The 3rd question, "Who remain on Trial?" was taken up. V. B. Wallace was reported deceased at Philadelphia, May 5th, 1882. King J. Still, Isaiah Johnson, S. E. Adams, James K. Adams, character passed and continued on trial, but upon recommendation of the Examining Committee, they were required to pass an examination in Thalheimer's History in addition to the regular studies.

E. H. Webb, and J. H. Nutter, character passed and continued on trial. Rev. E. Foster, D. D., compiler of "Foster's Cyclopædia," was introduced to the Conference.

Notices were given, Doxology sung, and Benediction pronounced by Rev. A. I. Kynett.

EVENING-MISSIONARY SERMON.

Anniversary services of the Missionary Society were held at night. After singing the hymn, "Jesus, the name high over all," and prayer by E. L. Hoffecker of the Wilmington Conference, W. H. THIRD DAY-Saturday, July 22nd, 1882.

MORNING SESSION

Conference opened at 8.30 A. M., by a prayer meeting led by N. Morris. At Q A. M. Bishop Foster took the chair, and the fournal of the previous session was read, corrected and approved.

The 13th question, "Who are the Deacons of the second class?" was taken up. The following brethren reported their collections, their characters passed, and were advanced: John S. Holly, James H. Mason, Even E. Parker, James H. Johnson, Jos. R. Waters, Chas. H. Hutchins.

The 14th question, "What Traveling Deacons have been elected Elders?" was taken up. The following brethren reported their collections, and were elected to Elders' orders: Arthur W. Hamilton, Benj. W. Allen, Matthias H. Horsey, Henry A. Monroe, Thomas M Hubbard, Thomas B. H. Coleman. The 10th question, "Wbat Local Preachers have been elected Deacons?"

Silas E. Adams, having passed a satisfactory examination was so elected.

A resolution relating to the Missionary Sermon was read by Bro. Parker and adopted. A Committee of three on the subject of organizing the Sustentation Fund work was ordered. G. H. Waters, W. J. Parker, and I. H. White, were appointed as a Committee.

The 5th question, "Who are admitted into full connection?" was taken up, Daniel Brittingham and James H. Winters answered the disciplinary questions, in the affirmative, reported their collections, and were admitted. The Bishop made a very plain, pointed address to the class, full of sound truth and instruction.

Revs. A. J. Myers, Baltimore Conterence, and E. L. Hoffecker, Wilmington Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, Rev. T. Henry, of the African Methodist Church, and Prof. J. G. Robinson, of Baltimore, were introduced to the Conference.

The following reports of Committees were presented : On State of Church, Bible Cause, Sunday Schools, Education.

Prof. Round, of the Biblical Institute, addressed the Conference on the Educational Report.

In accordance with the provisions of the report, after its adoption, the following were appointed a Conference Committee to work for the organization of a Conference Educational Society, and to act as a Board of Managers for said Society until its organization is completed :

Rev. A. J. Myers addressed the Conference in relation to the People's Cyclopædia.

Notices were given, Doxology sung, and Benediction given by the Bishop.

EVENING.

DAUGHTERS OF CONFERENCE ANNIVERSARY.

Opening Hymn, "Blest be the tie that binds," was announced by E. E. Parker, who also led in prayer. W. J. Parker, Chairman of the meeting, in a few perti-nent remarks, introduced Prof. J. G. Robinson, of Baltimore, who delivered a short address on the importance of the work of the Daughters of Conference. W. C. Dickerson and A. J. Myers also addressed the society in an instructive and entertaining manner. A collection was taken amounting to \$4.51.

SUNDAY SERVICES.

The Conference Love Feast was opened at Charles Wesley M. E. Church. at 8 30 a.m., by Rev's. N. Young and J. Brinkley. It was an occasion long to be remembered by those who participated in it.

After the Love Feast, the following were ordained : Deacon-Silas E. Adams; Elders-Arthur W. Hannlton, Benj. W. Allen, Matthias H. Horsey, Henry A. Monroe, Thomas M. Hubbard, Thomas B. H. Coleman.

The Bishop then preached a powerful sermon from 1st Timothy 1:15. In the afternoon Rev. J. W. Stevenson of Washington, D. C., preached from Micah 5:4, and at night Rev. G. H. Washington preached from 1st Cor. 9:26; both of the sermons were favorably received. Services were also held at the Town Hall and Court House during the day.

FOURTH DAY-Monday, July 24th, 1882.

MORNING SESSION.

The Conference was opened at 8.30 a. m., by W. J. Parker who conducted the prayer meeting.

At 9 a. m., Bishop Foster took the chair, and the Journal of the last session was read, corrected, and approved.

The 1st question, "Who are received by transfer, and from what Conference? Willis C. Dickerson, of the Newark Conference.

The 2d question, "Who are admitted on trial?" Daniel A. Ridout, James E. A. D.Grigsby, John H. Green.

Question 4th, "Who are discontinued?" None. Question 6th, "Who are re-admitted?" None. Question 7th, "Who are received on credentials from other churches?" J. W. Stevenson of the A. M. E. Church was admitted in full connection.

J. W. Brown was, at his own request, granted a supernumerary relation. The 20th question, "Have any died during the year?" Simon Taylor and Vincent B. Wallace. (see memoirs).

The 22d question, "Have any been transferred, and to what Conference?" was answered, John W. Stevenson, to the Washington Conference; Thomas H. Johnson, to the Newark Conterence.

A. MURRAY. WM. PERKINS, R. GILLETT, Laymen. The 28th question, "Who are selected for triers of appeals?" W. J. Parker, A. Brown, W. F. Butler, H. Jolley, J. D. Elbert, Wm. Taylor, I. H. Pearce.

A resolution relating to the required purchase of books by the Examining Committees was passed. The statistical report was read and adopted.

A resolution requesting the Presiding Elders to take some measures to secure greater accuracy in the statistical reports from the preachers on their districts was passed.

The report of the Committee on Freedmen's Aid was read and adopted.

The Daughters of Conference were introduced to the Conference and Wm. Perkins Esq., made a brief address, after which the Secretary, Mary E. Brown, read the annual report, and the Treasurer, Mary A. Webb, presented the funds collected in behalf of the worn-out and needy preachers, amounting to \$122.73.

The Bishop returned thanks to the Daughters of Conference for their noble work and commended the society to the attention of the preachers.

W. C. Dickinson offered a resolution relative to the work of the society, which was adopted.

A bill of \$11,50 from I. H. White and A. R. Shockly for bills against the Conference was referred to the Treasurer of the Sustentation Fund for payment.

The report of the Committee on Church Extension was read and adopted.

Report of the Committee on Sustentation Fund was read and adopted.

A collection was taken to relieve the brethren of the Conference who had assumed the responsibility of the funeral expenses of the late Vincent B. Wallace, amounting to \$10.57 and was paid to A. R. Shockly.

Report of Conference Treasurer was read and adopted. Resolutions relative to appropriating \$25 from Conference Claimant Fund, and aiding to pay the rent of G. H. Waters, were read and adopted.

The report of the Conference stewards was read and adopted. A draft on the chartered fund for \$25 was paid to the Conference stewards and applied by vote to the cases of S. P. Whittington and J. C. Carroll.

Rev. I. Jewell of the Wilmington Conference was introduced.

I. H. White offered a resolution relative to the Slater donation to the cause of education among the colored people, which was adopted.

Wilmington, Del., was fixed upon as the place for holding the next session of the Conference. An extra session was ordered to convene at 2 P. M.

Notices were given, Doxology sung, and Benediction pronounced by Dr. Foster.

AFTERNOON SESSION.

Dr. E. Foster occupied the chair and opened the Conference by singing the hymn, "Rock of Ages." The Journal of the morning session was read and approved.

Committee on Women's Foreign Missionary Society presented their report which was adopted.

Committees reported on auditing "Pres. Elders' account"; "Episcopal Fund;" "Sanctity of the Sabbath."

W. B. Green offered an amendment to the last report, which was accepted, and the report, as amended, passed unanimously. The two former reports were adopted.

Committees on Temperance, Minute Money, Tract and Missions, reported, and their reports were adopted.

A resolution of thanks was tendered by the Committee on Resolutions and unanimously adopted.

Special Committee on Death of Bishop Scott presented their report, and after remarks by N. Young and the Presiding Bishop, the report was adopted by a rising vote.

The Board of Managers of the Conference Educational Society presented the report of their organization. Dr. Round and H. A. Monroe made some remarks, after which, the report was adopted.

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G. H. Waters presented a resolution on the transfer of T. H. Johnson to the Newark Conference, which was adopted.

A motion that 2500 minutes be printed, and sold at ten cents each, was carried.

On motion, the Secretary and his assistant were appointed the Publishing Committee.

Committee on "Delinquent Minute Money" presented their report, which was adopted.

Committee on Memoirs reported a memoir on the death of Simon Taylor, which was adopted

Rev. I. H. White made a few remarks on the death of V. B. Wallace, after which the Committee was ordered to prepare a suitable memoir for publication.

Memoir of Mrs. M. D. Dickerson was submitted and received.

On motion, the funds of the Committee on Minutes were paid over to W. J. Parker to be transferred to the Treasurer, Abram Murray.

A collection was taken for the Sexton, amounting to \$5.67.

List of Committee for 1883 was read and referred.

The Secretary was ordered to purchase a Trunk for the use of the Conference papers.

The Committee on Conference Paper reported, and a Committee of six was appointed with power to arrange plans, to collect means, and to commence the publication of a Conference Paper, when funds sufficient, in their judgment, have been accumulated. The following were appointed —W. F. Butler, A. R. Shockley, A. Brown, H. A. Monroe, H. Jolley, I. H. White.

A motion to adjourn sine die, after the reading of the Minutes, was carried.

The Bishop made an earnest appeal to the members of the Conference in relation to their future work, after which the appointments were read, Doxology sung, and the Benediction was pronounced by the Bishop.

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PRESIDING ELDERS' REPORTS.

PHILADELPHIA DISTRICT.

To the Delaware Annual Conference:

DEAR FATHERS AND BRETHREN:—In submitting this my third annual report, it is due for me to say that I am thankful to Almighty God for His unlimited mercy and goodness which has followed me, and to the ministerial brethren for their kindness, and also to the laity for welcoming me in their midst. By these favors received I am able to say that another pleasant year has ended. Rev. Simon Taylor, one of our superannuated preachers, departed this life in the triumphs of faith, at his residence, near *Townseud's Inlet*, Cape May County, N. J., March 8th, 1882. And also Rev. V. B. Wallace, a promising young man who was admitted on trial into this Conference at its last session, and was appointed to the Homestead Circuit, after a severe and protracted illness, calmly and sweetly fell asleep in Jesus, May 5th, 1882. The following brethren, also, have been caused to mourn over their lost ones, viz: Rev. J. H. Pearce, an aged father.

Rev. J. K. Adams, a dear wife, and A. R. Shockley, a dear, sweet little girl. Rev. Geo. H. Waters was prostrated by a fearful attack of hemorrhage, which was followed by other diseases for more than a month, but is convalescent, and I trust that he will be able to take an appointment. The spirit of revival has prevailed during the year, but no wonderful awakening, except at Zion on the Odessa circuit. Twentieth and Oxford Mission, and Ezion, Wilmington, have had quite a large increase of members and probationers. The most of the Sunday Schools are in a good condition, showing indications of prosperity, everywhere commanding influence, and are securing a more general co-operation of the church. The International lessons are being more used than heretofore. The Catechism is also taught in most of the schools. The "Children's Day" was observed with manifest interest in both cities and villages, and collections were taken, but the expenses of preparation made the net profit small. The class meetings are interesting and well attended, and also the prayer meetings, wherever practicable, are maintained with encouraging results.

The temperance cause is not without attention, believing that intemperance is a growing evil which, if not checked, will destroy not only vital piety and religion, but will demolish good society and ruin the nation. Both the white and colored people are unitedly opposing the great evil.

Now in relation to the temporal department of the church. Port Deposit, T. M. Hubbard, pastor, has repaired the parsonage and refurnished it with suitable furniture and paid for the same, and has also freed the circuit entirely from debt, and is now making preparation for building a new church at Cokesbury. Cape May circuit, J. K. Adams pastor, has been successful in reducing the old debt to \$74 09. Bridgeton circuit: This charge under the pastoral care of K. J. Still, has made some improvements on its church property, consisting of a recess, pulpit and other necessary repairs on one of its churches, and by papering another. I think the circuit is clear of debt.

Salem circuit, under the pastorate care of S. P. Whittington is marching along in peace and harmony. In Penns Neck, they have an excellent Sabbath School superintended by Rev. Joseph Johnson, a local preacher, an excellent Sunday School worker. Salem, Mount Hope: This church has been burdened with a heavy debt ever since built, is very cheerful and full of zeal, working up toward the front under the pastorate care of W. H. Thomas; the right man in the right place.

Mount Zion: This church was made a station at the last session of the Conference, and T. B. H. Coleman was appointed as pastor. It moved along very pleasantly, until a wolf got in among the sheep, and ever since it has been under a cloud. It is free of debt. They have purchased an organ for the Sunday School, costing \$75 oc. Homestead: This charge is composed of four churches, which were separated from the Mount Zion charge at the last session of the Conference, and the late V. B. Wallace was appointed as pastor, but, unfortunately, the young man's health failed so that he was not able to serve them more than half of the year. I then appointed R. H. Coleman, a local preacher, to take charge of the circuit until the meeting of the Annual Conference. He has been remarkably successful in both the temporal and spiritual departments of the church. He has the new church ready for dedication.

Scott, Centreville: This church under the pastorate care of J. S. Holly, has commenced the foundation of a new church, and his people are doing all they can to raise money for said purpose.

Zoar: This church, under the pastorate care of W. F. Butler, is marching along in peace and harmony.

John Wesley, N. Morris, pastor, has been defeated in the purchase of the Presbyterian Church on Bainbridge street below t2th, on account of the stiffness of the price. The Board of Church Extension granted them a loan of \$8000, and appointed a committee to buy a church or a lot to build one upon, but so far they have been unsuccessful in their efforts. To buy a building lot in a conspicuous place for a church for the colored people in the city of Philadelphia, is a difficult thing to do. James M. E. Church, Germantown: This church has been newly papered, repainted and refurnished at the cost of \$200. The same has been paid. Pastor, B. W. Allen.

Laws M. E. Chapel, Frankford: Isaiah Johnson pastor: This church has been newly papered and has had its cellar plastered, with other necessary improvements at a cost of \$185 paid on the same, \$150.

Twentieth and Oxford; Haven's Mission: This is a new but flourishing place; the people have no house of their own to worship in, but have rented and fitted up one for said purpose; they pay \$25,00 per month. The present prospect is good for a strong point for us in the city of Philadelphia. What is needed now, is a church, A. R. Shockly, pastor; he and his people are doing all they can toward raising money to secure a place for the worship of God, and have succeeded in raising the sum of \$325,00, beside the keeping up of their current expenses, which are very heavy. They are a people that work, and trust in God; they are worthy people and need help.

North Penn: This church has a very small congregation; it was supplied with J. T. Tilghman, a local preacher, by the Presiding Elder, has paled in the church, and made some necessary changes on the inside of the church and paid for the same.

St. Daniel's, Chester, Pa: J. H. Pearce, pastor, has succeeded in canceling the old debt and is contemplating on rebuilding.

Ezion, Wilmington: This church is flourishing under the new pastor, W. J. Parker. Both pastor and people are in love and peace.

Wilmington Circuit: This charge is composed of three churches; H. D. Webb, a local preacher, is pastor, appointed by the Presiding Elder; has been very successful in canceling the old debts; the circuit is in a living state.

New Castle Circuit, Rev. Wm. Taylor pastor : This charge is composed of three Churches and one Mission, Mount Salem; one of the churches has a floatin debt of \$380; was sold by the sheriff and bought in by a friend at \$200. This amount has been fully met, and the trustees have a deed for the same, and are trying to keep up their dues with the Building andLoanAssociation. The circuit is in a tolerably fair state.

Odessa, A. W. Hamilton, pastor: has built a new brick church, with a scating capacity of 360, with class rooms attached, at a cost of 3,500; was dedicated by Bishop F. G. Andrews, on the 18th of June, 1882, both pastor and people have worked faithfully; they have raised this year and paid on the building and church lot, 515,35,39. It is one among the finest churches of the Conference. The pastor closes up his third year in peace and harmony.

Townsend Circuit, Scotts Chapel; named after the late Bishop Scott, was consumed by fire last winter; it was insured to the amount of \$600.00. The very zealous pastor, James W. Mason, and his people, have rebuilt a very neat little church; it was dedicated the 25th of June, free of debt; they also repaired the Ebenezer church, and nearly paid for the same; the pastor closes up his third year, and is desired for the fourth.

Smyrna Circuit : This charge has had a hard time; the small-pox got in among the members last winter, and they were compelled to close up the church, until sometime in the month of March; then in a few weeks thereafter, the pastor, Rev. George H. Waters, was attacked very suddenly with a fearful hemorrhage accompanied with other diseases, that kept him confined nearly up to this date; by these back-sets this charge has suffered, but the people seem to be cheerful.

Dover: Rev. W. M. Webb, pastor; This charge is keeping its dues paid up • in the Building Loan Society and has paid \$401 on the floating debt.

Dover Circuit, Rev. J. Brinkley, pastor; This Circuit lies in the country and at one of the churches people have nearly abandoned the church and gone either to the cities or villages. Milford: This is a large Circuit composed of five churches; J. D. Elbert, pastor; he is the right man in the right place, the Circuit is coming up under his Godly administration.

Lewes and Harmony: This Circuit is under the popular pastor, W. H. Johnson; has purchased a building lot in Lewes at a cost of \$150; paid the same and is getting ready to build.

I think the benevolent collections have been attended to by nearly all of the brethren, and in many of the charges the collections will be in advance of the previous years. The District Conference has gone out of existence because of no place to hold it.

The Brethren have all been faithful workers in every department of the church, and earnest preachers of the gospel of Christ.

I was attacked with the malaria fever the same week that I returned home trom the Conference, and was confined to my home three weeks. I thought that my labors were closed, but the Lord raised me up again, and they have been continous; more than once I have conducted the quarterly collections on three different charges; held love feast, preached three times, consecrated and administered the Lord's Supper three times, rode five miles in a wagon, nine on cars, and walked two and a half, all in one day.

With faith in Christ, and love for the Church and for my brethren stronger than ever, I close the work of another year.

CAMBRIDGE DISTRICT.

To the Bishop and members of the Delaware Conference: Through Divine providence I am permitted to offer the following as my first annual report of the Cambridge District, which extends over a portion of six counties in Maryland, and a small portion of Kent County, Delaware. Through the goodness of God, the lives of all the brethren have been sustained, and good health prevailed among them with a few exceptions. The brethren on the District and myself are in peace and harmony. I have urged upon the brethren the necessity of pursuing the Disciplinary plan with regard to the support of the Missionary cause, which I believe has been principally attended to. I have met every Quarterly Conference this year, and have preached ninety-nine times.

Sassafras circuit has three churches and is progressing finely, under the pastorate of J. H. Winters, who has succeeded in the midst of adverse circumstances, in rebuilding a new church at Sassafras, which was entirely destroyed by fire sometime last year, and was not insured. The building is 36×24 feet; height 14 feet, and will cost when completed about \$800; it is in good style with recess pulpit, &c. \$363.85 has been paid on the new church enterprise; also there have been improvements on the church at Poplar Neck, to the amount of \$62.08, and the church at Warwick has paid an old debt of \$50. Total paid in the charge this year for building and improving, \$475.93. Our white friends at Sassafras rendered much assistance in building the church at that place. One man by the name of Robert F. Griffith gave the frame and \$1c in cash. The spiritual condition of the charge is good; there have been several accessions to the churches during the year. The Sunday Schools are in a tolerable good condition. Raised for ministeral support, \$313. Raised for benevolent purposes, \$25.47. Balance of indebtedness on church property, \$217.06.

Millington circuit is in a good condition, under the pastorate of E. E. Parker. There are five churches in the bounds of the Circuit, with a probable value of $\$_2, 6_25$, and a parsonage valued at \$600. Two rooms one story and a half have been added to the parsonage this year, which cost \$126. A portion of it has been paid. \$146.23 has been paid for building and improving the parsonage and churches. Insurance on church property, \$575. The spiritual condition of the charge is very good. Revivals at nearly all the churches and a number of accessions. Also the Sunday School is in a good condition. Total received this year for ministerial support, \$403.70. Amount raised for benevolent purposes, \$22.

Still Pond circuit is in a prosperous condition, under the pastorate of J. S. Willis. There are four churches in the charge. Probable value of churches $\$_{3,600}$, and one parsonage valued at $\$_{400}$. Paid this year on improvements, $\$_{23}$, and on an old debt, $\$_{24}$. Total, $\$_{47}$. Debts remaining in the charge, $\$_{30}$. At Union the church has become too small for the congregation, and they are making preparation to rebuild in the near future, and have raised and have in hand for that purpose $\$_{205,20}$. Total raised this year for building and improving, $\$_{252,20}$. Spiritual condition good, quite a number of accessions this year. Also the Sunday Schools are in a very good condition. Total paid this year for ministerial support, $\$_{412,90}$. Raised for benevolent purposes, $\$_{16,55}$.

Jones Station, Chestertown, is in a very good condition spiritually and temporally under the pastorate of T. H. Johnson, who has labored earnestly among his people. Number of churches, one. Probable value, \$5,500. One parsonage valued at \$5500. There has been quite a number of accessions to the church during the year. The Sunday School is first-class, and ably managed by competent officers and teachers; in fact the entire church is well up to the times in every department. They have raised for ministerial support this year \$615. Raised for benevolent purposes, \$118.78. Raised on church indebtedness, \$300.

Fairlee Circuit is progressing very finally under the Pastorate of D. R. Dunn. There are four churches in the charge. The probable value of them is $\$_{3,600}$. Paid on the new church, St. George chapel this year, $\$_{15}6.38$. Paid on benches for John Wesly Church, $\$_{11}$. Paid on a lot for a church at Castle town, $\$_{15}$. Total paid this year on old indebtedness and improving church property $\$_{307,13}$: also a lot for a cemetery has been purchased for $\$_{50}$, and paid for. Total amount of indebtedness against the churches in the bounds of the charge, $\$_{426,32}$. The spiritual condition of the charge is good; there has been quite a number of conversions and accessions to the church during the year; also the Sunday Schools are in a prosperous condition. Total amount of ministerial support raised, $\$_{432}$. Amount raised for benevolent purposes, $\$_{40.75}$; also the the Centenary Biblical Institute for three years.

Edesville Circuit : This Circuit was formed at the last Conference, of detachments from two other Circuits, and is under the Pastorate of C. H. Hutchins, who labored at first under quite unfavorable circumstances; but since, by the judicious management of their pastor, peace and satisfaction have been restored A grand work has been donein the charge this year which will and now prevail. speak for itself as follows: There are three churches in the charge, valued at \$1600. A parsonage valued at \$700. The above named Parsonage has been built from the foundation, this Conference year, together with the purchase of the lot on which it stands. The house is 22x18; height two story; commodiously arranged with six rooms, cost of building \$441; raised and paid on the same, \$418, leaving a balance on parsonage debt of \$23; also \$25 worth of furniture for parsonage has been paid for. Total raised for parsonage and furniture, \$443. Total for building and improving churches and parsonages, \$485,54. Debts remaining on churches and parsonages, \$23. The spiritual condition of the charge is good. The Sunday School work is in a prosperous condition. Total amount raised this year for ministerial support, \$446.40. Raised for benevolent purposes, \$8.

Crumpton Circuit is in a very prosperous condition under the pastorate of J. Q. Dennis; number of churches in the charge, four; probable value of them is \$2500.00. Paid on old indebtedness \$225 00. Debts remaining in the charge on church property, not any.

The spiritual condition of the charge is very good; seasons of revival have been enjoyed during the year and over seventy-nive nave been added to the church. The Sunday Schools are in a tolerable good condition. Total raised this year for ministerial support, \$518 oo. Raised for benevolent purposes \$44.00.

Marydel Circuit is only in a tolerably good condition owing to the surrounding circumstances of the people in that locality, and having met with a very serious loss. The largest and best church in the Circuit, and the main support to the pastor, was entirely destroyed by fire in March, but through the persistent effort of the pastor, J. C. Carroll, a new church edifice has been commenced on the same lot where the old one stood, 24 x 36; height 44 feet. The building is raised, but not inclosed.

A house and lot containing three acres and $\frac{3}{6}$ of an acre has been purchased for a parsonage for \$210 00; raised and paid on the same, \$105.00. There are five churches in the charge, one of them is in a very dilapidated condition, and the membership and congregation nearly all gone. The spiritual condition of the charge is tolerable. The Sunday School work is not in a very prosperous condition. Reised for ministerial support \$324.20. Raised for benevolent purposes, \$71.00. Total amount raised for building and improving churches and parsonages, \$155.00.

Centreville Circuit is in a very prosperous condition under the pastorate of G. M. Landen There are six churches in the circuit and a prospect of a mission at Church Hill.

The probable value of church property is 6600.00. Probable value of parsonage lot, 5250.00. Paid on the dibt of Salem Church, 5400.00. For repairs on Charles Wesley, in which the Conference is now assembled so as to make it as pleasant as possible for the session, to the amount of 5362.00; raised on the same 5244.69, leaving a balance of 518.69. The corner stone for a new church at Gould town has been laid, and 5368.00 in hand toward building. Total amount raised this year for indebtedness on churches and parsonage property, 5503.00. Raised for ministerial support, 5430.00. Raised for benevolent purposes, 536.00.

Kent Island Circuit is in an excellent condition, under the pastorate of C. H. Ash. There are four churches in the charge, and all of them are comparatively new and only \$18 indebtedness against them. Their probable value is \$2,150, and are all insured to the amount of \$1,266, and parsonage, \$300 A new and first-class parsonage has been erected in the charge this year, 14x28 feet, one story and a half, with five rooms very comfortably arranged and finished complete. The entire cost of building, \$414.12. There has been paid on the same, \$354.40, leaving a balance due on parsonage of \$80. The probable value of parsonage, \$500. There has been paid on debt of churches \$144.24. Whole amount raised for building and improving churches and parsonage, \$513.49. The spiritual condition of the charge is very good. There has been seasons of revival in the charge, and quite a number professed faith in Christ and united with the church. The Sunday Schools are in a good condition. Total amount raised this year for ministerial support, \$481. Amount raised for benevolent purposes, \$34.50.

Hillsborough Circuit is in a progressive condition, under the pastorate of I. Broughton. There are six churches in the charge. Some of them are in a very good condition. The church at Hillsborough is a new church not finished; effort is being made to complete it. The church at Coppersville has been moved and repaired at a cost of \$75, which has all been paid. \$51.50 has been paid on Mc-Gee's Chapel. Total raised this year on churches and parsonage property, \$304.31. Probable value of church property, \$3,500 The spiritual condition of the circuit is good. Sunday Schools tolerable. Total raised this year for ministerial support, \$425. Raised for benevolent purposes, \$24. Probable value of parsonage, \$400.

Denton Circuit is in a tolerable good condition. J. W. Brown, pastor. There are five churches in the charge and one new church in contemplation, 26x35. A lot has been secured for the same and a purt of the frame. The probable value of church property is \$1,500. An old debt has been paid on the church at Denton to the amount of \$96. Total paid on church property this year, \$125. The spiritual condition of the charge not very good. The Sunday Schools are in a tolerable good condition. Raised this year for ministerial support, \$365. Raised for benevolent purposes, \$15.75. Insurance on church property, \$1,000. Greensborough Circuit has been supplied with J. W. Cook, a local preacher, who has conducted the affairs of the charge well. The charge is in a healthy

Greensborough Circuit has been supplied with J. W. Cook, a local preacher, who has conducted the affairs of the charge well. The charge is in a healthy condition except at Boonsborough, where a split was threatened, and a few persons withdrew from the Church and went to the A. M. E. Church; but some of them have since returned, and the balance of the church at Boonsborough appear to be in a state of reconciliation. There are five churches, in the bounds of the charge, and a good parsonage. The probable value of Churches, \$3,000. Probable value of parsonage, \$400. Raised on indebtedness and improving churches and parsonage, \$137-18. Total raised this year for ministerial support, \$387. The charge is at this time free of debt. Raised for benevolent purposes, \$20-04. The spiritual condition of the charge is good. The Sunday Schools are in a prosperous condition.

St. Michaels Circuit is in an excellent condition under the pastorate of H. Jolley. There are three churches in the charge, and one surplus one in which no regular service is held, and a very good parsonage. Probable value of churches, $\$_{2,700}$. Probable value of parsonage, $\$_{325}$. $\$_{72}$ has been raised toward re-building in St. Michaels. Raised for building and improving churches and parsonage, $\$_{351}$ 78. The churches at Broad Creek and Bay Side and the parsonage have been very neatly repaired. The amount of indebtedness remaining in the charge is $\$_{75}$. Amount of insurance on church property, $\$_{1200}$. The spiritual condition of the charge is good. The Sunday Schools are in a very prosperous condition Raised for ministeral support, $\$_{544}$. Raised for benevolent purposes, $\$_{39}$.50.

Talbot Circuit, is in a very progressive condition under the pastorate of A. Grannage. There are five churches in the charge, probable value, \$2,900.00, probable value of Parsonage, \$400,00. A new church has been built in Ferry Neck 26x36 feet, finished all but plastering and seating. There has been paid on the new church \$693.00. Whole amount raised on indebtedness of churches and parsonage, \$138.00. The spiritual condition of the circuit is good. The Sunday Schools are in a tolerably good condition. Raised this year for ministerial support \$431.00. Raised for benevolent purposes, \$19.00.

Asbury Station, Easton, is now in a very good condition under the pastorate of A.Brown. Asbury Church is one of the best and finest churches in the Delaware Conference; but for the past two or three years it has been very much oppressed under a heavy burden of debt, but through the persistent and successful efforts of Brother Brown during his administration, he has diminished the debt and relieved the people to a very great extent. There has been raised this year on the debt of the church and paid \$750.00, leaving a balance of indebtedness to the amount of \$950.00. Whole amount raised for indebtedness on church and parsonage \$775.00. Probable value of the church \$15,700.00. The probable value of parsonage \$500.00. The spiritual condition of the church, tolerable; they have enjoyed seasons of revival, and several accessions to the church during the year. The Sunday School is in a very prosperous condition. Raised for ministerial support during the year, \$498.25. Amount raised for benevolent purposes, \$31.25. Insurance on church property \$400.00.

Trappe Circuit is in an excellent condition under the pastorate of D. J. Waters. There are two churches, and a surplus one in which no regular service is held, and a parsonage. The probable value of churches is \$3,000.00. Insurance

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on church property, $\$_1,600.00$. Probable value of Parsonage, $\$_500.00$. Improvements have been made on the church at Trappe to the amount of $\$_77.66$. An old and oppressive debt has been paid off on the John Wesley Church to the amount of $\$_244.00$, having received $\$_50.00$ as a donation from the Church Extension Society, they were thus encouraged to raise the balance, which was $\$_{204}$. Total raised this year in the charges on churches and parsonage, $\$_{321.66}$. They have a bright prospect of a church in the town of Oxford, where we have had a Mission Sunday School going'on for some time, and where the pastor, through persistent effort, has secured a lot for the same.

The spiritual condition of the charge is good; several have been added to the church this year. The Sunday School also is in a prosperous condition. Received for ministerial support, \$438.00. Raised for benevolent purposes, \$22.00.

ceived for ministerial support, \$438.00. Raised for benevolent purposes, \$22.co. Cambridge, Waugh Chapel Station, is in a very prosperous condition, under the pastorate of H. A. Monroe. There is a Mission Church connected with the station. The probable value of the church property is \$7,790 00. Insurance on church property \$2,000.00. The parsonage has been rebuilt this year in a very modern and convenient plan, 16 x 30 feet, two stories with five rooms, finished complete at the cost of \$341 58. Paid on said claim \$304.00, leaving a balance of \$37.58, which is about all the indebtedness resting against the church or parsonage property. The spiritual condition of the charge is very good. The Sunday-School is in an excellent condition.

Church Creek Circuit is in a very good condition, under the pastorate of A. Lowber. There are four churches in the charge, and a parsonage. Probable value of churches, \$2,600.00. Probable value of parsonage, \$300.00. There has been raised for indebtedness \$26.66, on building and improving churches, \$172.19. There is no indebtedness against the charge. Beckwith and John Wesley are preparing to rebuild. The spiritual condition of the charge is tolerably good, and also the Sunday School is in a tolerably good condition. Raised for miniserial support, \$376. Raised for benevolent purposes, \$18.50.

Madison Circuit is in a very prosperous condition under the pastorate of J. H. Johnson. There are six churches in the charge. The probable value of them is \$3000. A very good and convenient parsonage, with five rooms and a good lot has been purchased in the village of Madison for \$300.00 and \$100.00 of the amount has been raised. Whole amount raised this year for building and improving churches and parsonage, \$166.33. Balance of indebtedness in the charge is \$200.00. The circuit is a very extensive one, and a great deal of bad travel to contend with, yet the affairs in the charge have been managed well, under the circumstances. The spiritual condition of the charge is good. The Sunday School is in a progressive condition. Raised for ministerial support this year \$356.37. Raised for benevolent purposes \$6.00.

In conclusion while there has been considerable progress this Conference year in the way of building up the work in the bounds of the Cambridge District, both spiritually and temporally, there remains much more yet to be done. It will require more means, persistent effort, and earnest prayer, on the part of the ministers and people, to build up the waste places that yet remain, and to make the District what it ought to be, and what it promises to be in the near future.

SALISBURY DISTRICT.

In presenting this my Second Annual Report of the condition of the churches on the Salisbury District, I desire to acknowledge with fervent gratitude, the goodness of the Lord, and his benediction upon the labors of the year. My time and my heart have been given to the responsible work assigned me, and I have been enabled to meet all my engagements with a few exceptions; was left by the boat, once, prevented by a storm, twice, but with these exceptions I have visited every charge four times, held the Quarterly Conferences, preached regularly every Sunday, and also labored in revival meetings as opportunity offered.

I am glad to say that the Lord has blessed me with good health during the year, past. The health of the ministers and their families has been very good, excepting J. H. Nutter, who was caused by illness to vacate his charge four months. Since then, he has recovered, and has been at work on his charge, since April 18th.

I feel glad, also, to be able to report to this Annual Conference that the past year has been one of great success on the Salisbury District, both spiritually and temporally. There has been a gracious out-pouring of the spirit on many of the appointments, especially Fairmount, Snow Hill, Pocomoke City, Horntown, Drummond Town, Deals Island, Quantico, Friendship, Green Hill, Union, Laurel, Washington, Parsonsburg, Vienna, North Berlin, South Berlin, Stockton and Federalsburg. These circuits have been blessed with a wonderful out-pouring of God's love. To some of them, one hundred converts have been added to their number, we trust such as shall be saved eternally.

The spiritual growth on Princess Anne, Snow Hill Circuit, and Chincoteague appointments has not been quite as encouraging as on the above named; still the meetings have been quite lively, and attended with much interest. Salisbury station is getting along micely in a spiritual and financial manner. A large number at this appointment have professed to have found peace with God. The mission at Custis Neck is doing well: half an acre of ground has been bought and a neat little church built, 24x30. It has very large Sunday School, and they are marching on to victory.

All of the ministers of the districts have labored with great zeal this year, in striving to build up the church of Christ. They have preached at their appointments regularly, with a few exceptions. The itinerants and local preachers appear to be in love, and they work in unity together. The reports of the Local Preachers were received at the Quarterly Conferences, and every one around the District was approved. The class meetings are well attended and quite lively. The average attendance is about two-thirds, and about the same proportion of heads of families observe family worship. The prayer meetings are guite well attended. Our Sunday Schools, on a number of the charges, are getting along nicely, and they are attended with great interest on the part of teachers and scholars. The most of them are organized in Missionary Societies, and on several of the charges classes have been formed for religious instruction of the children. Our benevolent collections have had good attention given to them, as will be seen from the reports of the pastors.

The material prosperity of the district is improving. Rev. H. T. Rich, pastor of Quantico Circuit, has put one of his churches through a course of repairs; has also got the greater part of the lumber on the ground to build a church at another appointment, and has bought a church from the white congregation at Shiles. Now, \$5 will close him of debt on his circuit.

G. W. Snead, pastor of Custus Neck, has purchased a half acre of ground, paid for it, bought the lumber, and built a snug church, $24x_{30}$. The indebtedness now is \$187. N. Young is in the act of completing the commodious church in Salisbury; has raised \$441 since the last Annual Conference, and so, we are slowly moving onward around the district. H. Morris has purchased a beautiful lot at Stockton, paid for it, and is in the act of building a respectable church thereon.

M. H. Horsey, pastor of Vienna Circuit, has succeeded in building a comfortable parsonage there, and paid as he went along. Many other improvements have been made which are too tedious to mention.

Personally, the year past has been one of earnest labor, and much looking to God in fear, and I feel that my faith has been strengthened in Him. Many unde-

served acts of kindness from the brethren, both of the ministry and laity, have been shown toward me, which will not soon be forgotten. Out of it all, as we look back on it, there ariseth cause for rejoicing, and praise to God, as well as inspiration for better, truer, diviner work in the future.

MEMOIRS.

SIMON TAYLOR.

Rev. Simon Taylor departed this life in Cape May Co., near Cape May Court House, N. J., March 8th 1882, in the eighty-third year of his age(83). He was born at Port Penn, Del., April 11, 1799. He was born a slave, but by the love of his Heavenly Master and the manifestation of his Almighty arm over the destiny of man, he was emancipated and set free at the age of twenty-one. He remained at Port Penn many years during which tune he formed an acquaintance with Miss Mary Price, a resident of Frenchtown, Md., to whom he was married, and with whom he lived happily many years. In 1833 he gave his soul to Christ, and his wife, in a short time, also joined in company with him toward the Celestial City. He began immediately to work for the Church of God and for the salvation of souls. He was a co-laborer in that work with Rev. Samuel Dale and Harnson Smith, and others. Rev. Simon Taylor was licensed as a local preacher about the year 1855; he joined the itinerancy in the year 1864. He filled the following appointments with great credit. Bridgeton and Goshen, 1864, 65 and 66; New Castle, 1867; Smyrna, 1868 and 69; Friendship, 1870, 71; Still Pond, 1872, 73, 74; Goshen 1875, 76; At the last named place he located.

REV. V. B. WALLACE,

departed this life, May 5th 1882, in the full triumphs of faith. He was converted to the Almighty God in the great revival in Philadelphia, in the year 1877. He joined the M. E. Church in Philadelphia, and being received in full membership in Zoar M. E. church, he soon gave evidences of a call to the ministry, and was licensed as an exhorter, by the rule of the M. E. Church, at Zoar, in 1879; and a local preacher in 1880, by the same church, under the administration of Rev. W. H. Coffey.

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BISHOP LEVI SCOTT.

Rev. Bishop Levi Scott D.D. Senior Bishop of the Methodist Episcopal Church, died at his residence, near Odessa, Delaware, July, 13th, 1882, after a protracted career of usefullness in the church in which he was reared.

He has filled all of the distinguished places in the church from the Pastorate to the Episcopacy.

From the beginning to the end, he manifested himself a friend of the colored race, especially those who were members of the Methodist Episcopal Church.

Twenty five or thirty years ago, when the freedom of speech was denied, or not allowed, to the white Preachers in the middle and the more southern States of the Union, and much less, association with the colored people, Bishop Scott (after repeated petitions by some of the leading colored brethren of the north) repulsed the vigorous objections offered by some of the leading men of the church and organized what was then known as a LocalConference in the more northern states, including a part of the state of Delaware.

This was the conception of a thing at that dark period, that has proved to be, in this brighter age, a regular organized conference in the Methodist Episcopal Church. We refer to the Delaware Conference: and yet the eighteen or twenty other conferences, a part of which are all, and a part, a majority are colored members, may be considered the fruit of the insignificant creature rocked in a cradle, in the form of a local conference twenty five or thirty years ago. Bishop Scott was then shaping a destiny for us that has proved more glorious then the eye of the church or world had thought to look upon for the next half century or more.

His persistent energies and noble philanthrophy were not easily satisfied. In 1852 he was elected to the Episcopacy, and 1853 he visited the mission work in Liberia, and held the first regular Conference of our church in that country.

Bishop Scott will not be forgotten when the names of John Brown, Abraham Lincoln, Gen. U. S. Grant, and Gen. James A. Garfield, are being read and thought of as the Heroes of *Irue* national freedom in this country.

Bishop Scott was the originator of the Centenary Biblical Institute in Baltimore, of which Professor Rounds has the honor to be president.

He has presided four times over this body, he has visited the Conference several times, and always expressed it a gratification to him to do so.

Now this great man has passed away; his work is done; the Heaven of eternal repose is gained, and in his footsteps may we tread, until our life's labor is ended, and we the harbor gain, and there greet the beloved father of this, and many other Conferences in the Methodist Episcopal Church.

MARTHA DEBORAH DICKERSON.

Martha D. Dickerson, daughter of Jacob and Mary Bryan, was born in Kent Co., Del., Nov. 15th 1851, and died in the triumphs of faith, Oct. 27th, 1881, ' in Orange City, New Jersey.

She was converted when about sixteen, and became a faithful member of the A. M. E. Church. When about eighteen she moved her membership to Chester, Pa., and in 1875 she was received by letter in Zoar M. E. Church, Philadelphia, Pa. She was married by Rev. W. J. Parker to Rev. W. C. Dickerson, Feb. 14th, 1878; Bro. Dickerson being pastor of Zoar at that time. He soon found that he had a wife, a mother for his children, and a devoted christian teacher; so much so, that her husband was led to believe that she did as much to build up the church as he did.

Those who knew her the longest, loved her the most. She had a kind word for every body, and could always smile at the raging storm of affliction, and trials. W. C. Dickerson, her husband, said, for seven long years I was acquainted with Mattie, and I never saw her show bad temper, say a wicked word. or do an evil act.

Last June, she was affected by the intense heat and became a victim to poor health. The long tedious summer passed away only to increase the melancholy fears that beset the heart of her friends. Thursday morning, October 27th 1881, the sun rose without a cloud, but alas it was Mattie's last look at Nature's rising sun. About 10.30 a m., after a serious conference pertaining to the condition of her health, she was seen on Main st., Orange, New Jersey, taking her last walk with her husband, resting on his arm.

About 2 p. m., hemorrhages set in, and although she was strangling in her own blood, every few minutes she could be heard all over the house, saying, "Bless the name of the Lord! a few more pains like this will take me home where all my sufferings will be over." About seven p. m. she complained of being cold, and then called her husband to her bedside and said, "Pet, wont you be late?" knowing that he had an engagement with a brother to lecture that evening. He replied, "Mattie I cannot leave you; you are too sick." "Ah," said she "dont disappoint the brother; Jesus will take care of me." Her husband called the daughter and nurse to their knees by her dying bed,

When done, she said "Amen," and when he kissed her good bye, she said, "take care of yourself, don't disappoint the brother." DEAR BRÉTHREN: — The Board of Managers of the Education Society of the Delaware Annual Conference, at a meeting held on 22d inst., after the election of the following officers, Rev. I. H. White, President; Abram Murray, Esq., Vice-President; W. H. Thomas, Secretary; Rev. J. E. Round, Treasurer, agreed to make the following recommendations:

ist, That the Conference set apart the afternoon of the second day of its ensuing annual session for the purpose of organizing a Conference Education Society. That the members of the Board of Managers on the different districts, act as subcommittees to urge upon the people the importance of the work.

FREEDMEN'S AID.

The work of the Freedmen's Aid Society, in educating suitable persons of our race for the work of the ministry, and for the profession of teacher, is second to none in its importance, and should command the deepest sympathy of all our ministry and membership. While all schools that are sustained by this society are doing a good work, our own Centenary Biblical Institute, by the thoroughness of its course of study, the faithfulness of its instructors, and the great increase of its facilities for usefulness, is worthy of our unqualified commendation. The culture of our future ministry, and the qualifications of those who are to instruct our children in the public schools, will depend very largely upon the effort we make in raising money for its treasury, and in interesting students to avail themselves of the facilities it offers. The large increase during the past year in the numbers of students, the still larger increase in the average attendance, the success of the trustees in paying for the new building, the large increase in the current revenue in the face of unusual embarassments, are truly wonderful, and should be a theme of devout thanksgiving. We are gratified to learn that the course of study is to be greatly increased, without any sacrifice of the persistent thoroughness of the past ten years. In taking up our Freedmen's Aid collections, we should bear in mind that we are contributing to the support of our own school, and that we also contribute, indirectly, but quite as effectually, to sustain all of the schools, under the charge of this society. We should also bear in mind that, hereafter, this collection is the only one that is to be used to sustain the Institute itself, and should make our principal effort in this direction. We recommend the adoption of the following resolutions :

ist, That the Freedmen's Aid collections of the past year be paid to the treasurer of the Centenary Biblical Institute, agreeably to the action of the board of managers of the Freedmen's Aid Society.

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CONSTITUTION

OF

Preachers' Aid Society of the Delaware Conference.

ARTICLE I.

The corporate name of this Society shall be the "PREACHERS' AID SOCIETY OF THE DELAWARE CONFERENCE OF THE METHODIST EPISCOPAL CHURCH."

ARTICLE II.

The object of this Association is to raise and perpetually maintain a fund for the relief of Preachers of said Conference and their families—said fund to consist:

First—Of such moneys as may be collected, from time to time, from the several Circuits and Stations within the bounds of said Conference, for that purpose.

Second—Of such sums as may be specifically appropriated to that object by the Daughters of Conference or other like organizations,

Third-Of such sums as may be received for annual or life subscriptions of its members.

Fourth—Of funds accruing from bequests, donations, and such other sources as may be opened up. The fund shall be permanent, and the whole of the proceeds, after payment of incidental expenses, shall be annually applied as herein directed.

ARTICLE III.

All members of this Conference may become members of this Society, and shall pay the sum of \$2.00 annually. Any person, not a member of this Conference shall or may become a member of this Society, for one year, by the payment of \$1.00; or a life member, by the payment of \$5.00 at one time, or a life patron, by the payment of \$20.00 in like manner; and such persons shall be entitled to participate in all the proceedings of the Society while members.

ARTICLE IV.

The officers of this Society shall be a President, Vice-President, Secretary, Treasurer, and five Managers. The said officers and managers shall constitute a Board of Control, having full power to manage the affairs of the Society, subject to this Constitution and such By-Laws as may be enacted under it. The Treasurer shall be indefinite, and three of the managers shall be laymen These officers shall be elected at the annual meeting of the Society, and shall hold their office to the close of the Annual Conference next ensuing, or until their successors are elected. The Treasurer shall, before entering upon the duties of his office, give bond and security for double the amount he holds in hand at any time, which may be, at any time increased by the Board at their discretion ; said bond to be approved by the Board, and filed with the Secretary. The Board shall have the power to make By-Laws for their own government and that of the Society; provided, said By-Laws are not inconsistent with this Constitution. Five members shall constitute a quorum. Vacancies occurring in the interim of Conference, by death, resignation, or otherwise, may be filled by the Board.

ARTICLE V.

The annual meeting of the Board shall be one day previous to the meeting of the Conference, and at the place designated for the same. And special meetings of the Board may be called by the President or any two members thereof, upon reasonable personal notice. The annual meeting of the Society shall he held on the second day of the session of the Annual Conference, at 7 o'clock P. M., at which time the Society shall elect officers for the ensuing year, and the Board of Control shall present a full and detailed report of the condition of the Society, its receipts and expenditures, with all other matters that may be nec essary to a full understanding of its doings by the members. Meetings of the ociety may be called by the President or any two members of the Board—twent^y days' notice having been given in the Church journal having the largest circulation in the Conference.

ARTICLE VI.

The Board shall have power to appoint an agent, and fix his salary, who shall labor for the increase of the Fund in such manner as they shall direct.

ARTICLE VII.

The Board shall, after defraying the necessary incidental expenses, invest all moneys of the Society according to their own discretion, with the following restrictions: All investments shall be made by direct loan, secured by first mortgage on productive real estate, for one-third its value, insured to the value of the amount of the loan, and policy assigned to the Board; or by the purchase of United States bonds. No loan shall be made by the Board, or any member or members thereof, without the written order of the President, countersigned by the Secretary; and at the annual meeting of the Board, the Treasurer shall present a full report of the receipts and expenditures during the current year, and of the amount on hand. The Board shall thereupon fix the amount to be applied to the objects of the Society for the Conference year then closing, and shall order, accordingly, which amount they shall pay over to the Stewards of the Conference. Contingent expenses shall be paid by the Treasurer, upon the order of the President, and countersigned by the Secretary; and no sum shall be paid out by him, except as herein directed.

ARTICLE VIII.

The proceeds of the Fund shall be applied to the aid of the following classes of persons, and under the following limitation and restriction, viz :

First—The Superannuated Ministers of the Methodist Episcopal Church, who shall have performed four years of effective service in the Delaware Conference after the date of their reception on trial by the Conference or transfer to the Conference, and also the families of such Ministers.

Second—The widows and orphan children of deceased Itinerent Ministers, who shall have performed like service in said Conference, and being still members thereof at the time of their decease; *provided*, that such widows or orphan children are persons of good, moral character.

Third—Ministers who have been embarrassed in their circumstances by protracted sickness—said Ministers having performed like service in said Conference, and being still members thereof—such Ministers shall receive the sum of \$2.00 per week, for three months; then at the discretion of the Board of Control. Also, there shall be appropriated for the burial of such deceased Ministers, that have performed like service in said Conference, the sum of \$40.00.

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ARTICLE 1X.

The Board shall, at their annual meeting, appoint a Distributing Committee to serve to the close of the ensuing session of the Conference. Said Committee shall consist of three members of the Conference, who may be the Stewards. This Committee shall, in the interim, and during the session of the Conference, obtain all necessary information, as to the necessities of the claimants on the Fund, and shall, upon such information, recommend appropriations to the full aggregate amount allowed by the Board for distribution, which recommendation shall be submitted to the Conference for approval.

ARTICLE X.

This Constitution may be altered, or amended at any annual meeting of the Society, by a vote of two-thirds of the members present and voting—such amendment or alteration having been first recommended by a majority of all the members of the Board of Control.

ARTICLE XI.

The corporate seal of this Society shall be a metallic impression, with the foling words and letters, to wit:

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"'THE PREACHERS' AID SOCIETY, DELAWARE CONFERENCE, M. E. CHURCH.'

BY-LAWS.

ARTICLE I.

No person shall be entitled to any dues from this Society, who shall have been suspended by his Presiding Elder, until his case shall be disposed of, and he deemed not guilty.

ARTICLE II.

If any members are found trying to defraud this Society, by pretending that they are sick, they shall be brought before a Committee for trial, and if found gullty, they shall be expelled; nevertheless they shall have a right to appeal at the next annual meeting of the Society, where the case shall be finally disposed of.

ARTICLE III.

Any member that shall be taken sick, shall consult with a regular physician, whose certificate as to the fact shall be received.

ARTICLE IV.

Any member that shall bring sickness on himself voluntarily, shall not be entitled to any of the benefits of this Society.

ARTICLE V.

If any member of this Society shall be sick for one week, and thereby entitled to dues, he shall forward to the President a certificate given by the Doctor under whose care he shall be placed; and the President shall, after general satisfaction give an order on the Treasurer for the amount due to the sick member, forthwith, as provided in the Constitution and By-Laws.

ARTICLE VI.

Any member of this Society living near a sick member, shall be a visiting committee to wait on hun, to ascertain the nature of the sickness of the member, and to give the President a full account of the case; provided, that the disease is not contagious.

ARTICLE VII.

The two nearest brothers shall be a committee to wait on the sick member, and any brother that neglects to wait on a sick member after being notified, unless prevented by some contagious disease, shall pay a fine of $$_2.\infty$, or the amount of one week's dues, to the sick.

ARTICLE VIII.

All members of the Board of Control shall have their fare paid out of the Society's funds, when attending the meeting of the Board of Control, by the nearest and cheapest route from their homes, to the place designated.

ARTICLE IX.

The Treasurer shall hold \$100.00 in hand at all times, to be ready to discharge our obligations to the sick members of this Society.

ARTICLE X.

No member shall be allowed, while speaking, to use personalities, or cast reflections on other members while speaking.

ARTICLE XI.

No member shall be interrupted while speaking, unless called to order by the President, or to allow a brother to make explanations.

ARTICLE XII.

No member shall be allowed to speak more than ten minutes at a time, unless called on by the President.
