RULES AND GUIDELINES FOR THE CONFERENCE NOMINATING COMMITTEE

- That the Peninsula Conference again record its faith in the principle of Rotation and adherence to the Book of Discipline of The United Methodist Church.
- 2. That the Nominating Committee be composed of the Cabinet, the Conference Secretary, the Conference Lay Leader, the Lay Leader of each District, the Conference President of United Methodist Men, a representative selected by the United Methodist Women Executive Committee, the District Presidents of United Methodist minister under appointment from each District to be elected for a quadrennium by the respective District Ministerium, and the Conference Council Director.
- 3. That, since the quadrennial system is an established part of the United Methodist economy, all members of boards, commissions, and committees shall be elected for a quadrennium unless restricted by Discipline, charter, or some other legal requirement. In the event of such legal restrictions, the Principle of Rotation is still to be observed. That for the 1988-93 time period, persons elected to Boards and Agencies of the Peninsula Annual Conference at the Annual. Confis change: is with or this one time period, only will bring the next change in leadership in 1993 following the Jurisdictional Conference of 1992 when Episcopal leadership changes occur.)
- 4. That no member of any board, committee, or commission shall serve more than two consecutive quadrennia on said board, committee or commission and shall not be eligible to be reelected until after one quadrennium has elapsed, except members of boards, committees, or commissions elected for three-year terms may serve three consecutive terms and shall be ineligible to be re-elected until after one term has elapsed and except that, when a member is elected to fill an unexpired quadrennium or term and serve not more than one additional consecutive quadrennium or term.
- That no member of the Conference, lay or ministerial, shall 5. serve on more than two boards, commissions, or committees concurrently. Ex-officio membership on conference boards or agencies in excess of two shall count toward the total of two. The following shall not be under the Conference rotation system nor counted in the above total: district committees or secretaries, Wesley College Trustees, Board of Directors of the Wesley Foundations, Board of Trustees of Peninsula United Methodist Homes, Inc., the Episcopal Residence Committee, and the Committee on Investigation. In the case of the Board of Ordained Ministry, the Nominating Committee is to request the courtesy of the bishop to inform it as to those persons who will be named to the Board of Ordained Ministry, in order to assist the Nominating Committee in equal distribution of responsibility on the part of the Conference ministry members. The Nominating Committee will consider membership on the Board of Ordained Ministry as one of two memberships permitted to each minister.

- 6. Insofar as possible, the membership on Councils, Boards, and Agencies of the Annual Conference shall include one-third clergy, one-third laywomen, and one-third laymen, in keeping with policies for general church agencies, except for the Board of Ordained Ministry.
- 7. That ministerial membership on Annual Conference boards and agencies shall be limited to Conference members and associate members of the Peninsula Annual Conference. In order to be eligible to serve on the Conference boards and agencies, lay members ghall be members of a local church within the Annual Conference. The Conference Nominating Committee may select other persons as affiliate members without vote.
- 8. "In recognition of the Rights of the Aging" as stated in the Social Creed of the United Methodist Church (Page 92 of the Discipline), age shall not be a barrier to serve on any board, council, or agency of the Annual Conference. However, the Conference Nominating Committee shall give careful attention to assuring that younger members of the Conference are given full opportunity for service.
- That a conscientious effort shall be made to distribute membership geographically. No fixed number shall be assigned, however, to any one district, since this could become artificial and impractical. Consideration shall be given to the inclusion of lay and clergy persons from small membership churches.
- That the Cabinet select only one representative from the Cabinet to serve on a Conference board and all the divisions of the board, and one cabinet representative each on all other support agencies except where the Discipline states otherwise.
- 11. That failure to attend the particular board or agency to which one is assigned for at least one called meeting during the year, without written explanation, or statement of intended activity to the chairperson of that board or agency, one will be subject to automatic removal in the next nominating committee's report. A report of the board or agency chairperson to the secretary of the Conference Nominating Committee by March 1st will include the attendance record of this board, committee or agency.
- 12. That the Conference Nominating Committee designate persons to serve as a Nominating Committee for the Boards, Commissions and Committees. The District Superintendent assigned to the agency is the convenor of this committee. The nominating committee shall be prepared at the organization meeting to nominate officers for the quadrennium for any that have not so designated their own by April 15th.
- That the date of election to any board, commission or committee be clearly indicated in the journal.
- 14. That in every case a nominee of any board, commission or committee shall be notified and consent to serve before the name is placed before the Conference. When vacancies occur in the report, nominations may be made from the floor, provided that the nominee is present and agrees to serve.
- 15. That recognizing again the belief in the principle of rotation in order to involve greater leadership, all district committees and officers shall be elected to four-year terms with a maximum of eight years and persons shall be ineligible for re-election until after a four-year term has elapsed, with the exception of

the District Committee of Ordained Ministry and the District Committee on Church Building and Location which shall serve a minimum of four years and a maximum of eight years.

Concerning the Nominating Committee, its report and the securing of talent:

- That the report of the Nominating Committee at the Annual Conference session will reflect a complete adherence to all the guidelines established by the Annual Conference.
- The Nominating Committee shall distribute mimeographed copies of its report to the Annual Conference on the day before the report is to be voted on by the Conference.
- 3. That forms shall be circulated for both ministers and laity in local churches to indicate areas of interest, thus creating a Talent Bank. In addition, the same form shall be sent to the members of the Cabinet, Board of Laity, Conference United Methodist Women, Executive Committee, and Conference Youth Council in order to obtain names that might otherwise be overlooked. These forms shall be returned to the secretary of the Conference Nomistiee.
- 4. That a complete file of all ministers in the Conference should be kept indicating where each one is serving in terms of Conference boards and agencies. Laity should likewise be listed on a similar file. A third file would be divided between ministers and laity as part of the Conference Talent Bank.
- 5. That a minimum of four meetings per year should be held by the Nominating Committee (it may be advisable that the committee meet more often, since its influence is so broad; whenever the committee approaches a new quadrennium, this latter need for additional meetings may be more evident).
- That the above adopted guidelines for the Nominating Committee of the Annual Conference shall become a printed part of its report at each Annual Conference session.
- That at the beginning of a new quadrennium, a complete and open look at membership on all boards and agencies shall be initiated by the Conference Nominating Committee and all personnel shall be eligible for re-alignment in accordance with A-5.
- Titles such as "Mrs," "Miss," or "Mr." shall not be used in the preparation of the Nominating Committee report.

Miscellaneous

 That the council director, and associate council directors, not be elected to boards and agencies under the Conference rotation, but serve only as ex-officio where assigned by the council director. 2. That two (2) high school youth (preferably 18th and 11th grades) shall be members of the following boards, divisions and committees: Commission on Christian Unity & Interreligious Concerns, Division of Education, Division of Exampliam, Division of Hand Weifrer Whistor of Cover Planning and Counseling, Division of Korship, Conference Council on Ministries, Board of Laity, Conference Statistica, These shall be selected by the Conference Voith concil each year.

THE PROCESS OF MAKING APPOINTMENTS

Par. 57, Article X - The bishops shall appoint, after consultation with the district superintendents, ministers to the charges; and they shall have such responsibilities and authorities as the General Conference shall prescribe.

Article X, quoted above from the 1964 Discipline, is the primary authority for itinerancy in the Constitution of The United Methodist Church. (The Constitution can only be changed by 2/3 vote of the 74 Annual Conferences. All other Discipline paragraphs quoted in these pages are in Part IV, Organization and Administration, and require only a majority vote of the General Conference to change.) This amont be negotiated on modified. All pastors accept this as part of their on and Conference membership vove, and all United Methodist churches re by covenant and law so committed.

Par 436 - The Itinerant System - The itinerant system is the accepted method of the United Methodist Church by which ordained ministers are appointed by the bishops to fields of labor. All ordained ministers shall accept and abide by these appointments.

Par. 529 - Responsibility - Pastors and clergy in appointments beyond the local church shall be appointed by a bishop, who is empowered to make and fix all appointments in the episcopal area within which the Annual Conference is a part. Appointments are to be made with the consideration of the gifts and graces of those appointed, to the needs, characteristics, and opportunities of congregations and institutions, and with faithfulness to our commitment to an open light to cate, sthmic origin, sex, color, or age, arcept for the provisions of mandatory retirement. Through appointment-making, the connectional nature of the United Nethodist system is made visible.

Par. 412.2 - Both men and women are included in all provisions of the Discipline which refer to the ministry.

Par. 538 - Consultation and Appointment-Making - Consultation is the process whereby the biakop and/or district superintendent confer with the pastor and Pastor-Parish Relations Committee, taking into consideration the criteria of Part. 531, a performance evaluation, needs of the appointment under consideration, and mission of the church. Consultation is not merely notification. Consultation is not committee selection or call of a pastor. Consultation is both a continuing process and a more intense involvement during the period of change in appointment. Consultation is not negotiation or voting upon the appointment of a pastor. It is information sharing and advice to the cabinet and bishop prior to the bishop's fixing the appointment.

Par 532. - Process of Appointment-Making - 1. A change in appointment may be initiated by a pastor, a Pastor-Parish Relations Committee, a district superintendent, or a bishop.

Pastor-Parish Relations chairpersons and/or pastors are asked to make such requests by using the evaluation form which is required to be sent annually to the district superintendent by January 15th. (See "Timeline for Appointment-Making" ± 2 .) The Pastor-Parish Relations Committee is to represent the charge in the appointmentmaking process. The chairperson is the designated officer through whom the charge contacts the district superintendent, and through whom the district superintendent contacts the charge.

Par. 532.2 - The Bishop and the Cabinet shall consider all requests for change of appointment in light of the criteria developed for each charge and the gifts and graces, professional experience, and family needs of the pastor.

Par. 532.3 - When a change in appointment has been determined, the district superintendent should meet together or separately with the pastor and the Pastor-Pariah Relations Committee where the pastor is serving, for the purpose of sharing the basis for the change and the process used in making the new appointment.

This meeting will provide the pastor the opportunity, in the presence of the district superintendent, to declare his/her acceptance of the change of appointment, stating his/her reasons for responding to the new opportunity and thereby to facilitate the grief process for the pastor and for the concretation.

Par. 532.4 - All appointments shall receive consideration by the bishop and the district superintendent(s) and the Cabinet as a whole until a tentative decision is made.

We interpret this to mean that all appointments require the participation of the entire Cabinet. This is to insure that all ministers of the Conference are considered whenever there is an opening.

Par. 532.5 - The process used in making the new appointment shall includer a) The district superintendent shall confer with the pastor about a specific possible appointment (charge) and its congruence with gifts, graces, professional experience and expectations, and the family needs of the pastor identified in consultation with the pastor (Par. 531.2).

Only "open" charges (churches) shall be considered by the Cabinet. A charge (church) becomes "open" by virtue of its pastor's retirement, change of appointment, leave of absence, sabbatical leave, disability, location, death or withdrawal from the United Wethodist ministry. In certain present pastor and the knowledge of the Pastor-Parish Relations Committee, may declare a charge "open" for appointment purposes.

<u>Par. 532.6</u> - The district superintendent shall confer with the receiving Pastor-Parish Relations Committee about pastoral leadership (par. 531.1).

Par. 532.7 - When appointments are being made to less than full-time ministry, the district superintendent shall consult with the minister to be appointed and the Pastor-Parish Relations Committee regarding proportional time, salary, and pension credit.

Par. 532.8 - If during this consultative process it is determined by the bishop and Cabinet that this decision should not be carried out, the process is to be repeated until the bishop, basing his/her decision on the information and advice derived from consultation, makes and fixes the appointment. Par. 532.9 - A similar process of consultation shall be available to persons in appointments beyond the local church.

Par. 532.18 - When the steps in the process have been followed and completed, the announcement of that decision shall be made to all parties directly involved in the consultative process; that is, the appointment Cabinet, the pastor, and the Pastor-Parish Relations Committee (of both charges) before a public announcement is made.

Par. 531 - Criteria - Appointments shall take into account the unique meeds of a charpe in a particular setting and also the qifts and graces of a particular pastor. To assist bishops, Cabinets, pastors, and congregations to achieve an effective match of charges and pastors, criteria must be developed an analyzed in each instance and then shared with pastors and congregations.

- Congregations the district superintendent shall develop with the pastor and Pastor-Parish Relations Committees of all churches profiles reflecting the needs, characteristics, and opportunities for mission of the charge consistent with the church's statement of purpose (Par. 524.). These profiles shall be reviewed annually and updated when appropriate to include:
 - a) The general situation in which a congregation finds itself in a particular setting: size, financial condition, quality of lay leadership, history.
- b) The convictional stance of the congregation: theology; prejudices, if any; spiritual life.
 - c) The ministry of the congregation among its people for the sake of the community: service programs, basis for adding new members, reasons for losing members, mission to community and world, forms of witness.
 - d) The qualities and functions of pastoral ministry needed to fulfill the mission and goals of the congregation.
 - Pastors The district superintendent and the pastor shall identify the pastor's gifts, graces, and professional experience and expectations, and also the needs and concerns of the pastor's spouse and family.
 - a) Spiritual and personal sensibility: personal faith, call and commitment to ordained ministry, work through the institutional Church, integration of vocation with personal and family well-being, life style.
 - b) Academic and career background: nature of theological stance, experience in continuing education, professional experience, record of performance, age.
 - c) Skills and ablities in church administration, leadership development, worship, liturgy, preaching and evangelism, teaching and nurturing, counseling and group work, ability to work in cooperation, and ability in self-evaluation, and other relational skills.
 - d) Family situation: health and educational needs of the family, and the spouse's career.

<u>Par. 533</u> - Prequency - While the bishop shall report all pastoral appointments to each regular sension of an Annual Conference, appointments to charges may be made at any time deemed advisable by the bishop and Cabinet.

Appointments are considered "fixed" until changed. They are reviewed and reported annually but not "made" annually.

Par. 267.2.f.B - (The duties of the Pastor-Parish Relations Committee mail includes the following). To confer with the pastor and/or other appointed members of the staff if it should become evident that the best interests of the charge and pastor(s) will be served by a change of pastor(s). The committee shall cooperate with the pastor(s), the district superintendent, and the bishop in securing clergy leadership. Its relationship to the district superintendent and the bishop shall be advisory only.

It is also vital that the committee understand that its relationship to the district superintendent and bishop is advisory only, and that it is to represent the needs of the entire charge. Members of the Pastor-Parish Relations the state of the state of the state of the state united Methodist Church functions to fulfill their responsibilities faithfully.

Par. 267.2.e - The committee...shall meet only with the knowledge of the pastor and/or the district superintendent. It may meet with the district superintendent without the pastor being present; however, when the pastor is not present, the pastor, or any member of the staff under consideration, shall be informed prior to such a meeting and immediately thereafter be brought into consultation either by the committee or by the district superintendent.

<u>Par. 267.2.f.3</u> - (The duties of the Pastor-Parish Relations Committee shall include the following:) To evaluate annually the effectiveness of the pastor and staff, based upon criteria, processes, and training developed by the Board of Ordained Ministry and Cabinet (Par. 445), and, where applicable, the Board of Diaconal Ministry.

Par. 445 - Evaluation - Evaluation is a continuous process which must take place in a spirit of understanding, acceptance, and with a genuine desire to embody and carry forth more effectively Christ's ministry in the world lest we create defensiveness and discouragement in the Church or in the person being evaluated. Pastoral effectiveness shall be evaluated annually (Par. 267.2 f 3) by the Pastor-Pariah Relations Committee and district superintendent by criteria and processes developed by the Board of Ordined Ministry and the Cabic and the training program for Pastor-Pariah Relations Committee members to enable them to evaluate the effectiveness of pastors in carrying out the functions of ordained ministry (Pars. 422.1b, 528, 732.2 n. o).

NOTES ON RETIREMENT

Mandatory Retirement - Pastors who attain the age of 70 before July 1 must retire as of July 1 of that year (Par. 453.1).

Voluntary Retirement - Voluntary retirement is available to those who attain the age of 65 or complete 40 Conference years of service before July 1 (Par. 453.2 c).

- Voluntary retirement is also available at a reduced annuity rate to those who attain the age of 62 or complete at least 37 Conference years of service before July 1 (Par. 453.2 b).
 - A partor may also retire after 28 Conference years of service with benefits beginning the first of any month after the session of Annual Conference in the year which the minister attains the age of 62 before July 1 (Par. 453.2 a).

ALL HINISTERS WHO QUALIFY FOR VOLUNTARY RETIREMENT MUST INDICATE IN WRITING BY JANUARY 15 THEIR INTENT TO ACTIVATE THIS OPTION; Otherwise, the Cabinet will assume their continued eligibility for appointment. The annual self-evaluation form may be used for this purpose.

TIMELINE FOR APPOINTMENT-MAKING

- FALL AND EARLY WINTER: District Superintendents make an informal inventory and evaluation of their charges (churches) and pastors, including a review of the criteria (Par. 531). They are available for consultation (Par. 538) with Pastor-Parish Relations Committees and pastors, and , in some instances, may initiate such contacts. The official contact person for the charge is the chairperson of the charge Pastor-Parish Relations Committee.
- 2. JANUARY 15: DEADLINE FOR REQUESTS for change of appointment, including retirement. By January 15, Pastor-Pariah Relations chairpersons and/or pastors are asked to make their requests and recommendations to the Cabinet by using the annual evaluation form. The reason(s) a change appears to be desirable shall be included (Par. 267.2 f 8). Initiating a request for change is not to be interpreted as an automatic guarantee that a change will be made. All requests will be treated with integrity by the bishop and Cabinet (Par. 532.1). Persons planning retirement must also observe the above date. Notification of intention to retire must be in writing. (See "Notes on Retirement").
- 3. FERUARY. Cabinet needs to begin the appointment-making process. Requests for change will be carefully reviewed. When neither the Pastor-Parish Relations Committee nor the pastor has made a request, the Cabinet, however, has the precogative of a state of the charges of the pastors or the program and missional strategy of the Conference.
 - a) "Open" charges (churches) will be determined, (see commentary under Paris 532:5) and the district superintendent will meet with the Pastor-Parish Relations Committee to gather all available data about the charge and its pastoral needs (Pars. 531 & 532.2) and present pastoral support including parsonage compliance with Conference policies.
 - b) The Cabinet determines which available pastor best fits the needs of the charge (Par. 53.2.2). Note: The present pastor is to remain neutral in all appointment proceedings concerning his/her successor.
 - c) The district superintendent of the "open" charge contacts the prospective pastor and consults with him/her, supplying

essential data and information about the "open" charge, community setting and time frame for the prospective pastor's response.

d) When the pastor-designate is determined, the district superintendent then contacts the chairperson of the Pastor-Parish Relations Committee of the "open" charge and arranges a time for the pastor-designate and the committee to meet. This meeting is an introduction of and to the pastortis meeting is an introduction of and to the pastorwill preside at this meeting. The district superintendent will preside at this meeting.

The purpose of the meeting is:

- To aid the district superintendent and the Cabinet, through consultation, in their responsibility to the appointment process.
- To verify the appropriateness of the proposed appointment, matching local needs and pastoral aptitudes.
- To initiate the process of getting acquainted with the pastor-designate.
- To arrange for the moving and receiving of the pastordesignate and his/her family.

The district superintendent will bring the meeting to a close with an appropriate summary of his/her insights and understandings. It is understood that barring prohibiting factors which may become apparent in the conversation with the Pastor-Parish Relations Committee, the pastor-designate will be appointed to the "open" charge.

e) When the results of the meeting have been shared with the Cabinet and the appointment has been fixed by the bishop, public announcements shall be arranged through the office of the district superintendent (Par. 532.10).

NOTE: The meeting of the pastor-designate with the Pastor-Parish Relations Committee may not always be possible for pastors receiving their first appointment following seminary.

- 4. FERRUARY MAY: Using the above process, the Cabinet will arrange for the appointments to be reported to the Annual Conferences (Par. 532.10). The list of appointments will be published in the Conference paper prior to the Annual Conference session, and publicly announced at the Annual Conference session along with additional changes and corrections.
- 5. JULY 1: Changes of appointment become effective.
- 6. POST-CONFERENCE: The district superintendent will meet with the new pastor and the Pastor-Parish Relations Committee for post-Conference role clarification to help facilitate the new shared ministry of charge and pastor. This meeting will be held at a mutually agreeable time.
- DISTRICT SUPERINTENDENT AVAILABILITY: The district superintendent is available to Pastor-Parish Relations Committees and pastors for consultation at any time it is deemed appropriate.

Others may want to take this route and we outline here the steps involved in case you may not be aware of the procedure.

- (1) All salary and conference apportionments are removed.
- (2) The church drops out of the listing of churches to which pastors are assigned. (We urge the conference to begin a listing of such churches in the journal with the charge conference where they are to report each year. This will allow for proper records and constitutes the historic continuity of these churches.)
- (3) The only services to be held are weddings, funerals, or special occasions.
- (4) One or more special services a year may be held with the offering received to be used for the upkeep of the building.

- (5) The remaining members are transferred to a nearby United Methodist Church for regular worship and church involvement.
- (6) The remaining members become a special committee under the charge conference to plan with the pastor for weddings, funerals, and special days. They also present a written report each year as to services held, money received and how expended, etc.
- (7) This allows the possibility that should population shifts bring people into the area we would simply resume regular services.

Par. 57, Article x - The hishops shall appoint, after consultation with the district appenrientendents, ministers to the charges; and they shall have such responsibilities and authorities as the General Conference shall prescribe.

Article X, quoted above from the 1964 Discipline, is the primary authority for itinerancy in the Constitution of The United Methodist Church. (The Constitution can only be changed by 2/3 vote of the 74 Annual Conferences. All other Discipline paragraphs quoted in these pages are in Part IV, Organization and Administration, and require only a majority vote of the General Conference to change.) This constitute the ion modified. All pastors accept this as part of their on and Gonference membership vows, and all United Methodist churches are by covenant and law so committed.

Par 436 - The Itinerant System - The itinerant system is the accepted method of The United Methodist Church by which ordained ministers are appointed by the bishops to fields of labor. All ordained ministers shall accept and abide by these appointments.

Par. 529 - Responsibility - Pastors and clergy in appointments beyond the local church shall be appointed by a bishop, who is empowered to make and fix all appointments in the episcopal area within which the Annual Conference is a part. Appointments are to be made with the consideration of the gifts and graces of those appointed, to the needs, characteristics, and opportunities of congregations and institutions, and with faithfulness to our commitment to an open linearancy. Open itlenging means appointents are for for the provisions of mandatory retirement. Through appointment-making, the connectional nature of the United Nethodist system is made visible.

Par. 412.2 - Both men and women are included in all provisions of the Discipline which refer to the ministry.

Par. 538 - Consultation and Appointment-Making - Consultation is the process whereby the biahop and/or district superintendent confer with the pastor and Pastor-Parish Relations Committee, taking into consideration the criteria of Par. 531, a performance evaluation, needs of the appointment under consideration, and mission of the church. Consultation is not merely notification. Consultation is not committee selection or call of a pastor. Consultation is both a continuing process and a more intense involvement during the period of change in appointment. Consultation is not negotiation or voting upon the appointment of a pastor. It is information sharing and advice to the cabinet and bishop prior to the bishop's fixing the appointment.

Par 532. - Process of Appointment-Making - 1. A change in appointment may be initiated by a pastor, a Pastor-Parish Relations Committee, a district superintendent, or a bishop.

Pastor-Parish Relations chairpersons and/or pastors are asked to make such requests by using the evaluation form which is required to be sent annually to the district superintendent by January 15th. (See "Timeline for Appointment-Making" + 2.) The Pastor-Parish Relations Committee is to represent the charge in the appointmentmaking process. The chairperson is the designated officer through whom the charge contacts the district superintendent, and through whom the district superintendent contacts the charge.

Par. 512.2 - The Bishop and the Cabinet shall consider all requests for change of appointment in light of the criteria developed for each charge and the gifts and graces, professional experience, and family needs of the pastor.

Par. 532.3 - When a change in appointment has been determined, the district superintendent should meet together or separately with the pastor and the Pastor-Parish Relations Committee where the pastor is serving, for the purpose of sharing the basis for the change and the process used in making the new appointment.

This meeting will provide the pastor the opportunity, in the presence of the district superintendent, to declare his/her acceptance of the change of appointment, stating his/her reasons for responding to the new opportunity and thereby to facilitate the grief process for the pastor and for the congregation.

Par. 532.4 - All appointments shall receive consideration by the bishop and the district superintendent(s) and the Cabinet as a whole until a tentative decision is made.

We interpret this to mean that all appointments require the participation of the entire Cabinet. This is to insure that all ministers of the Conference are considered whenever there is an opening.

Par. 532.5 - The process used in making the new appointment shall includer a) The district superintendent shall confer with the pastor about a specific possible appointment (charge) and its congruence with gifts, graces, professional experience and expectations, and the family needs of the pastor identified in consultation with the pastor (par. 531.2).

Only "open" charges (churches) shall be considered by the Cabinet. A charge (church) becomes "open" by virtue of its pastor's retirement, change of appointment, leave of absence, sabbatical leave, disability, location, death or withdrawal from the United Methodist ministry. In certain from the united Methodist ministry is no service present pastor and the knowledge of the Pastor-Parlish Relations Committee, may declare a charge "open" for appointment purposes.

<u>Par. 532.6</u> - The district superintendent shall confer with the receiving Pastor-Parish Relations Committee about pastoral leadership (Par. 531.1).

<u>Par. 532.7</u> - When appointments are being made to less than full-time ministry, the district superintendent shall consult with the minister to be appointed and the Pastor-Parish Relations Committee regarding proportional time, salary, and pension credit.

Par. 532.8 - If during this consultative process it is determined by the bishop and Cabinet that this decision should not be carried out, the process is to be repeated until the bishop, basing his/her decision on the information and advice derived from consultation, makes and fixes the appointment. Par. 532.9 - A similar process of consultation shall be available to persons in appointments beyond the local church.

Par. 532.18 - When the steps in the process have been followed and completed, the announcement of that decision shall be made to all parties directly involved in the consultative process; that is, the appointment Cabinet, the pastor, and the Pastor-Parish Relations Committee (of both charges) before a public announcement is made.

Par. 531 - Criteria - Appointments shall take into account the unique meeds of a charge in a particular seting and also the difts and graces of a particular pastor. To assist bishops, Cabinets, pastors, and congregations to achieve an effective match of charges and pastors, criteria must be developed an analyzed in each instance and then shared with pastors and congregations.

- Congregations the district superintendent shall develop with the pastor and Pastor-Parish Relations Committees of all churches profiles reflecting the needs, characteristics, and opportunities for mission of the charge consistent with the church's statement of purpose (Par. S28.1). These profiles shall be reviewed annually and updated when appropriate to include:
 - a) The general situation in which a congregation finds itself in a particular setting: size, financial condition, quality of lay leadership, history.
 - b) The convictional stance of the congregation: theology; prejudices, if any; spiritual life.
- c) The ministry of the congregation among its people for the sake of the community: service programs, basis for adding new members, reasons for losing members, mission to community and world, forms of witness.
 - d) The qualities and functions of pastoral ministry needed to fulfill the mission and goals of the congregation.
- Pastors The district superintendent and the pastor shall identify the pastor's gifts, graces, and professional experience and expectations, and also the needs and concerns of the pastor's spouse and family.
 - a) Spiritual and personal sensibility: personal faith, call and commitment to ordained ministry, work through the institutional Church, integration of vocation with personal and family well-being, life style.
- b) Academic and career background: nature of theological stance, experience in continuing education, professional experience, record of performance, age.
 - c) Skills and ablities in church administration, leadership development, worship, liturgy, preaching and evangelism, teaching and nurturing, counseling and group work, ability to work in cooperation, and ability in self-evaluation, and other relational skills.
 - Family situation: health and educational needs of the family, and the spouse's career.

<u>Par. 533</u> - Frequency - While the bishop shall report all pastoral appointments to each regular session of an Annual Conference, appointments to charges may be made at any time deemed advisable by the bishop and Cabinet.

Appointments are considered "fixed" until changed. They are reviewed and reported annually but not "made" annually.

Par. 267.2.f.8 - (The duties of the Pattor-Parish Belations Committee mall include the following). To confer with the pastor and/or other appointed members of the staff if it should become evident that the best interests of the charge and pastor(s) will be served by a change of pattor(s). The committee shall cooperate with the pastor(s), the district superintendent, and the bishop in securing clergy leadership. Its relationship to the district superintendent and the bishop shall be advisory only.

It is also vital that the committee understand that its relationship to the district superintendent and bishop is advisory only, and that it is to represent the needs of the entire charge. Members of the Pastor-Parish Relations the state of the state of the state of the state united Methodist Church functions to fulfill their responsibilities faithfully.

Par. 267.2.e - The committee..shall meet only with the knowledge of the pastor and/or the district superintendent. It may meet with the district superintendent without the pastor being present; however, when the pastor is not present, the pastor, or any member of the staff under consideration, shall be informed prior to such a meeting and immediately thereafter be brought into consultation either by the committee or by the district superintendent.

<u>Par. 267.2.f.3</u> - (The duties of the Pastor-Parish Relations Committee shall include the following:) To evaluate annually the effectiveness of the pastor and staff, based upon criteria, processes, and training developed by the Board of Ordained Ministry and Cabinet (Par. 445), and, where applicable, the Board of Diaconal Ministry.

Par. 445 - Evaluation - Evaluation is a continuous process which must take place in a spirit of understanding, acceptance, and with a genuine desire to embody and carry forth more effectively Christ's ministry in the world lest we create defensiveness and discouragement in the Church or in the person being evaluated. Pastoral effectiveness shall be evaluated annually (Par. 267.2 f 3) by the Pastor-Pariah Relations Committee and district superintendent by criteria and processes developed by the Board of Ordsheed Ministry shall conduct an annual training program for Pastor-Pariah Relations Committee members to enable them to evaluate the effectiveness of pastors in carrying out the functions of ordained ministry (Pars. 422.1b, 528, 732.2 n, o).

NOTES ON RETIREMENT

Mandatory Retirement - Pastors who attain the age of 70 before July 1 must retire as of July 1 of that year (Par. 453.1).

Voluntary Retirement - Voluntary retirement is available to those who attain the age of 65 or complete 40 Conference years of service before July 1 (Par. 453.2 c).

Others may want to take this route and we outline here the steps involved in case you may not be aware of the procedure.

- (1) All salary and conference apportionments are removed.
- (2) The church drops out of the listing of churches to which pastors are assigned. (We urge the conference to begin a listing of such churches in the journal with the charge conference where they are to report each year. This will allow for proper records and constitutes the historic continuity of these churches.)
- (3) The only services to be held are weddings, funerals, or special occasions.
- (4) One or more special services a year may be held with the offering received to be used for the upkeep of the building.

- (5) The remaining members are transferred to a nearby United Methodist Church for regular worship and church involvement.
- The remaining members become a special committee under the charge conference to (6) plan with the pastor for weddings, funerals, and special days. They also present a written report each year as to services held, money received and how expended, etc. This allows the possibility that should population shifts bring people into the
- (7) area we would simply resume regular services.

# VII. Business of the Annual Conference A. Daily Proceedings

# TUESDAY MORNING - MAY 19, 1987

Executive Session - At 10:00 A.M. Bishop Joseph H. Yeakel convened the Executive Session in the Wesley College Center (Room 206). The opening worship was led by the Rev. Dr. Bruce E. Cooke, President of the Board of Ordained Ministry.

Bishop Yeakel then clarified the fact that the mandated Executive Session was for <u>Elders in Full Connection only</u>. All other clergy, lay members, guests, and visitors were then asked to leave the room. However, it was moved and siccnded that the Rev. John Coleman, a visiting district superintendent from the Baltimore Conference, be permitted to stay. The motion was approved.

The Rev. Dr. F. David Weber, Registrar of the Board, then distributed the report entitled "part II: Pertaining to Ministerial Relations." This report, in its entirety, may be found under the <u>Disciplinary</u> Questions in this Journal.

Each of these pastors was personally congratulated by the Bishop and given a Certificate of Appreciation for their respective years of service. The Conference affirmed their aggregate ministry with warm applause.

BALLOTING FOR CENERAL AND JUDISDICTIONAL CONFERENCE DELEGATES: Bishop Yeakel explained the Rules for Balloting as included in the Conference packet. After prayer the first clergy and lay ballots were taken.

STATE OF THE CHURCH: In presenting his "State of the Church" address, hishop Yeakel stated that he had presided at forty-one annual conference sessions and that this was the first one where an increase in the total membership had been reported. However, he deplored the fact that 170 of our congregations had not received a single person on Profession of Paith.

Quoting from a report from the General Board of Discipleship, Bishop Yeakel methioned several factors relating to church growth: 1) the action for growth in the church is the local church, 2) If we want to grow, we will - the opposite is allow true, 3) Growing churches are intentional about growth, 4) Climate and atmosphere perceived on the first sunday are very important - 6 than recelly meet the needs of persons, 7) Growing churches have many opportunities for small groups, etc.

85% of the churches of our Conference shared in the "Offer Them Christ" program. Themes for the next quadrennium are expected to be: 1) Getting back to basics - leading people to Christ, 2) Spiritual formation - deepening our faith, 3] Building a just world, and 4) Addressing critical human needs.

May 24, 1988 will mark the 258th anniversary of John Wesley's conversion at Aldersgate. Bishop Yeakel expressed the hope that many gatherings to celebrate "assurance" would be held on May 22, 1988.

EMCC is not an option for us but a part of the continuing life of our church. While we must continue to stress inclusivism we must also stress itinearcy, especially with regard to the role of clergy spouses. Today the clergy are in crisis. Are we in a vocation or a profession? Are we serving the church or is the church serving us?

In the recent past, three Washington Area clergy have been killed by handguns: Louis Foxwell, Perry Hill, and Lewis Ransom. Let's advocate some adequate handgun legislation! The bishop requested that the Conference draft a resolution on such legislation before the adjournment of the current session.

Superintendents Ewart C. Mackshaw and Howell O. Wilkins were thanked for their service on the Salisbury and Easton Districts and their successors, P. Thomas McKelvey and Robert P. Whitlock, were acknowledged by the bishop. If was reported that Betty Wertz was to undergo more surgery in her continuing battle against cancer. Bishop Teakel thanked Dr. J. Gordon Stapleton, C.C.O.M., Director, and his staff, Theodore W. Briggs, Treasurer, and his staff, Dr. Paul Wragg of the U.M. Foundation, Allen Clark of Barratt's Chapel, Dr. C. Bdwin Lasbury, Wilmington District Superintendent, Dr. Edwin L. Ellis, Dover District Superintendent, and Mrs. Ruby Rnock, his own secretary, for all of their support and cooperation. We also welcomed the Rev. Susan Morrison, C.C.C.M. Directors, and the Rev. welcomed the Rev. Susan Morrison, C.C.C.M. Directors, and the Rev. Onference, as well as the Rev. Heather Murray Elkins, keynote speaker for our Conference sessions.

POINT OF PERSONAL PRIVILECE: Dr. Edwin L. Ellis requested that Mrs. Lois Yeakel be escorted to the stage by the Rev. Nr. Hackhaw and the Rev. Mr. Wilkins. Upon arriving Mrs. Yeakel received a corsage from Mrs. Mary Joyce Barton, President of the Ministers' Mates Association of the Dover District. The Conference greeted her with warm applause.

Bishop Yeakel recognized the Rev. William Hemphill, Jr. who asked that the U.M. Foundation be lifted from the calendar. This was agreed and the remainder of the calendar adopted by the Conference.

NOMINATING COMMITTEE REPORT: Dr. C. Edwin Lasbury, Chairperson of the Nominating Committee, offered explanatory remarks as the report was being distributed. Also, after some discussion, the following document, known as "J," relating to the rules and guidelines governing the Conference Nominating Committee, was also adopted:

#### PROPOSED RULE CHANGE:

Amend Rule No. 3 on Page 26 of the 1986 Conference Journal by addition:

That for the 1988-93 time period, persons elected to Board and Agencies of the Peninsula Annual Conference at the Annual Conference of 1988 will serve for a guinguennium (5 years).

RATIONALE: This change in rules for this one time period, only, will bring the next change in leadership in 1993 following the Jurisdictional Conference of 1992 when Episcopal leadership changes occur.

#### Rule 3. (As currently printed)

That, since quadrannial system is an established part of the mited Wethodist acconcer, all members of boards, commissions, and committees shall be elected for a quadrennium unless restricted by Discipline, chatter, or some other legal requirement. In the event of much legal restrictions, the principle of Rotation is still to be observed, (1966 Peninsula Conference Journal, page 26.) After prayer by the Rev. Mildred White the Conference was recessed at 5:39 P.M.

#### TUESDAY EVENING - MAY 19, 1987

The Conference was reconvened at 7:00 P.M. in the auditorium of the Central Middle School with the singing of "Offer Them Christ" - words by the Rev. Lawrence Jameson. Prayer was offered by the Rev. Robert O. Wallace, chairperson of the Division of Evangelism. The pastors of some sixty-four charges were then summoned to the stage to be honored for their full participation in the "Offer Them Christ" program. Bishop Yeakel presented each pastor with a Five-Star Recognition Certificate. MISSIONAL PRIORITY TEAMS: Bishop Yeakel summoned the Rev. Vaughn

Johnson and Ms. Darlene Webb, Chairperson, Missional Priority Coordinating Committee. Ms. Webb presented the following persons who will comprise missional priority teams who will respond to the needs and requests of local churches: Janet Commodore, Bmma Dickerson, Peggy M. Elbert, Christine Fithugh, Margaret E. Garley, Addie Marshall, Charlotte A. Nichols, Noble W. These person were commissioned with prayer by the bishop and then greeted with applause by the Conference.

COMPERENCE COUNCIL ON MINISTRIES: Bishop Yeakel summoned the Rev. Clifford A. Armour, Jr., Chairperson, C.C.O.M., who, in turn, called on Dr. Philip Bosserman, Chairperson, Board of Church and Society. Dr. Bosserman introduced Ms. Sally Milbury-Steen, Director of Pacem in Terris, who spoke briefly about the work of her peace education organization.

BALLOTING: Bishop Yeakel interrupted Dr. Bosserman to present the results of the second ballot.

BOARD OF CHURCH AND SOCIEFY (Continued): Dr. Bosserman explained that the Board had undergone a complete reorganization and that the resolutions being presented were a result of a consensus of the members. Dr. Bosserman then presented the following resolution on "in Defense of Creation".

#### A RESOLUTION ON IN DEFENSE OF CREATION

The spaceship earth has reached the situation where war is indefensible as a means of resolving conflicts between nations or internally within nations. The new technologies of miniaturization now make it possible to carry a small nucleat device in an oversized suitcase. The numbers of tactical nuclear arms in the European theatre alone almost equal the fire power of the nuclear warheads on the missiles located there. The total number of warheads shared by the nuclear powers is rapidly approaching 6%, 9% containing thousands of pounds of TNT for each of the five billion plus human beings on this earth.

The main enemy to peaceful co-existence among all peoples is national sovereignty. The pride of nations makes a Third World War inevitable unless we can strengthen the agencies and instruments for international cooperation and peace is the world-wide Christian Church of which the United Methodists are a part. The gospel of Jesus Christ can change the present ethos which relies on the violence of war to resolve international conflicts. The Bishops of the United Methodist Church of the United States of America issued a pastoral letter in 1986, entitled In Defense of Creation in which they emphatically state the creation is under attack. Air and water, trees and fruits and flowers, birds and fish and cattle, all children and youth, women and men live under the darkening shadows of a threatening nuclear winter....therefore, we say a clear and unconditioned No to nuclear war and to any use of nuclear weapons. We conclude that nuclear deterrence is a position that cannot receive the church's blessing.

WHEREAS, the Bishops of the United Methodist Church of the United States of America have issued this pastoral letter which condemns the use of nuclear weapons and notes the imminent dangers of war; and,

WHEREAS, a Foundation Document with a Guide for Study and Action now exist with the Pastoral Letter, providing rich materials for in depth discussions and prayerful thought, and suggestions for positive action to promote peace; and,

WHEREAS, all evidence points to a public which favors arms control and reduction, a decrease in military spending, and a deep longing for world peace,

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that Peninsula Annual Conference of the United Methodist Church hereby direct the Board of Church and Society to implement a program utilizing the Bishops' Pastoral Letter, Foundation Document and Guide for Study and Action to take place in every local church of the conference touching every age level of each congregation; that films, filmstrips, and other basic documents be made available to each local church, to the end that such a program will begin the process of changing the cultural climate of violence to one that affirms the gospel of Jesus Christ, a gospel of peace and peacemaking.

During discussion, Bishop Yeakel recognized the Rev. Thomas Blakelock who made the following motion to amend the resolution:

Replace 'implement a program' with 'encourage critical study by local congregations.' Delete 'to take place...of each congregation...'

The motion to amend was seconded but defeated.

Dr. Bosserman then presented the following resolution dealing with the "Farm Crisis".

### A RESOLUTION ON THE FARM CRISIS

"In the Beginning, the Creator formed light and darkness, energy and matter, space and time, and the earth with all that is around, on and within it. Primal life forms were brought forth, and finally human beings were made in the Creator's image and likeness. The Creator looked over this work and called creation good. Thus could the Psalmist sing, 'The earth is the Lord's and the fullness thereof, the world and those who dwell therein.' (Ps. 24:1 RSV)" (The Book of Resolutions, 1984: 251)

Several fundamental tenets come out of the biblical account first, God is the owner of the land, "thus it is a gift in covenant which involves the stewardship of keeping and tending the land for present and future generations; as God's creation it has rights and needs, the need to be regenerated that it may sustain life and be a place of joy; and it is a corporate gift to all of humanity requiring just patterns of land use." (bid.)

However in the past 55 years U.S. agriculture has changed dramatically in its organization an interdependence with the domestic and international economic dynamics. Land ownership is now increasingly in the hands of fewer entities. The family farm is declining rapidly. Over 2100 farmers lasve farming wordy were the second second second second second second second rate of loss of farmers in Delaware and Maryland leave the land every seven days. One half of all black farmers have quit the land. By the year 2008, few black farmers will be left. For every 5.5 farmers who leave, one business goes under. Perhaps there are 30 million displaced rural people, many of them now homeless.

WHEREAS, a great number of the Churches and their members in the Peninsula Annual Conference are rural; and,

WHERAS, each year more lands in Maryland and Delaware are taken for highways, airports, reservoirs, strip-mining, power plants, factories, housing developments, malls and other use--perhaps 159,000 arcss--having a large effect upon the ecosystem as well as denying the productive use of the land in a world where hunger is a critical problem; and, NHEREAS, the quality of rural life is declining: the rural areas on the peninsula are disproportionately poor (40 percent of the 34,080,000 living in rural areas in the United States live below the powerty line; education, health services, housing, justice and legal services, water resources, and transportation are all substandard in many of the peninsula's rural areas and the decline continues,

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that all the congregations, both rural and urban, of the Peninsula Annual Conference study and prayerfully consider the complex aspects of this growing farm crisis in order to deepen our understanding and motivation for the caring of creation;

THAT we make every effort to strengthen small and moderate sized family farms by affirming resident land ownership, monitoring private and government lending policies to farmers, and disposing of church-owned lands as a way that demonstrates a continuing stewardship of the land;

THAT we seek to influence community decision-makers to introduce improvements in the delivery of social services that increase the quality of life in rural places;

THAT we develop in rural parishes comprehensive equitable salary plans; and plan adequate ministries for small membership churches and cooperative pastorates; THAT we undertake ethnic and ecumenical models of ministry in our rural areas, including adequate orientation and training of pastors serving rural churches.

During discussion Bishop Yeakel recognized the Rev. Curtis Smith who moved that "no black farmers" be changed to "few black farmers" in third paragraph of the resolution. The motion was seconded and approved.

The bishop then recognized the Rev. Kofi Bart-Martin who moved that the following be substituted for the "Therefore, be it resolved:"

Therefore, Be it Resolved, that all the congregations, both rural and urban, of the Peninsula Annual Conference study and prayerfully consider the complex aspect of this growing farm crisis and seek effective way to address the crisis and minister to the communities affected.

The motion was seconded but defeated.

In response to a concern of the Rev. James Caldwell it was agreed to change the word "we" in the first three paragraphs after the "Therefore, be it resolved," to "local churches" and in the next two paragraphs to "Peninsula Annual Conference".

Bishop Yeakel then recognized the Rev. Dr. Charles Carpenter who moved that the resolution be tabled. The motion was seconded and approved.

MORING WORSHIP: Beginning at 9:08 A.M. the Conference was led in worship by the Division of Worship, the Rev. Alfred Taylor and the Rev. Gonzalee Matthews serving as liturgists. The soloist was Cynthia Matthews. A provocative sermon entitled "Momebuilders, Housekeepers, and Holy Habitations" was delivered by the Rev. Heather Murray IRLins, the Conference Preacher.

COMPOSITE REPORT OF THE CABINET: The Rev. Ewart C. Hackshaw, Dean, presented the report which stressed the following themes: evangelism, gambling, child abuse, the small church, AIDS, housing, Central America, and youth ministry. Full text may be found under "VII.(."

Edwin Hiddleton (Pastor, People's Church, Dover), thie Rev. H. Edwin Field Cross Control (Church, Dover), and the Church of Christ), the Rev. Robert Moore (Executive of New Castle Presbyrer) Foly Cross Roman Catholic Church, Dovet), and the Right Rev. Cabell Tennis, Bishop of the Episcopal Diocese of Delaware. The Conference greeted all of them with warm appleuse.

Ms. Price then introduced Dr. David Taylor, General Secretary for Strategy and Interpretation of the Consultation on Church Union. Stating that God continues to work in unexpected ways in our midst, Dr. Taylor said that the church has an inner yearning to be visibly and tangibly one. Rather than being like a business merger, however, this unity has to do with new relationships, not new structures. Among the miracles we have seen in our time are: the Sector World Council of Churches, exerging theologies of liberation, and the document Baptiss, Eucharist, and Ministry. Dr. Taylor pointed out that our General Conference will be making some crucial decisions regarding ecumenism when it meets in St. Louis in the summer of 1988.

MINISTERIAL EDUCATION FUND: Bishop Yeakel called on Dr. Bruce E. Cooke, President, Board of Ordained Ministry, who, in turn, introduced Dr. Douglas Lewis, President of Wesley Theological Seminary. Dr. Lewis stated that the Peninsula Annual Conference has had one of the best records in the entire denomination in supporting M.E.F. He spoke of the many ways the Fund assists seminaries, theological students, as well as the local church.

After prayer by the Rev. Mr. Burris, the Conference took a luncheon recess at 12 Noon.

## WEDNESDAY AFTERNOON - MAY 20, 1987

Bishop Yeakel reconvened the Conference at 1:30 P.M. in the auditorium of the Central Middle School with the singing of "We're Marching to Zion".

UNITED METHODIST PUBLISHING HOUSE: Bishop Yeakel recognized the Rev. Dr. J. Gordon Stapleton, C.C.O.M. Director, who spoke of the many new resources now being made available through the Publishing House, including all of the material relating to the Bishops' Letter "In Defense of Creation". He also mentioned that the Publishing House had divested itself of all holdings in South Africa. On behalf of the Publishing House he presented a check to Bishop Yeakel for \$19,811.60, to be deposited in the Pension Fund of the Peninsula Annual Conference.

Dr. Stapleton summoned the Rev. Pamela Lardear, one of the readers for the new U.M. Hymmal, who called the attention of the Conference to the booklet "Hymmal Revision Update" and invited participation in an open forum regarding the new hymmal.

CONFERENCE COUNCIL ON MINISTRIES (continued): Bishop Yeakel summoned the Rev. Clifford A. Armour, C.C.O.M. President, who, in turn, introduced Ms, Virginia Clendaniel, President, Board of Global Ministries.

Hs. Clendaniel called on the Rev. James Riley to present a summary of a study which had been undertaken by the Committee on Congregational Development. The complete text of this report may be found in this Journal under Section VII-c, "Reports". The study includes a listing of priorities for New Church Development and Church Redevelopment. The Conference accepted the report without debate.

Ms. Clendaniel then introduced the Rev. Garry Parker, Secretary of Global Ministries, who presented a report "Reviewing World Mission Funds," as ordered by the 1986 Annual Conference. The report was approved as presented. The text may be found in the <u>Journal</u> under Section VII-C.

The Rev. Mr. Parker also presented the following resolutions relating to a more intentional focus on evangelism by the General Board of Global Ministries.

#### PROPOSED RESOLUTION FORM PENINSULA CONFERENCE BOGM TO BE PRESENTED TO ANNUAL CONFERENCE, MAY 1987

WHEREAS, the General BOGM in plenary session at Louisville, KY in March of 1987 adopted a proposal calling for a new programmatic structure in BOGM on missions and evangelism which will facilitate the Board's continuing efforts in the proclamation of the Gospel; and,

WHEREAS WE, The Peninsula Conference BOGM, affirm both the urgency of the evangelistic task and the biblical and Wesleyan imperative of missional evangelism.

THEREFORE, we move that the Peninsula Conference, meeting at Dover, Delaware in May, 1987, record its support the action of the General Board of Global Ministries, and urge the swift implementation of the proposal, and that copies of this resolution be sent to Bishop James Ault, President of the General Board, and to Dr. Randolph Nugent, General Secretary.

#### Explanation:

The presentation of this resolution to the Peninsula Annual Conference for approval is aimed at affirming the significant and reconciling vote of the directors of the GBOGM in Louisville,

proposing a programmatic emphasis on evangelism within the BOGM. Support of this resolution expresses our agreement with the proposal and our encouragement to the GBOGM.

#### RECOMMEND adoption of the following proposal:

It is proposed that a new programmatic structure on mission and evangelism be considered for addition to the General Board of Global Ministries. Its <u>purpose</u> shall be to enable the Board in fulfilling its responsibilities for proclaiming the Gospel in areas where it has not been heard. Its <u>function</u> will be to assist the Board through the World and National Divisions, and other units with such matters as:

- Locating and identifying places and groups of people without a Christian witness, or where the witness has not penetrated the culture;
- Developing strategies for initiating ministries within and among these places and groups in consultation with mission partners, taking ecumenical relationships into account;
- Nurturing newly gathered communities of Christians leading to the establishment of United Methodist congregations, enabling them to be linked to the United Methodist Church through the missionary outreach of the General Board of Global Ministries;
- Providing advice to the missionary selection, training and placement processes of the Board with particular attention to the functions of evangelism and proclamation;
- Developing support mechanisms for missionaries especially those assigned to pioneer evangelism including prayer partnerships and support through Advance projects.

Therefore, it is further recommended:

- That this proposal be forwarded to the divisions and departments of the GGM for study and recommendation; to the representative of the Council of Bishops and to the participants representing the Mission Society for United Methodists in the ongoing dialogue relative to the work of GGM for their information and comment;
- 2) That the units of the GBGM and those others receiving this proposal for comment return their comments and recommendations to the Board Committee on Research and Development at the October 1987 meeting of the Board.

After some discussion the above resolutions were approved.

He requests we deal with three issues: The theology of John Wesley and the nature of Methodism, Church planting evangelism, and pastoral leadership. The agends is ambitious and will likely need to be more sharply focused if it is to be helpful. His proposal is that we gather all the pastors for two weeks of workshops in August of 1987.

Burnoli is a central African country lying between Zaire and Tanzania with a population of close to four million. Roman Catholics are in the majority in this former German and Belgian colony. The United Methodist Lurch in Burundi with a membership of about 12,860 members is based on an indigenous church which opted to become United Methodist and was accepted by our General Conference in 1984. That Church's coots lay in mission begun through the camp meeting movement interdenomicational mission begun through the camp meeting movement interdenomics living in the country. The major European language of Burundi is French. (I would be teaching in English through an interpreter.)

If this project is approved, I would seek to raise funds for travel and incidentials totaling approximately US \$2,589-53,080. There are advance specials listed in the GBGOM catalogue which our churches could also fund if there is an interest. I would expect to go to Burndi around the 18th of August, returning the last week of August. As I did following my trip to Indonesia in 1985, I would both write for the Communicator and speak in churches on my return.

It was noted that this proposal had already been endorsed by the

Conference Board of Global Ministries. It was then approved by the Conference.

The Rev. Mr. Johnson moved that: 1) the EMLC Committee be continued, 2) the Goals and Objectives of the Plan be approved, 3) the Hispanic Church budget (p. 64) be approved, and 4) the EMLC Committee budget (p. 76) be approved.

Bishop Yeakel recognized the Rev. Thomas C. Short who moved that the following be deleted from p. 9:

"F. Lack of cabinet leadership encourages EMLC to stay at minimum salary."

The motion to amend was seconded and approved after which the whole plan, as amended, with the exception of the salary portion, was approved by the Conference.

Ms. Webb thanked Bishop Yeakel, the Cabinet, the C.C.O.M., and all the members of the Conference for their support in the development of this important document.

- Develop objective criteria for persons to hold office, and present to the 1988 Annual Conference;
- c) Propose that the Vice-Chairperson take over as Chairperson, for the remainder of a term, in the event the Chairperson must resign.

It was understood that this resolution would be referred to the Nominating Committee for early action.

Thomas, Jr., Chairperson of the Nominating Committee, who presented the following slate for the Class of 1991: Clifford A. Armour, Jr., G. Wayne Cuff, Edvin C. Thomas, Jr., Joseph S. Bellmeyer, Eugene D. Bookhammer, Lozelle J. Deluz, Robert H. Reed, Gilbert S. Scarborough, Jr., and Edward P. Spear. These nominations were approved by the Conference.

Mr. Roe then presented the following Resolution dealing with the composition of the membership of the Board of Trustees.

CORPORATE RESOLUTION

WHEREAS, the Board of Trustees deems it advisable to amend Article Ninth of its Certificate of Incorporation:

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that Wesley College, Inc. amend the Certificate of Incorporation of the Corporation as follows:

 Article Ninth of the Certificate of Incorporation is amended by deleting the existing Article Ninth in its entirety and inserting in lieu thereof the following:

NINTH: The property and affairs of this corporation are to be managed and conducted by its Board of Trustees consisting of twenty-nine members, which shall be its governing body. One member shall be the Dover Area District Superintendent of the Peninsula Conference of the United Methodist Church who shall be an ex-officio member of the Board of Trustees. The elected Board of Trustees shall consist of twenty-eight (28) persons divided into four (4) classes of seven (7) members seal elected to serve a term of four (4) vers upon their installation at the Fall meeting of the Board and terminating upon removal for cause, death, resignation, or the installation of their successors. Of the elected Trustees thirty (200 and 10 and trustees shall be ordained clergy, at least five (5) of whom salaried or hourly employee of the College is eligible for membership on the Board.

In its selection of nominees for Trustee, the Committee on Trustee Development shall take into consideration an appropriate balance with regard to race, sex, age, alumni representation and geographical location of candidates so as to reflect the overall inclusiveness of the Peninsula Annual Conference and the Geographical area of residence of students it serves.

All Trustees at the time of the adoption of this Article Ninth shall continue to be eligible to serve their elected terms.

At the mext Annual Meeting of the Membership of the Corporation following the adoption of this Article Ninth, the first class of seven (7) Trustees shall be elected for a four (4) year term and each year thereafter an additional class of seven (7) Trustees shall be elected for a four (4) year term. A trustee shall not adoption of these by-laws. After an absence of one (1) year from the Board he shall be eligible for election to the Board, if otherwise qualified.

Vacancies on the Board of Trustees which may result from any cause other than the expiration of the term of office of a Board member, may be filled by the Board of Trustees; and each person elected to fill such a vacancy shall serve as a member of the Board of Trustees for the entire unexpired term of the member who he shall have been elected to replace.

The Board of Trustees of this corporation shall have power to make, alter or repeal By-Laws for this corporation, and shall have such other powers, and duties as may be prescribed by the By-Laws and as may be permitted by the Laws of Delaware and by this amended Certificate of Incorporation.

AND NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that this resolution be submitted to the next regular meeting of the membership of this corporation for approval.

After a brief period of discussion the resolution was adopted by the Conference.

Mr. Roe then introduced president Stewart who spoke briefly concerning the present state of the College. This year there were 638 full-time students and a financial surplus was enjoyed. Wesley survived the tragedy of the death of a member of the student body as an orçanic family. Athletic teams are now competing in the NCAA. Bishop Yeakel recognized the Rev. Dr. J. Gordon Stapleton, CCOM Director, who expressed profuse thanks to Wesley College for allowing the Peninsula Conference to use its facilities and equipment for so many purposes. The Conference expressed its gratitude with much applause.

Mr. Roe then declared the Corporate Session adjourned.

I move that the daily proceedings for Tuesday and Wednesday be approved and that the committee be authorized to approve the remainder of the proceedings when available.

The motion was seconded and approved.

REPORT OF THE STATISTICIAN: Bishop Yeakel summoned the Rev. Boyd B. Etter, Statistician, who stated that there was good news to share! After a three-year decline, the total membership of the Conference had shown an increase of 313 members. Dramatic increases in persons received by Profession of Faith and from other denominations were noteworthy. The entire report may be found under "VII, C." in this Journal.

CABINET PROPERTY MATTERS: Bishop Yeakel called on the Rev. Howell 0. Wilkins, Easton District Superintendent, who presented the following resolutions:

WHEERAS, the Charge Conference and the membership of the Wittman-Konniel Charge, John Weeley Church, NeOnniel, St. James' Church, Sherwood, and St. John's Church, Wittman, have voted on December 22, 1986 to merge and become one charge th the Peninsula Annual Conference recognize this merger and consider this a new congregation.

The resolution was approved by the Conference.

WHEREAS, the members of St. John's Church, located near Tilghman, on the Tilghman Charge, requested limited service status effective at this session of the Annual Conference, BE IT THEREFORE RESOLVED, that said St. John's Church be discontinued as an active congregation and the members transferred to the Tilghman Charge, or other churches of their choice, and that the St. John's Church building be listed as a 'limited Service Church' to be maintained by the committee of present members under the 'Guidelines for Limited Service Churches', accountable to the Tilghman Charge.

This resolution was also approved by the Conference.

Bishop Yeakel then recognized the Rev. Ewart C. Hackshaw, Salisbury District Superintendent, who presented the following resolution:

WHEREAS, the Administrative Council of the St. Stephen's United Methodist Church on the Oriole Charge, Salisbury District, has requested 'Limited Service' status as of July 1, 1987,

BE IT THEREFORE RESOLVED, that said St. Stephen's Church be discontinued as an active congregation and the members transferred to other churches of their choice, and that the St. Stephens Church building be listed as a 'Limited Service Church' to be maintained by the committee of present members under the 'Guidelines for Limited Service Churches,' accountable to the oriole Charge.

The resolution was approved by the Conference.

Mr. Hackshaw also presented the following resolution:

WHEREAS, the Administrative Council of Grace United Methodist Church on the Nanticoke Charge, Salisbury, District, has requested 'Limited Service' status as of July 1, 1987,

BE IT THEREFORE RESOLVED, that said Grace Church be discontinued as an active congregation and the members transferred to other churches of their choice, and that the Grace Church building be listed as a 'Limited Service Church' to be maintained by the committee of present members under the 'Quidelines for Limited Service Churches,' accountable to the Nanticoke Charge.

The resolution was approved by the Conference.

BOARD OF CHURCH AND SOCIETY (continued): Bishop Yeakel summoned the Rev. James VanDerWall who presented the following resolution:

A RESOLUTION ON HOUSING AND THE HOMELESS

Homelessness is a growing problem in both Maryland and Delaware A recent study by the Oniversity of Delaware and funded in part by churches and other private agencies (the United Methodist Church was not among those funding this research) shows that 51 percent of those now homeless have never been without housing before. The reasons for their being without housing ranged from the largest category. "could not afford" (34%), "spouse or child abuse" (21%), "eviction" (19%), "dwelling unsafe" (9%), "stranded" (5%), to "disaster" (4%), and "other" (32%). There is a disproportionate number of female heads of households, age 20-29 who are homeless, and they make up the majority of those between ages 30 and 45. This means many children are involved. Over 25 percent of the homeless are currently working and another 33 percent have been out of a job less than a year. These are not persons who refuse to work. Forty-three percent have been without shelter less than three weeks.

Why homelessness? Again the problem is a complicated one, but the fundamental reason seems to be that of powerlessness in terms of adequate income and influence. So many of these persons are women heads of households and the status of women has been an inferior one in this society despite the fact they are numerically superior. The political economy favors increasingly the wealthy and neglects the lower socio-economic levels. Only five percent of the households in the United States make 58,080 or more. 34 million are below the poverty line (\$11,060 for a family of four) and midd for an 136 income family takes up the greatest percentage of that income. The gap between the wealthy and the poor is widening. That has been occurring since 1978.

One of every four Americans lives in substandard housing. We might call this condition "near homelasenses". Though there are housing codes for many Peninsula communities, they are more often than not ignored. The occupancy rate of housing is very high making it easy to be a "slumlord". In many other communities no housing codes exist.

There are simply one too many shacks and one too many substandard apartments on the deninsula. The disproportionate number of ethnic persons occupying substandard houses and apartments is unconscionable and offensive to Christian beliefs in the personhood and dignity of human beings. The Gospel of Jesus Christ calls us to speak out on this grave issue of homelessness and substandard, inadequate housing. (See Millard Fuller, More Shacks)

WHEREAS, the need for housing for the homeless as well as for those living in intolerable shacks, abandoned warehouses, ancient house trailers, and other types of makeshift shelters is apparent on the Peninsula: and.

WHEREAS, the call of Christ's Gospel to the people of His church is one of action in behalf of the homeless and the ill-housed,

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED THAT the Board of Church and Society of the Peninsula Annual Conference bring together all agencies of the Conference in a joint, coordinated effort for a United Methodist housing ministry on the peninsula which works with other agencies in every way possible; and,

THAT each Board of Church and Society of each local church identify this as a program of utmost importance, and individually or in cooperation with other churches, identify specific housing needs existing in its community. Calling attention to the people who need housing is one of the first steps in the process of alleviating the problem. Imagination as to what a congregation can do and sometimes the use of existing ofurch buildings for housing the homeless is a place to begin; THAT each Board of Church and Society of each local church with other agencies demand that housing codes be followed and if no housing codes exist, then work to put them in place along with rent controls;

THAT we urge each Board of Church and Society of each local church to link with Habitat for Humanity efforts in this conference area supporting it with funding, volunteer help, and leadership.

Bishop Yeakel recognized the Rev. Dr. C. Edwin Lasbury, Wilmington District Superintendent, who made a motion that the following be substituted for the last paragraph of the resolution:

That we urge each Work Area on Church and Society of each local church to link with the Inter-Faith Housing Task Force, Inc., which incorporates the work of 'Habitat for Humanity', and the Delmarva Reumenical Agency Eastern Shore Low-Income Housing Task Force, which is working in conjunction with the Episcopal Diocese of Easton Housing Committee. Local churches are urged to support these programs with funds, volunteer help, and leadership.

The amendment was seconded and approved, after which the amended resolution was adopted.

The Rev. Mr. VanDerWall then presented the following resolution:

#### A RESOLUTION ON ETHNIC MINORITY LOCAL CHURCHES AND THE RISE OF RACISM

"God through creation has established a mode whereby, through a reconciling process, human beings can achieve the full potential of their existence.

The worth of every human being resides in the intrinsic value which Go das given to each individual. This affirmtion is calced in Jesus' parable where each human being is valued according to God's special love for that person.

A person who places another person, by thought or deed, outside of the possibility of human growth and development violates God's sacred mandate to humanity: 'Love your neighbor as yourself.'

This mandate sets the conditions for human existence through justice, mutual respect, and trust. Our failure to fulfil this mandate has resulted in oppression and racism." (The Book of Resolutions, 1984: 352-53)

Racism has surfaced overtly on the Peninsula during the last months. We have seen it across how York City, philadelphia, Tampa, Florida, at Columbia University, and the Citadel. Yet racism has been with us covertly within the social and cultural structures all the time. The disproportionate representation of the ethnic minorities, especially black people, among the poor, the unemployed, the functionally illiterate, poorly educated, the ill-housed, without health insurance, in primo and no death row and put to death because their victims were white, speak volumes about this subtle, covert, ingrained, institutional racism. WHEREAS, persons, before they are born are assigned to a group severely limited in freedom of movement, choice of work, and place of residence because of their race; and,

WHEREAS, groups of people, because of their race, are denied effective participation in the political process and are excluded from the normal channels available for gaining economic power, through denial of educational opportunities and entry into occupational/professional groups; and,

WHEREAS, the identity of persons is still defamed through stereo-typing of racial and ethnic groups in textbooks, cinema, mass media, interpersonal relations and other ways;

WHEREAS, people are still denied equal protection of the law, because of race;

WHERRAS, implicit, covert institutional racism permeates every institutional arrangement of society, the church does not escape and struggles with its own inclusiveness, the extent it realizes equality and justice,

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED THAT we as the Peninsula Annual Conference of the United Methodist Church re-commit ourselves to the Missional Priority of the Ethnic Minority Local Church by moving this program to the center of concerns for this final year of the quadrennium;

THAT the local Boards of Church and Society actively support the enforcement of affirmative action in employment, housing, health care institutions, and government systems;

THAT the local Boards of Church and Society take the lead in working with the Ethnic Minority Local Church program in its effort to confront the problems of housing, employment, educational opportunity, health care, youth unemployment, the double jeopardy which ethnic minority women face;

THAT, the Peningula Annual Conference affirm its continuing efforts to realize greater inclusivements at every level of the church incorporating equitable salary plans for pastors, cooperative programs across ethnic lands in so doing begin the defeat of both the overt and latent expressions of racism which currently plague this land.

The above resolution was approved by the Conference.

The Rev. Mr. VanDerWall then presented the following resolution:

A RESOLUTION ON THE SACREDNESS AND DIGNITY OF THE HUMAN PERSON AS EXPRESSED IN CHRISTIAN VALUES AND THE PROBLEM OF VIOLENCE

So many aspects of contemporary mass culture attack and affront the dignity of human persons by denigrating their bodies and brutalizing their spirits. Martin Buber noted in the 1920's that seeing others as objects creates a culture in which the form of social contained by a conclusion from this is that contemporary humans see  $\frac{1-H}{1-H}$  a conclusion from this is that contemporary humans see Turning others into objects leads easily into justifying the use of violence.

all its forms--indeed inventing new ones--through photos, movies, videos, in speech, and music.

WHEREAS, so many forms of public media portray and express forms of violence that are demeaning to the Christian concept of the person; and,

WHEREAS, an acceptance of violent conduct has led, and does lead, to greater acceptance of pornography, the easy use of violence for the resolution of any and all conflict, the encouragement of anger, especially in adult males (See Susan H. Gray, "Exposure to Pornography and Aggression Toward Women: The Case of the Angry Male", <u>Social Problems</u> 29 (April 1982) 387-398); and,

WHEREAS, violence is so prevalent in our society that we have become insensitive to its attack upon Christian values; and,

WHEREAS, there is a need for a ministry of the church that stresses those Christian values which dignify the human body that God has made and in which the Bible affirms His Spirit dwells;

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED THAT the Annual Conference:

- prepare an in-service study seminar for both clergy (will satisfy CEU requirements) and laity at the Conference level.
- 2) That materials be developed or found which will enable local churches to hold study sessions for special populations such as youth, parents of youth, young adult males, young adult females, and the like, teaching them the history of violence in American society. Christian views of violence, discussing the linkages of violence with pornography, spouse and child abuse, both physical and mental, and to feelings of apathy and powerlessness.
- 3) Encouraging local churches, sub-districts and other groups or associations of members to promote the thoughtful and prayerful practice of discriminating among the many mass media materials, programs, videos, and the like, in order to select those which promote the Christian way of life, explicitly rejecting violence in all its forms including hard core pornography, toys, music, and literature.

The resolution was approved by the Conference.

Bishop Yeakel recognized the Rev. Thomas C. Short who presented the following resolution on AIDS:

In as much as AIDS (Acquired Immune Deficiency Syndrome) is a devastating disease which threatens hundreds of lives within the bounds of the Peninsula Conference: Be it resolved that the Board of Church and Society provide, for the 1988 Annual Conference, a program whereby we can express our care and concern for the victims of AIDS and our encouragement for all who work to combat this deadly disease.

The resolution was seconded by the Rev. Jonathan Baker. Bishop yeakel recognized the Rev. Clifford A. Armour, Jr. who moved that the

Board of Church and Society provide a program on AIDS by December, 1987, to be approved by the Conference Council on Ministries. The amendment was seconded and approved, following which the resolution, as amended, was also approved. It was referred to the Board of Church and Society for implementation.

# RESOLUTION ON 'PARTNER' CHURCHES

WHEREAS, our partner churches are suffering in ways that threaten their very existence;

WHEREAS, ever-worsening economic conditions that have caused suffering to the churches also falls most heavily on those who are already most vulnerable--the children, older persons, women and poor;

WHEREAS, our partner churches have provided sure relief for persons threatened by life's storms and floods, in obedience to the Gospel demands of Jesus Christ;

WHEREAS, The Council of Bishops, with the approval of the General Council on Finance and Administration, has issued a \$9 million Bishops' Appeal for Partner Churches In Crisis;

AND WHEREAS, that goal could be exceeded if each and every United Methodist contributes at least \$1.60 to the Bishop's Appeal:

THEREFORE: The <u>Peninsula</u> Annual Conference urges all churches to contribute, at minimum, the sum of one dollar per member to the special appeal. This offering would be taken and forwarded to the Conference Treasurer sometime prior to the last Sunday in September, 1987.

FURTHER, The Conference urges all pastors and churches to study and be alert to the global economic crisis and its effect on our partner churches.

The resolution was adopted by the Conference.

INFRODUCTION OF YOUTH CONNCIL MEMBERS: Bishop Yeakel recognized the Bew. Herman Lipsius who introduced seven members of the Peninsula Conference Youth Council. Christy Johnson, a member of the group, spoke briefly of the Peace Mission to the U.S.S.R. in which she had participated on behalf of the Council. The Rev. Mr. Lipsius spoke glowingly of the Conference Youth Kally held in January, 1987, at Salisbury State College and commented that plans were already underway for another such event in 1988. He also made reference to the Summer Youth Service project which would be taking place in the Wilnington area this year.

Bishop Yeakel recognized the Rev. Dr. Edwin C. Thomas, Jr. who made the following motion:

I move that this Conference instruct the Conference Secretary, as the minutes are ediced, to make a list of the actions of this Conference that are instructions, calls, and encouragements to the local tourch and that the list be printed in the <u>Communicator</u> and mailed to the Lay and Clergy members of the <u>Conference</u>.

The motion was seconded and approved.

In recessing the Conference at 12:15 P.M., Bishop Yeakel prayed for the families of the thirty-seven sailors who had perished on the U.S.S. Stark and for the Rev. Thomas J. Wall, who had been injured in an automobile accident enroute to Conference earlier that morning.

### THURSDAY AFTERNOON - MAY 21, 1987

Bishop Yeakel reconvened the plenary session in the Central Middle School at 2:00 P.M. with the singing of "In the Garden". Prayer was offered by the Rev. Macco Williams.

HUNGER TASK FORCE: Bishop Yeakel recognized Ms. Doris Phillips who spoke of the continuing work of the Task Force and of the need for more churches to become involved in fighting world hunger.

UNITED METHODIST COMMUNICATIONS: Bishop Yeakel recognized the Rev-Susan Keinn Kester who read telegrams indicating the "Catch the Spirit!" Program would be carried by CBM in the fall in three primetime slots. She asked for the continued support and funding of the Conference with regard to this important work.

As this completed the balloting, Bishop Yeakel asked the entire delegation to the General and Jurisdictional Conferences to stand. The Conference affirmed them with enthusiastic applause.

BOARD OF PENSIONS: Bishop Yeakel recognized Mm. Kay P. Cloud, President, who directed the attention of the Conference to the report in the Pre-Conference Booklet. She then presented the following recommendations which were approved by the Conference:

- The Past Service Rate for 1988 be \$210 per year of approved service.
- Up to 100% of the pension and disability payments received be designated as the permitted housing allowance for 1988.

COMMISSION ON EQUITABLE SALARIES: Bishop Yeakel recognized the Rev. Ms. Laura Martin, Chairperson, who was not present because of serious illness. The Rev. Ms. New Yeaker Called on the Rev. Laurence M. Berry to present the report of the Task Porce on Basic Salary as a response to a mandate from the 1986 Arout Congression. Following several editorial changes offered by the Rev. Mr. Berry, the report was before the Conference as follows.

#### TASK FORCE ON BASIC SALARY

The Annual Conference of 1984 authorized the appointment of a Task Force on a Basic Salary Plan in response to action on a motion by Ewart C. Hackshaw.

Accordingly, the following proposal for a basic salary structure is suggested. These suggestions are made in accordance with the 1984 Discipline of The United Methodist Church, and with consideration to the needs of the church, and the people of the small churches currently being served by pastors who are at minimum salary or below minimum salary. We recognize that in some cases there will be a need for Conference support administered through The Commission on Equitable Salaries. However, we feel that there is a greater need to be fair and just to each of the individual pastors who serve year after year in the many small charges in our conference.

WHEREAS, there is a need to recognize the training, talent, and service of each pastor to insure qualified candidates for ministry to the churches of the Peninsula Annual Conference, and,

WHEREAS, it is the responsibility of each charge conference to establish the salary for its pastor, and,

WHERAS, it is the responsibility of the Annual Conference to establish the minium salary level to be paid by each charge, BE IT RESOLVED that all full members of the Annual Conference, serving full time, shall receive a minium salary equal to seventy (70) percent of the current Conference average compensation as provided by The Board of Pensions. In addition, upon recommendation of the District Superintendent or the Pastor-Parish Relations Committee, the minimum salary for each (J/2) of one percent of the Conference average compensation for each year of service to a maximum of twenty (20) years. Only those years when full pension credit was earned will econted. This will include years of service in the former E.U.B. and Methodist Churches.

All Probationary and Associate Members of The Annual Conference, serving full time, shall receive a minimum salary equal to sixty-five (65) percent of the Conference average compensation. In addition, upon recommendation of the District Superintendent or The Pastor-Parish Relations Committee, the minimum salary for each pastor shall be increased by a service increment of one-half (1/2) of one percent of the Conference average compensation for each year of service to a maximum of fifteen (15) years. Only those years when full pension credit was earned will be counted. This will include years of service in the former E.U.B. and Methodist Churches.

All Pull-Time Local pastors of The Annual Conference serving full time, shall receive a minimum salary equal to sity (60) percent of the conference average salary. In addition, upon recommendation of the District Superintendent or the Pastor-Paria Relations Committee, the minimum salary for each pastor shall be increased by a service increment of one-half (1/2) of one percent of the Conference average compensation for each year of service to a maximum of fifteen (15) years. Only those years when full pension credit was earned will be counted. This will include years of service in the former E.U.B. and Methodist Churches.

All Student Local Pastors and Part-Time Local Pastors of The Annual Conference shall receive a minimum salary of \$11,000.00, except as negotiated between pastor, P.P.R., and D.S.

Bishop Yeakel then recognized the Rev. Dr. Bruce E. Cooke who offered the following amendment:

- First Paragraph: first sentence to end with 'shall receive a minimum salary of \$15,000 for 1988'.
- Second Paragraph: first sentence to end with 'shall receive a minimum salary of \$14,500 for 1988'.
- Third Paragraph: first sentence to end with 'shall receive a minimum salary of \$13,500 for 1988'.

To change existing Paragraph Four to Paragraph Five and add a new Paragraph Four as follows: 'That such increments begin in 1988, using the 1986 Conference Average Salary (excluding housing) to compute increments representing previous service. Henceforth, such increments shall be computed annually using the Salary'. It available information regarding Conference Average

The amendment was seconded, but after much discussion, defeated.

Bishop Yeakel then recognized the Rev. Thomas W. Blakelock who offered the following amendment:

That the following be substituted for Paragraph Five: 'All student local pastors of the Annual Conference shall receive a minimum salary of 50% of the Conference Average Salary.'

The motion to amend was seconded but defeated. The original resolution, as perfected, was then approved by the Conference.

Bishop Yeakel then recognized the Rev. Clifford A. Armour, Jr. who moved:

That the Commission on Equitable Salaries be asked to study the question of and prepare recommendations for salary/compensation as it relates to second career persons entering the effective ministry of the United Methodist Church.

The motion was seconded but defeated.

POINT OF PERSONAL PRIVILEGE: Bishop Yeakel recognized the Rev. Cynthia Koski who presented the following concern:

Loren Frye, a member of Hockessin UMC who chaired the Commission on Equitable Salaries in recent years, is indeed very ill with cancer. I spent time with Loren before coming to Conference and he expressed his regret at not being able to be among us today. I request that the Conference Secretary communicate our concern and Good Wishes to Loren from this Conference gathering.

By unanimous consent this concern was affirmed by the Conference.

Bishop Yeakel then recognized the Rev. Dr. J. T. Seymour who moved to amend the travel reimbursement portion of the report of the Commission on Equitable Salaries by adding the cost of tolls and parking incurred in the performance of ministerial duties. The motion was seconded and approved following which the entire report was approved by the Conference.

POINT OF PERSONAL PRIVILECE: Bishop Yeakel recognized Mr. Richard Stone of the Laurel/Mt. Pleasant Charge who moved that the Conference send statements to Gov. Castle of Delaware and Gov. Shaffer of Maryland affirming the Bicentennial of the U.S. Constitution. The motion was seconded and approved.

COUNCIL ON FINANCE AND ADMINISTRATION: Bishop Yeakel summoned Mr. Calvin H. Webster to present the report. Mr. Webster called attention to the material in the Pre-Conference Booklet and moved the adoption of the budget in the amount of \$3,676,164. The motion was seconded and approved.

Bishop Yeakel recognized Dr. Roberta K. Tarbell, Lay Member from Hockessin U.M.C. who moved that a line item be added to the budget for the new dental plan. The motion was seconded and approved.

Bishop Yeakel recognized the Rev. William H. Revell, Jr. who moved:

That there shall be a fourth recommendation added to the list of recommendations in the report of the Council on Finance and Administration as found on p. 67 of the 1987 Pre-Conference Journal and that this recommendation number four shall provide the same dental care for retired ministers and spouses as is provided for active ministers and spouses, and that the effective date of this coverage for retired ministers and spouses shall be February 1, 1987.

The motion was seconded and some discussion ensued. Mr. Webster stated that he was uncertain as to whether our insurance carrier, Blue Gross Blue Shield, would make the plan retroactive to Pebruary 1, 1987. The above resolution was adopted with the understanding that the Council on Finance and Administration would reimburse all submitted dental bills, according to the Blue Cross Blue Shield formula, between Pebruary 1, 1987 and the date when Blue Cross Blue Shield would begin its coverage as per the adopted resolution.

Mr. Webster then moved that .38 be the apportionment factor for 1988. The motion was seconded and approved.

He then moved that property and liability insurance paid by the local church remain a part of the operating expenses used for calculating apportionments. The motion was seconded and approved after which the entire report was adopted by the Conference.

POINT OF PERSONAL PRIVILEGE: Bishop Yeakel recognized the Rev. George C. Godfrey, Vice-Chairperson of C. P. and A. who expressed profuse thanks to Theodore W. Briggs, Conference Treasurer/Business Manager, for his untiring efforts with Conference finances. The Conference affirmed Mr. Briggs with warm applause.

Bishop Yeakel then recognized the Rev. Dr. J. T. Seymour who moved:

That the Peninsula Annual Conference direct C. F. and A. to reestablish the Committee on Ministers' Benefits. For any start of two members of C. F. and A., two members of the Board of Pensions, and a Cabinet representative.

The motion was seconded and approved.

Bishop Yeakel then recognized the Rev. Dr. F. David Weber who moved that the following be deleted from the C. F. and A. report:

 That the Non-Contributory Group Life Insurance be discontinued as of December 31, 1989. Any person desiring continuance of this insurance may have their coverage converted to a direct pay policy.

The motion was seconded and discussion ensued. Bishop Yeakel recognized the Rev. Dr. R. Jervis Cooke who moved that the matter be referred back to C. F. and A. for study with a report at the 1988 Annual Conference. The motion was seconded and approved by the Conference.

CONFERENCE RULES OF ORDER: Bishop Yeakel recognized the Rev. Dr. J. Gordon Stapleton who moved that the following be added to the Conference Rules of Order as  $\ddagger$  28:

## SUBJECT: CALLING A DISTRICT CONFERENCE

Rule #28. In keeping with paragraph 744 in the 1984 Book of Discipline which states "A District Conference shall be held if directed by the Annual Conference of which it is a part and may be held upon the call of the district superintendent, which call shall specify the time and place', a district superintendent may call a District Conference with the consent of the presiding Bishop and the District tay Eader. This rule will be reviewed quadrenially at the Annual Conference following each session of the Northeastern Jurisdictional Conference.

The motion was seconded and approved by the Conference.

Bishop Yeakel then recognized the Rev. Douglas M. Lindsay who presented the following resolution:

A RESOLUTION CONCERNING THE REPORTING OF CLERGY INCOME

WHEREAS it has come to the attention of several clergy in the Peninsula Annual Conference that their inverse have been improperly prepared because of incorrect income reporting forms being used by church treasurers, and...

WHEREAS the General Council on Finance and Administration issued a letter (Feb. 16, 1984) to all conference treasurers, recommending the issuance of Form 1899 to all United Methodist clergy, and citing Revenue Ruling 88-118 that clergy members of Annual Conferences "are not common-law employees, but instead are independent contractors (CraigH oskins, 1984, p. 3)", and...

WHEREAS United Methodist clergy should list their occupation for income tax purposes as "United Methodist clergy" or United Methodist clergy" or United Methodist and cite Internal Revenue Service regulation 31.4481(C)-1(b) as the basis for that status designation, and...

WHEREAS the GCFA letter of February 16, 1984 was followed by a letter dated May 9, 1986, affirming the position of the 1984 letter, stating:

Nowhere is there any indication that there has been any statutory or regulatory change which requires local churches to issue W-2 forms to ministers. As local churches clearly do not directly hire and fire their ministers as "employees", our office continues to take the position that the issuence of a Form 1899, rather than a Form W-2, would be appropriate for local church treasurers to issue their pastors. (Hoskins, 1966)

WHEREAS this resolution is deemed necessary because the clergy members of the Peninsula Annual Conference receive a 1899, a W-2, or nothing: whether they serve in the parish or in some other appointed position, there is no uniform method of reporting clergy income to the Internal Revenue Service, and...

WHEREAS the conclusions of the General Counsel of the GCFA are of importance to ALL clergy members, and are herewith attached...

BE IT RESOLVED that the Peninsula Annual Conference officially adopt a standard procedure for reporting income paid to clergy members and to the IRS, and...

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that Form 1099 be adopted as the standard reporting form for the income of the clergy members of the

Peninsula Annual Conference, and that all church treasurers and clergy be advised of this policy by the Conference Council on Finance and Administration, with samples of all reporting forms to be used, by October 1, 1987.

The motion to adopt was seconded, and, after brief discussion, approved by the Conference.

GENERAL CONFERENCE PETITIONS: Bishop Yeakel recognized the Rev. William Hemphill, Jr. who presented the following petitions.

- One: Spiit-lad vinces In Defense of Creation, and request continued imaginative initiatives from the Council in addressing concerns which include: church revitalization, congregational renewal, and the relationship between racial/economic injustice and humanity's quest for peace. We, therefore, urge the General Conference to equip our Council of Bishops with the resources necessary to offer further initiatives in relating the Gospel to a suffering world.
- Two: WE urge the Commission on the General Conference in its planning for worship and special programs to emphasize our United Methodist witness to abundant life in Christ against the powers of death embodied in the twin demons of racism and nuclear arms testing and build up.
- Three: WE urge the General Council on Ministries to coordinate initiatives in preparation for General Conference that make plain the interlocking issues of racial justice and world peace.

The above petitions were all approved by the Conference.

Bishop Yeakel then recognized Ms. Lois Coursey, Lay Member from Kent Island U.M.C. who presented the following petition.

WHEREAS the Biblical witness affirms the goodness of created existence, the value of individual life, the equality of persons in God, and proscribes the shedding of innocent blood;

WHEREAS the Christian Church has historically advocated the rights of the weak, the handicapped, and the innocent;

WHEREAS the United Methodist Church has betrayed its calling to uphold the sanctity of innocent life, by sanctioning abortion on demand, in supporting the work of the Religious Coalition for Abortion Rights; WHEREAS the Religious Coalition for Abortion Rights, as a political action committee, advocates legal abortion on demand;

BE IT RESOLVED: That the United Methodist Church cannot morally justify its membership in the Religious Coalition for Abortion Rights.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the United Methodist Church, represented by the Women's Division of the Board of Global Ministries and the Board of Church and Society, withdraw its membership in and support of the Religious Coalition for Abortion Rights.

THIS RESOLUTION was approved by the Administrative Council of the Kent Island United Methodist Church, Harbor View, Chester, Maryland on April 14, 1987 and we seek the Peninsula Annual Conference to similarly adopt this resolution.

Bishop Yeakel recognized Dr. Roberta K. Tarbell, Lay Member from Hockessin U.M.C., who presented the following motion:

Be it resolved that the Conference Council on Ministries be directed to study the record and action of the Religious Coalition for Abortion Rights and make a report of its findings to the 1986 Peninsula Annual Conference.

The motion was seconded and a discussion ensued.

Bishop Yeakel then recognized the Rev. George C. Godfrey who offered the following amendment to the above motion:

That we direct the Board of Church and Society to present a program on abortion in the Fall of 1987, preferably in October.

The motion was seconded and a discussion ensued.

Bishop Yeakel then recognized the Rev. Dr. R. Jervis Cooke who made a motion to table this whole matter. The motion was seconded and approved by the Conference.

Bishop Yeakel then recognized Ms. Verdie Page Burris and Ms. Doris S. Phillips, who presented the following petitions.

### PROPOSED GENERAL CONFERENCE LEGISLATION Presented by GENERAL COMMISSION ON RELIGION & RACE

Delete Par. 739.2 and in its place insert new material

as follows:

The basic membership of the Annual Conference commission shall be nominated and elected by established procedure of the respective Annual Conference. Each Annual Conference shall determine the number and composition of the total membership which shall consist of a minimum of twelve. The commission membership shall include representation from each district. Care shall be taken to insure that the total membership shall maintain the one-third laywomen, onthird laymen and one-third clergy balance. It is strongly urged that the Annual Conference Commissions be constituted so that the majority of the membership be represented by racial and ethnic minority persons (Asian Americans, Black Americans, Hispanic Americans and Native Americans) reflecting the racial and ethnic minority constituency of the Annual Conference. Selection of commission members shall insure adequate representation of women, youth, young adulta, persons over 65 and persons with handicapping conditions. Hembers of the General Commission on Religion and Race residing in the Annual Conference shall be ex-officio members of the Annual Conference Commissions new create as many committees and task forces as it deems necessary in order to implement its responsibilities.

Add the following new sub-paragraphs after Par. 739.3 (n) to read as follows:

Serve in consultation with the bishop and other appropriate conference leadership to investigate and assist in resolution of complaints of racial discrimination made by clergy or laity.

Maintaining a close relationship with the General Commission on Religion and Race seeking to guidance, utilizing ist sining and resources, and interpreting to the Annual Conference the programs, plans and policies of the General Commission on Religion and Race.

## AMENDMENT TO PROPOSED GENERAL COMMISSION ON RELIGION & RACE LEGISLATION OF PARAGRAPH 739.2

## PENINSULA CONFERENCE COMMISSION ON RELIGION & RACE

The Peninsula Conference Commission on Religion and Race supports the General Commission on Religion and Race proposed changes of paragraph 739.2. However, we do not wish to delete the references to District Directors, and their functioning on the District Council on Ministries, and on the Conference Commission on Religion and Race. Therefore, we wish to amend proposed paragraph 739.2 as follows:

The basic membership of the Annual Conference Commission shall be nominated and elected by established procedure of the respective Annual Conferences. Each Annual Conference shall determine the number and composition of the total membership which shall consist of a minimum of twelve. The commission membership shall include representation from each district. Where a district has elected a district director of religion and race, that person shall serve on the Conference Commission on Religion and Race with vote. These persons will be elected by the usual procedure of the Conference and they shall serve as members of the Council on Ministries of their respective districts in order to act as liaison between the district and the Conference. Care shall be taken to insure that the total membership shall maintain the one-third laywomen, one-third laymen and one-third clergy balance. It is strongly urged that the Annual Conference Commissions be constituted so that the majority of the membership be represented by racial and ethnic minority persons (Asian Americans, Black Americans, Hispanic Americans and Native Americans) reflecting the racial and ethnic minority constituency of the Annual Conference. Selection of commission members shall insure adequate representation of women, youth, young adults, persons over 65, and persons with handicapped conditions. Members of the General Commission on Religion and Race residing in the Annual Conference shall be exofficio members of the Annual Conference Commission on Religion and Race with vote. The Annual Conference Commissions may create as many committees and task forces as it deems necessary in order to implement its responsibilities.

Both of the above were approved by the Conference.

Ms. Burris and Ms. Phillips also presented the following petition relating to Africa Church Growth:

WHEREAS the General Conferences of 1988 and 1984 approved and provided funding channels for a program known as Africa Church Growth and Development with components of:

evangelism and community development, leadership development, and church construction, and

WHEREAS the Africa Church Growth and Development Program has proved to be a justified "new model" for serving existing and new opportunities and challenges of church growth and development, offering opportunities for self-determination and mutual sharing and cooperation of United Methodist Churches in Africa, Burope, and United States of America, and

WHEREAS continuation of this program is vital to the churches in Africa, Europe and the USA,

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that Peninsula Annual Conference does hereby recommend that the General Conference of 1988 authorize the continuation of the Africa Church Growth and Development Frogram as a global program, covering Africa, Europe, and the United State and fine the second second second second State and fine and the second second second second through the General Board of Global Ministries (GBGM), and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that this program report to the 1992 General Conference through the GBGM reporting system.

The petition was approved by the Annual Conference.

Bishop Yeakel then recognized the Rev. John F. Holden, Pastor of the Chestertown-Pomona Charge, who presented the following petition relating to the position of Lay Assistant Pastor.

#### PETITION TO 1988 GENERAL CONFERENCE

In order to offer additional options for pastoral leadership in small churches, the position of Lay Assistant Pastor, serving under the supervision and tutelage of the pastor of the charge, is proposed.

Par. 435 (second paragraph)

In addition to the ministers, persons who have been granted a license as local pastors and who have been approved by vote of the ministerial members in full connection, may be appointed as pastors in charge under certain conditions which are specified in pp. 486-488, and persons who have been approved by District Committees on Ordained Ministry may be appointed to local churches as Lay Assistant Pastors under the supervision and tutelage of elders.

> (New Section) Lay Assistant Pastor

Par. 406A. Authority and Duties.

1. A Law Assistant Pastor is a person approved by the District

Committee on Ordained Ministry to perform all the duties of a pastor (p.439) including the Sacraments of Baptism and Holy Communion as well as the service of marriage (where state laws allow), burlal, confirmation, and membership reception, while assigned part-time or full-time to a particular local church.

 Such authorization granted by the approval may be renewed annually by the Distribution of a distance of a distance of a distance only within the local church to which the Lay Assistant Pastor is appointed.

 The license shall remain valid only so long as the appointment continues and must be recertified by the bishop when assignments change between sessions of the Annual Conference.

4. A Lay Assistant Pastor shall be under the supervision and tutelage of an elder who is pastor of the charge which includes the local church to which the Lay Assistant Pastor is appointed and who shall supervise the Lay Assistant Pastor's work and on-the-job training and study and give counsel and direction on matters of pastoral responsibility.

5. Lay Assistant Pastors shall be amenable to the supervising elder in the performance of their pastoral duties and may attend the sessions of the Annual Conference.

6. The church membership of Lay Assistant Pastors shall be in the local church to which they are appointed, and they shall be members of the Charge Conference.

7. Student Lay Assistant Pastors may retain their membership in their home churches and Charge conferences, but in the discharge of their ministerial functions they shall be amenable to the supervising elder under whom they serve.

Par. 407. License As a Local Pastor.

All persons not ordained as deacons or elders who preach and conduct divine worship and perform the duties of a pastor under pastoral appointment shall have a license as a local pastor or a certificate as a Lay Assistant Pastor.

#### (New Sections)

Par. 407A. Certificate As a Lay Assistant Pastor.

The District Committee on Ordained Ministry may authorize the certification of those persons who have:

 Completed the conditions of certification as specified by the Annual Conference.

 Been examined by the District Committee on Ordained Ministry; and

3. If they are applying for certification as a full-time Lay Assistant Pastor, appeared before the Board of Ordained Hinistry and provided the Board with a satisfactory certificate of good health on a prescribed form from a physician approved by that Board if they are to be participants in the Comprehensive Protection Plan. The Conference may require psychological and/or psychiatric tests and evaluations to provide additional information to qualify for such coverage. Par. 409A. Continuance as a Lay Assistant Pastor.

Persons certified as Lay Assistant Pastors shall meet the requirements of the Annual Conference to qualify for continuance as Lay Assistant Pastors.

Par. 410A. Existing, Reinstatement, and Retirement of Lay Assistant Pastors.

1. Discontinuance of Lay Assistant Pastor. Whenever a Lay Assistant Pastor is no longer approved for appointment (Par. 489A), or whenever any Lay Assistant Pastor severs relationship with The United Methodist Church, or whenever the appointment of a Lay Assistant Pastor is discontinued by the bishop, certificate and credentials shall be surrendered to the district superintendent for deposit with the secretary of the District Committee on Ordained Ministry. After consultation with the pastor, the former Lay Assistant Pastor shall designate the local church in which membership shall be held. The District Committee on Ordained Ministry shall file with the resident bishop a permanent record of the circumstances relating to the discontinuance of Lay Assistant Pastor status.

 Withdrawal Under Complaints and Charges. When a Lay Assistant Pastor is accused of an offense under Par. 2621 and desires to withdraw from the Church, the procedures described in Par. 2626.2 shall apply.

 Trial of Lay Assistant Pastor. When a Lay Assistant Pastor is accused of an offense under Par. 2621, the procedures described in pp. 2623-2624 shall apply.

4. Reinstatement of Lay Assistant Pastor Status. Lay Assistant Pastors whose approved has been discontinued from an Annual Conference of The United Methodist Church may be reinstated by the Annual Conference which previously approved them only upon recommendation by the Board of Ordained Ministry and the Cabinet. When approved by the District Committee as provided in Par. 407A, their certificate and credentials shall be restored, and they shall be eligible for appointment as Lay Assistant Pastors.

Whenever persons whose approval as Lay Assistant Pastors has been discontinued by an Annual Conference are being considered for appointment or temporary employment in another Annual Conference, the Board of Ordained Ministry where these persons are being considered shall obtain from the Board of Ordained Ministry of the Conference where approval has been discontinued certification of their qualifications and information about the circumstances relating to the termination of their approval as Lay Assistant Pastors. Before such persons shall be appointed, they shall be recommended by the Board and approved by the District Committee. A district superintendent may arrange for them to serve temporarily when the Board and the Cabinet agree.

5. Retirement of Lay Assistant Pastor. On recommendation of the Board of Ordained Ministry and by vote of the ministerial members in full connection, a Lay Assistant Pastor who has served not less than four years as Lay Assistant Pastor may be recognized as a retired Lay Assistant Pastor. Retirement provisions for Lay Assistant Pastors shall be the same as those for ministerial members in Par. 1666.5a. After a period of discussion the petition was not approved by the Conference.

COMMITTEE ON COURTESIES: Bishop Yeakel summoned the Rev. Laurence M. Berry, Chairperson, who presented the following report.

Nuch work has been accomplished in this 48th Session of the Peninsula Annual Conference. We have seen how by being yoked together in ministry we also cry together and laugh together. However, our purpose and task in the ministry of the church has become Clear -- we are in ministry together. As such, we give thanks for the leadership of Bishop Joseph H. Yeakel which both challenges and encourages us. We thank him for reminding us of our covenant in ministry -- both lay and clergy.

Special thanks to the Reverend Heather Murray-Elkins for her message of service. Each of us is richer for seeing that the stories of the Gospel are the stories of our lives also.

### Mothers and Fathers, Brothers and Sisters!

Grace and Peace are yours through our Lord Jesus Christ, Who, according to His great and abundant mercy, has brought us together again to rejoice in the blessed hope as children of the Resurrection.

We thank God for your faith and faithfulness for these many years; that you were not discouraged when you were asked to go the extra-mile - even though you were already tired and burdened; that you were not overwhelmed by your successes nor bevildered by your failures; that your devotion and commitment never wavered, because you were confident that the new dawn will one day burst upon the world's horizon with shouts of jubilation, putting to silence the world's horizon with shouts of jubilation, putting to silence the toor signs of death and defeat. We thank God for every humbling and uplifting experience through which you have come to proclaim the ever present reality of God's Kingdom.

The Bishop of London is reported to have once said to John Wesley, "Sir, you have no license to preach in this Parish." Whereupon, Wesley replied, "My Lord Bishop, the world is my Parish." It was in this spirit of global responsibility that we sought to the people of the Peninsula. From every pulpit, in one form or another, the salvation story was told, and we had a good time doing it. Perhaps this is a reminder, if a reminder were needed, of the field bisiness in which we ought to be continuously engaged. We feel that the benefits of this intense form of evangelism should not be allowed to dissipate, and our churches are urged to take whatever steps will be necessary to preserve these experiences. An evaluative congregation. Your response will indicate your interest in this, and inform the next steps we are to take in empowering the Church for mission and ministry in the 1930"s.

## GAMBLING

This is how the 1984 Discipline Para. 214 describes what ought to be the stance of the denomination on issues of morality and social responsibility: "A member of the United Methodist Church is to be a servant of Christ on mission in the local and worldwide community. This servanthood is performed in family life, daily work, recreation, social activities, responsible citizenship and all attitudes towards other persons . . . . each member is called upon to be a witness for Christ in the world; a light and leaven in society and a reconciler in a culture of conflict .... the standards of attitude and conduct set forth in the Social Principles shall be considered an essential resource for guiding each member of the church in being a servant of Christ on mission." The Cabinet is concerned that little or no attention was paid to its plea for witness and action on the proposal to legalize the use of slot machines in some counties in Maryland, and the wider issue of gambling. Community standards and personal lifestyles should be such as would make undesirable and unnecessary the resort to commercial gambling or public lotteries for recreation or income. It is a scandal for government to use the lottery as a means of funding

public works or education. The sinister aspect of this is that we have accepted it as part of the evening news. The public apathy and lack of awareness is frightening. We call upon pastors to instrumaterial gain at the expense of another's weakness or folly. The inducements are tremendous and it beccess an act of violence inflicted on the unwary, especially when that one is poor and without hope and the odds are one in a million. The Church has a key role in fostering responsible government and in developing moral maturity which frees persons from dependence on damaging social customs. Our members are expected to abstain from the use of raffles, bingo, door prizes, and other drawing schemes and games of chance for the purpose of gambling and fund raising in the local church. We should also refrain from all forms of gambling practices carried on in our communities and should work to influence organizations and government to seek and develop alternative forms of funding.

## CHILD ABUSE

Today there is a growing awareness of child abuse in our nation. It is present in communities of the Eastern Shore and in Delaware where our Peninsula Conference churches are located. Victims of child abuse have been found in families of all social and economic levels. This abuse may be physical, emotional, or sexual. In our particular area, there are more than four thousand cases emerging annually. These statistics are phenomenal. Yet there is hope that caring persons can make an impact upon the problem. The Delaware Committee for Prevention of Child Abuse has appropriately challenged church persons to join in the effort to work individually and collectively to seek help where abuse and neglect are suspected. The members of the Cabinet urge our churches to be sensitive to this crucial issue of our time, and to respond through our family ministry and outreach to persons who are stressed because of family situations, those who have been and are victimized, or to those who have questions about child-rearing or family living. A greater emphasis upon family life concerns in and through the ministry of the church will not only address the issue of child abuse, but will have a definite effect upon such related concerns as drug and alcohol abuse among youth, teen-age prostitution, juvenile delinguency, and violent crimes.

#### THE SMALL CHURCH

The future of the small church in the Peninsula Conference is a matter of significant importance. The effectiveness of the small church has too often been assessed by the numerical strength of its membership, or by the potential for reaching budgetary goals, both of which are essential components for setting the direction of ministry. However, even more important to the life or death of a congregation is the planning and potential for meeting the needs of its constituency regardless of size. During a recent workshop directed by Bishop Roy Nichols, an assertion was made that "every church can grow quantitatively or qualitatively". This suggests that the small church may not increase numerically but may well increase in the quality of its ministry. Both contribute to the fullness of its life, and affirm its right to exist. Some steps have already been noted by our Congregational Development Task Force to seriously enable the best possible ministry to develop across the Conference. The recommendations have been varied . . . . "starting new churches", "merging congregations", "closing some churches", "placing some on limited service", and "strengthening others". The small church is crucial to the life of the Peninsula Conference because approximately two-thirds of our churches have less than two hundred members. We strongly urge pastors and leaders of our small churches to consider parish alignments, and/or more effective use of lay speakers. A small church doesn't have to die. Adjusting worship hours, altering the use of buildings, and joint worship mervices will also contribute to effective ministry. Last, but not lesst, think about this.... better stewardship practices, like "the tithe" on the parts of all targe or mail, and supply every budgetary need. Through our loyal comminent to Christ and His Church, emerge those deeper spiritual blessings that God shares with usi

### AIDS

The rapid rise of AIDS, Acquired Immune Deficiency Syndrome, since its first diagnosis in 1981, prompts the Cabinet to speak to the clergy and congregations of the Conference about the importance of sex education and pastoral support. Sex education is a preventative measure which is strongly supported by the Social Principles of the United Methodist Church which state, "We recognize the continuing meet for fail and framt sex education opportunities by the rise of AIDS and all the synthe which surround the disease. While it was first discovered in the gay communities in New York and Los Angeles, the entire community is at risk today.

Pastoral support is essential for the AIDS patient, family, church and community. The patient will need pastoral support to face the realities of up to two years of suffering leading to death. The family will need pastoral assistance to obtain the facts and resist the prevalent temptation to reject the patient in the hour of second the sum of the community of the second second second vectors the second second second second second second with God, others and self. The entire community may need pastoral guidance when a specific case is discovered in their neighborhood.

How can we address so large and urgent an issue? Pastors are encouraged to preach, teach, counsel and comfort. Congregations, through their Council on Ministries/Administrative Councils, are urged to plan for special classes, workshops or seminars.

# HOUSING

The cost of housing has skyrocketed over the last decade. At the same time, the Federal Government's financial support for the development of housing for families of low and moderate means has dwindled. The housing problems facing families with annual incomes under \$13,900 are enormous and, often, insurmountable.

Across the country, communities are grappling with the problem of how to increase the stock of decent, affordable housing for families with low and moderate incomes. It is no longer possible for one segment of the community to bear the burden of solving our housing needs. Solving this problem in our communities and Conferences will require a new, dynamic and creative collaborative effort among the faith communities, the private sector and government.

The Cabinet of the Peninsula Annual Conference would like to go on record as supporting

- the Denominational Executives in the Wilmington area who have made a commitment to the housing problem.
- 2) the Interfaith Housing Task Force, Inc. working in the State of Delaware and
- 3) the belmarva Ecumenical Agency Eastern Shore Low Income Housing Task Force which is working in conjunction with the Rpiscopal Diocese of Easton Housing Committee and The Habitat initiative on the Salisbury District to improve low income housing conditions on Maryland's Eastern Shore.

# CENTRAL AMERICA

We see the events occurring in the region moving across our television screens. We hear the crise of those who vish to support the Contras and those who ask us not to support the Contras. Our government has increased its military involvement against the government of Nicaragua. We support the government fast granting aid to Guatemala and its army. Most of the religion brouge they violate the fundamental rights of people to determine their own desting and establish likerty and justice. Enormous human suffering is occurring in the area.

We call upon everyone to pray, to study the issues, to witness our convictions. We need to be in solidarity with people of Central America, to bring peace and justice, not destruction and death. Arch Bishop Romero, who was assassinated a few years ago in El Salvador, said, "All of us can do something." We can do these things -- pray, study, and witness.

# YOUTH MINISTRY

We are encouraged with reports of new experiences for young people in the churches. We should not, however, be satisfied with things as they are at the moment. Many thousands of young people are not being reached for Christ and for His Church. We call upon the people of this Conference to see that teenagers are given an opportunity to participate in the life of the Church and that there be a ministry to teenagers in every charge and in clusters and subdistricts. Each District Council on Ministries is called upon to provide a ministry to teenagers, and that what has begun in the Conference be continued. Let us make it possible to communicate to this peninsula that the United Methodist Church is reaching out to young people in a way unprecedented in recent years.

Television can be an instrument for the Gospel in a time when regular programming is becoming more violence, more sex and more death. Unfortunately, television evangelism is found to have feet of clay.

The constant emphasis on "being born again" becomes selfcentered. Jesus constantly emphasized that the kingdom is a social relationship. Our church needs to emphasize both the personal commitment and the social issues. We live in a world of social relationships. The integrity of television ministry is being questioned. Let us uphold the integrity of ministry within the church. We would like to remind you of some of the legislation passed at the General Conference of 1984, even as we prepare for the Conference of 1988. It might be interesting and helpful to note how many of these have been implemented, forgotten, or simply ignored:

Lifting up tithing and proportional giving as the biblical standard.

Creating a pastoral advisory committee in each church of a multiple church charge.

Establishing the office of Steward.

Specifying that Pastor's housing is not considered compensation.

Including the Lay Leader of the Charge on the Nominating Committee.

Including the Chairperson of the Council on Ministries on the Finance Committee and the Chairperson of Finance Committee on the Council on Ministries.

Requiring all Church Treasurers to be bonded.

Creating work area on the Status and Role of Women.

Set a goal of twenty million members by 1992.

As you seek to sensitize the people whom you serve on some of the issues with which we all have to deal and relate to our Christian calling, we urge you to remember in whose name you dare to speak. It is perilously easy to project one's own biases and prejudices on an unsuspecting and adoring congregation. One may even enjoy the illusion of being the long awaited Messiah, with all the right answers, hastening to dispense judgment on an unrepenting Church. There is great temptation to confuse one's own kingdom with the kingdom of God. We call upon you to acknowledge and confess with us that we have too often failed to be an obedient Church, but willing once again to submit ourselves to that Covenant of grace which we joyfully embrace.

# SALISBURY DISTRICT

This is the report of a District that has maintained a vitality and optimism, in spite of uncertain economic conditions and shifting and dwindling populations. It is never immediately apparent what keeps pastors and congregations committed the way they are to Christ and His Church, but through the year, they have ministered to the sick among them, shared joys as well as sorrows as they walked with each other, demonstrating the importance in their lives of their faith.

Congregational Development has been up front in our thinking. The local committee has met and studied the demographics of the area. The shift in population is towards the seashore resorts for some people, and for others, to the Metropolitan areas. Because distances are not great, the Salisbury area has become the service area for the resort communities of Ocean City, Mehoboth and Temaic. The Betiley, Ocean City, Boute 50 Corridor. We are looking for a community developer to work in the East Salisbury churches, and St. Paul, Berlin and New Bethel/St. John have been realigned as separate churches in this creates a new and significant station appointment in the area, and gives a much needed "shot in the arm" to all those churches involved. We became paintully ware of the growing number of Asians in the area. Some very important contacts have been a delooped presenting y community thurch, Ocean Fines, to initiate a Korean ministry as part of their outreach, and to develop a Korean speaking congregation.

As there are signs of growth, so there are signs of retrenchment on the District. As the population moves away, the Church is left without resources, financial and human, to maintain its structure. Accordingly, this year saw two churches vote "limited service" status - St. Stephens on the Oriole Charge, and Grace on the Nanticoke Charge. This is always sad, as it announces the certain death of those communities.

We have urged for a long time that Parsonages on the Salisbury District be a high priority. This is what makes the itinerant system work. This year saw some dreams come true. Congratulations to those pastors and congregations! Five parsonages came on line in 1986:

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After five years of planning and working, the Shiloh congregation moved into their new building - consecrated on May 3rd by Bishop Joseph H. Kirkwood - Seeking a new site on which to build a new church.

Salem - Building a new worship center as an interim step to building a completely new facility.

Bayview: Shelemiah - Planning major renovations.

# DISTRICT STRATEGIES

Our district strategies continue to guide us into a more glorious future. The strategies with a brief report are listed below.

Congregation Strategy - Each pastor and congregation on the district Is asked to develop a theological statement of purpose with objectives and goals for each year's work.

<u>Clusters</u> - Each pastor and congregation is asked to get acquainted with neighboring pastors and congregations and work together in ways that will strengthen the churches and better meet the needs of the community.

Resourcing Teams and/or Programs - All pastors and congregations needing help with important programs are invited to call on the District Superintendent, District consultants or Conference Staff for assistance.

New Church Development - The District, with the help and cooperation of MAP, is currently working on a new strategy for the Hispanic Ministry and a new site for the Kirkwood Church.

<u>Financial Aid</u> - The number of churches receiving apportionment adjustments and equitable salary support have been drastically reduced. As a result more and more churches are standing on their own feet and meeting their full financial obligations.

Each pastor and congregation is asked to consider how you might make a positive contribution to these district strategies.

### CONCLUSION

As I draw this report for my fourth year on the district to a close, a word of farewell and velcome would seem to be in order. The word of farewell is to the two members of the Cabinet who will be leaving their positions, Ewart C. Rackshaw and Howell O. Wikins. While they will not be seen at Cabinet meetings, we are expecting to see more of them on the Wilmington District.

The word of welcome is to P. Thomas McKelvey and Robert P. Whitlock who will be joining the Cabinet in official capacity. I look forward to working with them in cooperative and collaborative ways seeking a consensus on as many issues as possible. Finally, a word of thanks to Bishop Joseph H. Yeakel, our leader, and all the other members of the Conference leadership team -Cabinet, Staff and Business Manager. May the Lord guide and bless us and keep us in His service always.

# THE REPORT OF THE STATISTICIAN

# Peninsula Annual Conference January 1, 1986 to December 31, 1986

There is good news to share! The Peninsula Annual Conference is growing! Even before the bold evangelistic thrust of "Offer Them Christ," we were experiencing numerical growth. In 1986, the total full membership of the conference increased by 313 members. This ends a period of three consecutive years of decline.

Dramatic increases in members received by confession of faith and from other denominations are noteworthy. There was a 13.44 increase in members received on confession of faith over 1965. In addition, the number of persons received from other denominations rose by 35.851. There was also a sharp decrease in the number of persons removed by Charge Conference action and withdrawn. By far, death was the chief cause for removal of members.

Dover District gained 193 members in 1986. Wilmington District recorded an increase of 278. Easton and Salisbury District showed losses of 25 and 133 members respectively. District totals at the close of 1986 are as follows:

There were 498 full-service churches and 30 limited service churches on December 31, 1986.

There were 17d churches which received no new members by confession of faith in 1986, a slight increase over the previous year. Included in this number are 147 churches which received no new members at all. These statistics reflect significant growth in many of our other local churches.

Average attendance in the principal weekly worship service decreased slightly, despite the increase in membership. In 1986, 35,258 of local church members attended the principal weekly worship service. This percentage is essentially the same as that noted a year ago. The average membership of Peninsula Conference churches at the end of 1986 is 197. Average attendance in worship is 70.

Total church school membership decreased by 1.2% from the previous year. Church school attendance, on a positive note, increased slightly over that reported in 1985.

There are presently 161 full-service ethnic minority local churches in the conference. These reported 13,698 members in 1986, a decrease of 15 over the total membership in ethnic minority churches in 1985.

I express my deepest appreciation to Linda Etter for her assistance in verifying and tabulating the reports. The District Superintendents were helpful in obtaining reports from every local church in this Annual Conference. And of course, I am grateful to pastors, and in some cases, church secretaries for their patience as we sought to perfect the data submitted. May we all by God's grace, continue these patterns of growth in the present year!

# CONFERENCE COUNCIL ON MINISTRIES

#### The Report of the President

I wish to begin my 1986 report by expressing my deep appreciation of the Staff of the Conference Council for their fine work and leadership. They all bring gifts and graces that are so essential in carrying out the mission and ministry of Jesus Christ in our midst. Sometimes we lose sight of the fact that the church not the church is also the Conference staff who local congregation, but the church is also the Conference staff who wery significant parts missing if it were not for these persons who hold the position of Council Director or Associate Council Director.

I also thank all the members of the Council and its various committees. My special gratitude goes to the members of the Executive Committee who give freely of their time and counsel.

Nineteen eighty-six has been a year when we have spent much time thinking and dreaming as we attempt to find the best way in which, as a Council on Ministries, we can carry out the ministry of serving the churches of the Peninsula Annual Conference.

The following are some of the events that have been part of the agenda of the Council on Ministries:

- Early in 1986, each district held a training event for local church officers. Eighteen hundred and two Peninsula Conference leaders heard Bishop Joseph H, Yeakel share with them his vision of what the church can be as it reaches out in ministry and mission. It is exciting when one realizes that almost two thousand elected leaders of the local churches of the Peninsula Conference took a Sunday afternoon to find out just what their mission and ministry could be.
- 2. Reverend Dr. Robert P. Whitlock and the Board of Directors of Drayton Manor have spent 1986 dreaming and visioning exactly how Drayton Manor can serve the United Methodist Church. They have hed a very successful year in raising funds, increasing attendance, finding ways to develop the a deep debt of gratitude to Dr. Whitlock and the members of that board as they have moved Drayton Manor from a negative position to a very positive position in all ways.
- 3. The Council on Ministries, early in 1986, decided that it would evaluate the goals of each one of its boards and agencies at the end of each calendar year. The Council unanimously decided that this evaluation process would be done by the Program and Budget Review Committee and would begin at the conclusion of 1986. This will be the first without consideration for finances. This is an exciting new beginning of accountability within the Peninsula Conference.
- 4. One of the problems that continually faces the Council on Ministries is the question of calendaring. How do we schedule the number of events that the various boards and agencies want to carry out without making unreasonable demands on the people who should be attending these events? Proparation of the calendar for the succeeding year would be established at the June Council meeting. In June 1986, the 1987 Peninsula Annual Conference Calendar was created. Some

negotiating was necessary, as various boards and agencies came in with dates that were either same, or within the same period of time. Any dates or events that are added to the calendar after that June meeting the same same same Executive Committee of the Council for works within the council hopes that as we work at this, we within the the need for boards and agencies to discuss with same which they can calendar together, the ways in which they can calendar together, and ways in which they can carry out mutual ministries in the Peninsula Conference.

- 5. The Computer Committee under Richard Varell has been very active. It has worked closely with the Conference Staff in computerizing the Conference Office in Dover and has been available to the local churches who are beginning to use computers for their ministry and mission.
- 6. Bineteen eighty-six was the year for the Camp Pecometh feasibility study. We must offer our appreciation to the Bev. Dr. Willard Robinson, the Rev. Dr. John Simpers, and the Board for the outstanding work that they did and continue to do in the ministry of camping that is part of Camp Pecometh. The report of the feasibility study is in the Camp Pecometh. Exciting ministries continue to occur at Pecometh.
- 7. The Council on Ministries has supported the "Offer Them Christ" program which was adopted by the Annual Conference in 1986. The Rev. Mr. Robert O'Kelley Wallace has been elected chair of the Division of Evangelism and also chairs the "Offer Them Christ" Task Force. One of the exciting things about this program is that it is council-wide with various committees and boards on the Council making up the Task Force that is carrying out the program.
- The Nominating Process for boards and agencies of the Annual Conference is currently being reviewed and recommendations will be forthcoming from the Conference Nominating Committee.
- 9. Virginia Clendaniel was elected by the Council of Bishops to fill the wacancy created by Alice Pourie's resignation on the General Council on Ministries. Ms. Clendaniel will represent our Conference at the General Council and bring back reports from all the meetings to the Executive Committee or to the Council.
- 19. The report of the Retreat Ministries Task Force was received by the Council on Ministries. The paper "Towards A Theology of Retreat Ministries" is available and anyone who wishes to read it should contact the Conference Office. Our thanks go to the Rev. Dr. William Fitzhugh and his committee for developing this report.
- The request of the Conference in 1985 to publish a book on evangelism has been referred to the Board of Discipleship for further work.
- 12. The mission statement that was being developed by the Council is on hold. Our statement was requested by the General Conference - we did not have it prepared in time to submit to them.
- A new form of leadership has been developed within the Council on Ministries. Under the leadership of Bishop

Joseph Yeakel, a "leadership team" has been developed which includes the Conference Council Staff and the Cabinet. Each year the Conference Staff and the Cabinet meet with Dr. Paul Dietterich who is Director of the Center for Parish Development. One of his concerns, as he related to our cabinet and staff, was the way in which we as an Annual Conference manage our mission and ministry. This is also a concern of the Executive Committee of the Council as well as members of the staff and of the cabinet. Under the concept of the leadership team, each board or agency has one representative from the Conference Council Staff or the Cabinet sitting as a resource person. The Leadership Team meets monthly and shares where the board and agencies are, what their plans are for the future, and how those plans will impact the other boards and agencies of the Annual Conference. We are excited about this leadership team concept because it means that staff will be attending fewer meetings and therefore, be able to give more time in resourcing the boards and agencies to which they are assigned; but, it also means that more of the work of boards and agencies will need to be done by the members of those boards and agencies rather than depending on Conference Staff and cabinet members.

- 14. The final item that I wish to report to the Annual Conference is the dream that has been forming in the Council Executive Committee, in the Leadership Team, and in other parts of our Annual Conference during 1986. We hope that by the end of 1987, we will have moved our method of planning the work of the Annual Conference from crisis planning to strategic planning. For years we have been a Council and a Conference that responded rather than strategically planned where we were going. It is hoped that as we begin the media quadrenium, we will have anning in the hife of our Annual Conference and will be able to see its benefits for us. Plans are underway for a full-day workshop for the Council in April 1987, at which time the Council will learn the value and the role of strategic planning.
- Reports on Communications, Camp Pecometh, Drayton Manor, and REACH will be found at the conclusion of this report.

It has been a pleasure to serve the Council as chair during 1986, and again, I express my sincere appreciation to the staff, the Council, its committees, and to the Cabinet for their support in this ministry of mission of Jesus Christ.

# 1988 Program Objectives

Responsibilities -- The responsibilities of the Annual Conference Council on Ministries are:

 a) To describe, coordinate, and organize opportunities to respond to the missional priority, should any be adopted by the General conference.

b) To assist the Annual Conference and local churches in discovering their mission and to determine program emphases which will enable them to fulfill their mission.

c) To receive program recommendations from the local churches, the district and Annual Conference agencies, and the Jurisdictional and General council on Ministries; to evaluate these recommendations; and to formulate a coordinated conference program to be presented to the Annual Conference for consideration.

d) To provide staff personnel and necessary resources for the implementation and administration of the program adopted by the Conference.

 e) To receive and coordinate the budget askings of all Conference program agencies and to determine priorities to make budget recommendations to the Conference Council on Finance and Administration.

f) To cooperate in ecumenical projects and events which have been approved by the Annual Conference.

g) To interpret the programs of the General church, the Jurisdictional or central Conference, and the Annual Conference to the local churches; and to promote all General and Annual Conference benevolences.

h) To provide two-way channels of communication among Annual conference agencies, district Councils on Ministries, and local churches.

i) To provide for relationships with all news media within the conference; to lead the Conference in making creative use of television and telecommunication ministries; to provide training in communication; and to perform public relations functions for the Conference.

j) to give leadership in research and planning for the Annual Conference.

k) To provide guidance and training for district and/or local church leaders.

 To provide linkage with general program agencies and provide names to Annual Conference agencies and persons who carry program responsibilities related to each general program agency.

m) Increase ethnic leadership within the Conference.

n) Institutionalize programs begun under the Missional Priority.

#### Camp Pecometh

It is a privilege to present this report of the highlights of the camping ministry for the year 1986.

 Program Theme: "We Are The Children of God"
 (I John 3:1) was used in daily vespers, Bible Study, singing, and for the 48th Anniversary poster contest.

2. 46th Anniversary: Under the leadership of the Rev. Douglas Bidley, the 46th Anniversary of Camp Pecometh was observed at Annual Conference with a color-slide presentation. Three campers were awarded full camperships for their participation in the Conference-wide poster contest. Staff Alumin Day was observed with over 360 persons in attendance, culminating in a traditional Galilean candlelight service with the Rev. George C. Godfrey preaching. The final observance was an open house for former, present, and prospective campers and their families.

 A.C.A. Accreditation: Camp Pecometh achieved reaccreditation by the American Camping Association for a threeyear period.

4. <u>Camper Registrations:</u> increased again this year to 1,938 as compared to 942 one year ago, representing our highest encolment since 1975. Of the 1,438 campers, 59 came from Ethnic Minority Local Churches of the Peninsula Conference in addition to the 4% campers who attended camp under the auspices of the Neishborhood Mouse program.

5. World Hunger Offerings: totalled \$840.00, bringing the total offerings since 1975 to \$7,945.00.

5. Summer Staff: utilized 13 international counselors from Camp America, Inc. These young people came from New Zealand, Hong Kong, England, West Germany, and the Netherlands, adding a unique dimension to the program and staff.

7. Missional Priority Half-Camperships: were used by 17 children from Ethnic Minority Local Churches as compared to 20 last year.

 Persons with Mental Retardation: this special week showed a dramatic increase with 93 in attendance as compared to 53 persons one year ago.

9. <u>Mini-Camp:</u> for second grade children proved to be a successful first-time venture. The original model called for two overnight programs for 24 children. However, popular demand called for three events to be held for 75 children. This brief exposure to Pecometh was designed to acquaint prospective campers with the camping program.

10. Cabin Adoption Plan: has served the camp well for ten years and continues to elicit lay and clergy involvement in the camping ministry. Today, 23 out of 28 buildings are under adoption by local churches and there is a waiting list.

11. <u>Hayrides</u>: became a regular evening activity this summer due to the purchase of a large hay wagon.

12. <u>Christian Education Sunday Offering:</u> totalled \$11,412.65, the highest income in the l8-year history of this special offering for Camp Percometh.

13. <u>Camp Usage:</u> rose dramatically again this year, showing an increase of 1,975 campers over the previous year. Camper days likewise revealed an encouraging increase of 3,888 over last year.

14. <u>promotion:</u> the Camp Director/Manager brought the "Pecometh Story" to 1,562 persons in 23 church groups across the Conference, driving 1,421 miles.

15. <u>Financial Status</u>: the end-of-year report for 1986 indicated favorable balances of \$12,015.86 (Operating Budget) and \$11,277.90 (Specialty Budget).

16. <u>Certification</u> by the National Certification Board of the American Camping Association was awarded for the second time to our Camp Director/Manager for having fulfilled the necessary requirements in administration, continuing education, and provide the second second second second second second second provide 230 camp directors who has been awarded certification out of a total of 2,067 camp directors affiliated with the ACA.

17. Continuing Education: the Camp Director/Manager participated in seminars and workshops at the ACA Convention held in Kansas City, Missouri, and the Fall Management Conference and Societal Issues Seminar held in Hyannis, Massachusetts. In addition, he was awarded the Doctor of Ministry Degree from the Theological Seminary of Drew University. His project was entitled, "Increasing Ethnic Involvement in Christian Education Outdoors."

18. The Board of Directors: replaced the Camp Committee for Camp Pecometh and is accountable to the Conference Council on Ministries.

 <u>The Feasibility Study Report:</u> by Church Development Center, Inc. was received August 8, 1986, projecting a Conference-wide fund raising campaign to begin in 1988.

20. Camp development: is an ongoing process.

- a. The parking area of the Administration Building and the inner Camp road leading from there to the Dining Hall road has been "hard topped".
- b. The 10,000 pine trees planted as a buffer zone have shown good growth.
- c. The Office of Finance and Field Service has assigned Robert powell as campaign director for the 1988 development fund-raising campaign.

The greatest change, however, is a conscious and deliberate decision by the Council on Ministries to not just rely on the printed media, <u>The Communicator</u> for the most part, to communicate the message of the Conference and its churches, but to take decisive and bold steps utilizing television, radio, outside billboards, and secular press to spread the Gospel of Christ.

The Communications Committee is excited and enthused as we enter the new year. We stand ready to provide leadership and direction for our universal Christian task of discovering and using new and innovative ways to share the truth of God, Jesus Christ.

### **Council on Family Ministries**

In order to help churches who want to strengthen and support families, the Family Council continued to review and preview parenting resources during 1986. Several churches used and liked the video-based parenting program, Active Parenting, available in the Conference Office. A new video series called Parenting, transmission Together was reviewed and purchased in March 1987. It is a sinsession series that uses the insights of more than two dozen parents and children to provide hope, support, and practical advice for improving the quality of life and relationships within families. The separate sessions explore such questions as "How can we help our children grow up to be homest, caring, and responsible adults? Now can we talk about deep concerns and discus 'tough questions' within our family? How can a problem be turned into an opportunity? Now can continue our own growth. Because each sension is 28-22 minutes long, the series will be suitable for adult Sandy school classes. There will be a preview of the whole series for interested Pamily Coordinators on a Saturday in June.

Families need to have fun together, too. Last year's United Methodist Family Day at King's Dominion was a big success. Over 690 persons from the Peninsula Conference joined thousands of United Methodists from the Baltimore and Virginia Conferences to scream and yell on rides, to eat, to sing, and just to enjoy themselves on the second Saturday in May. It was such a success that Baltimore Conference invited us to go along with them again this year on Saturday, May 2.

Family ministry deals with many different concerns. In 1988, the Council hopes to work more specifically in the area of single parent families.

# Council on Youth Ministries

The Council on Youth Ministries is still plagued by a lack of continuity that continues to hamper it as a viable organization for the planning and carrying out of ministries for/by youth. In spite of all this, there have been opportunities provided for youth and adult workers with youth.

The Conference year began with a retreat at Camp Pecometh. This was small but enthusiastic and helped identify some persons interested in youth ministry.

Christi Johnson and Nancy Walker participated in the Mission of Peace to the Soviet Union. Stephen Huston and Karen Riggleman have been selected to participate in that program in April 1987.

Seventeen youth and adult leaders of youth attended the bortheastern Jurisdictional Youth Convocation at Albright College in the summer. This group was formed into a planning team for a Conference-wide youth weekend.

The weekend was spent at Salisbury State College. The event, planned for 159 people, doubled that expectation. With the cooperation of the college, David Burke, the retreat leader, and efforts of the leadership team, this most inspiring event is already evolving into an annual event. Our 1988 event will be at Salisbury State College in January.

There seems to be more interest in and more enthusiasm for youth work than there has been for the past fifteen or so years. There is a genuine need for help in training both youth and adults for youth ministry in the local church.

Herman Lipsius, working as the Youth Service Fund Coordinator, has helped the Conference to increase its Y.S.P. contribution from \$138.00 in 1985 to \$1,458.00 in 1986. Working with Innisbrook Company, local U.M.Y.P. groups have earned about \$7,500.00 for their own groups as well as made contributions to the Y.S.P.

The Youth Council, as such, has not functioned; interested persons are making youth ministry a reality.

### Cross-Racial Appointments Task Force

The Cross-Racial Appointments Task Force has met several times in 1986, spending much time on two of the major items of our responsibility.

Following the meetings of the District Superintendents and the selected churches on each district - a meeting of the Task Force was held where the District Superintendents reported on those meetings. Following a lengthy discussion, it was decided that a sub-committee of the Task Force be appointed to look at the procedures for selecting and preparing congregations for consideration. That revised procedure was then discussed with the Bishop and Cabinet by the Chair of the Task Force and by the Wilnington District Seretary of the Commission on Religion and Race, who is also a member of the Task Force. Following that meeting, the Commission on Religion and Race prepared a recommendation which included another direction than that recommended by the Task Force. the agenda for the next meeting of the Task Force and some decisions will be made about the procedure for selecting and preparing congregations for Cross-Racial Appointments.

The First Professional Growth Seminar was held at Drayton Manor in October, and a report of that seminar is in the report of the Board of Ordained Ministry.

The Task Force accepted a recommendation of the Commission on Religion and Race - that a group of editors be appointed who would prepare, or secure other persons to prepare, articles for The <u>Communicator</u>, which would discuss the issues of Cross-Racial Appointments.

A member of the Task Force, who is also a member of the Commission on Religion and Race, attended the national seminar for District Superintendents on pastoral exchange. The Reverend Mr. Dale Lantz prepared a report for our Task Force and the Commission on Religion and Race and that report is available.

The minutes of the Task Force and all the reports prepared are in the hands of all the members of the Task Force. If anyone would care to read the reports or the minutes of the meetings, please contact either the chair or any member of the Task Force.

# Drayton Manor

The end of 1986 marked the first four months of the Drayton Capital Endowment Fund Campaign. I begin my report with that fact because, while there is much to report about Drayton, the crucial fact is what will be the result of the Capital Endowment Fund Campaign. While the future of Drayton is not yet determined, there are good signs.

Over \$200,000 was on deposit as we moved into 1997. Eleven thousand of that amount was in the Endowment Fund and \$190,000 in the New Building Fund. The addition of \$21,000 in pledges by members of the Board of Directors brings the Building Fund to \$211,000 of the \$750,00 goal.

There was also good news in that a contract for \$88,989 had been taken on Lot #3 (the six acres furthest from the entrance and adjacent to the LaMotte property; this land was a problem lot because of its scant building area and steep terrain). With the income, after expenses from this sale, the Endowment Fund would reach \$89,989 of the goal of \$259,980. Two choice 3-acre lots remain on the market at the time of this writing for \$115,989 each; with their sale, the Endowment Fund would swell to over \$389,898, exceeding the goal. We are optimistic about the sale of these lots because they are choice lots and two of only several that exist in Kent County.

A strategy has been implemented to raise the remaining \$558,000 of the Building Fund goal: a) We will continue to pursue large donors: individuals, corporations, and foundations (we are in a cultivation process - getting started at the end of 1986 placed us in a position to not be included in most budgets already allocated for the year). b) We have developed a list of individuals whom we intend to contact in the spring of 1987, seeking to secure pledges over a three-year period from at least 500 units from this list.

We have also initiated a relationship with the Baltimore Conference. A fund-raising committee is working there, chaired by Ken Jones, a recently retired District Superintendent who is at work with the approval of the Bishop and leadership team of the Baltimore Conference. We are interested in involving the Baltimore Conference more deeply in the life of Drayton Manor, trying to secure an area of support for the programs and use of Drayton which would strengthen its position, particularly if we are successful in securing the funds to add a new building which would double our capacity to accommodate groups and individuals. We hope to eventually add six members to our present Board of Directors representing the Baltimore Conference in order to foster a more meaningful involvement in the development of the programming at Drayton. We do not propose adding such persons at this time. We have a cohesive Board now and it does not seem wise to add new persons until we have worked through some of the formative We are speaking of conceptual, hands-on involvement which stages. has to do with people feeling part of a process, not legally involved in ownership. This matter will be pursued with the CCOM Executive Committee and the Conference Council so that we have some clear direction as to the involvement of the Baltimore Conference.

Many positive things are going on at Drayton. Our seminars are going well; usage is significantly higher.

The income picture at prayton is stable. We ended the year in the black with surplus funds even after we had made major improvements which include an entirely new water line and filter system which should correct the problem of water at Drayton in a permanent manner. We continue to try to bring Drayton into firstclass condition. Improvements that were achieved during 1986 were that the Bell House roof was replaced, rugs for the Bell House and West Wing, repair of the East Wing steps, kitchen equipment, new carpet in the Manor House, showers in all the rooms in the Manor House, new double beds were placed in nine rooms, the tennis court was resurfaced, and the summing pool repaired. These improvements cost approximately \$11,600.

In addition, we were able to provide scholarship help in the amount of 3,58% to individuals, to the Board of Ordained Ministry, the Division of Worship, and Wesley Seminary students. As we look to 1987, we have more that \$39,6% in carry-over funds which have been designated as follows: \$5,000 will be used and available for scholarships to individuals and Boards and agencies of the Church we approximate the secretary to a foll-time position in the spring of 1007, which will add more stability and continuity to the office and wall be additional paving of driveways; an additional bathroom will be installed on the third floor; reupholstering of the East Room furniture is in process; landscaping and a new tractor for mowing. These items will bring Drayton closer to the kind of condition we need to have to properly entertain our guests.

It is hard to describe the dedication of the Board of Directors who have served at Drayton - twenty individuals who have given over the last year and a half, hundreds of hours of their time. Their dedication to the task has made our report of progress thus far possible. I take this opportunity to thank each of them individually for their set of the Boilefort interfort, our secretary, cooks, waitresses, housekeeper, and maintenance workers and volunteers who are all giving as much as they can to make Drayton work.

As a Board, we believe that Drayton has a great future and a significant one in the Peninsula Annual Conference. That is not news to any of you; you've heard us say that before. We hope to make a visual and written report to the Annual Conference in May of 1987, which will give a picture of where we are headed and whether or not it seems possible that we will reach our goal for the Endowment Fund and the New Building Fund.

We are pledged to reduce each year the amount of money we ask for subsidy from the Annual Conference. We began in 1985 with a figure of \$42,080, given by the Peninsula Annual Conference. In 1986, that figure was reduced to \$35,080. In 1987, the figure will be \$28,0808. We have requested only \$15,080 for 1988 and we expect to request no funds from the Annual Conference in the budget of 1989.

We are on target at Drayton, financially, programwise, shoring up our facilities, and making long-needed improvements. Nany more people are using Drayton and are being inspired by its presence. Our Open House introduced several hundred people to Drayton for the first time in most cases. We are excited. Things are happening but as I started the report, so I finish it.

The future of Drayton is not definite. It is optimistic. The next few months will indicate whether or not we can find individuals who are willing to invest in this dream and make it a reality. We do believe that Drayton must make significant changes in its facilities. The new addition which will add a new dining room, meeting room wheth inte new goest rooms is strategic. It is allowed to the advant atranagements that often have to be made for eating, meeting a very directly for that. # 1988 Program Objectives

Continuing Education - Realizing that one of the primary objectives of Drayton as a Conference Retreat Center is that of providing education for the clergy and lay persons of this area, we will increase our effort to foster more attendance and diversification of the program of Drayton; knowing that it should reflect the pluralism of the Annual Conference, securing the best leadership possible. Coal: To establish 24 seminars during 1988 (a 10% increase over

1987). Method: Active leadership by the Continuing Education Committee working with the Resident Director and seeking input from members of the Annual Conference.

Facilities - The long-range future of Drayton is tied directly to our ability to renovate and add to the facility.

Goal: "The improvement of the facility by addition of a new wing which would include a new dining area, meeting rooms, and new guest rooms. We also want to improve access by the addition of an elevator. Such improvements would return the Manor House to its intended and natural use and to effectively house two groups at one time.

Method: An aggressive Capital Funds Campaign to enlist 500 persons, or families, to make annula girts over a three ear period, this to be secured by May of 1988. It will be coordinated by the Finance and Property Committees of the Board of the Board or S.

Finance - We are on schedule in meeting the Conference mandate to Gilminate Conference subsidies by 1989. This would move the Conference subsidy from \$42,000 in 1985, to 335,000 in 1986, \$28,000 in 1987, \$15,000 in 1988, and no subsidy in 1989. Goal: To establish an Endowment Fund of \$300,000 the sale of the remaining lots by 1980. Method: To be carried out by the Finance and Property Committees of the Board.

Ethnic Minority and Local Churches Priority - We intend to continue to involve more ethnic minority churches and pastors in the use of Drayton and participation in the Continuing Education programs. We have made progress in each of the last two years. We will intend to seek progress again in 1988. The primary method is personal contact by the Resident Director.

Local Church Use - Dealing with the reality that there are few 'open' weekends available because of the increased usage of Drayton, but knowing that the addition of a new wing will strategically provide the possibility of doubling the usage on weekends, we intend to continue our campaign to interest local churches in having spiritual renewal weekends, planning seminars, and fellowship occasions at Drayton.

Week-day Use - Recognizing that one key to the financial stability of Dirsyton is directly related to the increased use of Drayton during the week, we will proceed with an aggressive development of week-day use.

Goal: To increase our week-day use by 30% in 1988.

Method: An active Marketing Committee approach through mailings, contacts by the Director, and the possible use of a marketing agent.

Scholarship Aid - We will offer \$5,000 in scholarships to Individuals, local churches, and Conference boards, and agencies.

General Knowledge of Drayton - Being aware that the majority of United Methodists in the Peninsula Annual Conference, lay and clergy, have never actually experienced Drayton, we will make increased efforts to bring persons and churches to Drayton.

### Missional Priority Coordinating Committee

The Missional Priority Coordinating Committee has worked dilgently to empower and enable Ethnic Minority Local Churches for witness and mission. It has also worked persistently to embla Ethnic Majority Local Churches (White churches) to embrace Ethnic Minority Local Churches.

It has sought this by working intentionally in the previous Conference year to develop a Comprehensive Plan for EMLC. The purpose of this plan is to enable the Peninsula Conference to be intentional about ongoing support of EMLC beyond 1988 when the Missional Priority of EMLC is no longer a priority.

The Missional Priority has initiated, developed and is ready to implement the District Mission Team Project in which Mission Teams, comprised of ethnic minority and ethnic majority, will work together in a cooperative venture to work with Ethnic Minority Local Churches in a summer project for a period of a month in the program areas of Church School Development, Church and Community Ministries, and Building Repairs.

The Missional Priority has been responsible for funding and facilitating the funding of a number of EMLC projects. Some of these include:

a) Korean Ministries (school, newspaper, UMYF program)

- b) The Building of EMLC Parsonages
  - 1. Crisfield Shiloh
  - 2. Deal Island St. Charles
  - 3. Trappe Scott's
  - 4. Cottage Grove John Wesley
- c) Church & Community Ministries Mt. Joy U.M. Church - Wilmington

The theme of the Missional Priority Coordinating Committee has been to enable Ethnic Minority Local Churches for witness and mission by moving them out of a survival fund-raising mode. With the joint efforts of Special Ministries and the Commission on Religion and Race, the Missional Priority Coordinating Committee is accomplishing its task.

- 2. Develop a Convocation on EMLC for Interpretation purposes.
- Be intentional about seeking and identifying churches that would participate in joint spiritual adventures such as youth activities, Vacation Bible Schools, spiritual retreats, etc. (Recommend this to the Youth Council).
- Have Special Ministries Consultants assist Ethnic churches in developing short-term and long-term goals as they relate to churches' mission in Evangelism, Stewardship, and Christian Education.

#### General Goals

- To continue to monitor program goals for the Conference Boards and Agencies to determine appropriate programs for advocacy by Missional Priority Committee and to determine areas in need of program development.
- To work with existing boards and agencies and if necessary refer program needs of the EMCC to insure the fullest involvement of every area in the Missional Priority.
  - a. To identify effective models of youth evangelism and programming in EMLC and advocate their implementation - to encourage revival of semi-annual district youth events and Annual Conference Youth Rallies. (Refer to Youth Council and have our committee monitor Youth Council on this goal).
  - b. To advocate participation by EMLC's in laboratory schools for teacher training. (Refer to Division of Education and have this group monitor Division on this goal).
  - c. To review models for changing the understanding of commitment to stewardship that are appropriate to the EMLC. Division of Stewardship has this as a goal. (Monitor this goal).
  - d. To review existing programs of Evangelism and Church Growth that are specific to the EMLC, or can be adopted by EMLC.
- Assist EMLC in adopting a mission statement based upon a needs assessment.
- Continue to advocate the development of charge-wide agencies such as: Charge Council on Ministries or Administrative Councils.
- 5. To support and advocate the African Church Growth Priority.

- To develop and implement the District Missional Priority Team Proposal.
- To continue to emphasize and provide support for the consultants beyond 1988.
- Encourage churches to be specific in dealing with church and community development.

# REACH

For the past four years, REACH has been the Peninsula Conference Comprehensive Mission/Stewardship Program. The program has enabled small and large Ethnic minority and Ethnic majority churches to be in mission and ministry.

As REACH reaches its culmination point, we have been able to move from the reaching mode to an embracing mode by not only sending our money, but sending people. The missionary visit to Sierra Leone by Curt Knepp and Judy Kraut enabled local churches of the Peninsula Conference to embrace other people of other cultures and heritage.

Local churches supported James Karmbor and family, while a student at Wesley Seminary, and were able also to provide adequate plane fare on his return to Liberia where he can continue to be in ministry and mission. Conference projects, such as Camp Pecometh, Special Ministries, and Neighborhood Nouse were supported. Other projects sponsored by the local church, such as Crisis Nouse and the Hispanic Outreach Worker Program were also supported well.

Many thanks go to the Peninsula Conference Churches who have supported REACH in its mission and ministry.

### Special Ministries

Special Ministries is the particular program area of the Peninsula Conference that has the responsibility of resourcing the Ethnic Minority Local Church. EMCC in the Peninsula Conference is inclusive of the Native America, Asian American, Hispanic, and Black American Ethnic groups, with Black American being the largest.

Special Ministries has worked very closely with the Missional Priority Coordinating Committee providing resources for EMLC. It has done this in the previous Conference year by doing the following:

- Helping EMLC to assess their mission and ministry in order to provide funding of program and building proposals.
- Helping EMLC to write mission statements to discover their purpose and reason for existence.
- c) Developing saturation events for EMLC in planning and developing ministries.
- Providing stewardship leadership workshops to help EMLC move out of a survival fund-raising mode to a missionminded mode.

Special Ministries Consultants continue to provide leadership in resourcing EMLC along with the Special Ministries Director. We are

excited about the leadership of the consultants: The Rev. Grant Johnson, Consultant of the Salisbury District, The Rev. George Commodore, Consultant of the Easton District, The Rev. Janet Harmon, Consultant of the Wilmington District, and the Rev. Hayward Greene, Consultant of the Dover District.

Through their untiring efforts, three new ethnic parsonages were buit. They include: Shioh Parsonage in Crisfield, MD, Deal Island Parsonage in Deal Island, MD, and Scott's Parsonage in Trappe, MD. Also, the merger of three Ethnic Churches of the St. Daniel-Wittman, McDaniel Charge was facilitated. The Special Ministries Consultants worked in the special ministries direction to solicit over 15 EMCC lass and by the Missional Priority and Division of Education. These consultants were also instrumental in helping to provide Ethnic minority leadership in Conference-wide events, such as the Conference Youth Bally and the District Mission Team Proposal.

#### BOARD OF CHURCH AND SOCIETY

A new president was elected to replace The Reverend Robert Price who had served so ably in that capacity for six years. We wish to thank Bob publicly for his stellar leadership in building up the Board as a strong voice exerting a positive influence on the life of the whole Annual Conference in this enormously important sphere of Church and Society.

I took over as the new president in January, 1987. I wish to thank the Board for sending Susan Kester and me to St. Louis for a conference planned by the General Board entitled "Waking the Connections." It was a perfect experience for entering this new task.

To link with the <u>Impact Network</u>, an ecumenical legislative alert service. The purpose would be to enable our Conference members to become more involved in the issues of church and society.

# 7. Peace with Justice: In Defense of Creation

To make the Bishops' Pastoral Letter a basic document in the life of every local church.

#### BOARD OF DISCIPLESHIP

The role of the Annual Conference Board of Discipleship is to provide for the connectional relationship between the Ceneral Board of Discipleship and the Conference, district and local church. The Board members and staff identified the following areas of ministry for which we provided resources and services: Evangelism, church School Development, Strengthening the Ethnic Minority Local church, Curriculum Resources, Worship, Developing Devotional Resources, Education for christian Living, Stewardship, Age-Level and Family Ministries, and Leadership Development and Training.

The Board of Discipleship finds a need to grow spiritually in understanding and interpreting its role of helping in the calling, nurturing, educating, and equipping of persons in the local church. Building on the thrust of "offer them Christ," we will attempt to help congregations make disciples of the "people in the pew" while reaching out to and receiving others even those with whom we are unfamiliar or uncomfortable. To accomplish this, we must develop strategies to change attitudes about disciplehip, aperiones shared provide oppodumities mople of United Methodism on the Peninula, with special emphasis on E.M.L.C., and utilize resource persons from the E.M.L.C. communities for developing others in the discipleship leadership roles.

On November 7-8, 1986 at Drayton Nanor, the Board held a planning retreat for the 1988 program and budget at which time we developed our direction and goals as a unified board rather than as divisions. Many of these goals represented a continuation or development of existing programs of the Board of Discipleship. Others represented our response to expressed needs not currently being met. For example, the process of disciple-making initiated by "Offer Them Christ" is to be further developed. We are proposing "To Grow As A Teacher: A Strategy For Disciple Making." # Division of Education

The Division of Education has had a Spirit-filled year. Our Lord has truly been alive in the educational ministries of our Conference and churches. It has been a great privilege for me to be a part of this work.

For the first time, we now have an intentional plan for training church educators. We have developed a three-year program for helping teachers and administrators to grow in their skills and faith. The program "To Grow As A Teacher" will be introduced during 1987-88 and will prove to be a benefit to our churches.

During 1986 we have met with 17 sub-district groups throughout the Conference to discover needs, get to know those persons working in education and to talk about building more effective church schools. The information gathered from these meetings is helping us in our future planning.

We have discovered a need to be a resource for professional Christian Educators and the churches employing them. So the Division is developing a model to provide support to these persons in our Conference. We are also working with the Board of Diaconal Ministries to supply guidelines for churches in order to have a quality relationship with their D.C.E.'s. This should be completed during 1987.

The Delmarva Ecumenical Agency Resource Center and the Interfaith Lay Academy continue to be supported in their fine work to help churches work together in ministry.

There have been a number of events which we have sponsored during this year that I would like to tell you about. In June, we planned a spiritual life retreat for educators at Drayton Manor under the leadership of the Rev. Jonathan Baker. Unfortunately, due to a lack of registrations, we had to cancel this event. We do hope to try again in the future.

In August, we conducted our annual teacher training workshops to prepare teachers to begin in September. There was good participation throughout the Conference and the leadership was superb.

An Area Education Event was held in Annapolis in September in cooperation with the Baltimore Conference. The Rev, Dick Murray from Perkins School of Theology provided the dynamic leadership for the all-day experience. Another event is being planned for 1988.

A Festival of Music Workshop was held in November to better equip teachers in the use of music in the church school. It was so enthusiastically received that another one is now in the works.

The final event has been Rally '87 in Houston, Texas. The actual event took place in January of 1987, but there was a great deal of advance preparation needed. Twenty-seven persons from our Conference participated in Rally '87. The theme was "Strengthening the Church Through the Sunday School". Working with the EMUC Coordinating Committee, we were able to identify many new persons for this event. This whole contingent will form a task force within our Conference using the training they received in Houston.

Lastly, I would like a word with you about our Education Consultants. This is a ministry begun several years ago and has grown more than we ever hoped. Doris Phillips and Liz St. Clair have worked with 22 different churches/charges in 1986 of which 1/3 have been EMLC. They report that due to their work, and the commitment of the persons in these churches, attendance has increased, new classes formed, and a new level of enthusiasm discovered. Sometimes it is difficult to meet all the needs of a particular church, but these two Consultants are showing that what once was thought impossible, really can happen when God's at work.

We praise God for his special gift to us in the person of Harvey Manchester. Through his skills, care, and energy, Harvey has provided excellent leadership not only to the Division of Education, but to the entire Board of Discipleship.

#### Division of Evangelism

Creating a new awareness of the importance of evangelism in the life of each local church on the Peninsula has been the major thrust of the work of the Division of Evangelism this past year. We have set into motion the good notion that evangelism is not a peculiar activity for unusual people at special times. It is a normal activity for all the church members all the time.

To help local churches become more aware of the role of evangelism in the regular week-by-week ministry, a plan was adopted at the 1986 Annual Conference that would give a special emphasis to the work of evangelism through a disciplined movement of preaching, teaching, and reaching. This movement is called "Offer Them Christ".

Our total efforts during the year have been directed to the planning stages of "offer Them Christ" which are being placed in motion in the early months of 1987. This movement will be an ongoing work of the churches of the Peninsula and it will not be effective unless adequate follow-up is carried out, not only by the Evangelism esphasis, but by the support of the companion Divisions of the Board of angle and the other Divisions division and workthow churches to Christ.

Evangelism is every possible way of reaching outside the church to bring people to faith in Jesus Christ and to membership in His Church.

To evangelize is to "say a word for Christ" and that, within itself is a privilege, an opportunity, and a sacred trust. The ensurance of the future of the Church depends upon what we do.

# Division of Stewardship

During the present quadrennium, the Division of Stewardship has maintained a focus on the holistic nature of stewardship in all of life, and primarily as it relates to folks' faith commitment. Our programs the theme is "Everyone a talent: everyone a task," and our programs have been designed to help the local church realize the truth of that statement. We have also felt a great need to stress the accountability factor involved in living out a lifetime of good, effective stewardship.

The Division of Stewardship has learned that stewardship talk is "shop talk." It's bruises on the arms...and splinters in the hands of folks in everyday life as we live out our commitment to Jesus Christ. In 1986, the Division of Stewardship earned some bruises and splinters as it participated in the following stewardship programs:

a) We celebrated the birth of the Order of St. Barnabas, an intentional and ongoing Conference-wide Stewardship program. In November, we honored the Charter Members of the Order of St. Barnabas at a dinner held in St. John's UMC in Seaford, Delaware. The Induction ceremony and program for the evening was written by the Division's Chairperson, Rev. Dr. Michaele S. Russell.

- b) In March, the Division of Stewardship offered Bi-District workshops in stewardship education, located in Cambridge for the Baston and Salisbury Districts, and in Middletown for the Dover and Wilnington Districts. Training was done by Lavon Kincaid, a former member of the Division of Stewardship, Nashville, TK.
  - c) Throughout the year, members of the Division of Stewardship have conducted stewardship training workshops in local churches around the Peninsula Conference. The workshops were conducted when requested by a local church.
- d) Two (2) members of the Division of Stewardship participated in the annual NASL leadership training workshops in Nashville, Tennessee, in April 1986.
  - e) In August, the Division of Stewardship met at Drayton Manor for a day of reflection and evaluation regarding the work of the Division. It was a day well-spent!
  - f) We have been in dialogue with the Section on Stewardship Board of Discipleship in Nashville, Tennessee, regarding the Order of St. Barnabas. They have used our program as a resource for other Annual Conferences who are seeking intentional stewardship programs.

Again this year, the Division of Stewardship is happy to report that a large percentage of the local church workshops offered by the Division have been conducted in EMLC churches upon their request. The Division of Stewardship has also continued the practice of mailing stewardship resources and information to those churches who have made requests.

### Division of Worship

The Division of Worship had a change in leadership during the year. Although Alfred Taylor is remaining a member of the division, he found it necessary to turn over the chair position due to other responsibilities. The theme for Annual Conference in 1986 was "Catch the Spirit." Judy Locht was invited as our special guest song leader and led the Wednesday and Thursday morning worship services. She also sang at the Laity Banquet. Richard Allen was organist for the services. Families of deceased members were sent a special letter of invitation to the Memorial/Communion Service prior to Conference. They were met upon arrival by members of the Worship Division, and were search together in a reserved section for the services displayed during sessions - a bana on the Sthuic Minority Local Church, "Catch the Spirit," and one on Camp Percenter. A problem was created when it became necessary to change the location of the Memorial/Communion Service to Delaware State College, but the transition ram smoothly. There were four Celebration of Praise Services held during 1986. These services, planned jointly with the Division of Brangplang, were held on each district. The host churches were: Wesley in the services Salisbury, Mt. Olivet in Seaford, Aldersgate in Wilsington, and Christ Church in Chestertown. It was felt that these services fulfilled the intent of generating a spirit of evangelistic praise.

A laity retreat, "Invitation to Discipleship," was held at Drayton Manor on October 17-18, 1986. David Kerr from Nashville led the retreat, which trained laity in the four characteristics of discipling: Reaching & Receiving, Relating, Nurturing & Empowering, and Sending.

one of the main goals for the Division of Worship is to specifically equip a pool of persons as leaders. This training basically takes place at the Jurisdictional and National WUMMOA meetings (rellowship of United Methodists in Worship, Music, and other Arts). Three members from our division attended the Jurisdictional FUMMOA at Lycoming College in August. It is anticipated that members will attend the National convocation of the "rellowship" in Knorville, Tennessee, August 2-8, 1987. Continuing Education funds are used to help sponsor attendance at the Jurisdictional and National meetings.

Our Division continues to plan leadership training and to maintain effective material resources in the worshiping community.

# Division of Health & Welfare

Wy first official act upon becoming Chaiperson of the Division of Health 4 Welfare in February was to attend the annual convention of the United Methodist Association of Health 4 Welfare Ministries held in Derver, Colorado, March 1-5, 1986. It was a great pivilege to a present at this convention and with the second special method in terceived the "individual Volunteer of the Year" award for her untiring work at the Methodist Country House in Wilmington, Delaware. The Rev. Mr. Richard C. Stazesky, President of Peninsula United Methodist Homes, Inc., received the "Affirmative Action Award of the Year". I was very proud to be present at this national event anotherse in achievement and accolades for two of our Conference Richard C. Stazesky.

The major emphasis of the annual convention in Denver was the official introduction of the RAGLE program. Education Assessment Guidelines Leading toward gxcellence. The United Methodist Church no Ionger operates a certification program for United Methodist-related agencies. As a result of this action, the United Methodist Association of Health & Welfare Whinistries has developed the EAGLE program. The EAGLE program is a voluntary self-assessment and educational approach utilizing principles and goals. The major emphasis of this program is on self-assessment and peer review evaluation of the Christian mission and ministry of health and welfare organizations rather than focusing on a detailed analysis of operational activities. I was trained as a Peer Review Consultant.

The EAGLE has been developed for the following purpose: "To provide a voluntary program that will promote, pursue, and recognize excellence in Christian ministry and mission that is holistic to persons through member organizations of the United Methodist Association of Health and Welfare Ministries."

The Division of Health & Welfare continues to support the Board of Child Care. In May, the Division sponsored two bus trips to the Board of Child Care: one originating from the Dover District and one from the Salisbury District. The ministries of the Board of Child Care are more appreciated once a tour of the facilities has been personally experienced. It is gratifying to witness what is being done in the name of Christ for the young people at the Board of Child Care. As a Division, we strongly encourage churches to support the ministry of the Board of Child Care through the annual "Christmas Stocking Offerings."

We are very fortunate to be able to participate in a program of aging ministries which is jointly sponsored by our Division, Peninaula United Methodist Homes, Inc., the General Board of Global Ministries, and the Health and Welfare Department. Has. Naomi Winchester continues to provide vital and meaningful resources to the Clergy and churches to promote their own lacal signes. 5. To survey churches to see how they are accessible to all persons with handicapping conditions; i.e., deaf, blind, mobility impaired, etc.; to provide a consultants' guide to churches for help in making their chrurches more accessible. Plan to work with the board of Laity for implementation.

#### Board of Child Care

Through the Board of Child Care the people of the Baltimore and Peninsula Conferences reach out to troubled and abused youth in a special, loving way. We are able to make the difference in the lives of children and youth in the context of our unique ministry. Over 188 years ago this church ministry to youth was conceived out of compose to the chalenge of Christy to youth was conceived out of the special of the second of the second second second second balance the second second second second second second balance the Kingdom of God." Our challenge today is to build upon that rich and caring heritage of Christian love.

We accomplish that by providing skilled, loving and strong leadership and support for the on-going ministry of our Child Care Center. This ministry includes residential care for 66 youth (ages 10-18), emergency shelter care for 17 youth (ages 10-18), adoption services and programs, counseling to single parents, and foster care for 25 children (ages infancy to 18). The entire program requires the skills of 65 staff working together as a whole to provide the best possible care.

Our deliberate effort to be of increasing service to ministers and to children throughout the Peninsula has been successful. We have children in care from Talbot, Morcester, Dorchester, and Micomico Counties. Chris, from New Castle County, left our care during the summer. He is in the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers and phones occasionally to keep us abreast of his progress.

An overwhelming demand for more emergency shelter care facilities for children (ages infancy to 18) and sibling groups has prompted the Board of Directors of the Board of Child Care to plan such a facility to help meet this growing meed. Our existing shelters (one for boys with 7 beds and one for girls with 18 beds) are always full. These children are referred due to abuse and neglect. Last year 139 children were given protection, medical help, food, clothing, and loving care in these two small homes. Fifty-five more were rejected because there was no room. Many others were not even referred because referring agencies knew were full. Fifteen acres of land for the new shelter for young children was purchased in the Chapeldia area of Baltimore County. On this land will be constructed two homes each providing shelter for twelve children, a utility building, and a central hall for office space, kitchen, and play area. Later on, as the need is verified and resources are available, as many as three additional homes may be placed on this site. This location is close enough to the main campus on Gaither Road to allow sharing of recreational facilities and easy access to administrative staff. The Directors of The Board of Child Care have agreed to advance one million dollars from invested funds to pay for the construction of phase one of this planed facility. No that is made and will occur withid care the opportunity, on an individual basis, to contribute to construction costs. Operating funds will be from reinbursement by the local social service departments and existing sources of revenue at Board of child Care.

Our adoption program is small, due to the limited availability of infants for adoption. Patricia Bright, social worker for adoption and counseling to unwed mothers, is available to you should the need arise.

We note, for your satisfaction, several achievements during the past year: our Auxiliary membership is at an all-time high in excess of thirteen thousand paid members. These men and women, who are representatives of churches throughout the Conferences express their repair curtains, bake cookies, purchase Christmas gifts and complete innumerable other works. Through their efforts, 328,988 soup labels have been collected and redeemed for educational supplies. Several of our chidern at mid-year are on the honor roll in school. With rare exception, our youth are in school and achieving! Paula, one of our graduates, is doing well at Prostburg State College. A record record number invited apeakers from our Board and staff to present a statement of this work. For thin, we say "Thank You."

Swartzell Nome for Children merged with Board of Child Care in 1986, Assets of Swartzell have been transferred to Board of Child Care and will be used to fulfill the general purpose of Swartzell which is "to provide care, maintenance, and support for dependent or orphaned children, and for other religious charitable and education purposes."

#### Peninsula United Methodist Homes, Inc.

The mission of Peninsula United Methodist Homes, Inc., an affiliate of the Peninsula Annual Conference, is to serve the needs of older adults across the Delmarva Peninsula. Throughout its caring tradition, PUHH has been committed to providing opportunities for older persons to live a full and active life in retirement.

These are challenging times for PUNH and other organizations that serve the elderly. The 6% population is growing at twice the rate of the total U.S. population, and the 85 group is expected to guadruple during this decade. Many persons in this rapidly expanding elderly population will seek the kind of retirement services that PUHH offers. Indeed, 872 men and women are currently waiting for admission to our homes. Not only is the number of 65+ adults growing rapidly, their average age is also increasing. Today the 257 residents at the Methodist Manor Nouse average 85 in age while the 365 Cokesbury Village residents average 86 in age. The trend toward longer life spans for our residents means that PUMH must provide for various levels of care and increase the services to meet the needs of older, more frail population.

To meet these changing meeds of the elderly, in 1986 PUMH expanded its services for those residents with special needs. Music therapy, health center day trips, special events with school children, and expanded remotivation therapy groups enrich resident life. Cokesbury's new health center began offering a specialized program for the care of those with Alzheimer's disease and related disorders, and began planning a personal care unit for those individuals who need some assistance to live independently.

To help meet the growing meeds of elderly persons, the corporation increased its efforts to expand present operations through additions to the Methodist Country House and the Methodist Manor House, mergers or acquisitions with existing facilities and planning for new site development on the Eastern Shore in Maryland and in New Castle County.

### Highlights of 1986

### A YEAR OF CELEBRATIONS

PUHM celebrated the 28th Anniversary of the Methodist Manor House at the Annual Meeting on September 16. Over 148 trustees, residents, staff members, pastors, and community friends gathered at the Manor House to celebrate the 26th year of service for PUMH and the opening of the Methodist Manor House 28 years earlier. Guest speakers included Rev. Dr. Brooks E. Reynolds, PUMH board chairman when the Methodist Manor House opened in 1966, and the Rev. Milton H. Keene, founding administrator of Meshoding that the Method Method House the Methodist Award in recognition of his three decades of loyal service to PUMH.

Cokesbury village dedicated its newly expanded health care center on November 9. More than 350 guests heard Governor Castle and others extol the 58 million health center as a model facility. The new 11g-bed facility offers Cokesbury residents and other persons from the surrounding community the finest medical care available along the Delmarva Peninsula. Forty-five residents moved into the new building on December 10, just 17 months after groundbreaking.

#### ADMINISTRATION

The PUMH Board of Trustees adopted a revised set of strategic goals at the June quarterly board meeting. Several of the new goals for the corporation reflect an increased interest in developing the professionalism of the staff, expanding PUMH's leadership position in the retirement/health care field, and expansion. Due to increasing competition in the retirement/health care field, PUMH devoted considerable attention this year to improving the marketing program. In addition to staff training and research, marketing activities included creating and revising promotional materials and organizing community special events.

PUMH upgraded its computer system this year. Many administrative operations will benefit from a five-fold increase in storage capacity and the addition of terminals and software. The new system will increase efficiency and ease in all record-keeping, file updating, and report processing.

The corporation implemented an Employee Assistance Program. Through this program, employees may receive assistance with various kinds of personal problems, e.g., marital, financial, etc. Through this program, PUMH hopes to reduce absenteeism and health insurance costs and enhance employee morale.

# APPRECIATION

PUMH recognized some very special people this year - our staff, our donors, and our volunteers. Throughout the year, at separate employee recognition dinners, PUMH recognized 37 employees for their five or more years of service. Worth special note is the fact that of these 37 people, eight have dedicated themselves to PUMH for 28 or more years! It is the loyal service of our employees that earns the fine reputation which all our homes enjoy today.

PUHH also held receptions to recognize contributors. These events offered our supporters, including united Methodist clergy and lay persons, an opportunity to tour the homes and see firsthand some of the fruits of their giving. The Peninsula Conference grant of \$100,000 and the Mother's Day Offering helped to support 85 people receiving benevolence at the Methodist Country House and Methodist benevolence, special projects, and the endowment, totaled \$141,862.22. This amount was 64 of the total 1966 operating budget.

Volunteer appreciation teas were held at the Methodist Country House and Cokesbury Village. Over 200 volunteers were honored for their 8,000 hours of service in the gift shops, health centers, administrative offices, and activities programs.

# AWARDS AND HONORS

Ruth Faust, Methodist Country House gift shop manager since 1960, received the 1986 Volunteer of the Year award from the United Methodist Association of Health and Welfare Ministries.

PUMH received the 1986 Affirmative Action award from the Health and Welfare Ministries Program Department of the General Board of Global Ministries.

Naomi G. Winchester, aging ministries consultant, received the third annual Martin Luther King award given by the Commission on Religion and Race of the Peninsula Annual Conference for outstanding service to church and community in the area of race relations.

Methodist Country House received accreditation from the Joint Commission on Accreditation of Hospitals. According to the records, there are no other nursing home facilities in Delaware which have the JCAH accreditation. Records also show that only 3% of all nursing homes across the country demonstrates Methodist Country House's commitment to excellence in providing health care services.

Cokesbury Village won both national and state awards for its energy management system. The national awards program, sponsored by the U.S. Department of Energy, spotlights unique conservation and renewable energy projects.

# Looking Toward 1988

Although its facilities have changed in size, structure, and services through the years, PUMH has never lost sight of its mission: to ensure that older persons have the services they need, and the opportunity to find personal fulfillment. In this time of change, we want to continue our tradition of providing Christian care and leadership in the retirement/health care field.

Our goal is to keep pace with changing needs while providing the highest quality service at the most reasonable cost. As we can provide resources, we remain committed to caring for all older adults, including those with special needs.

#### Division of Parish and Congregational Development

During 1986, the Division reviewed and approved expenditures of funds for grants and loans to churches throughout the Peninsula Conference in excess of \$170,608. These funds were to be used for the expansion of physical facilities in order to promote those concreations' responsiveness to their communities.

of the total amount expended and approved, 66% was expended for ethnic minority local church purposes. This is a sizable percentage of our budget and we feel we are upholding the emphasis which is being set forth in this quadrennium.

With each passing meeting, we continue to refine the process with which we review the applications made by various churches throughout the Conference for grants or loans from our Division. We are concentrating on the effectiveness of the funds we have at our disposal, and are also concentrating on making the churches granting these funds, more responsible for the use of those funds both before and after they receive them. We continue to follow up on major appropriations we have made in the past in order to help those churches as much as possible with their stewardship towards the goals there are they made the dist of the stewardship towards the yeals there is the strict superintendents. In the future, we also expect to consult with the ethnic minority consultant in the locality as it relates to a specific request of a local church.

We are at the forefront of participation in the district study program which was initiated in 1986. We feel we have established, and are continuing to firm up the process by which we can effectively use the funds in the responsibility of dealing with these matters and also are grateful to all members of our Division who take an active part in the deliberations at each and every meeting.

To pay mortgage payments on behalf of Mt. Joy Church. This is based on an agreement between the General Church and the Peninsula Conference in 1973, and is due to expire in 1992.

3. West Sussex Parish

To coordinate the efforts and talents of clergy and laity within a seven-church group so that they can do various ministries together in consideration of their geographical location. This endeavor is being evaluated during 1987 to determine its continuance.

#### 4. Ocean Pines

To provide funds for purchase of property for enlargement of facilities for congregation.

5. Parsonage Aid

Emergency minor maintenance to parsonages, usually divided equally over the four districts unless otherwise agreed upon. Help to keep the parsonages in habitable condition for the charges that need financial assistance.

#### 6. Urban Ministries

To provide opportunities for urban congregations to: identify needs, locate resources, and develop viable programs addressing these needs.

# 7. Leisure Ministries

To explore opportunities for various types of ministries in resort areas of the Conference, including summer cooperative ministries. This represents continued Conference support for leisure ministries.

8. Town & Country - Rural Ministries

To explore opportunities and provide guidance for cooperative ministries throughout the Conference. Continuing Conference support for cooperative ministries and expand responsibilities in this area are anticipated during 1988.

# Committee on Congregational Development

The work of the Committee on Congregational Development continues to be a very exciting and busy part of the work of the Division of Parish and Community Development. We are still the primary funding agency within our Conference to help build, rebuild or remodel existing parsonages and church structures. It is our goal and in light of their ministry potential. When a congregation becomes aware of a need to expand or repair its facilities we stand ready to help with guidance, suggestions, and funding.

Although it has been printed in previous <u>Journals</u>, it may be of value to outline again the procedure for requesting funds from Congregational Development, Board of Global Ministries: 1) Inform your District Superintendent explaining your congregation's needs or desires 2) Contact the Chairperson of Congregational Development asking for "Request for Funds" application form 3) Complete the application form (this will include signature of Secretary of District Building and Church Location and signature with recommendation of District Superintendent) with all information required 4) Submit Completed form to Chairperson of Congregational Development Committee 5) Wait patiently for the Committee to act on your application; you will be notified as soon as a decision is final.

#### Methodist Action Program

The Methodist Action Program is an ACTION program of United Methodists seeking to bring the word and love of Jesus Christ to our community through the support of local churches, the meeting of human needs, and involvement in social change. What follows is a summary of our current efforts to meet those goals.

#### MEETING SPIRITUAL NEEDS THROUGH CHURCH EXTENSION

Santisima Trinidad -- Bringing Christ's word and love to Wilmington's hispanic community through the development of a Spanish-speaking congregation.

New Church Development -- Working with the Conference Congregational Development Committee to develop two new congregations in Wilmington -- one on Route 896 and one on Route 7.

Brandywine-Trinity --- Supporting the work of their new pastor, Jim Davis, who in the last year has raised the average attendance from 20-60.

Small Local Churches -- MAP will work with other churches in ways similar to its efforts at Brandywine-Trinity as the opportunities arise.

#### MEETING THE NEEDS OF THE INNER CITY AT OLD ASBURY

Remnanuel Dining Room -- This cooperative effort of MAP, the Ministry of Caring, and local churches provides over 55,000 meals a year to the needy on Wilmington's East Side.

Summer Day Camp -- Met the educational and recreational needs of 50 Inner-city youth this summer. It also contributed to their spiritual development through daily Bible study.

Emergency Assistance -- Provides food, clothing, referrals, and emergency financial assistance to over 1,800 people every year.

# MEETING NEEDS THROUGHOUT THE CITY

Interfaith Housing Task Force -- This ministry, a cooperative effort with 6 other faiths, will create 1,000 units of quality housing for low-income families over the next five years.

Outreach to Hispanic Elderly -- An outreach worker who helps them overcome the barriers they face in getting help through the traditional health and social services systems. In Warch of 1987, we will establish a part-time "drop in center" staffed primarily by volunteers so that the hispanic elderly have a place to come for information and recreation.

Summer Day Camp at Haven UMC -- 50 children come here every summer for recreation and Bible Study.

Churches and Puture Homeowners -- Low-income families work with church volunteers to rehabilitate abandoned houses for home ownership.

Summer Youth Work Project -- Youth from 5 United Methodist Churches worked to rehabilitate a home for a low-income family. Working with the District Youth Council, we are planning to have a week-long inner-city youth service project for 10-20 churches starting in the summer of 1987.

#### NEW PROGRAMS TO MEET EMERGING NEEDS

Afterschool Educational Enrichment Program -- This program, which began operation in February 1987, gives "latch-key kids" a place to go after school and at the same time professional teachers and volunteers will conduct educational programs.

Ministry to Single Women -- MAP is convening a group of single women to develop ministries which can support them in the many challenges they face.

Clothing Bank -- MAP is facilitating a group of clothing bank operators to develop ways they can better coordinate their efforts and do group solicitation of hard-to-get items.

Brown Bag Clubs -- This program gives low-income families access to Surplus food which would otherwise give adwintowe teminies access to Brandywine Trinity has over 200 members and six other churches have expressed interest in starting clubs.

Local Church Ministry Development -- MAP will continue to work with local churches to develop ministries for meeting needs in their immediate communities.

#### 1988 and Beyond

In 1988, MAP will continue to strengthen and expand the efforts outlined above. Special emphasis will be placed on involving local churches and church members in mission. This involvement may be the development of a new ministry in their immediate community, involvement at Old Asbury Center, or involvement in one of MAP's city-wide efforts. #### Neighborhood House, Inc.

In 1987, Neighborhood House, Inc. will observe its 66th year of service to the South Willmington community. For, about the year 1927, a challenge came to sponsor work in South Willmington, which was recommended as "a fertile field by the City Missionary Society." A room was rented at 500 S. Claymont Street and classes started on November 12. The work grew and a decision was made to purchase property - 400 S. Heald Street - which was named after Mrs. Mary Todd Gambrill, who gave the Sl, 80, 800 In 1952 the second floor of the Mary Todd Gambrill Neighborhood House was utilized in carrying out the program.

The Mary Todd Gambrill Neighborhood House and the Riddle Hemorial Deaconess Home had been supported by the Women's Home Missionary Society and became the Heritage of the Women's Society of Christian Service of the Peninsula Conference in 1940. Two Conference committee's were directly responsible for the work at the centers. Then in 1947, a Deaconess Board was formed, in accordance with the plans of the Women's Division of Christian Service. This body became known as The Board of Managers of Conference Projects and by-laws were adopted by the Peninsula Conference Women's Society of Christian Service in 1952.

In 1961, based on a self-evaluation study in 1957, the two properties - Mary Todd Gambrill Neighborhood House and Riddle Memorial Deaconess Home - vere sold and Madeley Methodiat Church was purchased and remodeled for use as a community center. The street in the fail of 1962. The dedication followed in 1964, when the building debt was liquidated.

The 1964 General Conference of the Methodist Church approved the union of the administrative departments of the Board of Missions. This meant that the agencies formerly under the Women's Division, of which Neighborhood House was one of many, were now agencies of the Methodist Church. The "home mission" work of the Homen's Division of Christian Service was thas transferred to the newly order and for this work with the understanding that support for the work, which was of particular interest to local women, would continue.

In 1965, the Conference Board of Missions declared Neighborhood House to be a Conference Advance Special. This action allowed Official Boards, local church Commissions on Missions, or individuals not related to the Women's Society to make special gifts to Neighborhood House through the Conference Treasurer and receive Conference Advance Special Credit for their gifts. This action in no way affected the support given by local or Conference Women's Society of Christian Service to Neighborhood House. It was intended to provide a broader base of financial support for the Neighborhood House.

Today, Neighborhood House, Inc. is one of over seventy community centers related to the National Division of the United Methodist Church. The property is owned and the work supported by the Conference United Methodist Women. It is governed locally by an inclusive, autonomous predominately lay Board of Directors and continues to express the love and concern of the church in mission.

In 1962, when Neighborhood House opened its doors, it was the only community service agency in South Wilmington. As such, it could not be expected to serve more than a cross-section of the total community. So, the agency became a moving force to stimulate action from other community service agencies to help meet the needs in this area. In addition to helping to establish the South Wilmington Community Center, the agency worked with community residents to get a multipurpose facility built in the community. The facility now houses the Southbridge Medical Activities Council, a community health center.

In 1986, Neighborhood Nouse continued to provide programs and service designed to meet the basic human needs of the community. These programs and services included: emergency assistance (i.e., food, clothes, utility, rent), family services, day care, housing counseling, tutoring, day camp, resident camp, 4-H club, youth enrichment, drop-out prevention, vacation church school, junior achievement, college career counseling, youth employment, sewing, thrift shop, delinquency prevention, and modeling. Additionally, thanks to your generosity, children in our Day Care and Tutorial Programs received a gift of clothes and a toy at Christmas time.

Neighborhood House has developed a close working relationship with Mt. Joy United Methodist Church and the Methodist Action Program. In addition to coordinating a community vacation church school, Neighborhood House and Mt. Joy are exploring ways to improve the quality of life for our seniors, youth, and single parents. The Methodist Action Program and Neighborhood House are exploring ways to work together to provide housing for low-income residents of our communities.

In closing, our ministry in the name of Christ is enabled because of people like you, who are willing to put their faith into action. Thank you for your support and prayers.

# Wesley College

This report is being prepared on my fourth anniversary as President of your distinguished and stromg Wealey College. I happily celebrate my anniversary as President of the College, but I also celebrate the Church-realtedness of the College and the evidence that it enjoys the attention and the approbation of the College-related Church. By the laws of the state of Delaware, Wesley College is a separate legal entity from the Annual Conference. Each operates independently of the other, and neither is liable for the obligations of the other, absent a specific agreement to the contrary. The connection between the College and the Conference derives from the fact that the Board of Trustees of the College is elected by the members of the Annual Conference.

Once more, we approach the meeting of the Conference. During that annual meeting, our presiding Bishop will recess the Annual Conference and call it to order as the Wesley College Corporate Session. At that time, the Chairperson of the College Board of Trustees will report to the Corporate Session on the state of the College and any new candidates for the Board of Trustees will be nominated and elected.

while this formal relationship between the College and the Annual Conference is important, OUR MUTUAL MINISTRY IN HIGHER EDUCATION IS REALLY THE ESSENTIAL POINT FOR THE COLLEGE AND THE CUURCH TO PONDER AND CELEBRATE.

As we did last year, then, Wesley College once again this year seeks the support of the Peninsula Annual Conference. Your churchrelated College seeks the aid of the Conference in interpreting the College's ministry throughout our local churches that Wesley may be regarded as a unique and appropriate part of the Church's mission and ministry. We seek the encouragement of the Church's mission and attainable option for young men and women in United Methodist churches throughout the Peninsula who are considering a higher deducation. We respectfully request the conlinued support of the Peninsula Annual Conference that your Wesley College may continue to be helped in its Chaplaincy program, in its program of Scholarships for worthy students, and in its academic program so meaningful to the Church.

Minority scholarships and active recruiting have already led to ethnic minority representation of 10% in the current Wesley College enrollment and an acceleration of the number of ethnic minority persons on staff and faculty as well as in the student body. The Chaplaincy program seeks to enhance the overall religious life of the campus through the continuation of weekly Chapel services, personal and spiritual counseling, sponsoring the Wesley student Christian Association and Kappa Chi, the Church Vocations organization; weekly Bible study at the Chaplain's residence, and support of special services and projects. Wesley anticipates and celebrates that the Church will extend aid not only for continuing minority person scholarships but also for nursing scholarships, Christian vocation scholarships, Christian dependents of United Methodist clergy scholarships, and Asbury United Methodist scholarships. Wesley also seeks program support for our associate and baccalaureate programs in nursing, for library materials, for new program planning, for faculty development and continuing evolution of Wesley College as a four-year senior degree-granting institution of higher learning in proud affiliation with the United Methodist Church.

During the past year, significant program development has occurred. New baccalaureate programs in computer science, physical education, political science, and psychology have been implemented. Enrollment in the College's baccalaureate programs has increased to almost 40% and growing interest in these programs exists among both current and prospective students. Approval for a baccalaureate program in biology has been granted by the Board of Trusteesbringing the total number of baccalaureate programs to thirteen. Several other baccalaureate programs, including education, economics, and social services are in varying stages of planning and design. All baccalaureate programs have been adjusted to incorporate a new core curriculum or common set of academic requirements in the liberal arts.

While the College continues its planned phasing out of several associate degree transfer programs, enrollment remains strong in associate degree transfer programs. A new associate degree program in computer science has been added to the curriculum and an associate degree in travel and tourism is being considered. Transfer options will remain in all basic academic areas, but their numbers will become increasingly more consistent with the College's growing identity as senior level institution. Planned re-structuring of academic offerings to achieve this "mix" has been undertaken during the past year.

Last Fall several new faculty members were recruited to strengthen instruction and to support an increasing number of upperlevel courses. The credentials and experience of these persons have enabled them to make strong contributions to the College during their first year. Continued efforts to recruit extremely able instructors, both full and part-time, are underway. In addition, institutional efforts to provide professional development opportunities for current faculty members have been expanded and several persons are vigorously pursuing additional degrees and/or participating in a variety of professional activities.

During the year several key publications have also been significantly revised. The College Bulletin has been extensively modified to emphasize baccalaurate offerings and to present the Castitution of learning. Mast schedules for each semester have been redesigned and distribution has been increased -- with the objective of increasing community awareness of educational opportunities at Wesley College. Other institutional documents, including the Faculty Handbook, have been up-dated and strengthened in order to provide for appropriate structures, procedures, processes, and functions as required and expected at senior colleges. In addition, formal agreements with junior and community collegees have been pursued in an effort to facilitate and encourage transfer to Wesley College of students with associate degrees.

Several planning activities have begun this year in order to strengthen and broaden the academic program. Formal program review has begun and will provide systematic evaluation and a sound basis for institutional decisions affecting programs in the future. Planning efforts are in motion to offer a Winterim in January of 1988 and to provide several study abroad opportunities for Wesley students. Appropriate exploration into the feasibility of taking Wesley educational opportunities to other areas of the state is and being made. Additionally, the Coditation process for the Middle States Association of Colleges and Schools. All of these recent activities contribute to clear and growing academic strength and stability at Wesley College.

We predicated the budget for this past fall on 542 new and returning students. We opened with 630 full-time paid students. This was 79 students more than the previous fall -- a 14.44 enrollment increase. Between seemsters this cardenic year we have enjoyed a 99% retention rate. Including our part-time students, commuting students, wesley

will, by head count, be in the service of nearly 1800 students this year.

Your College celebrates with you that Weley has enjoyed an operating financial surplus for the third straight year, and the anticipated financial surplus following this coming June 30 should be the largest in Wesley College history.

Our students in four-year curricula have increased 58% from 1985 to the present. Our baccalaureste programs have risen by over 108% over just the past two years. Wesley is now a full-fledged four-year College; we are even playing four-year NCAA sanctioned sports, and we have won, our first season out, the Eastern States Athletic Conference National Regional Championship. Wesley is in steady evolution from stability toward lasting security.

We are even celebrating a new commitment to the development of global citizens. With our international student numbers growing, Wesley has also inaugurated its first Fulbright scholar-in-residence program. Currently, pr. Ernesto Vepes del Castillo, of Peru, is on the Wesley campus for the entire Spring Semester. A distinguished scholar of international reputation, he is teaching at Wesley and speaking throughout this geographical area on numerous compelling issues relating to Latin American development.

To maintain itself as a beautiful and commanding facility, Wesley is now involved in extensive renovation projects relating to its swimning pool, the Carpenter Formal Lounge, the College Center Student Lounge, Williams Hall, and the Athletic Facility. We are spending \$15,800 on these projects, but the funds for these improvements have all come from grants and gifts and will meither impact nor unbalance the current operational budget.

suffice to say, there is a great spirit at your Wesley Collegea feeling of excitement and anticipation over new directions. I take pleasure in celebrating these achievements and advances with you as reminders to us all that progress is in our blood, in our instincts. Goethe observed, "Nature knows no pause in progress and development, and attaches her curse on all inaction." We are not inactive at your Church-related College. We have much to celebrate with the College-telated Church, with the guiding help of God, let us continue our combined efforts in behalf of the evolution of this Wesley College to a future of lasting security with dignity. Through our combined efforts let us all have the joy of one day seeing our efforts in behalf of Wesley College and being very satisfied.

- 5. To provide a United Methodist and Christian presence on the campus, and be an advocate of Christian Faith and values in the decision-making and total life of the campus, e.g. bringing UNC and other Christian leadership to the campus to speak on Christian faith and values, and/or related areas to Wesley Foundation and campus community.
- 6. To assist in preparing minority students to make it in a majority culture; to encourage cross-racial and intercultural group activities and inclusiveness on campus via interpersonal group discussion.

# Wesley Foundation, University of Md. Eastern Shore

This past year's ministry on the campus of the University has been one of rebuilding. Many of our students who participated actively in our campus ministry were graduated, and we were left basically with the task of recruiting new students to take their place.

Our Program continues to stress:

 Christian Fellowship and Service; to provide students with the opportunity of being challenged to consider their Christian calling and responsibility.

- (2) Encouragement of students to communicate their faith in a Higher Education setting, and to attempt to provide them with the skills to do that.
- (3) Ecumenicity and denominational identity at the same time.
- (4) The Caring and loving relationship, not only within the Community of Faith, but to others on the campus as well.
- (5) The Inclusiveness of our Church's Ministry.

We attempted to meet these goals through (a) Mid-Week Worship Services, and (b) Campus Ministry Fellowship and Study: Appropriate Topics and Biblical References are chosen for these studies. An occasional guest speaker with particular expertise, including United Methodist pastors, have led in some of our studies.

We have also sponsored or participated in (c) Retreats, and (d) Social Events, by ourselves and with other Christian students from other campuses in Maryland. Our students attended three such retreats last year.

(e) Our students have also been encouraged to participate in local congregations, and they have, to some extent.

A representative number of students have been in contact with our Campus Ministry Program; however, only a minority have chosen to participate in any degree: of some 80 students on our mailing list, only about 29 are participating in various degrees. We do, however, anticipate a more rewarding ministry within the coming year.

#### UNITED METHODIST WOMEN

Sixty delegates from Peninsula Conference attended the National Assembly of United Methodist Women held in Anaheim, California, in April. They participated in the formal conclusion of a 4-year centennial celebration and helped launch a new theme, "Into the Future by Faith."

In May, 200 women gathered at Asbury UMC in Salisbury for worship and study under the theme "By Faith, What Are You Going To Do?". Group leaders of 10 workshops led participants into thinking about volunteerism, politics, parenting, and life as an older adult. The School of Christian Mission, also held in Salisbury, offered studies in "Suffering and the Community of Faith," "Technology and Human Values," and "Southern Asia." One-hundred and eighty-nine men and women gathered for this school. Nine ministers received CEUs.

This was the year for United Methodist Women to call the Pederation of Methodist Women together and women representing all Known denominations with "Methodist" in their name gathered at Dover Air Force Base for a Brunch. Mrs. Alcestis Coleman, President of the Arce Pederation, was the speaker.

Mrs. Cleo Henry, honcred for her leadership and dedication, was named one of "100 Women in Mission." Mrs. Hattle Hargis was awarded the same honor posthumously. Each is featured in a book entitled, "They Went Out, Not Knowing. Mrs. Henry was honcred with a musical celebration in November at Wesley College. Many friends and relatives gathered from across the Conference to enjoy a beautiful afternoon of music and friendship.

The Conference organization meets annually in November for the surpose of electing officers, recognizing accomplishments, and giving reports on the status of the organization. Eighty-eight received recognition for participating in the Reading Program. Local presidents were recognized with a certificate.

The organization continues to struggle with the need to attract young women. A goal in 1987-88, is to have an event for women under 46 in an effort to reach them and help them feel a relationship to the organization.

Goal 2, is to conduct training sessions for local leadership in sub-district groups. Ten workshops will be held in 1987 and 10 in 1988.

Emphasis will be placed on getting more accurate and complete reports from all the local units in 1987, and to encourage wider use of program materials that relate to the purpose of the organization.

A Spiritual Disciplines Workshop was held in October for District and Conference officers. Leaders from Women's Division led us in a study of the Bible, Theology, and Worship. Officers realized that nothing is gained in any area unless a strong spiritual foundation is present in their lives. This weekend was a must for them.

Two Spiritual life retreats on Wholeness were held in April 1986, led by Pam Lardear and two will be held in March 1987, led by Vaughn Johnson on the subject Faithfulness Within the Covenant Community. These retreats are held at Drayton Manor and are open to any woman who wishes to register and attend.

The Conference newsletter, <u>The Enabler</u>, is the primary source of communication for United Methodist Nomen. Each local president receives a free copy. Others may subscribe. Information about all District and Conference events is included in one of the four issues each year.

Our Conference giving to Missions in 1986 was \$138,829.18. Of this amount, \$1,669.25 went to Pood, Land, and Justice projects, and \$16,629.55 was supplementary giving over and above pledged money. We contributed \$13,444.48 to the Centennial Fund during 1983-86.

We commend the accomplishments of local units and pray for the potential that is there to burst forth in service to God's people everywhere that hurt, pain, poverty, and sin exist. To God be the Glory.

# BOARD OF ORDAINED MINISTRY

The Board of Ordained Ministry of the Peninsula Annual Conference has actively parsued the fulfillent of its many responsibilities since the 1986 Annual Conference session. There have been ten achdeuled meetings of the full board, and a number of other meetings involving the members of the Executive Committee and other committees of the board.

Our Candidacy Registrar, Douglas Ridley, has worked with the District Superintendents and the District Committees on Ordained Ministry in the task of supervising applications for candidacy certification. In 1986, the District Committees certified seven candidates. As of January 1, 1987, there were 22 additional applicants for candidacy. Twenty-eight ministers of our Conference are serving as Supervising Pastors, working with applicants for candidacy certification. As Registrar for Local Pastors, Gonzalee Matthews helped to enroll eight Peninsula Conference students in the 1986 Local Pastors' LiCensing School at Drew Theological School, of which our Conference is a sponsor. Local Pastors are required to be enrolled in seminary or the Course of Study program of the Division of Ordained Ministry.

The Board's Registrar, F. David Weber, continues to oversee the work of applicants for probationary and Full Membership in the Conference, and to maintain the records of the board. Any certified candidate who desires to be considered as an applicant for ordination as a Deacon or as an Elder in 1988 should contact the Registrar by August 15, 1987.

Fifteen persons attended an orientation retreat at Drayton Manor on July 21 and 22 for pastors beginning their first appointment in the Peninsula Conference. We are grateful to James Walz who again planned and co-ordinated this retreat.

This board and the Bishop's Cabinet again revised the form used in the Annual Evaluation of Pastoral Ministry in a further attempt to clarify and simplify this important process. Reporting and planning for the pastor's continuing education is intended to be a part of the annual covenant with the Pastor-Parish Relations Committee.

The Committee on Continuing Education has proposed some revisions in our Conference Policy for Continuing Education. The new policy has been approved by the Board for recommendation to the Annual Conference. A copy of this proposal is included at the end of this report.

Nine scholarships for Continuing Education, totalling \$2,875, were granted in 1986. Applications for C.E.U. credit should be sent to J. Ronald Owens, Registrar for Continuing Education.

The first in a series of Professional Growth Seminars to prepare clergy for Cross-Racial Appointments was held at Drayton Manor, October 28-38, 1986. Twenty-eight pastors participated in this pilot project. Additional such seminars will be conducted during the next several years in order to include all Peninsula Conference ministers.

The Scholarship Committee provided financial aid totalling \$29,838 in 1986, to 26 students preparing for ordained ministry:

21 Seminary	19 males	13 white
5 College	7 females	13 minority

The maximum amount of each scholarship was increased in the fall of 1986: from \$500 to \$750/semester for seminary students, and from \$400 to \$600/semester for college students. One candidate for Diaconal Ministry was given a scholarship, and this person is an ethnic minority female.

The Board of Ordained Ministry met with the Board of Diaconal Ministry on January 13, 1987 to discuss common concerns and procedures. Scholarship money is available to candidates for Diaconal Ministry upon recommendation by that board and approval by the Board of Ordained Ministry. We are planning jointly for the ordination and consecration service at Annual Conference.

The Board recommended a number of full members of the Conference to serve as Counseling Elders on each district. The District Superintendents assign Counseling Elders from this list to all ministers not yet in full connection. Plans are being made for training sessions for Counseling Elders, and for recular meetings on each district of candidates in process with their District Superintendent.

The Paychological Testing and Counseling Committee supervises the testing required of all candidates for ordination and Conference membership. We are moving toward a procedure of testing applicants for Certification as candidates as a part of this overall process. Local churches/charges recommending persons for candidatey will be expected to share the cost of this testing with the candidate.

The annual meeting of ministers serving Appointments Beyond the Local Church (ABLC's) was held at Cokesbury Village on March 14, 1997; and the Board joined the Conference Board of Pensions in sponsoring a seminar on financial planning for the clergy. We are continuing our efforts to develop policies and procedures dealing with clergy marital problems.

After the interviews with candidates for ordination were completed, a meeting was held on April 6 at Drayton Manor for those recommended by the Board. Bishop Yeakel discussed the meaning of ordination and plans were made for the ordination/consecration service at Annual Conference.

The 1988 General Conference will celebrate the 20th anniversary of the Ministerial Education Fund, which provides money for the operation of our 13 united Methodist Seminaries and for the work of Boards of Ordsined Ministry. We in the Peninsula Conference can be proved of one of the best records in the United Methodist Church in general fund.

The Board of Ordained Ministry expresses its sincere appreciation to The Rev. Dr. Robert P. Whitlock and The Rev. Dr. P. Thomas McKelvey, who have served faithfully as officers of this Board. Our prayers go with them as they assume new and significant responsibilities as District Superintendents.

#### POLICY FOR CONTINUING EDUCATION

- CONTINUING EDUCATION is a structured educational or spiritual event, supplementing a basic theological degree (M.Div. or equivalent).
- II. CONTINUING EDUCATION UNITS (CEU): One CEU is awarded for each ten (18) contact hours or equivalent, in an organized continuing education event or self-study program authorized by the Peninsula Annual Conference Board of Ordained Ministry (BOM) through its Committee on Continuing Education.
  - A contact hour is a 50-minute classroom session or equivalent.
  - B. Non-structured settings must include Board-approved evaluation instruments.
    - Research/Reaction papers, Critiques, Logs, Journals, Written Reports.
    - 2. Oral Reports/Interviews.
- III. CONTINUING EDUCATION CREDIT MAY BE GIVEN FOR structured events as well as individual and small group study programs approved by BOM, including:
- A. Events accredited by General, Jurisdictional, and Annual Conferences.

- B. Doctor of Ministry programs and CEUs granted by approved seminaries.
- C. Sabbaticals and Study Leaves of more than one month.
- D. Retreats and Short-Term Educational opportunities (less than one month).
- E . CEUs granted by accredited agencies for programs in other disciplines.
- F. Continuing Small-Groups Organized for Study.
- IV. GENERAL GUIDELINES FOR INDIVIDUALIZED PROGRAMS: Formal continuing education programs normally operate according to various prescribed criteria which are governed by established institutions. It is necessary, however, to identify certain criteria for individualized spiritual programs and study experiences.
  - A. An Individual Education Program should include:
    - Specific educational objectives.
       Administration procedures.
    - 3. Evaluation instruments.
    - 4. Annotated bibliography.
    - 5. Written summary evaluation.
  - B. An Individual Spiritual Program may be designed around: 1. A Spiritual Retreat.

      - 7. Negotiation -- CEUs granted only after prior negotiation.
- V. CONTINUING EDUCATION UNITS WILL NORMALLY NOT BE GIVEN FOR:

  - в. Annual Conference and other meetings, unless specifically authorized CEUs.
  - Mass media programs (unless integral to a larger educational c. program) .

VI. CERTIFICATION

CEUs granted by theological seminaries certified by the University Senate are accepted without further approval.

# BOARD OF DIACONAL MINISTRY

The Board of Diaconal Ministry has seen much change since its early development. For the first time this year we are consecrating two persons into the Conference as Diaconal Ministers. We are proud to see that all our efforts over the years are finally bearing fruit.

Many changes are going to effect our Board in the next few years. Our Board has gone from meeting once or twice a year to meeting once or twice each month. We are seeing our work go from certification of a few workers to certifying new and re-certifying many church workers. We are providing mentors for those seeking to become consecrated Diaconal Ministers, providing psychological evaluations, support groups, annual meetings, training sessions, and financial aid to those persons.

We met with the Board of Ordained Ministry for the first time this year and plan to meet at least once each year with them. I feel privileged to be able to chair this very important Board of our Annual Conference.

The Board members are working to make our Conference one which proclaims Christ's love through the use of the glifts and graces of the lay persons (certified lay-workers) and the non-itinerant ministers (consecrated) of the church. We have been blessed indeed.

# BOARD OF PENSIONS

The Conference Board of Pensions, in this quadrennium, has significantly increased pension benefits and is actively monitoring payments to the General Board for MPP and CPP to assure appropriate protection for the clergy and their families. Further, during the 1986-87 Conference year, the Board, in cooperation with the Peningula United Methodist Foundation, mailed letters to pastors under appointment and to retired pastors seeking to attract, by way of bequests, new funds for pensions.

'In response to comments from the very successful retirement planning seminars held in the spring of 1986, the Board of Pensions, in conjunction with the Board of Ordained Ministry, offered a Financial Planning Seminar. This one-day seminar, held in May 1987, was open to all pastors and their spouses.

As of December 31, 1986, pensions were being paid to 185 ministers, 151 surviving spouses of ministers, 3 children, 8 local pastors, and 28 surviving spouses of local pastors, for a total of 367 annuitants whose benefits had been earned in the Peninsula Conference. Total amount paid in 1986 by the General Board of Pensions to these annuitants was \$1,423,852. The average pension in 1986 for ministers within the Conference was \$4,1787. Social Security benefits are seen to be a set of the second second

With each increase in the Past Service Rate, the pension liability increases. The Peningula Conference Board of Pensions continues to defray a large percentage of the annual cost of reducing the Conference's pensions liability.

The Board's goal for 1987-88 is to improve communication of benefits to pastors and their spouses to enhance appreciation and understanding.

#### RECOMMENDATIONS

The Peninsula Conference Board of Pensions recommends that:

1. The Past Service Rate for 1988 be \$210 per year of approved service.

2. Up to 100% of the pension and disability payments received be designated as the permitted housing allowance for 1988.

On April 27, a Workshop on <u>Collecting and Preserving Church</u> Records <u>6</u> Artifacts was given to over 58 persons who came from all over the Conference. The Commission has four of its members trained in helping local churches preserve their records. Just call us and we will put you in contact with one of them.

In the September-October issue of <u>Colonial Homes</u>, Barratt Hall and Chapel were featured in a well-written and illustrated article that brought response from as far away as Texas. Additions to the Museum Collection: Silvertipped came (1895) made from wood of the Chapel that belonged to the Rev. Dawson, a former pastor, five local church plates, 29 early postcards of Methodist churches 4 activities, early map of Murderkill River that shows a draw bridge where Asbury met with people during the building of the Chapel, 32 local church histories and anniversary booklets, 19th Century letter about Joshus Thomsa, copy of Richard Allen's mamumission paper, and Methodist Protestant magazine from 1927-37.

### Delmarva Ecumenical Agency

### GENERAL PURPOSE: SHARE FAITH AND MINISTRY

- A Planning Retreat was held in October, the results of which are being recommended for implementation.
- The Denominational Executives of Northern Delaware, including the president of the Delaware Rabbinical Association, met monthly for lunch and discussion, the Rev. Ronald J. Degges, convener. This group works closely with D.E.A.
- Five issues of the NEWSLETTER (every two months) were sent to each congregation on the Peninsula.
- 4. The annual ecumenical award was presented in the southern Delaware area in May to Dr. Kuth N. Laws for outstanding work in Christian unity. This award is presented each year in a different quadrant of the Peninsula.
- The administrative budget is \$76,000; there is \$12,000 in the restricted custodian fund for ministries.
- 6. DEA was represented at 15 general meetings of judicatories.

### GOAL I: COORDINATE RESOURCES

 RESOURCE MINISTRIES: The Resource Ministries with an annual budget of \$28,888 served 128 congregations and recorded 3,375 bookings. One hundred seventeen persons attended the sixth annual Interfaith Lay Academy at St. Paul's United Methodist Church, Wilmington.

2. In conjunction with the Housing Committee, Diocese of Easton, the EASTERN SHORE HOUSING TAKE YORCE held a conference for church members on low-income housing to stimulate interest in four areas: elderly, ownership, rental, and rehabilitation. Maryland passed low-income housing legislation totaling 38 million dollars.

 DEA was represented on the local Board of the FEDERAL EMERGENCY MANAGEMENT AGENCY, which allotted \$254,351 to 42 nonprofit groups in Delaware (many churches).

 PACEM IN TERRIS programs addressed S. Africa, US/USSR relations, Ireland, and building peace in a nuclear world.

 A Conference on mobilizing CHURCH VOLUNTEERS was presented by the Division of Volunteer Services, State Department of Community Affairs in September.

6. The (new) MINISTERS ACTION COUNCIL OF DELAWARE (MACOD) has established six areas of concern: 1. betterment in education, human rights, health care, harmony in the community, organizational cooperation and emergency situations; 2. senior citizens; 3. continuing education for church leaders; 4. clergy support network; 5. evangelistic crusades; 6. housing. MACOD joined DEA san affiliated unit.

7. FOOD CONSERVERS, offices and warehouses at 1203 E. 13th St., Wilmington, has upgraded staff and volunteers because of increased workload: over a MILLION pounds of food was distributed to 1356 agencies (145 monthly average).

 CASA SAN FRANCISCO, Milton, Delaware, is helping 4000 rural poor annually through health, pastoral, community, emergency, educational, and nutritional services.

 THE DELAWARE INTERFAITH COALIFION ON AGING serves churches through its annual conference (spring), directory of religious services, networking among congregations, and programs to individual congregations and judicatories.

10. DELMARVA RURAL MINISTRIES is developing a project to build 30/50 houses or migrants (10/20 for year-round use) in Wicomico/Caroline Counties, Maryland.

 The PUBLIC ASSISTANCE TASK FORCE platform this year advocates for General Assistance increase (15.8%), medical assistance for the needy, housing and Aid to Families with Dependent Children (7.4% increase plus .4% cost of living).

12. The SMYRNA BUS has provided rides for 1383 persons. Contributions totaled \$3808: Catholic - \$1000, Episcopal Diocese of Delaware - \$1000, Lutheran - \$500, United Methodist - \$500.

13. The Delaware Emergency HOUSING FUND allotted \$13,000 from 1984 tax return checkoffs to nine not-for-profit agencies throughout the state.

14. DEA was represented at 18 other public functions of community and service AGENCIES, facility even special meetings of some of their staff; was represented ~* the regular meetings of the Maryland Interfaith Legislative Committee, whose advocacy priorities are public assistance increase, low-income housing, and unemployment.

# GOAL II: STRENGTHEN LOCAL ECUMENISM

1. Helped church representatives in LAUREL, DE, form an association of churches.

 Assisted Christ Episcopal Church, Christiana Hundred, Wilmington, Outreach Committee in publicizing and developing ecumenically a BAIL BOND program for indigent offenders.

 Facilitated a meeting between BLACK AND WHITE CLERGY in Salisbury, Maryland, to address the problem they perceive of the two communities moving farther apart.

4. Organized a DIALOGUE among pastors in west Wilmington on Baptism.

# GOAL III: DEVELOP THEOLOGICAL UNDERSTANDING OF ECUMENICAL ISSUES

 The FAITH AND ORDER COMMITTEE has developed an ecumenical consultation program on ministry recommended for implementation in 1987.

2. An advisory consultation on the Covenanting document of the Consultation of Church Union was held in November.

3. Four courses on ecumenism were offered as part of the Roman Catholic catechist certification programs.

### COMMISSION ON EQUITABLE SALARIES

It is the purpose of the Commission on Equitable Salaries to support ministry in the charges of the Annual Conference by 1) administering funds to be used in salary supplementation; 2) recommending Conference standards for ministerial compensation; and 3) providing counsel and advisory material on ministerial committees, to district superintements and Pastor/Parish Relations Committees.

### (1984 Discipline Para. 722)

The Commission on Equitable Salaries has provided financial assistance to those pastors whose charges, for various reasons, are unable to provide the minimum compensation set by the Peninsula Annual Conference. In addition, the Commission continues to award financial supplements to those pastors whose special talents are required to effectively serve their respective appointments.

In accordance with the 1984 session of The Peninsula Conference, the commission also provides the related pension (MPP 6 CPP). In 1986, pastors in 29 charges received salary supplements of \$33,134.96, plus pension fund contributions of \$6,289.16, for a total of \$35,344.12.

For the past few years we have been upgrading our minimum salary level. In 1986 we established four different minimum salaries for full-time pastors:

Full member \$14,500. Probationary 14,000.

### Associate 13,500. Local Pastor 13,000.

It is the hope of this Commission to keep our level of minimum compensation in line with those of neighboring conferences. As of this date, the Commission's recommendation has not been finalized. Newever, a suggestion for all groups, including student pastors, will be made at Annual Conference.

In addition, as a result of the 1986 session of The Peninsula Conference, the Commission is still studying the following proposed resolution:

BE IT RESOLVED that full-time pastors (except local pastors) shall receive, on the recommendation of the District Superintendent, an annual service increment of one hundred and fifty dollars (S159.40) for every year of service in the bundred Methodist Church, up to a maximum of two thousand five hundred and fory dollars (S159.40), and the former whethodist Church. Only those years when full pension credit was granted, may be used in this computation; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that full-time local pastors, on the recommendation of the District Superintendent, shall receive a service increment of one hundred and fifty dollars (\$150.00) for every year of service in the United Methodist Church, up to the service of the service of the service of the service of the years when full pension credit was granted, may be used in this computation.

When evaluating salary requests, the Commission considers, among other things, adequate housing for the pastor. In 1986 we reviewed cases where housing had not been adequate and in compliance with the 1986 session of Annual Conference awarded financial assistance equalling 28 of the benominational Average.

Accordingly, we are currently undertaking a study on how we as a Commission and as a Conference can deal with this issue.

Reimbursing pastors for miles traveled on church business is a policy established by this Conference. The Commission recommends the following action:

RESOLVED, that reimbursement for travel expense during 1988 shall be 21 cents per mile for the first 15,000 miles and 11 cents per mile beyond 15,000 miles, said rate being in compliance with IRS policy.

The Board of Ordained Ministry, as a member of the Cross-Racial Appointments Task Force, chaired by Clifford Armour, was able to develop a professional growth seminar for pastors as it relates to open itineracy.

The Monitoring Committee, chaired by Doris Phillips, was able to develop the monitoring instrument for monitoring of CCOM. The Education Committee, chaired by Sam Peterson, developed an excellent Martin Luther King Symposium. The theme was "Christian Discipleship in the Inclusive United Methodist Church". There were 400 in attendance.

The Commission, in cooperation with the Cross-Racial Task Force, will continue to facilitate the development of the Cross-Racial Appointment agenda in 1987.

The Education Committee will continue to use the MKK event as a sensitizing tool for inclusiveness. It will also continue to develop an agenda for the local churches in the Conference to deal with racial attitudes and perspectives.

The Monitoring Committee will continue to work with the Missional Priority Coordinating Committee to monitor the implementation of the Comprehensive Plan by Conference boards, committees, and divisions.

Finally, the Peninsula Conference Commission on Religion and Race will carry the ongoing crusade against social injustice, racism, classism, and sexism as it seeks to enable the United Methodist Church to be an inclusive church.

Nembers have actively sought new nominations to achieve a more active, inclusive, and geographically balanced representation on the Commission.

### Advocacy and Monitoring

The Commission has been in contact with the Board of Laity and Conference Arrangements Committee concerning the need for greater sensitivity to inclusiveness in Annual Conference programs. Several Commission members will monitor 1967 Annual Conference programs and proceedings to report progress or problems to appropriate groups or individuals.

The openness and service of each member of the Commission have been a great help in the hard work of beginning again.

1. To encourage the Cabinet to urge local churches and district Councils on Ministries to fill their office for the status and role of women.

2. To develop a pamphlet to introduce the work of the Peninsula Conference Commission on the Status and Role of Women to pastors and congregations and to help them become aware of women's issues as they relate to our connectional system and individual churches and members.

 To develop training and support in each district for local church and district representatives of the status and role of women.

 To study and identify concerns of clergywomen in the Peninsula Conference and to make this information available to the Board of Ordained Ministry.

5. To monitor conference boards, divisions, commissions, and committees for inclusive representation.

To monitor the salaries of women and other minorities in relationship to all clergypersons.

### AREA COMMITTEE ON EPISCOPACY

The Washington Area Committee on Episcopacy has followed the <u>Discipline</u> in its functions to "support the bishop...be available for counsel, and to assist in the determination of the needs and conditions of the area" as it met with the Bishop several times during the past year.

A productive retreat was held with Dr. Paul Dietterich of the Center for Parish Development to help identify and evaluate different stages of the Bishop's leadership in relation to the two conferences. These stages are: Leave-Taking, Bntry, Start-up, Mutual Testing, Mutual Acceptance, and Job/Role Planning, with some overlapping at times. The committee explored the difficulties and sadness of a bishop leaving one Episcopal Area and entering another, as well as the next area of Mutual Testing and Mutual Acceptance. It is generally agreed that the Bishop and the conferences are at the point of Mutual Acceptance which includes love, caring, dialogue, and communication in many areas of concern.

Bishop Yeakel has defined the key result areas for his goals as follows:

- 1) Celebrating the Good News
- 2) Human Resource Development
- Area/Conference Administration 3) General Church Oversight
- 4)
- Ecumenical and Interreligious Witness 5)
- Christian Presence in Public Life 6)

Highlighting a few of these includes the Bishop preaching in a wide variety of churches, ethnic minority congregations, smaller and larger congregations at various special events; conducting district workshops along with the Conference staff; calling clergy together for a Day Apart at the beginning of Lent; scheduling leadership seminars, Cabinet retreats and the Annual Bishop's Retreat. He also serves as president of the General Council on Finance and Administration, and he is a member of various boards of trustees of United Methodist institutions, as well as serving on ecumenical boards and agencies.

To help provide a "presence in Washington," the Area Committee on Episcopacy voted to accept the use of a conference room for Bishop Yeakel at the United Methodist Building, 100 Maryland Avenue, N.E., Washington, DC. It will be available for meetings or individual appointments.

The committee will follow the guidelines set forth by the Northeastern Jurisdictional Committee to facilitate the section of the Discipline which includes "consultation and appraisal of the work of the bishop." At this point, the committee feels it has functioned in the concept of free and open feedback and dialogue with the Bishop.

Finally, the Area Committee on Episcopacy thoroughly enjoys working with Bishop Yeakel and is delighted whenever Lois is present. At the February 14th meeting, many creative ideas were presented and explored, some of which will be implemented soon in furthering our support of the Bishop and in helping to provide the best possible working relationship between the Bishop and the conferences.

The committee is convinced that through this ongoing relationship with and support of Bishop Yeakel, the Baltimore and Peninsula Conferences will be able to advance the overall goals of the Kingdom and the mission of the church in today's world.

### COUNCIL ON FINANCE AND ADMINISTRATION

During the past year, the following actions were taken by the Council:

1. Drayton - approved a capital funds appeal to begin in the fall of 1986 to raise \$1,000,000.

- Professional Growth Seminar (Cross-racial appointments) appropriated \$2,488 towards cost of seminar.
- 3. Floyd Twilley appropriated \$500 towards severance pay.
- Wesley Foundation Univ. of Delaware denied their request for a \$5,000 grant.
- Easton District Parsonage authorized Easton district Parsonage Committee to study the possibility of replacing the district parsonage.
- Wilmington District Office appropriated \$2,600 for office expenses.
- Dover District Office appropriated \$3,082.66 for office expense.
- Dental Care Approved adding dental care to the Health Insurance Program for active ministers. This coverage is also included in the dependent coverage. Approved a study to find a feasible way to extend dental care to retired ministers.
- Long-Range Planning Approved paying one-half the cost for a seminar being led by Paul M. Dietterich at the joint meeting of CFA and CCOM on April 11, 1987.
- New District Superintendents Appropriated \$1,100 for special training event.
- That the Non-Contributory Group Life Insurance be discontinued as of December 31,1989. Any person desiring continuance of this insurance may have their coverage converted to a direct pay policy.

Recommendations:

- 1. The 1988 Budget in the amount of \$3,676,164 be adopted.
- 2. That .38 be the Apportionment Factor for 1988.
- That property and liability insurance paid by the local church remain a part of the operating expenses used for calculating apportionments.

### WASHINGTON AREA EPISCOPAL RESIDENCE COMMITTEE

I am happy to report that the episcopal residence is in good condition. The major news to announce is that the indebtedness on the Episcopal Residence was liquidated this past August, 1986. That good news means that for this year and perhaps next year instead of paying out nearly 518,958 in loan principal and interest, we can set aside extra monies in a reserve fund to take care of future major maintenance and replacement items and any unforeseen emergencies.

Our annual budget, which currently takes care of taxes, insurance, utilities, and maintenance, is underwritten in the following manner: two-thirds of the total budget is provided by GCFA through the Episcopal Fund and one-third is provided by the Area (Baltimore Conference at 70% and Peninsula Conference at 30%). Any expenditures beyond what has been appropriated by this formula must be borne by the Episcopal Area.

# REVIEWING WORLD MISSION FUNDS

### A Report from the Committee Assigned to Review As Ordered by the 1986 Annual Conference (Journal Reference pp. 190-191)

On a basis of the action taken by the 1986 session of the Peninsula Annual Conference, a committee was appointed to keep the assignment proposed in the resolution. Two persons accepting the appointment had to decline. The members of the committee who carried the set of the Merrill, William Hempill, and from the Conference Staff, Gordon Stapleton.

The mandate for the committee was "to investigate, and evaluate the funding procedures of the GBOCM and the organizations receiving these funds and to charge that committee with the responsibility of preparing a thorough written report of its findings and recommendations and to report back to the next Annual Conference." (1986 Journal, p. 191)

On the basis of this action, we proceeded in the following manner:

1. We met as a committee to analyze the task.

2. As a result of that meeting, we communicated with the General Board of Global Ministries at its headquarters in New York City posing certain questions and requesting a time to meet with the staff to hear answers to the questions. The questions were:

a. What are the criteria for funding causes, particularly non-United Methodist causes?

b. What are the non-United Methodist causes to which money is now directed?

c. What are the controversial areas of grants? (i.e., how do they fit with the criteria of the Board?) A number of guestions particularly revolved around some of the grants that were being made on the African continent. d. What is the process by which grant requests come to the General Board of Global Ministries?

e. How does the Board check on the accountability of grant requestors?

f. What is the philosophy of Missions as operating currently in the General Board?

In addition, we examined some documents printed by the General Board of Clobal Ministries which indicated where grants are currently being made. It was discovered that some of the items referred to in the Resolution were no longer in the funding cycle. There is a manual which lists all the grants and to whom they are made. A copy is available in the Conference office if any wish to examine it.

Four of the five members of the Committee went to New York to meet with the General Board leadership. What follows is an account of that hearing.

On arriving at the General Board of Global Ministries Office in New York, we were greeted by Mr. Robert Harmon, Director of Planning and General Secretary Randolph Nugent. We were the General Secretary's guest for lunch and had an extensive conversation about the philosophy of the GBCM.

This was followed by a meeting with twelve top-level staff of the General Board who were anxious to answer our questions. It is the opinion of the Committee that they dealt with us in a most responsible manner.

Peggy Billings, Associate General Secretary for the World Division, shared with us the purpose and responsibilities of the World Division. She gave us a staff paper which pointed out the responsibilities and purpose of this division. On page three of the paper, the priorities that are used by the World Division in selecting how moneys will be expended are listed. (Attached) These include ministries of Leadership Development, ministries of Calling to Discipleship, ministries of Human Freedom and Justice, and ministries of International Understanding and Action. She also pointed out the criteria for the maintenance and initiation of missional relationships of these four program priorities. In most every case, the Directors of the General Board (2 from each annual conference) determine the direction the World Division will take and give assignments to the staff. The Directors do designate to staff certain fiscal responsibilities, for example, up to \$12,000 for projects may be approved by the staff. They still have to report any actions taken between Board sessions to the Directors for confirmation. All grants must fit the Board's criteria. Grants are not, however, governed by the politics in the country in which they are made. This is different from how UMCOR makes its grants, where they often respond to a direct and immediate need that is recognized world wide. In terms of monitoring programs and making determinations about the real need in areas of the world where program request are made: the Area Secretary in the World Division would be responsible to determine if the organization is what it represents itself to be. These area secretaries are in touch with these particular assignments three or four times per year and should be knowledgeable about what is going on. Persons selected in most areas have both the cultural and the language relationships with the areas that they administer and are able to understand the needs perhaps better than other members of the Board might be. We also have to realize that in many cases, in dealing with autonomous churches, grants are made on a basis of requested need by these

churches. In some cases, block grants are given for specific programs that a Central Conference wants to develop and the expenditure of that money is determined by that Central Conference as to how it will carry out the program for which the money was given.

Grants are also made to partner churches such as autonomous Methodist Churches and other churches who were formerly related to the GRCM or its predecessor bodies, to enable them to be in ministry. And sometimes grants are made to ecumenical alliances for specific purposes, and occasionally to outside the second state of the second budget, over 681 of that budget goes for personnel, about half of which comes from local church or designated Advance Special gifts. When you look at the total expenditures for the entire General Board of Global Ministries for 1986, of \$187,451,527, a major part of that total comes from designated gifts which must be spent as directed by for specific purposes. Only a minor portion of the total can be disbursed for grants and gifts by the GRCM.

It should be noted that the General Board of Global Ministries has a responsibility to be in mission all over the world. It is often misguoted and knowledge reaching us through the media is not always accurate. In some cases, missionaries on site have knowledge that they can convey back to the General Board that never gets mentioned in the media.

The National Division information was shared with us by Kim Jefferson, a native of this conference, on behalf of the Associate General Secretary Rene O. Bideaux. He pointed out that the National Division is not a foundation, it is a missionary agency and in almost every case grants that are made by the National Division are now made in consultation with the Bishop of the Area, with the Council on Ministries through the Council Director, and through the Board of Global Ministries of the Annual Conference. They find it helpful to challenge the local churches and conferences to become involved in the mission so they use the partnership approach. Thus many of the grants that are given nationally are given in conjunction with annual conferences. There is a gap and some disagreement on empowering the courch to impact the political process. One question raised is about money given for voter registration. The money was given to be used for a part of the population that is not active in the political process and a group that very much needs the support of governments to deal with their needs, particularly in poverty areas. One strategy to help the people become empowered was to recruit them to get out and vote, not for any particular party but to vote for issues and people who meet the issues that would solve some of their problems.

In the preparation of missionary personnel, as Jo Marris reported to us, United Methodist have a gap in interpretation and using the Scriptures and their ability to witness and to use Christian discipline. It is true that many of the folks now coming out of seminaries and wanting to go in the mission field need training in the areas of Biblical studies that have not been mission training, center and all missionaries must now have a course in Biblical theology and United Methodist History and Polity.

The Women's Division reported to us that most of their money is distributed through the World and National Divisions. They do, however, have the interest-on-principle of moneys that have been given to designated causes. Some of this is given through the World and National Divisions and some of it can be made in direct grants, but these are usually small gifts. They pointed out that the Call to Prayer Offering is generally used for grants that would meet the these that is proposed each year when the offering is taken. The criteria for which grants are to be made are set by the Directors of the Division and the grants are usually one-time grants with some special action.

The Treasurer's office, Health and Welfare and the United Methodist Committee on Relief were also present at this meeting. We did not have time, the hours we were there, to hear from all of these persons individually, but there was a lengthy discussion especially with the World Division about the grants that they make.

In every case it appears that the Board of Global Ministries is genuinely trying to reach people with their needs. As Dr. Nugent explained to us, in many cases the United Methodist Church has entered into both sides of a political struggle, especially in places like Africa where our church has been in a large measure responsible for much of the education of the people. As a result we can often cross lines back and forth and talk to people where neither government systems or local people can do so. In doing this, we can stay out of political stystems to which our people are being exposed. Andes of political struggles that are going on in Africa today. The General Board consults with United Methodists, autonnous Methodists and other churches in a country before engagin in a ministry. Sometimes for reasons of conscience, it may not always carry out its ministry in accordance with those churches vishes.

Where there are hungry children, where there are children that are being abused, where there are children of war, where there are refugees, we are going to meet the mission needs. We are going to be the church of Jesus Christ wherever we can be. It is sometimes interpreted that we are taking sides in partisan political struggles, but that is not how our Church sees it. We are to be in mission to the world and in so doing, we may sometimes step behind political lines that might not meet someone glee's political philosophy. The Church has got to get beyond the philosophies of various political systems and see itself as a ministering servant of God to all people of the world. Wherever there is hurt or injustice, that is the place where the Church needs to be.

We discovered that as a committee we, in many ways, reflect the diversity which is representative of our denomination in our understanding of missional problems. We generally approve of the vast majority of grants and that they do reflect the nature of our here the state of the state of the state of the state of the improvement of their accountability systems the last guideennium and we look forward to continued improvement.

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Directors make decisions on a basis of information received from Area Secretaries and Staff. It is our expectation that these persons will do an adequate task of research, realizing there may always be some margin for errors in evaluation.

We note that there are different ways in which funding is accomplished, e.g. Women's Division, Advance Specials, World Service, etc. Most of the grants that are controversial represent a very small segment of the overall giving patterns. There probably is going to be continued controversy because there are different Christian understandings of how we are going to be involved in social concerns.

We also want to note that the funding procedures of the GBGM are related to the overall goals of the Board and that these procedures are now so in place that Directors have a handle on how the moneys are divided among those goals to be expended. The four goals are:

 Witness to the Gospel for an initial decision to follow Jesus Christ.

Strengthen, develop and renew Christian congregations and communities.

3. To alleviate human suffering.

4. To seek justice, freedom and peace.

Finally, we support wholeheartedly the mission program of the church. If churches are concerned about controversial issues, we recommend that they raise them with our Conference Missions Secretary or our two Directors on the General Board of Global Ministries. We recommend that we back the program of the General Board of Global Ministries as the Mission-arm of the church. We recognize that there will be controversial areas in which some may not be comfortable in supporting certain projects, but the supporting of our missionaries ought to be expanded and continued. We invite questions from any local church and our experience in this venture tells us that our General Board of Global Ministries is willing and ready to explain its stance on any project it has undertaken.

### REPORT OF CONFERENCE CONGREGATIONAL DEVELOPMENT SURVEY

Journals from past Annual Conferences are filled with evidence of the concern Peninaula United Methodist Church leaders have had for Congregational Development. Always aware of changing and growing population The United Methodist Church has been ready to meet the spiritual needs of people where ever they are found. Even though the financial burden is heavier and population changes more difficult to track, the Peninsula Conference is still concerned to meet people where they live to provide for spiritual nurture.

This concern to provide for spiritual nurture was the motivation for a very informal meeting in the Spring of 1983. The meeting was called to discuss the possibility of developing a new congregation in a very rapidly changing area of New Castle County, Delaware. As the people attending this meeting began talking to other Conference members about the exciting possibility of a new congregation, it became evident many people saw other areas of the Peninsula Conference with as great if not greater potential for dev conference wet the many challenges with limited resources? It was determined there were many areas with potential for new or redeveloped ministry, but how could we discover them and how could it be determined which should be given the greatest attention and supported with our

### resources?

It came to the attention of the Conference Board of Global Ministries that a study had been developed by the General Board of Global Ministries, Congregational Development Program Management Unit that could help us discover answers to the questions being asked. The General Board was contacted and asked to lead us in a study of dur Conference to evaluate where our greatest meets foongregational Development Study was conducted in the Peninsula Conference during the 1985-86 Conference year.

Each of our four districts organized a District Study Team that met to learn the process we would be following in our study for the next tem months. Each Team was responsible for the study and gathering of details for their respective district. Materials gathered and used were: census data, census tract maps, Annual Conference statistical reports, city/county population data and projections, city/county planning boards projections and highway department plans and projections. There were also questionnaises place. There were interviews with individual clergy, laity and churches. All of this dats gathering and evaluation took place under the guidance of the Congregational Development Program Management unit of the General Board of Global Ministries.

After all the data was gathered, evaluated and discussed; after interview sere held and conversations completed, each District Study Team met to determine the needs for new church development or church redevelopment on their particular District. These needs were evaluated and discussed and prioritized for each of the four representative from each Team was then asked to meet with the Cabiner where each District would present their determined Congregational Development needs. This meeting was conducted by the Rev. Russ Narris from the Congregational Development Program Management Unit of the General Board of Global Ministries. After each District had presented their findings and allowed to defend their choice a list of priorities was developed for our Annual Conference from all the determined from the Conference Congregational Development Study are listed in two categories:

Please note the numbering of these priorities does not necessitate the completion of one project before another one can be begun. Nor does it deny the possibility of beginning a lowered numbered priority, if it is advisable and the lowered numbered priority is ready to begin. For example, if the Kirkwood Relocation project has advanced sufficiently to warrant greater attention it could become the number one project although not the number one priority. It should also be noted the first four priorities under Church Redevelopment are specifically regarding Ethnic Minority Congregations.

Someone is bound to ask the question, "Why isn't my church or my area mentioned as a changing area with development potential?" This study was looking for areas of new church development or redevelopment and did not consider areas where ministry was adequately meeting the changing needs. For example, the growing the ministry already begun in that area. Likewise, the area of Ocean Pines is not mentioned in this report because there is a new congregation established in that area at present.

Of course it does not need to be said, but will be said any way, this is a report of the findings determined by a Conference Congregational Development Study. The priorities are presented as Annual Conference priorities established by the combined District to happen, it will take the work and commitment of our whole Peningula Annual Conference.

# Review of Wesley College

The 1986 Peninsula Annual Conference requested that the Monitoring Committee of the Commission on Religion and Race again review Wesley College as it its progress in developing an inclusive community. In order to follow-up that request, the Committee engaged in the following:

 Met with President Reed Stewart and members of his faculty and staff.

2. Met with four ethnic students presently attending Wesley College.

3. Interviewed two ethnic alumni of the college.

4. Interviewed two members of the Board of Trustees.

#### MEETING WITH PRESIDENT STEWART AND FACULTY/STAFF

On November 11, 1986, four members of the Monitoring Committee (Rev. Nathaniel Hiller, Rev. Dr. Fred Wood, Verdie Page and Doris Fhillips) met with Dr. Reed Stewart and seven members of his staff and faculty. The discussions, which focused on progress experienced in implementing recommendations suggested by the Monitoring Committee in 1983, were open and mutually beneficial. The following observations were noted:

 There has been an increase in the number of black students in 1986 - from 9.1% of student body to 10%.
 Of 46 faculty/staff positions, there are 7 blacks, 3 asians, and 1 native american.

- a. Staff 1 black, 1 asian
- b. Support staff (security and secretary) 3 blacks, 1 native american

3. In order to recruit black staff/faculty, the college used the Chronicle of Higher Education, newspapers, area grad schools.

Lower salaries continue to be an inhibiting factor in recruiting. Also, a person's race cannot be requested on the phone or in an application.

 Effort is being made to write and develop an Affirmative Action Plan. Request was made for a copy of the Peninsula Conference Affirmative Action Plan.

5. There is appropriate black representatives on the Board of Trustees - 3 of 29.

6. Faculty and staff felt there were not any race relations problem on campus at present.

7. Events sponsored by the Afro-American Club have attendance comparable to other events.

# INTERVIEW WITH STUDENTS

Two male and two female ethnic students were interviewed by the Monitoring Committee during the afternoon of November 11th. Rev. Dr. Robert Price, Chaplain, arranged the meeting.

The students shared openly and readily of their feelings about Wesley College. Most were pleased with a small college. All agree that there were not any race relations problems existing on campus at that time. Frustrations expressed did not seem to be motivated by racial experiences. Of two incidents shared, the students felt they could/could not have been caused by prejudices.

However, the students did express a desire to have a black faculty/staff person they could related to, someone who understands their ethnic roots, someone who could counsel.

### INTERVIEW WITH ALUMNI

Two black alumni living in the area were interviewed concerning their experience at Wesley. Both had attended when the percentage of ethnic students was lower. However, both reflected on very positive experiences with students and faculty, and were able to transfer to other colleges with little difficulty.

One student did comment that "things were better when her sister attended for there were more ethnics." In addition, another commented that he had felt a need for a black faculty presence -that it would have been very helpful.

### INTERVIEW - MEMBERS OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES

The Trustees felt that movement towards a more inclusive community meeds the leadership and presence of black faculty members. It was affirmed, however, that lower salaries were a problem. It is hoped that an increase in salaries can be achieved within the next two years, at least, to reach the average level of that offered at other schools.

# RECOMMENDATIONS

After considering the information learned in the interviews, the following recommendations were suggested:

 The top priority remains to recruit additional black faculty members. Even though there are some blacks in responsible positions, the need remains for ethnics in upper level, highly visible positions. Role modeling is an important motivating factor for black students. In addition, a multi-ethnic community is enriching to all those who experience it. Three suggestions are offered:

- a. Ask for personal interview. It is felt that if some blacks could see Wesley and realize the importance of role modeling and relations to black students, they would be willing to sacrifice larger salaries.
- Contact traditionally black grad schools for possible staff.
- c. Offer a part-time counselling position to a retired black educator in the Dover area. The General Board of Higher Education is compiling a list of retired educators. They could be contacted for this list in the near future.
- Related to the above is the suggestion to develop/finalize an Affirmative Action Plan that is consistent with that of the Peninsula Annual Conference.
- Continue to intentionally recruit black students. Even though the percentage has increased, the overall number could be higher.

### CONCLUSION

President Stewart and his faculty/staff are to be commended for the leadership they have provided Wesley in enabling them to achieve financial stability. Simultaneously, Wesley has proceeded to move from a junior College status to offering four-year degrees.

In addition, there are many signs that Wesley is indeed becoming an inclusive community. Both faculty/staff and students suggest that racial incidents and problems are few. All, indeed, seem committed to this goal. However, there is room for continued growth in this area and we feel the suggestions included in this report can contribute to that progress.

### Conference Council on Ministries

### Introduction

The Monitoring Committee is pleased to report that the overall results of our monitoring of the Conference Council on Ministries have been highly favorable. The monitoring process was carried out through an exhaustive questionnaire which provided information for monitoring both the C.C.O.M. Administrative Staff and the Council itself. Both of these areas were monitored as to Affirmative Action compliance, job positions and pay scales, recruitment policies, racial inclusiveness, job orientation, performance twol membership on boards and agencies, program goals for inclusiveness, and inclusiveness in communications. It is the conclusion of the committee that the C.C.O.M. does intentionally address the problem of inclusiveness of minority members.

# The Administration of the C.C.O.M.

Until this year, the administration staff was all white. When a job position became available, the Council Director intentionally interviewed only minority applicants, as an implementation of our Affirmative Action Policy. A black staff person was hired and has fit into the work staff congenially and productively. The recruitment policies seem to be functioning well, as do the orientation and evaluation of employees.

# The Council of the C.C.O.M.

The Monitoring committee finds no evidence of exclusion in the GC.G.O.M. membership. The Committee emphasizes the necessity of considering all hit; and graces that a person has, when executive and lendership positions become available. The Executive Committee seems to be acceptably well balanced, tacially, as determined by the Monitoring Committee. In terms of the boards and agencies, blacks have all too seldom held positions of chairpersons. They have only served as vice-chairpersons or in lesser positions. The Monitoring Committee vould like to see this situation remedied. Also, it has been noted that hardly any black pastors are on the C.C.O.M. To date there is one staff member and four consultants who

As far as C.C.O.H. programs, the Monitoring Committee realizes that E.M.C.C. has been our guadrennial emphasis for the past two quadrennia. However, we still must question the impact that this has had upon members of local white churches as to racial inclusiveness. How much have attitudes of raciam actually been changed? How many donated the state of the state of the state of the state of the state on conscientionally seeking racial inclusiveness.

C.C.O.M. programs appear to be inclusive, but there have been concerns and problems voiced. For example, are blacks involved in both the scheduling and designing of meetings? And, in some cases, are the ethnic vice-presidents just there to balance the ratios? These are questions we would like our Nominating Committees to deal with in the future.

### Recommendations of the Monitoring Committee of the C.C.O.M.

We recommend that the other minority groups be represented on the C.C.O.M. as well as blacks.

We recommend that ethnic leadership of the boards and agencies be increased.

We recommend that there be more black pastors on the C.C.O.M.

We recommend that ethnic churches recommend quality ethnic leaders to the Conference Nominating Committee.

We recommend that the C.C.O.M. staff train and orient new leadership on the boards and agencies with emphasis on jobs, goals and affirmative action and inclusiveness.

The Monitoring Committee of the Conference Commission on Religion and Race is pleased to submit this report based upon our monitoring of the C.C.O.M. We are pleased to be a part of our great church body, and wish to function in love and unity together, to bring all members together in equality and love, under the head, Christ Jesus our Lord.

### Introduction

In its review of Peninsula United Methodist Homes, the Monitoring Committee considered data gathered from questionnaires, and from meetings with the President and Directors of the Homes. Prior to submitting a final report, the Committee met again with Rev. Richard Staresky and Mrs. Maoni Winchester. From that data, the Committee observed that the Corporation is providing outstanding concern, however, were moted. Following are observations and recommendations in these areas:

AFFIRMATIVE ACTION PROGRAM: The Committee observed that the Affirmative Action Program has been revised. The use of minority vendors is commended.

# Recommendation

The Committee suggests the plan be revised to include measurable goals (numbers are not requested). This is necessary in order to implement the Affirmative Action Plan of the Conference Council on Ministries.

RECRUITMENT AND EMPLOYMENT: Of the 635 employees of PUMH, 269 or 334 are minorities. With the exception of three managerial positions, and two administrative positions and one Consultant, minorities are employed in lower level food and health service areas. Efforts have been made to locate qualified minority employees through advertisement in the media, and presentations at vocational schools and employment opportunity events. In second the second second second second second second education. This enables persons to qualify for job advancement. Higher pay scales for comparable jobs, no doubt, motivates qualified persons to seek employment elsewhere.

The new position of Aging Ministries Consultant, now being filled by an ethnic, is indeed a step that can bridge many gaps. As she assists local churches in developing ministries with, by and for the elderly, there can be improved, two-way, personal communication.

Discussions can clarify what the homes have to offer potential residents, information on scholarship, and employment opportunities. In addition, the quarterly newsletter can channel information directly to local churches.

# Recommendations

More minorities need to be recruited into supervisory and administrative positions for four reasons:

- 1. the United Methodist Church is an inclusive institution;
- minorities in decision-making positions encourage other minorities to seek employment with Peninsula United Methodist Homes;
- minorities in decision-making positions also provide an inclusive environment that can contribute to cross-racial and cultural enrichment, both for staff and residents;
- to eliminate the stereotyping of minorities into service only positions
  - a) The Committee has learned that the State of Delaware asks for race on its employment applications. The applicant is not required to state his/her race, but

can volunteer the information as a way of helping to implement affirmative action policies.

- b) FOMH needs to expand its educational incentives in employment opportunities to include churches especially minority churches. Perhaps an information event for Health and Welfare and/or Mission Chairpersons, could help inform members of the potential opportunities and rewards for service in the "caring" fields.
- c) Broader publicity is needed for position advertisement. The whole peninsula needs to be reached. Use of articles is suggested in addition to "listings." Conference and District newspapers and newsletters could be used. Young people graduating move to another stres. employment, often are seasy to
- d) Government related training programs need to be investigated, as they can be a source of qualified persons.
- e) DUMH meeds to take informed risks with respect to minority employment, giving persons the opportunity to qualify while on the job. As long as persons understand and are informed of the reality, risks are slight. Giving persons opportunity to up-date their skills on the job can be effective affirmative action.
- Intentional, on-going human relations training is suggested for all personnel. The Story of 0 is a recommended resource. A copy is in the Conference Library.

RECRUITMENT OF RESIDENTS: Of the 899 residents in PUMH, one is ethnic. There have been intentional efforts made by some minority pastors to recruit residents. Even though scholarships are available, these efforts to recruit have not been successful. Minorities do not see the homes as an option for them.

There are questions concerning the basic role and function of the homes. Culturally, ethnics feel abandoned if placed in a home. If they have accumulated property, they are pleased with the sense of ownership and want to pass it on to their children.

In addition, there exists anxiety within the minority community concerning whether they will be mistreated. The homes are viewed by some as being built exclusively for the white population. Can this stimma be removed?

### Recommendations: a. Fourte

Fourtheen percent of our Annual Conference members are minority persons who support Conference programs. The homes need to serve these persons. The Committee commends the homes for their Mission Statement, New Yenture Policy the homes for the theory of the commission of the theory of the need, awareness of the Church's responsibility and mission, and creative vision.

There is a need, however, for an expanded program of resident recruitment focusing on minority churches. This plan could include use of the Communicator, District newsletter, direct mailings to Health and Welfare persons, and cluster discussions with administrators. Tours could be offered for Health and Welfare persons. Educational slides could be developed and shared. These efforts could help address the apprehension felt by some persons with respect to the homes.

b. It is further recommended that PUMH proceed with the implementation of the Strategic Plan. Programs are especially meded to offer housing and in-home services to elderly who do not wish to become residents of the present homes. Results of the surveys, now being conducted by the provide. can indicate appropriate services PUMH can

COKESBURY VILLAGE: Special concern needs to be expressed for Cokesbury Village with respect to its minority resident and employee status. Compared to the other two homes, Cokesbury has the largest number of employees, and the lowest percentage of minority employment. Further, there are no minority residents.

During the 1973 Annual Conference, an addendum to the Pre-Conference Report of Peninsula United Methodist Homes and Hospitals was approved. (Journal of Peninsula Annual Conference, 1973, pg. 197) Included in this report was the following, related to Cokesbury Village:

> "We, therefore, request permission from the Annual Conference to proceed with the proposal when plans and financing have been approved... and that a program of information and recruitment racial, ethnic, and economic mix related to an inclusive community."

A fund was to be established to enable an inclusive comunity. Although the Village is financially secure, the fund has never been established. PUMH apparently failed to honor its commitment to the minority community.

Cokesbury Village remains open for any resident desiring to live there. However, for fiscal reasons, scholarships will not be offered for this residence. Two persons can be supported in the other homes for what it costs to support one resident in Cokesbury. PUMH management feels this is the most economic use of funds.

As an alternative choice for low income elderly, PUMH Trustees have begun negotiations with the Board and owners of the Layton Nome in Wilsington. This is an ethnic nursing home that has encountered multiple problems. PUMH hopes to develop a management of the the Layton NomeDoard, be a sound, operational basis.

# Recommendation:

If the 1973 Annual Conference resolution is not to be enforced, other programs should be developed, in addition to the Layton Home, to service the minority community. It is suggested that the concept of "shared housing" be explored as a possible alternative to the homes.

### Conclusion:

The Monitoring Committee wishes to affirm it was, indeed,

impressed with pupy, its administration, its new Consultant program, and its services. Our concerns focus on the fact that we need to be background. The Homes have not been able to do this. The Missional Priority of our church is to strengthem ethnic churches, to enable thes to be in mission and ministry. The Consultant's work focuses on this concern. However, another part of the prior programs, services of ministics to "all" our members. In light of this, we question the validity of continuing to build homes only for persons in the upper economic levels.

As outlined above, we are suggesting expanded plans be developed for employee and resident recruitments simultaneously, plans need to proceed for offering alternative care for elderly, not now being served by PUMM. The Board of Trustees, which has five minority members, can be instrumented in developing these plans.

In closing, we express appreciation to the Homes' administrators for the detailed information supplied, and for sharing helpfully in our discussions. Special thanks are offered to Richard Stazesky whose vision and sensitivity to met needs are an inspiration to us all.



# IX. Conference Rules of Order

- Rule 1: The Conference shall convene and adjourn at the discretion of the presiding Bishop and the Committee on Conference Arrangements. The Conference in plenary session may alter the time of convening or adjourning.
- Rule 2: The President shall decide all questions of order, subject to an appeal to the Conference; but in case of such an appeal the question shall be taken without debate, except that the appellant may make a simple statement of the grounds of his/her appeal.
- Rule 3: All resolutions, motions, amendments, and substitute motions presented at the Annual Conference shall be submitted to the Secretary in writing at the time they are made or as soon thereafter as possible.
- Rule 4: When a motion is made and seconded, or a resolution is introduced and seconded, or a report presented and read by the Secretary, or stated by the President, it shall be deemed in possession of the Conference; but any motion or resolution may be withdrawn by the mover, with the consent of the Conference, at any time before amendment or decision.
- Rule 5: No new motion or resolution shall be entertained until the one under consideration has been disposed of, which may be done by adoption or rejection, unless one of the following motions shall intervene which shall have precedence in the order in which they are placed, namely:

To fix the time in which the Conference shall adjourn.
 To take a recess.
 To lay on the Table.
 For the previous question.

- 6. To postpone to a given time.
- 7. To refer.
- 8. To substitute.
- 9. Amendment.
- 10. To postpone indefinitely.
- Rule 6: A motion to amend shall be in order, and a substitute for both amendments may be received which substitute may be amended only once, and if a substitute be accepted, it shall operate as an amendment to the original proposition.
- Rule 7: When a member is about to speak in debate, or to deliver any matter to the Conference, she/he shall rise and respectfully address the President, but shall not proceed until recognized by him/her.
- Rule 8: No member shall be interrupted while speaking except by the President to call him/her to order when she/he departs from the question, or uses personalities or d' language; but any member may call the President to the subject when she/he order, and any member may explain wh herself/himself misrepresented.

- Rule 9: When a member desires a question of privilege, she/he shall biely state the question; but it shall not be in order for her/him to proceed until the President shall have decided it a privileged question.
- Rule 10: No person shall speak more than twice on the same question, nor more than ten minutes at one time, without leave of the Conference; nor shall any person speak more than once until every member choosing to speak shall have spoken.
- Rule 11: When any motion or resolution shall have been acted by the Conference, it shall be in order for any member who voted with the prevailing side to move a reconsideration; but a motion to reconsider is a non-debatable motion and shall be decided without debate.
- Rule 12: No member shall absent herself/himself from the sessions of the Conference without leave, unless she/he is sick or unable to attend.
- Rule 13: No member shall be allowed to vote on any question who is not within the bar of the Conference at the time when such question shall be put by the President, except by leave of the Conference when such member has been necessarily absent.
- Rule 14: Every member who is within the bar at the time a question is put shall give his/her vote, unless the Conference, for special reason, shall excuse him/her.
- Rule 15: It shall be in order for him/her to move that the question be taken without further debate on any measure pending, except in cases in which character is involved, and if sustained by two-thick, the question shall be taken.
- Rule 16: The motion to adjourn shall be taken without debate, and shall always be in order, except, (1) when a member has the floor; (2) when a question is actually put, or a vote is being taken; (3) when the question is pending or seconding the demand for the previous question; (4) when the previous question has been called and sustained, and is still pending; and (5) when a motion to adjourn has been negatived and no business or debate has intervened.
- Rule 17: All reports of the Boards, Commissions, and Committees shall be published and mailed to meabers of the Annual Conference ten (18) days prior to the date of meeting of the Annual Conference. Reports to be included in this mailing must in the hands of the Secretary by the date set annually by the Conference Council on Ministries.
- Rule 18: No report shall be received or adopted by the Conference until a copy has been placed in the hands of the Secretary.
- Rule 19: These rules shall not be suspended or amended except by a vote of two-thirds of the members present and voting.
- Rule 28: All materials to be published in the Journal shall be in the hands of the Conference Secretary not later than 14 days following the adjournment of the Annual Session or they shall be excluded, the date to be part of the Organizational motion of the Annual Conference.

- Rule 21: The Nominating Committee shall distribute colling i report to the Annual Conference on the day before the report is to be voted on by the Annual Conference.
- Rule 22: Recommendations as to change in policy regarding data to be included in the Journal shall be determined by the journal Committee and submitted to the Annual Conference for action.
- Rule 23: With the exception of the Board of Ordained Ministry, no member of any Board, Division, Committee, or Commission shall serve more than two consecutive quadrennia on said Board, Division, Committee, or Commission, and shall be ineligible to be re-elected until after one quadrennium has elapsed except members of board, committees or commissions elected for three-year terms may serve three consecutive terms and shall be ineligible to be re-elected until after one term has lapsed and except that when a member is elected to fill an unexpired quadrennium or term she/he may complete the unexpired quadrennium or term and serve not more than one additional consecutive quadrennium or term. Persons elected to the Board of Ordained Ministry may serve eight (8) years regardless of what year in the quadrennium they begin serving. No member of the Conference, lay or ministerial, shall be elected to serve on more than two Boards, Divisions, Committees, or Commissions concurrently, except the committees elected or appointed for the Annual Conference session only, district committees whether or not elected by the Annual Conference and the quadrennial committee of the local church. The distribution of membership shall be according to districts, three lay persons and three ministers as nearly as possible to each district.
- Rule 24: Lay members of the Annual Conference will be elected quadrennially. A lay member may be re-elected for another quadrennium but must wait one quadrennium before being eligible for election for a third term.

Rule 25: In order to achieve balanced membership in the Annual Conference, the Conference Secretary shall report quadrennially the number of lay persons required to preserve equality of membership, and that the Peninsula Conference achieve the desired equality of membership, by (1) the Associate Lay Leader of Life and Work, the four District Lay Leaders, the four District Presidents of the United Methodist Women, all United Methodist Deaconesses active and retired within the bounds of the Peninsula Annual Conference, all certified Directors of Christian Education employed by churches of the Peninsula Annual Conference, and all other voting lay persons of the Conference Council on Ministries, shall be members in the Annual Conference with vote; (2) each pastoral charge enrolling more than 500 members, but having only one clergy member appointed to it, may elect one additional lay member, and further, that a pastoral charge having more than one clergy member appointed to it may elect one additional lay member, provided that more than 1,500 members are enrolled; and (3) the Conference Council on Youth Ministries shall elect as many youth members as needed to maintain a balance, divided equally among the districts.

- Rule 26: All budget requests must be referred to the Council on Finance and Administration prior to Annual Conference action.
- Rule 27: All statistical material for inclusion in the Statistical Tables to be printed in the Annual Journal must be in by January 36 or it will not be included.
- Rule 28: In Resping with paragraph 744 in the 1984 Book of Discipling which states "A District Conference shall be held if directed by the Annual canfer the district superintendent, which call shall specify time and place," a district superintendent my call a District Conference with the consent of the presiding Bishop and the District Lay Leader. This rule will be reviewed quadrennially at the Annual Conference following each session of the Northeastern Jurisdictional Conference.
