FIRST DAY.

Evening Session.

Thursday, October 8th, 1936.

THE BISHOP read Phillipians 3:20 and addressed the Conference on the subject "SOME THINGS THAT HELP US IN OUR DAILY LIVING".

was sung.

Hammond on the Commission on Budget; J. O. Thompson in place of J. E. Poole on the Bible Board; C. P. McVicar in place of M. L. Walton, Sr., on the Board of Finance; and H. S. Coffey in place of B. V. Switzer on the Board of Missions.

UPON MOTION of the presiding elders the following were appointed to serve as a special committee on the Restoration of Credentials: T. M. Swann, H. M. Canter, H. Sydenstricker, F. B. Wyand, J. Harry Smith, C. K. Ray and E. L. Woolf.

THE FOLLOWING SUBSTITUTIONS on the roll were made: A. H. McFerrin in place of H. G. Humphries in the Lewisburg District; Paul W. Kesler in place of William M. Powell and Eugene Sowder in place of George S. DeLong in the Roanoke District; and R. K. Reger in place of C. W. Cooley in the Winchester District.

QUESTION TWENTY-TWO of the General Minutes was called, namely: "Are all the preachers blameless in their life and official administration?"

Presiding Elders: William H. Best, presiding elder of the Baltimore District; Charles L. DeLong, presiding elder of the Lewisburg District; Harry C. Marsh, presiding elder of the Moorefield District; John C. Copenhaver, presiding elder of the Roanoke District; Selwyn K. Cockrell, presiding elder of the Rockingham District; Edgar C. Beery, presiding elder of the Washington District, and William W. McIntyre, presiding elder of the Winchester District, were called; they represented the work of their respective districts, and their characters were examined and passed.

M. L. WALTON, JR., presented the following joint resolution from the Commission on Budget and the Conference Board of Lay Activities:

"On the important matter of the benevolences the Church is facing a serious situation caused by the tendency of certain churches to refuse to accept their full proportion of the askings.

"To meet this situation and prevent the attendant serious consequences the Commission on Budget and Board of Lay Activities jointly recommend:

"1. That a mass meeting of the pastors and stewards of each district be held as soon as possible after the session of the annual conference: The presiding elder and the district lay leader in cooperation to provide for the program emphasizing the importance of the matter.

"2. That the presiding elders be requested to arrange a strong program of information and inspiration for the first quarterly conference in each charge before the vote is taken on the acceptance of the askings."

Bishop Mouzon, M. L. Walton, Jr., and N. B. Harmon, Jr., spoke to the resolution.

UPON MOTION the resolution was adopted.

REPORT NO. 1 of the Commission on Budget was presented, read and upon motion adopted.

INTRODUCTIONS: Dr. R. E. Blackwell, president, and Dr. S. C. Hatcher, vice-president, respectively, of Randolph-Macon College, Ashland, Va.; Dr. W. W. Quillian, General Secretary of the Board of Christian Education, and Mr. J. F. Rawls, treasurer of the General Board of Missions, were severally introduced to the Conference.

CONFERENCE adjourned with the benediction by Bishop Mouzon to meet tomorrow morning at nine o'clock.

THE REPORT of the Southern Methodist Publishing Company was presented and referred to the Board of Christian Literature.

REPORT NO. 1 of the Board of Missions was presented and read.

J. F. Rawls and John Paul Tyler addressed the Conference in behalf of this report and upon motion it was adopted.

THE BISHOP announced that an official copy of the Plan of Union, proposed for the Methodist Church, was ready for distribution and announced the total Methodist membership from each of the uniting bodies which will be included in the several areas.

THE BISHOP called attention to the Bishops' Crusade which is to be inaugurated in January, 1937, at the meeting of the General Missionary Council and presented a personal letter from Bishop Arthur J. Moore to the members of the Conference.

E. H. BLACKARD presented the following memorial from the Baltimore Preachers' Meeting, requesting that the vote on unification be taken at the next session of the Conference:

"Whereas, the Commission on Unification from the Methodist Episcopal Church, the Methodist Protestant Church and the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, have agreed upon a plan of unification, and

Whereas, the General Conferences of the Methodist Episcopal Church and the Methodist Protestant Church have voted favorably upon the plan, and

Whereas, the annual conferences of these two sister denominations are now taking the vote upon the plan, and

Whereas, the next General Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, which will be held in 1938, will not

be in a position either to prepare for the consummation of unification, in event the vote of our Church is favorable, or to plan for the work of our denomination for the following quadrennium in event the vote is unfavorable, unless the vote on unification has been taken by the Conferences prior to that time; therefore be it

RESOLVED, First: That the Baltimore Annual Conference in session at Washington, D. C., October 8-12, 1936, go on record as favoring a vote on the Plan of Unification at the annual meeting of 1937, and

Second: That we request the College of Bishops, in the interest of uniform action, to consider the advisability of recommending to all the annual conferences that the vote on the Plan of Unification be taken at the annual sessions during the year 1937.

Saturday, October 10th, 1936.

CONFERENCE was called to order at nine o'clock.

BISHOP MOUZON was in the chair.

CONFERENCE united in singing Hymn No. 381:

after which the Bishop led in prayer.

THE JOURNAL of yesterday afternoon and evening sessions was read and approved.

THE BISHOP appointed the following special committee to look after the allocation of the Eastern Panhandle of West Virginia to the Southeastern Jurisdiction in event of the consummation of the proposed plan of Methodist union: H. H. Sherman, F. J. Prettyman and H. Sydenstricker.

QUESTION SIX of the General Minutes was called, namely: "WHO ARE ADMITTED INTO FULL CONNECTION " The Secretary announced the names of William Hedley Clews, Charles Lee Felty, Lance Keith Knowles, Charles Albert McCormick, Jr., and Benjamin Wierman Coe and they were called forward. The Bishop read a portion of I Corinthians 1 with special emphasis on the twenty-first verse and addressed the Conference upon "The Place and Importance of Preaching in the Life and Work of the Church", after which he propounded the disciplinary questions, and upon motion they were severally admitted into full connection.

"A charge to keep I have,
A God to glorify,
A never dying soul to save,
And fit it for the skies."

INTRODUCTIONS: Dr. Alfred E. Smith, Publishing Agent, was introduced to the Conference and addressed it in regard to the general publishing work of the Church, church school literature, the circulation of the "Christian Advocate" and the distribution of the Methodist hymnal.

Bishop W. F. McDowell, D.D., of the Methodist Episcopal Church, was also introduced and briefly addressed the Conference.

Rev. E. C. Peters, D.D., president of Paine College, Augusta, Ga., brought greetings to the Conference and spoke of the work that college is doing.

THE BISHOP expressed his appreciation of the work of G. G. Oliver, assisted by George R. Harrison, R. Moorman Parker, Raymond Musser,

John F. Owens and R. B. Clagett, in preparing the exhibition charts, and upon motion the Conference gave them a rising vote of thanks.

ON MOTION of E. C. Beery the Conference instructed the secretary to give to O. D. Lambert a certificate showing the time and place of his ordination and by whom he was ordained, in lieu of his original certificates of ordination which were lost by fire.

QUESTION THREE of the General Minutes was resumed. The name of Carlton Matthai Harris was called and having passed in examination before the Committee on the Course of Study his character was passed and he was advanced to the class of the second year.

THE REPORT of the Board of Finance was presented and read.

H. P. Baker, Conference Insurance Agent, addressed the Conference relative to its group insurance and upon motion the report was adopted.

THE REPORT of the Board of Christian Literature was presented and read. F. M. Richardson, editor of the "Baltimore Southern Methodist", spoke with reference to the paper and its circulation, and upon motion the report was adopted.

THE REPORT of the Trustees of the Home for Aged and Orphans was presented and read. H. M. Wilson, superintendent of the Home, emphasized the great work the Home is doing and the increasing response the Conference is making to its needs, and upon motion the report was adopted.

REPORT No. 1 of the Board of Lay Activities was presented and read. M. L. Walton, Jr., Conference Lay Leader, addressed the Conference in regard to the work of temperance, which the report emphasized, and called upon the Church to measure up to its full obligations with reference to it.

BISHOP W. F. McDOWELL and BISHOP MOUZON also urged the Church to a strict adherence to its declared position in regard to alcoholic liquors.

G. G. MARTIN expressed the appreciation of the Conference to the entertainment committee for securing places of entertainment where liquor was not sold.

Upon motion the report was adopted.

THE REPORT of the Baltimore Conference Missionary Society was presented and read. Mrs. W. H. Ballengee, president of the society, was introduced to the Conference and emphasized the work this society is doing. Upon motion the report was placed on record.

THE REPORT of the Trustees of the Francis Asbury School was presented and read and placed on record.

"It is the judgment of your committee that nothing should be done towards securing a permanent place of deposit for our conference records until final action is taken on the pending plan of unification."

THE FOLLOWING resolution, signed by E. L. Woolf, C. M. Hesser, Harry V. Wheeler, H. Sydenstricker and others, regarding Richmond as a place of meeting for the next General Conference, was presented and read, and upon motion adopted.

"Whereas the people of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, in Richmond, Va., are making an effort to secure the next session of the General Conference of our denomination, and

"Whereas, it has been fifty years since a session of the General Conference was held in Richmond, and

"Whereas, the historical, cultural and Methodist atmosphere of Richmond makes it the ideal as well as the logical place for the session of the General Conference; therefore be it

"RESOLVED, that the Baltimore Annual Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, in Conference assembled in Washington, D. C., October, 1936, hereby endorses the request of Richmond, Va., for the next session of our General Conference and we hereby direct the secretary of our Conference to send a copy of these resolutions to each member of the General Conference Committee on location "

UPON MOTION it was ordered that when we adjourn we adjourn to meet at three o'clock this afternoon.

CONFERENCE adjourned with the benediction by Bishop William F. McDowell.

REPORT OF BOARD OF CHRISTIAN EDUCATION.

The work of the Board of Christian Education has been carried forward during the year through the splendid cooperation on the part of the pastors and presiding elders, with the members of the staff. We list among the outstanding items of interest of the year's work the following:

- (a) District institutes held in all districts.
- (b) A total of 2,654 training credits issued.
- (c) 125 Daily Vacation Bible Schools held with a total enrolment of 7,550 pupils.
- (d) 126 young people attending the Young People's Conference at Memphis, representatives going from every district.
- (e) Twenty-six students preparing for the ministry granted financial assistance.
- (f) Circuit institutes held throughout the Conference.
- (g) An increased attendance at Randolph-Macon Academy, Front Royal, Va., raising the enrolment to over 200.

We feel that the work of Christian education is the supreme mission of the Church. Through Christian education the individual is brought into the saving experience of Jesus Christ and is led to a growth in the knowledge of Him. We therefore urge our presiding elders and pastors and laymen to continue to give their whole-hearted cooperation to this most vital phase of our work. The Board of Christian Education pledges itself to throw all its forces back of the Bishops' Crusade looking for a great religious awakening in our Church.

We wish to express our appreciation of the splendid leadership rendered by Dr. H. H. Sherman, Executive Secretary, and Rev. C. A. York, Extension Secretary in charge of Young People's Work. We also wish to express our appreciation of the presence at the Conference and helpful suggestions of Dr. W. F. Quillian, the General Secretary of the General Board of Christian Education.

We make the following recommendations for your adoption:

1. That the district organization and work, headed by the presiding elder, be made as effective as possible in the several phases of the work of Christian education.
2. That in every church the pastor and general superintendent see that the local church board is set up and meets regularly.
3. That every church have an adequate training program, and provide for the expenses involved as a regular part of the budget.
4. That institutes or conferences be held in all our circuits and stations, led by the presiding elder, the pastor, the general superintendent, or a member of the conference staff.
5. That Church School Day be observed in every church, with an offering for the work of the board.

6. That the Fourth Sunday Missionary Day be observed regularly in every school, with program and offering, and that the receipts be used as the Discipline directs.

7. That College Day be held in every congregation with special emphasis upon Randolph-Macon institutions, enlisting the cooperation of the alumni and the local young people's division; and that each congregation be given an opportunity to make a contribution to the chair of Religious Education at Randolph-Macon College.

8. That Childhood and Youth Week be observed the third week in October, or as soon thereafter as feasible, using suggestions in our literature; and that Daily Vacation Schools be held throughout the bounds of the Conference.

9. That the Conference Training School at Front Royal and the assemblies for Intermediates and Young People be held as usual; and that district camps for Intermediates and Young People be held where feasible.

10. That district institutes be held November 16-23 as follows (subject to necessary changes):

11. We urge that our presiding elders, pastors and church school superintendents see that our own Methodist literature is used in all our schools. No other is so well adapted to our program of Christian education. "All lessons are Christ-centered" is the aim.

12. That during the month of October we make a special study of the alcohol problem, using material furnished in our regular literature.

13. That we cooperate in student work at the following places and request the General Board to make appropriations named, provided that the several local churches concerned make an appropriation of at least 50% of that granted by the General Board; and provided that a satisfactory organization and program of work is set up:

Shiley as student in Asbury College.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF FINANCE.

It is gratifying to note that according to the eighteenth annual bulletin of the General Board of Finance, for the conference year 1934-1935, the average per capita paid the claimants of the Baltimore Conference was the largest paid by any Conference in the connection. For the fifty-one superannuates the per capita average paid by this Conference was \$512.00, and for the sixty-three widows it was \$233.00.

For the year 1935-1936 your board has received, in addition to the amount from the Conference Claimants Assessment, the following sums: From the Corporate Board of Finance, \$6,500.00; from the General Board of Finance, \$2,825.92; and from the Publishing House, \$3,353.88. The disbursements are as follows: To the superannuates \$13.00 per service year; to the widows \$9.00 per service year, and to the orphans \$75.00 each, with adjustments for necessitous cases as provided for in paragraph 563 of the Discipline, and the action of this Conference.

The General Board informs your board that there remains in the Baltimore Conference on adjusted quotas an unpaid balance of \$21,629.93, and makes the following requests:

First, that during the ensuing conference year a special month be authorized as a period within which each charge having an unpaid quota balance for superannuate endowment shall make an effort to raise as much money as possible to apply on said unpaid balance. We suggest the month of May, 1937.

Second, that this Conference request each presiding elder to provide in his district conference program, an opportunity for a speaker, selected by the presiding elder, to exhort on the importance of every charge having an unpaid quota balance to raise something during superannuate endowment month to apply on this obligation.

Third, that a Conference Director of Superannuate Endowment be appointed by Bishop Edwin D. Mouzon, to serve in connection with his regular work in this capacity for the purpose of keeping alive this cause in the Conference throughout the year as far as possible. The board recommends the appointment of Rev. Harry P. Baker.

The General Board informs your board that it is preparing a plan of reorganization for the support of the Church's claimants. In order to get the viewpoint of the various Conference Boards of Finance on the subject, the General Board requests that each Conference Board elect a representative, who shall meet with the executive committee of the General Board in a joint meeting in St. Louis, Mo., about March 1, 1937. Your board has elected T. M. Swann.

At our Last Annual Conference the question was raised whether or not our policy with the Equitable Assurance Society could be maintained. After a joint meeting of representatives of the company and a special committee, authorized by the Conference, it was recommended that the special group policies be discontinued on account of

increasing cost, and that the master policy, providing one thousand dollar insurance for each member of the Conference, as set forth in the policy, be continued, with Rev. Harry P. Baker as Conference Insurance Agent. Brother Baker reports to your board that during the year thirty-two new members were secured, making a total membership of two hundred and twenty-three now in the group, with a reduction of the base rate per month per thousand from \$2.69 to \$2.18. While we are well over the safety line to continue the policy in force, your board urges the younger men to become members and thus keep at a minimum the base rate. Your board has elected Rev. Harry P. Baker Conference Insurance Agent in connection with his regular pastorate.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF CHRISTIAN LITERATURE

Realizing that the printed page is one of the most effective of promoting the Kingdom of God we urge all our people to use available means to disseminate good literature. This is made important by the fact that the country is being flooded by salacious and damaging periodicals of all kinds.

We especially recommend to the members of our own Conference the "Baltimore Southern Methodist", the "Christian Advocate", the "World Outlook" and "The Upper Room", as periodicals necessary to the cultivation of the spiritual lives of our people and their development in church membership.

We desire to go on record as heartily endorsing a campaign for the purpose of increasing the circulation of the "Baltimore Southern Methodist" and that at the proper time a committee from the Board of Christian Literature cooperate with the Southern Methodist Publishing Company to express our appreciation to Dr. F. M. Richardson and Miss Maude E. Hodges for the splendid manner in which the paper has been edited during the year.

We desire to record also our pleasure on account of the excellent report made by our Publishing House. This report shows a profit of \$120,160.09, which is an increase for the present year, 1936, of \$33,889.33. Out of this amount the committee has appropriated \$90,000 to the welfare of our superannuates and of this amount \$3,352.88 has been sent to the Joint Board of Finance of the Baltimore Conference. We are also pleased to note that the Publishing House reports that the new Methodist hymnal has received a hearty welcome and your Board of Christian Literature wishes to commend this new hymnal to all our churches.

Recommendations.

1. We consider the Sunday School literature, issued by our own Publishing House, to be of the very highest type and we recommend that it be placed in all our Sunday Schools.
2. We desire to ask the Conference through its budget committee the same apportionment for the "Baltimore Southern Methodist"—\$6,000—as was granted last year.
3. We earnestly request that our presiding bishop, Bishop E. D. Mouzon, appoint Rev. F. M. Richardson, D.D., as the editor of the "Baltimore Southern Methodist" for the ensuing year and that Miss Maude E. Hodges be retained as treasurer and assistant editor.
4. We recommend that the salaries of the editor and his assistant be made the same as last year.
5. We recommend that the Southern Methodist Publishing Company, as in past years, be requested not to authorize loans on the part of the business management in excess of the reasonable amount to be expected from the apportionment.

REPORTS.

6. We recommend that the ministers of the Church stationed in Virginia, lend whatever aid is possible to the Department of the Virginia Polytechnic Institute under conditions of the state in which they reside. From the Department offered by the State Department to all those who are stationed in Blacksburg, Va.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF CHURCH EXTENSION

Your board has read with interest the report of the secretary of the General Board, Rev. T. D. Ellis, D. D. The following notation is encouraging.

"I am glad to report to you that most churches which have been making definite efforts to pay the debts in full, or so far as to make them that future payments will not embarrass them. The number of applications reaching the board at the present time for aid in paying debts. The Board of Church Extension is in a position that a church out of debt will be a better contributor to the benevolences and better able to carry on a well-rounded program, hence it has tried to so administer the donation fund that it would encourage churches to pay their debts in full. We are glad to report to you that during the last two years we have received by small contributions inspired about 150 churches to pay their debts in full."

Conference Board of Church Extension is confronted with the problem as the General Board: Churches burdened with debt and aid that they may either reduce it or wipe it out. The amount of disposal to help in this cause is wholly inadequate. This fact is shown when we report to you that the amount we had to pay was just one-third of the askings. We call special attention to the service of your boards. We call special attention to the fact that the Department of Finance". Rev. B. L. Pool is in charge of all churches embarrassed with debt and to meet their needs.

REPORT OF BIBLE BOARD.

We your Bible Board respectfully submit the following report:

The board heartily endorses the work of the American Bible Society in the translation, publication and distribution of the Bible. A marvelous work has been achieved in the 120 years of the history of this organization. At the end of 1935 the whole Bible has been published in 175 languages, the New Testament in 207 additional languages, and entire books and selections in enough others to give a total of 927 languages in which Scripture translation has occurred. Of equal importance is the systematic distribution of the scriptures. The United States is organized into ten districts. From Alaska to Florida, tenement workers in city and country, the mountains, mines and slums of the city and to many neglected people portions of the Bible, in the hand of the colporteur, find their way. 65,000 copies of five cent New Testaments were distributed through the C. C. Camps scattered throughout the country. Foreign countries and islands of the sea are worked. More copies of the entire Bible were distributed in China last year than in any preceding year since the beginning of evangelical work there. Colporteurs have called upon 2,191,000 households in Japan. But that is only a beginning. During the year 1935 the Society distributed more than 7,200,000 volumes of Bibles, Testaments and other portions. Over half of that number were distributed in about 40 foreign countries.

We appreciate the response of many pastors and churches in the Conference in observing the 400th anniversary of the publication of the first English Bible. The retold stories of Tyndale, Rogers, and the 400 martyrs, who gave up their lives for the word's sake, in the

reign of Queen Mary, have given modern youth a true standard by which to measure the value of this inestimable book. In this celebration emphasis was placed on the part that, during the centuries, this book has played in moulding the character of the nation. Surely, this will result in a greater love for the book, and the determination to make it the guide of individual and national life.

We commend the publication of "The Upper Room" not as a substitute for Bible reading, but as a means to place in the hands of our people choice Scripture gems together with a brief comment and a daily prayer.

The board suggests that Bible Sunday be utilized this year to encourage a more general use of the Bible and the assumption by its users of greater responsibility for its distribution. Included in the material for Bible Sunday, which will be provided free, will be a 7,500 word brochure by Bishop Paul B. Kern.

We respectfully present the following resolutions:

Whereas, The work of the American Bible Society in translating, publishing and distributing the Bible is of great importance in the life of the churches and is indispensable to the whole missionary enterprise, be it

Resolved, First, That we express our hearty endorsement of the activities of the Society in its efforts to make the Bible more generally the common possession of humanity.

Second, That inasmuch as Sunday, December 6, has been designated as Universal Bible Sunday, members of this Conference take advantage of the cooperation offered by the Society in furnishing assistance, and plan carefully for a worthy observance of the day.

Third, That our ministers, recognizing that the percent of our benevolences officially recommended is small, encourage individual contributions.

The bishops themselves have assumed the leadership of such a movement and have designated Bishop Arthur J. Moore as general director. This enterprise has the cooperation of the Board of Missions and the financial aspect has been approved by the General Commission on Budget.

Your Conference Board of Missions regards such an advance movement as timely and urgently needed in our Church. We believe it will be welcomed by our people. The current spirit of secularism and materialism, which dominates the world and even threatens the Church, can best be combatted by a revival among us of that vital spirituality which longs for the salvation of all men and finds expression in a vigorous policy of world evangelization.

Therefore, be it

Resolved, 1. That we welcome the leadership of the bishops in the proposed undertaking, and pledge to them, and especially to Bishop Arthur J. Moore, the director, our full cooperation in every aspect of the movement.

2. That we especially urge our preachers and people to participate in the great rally to be held at Washington on January 12, 1937, and in Roanoke on February 12, 1937, and in their charges heartily to cooperate in all the cultivation plans that may be announced.

3. That we confirm the appointment of Dr. John Paul Tyler as director for this Conference and pledge to him our full support and cooperation.

**REPORT OF THE WOMAN'S MISSIONARY SOCIETY
BALTIMORE CONFERENCE.**

(July 1, 1935, to July 1, 1936.)

The year 1936 is Home Missions Jubilee Year, marking the fiftieth anniversary of the beginning of home mission work under our woman's organization. This calls to our attention the fact that while the Baltimore Conference has the distinction of being a pioneer Conference in foreign missions, the first annual meeting of the Woman's Parsonage and Home Mission Society of the Baltimore Conference was held at the Wesley Grove Camp Meeting, July 29, 1891—forty-five years ago. At that time there were only four adult and two juvenile societies, and the financial report showed a total of \$33.15. Twenty-three years later, in 1914, the Home Missions Society had grown to ninety-two adult, twenty young people and twelve children's societies, with a membership of 2,724, and a financial report of \$3,350.00. In that same year (1914), the home and foreign missionary work of our Conference was united into the Woman's Missionary Society and today, twenty-two years later, we are happy to submit the following statistical report:

- Young Women's Circles, 43; members, 882.
- Life Members (representing a gift of \$25.00), 82 Adults.
- Life Members (representing a gift of \$10.00), 1 Junior.

REPORT No. 1 OF THE BOARD OF LAY ACTIVITIES.

To the Baltimore Conference, M. E. Church, South:

We have had under consideration the stirring message on the subject of temperance of our General Board of Lay Activities, as reported by the general secretary, in his printed communication addressed to Conference Lay Leaders and members of Boards of Lay Activities, in which the perils of the present situation are graphically set forth in the following language:

"We keenly sense the danger to society in the increase in drunkenness of both men and women since the repeal of the Eighteenth Amendment. The tragedies of broken homes and ruined lives, the heavy death toll from drunken drivers on our highways, and the ruthless, brazen effrontery of the liquor interests in trying to make our people liquor-minded challenge the Christian Church to battle. Shall our great Church accept the challenge or shall it make a cowardly retreat? If we are worthy of the name of Christians, we will fight to the last ditch, and use every legitimate means to overcome this great evil."

This board most cordially approves and endorses the recommendations of our General Board and pledges its loyal support of the program it outlines, including:

1. A presentation of the question at this Conference. (Already arranged.)
2. Special presentation of the temperance question at all District Conferences.
3. Round table discussions of the liquor problem under the direction of Charge Lay Leaders in all churches.
4. Special sermons on temperance, from time to time, by all pastors.
5. Total abstinence pledge signing in all congregations.
6. No person who drinks intoxicants or is in sympathy with the sale of liquor to serve on any board of stewards.
7. Education to the fullest extent possible on the point that beer and light wines are intoxicants and are entering wedges to habitual drunkenness and to the sale of all kinds of liquor.
8. Co-operation with all who are fighting the legalized sale of liquor whenever a battle is waged in state, county or other political unit.
9. All possible efforts to prevent and discourage untruthful and disgraceful liquor advertisements of every form.
10. All officers of the law in dry territory urged to do their duty faithfully and our people urged to support them and not evade jury duty.
11. That the general secretary prepare and distribute throughout the Church, a pamphlet setting forth present-day trends and evils.
12. Conferences with leaders throughout the year.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON SABBATH OBSERVANCE.

The Baltimore Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, cannot be unmindful of the desecration that our modern day has accorded the Christian Sabbath. When our God laid down the basic law for His people He definitely commanded them to "Remember the Sabbath Day to keep it holy". By a positive and personal command at Mt. Sinai the Lord God set aside one day in seven to be kept holy to Himself.

This command of God was reaffirmed and incarnated in Jesus Christ. We read of Him, "He entered, as his custom was, into the synagogue on the Sabbath Day." Jesus taught us that "the Sabbath was made for man not man for the Sabbath". The New Testament definitely

teaches that the Christian Sabbath is to be continued and observed to the end of time. In keeping with this Biblical teaching our own Church, through her general rules, specifically states that it is expected of all who continue with us that they especially avoid the profaning of the day of the Lord.

In spite of much modern disobedience of this command of God and His Church, it must be plain to thinking people that nothing is more beneficial to the health, happiness and prosperity of mankind than a faithful observance of the Christian Sabbath. A world without a Sabbath would be too dull and desolate to imagine.

Where there is no Christian Sabbath there can be no Christian morality. Without a Christian Sabbath there would be no Christian worship; without worship, there would be no Christian religion; without a Christian Religion there would be no hope of mankind.

In view of the foregoing, be it resolved that the Baltimore Annual Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, adopt the following resolutions:

1. That we believe that the great lack of observance of the Lord's Day for spiritual and cultural purposes is due in no small measure to the lack of a Lord's Day educational program in the home, in the church school, and in the Church at large.
2. That we welcome the Lord's Day educational program as outlined by the Lord's Day Alliance of Maryland, which consists of:
 - (a) An Annual Lord's Day sermon by the pastor.
 - (b) Three of the mid-week meetings given to Lord's Day observance.
 - (c) Brief Lord's Day program, three times a year in our church schools.
 - (d) An annual Lord's Day program by the church school.
3. That in order to make this program effective, we recommend a Lord's Day Committee in every district, consisting of the presiding elder, a minister and a church school superintendent, to be named by the presiding elder, with the power to add to their committee as many others as they deem necessary.
4. That we name Rev. C. F. Phillips a member of the Lord's Day Alliance Educational Committee.
5. Be it further resolved, by the Baltimore Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, in session in Mt. Vernon Place Church, Washington, D. C., that we pledge the Lord's Day Alliance of Maryland and its general secretary, Dr. W. W. Davis, our whole-hearted cooperation in their work which is vital to Church, home and nation.

**THE THIRTEENTH ANNUAL REPORT, BOARD OF TRUSTEES,
HOME OF THE AGED, LOCATED AT GAITHERS-
BURG, MARYLAND.**

Our responsibility in the Home of the Aged increases year by year. Fourteen new guests were admitted to the Home during the conference year. This large increase was made possible by the opening of Epworth Hall. Our aged family numbers 67, with 28 on the waiting list. In all, 125 guests have enjoyed the comforts and loving ministry of the Home. An increased number of persons to be fed, as well as the increase in food prices, create an additional responsibility which we must share. Our list of loyal supporters must be increased to meet this obligation, otherwise this task will become burdensome. We call upon our presiding elders, pastors, superintendents, home directors, home guild officers and the entire membership of the Conference to think more, pray more and pay more to this glorious enterprise that it may go on prospering and enlarging its ministry to the dependent aged of our Conference.

We suggest that the matter of securing Maintenance Subscriptions be given special emphasis during the ensuing year. Our goal was fixed at two thousand subscribers some years ago, but we have secured approximately only half that number. We believe we can do nothing more constructive than press toward this goal.

Our achievements during the year are worthy of note. The successful opening of Epworth Hall, largely made possible by the activity of the Women's Home Guild, increased our capacity. The noteworthy achievement in the celebration of the tenth anniversary, which was made possible by the great faith, sound judgment and arduous toil of our efficient superintendent, Rev. H. M. Wilson, marks a new day in our history. We may expect to reap benefits from this outstanding achievement for years to come. Our financial exhibit is excellent. In our last report to the Conference we reported regretfully a deficit of \$2,000.00 on current expenses. It is now our pleasure to report that deficit paid, closing the year with the largest balance since 1932, namely, \$75.96. We note a substantial increase in income over last year from bequests and general contributions, but remind the Conference that the receipts from maintenance subscriptions, Christmas offerings and Mother's Day offerings have decreased. The new items offer genuine encouragement, consisting of \$2,300.00 from the Conference Home Guild and the great anniversary offering which will reduce our bonded indebtedness from \$72,600.00 to about \$49,000.00. All things being considered, we deem this the best year of the ten. For all this we fervently thank God and trusting Him we look forward with confidence to the future.

Recommendations.

First, we request Bishop Edwin D. Mouzon to reappoint Rev. Herman M. Wilson to the superintendency of the Home.

Second, we request the presiding elders at their first quarterly conference to ask this question: "Who is elected director of the Home for the Aged in each church?" and report the names and addresses to the superintendent of the Home. And in addition thereto we request the presiding elders to repeat the question at the fourth quarterly conference, where it rightfully belongs.

Third, we request the Conference to authorize a continuance of the Christmas and Mother's Day offerings in every church school and congregation. Furthermore, we request the superintendents of all our church schools and the pastors of all our churches to take an offering for the Home—Christmas and Mother's Day, respectively.

Fourth, we recommend that increasing effort be made to enlarge the number of maintenance subscribers to the Home. We further recommend that from time to time our people be advised of the great work the Home is doing and that they be encouraged to remember it in their wills.

REPORT OF FRANCIS ASBURY SCHOOL, INC.

In accordance with the instructions of the Annual Conference, authorizing a change in charter, the Francis Asbury funds are being used as loan and donation scholarships to help worthy and capable young men and women in their preparation for the ministry and missionary work of the Church. Jointly with the Ministerial Training Committee of the Board of Christian Education, all applications are carefully considered and appropriations made according to the best

judgment of the two committees, in view of the known circumstances and facts. During the school year 1935-36 eleven applications were granted amounting to \$1,327.50.

The number of applications for the session 1936-37 was unusually large. But for the Francis Asbury fund most of them would have had to be denied help for lack of funds. Fifteen were granted, amounting to \$2,695.00. The change of policy has enabled the board to meet an urgent need and to help take care of this very important work, thereby meeting the original intention of the donors and trustees of this fund.

The treasurer's report, as made to the annual meeting of the board at Front Royal, Va., in June, showed the finances in good condition. The books were audited and found to be correct. Summary financial statement taken from the treasurer's report is as follows:

MEMOIRS.

WILLIAM STEVENS.

The annual roll call of our "blessed dead", unusually long this year, is led by the name of William Stevens. His passing occurred November 28, 1935. Notwithstanding severe illness during the year, he came to the Conference in Staunton, 1935, with the glad expectation of continuing in active service; but instead thereof, he graciously accepted the alternative of the superannuate relation. Shortly after Conference he was stricken with a recurrence of his physical ailments and passed into the realm of the "Spirits of just men made perfect" from the Johns Hopkins Hospital. His body was laid to rest on the evening of November 30, 1935, in Riverview Cemetery, Richmond, Virginia, following the burial services conducted by Rev. D. M. Brown, assisted by Rev. Dr. Hatcher of Randolph-Macon College and Rev. Dr. Hughes of Park Place Methodist Church. Thus closed an earthly life of seventy-one years, forty-two of which were spent in effective relation with the Baltimore Conference.

Brother Stevens was born in Frostburg, Maryland, July 2, 1864. He was of British parentage—his father from England and his mother from Wales. His early life was developed amid the rather rugged environment of the period, but leavened by the cultural influences of religion and education. This influence was mediated through his mother from her uncle and foster father, Rev. William Edwards, a minister of the Congregational Church in England, and led to his early resolve to lead a Christian life. At the age of seventeen years, he joined the M. E. Church, South, in his home town. His early education was received in public and private schools in Allegany County, Maryland. Responding to the call to preach, he was granted license accordingly in 1889. In 1888 he entered Randolph-Macon College where he pursued the theological and academic courses, graduating in 1893. He was received on trial into the Annual Conference at Fredericksburg, Virginia, 1894, ordained an elder in 1898, receiving the following appointments consecutively: Elk Garden, Marlborough, Wilkens Avenue, Brunswick, Ronceverte, Stephens City, St. James (Roanoke, Va.), Vinton, Buena Vista, Bridgewater, Warrenton, Gaitttersburg, Strasburg, Ridgeway.

Brother Stevens had a beautiful home life. In 1896, he was married to Miss Kate McDowell Montgomery of Richmond, Virginia, granddaughter of Rev. Andrew McDowell of the Virginia Conference. Three children blessed this union, Mildred Montgomery, who died in infancy; Lucille Lenore and Byron Montgomery, who with his wife survive him.

Brother Stevens was endowed with a robust body and a vigorous mind. He was a diligent student and a wide and thoughtful reader. His independence of thought gave originality to his preaching—"not handling the word of God deceitfully, but by manifestation of the truth commending the same to every man's conscience in the sight of God". Mentally aggressive he was free from cant or conventions. Being an earnest seeker of truth, he frequently experienced the misfortune of being misunderstood as are all pioneers in this quest. He was not without faults, but these were exceeded by his virtues. He never claimed perfection, but he "laid hold thereof as he had been laid hold of by Jesus the Christ". He was a sympathetic pastor, a loyal friend, a lover of home, and a gracious host therein.

The writer of this memoir was privileged to share a friendly relation with our brother and his family through the length of their itinerant years. The association was always stimulating to the best and noblest in thought and action. As a memory it abides, a constant incentive to patient continuance in well-doing, encouraged by the hope that some time the broken threads of this our earthly pattern, will be woven into a perfect fabric by the Master hand.

"Say not 'Good night';
But in some brighter clime
Bid me 'Good morning'."

Harry Lee Myerly, son of Jesse and Elizabeth Gilbert Myerly, was born in Westminster, Carroll County, Md., October 9, 1862, and died in Memorial Hospital, Winchester, Va., December 6, 1935.

At the age of eighteen he was converted, under the ministry of Rev. F. A. Strother, and united with the Crums Methodist Episcopal Church, South, Berryville Circuit, now a part of the Brucetown Circuit.

A short time after his conversion he felt the call to preach, and at once began preparations for the work of the ministry. After attending the public schools of his county, he enjoyed the benefits of a liberal higher education at Randolph-Macon College, Ashland, Va. After his graduation, and in 1889 he united with the Baltimore Conference, and on March 16, 1891, in the Greene Memorial Church, Roanoke, Va., was ordained Deacon, by Bishop E. R. Hendrix. On March 26, 1893, he was ordained Elder in the same church, by Bishop J. S. Key.

His years of service embraced the following charges: Eagle Rock, Colliertown, Elliston, Buchanan, Royal Oak, Mt. Crawford, Franklin, Springfield, Berkley Springs, Mt. Solon and Prince Frederick. During the year 1920, he suffered a nervous breakdown, and was compelled to retire from the active ministry, which he loved so well.

Thereupon he located in Brucetown, Va., where the remaining years of his life were spent, surrounded by appreciative and loving friends, who shielded him from over exertion, and encouraged him at all times. In his superannuation he was not content to be idle, and gave what strength and energy he could command in teaching in the church school, and other services his health would permit.

In 1891, he was united in marriage to Miss Katie Grant of Clarke County, Va. Theirs was a most happy wedded life, each contributing to the building of a happy, useful home. She was always ready and ever willing to share with him not only the joys, but also the shadows of the itinerant life.

As a preacher, Brother Myerly was earnest, and convincing, and many souls were brought to conviction and led to Christ under his preaching. As a pastor he was no respecter of persons, no burden was too heavy, no hardship too great for him to bear, if by doing so he could bring comfort or help to some sorrowing heart. He was a genial companion and friend. In his ministry he met all sorts and conditions of men and he met them on common ground. For all he had a dignified but winning presence and an outstretched hand. To the poor and suffering he was kind and sympathetic, and the needy were often the recipients of his unostentatious benevolence. For him neither wealth nor poverty made the man. The honesty, the intention, the character—these determined his judgment, so that as the years sped on the simplicity and uprightness of his own character made a profound impression on his people.

Such a life as his was worth living, because he lived for something. He took hold of life, and with all his physical might and all his mental strength turned to good account the talents with which he was endowed; and in doing this he made for himself a good name, to which we here today, who would do him honor, can add nothing. His life work well done is his monument.

The love and esteem in which the friends and neighbors of Brother Myerly held him was amply testified by their general unmistakably sincere sorrow, when the people came from far and near to pay their last tribute to their friend, their benefactor and their honored and highly respected minister.

I was privileged to attend the funeral of Brother Myerly, for I had been his pastor for two years, and I was deeply impressed by the universal sorrow expressed by the people, and by the great outpouring of his friends who desired to give evidence of the loss they so keenly felt. With bowed heads we gathered within the portals of his late home. Loving hands had covered the bier with sweet-scented flowers. It seemed that his worth had been such that all nature had been robbed of her storehouse of flowers for his bed, as if to conceal the fact that he was gone.

Brother Myerly is survived by his beloved wife, and one brother, Mr. J. G. Myerly, of Poolesville, Md.

The funeral services were in charge of his nephew, Rev. Harry Stockton Myerly, assisted by Rev. W. W. McIntyre, presiding elder of the Winchester District, Dr. Hubert Sydenstricker, Rev. H. V. Wheeler, J. D. Russell, J. H. Brown, W. D. Eye, J. H. Haley, F. H. Strieby and Thomas Morgan. There was but one hymn used, "Rock of Ages", a favorite of his, sung by Mrs. Thomas Morgan. His body was laid to rest in the Green Hill Cemetery at Berryville, Va., where it shall rest until the dead shall hear the voice of the Son of God, and those who hear shall live.

And if the disembodied spirits can look down from the battlements of heaven, his spirit looks down upon us today, saying, in words which illustrate both his life and death:

"So live that when the summons come to join
The innumerable caravan which moves
To that mysterious realm where each shall take
His chamber in the silent halls of death,
Thou go not, like the quarry-slave at night,
Scourged to his dungeon, but, sustained and soothed
By an unfaltering trust, approach thy grave,
Like one that wraps the drapery of his couch
About him, and lies down to pleasant dreams."

ANDERSON LEE BARRET.

Rev. Anderson Lee Barret, son of James Addison and his wife, Eliza Burbridge Anderson Barret, was born in Springfield, Illinois, May 11, 1849. He departed this life in Cumberland, Maryland, December 3, 1935, thus reaching the advanced age of nearly 87 years. We note in this memoir a few of the facts of this wonderful experience; for to have lived and loved, and suffered and labored for 87 years!—What an adventure!

Brother Barret received his academic education at Virginia Military Institute, Lexington, Virginia, which he entered in 1866, graduating therefrom in 1870. From this time until 1886 he practiced law in Marion County, Kentucky. Hearing the call to the gospel ministry, he surrendered his life to the Church. Entering the Western Virginia Conference in 1886 he was appointed to Warfield, Kentucky. Perhaps his greatest work in that Conference was in his association with Barboursville College as secretary. Through his influence with Mr. Morris Harvey, he was able to rebuild the college, thus changing the name to Morris Harvey College.

In 1909 he transferred to the Baltimore Conference at the session at St. Paul's Church, Baltimore. His appointments were: Christians-

burg, Va., 1909; South Cumberland, 1910-14; Moorefield, 1914-18; Goshen, 1918-20; Frederick City, 1920-24; Beltsville, 1924-27. At the Conference at Greene Memorial Church, Roanoke, he requested and received a superannuate relation, which was continued until his death.

Brother Barret was twice married. In 1875 he was united in marriage with Miss Alice Pennington of Catlettsburg, Kentucky. Together they labored in the practice of law and in the ministry of the gospel until this union was severed by the death of Mrs. Barret at Moorefield, W. Va., October 8, 1914. In 1916 he and Miss Nellie Clinedinst were married. This union lasted until 1927 when at Beltsville, Maryland, she was called to the Father's House. From this time, the worn and broken soldier of the Cross made his home with his son, Mr. E. O. Barret.

Forty-one years he served his Lord and the Church in active ministry. One of his brethren who was intimately associated with him writes: "Brother Barret was a good man, a strong preacher of the glorious gospel of the blessed Christ, a faithful pastor, a wise shepherd of souls." Another pilgrim soldier has laid aside his armor and entered into the Presence.

Surviving the father are three sons, E. O., James H., Maury Lee Barret, and one daughter, Mrs. Edward F. Diehl.

Funeral services, in charge of his presiding elder, Rev. H. C. Marsh, assisted by Rev. A. I. Orndorff, were held on Thursday afternoon, December 5, 1935, at 2 o'clock in the church at Moorefield, W. Va. His body was laid to rest in the cemetery of that fair West Virginia town.

JOHN BARNETT GRIMES.

Rev. John Barnett Grimes, the son of Allen and Sarah Grimes, was born at Millpoint, West Virginia, October 4, 1865, and, after an illness of several months, died in the Marlinton Hospital, December 14, 1935, in the seventy-first year of his age. In his death the Baltimore Conference lost one of its faithful, efficient preachers and humanity one of its truest friends.

The early years of his life were spent in the vicinity of his birthplace. It was in this community he received his education in the public schools and at Hillsboro Academy.

From childhood his deep piety and an insatiable desire for knowledge were manifested. He was converted in 1879 at the Droop Mountain camp meeting at which Rev. V. W. Wheeler and Rev. J. R. VanHorn were the outstanding leaders and preachers.

In 1887 he was united in marriage to Miss Serene Bruffey, who, with five children—U. W., Dice, Clyde V., Mrs. E. T. Swann and Mrs. Carl Tracy—survives him. One child, Denny, died in infancy.

Early in life he was called to the ministry but he tried to satisfy the call by putting his very best efforts into the teaching profession. He taught his first school in 1884-5 on Locust Creek. For several years he was a successful and popular instructor in the public schools of Pocahontas County, West Virginia. He was elected county superintendent of schools for two four-year terms, 1900-1908. He was licensed to preach and served as local preacher for about fifteen years along with his work as teacher and county superintendent. He preached his first sermon in the old church at Marlinton. He thought that by having a chance to talk to all the children of the county while he was superintendent, he could satisfy his call to the ministry.

When one son was in the thick of the fight in France he asked God to bring his boy home safely and promised that he would surrender all and give his entire time to the ministry. His son was returned safely. True to his promise, he entered the ministry soon after that and worked as hard at it as he had always done in anything he undertook.

In 1920 he was appointed to the Blue Sulphur Charge. In April, 1922, he was admitted on trial into the Baltimore Conference, and into full connection in 1924. He was ordained Deacon in Mount Vernon Place Church, Washington, D. C., on March 27, 1910, by Bishop Alpheus W. Wilson. At Braddock Street Church, Winchester, Virginia, he was ordained Elder on March 28, 1926, by Bishop Warren A. Candler.

During the fifteen years of his active work in the Conference, Brother Grimes was appointed to the following fields of labor: Blue Sulphur, 1920-24; Callaghans, 1924-25; Epworth, Covington, 1925-28; Mt. Solon, 1928-33; Rockbridge Baths, 1933-35.

John Barnett Grimes was a preacher of marked ability. He had the instinct of a true Christian gentleman and the deep piety which sanctifies all human attainments. He was a quiet soul with a deep religious nature, careful not to offend in word or deed, and anxious to be a workman approved of God. He was a preacher who did not spare himself in his arduous labors for the development of Christian people and the salvation of the unchurched. He loved to preach and to visit among his flock. He was unusually careful to visit and read and pray with the sick.

He was always the personification of sincerity. He seemed to live it and wear it in his countenance. Tenderness and sympathy, which had a large place in his very being, characterized his ministry. He was keenly sensitive to that which was real and genuine. "Pure gospel preaching in a most beautiful language" are the words by which his pulpit ministrations have been described.

Rev. John A. Anderson says, "In the early days of my superannuation, it was my privilege to enjoy the faithful ministry of Brother J. B. Grimes for four consecutive years. He first impressed me as being a sincere, unassuming, sympathetic man of God who felt he had a message from his Lord which he was eager to deliver to his fellow

men. As weeks multiplied into months and years this impression deepened and abides with me to this day. He was a strong scriptural preacher. As a pastor, J. B. Grimes excelled. He was diligent and painstaking in the discharge of his pastoral duties, always kind, but firm in his advocacy of what he believed to be right."

Wherever he was appointed he went with a willing mind and left the impress of his piety and zeal on every charge he served. He carried with him the atmosphere of a fervent spirit that enjoyed a close fellowship with his divine Master.

He was a lifelong student. He never entered the pulpit without the most careful preparation. In addition to his general study and training he pursued a special course and as a result received the degree, Doctor of Divinity, in 1927.

During the year 1935 he was in failing health. Most of the time he was under a doctor's care. He preached his last sermon March 10, 1935. On account of his health he was forced to superannuate at the Conference at Staunton, 1935. He went to his home at Lobelia, Pocahontas County, West Virginia, where his condition gradually grew worse. He was placed in the Marlinton Hospital, November 11, 1935. Even in his extreme illness his heart was in his loved employ. When he was too weak to stand he remarked to his sister that he hoped to live, for their were some strongholds of Satan he wanted to break down.

On Saturday, December 14, 1935, he ended his Christian warfare and his spirit went home to God. On Monday, December 16, 1935, the funeral service was conducted at Emmanuel Church by Rev. J. H. Light, assisted by Rev. B. W. John and Rev. J. D. Pope. His body was laid to rest in the cemetery at that place to await the resurrection of the faithful.

BASIL WORTHINGTON WATERS.

A light of the steadiest ray went out when Basil Worthington Waters left us to serve in the larger sphere beyond. He would not desire to be classed with many brilliant meteors that pass through our sky with dazzling splendor, but a steady and true North Star that was always in the sky to guide the wayfarer in his journey home.

He was born near Brookeville, Montgomery County, Maryland, on January 11, 1859. He had his beginning near the place of the beginning of the Methodist Church in America. The influence of Robert

Strawbridge and his early co-laborers, who preached in this section before the organization of the Church in this county, was still a real factor in the religious life of this countryside when he was a boy. His home was religious in the old-fashioned way. It is one of the outstanding achievements of early Methodism that it attracted by its sincerity of purpose and the depth of its conviction many of the leading families of Maryland. Among this class was the Waters family. It was characteristic of his class of early Methodists that they combined very deep and enthusiastic religious feeling along with a real culture in the arts and sciences that gave them at once aggressive religious loyalty, with a just appreciation of the finer elements of social life. He had the advantage of being brought up in a community that gave large attention to the cultivation of the mind. His schooling was in a state-endowed academy that had the form of instruction after the order of the then current Latin School. He afterwards attended Randolph-Macon College and graduated in 1881.

He was received into the Baltimore Conference March, 1881, and was sent as junior preacher to Freedom Circuit. March, 1883, he was sent again as junior preacher to Bridgewater Circuit, where he served two years. March, 1885, he was appointed as preacher in charge at Easton, Maryland. In each of these charges he was universally popular with the people and his name is still held dear in the memory of many of the older saints in these early days of his service in the Church.

This was the day of high romance in the field of foreign missions. The hitherto shut-in nations of the Far East were opening their doors to adventurous souls from the West with their Gospel message. Our choicest young men and women were being selected with greatest care for this most difficult field. Bishop Alpheus W. Wilson laid hands on this consecrated man for service in Japan. He landed in Japan November 2, 1887, and served as follows: Hiroshima, 1888-1894; Osaka, 1895-1900; Hiroshima, 1900-1904; Nakatsu, 1905-1910.

While in Japan he married Miss Tallalah Harris Lipscomb, February 28, 1890. She was a missionary under the Woman's Board.

He returned to the United States May, 1910. He re-entered the work of the Baltimore Conference and served Roanoke Circuit, 1913-1916; Cambria, 1916-1920; Glen Wilton, 1920-1923; Rockbridge Circuit, 1923-1927.

At the Conference of 1927 he took the superannuate relation. After returning to this country he married Miss Willie Deisher Wood. By his first marriage there were the following children: Basil Worthington, Jr., William Lipscomb, Harris Magruder and George Lipscomb. The last two are now members of the Baltimore Conference.

So we record the facts of his earthly life. No man has served us more faithfully, more laboriously or more zealously. He had a charming personality. He carried his cross with a smile. His life was so fully given into the hands of his Lord that he did not count the cost.

The outward circumstances of his life were of little moment. It was his will to do the will of Him who sent him. His memory abides in Japan and America. Whatever the Japanese got out of his ministry we are sure that those who came into personal contact with him got the impression of high Christian character. Whatever grasp they had on his message, we know that his gentleness made great those who felt the touch of his personality.

After his superannuation he settled in Buena Vista, Virginia. Here he died February 26, 1936, and was buried there by loving hands of his brethren in the ministry.

We may place his name among the foremost saints of the Baltimore Conference.

WILLIAM CLIFTON SMITH.

In the death of Rev. William Clifton Smith, our Conference has for awhile lost a brother whose sweet and gentle spirit for thirty-three years adorned the doctrine of God in our midst and among our people of the churches he served as pastor. The record of his life is an open book—he lived, he found Christ, he followed Him, and, as his earthly end drew near, with calm and joyful assurance of entrance into the heavenly home he faced death serenely and victoriously. In life he walked with God and now is not, for God took him.

The son of Charles Henry and Mary Ann Smith, William Clifton was born August 27, 1868, on a farm in Louisa County, Virginia. As a child he was started in that path which groweth brighter and brighter unto the perfect day. The outstanding event of his youth was his conversion. He himself wrote as follows: "In early life I experienced the great mystery of being 'born again', clear, full, joyful, satisfying, and on three distinct occasions I was caught up into the presence and power of God's wonderful love and saving grace."

During his employment, first with a contracting and later with a mercantile firm in Roanoke, the call of God to preach became so urgent he could not longer delay. He accepted the call of God as a call to fuller educational preparation and so the next five years of his life were spent in school under the direction of men whose convincing lives helped fashion him mentally and spiritually.

In 1900 at the age of thirty-two he was admitted on trial into the South Carolina Conference and was appointed to Rembert Charge, which he served for two years. There he met and loved Miss Annie A. Driggers of Florence County. She was a woman of rare charm and culture and of a devout and Godly spirit. To them were given three sons, William, Archie and Paul. In the lives of those sons the light of her sweet spirit and the gentle influence of that Christian home

continue to shine. In 1926, at Arnold, Md., Mrs. Smith laid down her early labors and entered into the rest of the children of God.

From the West End Charge of Georgetown, South Carolina, Brother Smith was transferred to our Baltimore Conference in 1903, and of the transfer he wrote: "I was received with kindness and courtesy, for which I feel deeply grateful to my brethren."

In our Conference he served the following charges: Darnestown, 1900; Clarksburg, 1905; Colesville, 1907;—then a year was spent at Havana, Florida, for the sake of his health—Church Hill, 1910; Clarksburg, 1914; Jarrettsville, 1916; Howard, 1918; Marshall, 1920; Cumberland (Trinity), 1924; Asbury, 1925; Patuxent, 1927; Frederick, 1928; Freedom, 1930; Queen Anne, 1931.

In 1929 he was married to Miss Carrie D. Smith of Church Hill, Md., who survives him. She made his home bright and his life happy. She shared the joy of his work and with him loved and ministered to the care of the three sons. The devotion of those young men to her is lovely proof of her gracious, helpful and tender spirit. The joy in that home when the sons returned with their brides and later with the grandchildren was beautiful. Not the least glory of Brother Smith's life is the respect and admiring love in which his sons always held him.

Brother Smith never lost the glow of his love for Christ. Modest, retiring and gentle though he was, he yet was fearless, uncompromising in his preaching. All his people respected the courage of his convictions even though sometimes they could not agree with his judgment, and they loved him.

His was a joyous ministry. He never complained of hard appointments, but rather thanked God for the privilege of preaching the Gospel anywhere.

As the end of his active ministry approached he faced cheerfully the physical necessity of his retirement, sent his love to the brethren meeting in Conference and with his wife courageously set out on a long journey to the Penney Farms of Florida—that ante-room of heaven for many worn-out ministers of Christ who are forced to face old age without adequate provision.

To every session of the Conference he sent a message of tender greetings. His last message was: "I am deeply grateful for the kindness and courtesy that I have continuously received from each of them. May the joys that Jesus came to give the world richly fill the hearts of each one."

Quietly on the morning of December 23, 1935, he entered into the "Father's house" and we who labored with and loved him are stronger because he lived.

"O blest communion fellowship divine!
We feebly struggle, they in glory shine;
Yet all are one in Thee, for all are Thine.
Hallelujah! Hallelujah!"

In addition to the three sons, two grandchildren and his wife, Brother Smith is survived by a sister, Mrs. L. W. Woolfolk of Louisa, Va.

His body was laid to rest at Church Hill, Md., with services conducted by his presiding elder, Dr. William H. Best, assisted by Rev. L. H. Smallwood and C. R. Curtis.

JOSEPH HENDRICKSON BALTHIS.

Joseph Hendrickson Balthis was born in Luray, Virginia, November 26, 1876, and died at White Sulphur Springs, West Virginia, on January 17, 1936. These dates mark the earthly span of a noble career and comprise the record of a life filled with service to its Lord, rich in good works, and triumphant in faith.

His father, Rev. Maybury Goheen Balthis, was an honored member of the Baltimore Conference from 1861 to the day of his death. By reason of failing health, however, he was compelled to take the superannuate relation in 1884 and settled in New Market, Maryland. Here his son, Joseph, at that time but eight years of age, grew to young manhood and from this place he went forth to preach the gospel of Jesus Christ.

During Brother Balthis' earlier life, camp meetings were in vogue and while attending one of these, he was genuinely converted. Shortly afterward, and while still in his youth, he was convinced that God had called him to preach. This matter settled once and for all, he set about preparing himself for his life's work. Already he had been taught by his mother in a private school which she conducted, and being thoroughly grounded he entered Randolph-Macon College where he graduated with high honors. In 1929 his Alma Mater conferred upon him the degree of Doctor of Divinity.

At the session of the Conference, held in Washington in 1900, he was admitted on trial and the next year he was ordained a Deacon. After being received into full connection in 1902, he asked for an appointment to the theological department of Vanderbilt University, where he spent two years in added preparation for the ministry, and then, resuming his work in the Conference, he was ordained Elder in 1906. The following are the charges he served: 1900, Junior Preacher, Rockville, Md.; 1903, Student Vanderbilt University; 1905, Emory, Washington; 1908, Middleburg, Va.; 1911, Cumberland, Md.; 1915, Trinity, Baltimore; 1916, Belmont, Roanoke; 1920, St. Paul's, Baltimore; 1923, Martinsburg, West Virginia; 1927, presiding elder, Washington District; 1931, presiding elder, Alexandria District; 1932,

Woodstock, Virginia; and 1934, White Sulphur Springs, West Virginia, where he ceased both to live and to labor.

Brother Balthis was a diligent student of the Word and a faithful expounder of the truth. He carefully prepared each sermon and preached it with such earnestness and power as to carry conviction to the hearts of his hearers. He was a real pastor, watching with scrupulous care over all his flock and he was a wise administrator both in the larger fields of service, which the districts presented, and in the charges to which he was sent.

He was twice married. The first time to Miss Verda Griffith of Laytonsville, Md., on April 11, 1906. To them were born five children, one of whom died in early childhood. His second wife was Miss Margaret Catharine McCarty of Strasburg, Virginia. They were married September 21, 1926.

While pastor at Woodstock, Brother Balthis' health became seriously impaired and for some months he was in the hospital and resting at home. Moving to White Sulphur Springs, it was hoped the high altitude might be helpful and for a time he did seem to improve, but in the fall of 1935 he began a rapid decline from which he never rallied, and on January 17, 1936, he passed peacefully through the shining portals to present the record of his life in the presence of his Lord.

Besides his wife, he is survived by four sons: Dr. Jos. H. Balthis, Jr., of Wilmington, Delaware; Rev. Harry G. Balthis, student of the Yale Divinity School, who took up his father's pastorate at his death and completed the year; Donald Balthis of Washington, D. C.; and David, who is still at home.

The funeral was held in the church at White Sulphur Springs, which was filled with a sorrowing company of loved ones and bereaved parishoners. It was conducted by his presiding elder, Rev. Charles L. DeLong, assisted by Rev. Frank M. Richardson and Rev. Moorman Parker. The interment was at Goshen, Maryland, where many other of his brethren of the ministry gathered to do him honor.

His was a noble life, nobly lived and his triumphant faith having passed over into full fruition, he now carries on in the blessed service of the Father's House. There we shall find him again.

JAMES CARROLL HOOKS.

Our brother, James Carroll Hooks, was born in Obion County, Tennessee, March 17, 1849, and lived to see his 87th birthday.

At 14 he entered the Confederate Army as a courier, serving in Forrest's cavalry for a year. Captured by the enemy and hung until

almost breathless, he would not betray his trust—such was his devotion to the Southern Confederacy. And in uniform of a Confederate soldier he was buried.

After the close of the Civil War, he attended Andrews College, Trenton, Tennessee, to prepare himself for the Christian ministry.

He was licensed to preach by Rev. G. M. Hurrin, presiding elder, at Trenton, Tennessee, March 20, 1870. Two years later Bishop William Wightman ordained James Carroll Hooks as Deacon in the Memphis Conference at Summerville, and in 1874 at Humbolt, also in Tennessee, Bishop Robert Paine officiated when he was made an Elder.

While in the Memphis Conference he served Union City, Tennessee; also Mayfield and Paducah, Kentucky.

In 1892 he was transferred to Helena, Arkansas, but returned soon to the Memphis Conference.

After serving churches in Arkansas and Oklahoma, he was transferred to the Baltimore Conference. At the time of his transfer, Brother H. I. Stephens was presiding elder of the Rockingham District. In 1887, Brother Stephens and Brother Hooks had churches in Paducah, Kentucky; the former, pastor of a mission church, and the latter, pastor of First Church. Here a ministerial friendship began and continued, when, in 1917, Brother Hooks was transferred to Luray, Virginia, in the Rockingham District of the Baltimore Conference.

In 1920, he was sent to White Sulphur, W. Va. Three years later he superannuated but soon relinquished the role of a superannuate to accept work on the Frederick Circuit, Winchester District. From there he was sent to New Market. In 1929, he was placed again on the retired list. After his superannuation he resided with his son, Robert L. Hooks, Kansas City, Missouri.

Thrice married Brother Hooks had as his first wife Miss Louise Lowry of Corinth, Mississippi, daughter of Col. Lowry of the Confederate Army and sister of Gov. Robert Lowry, of that state, after whom his only son was named. They were married November 14, 1874. Her death occurred April 1, 1880. His second wife was Miss Molly Vance, Hernando, Mississippi. They were married November 24, 1882. She died during Brother Hooks' pastorate at New Market, October 27, 1929, and was buried at Winchester, Va. His third wife was Mrs. Alice Glace, Marline, Texas. They were married June 5, 1931. After this marriage most of their time was spent in the wife's home in Texas. However, it was while visiting his son Robert, in Kansas City, that he passed away on March 10, 1936.

His body was brought back to Virginia and buried beside his second wife in the cemetery at Winchester, Va. The funeral services held at New Market were conducted by the pastor, Rev. W. A. Lynch, assisted by Doctors S. K. Cockrell and G. G. Martin and Rev. F. L. Baker. Dr. Hubert Sydenstricker, pastor of our church at Winchester,

Virginia, conducted the services at the grave. He was laid to rest in the state he called his home, for he considered Virginia the greatest state in the union and her people the best on earth.

Brother Hooks will be missed from the sessions of the Baltimore Conference. Although a man of advanced age his health and strength permitted him to attend the annual gathering of his brother ministers. Whenever the opportunity was given the superannuates to speak, Brother Hooks was always ready with his testimony; sometimes taking the form of a hymn which he could sing with clear, strong voice. His brethren of the Baltimore Conference recognized his warm heart and appreciated his earnestness as a preacher of the old Gospel.

As he himself once wrote, "I never considered myself a great preacher but do give myself praise for being a good pastor." Also, he was fond of writing and continued to write for the local papers and the "Baltimore Southern Methodist" up to the last. These communications were interesting and helpful.

His sole surviving son, Robert L. Hooks, Kansas City, Missouri, writes: "Never a day passes but I thank God for His goodness to me in the gift of such a father." In addition he leaves a widow, Mrs. Alice Glass Hooks, of Marline, Texas.

WILLIAM RUSSELL HARDESTY.

William Russell Hardesty was born at Huntingtown, Calvert County, Maryland, June 2, 1881, son of James W. and Hannah A. Hardesty. He grew to manhood on his father's farm. His parents were members of the Methodist Episcopal Church, and he was converted and united with that Church in 1897. He soon felt the call to preach, and sought and obtained license as an exhorter. On December 13, 1903, he was received into membership of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, Prince Frederick Charge, Calvert County, Maryland. At a special session of the quarterly conference of that charge, held at the parsonage February 13, 1904, Rev. George W. Richardson, pastor in charge, presiding, and Rev. Harry P. Baker, junior pastor, secretary. Brother Hardesty was granted license as an exhorter. This conference also recommended him to the district conference for license to preach.

On July 19, 1904, at the East Baltimore District Conference, held in Friendship Church, Chesapeake Charge, William Russell Hardesty was made a local preacher, Rev. B. W. Bond, presiding elder. He then attended Randolph-Macon Academy, at Front Royal, Virginia, and Dickinson College, Carlisle, Pennsylvania.

He began his ministry in 1904 as a supply, serving as junior preacher on Forest Grove, one year; Linganore, one year, and Brucetown, two years.

In the spring of 1908, at the session of the Baltimore Annual Conference held in Roanoke, Virginia, he was admitted on trial. He was ordained Deacon in 1909 by Bishop A. W. Wilson, and was admitted into full connection in 1910. He was ordained Elder in 1915 by Bishop W. A. Candler. He was returned to Brucetown for that year.

He served then the following charges in the order named: Stafford, four years; Frederick, two years; Ridgeway, four years; New Market, four years; Shenandoah Junction, one year; Middleburg, two years; Del Ray, four and one-half years; Easton, three years; Stephens City, one year; Hillsboro-Bluemont, two and one-half years. While shoveling snow from the parsonage porch, he ran a thorn in his hand from which septicemia developed. He was taken to the Memorial Hospital in Winchester, Virginia, and from there he went to his eternal reward at 2:30 P. M. March 14, 1936.

Brother Hardesty never doubted his conversion nor his call to the Christian ministry; on these two experiences he staked his all. He was a man of faith in his Lord and Master and in the ultimate triumph of His cause. He had the courage to stand for the right no matter what it cost. He was a sound, helpful preacher; was especially interested in children and old people, but he loved all men and was loved by his people who were helped to the higher living by his unselfish and untiring ministry. The church grew under his leadership, for he was a missionary pastor.

The secretary of the Woman's Missionary Society of the Winchester District said: "I have lost a missionary pastor in the death of Brother Hardesty." During his last illness one of his nurses said: "He must have been a good man, for he is such a good patient". Several times during the night before he passed away he said: "Preach the Word! Preach the Word!"

On December 31, 1908, Brother Hardesty was married to Miss Nannie Estella Gardner, of Ridgeway, West Virginia. The following children blessed this happy union: Mrs. Mary Hardesty Meglath of Aldie, Virginia; Ruth Gardner Hardesty, a student at Harrisonburg State Teachers' College, and Anne Lee Hardesty.

The funeral, conducted by Rev. Harry V. Wheeler, assisted by Revs. W. W. McIntyre, presiding elder, Winchester District; C. L. Beard, H. Sydenstricker, F. H. Strieby and J. C. Dugger, was attended by a host

of sorrowing friends, many of whom were former parishioners of the deceased, who came to bear testimony to the worth, work and influence of this good man, and among them were many of his ministerial brethren.

The services were held in Payne's Chapel near Ridgeway, West Virginia. He had been pastor there twice and was married at its altar. In the cemetery that surrounds the church, his body was laid to rest. A good man has gone. We shall miss him, but his influence abides.

HENRY SLICER COE.

Henry Slicer Coe, son of the Reverend William Gwynn Coe, D. D., and his wife, Annie M. Armstrong Coe, was born in the City of Baltimore, Maryland, February 19, 1856. He passed to his reward Thursday, May 21, 1936, at Edinburg, Va., at the advanced age of 80 years. To compass the life of this man of God in these brief lines is an impossible task. Moreover the writer is conscious of the fact of his limitations both as to time and knowledge of the man, for who knoweth the spirit of a man? A few facts that are outstanding in the life of this remarkable man are recorded, and here, at the beginning of this memoir, one finds that Brother Coe had written his own biography. He writes: "to relieve the committee of a task, a brief autobiography is furnished." The writer uses this autobiography as a basis for this memoir.

Brother Coe, one of 12 children, was a child of the Methodist parsonage. He was named after the late Rev. Henry Slicer, of Baltimore, the minister who led his father to the knowledge of Jesus Christ. One month after his birth, his itinerant life began when his father moved to Warm Springs Circuit, Bath County, Virginia. "The vicissitudes and hardships of the itinerant life that extended into my experience as a child of the parsonage never raised in me the semblance of a barrier against a voluntary continuance of such a life", he writes. "Indeed", he continues, "I think there never was absent from my conscious religious experience a growing conviction of a call to the ministry." Like the prophet Jeremiah, there was never a time in his life when he did not "stand at attention" before his Lord, and so at the tender age of five years he began his scholastic preparations for the glorious commission which culminated at Washington and Lee University in 1874. In his characteristic vein he writes: "Four of us were at the University in 1874 and five others were in the waiting line, the reason for my withdrawal one year short of a degree will be understood."

In January, 1875, he was licensed to preach by the quarterly conference at Lewisburg, West Virginia, and by that body recommended for admission on trial to the Baltimore Annual Conference, into which body he was admitted at the session held in Washington, D. C., in 1875, as the youngest member of the class. For two years he served as junior preacher on the Frankford Circuit and was ordained Deacon by Bishop Hubbard Hinde Cavanaugh in Alexandria, Virginia, March 11, 1877. On March 9, 1879, he was ordained Elder at Salem, Virginia, by Bishop W. M. Wightman. His appointment that year was Ronceverte Circuit.

"On Monday, March 19, 1877, I was joined in marriage with Miss Cornelia Pettigrew in Lexington, Virginia, my father performing the ceremony."

"On Thursday, March 29, my father died, at the beginning of his fourth year as presiding elder of the Lewisburg District. A few days later came a telegram from Bishop Kavanaugh appointing Rev. A. P. Boude, presiding elder, thus transferring him from the station to the district. The telegram also announced the appointment of a preacher to the station. The quarterly conference, being in session when the telegram arrived, took swift action refusing (for reasons) to receive the pastor appointed and asking the Bishop to put me in the station. This was done in kindness to my mother and to secure her a dwelling place for the year, and their kindness to their young pastor, just 21, was marked throughout the year.

My appointments thereafter were: 1878-1879, Hinton, West Virginia; 1880-1883, South River; 1883-1884, Bladensburg and Emory—parsonage in Bladensburg but church in Hyattsville; 1884, Upper Botetourt—parsonage at Glen Wilton; 1886, Eagle Rock and Shiloh were put on another charge, and my circuit then became Clifton Forge—parsonage still at Glen Wilton. So I was four years on this charge. 1888-1890, Blacksburg; 1890-1891, Roanoke Circuit, with C. A. Scanland, Junior Preacher; 1891-1892, Keyser, West Virginia; 1892-1895, Edinburg, Virginia; 1895-1899, Berkeley Circuit, West Virginia; 1899-1901, Waynesboro and Basic, Virginia; 1901-1902, Warrenton, Virginia; 1902-1906, Mt. Jackson, Virginia; 1906-1907, Augusta Circuit; 1907-1909, Elkton, Virginia; 1909-1911, Elliston, Virginia."

A complete physical breakdown made it necessary for him to ask a superannuate relation at the Conference of 1911.

"On June 8, 1909, I was married to Miss Frances Wierman, youngest daughter of B. B. Wierman, of Moores Store, Virginia, Rev. J. A. Snyder officiating. We took up our residence in Edinburg, Virginia. Here I found congenial employment, teaching in the Sunday School and preaching as occasion afforded.

"For thirty-six years I gave of the best that was in me to the work of the ministry, never choosing my appointments. Sometimes

I thought the 'powers that be' lacked wisdom in placing me, but I never questioned it 'out loud'.

"My 'best' appointments were usually misfits, and were disappointing to my friends. The 'low grade' appointments that never asked for a particular preacher, and that no particular preacher ever asked for, proved to be my best charges. Here I did my best work and found my highest joy; and here I usually stayed three or four years. Statistics do not always tell the full story of accomplishments. If that were so, a study of the conference minutes would put me near the foot of the class. I never had a great ingathering of converts—yet I have witnessed some great revivals, that laid the foundation for further ingatherings. I have been an unprofitable servant, yet the Lord gives me life in Jesus Christ my Saviour."

Brother Coe was a student all his life. The habits he formed at college grew stronger through the years. He loved philosophy and theology. His ever alert mind found ample scope in investigating and weighing the truths of the Gospel which he practiced out of a glowing heart and vital experience. Sin was a fact and redemption was, too. Jesus Christ to him was "just such a Saviour as I, a poor sinner, need."

With his pen as well as through his lips, Brother Coe sought to fulfill his commission. Scholarly without being pedantic, his writings contained a subtle wit that was at once pleasing to the reader and gave point to the theme at hand. During his superannuation he was a frequent contributor to the church papers.

His home life was beautiful.

Always handicapped by a frail body, for twenty-five years he lived with his family in his own house at Edinburg, Va., ever serving his Church and his community as occasion offered, and at the same time keeping in readiness the prophet's room that fellowship and communion with his brethren might not be interrupted. He loved the Church and the brethren of the Conference. No man amongst us was better acquainted with the facts and the personnel of the Baltimore Conference.

During the later years he made his winter home with his children in Washington, and it was here, only a few months ago, that this writer saw him at the time of his eightieth birthday. He had no doubt as to the future of God's children. With a spirit undaunted, he looked forward into the future and was not afraid.

In addition to his faithful wife, the following children survive: Mrs. Henry Mohler, Decatur, Ga.; Mrs. Frank Merritt, Buena Vista, Va.; Miss Cornelia Coe, Washington, D. C.; Messrs. Henry, S. G. and Madison Coe; Rev. Benjamin W. Coe of the Baltimore Conference; Misses Sallie and Mary Coe of Washington, D. C.; two sisters, Misses Nellie and Sallie Coe of Washington, D. C.; and seven brothers, Rev.

W. P. C. Coe of the Baltimore Conference, Messrs. Frank, B. A., Walter, Turner P., James and Bernard Coe, also survive.

The funeral was held at the Methodist Church in Edinburg, Saturday, May 23, at 2 o'clock, Rev. R. L. Eutsler, officiating, assisted by Revs. W. H. Ballengee and R. L. Moore and others of the brethren.

"For all the saints Who from their labors rest,
Who Thee by faith before the world confessed,

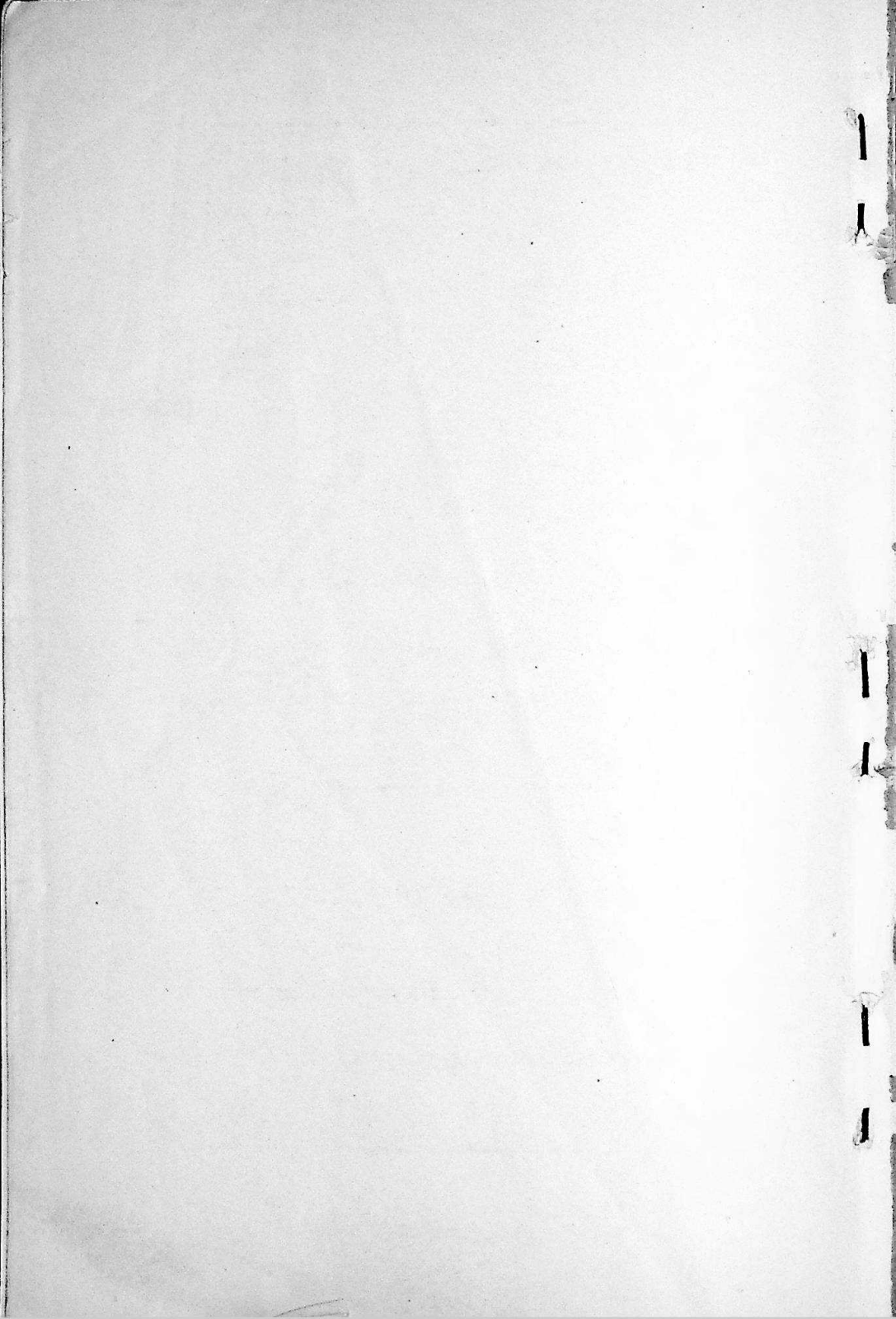
