early May celebrating the Bicentennial of American Methodism. Our United Methodist Women had the opportunity to be involved attending sessions, serving at coffee breaks and information centers, and as receptionists. They worked in the secretarial pool, as pages, and participated in the Bicentennial Celebration. During the Bishop's Pre-Conference Business Session in Wilmington our women were also responsible for coffee breaks.

Our Spring Event was May 19 at Elkton United Methodist Church. The theme was "Hope of the World." A workshop was held on Economics and the Christian Community, highlighting Financial Planning, Investments, Wills, Computers, and Theological Implications and Reflections. The speaker, Dr. Robert Lee McCann, Associate Professor of Political Ethics, Wesley Seminary, challenged us to be more aware of our responsibility to ourselves and our community. 175 attended with 50 churches represented.

On June 9 several women from our Conference convened at Grace UM Church, Wilmington, to engage in a political skills workshop entitled, "Making a Difference: Women in Electoral Politics." They were trained by Mrs. Mary Pat Clarke of Baltimore, a member of the National Women's Education Fund, to build skills in order to run for office and work in campaigns of progressive women candidates. Local resource reactors were: The Honorable Norma Lee Barkley, Wicomico County Judge of Orphan's Court, and the Honorable Janet C. Rzewnicki, Treasurer, State of Delaware.

The Annual School of Christian Missions was held at Salisbury State College, Salisbury, MD, July 12-15, with 192 attending. The studies were Ephesians with 3 teachers: Dr. Carroll Yingling, Jr. of Catonsville, MD, the Reverend Mrs. Mildred White, Dover, DE, and the Reverend Gonzalee Matthews, Salisbury, MD; Swords Into Plowshares led by the Reverend Carroll Doggett, Frederick, MD, and Mrs. Dorothy Miller, Millersville, PA. The Korean study was led by Dr. Phares Harvey, Washington, D.C. A special addition was having two Korean women of the Newark, DE congregation attend on scholarships and share in many ways. Resolutions from General Conference which related to our studies were presented to those attending. The 1985 school will again be held at Salisbury State College, July 18-21.

The Conference Annual Meeting was held November 10 at Avenue UM Church, Milford, DE with the Reverend Paul McCoy as host pastor due to the recent death of the Reverend Frank Lucia. The theme was "We Journey in Faith." Bishop Joseph H. Yeakel gave the message and spoke of our choices. He said, "What you are - the church is, what you do - the church does. We're it. We're the church. We journey in faith by choice." 352 attended with 110 churches represented.

This was the first year to hold a District Officers Training Day in the fall before their term started. It was held December 1 at Asbury UM Church, Harrington, DE. Officers spent part of the time with counterparts and the rest together sharing concerns for issues, thoughts on goals, and receiving general information. Saturday, December 7, 1985 will be this year's training date.

The Conference Mission Team met for overnight at Drayton Manor December 4-5 to evaluate the accomplishments of the year and set goals for the new year. The issues which were a concern at Leadership Training Day led to the decision for new goals. One goal is to "Develop a method of ministry to older women." Another is to "Search for ways to attract younger women, 20-40, to our organization." Our "Women in Crisis" goal is ongoing with more specifics for 1985.

We will celebrate the Centennial of United Methodist Women organized for mission on May 4 at Delaware State College looking at our heritage and our future, recognizing many women for their service. Mary Lou Santillan Baert of Nashville, TN will be our speaker.

We are pleased to report the financial giving for 1984. The women of this Conference gave \$100,318.39 to "Pledge to Mission," \$3,413.98 to the Centennial Fund, \$3,839.31 to "Call to Prayer & Self-Denial," and \$16,020.81 for Supplementary gifts which totals \$123,592.49. Neighborhood House in Wilmington, DE received special designated giving in the amount of \$12,332.97. This is a continuing service of giving money and time and talents to serve the South Wilmington Community.

This has been a good year in many ways yet we have continuing challenges as we become aware of the needs in our communities and the world. This keeps us volunteering to serve our Lord Jesus Christ.

Ministerial Education Fund

In the calendar year 1984, we were one of 13 Conferences across the church which paid its Ministerial Education Fund apportionment in full. We contributed \$154,896 to this fund, of which seventy-five percent was forwarded to the General Council on Finance and Administration and distributed to our thirteen United Methodist Seminaries to subsidize ministerial education. The other twenty-five percent became a part of the operating budget for our board.

Scholarships

Dr. Robert P. Whitlock is the new chairperson of the board's Scholarship Committee which provides financial assistance to students from our Conference who are preparing for ordained ministry. This remains a major priority of our board. Scholarships granted in the 1984 calendar year totalled \$29,400. The following statistical data represents students receiving aid in the fall of 1984:

The board's portion of M.E.F. funds is supplemented by funds from the Scott Memorial Fund and the Riddle Fund. Local churches are encouraged to contribute to scholarships through the REACH program of our Conference. By action of the 1984 General Conference, these scholarship funds are also to be made available to students preparing for Diaconal Ministry. Our Scholarship Committee is working with the Conference Board of Diaconal Ministry to develop procedures for sharing these funds. Application forms may be requested from: Dr. Robert P. Whitlock, St. Paul's United Methodist Church, 1314 Foulk Road, Wilmington, DE 19803.

Continuing Education

This committee, chaired by Dr. Donald O. Clendaniel, Sr., Kent Island United Methodist Church, Rt. 301 and Cox Neck Road, Chester, MD 21619, is responsible for

approving continuing education credits, granting financial aid for continuing education programs, and monitoring clergy compliance with the church's requirements for continuing education.

Dr. J. Ronald Owens, 601 S. Central Avenue, Laurel, DE 19956, Registrar for Continuing Education, maintains a record of all Continuing Education units reported by clergy in our Conference. All clergy are expected to do some continuing education annually and to earn eight C.E.U.'s each quadrennium. This committee has been reviewing and revising its guidelines for the new quadrennium.

Candidacy

The Reverend Douglas M. Ridley, Candidacy Registrar, works specifically with District Committees and Supervising Pastors to prepare persons for certification as candidates for Ordained Ministry and to monitor and supervise their progress until they are recommended for probationary membership in our Conference. The Candidacy Registrar has met with each of the District Committees and has conducted training sessions for new supervising pastors during 1984.

Candidates desiring an appointment must attend the Local Pastor's Licensing School which is held annually during the summer. Dr. Dilio Mariotti and Dr. Fred Bruner represent our board on the Board of Directors of this school.

Psychological Testing

Dr. James Walz is the new chairperson of this committee, which is in the process of being redefined as the Psychological Testing and Counseling Committee. All candidates for deacon's orders and probationary membership in our Conference are given thorough psychological testing by Dr. Adolph Angermeier, whose report to the board becomes a significant part of our consideration of their application. This committee also supervises any counseling of clergy recommended by the board.

Guidelines for clergy involved in marital separation and/or divorce are being developed by this committee for recommendation by the board for adoption by the Executive Session of the Annual Conference. A plan is also being developed for ministry to clergy families affected by such crises.

Counseling Elders

The Reverend K. Wayne Grier is chairing our Counseling Elder Program, which will train elders to be appointed by the District Superintendents as counselors for all candidates and probationers preparing for ordination as elders. Counseling Elders are intended to provide guidance and support for these persons "in process" of seeking ordination.

Recruitment

The Recruitment Committee, currently chaired by the Reverend H. Ward Greer, is charged with responsibility for assessing the on-going needs of our Conference for clergy to serve our churches and for recruiting candidates from the churches, colleges, and seminaries.

Service to Ministers and Change in Status

The Reverend Ralph A. Ellis, Jr. chairs the committee of our board which has responsibility for recommending changes in the relationship of clergy members to our Conference such as retirement, sabbatical leave, disability leave, leave of absence, special appointments, etc. Any clergyperson seeking such a change should contact this committee. Annual reports of persons in these categories are also to be addressed to the chairperson of this committee.

Other Business

In addition to the work of the committees of our board, we have been involved in many other activities.

1) A retreat was conducted in late June at Drayton Manor for all persons who had been appointed to charges in our Conference for the first time at the 1984 Conference session.

2) The Board met with Bishop Yeakel and the Cabinet on October 30 to review the responsibilities of the Board and our working relationship with these key persons.

3) The Executive Committee of the board participated in a seminar dealing with Cross-Racial appointments at Drayton Manor, February 18-20, helping to develop a document that will guide our Conference in dealing with this critical issue.

4) Dr. J. Ronald Owens represented our board in helping to plan the Bishop's Covenant Service for clergy on March 6 in Annapolis.

5) A meeting was held on April 15, 1985 for all persons recommended for ordination and Conference membership to get better acquainted with the Bishop and to plan for Annual Conference.

6) A meeting was held at Wesley College on April 24, 1985 for members of our Conference serving in Appointments Beyond the Local Church.

7) The board has been working under the guidance of Dr. F. David Weber to develop written policies and procedures for the work of our Peninsula Conference Board of Ordained Ministry. These will be presented at the 1985 Conference session.

8) By order of the 1984 General Conference, an Executive Session of the Annual Conference is being planned for 1985.

A special word of thanks needs to be offered to Dr. Edwin C. Thomas, Jr., who has faithfully fulfilled his responsibilities as Registrar, even in the midst of deep personal tragedy.

1986 Program Objectives

1. Continue certification process.
2. Provide more publicity by participating in every college career day within the boundaries of our Conference.
3. Continue to develop a plan to provide some financial assistance to those seeking certification as professional workers in our Conference.

BOARD OF PENSIONS

In this quadrennial year of 1984, the Conference Board of Pensions experienced a 57% turnover in membership. As a result, membership training was accorded a high priority. Such training has been most worthwhile, and has encouraged rapid assimilation of the Board's duties and responsibilities and facilitated informed decisions. Interest and attendance on the part of all members has been high.

Six members of our Board of Pensions, including the officers, attended the 2 1/2-day quadrennial Conference held by the General Board of Pensions in Harrisburg, PA, last October. The purpose of the Conference was a) to trace the development of the United Methodist Church pension system from 1784 to 1984, b) to chart the purpose, procedures and channels through which pension protection and related

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benefits can be provided for those who serve the church as ministers and full-time lay employees, and c) to enable persons responsible for pension leadership and administration to appreciate, understand and be better positioned to administer the pension and benefit program for their respective Conferences, and to disseminate information to educate the members of their respective Conferences in matters pertaining to the pension and benefit programs.

At the end of 1984, pensions were being paid to 182 ministers, 151 surviving spouses of ministers, 3 children, 10 local pastors, and 23 surviving spouses of local pastors, for a total of 369 annuitants whose benefits had been earned in the Peninsula Conference. Total amount paid in 1984 by the General Board of Pensions to these annuitants was \$905,549. The average pension for ministers within our Conference increased during the quadrennium from \$2,874 in 1980 to \$4,347 in 1984. To this annual pension payment is added any Social Security that each minister may be eligible for. In a continuing effort to keep faith with those who serve our Conference, the Past Service Rate has been increased each year as follows:

1980 - \$120	1982 - \$135	1984 - \$170
1981 - \$125	1983 - \$155	1985 - \$180

Beginning in 1982 and continuing through the current year, the Peninsula Conference Board of Pensions is paying, from special funds designated for pensions, more in dollars and in percentages toward the annual cost of reducing the Conference's pension liability than in any prior year. The Board's contribution in 1984 toward the payment to reduce pension liability, made to the General Board of Pensions, was \$317,000.

GOALS FOR THE CURRENT QUADRENNIUM

1. Develop an ongoing pre-retirement seminar to be presented at regular intervals for ministers and their spouses upon attaining a specified age.
2. Improve communication of pension benefits to ministers and their spouses to enhance appreciation and understanding.
3. Monitor payment of MPP contributions by local churches and communicate with the district superintendents relative to churches in arrears as to the necessity for timely payments.
4. Maintain a Past Service Rate that is at least 1% of Conference Average Salary and maintain MPP contributions at 12% to assure adequate compensation in retirement years commensurate with years of active ministry.

RECOMMENDATIONS

The Peninsula Conference Board of Pensions recommends that:

1. The Past Service Rate for 1986 be \$195 per year of approved service.
2. Up to 100% of the pension and disability payments received be designated as the permitted housing allowance for 1986. (The legal text of this resolution may be found on page 287 of the 1983 Journal.)

THINGS OF PENINSULA ANNUAL CONFERENCE

BISHOP'S RESIDENCE - In connection with the Episcopal Residence Committee, and pursuant to paragraph 735 of the 1984 Discipline, we participated in the acquisition of the Bishop's residence in Laurel, MD. An agreement was signed with the Baltimore Conference for them to pay 70% of the acquisition and maintenance costs of the residence and the Peninsula Conference to pay the balance.

FUND MANAGEMENT - We have agreed with the Peninsula United Methodist Foundation for them to manage and invest the better part of the assets under the Board's jurisdiction. This Agreement is subject to review and rescission as warranted.

WHITE'S CHAPEL - The Board signed a deed to Prospect United Methodist Church for the land on which White's Chapel was formerly located, in order to permit the cemetery to be expanded.

UNION UNITED METHODIST CHURCH - The Board made a grant of \$750 to the Union United Methodist Church (Bear, DE) to assist them in the construction of a ramp for handicapped persons.

HYNSON CHAPEL (KENT COUNTY, MD) - The property was declared abandoned and the Board directed to take appropriate action by the Conference in 1983 (see page 202 of the Journal). An appraisal has been obtained and interested persons have been invited to submit bids. The Board will consider the matter at its meeting to be held at the time of this year's Annual Conference.

1. To promote and administer Planned Giving programs by working with individuals, churches, and agencies.
2. To assist local churches and agencies in the establishment, promotion, and management of capital funds.
3. To manage trust and other funds on behalf of the church.

ANNUAL REPORT

1. Eight local church programs and consultations were conducted, three consultations with Peninsula Conference institutions, and four with Conference staff.

4. Management Fees received, \$2,822.57. These fees are used within the Peninsula Conference to promote Planned Giving programs.

5. There is a total of 208 donor/prospects, an increase of 16.

6. Personnel Changes:

a. The Reverend Paul H. Wragg was selected to replace Richard D. Bailey, who resigned to take a position with the Western North Carolina Conference. Reverend Mr. Wragg is a member of the Peninsula Conference and has 32 years of experience as a pastor, chaplain, and administrator. He is a graduate of Duke Divinity School and holds an additional Masters in Education and a Doctorate in Social Psychology. He worked with Richard Bailey in the Foundation office for four months prior to assuming the position as Executive Director in January 1985.

b. Mr. Thomas Wagner is the new Treasurer of the Foundation. Mr. Wagner is a dedicated United Methodist layman and works as a bank examiner.

PROGRAMS OF DEVELOPMENT

Original Program Goals

1. A Program to Educate the Local Church About Planned Giving

This program is continuing in both Conferences. There has been good use of "Getting Started in Planned Giving." A number of churches in both Conferences have held planned giving consultations. Planned Giving/Foundation Sunday (discussed later) is helping to introduce planned giving to members of our churches.

2. Housing for Retired Ministers

Baltimore Foundation has launched this program with Pensions and Conference Trustees. Reeder Memorial Home, Boonsboro, MD, has given a home adjacent to its property for this purpose. Peninsula Foundation is in the beginning stages of developing a similar program.

3. A Program of Wills and Estate Planning

This program is promoted through seminars for churches, professionals, and church agencies. It is one of the fundamental keys of Planned Giving.

4. Promotion of Pooled Income Fund

Promotion of the Pooled Income Fund is progressing in both Conferences.

5. A Program of Cash Flow Management for Local Churches

Studies have produced no workable results yet. The Investment Committee is continuing to study the matter and is working toward an answer.

Planned Giving/Foundation Sunday

Planned Giving/Foundation Sunday (PG/FS) was observed September 10 in the Peninsula Conference. This year's theme was Gifts of Life Insurance. Bulletin inserts were prepared and distributed. New this year is "Lifetrends" which introduces the theme and gives examples of how gifts of life insurance may help a donor.

PG/FS is a way to introduce planned giving to a congregation. Its effectiveness depends on the use of materials. Over a cycle of seven years planned giving options are introduced to a church. The materials provide accurate information on how churches may present these planned giving options and encourage gifts to their church and other United Methodist institutions and programs. Projected themes are:

- 1984 - Life Insurance Gifts
- 1985 - Endowment Funds
- 1986 - Gifts of Personal Property

Direct Mailing Program

The Direct Mailing Program to encourage wills and bequests is in progress. Sixteen local churches, an increase of one, are using this program.

Foundation and Corporate Gifts

We have been studying foundation funding and corporate gifts funding. We can develop the resources and skills to allow time for writing of funding proposals. This could provide monies for development program in the Area and Conferences. In addition, we can help Conference institutions and programs apply for funding.

Foundation Development Endowment Funds

Last year it was reported that both Foundations have approved in principle the establishment of an Area and Foundation Development Endowment Fund. The purpose of this Fund is to provide monies for the ministry of development through the two Foundations in the Washington Area.

After further study, it was decided that each Foundation should create its own Development Endowment Fund which would allow gifts for use in the Washington Area. Both Foundations approved identical trust agreements to create their Fund. These Funds will receive individual, corporate, and foundation gifts.

Investment In The Future

The 50-Year Fund "Investment In The Future" was launched at the 1983 Annual Conferences. This idea encourages churches to invest in the future generation. Gifts of money are accumulated in a fund, invested safely at the most beneficial available interest rate and compounded over the ensuing years to realize substantial — even unbelievable — growth.

For example, \$10,000 invested today at 12% could become more than \$31,000 in 10 years, \$170,000 in 25 years or \$2,890,000 — nearly three million dollars — after 50 years!

A flyer was produced for this program and a mailing went to all clergy and Administrative Board chairpersons. A number of inquiries are now being followed-up.

Lifetrends — A New Gifting Opportunity

We were privileged to assist in the planning of a new gifting opportunity. The new gifting program allows a younger donor to make a gift of life insurance to a college, or other charity, of a policy that takes advantage of current economic trends. Cash values, which could be used by the institution, quickly build up. Face value of the policy is \$25,000 — \$100,000. A vanishing premium concept makes this very attractive, as does an option to provide a college education for a surviving child. Our own Foundations can make use of this new gifting concept as can our institutions.

Program and Consultations

This is a vital part of the continuing Foundation program with the Executive Director and volunteers participating.

Management Services

Revocable and irrevocable trusts now administered by the Peninsula Foundation on behalf of local churches and institutions total \$365,198.80. An investment committee composed of United Methodist persons from the financial community, who work without remuneration, meet regularly. The Investment Guidelines follow.

THE INVESTMENT GUIDELINES
FOR THE
PENINSULA UNITED METHODIST FOUNDATION, INC.

The monies and/or property entrusted to the Foundation will be managed in accordance with the investment policies of the United Methodist Church and adhering to the following guidelines:

I. INVESTMENT OBJECTIVES

The Investment Objective is to preserve the integrity or real value of the Foundation as measured in terms of continuing, contemporary purchasing power. A prudent and careful investment policy should protect the beneficiaries against periods of inflation as well as recession. Specific objectives include:

- a. Preserving the principal value of the invested funds;
- b. Providing a reasonable rate of return;
- c. Seeking long-term appreciation on a prudent investment basis;
- d. Providing a socially beneficial effect consistent with the nature and mission of the church.

II. GENERAL INVESTMENT PHILOSOPHY

The Investment goals of the Foundation are best served through blending fixed-income type and equity-type investments. The ratio between these categories should be varied to reflect changes in the general economic outlook, the level of securities prices, and the rate of inflation.

III. INVESTMENT IN FIXED-INCOME TYPE ISSUES

Fixed-income policy emphasizes the selection of high quality issues which a) fluctuate little in value, except with changes in money rates, b) are almost entirely free of credit risk, and c) are not affected to any important extent by business conditions. The fixed-income section of the portfolio should include at all times certain highly marketable investments providing necessary liquidity.

IV. INVESTMENT IN EQUITY-TYPE ISSUES

Equity policy emphasizes the prospects of capital appreciation and increasing income through the selection of issues of good quality companies with superior long-term growth potential as well as issues which are considered to be undervalued in the market place. Equity-type issues may include not only common stocks but also convertible bonds, convertible preferred stocks, options and warrants to purchase common stock. The common stock section of the portfolio should be blended with the fixed-income type issues.

V. SUPERVISION

Continuous review of all investments is the primary responsibility of the Investment Committee, and Investment Counsel where feasible or necessary, as well as the responsible board or agency and its administrative officers.

VI. ADDITIONAL

No further investments will be made in nuclear power plants.

COMMISSION ON ARCHIVES AND HISTORY

This was a "high water-mark year" for our church. Over 6,500 people made the trip to Barratt's Chapel and the Conference Museum to hear the story and view the artifacts of Peninsula Methodism. Every week we have inquiries from churches bringing their members to touch our heritage, geneologists looking for a Methodist ancestor, an interested Methodist seeking to understand his/her church better, and people from the general public. There were 24 weddings and 40 local churches visited and/or held services within its historic walls. The Council of Bishops gathered for worship on April 27 as they made their way to Baltimore for General Conference. The Northeastern Jurisdiction Commission on Archives and History held their annual meeting at Wesley College in Dover. The 200th Anniversary Service was on Sunday, November 11, with the Reverend Dr. Charles Yrigoyen, Jr., General Secretary for the General Commission on Archives and History. A service of Holy

Communion and a play reenacting the meeting of Coke and Asbury was observed on November 14 - 200 years to the day. The year concluded with a love feast and Carols Service in December.

The Conference Museum has received a painting of Ezekiel Cooper, an early Methodist leader from Mr. Edward Cooper. The Mary Scott Kirkpatrick family gave the David Chalfont portrait of Bishop Levi Scott of Odeessa, DE. Edith Barratt Lensen gave a 19th-century oil painting of the Chapel by C. F. Cummings. The library has been completely catalogued by a dedicated team of volunteers headed by Mrs. Mary Cool. The church file has been revised and alphabetized by district.

There have been 175 new additions to the collection, including the E. C. Ballman files and a microfilm of Thomas Haskin's Journal.

A word on Delaware Conference materials. The Museum has a complete collection of Delaware Conference Journals and copies of histories written by Dr. P. J. Handy and W. C. Jason, Sr. With the new acquisition of the Cox Manuscript on microfilm in 1985, the Museum will have collected all the known documents on the Delaware Conference.

The Commission recommended to the Annual Conference that Bridgetown UMC be declared a Conference-Approved Historic Site. This was done. It has been registered with the General Church and the plaque was presented to the congregation on September 23, 1984.

The work of the Chapel and the Museum is enhanced by the generous gifts of the Howard B. Warren and the Clinton Brown Endowments, and the Barratt's Chapel Fund. Our endowment needs to be increased to meet the rising costs in maintaining a 204 year-old building and the Museum. Please contact the Chapel (302-335-5544).

We have purchased tables and chairs for picnics on the lawn, installed outdoor lights for better visibility from the road, and repaired the cemetery wall.

For the Bicentennial, the Commission issued 200 silver and 800 bronze coins; published New Light on Old Barratt's; sold a counted cross stitch pattern of the Chapel, First-Day Stamps, Commemorative Plates, and Love Feast Mugs.

During the year, we met seven (7) times and elected new officers for the quadrennium. As President, I express my appreciation to Mr. William Jones for his past leadership and to Mr. and Mrs. Allen Clark, curatorial family, for their untiring labor in preserving the story of Peninsula Methodism to the glory of God.

COMMISSION ON CHRISTIAN UNITY AND INTERSECTIGIOUS CONCERNS

One of Methodism's elder statesmen in the ecumenical movement, Dr. Albert C. Outler, told an end-of-the-year Conference that "old order" ecumenism with its "trickle-down theory of unity from the top," has been stymied by church bureaucracies which are preoccupied with their own survival. But the good news, he added, is that local groups no longer wait for "denominational initiative or even for clerical leadership" before engaging in shared prayer, Scripture study, and Christian cooperation. This evaluation seems pretty well borne out on the Peninsula.

Our Commission took the initiative in setting up a luncheon for our new bishop with the chief executive officers of the cooperating denominations on the Peninsula at the special session of Annual Conference in October. We are planning another such luncheon at our regular session in 1985 with church leaders in the Salisbury area. United Methodists have been invited to participate in the installation of the new Roman Catholic Bishop for the Wilmington Diocese, the Most Reverend Robert E. Mulvey, through the presence of Bishop Yeakel and Wilmington Superintendent C. Edwin Lasbury in April, 1985.

Our Commission is keeping informed and being a conduit of information concerning the reorganization of the World Council of Churches and the National Council of Churches in light of member denominations requesting greater participation in decision-making. Our General Conference and Council of Bishops have reaffirmed the necessity for such councils if the Church is to witness effectively and efficiently - and have recognized and responded to the need for these councils to be more closely monitored and representative of the positions of their constituencies. Our Commission continues to welcome questions and inquiries and promises to give straight factual answers as they can be determined.

For the first time in many years widespread interest has been shown in the Consultation on Church Union (CCU). A 70-page theological consensus document was presented to the eight participating denominations by the 16th session held in Baltimore, November 30, 1984. It has been called "the most significant act CCU has taken in its 22 years" to move the member denominations toward "organic church union," predicted to be 12 to 16 years away. The 18-member UM delegation voted unanimously to support the document.

On the local scene exciting things are also happening. The National Conference of Christians and Jews (Delaware Region) has set up an experimental theological dialog composed of six diverse members which has been meeting monthly. C. Edwin Lasbury is the UM participant. It is hoped that a model will evolve shortly which can be duplicated around the Peninsula.

In the Easton District Howell Wilkins has taken the initiative in starting an ecumenical dialog among the CCU churches on the Baptism, Eucharist, and Ministry documents which have been proposed as the basis for our eventual unity and current recognition of validity. This Commission invites other communities to set up such study/discussion groups; we can supply the material.

Dale Wroman reports active inter-church outreach in the Salisbury District across theological labels. He refers to a paid chaplain at the Peninsula General Hospital and the construction of a chapel at the McCready Hospital in Crisfield. Also, several county ministerial associations are working with the DEA to influence the State of Maryland to provide a resident chaplain at the new state prison near Princess Anne.

The National Association of Evangelicals (NAE), a theologically conservative but ecumenical complement to the NCCC, has developed local chapters composed largely of UM's in New Castle County and most recently Kent County, DE. The non-separatist evangelical coalition provides the opportunity for evangelicals to meet across denominational lines and to work with other ecumenical agencies in expressing common Christian concerns.

Our Commission has been given the charge to develop goals in keeping with the Quadrennial Missional Priority. We are aware that ethnic minorities have often developed their own ecumenical networks when the traditional associations have not spoken to their needs. We hope a greater effort can be made to create broader participation in all endeavors whose purpose is to make visible the Body of Christ.

DELAWARE ECUMENICAL AGENCY

We had three goals for the year.

Goal I: Provide for coordinating resources among member denominations and various ministries and other organizations. Time and energy were focused on organizations addressing four areas of concern: education, hunger, justice, and peace. Resource Ministries, our ongoing education effort under the direction of Elaine Stout, expanded services this year. The DEA represented the churches in the allocation of \$198,598 federal emergency food and shelter funds in Delaware. Also,

an advisory committee of representative riders was organized for the weekly bus that transports friends and visitors to the Smyrna Correctional Institution; the fare was raised to cover expenses. A special task force has worked to support expansion of the correctional chaplaincy staff in Delaware by 4.5 full-time, professionally trained chaplains.

Goal II: Strengthen ecumenical awareness through relationships and activities of denominations and congregations. This goal is our priority for 1984 and 1985. A task force on local ecumenism provides support and direction to this effort. These actions were facilitated: the organization of the Sussex County Academy of Adult Religious Education; a coalition of ministeria in Somerset County to plan for the arrival of a new 3000-bed correctional institution (1987); a five-evening Lenten program in the Pike Creek Valley (New Castle County - four churches, 320 attendance). On a smaller scale, DEA helped initiate expanded ecumenical activity in the Northeast Parish (Claymont), the reactivation of the "9th Ward" ministerium (Wilmington), an ecumenical youth ministry in the Harrington area, a possible expansion of the Seaford Ministerium to an association of churches including laypersons, and a nutrition ministry in Cecil County.

Goal III: Develop a strong theological rationale for ecumenical action. As its first effort, the Faith and Order Committee is about to finalize, publicize, and promote a statement on peace and justice. In other action, a course has been offered to catechists on the World Council convergence statement, Baptism, Eucharist, and Ministry.

The DEA office, through the able service of Judy Berry, administrative secretary (and bookkeeper as of July 1), provides day-to-day linkage of persons working ecumenically, duplicating services in the machine room, and an up-to-date church mailing list to members and approved organizations.

Major expectations for 1985 are continued emphasis on local ecumenism and the presentation of a workshop on "Christian Growth in Faith," October 12 (north) and 13 (south), the Reverend Dr. John H. Westerhoff, III, keynote speaker.

COMMISSION ON EQUITABLE SALARIES

The Commission on Equitable Salaries has continued its tradition of giving fair and reasonable financial assistance to those pastors whose charges are unable to provide adequate compensation for the pastoral services they receive. In 1984, pastors in 24 charges received salary supplements of \$57,116, plus related pension fund contributions of \$7,313, for a total of \$64,429. The distribution of these funds is shown below.

Although the Conference budget has traditionally provided some funds to the Board of Global Ministries for "bricks and mortar" in new church development projects, no funds have been allocated for salary support in such cases. It now has been agreed between the Board of Global Ministries and the Commission on Equitable Salaries that the Board will continue to handle the physical facilities in new church development projects and this Commission will seek the budget funding to handle the related salary support requirements. Accordingly, a request for salary support funds for new church development has been made for 1986.

In evaluating salary support requests, the Commission considers, among other things, whether or not the charge is providing adequate housing for the pastor. Although the Discipline (para. 255.3f) requires the Administrative Board of the local church to provide its pastor with adequate housing, we review cases where the housing is either substandard or non-existent. Accordingly, we currently are undertaking a study of the housing problem in the Peninsula Conference and hope to have a recommendation for the Annual Conference at an early date.

In recent years, we have been upgrading our minimum salary levels, hoping to bring them in line with neighboring Conferences by 1987. The five Conferences that we monitor are: Baltimore, Southern New Jersey, Eastern, Central, and Western Pennsylvania. Based upon their past actions, we expect the 1986 average minimum salary for these Conferences to be \$13,902. If our minimum salary recommendation for 1986 (10% increase over the current \$12,250) is adopted by the Annual Conference, we will be 3% short of the expected average of our neighboring Conferences and should reach parity by 1987, as targeted. The Commission recommends the following action:

RESOLVED, that the minimum salary (as defined by the 1982 Annual Conference) in 1986 for full-time Conference, probationary, and associate members be \$13,475.

RESOLVED FURTHER, that the minimum salary for student pastors in 1986 be \$9,200 (same as in 1985), unless some smaller figure is agreed upon by the student, charge, and district superintendent as being appropriate for the work to be performed.

Conference policy requires that pastors be reimbursed for miles traveled on church business. The Commission recommends the following action:

RESOLVED, that reimbursement for travel expense during 1986 shall be 20.5 cents per mile for the first 15,000 miles of business and 11 cents per mile beyond 15,000 miles, said rates being in compliance with IRS policy.

RESOLVED FURTHER, that all pastors will utilize the reimbursement form to be supplied by the Conference Business Office, so as to standardize the reporting.

Following through the Conference-approved agenda for the Conference Commission on Religion and Race, the Commission was able to do the following:

- a) Had a retreat at Drayton Manor led by Evelyn Fitzgerald from General Church Commission on Religion and Race for the training of the Peninsula Conference Commission.
- b) The Monitoring Committee affirmed its role in looking at Conference Boards, Homes, and other supported agencies.
- c) Drafted an Affirmative Action Policy Plan for the Peninsula Annual Conference.
- d) Sensitized and educated District Directors, two Directors being appointed on each District. As a result the attendance and program of the Martin Luther King, Jr. Symposium was a success with just as many whites as blacks in attendance.
- e) For the purpose of open itineracy and cross-racial appointments the CORR has been intentional in that a major Retreat at Drayton Manor led by Anthony Shipley, a District Superintendent and consultant from the Detroit Conference, in conjunction with the cabinet, Bishop, Board of Ordained Ministry, and Wilmington Task Force met to focus on concerns surrounding cross-racial appointments and to develop a policy document on cross-racial appointments.

The Agenda has been demanding and challenging as we seek to combat the vicious enemy of racism, but our God has been there to strengthen us and guide us.

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INTRODUCTION

The policy of open itinerancy has been set forth in our Book of Discipline over the years. In the Peninsula Annual Conference we have come to a point of being more intentional in implementing this in terms of cross-racial appointments. This document is the result of a study implemented by the Conference Commission on Religion and Race on order of the 1984 Annual Conference. It is now provided to churches for their study and implementation and to create an awareness and to do some consciousness-raising in terms of the whole matter of itinerancy.

This document is being presented to the 1985 Annual Conference for both study and for the implementation of the recommendations contained therein. It is designed to be shared by clergy, local churches, the cabinet and the Boards and Commissions of the Conference. There are suggestions for specific steps that each group may take to improve the climate for cross-racial appointments.

Appendix numbered I contains specific recommendations incorporating the sense of this study by the four groups involved. It is before you for consideration and debate and hopefully adoption, as designed by the Conference Commission on Religion and Race.

BIBLICAL-THEOLOGICAL REFLECTION

(1) Scripture affirms that all persons are created in the image and likeness of God (Gen. 1:26-27); all are accordingly of equal value in God's sight (Ref. Acts. 17:26). Persons are to be accepted and valued regardless of race, color, ethnic or national origin, social status, educational attainment, or economic condition because they are created in the image of God and endowed by God with dignity and worth (Psalm 8:4-6).

(2) The biblical-theological rationale for cross-racial appointments in an inclusive church is also based on the concept of the church as the "body of Christ." According to that prominent image of the church, Christians may be different in talents, gifts, background, etc., but nevertheless comprise the one entity of the church whose members are interdependent in function and contribution (1 Cor. 12:12-28; Rom. 12:4-8).

(3) The oneness and unity of believers in Christ is further underlined by the recurring message of the New Testament that social, ethnic and other human differences are transcended in Christ (Gal. 3:28; Eph. 2:13-14; Col. 3:11; Acts 10:28, 34-35).

(4) Scripture asserts not only the ability of Christ to eliminate barriers that divide and separate (Eph. 2:14), but also appeals to believers to maintain Christian unity which the Holy Spirit brings (Eph. 4:3-6). In the latter passage, the writer outlines seven essential unities on which our oneness is based.

(5) Scripture also affirms the pre-eminence of love as the chief attribute of God (1 John 4:7-8, 16). Christians are bound together in sacred covenant to love one another (John 15:12; 1 John 4:11). A system of inter-church relationships which intentionally or through indifference excludes some believers from participation in the life and ministry of a local church simply on the basis of racial differences violates the spirit of the biblical imperative of love.

(6) Cross-racial appointments afford the opportunity for pastors and congregations of diverse talents, gifts, graces, and ethnic backgrounds to enrich the total fellowship of believers in the "body of Christ."

THE ROLE OF THE HOLY SPIRIT

(7) We affirm that the Holy Spirit has a vital place in the efforts towards racial inclusiveness in the peninsula Conference. As congregations engage themselves in prayerful preparation to experience new attitudes of racial understanding and acceptance, they should seek the guidance of the Holy Spirit.

(8) Through the study of the Scriptures under the influence of the Holy Spirit, barriers may be broken down which might otherwise obstruct the mutual acceptance of white and ethnic minority Christians.

(9) It is recommended that prayer groups be formed in local churches particularly those selected for potential cross-racial appointments and that biblical passages such as those dealing with the unity of the church, the High Priestly prayer of

Jesus in St. John's Gospel, the Pauline teachings on the Body of Christ, the message of reconciliation, along with other passages on inclusiveness in Christ be studied afresh.

(10) Evangelism chairpersons in local churches should urge local Councils on Ministries to participate in joint prayer and/or study fellowships across racial lines.

(11) Individuals, small groups, and leaders of worship are constrained to pray that the Holy Spirit will continue to foster and strengthen the racial unity of the Peninsula Conference and the United Methodist Church in general.

(12) Pastors are challenged to lift up biblical references to Christian unity in Sunday worship services, sermon opportunities, and study periods.

KNOWING THE REAL NEEDS OF MEMBERS IN CROSS-RACIAL SITUATIONS

(13) There is a policy in place for the retention of pastors in the Peninsula Annual Conference. That policy is our ordination covenant to go where assigned and to serve until reassigned. At the present time there are more opportunities for assignment among white clergypersons than for ethnic clergypersons.

(14) This policy needs to be supplemented to deal with three concerns: 1) mobility, 2) personal satisfaction and monetary awards and 3) a place for exploring career possibilities within and without the Annual Conference.

(15) Providing mobility for ethnic pastors must involve the development of congregations that have potential for ministry to become viable appointments. We must also make available cross-racial appointment opportunities.

(16) When such appointments are to be made serious consideration should be given to such factors as these:

(17) In the case of appointments across racial lines, the Board of Ordained Ministry and the receiving District Superintendent shall arrange for such pastors to gain an adequate understanding of the following:

- (a) the general social, economic, and cultural context of the congregation(s) to be served;
- (b) the specific needs of parishioners, such as employment, housing and other necessities; and
- (c) the relevant hopes, concerns, struggles and aspirations of the particular racial community.

(18) To assist in this process the outgoing pastor and the District Superintendent shall prepare a statement of social realities and the felt needs of the local congregation(s).

(19) Care shall be taken not to exaggerate on the one hand nor underestimate on the other hand the cultural differences between the particular charge and other ethnic groups in the community.

CONCERNING EXISTING MODELS

(20) The Commission on Religion and Race of the Peninsula Conference shall seek information concerning existing models and work instruments of inclusive churches as far as they relate to the following:

- a. pastors involved in cross-racial appointments;
- b. integrated congregations; and
- c. larger cooperative inter-ethnic parishes.

(21) It shall request such information from the following entities:

- a. The General Commission on Religion and Race
- b. The Council of Bishops (through Bishop Yeakel)

c. The National Council of Churches

d. Conference Council Directors

(22) The Commission shall also request information from all pastors and churches in the Peninsula Conference who have been part of an inclusive church at any time. (Note: See Guide for Discussion of the Cross-Racial Appointment Experience, Appendix II).

(23) A Task Force appointed by the Annual Conference Council on Ministries, including a representative from the Cabinet, the Commission on Religion and Race, B.M.C.R., B.O.O.M. and from each District Task Force of the Commission on Religion and Race shall:

- (a) Select from existing models those which might serve as suitable patterns for our Conference.
- (b) Identify elements of existing patterns which raise cautions for our Conference.
- (c) Identify elements of existing patterns which are conducive to successful inclusive appointments.
- (d) Present this information and their recommendation for implementation in the Peninsula Conference to the Cabinet, Commission on Religion and Race, District Task Forces of the Commission on Religion and Race, Board of Ordained Ministry, the Conference Council on Ministries and ask each of the above to report back to the Task Force.
- (e) Using the data from existing models, the recommendations for implementation from the Task Force and the responses from the Cabinet, Commission on Religion and Race, District Task Forces, Board of Ordained Ministry and the Conference Council on Ministries, the Task Force shall present a recommendation for specific models of inclusive churches to the Conference Council on Ministries which will refine the recommendation and present to the Annual Conference for adoption by Annual Conference 1986.

FINANCES

(24) Potential sources of money to facilitate racial inclusiveness in the Peninsula Annual Conference are as follows:

- (a) EMLC funds
- (b) Ministerial Education Fund monies (Annual Conference allocation)
- (c) Annual operating budget of the Conference. Requests may be made by CORR or BOOM through COOM to CFA.
- (d) General Board of Global Ministries (National Division funding available to upgrade parsonages)
- (e) Foundations: requests made for specific projects.
- (f) Wesley Theological Seminary: funds for training and Continuing Education.

(25) Such funds will be needed for the following purposes:

- (a) Training for pastors and local church laity to be involved in cross-racial appointments.
- (b) Parsonage improvements.
- (c) Salary supplements.
- (d) Funds should be provided for stewardship programs quite apart from salary supplements and other monies, in order that affected local churches may come to a true stewardship understanding of their responsibility for ongoing pastoral support.

- (e) Materials, "tools," etc.
- (f) Office and administrative expenses including typing, printing, etc.
- (g) Miscellaneous.

THE RESPONSIBILITY FOR IMPLEMENTING
CROSS-RACIAL APPOINTMENTS

(26) The implementation of cross-racial appointments is the responsibility of all areas of the Peninsula Conference: The districts and the entire membership, the administrative family and the local church.

(27) Open itinerancy is an integral factor of the appointment system according to the Book of Discipline of the United Methodist Church (see Appendix III). In practice, however, the sociological forces at work in our geographical area tend to exert pressure which weakens its effectiveness. The present policy of the Bishop and the Cabinet is that every charge is an "open appointment," and pastors will be assigned without regard to race or sex.

(28) The specifics of the role and responsibilities of the Cabinet, Board of Ordained Ministry and Commission on Religion and Race are spelled out in detail in other areas of this policy statement.

(29) But the responsibilities do not stop with the three groups listed above. The Board of Discipleship (Divisions of Education, Evangelism, Stewardship, and Worship) has a significant responsibility to supply tools, resources, consultants, that can be helpful in training of clergy and laity. As support of the Board of Discipleship's role, attention should be given to resources, and personnel at the general level, especially in the areas of curriculum and worship training and resources.

(30) The B.O.G.M. must be sensitive to parsonage and building needs for effective ministry. The study "Ten Years Later" highlights the needs for parsonage upgrading and educational and Koinonia area within the ethnic church. The Committee on Congregational Development must be sensitive to the need for new ethnic congregational development in suburban and urban areas where white congregations are not ready or willing to become inclusive.

(31) The Council on Finance and Administration must not only seek funds within current resources, but must make allowances for whatever developments might occur as the cross-racial appointments are made.

(32) Other institutions that can provide insightful information are:

- Wesley Theological Seminary - Faculty
- Urban Institute
- Alban Institute
- Center for Parish Development
- National Commission on Religion and Race
- Wilmington District Task Force
- Methodist Action Program
- Neighborhood House

AN IMPLEMENTATION PROCESS

(33) The policy of open itinerancy shall be implemented through the following steps:

1. The Cabinet will help us to utilize the existing covenant (Appendix III).
2. Development of an agenda by the Commission on Religion and Race for District Conferences call for the purpose of educating and challenging local church leaders to understand the United Methodist covenant of open itinerancy.
3. All pastors shall attend one professional growth seminar of 76-92 hours dealing with racism, inclusiveness and cross-racial appointments to be developed by Board of the Ordained Ministry and offered annually through 1992.

4. Wherever possible the Cabinet will develop a 45-minute sub-district experience for Cluster Charge Conferences.
5. The Commission on Religion and Race will develop a methodology to assist the Cabinet in the implementation of Par. 531 (Criteria for Appointment) in the Book of Discipline with specific reference to cross-racial appointments.
6. By June 1986, the Board of Ordained Ministry shall develop guidelines for adoption by the Annual Conference to assure greater equity in cross-racial appointments with regard to compensation and status.
7. Each District Superintendent shall begin dialogue by the end of 1985 with at least three charges in their district believed to be candidates for development of cross-racial appointments.
8. Each District Superintendent, with the Commission on Religion and Race, shall by June 1986, begin training and preparing three charges per district to receive a pastor of different race at the time of the next pastoral change.
9. After the appointment is confirmed and before the appointment is announced, the new pastor and the congregation will come together for covenant.
10. The Cabinet with Board of Ordained Ministry shall develop by June 1986 support processes and structures for pastors, their families and congregations involved in cross-racial appointments.

(34) Suggested criteria for the selection of churches where a cross-racial appointment could occur:

1. Have exhibited a readiness through a clear statement of purpose for their existence, and
2. An understanding and commitment to doctrine and discipline of the Church.
3. The Church has dealt with real attitudes, especially negative ones, and
4. Is willing to have training in altering behaviors which are obstacles to cross-racial appointments.
5. The Church will be willing to begin working at least six months before the anticipated appointment and will agree to an evaluation six months after the appointment has been made.

SUPPORT AND PREPARATION FOR CLERGY
INVOLVED IN CROSS-RACIAL APPOINTMENTS

(35) **PROFESSIONAL GROWTH SEMINAR:** The Board of Ordained Ministry will design Professional Growth Seminars to deal with racism, cultural awareness, inclusiveness and cross-racial appointments. As indicated elsewhere in this document such seminars are expected to be a minimum of three days in length and offered annually beginning in the 1985-86 Conference year and continuing through 1992. Staffing of these seminars will be the responsibility of the Board of Ordained Ministry.

(36) **RECRUITMENT OF ETHNIC MINORITY PERSONS FOR ORDAINED MINISTRY:** There are three areas in recruitment that need to be a part of our thinking as we seek to find the best persons to serve as ordained ministers in the Peninsula Conference.

1. **Resources:** The Recruitment Committee of the Board of Ordained Ministry shall provide resources for recruitment. Presently available resources, such as "The Christian as Minister," "Ethnic Minorities in Ordained Ministry," and "Women in Ordained Ministry," and locally-developed or adapted resources shall be made available to congregations, high schools, colleges, and local agencies dealing with career planning and development. Resources promoting Peninsula Annual Conference specifically shall be made available through seminaries.

The Recruitment Committee of the B.O.O.M. shall emphasize to pastors the need to hold to the high standards of ministry as role models for others who might experience a call to ordained ministry.

2. **Training:** The Recruitment Committee of the B.O.O.M. shall make available training for pastors, P.P.R.C. chairpersons, and Secretaries of Enlistment to help them understand "call" and "itinerancy" and to challenge those people to be sensitive to God's call to ministry. They shall provide models and programs, for example "Challenge Sunday" (an annual worship occasion to challenge congregations with the call to ministry and individuals with the call to ordained ministry).
3. **Support:** The Recruitment Committee of the B.O.O.M. shall encourage and assist Wesley Foundations to build support groups for students considering or declared for ordained ministry to give specific attention to the needs and concerns of those students.

The Cabinet normally has available pastoral appointments for students in college and seminary. These charges will be sensitized by the Cabinet to the primacy of the student's educational work over parish work.

The Counseling Elder Committee of the B.O.O.M. will emphasize in training Counseling Elders the need for student pastors to understand the primacy of the student's educational work over parish work.

The Scholarship Committee of the B.O.O.M. shall locate and make available adequate funds (in comparison to what other Conferences provide) for seminary student scholarships.

(37) RECRUITMENT AND TRAINING FOR CROSS-RACIAL APPOINTMENTS:

1. **Recruitment:** Ideally, all pastors are available and ready to serve wherever appointed. However, as we begin to make more cross-racial appointments, it will be necessary to identify those pastors who are especially interested in and committed to cross-racial appointments, and then determine which of these are best suited for the task. Recruitment of pastors for cross-racial appointments should coincide with the readiness of corresponding churches to accept these appointments.

The Board of Ordained Ministry, Commission on Religion and Race, the Bishop and Cabinet should offer seminars/workshops on cross-racial appointments that will help all pastors identify issues (those that are roadblocks) and begin to deal with them.

Recruitment will be easier if good training and preparation is offered and on-going support is provided. The best recruitment tool will be success stories from pastors and churches who have good experiences with these appointments. Such stories must be told.

2. **Training:** Training for cross-racial appointments should include: Worship, History, Culture, Life-style, Self-awareness, Church Organization, Leadership Styles, and Experiential Learning (attending worship services and funerals, etc.). Use should be made of persons (both lay and clergy) with cross-racial local church experiences.

Training should be offered:

- a. generally - for all clergy,
- b. at the time of a cross-racial appointment,
- c. after six months or one year. Joint training session should be offered - including Blacks preparing to serve White churches and Whites preparing to serve Black churches.

There is also a need to train the laity in how to accept cross-racial pastorates.

(38) ASSIGNMENT OF A MENTOR TO EACH PERSON APPOINTED CROSS-RACIALLY: A minister who was appointed cross-racially would be assigned a mentor. The mentor may or

may not be a person of the same race as the minister. The competence and ability of the person to relate to the minister is the prime consideration in being selected as a mentor. The mentor shall be selected by the Bishop and Cabinet in collaboration with the supervising district superintendent and the minister involved.

The mentor would meet with the minister at least bi-monthly to share what is happening in the minister's cross-racial appointment. The mentor should be responsible for making sure that the minimal bi-monthly meetings are held. The mentor would be a sounding board who would react to the minister's goals and plans for his/her ministry. The mentor would be a person who listens, empathizes, and responds to the minister's enthusiasm and joy, hopes and fears, hurts and pains. The mentor would be a person who is present to clarify misconceptions and misunderstandings, especially those rooted in cultural and racial differences. The mentor would be in a position to sound the alert for problems and also to affirm.

(39) SUPPORT FOR LAITY AND CLERGY IN CROSS-RACIAL APPOINTMENTS: The lay leadership of eight key leaders and the appointed clergy from two congregations with cross-racial appointments would be paired together in a support group. The group of 18 persons would be convened by the supervising District Superintendent or the group process facilitator. The decision about the leadership could be made Conference-wide or by each participating pair of churches. The group would meet monthly for the first 6-12 months and then set their own schedule that would be on a regular basis.

The purpose of the group would be to affirm, strengthen and develop positive relationships among those experiencing the cross-racial appointments. This would be an opportunity to share concerns and frustrations, to work through and beyond them. It would provide an opportunity to listen, empathize, respect, appreciate, and love one another. This also would be the setting to help this support group explore and strategize ways of being affirmative and supportive with each respective congregation and ways of helping that congregation to work through and beyond their concerns and frustrations in moving toward mutual respect, appreciation and positive ministry together.

(40) CAREER PROTECTION FOR CLERGY IN CROSS-RACIAL APPOINTMENTS: A cross-racial appointment is a step that involves many risks for a pastor and his/her family which could lead to failure. This could be very difficult in terms of the minister psychologically and his/her family and in terms of future appointments.

1. Psychological Protection: The stress of the minister and her/his family could cause personal and/or family problems. Therefore, the B.O.O.M. should make available financial support for counseling and ready access to counseling on an anonymous basis. The minister and/or the family of the minister should be able to go directly to the counselor with the bill being paid by the B.O.O.M. without knowledge of who was counseled.
2. Career Protection: The assessment of the minister and his/her ministry should not necessarily be regarded as a professional failure if the cross-racial appointment does not work. The Bishop and Cabinet are urged to be sensitive to this factor in such a way that it does not reflect negatively on future appointments.

(41) DEVELOPING APPROPRIATE REWARDS FOR PASTORS IN CROSS-RACIAL APPOINTMENTS: During the end of the twentieth century and around the first part of the twenty-first century, for a clergy member of the Peninsula Conference to offer himself/herself for a cross-racial appointment is to accept the risks and challenge of a frontier.

It is the desire of the Peninsula Conference to tangibly support and reward the clergy who train and commit themselves to such a minority of leadership.

Therefore, the Conference will support and reward those who are accepted by the cabinet for such appointments.

An ethnic minority pastor appointed to an ethnic majority church will be remunerated at least at the level of his/her predecessor. At the end of a pastorate of a minimum of six years, (health reasons excepted) should the ethnic minority pastor prefer to return to an ethnic minority church, salary level of the pastor shall be at least maintained by Equitable Salary Funds with provisions for

an annual increase based on cost of living and merit percentages. The merit percentage shall be based upon the percentage of increase of the D.A.C. minus the official cost-of-living figure.

When an ethnic majority pastor is appointed to an ethnic minority church, his/her compensation package shall be equal to the ethnic majority charge he/she is leaving plus the average increase of all those being moved in the Conference that year, supported if necessary by Equitable Salary Funds. His/her compensation shall be increased each year by the formula in the preceding paragraph while serving the ethnic minority charge where there are not resources to carry the full economic load.

After a minimum appointment of six year (health reasons expected) should he/she desire to return to an ethnic majority charge, he/she shall be appointed to a charge which can carry his/her salary package, or his/her salary package shall be maintained by Equitable Salary Funds.

Such pastors as described above shall successfully complete official Conference training programs for such appointments and shall commit themselves to negotiating professional goals for pastoral service with the pastor-parish committee each year, and be evaluated in his/her performance as measure by the goals. The District Superintendent shall preside at the negotiation of the goals, and prepare a personal evaluation of the pastor's effectiveness for the cabinet. There shall be a consultant or mentor whose responsibility is to counsel the pastor on a minimum of a bi-weekly basis.

Just as a pastor should produce to merit and receive support so should the charge. Any charge receiving Equitable Salary Funds as a result of a cross-racial appointment will receive special assistance in resource development to the end that the charge grows to the point of resourcing its own leadership. If the charge is unable to reach the level of self-resourcing in six years, the financial support from all sources will need to be evaluated annually for continuance.

APPENDIX NO. I

WHEREAS, following discussion of open itinerancy at the 1984 Annual Conference, a motion was approved requesting the Commission on Religion and Race to meet with the new Bishop to share the concerns expressed:

AND WHEREAS, members of the Commission on Religion and Race, Board of Ordained Ministry, Wilmington District Task Force on Racial Inclusiveness did meet with the Bishop and Cabinet in November 1984 and agreed to hold a Workshop in February 1985 to develop guidelines and procedures for selection, preparation and support of pastors and congregations for cross-racial appointments;

AND WHEREAS, such workshop was held, AND WHEREAS, Bishop Yeakel has publicly affirmed his commitment to open itinerancy as an integral part of the covenants of ordination and the nature of the local church as expressed in the Book of Discipline. (Par. 529)

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Peninsula Conference implement a policy of cross-racial appointments through the following steps:

1. With the intent of educating and challenging local church leaders to understand the United Methodist Covenant of open itinerancy we request that District Conferences for this purpose be held no later than the end of March 1986.
2. All pastors shall attend one professional growth seminar of 76-92 hours dealing with racism, inclusiveness and cross-racial appointments to be developed by Board of Ordained Ministry and offered annually through 1992.
3. Each District Superintendent dedicate 20-30 minutes of each Charge Conference in 1985 to a discussion of steps being taken by each pastor and Pastor-Parish Relations Committee to prepare for cross-racial appointments.
4. Each District Superintendent begin dialogue by the end of 1985 with at least three charges in their district believed to be candidates for development of cross-racial appointments.

5. Each District Superintendent, with the Commission on Religion and Race shall by June 1986, begin training and preparing three charges per district to receive a pastor of different race at the time of the next pastoral change.
6. By June 1986, the Board of Ordained Ministry shall develop guidelines for adoption by the Annual Conference to assure greater equity in cross-racial appointments with regard to compensation and status.
7. The Cabinet with Board of Ordained Ministry shall develop by June 1986, support processes and structures for pastors, their families and congregations involved in cross-racial appointments.

APPENDIX NO. II

GUIDE FOR DISCUSSION OF THE CROSS-RACIAL APPOINTMENT EXPERIENCE

1. How were you (your church) selected for cross-racial appointment? Volunteered, agreed to a proposal, or given no choice?
2. Please describe any especially helpful prior training or experiences which aided the pastor or the church in adjusting to the cross-racial/cultural relationship. For example, pulpit exchanges, seminars, seminary classes.
3. How much lead time did you have to prepare?
4. How much lead time do you feel you should have had?
5. What did you do to prepare?
6. With the benefit of hindsight, are there things you would have done differently to prepare, assuming you had the lead time you feel you needed?
7. Please describe any factors or circumstances unrelated to the cross-racial pastorate which impacted, pro or con, the effectiveness of your cross-racial pastoral experience. For example, pastor's special talents, health, age, etc; growth or decline or other change of neighborhood or church membership.
8. What was the racial mix of the congregation at the time of the appointment? Of the community? (Give % estimates).
9. What special organized support did your church give the pastor to help relate to different racial/cultural customs and practices, and deal with members who did not welcome a pastor of another race?
10. What special organized support did your church give the pastor's family to help them relate to the community, and deal with resistance?
11. With the benefit of hindsight, is there any special organized support for pastor and family that would have been helpful?
12. What positive things happened in the lives of the pastor, pastor's family and the congregation as a result of the cross-racial appointment?
13. What suggestions do you have to improve the education, preparation and support of pastors and churches for cross-racial appointments?

APPENDIX NO. III

COVENANT

CONSTITUTION

Par. 57, Article X - "The Bishops shall appoint, after consultation with the District Superintendents, ministers to the charges;...

DISCIPLINE

Section VIII. Appointment-Making.

Par. 529. Responsibility - 1. Pastors and clergy in appointments beyond t'

local church shall be appointed by a Bishop, who is empowered to make and fix all appointments in the episcopal area within which the Annual Conference is a part. Appointments are to be made with consideration of the gifts and graces of those appointed, to the needs, characteristics, and opportunities of congregations and institutions, and with faithfulness to our commitment to an open itinerancy. Open itinerancy means appointments are made without regard to race, ethnic origin, sex, color, or age, except for the provisions of mandatory retirement. Through appointment-making, the connexional nature of the United Methodist system is made visible.

Par. 414. Qualifications for Election to Probationary Membership.

7. Each must have been examined in written form covering the areas indicated and approved by the Board of Ordained Ministry with respect to the following questions:

a. Theology and Vocation -

- (1) Describe your personal basic beliefs and experience as a Christian.
- (2) How do you conceive your vocation as a minister? Are you presently convinced that the ordained ministry is the best way to fulfill your response to God? Explain.
- (3) How do you understand the theological tasks of a United Methodist minister, with special reference to Part II of the Book of Discipline?
- (4) What is your understanding of the Kingdom of God and the nature and mission of the church today?

b. The Practice of Ministry -

- (1) Describe and evaluate your personal gifts for ministry. What would be your areas of strength and areas in which you need to be strengthened?
- (2) Are you willing to relate yourself to all persons without regard to race, color, national origin, or social status?
- (3) Will you regard all pastoral conversations of a confessional nature as a trust between the person concerned and God?

c. The Christian Life -

- (1) What is your understanding of the Christian life as set forth in the Articles of Religion, the statement of Our Theological Task, and the Social Principles in the Discipline?
- (2) For the sake of the mission of Jesus Christ in the world and the most effective witness to the Christian gospel, and in consideration of your influence as a minister, are you willing to make a complete dedication of yourself to the highest ideals of the Christian life; and to this end will you agree to exercise responsible self-control by personal habits conducive to bodily health, mental and emotional maturity, fidelity in marriage and celibacy in singleness*, social responsibility, and growth in grace and the knowledge and love of God?
- (3) What do you anticipate to be the risks and sacrifices entailed in serving in the United Methodist ministry?

* See Judicial Council Decision 542.

- (4) Indicate in some detail how your close personal relationships affect your ministry.
- (5) Mismanagement of personal finances may detract from your effectiveness as a minister. Are you presently in debt so as to interfere with your work, or have you obligations to others which will make it difficult for you to live on the salary you may receive?

Par. 424. Historic Examination. - The Bishop as chief pastor shall engage those seeking to be admitted in serious self-searching and prayer to prepare them for their examination before the conference. At the time of the examination the Bishop shall also explain to the Conference the historic nature of the following questions and seek to interpret their spirit and intent. The questions are these and any others which may be thought necessary:

1. Have you faith in Christ?
2. Are you going on to perfection?
3. Do you expect to be made perfect in love in this life?
4. Are you earnestly striving after it?
5. Are you resolved to devote yourself wholly to God and his work?
6. Do you know the General Rules of our Church?
7. Will you keep them?
8. Have you studied the doctrines of The United Methodist Church?
9. After full examination do you believe that our doctrines are in harmony with the Holy Scriptures?
10. Will you preach and maintain them?
11. Have you studied our form of Church discipline and polity?
12. Do you approve our Church government and polity?
13. Will you support and maintain them?
14. Will you diligently instruct the children in every place?
15. Will you visit from house to house?
16. Will you recommend fasting or abstinence, both by precept and example?
17. Are you determined to employ all your time in the work of God?
18. Are you in debt so as to embarrass you in your work?
19. Will you observe the following directions?
 - a. Be diligent. Never be unemployed. Never be triflingly employed. Never trifle away time; neither spend any more time at any one place than is strictly necessary.
 - b. Be punctual. Do everything exactly at the time. And do not mend our rules, but keep them; not for wrath, but for conscience' sake.

BOOK OF WORSHIP - Ordination Service.

Page 50 -

And now, that this congregation of Christ here assembled may also understand your purpose in these things, and that this your promise may the more move you to perform your duties, you shall answer plainly to these things which we, in the name of God and his Church, shall ask of you touching the same:

Do you believe in your heart that you are truly called, according to the will of our Lord Jesus Christ, to the ministry of elders?

I do so believe.

Are you persuaded that the Holy Scriptures contain all truth required for eternal salvation through faith in Jesus Christ? And are you determined out of the same Holy Scriptures so to instruct the people committed to

your charge that they may enter into eternal life?

I am so persuaded and determined, by God's grace.

REPORT

GENERAL CHAIRPERSON

WASHINGTON AREA GENERAL CONFERENCE LOCAL COMMITTEE

On Wednesday, May 10, 1984, as the General Conference began its afternoon session in the Civic Center at Baltimore, special recognition was given to our Local Committee. As the General Chairman I was given the opportunity to speak briefly. I said, "If every person in the Washington Area, the Baltimore and Peninsula Conferences, who has helped to entertain the Conference were here this afternoon, each delegate would probably have at least one host or hostess by your side." There were 1,000 voting delegates. At least this many of our local people contributed in some manner toward the formidable task of entertaining the Bicentennial General Conference.

The Executive Committee of the Local Committee numbered thirty-five. There were twenty-two sub-committees with memberships of varying sizes. In addition, hundreds of persons volunteered their services as guides, secretaries, interpreters, packet stuffers, registration aides, communion stewards, ushers, organists, transportation providers, tour planners, cookie bakers, refreshment breakers, lounge hostesses, equipment securers, movers, welcomees, information booth attendants, worship leaders, and special program planners — to name only some of the different things needing to be done. Also, since the Council of Bishops met in Wilmington the entire week prior to General Conference there was a large group who focused their efforts in that direction. The gala luncheon at Wesley College and the worship service at Barratt's Chapel provided the final, superb touches of that week's schedule.

Since the 1984 Annual Conferences convened only a few weeks after the adjournment of the General Conference, it was not possible to present a final report at that time. In fact, a number of months were required to complete all the responsibilities relating to the records and financial matters. That is the reason this report appears in the 1985 Conference Journal of the Baltimore and Peninsula Conferences.

Two thick notebooks filled with materials that documented all our work were prepared and sent to the Commission on the General Conference. They are already being used by the Local Committee in St. Louis as it begins to prepare for the 1988

General Conference. Duplicates of these notebooks will be given to the Lovely Lane Museum where other items of historical interest developed by our Committee have been deposited.

Attached to this report is a financial statement that explains the source of all receipts and how our resources were expended. In those few instances where no expenses are listed it simply means that those sub-committees were able to do their work without requiring funds. In each instance we tried to exemplify good stewardship while not skipping on the necessities to fulfill our stated goals.

One of our major goals from the outset was to plan a time of inspiration and entertainment through music for the delegates and officials of the General Conference mid-way through its schedule on Saturday night. Happily we were able to present this musical highlight on two occasions, with a sold-out public concert the following Monday night. The Bicentennial Concert, featuring the work, "Love Divine - 1984," which we commissioned Mr. Norman Scribner to compose, was a tremendous success. The Baltimore Symphonic Orchestra and the Washington Choral Arts Society filled the new Meyerhoff Ball with thrilling sound and song. We are particularly grateful that the late Bishop W. Earl Ledden, whose substantial gift helped underwrite the cost, was able to attend the premier performance along with members of his family.

We are pleased to note that two complete sets of performance materials have been placed in the Baltimore Conference Resource Library for preservation and possible use by local churches or groups of churches. United Methodist congregations in the Washington Area may borrow these materials without cost, but others outside the area will be charged a nominal rental and royalty fee.

Although I have said "Thank You" many times to many people who contributed to the success of this once-in-a-lifetime venture, I say it again in conclusion. I am also deeply grateful to Bishop D. Frederick Wertz for his confidence and support, and for graciously sharing with me the privilege of giving leadership to this significant contribution to the life and work of our United Methodist Church.

I. PREFACE/BASIC CONCEPTS

PREFACE

This brochure has been prepared for the use of ministers of the Peninsula Annual Conference in guiding those who are interested in the United Methodist ministry, and for the benefit of any one planning to enter the ministry of the United Methodist Church and for those currently in ministry in the United Methodist Church.

The Board of Ordained Ministry reminds each pastor of a charge that the work of ministerial recruitment and guidance begins in the local church, and its inception is largely determined by the local minister. We therefore urge each pastor to acquaint himself/herself with the basic requirements for Conference membership and ordination so that he/she may convey this information to candidates.

Members of the Board of Ordained Ministry are available at all times to be of assistance to those seeking further information about ministerial training and the steps which lead to Conference membership and ordination.

The members and officers of The Board of Ordained Ministry are listed in the Peninsula Annual Conference Journal.

All paragraph references are found in the 1984 Discipline of The United Methodist Church.

BASIC CONCEPTS

The purpose of this document is to help interpret the current policies of the 1984 Discipline and to state the policies and procedures of the Board of Ordained Ministry of the Peninsula Annual Conference, which relate to the life and work of the Ordained Ministry.

This document is to be presented for adoption at the 1985 session of the Peninsula Annual Conference. It is presented to be the "operational manual" for the Board of Ordained Ministry. It is the desire of the Board of Ordained Ministry that this document be printed in the Conference Journal at the beginning of each quadrennium. It is assumed that these policies and procedures will be in force until changed by subsequent Annual Conferences or by changes in the Discipline.

II. ENTERING THE MINISTRY

STEPS INTO THE PENINSULA ANNUAL CONFERENCE

(A Modification of: Steps into the Ordained Ministry)

Upon hearing a call to ministry, the formal means through which a person moves toward ordination and Conference membership is the candidacy process as set forth in the Discipline (Par. 404-434). At different stages of the process, the candidate shall relate to the local congregation (1,2, and 5 below), the District Committee on Ordained Ministry (DOOM, 3-6 below), the Conference Board of Ordained Ministry (BOM, 7-10 below).

1. THE INQUIRING CANDIDATE (Par. 404.1)

The candidate should read the vocational guide "The Christian as Minister," and discuss it as part of consultation with his/her pastor or another United Methodist minister, and apply to the District Superintendent in writing.

2. THE DECLARED CANDIDATE (Par. 404.2)

The candidate consults with the pastor and Pastor-Parish Relations Committee, after formulating a written statement reflecting his/her call to ordained ministry and requesting recommendation for certification. The committee makes a report to the Charge Conference, which in turn makes a recommendation to the DOOM.

To be recommended to the DOOM, the candidate must (1) have been a full or affiliate member of the recommending congregation for one year; (2) have been graduated from an accredited high school or received a certificate of equivalency;

and (3) receive confirmation by a two-thirds majority of the Charge Conference.

3. THE EXPLORING CANDIDATE (Par. 404.3)

Declared candidates and candidates seeking to explore candidacy prior to a public declaration shall apply to the District Superintendent in writing for admission to candidacy studies.

At this time, a first interview with the DCOM is desirable, for mutual getting-acquainted.

The candidate sends his/her "Application for Candidacy Guidebook," along with \$50 (check or money order) to the DOM in Nashville, TN. The local Church is requested to pay the \$50. The Candidacy Guidebook is a notebook of exploratory studies of call, ministerial roles and functions, and other matters related to ordained ministry.

4. THE CERTIFIED CANDIDATE (Par. 404.4)

Candidates who have been recommended by their Charge Conference and have completed their exploration of ministry with a supervising pastor shall appear before the DCOM for examination.

Their supervising pastor will introduce the candidate to the DCOM, if they have not had a first interview. The supervising pastor presents a written report to the DCOM on the issues explored with the candidate. (This report will have been shared with the candidate beforehand.) The supervising pastor is only an observer during the interview, itself.

Following the examination, the DCOM votes on the confirmation of the candidate, and arranges for the presentation of the Certificate of Candidacy to the candidate.

5. CONTINUATION OF CANDIDACY (Par. 404.5)

The progress of certified candidates must be reviewed and candidacy renewed annually by the DCOM. The Charge Conference recommendation to renew the certificate is necessary each year.

Educational progress, either in a school, college, university, or school of theology listed by the University Senate or in the studies for the license for the local pastor through the five-year course of study under the DCOM, is an important part of the annual review for renewal.

An annual personal interview with the candidate by the DCOM is recommended.

6. LOCAL PASTOR STUDIES (Par. 406-411)

The Peninsula Annual Conference requires all persons to be appointed as pastors, either ordained or local pastors, to complete the license for local pastor studies. These studies are a three-week overview course in the practical aspects of the pastoral ministry. The BOM will pay for this course of study.

Candidates licensed as local pastors are eligible to serve as pastors under appointment while they continue as students or in the ministerial course of study. The DCOM grants the license as local pastor to candidates while they are under appointment, serving as a full-time, part-time, or student local pastor. The DCOM oversees the progress of local pastors in their studies.

Each local pastor will be assigned to a counseling elder by the Cabinet to provide supervision and counsel in fulfilling the requirements for associate and probationary membership.

For categories of local pastor see Par. 408.

7. PROBATIONARY MEMBERSHIP (Par. 418-419)

Candidates and student local pastors who have a Bachelor's degree, completed at least half of the work required for a M. Div. degree at an approved school of theology, and been recommended by the DCOM may be admitted into probationary membership in the Annual Conference, and ordained deacons.

Probationary members come under the nurture and guidance of the BOM, and continue to work with a counseling elder.

ORDINATION AS DEACON AND ADMISSION TO PROBATIONARY MEMBERSHIP:

The primary focus at this level is upon a candidate's readiness for ordained ministry: the development of beginning professional skills, a demonstrated ability to utilize resources for growth, and the vocational/professional commitment to ministry. A second evaluation of fitness issues can be obtained for evidence of increasing maturity and for making additional nurturing recommendations to the candidate. If there is considerable doubt about a candidate's qualifications, screening and/or referral decisions should be made at this level.

It is assumed that when a Board of Ordained Ministry recommends a candidate for orders as a deacon and admission to probationary membership that this person is deemed appointable. By appointable we mean that this person, in the judgment of the Board of Ordained Ministry, has the skills and capabilities to be appointed to the variety of appointments offered at this time by this Conference.

FROM SEMINARY CANDIDATES SEEKING PROBATIONARY MEMBERSHIP IN THE PENINSULA ANNUAL CONFERENCE must:

- a. Have been certified candidates for at least one year.
- b. Be recommended by 3/4 majority of DODM.
- c. Graduate from an approved college or university listed by the University Senate of the UMC, with a BA degree, or equivalent.
- d. Have completed at least 1/2 of the work required for the M. Div. or equivalent first professional degree in a school of theology approved by the University Senate of the UMC.
- e. Present on prescribed forms (provided by Conference BOM) an application form, a certificate of health from an approved physician, results of psychological testing (to be paid for by the Conference), a written sermon, a tape of worship service, a spiritual autobiography affirmation of faith.
- f. Be interviewed and recommended by the Board of Ordained Ministry (BOM) to the Ministerial Members in Full Connection of the Peninsula Annual Conference for election to Probationary Membership.
- g. Continue on Probation under the nurture and guidance of BOM for a minimum of two years. No person shall continue on probation beyond eight years. (They may revert to Local Pastor Status).
- h. Submit to annual review and evaluation of the BOM and be recommended for continuation on probation. (Par. 417).

FROM ASSOCIATE MEMBERSHIP (Par. 420). Associate Members who exhibit exceptional promise for the ministry may qualify for Probationary Membership in the Peninsula Annual Conference under the provisions of Par. 420, upon 3/4 majority vote of the ministerial members of the Conference in Full Connection, provided, that they have:

- a. Reached 35 years of age.
- b. Served full-time under appointment as an Associate Member for at least two years.
- c. A Baccalaureate degree from an approved institution.
- d. Completed two years of advanced study prescribed by the Division of Ordained Ministry beyond the 5-year Ministerial Course of Study required for admission to Associate Membership, in cooperation with the United Methodist Theological Schools, and
- e. Been recommended by 3/4 vote of the Cabinet and 3/4 vote of the BOM. Written statements of such recommendations shall be read to the Ministerial Members of the Annual Conference in Executive Session,

setting forth the exceptional reasons why this person should be admitted to Probationary Membership.

8. ASSOCIATE MEMBERSHIP (Par. 418-419)

Local pastors who have been under full-time appointment for four years, have completed the five-year ministerial course of study, and have 60 semester hours of credit toward a Bachelor's degree from an approved school may be admitted to associate membership in the Annual Conference, and ordained deacons. Associate members come under the nurture and guidance of the BOM.

Associate Membership is a special relationship for those persons who, because of age or other reasons, cannot meet the requirements for full membership in the Annual Conference. The requirements for associate membership are provided in Par. 418-420 of the Discipline. When met, they qualify the associate member for ordination as deacon.

An associate member may serve on any board, commission, or agency of the Annual Conference except the Board of Ordained Ministry, but is not eligible for election to the General or Jurisdictional Conferences. The associate member has the right to vote in the Annual Conference on all matters except on constitutional amendments, election of delegates to General or Jurisdictional Conferences, or matters relating to ordination, character, and Conference relations of ministers.

9. FULL MEMBERSHIP (Par. 421-424, 428-434)

Those probationary members who have completed the license for local pastor studies and served full-time under episcopal appointment for at least two full Annual Conference years following completion of the educational requirements specified in Par. 423 (typically, an M. Div. degree from an approved school of theology) may be admitted into full Conference membership, and ordained elders.

Throughout their ministry, full members come under the nurture and guidance of the BOM.

The primary focus of the Board of Ordained Ministry at this level is a candidate's effectiveness in professional practice as demonstrated by actual job performance and his/her ability to seek out and utilize resources for continuing personal and professional development.

It is assumed that when a Board of Ordained Ministry recommends a candidate for orders as an elder and admission into full connection that this person is deemed appointable in the itinerant ministry of the United Methodist Church. By appointable we mean that this person, in the judgment of this Board of Ordained Ministry, has the skills and capabilities to be appointed to the variety of appointments offered at this time by this Conference. Ordination as elder and admission into full Conference membership presupposes that all the standards have been met.

Probationary Members may be admitted to Full Membership in the Peninsula Annual Conference by vote of the ministerial members in Full Connection, provided they have:

1. Served full-time under episcopal appointment in a local church, not in appointment beyond the local church in the Peninsula Annual Conference to the satisfaction of the District Superintendent and the BOM for at least two full Annual Conference years following fulfillment of the educational requirements specified in F3. (Par. 424).
2. Been previously elected to Probationary Membership; ordained Deacon; and been recommended by the Conference BOM.
3. Met the following requirements:
 - a. Master of Divinity degree from an approved seminary.
 - b. Completion of at least 2 credit hours each in United Methodist history, doctrine, and polity; OR complete the course of Study of the Division of Ordained Ministry. (Par. 1529.2);
 - c. Satisfy BOM as to physical, mental, and emotional health;

d. Submit full transcripts of seminary grades, answers to the Disciplinary questions required by the BOM;

e. Appear before the BOM for a satisfactory interview. (Par. 421).

4. A deacon who transfers into the Peninsula Annual Conference must serve 2 years in an appointment to a local church and make a regular application for Elders Orders and Full membership to be ordained an Elder and become a full member. Such person may be required to undergo the same psychological exams as required of persons applying for probationary membership. Each Deacon shall provide a recommendation from their former District Superintendent and Board of Ordained Ministry.

10. FULL MEMBERSHIP THROUGH EXCEPTIONAL PROMISE (Par. 416, 420, 423)

Associate members who show exceptional promise for ministry may be admitted to probationary and full membership in the Annual Conference upon completion of the Bachelor's degree and the requirements of the advanced ministerial course of study.

UNDERSTANDING THE BOARD OF ORDAINED MINISTRY
REGISTRAR FOR CANDIDACY

The registrar for Candidacy of the Board of Ordained Ministry assists the registrar in all areas related to Candidacy, from a persons' initial inquiry into the calling to ordained ministry through his/her recommendation by the Board of Ordained Ministry for probationary membership and deacon's orders, including responsibilities related to the functioning of district Committees on the Ministry and Supervising Pastors.

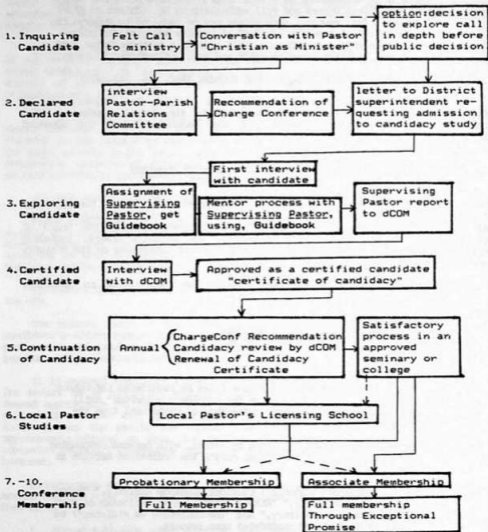
The Registrar for Candidacy works in the following five areas related to candidacy:

- A - Record-keeping
- B - Supervising Pastors
- C - District Committee on Ordained Ministry
- D - Liaison to Division of Ordained Ministry

A. RECORD-KEEPING

1. Keep accurate progress and status files on candidates throughout the process, form "Application for Candidacy Guidebook" until reception into Probationary Membership or withdrawal from the process.
2. Do follow-up contact, at least by letter, with persons responding to the invitation of the Bishop during the ordination service at Annual Conference.
3. Provide resources ("Should I Consider Ordained Ministry," "Steps into Ordained Ministry," "Ethnic Minorities in Christian as Minister," "Women in Ministry," and "The Christian as Minister") to inquiring or declared candidates upon request.
4. Keep on hand and supply to Supervising Pastors, District Committee on Ordained Ministry, and District Superintendent appropriate forms related to the Candidacy process.
5. Receive, record on applicant's file, and pass on to Conference Business Office the Conference's portion of the Candidacy Process registration fee from the Division of Ordained Ministry (be certain Conference credits same to the proper account).
6. Keep updated lists of Supervising Pastors, and supply same to Supervising Pastors, District Superintendents, District Committee on Ordained Ministry Chairpersons, and Division of Ordained Ministry.
7. Assist registrar of Board of Ordained Ministry in preparing the Board of Ordained Ministry report to Annual Conference, particularly questions 20-23.

CANDIDACY PROCESS



8. Keep accurate accounting of costs related to work as Registrar of Candidacy, and submit bills to Conference Office for reimbursement.
9. Clarify and forward any bills for administrative costs submitted by chairpersons of District Committee on Ordained Ministry.

B. SUPERVISING PASTORS

The Registrar for Candidacy will:

1. Consult with District Committee on Ordained Ministry through the District Superintendent to get their recommendations of ordained ministers to serve as Supervising Pastors.
2. Select and invite for training potential Supervising Pastors from those recommended.
3. Provide training settings, materials, and leadership to prepare new Supervising Pastors and refresh the skills of present Supervising Pastors.
4. Enroll new Supervising Pastors with Division of Ordained Ministry.
5. Provide IRAI Cover Sheets, Report of Completion of Candidacy Process forms, and any other appropriate forms, resources, and information to Supervising Pastor.
6. Maintain regular (at least semi-annual) communication with each Supervising Pastor, at least by letter.
7. Provide accountability structures for Supervising Pastors.
8. Provide exit opportunity for Supervising Pastors who have served beyond four years or who have been ineffective.
9. Be liaison between Division of Ordained Ministry and Supervising Pastors for two-way communication.

C. RELATION TO DISTRICT COMMITTEE ON ORDAINED MINISTRY

The Registrar for Candidacy will:

1. Provide training for District Committee on Ordained Ministry with regard to the Candidacy Process, the work of Supervising Pastors, and the functioning of the District Committee on Ordained Ministry.
2. Attend District Committee on Ordained Ministry meetings periodically to maintain communication, answer questions/concerns, and give encouragement for the committee's work.
3. Provide "Application for Candidacy Process" forms, appropriate forms, resources, and information to the District Committee on Ordained Ministry.
4. Provide list of Supervising Pastors to District Committee on Ordained Ministry chairperson and District Superintendent.
5. Act as a consultant to the District Committee on Ordained Ministry on concerns and questions related to candidacy.
6. Be liaison between Division of Ordained Ministry and District Committee on Ordained Ministry for two-way communication.

D. LIAISON WITH DIVISION OF MINISTRY

The Registrar for Candidacy will:

1. Serve as primary channel of two-way communication between the Division of Ordained Ministry and Supervising Pastors.

2. Have direct responsibility to Division of Ordained Ministry for quality of the Candidacy Process in the Peninsula Annual Conference.

UNDERSTANDING THE BOARD OF ORDAINED MINISTRY
SUPERVISING PASTOR PROGRAM

SUPERVISING PASTORS:

1. Shall be ordained elders.
2. Must be selected by the Registrar for Candidacy upon recommendation of the District Committee on Ordained Ministry through the District Superintendent, and trained for their task as provided by the Registrar for Candidacy.
3. Give supervision to persons inquiring about or declared for the ordained ministry as they go through the Candidacy Guidebook.
4. Are assigned by the District Committee on Ordained Ministry or the District Superintendent.
5. Must sign the "Application for Candidacy Guidebook" before the candidate sends it to the Division of Ordained Ministry, Nashville, TN.
6. Guide the candidate through the Candidacy Guidebook, for the purpose of facilitating the candidate's decision-making process.
7. Send appropriate completed copy of Biographical Information Form from the Candidacy Guidebook to the Registrar of Candidacy.
8. Receive and review with candidate the results of the WEBB (URAD).
9. Prepare Report to District Committee on Ordained Ministry, and share with candidate, both signing agreed-upon report.
10. Present candidate to District Committee on Ordained Ministry, through sharing of report and personal introduction of candidate, at interview, if possible to attend.
11. Prepare and send to appropriate people the Report of Completion form, after the candidate has been approved for certification, or, in that event, after the candidate has withdrawn from the process.
12. Maintain a file of information gathered during work with candidate.
13. Forward appropriate file materials to the District Committee on Ordained Ministry after certification, unless you continue with the candidate in which case you keep them, or unless the candidate withdraws, in which case the file should be returned to him/her.

SUPERVISING PASTORS: PROCEDURE CHECK LIST:

- a. Before first meeting with the candidate:
 - 1) Ascertain he/she has read "The Christian as Minister."
 - 2) Have him/her read the Introduction, Part I and II, and the beginning of Part III of the Guidebook, pages 2-21.
 - 3) Have him/her complete the "Biographical Information Form" (two copies, pages 25-26 and 27-28) to bring to you at the first meeting.
- b. First meeting:
 - 1) Getting acquainted.
 - 2) Establish contract of confidentiality report to District Committee, design of meetings (when, where, duration), consider possible end-date.

- 3) Get "Biographical Information Forms."
 - 4) Agree on Exploratory Studies to emphasize, order of consideration, etc.
 - 5) Prepare candidate to take IRAI, make sure instructions are understood, give "Cover Sheet" for mailing after completed.
- c. Last meeting:
- 1) Share your Report to the District Committee on Ordained Ministry with the candidate.
 - 2) Have him/her sign the report along with you.
- d. Attend District Committee on Ordained Ministry interview with the candidate.
- e. Follow-up meeting (after District Committee on Ordained Ministry has granted Certificate of Candidacy to candidate):
- 1) Evaluation of process (both personally and using form in Candidacy Guidebook, p. 142).
 - 2) Celebrate together the end of this relationship (Supervising Pastor to candidate).

UNDERSTANDING THE BOARD OF ORDAINED MINISTRY
DISTRICT COMMITTEE ON ORDAINED MINISTRY

The basic responsibilities of the District Committee on Ordained Ministry are outlined in the Discipline, Par. 749.

The District Committee shall:

1. Maintain a list of all persons under its care, from inquiring candidates through recommendation for probationary membership to the Conference Board of Ordained Ministry.
2. Have the following responsibilities with regard to candidacy:
 - a. When feasible, meet with inquiring or declared candidate for a get-acquainted interview before the candidate is assigned a supervising pastor and makes application for the Candidacy Guidebook.
 - b. Assign supervising pastors (except that the District Superintendent may do this for the District Committee for inquiring or declared candidates who cannot, or choose not to, come for a get-acquainted interview).
 - c. Suggest that the person's local church or Charge Conference pay the \$50 fee that must accompany the "Application for Candidacy Guidebook."
 - d. Interview declared candidates upon completion of the Candidacy Guidebook, for the purpose of determining whether there is evidence that their gifts, graces, and usefulness warrant, and that they are qualified under Par. 406-409, and they are therefore candidates who should be certified for ordained ministry.
 - e. Issue the Certificate of Candidacy to those persons who have made written application, been recommended by their Charge Conference or the Conference Board of Ordained Ministry, completed the Candidacy Guidebook studies with a supervising pastor, and been approved by the District Committee on Ordained Ministry.
 - f. Inform the registrar for candidacy of the Conference Board of Ordained Ministry of any candidate thus certified.

- g. Request whatever aptitude or psychological testing, studies, or additional information deemed necessary or appropriate for its decision to certify or recertify candidates for ordained ministry.
3. Have the following responsibilities with regard to continuation of candidacy:
 - a. Receive annually from the certified candidate an official transcript from the school the person is attending.
 - b. Review the candidate's progress annually, and on written application, recommendation of the Charge Conference, evidence that the candidate's gifts, graces, and fruits continue to be satisfactory, and evidence of satisfactory progress in the required studies, grant renewal of the Certificate of Candidacy if all is in order.
 - c. Where desirable or plausible, hold an annual personal interview with the certified candidate.
 - d. At its discretion, reinstate a person whose candidacy has lapsed.
 4. Have the following responsibilities with regard to local pastors:
 - a. Counsel with certified candidates to ascertain their readiness to attend the Interconference Local Pastors Licensing School for licensing as a local pastor.
 - b. Grant the license to those local pastors who have completed the Interconference Local Pastors Licensing School and are appointed to serve a charge.
 - c. Recommend annually to the Conference Board of Ordained Ministry those local pastors who qualify for continuance as local pastors.
 - d. Recommend in writing to the Conference Board of Ordained Ministry those local pastors (or certified candidates) who have met the requirements and whom they approve for probationary membership in the Annual Conference.
 - e. Receive and act upon requests from discontinued local pastors seeking reinstatement as local pastors, with an interview a recommended part of the decision process.
 5. Forward to the registrar of the Conference Board of Ordained Ministry its files on each certified candidate or local pastor recommended for probationary membership along with that recommendation.
 6. Keep meeting minutes, or at least a record of actions taken, and shall forward a copy to the registrar for candidacy immediately after the meeting.

UNDERSTANDING THE BOARD OF ORDAINED MINISTRY
COUNSELING ELDER COMMITTEE

1. It is the policy of the Board of Ordained Ministry to assign a Counseling Elder to all local pastors and probationary members.
2. The Counseling Elder is assigned a counselee by the District Superintendent. The Counseling Elder Committee then contacts, by letter, each Counseling Elder and counselee with instructions and guidelines. The Counseling Elder also receives an evaluation report annually to be completed on his/her counselee, and returned to the District Superintendent.
3. Counseling Elders are expected to meet with their counselee at least once a month (unless the person is attending school at some distance from the Conference), to discuss academic progress and church responsibilities (if the person is serving a charge). Encouragement is given to the Counseling Elder to establish an open, friendly relationship with his/her counselee.

4. The Board of Ordained Ministry (Counseling Elder Committee) shall on some regular basis, provide training for Counseling Elders in the area of their responsibility (1984 Discipline, Par. 411).
5. The Board of Ordained Ministry (Counseling Elder Committee) shall annually recommend to the Cabinet members in full connection, who have received training, to serve as Counseling Elders (1984 Discipline, Par. 732.2v).
6. Unless there is a problem or a move, Counseling Elders should be assigned for the duration of a counselee's candidacy/probation period.
7. A timetable shall be developed specifying when Counseling Elders shall be appointed by the District Superintendent.

UNDERSTANDING THE BOARD OF ORDAINED MINISTRY
SCHOLARSHIP COMMITTEE:

GUIDELINES

The Scholarship Committee is designed to provide financial help to students preparing for the ordained ministry. While designed primarily for seminary students, it is also recognized that many who intend to enter the ordained ministry need assistance in completing their college training; for this reason some limited aid is available.

The key issue is the availability of funds which rarely meets legitimate needs. In the 1984-85 school year approximately \$30,000 was granted. The Committee is endeavoring to make more visible the opportunity for local churches to contribute to this fund making more realistic grants possible.

While the scholarship is financial it is also seen as a very clear evidence of the Annual Conference extending itself to those who are part of its ministry in preparation.

Students are asked to apply in writing for the necessary forms:

- a statement of need
- school certification - indicating enrollment
- a certification by the District Superintendent recommending scholarship help
- signing a promissory note indicating an obligation to serve three (3) years full-time in the Peninsula Annual Conference or repayment of the loan over a ten-year period.

Grants are made by the committee on a semester basis with each student's needs being reviewed before each semester.

For more information contact the chairperson of the Scholarship Committee.

III. DOING MINISTRY

CONTINUING EDUCATION GUIDELINES

- I. Who is included:
Ministers of the Conference serving under appointments.
- II. The following areas are included as appropriate continuing education:
 - A. Growing in professional competency.
 - B. Growing in self-awareness including an understanding of life goals, strengths and weakness, and personal characteristics.
 - C. Growing in the knowledge and skills of spiritual, social ethics/ community outreach.

III. The following are examples of activities that normally would not qualify for Continuing Education credit without prior approval of the Continuing Education Committee of the Board of Ordained Ministry.

- A. Board or committee meetings and orientation sessions.
- B. Annual meetings and conventions, unless specifically including CEUs.
- C. Mass media programs (unless an integral part of a larger educational program.)
- D. Entertainment and recreation, attendance at lecture series, cultural performances, travel tours, etc. (unless an integral part of a larger educational program.)
- E. Work experience (on-the-job training).
- F. Individual scholarship (independent, unsupervised writing and research.)
- G. Self-directed studies unless CEUs are granted by a seminary.
- H. Activities for which credit, support, or approval is requested after the fact (i.e., not part of an intentional plan.)
- I. Events of one day or less duration sponsored by Peninsula Conference Boards, Divisions, or Agencies, unless approved by the Committee on Continuing Education prior to the event.

IV. How much continuing education is required:

- A. Eight Continuing Education Units (CEUs) per quadrennium. A CEU is 10 contact hours or 10 hours in a formal setting with an instructor or instructors. For the 1985-88 quadrennium, it will be required that 4 of the 8 CEUs be earned in units of not less than one CEU. The other 4 can be earned in not less than .5 units. It is highly recommended that clergy spend one week (five consecutive days), in one continuing education event per quadrennium.

V. Availability of Continuing Education events:

VI. Funding:

- A. The Peninsula Conference, in session on June 10, 1981, at Asbury United Methodist Church, Salisbury, MD, adopted this motion: "That the Board of Ordained Ministry recommends to the local charge that a minimum of \$500 per year be budgeted for each minister's continuing education and that this be excluded from the apportionment base and salary and included as a line item in the Journal."
- B. The Board of Ordained Ministry recommends that unexpended continuing education monies can be accumulative during the tenure of the pastor.
- C. In addition to this funding from the local church, clergy may apply to the Continuing Education Committee of the Board of Ordained Ministry for financial assistance. Requests should be directed to The Rev. Dr. Donald O. Clendaniel, Sr., P.O. Box, Chester, MD 21619.

VII. Accountability:

Par. 446.2 of the 1984 Discipline states:

"Pastors shall be asked by the District Superintendent in the Charge Conference to outline their programs of continuing education for the year. The District Superintendent shall also ask the local church to describe its provision for time and financial support for the pastor's program of continuing education."

- B. As part of the annual evaluation by the Pastor-Parish Relations Committee, CEUs shall be reported by the pastor. Plans for dealing with a recognized need for personal and professional growth shall include planning for Christian education and provisions for the necessary time and funding.
- C. Clergy shall report their CEUs to the Pastor-Parish Relations Committee which shall include this information in its report of the annual evaluation to the District Superintendent with a copy to the Board of Ordained Ministry registrar for continuing education.

VIII. Certification:

- A. CEUs granted by theological seminaries certified by the University Senate are accepted without further approval.
- B. CEUs granted by other United Methodist Conferences, National boards/agencies of the United Methodist Church, or other accredited non-United Methodist Seminaries are accepted without further approval.
- C. CEUs granted by accredited agencies in other disciplines (i.e., health, psychological, social work, etc.) are accepted without further approval.
- D. CEUs not so granted or authorized must be approved by the Chairperson of the Continuing Education Committee in advance.
- E. The Continuing Education Committee will report the number of CEU credits earned annually to: the individual pastor, District Superintendents and the Board of Ordained Ministry.

The Book of Discipline, 1984, Section VI, Par. 446, states:

"Ministers shall be expected to continue their education throughout their careers, including a carefully developed personal program of study augmented periodically by involvement in organized educational activities."

NOTE: A special article on the Appointment-Making Process is included in this Journal, following the list of appointments for 1985.

MINISTERS IN APPOINTMENTS BEYOND THE LOCAL CHURCH

CATEGORIES OF APPOINTMENT:

Ministry as a pastor in a local church is only one of many settings in which ordained clergy serve. The 1984 Discipline recognizes five categories of appointment beyond the local church (Par. 443.1):

- a. Appointments within the connectional structures of United Methodism: district superintendents, staff members of Conference councils, boards and agencies, treasurers, bishops' assistants, superintendents or directors of parish development, staff of general boards and agencies, missionaries, faculty and administrators of United Methodist schools of theology and other educational institutions, campus ministers, and staff members of ecumenical agencies.
- b. Appointments to extension ministries of persons under endorsement by the Division of Chaplains and Related Ministries, such as: chaplaincy in the armed forces, Veterans Administration, industry, correctional, health care fields, and other related ministries which the Bishop and Conference Board of Ministry may designate.

(The Division of Chaplains and Related Ministries annually affirms the ministry of those persons under its endorsement and requests their appointment. See Par. 1610.)

- c. Conference members in service under the World Division of the General Board of Global Ministries may be appointed to the ministries listed in (a) and (b) above. They may be assigned to serve either in Annual Conferences or Central Conferences, or with affiliated autonomous churches, independent churches, churches resulting from the union of Methodist Churches and other communions, or in other denominational or

ecumenical bodies. They may accept such rights and privileges, including affiliate membership, as may be offered them by overseas Annual Conferences or by other churches to which they are assigned, without impairing their relationship to their home Annual Conference.

- d. Conference members may receive appointments beyond the ministries usually extended through the local church and other institutions above in (a) and (b), when considered by the Bishop and Board of Ordained Ministry to be a true extension of the Christian ministry of the church or an outreach ministry in keeping with the goals of the Annual Conference and one in which ordination to Word, Sacrament, and Order is useful or necessary. These ministries shall be initiated in mission response to the needs of persons in special circumstances and unique situations and shall reflect the commitment of the clergy to intentional fulfillment of their ordination vows to Word, Sacrament, and Order. These appointments may involve clergy with expertise from other vocations. Conference members in such appointments retain Conference membership, and the Annual Conference may choose to extend financial support and benefits for its clergy by vote of the Annual Conference.

Those seeking such an appointment in this category shall submit to the Bishop, the District Superintendent, and the Board of Ordained Ministry a written statement of their intentional fulfillment of their ordination vows to be a minister of Word, Sacrament, and Order not later than ninety (90) days before Annual Conference. In addition, a statement to the Bishop shall be required from the institution in which the ministry is to be performed assuring freedom in the fulfillment of ordination vows.

On recommendation of the Cabinet and the Board of Ordained Ministry, such positions are to be confirmed by a two-thirds vote of the ministerial members of the Annual Conference.

The Bishop may make and add interim appointments in this category after consultation with the Cabinet and executive committee of the Board of Ordained Ministry, the position to be formally acted upon by the next session of the Annual Conference.

- e. Ordained ministers who are probationary or full members may be appointed by the Bishop to attend any school, college, or theological seminary listed by the University Senate.

ACCOUNTABILITY:

There is a legitimate need for the expressions and extensions of ministry in other than the traditional setting. We also believe that there is a need for a degree of accountability. Par. 443 includes a design for an accountability structure for those in appointments beyond the local church.

- a. Persons in such appointments have a Charge Conference relationship in their home Conference. If they are employed beyond the bounds of their Annual Conference, they are also required to hold affiliate Charge Conference relationships in a church where they live; and
- b. They must provide an annual report to the Bishop, District Superintendent, Charge Conference, and the BOM.
- c. The Bishop and the BOM shall provide an opportunity to have all ABLC persons meet annually.

COMMITTEE ON STATUS AND SERVICE

In each Annual Conference the Board of Ordained Ministry and the Bishop and Cabinet share a demanding responsibility in the process through which clergy change or terminate their relationship to the Conference. As demanding, complex, and sometimes painful as this responsibility may be, a proper concern for the well-being of both church and clergy requires that requests and decisions be made sensitively and objectively.

There are a number of possible changes in Conference relationship which may occur during a minister's career and a variety of tracks for termination of Conference

membership. The sections of the Discipline which follow highlight the legislative changes in this area authorized by the 1984 General Conference.

POLICY:

All pastors are accountable as to character and effectiveness to the Annual Conference throughout their entire ministry (p.194, bottom, 1984 Book of Discipline).

The General Conference has made it clear in the Doctrine and Doctrinal Statements...(Part II of the Discipline) that scripture, tradition, experience and reason are the guidelines of ministry. "United Methodists share with all other Christians the conviction that Scripture is the primary source and guideline for doctrine" (p. 194, footnote 8, The Discipline).

The Committee on Status and Service has as a major part of its task the responsibility of gathering and assembling information concerning the accountability of the clergy of the Conference, and is amenable to the Board of Ordained Ministry.

Clergy persons will contact this Committee with regard to anticipated changes in status and service.

PROCEDURE:

The Discipline states: "Ministers seeking a change in Conference relationship shall make written request to their Board of Ordained Ministry stating the reason for the requested change of relationship." In addition, the Board of Ordained Ministry may request personal interviews with the minister requesting the change in relationship, except where personal appearance results in undue hardship (Par. 449, p. 233).

Change in Status: Retirement, Par. 453

1. Mandatory Retirement. - Every ministerial member of an Annual Conference who will have attained age seventy on or before July 1 in the year which the Conference is held shall automatically be retired.
2. Voluntary Retirement. -
 - a. With Twenty Years of Service. - Any members of the Annual Conference who have completed twenty years or more of service under appointment as ministers or as local pastors with pension credit to the opening date of the session of the Conference may request the Annual Conference to place them in the retired relation with the privilege of receiving their pensions for the number of approved years served in the Annual Conference or Conferences and such other benefits as the final Annual Conference may provide, payment to begin the first of any month after the session of the Annual Conference which occurs in the year in which the minister attains age sixty-two on or before July 1. If pension began prior to the age at which retirement under Par. 453.2c could have occurred, then the provisions of Par. 1706.4i shall apply.
 - b. With Thirty -seven Years of Service or at Age Sixty-two. - At their own request and by vote of the ministerial members in full connection, any ministerial members who will have attained age sixty-two on or before July 1 or will have completed thirty-seven years of service under appointment in the year in which the session of the Annual Conference is held may be placed in the retired relation with an annuity claim for an actuarially reduced pension, payment to begin the first of the month after the session of the Annual Conference (See Par. 1706.4i).
 - c. With Forty Years of Service or at Age Sixty-five. - At their own request and by vote of the ministerial members in full connection, any ministerial members who will have attained age sixty-five on or before July 1 in the year in which the session of the Conference is held or will have completed forty years of service under appointment as a minister, or as a local pastor with pension credit, as of the Conference session may be placed in the retired relation with the privilege of making an annuity claim.

ecumenical bodies. They may accept such rights and privileges, including affiliate membership, as may be offered them by overseas Annual Conferences or by other churches to which they are assigned, without impairing their relationship to their home Annual Conference.

- d. Conference members may receive appointments beyond the ministries usually extended through the local church and other institutions above in (a) and (b), when considered by the Bishop and Board of Ordained Ministry to be a true extension of the Christian ministry of the church or an outreach ministry in keeping with the goals of the Annual Conference and one in which ordination to Word, Sacrament, and Order is useful or necessary. ACCOUNTABILITY:

- a. Persons in such appointments have a Charge Conference relationship in their home Conference. If they are employed beyond the bounds of their Annual Conference, they are also required to hold affiliate Charge Conference relationships in a church where they live; and
- b. They must provide an annual report to the Bishop, District Superintendent, Charge Conference, and the BOM.
- c. The Bishop and the BOM shall provide an opportunity to have all ABLC persons meet annually.

COMMITTEE ON STATUS AND SERVICE

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Change in Status: Retirement, Par. 453

1. **Mandatory Retirement.** - Every ministerial member of an Annual Conference who will have attained age seventy on or before July 1 in the year which the Conference is held shall automatically be retired.
2. **Voluntary Retirement.** -
 - a. **With Twenty Years of Service.** - Any members of the Annual Conference who have completed twenty years or more of service under appointment as ministers or as local pastors with pension credit to the opening date of the session of the Conference may request the Annual Conference to place them in the retired relation with the privilege of receiving their pensions for the number of approved years served in the Annual Conference or Conferences and such other benefits as the final Annual Conference may provide, payment to begin the first of any month after the session of the Annual Conference which occurs in the year in which the minister attains age sixty-two on or before July 1. If pension began prior to the age at which retirement under Par. 453.2c could have occurred, then the provisions of Par. 1706.4i shall apply.
 - b. **With Thirty-seven Years of Service or at Age Sixty-two.** - At their own request and by vote of the ministerial members in full connection, any ministerial members who will have attained age sixty-two on or before July 1 or will have completed thirty-seven years of service under appointment in the year in which the session of the Annual Conference is held may be placed in the retired relation with an annuity claim for an actuarially reduced pension, payment to begin the first of the month after the session of the Annual Conference (See Par. 1706.4i).
 - c. **With Forty Years of Service or at Age Sixty-five.** - At their own request and by vote of the ministerial members in full connection, any ministerial members who will have attained age sixty-five on or before July 1 in the year in which the session of the Conference is held or will have completed forty years of service under appointment as a minister, or as a local pastor with pension credit, as of the Conference session may be placed in the retired relation with the privilege of making an annuity claim.

- d. The Annual Conference, at its discretion, upon joint recommendation of the Board of Ordained Ministry and the Conference Board of Pensions, may designate any time within the ensuing Conference year as the effective date of retirement of a minister who is placed in the retired relation under the provisions of Par. 2b or 2c above.
3. Involuntary retirement. - By a two-thirds vote of those present and voting, the ministerial members of the Annual Conference in full connection may place any ministerial members in the retired relation with or without their consent and irrespective of their age if such relation is recommended by the Board of Ordained Ministry and the Cabinet. Action toward involuntary retirement must be started at least ninety (90) days prior to Annual Conference. This process shall not preclude the rights to appeal and trial by any person so guaranteed by our Constitution.
 4. Pre-retirement Counseling. - The Board of Ordained Ministry in cooperation with the Board of Pensions shall offer to all ministerial members anticipating retirement, pre-consultation at least five years prior to the date of anticipated retirement (Par. 723.2n). The purpose of the consultation will be to assist the clergy and spouses to plan and to prepare for the psychological and financial adjustments of retirement, as well as providing guidance and counsel for their return to a new relationship in the local church. In pre-retirement counseling the Board of Ordained Ministry and the Board of Pensions may relate to the Annual Conference Association of Retired Ministers or similar organization where it exists. The board shall take initiative in assisting retirees to establish such organizations.
 5. Charge Conference Membership. - All retired ministers who are not appointed as pastors of a Charge, after consultation with the pastor, shall have a seat in the Charge Conference and all hold such membership except as set forth in the Discipline. They shall report to the Charge Conference and to the pastor all marriages performed, baptisms administered, and other pastoral functions. If they reside outside the bounds of the Conference, they shall report of their Christian and ministerial conduct, together with an account of the circumstances of their families, signed by the District Superintendent or the pastor of the charge within the bounds of which they reside. Without this report the Conference, after having given thirty days' notice, may locate them without their consent.
 6. Appointment of Retired Ministers. - A retired minister shall be eligible to receive an appointment when requested by the Bishop and Cabinet but not the same appointment from which he/she has been retired. A retired minister appointed to a pastoral charge shall have neither a claim upon minimum salary nor further pension credit. Retired ministers may serve on Conference agencies, except the Board of Trustees, the Board of Pensions, and the Council on Finance and Administration.
 7. Return to Effective Relationship. - A ministerial member who has retired under the provisions of Par. 453.2 may at his/her own request be made an effective member upon recommendation of the Board of Ordained Ministry, the Bishop, and Cabinet, and by majority vote of the ministerial members of the Annual Conference and thereby eligible for appointment so long as he/she remains in the effective relation or until Par. 453.1 applies. Each minister requesting return to effective relationship after voluntary retirement must meet the following conditions: (1) Presentation of their certificate of retirement, (2) A satisfactory certificate of good health on the prescribed form from a physician approved by the Board of Ordained Ministry. However, any pension being received through the General Board of Pensions shall be discontinued upon their return to the effective relationship. The pension shall be reinstated upon subsequent retirement.

Change of Status: Maternity/Paternity Leave. Par. 451

Maternity/paternity leave not to exceed one-fourth of a year will be available and shall be granted by the Bishop and the Cabinet and the executive committee of the Board of Ordained Ministry to any probationary member, associate member, or minister in full connection who so requests it at the birth or arrival of a child into the home for purposes of adoption.

1. During the leave, the minister's Annual Conference relations will remain unchanged, and the insurance plans will remain in force.

2. A maternity/paternity leave of up to one quarter of a year will be considered as an uninterrupted appointment for pension credit purposes.
3. The minister's salary will be maintained for no less than the first six weeks of the leave.
4. During the leave time pastoral responsibility for the church or churches involved will be handled through consultation with the Pastor-Parish Relations Committee of the local church(es) and the District Superintendent.
5. Persons desiring maternity/paternity leave should file their request with the Pastor-Parish Relations Committee after consulting with the District Superintendent at least ninety (90) days prior to its beginning to allow adequate pastoral care for the churches involved to be developed.
6. Special arrangements shall be made for District Superintendents, Bishops, and those under special appointment.

Change of Status: Disability Leave. Par. 452

1. When ministers who are local pastors under full-time appointment, associate members, probationary members, or members in full connection in an Annual Conference are forced to give up their ministerial work because of their physical or emotional disability, such leave may be granted or renewed only after a thorough investigation of the case and examination of medical evidence by the Joint Committee on Disability of the Annual Conference and upon joint recommendations of the Board of Ordained Ministry and the Conference Board of Pensions and by a majority vote of the ministerial members of the Annual Conference in full connection who are present and voting, they may be granted annual disability leave without losing their relationship to the Annual Conference. When a minister is granted disability leave by the Annual Conference granting the disability leave unless the disability meets the medical evidence standards set forth in the Comprehensive Protection Plan Document, subsection 5.4.
2. When ministers who are full-time local pastors, associate members, probationary members, or members in full connection in an Annual Conference are forced to give up their ministerial work between sessions of the Annual Conference on account of physical or emotional disability, such leave may be granted only after a thorough investigation of the cause and an examination of medical evidence by the Joint Committee on Disability of the Annual Conference, with approval of a majority of the District Superintendents, after consultation with the executive committee of the Conference Board of Pensions, a disability leave may be granted by the Bishop for the remainder of the Conference year. When a minister is granted disability leave by the Bishop, the General Board of Pensions shall immediately pay disability benefits. The payment of such benefits will be a charge to the Annual Conference granting the disability leave unless the disability meets the medical evidence standards set forth in the Comprehensive Protection Plan document, subsection 5.4. Any such leave granted between sessions of the Annual Conference, with the effective date of such leave, shall be entered in the minutes of the next regular session of the Conference.
3. On and after January 1, 1982, ministers or local pastors who are participants in the Comprehensive Protection Plan may be granted a disability leave only after medical evidence shall have been secured and reviewed in accordance with the provisions of that plan.
4. When ministers or local pastors on disability leave recover sufficiently to resume ministerial work, with their consent they may receive an appointment from a Bishop between sessions of the Annual Conference, thereby terminating the disability leave. Such appointment shall be reported immediately by the Cabinet to the Annual Conference Board of Pensions and the General Board of Pensions. Such termination of leave, together with the effective date, shall be recorded in the minutes of the Annual Conference at its next regular session.

Change of Status: Leave of Absence. Par. 450.

1. This relationship is granted to ministers who are probationary, associate, and full members and who because of impaired health, emotional and/or

physical exhaustion, ineffectiveness or incompetence, or other equally sufficient reason are temporarily unwilling or unable to perform the duties of full-time itinerant ministry. This relationship may be initiated by the minister or the Cabinet, with or without the consent of the ministerial member, through the Board of Ordained Ministry, and granted or renewed by the vote of the ministerial members in full connection upon the board's recommendation. The person in question has the right to a hearing before the Bishop, Cabinet, and executive committee of the Board of Ordained Ministry prior to the granting of a leave of absence without the minister's consent. Between sessions of the Annual Conference this relation may be granted or terminated with the approval of the Bishop, District Superintendents, and executive committee of the Annual Conference Board of Ordained Ministry. This interim action shall be subject to the approval of the Annual Conference at its next session. This relation shall be approved annually upon written request of the ministerial member or the Cabinet with or without the consent of the ministerial member at least ninety (90) days prior to the Annual Conference and shall not be granted for more than five years in succession except by a two-thirds vote of the ministerial members in full connection. This leave shall be counted as a part of the eight-year limit for probationary members unless the Board of Ordained Ministry recommends otherwise. After consultation with the pastor, ministers on leave of absence shall designate the Charge Conference in which they shall hold membership. The exercise of their ministry shall be limited to the Charge Conference in which their membership is held and under the supervision of the pastor in charge, to whom they shall report all marriages performed, baptisms administered, and funerals conducted, and shall be held amenable for their conduct and the conduct and the continuation of their ordination rights to the Annual Conference. Should they reside outside the bounds of the Annual Conference, they shall forward to it a copy of the report made to the Charge Conference where they hold membership, and, in case of failure to do so, the Annual Conference may locate them without their consent. They shall have no claim on the Conference funds except by vote of the ministerial members in full connection. They shall be eligible for membership on Conference committees, commissions, or boards, except the Board of Ordained Ministry and the Board of Trustees. They shall not receive pension credit and shall not be eligible to receive pension payments while in this relation.

2. When a member requests an end to the leave of absence, it shall be by written request at least six months prior to the session of Annual Conference. The Board of Ordained Ministry shall review the circumstances surrounding the granting of the relationship for the purpose of determining whether those circumstances have been alleviated.
3. When ministerial members do not request an extension of the leave of absence annually during the five-year period, or do not indicate willingness to return to the itinerant ministry at the end of the five-year period, the provisions of Par. 455 (Involuntary Termination) shall be invoked.

Change of Status: Sabbatical Leave. Par. 448

A sabbatical leave should be allowed for a program of study or travel, approved by the Conference Board of Ordained Ministry. Ministers who have been serving in a full-time appointment for six consecutive years from the time of their reception into full membership or for eight consecutive years from the time of their reception into associate membership may be granted a sabbatical leave for up to one year. Whenever possible, the salary level of the last appointment served before the leave should be maintained in the appointment made at the termination of the leave. The appointment to sabbatical leave is to be made by the Bishop holding the Conference upon the vote of the Annual Conference after recommendation by the Board of Ordained Ministry. Ministers shall submit a written request for a sabbatical leave, including plans for study or travel, to the Board of Ordained Ministry, with copies to the Bishop and District Superintendents, ordinarily six months before the opening session of the Annual Conference. To be eligible for an additional sabbatical leave ministers shall have served consecutive years under full-time appointment following the previous sabbatical leave.

IV. EXITING MINISTRY

TERMINATION OF CONFERENCE MEMBERSHIP

Voluntary Termination: Par. 454

1. By Discontinuance from Probationary Membership. - Probationary members may request discontinuance of this relationship or may be discontinued by the Annual Conference, upon recommendation of the Board of Ordained Ministry, without reflection upon their character. When this relationship is discontinued, they shall no longer be permitted to exercise ministerial functions and shall surrender their credentials to the District Superintendent for deposit with the Secretary of the Conference, and their membership transferred by the District Superintendent to the local church which they designate after consultation with the pastor. The Board of Ordained Ministry shall file with the resident Bishop a permanent record of the circumstances relating to discontinuance as a probationary member as required in Par. 723.3e. If after discontinuance, probationary members are classified and approved as local pastors in accordance with provision of Par. 408 and under the conditions outlined in Par. 409, they may be permitted to retain their credentials of ordination and shall receive credit in the course of study for their theological work as the Division of Ordained Ministry shall determine.
2. By Honorable Location. -
 - a. An Annual Conference may grant associate members or members in full connection certificates of honorable location at their own request; provided that it shall first have examined their character at the Conference session when the request is made and found them in good standing; and provided further, that this relation shall be granted only to one who intends to discontinue service in the itinerant ministry. The Board of Ordained Ministry shall provide guidance and counsel to the locating member and family as they return to a new relationship in the local church.
 - b. Location shall be certified by the presiding Bishop. Ministers located according to the provisions of this paragraph shall not continue to hold membership in the Annual Conference. After consultation with the pastor, located ministers shall designate the local church in which they shall hold membership. As ministerial members of the Charge Conference, they shall be permitted to exercise ministerial functions under supervision of the pastor in charge. They shall have all the privileges of membership in the church where they elect to hold membership except as set forth in the Book of Discipline. When approved by the executive committee of the Board of Ordained Ministry, a person on honorable location may be appointed ad interim by the Bishop as a local pastor. Otherwise, the exercise of their ministry shall be limited to the Charge Conference in which their membership is held. A copy of the Annual Report to the Charge Conference must be forwarded to the registrar of the Board of Ordained Ministry in order for location to be continued; the person is referred to the Board of Ordained Ministry for determination of Conference relationship. They shall report to the Charge Conference and the pastor all marriages performed, baptisms administered, and funerals conducted; and shall be held amenable for their conduct and the continuation of their ordination rights to the Annual Conference within which the Charge Conference membership is held. The provisions of this paragraph shall not apply to persons granted involuntary location prior to the General Conference of 1976. The names of located members after the annual passage of their character shall be printed in the Journal.
3. By Withdrawal to Unite with Another Denomination. - When ministers in good standing withdraw to unite with another denomination or to terminate their membership in the denomination, their credentials should be surrendered to the Conference, and if they shall desire it and the Conference authorize it, the credentials may be returned with the following inscription written plainly across their face:

A.B. has this day been honorably dismissed by the _____ Annual Conference from the ministry of The United Methodist Church.

Dated: _____

_____, President

_____, Secretary

4. By Surrender of the Ministerial Office. - Associate members or members in full connection of an Annual Conference in good standing who desire to surrender their ministerial office and withdraw from the Conference may be allowed to do so by the Annual Conference at its session. The minister's credentials shall be surrendered to the District Superintendent for deposit with the Secretary of the Conference, and his/her membership may be transferred to a church which he/she designates, after consultation with the pastor, as the local church in which he/she will hold membership.
5. By Withdrawal Under Complaints or Charges. - When ministerial members are accused of an offense under Par. 2621 and desire to withdraw from the membership of the Annual Conference, it may permit them to withdraw under the provisions of Par. 2626.2. The ministers' credentials shall be surrendered to the District Superintendent for deposit with the Secretary of the Conference, and their membership may be transferred to a local church which they designate, after consultation with the pastor.
6. By Withdrawal Between Conferences. - In the event that withdrawal by surrender of the ministerial office, to unite with another denomination, or under complaints or charges, should occur in the interval between sessions of an Annual Conference, the member shall deposit with the Bishop or District Superintendent a letter of withdrawal from the ministry and his/her credentials. This action shall be reported by the Board of Ordained Ministry for confirmation by the Annual Conference at its next session.

TERMINATION OF CONFERENCE MEMBERSHIP

Involuntary Termination. Par. 455.

1. General Provisions. - Ordination and membership in an Annual Conference in The United Methodist Church is a sacred trust. The qualifications and duties of associate members, probationary members, and full members are set forth in the Book of Discipline of The United Methodist Church, and we believe they flow from the gospel and taught by Jesus the Christ and proclaimed by his Apostles. Whenever an ordained minister in any of the above categories violates this trust, the membership of his/her ministerial office shall be subject to review. This review shall have as its purpose the reconciliation and restoration to the minister and the strengthening of the Church. If the remedial process is unfruitful, discontinuance or termination may follow.
 - a. Supervision. - In the course of the ordinary fulfillment of the superintending role, the Bishop or District Superintendent may receive or initiate grievances about the performance or character of a minister. A grievance is a written and signed statement claiming misconduct or unsatisfactory performance of ministerial duties. The supervisory response, in cooperation with the Pastor-Parish Relations Committee for pastors, the District Committees on Superintendency for District Superintendents, or appropriate personnel committee, shall be directed toward a reconciliation between all parties and the ordained minister. If supervisory activity does not achieve the desired results, the District Superintendent or the Bishop may refer the matter as a complaint to the chairperson of the Board of Ordained Ministry who shall forward it on to the Joint Review Committee.
 - b. Complaints. - A complaint must be based on incompetence, ineffectiveness, or any one or more of the offenses listed in Par. 2621 and shall be submitted in written form and signed by the District Superintendent. No complaint shall be considered for any misconduct or unsatisfactory performance which shall not have been committed within two years immediately preceding the filing of the grievance. The person filing the grievance and the minister shall be informed of the process for filing and its purpose. Complaints may be initiated by the Bishop, a District

Superintendent, or the Cabinet. Complaints shall be lodged with the chairperson of the Annual Conference Board of Ordained Ministry, who shall forward the complaint to the Joint Review Committee and the minister against whom the complaint is lodged within ten days of receipt.

- c. Joint Review Committee. - In each Annual Conference there shall be a Joint Review Committee composed of two District Superintendents appointed annually by the Bishop, two Board of Ordained Ministry members nominated by the chairperson and elected annually by the Board and two non-Cabinet, non-Board members in full connection, one nominated by the Bishop and Cabinet, one by the Board, and elected annually by the members in full connection in ministerial executive session. An alternate shall be provided in each of "the" three categories. The alternate who is not a member of the Cabinet or Board of Ordained Ministry shall be nominated by the Bishop and Cabinet. When a person serving on the Joint Review Committee is involved or related to the complaint, the alternate shall serve. The committee shall elect its own officers. This committee shall receive from the chairperson of the Board of Ordained Ministry all complaints and seek resolution of them. The work of this committee shall be informal and confidential and shall guarantee that the person or persons lodging the complaint and the person against whom the complaint is lodged shall have the right to be heard. No witness will be called and no counsel shall be present. Should the ordained minister under complaint desire it, a clergy person chosen by the minister may accompany him/her at meetings of the committee. If resolution of the matter is not achieved, the Joint Review Committee shall refer the complaint with any recommendations to the Board of Ordained Ministry.
- d. Disposition of Complaints. - When a complaint has been received from the Joint Review Committee, the Board of Ordained Ministry shall develop a response based on the report of the Joint Review Committee and the needs of the church and the minister. The Board of Ordained Ministry may recommend remedial action, discontinuance, leave of absence, administrative location, termination, or it may dismiss the complaint. In rare instances, the Board may refer the matter to the Committee on Investigation for possible trial. The Board's recommendation will be shared with the minister, the Bishop, the Cabinet, and the complainant.
- e. Remedial Action. - In cooperation with the Cabinet and in consultation with the minister, the Board of Ordained Ministry may choose or recommend one or more of the following options for a program of remedial action, subject to regular oversight by the Board and annual review.
- (1) Program of continuing education (Par. 446)
 - (2) Leave of absence (Par. 450)
 - (3) Early retirement (Par. 453.2)
 - (4) Sabbatical leave (Par. 448)
 - (5) Honorable location (Par. 454.2)
 - (6) Surrender of ministerial office (Par. 454.4)
 - (7) Personal counseling or therapy
 - (8) Program of career evaluation
 - (9) Peer support and supervision
 - (10) Private reprimand: A letter signed by the chairperson of the Board of Ordained Ministry and the minister's District Superintendent, addressed to the minister with a file copy in the permanent file of the Board of Ordained Ministry stating the appropriateness of the complaint, the specific remedial action required, and the conditions under which the letter shall be withdrawn from the file and destroyed.

- f. Recommendation to Terminate Membership. - The Board of Ordained Ministry shall recommend the discontinuance of a probationary member in keeping with the provisions of Par. 454.1. The Board's recommendation to terminate the membership of an associate member or member in full connection must be based on any one or more of the offenses listed in Par. 2621. The Board shall notify the minister, the Bishop, and District Superintendent of the recommendation and shall forward the recommendation to the ministerial executive session of the Annual Conference. The notice to the minister shall also inform the minister of his/her right to elect trial (Par. 455.3) or withdraw under complaints (Par. 454.8). The recommendation of the Board of Ordained Ministry shall be acted upon by the ministerial executive session unless the minister shall choose withdrawal or trial. Such choice by the minister must be made and notification of the choice sent to the Bishop and the chairperson of the Board of Ordained Ministry within ten days following receipt of notice of the Board's recommendation. If a full member or associate member chooses trial, the Board of Ordained Ministry shall submit the formal complaint and other appropriate material to the Committee on Investigation.
2. THE JOINT REVIEW COMMITTEE AND COMMITTEE ON INVESTIGATION SHALL BE LISTED IN THE CONFERENCE JOURNAL.

A Covenant of Affiliation
Between
Peninsula United Methodist Homes, Inc.
and
The Peninsula Annual Conference of
The United Methodist Church

SECTION I. THE MEANING AND PURPOSE OF AFFILIATION:

- A. Annual Conference affiliation with a health and welfare type ministry or other program and the Conference's permission for that ministry or program for the use of the words "Peninsula United Methodist" in its name signifies that its goals and activities are consistent with the mission and ministry of the conference. Through affiliation the Annual Conference witnesses to the vitality and reliability of such ministries and publicly commends them as worthy ministries. It testifies that the services provided are worthy of the support of The United Methodist Churches of the Peninsula Annual Conference, public and private organizations and individuals.
- B. The purpose of this covenant of affiliation is to provide a clear and consistent mutually agreed upon statement of the relationship between Penin-

sula United Methodist Homes, Inc., and the Peninsula Annual Conference of The United Methodist Church. This covenant defines the ongoing responsibilities of each party to the other and supersedes any other prior understandings and relationships whether expressed or implied. All future relevant communications and contracts by either party shall reflect the affiliated relationship as covenanted herein.

SECTION II. RESPONSIBILITIES OF PENINSULA UNITED METHODIST HOMES, INC. TO THE PENINSULA ANNUAL CONFERENCE OF THE UNITED METHODIST CHURCH:

A. To present to the Annual Conference session the following:

(When the information required by items 1-5 below is published it shall be preceded by the following:

"The following information about Peninsula United Methodist Homes, Inc., is printed because the Conference has a common missional interest with Peninsula United Methodist Homes, Inc., although the Conference does not have any financial or legal responsibility for Peninsula United Methodist Homes, Inc.")

1. A current mission statement and a summary of the common religious heritage shared with the Peninsula Annual Conference. Notification shall be made to the Annual Conference of any amendments to the mission statement.
2. An annual report concerning the operations of the corporation.
3. An annual independent audit of finances.
4. Notification of any changes in its Certificate of Incorporation and Bylaws.
5. The names of those nominated by Peninsula United Methodist Homes, Inc. to be confirmed by the Annual Conference for the current class of Trustees and the names already serving to meet the following requirements:
 - a. 40% of the membership of the Board of Trustees of Peninsula United Methodist Homes, Inc., shall be made up of persons confirmed by the Peninsula Annual Conference. One half of these shall be laypersons currently holding membership in a local church of the Peninsula Conference and having done so for no less than four consecutive previous years. The other half of these shall be clergy holding full membership in the Peninsula Annual Conference and having done so for at least four consecutive previous years. Every effort shall be made for both groups to be representative of the diversity of the Annual Conference. Through this process there is a sharing in the recognition of individuals who support high standards of care and operation with a sense of mission in common with the Annual Conference. The persons nominated and confirmed as trustees do not represent, nor are they responsible to, the Annual Conference which confirmed them. The Board of Trustees of Peninsula United Methodist Homes, Inc., operates autonomously from the Annual Conference. (While 40% are confirmed by the Peninsula Annual Conference, all of the trustees are elected by the Peninsula United Methodist Homes, Inc. trustees under the provisions of its bylaws.)
 - b. The chairperson of the Division of Health and Welfare Ministries of the Peninsula Annual Conference Board of Global Ministries and the Wilmington District Superintendent will be considered as liaison persons to the Board of Trustees and will have ex-officio membership. These liaison persons are not to be considered part of the 40% to be confirmed and will have voice but no vote as ex-officio members.

B. To present to the Division of Health and Welfare Ministries of the Board of Global Ministries of the Peninsula Annual Conference the following:

1. All of the above information for review and recommendation no less than 90 days before the Annual Conference session.

2. A current copy of the Certificate of Incorporation and Bylaws.
 3. Documents advising of any significant changes in program or direction.
 4. Any plans to solicit funds from the churches of the Peninsula Annual Conference other than the annual Mother's Day offering. (See Section III., E.). Such plans shall be reviewed and coordinated with the Council on Finance and Administration of the Peninsula Annual Conference.
 5. To keep on file with the division current samples of all promotional materials, service contracts, and other significant materials.
- C. To maintain membership in the United Methodist Association of Health and Welfare Ministries.
 - D. To use the name Peninsula United Methodist Homes, Inc. on all promotional and official documents.
 - E. To present to current residents of Peninsula United Methodist Homes, Inc., facilities and all future residents a summary of this covenant.
 - F. In the event of dissolution of Peninsula United Methodist Homes, Inc., consideration shall be given the Peninsula Annual Conference of The United Methodist Church, its successors and assignees in transfer of any assets which must be assigned as result of dissolution.

SECTION III. RESPONSIBILITIES OF THE PENINSULA ANNUAL CONFERENCE OF THE UNITED METHODIST CHURCH TO PENINSULA UNITED METHODIST HOMES, INC.:

- A. Permit the use of the name and logo of the Peninsula United Methodist Homes, Inc., including reference to the affiliated relationship.
- B. Provide for the president of Peninsula United Methodist Homes or the Homes' designee an ex-officio position on the Division of Health and Welfare Ministries and Board of Global Ministries of the Peninsula Annual Conference. In addition both the President and the chairperson of the Board of Trustees will hold an ex-officio membership on the Peninsula Annual Conference Council on ministries. These positions will be with voice and without vote.
- C. Provide for the confirmation of nominations made by the Peninsula United Methodist Homes, Inc., representing 40% of the Board of Trustees as outlined in Section II., B., 5. of this covenant at the regular session of the Annual Conference. The Peninsula Annual Conference may confirm or reject any of these nominations. If additional nominations are necessary between sessions of the Annual Conference, the Division of Health and Welfare Ministries of the Board of Global Ministries will have the power to confirm such nominations and report such to the next Annual Conference session.
- D. Provide Peninsula United Methodist Homes, Inc., with access to communications channels of the Conference, including the Journal, the Conference, the Conference proceedings, and Conference newspaper, as well as other means of furthering promotion and interpretation of its mission and program.
- E. Give consideration to the needs of Peninsula United Methodist Homes, Inc., in its annual funding. Promote an annual Mother's Day offering for Peninsula United Methodist Homes, Inc.
- F. Encourage participation in peer review and self-evaluation programs which may be offered by the Department of Health and Welfare Ministries of the General Board of Global Ministries and/or the United Methodist Association of Health and Welfare Ministries. To share resources which may be offered through these channels for enrichment or support of ministry.
- G. Assist in maintaining awareness of spiritual and missional priorities in ministry.
- H. Communicate any changes in the Book of Discipline of The United Methodist Church and/or Annual Conference action which may affect this relationship.

- I. Maintain membership in the United Methodist Association of Health and Welfare Ministries.

SECTION IV. LIMITATIONS ON THE SCOPE OF THIS RELATIONSHIP:

- A. Neither the Peninsula United Methodist Homes, Inc., nor the Peninsula Annual Conference has or accepts any legal or financial responsibility for the operations or affairs of the other. Neither is the agent or servant of the other, neither shall represent that it is the agent or servant of the other and neither shall represent that the other is its agent or servant.
- B. Ownership and control of the assets and operations of Peninsula United Methodist Homes, Inc., resides totally and solely in Peninsula United Methodist Homes, Inc.

SECTION V. REVIEW PROCEDURES:

This covenant agreement shall be reviewed annually by the Annual Conference Division of Health and Welfare Ministries and Peninsula United Methodist Homes, Inc., and revised as needed. Either party may terminate the covenant agreement on one year's written notice. In the absence of revision or notification of termination, the covenant agreement will continue in force from year to year.

This Covenant establishing an affiliation relationship between Peninsula United Methodist Homes, Inc., and the Peninsula Annual Conference of the United Methodist Church, entered upon this the 12th day of June in the year of 1985, is mutually subscribed to by the parties listed below, signing as authorized representatives of their respective organizations.

RESTATED CERTIFICATE OF INCORPORATION
OF
PENINSULA UNITED METHODIST HOMES, INC.

(originally incorporated under the name of Homes for the Aged of the Peninsula Annual Conference of the Methodist Church, Inc.)

UNDER SECTION 245
OF THE
DELAWARE GENERAL CORPORATION LAW

WE, RICHARD C. STAZESKY, President, and ROBERT P. FAUST, Secretary, of Peninsula United Methodist United Methodist Homes, Inc. a corporation existing under the laws of the state of Delaware, do hereby certify as follows:

1. The name of the corporation is Peninsula United Methodist Homes, Inc. The name under which the corporation was originally incorporated was Homes for the Aged of the Peninsula Annual Conference of the Methodist Church, Inc., which name was changed to Peninsula United Methodist Homes and Hospitals, Inc., by certificate of amendment dated June 9, 1966, and which name is further changed to Peninsula United Methodist Homes, Inc., by this certificate.

2. The original certificate of incorporation of the corporation was filed with the Secretary of State, Dover, Delaware, on October 11, 1954.

3. The amendments to the certificate of incorporation effected by this certificate are as follows:

- (a) To change the name of the corporation;
- (b) To change the address of the corporation's registered office;
- (c) To shorten and clarify the statement of the business, objects and purposes of the corporation;
- (d) To eliminate any requirement that the property of the corporation be held in trust or that the corporation be under the supervision or control of the Peninsula Annual Conference of The United Methodist Church or any other body of The United Methodist Church;
- (e) To eliminate requirements for approval by the Peninsula Annual Conference of The United Methodist Church or any other body of The United Methodist Church of dissolution of the corporation or amendment of the certificate of incorporation;
- (f) To provide for adoption, amendment and repeal of the by-laws of the corporation; and
- (g) To expand the types of organizations to which the remaining assets of the corporation may be distributed in the event of dissolution.

4. The amendments and the restatement of the certificate of incorporation have been duly adopted in accordance with the provisions of the General Corporation Law of Delaware and the provisions of the corporation's certificate of incorporation as it existed prior to the amendments effected by this certificate, by:

- (a) An affirmative vote of two-thirds of the members of the corporation at a meeting called for that purpose; and
- (b) Approval of the successor to the Board of Hospitals and Homes of the Peninsula United Methodist Annual Conference.

5. The text of the certificate of incorporation of said Peninsula United Methodist Homes, Inc., as amended, is hereby restated as further amended by this certificate, to read in full, as follows:

CERTIFICATE OF INCORPORATION
OF
PENINSULA UNITED METHODIST HOMES, INC.

FIRST: The name of the corporation is Peninsula United Methodist Homes, Inc.

SECOND: The address of the corporations's registered office in the State of Delaware is Building D-200, 3801 Kennett Pike, P.O. Box 4420, Wilmington, New Castle County, Delaware 19807. The registered agent at such address shall be the corporation itself.

THIRD: The nature of the business of the corporation and the objects and purposes proposed to be transacted, promoted or carried on by it are as follows:

(a) The corporation is not organized for profit. No part of the net earnings or assets of the corporation shall be distributable to or inure to the benefit of its members, trustees, officers, donors or persons having a personal and private interest in the activities of the corporation, except that the corporation is authorized and empowered to pay reasonable compensation for services rendered and to make payments in furtherance of the purposes set forth in this Article "THIRD." No substantial part of the activities of the corporation shall be the carrying on of propoganda, or otherwise attempting to influence legislation, and the corporation shall not participate in, or intervene in (including any publishing or distributing of statements), any political campaign on behalf of any candidate for public office. Notwithstanding any other provision of this certificate, the corporation shall not carry on or engage in any activity not permitted to be carried on or engaged in by a corporation exempt from taxation under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1954, as amended, or the corresponding provisions of any future United States Internal Revenue Law, or by a corporation, contributions to which are deductible under Section 170(c)(2) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1954, as amended, or the corresponding provisions of any future United States Internal Revenue Law.

Subject always to the provisions of paragraph (a) of this Article "THIRD":

(b) The purpose of the corporation shall be to provide services and facilities for the aging.

(c) The corporation may engage in any lawful act or activity for which corporations may be organized under the General Corporation Law of Delaware.

FOURTH: The corporation is not organized for profit and shall not have authority to issue capital stock. The membership of the corporation shall consist of persons called "trustees." The number of members and conditions of membership, including tenure of office, shall be as stated in the by-laws of the corporation.

FIFTH: The corporation shall have perpetual existence.

SIXTH: The members of the corporation shall not be personally liable for payment of the corporation's debts.

SEVENTH: The original by-laws of the corporation shall be adopted by the incorporators. Thereafter, the power to adopt, amend or repeal the by-laws shall be in the members of the corporation.

EIGHTH: Upon the dissolution of the corporation, the members shall, after paying or making provision for the payment of all of the liabilities of the corporation, dispose of the assets of the corporation exclusively for the purposes of the corporation in such manner, or to such organization or organizations organized and operated for such purpose or purposes as shall at the time qualify as an exempt organization or organizations under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1954, as amended, or the corresponding provisions of any future United States Internal Revenue Law, as the members shall determine. Any such assets not so disposed of shall be disposed of by the Court of Chancery of the State of Delaware, exclusively for such purposes or to such organization or organizations, as said court shall determine, which are organized and operated exclusively for such purposes.

NINTH: The corporation is an independent legal entity. It is not an agency of or controlled by The United Methodist Church or the Peninsula United Methodist Annual Conference or any other part, division, department, board, agency or affiliate of The United Methodist Church.

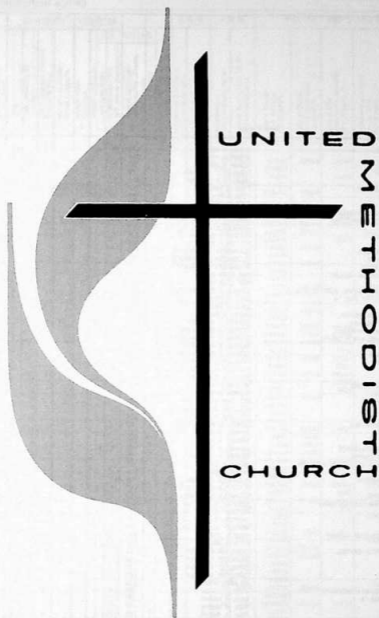

NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

DECEMBER 31, 1984

Note 1 Summary of Significant Accounting Policies.

The financial statements of the Methodist Mission and Church Extension Society, Inc. have been prepared on the accrual basis. The significant accounting policies followed are described below to enhance the usefulness of the financial statements to the reader.

Fund Accounting

To ensure observance of limitations and restrictions placed on the use of resources available to the Society, the accounts of the Society are maintained in accordance with the principles of fund accounting. This is a procedure by which resources for various purposes are classified for accounting and reporting purposes into funds established according to their nature and purpose.

The assets, liabilities and fund balances of the Society are reported in five self-balancing funds as follows:

Operating Funds, which include unrestricted and restricted resources, represent the portion of expendable funds that is available for support of the Society's operations.

Harrison Street Church School Funds represent resources that are to be used for scholarships which are made at the discretion of the board of directors.

Church Extension Funds represent resources that are restricted for church extension and development. This fund was closed during the year and all funds were expended.

Capital Funds represent funds restricted for plant acquisitions and funds expended for buildings and church properties.

Mission Endowment Fund represents monies received from the Harrison Street Church fire insurance settlement which have been invested into common stocks, U. S. Obligations and corporate bonds. Income from this fund will be used to promote the Society's programs.

Old Asbury Church Fund represents funds that are available for the support of Old Asbury Church.

Capital Fund Assets

Capital Fund assets are stated at their estimated values as of December 31, 1981 for assets purchased prior to 1982 and at cost for assets purchased after 1981. Depreciation is not provided for in the financial statements.

Note 2 Investments.

Investments are stated in the financial statements at cost. The cost and market value at December 31, 1984 are as follows:

Note 3 Other Commitments.

During 1982, the Society's Board approved a contribution to the Latin American Community Center in the amount of \$90,000 to assist the Center with its building program. As of the date of this report, the Society has a remaining commitment to the Center in the amount of \$60,000.

As of the date of this report, the Society had entered into two contracts for the renovations and rehabilitation to 623 N. Harrison Street and the kitchen at Old Asbury Church. Construction costs for the renovations of 623 N. Harrison Street are expected to be approximately \$144,420, of which \$12,673 has been paid as of December 31, 1984. Construction costs for the renovation to the kitchen at Old Asbury Church are expected to be approximately \$23,024. No payments have been made on the contract as of December 31, 1984.

Also, as of the date of this report, the Bank of Delaware has approved a ten year loan to the Society for up to \$125,000 to pay for the renovation at 623 N. Harrison Street. The loan is payable on demand at an interest rate of 10.75%. Investments held in the Mission Endowment Fund will be held as collateral.



NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS
DECEMBER 31, 1984 AND 1983

1. Summary of significant accounting policies.

GENERAL Assets and liabilities, revenues and expenditures, are recorded on the cash basis of accounting.

INVESTMENTS -
STOCKS

were originally recorded at market value and adjusted for additions and deletions since that date at cost. Market values of the Endowment Fund stock at December 31, 1984 and 1983, were \$998,421 and \$1,087,863, respectively, and unrealized appreciation amounted to \$489,507 and \$437,271, respectively. Market values of the Joshua Thomas Kinder Fund stocks at December 31, 1984 and 1983, were \$11,655 and \$10,000, respectively, and unrealized appreciation amounted to \$2,866 and \$1,890, respectively.

BONDS

were originally recorded at market value and adjusted for additions and deletions since that date at cost. The premiums are amortized over the life of the bond on a straight line basis. Market values of bonds at December 31, 1984 and 1983, were \$1,835,451 and \$1,652,368, respectively, and unrealized depreciation amounted to \$8,780 and \$41,205, respectively.

2. Ministers' Reserve Pension Fund.

The Peninsula Conference entered into Plan A of the Ministers' Reserve Pension Fund of the United Methodist Church, a contributory defined benefit plan, on January 1, 1977. During the years ended December 31, 1984 and 1983, nothing was paid for current funding while \$740,182 and \$668,957, respectively, was paid on the accrued service costs. The balance of the accrued service costs, which was estimated to be \$8,475,230 at December 31, 1984, is being funded in annual deposits of \$740,182 for a period of 30 years or until such time as the actual cost of funding the accrued service obligations has been met. Effective January 1, 1982, the cost of current funding is being paid by the local church, board or agency which employs the plan participant and not the Conference as in the past.

3. Financial Statement Reclassification.

Certain amounts in the financial statements for the year ended December 31, 1983 have been reclassified to a basis comparable with the amounts presented for the year ended December 31, 1984.

SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

The major accounting principles and practices followed by Wesley College are presented below to assist the reader in evaluating the financial statements and accompanying notes.

Fund Accounting

The accounts of the College are maintained in accordance with the principles of "fund accounting." This is the procedure by which resources for various purposes are classified for accounting and reporting purposes into funds that are in accordance with activities or objectives specified. Separate accounts are maintained for each fund; however, in the accompanying financial statements, funds that have similar characteristics have been combined into the following four fund groups:

Current Funds
Loan Funds
Endowment and Similar Funds
Plant Funds

All fund groups are separated into those which are restricted by donors or grantors and those which are unrestricted. Restricted funds may only be expended for the purpose indicated by the donor/grantor, whereas unrestricted funds are under the control of the Trustees of the College to use in accordance with its Charter and By-laws.

There are three financial statements used for fund accounting:

Balance Sheet - a listing of the assets, liabilities and fund balances as of the end of a fiscal year.

Statement of Current Funds Revenues, Expenditures and Other Changes - a summary of the financial activity of the current funds during a fiscal year. It does not represent the entire operations of the period (there is financial activity recorded in the other funds) nor does it reflect the net income or loss for a fiscal year.

Statement of Changes in Fund Balances - a summary of all the additions to and deductions from each of the major fund groups and subgroups during a fiscal year. This statement provides an overview of the College's financial activity during a fiscal year.

All unrestricted funds and funds restricted for current operations are reported as revenues in the statement of current funds revenues, expenditures and other changes during the year received or accrued with the exception of appreciation in value of investments of the endowment and similar funds.

All other restricted funds are recorded as additions to the appropriate fund balance in the statement of changes in fund balances when received or accrued.

Explanation of Transfers

Mandatory transfers to other funds - transfers made in accordance with contractual agreements relative to debt service and Federal student financial aid programs.

Investments

Investments in stocks, bonds and notes are stated at current market value.

Endowment and Similar Funds

The endowment and similar funds are subdivided into appropriate classifications. Endowment funds have been received from benefactors who, by the terms of their conveying instruments, have stipulated that the principal of their gifts may never be expended. Funds functioning as endowment have been established by the College, and expenditures from the principal of funds functioning as endowment are not similarly prohibited. Appreciation in value of investments of the endowment and similar funds are recorded as additions to principal of such funds.

Funds Held in Trust by Others

The College is income beneficiary of trust funds held by others which expire in December 1991. Income from the trust, which amounted to \$13,638, has been recorded as gift income of the unrestricted current funds.

Taxes

The Internal Revenue Service has ruled that the College is a tax-exempt institution; accordingly, no provisions for taxes has been made in the financial statements.

Pensions

Substantially all faculty and professional members are provided pension benefits under a program administered by the Teacher Insurance and Annuity Association. The policy of the College is to pay its share of the annual premium; there are no unfunded benefits. Pension plan expense was \$45,995 in 1984.

Plant Funds

Land and improvements, buildings and equipment and furnishings are recorded at cost, or appraised value at time of acquisition if contributed.

No provision is made in the accounts for depreciation of plant assets since such provision is not in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles for colleges and universities.

The Wilmington Trust Company note is unconditionally guaranteed by the Peninsula Annual Conference of the United Methodist Church (PAC). The note is secured in the event of default by a lien and a security interest in and against all property of any nature of the College or the PAC. Additionally, a mortgage subordinate to the mortgages of the plant fund was entered as security for all payments of the note. The College may make additional borrowings against the note, up to a maximum principal amount of \$1,800,000, through October 1985. The amount of the quarterly principal payments which begin on October 1, 1985 will be equal to one thirty-second (1/32) of the loan balance as of July 1, 1985.

1. Summary of Significant Accounting Policies:

The financial statements are prepared on the accrual basis of accounting.
Fixed Assets are depreciated on a straight line method over the estimated useful lives of the assets.
Investments are stated at cost.
Fixed Assets donated are capitalized at the fair market value on the date of gift.
Medicare reimbursements are recorded when received, therefore the accounts receivable do not reflect any monies due from this source.

4. Mortgage Receivable:

In March 1982, the corporation sold certain capital assets for \$30,000 cash and a \$60,000 mortgage note receivable due February 1, 1987. The note bears interest monthly at 3.1 percent below prime, with principal payments being made at the option of the purchaser.

5. Pension Plan:

The minimum rental commitment on the lease as of April 30, 1984 aggregates approximately \$76,036. Rent expense for the year ended April 30, 1984 amounted to \$40,164.

8. Compensated Absences:

The Corporation has fully adopted the Provisions of Statement 43 of the Financial Accounting Standards Board which sets forth the criteria for accounting for compensated absences. In accordance with the pronouncement, the corporation has accrued an amount for vested vacation accumulated by the Corporation's employees as of April 30, 1984.

AUDITORS' REPORT

To The Board of Directors of the
Peninsula United Methodist Foundation, Inc.

We have examined the balance sheet of Peninsula United Methodist Foundation, Inc. as of December 31, 1984, and the related statements of revenues and expenses, and changes in fund balances for the twelve months then ended. Our examination was made in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards and, accordingly, included such tests of the accounting records and such other auditing procedures as we considered necessary in the circumstances.

In January 1984, the Foundation received title to a 22 acre parcel of land which it was to sell and, after the sale, it was to expend the proceeds to a specific charity. At the time the title was transferred to the Foundation, the Foundation recorded the gift of real estate in the endowment fund for \$187,000, the fair market value as established by a certified real estate appraiser employed by the donor shortly before the date of gift. In August 1984, the Foundation offered this same land in full payment of an obligation it had incurred in the amount of \$30,000, and in May 1985 the Foundation received an offer to sell the land for a price of \$35,000. It is our opinion that there has either been a substantial decrease in the value of the land since the date of the gift, or the land was recorded at a price in excess of the actual market value at the date of gift and we believe the Foundation should reduce the carrying amount of the land as reported in the Endowment Fund section of its balance sheet to reflect any decrease in market value as of the end of the year.

In our opinion, except for the effect, if any, of carrying the land in the Endowment Fund at an amount in excess of market value as described in the preceding paragraph, the financial statements referred to above present fairly the financial position of Peninsula United Methodist Foundation, Inc., at December 31, 1984 and the results of its operations and changes in its fund balances for the twelve months then ended, in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles applied on a basis consistent with that of the preceding year.

NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS
DECEMBER 31, 1984

Note 1 Summary of Significant Accounting Policies.

The financial statements of Peninsula United Methodist Foundation, Inc. have been prepared on the accrual basis. The significant accounting policies followed are described below to enhance the usefulness of the financial statements to the reader.

Fund Accounting.

To insure observance of limitations and restrictions placed on the use of resources available to the Foundation, the accounts of the Foundation are maintained in accordance with the principles of fund accounting. This is the procedure by which resources for various purposes are classified for accounting and reporting purposes into funds established according to their nature and purpose. Separate accounts are maintained for each fund; however, in the accompanying financial statements, funds that have similar characteristics have been combined into groups.

The assets, liabilities and fund balances of the Foundation are reported in six self-balancing fund groups as follows:

General Funds, which include unrestricted and restricted resources, represent the portion of expendable funds that are available for support of the Foundation's operations.

Capital Funds represent resources restricted for the acquisition of furniture and equipment, and funds expended for furniture and equipment.

Annuity and Life Income Funds represent funds managed by the Foundation which are gifts to various charitable organizations. These gifts are given with the condition that the Foundation will pay the income earned by the donated assets to the donor for the lifetime of the donor or an individual designated by the donor. These funds include Pooled Income Funds, Charitable Remainder Trusts and Gift Annuities.

Endowment and Similar Funds represent gifts of present and future interests in which the donor has stipulated in the donative instrument that the principal be maintained in perpetuity or until a specific time or event and that the income be expended to a specific charitable organization.

Philanthropic Funds represent gifts to the Foundation. These gifts are normally held by the Foundation until the donor requests the Foundation to disburse the funds to a specific charitable organization.

Agency Funds are funds which the Foundation holds as custodian and investment advisor.

Note 2 Investments.

Investments are recorded at cost; investments received by gift are carried at market value at the date of gift. A comparison of cost to market value at December 31, 1984 is as follows:

Real estate held for investment (including future interests in real estate) are stated at market value at the date of gift.

Note 3 Capital Fund.

Depreciation of equipment is provided over the estimated useful lives of the respective assets on the straight line method.

Note 4 Tax Exempt Status.

The Peninsula United Methodist Foundation, Inc. is exempt from federal income taxes under the provisions of Section 501 (c) (3) of the Internal Revenue Code according to a determination letter from the Internal Revenue Service dated September 29, 1978. In addition, the Foundation has been determined not to be a Private Foundation within the meaning of IRC Section 509 (a) and is therefore not subject to the excise tax on investment income.

Note 5 Contingent Receivables and Payables.

The Foundation has obtained reinsurance on all charitable gift annuities received to date. The Foundation has a contingent receivable equal to the difference between the cost of the annuity purchased and the amount of annuity paid by the insurance company to an annuitant who dies before receiving annuity payments equal to the amount of the policy cost. The amount contingently receivable at December 31, 1984 was estimated to be \$79,835.

Note 6 Loan Payable.

Loan Payable at December 31, 1984 represents an unsecured, non-interest bearing loan, payable to the Catherine Jane Howe Trust. Proceeds from the loan were used to fund a Foundation Program. The loan will be paid off as soon as a parcel of land, which was donated to the Foundation during 1984, is sold.

The above introductory statement is quoted from the meditation given by The Rev. George C. Godfrey, Senior Minister, at the memorial service held in Wesley United Methodist Church in Dover, DE, on February 23, 1985, for the Rev. Dr. Franklin Bryan

Bailey. Dr. Bailey died on Ash Wednesday, February 20, 1985, at age eighty-eight in Dover, DE, following a five-day illness.

A son of William Franklin Pierce and Mary Adeline (Dryden) Bailey, Franklin Bryan was born on October 1, 1896, in Snow Hill, MD, and was the youngest of eight children. He was baptized in January, 1909, at Bates Memorial Methodist Protestant Church, Snow Hill, where he and his mother became active members; his father had been nurtured in the Baptist tradition. His love of music was noticed early in his teens when he learned to play the cornet and violin, eventually teaching violin to others.

Two years following graduation from Snow Hill High School in 1915, he entered Western Maryland College, Westminster, MD, where he received the A.B. degree in 1921. While at WMC he participated in dramatics, played in the college orchestra, sang in a choral group, and was ROTC bugler. In 1924 he graduated from Westminster Theological Seminary (now Wesley), Westminster, MD with a B.D. degree and while serving at nearby Deer Park, MD, Circuit completed his requirements for the S.T.D. degree in 1934. His doctoral thesis was entitled, "A Brief Review of Several Religions and the Finality of the Christian Religion." He was president of his seminary class.

In 1924 he was ordained in Bethesda Methodist Protestant Church, Salisbury, MD. All through his secondary and higher education careers he gained financial assistance as well as valuable life experience in various employment areas such as in local Snow Hill and Salisbury businesses, in the drafting department of the DuPont Company in Wilmington, DE, and at the Norfolk Navy Yard, Portsmouth, VA.

It was in Portsmouth that he became active in Cottage Place Methodist Episcopal Church, South and met Laura Anne Bohlken, whom he married on October 7, 1924 at this church which her parents were instrumental in founding.

Dr. Bailey served the following Maryland Methodist Protestant Conference churches: West Wilmington, DE, 1921-23; Lauraville, Baltimore, MD, 1925; Wallace Memorial, Fox Hill, VA, 1926-29; Mardela, MD, 1928-29; Deer Park, 1930-34; Calvary, Baltimore, 1935-36; Maryland and Peninsula Methodist Conferences: Federalsburg, MD, (Christ), 1937-44; Laurel, DE, (Christ), 1945-55; North East, MD, 1956-59; and Associate, McCabe Memorial (now Peninsula-McCabe), Wilmington, 1960-61. He retired in 1962 but continued to serve McCabe Church in visitation, teaching, and preaching; he ended his official ministerial career in Wilmington, where it had begun forty-one years before. In 1972 he and Laura moved to Dover, DE, where he continued to visit the homebound as a volunteer for Wesley Church.

Among other Peninsula Conference duties, he served as a member of the Board of Trustees for sixteen years.

In addition to Dr. Bailey's pastoral pursuits, he followed two avocations—writing and teaching. From 1937-40 he wrote the weekly adult church school lessons as a staff member of *The Methodist Protestant-Recorder*, the official Maryland Conference magazine published in Baltimore. Further, besides biblical teaching, he also taught in the Federalsburg and Laurel public high schools. He was also a Mason.

Retirement kept Franklin Bailey as busy as ever. Besides his church involvement, he spent many hours in his workshop refinishing furniture, caning chairs, and as during his active years, he never tired of planting flower and vegetable gardens nor of his love of swimming, preferably in the ocean. Extensive traveling was another opportunity which retirement permitted. Laura and Franklin took many bus tours, including a thirty-day trip to the West Coast, and visited more than thirty states; they also flew to Hawaii twice and cruised to the Bahamas. During these trips he served the groups as

also flew to Hawaii twice and cruised to the Bahamas. During these trips he served the groups as traveling chaplain, conducting worship services enroute.

Dr. Bailey is survived by two sons and one daughter-in-law, Franklin Bryan, Jr., of Dover and Ralph Bohlken and Wendy Leigh (Wright) and one grandson, Jonathan Franklin, all of Salisbury.

It was most appropriate and appreciated that Franklin's contemporaries served as honorary pallbearers: The Revs. Hartwell F. Chandler, Harvey B. Flater, F. Douglas Milbury, Dr. W.A. Roberts, Oliver H. Spence, and Dr. Roy L. Tawes. A younger generation who knew Franklin well included as pallbearers: The Revs. Clifford A. Armour, Jr., Harvey Manchester, Jr., Dale R. Pruett; Robert W. Starrett, Carolyn R. Swift, and Lay Speaker Richard Scott. Interment was in Lakeside Cemetery, Dover.

THE REV. HOWARD ANDREW BAILEY



Howard Andrew Bailey was the seventh child born to Dori and Sarah Casson Bailey, April 10, 1901, in Denton, Maryland.

After finishing grade school in Denton, Maryland, he graduated from Dunbar High School in Washington, D.C. He continued his education in Washington, D.C. at Howard University School of Religion where he received his Bachelor of Divinity degree, cum laude. His post-graduate work was continued at Temple University in Philadelphia, Pennsylvania.

In 1933 he became a member of the Delaware Conference; 1933-'35—Greenlock and Rhodes, N.J.; 1935-'38—Hamilton Memorial, Atlantic City, N.J.; 1938-'42—Newport, Del.; 1942-'43—Salem, N.J.; 1943-'65—Executive Secretary, Board of Education, Delaware Conference; 1965 - Peninsula, 1965-'69—

Associate Executive Secretary, Board of Education; 1970-'71—Staff Assoc. Methodist Action Program; 1972-'81—Haven United Methodist Church, Wilmington, Del.; 1981—Retired.

For many years he served on the Board of Trustees of the Christian Center of Morgan University, Baltimore, Maryland. He was also a Trustee of Morristown College, Morristown, Tennessee.

His teaching and administrative positions in The Methodist Church included: teaching in Pastor's Supply School at Bennett College, Greensboro, North Carolina, under the Board of Education and in the Schools of Methods under the Board of Missions, The Methodist Church. He gave much of his time, "beyond the line of duty," as dean and teacher in many schools for laity and clergy alike.

He was married to the former Nora Augusta Jefferson, daughter of the Reverend and Mrs. John Wesley Jefferson, of the former Delaware Conference, The Methodist Church, who was a faithful wife for more than fifty years.

In addition to his wife he leaves to mourn their loss: a son, Wayne; three grandsons, Wayne, Jr., Vernon, and Michael; two sisters, Mildred Rivers and Kay Nichols; two brothers, Theodore and Carroll; three sisters-in-law, Ora and Lillian Bailey, and Bernetta Reid; one brother-in-law, Bishop D. Ward Nichols; and a host of other relatives and friends.

Howard Andrew Bailey's interest in ecumenical living in both Church and civic projects was expanded by extensive travel. His insight, understanding, and leadership served as the basis upon which he was awarded a number of citations and other honors.

Following a lengthy illness at his home in Yeadon, Pennsylvania, and in the Hospital of The University of Pennsylvania, Philadelphia, death came on Sunday, September 9, 1984, in the Hospital of The University of Pennsylvania. The Memorial Service was held on Sunday, September 16, 1984, Camphor Memorial United Methodist Church, Philadelphia, where he has been a member for many years.

The Reverend Carroll P. Boswell, Minister, and The Reverend Lydia C. Moore, Associate Minister officiated. The Reverend Dr. C. Edwin Lasbury, Superintendent, Wilmington District, Peninsula Annual Conference, delivered the eulogy. The interment was in Rolling Green Memorial Park, West Chester, Pennsylvania, September 17, 1984.

THE REV. WALDO LEE DISE

Waldo Lee Dise, born on Tangier Island, Virginia, of Joshua Thomas Dise and Martha (Murphy) Dise on July 18, 1902, died at his home in Bivalve, Maryland, of heart failure on December 14, 1984. He was 82.

Married in June, 1923 to Mary Adeline Tieman, he is survived by his wife; daughter, Anita Margaret Dise Brown, of Harpers Ferry, West Virginia; son, Kendall Arden Dise, of Bivalve, Maryland; grandson, James Lee Brown, of Baltimore, Maryland; granddaughter, Barbara Lynn Miller, of Warrenton, Virginia; grandson, Stephen Dorman Brown, of Norfolk, Virginia; brother, Eugene Dise, of Carson, Virginia; sisters, Violet Baland and Mary Chandlee, both of Baltimore, Maryland; and several nieces and nephews.

He graduated from Wesleyan Collegiate Institute, Dover, Delaware in June 1923 and took his bride the same month. Additional degrees were received from Gettysburg Theological Seminary, Gettysburg, Pennsylvania (1928) and Harvard University Chaplain School in Cambridge, Massachusetts (1944).

A World War II army veteran, he served as a chaplain with the 48th Field Hospital with the First and Ninth Armies and achieved the rank of Captain. He was with the Army of Occupation for 18 months following the war, and served as a Chaplain Attendant for the funeral services of General George Patton.

His first church appointment was in White Haven, Maryland (1923), followed by charges in Breezewood, Pennsylvania; Aurora, West Virginia; Church Creek, Maryland; Pittsville, Maryland; Wyoming, Delaware; St. John's United Methodist Church in Fruitland, Maryland; Hurlock, Maryland; Rehoboth Beach, Delaware; Centreville, Maryland; East New Market, Maryland; Mardela, Maryland; St. Andrew's United Methodist Church in Salisbury, Maryland; and Hebron, Maryland. He retired in 1965 to spend his remaining years at Briar Patch, the family estate next to the Nanticoke River in Bivalve, Maryland.

His last act in the Church occurred two weeks prior to his death, when he celebrated the baptism of great-granddaughters Emily Hearne Miller and Rachel Addison Miller at the home of his granddaughter, Barbara.

THE REV. FRANK LUCIA

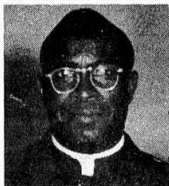
The interment was in Barratt's Chapel Cemetery in Frederica, Delaware.

THE REV. CHARLES PARKER SPENCER, SR.



The Reverend Charles Parker Spencer, Sr. departed this earthly life on Monday, October 15, 1984 at the West Jersey Hospital in Voorhees, New Jersey, after a lengthy illness.

THE REV. DR. ROY LAWSON TAWES



Roy Lawson Tawes, son of Fred Bowers and Nancy Lawson Tawes was born at Crisfield, Maryland, May 4, 1906. He came of seafaring folk and spent his boyhood living and working along the shores of the Tangier Sound. Early in life he came under the influence of the late Rev. Dr. Wilbur F. Corkran and under his tutelage became known as "the boy preacher," devoting much of his time and talent to speaking at camp meetings, to youth groups, and the activities of his own church. After graduating from Crisfield High School and the former Wilmington Conference Academy, now Wesley College, he was admitted to membership in the Wilmington Annual Conference of The Methodist Episcopal Church, where he began a succession of appointments in 1928 which was to last more than fifty years and cover a variety of charges ranging from student pastor to district superintendent. Other activities and contributions were to include service as a Trustee of Wesley College and membership on the Conference Boards of Education, Evangelism, Pensions, and Investigation.

In 1960 he was elected a member of The General Conference of The Methodist Church. The author of three volumes of sermons, his book, "The Global Christ," was chosen as Book-Of-The-Month by *Pulpit Digest*. In addition to writing a weekly column for *The Wilmington Morning News*, he was a contributor to such magazines and periodicals as *The Christian Advocate*, *Christianity Today*, *Pulpit Digest*, and *The Upper Room*. In 1964 he was the recipient of The Freedom Foundation Award at Valley Forge for his sermon, "It Costs To Be Free."

When, in 1960, Western Maryland College conferred upon him the degree of Doctor of Divinity, honoris causa, the president, Dr. Lowell Ensor, said of him: "You were unable because of circumstances to complete a formal college education, yet in the considered opinion of many of your associates you are one of the most broadly-educated men on the Delmarva Peninsula. You have lived with books as your closest friends, and your fine library has been more important to you than a well-stocked pantry. In devoting this love of learning to your high calling as a Christian minister, you have become a preacher of exceptional merit, enriching your sermons with the wisdom of the ages. As a consequence, several volumes have been published, your contributions to religious journals are sought, and you are in constant demand as a reviewer of religious books. With all this love of learning, you have never neglected the human and temporal phases of your ministry, but have given yourself with complete devotion to the building of Christ's kingdom."

Dr. Tawes died in Milford, Delaware on April 3, 1985. Funeral services were conducted at Avenue Church on April 11th with the Rev. Paul E. McCoy, pastor, Dr. Edwin L. Ellis, district superintendent, Dr. R. Jervis Cooke, and the writer of this memoir officiating. Burial was at Barratt's Chapel, Frederica, where Dr. Tawes once served as pastor. He is survived by his wife, Mabel Sue Warren Tawes, to whom he was married May 10, 1927, and three children, Onetia Tawes Pierson of Manlius, N.Y., Bonnie Sue Tawes of Madrid, Spain, and Dr. Roy L. Tawes, Jr. of Hillsboro, California.

MRS. BERTHA MAE CANNON JEFFERSON

"To know what to do is wisdom
To know how to do it is skill
To do it when it should be done is service"

These words, written in the front of her address book, exemplified the life of Bertha Mae Cannon Jefferson.

She was born on a farm in Dagsboro, Delaware on March 8, 1895, the third child in a family of seven, to Granville and Sallie E. (Johnson) Cannon. She attended the public schools in Sussex County and from 1917-1919 attended West Chester Normal School (now West Chester State University) in Pennsylvania. She taught elementary school in Sussex County and on June 2, 1923, married her principal, Otis Paynter Jefferson.

Two sons were born to this union: in 1928, Otis Paynter Jefferson, Jr., Dagsboro, Delaware, recently-retired as Dean of the University Parallel Program of the University of Delaware, and in 1931, the Rev. Kinmoth White Jefferson, Montclair, New Jersey, the Executive Secretary, Office of Urban Ministries, National Division, Board of Global Ministries, the United Methodist Church.

In 1925, her husband, Otis, decided to enter the Methodist ministry, and Bertha made a loving home of the parsonages in Cheswold, Delaware; Crumpton, Maryland; Ocean City, Maryland; Chincoteague, Virginia; Chesapeake City, Maryland; Perryville, Maryland; Lewes, Delaware; Centreville, Maryland; Wilmington, Delaware (Peninsula Church); Seaford, Delaware; Crisfield, Maryland (Emmanuel Church) and Wilmington (Eastlake-Trinity). In 1962, Otis retired and worked part-time with the Rev. Dr. Brooks Reynolds at Asbury United Methodist Church, Wilmington Manor. On May 13, 1963, with the death of Otis, their 39-year partnership ended.

For the next 22 years she lived, first, in Wilmington, then in an apartment in Seaford, and in the final decade of her life at the Methodist Manor in Seaford. She was a loving mother, a gracious mother-in-law to Sara Dunreath Campbell and Elizabeth Norell Baker, and a caring grandmother to five granddaughters, Dana Joy, Tamara Lynn, Nancy Elizabeth, Judith Anne, and Susan Grace. She provided a role model of responsible and lively interest in the world. She was a reader, a letter writer, "the best fried chicken cook ever," according to her New Jersey granddaughters, a gracious hostess, and, always a dignified lady. She was a lifetime member of the W.C.T.U. She had high standards for herself and her family. Her family, her friends, and her faith were significant cornerstones in her life. She left a brother, Elisha Cannon, Lakewood, New Jersey, and two sisters, Sarah (Mrs. Raymond Faucett) and Hannah (Mrs. Howard King) of Seaford, Delaware.

Two months after her ninetieth birthday she suffered a stroke, and on May 18, 1985, she died. She was buried May 20, 1985, beside her husband, at the Slaughters Neck Methodist Church Cemetery in a graveside service which nearly a hundred people attended. The Rev. Dr. Brooks Reynolds, who had participated in her husband's funeral service twenty-two years before, officiated. Her sons, Otis and Kim, also participated in the service.

In a letter of condolence Bishop James Ault included the words of an old prayer, which is included here as an affirmation of her and our Christian faith.

She went with her husband to his first Charge in 1919 at Bayside, Maryland in the old Wilmington Conference. All across the years Julia was active in organizing young adult groups, working in the Church School and special programs of the Conference and Church. Because of their work and her sparkling personality many of those she had influenced in her classes remained friends throughout the years.

Upon retirement they moved to Wilmington, Delaware, finally purchasing a home in the Bellefonte area. In 1962 they took up residence at the Methodist Country House.

Julia quickly became involved there and was soon on the Residence Council and became the leader of the Country House Prayer Group. She was well known for her poetry and often wrote a poem for special occasions or services.

Although Julia never had any children, many who gathered around her and remained loyal throughout the years, she called her "children." They enriched her life with fellowship and joy as she enriched theirs with love and affection.

On her 90th birthday over seventy people gathered at a surprise party at the Country House to bring her greetings and help her celebrate. In the Spring of '84 it was necessary for her to leave her room and move to the Health Center at the Country House. She remained active, getting around in a wheelchair until about two weeks before her death. On Saturday, February 9, 1985 her Master called her home. Her long-time friend and one she called her "daughter," Eleanor Wilfong Robinson, was with her. Services were held at McCreary Funeral Home, Kirkwood Highway, Wilmington at 2:00 p.m. on February 13th 1985, with interment conducted by Dr. Willard L. Robinson, Jr. at the Townsend Cemetery.

Julia had lived a full, vigorous life and brought a positive hope of joy to all who came to know her. Her poem "Wild Roses" seems to sum up her feelings and attitude as well as to serve as a fine example of her poetry:

WILD ROSES

by H. Julia Shockley

*Does anyone remember
The little wild pink rose
That bloomed in spring and summer
Along the country road?

Their lovely little faces turned
To greet the morning sun.
Their perfume lured each roving bee
Until the day was done.

In Memory I still can see
Wild roses pink and sweet.

MRS. MAE WILLIAMS TURNER

Mae Williams Turner was born near Gamber, Carroll County, Maryland on July 28, 1893, the daughter of Charles Beauregard Williams and Effie May Williams. Mae Williams never knew her father, since he died on August 17, 1893. When she was about five years old her mother married again, this time to Samuel Elbridge Miller.

The family lived in Westminster, Maryland, and there Mae Williams attended West End Elementary School and graduated from Westminster High School in 1911.

She taught in the schools of Carroll County and attended college classes in the summer to maintain her teaching certificate. In later years she told of walking long distances to teach in one-room rural schools and of her adventures in taming unruly youths twice her size.

On June 16, 1919 Mae Williams married Gilbert Edwin Turner, then a student at Westminster Theological Seminary of the Methodist Protestant Church.

Gilbert Turner graduated from the Seminary on May 4, 1920, and was ordained a minister of the Methodist Protestant Church. Mrs. Turner continued to teach in the public schools until the birth of her children, Brice Williams Turner, Sept. 5, 1924, David Edwin Turner, Oct. 22, 1926, and Donald Paul Turner, Jan. 22, 1930.

After her sons were older, Mae Turner returned to school to obtain her college degree. She graduated from Salisbury State College, Salisbury, Maryland in 1947, and taught in several schools, the last being at Smith Island, Maryland. She retired from teaching in June 1959.

Mae Turner and the Rev. Mr. Turner resided at Uniontown, Carroll County from 1959 until his death on January 1, 1976. Increasing health problems made it necessary for Mae Turner to enter the Westminster Convalescent and Nursing Center, where she remained until her death on Sept. 1, 1984. Burial was in the Methodist cemetery in Uniontown. She was 91. The Rev. Jane Billingslea of the Uniontown United Methodist Church officiated.

Mae Turner was firmly convinced that it was necessary to persevere to the last, that a good education is one of life's treasures, and that the hills of Western Maryland were the nearest place to heaven on this side of paradise.

IX. Conference Rules of Order

- Rule 1:** The Conference shall convene and adjourn at the discretion of the presiding Bishop and the Committee on Conference Arrangements. The Conference in plenary session may alter the time of convening or adjourning.
- Rule 2:** The President shall decide all questions of order, subject to an appeal to the Conference; but in case of such an appeal the question shall be taken without debate, except that the appellant may make a simple statement of the grounds of her/his appeal.
- Rule 3:** All Resolutions, motions, amendments, and substitute motions presented to the Annual Conference shall be submitted to the Secretary in writing at the time they are made or as soon thereafter as possible.
- Rule 4:** When a motion is made and seconded, or a resolution is introduced and seconded, or a report presented and read by the Secretary, or stated by the President, it shall be deemed in possession of the Conference; but any motion or resolution may be withdrawn by the mover, with the consent of the Conference, at any time before amendment or decision.
- Rule 5:** No new motion or resolution shall be entertained until the one under consideration has been disposed of, which may be done by adoption or rejection, unless one of the following motions shall intervene which shall have precedence in the order in which they are placed, namely:
1. To fix the time in which the Conference shall adjourn.
 2. To adjourn.
 3. To take a recess.
 4. To lay on the Table.
 5. For the previous question.
 6. To postpone to a given time.
 7. To refer.
 8. To substitute.
 9. Amendment.
 10. To postpone indefinitely.
- Rule 6:** A motion to amend shall be in order, and a substitute for both amendments may be received which substitute may be amended only once, and if a substitute be accepted, it shall operate as an amendment to the original proposition.
- Rule 7:** When a member is about to speak in debate, or to deliver any matter to the Conference, she/he shall rise and respectfully address the President, but shall not proceed until recognized by her/him.
- Rule 8:** No member shall be interrupted while speaking except by the President to call her/him to order when she/he departs from the question, or uses personalities or disrespectful language; but any member may call the attention of the President to the subject when she/he deems a speaker out of order, and any member may explain when she/he thinks herself/himself misrepresented.
- Rule 9:** When a member desires a question of privilege, she/he shall briefly state the question; but it shall not be in order for her/him to proceed until the President shall have decided it a privileged question.
- Rule 10:** No person shall speak more than twice on the same question, nor more than ten minutes at one time, without leave of the Conference; nor shall any person speak more than once until every member choosing to speak shall have spoken.

- Rule 11: When any motion or resolution shall have been acted by the Conference, it shall be in order for any member who voted with the prevailing side to move a reconsideration; but a motion to reconsider is a non-debatable motion and shall be decided without debate.
- Rule 12: No member shall absent herself/himself from the sessions of the Conference without leave, unless she/he is sick or unable to attend.
- Rule 13: No member shall be allowed to vote on any question who is not within the bar of the Conference at the time when such question shall be put by the President, except by leave of the Conference when such member has been necessarily absent.
- Rule 14: Every member who is within the bar at the time a question is put shall give her/his vote, unless the Conference, for special reasons, shall excuse her/him.
- Rule 15: It shall be in order for her/him to move that the question be taken without further debate on any measure pending, except in cases in which character is involved, and if sustained by two-thirds, the question shall be taken.
- Rule 16: The motion to adjourn shall be taken without debate, and shall always be in order, except, (1) when a member has the floor; (2) when a question is actually put, or a vote is being taken; (3) when the question is pending or seconding the demand for the previous question; (4) when the previous question has been called and sustained, and is still pending; and (5) when a motion to adjourn has been negatived and no business or debate has intervened.
- Rule 17: All reports of the Boards, Commissions, and Committees shall be published and mailed to the members of the Annual Conference ten (10) days prior to the date of meeting of the Annual Conference. Reports to be included in this mailing must be in the hands of the Secretary by the date set annually by the Conference Council on Ministries.
- Rule 18: No report shall be received or adopted by the Conference until a copy has been placed in the hands of the Secretary.
- Rule 19: These rules shall not be suspended or amended except by a vote of two-thirds of the members present and voting.
- Rule 20: All materials to be published in the Journal shall be in the hands of the Conference Secretary not later than 14 days following the adjournment of the Annual Session or they shall be excluded, the date to be part of the Organizational motion of the Annual Conference.
- Rule 21: The Nominating Committee shall distribute copies of its reports to the Annual Conference on the day before the report is to be voted on by the Annual Conference.
- Rule 22: Recommendations as to change in policy regarding data to be included in the Journal shall be determined by the Journal Committee and submitted to the Annual Conference for action.
- Rule 23: With the exception of the Board of Ordained Ministry, no member of any Board, Division, Committee, or Commission shall serve more than two consecutive quadrennia on said Board, Division, Committee, or Commission, and shall be ineligible to be re-elected until after one quad-

rennium has elapsed except members of boards, committees, or commissions elected for three-year terms may serve three consecutive terms and shall be ineligible to be re-elected until after one term has lapsed and except that when a member is elected to fill an unexpired quadrennium or term she/he may complete the unexpired quadrennium or term and serve not more than one additional consecutive quadrennium or term. Persons elected to the Board of Ordained Ministry may serve eight (8) years regardless of what year in the quadrennium they begin serving. No member of the Conference, lay or ministerial, shall be elected to serve on more than two Boards, Divisions, Committees, or Commissions concurrently, except the committees elected or appointed for the Annual Conference session only, district committees whether or not elected by the Annual Conference and the quadrennial committee of the local church. The distribution of membership shall be according to districts, three lay persons and three ministers as nearly as possible to each district.

- Rule 24: Lay members of the Annual Conference will be elected quadrennially. A lay member may be re-elected for another quadrennium but must wait one quadrennium before being eligible for election for a third term.
- Rule 25: In order to achieve balanced membership in the Annual Conference, the Conference Secretary shall report quadrennially the number of lay persons required to preserve equality of membership, and that the Peninsula Conference achieve the desired equality of membership, by (1) the associate lay leader of Lay Life and Work, the four District Lay Leaders, the four District Presidents of the United Methodist Women, all United Methodist Deaconesses active and retired within the bounds of the Peninsula Annual Conference, all certified Directors of Christian Education employed by churches of the Peninsula Annual Conference, and all other voting lay persons of the Conference Council on Ministries, shall be members in the Annual Conference with vote; (2) each pastoral charge enrolling more than 500 members, but having only one clergy member appointed to it, may elect one additional lay member, and further, that a pastoral charge having more than one clergy member appointed to it may elect one additional lay member, provided that more than 1,500 members are enrolled; and (3) the Conference Council on Youth Ministries shall elect as many youth members as are needed to maintain a balance, divided equally among the districts.
- Rule 26: All budget requests must be referred to the Council on Finance and Administration prior to Annual Conference action.
- Rule 27: All statistical material for inclusion in the Statistical Tables to be printed in the Annual Journal must be in by January 30 or it will not be included.
