





RULES AND GUIDELINES FOR THE CONFERENCE NOMINATING COMMITTEE

.

- That the Peninsula Conference again record its faith in the Principle of Rotation and adherence to the Book of Discipline of The United Methodist Church.
- 2. That the Nominating Committee be composed of the Cabinet, the Conference Secretary, the Conference Lay Leader, the Lay Leader of each District, the Conference President of United Methodist Men, a representative selected by the United Methodist Women Executive Committee, the District Fresidents of United Methodist Women, a youth selected by the Conference Footh Council, off or a quadrennium by the respective District Ministerium, and the Conference Council Director.
- 3. That, since the quadrennial system is an established part of the United Methodist economy, all members of boards, commissions, and committees shall be elected for a quadrennium unless restricted by Discipline, charter, or some other legal requirement. In the event of such legal restrictions, the Principle of Rotation is still to be observed. That for the 1988-93 time period, persons elected to Boards and Agencies of the Peninsula Annual Conference at the Annual Conference at the Annual Conference at the Annual Conference of the Peninsula Annual Information (Phis change in rules for this one time period, only, will bring the next change in leadership in 1993 following the Jurisdictional Conference of 1992 when Episcopal leadership changes occur.)
- 4. That no member of any board, committee, or commission shall serve more than two consecutive quadrennia on said board, committee or commission and shall not be eligible to be reelected until after one quadrennium has elapsed, except members of boards, committees, or commissions elected for three-year terms may serve three consecutive terms and shall be ineligible to be re-elected until after one term has elapsed and except that, when a member is elected to fill an unexpired quadrennium or term and serve not more than one additional consecutive quadrennium or term.
- 5. That no member of the Conference, lay or ministerial, shall serve on more than two boards, commissions, or committees concurrently. Ex-officio membership on conference boards or agencies in excess of two shall count toward the total of two nor counted in the above total: district committees or system or counted in the above total: district committees or system secretaries, Wesley College Trustees, Board of Directors of the Wesley Poundations, Board of Trustees of Peninsula United Methodist Homes, Inc., the Episcopal Residence Committee, and Ordained Hindstry, the Nominating Committee is to request the courtesy of the bishop to inform it as to those persons who will be named to the Board of Ordained Ministry, in order to assist the Nominating Committee in equal distribution of responsibility on the part of the property of the bishop to inform all distribution of responsibility on the courtesy of the bishop to inform the study of the property of the bishop to inform the study of the property of the study of the study of the property of the study of

- 6. Insofar as possible, the membership on Councils, Boards, and Agencies of the Annual Conference shall include one-third clergy, one-third laywomen, and one-third laymen, in keeping with policies for general church agencies, except for the Board of Ordained Ministry.
- 7. That ministerial membership on Annual Conference boards and agencies shall be limited to Conference members and associate members of the Peninsula Annual Conference. In order to be eligible to serve on the Conference boards and agencies, lay members shall be members of a local church adapticity and the conference of the Conferen
- 8. "In recognition of the Rights of the Aging" as stated in the Social Creed of the United Methodist Church (Page 92 of the Discipline), age shall not be a barrier to serve on any board, council, or agency of the Annual Conference. However, the Conference Mominating Committee shall give careful attention to opportunity for service.
- 9. That a conscientious effort shall be made to distribute membership geographically. No fixed number shall be assigned, however, to any one district, since this could become artificial and impractical. Consideration shall be given to the inclusion of lay and clergy persons from small membership churches.
- 18. That the Cabinet select only one representative from the Cabinet to serve on a Conference board and all the divisions of the board, and one cabinet representative each on all other support agencies except where the Discipline states otherwise.
- 11. That failure to attend the particular board or agency to which one is assigned for at least one called meeting during the year, without written explanation, or statement of intended activity to the chairperson of that board or agency, one will be subject to automatic removal in the next nominating committee's report. A report of the board or agency chairperson to the secretary of the Conference Nominating Committee by March 1st will include the attendance record of this board, committee or agency.
- 12. That the Conference Nominating Committee designate persons to serve as a Nominating Committee for the Boards, Commissions and Committees. The District Superintendent assigned to the agency is the convenor of this committee. The nominating committee shall be prepared at the organization meeting to nominate officers for the quadrennium for any that have not so designated their own by April 15th.
- That the date of election to any board, commission or committee be clearly indicated in the journal.
- 14. That in every case a nominee of any board, commission or committee shall be notified and consent to serve before the name is placed before the Conference. When vacancies occur in the report, nominations may be made from the floor, provided that the nominee is present and agrees to serve.
- 15. That recognizing again the belief in the principle of rotation in order to involve greater leadership, all district committees and officers shall be elected to four-year terms with a maximum of eight years and persons shall be ineligible for re-election until after a four-year term has elapsed, with the exception of

the District Committee of Ordained Ministry and the District Committee on Church Building and Location which shall serve a minimum of four years and a maximum of eight years.

R.

Concerning the Nominating Committee, its report and the securing of talent:

- That the report of the Nominating Committee at the Annual Conference session will reflect a complete adherence to all the quidelines established by the Annual Conference.
- The Nominating Committee shall distribute mimeographed copies of its report to the Annual Conference on the day before the report is to be voted on by the Conference.
- 3. That forms shall be circulated for both ministers and laity in local churches to indicate areas of interest, thus creating a Talent Bank. In addition, the same form shall be sent to the members of the Cabinet, Board of Laity, Conference United Methodist Women, Executive Committee, and Conference Youth Council in order to obtain names that might otherwise be overlooked. These forms shall be returned to the secretary of the Conference Nominating Committee.
- 4. That a complete file of all ministers in the Conference should be kept indicating where each one is serving in terms of Conference boards and agencies. Laity should likewise be listed on a similar file. A third file would be divided between ministers and laity as part of the Conference Talent Bank.
- 5. That a minimum of four meetings per year should be held by the Nominating Committee (it may be advisable that the committee meet more often, since its influence is so broad; whenever the committee approaches a new quadrennium, this latter need for additional meetings may be more evident).
- That the above adopted guidelines for the Nominating Committee of the Annual Conference shall become a printed part of its report at each Annual Conference session.
- 7. That at the beginning of a new quadrennium, a complete and open look at membership on all boards and agencies shall be initiated by the Conference Nominating Committee and all personnel shall be eliquible for re-alignment in accordance with A-5.
- Titles such as "Mrs," "Miss," or "Mr." shall not be used in the preparation of the Nominating Committee report.

Miscellaneous

 That the council director, and associate council directors, not be elected to boards and agencies under the Conference rotation, but serve only as ex-officio where assigned by the council director. 2. That two (2) high school youth (preferably 18th and 11th grades) shall be members of the following boards, divisions and committees: Commission on Christian Unity & Interreligious Concerns, Division of Education, Division of Evangelism, Concerns, Division of Evangelism, Division of Section of Evangelism, Data of Church and Society, Division of Career Planning and Counseling, Division of Worship, Conference Council on Ministries, Board of Laity, Conference Mominating Committee, and Committee on Conference arrangements. These shall be selected by the Conference Youth Council each year.

Others may want to take this route and we outline here the steps involved in case you may not be aware of the procedure.

(1) All salary and conference apportionments are removed. (2) The church drops out of the listing of churches to which pastors are assigned. (4) HE CHANCH GROUP OUT OF THE HISTORY OF CHANCHES tO which pastors are assigned.
(Ne urge the conference to begin a listing of such churches in the journal with
the charge conference where they are to report each year. This will allow for
proper records and constitutions the historic continuity of these churches.)
The only services to be held are weddings, funetals, or special occasions.

(4) One or more special services a year may be held with the offering received to be

used for the upkeep of the building.

(5) The remaining members are transferred to a nearby United Methodist Church for

regular worship and church involvement.

- (6) The remaining members become a special committee under the charge conference to plan with the pastor for weddings, fumerals, and special days. They also present a written report each year as to services held, money received and how expended, etc.
- (7) This allows the possibility that should population shifts bring people into the area we would simply resume regular services.

THE PROCESS OF MAKING APPOINTMENTS

Par. 57, Article X - The bishops shall appoint, after consultation with the district superintendents, ministers to the charges; and they shall have such responsibilities and authorities as the General Conference shall prescribe.

Article X, quoted above from the 1984 Discipline, is the primary authority for itinerancy in the Constitution of The United Methodist Church. (The Constitution can only be changed by 2/3 vote of the 74 Annual Conferences. All other Discipline paragraphs quoted in these pages are in Part IV. Organization and Administration, and require only a majority vote of the General Conference to change.) This constitutions of the Conference of Conference and Conference to Change. The Conference of Conference are completed to the Conference of Conference and Conference membership vows, and all United Methodist churches are by covenant and laws occommitted.

Par 436 - The Itinerant System - The itinerant system is the accepted method of The United Methodist Church by which ordained ministers are appointed by the bishops to fields of labor. All ordained ministers shall accept and abide by these appointments.

Par. 529 - Responsibility - Pastors and clergy in appointments beyond the local church shall be appointed by a bishop, who is empowered to make and fix all appointments in the episcopal area within which the ahnual Conference is a part. Appointments are to be made with the consideration of the gifts and graces of those appointed, to the needs, characteristics, and opportunities of congregations and institutions, and with faithfulness to our commitment to an open constitution of the constant of the constan

 $\underline{\text{Par. 412.2}}$ - Both men and women are included in all provisions of the Discipline which refer to the ministry.

Par. 538 - Consultation and Appointment-Making - Consultation is the process whereby the bishop and/or district superintendent confer with the pastor and Pastor-Parish Relations Committee, taking into consideration the criteria of Par. 531, a performance evaluation, and mission of the characteristic conference of the consideration, and mission of the church. Composition to the consideration, and mission of the church. Composition or call of a pastor. Consultation is both a continuing process and a more intense involvement during the period of change in appointment. Consultation is not negotiation or voting upon the appointment of a pastor. It is information sharing and appointment may be cabinet and bishop prior to the bishop's fixing the appointment.

Par 532. - Process of Appointment-Making - 1. A change in appointment may be initiated by a pastor, a Pastor-Parish Relations Committee, a district superintendent, or a bishop.

Pastor-Parish Relations chairpersons and/or pastors are asked to make such requests by using the evaluation form which is required to be sent annually to the district superintendent by January 15th. (See "Timeline for Appointment-Making" - \$2.) The Pastor-Parish Relations Committee is to represent the charge in the appointment-making process. The chairperson is the designated officer

through whom the charge contacts the district superintendent, and through whom the district superintendent contacts the charge.

Par. 532.2 - The Bishop and the Cabinet shall consider all requests for change of appointment in light of the criteria developed for each charge and the gifts and graces, professional experience, and family needs of the pastor.

Par. 532.3 - When a change in appointment has been determined, the district superintendent should meet together or separately with the pastor and the Pastor-Parish Relations Committee where the pastor is serving, for the purpose of sharing the basis for the change and the process used in making the new appointment.

This meeting will provide the pastor the opportunity, in the presence of the district superintendent, to declare his/her acceptance of the change of appointment, stating his/her reasons for responding to the new opportunity and thereby to facilitate the grief process for the pastor and for the congregation.

Par. 532.4 - All appointments shall receive consideration by the bishop and the district superintendent(s) and the Cabinet as a whole until a tentative decision is made.

We interpret this to mean that all appointments require the participation of the entire Cabinet. This is to insure that all ministers of the Conference are considered whenever there is an opening.

Par. 512.5 - The process used in making the new appointment shall include: a) The district superintendent shall confer with the pastor about a specific possible appointment (charge) and its congruence with gifts, graces, professional experience and expectations, and the family needs of the pastor identified in consultation with the pastor (Par. 531.2)

Only "open" charges (churches) shall be considered by the Cabinet. A charge (church) becomes "open" by virtue of its pastor's retirement, change of appointment, leave of absence, sabbatical leave, disability, location, death or withdrawal from the United Methodist ministry. In certain situations the Cabinet, with the written agreement of the situations that the charge "open" for Relations Committee, may declare a charge "open" for appointment purposes.

Par. 532.6 - The district superintendent shall confer with the receiving Pastor-Parish Relations Committee about pastoral leadership (Par. 531.1).

Par. 532.7 - When appointments are being made to less than full-time ministry, the district superintendent shall consult with the minister to be appointed and the Pastor-Parish Relations Committee regarding proportional time, salary, and pension credit.

Par. 532.8 - If during this consultative process it is determined by the bishop and Cabinet that this decision should not be carried out, the process is to be repeated until the bishop, basing his/her decision on the information and advice derived from consultation, makes and fixes the appointment. Par. 532.9 - A similar process of consultation shall be available to persons in appointments beyond the local church.

Par. 532.16 - When the steps in the process have been followed and completed, the announcement of that decision shall be made to all parties directly involved in the consultative process; that is, the appointment Cabinet, the pastor, and the Pastor-Parish Relations Committee (of both charges) before a public announcement is made.

Par. 53] - Criteria - Appointments shall take into account the unique needs of a particular particular stein and also the gifts and graces of a particular pastor. To assist bishops, Cabinets, pastors, and congregations to achieve an effective match of charges and pastors, criteria must be developed an analyzed in each instance and then shared with pastors and congregations.

- Congregations the district superintendent shall develop
 with the pastor and Pastor-Parish Relations Committees of
 all churches profiles reflecting the needs, characteristics,
 and opportunities for mission of the charge consistent with
 the Church's statement of purpose (Par. 526.1). These
 appropriate to include weed annually and updated when
 appropriate to include.
 - The general situation in which a congregation finds itself in a particular setting: size, financial condition, quality of lay leadership, history.
 - The convictional stance of the congregation: theology; prejudices, if any; spiritual life.
- c) The ministry of the congregation among its people for the sake of the community: service programs, basis for adding new members, reasons for losing members, mission to community and world, forms of witness.
 - d) The qualities and functions of pastoral ministry needed to fulfill the mission and goals of the congregation.
- Pastors The district superintendent and the pastor shall identify the pastor's gifts, graces, and professional experience and expectations, and also the needs and concerns of the pastor's spouse and family.
- a) Spiritual and personal sensibility: personal faith, call and commitment to ordained ministry, work through the institutional Church, integration of vocation with personal and family well-being, life style.
 - Academic and career background: nature of theological stance, experience in continuing education, professional experience, record of performance, age.
- c) Skills and abilities in church administration, leadership development, worship, liturgy, preaching and evangelism, teaching and nurturing, counseling and group work, ability to work in cooperation, and ability in self-evaluation, and other relational skills.
- d) Family situation: health and educational needs of the family, and the spouse's career.

Par. 533 - Frequency - While the bishop shall report all pastoral appointments to each regular seasion of an Annual Conference, appointments to charges may be made at any time deemed advisable by the bishop and Cabinet.

Appointments are considered "fixed" until changed. They are reviewed and reported annually but not "made" annually.

Par. 267.2.f.8 - (The duties of the Pastor-Parish Relations Committee shall include the following:) To confer with the pastor and/or other appointed members of the staff if it should become evident that the best interests of the charge and pastor(s) will be served by a change of pastor(s). The committee shall cooperate with the pastor(s), the district superintendent, and the bishop in securing clergy leadership. Its relationship to the district superintendent and the bishop shall be advisory only.

It is also vital that the committee understand that its relationship to the district superintendent and bishop is advisory only, and that it is to represent the needs of the entire charge. Members of the Pastor-Parish Relations Committee must understand how the itinerant system of The responsibilities faithfully.

Par. 26.7.2.e The committee...shall meet only with the knowledge of the pastor and/or the district superintendent. It may meet with the district superintendent without the pastor being present; however, when the pastor is not present, the pastor, or any member of the staff under consideration, shall be informed prior to such a meeting committee or by the district superintendent.

Par. 267.2.f.3 - (The duties of the Pastor-Parish Relations Committee shall include the following:) To evaluate annually the effectiveness of the pastor and staff, based upon criteria, processes, and training developed by the Board of Ordained Ministry and Cabinet (Par. 445), and, where applicable, the Board of Disconal Ministry.

Par. 445 - Evaluation - Evaluation is a continuous process which must take place in a spirit of understanding, acceptance, and with a genuine desire to embody and carry forth more effectively Christ's ministry in the world lest we create defensiveness and discouragement in the Church or in the person being evaluated. Pastoral effectiveness shall be evaluated annually (Par. 267.2 f 31) by the Pastor-Parish Relations Committee and district superintendent by criteria and processes developed by the Board or Carrier and the Cabinet. NOTES ON RETIREMENT

Mandatory Retirement - Pastors who attain the age of 78 before July 1 must retire as of July 1 of that year (Par. 453.1).

Voluntary Retirement - Voluntary retirement is available to those who attain the age of 65 or complete 48 Conference years of service before July 1 (Par. 453.2)

- Voluntary retirement is also available at a reduced annuity rate to those who attain the age of 62 or complete at least 37 Conference years of service before July 1 (Par. 453.2 b).
- A pastor may also retire after 28 Conference years of service with benefits beginning the first of any month after the session of Annual Conference in the year which the minister attains the age of 62 before July 1 (Par. 453.2 a).

ALL MINISTERS WHO QUALIFY FOR VOLUNTARY RETIREMENT MUST INDICATE IN WRITING BY JANUARY 15 THEIR INTENT TO ACTIVATE THIS OPTION; Otherwise, the Cabinet will assume their continued eligibility for appointment. The annual self-evaluation form may be used for this purpose.

TIMELINE POR APPOINTMENT-MAKING

- PALL AND EARLY WINTER: District Superintendents make an informal inventory and evaluation of their charges (churches) and pastors, including a review of the criteria (Par. 531). They are available for consultation (Par. 539) with Pastor-Parish Relations Committees and pastors, and , in some instances, may initiate such contacts. The official contact person for the charge is the chairperson of the charge Pastor-Parish Relations Committee.
- 2. JANUARY 15: DEADLINE FOR REQUESTS for change of appointment, including retirement. By January 15, Pastor-Parish Relations chairpersons and/or pastors are asked to make their requests and recommendations to the Cabinet by using the annual evaluation included (Par. 267.2 f 8). Initiating a request for change is not to be interpreted as an automatic guarantee that a change will be made. All requests will be treated with integrity by the bishop and Cabinet (Par. 532.1). Persons planning retirement must also observe the above date. Notification of Retirement).
- 3. PEBRUARY: Cabinet needs to begin the appointment-making process. Requests for change will be carefully reviewed. When neither the Pastor-Parish Relations Committee nor the pastor has made a request, the Cabinet, however, has the prerogative of initiating changes of appointment which are deemed to be for the good of the charges or the pastors or the program and missional strategy of the Conference.
 - a) "Open" charges (churches) will be determined, (see commentary under Par. 532.5) and the district superintendent will meet with the Pastor-Parish Relations Committee to gather all available data about the charge and its pastoral needs (Pars. 531 & 532.2) and present pastoral support including parsonage compliance with Conference policies.
 - b) The Cabinet determines which available pastor best fits the needs of the charge (Par. 532.2). Note: The present pastor is to remain neutral in all appointment proceedings concerning his/her successor.
 - c) The district superintendent of the "open" charge contacts the prospective pastor and consults with him/her, supplying

essential data and information about the "open" charge, community setting and time frame for the prospective pastor's response.

d) When the pastor-designate is determined, the district superintendent then contacts the chairperson of the Pastor-Parish Relations Committee of the "open" charge and arranges a time for the pastor-designate and the committee to meet. This meeting is an introduction of and to the pastortic than the committee of the pastor of the committee of the pastor of the committee of the pastor of the committee of t

The purpose of the meeting is:

- To aid the district superintendent and the Cabinet, through consultation, in their responsibility to the appointment process.
- To verify the appropriateness of the proposed appointment, matching local needs and pastoral aptitudes.
- To initiate the process of getting acquainted with the pastor-designate.
- To arrange for the moving and receiving of the pastordesignate and his/her family.

The district superintendent will bring the meeting to a close with an appropriate summary of his/her insights and understandings. It is understood that barring prohibiting factors which may become apparent in the conversation with the Pastor-Parish Relations Committee, the pastor-designate will be appointed to the "open" charge.

e) When the results of the meeting have been shared with the Cabinet and the appointment has been fixed by the bishop, public announcements shall be arranged through the office of the district superintendent (Par. 532.18).

NOTE: The meeting of the pastor-designate with the Pastor-Parish Relations Committee may not always be possible for pastors receiving their first appointment following seminary.

- 4. FEBRUARY MAY: Using the above process, the Cabinet will arrange for the appointments to be reported to the Annual Conferences (Par. 532.18). The list of appointments will be published in the Conference paper prior to the Annual Conference session, and publicly announced at the Annual Conference session along with additional changes and corrections.
- 5. JULY 1: Changes of appointment become effective.
- 6. POST-CONFERENCE: The district superintendent will meet with the new pastor and the Pastor-Parish Relations Committee for post-Conference role clarification to help facilitate the new shared ministry of charge and pastor. This meeting will be held at a mutually agreeable time.
- DISTRICT SUPERINTENDENT AVAILABILITY: The district superintendent is available to Pastor-Parish Relations Committees and pastors for consultation at any time it is deemed appropriate.

TUESDAY MORNING - MAY 24, 1988

PLENARY SESSION: After a brief recess, Bishop Joseph H. Yeakel convened the forty-ninth session of the Peninsula Annual Conference and recognized the Conference Secretary, Dr. W. Daniel Rich, who offered the following Organizational and Procedural Motion:

The first sentence of A-12 would then read: "That the Conference Mominating Committee designate three persons from each Board, Commission, and Committee to serve as a nominating committee for their agency for the purpose of nominating a Chairperson, Vice Chairperson, and Secretary for their respective agencies.

Bishop Yeakel presented each of the above with a Certificate of Appreciation and personally greeted them and their spouses. The Conference responded to their aggregate ministry with enthusiastic applause.

POINT OF PERSONAL PRIVILEGE: Bishop Yeakel recognized the Rev. Dr. Robert P. Whitlock, Host Superintendent, who, in turn, requested that the Rev. Dr. P. Thomas McKelvey, Salisbury District Superintendent, secort Mrs. Lois Yeakel to the stage. There Dr. Whitlock presented Mrs. Yeakel with a beautiful bouquet of spring flowers and the Conference gave her a standing ovation.

DISTRIBUTION OF APPOINTMENTS: Bishop Yeakel requested the ushers to distribute the Appointment List, to become effective July 1, 1988. He attessed the fact that everyone is not appointed every year - rather all pastors are appointed until Changed. He then led the Conference through the list, making corrections and additions as needed.

"SHARING" - A strange figure dressed in eighteenth-century garb wandered onto the Conference floor and engaged in dialogue with Dr. Stapleton. He asked if Dolly Brittingham was present - then asked her to share her faith story, which was very inspiring. The Conference deduced that the "figure" was none other than John Wesley himself!

BISHOP'S ADDRESS: Bishop Joseph H. Yeakel began his address by donning a "hard hat" which he said he often used at Cabinet meetings! He then proceeded to share his thinking on the five themes listed below:

I - The Church after General Conference

The African University initiative was a bold step by the General Conference which will have far-reaching benefits in the years to come. The General Conference of 1988 cared for more than 2,000 proposals, petitions, etc. One of its greatest achievements was the approval of a new Hymnal which features inclusive languages. Although the General Conference reaffirmed the church's stance that homomeruality is incompatible with Christian teaching (thereby Darring) homomeruals from ordination), it did authorize (thereby Darring homomeruals from ordination), it did authorize doctrinal statement stresses the primacy of Scripture but still allows plenty of space for tradition, reason, and experience.

At this point, Bishop Yeakel introduced Dr. Susan Morrison, Baltimore Conference Council Director, stating that she had been elected to the Judicial Council by the General Conference. He also introduced Dr. Mary Krause, a District Superintendent from the Baltimore Conference.

II - The Family in Crisis

Recently there has been a rash of senseless killings and maimings among our youth. Many young people everywhere are plagued by despair and thoughts of suicide. Major changes affecting family life today include: single parent families, hectic lifestyles, and poverty. The church needs to be intentional and more determined about its family ministries!

III - E.M.L.C.

Although the national priority is officially ending, our war against racism must continue on all fronts! Racism is sin, pure and simple, and it represents the "unfinished church among 115. "

IV - Next Quadrennium (1988-1992)

The Peninsula Conference has approved a \$5 million campaign for Camp Pecometh. That campaign begins this fall!

We must continuously work on the peace issue -- the Bishops' Letter was only the beginning!

TUESDAY AFTERNOON - MAY 24, 1988

Bishop Yeakel reconvened the Conference at 2:00 P.M. with the singing of the hymm, "O God, Our Help in Ages Fast." He then called on the Rev. Dr. F. David Weber who spoke with much enthusiasm about the Celebration of the Church to be held in Annapolis on September 25th. The theme will be "Oh. For A Thousand Tonques."

At that point, "John Wesley" came on stage and reminded us of his rules for singing! He called on Vernell Mitchell, an Easton District young person, who testified about all the wonderful developments in her home parish. "John Wesley" commended her.

COMPOSITE REPORT OF THE CABINET: Bishop Yeakel summoned the Rev. Dr. C. Edvin Lasbury, Cabinet beam, to introduce the report. Consecutively, the various members of the Cabinet made presentations on the following topics: inclusive and shared ministries, youth ministry, family ministry, inclusiveness, strengthening the local church, intentional membership growth, Aids Ministry, stewardship, and the conclusion. The full text of this report may be found under "VIII.C."

MINISTERIAL EDUCATION FUND: Bishop Yeakel then recognized Dr. Douglas Lewis, President of Wesley Theological Seminary, Washington, D.C., who was representing all thirteen United Methodist seminaries in the U.S.A. Dr. Lewis spoke of the crucial interaction between teachers and students and of the fact that a parish minister must be trained to be a "generalist." The challenge of the 1998's, he said, asked the Peninsula Annual Conference to be in partnership with all of our seminaries.

At that point, our friend "John Wesley" appeared once again, this time calling for Sue Waughn of Glasgow, Delaware. A Sunday School teacher at Kirkwood U.M.C., Sue spoke eloquently about the recent establishment of an outpost Sunday School in her area. Our "friend" was very pleased.

ORDER OF THE DAY: Drayton Manor Report

Bishop Yeakel called on the Rev. Dr. Robert P. Whitlock, chairperson of the Drayton Board of Directors, who, in turn, introduced members Alice Coleman, Ella Mae Henry, and Ward Keever. Mr. Keever presented a financial report which stated that there will be no Conference subsidy whatever in 1989 and also that the Board had raised some \$255,888 towards the cost of a new wing at Drayton.

There followed an excellent audio-visual presentation showing the present as well as the future possibilities for Drayton as a retreat center of the finest kind.

Dr. Whitlock then presented the resolution below, and the Rev. Dr. Edwin C. Thomas, Jr. moved that it be treated as a whole and not divided into two parts. The motion was seconded and approved by the conference after which the entire resolution as presented was approved.

WHEREAS, the Peninsula Annual Conference of the United Methodist Church established in 1985 a new Drayton Board of Directors, a committee of the Peninsula Conference Council on Ministries, and

WHEREAS, the Drayton Board has been able to eliminate the Annual Conference program subsidy, as directed by the 1985 Annual Conference, and

WHEREAS, Drayton has been placed on a firm financial basis in 1985, 1986, and 1987 while at the same time making major capital improvements, and

WHEREAS, the usage of Drayton has dramatically increased over those same three years, and

WHEREAS, the Drayton Board has established long-range goals in the areas of program, facilities, usage/marketing, and finance; therefore,

BE IT RESOLVED that Drayton be retained as a viable program agency of the Peninsula Annual Conference, oriented primarily toward spiritual growth through retreats, planning, and continuing education events.

.

WHEREAS, the Board of Directors of Drayton has raised approximately \$380,000 of the total project cost of a new addition and renovations (\$850,000); and

WHEREAS, professional consultation and study have confirmed that the profit margin realized from additional space will provide sufficient income to amortize a loan of not more than thirty percent (30%) of the project cost;

NOW THERFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that when the Drayton Board has raised sufficient funds to be within \$259,800 of the cost of the planned addition, and has secured the approval of the Peninsula Conference Council on Hinistries and the Council on Finance and Administration, the Drayton Board is authorized to proceed with the securing of architectural construction drawings, to receive bids for the construction of the addition, with authority to borrow any funds, not to exceed \$259,800, necessary to complete the project, using the Drayton Endowment Fund as collateral, if such funds have not been raised through continuing efforts.

Note: THIS CONTRACT AND AUTHORITY TO BORROW shall be subject to the prior approval and consent of the Bishop and the Cabinet of the Peninsula Conference. The provisions of Sections 2512, 2515 and 2516 of the 1984 Discipline of the United Methodist Church will be complied with in the execution of any contract and/or mortgage on the property of Drayton Manor, title to which is wested in The Trustees of the Peninsula Annual Conference of the United Methodist Church, Inc. by deed dated November 2, 1966 and recorded in Liber E.W.P. No. 2, folio 222, among the Land Records for Kent County, Maryland.

CHURCH AND SOCIETY RESOLUTIONS: Bishop Yeakel summoned the Rev. James Van Der Wall, Secretary of the Board of Church and Society, who presented the following resolution:

RESOLUTION ON RACE RELATIONS

WHEREAS within the bounds of the Peninsula Annual Conference this year there have been a number of cross burnings, and,

WHEREAS there is a need to help foster a change in attitudes and behaviors of children, youth and adults who must live in a society diseased by injustice and racism, and.

WHEREAS the clergy of the Peninsula Annual Conference have accepted the call to be messengers, watchers, and stewards of the Lord; to teach and to admonish, to find and provide for the Lord's family; to seek for Christ's sheep that are dispersed abroad in the midst of an evil world, that they may be saved through Christ forever.

BE IT THEREFORE RESOLVED that we, the members of the Peninsula Annual Conference,:

- Request each local church to have one or more interracial events each year. These events are to be shared with district superintendents at the Charge Conference.
- Expect local churches to work with other churches, families, and communities to help foster changes in attitudes and behaviors to help develop a more just society that does not discriminate against others because of their race, color, national origin, sex, or economic condition.
- Appeal to ministers to risk being role models of the covenant made at ordination to be itinerant in proclaiming the Gospel to all people.
- Encourage each district to form support groups for those who risk being role models of the covenant.

After brief discussion the resolution was approved by the Conference. Then, Rev. Mr. Van Der Wall presented the following resolution:

A RESOLUTION ON HOUSING AND HOMELESSNESS

WHEREAS it is clear from scripture that God wills Christians to care for the neighbor in distress and,

WHEREAS homelessness is a leading cause of distress not adequately attended to in the United States,

BE RESOLVED THAT we, the Peninsula Annual Conference, petition our federal, state, and local officials to devote a larger share of our tax money to produce temporary shelter and to build affordable permanent housing for those in need.

THAT our local United Methodist Churches, with the help of our Conference Board of Church and Society, be directed to find the greatest housing needs in their town or county and work to alleviate them in cooperation with other churches, civic organizations and units of government, by one or more of the following such as:

1. Work to change zoning regulations so as to allow more shelters and low cost apartments, trailer parks and the like in our neighborhoods.

2. Work with elected representatives to devise financial encouragement of shelters and low cost housing.

 Set up support groups for existing or future economical and public low cost housing projects, including self-help housing programs.

Bishop Yeakel recognized William Cooke who moved that the word "Eederal" be deleted from the third paragraph of the resolution. The motion was seconded, but, after discussion, defeated. Bishop Yeakel then recognized the Rev. Constance Metzger who moved to amend the resolution by the addition of the following:

 Encourage Peninsula U.M. Homes to pledge a greater percentage of its financial resources to low-income housing programs within the Conference.

The motion to amend was seconded and approved, after which the entire resolution, as amended, was approved by the Conference.

COMMISSION ON THE STATUS AND ROLE OF WOMEN: Bishop Teakel recognized the Rev. Mary Lou Green and the Rev. Lawrence Livingston who explained the evaluation instrument being used by COSROW to determine the degree of inclusiveness during the Conference sessions. They also pointed out the very informative brochure designed for use within the local churches.

CABINET PROPERTY MATTERS: Bishop Yeakel recognized the Rev. Dr. C. Edwin Lasbury, Wilmington District Superintendent, who presented the following resolution:

Whereas the Charge Conference of the Mt. Salem/Christiana/ Kirkwood Charge voted to merge the Mt. Salem Church, New Castle, and St. Paul's Church, Kirkwood, by placing the St. Paul's Church on Limited Service and transferring the membership to the Mt. Salem Church.

Therefore, be it resolved that the Peninsula Annual Conference approve this merger and recognize the successor charge as New Castle-Mt. Salem with two churches, Mt. Salem and Mt. Pleasant.

The resolution was seconded and approved by the Conference.

Then the Bishop recognized the Rev. Robert P. Whitlock, Easton District Superintendent, who presented the following resolutions:

Whereas, the membership of Taylor's Island Charge totaling 176 members is divided among five churches in most cases in close proximity to each other, and, whereas, these congregations seet as one, rotating among the churches and are in harmony of ministry and are growing, that Melone and Lane's, in fact acting on Limited Service since July 1, 1987, be placed on Limited Service.

Whereas, the church conferences of Union Grove, Mashington, and Zorah Churches in Nurlock, Maryland, have voted overwhelmingly on May 21, 1988 to merge and become one congregation, let the Peninsula Annual Conference recognize this merger and consider this a new congregation.

Both of the above resolutions were approved by the Conference.

"SHARING:" "John Wesley" appeared on stage once again calling for the Rev. Karen Bunnell from Aldersgate U.M.C. Karen spoke eloquently about a unique ministry for and with the handicapped known as "Checkerboard." While Mr. Wesley was amazed at some of their activities, such as dancing, he smiled on the compassion of those involved in this unusual ministry. Before departing for parts unknown he even came to the podium and read from his own journal about his heart-warming experience at Aldersgate Street!

The Conference recessed with the singing of the hymn, "Come, We That Love the Lord."

TUESDAY EVENING - MAY 24, 1988

On the evening of Aldersgate 250 the Conference gathered in the auditorium of the Central Middle School for special awards in the ministry of evangelism. On behalf of the Division of Evangelism, William C. Hopkins presented the Harry Denman Awards to Ms. Barbara Jester (Salem UMC, Newark, DE) and the Rev. Robert O. Wallace (Zion UMC, Cambridge, MD). The Conference responded with warm applause.

Although the service was lengthy, members of the Conference left the auditorium at 9:45 P.M. knowing that they had been truly blessed!

WEDNESDAY MORNING - MAY 25, 1988

MORNING WORSHIP: Beginning at 8:45 A.M. the Conference was led in morning devotions by members of the Division of Worship.

PLENARY SESSION: After a brief recess, Bishop Joseph H. Yeakel reconvened the session and recognized the Rev. Dr. Edwin C. Thomas, Jr. who presented the following motion:

I move the reconsideration of Al2 on sheet A-1 that was adopted by this Conference on Aldersgate 250, 1988.

The motion was seconded and approved, after which Dr. Thomas presented a second motion:

Resolved, that Al2 as presented by the Nominating Committee be adopted. Be it further resolved that the adoption of the above is an expression of affirmation and appreciation for the leadership of this Conference exercising their responsibility to lead, and

Be it also resolved that the Nominating Committee is instructed to bring a proposal for the procedure of election of officers of the Boards, Commissions, and Committees to the 1989 Peninsula Conference that will include the ownership of the said agencies in the selection of their officers.

This motion was seconded and approved by the Conference.

NOMINATING COMMITTER REPORT: Bishop Yeakel then summoned the Rev. DIP. P. Thomas McKeleye, Chairperson of the Nominating Committee. Dr. McKelvey and Bishop Yeakel led the Conference through the report, making additions and corrections and soliciting them from the floor. The final report will be presented on Thursday for adoption by the Conference.

"SHARING:" At this point "John Wesley" appeared yet another time! He called on the Rev. Jim Jones and a layman from Rising Sun, Maryland, who spoke eloquently about the dynamic Bible study which was taking place in their area. Our "friend" blessed them both!

COMMISSION ON EQUITABLE SALARIES: Bishop Yeakel summoned the Rev.

Laura A. Martin, Chairperson, who directed the attention of the Conference to the report in the Pre-Conference Booklet. After making

editorial changes in the report, Rev. Ms. Martin presented the following recommendations which were acted upon individually:

Using the formula adopted by the Peninsula Annual Conference at its 1987 session, the Commission recommends the following as the level of minimum compensation:

Full Member --\$16,847.00
Probationary & --\$15,644.00
Full-Time Local Pastor --\$14,440.00

CONFERENCE AVERAGE COMPENSATION FOR 1989 -- \$24,867.00
*THE SERVICE INCREMENT WOULD EQUAL -- \$120.00

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that all student local pastors and part-time local pastors receive a minimum salary of \$11,758.88, except as negotiated between pastor, P.P.R. and D.S.

Reimbursing pastors for miles traveled on church business is a policy established by this Conference. The Commission recommends the following action:

BE IT RESOLVED that reimbursement for travel expense during 1989 shall be 22-1/2 cents per mile for the first 15,000 miles and 11 cents per mile for the 00 miles, said rate being in compliance with IRS policy. In addition, we also recommend that pastors be reimperformance of ministerial duties, incurred in the

The Commission on Equitable Salaries also recommends the following action be taken:

WHEREAS the Peninsula Annual Conference has a Health Care Program for its clergy,

WHEREAS the Peninsula Annual Conference makes available through Blue Cross/Blue Shield family coverage at a current cost of \$1,872.80 per year.

WHEREAS some clergy receive family coverage as a full or partial benefit and others do not,

BE IT RESOLVED that effective January 1, 1989 all charges in the Peninsula Annual Conference pay the insurance premium for family coverage as a fringe benefit.

Having passed this resolution all clergy would receive equitable benefits in the area of health/dental care for the entire Peninsula Annual Conference. The Commission on Equitable and stands ready to assist when the need stiese. Our Commission will assist in salaries and hopes charges will give priority to paying the insurance pressums for all clergy persons.

Each of the above recommendations were approved by the conference.

Rev. Ms. Martin then introduced the Rev. Laurence M. Berry of the Commission on Equitable Salaries who presented the following resolution:

Parsonage Furniture Proposal March 1, 1988

In response to comments by both laity and clergy about the present system of furnished parsonspea an investigation was made into the efforts of the Baltimore Annual Conference as reported at the 1978 session of the Annual Conference. At that time the Baltimore Annual Conference overwhelmingly approved the change to an unfurnished parsonage system.

An unfurnished parsonage would be defined as containing major appliances (refrigerator with separate freezer compartment, range, washer and dryer, with a dishwasher recommended). Floor and window coverings for the living areas (living room, dining room and/or den, bedrooms, library, and family room) should be provided. Wall-to-wall carpeting and draperies and sheer curtains should be neutral in color.

We recognize the authority of the local congregations and the district trustees to dispose of their furniture. In view of the fact that parsonage furniture was purchased for use by a parsonage family and was provided for their comfort and benefit, the following resolution is made:

WHEREAS each person and family should have the opportunity to express their individuality.

WHEREAS each person and family should have a sense of belonging and roots.

WHEREAS the use and furnishing of a home often provide an expression of individuality and a sense of belonging.

WHEREAS the furnishings of a parsonage often cause conflict between the clergy and the laity.

WHEREAS there are at least 20 conferences operating under an unfurnished parsonage system.

WHEREAS the upkeep of parsonage furnishings can be a hindrance to the carrying out of the important function of ministry.

THEREFORE, we recommend that ownership of the parsonage furnishings be transferred to the parsonage family now in residence. It is further recommended that this proposal be refective as of the date of this Annual Conference. The purpose is that no undue financial hurship to the propose of the part of the propose of the

Any office furniture, whether in the parsonage or the church office, will be exempted.

It is further recommended that churches consider that ministers will be meeting the additional costs of replacing and maintaining furniture, costs formerly borne by the church.

We recommend that churches not be required to relinquish ownership of heritage items that are in parsonages. However,

they should remain in the parsonage only if the minister in residence wishes to use them. Such heritage items shall appear on an inventory record in the parsonage book.

We also recommend that student appointments and other parttime appointments be exempted from the provisions of this legislation. Those churches shall continue as they have in the past.

As the time for an Order of the Day had arrived, discussion of the above proposal was postponed.

ORDER OF THE DAY: Corporate Session of Wesley College

Bishop Yeakel summoned Gilbert S. Scarborough, Fresident of the Board of Trustees, and Dr. Reed M. Stewart, College Fresident. Mentioning that Dr. David Eisenhower, grandson of the late president, had spoken recently at Mesley, Hr. Scarborough declared the College to be "alive and well!" He then called on the Rev. Dr. Edwin C. Thomas, Jr., nominations: the Womlanting Committee, who made the following the Womlanting Committee, who made the following.

The class was duly elected by the Conference.

Mr. Scarborough then introduced President Stewart who spoke briefly about the present state of the College. Dr. Stewart said that Wesley is now a four-year baccalaureate college with a varied curriculum. Some 1,958 applications for admission next fail have been roctived so dome 1,958 applications for admission next fail have been roctived so of credit for which it was the guarantor. The College ended the last fiscal year with an operational surplus.

The Conference received the entire report and responded with enthusiastic applause.

COMMISSION ON EQUITABLE SALARIES: (continued) -Parsonage furniture Proposal

Bishop Yeakel recognized the Rev. Charles E. Barton who offered the following motion:

The Commission on Equitable Salaries shall be designated as the agency to which all questions of interpretation shall be directed. This commission shall make the interpretation and shall arbitrate any differences.

This motion was seconded and approved by the Conference.

Bishop Yeakel then recognized the Rev. William Hemphill, Jr. who moved that the proposal be amended by electing Hemphill, and paragraph on p. 59, referring to student appointments and other part-time appointment.

The amendment was seconded but defeated.

Bishop Yeakel then recognized Ms. Robin Ruf of Unity-Washington UMC, Hurlock, Maryland, who presented the following alternate proposal:

After considerable prayer and discussion regarding the Parsonage Furniture Proposal as stated by the Commission on Equitable Salaries March 1, 1988: I wish to propose the following resolution:

WHEREAS ownership of personal items is important to a sense of identity for individuals and families.

WHEREAS upkeep of parsonage furniture can cause conflict and interfere with the effective ministry of the church.

WHEREAS the clergy of the Peninsula Annual Conference committed themselves to serving within the conference with the expectation furniture would be provided for their use.

WHEREAS the laity of the Peninsula Annual Conference has an obligation to lovingly consider how their actions will influence their parsonage families.

WHEREAS the laity of the Peninsula Annual Conference has a responsibility to thoroughly debate any actions regarding stewardship of church possessions.

THEREFORE, we recommend the Peninsula Annual Conference cease to provide parsonage furniture effective as of the conference session of 1989. It is further recommended that the Commission on Equitable Salaries hold district meetings to provide a forum for clergy and parsonage families for the discontinuation of this practice and that the Commission present its plan for such compensation to the local churches no less than three months prior to the conference session of 1989. The purpose is to provide the opportunity to select a 1989. The purpose is to provide the opportunity to select a consistent with the laity's obligation to care for their parsonage families and to maintain good stewardship.

The motion to substitute the above for the original proposal was seconded but defeated.

Bishop Yeakel recognized the Rev. John F. Mitchell, who called for the question. The call was seconded and the vote taken: 239 For and 148 Against.

POINT OF PERSONAL PRIVILEGE: The Rev. William Hemphill, Jr. expressed appreciation to all laypersons who had served on parsonage committees across the years and thanked God for this important ministry.

"SHARING: "John Wesley" came on stage and introduced three youth. While one sang The Lord's Prayer, the other two "signed" it and then spoke of a vital ministry to the hearing-impaired.

ORDER OF THE DAY: Conference Preacher - Dr. Michael Williams

With the Rev. Charlotte A. Nichols as liturgist the Conference entered into an experience of worship. Dr. Williams delivered another dynamic address entitled, "What's a Good Jewish Boy Doing in a Place Like This?"

At 12:15 P.M., the Conference took a Luncheon Recess.

WEDNESDAY AFTERNOON - MAY 25, 1988

Bishop Joseph H. Yeakel reconvened the plenary session at 2:00 P.M. with the singing of the hymn "God the Spirit, Guide and Guardian" from the sampler of the new hymmal. The Bishop then led in prayer.

BOARD OF PENSIONS: Bishop Yeakel summoned Kay P. Cloud, President, who directed the Conference's attention to the report in the Pre-Conference Booklet and then offered the following recommendations:

The Peninsula Conference Board of Pensions recommends that:

- The Past Service Rate for 1989 be \$225 per year of approved service.
- Up to 189% of the pension and disability payments received be designated as the permitted housing allowance for 1989. (The full text of this resolution may be found in the 1986 Conference Journal.)

Both of the above were approved after which the whole report of the Board of Pensions was approved by the Conference.

"SHARING:" "John Wesley" appeared yet again, this time calling for the Rev. Sandra Steiner Ball of the Kent Island UMC. The Rev. Mrs. Ball spoke of the successful introduction of a system of lay pastoral care known as "Stephen Ministries" and the varied needs it is meeting. Our "friend" was very pleased!

CONFERENCE COUNCIL ON MINISTRIES: Bishop Yeakel summoned the Rev. Dr. J. Gordon Stapleton, Director, who made the following report.

<u>Camping</u>: Pecometh is fully accredited by the American Camping Association and has never had a fatality or serious accident in all of its 40 years.

Reach: Dr. Stapleton introduced the Rev. Vaughn A. Johnson, Associate Council Director, who stated that REACH, which raised some \$627,988 for missions at home and abroad, will be ending on December 31, 1988. He said that it was a program in which churches of all sizes had participated.

Special Ministries: Rev. Mr. Johnson thanked Ms. Darlene Webb for chairing the Missional Priority Coordinating Committee which created the Comprehensive Plan which is now being monitored. He commended the consultants who are working in program development along with the Mission Teams which had taken special training.

Leadership Development: Dr. Stapleton commended the Rev. Harvey Manchester for his many-faceted ministry in this area, especially the recent "To Grow A Teacher" seminars on each district.

Evangelism: For the second year in a row the Peninsula Conference has shown an increase in membership. Many of our churches are continuing to follow up on the "Offer Them Christ" program.

Conclusion: Dr. Stapleton praised all clergy and laity who had given their time, effort, and commitment to "make ministry happen" across our Conference.

The Conference received the report with applause. POINT OF PERSONAL PRIVILEGE: Bishop Teakel recognized the Rev. Dr. Willard L. Robinson, Jr., who thanked all of those who had been supportive of the ministry of Camp Pecometh and the development of its new facilities.

CROSS-RACIAL APPOINTMENTS TASK FORCE: Bishop Yeakel recognized Dr. Stapleton, Council Director, who directed the conference's attention to the report in the Pre-Conference Booklet. Re asked that the existing IV. and V. on pp. 18-11 be deleted and that the following be substituted for them:

- IV. That the Task Force design a process through which each church/charge in the Peninsula Annual Conference would be prepared for open itineracy. The first two steps would be:
- A. Reflection/Dialogue Groups at each session of the Peninsula Annual Conference. (These groups in 1988 Will meet on Monday afternoon with facilitators from the General Commission on Religion and Race and small group leaders from the Peninsula Annual Conference.
- B. District events planned by the Conference Commission on Religion and Race. These events will begin as early as June 1988 in the Salisbury District. (The format of the district event will be in the packet given to each member at the Annual Conference session.)

Following the Reflection/Dialogue Groups at Annual Conference, the Task Force with the Annual Conference and the General Commission will design other means of preparing the church for open itineracy.

V. By June 1986 the Board of Ordained Ministry shall develop guidelines for adoption by the Annual Conference to assure greater equity in cross-racial appointments with regard to compensation and status.

After some discussion the Conference approved this recommendation.

Bishop Yeakel then recognized Ms. Verdie Page Burris who offered the following resolution:

WHEREAS the Commission on Religion and Race is primarily a monitoring and advocacy group.

WHEREAS the Board of Ordained Ministry is responsible only for the Professional Growth Seminars, as they relate to the program of racial inclusiveness. . .

WHEREAS another group/voice is needed to promote and coordinate racial inclusive programs.

BE IT THEREFORE RESOLVED that we continue the Cross-Racial Appointments Task Force.

The motion was seconded and a discussion ensued.

Bishop Yeakel recognized the Rev. Grant L. Johnson who moved that the Word "Committee" be substituted for the words "Task Force" in the above resolution. The motion was seconded and Bishop Yeakel commented that such a group could not enter into the appointment—making process, per se. That is the exclusive realm of the Bishop

and Cabinet. Rev. Mr. Johnson replied that his intention was the creation of a standing committee of the Conference Council on Ministries which would continue the functions of the Cross-Racial Appointments Task Force.

Bishop Yeakel then recognized the Rev. George C. Godfrey who moved that we delay action on the main motion until we had heard from the Dialogue Groups which had met earlier in this Conference. The motion was seconded and approved.

REPORT OF DIALGOUE GROUPS: Bishop Yeakel summoned the Rev. Vaughn A. Johnson and the Rev. Dr. Fred D. Wood, III who gave a comprehensive overview of the issues with which the groups had dealt. The complete text of their report may be found under "VII.C" in this <u>Journal</u>.

Bishop Yeakel then recognized Ms. Darlene Webb who presented the following resolution:

WHEREAS, the Peninsula Conference has gone on record as being intentional about eliminating racism in all its forms in the church and the society in general, and

WHEREAS, in response to that intentionality the Conference Arrangements Committee, in cooperation with the Cross-Racial Appointments Task Force planned the inter-racial dialogue and workshops on racism, and

WHEREAS, other conference events were held simultaneously with these workshops and some people were prevented from having the opportunity to participate, and

WHEREAS, racism is an evil that has invaded all our lives at some point and we all can benefit from such dialogue, and

WHEREAS, the committee can be commended for its efforts.

BE IT RESOLVED that the Conference, in the future, plan such events so all conference participants, including its leadership, are encouraged to participate.

The resolution was seconded and a discussion ensued. Bishop Yeakel recognized the Rev. Kofi Bart-Martin who moved to amend the resolution as follows:

That the Peninsula Conference be intentional by adopting an initiative for the next quadrennium under which once every quarter pastors of different racial and ethnic backgrounds would preach and participate in the worship experience of the other group. Discussions should follow to enable the groups to share their thoughts and feelings and grow through the process.

The amendment was seconded but failed, after which the Webb resolution was approved by the Conference.

ORDER OF THE DAY: Methodist Action Program

Bishop Yeakel summoned James C. Walker, Executive Director of M.A.P. Mr. Walker spoke of a many-faceted ministry including counseling, food, fuel, and housing. He introduced an elderly Hispanic woman who spoke, via an interpreter, about what the ministry of the Hispanic U.H. Mission had meant to her.

Mr. Walker then introduced the new Hispanic pastor, the Rev. Jeremias Rojas, who, in turn, presented an outstanding musical ensemble from Camden, N.J. The group presented a series of songs in Spanish and even taught some to the Conference. A spirit of joy in the christian fellowship prevailed. The Conference responded with warm applause.

CROSS-RACIAL APPOINTMENTS TASK FORCE: (continued)

After consulting with the parties concerned (Ms. Burris, Rev. Mr. Johnson, and Rev. Mr. Godfrey) Bishop Yeakel suggested the following resolution:

Be it resolved that a standing committee, under the Aegis of the Conference Council on Ministries, be created for the purpose of promoting and coordinating racial inclusiveness programs in the Peninsula Annual Conference.

This resolution was approved by the Conference.

U.M. PUBLISHING HOUSE: Bishop Yeakel recognized Dr. Stapleton, Council Director, who introduced Mr. H.M. Birchard, Baltimore Manager of Cokeabury. Mr. Birchard mentioned the 200th Anniversary of the U.M. Publishing House to be celebrated in 1999 and presented a check in the amount of \$18,218.65 to be used for ministerial pensions in the Peninsula Annual Conference.

Bishop Yeakel then summoned Dr. Mary Krause, Superintendent of the Baltimore North District, Baltimore Annual Conference, who brought greetings and gave the dismissal with blessing at 5:00 P.M.

THURSDAY MORNING - MAY 26, 1988

MORNING WORSHIP: Beginning at 8:45 A.M. the Conference was led in morning devotions by members of the Division of Worship.

PLENARY SESSION: Following a brief recess the Plenary Session was reconvened by Bishop Joseph H. Yeakel.

ORDER OF THE DAY: Order of St. Barnabas

Bishop Yeakel summoned the Rev. Dr. Michaele S. Russell, Chairperson of the Division of Stewardship. Dr. Russell reminded the Conference that the Order of St. Barnabas is an ongoing program of intentional, creative stewardship designed to help the local church realize that "everyone does have a talent; everyone does have a task." The focus of the program has always been on the holistic nature of stewardship in all of life, and primarily as it relates to one's faith

As Dr. Russell read their respective faith stories, the following 1988 nominees came to the stage to receive their awards: Robert Wagner (Whatcoat UMC, Camden, DE), Mattie B. Love (Ezion-Mt. Carmel UMC, Wilmington, DE), Ethel Guy (Rockawalkin UMC, Rockawalkin, MD), James Beall (St. Paul's UMC, wilmington, DE), and the Rev. Joseph Henry (Oakville-Cottage Grove UMC, Berlin, MD). The Conference responded to these awards with enthusiastic applause.

Bishop Yeakel recognized the Rev. George H. Moore who moved that this session of the Peninsula Annual Conference initiate the office of "Steward of the Order of St. Barbanas." At the suggestion of the Chair, the matter was referred to the Division of Stewardship for

study.

"SHARING:" At this point our "friend" appeared once again, this time calling for "one of those female pastors" - the Rev. Carol Beyer. Carol spoke with elequence about the vital program and dynamic ministry presently occurring on the Magnolia Charge.

COUNCIL ON FINANCE AND ADMINISTRATION: Bishop Yeakel summoned the Rev. George C. Godfrey, Vice-President of the Council, who referred to the printed report in the Pre-Conference Booklet. He then presented the following resolution relating to health and life insurance benefits:

WHEREAS, the 1962 Annual Conference meeting at Grace United Methodist Church on May 17-28, authorized the Commission on Morld Service and Finance on predemance to the Council of Cou

WHEREAS, the Council on Finance and Administration after careful consideration believes the Conference would be better served if the medical, dental and life insurance benefits were administered by an agency other than the Council on Finance and Administration,

BE IT RESOLVED, that the Council on Finance and Administration recommends that it no longer administer the medical, dental and life insurance benefits and that this responsibility be transferred to the Conference Board of Pensions.

BE IT FORTHER RESOLVED, that the Conference Board of Pensions will begin administering the medical, dental and life insurance benefits immediately following the close of this Session of the Annual Conference.

After brief discussion the above resolution was adopted.

The Rev. Mr. Godfrey then moved that the 1989 budget in the amount of \$3,857,035 be adopted. The motion was seconded and adopted by the Conference.

He then moved that .38 be the apportionment factor for 1989. The motion was seconded and approved.

Bishop Yeakel then recognized the Rev. Dr. J. Gordon Stapleton who moved that, effective with the 49th Session of the Peninsula Annual Conference, the cost of moving a pastor, which is borne by the local church, be exempted from the calculations for determining apportionments. The motion was seconded and approved by the Conference.

Bishop Yeakel then recognized the Rev. Robert W. Helms who made the following motion:

I move that the Board of Pensions intentionally move as quickly as possible to the day when it can offer to the clergy of the Conference and other health benefit group members the option of a Health Maintenance Program.

The motion was seconded and, after brief discussion, approved by the Conference.

CAMP PECOMETH: Bishop Yeakel recognized the Rev. Dr. Willard L. Robinson, Jr., Chairperson, who promoted the forthcoming development plan which will involve a three-year stewardship campaign across the Conference attempting to raise five million dollars in capital funds. Dr. Robinson introduced the Rev. and Mrs. Wesley Sheffield, Dept. of Field Service and Finance, General Board of Global Ministries, who will be directing this effort. The Conference endorsed the plan with enthusiastic appliause.

BOARD OF GLOBAL MINISTRIES: Bishop Yeakel summoned Virginia Clendaniel, Chairperson, who moved the adoption of the entire report approved in the Pre-Conference Booklet. The motion was seconded and approved.

Ms. Clendaniel then introduced the Rev. Vaughn A. Johnson, Associate Council Director, who presented a policy statement relating to Cooperative Parish Ministries which had been developed by a special Task Force created by the Conference Council on Ministries. Rev. Mr. Johnson explained that the policy statement had been approved by the Council at its April meeting.

During the ensuing discussion, Bishop Yeakel recognized the Rev. John F. Holden, a pastor with considerable experience in cooperative parish ministries, who made the following motion:

I move that the policy statement be referred back to the Task Force on Cooperative Parish Ministries for further study and development.

The motion was seconded, but, following discussion, defeated. Rev. Mr. Johnson them moved the adoption of the policy statement; the motion was seconded and approved. In response to Mr. Holden's concerns it was stated that this policy statement represents only the beginning of the process -- the overall policy will continue to be perfected and refined as time goes on.

Bishop Yeakel then recognized the Rev. Garry O. Parker, Secretary of Global Ministries, who presented the following resolution in observance of the 40th Anniversary of the Advance:

WHEREAS, 1988 is the 40th Anniversary Advance for Christ and His Church, our denominational second-mile giving program of the Board of Global Ministries and,

WHEREAS, we want to encourage local congregations of the Peninsula Conference to join in partnership in the Advance during the 1988-89 conference year.

THEREFORE, the Peninsula Conference Board of Global Ministries recommends that each local church of our Annual Conference participate in the Advance and that the members of the Peninsula Conference, in session in Dover, Delaware, May 1988, recommend this resolution.

The resolution was seconded and adopted by the Conference, following which an informative brochure entitled "Forty Years of Making a poliference" was circulated. Mr. Parker gave a first-hand testimony as to the significant impact which the <u>Advance</u> has made in Indonesia and other parts of southeast Asia.

The entire report of the Board of Global Ministries was then adopted by the Conference.

EMPORT ON GENERAL COMPERENCE: Bishop Yeakel summoned the Rev. Dr. J. Gordon Stapleton, Chairperson of the Peninsula Delegation, who, in turn, invited the following members of the delegation to the stage: Dr. James Hardcastle, Dolly Brittingham, Virginia Clendaniel, Harry Appleby, Norma Jo Walton, the New. Charlotte A. Nichols, the New. Swann Keirn Kester, the New. William Hemphill, Jr., and the New. Dr. representing the Peninsula Conference at the General Conference held in St. Louis, Mo, in April, 1988.

In sequence, the delegates shared the following issues/results of the General Conference session:

1. Approval of an African University in Zimbabwe.

2. Creation of a Task Force on Ministries with Older Adults.

3. Approval of a 100 million dollar scholarship fund

(endowment) for United Methodist students.4. Establishment of seminary scholarships for Native Americans.

 Creation of a theme for the quadrennium 1988-1992 as follows: "Celebrate and Witness."

follows: "Celebrate and Witness."
Refinement of doctrinal standards, stressing the primacy of

scripture, while still giving emphasis to tradition, reason, and experience. Also, John Wesley's sermons will now be included in the doctrinal standards.

7. More participation by laity on more boards and commissions.

 Reaffirmation of the stand on homosexuality - incompatible with Christian teaching, thereby barring avowed homosexuals from ordination; however, an extensive study of the nature of homosexuality was approved.

9. Approval of a budget of some \$410 million for the

quadrennium.
10. Approval of a New Hymnal, the first U.M. one, of more than 1,000 pages. At this point, the Conference applauded Prof.
Laurence Hull Stookey, a member of the Peninsula Conference, who had served very diligently as a member of the Committee on the New Hymnal for the last four years.

 Strengthened the National Youth Organization and its nexus with regional and local youth ministry units.

"SHARING:" "John Wesley" appeared again, this time asking for the Rev. Douglas Ridley of Milton, Delaware. Mr. Ridley, in turn, introduced Steven Dester who spake of the importance of prior introduced Steven Dester who spake of the importance of prior Sussex Correctional Institution at Georgetown, "John Wesley," who always was interested in prison shinstries, blessed Mr. Dexter

Before the worship hour it was reported that \$1,386.85 had been received during the Communion/Memorial Service, to be contributed to the African University initiative.

MORSHIP: The Conference them moved into an experience of worship with the Rev. Lawrence Livingston serving as liturgist. An inspiring sermon entitled "Visions of Cod" was delivered by Dr. Michael Williams of the General Board of Discipleship.

The Conference was recessed at 12:15 P.M.

THURSDAY AFTERNOON - MAY 26, 1988

PLENARY SESSION: Bishop Joseph H. Yeakel reconvened the plenary session with the singing of the hymn, "Alas! and Did My Savior

Bleed." The Bishop then led in prayer.

BOARD OF CHILD CARE: Bishop Yeakel summoned Claude F. Libis, Executive Director of the United Methodist Board of Child Care, who presented an inspiring and informative audio-visual program of the Board's many-faceted ministry. The Conference responded with applause.

REPORT OF GENERAL CONFERENCE: (continued)

- Rejection of abortion as a means of 1) birth control and/or 2) gender selection.
- 13. Condemnation of sexual violence and pornography. 14. Increased emphasis on a ministry to the victims of AIDS and their families.
- 15. Continued emphasis on economic justice and world peace.

In concluding the report of the Peninsula Conference Delegation, Dr. Stapleton stressed that the General Conference is the only body which can speak for the entire United Methodist Church. All clergy and laity have a responsibility to explain the church's "official position" on any issue before sharing their personal views on that particular issue. The Conference accepted the report with gratitude and applause.

- Noting that many issues exist in our Annual Conference as a result of changing population, membership decline, growth potential, and the alignment of churches, and believing that we need to study these issues on an Annual Conference basis in order to develop a strategy for the whole Conference, in addition to needs assessment in each local church.
- 2) THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that in order to strengthen the local church, the 49th Session of the Peninsula Annual Conference establish a Task Force to gather information that has been acquired in the past as well as the present situation in each charge and district, with particular emphasis on the EMLC churches of the Annual Conference.

The Task Force will be comprised of the following: two persons from the Cooperative Parish Committee of the Board of Global Ministries, a Cabinet representative, the Council staff person appointed to EMLC, and one lay and one clergy person from each district appointed by the district superintendent in consultation with the District Council on Ministries.

This Task Force would not have the power to act but would 31 have the power to recommend, after study, a plan of action to be implemented by a particular district or by the

Conference itself. We ask this Task Force to bring a report to the 1989 Annual Conference.
The motion was seconded and, after brief discussion, approved by the conference.

COMMISSION ON THE STATUS AND ROLE OF WOMEN: Bishop Yeakel summoned the Rev. Ms. Mary Lou Green, Chairperson, who gave a slide with the control of the results of the survey of inclusiveness with regard to critication in the Annual Conference seasion. She also submitted the following resolution which was approved by the Conference.

- WHEREAS, the United Methodist Church, through its connectional structures, is called to demonstrate a continuing commitment to the full and equal responsibility and participation of women in the total life and mission of the church, sharing fully in the power and in the policy making at all levels of the church's life:

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that our Peninsula Conference Delegates to the Northeastern Jurisdictional Conference give prayerful consideration to clergywomen qualified for episcopal candidacy.

C. Reports

From C. Edwin Lasbury who compiled this report for Edwin L. Ellis, P. Thomas McKelvey, Robert P. Whitlock and myself. . .

To all the clergy in the conference and the lay members who were elected at the Charge Conferences:

May God our creator and Jesus Christ our redeemer give us grace for this day and peace for the journey through the presence of God's spirit in our individual lives and corporate experience.

The Apostle Paul in his Letter to the Philippians began with a prayer for his readers when he wrote, "I thank my God for you every time I think of you. . .you are always in my heart!" What more appropriate way could the District Superintendents begin their report inamuch as we think of you every time we meet and spend thirty districts, the conference and area and lifting them to the Lord in prayer. You, my friends, in the words of Paul, are "always in our hearts!"

When the day came to begin to think about this report, several questions came to mind - (1) would it be a report on the past or a vision of the future? (2) what topics would be included? and (3) how would it be presented? It did not take long to decide that we would leave the reporting on the past to the various boards and agencies where goals had been set and there was an eagerness to report such as the contract of the contra

Then we began to think about topics - what are the programmatic concerns which are uppermost on our minds? In the brainstorming session to follow, these were the items to emerge.

- Inclusive and Shared Ministries
- Youth Ministry - Family Ministry
- Inclusiveness
- Strengthening the Local Church - Intentional Membership Growth
- Intentional Membership Growth
 Aids Ministry
- Stewardship

When each of the topics was claimed, we decided to share in the presentation by having each superintendent speak on the topics about which he wrote.

INCLUSIVE AND SHARED MINISTRIES

We have a dream for the churches in every community on the Eastern Shore of Maryland and in the State of Delaware. The vision is rooted in the Apostle Paul's understanding of the Church as the Boddy of Christ composed of individual members or parts that have different functions and unique gifts and abilities, but with each individual part, be it big or small, strong or weak, black or white, red, brown or yellow, being a valued and important part of the whole Body. I see the Body of Christ glorifying God as each individual member, congregation and charge upbuilds itself and the whole Body in the love of Jesus Christ. We see this functional unity happening at the local level as congregations existing in the same communities work together to strengthen the life and ministries of each church and charge but also to be in ministry together to that community or geographical area. We see us helping one another, and we see us becoming more vital and more involved in shared outreach and ministry! We can do so much more in people's lives, in our communities, and in God's world when together we serve and work and when together we are in ministry.

The realities of the present situation in our communities are varied. Cooperation and shared ministries are happening in some of our communities. There are many exciting things happening among United Methodist congregations and ecumenically too. However, in some of our communities there is little, if any, cooperation among congregations. Sometimes we become so preoccupied with "our" church and institutional survival that we turn inward and thus experience failure in our "vital statistics" of being in ministry, of reaching out to couch the lives of individuals and the life of our community countries of the country of the control of the countries of the countries

We see community clusters of congregations not joined together for more institutional structure, nor for more meetings or busy work; but rather, joined together for functional programs that strengthen and enhance ministry. We see the potential for co-operative leadership training. We see periodic planning done as teachers, and other leaders come together to share visions, ideas, counselors, and other leaders come together to share visions, ideas, congregations and discovering areas for cooperating in ministries to the community.

As United Methodists our heritage, theology and structural connectedness make greater cooperation and shared ministries at the local community level readily achievable. The imperative comes from the One who has called us together for a shared life and ministry. It is not to the contract of the contrac

YOUTH MINISTRY

As we share in the life and ministries of the local churches of our Peninsula Conference, we see a variety of youth programs and youth ministries, but in some churches we see no youth or youth programs at all. However, there are hopeful signs as some congregations develop youth programs for the first time, while others revitalize not so vital youth programs. Some significant things are happening with the youth in a number of our local churches.

Youth Ministry in our Conference is in a period of resurgence as evidenced by events that are now occurring annually on a conference-wide basis. The Confirmation Rally with Bishop Joseph H. Yeakel has been successful for a number of years now. The Conference Youth Rally at Salisbury State College was a huge success in its inaugural year of 197 with over 489 youth in attendance, while in 1986 over 588 youth from around our 10 youth groups are coming to Camp Percometh for weekend retreats on just about every weekend of the year. Pecometh's summer enrollment of young people is very high with a variety of sexting programs for junior and senior

high youth. Also, youth are participating in our U. M. Appalachia Service Project, our MAP sponsored Wilmington Service Project, Salisbury's ecumenical Habitat for Humanity, and in CROP Walks for the Hunqry.

An exciting vision for us is one in which a multitude of youth are involved in the life and ministries of every church and charge in our Peninsula Conference. (1) We see our congregations with youth participating in active and vial United Methodist Youth Fellowships or ecumenical youth groups that neet weekly for fun, fellowship and meaningful programs! (2) We see youth involved in real ministry to the needs of other check and help of the property of the needs of other check and help of the property of the needs of other check and help of the property of the needs of other check and help of the grow in the faith and deal with issues relevant for their lives! (4) We see youth not on the back paws of our sanctuaries, but rather up front as active participants and leaders (speaking, praying, dramatizing, singing, and playing musical instruments) in our sunday worming of the property of the check of the ch

In our dream the Church and the love of Christ are so much at the center of the lives of our youth that they are growing and flowering as disciples of Jesus Christ! The vision involves a cadre of adults (5 to 28) in each congregation or charge who with great commitment and determination take leadership for developing or commitment and determination take leadership for developing are committed to the committee of the committee o

We see our churches exploding with youth! We see each of our congregations having programs and ministries for youth, with youth and by youth!

FAMILY MINISTRY

There is an increasing emphasis upon Family Life across the nation and in the United Methodist Church. Strengthening our families is a crucial need in our local churches and communities. The General Board of Discipleship's "Family Ministries Networker" suggests that "economic, political, and moral factors, tear at the very heart of Family Life. Our community and church are highly characterized by this profound realization. Inasmuch as the church is often identified as an institution of the family, or better is often identified as an institution of the family, or better the strengthen to the strengthen that is a strength of the str

We recognize that family ministries are taking place in many local churches of the Annual Conference. This is commendable, yet there seems to be little coordinated effort to make known the "good news" by sharing our successes with one another. Likewise, emphasis upon the family has such "low key" concern that few of the available church produces films, video, standard and special curriculum items in this area. The Conference Council on Ministries has a special resource person for Family Life. The sad note is that a single staff

person could not begin to meet our needs no matter how prepared they may be, or how available they are.

of special interest during this quadrennium is the adoption and promotion of the "Children's Cumpaign" by the Komens' Division of the Board of Global Ministries. This program has been designed for the purpose of calling us to a greater awareness of issues that affect the children of our church and nation. Every local church should have at least one resource packet made available through the Service Center in Cincinnati. This packet suggests directions that may be followed in order to focus upon and respond to this great need today.

The nutture and preservation of the family, and our need to be intentional about this concern, is a matter that commands immediate action. The future and anticipated growth of the church depends largely upon how serious we are today to address family life matters, and how motivated we are in our congregations to get involved in programs and projects that will make our dreams become realities.

INCLUSIVENESS

The United Methodist Church's commitment to Bacial inclusiveness, twenty years after the 1958 merger, has been little more than a dream, inasmuch as only minimal progress has been made towards its reality. Indeed our Annual Conference has taken this ready to the control of th

This matter must not be perceived as a dilemma causing the church to "back off" only to become discouraged and/or defeated, but should present a challenge to evaluate the failures and successes of the past twenty years in order to focus upon more realistic directions for the future. We need to be thankful for the positive directions already in process in our conference, such as the monitoring efforts of the Commission on Religion and Race, to maintain inclusive institutions, boards, and agencies; the strategies of the Committee for the Ethnic Minority Local Church to raise the level of consciousness for Ethnic Minority Local Church to raise the level of consciousness for Ethnic Minority Local Church and Science strengthen Ethnic Minority Local pastoral leadership for the inclusive ministry of the Church, the Board of Church and Society for addressing the societal issues that relate to the inclusive nature of our Ministry and Mission; and finally, the commitment of the Bishop and Cabinet to always consider every appointment as having the

The list of positive steps are by no means exhausted. Much more is taking place through the structured program of the Conference, and in many local churches. To make inclusiveness a reality, we must continue to build upon the past, and move creatively and faithfully into the future.

STRENGTHENING THE LOCAL CHURCH

As District Superintendents, we note that many issues exist on our Districts and in our Annual Conference as the result of changing population, membership decline, growth potential, and the alignment of charges. We believe that while issues must be approached on an individual issues that equires a needs assessment in each church), there are issues that exist on each district and in the conference that need to be studied in total rather than as a priority subject to a particular Cabinet or District Superintendent or Program Staff person.

Our Annual Conference has made many efforts to strengthen the local church. We need at this point an analysis -- where are we? We need the overall picture. We need to gather information that has been gleaned in the past few years and study that, as well as the present situation in each charge and district.

We have had three quadrennia to emphasize the strengthening of the Ethnic Minority Local Church. We now need to determine the issues that have emerged -- membership strength, stewardship, facilities, alignments, the strengthening of charges . . . What are the issues that particularly confront the EMEC churches of our Annual Churches are considered to the confidence to the confidence of the confidence to the confidence of the confidence to the confidence of t

we suggest the following strategy: that the Annual Conference authorize the establishing of the following task force dealing with the strengthening of the local church: two persons from the Cooperative Parish Task Group, a Cabinet representative, the Conference Staff person appointed to the Ethnic Minority Local Church, and one lay and one clergy person from each district appointed by the District Superintendent in consultation with the District Council on Ministries.

This task force would be objectively looking at the whole conference picture, dealing with problems and with strengths, drawing upon studies in our Annual Conference and in the General Church with the intention of coordinating the resources necessary to strengthen the local church.

This task group would not have the power to act but would have the power to recommend, after study, a plan of action to be implemented either by a district or the conference. We suggest that this group should be in place as soon as possible and report on update at the next conference session.

INTENTIONAL MEMBERSHIP GROWTH

While not always the case, a matter closely related to the whole strategy of the strengthening of the local church and the alignment of charges is the issue of membership growth.

We applaud our stabilization of membership in the last two years. We have turned a corner; we are no longer losing members; we are gaining a few members each year. While we recognize that many local churches and charges and districts have some strategy for growth, there is really no implementing of a conference plan that has to do with survey of communities, visitation, recruitment, and the contract of the church is a survey of communities of the church is a survey of commence of the church; namely, we do not have a conference strategy for membership growth.

While there are some communities where it may be true that there is little potential for growth, these communities are the exception. The fact is that there are many persons who are unchurched in all of our communities (the average congregation also registers appeared to the communities of the average congregation also registers appeared to the communities of the communit

fervor to evangelize, bringing new persons to Christ.

The General Church and our conference have presented programs to promote growth, such as our recent "Offer Them Christ" program. We applaud those efforts and recognize that they have had impact on our conference, districts, and local churches. But what is our strategy at this point?

We believe as a Cabinet there is great potential for the Peninsula Annual Conference to be growing in number as well as in discipleship. We do not propose a strategy of merely growing statistically; the church is where individuals can experience the transforming of their lives and their world; that means there must program development that will encourage and enable each person to

With this in mind, we call upon the Annual Conference to set as a priority the developing of a strategy for memberahip growth that can be implemented on each district and in each local church. Such a strategy will involve surveying our communities, determining who is there. In small communities this can be done by the charge. In larger population areas it will take cooperative efforts to determine who is unchurched. It will be necessary to develop a strategy for training those who visit. It will be necessary for us to help the local churches interpret themselves to the community they are brought into the church to recruit and disciple those who are being brought into the church.

In order to do this we will need to draw upon the resources of the General Church and our Annual Conference.

We urge the Board of Discipleship to deal with the issue, developing a strategy for our Annual Conference. We would like to have a report on this as soon as possible. If it should come before our next Annual Conference session we will welcome that news. If not, we would hope for a plan of action at the next session of our Annual Conference.

AIDS MINISTRY

Acquired Immune Deficiency Syndrome, AIDS, is a serious disease which destroys the immunities that nature has supplied in our bodies. When AIDS attacks, our capacity to counteract some infections and cancers are eliminated. The body can no longer shake the diseases that usually are under control through its normal biological systems.

The reason we would bring this matter to your attention is that AIDS has spread to epidemic proportions. It is no longer isolated among certain segments of the population but is threatening the total population including our sexually active youth. It has touched our churches and is challenging our congregations to be better informed, more supportive and distinctly pastoral.

The Conference Board of Church and Society has been involved in a study, through an Adds Tark Force, to develop guidelines for our institutions and adds and force the Conference Council on Ministries has adopted a document for camping and retreat programs and personnel at Camp Percometh and Drayton Manor. We have been involved further with the Delmartys Ecumenical Apency (DEA) to cooperatively develop and distribute resources for the local churches of our denomination as well as others on the Penisula.

The churches are asked to take this matter seriously! Pastors are asked to preach, teach, counsel and comfort. Congregations,

through their Council on Ministries/Administrative Councils, are urged to plan for special classes, workshops or seminars.

STEWARDSHIP

One of the greatest needs in our churches is a renewed emphasis on stewardship - the proper use of our God given resources and the giving of our time, talent and dollars to the work of the Kingdom.

This concern is dramatically illustrated by the fact that in our average church 25% of the members give 75% of the money and provide all the leadership and 75% of the members provide only 25% of the church funds and no leadership. The tragedy of this situation is that little is done to change these percentages.

In a recent article titled "Churches Losing Billions of Dollars" by Paul Dietterich, Protestant giving was reported to be 2.2% of gross Protestant income, a percentage that has held constant for 25 years. United Methodist giving was reported to be only 1.7%, well below other Protestants. By failing to stimulate giving at the same rate as other Protestant bodies, United Methodists are suffering substantial losses each year.

Now is the time for United Methodist pastors to get our feet on the ground Biblically and theologically speaking. We suggest reading Paul's words in chapters 8 and 9 in II Corinthians and reflecting on the fact that this is God's world where we have been blessed more abundantly. How can we appropriately show our love to God and demonstrate our gratitude? How can we share our abundance like those Macedonian Christians who. . . "Gave as much as they could, and even more than they could."

The Cabinet urges the pastors and people to cooperate in a stewardship program every year. Every third year it should be a comprehensive every member canvass. In the intervening years, a melaxed Circuit Rider or Phone-a-thon program might be done. Regardless of the program, the people need to be fully informed of the local goals for ministry and mission which have been approved for while they may be mystified by the budget they are interested and willing to support the clurch in mission.

CONCLUSION

This is the composite report of the District Superintendents. It is not a report on the past but a vision of the future and a raising of issues from our perspective, close to the pastors and people on the districts.

If we can address these issues which have been placed before you, we believe we can not only grow but serve, and the Kingdom of Almighty God will come closer than we ever imagined.

Bishop Jack M. Tuell, in his Episcopal Address to the General Conference, said the church will grow for five reasons. With these brief points, I would like to close:

- 2. "We have a sound theology, ..based on God's grace reaching out to all people in their need, offering them Christ and then helping them on the way to holiness of heart and life."
 - 3. "We have the human resources (of) an incredible reservoir of

people power - redeemed by Christ."

- 4. "We have the material resources" of 42,212 established congregations "based strategically to participate in God's mission to the world."
- 5. "We have the organization (which) needs only to be put to work anew in the service of the Spirit."

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORTS DOVER DISTRICT

I wish to express deep gratitude and appreciation to the clergy and laity of the Dover District for the sincere cooperation, commitment, and care which you have shown and extended to the District Superintendent and his family during this past year. There have been exciting and challenging experiences shared together, many difficult tasks to perform and countless decisions to make in order to achieve our goals. You have helped to strengthen and sustain us by your prayers and by reaching out with your love and spiritual warmth. We have been diversified in the use of our talents and resources, but "united" in our efforts to build "community" among us in the Dover District Family. We have used our individual strengths to compensate for our weaknesses. We have intentionally set out and taken the risks on our journey to really be the "Church in the World today." We have grown to be aware of our many shortcomings and have celebrated our joys and successes.

There has been a conscientious effort on the District to encourage our clergy and laity to develop a deeper sense of appreciation and loyalty to the Connectional System of the United Methodist Church, and to promote the many helpful resources available through our United Methodist Church. This has been aimed toward the growth and enrichment of all persons of our local churches with the understanding that an "informed" Christian is indeed a "growing" Christian. This was especially helpful in the development and promotion of district programs.

Some special tasks were directed toward challenging the District Superintendent to diligently ascribe to building bridges of relationships between himself, pastors, and congregations. Much of this was initiated and supported through the appropriate district structures, like our District Council on Ministries, Committee on Superintendency, United Methodist Women, Committee on the Ministry, and other district boards and agencies. Some specific goals cited for this venture were as follows:

- To help pastors and congregations effectively recognize and
- resolve various types of conflict. To recognize the needs of the parsonage families so there might be a higher level of trust and more response to their
- To help congregations grow beyond apparent narrow or
- entrenched perspectives for ministry. To promote and resource congregations for broader ministry.

To fulfill some of the above-stated objectives, the following positive steps were taken by the Superintendent and those district leaders with whom he shared:

- Formal and informal consultations were held with more than
- 88% of our clergy.

 Individual Charge Conferences were held by the District Superintendent except for three. These were officiated by other elders of the district at the request of the Superintendent.
- The Superintendent called upon parsonage families formally whenever possible. About half of our parsonages were visited.

The Ministers and Mates supported the effort to reach our goals by scheduling six monthly gatherings. Each meeting lifted up specific topics of interest for clergy and spouses. Some very helpful themes were - Stress Management, Ministry with persons having AIDS. Trends in Adino. and General Conference Alert.

The District Council on Ministries and various Conference Agencies held district events, all of which were well attended - there were Workshops for Church School Leaders, Seminars for EMLC Leaders, Stewardship Programs, Programs for Laity, those fostered by the District United Methodist Women, Dialogue with Bishop Yeakel and the Pastors, Evangelism events, and Missions activities.

In my opinion, two events are of special note:

- 1. Mission Pestival This was held on April 16th at St. John's United Methodist Church In Seaford, Delaware. More than 389 people gathered to celebrate the need for the Church to be aware and more involved in Mission. Key leaders were drawn from across the Eastern Seaboard, and many attractive displays called our attention to the fact that the United Methodist Church is a Mission Centered Body.
- 2. District Conference Om March 20th, 1988 more than 400 pastors and officials gathered at the Avenue United Methodist Church in Milford, Delaware. The purpose of the meeting was to determine the future for the District Office. The representatives in attendance approved plans set before them by the Committee on Superintendency, to relocate the office to a facility owned by Wesley part of the District Paret, Dover, and to support the dame by adopting the supplement that which is alloted through the Annual Conference.
- Our District Families experienced joys and sorrows during the year. There was sicknesses, deaths, births, and marriages in several of our parsonage families. EASTON DISTRICT

The 1987-1988 Conference Year has been an exciting time of discovery for the Easton District. It has been my pleasure to get to get to know the pastors on the District and thousands of lay people. A sense of genuine excitement on the District is witnessed by growth in membership, stewardship, church schools, small-group and prayer ministries. The several District gatherings during the year have found churches crowded and overflowing with those who were feeling the Spirit. The District has caught the Spirit.

The District has a five-year plan that comes as a result of individual consultations with the D.S. and each of the pastors (three-four hours), individual charge conferences, an overnight retreat of the District Ministers and Mates at Drayton, and a two-day planning retreat by the District Council on Ministries. The plan was adopted at a District Conference in January.

Before we can emphasize membership growth (the 1989 theme), we must first examine the discipling ministry we have in place (church school, youth ministry, small groups -- prayer, study, service, etc.). Hence, our first focus in 1988 has been developing program.

Strengthened in these areas, we can then develop an intentional membership growth strategy outlined in workshops at our District Conference in the fall of 1988.

The remaining themes will complete the five-year plan:

1990 - Social Issues

1991 - Family/Youth

1992 - Mission/Outreach

(While all of these emphases are an ongoing part of each church's mission, we cannot focus on the whole life of the church at one time.)

Fifteen charges on the District are working with me and other Conference staff doing strategic planning. In almost every case this involves an analysis of program (what is going on in the church compared to what is needed). The "needed is determined by an analysis of the community; part of this analysis involves mapping the community (locating all of the homes in the area) to determine membership potential; visitation teams are recruited and trained.

In addition, issues dealt with include: alignments and realignments, facilities, growth potential, a sense of mission, a participation in the commenty, spiritual resources within the participation (pref study, Sible study and other opportunities). All of this involves a deep commitment on the part of pastor and laity.

Exciting results are already beginning to take place; the charges involved are:

Cambridge: Waters-Aireys Cambridge: St. Luke's Church Creek Church Hill-Price Easton-Miles River Galena-Warwick Harmony-Ames Millington-Pondtown Preston-Hurlock Rock Hall-Fairlee Sassafras-Warwick Still Pond-Coleman Still Pond-Kennedyville Taylor's Island

In order to deal more effectively with churches wishing to develop more effective ministry, the District Council on Ministries has adopted a design to recruit, train and deploy lay-clery teams who will work with two charges each during the 1988-1989 Conference year.

Some of the significant happenings around the District during the year:

-Twelve years ago a study was made of the issues surrounding the Still Pond-Betterton-Lynch Charge with recommendations for realignment. As a result of further study and action, a realignment has taken place with Warwick, formerly in the Wilmington District, now joining with Galena; Kennedyville joins with the Still Pond-Betterton-Lynch Churches. Intensive work has been done, particularly in the Still Pond-Betterton-Lynch area, as regards the complete renovation of the parsonage, realignment of the charge, and change of service times. The people there deserve a great deal of commendation significantly strengthened.

-Three churches in Murlock (Union Grove, Washington and Zoar), located only 1 1/2 miles apart, are moving deliberately toward a merger that grows out of a sense of mission in an area where growth and ministry have tremendous potential; it is no easy matter from members to surrender roots of such longevity; it is the working of course.

-Three years ago the Grasonville Church decided to become a station and have moved rapidly into strong ministry and membership growth that has seen a 38 percent increase over the last three years. Their program has developed and deepened; they have purchased and paid for a new parsonage and are now in the process of planning additional educational space.

-The East New Market-Linkwood Charge has been doing intensive study and has developed plans for extensive facility renovation. (A major addition is in the completion stages at Linkwood. This charge is one of the fastest-growing ones as regards attendance, program and mission strategy.)

-At Kent Island Church, one of the fastest-growing churches in our Annual Conference, in-depth ministries and programs have been developed, the most recent being the Stephen's Ministry, which will be described during the Annual Conference sessions. An exciting, caring ministry, it reaches out to the congregation.

-Centreville Church has voted to build a new parsonage rather than remodel the present one; it will be located on part of the 28 acres of land surrounding the church.

-A parsonage is in the planning stages for the Millington-Pondtown Charge; this charge has developed a keen sense of community mission as the result of pastoral and lay leadership. -The members of the Chestertown-Janes-Pomono Charge are making plans to removate and expand their paraonage as they strengthen ministry. This charge has been working for over seven years and has developed a strong community mission and now is taking a step to deal with the housing issue as this charge becomes one of the strongest EMLC charges on the District.

-St. Luke's in Cambridge, where a fire destroyed the sanctuary in January of 1987, has completed an intensive mission study and has completed architectural plans and finance as it moves toward the building of a new church with a promising future. The General Church, Annual Conference and District have supported this congregation through this difficult and exciting opportunity.

-The New St. John's Church at Wittman, the result of the merger of three churches, is strong and enthusiastic about its future.

 $-\mbox{\bf A}$ committed membership at Mt. Pisgah on the Rock Hall-Fairlee Charge continues to complete its new church.

-St. George's Church of the Still Pond-Coleman Charge is "closing in" its new sanctuary-education building as it moves deliberately toward the celebration of worship and mission in its new church.

-Building improvements, primarily focusing on heating plants, are proceeding in two churches of the Ridgely-Marydel Charge.

-The District's payment of almost 100 percent of apportionments (99.6 percent) indicates a strong awareness on the part of churches of connectionalism and doing their share to support the mission and outreach of the whole United Methodist Church.

-For the first time in many years, we experienced a net growth of 159 members on the District. We have turned the corner and move toward the priority emphasis for 1989, intentional growth.

-New church schools have been started in the following churches:

Easton-Miles River Sassafras-Warwick Waters-Aireys Taylor's Island Wittman-New St. John's Ridgely-Marydel-Replanted Zion

-A dramatic strengthening of the church school has occurred at Oxford and at Barclay.

-A new youth group is in place in Goldsboro.

In connection with this, we will have a workshop on the weekend of July 38-31 (being coordinated by Harvey Manchester, Liz St. Clair and Doris Phillips) to facilitate and strengthen those churches that have newly started a Sunday school or are planning one.

-There has been an emphasis on the District to begin new prayer ministries. Eight charges have attended sessions coordinated by Mary Ellen Whitlock.

-Attendance at the "To Grow A Teacher" seminars (where the pastor, church school superintendent and Education Work Area person from each church were encouraged to attend) totaled almost 200 people.

-Through the efforts of outreach and evangelism, 22 of the 63 charges on the District reported a membership gain of five or more members in 1987:

THE REPORT OF THE STATISTICIAN Peninsula Annual Conference Period: January 1, 1987 to December 31, 1987

We rejoice to share the good news that for the second consecutive year, membership in Peninsula United Methodist Churches is increasing! This growth is certainly evidence that we are taking seriously Christ's call to be, and to make of others, disciples. Full membership in the Peninsula Annual Conference stands at 98,588 at the end of 1987, an increase of 287 over 1986.

Numerically, the increase is attributable to a greater number of members received on confession of faith or restored. This increase was sufficient enough to offset a rise in the number of persons removed by Charge Conference action or withdrawn. Please bear in mind that some of these changes are the result of membership audits in the previous year.

The Dover, Easton, and Salisbury Districts gained 185, 159, and 43 members respectively. Wilmington District recorded a decrease of 100. District totals at the close of 1987 were as follows:

Dover 23,479
Easton 21,962
Salisbury 22,495
Wilmington 30,644

These were 491 full-service churches and 32 limited service churches on December 31, 1987.

There were 171 churches which received no new members by confession of faith in 1987, an increase of one over the previous year. Included in this number are 145 churches which received no new members at all. These statistics reflect significant growth in many of our other local churches.

Average attendance in the principal weekly worship services decreased by 1.7%, despite the increase in membership. In 1987, 34.55% of local church members attended the principal weekly worship service. The average membership of Peninsula Conference churches at the end of 1987 is 281. Average attendance in worship is 69.

Total church school membership decreased slightly from the previous year. Church school attendance also fell by 1.9%.

There are presently 156 full-service ethnic minority local churches in the conference. These reported 14,833 members in 1987, an increase of 343 or 2.5% over the total membership in ethnic minority churches in 1986.

I express my deepest appreciation to Linda Etter for her assistance in werifying and tabulating the reports. The District Superintendents were helpful in obtaining reports from every local church in the Annual Conference. And of course, I am grateful to pastors, and in some cases, church secretaries for their patience as we sought to perfect the data submitted. As always, our Conference Treasurer, Ted Briggs, and his faithful staff provided invaluable assistance in data entry, without which this report would have been a much greater burden. May we strive, by God's grace, to continue these patterns of growth in the present year!

The Report of the President

The work of the Annual Conference Council on Ministries is carried out through the Boards, Commissions and Committees that make up the Council. As chair, I wish to thank the persons involved on those boards, commissions and committees for their commitment and their dedication. Yet the Council, itself, has been very busy.

In response to the growing AIDS epidemic in our world, the Council, in response to a resolution passed at Annual Conference, established in the Board of Church and Society a Task Porce that has addressed the way in which the Annual Conference might respond. The recommendation of the Task Force can be seen in the report of the Board of Church and Society. The Council also sent three representatives, Cliff Armour, Harvey Manchester, and Bonnie Parkasfalvy to the Mational Consultation on AIDS Ministries. Also Parkasfalvy to the Mational Consultation on AIDS Ministries also the University of Delaware. Those persons are now available as a resource for our Annual Conference.

The Council also appointed a Task Force to evaluate our relationship to the Delmarva Ecumenical Agency. The Task Force consisted of Carol Price, Lehman Tomlin, and Howell Wilkins, with Jervis Cooke as chairperson. The committee recommends continued participation in the work of the Delmarva Ecumenical Agency and continued financial support of existing agreements. It was also recommended that we as an Annual Conference make every effort to ensure that our members of the DEE Executive Board participate fully so that the Peninsula Annual Conference can get the most benefit from this ecumenical relationship.

The Council also established a Council Committee on Nominations for 1988. The chair of that committee was Jonathan Baker. The Committee on Nominations will be able to review the membership of all council Committees and also have available for the first meeting of the Council following Annual Conference a slate of officers for the new quinquennium.

An important part of each Council Meeting was a report from Camp Pecometh and Draytom Manor. We have rejoiced with both facilities as they shared exciting things that were happening. The Council also sent persons to the National Convocation on Raciam which was held in Louisville, Kentucky during the week of September 13-16. There were three clergy and three leity along with Bishop Yeakel in attendance.

This is my last report as Chair of the Conference Council on Ministries. I wish to take this time to express thanks to the persons who have served as officers with me: Cora Selby as vice chair, and John Mitchell as secretary. I have enjoyed working with both of them and have found them to be very supportive. A very special Thank You goes to the members of the Executive Committee over the last quadrennium. As often as possible programs and counsel have been carried directly to local churches. Other bases of the conference wide has a district and Conference—wide hasis.

This year a serious commitment has been made to evangelism and the program entitled OFFER THEM CRRIST has reached a majority of the churches in the Conference. We are grateful to Robert O'Kelley Nallace and the Evangelism Division of the Board of Discipleship Leadership was provided by our own Bishop Teakel, with assistance program that should bear much fruit.

Vaughn Johnson and the Missional Priority Coordinating Committee designed, recruited, and dispatched the folk to respond to requests for assistance from local churches.

Camp Pecometh experienced one of its best summers in attendance. Jack Simpers has led us into a camping program that is second to none across the church. Now fully accredited by the American Camping Association, we are constantly requested to take persons from beyond our area because of its fine reputation. This fall the Camping the continue to plan for the continue to plan for tomocrov's children today.

Drayton Manor has fulfilled its commitments to the Annual Conference mandate. It brings a positive report to this session of the Annual Conference on both usage and financing. The programming offered this year has been varied and excellent with larger registrations than in the past. We say good-bye to James Morgan who has been our Resident Director for the past eight years and wish him well in his new assignment, with thanks for all his efforts.

Unfortunately, in our Conference as in our world racism is alive and well. We continue to address it as a Council. The Religion and Race Monitoring Task Force has been working with our institutions and for the most part has brought good news to the Council on how we are functioning. There will continue to be areas for improvement and this group will keep them before us. We are working to sensitize our churches to the need for Christians to be inclusive. Our Cross-Racial Appointments Task Force with the Board of Ordained Ministry continues to sponsor Personal Growth Seminars for clergy in the area of racial sensitivity. The General Council and counsel in this area our comprehensive Plan, developed through the Missional Priority Coordinating Committee, is now a guide for our living together as a Conference and is now a part of the Conference Budget. We have a ways to go, but we will not stop moving.

There are too many persons to thank for this quadrennium's programs. We are grateful to all the Board and Committee Chairs and their officers and members who have functioned in their assigned capacities. The Council is forever indebted to Clifford Armour, our President and Chairperson for these four years. Cora Selby, Vice Chairperson, and John Mitchell, Secretary, have both fulfilled their responsibilities so well. Our thanks also to Bishop Joseph Yeakel who has made the time to be present at our meetings and to contribute his expertise to our deliberation. Four Council Staff has given you a full measure of their time and all council Staff has given you a full measure of their time and alized areas and as Council Director, I am grateful for their support and cooperation. Of course, much that took place this year would not have happened except for the work of Shirley Still, Cloria Reed, Toni Moor, and Loraine Wood. They seldom leave the office on time, and they put up with too many last-minute requests and through it all keep a gracious spirit that occasionally shames the rest of us.

Thanks also to Calvin Webster and members of CFA; many of whom will leave that assignment this year. Their cooperation in matters of finance has been a pleasure in our working relationship. Finally, our thanks to each local church, who through its sharing makes this ministry possible. I want each one to know that from this ventage point it can be seen that lives are being changed, the poor are being fed, and the good news is being heard across the world. - 9. To provide for relationships with all news media within the conference; to lead the conference in making creative use of television and telecommunication ministries; to provide training in communication; and to perform public relations functions for the conference.
- To give leadership in research and planning for the Annual Conference.
- To provide guidance and training for district and/or local church leaders.
- To provide linkage with general program agencies and provide names of Annual Conference agencies and persons who carry program responsibilities related to each general program agency.

Camp Pecometh

It is a privilege to report that the year 1987 has been one of the most exciting and spiritually enriching years for the camping ministry of the Peninsula Conference and for its director. Some of the highlights have included:

- 1987 Summer Theme: was based upon John 8:12, "I am the light of the world. Whoever follows me will have the light of life and will never walk in darkness." This theme cemented many relationships throughout the summer and guided us nor Bible study, daily wespers, and weekly Calilean candielight services.
- Weather Conditions: influenced all facets of the camping program as the temperature remained in the 198 degree area throughout the summer. In the absence of rain, the heat seemed even more oppressive to campers and staff alike day after day.
- Camper Registrations: reached a new high for the past seventeen years. One hundred forty-five new campers joined the ranks this year, bringing the total camper registrations to 1,183 as

- compared to 1,638 last year. This was the highest number of registrations in 17 years.
- Racial Ratio: among campers and staff remained about the same as last year. Of the 95 black children who attended camp, 42 came from Neighborhood House, Wilmington.
- 5. Morld Hunger Offerings: totalled \$1,008.00 this year as part of the weekly Galilean Candlelight Services, an increase of \$168.00 over last year. Since 1975 the total amount of \$0,953.00 has been contributed to this worthy cause. Perometh campers and staff CARE about world hunger.
- Spring Work Days: we are indebted to the 198+ volunteers who contributed over 196 hours to prepare the camp buildings and grounds for ministry!
 - 7. ELMC Comperships: showed a dramatic increase in the number of children who took advantage of the one-half camperships provided by the Missional Priority Fund. Twenty-seven children used this resource this year as compared to 17 last year.
 - Work for Persons with Mental Retardation: was once again a highlight of the summer season with 53 campers. This number represented a planned reduction of 571 in order to provide more adequate supervision, trained leadership and medical attention. Three nurses (RN) were on duty that week and the counselorcamper ratio was 1 to 3.
 - Camper Staff: increased from 47 in 1986 to 54 this summer due to the increase in the number of campers (145). Four male counselors from England were secured from Camp America, Inc., and were an asset to our staff.
 - 16. Mini Camp: for second grade children in its second year proved to be a success once again. We were happy to learn that all 1986 mini-campers attended camp in 1987 as regular campers.
 - 11. Christian Education Sunday: Offering: totalled \$9,822.42, enabling the camp to reach its goal of \$9,500.
 - 12. Camp Development Plan: was presented to the Zoning Appeals Board of Queen Anne's County, Md. on June 4th. Approval of the overall plan of development was granted.
- 13. Campership Pund: for disadvantaged boys and girls closed the year with a balance of \$3,438.59 and provided a camping experience for eight campers who otherwise would not have attended camp.
 - 14. New This Year: three new program components were especially well received and given high ratings by the campers who participated in them, namely, the Eastern Shore Bike Hike, the Rafting-Kayaking program with the Blue Ridge Outfitters' Outdoor School, and the Workboat-Canoe Trip featuring crabbing on the Chester River.
 - 15. Cabin Adoption Plan: is now in its 12th year and we are pleased to welcome two new churches to this program. The United Methodist Men of Epworth UNC, Rehoboth Beach, DE transformed the Boys' Wash House in the spring. The men of Rent Island UNC have recently adopted 'Cabin X' on Boys' Mill. roday 2 dout of 26 peninsula Conference being maintained by the laity of The Peninsula Conference.

- 16. Camp Finances: Balances as of December 31st were \$10,596.18 in the Operating Budget and \$19,531.21 in the Specialty Budget.
- 17. Camp Usage: remained high once again. While showing a decrease in the number of campers, an increase was shown in the number of days the camp facilities were used. It is a general feeling that the camp facilities are nearing capacity usage.

- Promotion: the Camp Director/Manager brought the Pecometh Story to 2,099 persons in 15 church groups and 43 camping groups, and drove 1,190 miles.
- 19. Continuing Education: The Camp Director/Manager participated in six Continuing Education events, namely, ACA Fall Management Conference (Athens, GA), ACA International Congress (DC), Management Seminar (Wilm. District), Parish Development Seminar (Peninsula Conference), N.E. Jurisdictional Geminar (Moravia, Geneva, NI).
- Camp Development: the 1987 Annual Conference passed an enabling resolution to develop a five million dollar fund campaign for Camp development.
- Fund Contract: the contract to conduct the fund raising compaign was signed between Peninsula Conference and the Office of Finance and Field Service, General Board of Global Ministries on December 10, 1987, with said campaign to start July 1, 1988.
- 22. Reorganization of Board: The Board of Directors of Pecometh has been reorganized into five working teams, each team headed by a chairperson. The teams are - Program, Personnel, Facilities, Finance, and Camp Development.

1989 Program Objectives

- TO ESTABLISH A CAMP AMBASSADOR IN EVERY ETHNIC MINORITY LOCAL CHURCH OF THE PENINSULA CONFERENCE.

 - Process: The Camp Pecometh Board of Directors will assume responsibility for implementation in cooperation with the Conference Council on Ministries and the Council on Finance and Administration. This projection includes a Conference-wide capital funds drive by receiving pledges beginning January 1, 1989.
- ENCOURAGE THE USE OF THE PECOMETH "SPEAKERS' BUREAU" THROUGHOUT THE PENINGULA CONFERENCE WITH SPECIAL EMPHASIS DIRECTED TOWARDS THE ETHNIC MINORITY LOCAL CHURCHES.
 - Process: Promote use of the "Speakers' Bureau" through the Communicator, Ministers' Coordinated Mailings, and the Ministers & Mates' Associations.
- 6. TO DEVELOP AT LEAST ONE NEW CAMPING PROGRAM DURING THE YEAR.

 Process: Discover campers' interests and needs through written evaluations on a weekly basis in addition to communication with other church camps.
- 7. CONTINUE TO STRENGTHEN AND PROMOTE ADULT CAMPING PROGRAMS.
 - Process: Discover needs of adults who already use the camp and continue to work through the Conference Coordinators of Adult and Family Ministries in conjunction with the Conference Committee on Retreat Ministries
- TO THOROUGHLY EVALUATE AND FURTHER DEVELOP THE CHRISTIAN EDUCATION COMPONENT OF THE SUMMER CAMPING PROGRAM.
 - Process: This evaluation and development shall be the seponsibility of the Program Committee of the Board of Directors in conjunction with the Area Coordinators of the Conference Council on Ministries and the Camp Director/Manager using the Summer Campers Evaluations as references.
- TO INCORPORATE A GREATER SENSE OF APPRECIATION AND UNDERSTANDING OF WILDLIFE IN THE CAMP PROGRAM INCLUDING THE CONSTRUCTION OF A POMD ON THE UPPER LEVEL OF THE CAMP'S PROPERTY.
 - Process: The Wildlife Management plan as formulated by the Maryland Wildlife Administration, Department of Natural Resources, shall be implemented. Proper of Cultivation of the property for continued grower of the property for continued grower of the forms of wildlife shall be given priority status in the development of the camp.
- 18. CAMP PECOMETH WILL CONTINUE TO EVALUATE THESE GOALS AND STRATEGIES IN RELATIONSHIP TO THE EMC.

Process: This evaluation shall be done by the Camp Pecometh Board of Directors in conjunction with an Ethnic Minority Task Force, Special Ministries of Peninsula Annual Conference and the Camp Director/Manager. Particular attention will be given to Asian Korean, Hispanic, and Native American as well as Black.

Committee on Communications

Wow, what a year this has been! The Communications Committee continues to make new and bold strides in the ministry of communications in the Peninsula Conference.

Due to the vision of the 1987 session of the Peninsula Annual Conference, the budget of this committee was increased to 575,888. This enabled us to do new and exciting things to help spread the Word of God to all of the Peninsula.

We held two seminars at Drayton last fall to help start the training process in the local church as concerns a ministry of communications. With the help of the United Methodist Reporter Institute, these seminars were well attended and considered huge successes.

One big accomplishment was to put "Catch the Spirit" on overthe-air local television stations. "Catch the Spirit" can now be seen each Sunday on either Channel 16 or Channel 51 (Kilmington area). Local pastors are being encouraged to do a 98-second "Devotional" during the programs to allow us to add a "local" flavor to this national broadcast.

Also, this year we started a matching grant program for local churches. All churches in the Conference are eligible for matching monies (up to \$580) for new communications projects in their area. Already (as of January 15, 1988) the Communications Committee has made seven grants to churches from all of the districts of the Conference.

We are planning innovative and exciting spring and fall campaigns for 1988. Our vision is that local churches will take the Conference Communications work as a backdrop for their own local campaigns to tell the world that we, the United Methodist Churches on the Delmarva Peninsula, are alive and well and ready to minister to the needs of our neighbors.

Cross-Racial Appointments Task Force

After the 1985 session of the Peninsula Annual Conference adopted the paper "Cross-Racial Appointments: Policy and Procedures (For Study and Implementation), a task force was appointed by the Cabinet to oversee the implementation of the resolution Appendix I.

The following are the action statements of the resolution and what the Task Force has accomplished:

 With the intent of educating and challenging local church leaders to understand the United Methodist Covenant of Open Itineracy, we request that the district conferences for this purpose be held no later than the end of March 1986.

The district conferences were all held in 1986. For more information see the May 1986 report of this Task Force.

II. All pastors shall attend one professional growth seminar of 76-92 hours dealing with racism, inclusiveness, and crossracial appointments to be developed by the Board of Ordained Ministry and offered annually through 1992.

The Professional Growth Seminars are being held in October and May of each year at Drayton Manor. They are under the capable leadership of Chrowther Chrolis and Richard Varell of the Board of Ordained Ministry. Barbara Thompson of the General Commission on Religion and Race has been the primary resource person at each seminar. Many clergypersons have participated to date. Seminars are planned for the next few years so that all clergypersons in the Peninaula Annual Conference will have an opportunity to participate

III. Each District Superintendent dedicate 20-30 minutes of each Charge Conference in 1985 to a discussion of steps being taken by each pastor and Pastor-Parish Relations Committee to prepare for cross-racial appointments.

This was completed in 1987. The Task Force recommends that the Covenant on Racism that is frequently used at a session of the Annual Conference be used at each Charge Conference in 1988; thus, broadening the numbers of persons who are covenant and, thus, the comma them to other annual Conference to work to eradicate both overt and

IV. Each District Superintendent begin dialogue by the end of 1985 with at least three charges in their district believed to be candidates for the development of cross-racial appointments.

V. Each District Superintendent with the Commission on Religion and Race shall, by June 1986, begin training and preparing three charges per district to receive a pastor of a different race at the time of the next pastoral change.

Each District Superintendent began dialogues with three churches on each district. After the initial meetings with the selected churches it became obvious to the Task Force and the Cabinet that the implementing of IV and V as written would be very difficult. Churches resented being selected. The word that began to circulate was "targeted." This word caused many problems. It soom was also obvious that given the itinerant and appointive nature of the United Methodist Church, to determine and to guarantee that a given church would receive a cross-racial appointment at the next change of pastoral appointments is difficult because of the personnel and other factors that are

After many meetings with the Cabinet, the Task Force suggests the following to replace IV and V:

IV. That the Task Force design a process where each church/charge in the Peninsula Annual Conference be prepared for open itinerary. The first two steps would be:

- A. Reflection/Dialogue Groups at each session of the Peninsula Annual Conference. (These groups in 1988 will meet on Monday afternoon with facilitators from the General Commission on Religion and Race and small group leaders from the Peninsula Annual Conference.)
- B. District events planned by the Conference Commission on Religion and Race. These events will begin as early as June 1988 in the Salisbury District. (The format of the District event will be in the packet given to each member at the Annual Conference session.)

Following the Reflection/Dialogue Groups at Annual Conference, the Task Force with the Annual Conference and the General Commission will design other means of preparing the church for open itineracy.

V. By June 1986 the Board of Ordained Ministry shall develop guidelines for adoption by the Annual Conference to assure greater equity in cross-racial appointments with regard to compensation and status.

VI. The Cabinet with the Board of Ordained Ministry shall develop by June 1985 support processes and structures for pastors, their families, and congregations involved in cross-racial appointments.

In discussions with persons who are currently involved in cross-racial appointments, it is unclear just what kind of support processes and structures for pastors, their families and congregations might be needed and/or helpful. When the Task Force met with persons who are currently serving there was no consensus about the need for or (if needed) the design that would be most helpful. The Task Force is reviewing the information gathered to determine what kind of support might be implemented.

VII. That representatives of the Missional Priority Coordinating Committee work along with the Task Force for Cross-Racial Appointments for the purpose of evaluating the effectiveness of cross-racial appointments as they strengthen or weaken the ethnic minority in local churches.

See report of the Missional Priority Coordinating Committee.

VIII. The Task Force will report on the strengthening or other effects on all churches participating in these programs.

Members of the Task Force met with pastors who are currently involved in cross-racial appointments. The following are some observations from interviews with the pastors now working in cross-racial appointments:

- a. a need to be careful as to who is appointed. Is the person on a basis of past performance one who demonstrates the ability and is personally ready to accept the challenge?
- a need for preparation: such as learning of the cultural stance of the congregation - a learning of the cultural offering of the pastor to the congregation.
- c. another concern cited was the rural-urban differences, especially when a pastor's previous ministries have been largely in one area.
- d. the attitude of the congregation. (Many PPR reports indicate that nothing is being done from within the congregation to prepare them to accept a person of another race or sex.)
- there is a fear on the part of some white congregations that the appointment of a black pastor will make the church go largely black.

The Task Force will meet with pastors in cross-racial appointments at least annually, but makes itself available to meet at any time needed.

Drayton Manor

Report of the Board of Directors

This report to the Annual Conference comes at the end of the three-year period the Penisula Annual Conference has given the new Board of Directors at Drayton to deal with two basic mandates: First, that the Board find alternate sources of income in order to First, that the Board find alternate sources of income in order to see the secondary of the secondary, that the new Board of Directors deal with the long-range future of Drayton.

Pursuant to the first mandate, the Endowment Fund has increased from \$11.089 % to \$100,000 %, thus creating adequate operating income; there is no subsidy request in the Annual Conference budget beginning in 1989. That has come as the result of two factors: a stabilizing of the financial status of Drayton (increased usage and management) and sale of 11 acres of non-programmatically strategic land.

As to the second issue, the Board of Directors have spent many hundreds of hours in analyzing the long-range future of Drayton and has developed a long-range plan that would result in the building of a wing at the rear of the Manor (these-story in mature, with nine most puest rooms, a dining hall to seat 75 to 100 people, and many long that the seat of the building would include an elevator to improve access to the building.

During the past 18 months, the Board has been able to raise \$295,400 toward the total cost of \$855,400 for the new addition (\$759,800 for the building and furnishings and another \$100,800 for the building and furnishings and another \$100,800 for renovations and financing costs). The strategy of the Board at this point is to seek a foundation grant from the Kresge Foundation (a request for \$295,800 is now in the hands of that foundation). In addition, Consultation Conferences are being held around the Conference (10 to 12 persons invited to hear the Drayton story and to pledge financial support to the long-range future of Drayton). They will conclude in May 1988.

The Board rejoices in that we have more than met the requirements of the original mandate in 1985. The Conference will not provide any more program subsidy for Drayton (\$42,800 received in the budget in 1985 will be & in 1989). We feel we are moving in a major way toward the completion of the second phase of the program subsidy of the second phase of the program on weekends and will also provide a great deal more income than expenses in accommodating the additional groups. In effect, we will be able to have two groups every weekend instead of one (we work primarily with groups of 28-15 members; we will also be able to accommodate larger groups during the week and weekends when that is required). Our income will be present of additional income, thus providing a margin of profit to care for the operating expenses of Drayton.

A specific plan of action from this point will be developed and presented to the April 15 meeting of the CCOM and will be available for discussion at the pre-Conference briefings and on the floor of Annual Conference. The plan will call for Drayfor to secure income from its already-extabilized with whom we have already made contact over the past two and half years.

Drayton is more than aware of the fact (and cooperates completely with the agenda of the Peninsula Annual Conference) that now it is Camp Recometh's opportunity. Drayton's continuing to draw from the already-established Friends and other sources will not in any way represent solicitation from those who have not already been relating to the Drayton story.

We are unbelievably excited and pleased that we have been able in less than two and half years to bring this kind of report to the Annual Conference. It is due in large measure to the highly dedicated group of persons who have served on the Board of Directors of Drayton. As the Chairperson of that Board, I want to take the

opportunity to publicly thank each of those persons through this report.

It would have been good if we could have accomplished everything by the Annual Conference session of 1988. That was a dream that was almost a fantasy. We believe that it is almost miraculous that we have been able already to raise over \$600,000 of the one-million dollar goal and have prospects of significant money at this time.

It is hard to conceptualize the Peninsula Annual Conference without a Drayton Retreat Center. So many of our boards, agencies, commissions, committees, districts, Program Management Teams, and Cabinets have grown accustomed to the availability of Drayton. This is not to mention all of the local churches in retreats, spiritual renewal seminars, and program planning as well as those who have attended the many exciting continuing education events. Drayton has, in the last three years, become more a fixed put the final piace in place. There will be no lack of effort on the part of the Board of Directors to accomplish that.

As of July 1, 1988 Drayton moves into a new era. It is time then for new leadership. Jim Morgan, who has served Drayton and has given his best for eight years, will be taking another appointment. Bob McKee, a very capable member of our Annual Conference Council on Ministries, local churchman and also member of the Board of Directors of Drayton, will assume the leadership of the Board, assisted by those dedicated Board members and committees who have made Drayton possible.

I hope I speak for Jim Morgam in saying that the time with Drayton has been exciting and wonderful. But I also realize for a variety of reasons that it is time to move on. I welcome the new leadership who will arrive at Drayton July 1 to take Drayton into the leadership who will arrive at Drayton July 1 to take Drayton into the resident District Superintendent. Jim will always remain a friend of Drayton and as he wishes an active participant in the life of the Retreat Center both as a participant and leader. I take this opportunity to express my appreciation to him on behalf of all of the Friends of Drayton for his giving of himself over these eight years thank you will be offered Jim; we will have such an occasion in June when we recognize those who have been so strategic to Drayton to this point and also welcome the new leadership.

Report of the Resident Director

For a variety of reasons prayton is playing an increasing role in the lives of people on a spiritual journey with thrist. More persons are expressing themselves in this regard, saying that their time here has been "refreshing", "renewing", or "rewarding". It is a thankful note that a larger number in our Conference are sharing the encourages crowth in the Christian life; ty which energizes and

This attitude is reflected by the increased use by churches in 1897. There were 117 churches who came to retreat and plan in 1987, up from 99 in 1986. That is an increase of 15%. Some 49 churches were from the Peninsula Conference, while others came from the Baltimore Conference and eight other denominations. A growing number of civic organizations are discovering the advantages of brayton and

are coming during the week to plan and train their staffs, which contributes significantly to the budget. The total number of persons attending retreats and events in 1987 was 4210, up 19% over 1986.

Income for 1987 increased \$7300 over 1986 and left a balance of \$29,336 in the operating account. This was all in addition to over \$550,400 that was raised in our Capital Fund Drive for which we received the Barnabas Award for effectivenes in atewardship.

Contributions from the Friends of Drayton, a rapidly growing 1895. They are a vital force for us. Many visible improvements were made to the property this year. Some of them were: the planting of new trees, new drapes (handmade by members of the Board) in ten rooms, new pictures on the walls, repair of the bart roof and many other water tower and a new tractor was purchased.

The Open House was an outstanding success with many new people wisiting prayton for the first time and learning of its opportunities and program. Sixteen continuing education events were held in 1997 for both clergy and laity. They were in the areas of theology, Bible study, pastoral care, administration, and preaching as well as a number in spiritual formation. Registration was up 45% over 1986. What began in a modest way in 1981 has now flowered into a substantial program for our Conference as well as for the three adjoining Conferences to whom we directly market. Drayton is becoming a regional center for continuing education for clergy and laity, and hosting well-known and respected leaders from across the init a finer setting anwhere.

Missional Priority Coordinating Committee

The beginning of a new year reminds us of exciting possibilities for greater service to fulfill the purpose of the Missional Priority.

The Missional Priority Coordinating Committee has attempted to do God's will as we planned, implemented and carried out the mandate of empowering the Ethnic Minority Local Church for witness and mission.

In reviewing the past, we can rejoice over 1987 as another fine year. Among the outstanding accomplishments were:

- -- Completion of a Comprehensive Strategy Development Plan which was presented and adopted at Annual Conference. This Plan calls for incorporation of the goals, objectives and strategies of the priority in the ongoing life and program of the Annual Conference. This Plan also provides for ongoing support of several major programs instituted.
- -- The Committee sponsored a Convocation on EMLC on October 3, 1987 at Wesley College, entitled "Celebrating the Gifts and Graces of EMLC." The work of the Mission Teams' efforts to embrace minority churches in empowering them for witness and mission was highlighted.
 - -- Under the leadership of the Staff Representative to the MPCC and Special Ministries Consultants, the Missional Priority District Mission Team Project was developed. These Mission

Teams, representing white and black churches, were presented and Commissioned by Bishop yeakel and deployed to minority churches to work in the areas of Christian education, church and community work, or building repairs, thereby strengthening the whole church.

- -- Special Ministries Consultants continued to assist local churches to do needs assessments of mission and ministry in buildings or programs - to develop Christian Education programs through church schools - to develop youth ministries and Stewardship programs.
- -- General Board of Discipleship met with Conference Missional Priority leadership on the 21rd of October, 1987 for the purpose of reviewing program development of BMLC. An ongoing consultative process is being established with this agency.
- -- The Rev. George Commodore, Special Ministries Consultant, attended the National Meeting at Gulfside, Mississippi and presented a direction paper entitled "The Incorporation of the Ethnic Minority Local Church - 1988-92 Quadrennium."

During 1987, the Missional Priority Coordinating Committee was responsible for funding or facilitating the following EMLC Projects:

- a. Summer Youth Work Program (Wilmington)
- b. Summer Youth Program (Pocomoke City)
- c. Summer Youth Program (Dover)
- d. BMCR Youth Rally
- e. Mission Project, Oakville-Cottage Grove United Methodist Church
- f. Funding to support Korean Church Development (Rev. Bruner)

Projects Approved and Forwarded to National Agencies:

- a. Wilmington Hispanic Proposal
- b. Mt. Pleasant U.M. Church (building project)
- c. Oakville-Cottage Grove U.M. Church (building program)
- d. John Wesley U.M. Church (parsonage proposal)

As the Quadrennium comes to an end, the questions are: how has the Ethnic Minority Church in all aspects become totally incorporated in the life of the Peninsula Conference, its program boards, Council on Ministries, its Cabinet, and are we a more inclusive church than before? The answers to these questions are not in the affirmative. However, the Missional Priority has made a difference. It has added much to the total ministries of EML churches, enabled the beginning of new and innovative ministries. Congregations throughout the Conference have become involved in programs and projects with Ethnic Minority persons and local churches. All of this is shaping and molding a future of the church's mission to share the love of Christ with the people of the community in which it serves.

The Committee takes this opportunity to thank the Bishop, his Cabinet, and local congregations for helping the MPCC and the Council ouniet, and local congregations for neeling the MPUC and the Council on Ministries to accomplish what it has. Time and space would not permit me to name all of you. However, I do take this opportunity to thank J. Gordon Stapleton for his assistance and support to the Committee, Vaughn Johnson for his creative leadership and direction, James Riley for continued concern, Jamet Commodore for being the best secretary a committee could wish for, Susan Keirn Kester for development of the Missional Priority Logo, the Special Ministries Consultants, and last but not least, the Missional Priority Coordinating Committee. Because of you, the picture of the Peninsula Conference is much brighter as it relates to "Developing and Strengthening the Ethnic Minority Local Church for Witness and Mission.

- Any building proposal submitted will be evaluated and assessed or recommended for possible funding by the Ethnic Minority Local Church Committee to either the Conference Board of Global Ministries or the General Board of Global Ministries.
- All Conference programs related to the Missional Priority Coordinating Committee shall be carefully evaluated and funded as outlined on Page 76 of the Comprehensive Plan.

Program Committee:

General Goals

- 1. To continue to monitor program goals for the Conference Boards and Agencies to determine appropriateness for advocacy by Missional Priority Committee and to determine areas in need of program development.
- To work with existing boards and agencies and if necessary refer program needs of the EMLC to insure the fullest involvement of every area in the Missional Priority.

Sub-goals

- a. To identify effective models of youth evangelism and programming in EMLC and advocate their implementation, to encourage revival of semi-annual district youth events and Annual Conference Youth Rallies (Refer to Youth Council on this goal)
- To advocate participation by EMLC's in laboratory schools for teacher training. (Refer to Division of Education and have this group monitor Division on this goal)
- c. To review models for changing the understanding of commitment to Stewardship that are appropriate to the EMC. (Division of Stewardship has this goal)
- d. To review existing programs of Evangelism and Church
 Growth that are specific to the EMLC, or can be

- Assist EMLC in adopting a mission statement based upon a needs assessment.

Establish events that will sensitize pastors and churches to open up understanding of cultural differences and sensitize congregations to be sensitive to the needs of African ministers. Encourage U.H.W. to work on this goal. Develop Task Force with Board of Global Ministries to look at the kinds of programs that could be developed.
- Continue to develop and implement the District Missional Priority Proposal.
- To continue to emphasize and provide support for the Consultants beyond '88. The Special Ministries Consultants

should be continued to assist ethnic churches in developing mission strategies, i.e., ministries that will relate closely to the needs of women, youth, young adults, senior citizens, and justice and outreach church programs. In addition, Special Ministries Consultants will assist churches in developing short-term and long-term goals as they relate to churches' mission in Evangelism, Stewardship, and Christian Education.

 Consultants should encourage churches to be intentional in dealing with church and community development.

General Goals

The tasks of the EMLC Committee are:

- Monitor the progress of the Plan in those Conference agencies which have a share of responsibility for its implementation.
- b. Report regularly to the Conference Council on Ministries and the Annual Conference.
- c. Administer those funds which are held for implementation of the plan and report on their use.
- d. Make such suggestions as are necessary to amend, improve or change the plan once it is adopted so that it may remain current and responsible to the needs of the EMLC.

In addition to the staff Person, Special Ministries utilizes four (4) Special Ministries Consultants that are assigned to a district, but also, according to their specific gifts and skills, to develop mission and ministry. They include Janet Harmon of the Wilmington District, Hayward Greene of the Dover District, George Commodore of the Easton District, and Grant Johnson of the Salisbury District. These consultants also work with the Education Consultants to develop programs with the ethnic churches in the areas of church school and leadership development. These consultants also develop and sponsor programs with the think churches in the areas of church and sponsor programs when included acolyte training, leadership programs for the small membership training, VBS training, PPRC training, and curriculum workshops.

In addition to this work, Special Ministries has helped to resource several local churches in their building program. This was begun with the understanding of the process for building as outlined by the Discipline, developing preliminary drawings and finding financial support.

BOARD OF CHURCH AND SOCIETY

I. An AIDS Ministry and Program

Responding to a resolution of the 1987 Annual Conference to create a Conference-wide AIDS ministry and program, the Board of Church and Society, under the direction of the Rev. Harold E. Walton, chair of the program area on human welfare, established a representative task force composed of persons on and outside of the

- Board. The following recommendations were adopted by the Conference Council on Ministries:
- To distribute among leaders of churches in the Annual Conference a packet of materials that sets forth the biblical and theological perspective of our church and directs local persons to other publications and persons who can be helpful. To include:
- -- Information for Persons With Aids (PWA's) and their loved ones:
 - -- Information on developing a local AIDS ministry:
- -- A list of available resources on the local and Conference levels (networking):
 - -- A bibliography of available materials;
 - -- A composite of related church pamphlets and brochures.
- -- Development of materials and resources of all kinds including knowledgeable people to help in addressing the issues related to human sexuality.
- Support of the center in Salisbury sponsored by Asbury Church and the center in Wilmington sponsored by DEA, in the form of:
 - -- Funds: books and materials;
 - -- Recruitment of volunteers;
 - -- Information via The Communicator.
 - -- Other forms of envisioned support.
 - The creation/distribution of liturgical materials.

4. The financial support of a consultant who would be at the Service of the Annual Conference and would need funds for materials/training to maintain adequate skills and professional awareness.

II. Pacem in Terris

The Board has increased its support of Pacem in Terris, an ecumenical program dealing with peace and justice issues. Its director, Dr. Sally Hilbury-Steen, is a member of the Board and provides for the whole Conference leadership and resources, projects provides for the whole Conference leadership and resources, projects can participate. Pacework, Pacem in Terris' publication, is sent to each local pastor and Church and Society chairperson.

The Board sent letters to both President Ronald Reagan and Mikhael Gorbachev commending them for their participation in the December 1987 Summit at which time they signed an INF agreement eliminating medium range missiles from the two nations' arsenals.

III. Housing and Homelessness

The Rev. Richard Green, one of the co-chairs of the program area monitonmental justice, has led the Board in considering just how we might be more locally involved in addressing the serious social problem of homelessness and lack of adequate housing for so many in the Conference geographical area. Steps to deal with this have been

taken in terms of networking with others, finding out what is available locally for the homeless and programs for providing low-income housing.

IV Pace Pelations

The Rev. Ronald Bell, Sr., chair of the program area on economic justice, led the Board in emphasizing the need to respond to a series of racial incidents in the Conference geographical area. Cooperating with the EMCC program and the Commission on Religion and Race, the Board worked to help local church communities to be more inclusive.

V. The Smyrna Bus Ministry

The Board continued to support the ecumenical Smyrna Bus Ministry project which provides bus transportation for Wilmington area families of prisoners at the Delaware Correctional Center who do not have access for regular visits.

VI. Children in Crisis

Punds were provided to help alleviate hunger in Somerset County. Cooperating with the EMLC program emphasis the Board tried to sensitize local clergy and laity to the needs of children, especially those of ethnic minorities who are disproportionately represented among those in poverty and hunger and homelessness.

The majority of these programs and projects were significantly aided by a September retreat the Board held at Drayton Manor at which the Rev. Mary Council-Austin of the General Board of Church and Society was the key-note speaker and principal resource person.

- Training Events
 To support persons to attend vital training events which will
 help the local churches and Conference Board of Church and
 Society to be more effective.
- The Smyrna Bus Ministry
 To continue contributing to this ecumenical program which
 provides bus transportation to Wilmington area families for
 prisoners in the Delaware Correctional Center at Smyrna.

 Emerging Issues Contingency funds have been set aside to allow the Board to respond to some vital issue which may surface during the course of the year.

BOARD OF DISCIPLESHIP

The role of the Board of Discipleship is to be of support and service to all churches of the Peninsula Annual Conference. To fulfill this mandate, the Board members and staff identified the following areas of ministry for which we provide resources and services: Education for Christian Living, Strengthening the Ethnic Hunority Local Church, Church School Development, Evangelism, Stewardship, Age-level and Family Ministries, Leadership Development and Training.

Under the leadership of the Division of Evangelism, the movement called "Offer Then Christ" was highly successful. This special program was designed to help local churches become more aware of their role of evangelism in their regular week-by-week ministry through a special emphasis in the areas of preaching, teaching, and reaching,

On November 13-14, 1987 at Drayton Manor, the Board held a planning retreat for the 1989 programs and budget at which time we developed our direction and goals as a unified board. Many of these goals represented a continuation or development of existing programs of the Board of Discipleship. Others represented our response to expressed needs not currently being met.

The Division of Education composed a plan to help local churches recruit, encourage, and develop teachers. The strategy manual was designed in 1986, and a workshop process for effectively introducing it was created and tested in 1987. In 1988, "To Grow A Teacher" will be introduced using that workshop in a series of sub-district meetings.

A variety of focused stewardship workshops were conducted throughout the Conference primarily simed at the particular needs of the local churches in this area. This Division celebrated the second anniversary of the Order of St. Barnabas, an intentional and ongoing Conference-wide stewardship program.

Plans are underway by the Division of Worship to organize and nurse a Chapter of the Fellowship of United Methodists in Worship, Music, and Other Arts as a practical strategy to resource the worshipping life in our churches.

I want to express appreciation to an outstanding team of Division Chairpersons: Paul R. Bauer, Education, and Michaele S. Bussell, Stewardship, both of whom have completed eight years of service to the Board; Robert O. Wallace, Evangelism, and Beverly J. Roupp, Worship; staff members Harvey Manchester, Jr., James R. Worgan, and Vaughn A. Johnson have been most helpful as well as Consultants Doris Phillips and Elizabeth St. Clair, and Children's Coordinator, Cindy Quillen.

Division of Education

This has been a year of building. We began building in January with Bally '87 in Houston for Christian educators. A strong cadre of laity and clergy participated in this event and are adding a new dimension to our work in the Peninsula Conference.

"To Grow A Teacher" has been our primary focus. There were many things which needed to be put into place in order to begin building this training program. It will be inaugurated during the spring of 1988.

Our Consultants ministry, training workshops, and support for the DEA and the Interfaith Lay Academy are ongoing concerns. A great deal of time and effort goes into making these programs effective tools for training and growth.

The churches in the North Kent Sub-District have been getting together and have found support from each other. This may become a model for other clusters of churches to use in working together.

Two fall events were great successes. We conducted a Music Festival led by Flo Keiger and a seminar on worship and storytelling with Mike Williams at Drayton Manor. Both were well appreciated.

As this quadrennium draws to a close, as well as my position as Chairperson of the Division of Education, I would like to extend my deepest appreciation to all those persons who have given so tirelessly and unselfishly to further the efforts of Christian Education in our Conference. It has indeed been a blessed time.

1989 Program Objectives

- To provide local churches the opportunity to engage in an indepth process for developing and strengthening their education ministry under the quidance of trained consultants.
- To provide brief introductions (1 1/2-2 hr. format) to basic teaching and administrating skills. (These are the workshops traditionally offered in August and September.)
- To provide a half-day experience of observing a skilled teacher teach a class and to analyze what took place and how skills were used.
- To provide financial support for the ministry of the DEA Resource Center and its Interfaith Lay Academy.
- To place useful Christian education audio-visuals in the Conference Office.
- 6. To provide skills training especially for those who teach youth.

- 7. To offer an evening rally on each district designed to motivate teachers and to offer them theological enrichment; and, during the day, to offer consultation with interested pastors in how to build bridges in the church school for racial inclusiveness, how to establish caring themes, and how to use and teach prayer in the church school classroom.
- To enable parents to understand and act upon their responsibility in the religious education of their children.
- To enrich discipleship through awareness and action by providing a retreat at Drayton to deal with persons on the periphery of the church's ministry (widows, divorced, senior citizens, unchurched, etc.
- 16. (1) To provide teachers an intensive opportunity to improve planning and teaching skills and (2) to prepare persons to be teacher trainers in the Peninsula Conference and to become certified lab leaders.
- 11. To help send persons to Pocus '89, a United Methodist National Conference on Ministries with Children. This conference utilizes scores of top-notch leaders in hundreds of workshop offerings or teachers and others engaged in ministry with children.
- To send the CCOM staff related to the Division of Education to professional meetings and conferences beyond the scope of continuing education.
- 13. To send a person to be trained to lead workshops in the Annual Conference introducing the new hymnal for use in local churches, with emphasis on how the hymnal is used in Christian education.
- 14. To provide funds for the Division of Education officers to attend education conferences and events.
- 15. To inform Annual Conference members and others as to what is available to promote Christian education.

Division of Evangelism

The major thrust of Evangelism in 1987 was the Conference-wide movement known as "Offer Them Christ" which was received and supported by 86% of the pastoral charges.

Resulting from the movement has been a renewed emphasis on evangelism, new Sunday school classes, Bible study groups, and last, but not of least importance, an increase in church membership.

Two other events that have benefited local churches and individuals were the training sessions for lay speakers in evangelism led by Vance Archer of Nashville and a two-part training and motivation program led by a number of lay persons from the Conference. The purpose of these sessions was to create deeper local church be importance of evangelism by every member of any local church.

Fifty-seven local churches were recognized as Five-Star Churches for outstanding work in evangelism during the year.

For the first time, the Harry Denman Evangelism Award was awarded to Mr. William C. Hopkins of Conley's Chapel Church, Lewes, Delaware.

Division of Stewardship

As the present quadrennium draws to a close, the Division of Stewardship is happy to report on a busy and exciting year. Local churches and individuals across the Peninsula Conference have shown an increased awareness of the need for creative, effective stewardship resulting from deepening faith commitments. Requests for stewardship workshops have increased as well as requests for stewardship materials, and the Division of Stewardship has aborded to stewardship materials, and the Division of Stewardship has aborded to the committee of the commi

Effective stewardship reflects an air of celebrating our participation in, and response to God's kingdom on earth. With that concept in the back of our minds, the Division of Stewardship participated in the following stewardship programs in 1987:

- a. We conducted more local church stewardship workshops than ever before. EMLC churches continued to have the highest request rate for workshops, and overall attendance at workshops has increased.
- b. We celebrated the second anniversary of the Order of St. Barnabas, an intentional and ongoing Conference-wide Stewardship Program. In November, we honored the 1987 Members of the Order of St. Barnabas at a reception held in Greenwood UNG in Greenwood, Delaware. The program and worship service for "An Evening With Barnabas" were written by the Division's Chairperson, Rev. Dr. Michaele S. Russell.

- c. In November and December the Division of Stewardship offered Bi-District workshops in stewardship education. They were held in Canden, Delaware (Nov., Whatcoat UMC) for Dover and Wilmington Districts, and in Cambridge, Haryland (Dec., Waugh UMC) for the Salisbury and Easton Districts. Stewardship training was shared by Michaele S. Russell, Division Chairperson; Waughn A. Johnson, Staff Representative; and Bryan Rice, Foundation Director.
- d. Two (2) members of the Division of Stewardship participated in the annual NASI leadership training workshops in St. Louis, Missouri in April, 1987.
- e. The Division of Stewardship has maintained communication with the Section on Stewardship, Board of Discipleship in Nashville, TN regarding new stewardship resources, future EMCC stewardship training workshops, and updates on the Order of St. Barnabas.
- f. In April, 1987 Vaughn A. Johnson and Michaele S. Russell conducted the first stewardship workshop requested by a community ministerium (the greater Harrington-Felton area). It was well-attended and well-received.

Stewardship means living out our commitment to Jesus the Christ on an everyday basis, and it has been a blessing to see local churches and folks wrestle with the issues surrounding effective, creative stewardship. It has also been a blessing working with the members of the Division of Stewardship as we wrestled with the same issues as well as program and budget concerns. Special thanks go to Vaughn A. Johnson, our Staff Representative, who always challenged us and kept us centered on our task over the last four (4) years. Working together made my job easier, and it allowed us to offer local churches the best we had to offer.

Division of Worship

One would think that being elected Chairperson for the Division of Worship on July 7, 1987, for a term ending in May 1988, would not necessarily denote much activity other than establishing Division

leadership. This assumption could be true except for when your group is blessed with God's presence and the support of experienced committee members and skilled staff representatives. Therein lies the likelihood of a successful program, one which makes it possible to develop inclusive worship experiences to be shared by and among the diverse people of United Methodism on the Peninsula.

Each year the Division of Worship collaborates with the Conference Arrangements Committee in planning and preparing worship experiences for Annual Conference. As the varied tasks are determined, the Division has responded with recommendations such as the well-received Conference Worship Leader, Heather Murray Elkins in 1987.

This year the Division of Worship organized an Annual Conference Task Force Committee. Its members were fascinated by the reading of the account of John Wesley's "Aldersgate Experience." By rediscovering what was os special in Wesley's own pligrimage to a desired relationship of wholeness with God, the committee identified conference. "PRANIME MIGHTLINIFYESTIFTING OPENLY." PENNIME ANNUAL CONFERENCE."

Other designated committee responsibilities included: 1) preparing and coordinating the three morning 15-minute worship services and the "Moly Communion" and "Aldersgate Celebration" evening services, as well as providing worship context for the Conference Preacher, Dr. Michael E. Williams; 2) furnishing service attendant logistics, such as liturgists, servers, music (choirs), and auditorium visuals; and 3) designing the process for a prayer vigil to "surround" the Annual Conference in session.

The Board of Discipleship has adopted concerns which emphasize the importance of equipping persons to help in the nutruing and educating process of building effective disciples in the Conference. By providing funds to both laity and clergy, the Division of Worship encouraged attendance at the National School of Worship (FUNWHOA) held during July, 1987. This experience provides training in worship skills for persons who are identified as having the interest and conference to become active worship resources to the churches of our Conference.

Two very special opportunities were planned in conjunction with the Division of Education and held at brayton Manor. On October 15-16, the "preaching Peers" event was led by Dr. Michael E. Williams, Director of Preaching Ministries of the General Board of Discipleship, who dealt with developing and sharpening preaching skills using Fred Craddock's video series, PREACHING. Sunday school teachers, pastors, worship leaders and others wishing to develop teachers, pastors, worship leaders and others wishing to develop the Michael Williams session "To Tell the Old/New Story," Scholarship money was made available and continuing education units were awarded to persons completing the programs.

As long as I have been a member of the Division of Worship, it has been an ongoing goal to purchase worship enrichment resources and place them in the Conference Resource Library for use by worship leaders in local chutch programming. It is our hope that these materials lend additional assistance in the designing of inclusive materials lend additional assistance in the designing of inclusive BMCC. Our programming the programmi

The other sub-committee of the Division of Worship has been to establish a Peninsula Conference Chapter of the Fellowship (FUMWMOA), and it is chaired by the Rev. Alfred Taylor. An intentional effort

will be made to increase the number of FUMWMOA members in our Conference and to assure that ethnic minority membership is recruited.

Many of you may want to know that The Pellowship of United Methodists in Worship, Nusic and Other Arts, (FUMMNOM), exists to link United Methodists who desire to strengthen their skills and the worshiping life of the church with creative, useful worship resources. We hope to create a Peninsula Conference Chapter of PTUMNNOA that would become our leadership pool from which we would resource the local church. Such an approach has worked well in other conferences.

At this writing, an all-day kick-off event has been planned for April 36, 1988, as 5t. Mark's, Baston. Heather Murray Elkins, the workshop leader, will be working with many exciting and new resource materials. Our Division looks forward to being of service to you and your church family through this caring, support group of persons with similar interests.

Hunger Task Force

During 1987 the Hunger Task Force carried out its goal of sensitizing local churches and offering ways for local churches to respond to hunger needs with a variety of methods. Educational material from UMCOR and Bread for the World, distributed through the Coordinated Mailing and at Annual Conference, have helped to inform churches. A Conference-wide survey of hunger programs was tabulated in March and became a resource for developing a four-page Communicator insert, published in December. Task Force members assisted by interviewing and photographing programs throughout the Conference. The Task Force has been developing a hunger resource booklet to assist local churches in planning programs dealing with hunger. We expect to distribute it during the spring of 1988 through our Hunger Interpreters. Our Conference CROP Walk had increased participation in 1987. We worked with the Lower Shore Food Network and with Maryland Food Bank in training and information services. are thankful for increased support for One Great Hour of Sharing, but note that UMCOR giving was down slightly. While urging greater giving for all our churches we give thanks for the witness of our Christian care about hunger issues among our churches.

Board of Child Care

One hundred twenty boys and girls from fourteen counties of Baltimore and Peninsula Conferences were received in our two emergency shelter homes in 1987. These children range in age from ten to seventeen. They come after having been removed, by Court action, from the home in which they were living. Such drastic action is adjudicated necessary because of the physical danger to the child or because sexual molestation has been occurring between child and parent or step-parent. Many children, after having stayed their limit of sixty days in emergency shelter, are transferred to semi-permanent care in our Galther Road residence.

One hundred seventy-nine children were turned away. We have completed architectural plans to construct an additional center for children. This center will target an emergency shelter population of sibling groups and children of pre-school and grade school age. The Center is expected to be on a new campus eight miles west of our Gaither Road base. Construction is delayed by appeals of a small group of residents who challenge decisions of our County Board of Appeals, our Zoning Commissioner, and our County Review Group. It grieves staff and Board of Child Care that children are left in the cold while such a delaying tactic proresses.

Adoption Services Available

"Adoption Planning for Your Baby," a recently created folder, has been mailed to each of the local churches. The message is: "Board of Child Care is available to help birth parents make a responsible choice regarding the adoptive family for their baby...Adoption can be a courageously loving decision for birth parents who are unable to care for their children."

EAGLE Status Conferred

EAGLE status was conferred upon Board of Child Care February 28th at the annual meeting of United Methodist Association of Health & Welfare Ministries. Successful completion of the EAGLE program signifies Board of Child Care has demonstrated it:

- is striving to meet and exceed legal, financial, ethical and clinical standards
- continually monitors and evaluates its service quality, the effectiveness and quality of its staff and safety of its facilities
- has designed its programs to be sensitive to meeting community needs
- has an effective management program
- has a written statement of mission and program which reflects its purpose of Christian service and witness
- has a clear written statement of relationship with a connectional unit of the UMC.

Auxiliary - A Powerful Influence

The Auxiliary has accepted the challenge to solicit 975,000 labels from Campbell's Soup Products. The labels will be redeemed for a 15 passenger Dodge Van to be used to transport children. At this writing, one-half the goal is in hand. Every member of our Church can participate. Please collect the labels and send them in. JAMBOREE, our open house with fun for all, is scheduled Saturday, October 1. Please bring a little sunshine. Cookies and gifts at Christmas were enjoyed by all our children. A party for children in foster care was held just before Christmas.

Summer program - sponsored by the Auxiliary featured a bike hike on 184 miles of the Chesapeake & Ohio Canal. Planned for summer of '88 is a repeat of the bike hike, and camping trips to Blackwater Falls, West Virginia; Allegheny State Park, New York; and Cape Henlopen, Delaware.

Development Director Joins Staff

Karen Daniel joined our staff in July '87 as director of development. Karen has helped us complete a tape slide program which presents the work with children of Board of Child Care. Karen is getting to know the many friends of Board of Child Care, visiting in their homes, showing slides and letting them know how they might help this work. This program is available to individuals or to local church groups.

Peninsula United Methodist Homes, Inc.

The mission of Peninsula United Methodist Homes, Inc., an affiliate of the Peninsula Annual Conference, is to serve the needs of older adults across the Delmarva Peninsula. With a tradition of 28 years of service, PUMH offers its residents opportunities for living a full and active life in retirement.

These are challenging times for PUNHs and other organizations that serve the elderly. The 60+ population is growing at twice the rate of total U.S. population, and the 85+ group is expected to quadruple during this decade. Many persons in this rapidly expanding elderly population will seek the kind of rectirement services that continue the services are considered to the services and services are considered to the services are considered to the services and services are considered to the services are considered to the services and the services are considered to the services are considered to the services are considered to the services and the services are considered to the s

While the number of 65 adults is growing rapidly, we are faced with a critical labor shortage. The number of young people available to serve these older persons is decreasing. In an effort to attract more young people and retain our current young employees, we implemented wage increases for service employees in our housekeeping, food service, and maintenance departments. We are concerned that we continue to provide our residents with the kind of quality service that they are accustomed.

The shortage of nursing personnel has also been especially worrisone during 1997. There are more nursing jobs than licensed nurse willing to fill the add the gap is expected to widen. As we strive to be one creative in attracting employees to our facilities, more that ever we appreciate the 658 talented, hard-working and dedicated employees we currently have. These are the people with the skills we need to make residents' lives comfortable, secure, and fulfilling.

To meet the changing needs of the 257 residents at the Methodist Kanor Country House, 248 residents at the Methodist Manor House, and 398 residents at Cokesbury Village, during 1987 PUMH expanded its services for those with special needs. On June 24, 1987, Cokesbury Village opened a 38-room personal care unit, known as the Brandywine Wing. The Brandywine Wing is designed to provide 24-hour assistance to people who need some help with the everyday little things - like bathing, dressing, or taking medications. The personal care wing, staffed with nursing aides, includes a dining room, a cook nook for preparing snacks, a garden patio, a meditation chapel, and a beautiful lounge/activity room. This new level of service enables residents to remain independent as long as possible.

Faced with the challenge of providing medical care to an increasing number of older residents needing nursing care, the Board of frustees approved plans to renovate and expand the health center at the Methodist Country House. Renovation of the existing health center will enable the Country House to meet the demand for more skilled nursing care, offer specialized care for persons with the property of the propert

To help meet the needs of a larger number of elderly persons, PDNM is planning a new retirement community in Chestertown, ND. We are developing this community of 180 spartments and cottages, known as Meron Point of Chestertown, on 5° acres along the Chester River. Marketing began in the summer of 1907, and we anticipate that the facility will open in 1911. We are pleased that we will soon meet one of our long-term goals of serving the elderly on Maryland's Eastern Shore.

Since our mission is to serve elderly persons of diverse ethnic and economic backgrounds, FURH agreed to manage the Layton Home, a nursing home located at 8th and Malnut Streets in Wilmington. Since August 1, 1987 we have endeavored to help the Layton Home maintain its long tradition of responsiveness in providing nursing care to

limited-income elderly, especially minority persons. State working to the first state working very hard to ensure a secure future for the 108-bed nursing home, which has served the elderly since 1092.

Mhile DUMH is associated primarily with serving persons who are 68+, in reality, through its sharing of programs, experience and resources, PUMH reaches out to people of many different ages and backgrounds. Indeed, many persons in our surrounding communities also benefit from our caring.

In our efforts to reach out to older persons not living in our facilities, PUMM continues to offer its older adult ministries program. During 1987, Naomi G. Winchester, Aging Ministries Consultant, helped 15 churches throughout the Conference set up programs which would minister to their older parishioners' needs for health care, security, and companionship.

In our efforts to reach out to the community, Peninsula United Methodist Homes, along with the Peninsula Conference Board of Clobal Ministries, sponsored three days of workshops entitled "Images of Aging, a Wholstic Approach for Caring." Dr. David B. Oliver, professor of gerontology and health and welfare studies at St. Paul School of Theology, Kansas City, Mo, challenged and inspired almost a ministers, care-givers, and lay people troughnous the control of the Conference of

In response to a growing number of requests from professionals around the country, Cokesbury village staff conduct day-long seminars about the planning, construction, and daily activities in the new 18-bed Altheimer's unit. During 1987, nearly 108 nursing home stimembers, from as far away as North Carolina, have come to Cokesbury to learn about the Alzheimer's care program.

Each PUMM facility is committed to providing its residents with the best medical care. In addition to providing the best medical care to residents, the Methodist Country House, and Cokesbury Village are proving to be excellent learning centers for dental students and nursing students throughout the State. During 1937 approximately 85 students throughout the Medical Pumping State of State

PUMH is grateful for the many special people that help enhance ministry to older adults. At PUMH's third Annual Dinner, Evelyn V. Walls, Resident Care Nurse at the Methodist Country House for the past 20 years, received the 1987 George H. Pigueron, Jr. Founders Award. Indeed, Evelyn Walls' vision, Christian dedication, and tireless efforts exemplify devotion and compassionate concern for Country House residents.

PUMH is also grateful to the Peninsula Conference churches and other 1,125 friends that helped sustain our caring ministry through gifts of over \$880,600 in 1986-87.

The Peninsula Conference grant of \$180,000 and other benevolence giving provided support for 78 residents of limited income at a total cost of \$420,000. On behalf of all residents who benefit from these generous gifts, we express our deepest thanks.

Looking Toward 1989

Great progress has been made during 1987 to build on the firm foundation which has developed over 28 years. The trustees and staff working together have embarked on new beginnings which will further our ministry on behalf of older adults.

Our accomplishments of this past year and our dreams of fulfilling our mission inspire us to look for even better ways of providing Christian care for older adults.

Division of Parish and Congregational Development

During 1987 the Division reviewed and approved expenditures of funds for grants and loans to churches throughout expenditures of conference in excess of 594,800. These funds were to be used for the expansion of physical facilities in order to promote those congregations' responsiveness to their communities. For 1988, we expect our approvals to exceed 5110,800.

Of the total amount expended and approved, a majority was expended for ethnic minority local church purposes. We feel we are upholding the emphasis which is being set forth in this quadrennium.

With each passing meeting, we continue to refine the process with which we review the applications made by various churches throughout the Conference for grants or loans from our Division. We are concentrating on the effectiveness of the funds we have at our disposal, and are also concentrating on making the churches granted these funds more responsible for the use of those funds both before appropriations receive them. We continue to follow up to major appropriations receive them. services. This new "Construction Evangelism" will be a challenging new mission area.

Methodist Action Program

The Methodist Action Program (MAP) is the ACTION program of the Peninsula Conference in metropolitan wilmington. Since 1966 we have been bringing the Word and Love of Jesus Christ to this urban community through: (1) the support and development of local churches; (2) the meeting of human needs; and (3) involvement in social change.

1987 has been a good year for MAP. Three exciting new ministries have been developed - the AFTERSCHOOL EDUCATIONAL

EMRICHMENT PROCEAN, the "LOS ADDELOS" (the Grandparents) DROP-IN CENTER, and the SUPHER YOUTH HISSION MORE PROJECT : INTERPRIS; and more efforts to develop an Hispanic united Methodist Clurch have not efforts to develop an Hispanic united Methodist Clurch have and the formal opening of the new HISPANIC UNITED METHODIST HISSION. All this has been happening as our existing ministries continue to be successful in bringing the Word and Love of Christ to those in meet home of this would be possible without the support of the Peninsula Annual Conference and the hundreds of individuals who continue to define the property of the peninsula the successful continues to the financial contributions. unfortunately, these are not good times for those we serve. The most recent report from the Census Bureau reports that while the rate of those in poverty (141) is down slightly, more individual people are poor than any time since the Depression. 321, million Americans live in poverty, it is even worse for children. One in every five children lives in poverty.

To give you some idea of what that means take a couple of minutes and do a little thought experiment. The poverty level is \$18,989 for a family of four. Try to figure out your family object using that amount. I can't figure out how to do it either!

With our Christian faith as our foundation MAP is proclaiming the Love of Christ through ministries that meet the needs of "the least among us."

We discovered that over half of the first graders in the Old Abbury area were in danger of failing first grade. Not only are they economically disadvantaged but that means that they are not getting the educational help that would give them a chance to improve their condition in the future. Working with the Christiana School District, Grace United Methodist Women, and others, MAP started the AFTERSCHOOL EDUCATIONAL ENHICHMENT PROGRAM which is working daily are deducational support they need.

More Hispanics live in powerty than ever before (29%). Among those that sulfar most are the Hispanic elderly. HAP provides the only OUTREACH SERVICES TO THE HISPANIC ELDERLY in the State. This involves helping them get housing, receive critical medical attention, and help with social Security problems. This year we attention, and help with social Security problems, this year we have been applied to the second security problems. Altered this services. Already this year they have had their own Thanksgiving Dinner; taken a trip to the beach; received file whots from Public Health; had a preventive health screening by the Visiting Nurse Association; and heard a presentation from Dpt on how to deal with util typoblems. Individual contributions and a special one-time full-time, five days a week in 1988.

We are also reaching out to meet the spiritual needs of the Hispanic community. Norking with the General Board of Global Hinastries, the Annual Conference, other Hispanic United Methodist Churches in the region, and local churches in the Wilmington District, MAP has redeveloped the effort to create an HISPANIC UNITED MITMOIST MISSION. During the summer, a seminarian funded by Skyline U.M.C. and the Missional Priority Committee, conducted a five-week evangelistic campaign with the help of volunteers from Skyline, Rockessin, and Grace United Methodist Churches along with volunteers from Hispanic United Methodist Churches in philadelphia and Camden.

The closing highlight of the campaign was an evangelistic festival which featured live music, preaching, games, and Christian videos. A lay worker has followed up on the campaign with a visitation ministry and facilitation of a "Morship Group" at the future Mission site. With the appointment of a new pastor in the spring, the new Mission stronger Kinsanic United Methodist Churches in the country when the country were stronger kinsanic United Methodist Churches in the country was

This year we worked with the Conference Youth Council to develop the SUMMER YOUTH MISSION PROJECT. Youth groups spent a week in mission to the city. During the day they worked on a house which Neighborhood Mouse is rehabilitating for a low-income family and they helped Maven UMC renovate its parsonage. During the evening they had siblical reflection sessions to explore the spiritual meaning of their efforts. In 1988 we plan to have 8-12 youth groups participate and in 1989 we hope to open a second work site in another area of the

The INTERPAITH HOUSING TASK FONCE, our joint effort with other faiths to create affordable housing for low-income families is also beginning to bear fruit. Pending final agreements on the financing, we will be working with the Claymont community to removate 38 houses for low-income families. We are also working on plans at another projects in our force over 188 nuts, and are negotiating on two projects in our force over 188 nuts, and are negotiating on two

One other exciting note is an agreement that has been reached between community groups (including ARP and Mertidian Bancorp/Celawars Trust to provide over \$60 million in loams over the next five years to poor neighborhoods in Milmington and Philadelphia. In addition to the investment, this agreement is important because in the words of Meridian's president, Sam McCullough, this agreement achieves "the Moridian processes of the provided of the community."

In addition to these new efforts, we continue to work with the Ministry of Caring to provide over 53,898 meals a year at OLD ASBURY CENTER and our EMERGENCY ASSISTANCE PROGRAM provides clothing, money, food, counseling and/or referrals to over 2888 people a year. Srown Bag Clubs developed by MAP and participating local churches continue to give families access to surplus food through the Delawate

New Goals for 1988

At a series of planning retreats last fall the Board targeted three primary goals for 1988 in addition to the continuation of our existing ministries. These were:

- 1. The continued strengthening of our Hispanic Ministries.
- Increased local United Methodist Church involvement in the Interfaith Housing Task Force.
- The development of a Task Porce to develop proposals on how we can build on MAP's existing programs and other community resources to develop a wholistic ministry focused not just on meeting the needs of individuals but on meeting individual needs in the context of the needs of the entire family.
- In addition to this, as opportunities arise, MAP will continue to work with other organizations in the Peninsula Conference as well as agencies in the community to: 1) strengthen the ethnic minority

local church; 2) improve race relations, both in United Methodism (especially cross-racial appointents and multi-ethnic congregations) and in the region; 3) meet emergency needs of people; 4) address education and child care needs; 5) help congregations to understand and address basic justice concerns; 6) promote health for all (especially AIDS and teen pregnancy issues); 7) work for equity in the Judicial System; 8) promote understanding of the interdependence between national and international problems; 9) facilitate United Methodist congregational development and redevelopment in the Wilmington pistrict; and 10) sustain ecumenical cooperation.

None of this would be possible without the prayers and gifts of the people and Churches of this Peninsula Conference. Your prayers support us daily and your financial contributions enable us to bring God's love to those who would otherwise be alone without help.

Neighborhood House, Inc.

The year 1987 was a special one of celebration for Neighborhood House, Inc. because it marked 60 years of service to the South Wilmington community.

Our celebration was not merely one of marking the year, but rather of renewing our commitment and rededicating ourselves to our timeless purpose: serving the needs of the surrounding community through actions of Christian service.

Whether we have provided day care or sewing classes, crisis alleviation or 4-H, youth employment workshops or modeling classes, housing counseling or community gardening projects, our efforts have been toward working with each individual to help him or her gain skills to achieve a full life as a contributing and caring member of the community.

This year we continued to work to achieve new, low-cost housing in our community, to renew efforts to provide re-direction for the unemployed, and to stimulate small business development in our community. Numerous projects are now underway to carry the development and family service, only in the continuing of the continuing child care, orpanded yoth development and family service, proved housing conditions, and all-around community betterment.

Thanks to the support of a dedicated staff, countless loyal volunteers, and a newly formed Alumni Association, Neighborhood House can stand at the milestone of 50 years of community service looking back with thankfulness and into the future with faith and hope.

COMMUNITY PROCRAMS: Community service was the fundamental goal of the Riddle Hemorial Deaconess Home and the Mary Todd Cambrill Neighborhood House, the founding organizations of today's Neighborhood House. The total community has remained a primary concern through the years, and in 1987 such programs as Adult Basic Education, gardening, sewing, exercise classes, the annual bazaar,

and special observance of Black History Month have contributed to the growth and training of many individuals in the community.

CHILD CARE: The first specialized program was a kindergarten class in a rented room at 500 S. Claymont Street in 1927. Through the years nursery school, full day care and then around-the-year day care were added. In 1987 a staff of seven, assisted by volunteer workers, made sure their tiny charges were given nourishing food, treated with sharing.

YOUTH DEVELOPHENT: When the Mary Todd Gambrill Neighborhood House opened on South Heald Street, activities were extended to include older children after school. In 1987 ongoing concern for youth development was manifest in the lively ABC 4-R (Lub, Girl Scout groups, Junior Achievement, day-camp and resident-camp opportunities for six-year-olds through teenagers; sports included baskethall and football teams, and a 7-week summer Youth Enrichment Program of learning and fun.

TUTORING/DROPOUT PREVENTION: Closely allied with Youth Development programs is the more recent service of Tutoring/Oropout Prevention to guide young students into educational challenges. With significant success in this area came the natural outgrowth in 1974 of the College/Career Readiness program to supply high school students with college counseling and career exploration opportunities.

THRIFT SMOP: First opened in 1983 across the street from Neighborhood Mouse, Thrift Shop growth has proved it fulfills a real need for good, affordable clothing for all ages. Its service and success increased in 1987 and the present need is for evercontinuing donations and enlarged space.

CRISIS ALLEVIATION/FAMILY SERVICES: Several recent Neighborhood House programs have evolved in response to perceived community needs in the South Wilmington area. Family Services in 1937 has turned individual problems into success stories, has distributed energency food and cipthing, has assisted clients in locating training programs agencies for help with their problems.

MODISING SERVICES: With increased home ownership in South Wilmington as a primary poal, the Mousing Services program was begun in 1977. To date eleven houses have been renovated and sold at low cost, often to community residents. In 1987 the Apple Square project was a high priority to help finance 28 modular homes to increase low-cost housing opportunities in South Wilmington. Advice on home energy assistance programs and shared-housing possibilities for senior citizens was also made available.

Wesley College

Today, March 1, 1988, I celebrate my fifth anniversary as President of Wesley College. I also celebrate the fact that Wesley is not only a church-related College, but that she also enjoys the honor of support and advocacy from a college-related Church. At this writing, the College is preparing for the upcoming Middle States Association on-site evaluation. Ours is a critically important evaluation for reaffirmation of accreditation. The College has completed a comprehensive self-study focusing all aspects of its operations. The Evaluation Team has been identified and confirmed and will arrive here on April 24. The Team will conclude its work on April 27, and it is probable that the final decision of the Middle States Association will be rendered sometime around the meeting of the 1988 Peninsula Annual Conference. The Evaluation Team we anticipate meeting in April is comprised of eight higher education professionals representing outstanding institutions in four different states and the Team also includes two sitting college presidents. Our review will be thorough, even rigorous. I believe we are ready and I believe our petition for reaccreditation will be responded to favorably.

As you know, the Commission on Institutional Review of the University Senate makes on-site visits once each quadrennium to assess schools, colleges, and universities related to the United Methodist Church for formal listing by the Senate. The College has

just been informed by the Division of Migher Education of the Board of Higher Education and Campus Ministry of the United Methodist Church that Wesley College is scheduled for such a visit in 1988. Such visits normally follow institutional self-studies and regional reaccreditation visits, and so the announcement of this review is certainly within the normal flow of evaluation events currently attaching to the operation of an institution such as Wesley. It is gratifying to be able to report to you that Wesley College, a proud child of the Church, is in remarkably good shape and doing guite well. Since June 30, 1983, we have achieved a reduction of \$592,000 in the Current Fund cumulative operating deficit. In addition, Capital Fund Indebtedness has been reduced by \$617,000 between June of 1983 and June of 1987. Obviously, therefore, total net reduction from June 1983 to June 1987 is \$1,209,000. Furthermore, we have had four consecutive years of operating surplus; three years of raises with an unusual mid-year raise here for everyone effective January 1, 1988; our Baccalaureate majors have doubled in the last two years without unbalancing the operational budget, and numerous new faculty have been employed to nourish those majors. Our residence halls are at 90% of capacity and our student applications for next year, as well as our student confirmations, are running well ahead of what they were this time last year, and last year provided us a "banner" yield. It is my anticipation that nearly 70% of Wesley College students, including non-declared majors, will be four-year Baccalaureate degree students by the Fall Semester of 1988. Additionally, the College is now playing four-year intercollegiate competition sports under the strict auspices of the NCA Division III. In that endeavor we are also enjoying a full measure of success.

Our Quest for Quality Campaign has recently entered its public phase. At this writing in Narch, 1988, the College is marching steadily from stability to security. To date, the Quest for Quality program has achieved \$1,244,800 in gifts and pledges and an additional \$632,800 in planned gift commitments. The goal of teampaign is \$3,558,800 and the campaign is divided into three parts: Part 1 addresses current needs, i.e., student financial aid, library acquisitions and capital improvement projects; Parts 2 and 3 seek planned gift commitments for the College endowment. To date, Campaign leadership includes Trustee William F. duPont as the Chairperson and Mayor Crawford Carroll, Trustee Dugene Bookhammer, and Trustee Thomas C. Roe in regional leadership positions.

Given the remarkable momentum of the College, we contacted the Wilnington Trust Banking System with a request that the terms and conditions of the \$1.8 million line of credit be liberalized to reflect Wesley's renewed strength. The Bank has finally responded formally and positively and it has awarded the College a continuation of a revolving line of credit, but in the absence of any quarantor whatsoever. Therefore, I am pleased to infinite or of any quarantor conditions that the second contract of the college's line of credit and is relieved of all contingent liability associated therewith.

As we all know, by the laws of the State of Delaware, Wesley College is a separate legal entity from the Annual Conference. Each

operates independently of the other, and neither is liable for the obligations or the other, absent a specific agreement to the contrary. The connection between the College and the Conference derives from the fact that the Board of Trustees of the College is elected by the members of the College Corporation who are also the clergy and lay members of the Annual Conference. However, while this formal relationship between the College and the Conference is important, our mutual ministry in higher education is still the point for the College and the Church to ponder and to apply. The aid of the Peninsula Annual Conference of the United Methodist Church, annually, to Wesley College is absolutely essential to the continuing health and vitality of your church-related College. I sake you to continue to look favorably upon this institution ame, the most of the continuing the continue to look favorably upon this institution and its growing promise.

Wesley Poundation, University of Maryland Eastern Shore

In 1987, the University of Maryland Rastern Shore (UMES) Campus Ministry has been one of continued building and growth. We have been able to reach about sixty-three (63) persons, both students and staff, Some of the contacts have been irregular, of course, but by and large, we have seen growth in active participation. Our mid-week Chapel Services on Wedneddays now average about fourteen (14) mattendance, and our "Christian Fellowship and Bible Study" about twenty (28). Our growth is due in large part to more frequent personal and other contacts, particularly through letters and other mailings.

Our Bible Study is now being held in Residence Halls and this, too, has contributed to the increase in participation. As a Christian Fellowship we have become more visible on Campus.

Due to active recruiting this year, we now have a large percentage of Freshman who are becoming increasingly committed to the Ministry. We have also maintained a close relationship with the Baptist Student Union, and do most things together. This relationship has continued to add to our effectiveness.

We are continuing to stress:

- (a) Spiritual Growth among our students, and encouraging those who are so gifted to consider venturing into the Christian Ministry and other Christian Vocations.
- (b) Strengthening our Fellowship and Witness by training, in order to promote a more effective witness on Campus.
- (c) Encouraging Ecumenism on campus in order that the Christian Community might become more effective in ministering to the Spiritual needs of the community.
- (d) Promoting the inclusiveness of the Church, and giving students the opportunity to fellowship with students of other races and cultures on campus, and on neighboring campuses.
- (e) Encouraging students to be actively involved in the ministry of the local churches in the area.

(f) The necessity of Christian outreach and Service as an outgrowth of Religious Devotion.

Our Wesley Foundation Board has also become very active during the year, with some Board Members giving their time and talents unselfishly to the ministry on campus.

Mid-Week Chapel Services

The Leadership in our Mid-Week Chapel Services has been shared by Campus Ministers, Faculty, students and Guest Speakers. This has been very rewarding Spiritually, and it has also encouraged active participation and interest by students. Students appear more ready to invite others to come when they themselves are conducting the worship or involved in the Speaking role.

Fellowship and Bible Study

Our studies have included such topics as: "Relating yourself to the Campus", "Maintaining your Witness on Campus", "Bealing with Trials and Temptations", "The Mission of the Church", and "God's Calling".

Campus Ministers, Faculty, and Pastors in the Community have shared in the leadership of these studies.

Retreats and Conferences

We participated in five (5) retreats this year, including one "International Betreat", one "Leadership Training", and one "BHECM Peninsula Conference Retreat at Drayton". These were fairly well attended, and the students in large part were blessed spiritually, these have resulted also in a closer and more intimate community.

Congressional Involvement

Several of our foreign students were invited to attend Morship Services in a number of our local churches on Morld Communion Sunday. With the co-operation of the pastors, they were given the opportunity to participate in those churches. A number of them have become associated with those churches.

Others in our campus ministry have been given the opportunity also, to speak and to participate in other churches on several occasions. They, too, have remained affiliated with those churches.

Outreach and Service

(a) Religious Emphasis Week and UMES Day

We conducted, with the help of the Board, our annual observance Religious Emphasis Week'. The highlights of the week included a first attempt to host an 'All Campus Assembly'. With the help of all the Academic Departments in the University, all students, faculty, staff, and other community persons were invited to attend. We invited a speaker from Howard University Divinity School in Washington, D.C. to be the keynote speaker. This was well-attended.

Our Annual UMES Day was sponsored by the Board in the local church. This event also included not only Board Members, but faculty, students and staff persons as well as the University choir. Both the Campus and the local community benefited greatly from these and other outreach activities during the week.

(b) Clothing and Thanksgiving Basket Drive

These drives were conducted for needy families in the local community. The response from the college community was overwhelming.

(c) Community Forum

with the help of the Board, we also held one Community Forum in the local Church for high school juniors and seniors together with their parents. The purpose was to have them meet with the Chancellor and other University personnel, who were invited to make presentations for the purpose of recruiting and introducing them to the University. The idea was well received with requests to repeat.

This has been my very best year so far, and it has certainly provided much encouragement for further work.

In 1987 Peninsula Conference United Methodiat Women concentrated on training sessions for members of local units. Ten workshops were held in 1987 and ten more are planned for 1988; one in each subdistrict.

The first week in May, the spotlight was placed on local units and district organizations. Each district had a "Gala" with programs stressing missions and personal renewal. Local units held special programs to recruit new members and highlight the work of UNW. Many churches concluded the week-long celebration by having a woman in the pulpit on Sunday.

Three women were guests of Komen's Division at a seminar to study social concerns. Paulette Mullen, Claire Wolke, and Norma JO Walton journeyed to Columbus, Ohio for this event, entitled "Faithful Action - Joyful Living." This became the theme of the Fall Annual Conference meeting when a program was presented by the delegates.

Also at the Pall meeting, Susan Keirn Kester was recognized for her support of UMW, especially in producing a video about Mrs. Cleo Henry. Carolyn Dorman, Ella Mae Henry, and Nancy Leathrum were elected nominees for Women's Division.

A successful School of Christian Mission was held at Salisbury State College in July. Courses taught were "Peoples and Churches in the USSR," "Acts of the Apostles," and "Toward Health and Wholeness." Ministers who attended received CEU's. Another School will be held in July, 1988 and the goal for attendance is 200+.

Spiritual Life Retreats continue to offer meaningful experiences for women in the Conference. Dr. Edwin Thomas led the spring retreats entitled "Holy Moments."

In 1987 Peninsula Conference UMW gave \$123,525.28 in undesignated giving to missions; \$1,456.15 to Food, Land, and Justice projects, and \$3,652.37 to World Thank Offering projects.

other goals for 1988 are to evaluate the progress of the Charter for Racial Justice, become actively involved in a "Campaign for Children," and promote new opportunities for giving to mission. Special certificates will be given at the fall meeting to those units completing a check list of activities that fulfill the purpose of NEW.

Conference Officers, known as "The Mission Team," reflect inclusiveness except in the inclusion of younger women. We continue to work for ways to attract younger women to the organization,

especially at the leadership level. Scholarships for special events have been offered to young women, child care made available, and a special event for women under 40 was held in March.

BOARD OF ORDAINED MINISTRY

The Board of Ordained Ministry of the Peninsula Annual Conference has met for nine all-day sessions since the 1987 Conference session, with a number of other meetings of the Executive Committee and other committees of this board also having been held as we have sought to fulfill our many responsibilities.

Raymond Hopkins was elected to serve as Secretary of the Board, and Dan Walker was elected to serve as Chairperson of the Scholarship Committee.

Eleven persons from the Peninsula Conference attended the Local Pastor's Licensing School at Drew Theological Seminar, July 5-17, 1987

An Orientation Retreat for Pastors serving in the Peninsula Conference for the first time was held at Drayton Manor, July 28 and 29, 1987; with spouses and families being included in this program.

Six clergy women from the Peninsula Conference attended a National Convocation entitled "Well-Springs of Mope" at Great Gorge, New Jersey, August 17-21, with financial assistance provided by the Board. They reported to the Board that this was a meaningful and significant event in their lives.

We continue to offer the Professional Growth/Cross-Bacial Appointments Seminars for clergy, as mandated by the Conference. One such seminar was held in the fall of 1987, and another is being planned for the fall of 1988. The 1986 General Conference session created scheduling prollems for this past spring.

officers of our Board have worked with representatives of the Baltimore Annual Conference to develop an Area-wide Transition Seminar for pastors who are moving to new appointments. This event is scheduled for June 4 in Annapolis, Maryland.

The Scholarship Committee granted a total of \$23,688 to 28 persons preparing for ordained ministry in the Peninsula Conference, Of these 28 scholarship recipients, 22 are males, and 6 are females; and 11 are ethnic minority persons. The Continuing Education Committee, which is chaired by Dr. Donald O. Clendaniel, Sr., granted a total of \$2,819 to persons and events in 1987. Pastors are reminded that they are required to accumulate and report at least 8 C.E.U.'s for the quadrennium (January 1, 1985-December 31, 1988)

The Committee on Counseling Elders provided each District Superintendent with a list of full members of the Conference who are recommended to serve as Counseling Elders, and the Superintendents assigned a Counseling Elder to work with each pastor who is not a full member. Instructions were provided to guide the Counseling Elders in the fulfilment of their duties.

The Psychological Assessment and Counseling Committee has developed a program of testing to be used by District Committees on the Ordained Ministry in the processing of applicants for certification as candidates. This program is currently being implemented on each of our districts.

Officers of our Board met with the Monitoring Committee of the Conference Commission on Religion and Race in October to review our Board's performance with regard to racial inclusiveness. We were pleased to be able to report a significant increase in the number of ethnic minority pastors, both male and female, who have been received into full and probationary membership in the Peninsual Conference. It was agreed that we need to continue to emphasize the need for preparations.

Dr. J. Ronald Owens, our Registrar for Continuing Education, and Mational Convocation on Continuing Education for Ethnic Minority Clergy in Nashville in December. After reporting on this meeting to the Board, Dr. Owens held a follow-up meeting in Dover on March 2.

The Annual meeting of clergy persons serving Appointments Beyond the Local Church (ABLCs) was held at Wesley College, on January 23; and our Board joined the Conference Board of Pensions in sponsoring a Pinancial Planning Seminar for Clergy in April

At our February 8 meeting, it was our privilege to meet with Dr. Poong Ro Cha, the Mission Superintendent for the Eastern Seaboard Provisional Korean Mission. We discussed matters relating to transfers and conference membership of Korean speaking pastors.

After the interviews with candidates for ordination were completed, a meeting was held on April 11, at Drayton Manor, for those recommended by the Board. Bishop Yeakel discussed the meaning of ordination and plans were made for the ordination service at Annual Conference.

We are pleased to report that the Peninsula Conference continued its excellent record of performance by again paying 180% of its asking to the Ministerial Education Fund in 1987.

As we come to the end of another quadrennium, I would like to express my deep gratitude and appreciation to all of the members of our Board of Ordained Ministry for their countless hours of service, for the volumes of material that they have read and studied, and for their honest wrestling with often very difficult matters. As a Board, we are also grateful to Bishop Yeakel and his Cabinet - both past and present - for their cooperation and support, and for their openness and honesty with us.

BOARD OF PENSIONS

Prior to 1977, pensions for Peninsula Conference clergy were unfunded. Concern for both the leavel of pensions and the fact that they were unfunded resulted in a number of changes. Now, the Conference Board of Pensions is pleased to say that significant strides have been made in the intervening eleven years in providing for the pensioning of the clergy and their families, as well as in the funding of those pensions. Greater financial security for our retired clergy families has been achieved.

This financial security was achieved with the full support and cooperation of the local churches, which began payments to the Ministerial Pension Plan (MPP) in 1982 and to the Comprehensive Protection Plan (CPP) in 1985. We extend our thanks to the clergy and lairy who struggled with the implementation of the new MPP/CPP program and those who keep their MPP/CPP payments up to date.

Starting early to plan for retirement can mean the difference between financial security in retirement or having to struggle to make ends meet. The Board, in cooperation with the Board of Ordained Ministry, presented a retirement planning seminar in 1986, and in 1987 offered a seminar geared strictly to financial planning. In April, 1988 a retirement planning seminar is again being offered to all clergy and their spouses. Those persons are encouraged to take advantage of this opportunity, even if they attended in 1986. Communication of benefits to the clergy was a top priority during the 1987-88 Conference year. Representatives of the Board met with the Ministers and Mates on each district to present a benefits program and answer questions. Printed materials were distributed to all the clergy.

In order for the local churches in the Conference to maintain the 12t contribution rate to the MPP, which assures maximal pension at retirement, the Past Service Rate used to calculate pensions earned prior to 1982 must be maintained at not less than 8.9 of 10 conference Average Salary. The reason for having fallen short is the high annual cost to the Conference of amortizing the unfunded liability plus each annual increase in the Past Service Rate. The Board of Pensions continues to assist the Conference in meeting that financial obliqation from investment earnings on funds contributed over the years by way of bequests and other gifts dedicated to assuring income for clergy families in their retirement. Reeping faith with those who serve the Lord, the Past Service Rate has been increased each year as follows:

The Peninsula Conference Board of Pensions recommends that:

- The Past Service Rate for 1989 be \$225 per year of approved service.
- Up to 198% of the pension and disability payments received be designated as the permitted housing allowance for 1989. (The full text of this resolution may be found in the 1986 Conference Journal.)

1989 Program Objectives

- To seek new and improved ways to communicate to ministers and their spouses the provisions of their benefit plans, and enhance their appreciation and understanding of the financial security provided by their benefit plans in the event of illness, disability, retirement and death.
- To make improvement in closing the gap between a Past Service Rate that is 0.93% of Conference Average Salary (CAS) and a Past Service Rate that is 1.0% of CAS.

It gives each person an opportunity to touch and see many items that tell the story of God's grace to the people of our Conference. The hours are Saturday and Sunday from 1:30 to 4:30 p.m. and other times by appointment (302-335-5544).

The Anniversary Service of the meeting of Coke and Asbury was held on Sunday afternoon, November 8, with over 108 attending George Caley, accompanied by Starr Fioca, started the service with old-fashioned hymn sing of camp-meeting songs. Our primary goal is the care of Barratt's Chappel, a Shrine of the United Methodist Church. With the help of a grant from the General Commission on Archives & History and the Moward B. Delmarva Ecumenical Agency

The year 1987 was a time of exciting new beginnings for the Delmarva Ecumenical Agency. With the participation of many of its board members, including Bishop Yeakel and Rev. Dr. Stapleton, an extensive planning process produced an expanded Resource Ministry and two new programs: an A.I.D.S. Ministry to educate congregations confused and concerned about the disease and to minister to persons with A.I.D.S., and a Ministry for Public Policy in Delaware, to advocate for the poor, the disabled and the elderly. The expanded Resource Ministry will mean DEA religious education resources available in the Dover Conference Office, in Easton and in Salisbury. Ongoing programs were strengthened; low-Incomploons and Waryland's Patith and Order Committee Ministry Consultations. These accompliables are a sign of new ecumenical energy brought to us by the renewed commitment of members of the board.

The staff and office continue to be a vital link among judicatories and in the community. A few examples follow: carrying out a project of the denominational executives of Northern Delaware - a newspaper ad listing sixty-eight names of persons against capital punishment; representing the churches at government hearings and on the emergency food and shelter board, which allocated 159,089 federal dollars to agencies that serve the hungry and the homeless. A consultation on the "COUC Consensus" was held. Thirty-two groups used our mailing labels to contact congregations about such varied needs as sick and bandicapped children and families facing disaster.

In March, an electrical fire in the wiring of our building destroyed our offices. We moved to temporary quarters at Immanuel Episcopal Church, then returned to our rebuilt offices in September. Thanks to all who contributed to our fire funds: over \$1,700 to the administrative office, and \$12,000 to the secure Center!

As a wehicle for Christian ministry, we look forward in 1989 to bringing our services to more and more congregations, well aware of the amount of work this will take, but confident that we are better able to serve them with a more effective structure and new and stronger programs.

COMMISSION ON EQUITABLE SALARIES

According to Paragraph 722 of The Book Disciple, it is the purpose of the Commission on Equitable Salaries to support ministry in the charges of the Annual Conference by 1) administering funds to be used in salary supplementation; 2) recommending Conference be used in salary supplementation; 2) recommending Conference and advisory material on ministerial compensation to District Superintendents and Pastor/Farish Relations Committees.

In accordance with those guidelines, the Commission on Equitable Salaries has provided financial assistance to those pastors whose charges, for various reasons, were unable to provide the minimum compensation established by this Annual Conference. In addition, the Commission continues to award financial supplements to those pastors whose special talents are required to effectively serve their respective appointments. (A list of those charges receiving financial supplement can be found at the end of this report).

In addition, the Commission also provides the related pension (MPP & CPP). In 1987, pastors in 25 charges received salary supplements of \$43,796.00, plus pension fund contributions of \$7,496.52, for a total of \$51,292.52.

For the past few years we have been upgrading our minimum salary level and in 1987 this Annual Conference adopted the following formula for determining that minimum level of compensation:

Full members shall receive a minimum salary equal to 70% of the current conference average salary;

Probationary & Associate Members serving full time shall receive a minimum salary equal to 65% of the current conference average salary; and

Full-time local pastors serving full time shall receive a minimum salary equal to 684 of the current conference average salary. In addition, upon recommendation of the D.S. or the PPBC, the minimum salary for each pastor shall be increased by a service of each year of a crucial salary of the sal

Using the formula adopted by the Peninsula Annual Conference at its 1987 session, the Commission recommends the following as the level of minimum compensation:

Full Member -- \$16,847.00
Probationary & Associate Member -- \$15,644.00
Full-Time Local Pastor -- \$14,440.00

CONFERENCE AVERAGE COMPENSATION FOR 1989 -- \$24,867.88
*THE SERVICE INCREMENT WOULD EQUAL -- \$128.88

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that all student local pastors and parttime local pastors receive a minimum salary of \$11,750.80, except as negotiated between pastor, P.P.R. and D.S.

Reimbursing pastors for miles traveled on church business is a policy established by this Conference. The Commission recommends the following action:

BE IT RESOLVED that reimbursement for travel expense during 1989 shall be 22-1/2 cents per mile for the first 15,000 miles and 12 cents per mile beyond 15,000 miles, said rate being in compliance with IRS policy. In addition, we also recommend that pastors be reimbursed for tolls and parking expenses incurred in the performance of ministerial duties.

The Commission on Equitable Salaries also recommends the following action be taken:

WHEREAS the Peninsula Annual Conference has a Health Care Program for its clergy,

WHEREAS the Peninsula Annual Conference makes available through Blue Cross/Blue Shield family coverage at a current cost of \$1,872.88 per year,

WHEREAS some clergy receive family coverage as a full or partial benefit and others do not,

BE IT RESOLVED that effective January 1, 1989 all charges in the Peninsula Annual Conference pay the insurance premium for family coverage as a fringe benefit.

Having passed this resolution all clergy would receive equitable benefits in the area of health/dental care for the entire Peninsula Annual Conference. The Commission on Equitable Salaries realizes that this may be difficult for some charges and stands ready to assist when the need arises. Our Commission will assist in salaries for all clergy persons; use priority to paying the insurance premiums for all clergy persons;

Parsonage Furniture Proposal

March 1, 1988

In response to comments by both laity and clergy about the present system of furnished parsonages an investigation was made into the efforts of the Baltimore Annual Conference as reported at the 1978 session of the Annual Conference. At that time the Baltimore Annual Conference overwhelmingly approved the change to an unfurnished parsonage system.

An unfurnished parsonage would be defined as containing major appliances (refrigerator with separate freezing compartment, range, washer and dryer, with a dishwasher recommended). Floor and window coverings for the living area (living room, dining room and/or den, library, and family room) should be performed to the property of the

We recognize the authority of the local congregations and the district trustees to dispose of their furniture. In view of the fact that parsonage furniture was purchased for use by a parsonage family and was provided for their comfort and benefit, the following resolution is made:

WHEREAS each person and family should have the opportunity to express their individuality.

WHEREAS each person and family should have a sense of belonging and roots.

WHEREAS the use and furnishing of a home often provide an expression of individuality and a sense of belonging.

WHEREAS the furnishings of a parsonage often cause conflict between the clergy and the laity.

WHEREAS there are at least 20 conferences operating under an unfurnished parsonage system.

WHEREAS the upkeep of parsonage furnishings can be a hindrance to the carrying out of the important function of ministry.

THEREFORE, we recommend that ownership of the parsonage furnishings be transferred to the parsonage family now in residence. It is further recommended that this proposal be effective as of the date of this Annual Conference. The purpose is that no undue financial hardship be incurred by the clergy, and that each charge not be subjected to any additional expense for furniture replacement.

It is further recommended that churches consider that ministers will be meeting the additional costs of replacing and maintaining furniture, costs formerly borne by the church.

We recommend that churches not be required to relinquish ownership of heritage items that are in parsonages. However, they should remain in the parsonage only if the minister in residence wishes to use them. Such heritage items shall appear on an inventory record in the parsonage book.

We also recommend that student appointments be exempted from the provisions of this legislation. Those churches shall continue as they have in the past.

COMMISSION ON RELIGION AND RACE

The Commission on Religion and Race of the Peninsula Conference continued to affirm its inclusive agenda. Through its subcommittees of education, monitoring, and cross-racial appointments and training, it was able to develop a Martin Luther King, Jr. Symposium, which examines carefully the cultural struggles of an inclusive church.

The commission developed a process for development of educational resources for the purpose of helping local churches prepare for cross-racial appointments. The commission was intentional in helping hanual Conference committees, boards, and agencies in being inclusive as it completed the monitoring of PUMH, Mesley College, CCOM, and reviewed the Board of Ordained Ministry.

The Commission on Religion and Race met with the Cross-Racial Appointments Task Force to review its agenda. Even though the mandate for preparing selected churches of the Peninsula Conference for Cross-Racial Appointments did not fly, the commission has developed Dialogue Sessions for preparing and sensitizing all local churches of the Peninsula Conference for Cross-Racial Appointments.

We appreciate the fine leadership of the Commission, such as Doris Phillips of the Monitoring Committee, Dale Lantz and Fred Wood of the Cross-Racial Appointments Committee, and Sam Peterson of the Education Committee as they have sought well to make this an inclusive church.

COMMISSION ON THE STATUS AND ROLE OF WOMEN

During 1987-88 the Commission has moved from rebuilding itself to becoming more active in its duties of serving as advocate, catalyst, and monitor for the concerns of women within our Conference, districts, and local churches.

Karen Gonda and Liz Carlisle Johnston became our Easton and Wilmington District representatives. We are still seeking representatives for the Dover and Salisbury Districts as well as more active, inclusive, and geographically balanced representation on the Commission.

Three members re-established ties with the Baltimore COSROW while attending the National United Methodist Clerpysomen's Consultation in August. At our October retreat, Mollie Nash, Co-chairman of the Baltimore COSROW, helped us explore local church needs concerning women and how we might support local church representatives. Laurence Livingston and Karen Gonda used ideas from that retreat to conduct a workshop for Easton District local trepresentatives in February.

Our new pamphlet will help in projected local church training. Its distribution at the 1988 Annual Conference will also make pastors and lay members more aware of our work and resources.

We were pleased by the positive actions of the Conference Arrangements Committee and the Board of Laity in response to our 1987 monitoring and look forward to efforts toward even broader inclusiveness in language and participation at the 1988 Annual Conference.

The Commission continues to monitor the salaries of women and other minorities in relationship to all clergypersons and to try to coordinate with the Commission on Religion and Race and the Missional Priority Committee on monitoring Conference boards, divisions, commissions and committees.

The Washington Area Committee on Episcopacy has been faithful to these functions as outlined in the <u>Discipline</u> as four years with Bishop Yeakel come to a close.

At each meeting Bishop Yeakel reported on his episcopal leadership in the key result areas of celebrating the Good News, making the following priorities: ethnic minority local churches, places where women serve as pastors and taking into account geographical areas, small and large churches and various celebration.

Bishop Yeakel is heavily involved with area and conference administration as he works with the Cabinets of the Peninsula and Baltimore Conferences, various boards and institutions. He also gives leadership in the General Church and as an ecumenical witness and strives to be a Christian presence in public life in our society.

In all of these areas the bishop reported to the Episcopacy Committee and welcomed feedback, questions and concerns.

The Episcopacy Committee and the Bishop continued to explore creative ideas and difficulties and ways to grow in the area.

In the evaluation to the Jurisdictional Committee the Washington Area Committee noted that "in the midst of..diversity....sishop Yeakel is moving to work through those things that divide us.." The committee also reported that Bishop Yeakel "continued to appoint persons across racial lines, give clergy couples...compassionate appointments, and support women in leadership positions in the

In summary the committee reported:

"We believe that in the midst of the rapidly changing social environment in the life of the United Methodist Church, Bishop Yeakel is seeking to be faithful to the commitments our church has made to be a witness in these areas.

It is our expectation that Bishop Yeakel will be returned to the Washington Area for a second quadrennium. This is our request to the Northeastern Jurisdiction Committee on Episcopacy."

Finally, the Washington Area Committee voted to have an areawide convocation for both the Peninsula and Baltimore Conferences on Sunday, September 25, from 3:88 p.m., the gathering time, to 6:88 p.m. at the Naval Academy in Annapolis. The goal is to have 1,888 persons from each district to fill one side of the stadium and a Colabration for the Church promises to be a great day of

A Celebration Committee from both conferences is at work to plan the event and each district and each church is asked to be involved in this exciting day when God's Spirit will be felt and heard as United Methodists join in a great gathering of worship and praise.

During the past year, the following actions were taken by the Council:

- Communications appropriated \$13,500 for the Communications' Expanded Media Plan.

- Director of Stewardship disapproved the funding of a request for half-time position Director of Stewardship.
- Pecometh Campaign approved the Pecometh Fund-Raising Campaign.
- Salisbury District Office appropriated \$5,000 for District Office expenses.
- Dental Insurance extended the coverage to retired ministers in compliance with the action taken by Annual Conference.
- Eastern Seaboard Korean Provisional Mission Appropriated \$1,000 for 1987 and \$3,000 for 1988.

- Paul David Marlowe appropriated \$1,000 towards severance pay.
- Wilmington District Office appropriated \$1,000 for fire damage.
- Computerizing District Offices appropriated \$4,500 per district to purchase computers.
- Peninsula United Methodist Foundation appropriated \$2,893.82 to remove the accumulated operating deficit at December 31, 1987.
- Pecometh Campaign loaned \$205,000 to cover initial startup costs.
- REACH appropriated \$46,000 to remove accumulated operating deficit remaining on December 31, 1988.
- Pecometh appropriated \$8,217 towards the cost of a new walk-in refrigerator.

Recommendations:

 MHRREAS, the 1962 Annual Conference meeting at Grace United Methodist Church on May 17-29, suthorized the Commission on World Service and Finance (the predecessor to the Council on Finance and Administration) full and complete authority to administer the medical and life insurance benefits for the Peninsula Conference,

WHEREAS, the Council on Finance and Administration after careful consideration believes the Conference would be better served if the medical, dental and life insurance benefits were administered by an agency other than the Council on Finance and Administration,

CROSS-RACIAL DIALOGUE & REFLECTION GROUPS

These are quotes, things that you said, important things that we can ponder and keep in our hearts. And more importantly, these things that we can put into action when we get back to the local church, because as the apostle James says, "fisith without works is dead." Here is what you, the Conference, said about Racial Inclusiveness during the Dialogue Sessions:

- "Children of all races play together and don't care. Jesus took a child into the midst of them and said, "unless you become like little children you will not enter the kingdom of heaven." (Matthew 18:3)
- The church is yoked together by race rather than by geographical location! Why not yoke them together by geographical location, which would thereby offer far greater opportunities for working together to solve common community problems.
- The Conference and individuals are struggling with this issue. We need to appreciate our differences and encourage churches to do things "together."
- 4. We have ethnic, religious, and economic prejudices. Inclusiveness should come at the local church level. This is hard to do because of our attitudes. We are talking about it again because we have not been intentional enough! Have a time line to meet goals!
- 5 A brother in my small group said: "There are many instances where the love of Christ has broken down the barriers. It happened to me. I never knew any black people while I was growing up, and I was very afraid of them. But when I accepted Christ, all my fear turned into love.
- 6. One of the small group leaders reported: "Everyone in my group had people of other races in their lives that they love."
- 7. "Be intentional about open itineracy, put our money where our mouth is."
- 8. The Conference should give us educational and sensitizing information and material.
- 9. "We are the children of God, we have to accept one another in Cross-Racial Appointments and work together!"
- 18. Another small group leader stated "My group consisted of seven W.A.S.P.'s (meaning White Anglo-Saxon Protestants.) "We don't really know you. We need to listen to the Holy Spirit, even when it hurts. Openness is God's way. We confess (to God), "help us."
- 11. An important way to work with this is in cooperative ministries.
- Seriously working together means acknowledging our past hurts and pains, talking and sharing.
- 13. When I was growing up, I lived across the street from a white school, and I had to walk three miles to a black school."
- 14. "One person said that Asians are working closely with the church and still maintain their closeness among themselves and keep their culture."

- May I interject here that I have seen this working at the new Community United Methodist Church in Ocean Pines near Ocean City. Maryland, with the Rev. Fred Bruner and the Associate Pastor from Korea. They have services in Korean and use Methodist Hymnals printed in Korean. They share the Church and work together.
- 15. One of you said "The Conference structure doesn't impede our inclusiveness, it is us, our attitudes. We need more teachings of Christ."
- 16. "It's going to take a lot of love and patience to help our Conference. Jesus said "Love God with all your heart, mind, soul, and strength and your neighbor as yourself." Who is my neighbor?
- 17. We shouldn't use the expressions "Black" or "White" Church. It's God's church. In order to do this, we have to have a good relationship with God.
- 18. "Every family needs to invite the opposite race to their home for dinner." $% \frac{1}{2} \left(\frac{1}{2} \right) = \frac{1}{2} \left(\frac{1}{2} \right) \left(\frac{1}{2} \right)$
- 19. This group recorder reported: "We were slow to get started. I think this was due to lack of team-building, also with the subject matter. The group expressed a desire to have further dialogue, particularly at the local level."
- 28. From one of the small groups: "Your 'Centering the Dialogue' sheet was written from the point of view of a white person. It is assumed that a white person is answering the question. Look at the list of groups. Whites are not listed. Therefore, Blacks do not have the opportunity to describe a relationship with a white person. This is an example of the insidiousness of racism."

You see, even when we are committed so totally against racism, we carry the seeds of it within our own minds - Bagaga that we carry possibly from years and years ago. "We see the enemy - racism - and it is us."

After the group sessions were dismissed, the four large group leaders met with members of the Conference Commission on Religion and Race to evaluate the afternoon experience and to make some recommendations. Here are the recommendations that were made.

Warren Hill, the Black large group leader, recommends dialogue sessions with a confrontational attitude in love, to help to be honest and admit the baggage that they carry.

Rev. Tenaka was the Asian group leader. He suggested that we work toward Cross-Cultural Appointments as well as Cross-Racial Appointments. He said you can't force inclusiveness and you must keep on working on it. And he emphasized, "Work with the youth."

Hector Navas, the Hispanic Facilitator, who grew up in a New York ghetto, said 74 shetto is not a place, it is a mentality, an attitude the same that of the same to the same to the same to the story of the demonia in the Shile who was possessed by many demons. And it was only Jesus who could liberate this many demons and make him well. We need to bring Jesus Christ to those who are hurting and to those who are possessed with the demons of facism.

Evelyn Fitzgerald, the Head Facilitator, made the following suggestions

1. Get local churches more educated and involved.

2. Put programs in place to deal with the problem across the board.

The Conference needs to be the role-model, set the pattern, 3. and resource it on the local church level.

Start where the people are - with dialogue. 4. Focus on the local church and local pastors.

5. Work toward a clearer definition and understanding of racism, and take ownership of the problem to understand it. The whole church needs this.

The Conference Commission on Religion and Race begin a Committee on Research to research and document the blight of racism in the church. Use monitoring information and statistics.

Do a 10-year comparison of salaries.

Demonstrate what racism is.

I think our Conference Dialogue Sessions have given us a clear picture of where you want your church to go, and things we must do to bring God's love and justice truly into our midst. As the little boy said to the symbols player in Carnegie Hall, "It's time to hit it."

STATEMENT OF PURPOSE

The purpose of Cooperative Parish Ministry is to. . .

Meet the needs of the local church through Cooperative Parish Ministries:

Strengthen the witness of the local church through Cooperative Parish Ministries:

Assist local churches to minister to the needs of their local communities through Cooperative Parish Ministries:

I. Establish (Process of Formation)

- A. Recommendation for Exploration from the Cabinet Initiation: The stimulus for organizing a cooperative ministry can come from a minister or one of the congregation, a lay person, Conference staff person, Conference or District agency, Regardless of the origin of the stimulus, the District Superintendent shall have the responsibility of initiating the actual development of the cooperative work, doing so in close cooperation with local churches involved, and in consultation with appropriate Conference and District agencies and staff persons.
 - B. Parish Development Model
 - 1. Preparatory:

PARISH COUNCIL FORMATION

As a Parish Council is formed, the item of first importance is Representation. In order to build trust among congregations, large and small, as they work together in developing a parish, there must be a sense of equality in representation in the Parish Council. Therefore, the early councils should be made up of an equal number of representatives from each church regardless of history of working together, the issue of representation begins to fade, and the issue of function begins to take over. As this happens, Task Forces and other Work Groups are chosen by the Parish Council with more regard to getting representation from each Church. As this trust builds, it is interesting to see how the functional issue becomes more important than the representational issue.

Parish Council-Staff Relationships involve a mutual sharing of the Parish Coals with the Staff and Staff Goals with the Parish, via the Parish Council. The Lay Council is also the Counsel to the Staff regarding the needs, interests, concerns, and commitment of local churches to the parish. It begins as a representative organization with power being given to the Council by the Local Churches. As the trust relationship builds, that power becomes greater it is important that in not be of the council by the Staff, or the parish Council and the District Superintendent initially should develop a written policy regarding Staff changes and turnover. This statement should include some written assumptions about the Parish:

Why is it being formed?

What benefits will accrue to each Local Church?

What we can be and do together that we cannot be and do separately?

The matter of Community improvement, including the issues of importance to each local congregation.

There should be continual interpretation dealing with issues, the use of controversy as a creative force, and the development of action considering minority opinions. The Parish Council is responsible to relate and interpret needs to the Staff as they arise. The Staff has a right and responsibility to hold the Parish Council accountable for this relationship since the Parish Council gives primary direction and oversight to the Staff's daily functioning.

The Parish Director, utilizing the Parish Council as an overall planning and dreaming group, relates issues of staff, program, facilities, budget, etc. to the appropriate groups in the tecommendation. This provides a sounding board for the general directions of the control of the control of the council purpose of

II. Conference Support System

A. Appointment system--The Bishop and Cabinet are requested to give intentional consideration to the appointment of staff to Cooperative Parish Ministry. (Please note: some possible consideration as suggested from the Hinton Rural Life Center)

General Considerations in which the District Superintendent Participates and Must Establish a Stance:

 The overall attitude/stance of the bishop and the cabinet toward cooperative forms of ministry (public pronouncements, potential appointees who will serve or be made available, the appointment process, political realities for district superintendents and cabinet).

- The realities (salaries, the nature and life of Annual Conference, small church/large church) of the United Methodist Itinerant system. Opportunities for advancement, sense of worth and value, success in mission and ministry. What gives sense of worth to one's ministry? (Need Board of Ordained Ministry and Cabinet together on a theology of ministry.)
- The clergy leadership style (flexibility, openness, participatory style). Style requirements are basic to appointment decision.
- The term of appointment (length of time needed for "entry". . . investment of time of laity and clergy in short appointments. . . requirements of team-building . . .small church entry uniqueness, etc.) Within the understanding of the itinerant system.
- The Conference Council on Ministries shall adopt the roles В. as reflected in the Cooperative Parish Statement.

Controlling Purpose:

To help build a positive image for the small membership church and formulate realistic criteria for the evaluation of mission and ministry in small membership churches.

- Why: (1) Recognize the small membership church as a legitimate place for ministry.
 - (2) Enable the small membership church to overcome a defeatist attitude in order that mission and ministry can be done.

Presupposition: Conference Council on Ministries' staffs are much more effective and efficient at producing large programs which churches can "buy into" than taking a program directly to local churches.

- How: (1) Generate resources tailored to the needs of small membership churches.
 - (2) Provide special skills and opportunities for skill development to parish councils and staffs (planning processes, team-building, Christian education training).
 - (3) Help churches relate to the total program of the church, district, and Conference.
 - (4) Help channel ideas and information from one area to another in order to inform and inspire people in other areas with what is being done in other cooperative parishes.
- C. There shall be a Cooperative Parish Ministry Committee placed as a sub-committee of Parish Development Committee of the Board of Global Ministries which shall have the responsibility of giving oversight to the development and evaluation of Cooperative Ministry and recommend for possible funding. The committee shall, in consultation

with the Cabinet, prepare a pool of clergy who have the gifts and graces for cooperative parish ministry based on suggested guidelines for choosing clergy in Cooperative Parish Ministries. The Cooperative Parish Ministries Committee shall also offer training for clergy.

- D. The Commission on Equitable Salaries is requested to provide supplemental funding for clergy staff for the development of cottage series Ministry upon recommendation of the Detrict Superintendent, Cooperative Parish Ministry Committee, or Parish Council.
- E. The Board of Global Ministries, Board of Discipleship, Board of Church and Society, and any other program agency of the church may request supplemental funding or support for the program development of Cooperative Parish Ministry upon recommendation of District Parish Ministry upon recommendation of District or Parish Council.

III. District Support System

A District Strategy Team on Parish Development may be developed by the District Superintendent and convened by both the Conference Staff Person assigned to parish development, and the District Superintendent for the purpose of developing a strategy for Cooperative Parish Ministry on the District. This committee process of Cooperative Parish Ministries.

IV. The Parish Council Support System

The Parish Council, as outlined in the Structuring Phase, shal model and convenant its program of mission and mnistry. It shall be responsible for structuring, maintaining, and operating its adopted mode of ministry. It shall also recommend all forms of support for the Parish, after careful evaluation, to appropriate District and Conference agencies and also the

V. Process of Funding

- A. The Cooperative Parish Ministry is encouraged in its process of development to examine carefully the resources of its own community and the participating covenanting local churches to determine the level of financial and other forms of support it can develop, whether it is for in the structuring phase as the Parish Council is developed. Support should be developed by the Parish for the sake of the Cooperative Parish.
- B. When the Cooperative Parish has determined the level of support it is able to generate, and has reached the conclusion that it needs supplemental support, it is to seek this support by contacting a Conference Staff person to assist in submitting a proposal form to request funding. All proposals should have the approval of Parish Council, District Superintendent, Committee on Cooperative Parish Ministry, and whatever agency is funding the proposal.
 - C. Funding will be limited to specific projects with clearly stated goals. Receiving organizations will make annual

reports accounting for all funds received, and evaluating all projects funded by the Committee.

D. Guidelines for funding:

- Will this allocation increase the capability of the organization to carry out its mission? How?

- 5. What are the specific goals and objectives you set for this ministry? How will they be evaluated?
- 6. How does this project fit into the overall objectives of your organization?
- Are participating churches paying their World Service and Conference apportionments? If so, what percentage? If not, why?
- 8. Has the recommended plan for the formation of new parish ministries been followed?
- What are the expectations of those seeking resources for future allocations? In coming years, will larger or smaller quantities of resources be sought?
- 18. Is this ministry for which resources are sought, one in which the primary emphasis is on hiring someone to carry out the ministry of the church, or is it one in which the primary emphasis is on opening new opportunities for laypersons and clergypersons to respond directly to the call to ministry and service?

VI. Process of Evaluation

- A. There shall be an INTERNAL evaluation done by the Cooperative Parish Council. The Parish Council evaluates carefully with staff the effectiveness of the following: organizational structure, patterns of communication, use of clergy staff, benefit to local churches, and decisionmaking procedures and the realization of its goals. The parish Council shall submit its evaluation to the District Strategy Team Committee, or District Superintendent for reflection and possible recommendation to the Conference Cooperative Parish Committee.
- B. There shall be an EXTERNAL evaluation made by Cooperative Parish Committee and Staff person assigned. There shall be Cabinet representation on the committee. The Committee shall use the existing data to evaluate the effectiveness in light of the purpose and program as outlined in the Cabinet Policy Document and adopted goals of Cooperative Farisher.

ADDENDUM I

SUGGESTED CRITERIA FOR ALIGNMENT OR REALIGNMENT OF CHARGES OF A COOPERATIVE PARISH

The United Methodist Church is committed to strengthening local churches for withess and ministry regardless of size, race or cultural background, geography and social economics. With this in mind, we recommend the following for alignment or realignment of churches to form charges of any form of a cooperative parish.

 Local churches shall be aligned or realigned based on a careful study of the program need as it relates to mission and ministry.

- Personnel (clergy and laity) shall be deployed to the parish based on the ideal of matching gifts and graces with the program needs of the cooperative parish.
- Realizing that the United Methodist Church is an inclusive community, local churches shall be aligned or realigned regardless of race because the primary rationale for alignment is based on what will enable this charge or parish to be in mission and ministry.
- Alignment or realignment of churches shall be considered for any small church, 300 members or less, to enable it to be in mission and ministry in a cooperative ministry setting.
- Alignment or realignment of churches shall be considered for any large membership church, 300 members or more, to enable it to be in mission and ministry in a cooperative ministry setting.
- It is highly recommended that local churches be aligned or realigned within a 5 to 10 mile radius of each other within the same community or communities with similar program needs as it relates to mission and ministry.
- 7. Understanding that socio-economics do play a vital role in the development of the alignment and realignment of churches in a cooperative parish, a careful study and examination should be given to the development of the potential of resources as it relates to the church and community. Therefore, necessary support systems as determined could be developed from the Annual Conference and General Church, as well as the local churches involved.

ADDENDUM II

*TESTED PATTERNS OF COOPERATIVE PARISH MINISTRIES

A Cooperative Parish Ministry pattern emerges when two or more churches and pastors intentionally plan and work together in services of ministry and mission. For some years United Methodists have tested several patterns or models of Cooperative Parish Ministries which, with modifications, may be adapted to service settings in the Peninsula Conference.

- A. Cluster Group -- a number of local churches in an extended area are gathered by a district superintendent into a simple pattern of cooperation to provide a communication network or mutual support system. A cluster permits some fellowship and peer support among pastors and their families. It provides an area for considering mutual seeking high visues and scheduling events and programs seeking high visues and support.
- B. Circuit -- a leadership deployment pattern for one pastor to serve two or more local churches who may or may not minister to the same community or to similar persons.

^{* 1984} Book of Discipline

The churches plan and work together for pastoral support and pastoral service to member families. They usually share programs and resources for mission where duplication of the pastor's leadership may be counterproductive and where each church has similar wested interests. The local churches maintain separate identities and management structures and queerally develop their own plans and within the community, with member families and mission within the community.

- C. Enlarged Charge -- a leadership deployment pattern for one pastor to sever two or more local churches of relatively equal size who work as a unit with charge an angeent and planning structures. The churches share resources with each other to serve a common service field. They share in a single Administrative Board/Council and necessary structures for a single ministry and mission while maintaining separate local church identifies.
- D. Extended Ministry -- a larger membership church chooses to share its pastor and resources with a smaller membership church. Both churches maintain their own identities and traditions. The smaller membership church usually has limited resources and serves a smaller mission target. The state of the smaller membership church as an integral part of its own mission within their community.
- E. Group Ministry -- two or more local churches and two or more pastors within neighboring service areas plan and work together in ministry and mission. Each pastor is appointed to a pastoral charge whose churches maintain their own identity. Each church and pastor share in the membership and work of a "group ministry council" which programs developed to meet the ministry and mission needs of the churches.
- F. Larger Parish a number of local churches within a larger community setting pool their resources to serve the ministry and mission needs of the larger community. While meeting ministry needs of member families, each local mission needs of the larger community. Generally, each pastor is assigned to all the churches with a view to providing specialized service to the parish in addition to general pastoral care to specific churches: are Professional church workers who are the parish and the composition of the community. The parish was not all local churches determines the plans and programs, budget and personnel to be utilized in the parish's ministry and mission. The larger parish exercises its authority on the basis of a churche who want to be included in the larger parish.

The six models identified above are types or styles of Cooperative Parish Ministries which may form a framework for new patterns yet to emerge from churches and pastors working "in connection" with one another in the Peninsula Conference.

No meal was eaten, no daily tasks engaged in, and no plans made without the benefits of prayer and the sure guidance of the Father who made all things possible. Whether by power or sail, calm or stormy weather, good times and bad -- faith and work were comingled. There was nothing strange about that. It was natural!

His wife of over fifty-seven years shared not only Malcolm's way of life but his basic religious philosophy. Caring for the two daughters, Flora and Shirley, in his absence as well as representing the family in community affairs while he was gone, the family was a strong unit of support and love. He and his family found no demarcation between the world of work and the life of faith. IX. Conference Rules of Order

- The Conference shall convene and adjourn at the discretion Rule 1: of the presiding Bishop and the Committee on Conference Arrangements. The Conference in plenary session may alter the time of convening or adjourning.
- The President shall decide all questions of order, subject Rule 2: to an appeal to the Conference; but in case of such an appeal the question shall be taken without debate, except that the appellant may make a simple statement of the grounds of his/her appeal.
- Rule 3: All resolutions, motions, amendments, and substitute motions presented at the Annual Conference shall be submitted to the Secretary in writing at the time they are made or as soon thereafter as possible.
- Rule 4: When a motion is made and seconded, or a resolution is introduced and seconded, or a report presented and read by the Secretary, or stated by the President, it shall be deemed in possession of the Conference; but any motion or resolution may be withdrawn by the mover, with the consent of the Conference, at any time before amendment or decision.
- No new motion or resolution shall be entertained until the Rule 5: one under consideration has been disposed of, which may be done by adoption or rejection, unless one of the following motions shall intervene which shall have precedence in the order in which they are placed, namely:
 - 1. To fix the time in which the Conference shall adjourn. 2. To adjourn.
 - 3. To take a recess.

 - To lay on the Table.
 For the previous question.
 - 6. To postpone to a given time.
 - 7. To refer.
 - 8. To substitute. 9. Amendment.
 - 10. To postpone indefinitely.
- A motion to amend shall be in order, and a substitute for Rule 6: both amendments may be received which substitute may be amended only once, and if a substitute be accepted, it shall operate as an amendment to the original proposition.
- Rule 7: When a member is about to speak in debate, or to deliver any matter to the Conference, she/he shall rise and respectfully address the President, but shall not proceed until recognized by him/her.
- Rule 8: No member shall be interrupted while speaking except by the President to call him/her to order when she/he departs from the question, or uses personalities or disrespectful language; but any member may call the attention of the President to the subject when she/he deems a speaker out of order, and any member may explain when she/he thinks herself/himself misrepresented.

- Rule 9: When a member desires a question of privilege, she,he shall briefly state the question; but it shall not be in order for her/him to proceed until the President shall have decided it a privileged question.
- Rule 18: No person shall speak more than twice on the same question, nor more than ten minutes at one time, without leave of the Conference; nor shall any person speak more than once until every member choosing to speak shall have spoken.
- Rule 11: When any motion or resolution shall have been acted by the Conference, it shall be in order for any member who voted with the prevailing side to move a reconsideration; but a motion to reconsider is a non-debatable motion and shall be decided without debate.
- Rule 12: No member shall absent herself/himself from the sessions of the Conference without leave, unless she/he is sick or unable to attend.
- Rule 13: No member shall be allowed to vote on any question who is not within the bar of the Conference at the time when such question shall be put by the President, except by leave of the Conference when such member has been necessarily absent.
- Rule 14: Every member who is within the bar at the time a question is put shall give his/her vote, unless the Conference, for special reason, shall excuse him/her.
- Rule 15: It shall be in order for him/her to move that the question be taken without further debate on any measure pending, except in cases in which character is involved, and if sustained by two-thirds, the question shall be taken.
- Rule 16: The motion to adjourn shall be taken without debate, and shall always be in order, except, (1) when a member has the floor; (2) when a question is actually put, or a vote is being taken; (3) when the question is pending or seconding the demand for the previous question; (4) when the previous question has been called and sustained, and is still pending; and (5) when a motion to adjourn has been negatived and no business or debate has intervened.
- Rule 17: All reports of the Boards, Commissions, and Committees shall be published and salled to members of the Annual Conference ten [18] days prior to the date of meeting of the Annual Conference. Reports to be included in this mailing must in the hands of the Secretary by the date set annually by the Conference Council on Ministries.
- Rule 18: No report shall be received or adopted by the Conference until a copy has been placed in the hands of the Secretary.
- Rule 19: These rules shall not be suspended or amended except by a vote of two-thirds of the members present and voting.
- Rule 20: All materials to be published in the Journal shall be in the hands of the Conference Secretary not later than 14 days following the adjournment of the Annual Session or they shall be excluded, the date to be part of the Organizational motion of the Annual Conference.

- Rule 21: The Nominating Committee shall distribute copies of its report to the Annual Conference on the day before the report is to be voted on by the Annual Conference.
- Rule 22: Recommendations as to change in policy regarding data to be included in the Journal shall be determined by the Journal Committee and submitted to the Annual Conference for action.
- With the exception of the Board of Ordained Ministry, no Rule 23: member of any Board, Division, Committee, or Commission shall serve more than two consecutive quadrennia on said Board, Division, Committee, or Commission, and shall be ineligible to be re-elected until after one quadrennium has elapsed except members of board, committees or commissions elected for three-year terms may serve three consecutive terms and shall be ineligible to be re-elected until after one term has lapsed and except that when a member is elected to fill an unexpired quadrennium or term she/he may complete the unexpired quadrennium or term and serve not more than one additional consecutive quadrennium or term. Persons elected to the Board of Ordained Ministry may serve eight (8) years regardless of what year in the quadrennium they begin serving. No member of the Conference, lay or ministerial, shall be elected to serve on more than two Boards, Divisions, Committees, or Commissions concurrently, except the committees elected or appointed for the Annual Conference session only, district committees whether or not elected by the Annual Conference and the quadrennial committee of the local church. The distribution of membership shall be according to districts, three lay persons and three ministers as nearly as possible to each district.
- Rule 24: Lay members of the Annual Conference will be elected quadrennially. A lay member may be re-elected for another quadrennium but must wait one quadrennium before being eligible for election for a third term.
- Rule 25: In order to achieve balanced membership in the Annual Conference, the Conference Secretary shall report quadrennially the number of lay persons required to preserve equality of membership, and that the Peninsula Conference achieve the desired equality of membership, by (1) the Associate Lay Leader of Life and Work, the four District Lay Leaders, the four District Presidents of the United Methodist Women, all United Methodist Deaconesses active and retired within the bounds of the Peninsula Annual Conference, all certified Directors of Christian Education employed by churches of the Peninsula Annual Conference, and all other voting lay persons of the Conference Council on Ministries, shall be members in the Annual Conference with vote; (2) each pastoral charge enrolling more than 500 members, but having only one clergy member appointed to it, may elect one additional lay member, and further, that a pastoral charge having more than one clergy member appointed to it may elect one additional lay member, provided that more than 1,500 members are enrolled; and (3) the Conference Council on Youth Ministries shall elect as many youth members as needed to maintain a balance, divided equally among the districts.

 January 39 or it will not be included.
- Rule 28: In keeping with paragraph 744 in the 1984 Book of biscipline which states "A District Conference shall be held if directed by the Annual Conference of which it is a part and may be held upon the call of the district superintendent, which call shall specify time and place, "a district superintendent my call a District Conference with the consent of the presiding Bishop and the District Lay Leader.
