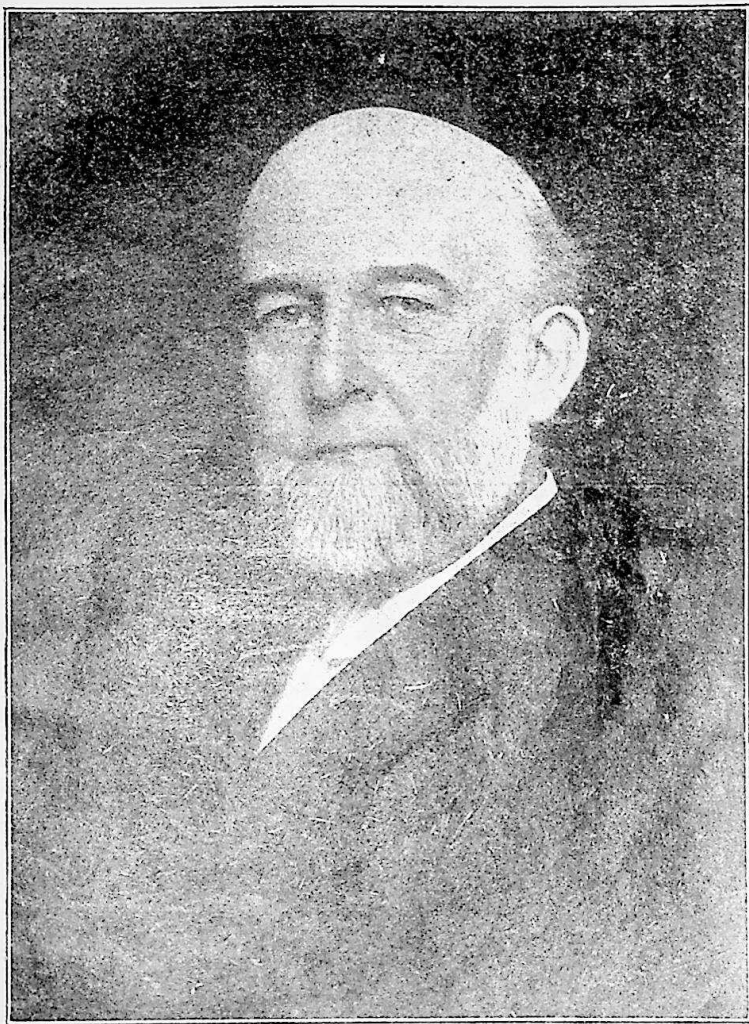
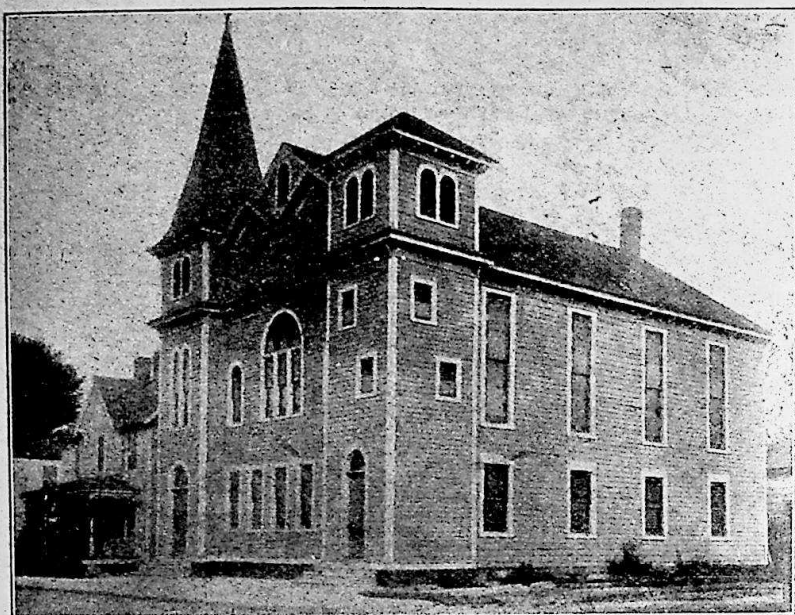

Where 58th Session of Delaware Conference was held.

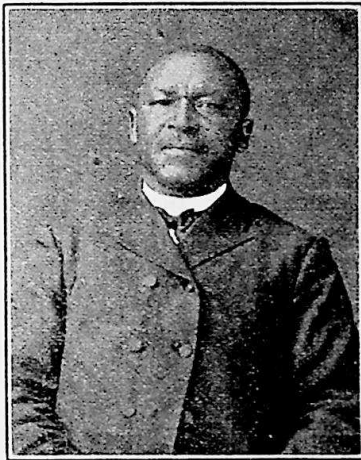

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## II

### RULES OF ORDER.

#### OF THE DELAWARE ANNUAL CONFERENCE.

Rule I. The President shall decide all questions of order, subject to an appeal to the Conference; but in case of such appeal, the question shall be taken without debate.

Rule II. He shall appoint all committees not otherwise specially ordered by the Conference.

Rule III. On assigning the floor to any member of Conference, he shall distinctly announce the name of the member to whom he assigns it.

Rule IV. All motions or resolutions introduced by any member shall be presented in writing, if the President, Secretary, or any two members request it.

Rule V. When a motion or resolution is moved and seconded, or a report is presented, and is read by the Secretary, or stated by the President, it shall be deemed in possession of the Conference; but any motion or resolution may be withdrawn by the mover, with the consent of Conference, at any time before amendment or decision.

Rule VI. The motion to adjourn, to lay on the table, to take from the table, or for the previous question, shall be taken without debate.

Rule VII. No new motion or resolution shall be entertained until the one under consideration has been disposed of, which may be done by adoption or rejection, unless one of the following motions shall intervene, which shall have precedence in the order in which they are here placed, namely: (1) To fix the time to which the Conference shall adjourn. (2) To adjourn. (3) To lay on the table. (4) For the previous question. (5) To postpone to a given time. (6) To refer to a committee. (7) Substitute. (8) Amendment. (9) To postpone indefinitely.

Rule VIII. A substitute or amendment may be amended.

Rule IX. When any member is about to speak in debate, or to deliver any matter to the Conference, he shall rise and respectfully address the President.

Rule X. No member shall be interrupted when speaking, except by the President to call him to order when he departs from the question, or uses personalities or disrespectful language; but any member may call the attention of the President to the subject when he deems a speaker out of order, and any member may explain if he thinks himself misrepresented.

Rule XI. No person shall speak more than twice on the same question, nor more than fifteen minutes at one time, without leave of the Conference; nor shall any person speak more than once until every member choosing to speak shall have spoken.

Rule XII. When any motion or resolution shall have been acted upon by the Conference it shall be in order for any member who voted with the prevailing side to move a reconsideration; but a motion to reconsider a non-debatable motion shall be decided without debate.

Rule XIII. No member shall absent himself from the service of the Conference without leave, unless he is sick or unable to attend.

Rule XIV. No member shall be allowed to vote on any question who is not within the bar at the time when such question is put by the President, except by leave of the Conference, when such member has been necessarily absent.

Rule XV. Every member who is within the bar at the time the question is put shall give his vote, unless the Conference, for special reasons excuse him.

Rule XVI. It shall be in order for any member to call for the yeas and nays in any question before the Conference; and, if the call be sustained by twenty-five members present, the vote thereon shall be taken by yeas and nays.

Rule XVII. It shall be in order to move that the question shall be taken without further debate, on any measure pending before the Conference, except in cases where character or Conference relations are involved; and, if sustained by a two-thirds vote, the question shall be so taken; nevertheless, it shall be in order under this rule to move to recommit, to divide or to lay on the table after the previous question has been ordered.

Rule XVIII. The motion to adjourn shall be taken without debate, and shall always be in order, except (1) when a member has the floor; (2) when a question is actually put, or vote is being taken; (3) when a question is pending on sustaining the demand for the previous question; (4) when the previous question has been called and sustained, and action under it is still pending; (5) when a motion to adjourn has been negatived, and no business or debate has intervened; and (6) when a motion to fix the time to which the Conference shall adjourn is pending or shall be made.

### CAMBRIDGE DISTRICT.

Bishop Berry and Brethren:—

With profound gratitude to our Heavenly Father for His providence and due appreciation to the pastors and people for their cordial hospitality and hearty co-operation, I present this my fourth annual report.

#### Translations.

Father John H. Harmon, retired, went to his coronating last July 27th, he was supplying East New Market Circuit.

Louis Edward Toulson, for 35 years a faithful member of this conference went to his reward February 22.

During the year the following have been on the sick list: Brothers F. H. Quinn, W. E. Hilton, J. R. Holland, F. T. Johnson, E. H. Jolley, Mrs. J. S. Bantum, Mrs. D. R. Shockley, Mrs. J. H. Dredde and Mrs. F. T. Johnson.

This has been a strenuous year. We have had to face the stubborn reaction. But by His help we have overcome. We have not accomplished as much as we desired but we are grateful to God that the report will surpass last years good record. Let us rehearse some of the most salient achievements of the charges.

#### Survey of the Charges.

AIREY has increased her pastoral support \$100, Enlarged two of her churches. Raised for, the apportioned benevolences \$131; conference collections advanced; conversions 9; accessions 9. Louis T. Robins, pastor.

BECKWITH reports a fairly good year. The pastor, W. T. Purnell has zealously labored to train the people in Christian giving. Apportioned benevolences \$60; conference collections taken; conversions 6; accessions 10.

BRIDGEVILLE maintains last year's excellent record by remaining on the Roll of Honor. Apportioned benevolences \$456 and conference collections are in full. Pastoral support increased \$200; paid on old indebtedness \$200; conversions 51; accessions 48. D. W. Henry, pastor.

BRIDGEVILLE CIRCUIT has built a modern parsonage and other improvements costing \$2,500. They have paid \$1,144 on the same, \$350 of which was donated by the Board of Home Missions and Church Extension; apportioned benevolences \$271; conference collections advanced; conversions 32; accessions 27. R. W. Thomas, pastor.

CAMBRIDGE—ST. LUKES. This Mission has wrought nobly; apportioned benevolences \$76; conference collections advanced; conversions 29; accessions 37. D. R. Shockley, pastor.

CAMBRIDGE—WAUGH, with her debt all cancelled, has improved her property. The parsonage has been beautifully painted and electric lights installed. Pastoral support increased \$100; apportioned benevolences \$672; and conference collections both advanced; conversions 17; accessions 35. The badly perverted social life of the community is gradually being transformed. M. A. Thompson, pastor.

CAMBRIDGE CIRCUIT has been revived both spiritually and financially. Pastoral support increased \$100. Paid on old indebtedness \$27; apportioned benevolences \$81.; conference collections advanced; conversions 23; accessions 23. W. G. Matthews, pastor, attended the Rural Summer School.

CHURCH CREEK well organized by E. F. Showell, has suffered some reverses partly thru the failure of her canning industry; apportioned benevolences \$132; conference collection taken; pastoral support increased \$150; conversions 4; accessions 15. S. S. Lankford, pastor.

CRAPO reports another prosperous year. Pastoral support increased \$75; apportioned benevolences \$137; conference collections taken; conversions 20; accessions 20. J. H. Dredde, pastor.

EAST NEW MARKET, noted for her leadership in doing things, leads this year in the organizing and training of her young people; apportioned benevolences \$246; conference collections taken; conversions 27; accessions 19. D. S. Quillen, pastor.

EAST NEW MARKET CIRCUIT has been greatly hindered by the protracted illness resulting in the death of her pastor, J. H. Harmon. By permission of the resident Bishop, his unexpired term was filled by D. S. Quillen. The indebtedness on the parsonage of \$128 has been cancelled; apportioned benevolences \$60; conference collections taken; conversions 7; accessions 7.

FEDERALSBURG has surpassed her previous good record. Paid on old indebtedness \$887; apportioned benevolences \$290; conference collections in full; conversions 23; accessions 17. F. T. Johnson, pastor.

FRANKFORD, with F. H. Quinn pastor, has enlarged her vision and increased her zeal to work for the Kingdom of God. Long standing indebtedness of \$262 liquidated on church; pastoral support increased \$200; apportioned benevolences \$107; conference collections advanced; conversions 5; accessions 9. There are being practiced here likewise some of the good lessons taught at the Rural Summer School.

GIRDLETREE has had a record breaking year; J. L. Nichols, the pastor is happy over the results of his labor; conversions 74; accessions 69; apportioned benevolences \$282; conference collections in full; pastoral support increased \$100.

GOLDEN HILL, with Bishop Benjamin Carson pastor, renders a good account of her stewardship; conversions 12; accessions 12; apportioned benevolences \$105; conference collections taken; raised \$274 on a new church.

Harrington has remodeled her church at a cost of \$1,531, and has paid \$1,300 on the same; \$700 of which was a donation from the Centenary, for which they are very grateful; apportioned benevolences \$121; conference collections taken; conversions 10; accessions 10. T. A. Johnson, pastor.

HURLOCK has experienced another record breaking year, which is a tribute to the leadership of her late pastor, Rev. L. E. Toulson, who was sick from Nov. 14th to Feb. 22nd, as well as a striking evidence of the loyalty of her good people; paid on old indebtedness \$500; raised on a new church at Petersburg \$412; pastoral support increased \$105; apportioned benevolences \$434; conference collection advanced; conversions 11; accessions 11.

LAUREL with C. W. Downs pastor, has surpassed her previous good record; raised \$300 on a new church; pastoral support increased \$100; apportioned benevolence \$307; conference collections in full; conversions 10; accessions 19. The young people are well organized and active.

LEWES is enjoying a new day, spiritually, financially and socially. Her family altars have been rebuilt; her abandoned weekly prayer meetings are well attended; her young people are being organized and trained; \$156 raised cancelling all indebtedness; pastoral support increased \$100. Apportioned benevolences \$102; conference collections advanced; conversions 4; accessions 5. T. L. McDonald, pastor, has taken unto himself a wife.

LINCOLN. J. G. Harris, pastor, fits gracefully in this charge; \$520 paid on old indebtedness; \$180 raised for renovating the church at Lincoln City; pastoral support increased \$100; apportioned benevolences \$206; conference collections advanced; conversions 42; accessions 56.

LINKWOOD with E. H. Nichols, pastor, has quickened her pace. Mt. Pleasant Church at Salem has done exceptionally well; apportioned benevolences \$100; conference collections advanced; conversions 18; accessions 18.

MADISON. \$400 has been raised to renovate the Church at Madison proper; \$439 expended for improvements at the other two churches; apportioned benevolences \$130; conference collections taken; conversions 31; accessions 31. Jose Augulo, pastor.

MILFORD has been blessed with a revival; conversions 38; accessions 35; pastoral support increased \$200; apportioned benevolences \$218; conference collections taken; the faithful few have been very loyal. W. E. Hilton, pastor.

NASSAU is enjoying a season of peace and good will. Mt. Pleasant Church at Rehoboth has been renovated; \$300 raised on remodeling the church at Nassau proper; pastoral support increased \$200; apportioned benevolences \$168 conference collections taken; conversions 18 accessions 16. Alexander Reid, pastor.

NEWARK. The Cedar Chapel Church has not been able to overcome her handicap. St. Peters has successfully labored; apportioned benevolences \$60; conference collections taken; conversions 15; accessions 15. H. J. Stewart, pastor.

**NORTH BERLIN.** Success has again greeted this charge; \$2,100 paid on old indebtedness and improvements; pastoral support increased \$125; apportioned benevolences \$508; conference collections in full; conversions 38; accessions 37. J. R. Holland, pastor.

**PRESTON** is well organized. The people are spiritual-minded and loyal; \$460 paid on old indebtedness; \$180 raised on a new church at Dover Roads; pastoral support increased \$100; apportioned benevolences \$308 conference collections taken; conversions 12; accessions 12. D. G. Waters, pastor.

**SEAFORD.** J. C. Bantum, pastor, has labored in the midst of embarrassing difficulties. Nevertheless, his report is fairly good all things considered; \$280 paid on old indebtedness; \$80 raised for reseating the Mt. Hope Church; apportioned benevolences \$213; conference collections taken; conversions 11; accessions 6.

**SNOW HILL** under the pastorate of W. J. Helm, has excelled herself for liberal giving to the various causes. Apportioned benevolences \$650; conference collections in full; pastoral support increased \$200; raised on improvements \$390; conversions 37; accessions 35.

**SNOW HILL CIRCUIT** has surpassed all of her previous records; pastoral support increased \$200; apportioned benevolences \$115; conference collections in full; conversions 14; accessions 11. W. E. Davis, pastor.

**SOUTH BERLIN AND SINEPUXENT.** The uniting of these two weaker charges under the pastorate of E. F. Showell has proved effectual. Paid on old indebtedness \$533; apportioned benevolences \$267; conference collections advanced; conversions 8; accessions 12.

**STOCKTON** has been blessed with a Pentecostal shower, and the people have evidenced their joy by liberal giving; conversions 82; accessions 82; apportioned benevolences \$224; conference collections advanced; pastoral support increased \$100. L. H. Martin, pastor.

**STOCKTON CIRCUIT** has enjoyed a prosperous year; apportioned benevolence \$126; other collections advanced; \$187 raised to build a new parsonage; conversions 20; accessions 15. S. J. Hooper, pastor.

**TRINITY** is growing in spiritual vision, and increasing in righteous purpose; pastoral support increased \$100; apportioned benevolences \$100; conference collections nearly full; conversions 14; accessions 15. W. H. Saunders, pastor.

**VIENNA** has raised \$250 and is planning to build a new parsonage; and increased the pastoral support \$100; apportioned benevolences \$115; other collections in full; conversions 2; accessions 2. M. W. Clark, pastor, has done much to promote peace and unity.

**WHALEYVILLE** with E. H. Jolly pastor, has experienced a revival; conversions 23; accession 31; apportioned benevolences \$122; other collections advanced. Special efforts have been made to organize and train the young people.

### Evangelism.

The campaign for Evangelism has been incessantly carried on. The nine sub-district groups are systematically organized and functioning. Their work has been greatly supplemented by the District Monthly Preachers' Meeting. Rotating by invitation from group to group, it has carried the impact of the Spirit and disseminated the Centenary propaganda. The communities have been greatly stirred, morally and spiritually. Large revivals have resulted from these visitations.

The strict necessity of adequately training these new disciples into the true fellowship and service of the church has been emphasized. The Lay Lenten Preachers did much to augment and stabilize the membership. We are glad to report that each charge has made a special effort at Evangelism. God has greatly blessed each church with converts. Again, more than 10% have been added to the membership and a substantial increase made over last year.

### Temperance.

With the overwhelming ratification of the 18th Amendment to the Constitution of the United States, and the glorious benefits resulting therefrom, one would think that the biggest and greatest phase of our temperance problem had met its solution. But not so. The forces of intemperance are very much stirred. They very reluctantly consent to the death of John Barleycorn. Much less do they agree that he should be interred. Intemperance, like a giant octopus, is seeking to entwine his deadly arms around every moral principle, and to suck the life out of every Christian institution. Sabbath Desecration, Ill-censored Motion Pictures, Prize Fighting, Cigarette Smoking, Gambling in high and low places, dance halls, and divorce mills. These are uncircumcised Phillistians yet standing in our midst. What is needed? We must elect men to our legislative halls who will cause proper laws to be enacted to safeguard the moral and spiritual life of every community. We must place executives in power who will unequivocally enforce the laws. The Church must attack the problem at its source. She must continuously hold up the arms of the Board of Temperance, Prohibition and Public Morals. She must indoctrinate her youth in the fundamentals of Christianity. She must strenuously strive to enlarge and perpetually keep alive the Christian social consciousness.

### Classes and Unit Leaders.

Among the many striking Disciplinary changes made by the recent General Conference, none should be more highly beneficial to the life of the church than the new adjustments made in the classes and the demands made upon the leaders. Many of our classes have been too large. The leadership has been too inadequate. The original Wesleyan idea of a system of pastoral and sub-pastoral oversight that would effectively reach every member has been expanded. The readjustment requires that not only every member but every constituent or the church shall be reached with

the entire program, spiritually; evangelistically, socially, educationally and financially. This important change has been especially stressed in every quarterly conference. The pastors are reorganizing the classes and units for prayer and service. Greater and better results are beginning to accrue to all our church enterprises.

#### Education.

The Public School is a promoter of Democracy. The Christian College is the handmaid of religion. Christian religion is the sure foundation upon which all civilization and enlightenment must stand. The boy is the father to the man. The corrupt political and perverted social conditions among the nations, the erroneous religious conceptions of the world, convince us as never before that Christian education is the only true hope for the human family. It gives us exquisite joy to note that the educational impulse is manifesting itself in every town and hamlet on this district. The campaigns for finances which have helped to make possible our Christian schools have only intensified this impulse. The youth hunger and thirst. The parents anxiously crave to give them the higher education. The child is still in our midst as a potentiality. The trite statement of the Psalmist, "Out of the mouth of babes and sucklings hast thou ordained strength because of thine enemies, that thou mightiest still the enemy and the avenger," is being newly interrupted and commanding the thoughtful consideration of Christian education supremely. For it is very evident that thru Christian education, God intends to put all things under man's feet.

Our hearts overflow with gratitude that Morgan College, Princess Anne-Academy and Delaware State College exist for the higher education of our youth. The collections for the Board of Education and the Board of Education for Negroes have been taken. WE MUST EDUCATE.

Three of our pastors again attended the Summer School for Rural Workers at Drew Theological Seminary. Thus we have eight trained pastors to assist in organizing the District Rural Societies.

Nearly all of our pastors observed Good Literature Day. Much wholesome information was imparted. The Church Literature, including the South Western Christian Advocate, is being more largely purchased and widely read.

#### District Parsonage.

The Board of trustees has painted the District Parsonage greatly beautifying its appearance and enhancing its value. The Building Loan dues have been paid regularly each month.

#### Sunday School and Epworth League Convention.

Our Sunday School and Epworth League Convention was held June 24-26, at Mt. Pleasant Church, D. G. Waters, pastor, Preston, Md. 75 Sunday Schools, 34 Epworth Leagues and 27 Junior Leagues were represented. The hospitality accorded us was almost perfect. The subjects



treated were of a high order. The addresses delivered by some of our leading educators were highly instructive and inspirational. For our young peoples' societies to properly function, we must have trained Christian workers. Most gladly do we hail the coming of the proposed joint Sunday School Institute of the Delaware and the Washington Conferences, next July, at Morgan College, Baltimore, Md.

#### District Conference.

The Cambridge District Conference is tending toward the momentum and dignity of our Annual Conference. Our laity always entertain happy anticipation of its coming. Again, this year, we endeavored to conduct it largely as a seminary of methods covering the various phases of the Centenary activities as well as the Academic Education. Some of our ablest educators and Christian statesmen greatly stirred and felicitated us, including Dr. Leonard C. Murdock, Executive Secretary of the Philadelphia Area, and Dr. Kendall of the Department of Evangelism of the Board of Home Missions, and Bishop Matthew Wesley Clair of Monrovia, Liberia, West Africa.

The appearance of Bishop Clair, one of the first Negro General Superintendents, was greeted with joyous hilarity. His powerful sermon and unique appeal were received with ever abounding enthusiasm. The conference expressed its gratitude by contributing \$113.52 as a donation to help our work in Liberia, and a scholarship was established in the College of West Africa.

#### Ministerial Support.

Last year, an intensive campaign for the increase of ministerial support commensurate with the high cost of living and consonant with the worth and dignity of the Christian ministry was waged. Accordingly thirty one charges out of thirty seven increased their pastoral support. It gives us joy to report the good work still continues. The laity has further shown its appreciation by again increasing their support. Thirty one charges out of thirty six have advanced to the amount of \$3,586.

Thus it is beginning to be as it should. If Methodism hopes to attract the best young men and maintain the high standing of her ministry, she must give a support consistent with the character and dignity of her ministry.

The Methodist Episcopal Church thru its General Conference assembled at Des Moines, Iowa, last May, honored us by electing two Negro General Superintendents out of seventeen. Bishop, we are aware that none were more influential in bestowing this special honor than you. Witnessing that ecstatic scene, we know that your joy was second only to ours. We have resolved to show our heartfelt gratitude to God and the church by most strenuously endeavoring ever to maintain our last years good record. We raised our apportionment of the Episcopal Fund, 100% plus.

What shall I say further? Who could have the slightest semblance of peace of conscience until every annuity due to our retired fathers, the



widows and the orphans has been paid 100 cents to the dollar? To this we most sincerely pledge ourselves. To this we will most deliberately plan and consistently work.

#### Summary.

In all of the charges the Centenary Quota has been subscribed over the top. But the actualizing of subscriptions into real money has been another proposition. We have zealously labored to advance the various causes of the Church and the Kingdom. Total conversions 787; accessions 792. Tithing Stewards 375; Life Service 60. Apportioned Benevolences \$7,597. A parsonage has been built and a church remodeled under the auspices of the Centenary; Old indebtedness and improvements \$13,500. The results have been meager in comparison with what we believe God desires.

While we have appreciably advanced beyond last year, we have partially failed. But we do not despair. God, our Father; the Christ, our Savior; the Holy Spirit, our inspirer, yet lives and is strenuously active. He yet wills to feed the famished millions in the desert, open the prison houses and to save the lost. He still ravishes man's mind with heavenly visions. The Centenary of Christian Missions is divine.

Let each member of the Kingdom acknowledge God's ownership and sincerely cooperate with Him by faithfully practicing Christian stewardship and tomorrow as now, universal hope, peace and joy will come from above pouring thru the gates of Christian self sacrifice opened gloriously wide.

With sincere gratitude to the pastors and to the people for their hearty cooperation, I submit this my fourth annual report.

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#### CENTREVILLE DISTRICT.

Bishop Berry and Brethren:

I am thankful for the privilege that comes to me through the mercy of our Heavenly Father to present to this Conference my third Annual report. I am thankful to have been able to preside over all of my Quarterly Conferences during the year, and kept in touch with the progress of the work on every Charge. We are pleased to report general good health of pastors and wives during the year; with the exception of T. H. Woodley, pastor at Easton, who was quite ill for a short period at the beginning of the Conference year. Mrs. L. A. Blake was also ill for a short time. J. H. Nutter and wife, bereaved of their youngest daughter Cozzetta, on the first of September at Ridgely. Rev. Stephen Allen Earle, who was a supply pastor of Easton Circuit, was called to his reward April 18th 1920. He died in the Hospital at Cambridge, Md. Brother Earle was a faith-

ful pastor, a tireless worker, a christian brother with many years of service for the Master to his credit. Suitable memoir will be read.

The widow of the late Dr. John W. Fenderson my predecessor, passed to her rest during the past summer in Baltimore City. She left two boys as orphans. We have been blessed with unusually mild weather during the winter which was favorable to the success of the work of the church in rural parts of the district. Many pastors took advantage of weather conditions, to advance the success of their work.

#### Survey of Charges.

CARMICHAEL sends the following report—conversions 11; accessions 8; paid on debt \$350; Episcopal Fund full; Conference Claimants full; Centenary Collection \$120. I. D. Paine, pastor.

BARCLAY reports—conversions 2; accessions 5; centenary collection \$73. Nicholas Brown, pastor.

CATLIN is a small charge and is not doing very much along any line, yet it could do better if the people were more willing to sacrifice for the Kingdom of the Master. The pastor reports paid on debt \$51; accessions 3; centenary collections \$80. T. B. H. Coleman, pastor.

CENTREVILLE. This Charge is well organized, has enthusiastic leadership in its pastor, therefore another year of success. In three years the debt of \$3,400 has been reduced to \$1,600 by a small membership of sacrificing people, inadequately paid for their labor. Paid on debt this year \$775; conversions 2; accessions 4; tithers 5; Episcopal and Conference Claimants Apportionments, full; Centenary quota, \$410 full. S. J. Horsey, pastor.

CENTREVILLE CIRCUIT. Reports as follows—

CHESTERTOWN. These loyal Methodist Episcopallians burdened with debt, have been dismayed but not discouraged; have rallied to the clarion call of their leader for five years, and under adverse circumstances have steadily reduced the debt of \$13,000 to \$7,542. The pastor reports having raised this year on debt \$1,200; conversions 8; accessions 8; Episcopal and Conference claimants; apportionment, full; tithers 15; Centenary collections \$247. W. H. Johns, Pastor.

CHURCH HILL. This Charge has had success, and reports paid on debt \$411; conversions 51; accessions 5; Episcopal and Conference Claimants, apportionment full. Centenary collections \$440. Lewis Hodges, pastor.

CORDOVA. The pastor has been consistent in his effort to advance all of the interests of the Church on this Charge, and reports conversions 25; accessions 10; Episcopal and Conference Claimants; apportionment, full; Centenary collections \$198. G. W. Downs, pastor.

COX'S NECK MISSION. These people are still at work, hoping to realize their ambition in the near future and reports; Centenary \$23.

CRUMPTON with J. H. Cooper as pastor has had fair success and reports paid on debt \$110; conversions 7; accessions 7; Episcopal Fund full; Conference Claimants advanced; Centenary collections \$133.

DENTON. This Charge knows no failure. In spite of a decrease in the membership because of the removal of many to the city and elsewhere, has maintained its record and reports having paid on debt \$400; conversions 27; accessions 12; Tithers 26; Episcopal Fund full; Conference Claimants advanced; Centenary collection \$360. M. V. Waters, pastor.

DENTON MISSION has had ordinary success, supplied by S. H. Doram reports conversions 5; accessions 2; Episcopal Fund full; Centenary \$39.

EASTON maintains its reputation as the leading Charge on the district. Pastor T. H. Woodley has organized his people on the plan of the Committee on Conservation and Advance; therefore in spite of the waning enthusiasm of his people toward the Centenary propaganda, he was able to advance above last year. Paid on improvements \$171; Tithers 7; conversions 2; Episcopal and Conference Claimants Apportionment full; Centenary collections \$687.

EASTON CIRCUIT with C. E. Kincade as pastor has done well. The pastor succeeded the late S. A. Earle. Though a stranger he soon won the confidence and respect of his people and carried forward the plans of the former pastor, to remodel the church. They have received from the Board of Home Mission and Church Extension the appropriation for 1920. The Charge reports conversions 22; accessions 15; Centenary collection \$102.

FAIRLEE has been noted as one of the best Circuits on the district. But the people have gotten the habit of migrating, therefore no pastor can calculate the degree of his success. Pastor J. N. Bullen who is a faithful worker reports paid on debt \$227; tithers 1; conversions 10; accessions 9; Episcopal Fund full; Centenary collection \$260 advanced.

GREENSBORO with J. H. Blake as pastor has advanced. The pastor has been enthusiastic in his effort to imbue his people with the Centenary spirit, but they responded slowly. The Charge reports as follows—Paid on debt \$250; canceled Mortgage leaving both churches free of debt; conversions 21; accessions 22; tithers 12; Episcopal Fund full; Conference Claimants advanced; Centenary collections \$314, advanced.

LONGWOODS. This Charge has been benefited in many ways under the pastorate of J. E. A. D. Grisby and reports conversions 2; accessions 3; Episcopal fund advanced; Conference Claimants same as last year; Centenary \$53.

MARYDEL is slow to awaken to its duty to the Centenary. The pastor has labored to inspire the people to give liberally to the causes of the Church, but his efforts have not been very successful. The Charge reports as follows—conversions 4; accessions 4; Episcopal and Conference Claimants Apportionments advanced above last year; Centenary collection \$85, advanced.

MELITOTA still maintains its record. The Charge is small but the people are kind to their pastor, and because of that the pastor is able to report as follows—Paid on debt \$100; accessions 5; Episcopal Fund full; Conference Claimants advanced above last year; Centenary collection \$110, advanced. W. E. Stanley, pastor.

McDANIEL has fallen far below its success of last year. The people took a firm stand against the Centenary, and the pastor seems not to have been able to persuade them. Paid on debt \$281; accessions 4; Episcopal Fund full; Conference Claimants slightly advanced above last year; Centenary collection \$166. J. H. Russum, pastor.

MILLINGTON with C. W. Moore as pastor did not fall; conversions 11; accessions 11; Episcopal and Conference Claimants apportionments full; Centenary collections \$170.

OXFORD people and pastor are happy over achievements for the year. Through cooperation with their pastor the Charge was able to cancel the long standing debt of \$900 and burn the Mortgage on February 11th amid rejoicing. Both churches have been thoroughly renovated; conversions 10; accessions 7; Episcopal and Conference Claimants apportionment full; Centenary collections \$186. L. D. Beecham, pastor.

POMONA with S. A. Waters as pastor has had a busy year. In spite of opposition to the Centenary, the pastor did not falter but pushed the Centenary cause vigorously and reports the following result. Conversions 18; accessions 25; Episcopal Fund full; 89 per cent of Conference Claimants apportionment; Tithers 2; collection for Centenary \$200.

RIDGELY is a strong Charge. Many of the people own their homes, and do not migrate. There are many young people who should be trained for Christian work. The great need of the Charge is a new church building. The pastor has done what he could in one year of service, and reports—conversions 53; accessions 48; paid on debt \$203; tithers 3; Episcopal Fund, full; Conference Claimants apportionment, advanced; Centenary collection \$258; Benevolence full. J. H. Nutter, pastor.

ROCK HALL is delighted with J. O. Lockman as pastor. They raised the salary from \$720 to \$1000 dollars and paid up by the first of January and simply kept on paying that the pastor and his family may not be in need. The Charge reports an advance along all lines. Paid on debt \$440; conversions 31; accessions 20; Centenary collection \$271 advanced.

ROYAL OAK people and their pastor C. W. Winder have labored together to the advantage of the Charge. The pastor reports advancement. Installed Electric light in the home church and paid for them. Put a new roof on the church at Bellevue, and beautified the interior. Paid on debt \$75; tithers 2; conversions 8; accessions 7; Episcopal and Conference Claimants apportionment full; Centenary collection \$203, advanced.

ST. MICHAELS has had a year of success, and the pastor reports—Paid on debt \$724; conversions 17; accessions 12; Episcopal Fund full; Conference Claimants Fund same as last year; Centenary collection \$225. W. E. Waters, Pastor.

STEVENSVILLE. This is a strong Charge, and is able to do quite well for all of the causes of the Church. But I am sorry to say the people have taken a firm stand against the Centenary. It seems that they will not be influenced otherwise by the pastor who has done his best and reports—Paid on debt \$140; conversions 42; accessions 40; Centenary collection \$138. C. W. H. Briddell, pastor.

TRAPPE is a strong station. Pastor Abraham Chase has been afflicted with a strong opposition to all phases of the Centenary propaganda. But nothing daunted him in pushing every claim of the Church, and reports as follows—conversions 12; accessions 10; Episcopal Fund full; Conference Claimants apportionment advanced; Centenary collection \$288, advanced.

WILLISTON has had success. The pastor has labored to keep the Charge up to the standard. He has repaired and renovated two of his churches. Conversions 12; accessions 12; tithers 2; Episcopal and Conference Claimants apportionment same as last year; Centenary collection \$203. W. H. Hayman, pastor.

WITTMAN is burdened with debt and because of it, the people feel they are not able to do much for benevolent causes. The pastor reports as follows—Paid on debt \$1.133; conversions 6; accessions 6; tithers 1; Centenary collection \$87. J. O. Stanly, pastor.

WOODLAND is pleased with its new pastor and shows its appreciation by cooperating with him in his effort to advance the efficiency of the Charge. The pastor reports as follows—conversions 8; accessions 9; tithers 1; paid on debt \$225; Episcopal Fund full; Conference Claimants apportionment advanced; Centenary collection \$132. W. T. B. Devron, pastor.

#### District Activities.

The District Trustees sold the house owned by the district in Centreville and purchased a splendid property in Easton for the Superintendents home, because of better environment and convenience. The house has been remodeled and fitted up with modern improvements.

Epworth League and Sunday School Convention was held in Chestertown in June. The Convention was profitable to all present. Various phases of the Centenary propaganda were discussed and life service for young people was stressed.

DISTRICT CONFERENCE was held in Charles Wesley Church Centreville, S. J. Horsey, pastor. The Conference was well attended by ministers and laymen. Inspirational addresses were delivered by all of the District Superintendents.

Dr. L. C. Murdock, area secretary for the Centenary movement was present and delivered a message relative to the Centenary in its various phases, that enlightened the laymen and inspired the pastors.

Dr. J. W. Jackson, assistant secretary was present during the conference and was alert to all of the interests of the Centenary.

Dr. J. O. Spencer was present in the interest of Morgan College. His address was inspiring. He made both ministers and laymen feel that Morgan College must have best efforts in making it the outstanding training camp for our boys and girls, as future leaders of our people.

Rev. W. H. Johns looked after the interest of the Southwestern Christian Advocate, and reported 26 new subscriptions and 30 renewals.



### Ministerial Support.

I have urged that both Conference Claimants and Episcopal Fund be raised if possible in full. As I see it, we cannot afford to neglect either; for it is Ministerial Support. Retired ministers, and deceased minister's widows and children are receiving a very small percentage of their claim. Therefore, we feel it our duty to do all we can that these claims may be met fully. Pastors salary was increased on the district this year to the amount of \$2,217.

### Evangelism.

To my mind all of the Centenary propoganda focuses into Evangelism. I am convinced that the most effective way to carry forward evangelism successfully, is the Centenary way. If every christian would catch the spirit of the Centenary propoganda "Everybody working, everybody paying, everybody praying" a revival would sweep through the Church as a great conflagration, and thousands of precious souls would be brought into the Kingdom of Christ. The Lord would open the gates of Heaven and shower upon us such blessings that we could not contain them.

### Centenary.

The Centenary movement is with us to stay. We will not be satisfied to abandon this great movement after the expiration of five years and return to the old method of carrying forward the work of the Master. Just now, we are meeting with obstacles in striving for the success of this great cause, but we are not discouraged. We are aware that the people must be trained until they have gotten a vision of the tremendous importance of this movement for the uplift of the world, and opposers must be convinced of the righteousness of the movement. We believe if perseverance, patience and tact be exhibited by the pastors; that we will finally witness the ultimate triumph of this cause, for I believe it is espoused by the Eternal Father of us all.

### Education.

I have urged that parents make sacrifice that their children may be educated. The race is depending upon the trained youth of today for leadership tomorrow. We have a few from the district attending Princess Anne Academy, Delaware State College, Maryland Normal and Industrial Institute, at Bowie. But the number is entirely too small, we are praying for better success in the future.

### Summary.

Total raised on debts \$8,426. Total conversions 329. Total accessions 279. Total raised for Episcopal Fund \$448. Total raised for Conference Claimants \$954. Centenary collection \$6,273. We have tried to impress the brethren that no man who himself is looking backward can

lead his people forward. Let pastors and people therefore fall in line, keep step and ONWARD; onward until the Centenary quota in every Charge be filled, onward until every christian in the church of God become a tither, onward until the kingdoms of this world become the Kingdom of Our Lord and His Christ. With thanksgiving to God, for His abiding care and with appreciation of the kindly consideration of pastors and laymen through out the Conference year, this report is respectfully submitted.

#### PHILADELPHIA DISTRICT.

Bishop and Brethren:

We are thankful to our Heavenly Father for having spared the lives of all the pastors, and for keeping most of them in good health.

Rev. Howard R. Coleman, our pastor at Hudson, underwent an operation in January for appendicitis. He has fully recovered.

Rev. P. M. Shelton has not recovered his sight but his health is improved.

Rev. W. B. Nelson, on September 21, was bereft of his devoted wife. She was a helpmate indeed. A suitable memorial will appear in the conference journal.

Rev. A. G. Henry was saddened by the death of his father, May 16th. He was a member of the Washington Conference.

Mrs. Hayman Ward, widow of the late Hayman Ward, died January 1, in Baltimore, Md. leaving one child, Dorothy, age 13 years.

Mrs. J. R. Brown and Mrs. R. G. Waters each lost a father. These all departed in the faith and the Resurrection Promise, is the hope of the bereaved.

#### Observations.

I desire to thank the pastors and charges for the fine cooperation they have given and this cooperation includes the program of the church, which we believe is endeavoring to interpret the teachings of Jesus in terms of sacrifice and service.

Within the last eight years, our church has almost become a new one. Programs and drives have been the order of the day. Sacrifice and Evangelism have been the key words.

Realizing that the church can not properly carry out its program of World Evangelism without the support of every Conference and district, we have fashioned and projected our program in harmony with that of the great church.

At the beginning of the year the district adopted the following: Resolved that there be (a) a graded Sunday School and Junior League in each Church. (b) That there be a Revival in each church and 10% net



gain in membership. (c) That there be a Debt Paying or Building Fund campaign in each church and full subscription and payment of the Second year's Centenary quota. (4) Benevolences in full and each charge in the Star class.

#### District Meetings.

The Epworth League and Sunday School convention was held July 7th and 8th in St. John's Church, Orange, New Jersey. It was largely attended and enthusiastic.

After several papers and discussions on "The Church and the Young People" the following was adopted. "Resolve that we give more attention to the training of our young people in Methodist Doctrine and Bible Religion." To carry out this, the following committees were appointed. On organizing and grading leagues and schools, Mrs. S. E. Hill, Mrs. Emma Johnson, Mrs. N. L. Kemp and Rev. J. E. A. Johns; on "Religious Education and Young People's Work", Revs. J. R. Brown, F. J. Handy, W. B. Perry, A. G. Henry and Mr. H. D. Gates. Reports from these show that there are 16 graded Junior Leagues and 22 graded Sunday Schools, 6 Teachers Training Classes, and that Decision Day and Win My Chum Week brought 280 young people into the church. 78 certificates and 29 diplomas were given to Juniors.

#### Preachers' Meetings.

Our Preachers Institute met September 28, 29, 30, in Newman Church, Brooklyn. It was educational and inspiring. Dr. William H. Brooks of New York preached the Annual Sermon; Prof. Edwin Lee Earps of Drew Theological Seminary lectured on "The Church and the Community". Resident Bishop J. F. Berry lectured Thursday morning on "Stewardship" and in the afternoon on "Evangelism". These together with the papers and discussions sent the men home from the institution ready to carry out the whole program of the church.

#### The Centenary.

The gifts coming from the Centenary, though few, have been sufficient to stimulate greater interest and larger giving. The following charges raised the Centenary Quota in full and are in Class A. Germantown, Haven, Delair, Mount Holly (John Wesley, Brooklyn) Somerville, Merchantville (John Wesley, Phila.), Zoar Mission, Newman, Yonkers, Zoar and Pleasantville. 13 charges as compared with 6 last year.

The following charges raised 50% or more and are in Class B. Atlantic City, Bridgeton Circuit, Grenloch and Rhodes, Frankford, Salem, Magnolia Montclair, Burlington and Orange. Some others under the circumstances, have done very well.

#### Charges.

ATLANTIC CITY followed the district program. Had a revival, 63 conversions; 123 accessions, has a graded Sunday School, organized the

units, has 4 tithers, bought a parsonage for \$8000.; paid \$2500. on same. Centenary quota \$1655, raised \$1136 for building and improvement; \$1200; Benevolence in full. Plan for next year is to complete Stewardship Drive and pay \$5000 on mortgage. A. L. Martin has been asked to return for the 12th year. Atlantic City Mission, our youngest work, is beginning to grow. It has 5 members and 31 in the Sunday School. Dr. Martin and his church have given it loyal support. It is in a community of 5000 colored people not over churched. Robert Price, pastor.

BRIDGETON used the district program. Had 10 conversions; 13 accessions; has a graded Junior League; organized the Units. 10 tithers, 5 constituents; Centenary quota \$455; raised \$175 Benevolence in full; Paid on mortgage debt \$1040. Plans for next year to pay off remainder of the debt. F. O. T. Laws is asked to return.

BRIDGETON CIRCUIT. L. S. Perry came to Bridgeton Circuit in June and things began to move. He put on the program, had 27 conversions; and 24 accessions; organized the units; has 16 tithers; paid \$300 on the debt; Centenary quota \$227, paid \$125; Benevolence in full.

BROOKLYN—JOHN WESLEY. This congregation, aided by the Centenary, has bought the Greek Catholic Church on Pacific Street near Hoyt. It is a brick structure 50 x 75 feet, with a hall 25 x 100 feet attached. Above this is a parsonage of 14 rooms, total cost \$32,500, paid \$10,000. This gives us another good church in Brooklyn; 70 conversions; 75 accessions; 26 tithers; Building and Improvements, \$500; Centenary quota 282; raised \$300; Benevolence full and over. J. R. H. Matthews is a real leader. The people love him and have asked for his return.

EBENEZER MISSION located too near John Wesley, has never done well. W. H. Smithwick has withdrawn. Some of the members have transferred to John Wesley Church and Ebenezer Mission is no more.

NEWMAN had 2 conversions; 23 accessions; Units organized; 9 constituents, 2 tithers; Paid on debt \$450; Improvement \$93; Centenary \$108. in full and all benevolent collections taken. Dr. J. R. Waters has done well in this difficult field.

BURLINGTON CHURCH has been remodelled and \$600 paid on the same. Conversions 4; accessions 6; constituents 23; tithers 7; Centenary quota \$184; raised \$125; Benevolence taken. The pastor and people deserve credit for their faithfulness. J. H. Blackiston has been asked to return.

CAMDEN had 4 accessions; has a graded Sunday School; Units organized; 40 constituents; and 3 tithers; Paid on debt \$188; Improvement \$600; Centenary quota \$648; paid \$183; Benevolence full. J. A. T. Faust, pastor.

CAMDEN MISSION has had 3 accessions and raised \$75 on the building fund. Something raised for benevolence. B. W. Berry, pastor.

DELAIR. Here is a new creation. E. F. Morris began the year with a revival and has had 95 conversions; 93 accessions; the pastor's salary was increased from \$700 to \$1300; has a graded school and league; 10 children joined the church on Decision Day; the church and parsonage have

been renovated at a cost of \$3700 and paid for; Electric lights are being installed; Centenary \$237; paid \$250; Benevolent collection in full. The pastor has gripped the entire community.

ENGLEWOOD. This is a town with an increasing negro population, but debt and other circumstances prevent our growth; 2 accessions, 12 tithers; paid on debt \$48; Centenary 10; benevolence taken. F. D. McQueen, pastor.

GRENLOCK AND RHODES. C. W. Johnson is a good workman. Has followed the program, had a revival and organized the units; Constituents 16; tithers 2; Paid for improvement \$150; Centenary quota \$368; raised \$233; Benevolence in full. He plans to remodel Westmont Church.

HUDSON. J. N. Bridgman left this charge in May and Howard R. Coleman, a local preacher from East Calvary was sent to take charge. He has had a good year; raised \$40 for Centenary; \$70 for benevolence. The people like Brother Coleman and have asked for his return.

JERSEY CITY MISSION has been detached from Yonkers and attached to Newman; but the District Superintendent with the aid of J. P. Blades, a student in Drew Theological Seminary has looked after it. This charge has a future but needs a resident pastor. We are planning for its development.

MAGNOLIA has had a better year. 9 conversions; 13 accessions; Centenary quota \$825, raised \$500; Benevolence nearly full. Here are great possibilities and the people are growing in grace. J. T. Wallace is invited to return.

MERCHANTVILLE has carried out the program, 25 conversions; 39 accessions; a graded school and league; 150 constituents; Raised for Building Fund \$1734; for Improvements \$300; Centenary \$500. in full. All other collections in full. L. H. McArthur is a good leader and his people have a mind to work. He is invited to return.

MONTCLAIR is carrying out the church program. Conversions 12; accessions 100; a graded Sunday School and League; Units organized 200 constituents and 20 tithers; Building Fund Rally \$1300; Improvements \$1000; Centenary quota \$1415; raised \$919; Benevolence full. Classes formed for Teacher Training and Religious Education. The plan for next year is to build and equip a Parish House. Here are great resources. F. J. Handy, pastor.

MOUNT HOLLY has built a \$4000 parsonage and nearly paid for it. Conversions 12; accessions 12; graded league and Sunday School; 12 constituents; 25 tithers; Centenary quota \$357, raised \$365. All Benevolence in full. A plan to build a Parish House is part of next year's program. W. B. Berry the alert pastor is invited to return.

NEWARK had a good year. Followed the program, a graded Sunday School; 60 accessions; 6 tithers; 12 children joined the church on Decision Day; Centenary quota \$1356, raised \$500, paid on debt \$1200; for Improvement \$350. The pastor has given much care to the young people and to social betterment. The congregation continues to grow.

W. A. Hubbard, the esteemed pastor, is invited to return.

ORANGE reports having carried out the program. 25 conversions; 40 accessions; 26 constituents and 25 tithers; Paid on the debt \$450; for Improvement \$800; Centenary quota \$1058, raised \$600; Benevolence taken. There is more harmony now than at the beginning of the year. Under the circumstances this charge has made a good record. The pastor R. G. Waters is asked to return for the 7th year.

OSSINING has had 5 accessions; and has 25 constituents; 15 tithers; Gave for Centenary \$12; Benevolence \$52. R. A. F. Graham, pastor.

#### Philadelphia.

FRANKFORD says "R. S. Johns' preaching just suits them". They have followed the program; 7 conversions; 10 accessions; a graded school and league; 48 constituents and 5 tithers; Raised on mortgage debt \$1000.; for improvement \$150; Centenary quota \$400, raised \$200; Benevolence in full. The future looks brighter.

GERMANTOWN is still happy. Has a graded Sunday School and League; 36 conversions; 50 accessions; 145 constituents and 52 tithers; Units organized; Raised on Building fund \$3900; Improvement \$558; Centenary quota \$1374, raised \$1422 Benevolence running over; Conference Claimant Investment Fund \$140. This is the oly charge that has raised its quota in five years. They have given \$222. in special gifts for Africa and have done similar Home Missionary Work. Plans are being made to begin the election of the new church. J. E. A. Johns smiles and there is a unanimous request for his return.

HAVEN, a promising church, has successfully worked the program. Conversions 70; accessions 120; Decision Day brought 27 children into the church; Units organized; 400 constituents and 84 in the Tither's Association; Paid on old debts \$2684; for Improvements \$420; Centenary quota \$1263, raised \$1263; Benevolence in full. Here are several active Young Peoples Societies and Clubs. Plans are being made for the erection of a modern Sunday School building equipped to meet the increasing community need. J. R. Brown is energetic and happy in his field. He has been invited for the 9th year.

JOHN WESLEY. This congregation, aided by the centenary, has bought the Disciples Church, corner of Holly and Aspen Sts. for \$20,000. It has a seating capacity of about 500. They moved in on Palm Sunday and are happy. Conversions 30; accessions 40; a graded school and league; 9 joined the church on Decision Day; 200 constituents, 71 tithers; Raised for debt \$2200; Improvement \$1000; Centenary quota \$563, raised \$563; Benevolence full. J. W. Jefferson has been invited to return and has consented to do so.

SOMERVILLE has bought a \$3000. parsonage and raised \$1150 on the same; the Centenary gave them \$600; 47 constituents and 5 tithers; Raised for Improvement \$183; Centenary \$238 in full; Benevolence in full. E. E. Parker is young and active and is loved by his people.

ZOAR has just celebrated her 125th Anniversary and makes her best report. Has a graded Sunday School and League; 200 tithing stewards; Raised for debt \$4600; Improvement \$1500; Centenary quota \$2851, raised \$2851; Benevolence in full.

The passing of Dr. Butler from Pastoral activities to the realm of a General officer, distressed this congregation, but when they discovered that their pastor had been honored and the conference had been given General representation, they reluctantly yielded.

Dr. Butler's service in Zoar, and in the Quaker City, has won for him a place in the hearts of many Philadelphians. Plans are being made for remodeling the newly acquired properties into a Parish house and social center. F. H. Butler was the pastor.

MOUNT ZION, formerly Zoar Mission, has had a prosperous year. 45 conversions; 22 accessions; 40 constituents and 8 tithers. Has bought the adjoining property and plans to convert the two buildings into a church. The membership is growing. Raised on debt \$450; Improvement \$169; Centenary \$86 in full; Benevolence in full. William Goldsborough is the faithful pastor.

PLEASANTVILLE has carried out the program, conversions 2; accessions 5; has a graded league and school; constituents 30; tithers 12; Paid on Mortgage \$1558; Centenary quota \$345, raised \$345; Benevolence full. The plan is to pay off the balance of the mortgage and renovate the church. J. I. Peaco is invited to return.

SALEM has a brighter future. The pastor, of dauntless courage, has had his faith tried this year. Like Nehemiah he arrived and went around the fallen walls, met a discouraged people, but said, "Let's rally and build".

His first rally of \$500. went for many vexing debts, the second of \$1000, was sought by creditors but he refused to pay them and began to build.

The Centenary promised to give \$1 for each one they raised up to \$4000. They accepted the challenge and in six months came out \$500 ahead of the Board. Few people have made greater sacrifices than these. \$25 and \$50 were often asked of members and many gave it. The Sunday School room is shut in and is being used. The main walls are nearly up, but the work has stopped for lack of funds.

Bishop Berry is endeavoring to secure a loan for them.

On September 21st, just when the work was heaviest, Brother Nelson was bereft of his faithful companion, who, when dying, prayed for the church, and told her husband that she believed in his ability to carry the project through. This mightily nerved the pastor. In class meeting fashion I ask this conference to pray for Mount Hope, her pastor, and 128 courageous members. Conversions 25; accessions 5; tithers 51; Raised for building fund \$5400; Centenary \$300; Benevolence full. For all purposes \$7,350. W. B. Nelson, pastor.

SALEM CIRCUIT has wrought splendidly. 13 conversions, 13 accessions; 20 constituents and 40 tithers; Raised for improvement \$100; Cen-



tenary quota \$237, raised \$100; Benevolence nearly full; Plan to remodel the church next year. J. N. C. Davis, pastor.

SPRING LAKE is a summer appointment supplied by Jesse L. Hull, a student in Morgan College. It has no membership but paid \$750 on the debt and plans to pay the balance next year; gave \$5.00 to the Centenary.

WHITE PLAINS had a splendid year spiritually and financially. Conversions 21; accessions 60; Decision Day was observed and 7 children joined the church; Brother Edwards led his people in buying a beautiful parsonage for \$4,900; Raised \$2000. on the same; Improvements \$190; Parsonage furniture \$400; Centenary quota \$292, raised \$100; Benevolence in full. J. H. Edwards, pastor.

YONKERS has done remarkably well. The congregation has outgrown the store room where they meet. The young people received special training. A Teachers' Training Class and other activities among the Young people bespeak the future of this church; Improvements \$346; Centenary \$76 in full; Benevolence advanced. A. G. Henry plans to move into larger quarters.

#### Retired Preachers.

Rev. S. M. Shelton, located in Philadelphia, is a member of Haven Quarterly Conference. He has assisted with communion 12 times, preached 9 times, visited and prayed in many homes near him. He is not at this session but sends love to the brethren.

Rev. A. W. Lowber is a member of Zoar Quarterly Conference. He has assisted Dr. Butler with the Communion and preached when his health permitted.

Rev. A. R. Shockley, located in Moorestown, New Jersey, is a member of Merchantville Quarterly Conference. Has preached 36 times and administered the sacrament in Zoar Mission 12 times. These brethren are congenial with their pastors. The people love and hear them gladly.

#### Church Extension.

Our church Extension work has not gone on as rapidly as we had planned, but as shown above, two churches have been remodelled. Two churches and a church house have been bought, one church is being built, three parsonages have been purchased and one built.

We are planning to build other churches, and establish three social centers.

No missions have been organized this year. There are several places where they are needed, but lack of men and money has prevented our giving into these places. We have striven to develop the Missions we have, and to give the Local preachers and deacons an idea of what they might do by starting work in neglected sections.

#### Salaries Increased.

The charges have responded cheerfully to our appeal for better ministerial support. Last year 22 of the 33 charges increased the pastor's



salaries; this year all increased again except two. The increases have been from \$50 to \$600—total increase of \$5713. Last years increase was \$4038. Total for the two years \$9,751. We did not rise to the minimum salary ordered by the Conference but it is gratifying to say that 20 of the charges pay \$1000 or more and two pay \$2000. Nearly all of the charges have made Pro Rata division of Ministerial Support. Only 8 failed to raise Support of Conference Claimant in full. All plan to raise it next year and we trust that something will be done for the supply brethren.

#### Legislation and Reform.

The security of a great nation depends more upon its adherence to the principles which made it great than upon its army and navy.

That nation is blest whose God is the Lord and no one can call Him Lord, who does not keep His commandments and follow His precepts.

The present attempt, on the part of some states, to break down our Christian Sabbath is but a step in the direction that fallen nations have gone. When the Sabbath, the Church and the Bible are gone, upon what shall our nation rest?

To retain the Sabbath as a day of rest and worship for all people has been the effort of our pastors.

Our Preachers' Meetings have joined with others in protest against any repeal of or amendment to, the laws, which protect this Sacred Institution. We have sought to have the laws enforced against those who openly violate them, by games and sports on the Lord's Day. We join in protest not only against games on the Lord's Day but against moving pictures and other amusements which tend to undermine our Christian Sabbath.

#### Summary.

Those have been twelve months of prayer and toil but also of sweet fellowship and blessing.

To associate and work with these 33 pastors and congregations and to see their sacrifice and loyal service for Jesus Christ so warms one's heart that he feels like singing their praise for ever.

Another glance at the report from the charges reveal the fact that there has been no great revivals as at some other times, but that God has given us 735 conversions and 933 accessions. The charges have raised for building and improvements \$9054, for building funds and mortgage debts \$47,000, support of Conference Claimants \$1852, paid for pastors salaries \$35,506, for regular benevolences and Centenary \$16,159 an increase in centenary and benevolence of \$5006.

Brethren, we are thankful for what we have been able to accomplish but we cannot and must not be satisfied. While from far and near, we still hear the call of the worlds great need and God's spirit urges us onward; we dare not and will not slack. We must gird ourselves and enter with Him upon the New Year in the mightiest effort of our lives and by His grace prove ourselves worthy of the great task committed to us.

With thanksgiving to God for his protecting care and sincere appreciation to my brethren for their co-operation and prayers,

Under the guiding hand of God we have given ourselves unreservedly to our work during the year, and today we render a concise report of the same.

Our effective ranks have not been broken by death. The Reverend I. H. Johnson, a retired member of the conference went to his eternal reward July 24, 1920; his wife Mrs. Rosena Johnson having preceded him only fourteen days before.

The following persons have been on the sick list sometime during the year: C. T. Covington, J. M. Dickerson, T. W. Cooper, H. C. Snead, Mrs. S. T. Parker, Mrs. I. D. Pitts and Mrs. J. A. Kiah.

As much as we would like to note all the achievements of the district, times admonishes us to make only a brief survey of the outstanding features of the charges.

#### Charges.

COTTAGE GROVE increased the pastor's salary \$200, bringing it up to \$1000; raised \$350 for improvements; \$50.00 on old debts; \$208. for the Centenary and \$44.00 for other benevolences; conversions 32 and accessions 30. M. P. Sterling, pastor.

CRISFIELD—SHILOH, has had a very successful year under the pastoral care of C. S. Sprigg. It has had 41 accessions, more than 25% increase in membership. Raised \$800.00 on improvements; \$553.00 for the Centenary; \$50.00 for Bishop Clair's yacht fund; \$16.00 for Near East; \$15.00 for China relief; other benevolences \$180.00; Total \$814.00.

CRISFIELD—UNION-ASBURY has been blessed with a great revival, 68 conversions; Raised \$348.00 for Centenary; \$53.00 for other benevolences; total \$401.00; \$122.00 for improvements. T. W. Cooper, pastor.

DAMES QUARTER, C. A. Norwood, pastor, reports \$50.00 for the Centenary; \$16.00 for other benevolences. A revival resulted in 86 conversions and 56 accessions.

DEALS ISLAND, notwithstanding the unfavorable industrial conditions there, makes a good report. The pastor, G. W. Joynes and his people have labored hard for a success. They report 28 conversions, 16 accessions; \$150.00 for the Centenary; \$60.00 for other benevolences and \$145.00 for improvements.

DELMAR, with C. T. Covington as pastor continues to advance. Centenary \$125.00; other benevolences \$44.00; paid on improvements \$366.00; conversions 15.

FAIRMOUNT-CENTENNIAL excels last year's report. G. H. Bivins, the supply pastor, deserves great credit for the masterly way he has handled a difficult situation. Raised for the Centenary \$160.00; other benevolences \$40.00; Ministerial support in full; Pastor's salary advanced \$100.00; conversions 24, accessions 16.

FAIRMOUNT—ST. ANDREWS increased it's Centenary offerings over last year. The report shows 213.00 for the Centenary; \$32.00 for other benevolences; \$96.00 for local charities and \$556.00 on old debts; conversions 12, accessions 6. S. T. Parker, pastor.

FRUITLAND has built a new church which is a credit to the conference. The building is of frame construction and when completed will cost \$8000.00. The District Conference will be held in that building next fall. Conversions 32, accessions 25; Centenary \$200.00; other benevolences \$88.00; total \$288.00; Raised on new church \$1786.00. I. D. Pitts, pastor.

GREENWOOD. G. S. Jacobs, pastor, went to this charge last conference under discouraging circumstances, but under his leadership order has been brought out of the chaotic condition and a good year's work is the result. A church has been started in the place of the one torn down, and will be completed this year. Centenary \$180.00; other benevolences \$42.00; accessions 10.

HEBRON, supplied by J. E. Waters, has done well. Ministerial support, centenary and benevolences far in advance of last year. Centenary \$100.00; other benevolences \$40.00; conversions 6, accessions 6.

HOPEWELL has been successfully lead by W. T. Spellman, pastor. The benevolences are quite in advance of last year, Centenary \$225.00; other benevolences \$70.00; conversions 47, accessions 41. The parsonage was improved and \$200.00 paid on same.

HORNTOWN, has taken on new life under the leadership of O. H. Spence. Both of the churches have been repaider and the parsonage painted. Raised for improvements \$443.00; old debts \$242.00; Centenary \$346.00; other benevolences \$40.00; local charities \$173.00; conversions 13, accessions 7.

JAMESTOWN, with O. P. Dickerson as its leader, is proud of it's record this year. A revival stirred the charge resulting in 30 conversions and 5 accessions. A splendid parsonage with 7 rooms has been bought and \$700.00 paid on the same, the balance secured by a mortgage. This property is almost directly in front of the church, on the main road leading from Westover to Fairmount. Centenary \$150.00; other benevolences \$25.00.

KELLER is building two new churches, one is almost completed; we hope to see them both completed early next year. A revival resulted in 53 conversions and 15 accessions. This charge reports \$75.00 for the Centenary, \$42.00 for other benevolences; \$470.00 for old debts and \$376.00 for a new church. H. C. Snead, pastor.

KINGSTON with I. H. Bivins, pastor, has wrought well. This charge reports \$425.00 for the Centenary; \$60.00 for other benevolences, in-

creased pastor's salary \$100.00; \$325.00 for improvements. The charge is spiritually alive, conversions 64, accessions 28.

LEEMONT reports 20 conversions and 20 accessions; \$700.00 paid on indebtedness; \$253.00 on Centenary and \$45.00 for other benevolences. E. E. Rogers, pastor.

LIBERIA, under the leadership of H. R. Purnell, pastor, reports 27 conversions; 9 accessions; \$155.00 raised for building and improvements, old debts \$170.00; \$85.00 for Centenary; other benevolences \$45.00.

MARDELA SPRINGS has beautifully renovated its church at a cost of \$1600.00, and paid \$602.00 on the same; \$130.00 raised for Centenary and \$40.00 for other benevolences; conversions 35; accessions 12. J. W. Bowling, pastor.

MARION STATION. On the 19th of January this charge had the great misfortune of having both its church and its parsonage destroyed by fire. This property was a good one and well insured. The insurance has been paid over to the trustees and if carefully handled will go a long way toward replacing the buildings. The pastor, W. A. T. Miles, was the biggest loser, having lost all of his books, the family most of their clothing and personal effects. Many of the ministers and laymen of the conference, as well as the white and colored citizens of Marion, gave liberally to brother Miles in his distressed condition. Raised for Centenary \$364.00; other benevolences \$87.00; conversions 65; accessions 40.

MOUNT VERNON was blessed with a great revival, 66 conversions; Pastor's salary advanced \$200.00, paid in full; \$600.00 paid on old debts; \$100.00 reported for the Centenary and \$35.00 for other benevolences. R. C. Hughes, pastor.

NANTICOKE. F. G. Campbell was sent to this charge last year and has succeeded grandly. The report shows 25 conversions, 41 accessions, \$254.00 raised for the Centenary; \$90.00 for other benevolences and \$1260.00 raised on the building fund for a new church.

OAKVILLE reports an increase over last year for the Centenary and other benevolences; \$76.00 for Centenary; other benevolences \$27.00; paid \$800.00 on old debts. J. O. Griffin, pastor.

ORIOLE led on by C. W. Shockley as pastor has done well. One church has been rebuilt at a cost of \$2500.00 and \$700.00 paid on the project; \$126.00 raised for Centenary; \$52.00 for other benevolences. A gracious revival resulted in 46 conversions and 40 accessions.

PARSONSBURG is a small station, but is thoroughly organized, hence the report shows every dollar of its apportionment for the Centenary raised in full \$220; other benevolences carefully looked after; 12 conversions, 9 accessions. R. N. Davis, pastor.

POCOMOKE CITY, led by W. R. A. Palmer, has had a record breaking year. The charge is well organized. The spiritual tide has been high the entire year, resulting in 68 conversions and 43 accessions; \$1000.00 paid on old debts, freeing the church; \$1296.00 raised for ministerial support, \$35.00 beyond the estimate; pastor's salary advanced \$100.00; Centenary \$700.00; \$10.00 above the apportionment, other bene-

volences in full, local charities \$150.00; total \$1150.00. Bishops Hamilton and Clair visited this charge during the year and brought helpful messages.

PRINCESS ANNE comes into its very own this year as a leader of the district. There has been a revival in this charge for three months continuously. 164 persons have been converted and the meetings are still in progress. The whole community, including our school, has been stirred as perhaps never before. At the academy on prayer day for colleges, 16 of the students were converted. No wonder the pastor, E. O. Parker, is shouting happy, for in addition to the revival he reports every dollar of his apportionment for Centenary; other benevolences and ministerial support raised in full; Centenary \$841.00; other benevolences in full; total \$1170.00; ministerial support \$1316.00.

QUANTICO. J. A. Kiah the pastor here is steadily leading this charge to the front. Handicapped with a sick wife during the entire year, this pastor brings to the conference what is by far the best report in the history of this charge. 11 conversions, 41 accessions; \$250.00 for the Centenary and more than \$50.00 for other benevolences. The parsonage has been greatly improved and \$734.00 paid on same. The pastor has succeeded in having the deed and title to the church property, which were defective, made secure.

SALISBURY—JOHN WESLEY, the splendid building in which we are now assembled has been renovated and painted throughout, also the parsonage. The total cost \$2000.00, and \$1000.00 has been paid on same; Centenary \$300.00; other benevolences \$171.00; total \$471.00; The pastor's salary was increased \$150.00; Total ministerial support \$1204.00. J. M. Dickerson, pastor.

SALISBURY, WHITE CHAPEL, C. W. Pullett, pastor, has had a successful year. Raised \$105.00 on church improvement; \$104.00 on old debts; advanced pastor's salary \$100.00 making it \$1000.00; Centenary nearly \$200.00, other benevolences \$25.00.

SHARPTOWN reports 7 conversions and 11 accessions; quite an increase in ministerial support; \$100 for Centenary and \$38 for other benevolences. Malachi Rasin, pastor.

UNIONVILLE, under the leadership of G. T. Townsend, again reports victory, surpassing it's fine record of last year. Conversions 41; accessions 10; raised \$225.00 for the Centenary; \$55.00 for other benevolences; \$300.00 for improvements and \$300.00 for old debts.

WACHAPREAGUE has had 18 converts and 18 accessions. Raised \$140.00 for the Centenary; other benevolences \$40.00 and \$270.00 for improvements. W. H. Turner, pastor.

WATTSVILLE. J. S. Coulbourne has again led this charge to victory. Revival fires have burned a good part of the year. Conversions 67, accessions 68. The new church at Atlantic was dedicated this year. The church at Wattsville was renovated at a cost of \$600.00 and the parsonage repaired. \$500.00 paid on the same; nearly \$500.00 has been raised for the Centenary; the total for conference collections \$550; old debts \$1000; local charities \$25.



WETIPQUIN has done well under the leadership of W. W. Brown. Raised for Centenary \$161; other benevolence \$60; ministerial support in full; the home church was improved and \$289 paid on the same; \$80 on old debts; conversions 31, accessions 12.

WHITE HAVEN with Roswell Waters pastor exceeds the fine report of last year. One church has been improved with a modern lighting system and painted throughout. \$313.00 raised for old debts; \$166.00 for improvements; \$125.00 for Centenary and \$55.00 for other benevolences; conversions 16, accessions 16.

WITHAMS, spiritually alive, has been victoriously led by J. R. Purnell. A great revival resulted in 85 conversions and 3 accessions. The church and parsonage property has been greatly improved and \$750.00 raised on same; \$251.00 paid on old debts; \$198.00 for Centenary; \$59.00 for other benevolences and \$94.00 for local charities; ministerial support paid in full, \$1130.00.

#### Mission Points.

LEATHERBERRY CHAPEL, just outside the corporate limits of Salisbury, is in a good section and is growing. The membership has been increased by 14 accessions; conversions 8; raised \$40.00 for Centenary and \$20.00 for other benevolences. Supplied by L. W. Pinket, pastor.

PORTSVILLE supplied by J. J. Mitchell continues to make progress. Increased pastor's salary and raised \$55.00 for Centenary and other benevolences.

#### Ministerial Support.

The campaign for more adequate support for our ministry started four years ago continues to bear fruit. Increasingly the laity is awaking as any other person, can never render his best service when he must incessantly tax his brain to find ways and means to make his meagre salary cancel the cost of living. Really, the sacrifice in some of our parsonages is remarkable. This campaign must be waged until no married man in this conference receives less than a thousand dollars salary. To our appeal the Quarterly conferences of the Salisbury District have responded nobly and their answer this year is a total increase of \$5,650.00.

The reports show that the support for bishops and district superintendents have carefully looked after, but some pastors and stewards still seem inclined to disregard the rights of the conference claimants. It does not look well for a charge to report all other ministerial support in full, but a deficiency for the worn out preacher. Brethren, "Are we not tending upward too, as fast as time can move"?

#### District Activities.

Our district is thoroughly organized under the group system and the friendly rivalry engendered among the different groups has been fruitful of splendid results, spiritually and financially.



### The Monthly Preachers' Meeting.

The monthly preachers' meeting, upon invitation, rotates among the charges. These meetings are hailed by the people in the rural sections with spiritual eagerness and great delight. They have been a vitalizing force in many of our churches and some of our most sweeping revivals are traceable to this effective organization of the district.

The Sunday School and Epworth League Convention held at White Chapel, this city, was largely attended and up to a high standard of efficiency. The addresses of Doctors Kiah and O'Connell were highly instructive and inspirational.

At the District Conference at Pocomoke City we were favored with the presence of Bishop M. W. Clair of Liberia, Africa, Doctor L. C. Murdock, our Area Secretary and all of our colleagues in the superintendency. All these brethren in the delivery of their strong messages seemed to be especially endowed for the occasion.

### Education.

The public schools are in the business of training our children for useful citizenship and yet the salaries offered by the state for teaching is often far below the wages of an unskilled laborer or a house servant. There are persons employed as teachers in the public schools for our race within the limits of the Salisbury District who receive from the state less than thirty dollars a month for their services. In charges like Wattsville, Withams, Leemont and Keller, money that would have been paid for Centenary and other benevolences has gone to supplement the meagre salaries of teachers, the servants of the state. Wattsville alone has paid \$260.00 this year for that purpose. The result of this policy upon the part of the state—and this applies to both Maryland and Virginia—is untrained and incompetent individuals in our schools who are a menace to the mental development of the childhood of the race. The one bright star in our educational firmament is our own.

### Princess Anne Academy.

The work at PRINCESS ANNE ACADEMY shows constant improvement. Principal T. H. Kiah reports that this year is the most pleasant of his eleven years' experience as principal of the school. He has an efficient corps of teachers and a loyal and faithful body of students.

The religious fervor of the school is up to the usual standard. The week and Day of Prayer services resulted into 16 conversions. The Rev. George T. Fields, of Haven M. E. Church, Wilmington, preached the annual Day of Prayer sermon. It was a masterful and convincing discourse. Rev. E. O. Parker, pastor of Metropolitan M. E. Church, Princess Anne, Principal T. H. Kiah, and the district superintendent of the Salisbury District assisted in the services.

Although the school is badly in need of an administration building, considerable relief was obtained last fall, when the State erected a portable building to be used as class rooms. This building was used as a Y. M. C. A. hut at one of the camps in the World War. It was arranged into four class rooms by the students in the carpentry department, under the direction of the instructor in that department, Mr. Lewis B. Willfs.

The greatest need of the school is a dormitory for boys. The present building occupied by the boys has been in use for more than thirty years, and has long since outlived its period of usefulness. It is hoped that this grave situation will be remedied soon. It must be remedied. I appeal to the ministers and laymen of the Delaware Conference to rally to this urgent call. This is our school; these are our boys and girls. Upon them rests the future of our church, our homes, our government.

PRINCESS ANNE ACADEMY is doing a great work, and commends the hearty support of the Conference of which it is a part.

#### Evangelism.

An intensive evangelistic campaign has been conducted throughout the district. Firmly convinced that the pastors are their own best evangelists we have encouraged and advocated pastoral evangelism. The result is the evangelistic spirit has so permeated the district that almost every charge has had a revival resulting in quickened congregations, hundreds of saved souls and a religious atmosphere in many communities hitherto spiritually decadent.

#### Conclusion.

I am profoundly conscious that my own contribution to this splendid result is small. Great credit is due to the thirty-nine pastors of the district, together with their self-sacrificing wives and loyal people. I have, simply as an orderly, carried the message of encouragement and good cheer, which have, from time to time, been sent down, through me, by the consecrated leaders of our great church, to these heroic soldiers of the Cross in the thick of the fight. Impelled by the highest motives, and obeying our Supreme General's command, "On to victory", we rejoice to report to you today from our small division of the great field 1348 conversions, 355 accessions; Centenary Offerings \$9620; other benevolences \$2040; ministerial Support \$38986; old indebtedness \$10508 and building and improvements \$13960.

With due appreciation of the kindness of my comrades in the cause of our Christ, and gratefully acknowledging the loving care and guidance of my Heavenly Father, this report is respectfully submitted.

## SOUTH PHILADELPHIA DISTRICT.

Bishop and Brethren:—

Forward has been our watchword. No difficulties, no obstacles, no hardships have otered us. Like David Livingston our prayer has been, "Anywhere, Lord, only let it be forward."

Our effective ranks remain unbroken. God be praised. Our retired brother the late Rev. F. J. Lee who had answered to this Conference's Annual roll call fifty-one times, left us for his heavenly home October 28, 1920. His was a beautiful, useful, inspiring christian life. A suitable memoir has been prepared.

I. J. Brittingham was taken suddenly ill on December 12th, 1920 and has been unable since to carry on his work but is now greatly improved and is on the road to complete recovery.

The veteran L. Y. Cox having past his eighty-first birthday is confined to his room helpless, but rejoices in the hope set before him in Christ Jesus our Lord.

While the district has not accomplished all I desired, I am thankful to report some achievement.

BUTTONWOOD CIRCUIT with L. T. Robbins pastor, has paid \$650 on old indebtedness; 525 for improvements beautifying the property at Christiana and installing electric lights in the Buttonwood church. The Centenary and other collections have been increased 100 per cent and the pastor's salary increased \$400. 35 conversions, 20 accessions.

CAPE MAY reports \$1004 spent on improvements; \$515 on old indebtedness; \$200 advance in pastor's salary. Centenary increased over last year and all other collections in full. H. T. Johnson, pastor.

CHESTER—ST. DANIELS, with W. J. L. Hughes, pastor is a live church in a congested Negro section. It is completely organized according to the unit system and has 122 tithing stewards.

The Board of Home Mission and Church Extension has come to our assistance here by giving an appropriation toward the support of a woman worker and \$6000 towards enlarging our plant to serve this community's social needs. The trained christian woman worker is Mrs. E. P. Thomas who is a live wire. Both pastor and woman worker are brimful of holy enthusiasm and consecrated common sense. The Sunday School has been standardized and is in the process of being graded. All the classes are thoroughly organized and the average attendance is increasingly large. Two suburban mission Sunday Schools have been organized; one at Twin Oaks with an enrollment of twenty and the other at Village Green with an enrollment of fifteen.

The Epworth League and the Junior League have taken on new life. The Junior League is receiving graded religious instruction and has an average attendance of 100.

This charge reports 58 conversions; 75 accessions; \$7500 paid on building and improvements; \$500 on old indebtedness and \$1600 for the Centenary besides all other collections in full. It remains in the Honor Class. Raised for all purposes \$11,000.

CHESTER—SILOAM is spiritually awake and has had 20 conversions and 23 accessions and a growing congregation and has paid \$840 for improvements. It remains on the Honor Roll having again raised the full quota for the Centenary and other Benevolent collections besides all the other Conference collections in full. Raised for all purposes \$4600. Sydney Emptage, pastor.

CHESWOLD, with R. B. Thompson pastor has advanced in Sunday School and Epworth League work. Day Bible Schools are maintained at each appointment on this circuit. Raised for the Centenary \$155; 5 conversions, 5 accessions.

COKESBURY has increased the pastor's salary \$50 and advanced the Benevolent collections. Raised for the Centenary \$75; conversions 6; accessions 8. F. L. Tomlinson, pastor.

COLEMAN with W. C. Bowland pastor has spent \$398 for improvement and has fitted up their community hall. Conversions 14, accessions 14; Raised for Centenary and other Disciplinary Benevolent collections \$265. This charge has made a ten per cent net gain in membership and \$150 advance in pastor's salary.

DELAWARE CITY has had a year of advance. 9 accessions, Centenary and other Benevolent collections are more than three times as much as that of last year \$202; Pastor's salary advanced \$400. E. B. Green, pastor.

DOVER with L. S. Moore pastor reports 14 conversions; 16 accessions; \$149 paid on improvements; \$296 on old indebtedness, and raised for Centenary and other Collections \$584, every apportionment in full and goes on the Honor Roll.

DOVER CIRCUIT, notwithstanding the illness of the pastor, I. J. Brittingham since Dec. 12th, 1920 makes a good report. Conversions 10, accessions 8; Centenary and other Benevolent collections in advance of last year.

GALENA has paid \$450 on old indebtedness clearing the Circuit of debt; \$125 for improvements and advanced the Benevolent collections. Raised for Centenary alone \$325; 27 conversions and 27 accessions. T. E. Randall, pastor.

MIDDLETOWN with J. L. Parker pastor has had 5 conversions; 5 accessions; paid \$118 on old indebtedness and increased the Centenary and other Benevolent collections; Raised for Centenary \$185.

NEW CASTLE has had a great spiritual awakening and reports 72 conversions, 69 accessions; \$1325 on old indebtedness; \$125 on improvements; \$200 on increase in pastor's salary, and nearly 100 per cent advance in Centenary \$279 and other Benevolent collections in full. J. L. Taylor, pastor.

NEWPORT with J. H. Stevenson pastor has had 7 conversions; 23 accessions; paid \$300 on improvements and has advanced the Centenary and Benevolent collections.

OCEAN CITY, a summer appointment supplied by D. L. Ridout, reports the full quota for Centenary and all other Benevolent and Conference collections raised and all current expenses met.

ODESSA with M. H. Murphy pastor goes on the Honor Roll. \$315 for Centenary and Disciplinary Benevolences. All apportionment met in full and the pastor's salary increased by \$200. Conversions 6; accessions 9.

EAST CALVARY has had 400 conversions; 543 accessions; has paid for improvements \$2517; for old indebtedness \$24,519; for the Centenary and other Disciplinary collection \$5620 beside other Conference Collections raised in full. This charge is thoroughly organized. It has 500 tithing stewards; it has raised for all purposes over \$45,000. C. A. Tindley, pastor.

MACEDONIA with J. L. Davis pastor has struggled manfully and reports 8 conversions; 22 accessions and the Centenary and all other Benevolent apportionments raised in full.

ST. PAUL, in spite of serious handicaps has succeeded and reports 8 conversions and 8 accessions and the Benevolent collections raised. J. E. Dennis, pastor.

PORT DEPOSIT with W. B. Whittington pastor reports \$172 paid on old indebtedness and \$50 raised on the Centenary.

PORT PENN with K. S. Stewart pastor has had 18 conversions; 16 accessions; \$321 paid on old indebtedness; \$248 on the Centenary the full quota, other collections raised in full and the pastor's salary advanced.

SASSAFRAS has spent \$350 on improvements; advanced the pastor's salary by \$150 and raised for Centenary \$322 and other collections in full. Conversions 35; accessions 35. W. C. West, pastor.

SMYRNA with J. W. Gillis pastor has had a revival and reports 38 conversions and 38 accessions; \$500 paid on improvements; \$328 on old indebtedness; \$300 for the Centenary besides raising the other Benevolent collections, and \$500 advance on the pastor's salary.

STILL POND reports 12 conversions and 12 accessions and the pastor's salary advanced by \$250 and \$180 paid on improvements. P. W. Price, pastor.

SWAINTON with L. W. Deakins pastor reports \$141 paid on old indebtedness and an advance on the pastor's salary.

TOWNSEND has had 20 conversions and 8 accessions; paid \$100 on improvements and \$209 on Centenary and made \$275 advance on pastor's salary. A. A. McDowell, pastor.

EAST WILMINGTON with R. H. Coleman pastor reports Benevolent collections raised in part.

EZION reports \$5000 paid for improvements. A new electric pipe organ has been installed at the cost of \$4200 and paid for. Quota \$2106 for the Centenary and all the other Benevolent and conference collections amounting to \$2512 are raised in full. 40 conversions and 50 accessions. J. U. King, pastor.

HAVEN with G. T. Fields pastor has had 24 conversions and 30 accessions; paid \$525 on improvements and \$200 on old indebtedness and \$300 for Centenary.

MT. JOY has the distinction of being the first charge on the district



to raise and pay its full quota (\$691) for Centenary. It was sent in not later than the beginning of the second quarter. All other collections raised in full and Mt. Joy remains on the Honor Roll. 16 conversions and 19 accessions. J. W. Bond pastor.

WOODBURY with J. W. Parker pastor has had a record breaking success. The church at Woodbury has been remodeled and enlarged, a basement built under it and a pipeless heater installed. The audience room has been beautified and refurnished. \$1423 has been raised for improvements and \$206 paid on old indebtedness. Pastor's salary has increased from \$600 to \$1092. Quota for Centenary and all other collections have been raised in full. This charge goes on Honor Roll.

These 31 charges report 917 conversions, and 1100 accessions, They are all organized into classes or units.

#### Evangelism.

The work of Evangelism has been prosecuted. The forward program of the Church has been stressed. Some pastors have the passion for saving folks and setting others to work at the same business. They are instant in season and out of season. They believe the one business of the Methodist preacher is to save souls. They are in dead earnest. They never fail to have results. May their tribe increase.

Through the unit system we have been trying to get every layman to be an intercessor praying for others and a worker using every means the Spirit may suggest to win disciples for our Lord.

#### Conservation.

Holding those we bring into the church is of great importance. These converts are not to be let alone. They must not be allowed to drift. They are to be trained and developed into full grown christians. They are to learn by doing. They are to live like Christ lived and for the motive for which he lived, namely, to do the will of our Father who is in heaven.

The churches who teach systematically and inspire their people to love and serve, sacrifice and give, are holding them.

This district has made a net gain of over ten percent in full membership.

#### Benevolent Collections.

Early and late the churches have been entreated to raise their quota for the Centenary and other Disciplinary Benevolent Collections. The reports will show the district has raised over \$16,000 for these collections which is 80 per cent of its quota.

One of the by-products of this intensive campaign has been the effect it has had on the local budget. Never before have the people given more largely or more systematically to carry on the work of the local churches. The declaration of Christ has been demonstrated: "Give and it shall be given unto you: good measure, press down and shaken together and running over."



### Ministerial Support.

There has been increase in pastors' support amounting to \$4700, an average of fifteen percent. 27 out of 31 charges made advance.

Most of the Quarterly Conferences readily agreed to increase the pastor's salary. The people have responded with prompt payment. There is need however, for further advance. The pastors are still inadequately supported. The increase in the cost of living is in advance of the increase in support of pastors.

An increased amount has been raised for the support of Conference Claimants. Pastors and people are learning the law of our Church. The retired ministers, widows, and children of deceased members of the Conference have legal claims which are required to be raised in proportion as the pastor's salary and other ministerial support are raised. This ought not to be confused with the Benevolent collections. The stewards are required by the Discipline to provide to meet these claims just the same as for the claim of the pastor. In every case where the law is observed, the reports show the apportioned fully met.

The time is come when we must see to it that the Conference Claimants receive 100 percent on every dollar of their claim.

### Christian Stewardship.

If our churches are to keep up the present rate of giving, if they are to fulfill their pledges for the Centenary, if they are to deal fairly with the pastors who serve them in spiritual things, if they are to give the veteran, the widow and the orphan their claim, if they are to bind upon the broken-hearted, care for the helpless, heal the sick and thus advance the kingdom of our Lord, they must teach and practice Christian Stewardship.

The church that neglects this will always be singing, "And shall we ever live at this poor dying rate." Put on, keep on this campaign until the members of our churches, not in word and in tongue but in deed and in truth, become real partners with God.

### District Conventions.

A District Epworth League and Sunday School Convention was held in Dover, Del. June 16th and 17th, 1920 and was largely attended. It gave needed stimulus to our work.

For a week beginning August 3rd, a District Chautauqua and Camp Meeting was held in a grove adjacent to Delaware State College for Colored students. It was a summer institute for preachers. Though a humble beginning, those who attended expressed themselves as much benefited. Drs. F. J. Handy, A. G. Henry and W. C. Jason gave us valuable aid.

Plans have been formed by which we hope to interest the whole Conference, especially the Board of Examiners and the undergraduates. We

should like them to hold their annual mid-year institute at this place. Dr. W. C. Jason by his generosity has made this possible.

Our District Conference was held Oct. 19th, 20th and 21st, at Smyrna, Del. and was well attended by the pastors and representative Laymen from each charge. Dr. L. C. Murdock, Area Secretary, and my colleagues, District Superintendents Hargis, Wallace, Fletcher and Jewet stirred the Conference with inspiring addresses.

#### Delaware State College for Colored Students.

The Delaware State College for Colored Students located near Dover, Del., which has for its president, Dr. W. C. Jason, a member of this Conference, is largely attended and doing good work with a prospect of increased facilities. It has a strong, progressive faculty and deserves the hearty co-operation and support of all our people in the State of Delaware.

#### Conclusion.

The whole year has been spent in strenuous effort to forward the interest of the Kingdom. I am thankful for God's blessings and the hearty co-operation of my brethren of the ministry and of the laity.

This my second annual report is respectfully submitted.

#### REPORT OF COMMITTEE TO VISIT PRINCESS ANNE ACADEMY.

The Committee raised by the Annual Conference to visit Princess Anne Academy, arrived on the grounds at the noon hour Wednesday, March the 8th, under the faithful guidance of Princess Anne's congenial pastor, the Rev. E. O. Parker. Those familiar with the hospitality of the present administration, know the fortune of a hungry preacher arriving at these quarters at noon tide. Close to two hundred pupils were assembled for the midday meal, together with a most efficient corps of teachers. The first impression forced upon you was: An unavoidable sense of long practiced, and unusually natural, discipline and decorum. Perfect precision as to time, and place, and manner, and method, was strictly observed. The two hundred were in the hands of the dining room matron, as one person.

Upon visiting class room, shop, dormitory or chapel, that same sense of discipline and decorum, pervaded, voluntarily. If the object of education is conduct, and if conduct is the art of living—concretely and actually—you must observe at a mere glance, that here the fundamentals of education are effectively exhaled.

Whether dealing with the sciences, arts, the industries, or what not, the pupil is required to actually demonstrate his or her knowledge of the subject studied. In the printshop, at the forge, on the farm, at the bench, in the class room, with needle or with frying pan, this art of compelling the hand to execute what the mind decrees, is an actuality.

The crowning exercises of the day came 5 P. M. at the chapel. Here prayers were said, Scripture read, declamations rendered, addresses from visitors, indulged, and Oh, the singing! It was worth the trip to hear that singing. They sing the plantation melodies here, spontaneous and natural

Around the whole shed a mystery inexplicable. For I looked for a conspicuous hand to direct these most stupendous and significant proceedings, and it was impossible to locate it. But we know it was there. And, the absolute perfect harmony that prevailed between that most capable principal and his faculty, explained it all.

As we viewed and reviewed the situation, this overwhelming truth possessed us: What a mighty change the years have wrought at Princess Anne Academy! A few years back, our problem was: How shall we turn the stream of youth to our school? How shall we fill our educational halls with eager youths to be taught? Today our problem is: How shall we provide halls enough for those who are desirous to fill them? Two hundred at Princess Anne, but as many more turned away because of inadequate accommodations and housing facilities. On one hand we saw young, anxious, pulsating and overflowing life, pleading for a real chance to expand and grow; On the other hand we saw, cramped, limited, outgrown and antiquated housing facilities, forbidding growth. Everything too small to accommodate this growing and expanding life.

The present administration building is a mere improvised temporary shed—a sorry makeshift. The chapel long since outgrown, ceases to offer any inspiration, for youthful aspiration. And the boys, who heroically voted unanimously that the girls should have the first consideration in dormitory accommodations, are suffering untold disadvantages while they patiently wait—and dream. The good God has brought us now to a place where we cannot stay. We must advance, or retreat. Do more, or stop doing at all. We ought to decide at once that we will go forward with a forward going God, and do the things that must of necessity be done for a more capable Princess Anne Academy.

### MEMOIRS.

REV. I. H. JOHNSON.

The Rev. Isaiah H. Johnson was born at Barclay, Queen Annes County, Maryland, January the twelfth, eighteen-fifty-one (Jan. 12th, 1851) and died July the twenty-fourth, nineteen-twenty (July 24th, 1920). He was the son of Isaiah H. and Lucy Anne Johnson who were honored members of the M. E. Church. He was converted while young and joined the M. E. Church at his home. He received his early training in the public school. After being called to the ministry, he further equipped himself for the work by taking a course at the Biblical Institute now known as Morgan College at Baltimore, Maryland. He joined the Delaware Conference in the year of 1881 and was ordained elder in 1884 at the session in Philadelphia, Pa. by Bishop Stephen H. Merril. He served the following appointments:

Frankford, Pa., 2 yrs.; Stockton, Md., 2 yrs.; Salisbury Circuit, Md., 1 yr.; Lewes, Del., 1 yr.; Church Creek, Md., 3 yrs.; Lee Mount, Va., 1 yr.; Seaford, Del., 2 yrs.; Fairlee, Md., 2 yrs.; Royal Oak, Md., 3 yrs.; Camden, Del., 2 yrs.; Kingston, Md., 2 yrs.; Deals Island, Md., 1 yr.; Sassafras, Md., 2 yrs.; Odessa, Del., 3 yrs.; Port Deposit, Md., 2 yrs.; Burlington, N. J., 2 yrs.; White Haven, Md., 2 yrs.; Oriole, Md., 2 yrs.; Retired in 1916 because of ill-health. He requested and was granted a supernumerary relation. At all of his appointments he was noted as an earnest enthusiastic preacher and a faithful and diligent pastor. He was a man of amiable disposition, fiery zeal and intense devotion. He always showed great ability in bringing things to pass. He had an unswerving faith in the power of the Gospel to save. After retiring from the conference he resided at his home near Pocomoke City, Md., and attended Unionville Church. In 1884 Miss Rosena F. Waters passed away only sixteen days before he received his summons to meet the Kong on high. He leaves three children (one daughter and two sons) two brothers, one sister and six grandchildren to mourn his loss. His funeral was preached by Rev. G. T. Townsend, pastor of Unionville Church assisted by Revs. W. R. A. Palmer, Rev. J. W. Jewett D.S. and Rev. G. S. Jacobs. His remains were deposited in the Trinity Cemetery, Unionville, Md., to await the summon of the General Resurrection.

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### JOHN HENRY HARMAN.

John Henry Harman, was born of good old Methodist stock, his father Edward Harman was one of the best known, as well as one of the best informed local preachers of this peninsula. His mother was the granddaughter of Joseph Whittington, the first pastor of Ezion Methodist Episcopal Church of Wilmington, Delaware.

He was born April 4th, 1848 at Girdletree, Maryland, and departed this life July 27, 1920. His early christian training brought him into the church when quite young, he was converted at eleven years of age in Ebenezer Methodist Episcopal Church, Snow Hill, Md. He was very studious and took advantage of every opportunity to acquire knowledge.

On October 15, 1867 brother Harman was married to Miss Sarah Maria Parker, she became a leader among women of the charges he served and contributed largely to his success in the ministry, she was interested in everything which made for success, she was true and loyal to him during his illness, and administered to his necessities with fondest love and patience. After his marriage he moved to Baltimore, here he joined the Asbury M. E. Church. The pastor of that church soon discovered in young Harman the qualities of leadership, and appointed him a class leader, he also filled the positions of steward and Sunday School Superintendent, it was at this church he was licensed to preach.

Brother Harman returned and taught school in his home county, it was from this position he was called by the late John H. Holland who was Presiding Elder of the Sallsbury District, to take charge of Vienna charge, the following year he joined the Delaware Conference and served the following charges:

Vienna, Md., 2 yrs.; Madison, Md., 4 yrs.; East New Market, Md., 2 yrs.; Odessa, Del., 2 yrs.; Mt. Joy, Wilmington, Del., 3 yrs.; New Castle, Del., 2 yrs.; Merchantville, N. J., 2 yrs.; Crisfield, Md., 5 yrs.; McDaniel, Md., 3 yrs.; Oxford, Md., 2 yrs.; Milford, Del., 2 yrs.; Seaford, Del., 3 yrs.; Vienna, second time, 2 yrs.; Retired at Berlin, Md. in 1917. In June 1918 he was appointed to supply Sinepuxent charge. He served this charge about two years, then he was appointed to supply East New Market for the second time. He had served nearly four months when he was called from labor to his reward. Funeral services were held at his former home Girdletree, Md., conducted by his District Superintendent Dr. David H. Hargis, assisted by C. W. Pullett, J. L. Nichols, L. H. Martin, M. W. Clark, W. E. Hilton, W. J. Helm, D. S. Quillen and E. F. Showell.

When the roll was called today I felt like rising and saying what was said of another in that beautiful story by Bishop Berry in the Christian Advocate of Feb. 24th. "Never mind about John Harman he has got his crown."

I know John Harman he was a christian gentleman of the old school. A hard worker, a safe and sound gospel preacher. There are some great monuments to his memory, but I will only mention one viz.—that beautiful structure Shiloh church, Crisfield, Md. It was a great undertaking to attempt to build at that time. It required much faith, but God was with him, and the work was accomplished.

There are some lives which disappoint us, some impressions of character, which have to be revised in later years, and some times reversed, but not so in the case of John Henry Harman. The good impression I formed of him years ago have continued through, unchanged to the very end of his life. I have known him from the beginning of his ministerial life. I do not mean a passing acquaintance, but a close personal familiar

acquaintance. We kept up correspondence during all these years, until the day he died, yes, he wrote me on the very day he died.

Permit me to give a few quotations from letters received from him. I have one here in which he writes me saying, "We can not be in the conference a great while longer, that is to say the time will seem short, then we will go where sorrow never comes. Only a little longer now and we will reach home to meet our loved ones who are waiting for us, yes, father, mother, sisters and brothers and old friends, O, that will be a happy meeting when we shall meet to part no more. It seems to me that the joy will be that we have conquered in this earthly combat.

I quote him from another letter. "It will not be long before I must lay off, but brother I intend to have the victory, yes, I have it now. While I feel the weight of years and my physical forces failing me, I am full of joy, my soul goes out on the wings of faith, so that some times I feel that I am almost close enough to speak to our departed loved ones. But not quite yet, but it will be soon. I am sure it will be pleasant when the days work is done, and we get home to rest. Now Dear Brother Waters if it be that you and I shall meet no more and I shall fall first, come on up home where Christ has gone to prepare a place for us—I'll be there—but should you go and get there before I do, you will not have to wait long for I will be there soon. He writes me from the Cambridge hospital, closing his letter by saying "He is with me all the time, and he closed his letter written on the day of his death, my saying "I thank the Lord He has been with me through it all, and He still is with me. John Henry Harman died well.

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REV. FREDERICK JOSHUA LEE.

The Rev. Frederick Joshua Lee, the son of the late Exus and Sarah Lee was born on Kent Island, Kent County, Md., May 15th, 1840. Early in the morning of October 28, 1920, he passed out of a room, where the air was heavy with opiates into an atmosphere exhilarant, and from a body painstruck into conditions rubicund with health immortal. He has become one of the inhabitants of heaven—deathless as God is deathless—never to know pain or sickness, or suffering, or sorrow except as a vivid reminiscence.

In the days of his youth, he became a christian and connected him-





He received his education in the Public Schools in his own town and Princess Anne Academy. At the early age of 12, he experienced his second birth. Passing thru the regular routine of his local Church, he became an acceptable local preacher.

During the Presiding Eldership of the late I. H. White, he supplied Snow Hill Circuit and filled the unexpired year of the late Rev. Noah Morris at Crisfield, Md. He joined the Delaware Conference in 1886, at John Wesley, Salisbury, Md., the late Bishop Randolph S. Foster, presided.

Bro. Toulson was an earnest and enthusiastic worker. He was always anxious to excel. He served very acceptably, Oriole, Md., 2 yrs.; Leemont, Va., 2 yrs.; Pomona, Md.; 5 years; Royal Oak, Md., 4 yrs.; Linkwood, Md., 4 yrs.; Marion, Md., 6 yrs.; Townsend, Del., 3 yrs.; Galena, Md., 4 yrs.; and was closing his 3rd year at Hurlock, Md.

While it is almost impossible to say just when and where a Minister does his best work spiritually yet from all human discernment the indications are that he excelled at least in these Charges: Leemont, Royal Oak, Marion, Townsend, Galena and Hurlock. At the first four charges he built Modern Churches that would do credit to any community. At Galena he cancelled a large Mortgage Debt of long standing. The Hurlock Charge has steadily advanced both financially and spiritually—reaching its acme during the third year of his inspiring leadership.

He was very polite, dignified and brotherly. Therefore he was generally beliked by the brethren of the Conference and beloved by his parishioners.

He was treasurer of the Annual Conference Board of Stewards. He was a zealous evangelistic preacher. His pastorates were usually blessed with revivals.

Upon returning from the last session of the Annual Conference, he was indisposed for three weeks. After this he showed signs of failing health but never relinquished his work until Sunday, Nov. 14th, 1920. He planned and directed the work thru the local forces evincing a deep interest until the end. Nature having endowed him with a strong physique and an indomitable will he was optimistic as to his recovery and his ability to continue in the active work until last week, Feb. 14th, when he decided to take the retired relations.

The last Sunday he lived, although gloom to many, was a day of rejoicing for him. "Said he, "Wife, I have never failed in my Ministry, I have made adequate provision for your comfort. I feel I have done my duty. I am now waiting for the Master." On Monday he grew worse. Monday night he was in a semi-conscious condition and preached to the end. His last audible words—"The Church must be clean if it hopes to keep the Spirit of the Lord Jesus Christ."

April 20th, 1905 he was united in the bonds of Matrimony to Mrs. Ella Gertrude Ambush, of Baltimore. She was a very valuable asset to him during his Ministry. Her love, care and devotion to him during his illness may be equaled but cannot be surpassed.

He leaves to mourn their lost, besides his loving wife and adopted daughter, Mrs. Eunice L. Jackson, a nephew, Philmore Toulson and many other relatives and friends.

"It is not death to die,

virtuous character is the greating thing in the world; and taught them to remember their Creator in the days of their youth.

Indeed, so exclusive was the Christian home in which Mrs. Nelson was raised that it was singled out as the model home of that neighborhood, which distinction it still retains.

As might be expected, at an early age, little Lillian gave her tender heart to God.

She graduated from the Armstrong High School of Richmond, Va., in June, 1903, with all the honors that a school girl could wish.

Feeling that she could be of most service to her people in instructing the young, she began teaching as soon as practible after her graduation, filling with utmost satisfaction several positions in the rural districts of Virginia.

She possessed a retiring, yet magnetic disposition which was loving and compelling. Her pupils were, therefore, irresistibly drawn to her in whom they soon discovered tenderness, ability, and interest. Her love for her pupils did not cease on Friday, but every Sunday morning found her in Sunday School still leading her little ones onward and upward.

In June, 1918, Rev. Wm. B. Nelson was fortunate enough to meet Miss Lillian Brock. Each saw in the other admirable and dependable qualities. An intimate friendship was established, which resulted in their marriage on October 9, 1918, at her mother's beautiful home in Richmond, Va.

Thus she relinquished her successful career as a teacher to adorn a parsonage. The writer is happy to state that she did not merely adorn, but she kept, and blessed, and inspired the parsonage; for she proved an ideal preacher's wife. It is hard to estimate how much of her husband's success as pastor at White Plains, N. Y. and again at Salem, N. J. was due to her Christian fearlessness, her unselfish devotion, and her helpful suggestions. She developed to a remarkable degree the ability to make and keep friends.

She labored nobly and vallantly with her husband for seventeen months at White Plains, N. Y. and for six months at Salem, N. J. Her life was exemplary in both charges.

The summons came early on September 21, 1920, but before answering it she charged her husband about 'bringing up her only son (only 8 days old) in the fear of the Lord; she also took time to inquire how the work on the new building was progressing—so interested was she in her husband's success. She then sang "I'm a Child of the King" and gave up the ghost at 4.30 p. m. (on Sept. 21, 1920).

She is survived by her husband, an infant son, a mother, and four sisters.

Funeral services were held at her home church in Richmond, Va., and interment in the family plot at Evergreen Cemetery.

So profound has been the impression made upon the husband during twenty-three months of matrimonial bliss by one so noble, so unselfish, so virtuous that he has resolved with the Moabitess: "Her people shall be my people, and where she is buried, there will I be buried."
