# Report of District Superintendents

## DOVER DISTRICT

Bishop Shaw, Members of the Conference and visiting friends, I am happy to present this my second Annual Report of the Dover District. The district has an area of 90 miles from the north to the southern end at Newark, Md. and 120 miles from Rehoboth on the east to Port Deposit on the west. So you see I have quite a large area.

I have by the help of the Lord been able to make the round four times visiting most every charge. I ask the Lord to go before me and behind me and protect me from accidents and injuring others; to preserve me in health and strength of body and mind for my task and He has heard my prayers.

I have spent another pleasant year of my ministry on the Dover District working with the ministers, their wives and the good laymen. Peace and harmony prevailed throughout the District. There was a fine spirit of cooperation in helping me put over the program of the District. I did not attempt to drive them out to lead them and they followed. Our motto was "Christ First." This is the result of the fine reports from the charges which you will hear later.

### Progress

I am happy to note some progress made on the District this year. Revivals have been conducted in many charges with some degree of success. Some made the evangelistic appeal each Sunday which resulted into conversions and additions to the churches.

Improvements have been made on church property. Mortgages and floating debts paid off and reduced greatly. The financial condition of the District has greatly advanced. Pastors' salaries have been increased in many cases and waiting to increase the District Superintendent's salary, keeping in harmony with the high cost of living. Nearly all the pastors are invited to return, while some have their faces turned toward Philadelphia, the Jerusalem.

The old District Parsonage at Bridgeville, Del. was sold for \$1000 cash and the proceeds were divided proportionately between the participating districts, namely Dover, Easton and Salisbury. We have now a nest egg of \$406.50 on a District Parsonage building fund which we hope to add to yearly, until we are able to build a parsonage.

There are two abandoned churches on the district for sale, namely Bell Chapel near Dover and Ingleside Church near Barkley, as soon as the Conference Trustee can arrange for the sale, some one would like to purchase them.

### District Activities

Bishop Shaw in the midst of a busy life found time to visit a number of charges on the district and delivered soul stirring messages.

We were pleased to have Dr. J. W. Golden, the Central Jurisdictional Secretary of the Commission on Evangelism visit our district at Chestertown

and Milford. He inspired us with his new approach to evangelism. He taught the lukewarm Christians how they might become soul winners.

We are grateful to Dr. J. T. Fletcher for the inspiration and help he gave the ministers in paying off old indebtedness with the Board of Home Mission and Church Extensions as well as recommending loans and donations toward the erection of a new church and aiding others in meeting pressing obligations.

We are no less grateful to Dr. F. J. Handy, the Conference Director of Religious Education, the District and Conference Directors, for the work accomplished in Religious Education. We have been greatly handicapped in the work of the District because of the gas shortage.

The following district meetings were held: District Steward Meeting, Methodist Youth Fellowship Institute, The Caravan, the Women's Society of Christian Service, Ministers' Wives Association, District Missionary Meeting, Laymen Association, the Preachers' Meeting and the Efficiency Conference held at Bridgeville, Del., March 6th. It was largely attended and enjoyed by all.

It was a pleasure to greet each other at the Preachers' Meeting after having been apart for two months. It was like a reunion. All of these meetings were helpful socially and spiritually.

On November 12, the District Lay Activities Conference at Greensboro, Md., J. O. Griffith, pastor. The District Missionary Institute at Replanted Zion Church, Ridgely, Md., L. F. Hodges, pastor. brought highly illuminating messages: The Reverends O. P. Jefferson, C. S. Jarvis, H. Kirby Kran, and Dr. J. Earle Cummings, District Superintendent. All of the Peninsula Conference, Methodist Church; the Rev. H. E. Nichols, of the A. M. E. Church, Principal W. H. Fauntleroy, Supervisor of Colored Schools of Talbot County, Dr. F. J. Handy, Executive Secretary of Christian Education, Delaware Conference, Dr. J. J. Seabrook, Director Morgan Christian Center; Mrs. J. O. Miller, Philanthropist of Pittsburgh, Pa., His Honor, Mayor William Horney of Centreville, and His Honor, Mayor George B. Taylor of St. Michaels, brought warm words of welcome. At this last place a remarkable thing occurred. The Mayor remained to the close of the service, and the pastor assisted with the communion.

The full delegation attended the Area Council meeting which was held at Bennett College in Greensboro, N. C., August 4-7. There was also a fine representation at the Delaware Washington Conference Institute and the School for Rural and City Pastors, held at Morgan College, August 17-23 and September 7-17, respectively. All our supply and accepted supply pastors, save one, attended the Area Ministerial Training School at Morristown, Tenn., June 30th.

All charges and the District Board of Lay Activities of the Eastern District cheerfully donated \$127.91 to the Special Mt. Carmel Day offering. We bid God's speed to the Mt. Carmel Church.

The District Preachers meetings, Ministers Wives Association and the Woman's Society of Christian Service are permanent assets. They meet monthly. The Ministers Wives Association will make a very liberal donation to the Board of Conference Claimants.

#### District Parsonage

Last year the District Parsonage indebtedness was reduced from \$2,671.00 to \$1,911.00. This year the accustomed Annual Rally was held. Again, our Resident Bishop, A. P. Shaw was the guest speaker. His address was highly illuminating. The response from the charges was very liberal—\$927. This, with the rebates from the old District Parsonage on Higgins Street and from the former District Parsonage, Bridgeville, Delaware, has enabled us to further reduce the indebtedness to \$405. Besides, the Board of Trustees and Auxiliary Committee have beautified the exterior of the parsonage and garage with a new coat of paint. They have overcome the bad drainage by installing appropriate rain spouting; all of which have been paid for.

#### Special Campaign

The special District Indebtedness Campaign was conducted under the auspices of the sub-district groups. It was eminently successful. The attendance and contributions in several of the charges were greatly augmented by the presence and inspiring sermons of Bishop A. P. Shaw.



### Special Needs

The following charges are in special need of new edifices to encourage their liberal congregations. Chapel, J. S. Coard, pastor; Hurlock, J. L. Williams, pastor, are collecting funds for that end. Hoopersville has purchased and paid for a new site and is negotiating for an abandoned church of another congregation, A. L. Boggs, pastor.

### Christian Education

While we have been greatly restricted in our travel, due to tire and gasoline rationing, yet we have endeavored to carry on unceasingly with an adventurous program, for the advancement of Christian Education. Vacation Church Schools have been held. The local church fellowships have been visited by the Conference and District Officers. Instead of the Annual School, the District Officers after due deliberation with the Conference Executive Secretary, visited the seven sub-district groups. The importance of and opportunity for Christian Education were stressed. One hundred and seventy three were in attendance. The Dean instructed them as to the selection of courses. Twenty two applied for the several Home Study Courses at the General Office in Nashville, Tenn.

### Quarterly Conferences

The first and fourth Quarterly Conferences were held individually. The second and third were held collectively through the sub-district groups. We have visited and preached in all the churches.

Other items and trustee collections likewise increased. Various societies organized and functioning. Conversions 4; Accessions 4. R. W. Thomas, pastor.

Finally, Evangelistic efforts have been conducted in each charge. The program of Christian Education has been vigorously presented. The benevolent causes and Ministerial support stressed. Eight charges merit the World Service Distinguished Service Certificate for raising the General and Annual Conference benevolences IN FULL. Others have made marked increases.

While the Satanic influences have been evident emanating from a global war instinct with hatred, rapine, destruction and death to Christian personality, virtue and happiness the pastors have strenuously striven to awaken the people to their righteous possibilities and incumbent duties fully to cooperate with an Everliving, Allwise, active God in building His Kingdom. Gibbons has averred "The blood of the martyr is the seed of the Kingdom."

The philosophy of history indicates clearly that revolutions never go backward. They bomb us with material dynamite that we may bestir ourselves to the serious realization of bombing them with the gospel—"The dynamite unto Salvation." "The Kingdom is Coming."

Let us conclude with a very illuminating and significant quotation from the facile pen of Dr. Lucius H. Bugbee—"we are passing through days of transition and restless change. Many Kingdoms of Knowledge and experience in which we trusted have crumbled. Principles of conduct which we once regarded as certain as the axioms of Euclid have lost authority. We need to be reminded again that the roots of religion are not in books or theories or creeds, but in the nature and needs of man and in the answering fullness of God. The Church did not create religion. Religion was born, not made. The real significance of life is not to be identified with current events and immediate results, but with the ultimate triumph of Christian Character which frequently comes through apparent failure. What is the passing of time if we have Christ?"

Again, we are deeply grateful to our Heavenly Father for His unbounding goodness and His loving care during these trying days. We greatly appreciate the hearty cooperation and good will of the pastors, their wives and the laymen with whom we have been permitted to labor.

Our effective ranks have not been invaded by death, for which we are thankful. The pastors and their families for the most part have been blessed with good health. Yet there has been some sickness in some of our parsonages and a death of an honored retired minister, and of a son of one of our ministers.

## Sickness and Death

Mrs. Rosella Johns, Mrs. Bertha E. Thompson, and Mrs. Eunice Mears were ill during the year, the last two mentioned having undergone operations from which they have recovered.

The Reverend Jesse Thomas Wallace, retired, passed from labor to reward on April 22, 1943—Thursday of last week.

Preston L. Johns, son of the Rev. and Mrs. J. E. A. Johns, passed on April 21, 1943.

## District Meetings

There is a regular organized Preachers Meeting on the District. Its sessions are spiritually, intellectually, and socially satisfying and helpful. It serves as a kind of bureau of information and a clearing house of the plans, policies, and programs of the church as sent down by the Bishops and other leaders of the church from time to time. The sessions are held on the second and fourth Tuesdays of each month.

The District Stewards Meeting, held at Mount Zion Church, Philadelphia, on May 13th, 1942, with a suitable program, furnished inspiration for the work of the year. Goals set at that time were more than reached during the year. Almost all of the charges were represented. Dr. Butler and his people spared no pains to make us comfortable and happy.

The District Youth Fellowship held its summer conference at Brooks Memorial Church, Jamaica, New York, July 10-12. The program was well planned, the leadership able, the entertainment good, and the attendance fine. Brother C. L. Carrington and his loyal people deserve great credit for the success of this conference.

The District Conference, using as its theme the text, "God has not given us the spirit of fear, but of power, and of love, and of a sound mind," was the high-water mark of the year. Preaching was the dominating feature, with a sermon each night. However, no detail of a regular District Conference program was omitted. Brother H. H. Nichols and his people were at their best in entertainment of the conference.

The District Woman's Society of Christian Service held its annual institute at Camphor Memorial, Philadelphia, under presidency of Mrs. Emma



F. Cruger. It was highly successful and greatly helpful in the development of our women's work.

The District Missionary Institute was held at Peniel, Philadelphia, November 10th, with Dr. F. H. Butler, district missionary secretary, in charge. The results were highly gratifying.

The District Youth Fellowship Mid-winter Institute was held at Mother Zoar, January 29-31, 1943. It was well attended, managed, and entertained. The Rev. N. W. Moore, Jr. was host pastor.

The Efficiency Conference, held March 24th at Janes Church, Germantown, the Rev. H. R. Coleman, pastor, gave opportunity in the reports rendered to get a preview of the year's work, and gave prophecy of a truly wonderful achievement in Kingdom building on the District. The prophecy has been more than fulfilled as a brief review of the charges will reveal.

### Charges

**BROOKLYN, New York:** Church of the Redeemer. The Rev. John L. Bryan, former pastor of this church, resigned the first week in January, and it was necessary for me, at the request of Bishop Shaw, to take charge of the work on the 10th of January. The Bishop subsequently appointed the Rev. Joshua E. Licorish, then serving at Denton, Maryland, to finish out the year. The report shows considerable advancement over that of last year.

**JOHN WESLEY,** the Rev. J. N. Bullen, pastor, continues to make progress. Ministerial support, \$1511; General and Annual Conference Benevolences, \$101; Other Conference Items, \$51; Current Expenses, \$1866; Repairs, \$225; on Old Debt, \$840; Woman's Society of Christian Service, \$638. Total, \$4,512.

**NEWMAN.** This church enthusiastically received the new pastor, and immediately set out to make this a truly great year. Brother R. G. Waters is happy in the service of this growing congregation. The report follows: Conversions, 35; Preparatory Members Received, 131; Full Members Added, 85; Ministerial Support, \$1875; General and Annual Conference Benevolences, \$212; Other Conference Items, \$57; Repairs, \$925; Current Expenses, \$3,125; Old Debts, \$890. Total, \$6,184.

**ENGLEWOOD** has had a good year. The pastor, R. A. Bolden, is constantly seeking to inspire his people to do greater things. His efforts are bearing fruit, as there has been a decided increase in every way. Raised for Ministerial Support, \$825; General and Annual Conference Benevolences, \$55; Other Conference Items, \$40; Repairs and Improvements, \$225; Current Expenses, \$212; Old Debts, \$125. Total, \$1482.

**JERSEY CITY.** Led on by Charles L. Carrington this church makes the best report in its history. Every apportionment has been raised one hundred per cent. Ministerial Support, \$1070; General and Annual Conference Benevolences, \$142; Other Conference Items, \$69; Woman's Society, \$205; for Repairs, \$270; Current Expenses, \$2,094; Old Debts, \$4,350. Total, \$8,795.

**JERSEY CITY: St. Marks.** It will be recalled that a fine looking group and a fine group of people came to this Conference last year on Saturday asking to be formally received into the Conference. Prior to that, however,

they had requested me to visit them with a view of their coming to us. I granted their request, making several visits there, inspecting their church and parsonage, also inquiring into their status as a church. I found out that they had been carrying on for about six years as an independent group. I was favorably impressed. Later on, our resident Bishop was invited to visit them, and he also was favorably impressed. Subsequently, the Bishop preached for them and arranged for their coming to our Conference on Saturday, May 2, 1942.

Mrs. Lottie Marshall, in a very impressive address, represented them.

S. M. Emptage was appointed by Bishop Shaw to this new work. He has had remarkable success. Every apportionment is in full. Ministerial Support, \$1160; Woman's Society, \$320; General and Annual Conference Benevolences, \$46; Other Conference Items, \$44; Current Expenses, \$605; Old Debts, \$1336. Total, \$4,093.

Dr. Edgar A. Love, Superintendent of the Department of Negro Work of the Board of Missions and Church Extension has visited the church, and has been very helpful, also the Board.

THIRKIELD, E. W. Dean, pastor, had an increase in Ministerial Support, amount, \$990; General and Annual Conference Benevolences, \$35; Other Items, \$40; Other Collections, \$55. Total, \$1120.

MONTCLAIR, under the leadership of W. H. Mears, has had a great year. The report shows 80 conversions, 30 transfers, 122 full members added this year, making the membership 641 full members in this growing charge. The Woman's Society, \$1045; Ministerial Support, \$2,510, which is in excess of the apportionment; General and Annual Conference Benevolences, \$594 in full; Other Conference Items, \$212, more than full; for Repairs, \$900; Current Expenses, \$3,150; Old Debts, \$4,586. Total, \$12,956. Here every cause has been looked after, and every apportionment raised in full.

NEWARK continues to advance under the guidance of R. S. Thompson. The report exceeds that of last year. Number of conversions, 71; Preparatory Members received, \$60; Full Members added, 12, bringing the total to 582. The Woman's Society raised \$1024; Ministerial Support, \$2,240, in full; General and Annual Conference Benevolences, \$453, in full; Other Items, \$151, more than full; raised for Repairs, \$706; Current Expenses, \$574; Old Debts, \$1,705. Total, \$6,453.

NEW ROCHELLE is a small mission looked after by G. T. Jackson, who lives in Ossining and also serves as pastor there. The membership is small and decreasing. \$420 was raised for Ministerial Support; \$406 for Current Expenses; \$6 for Benevolences. Total, \$832.

NEW YORK CITY: Butler Memorial. W. P. Johnson has been in charge here, and the work has gone forward under his leadership. The Church has been thoroughly renovated, with beautiful stained glass windows installed, new pulpit, new carpet, and other furnishings. Raised for these purposes, \$1,025; Ministerial Support, \$704; General and Annual Conference Benevolences, \$25; Other Items, \$35; Other Collections, \$40. Total, \$1,829.

EAST CALVARY is carrying on a unique and a much needed social service work in the heart of Harlem. In addition to the regular religious services, a day nursery, a kindergarten, a school and supervised play are

provided for children whose mothers are employed. In summer several of these children are given camp life benefits in the country. The New York City Society of the Methodist Church gives financial assistance to this work. William James is the pastor.

SHAW CHAPEL, also in Harlem, was organized a short while after last Conference. S. A. Bellamy, a local preacher of John Wesley, Brooklyn, was placed in charge. The membership numbers 58; raised for Ministerial Support, \$194; for Benevolences, \$12; for Improvements and Current Expenses, \$312. Total, \$623.

TRINITY MISSION has not done so well. The report has not been received. W. A. Meyers is the pastor.

ORANGE, with C. L. Trader as pastor, seemingly has taken on new life. They are responding beautifully to his leadership. Ministerial Support in full, \$1407; General and Annual Conference Benevolences, \$171; Other Items, \$85; Repairs, \$250; Old Debts, \$200; Woman's Society, \$321; Current Expense, \$800; Total, \$3,834.

OSSINING bought a new parsonage at a cost of \$2,400, \$400 being paid down, and \$25 a month being satisfactorily met. The membership and attendance are increasing. Raised for Ministerial Support, \$750; Benevolences, \$65; Current Expenses, \$507; Total, \$1,330. George T. Jackson is the pastor.

PHILADELPHIA: BETHSAIDA sends to the Conference the best report in its history. The pastorate is a new experience for George W. Taylor, the pastor. Both the people and the pastor are shouting happy. And why not when they have vastly surpassed all expectations? They have gone the "second mile." Increase in full members, 30. The membership is now 126. Ministerial Support, \$1035, more than full; General and Annual Conference Benevolences, \$61, in full; Other Conference Items, \$55, more than full; for purchasing New Property, \$865; for repairs, \$75; Current Expenses, \$310; Other Collections, \$1,226; Woman's Society, \$206; Total Raised, \$4,484.

CAMPBOR MEMORIAL, with D. L. Riddout as pastor, marches on to greater heights. We reported last year that a splendid new parsonage had been purchased. We are happy to report this year that the congregation, in September, will go into one of the finest churches in the Central Jurisdiction, a property purchased from the Fifth United Presbyterian Church, only a block and a half from the present church's splendid location.

With the backing of the Board of Missions and Church Extension and the City Missionary Society, and the constant encouragement of the resident Bishop, and supported by the District Superintendent, these loyal people, led by a pastor who would not be disheartened, overcame many obstacles to secure this excellent plant for \$25,000 cash. The church has one of the most beautiful auditoriums to be found anywhere, a splendid Sunday School building, a Recreation Building, two kitchens, a pastor's study, several committee meeting rooms, and every conceivable equipment for doing the educational work of the church.

In addition to the achievement of insuring the acquisition of this marvelous plant, the church reports all apportionments met in full, and \$2,300 paid on old church and parsonage debts. Ministerial Support, \$1,946, in full;

General and Annual Conference Benevolences, \$204; Other Conference Collections, \$196; Woman's Society, \$325; Current Expenses, \$1,465; Old Debts, \$2,300; Repairs, \$220; Total, \$7,475. New members added, 48. Camphor Memorial expects to entertain the next session of the Delaware Conference.

EAST GERMANTOWN has had a great year under the able leadership of a workman who can still do a great job in pastoral administration, J. E. A. Johns. Despite sickness in his family, he has led his people out of debt and given them visions of greater service for the Master. The report shows: Ministerial Support, \$1,093; General and Annual Conference Benevolences, \$97; Other Conference Collections, \$68; Old Debts, \$940; Repairs, \$325; Current Expenses, \$940; Total, \$3,463.

GERMANTOWN has gone far beyond its great report of last year. H. R. Coleman, the pastor, is a tireless worker. Great things have been done by this church this year. The report shows 21 conversions, 70 Preparatory Members received; 43 Full Members added; Ministerial Support, \$2,510; General and Annual Conference Benevolences, \$802; Other Conference Items, \$169; all in excess of the apportionments; Raised for Repairs, \$2,125; on Parsonage, \$300; Current Expenses, \$2,133; Old Debts, \$6,562; Total, \$14,401.

HAVEN, J. W. Jefferson, pastor, has had another remarkable year. Every cause has been looked after, and every benevolent apportionment filled. \$3,000 paid on Old Debt; Current Expenses, \$2,500; Repairs, \$200; Woman's Society, \$2,920; Ministerial Support, \$2,710; Total, \$9,430.

JOHN SIMMONS, under the leadership of Edgar V. Wimberly, has done well. Ministerial Support, \$1,223, in full; General and Annual Conference Benevolences, \$110; Other Conference Items, \$65; for Building, \$4,368; Repairs, \$230; Current Expenses, \$960; Old Debts, \$304. Total, \$6,260.

JOHN WESLEY. This church had the unique distinction on a recent Sunday of burning two mortgages, one on the church, and the other on the parsonage. The one on the church had been of many years standing; and the one on the parsonage only three years. Conversions, 4; Full Members added, 50; total, 600; Ministerial Support, \$2,445, in full. General and Annual Conference Benevolences, \$379. Other Conference Items, \$172; Repairs, \$250; Current Expenses, \$2,500; Old Debts, \$4,500. Total, \$8,918. W. A. Hubbard, pastor.

MOUNT ZION, F. H. Butler, pastor, makes a report surpassing its notable one of last year. Conversions, 25; Preparatory Members, 100; Full Members, 65, bringing the total of 573. Ministerial Support, \$2,278; General and Annual Conference Benevolences, \$280; Other Items, \$147; Woman's Society, \$167; on New Church Building, \$5,200. The construction of the new church building is going on successfully, and when completed will give our Methodism another great church in Philadelphia. The Board of Missions and Church Extension and the Philadelphia City Missionary Society continue to help this project, for which we are very grateful. The church reports a total of \$10,180 this year.

PENIEL makes another great report. D. R. Fletcher continues to be a dynamic leader for this congregation, which is growing all the time. 21 Preparatory Members were added this year, and 12 Full Members. The

total membership is now 298. Ministerial Support, \$1,901, which exceeds the estimate; General and Annual Conference Benevolences, \$178, in full; Other Items, \$106; Repairs, \$275; Current Expenses, \$1,052; Old Debts, \$2,500. Total, \$7,108.

**TINDLEY TEMPLE.** For the 17th time this great church welcomes the Delaware Conference. We are indeed grateful to these loyal Methodists and their congenial pastor for their hospitality. This has been a year of outstanding achievement for the church. Preparatory Members received, 120; Full Members, 75; Conversions, 10. The Woman's Society of Christian Service reports \$2,686. Ministerial Support, \$3,718, in full. General and Annual Conference Benevolences, \$1,841; Other Conference Items, \$369; for Repairs, \$2,500; Current Expenses, \$7,225; Old Debts, \$18,707. Grand Total, \$34,377.

**ZOAR,** N. W. Moore, pastor, has had a very successful year. Number of conversions, 33; Full Members, 33; Raised by Woman's Society, \$757; Ministerial Support, \$2,490 in full; General and Annual Conference Benevolences, \$1,100; Other Items, \$349; for Repairs, \$856; Current Expenses, \$5,243; Old Debts, \$2,500; Grand Total, \$12,931.

**TRENTON** makes the best report in its history. The lack of a suitable building is a great handicap to this loyal and growing congregation. W. A. T. Miles is the pastor. He is an able preacher and a hard worker. The people have followed his leadership with sublime confidence. The long-standing debt has been cancelled. Ministerial Support, \$1,500; General and Annual Conference Benevolences, \$114; Other Items, \$72; Raised for Old Debts, \$1,278; Repairs, \$376; Current Expenses, \$337. Total, \$4,612.

**SPRING LAKE,** our summer appointment, was led last year by Grant Shockley. The splendid church building was repaired and beautifully renovated at a cost of \$300, and paid for. \$375 was paid the pastor, enabling him to matriculate at Drew Seminary, where he is attending this year, meanwhile rendering service at Saint Marks Church in New York City. Conference Collections, \$20; Ministerial Support, \$414; Current Expenses, \$60. Total, \$794.

**WHITE PLAINS.** J. E. Dunn deserves great credit for the work done at this charge this year. Tenderly caring for his invalid mother, he has rendered faithful service to his people. Ministerial Support, \$1,433; General and Annual Conference Benevolences, \$65; Other Conference Items, \$28; for Repairs, \$250; Current Expenses \$677.00. Total, \$3,443.

### Conclusion

A partial review of my two years as superintendent of the Philadelphia District shows an increase of two appointments, one additional church building and another in prospect; a very well appointed church property, recently acquired by Camphor Memorial in Philadelphia, destined to be one of our greatest appointments in a few years—and also a splendid parsonage for this same congregation; a much larger and more serviceable building for Mount Zion in Philadelphia; a large and commodious parsonage for Janes Church in Germantown, and a splendid parsonage at Ossining.

Added to these, many churches have greatly reduced their debts, some completely cancelling them, and all claims of the church have been greatly increased. Dr. J. T. Fletcher, of the Department of Finance and Debt Raising, Board of Missions and Church Extension, deserves much credit for his excellent services in several of the Charges of the Philadelphia District. But even more important is the increase in spiritual fervor in all our charges. Our pastors are preaching with greater power, and the people are responding more nobly to fine leadership.

It has been a privilege to work with these loyal pastors and their devoted laymen. The service of the Kingdom has become more real to me because I have served and loved them, and have been encouraged by their many expressions of confidence. I come to the end of my term of office happy in the service of the Master and in the fellowship of the brethren. They have all been wonderfully kind, and I shall ever remember them.

"Blest be the tie that binds  
Our hearts in Christian love;  
The fellowship of kindred minds  
Is like to that above.

"When we are called to part,  
It gives us inward pain,  
But we shall still be joined in heart,  
And hope to meet again."

J. Waters, Local Preacher, and District Steward of Shiloh Methodist Church, Crisfield, Md., and also a district parsonage trustee. Wattsville also sustained a great loss in the passing of brothers Henry, Beecham and Drummond, this Conference year.

#### District Activities

Our initial visit and business meeting was our DISTRICT STEWARDS MEETING, held May 19th, 1942 at Metropolitan Methodist Church, Princess Anne, Md. It was a meeting well attended, filled with inspiration and Christian cordiality. A resolution was read and adopted by the body, pledging their full support and loyalty to the new administration.

#### Migrant Camps Create New Problems and Responsibilities

Adequate farm labor for harvesting crops on the Eastern Shore of Maryland, has for a long time been a very grave problem. For many years the housing and sleeping quarters of those who migrated from the Southland, following up the crop seasons for a livelihood were obliged to sleep in shacks having for their bed a floor of an old barn or out-building covered with straw. Their cooking accommodations, an open fire in the yard, exposed to wind and rain. It has been through the constant and most resolute effort on the part of the Home Missions Council involving the Council of Churches and Christian Education—that the Employer and United States Government have agreed to see that better living conditions of the sanitary type would be provided.

#### How the Local Churches Were Helped in Organizing Under the New Legislation

Since one of our district objectives was: THE LOCAL CHURCH ORGANIZED 100% according to New Legislation, the superintendent proceeded to help the Pastors and Local Church by sending to our Publishing House, Nashville, Tenn., for a full supply of free materials covering every



organization in the Local Church. The Methodist Publishing House responded by sending us fully a small truck load. We called in the District Board of Christian Education to discuss with them the feasibility of setting up a District Team to travel the district to explain and present first the free material to the Pastors. Such was to be done during our Group Quarterly Conferences. Rev. J. W. Elbert was approved by the Board as District Dean. The other members of the Team were as follows: Rev. R. C. Hughes, Rev. J. W. Handy, Jr., Rev. J. R. Shockley, Rev. W. A. Harewood, Rev. I. R. Elzey, Rev. M. L. McKenney, Mrs. Maude Clark, Mrs. Mae Harewood, Mrs. Mary A. Stewart, Mrs. Pearl R. Spence and Mrs. Cora Handy. It was by the sacrifices made in gas, automobiles and time, that the Salisbury District was able to impart much valuable information both to the pastors and Laymen. Our district team was endeavoring to specialize in certain phases of the Educational program.

After the Pastors had been given the material first and some knowledge of setting up the new program in Christian Education—then packages of material were given out to the General Superintendents and others.

According to our last Quarterly Conference reports, our district is on the road to becoming 100% organized. There will be a follow up however.

#### The Third Annual District Conference

October 6th, 7th, and 8th, 1942, the Third Annual District Conference was held at Metropolitan Methodist Church, Princess Anne, Md., the Rev. W. L. D. Lyght Pastor. The entertainment and the most generous hospitality rendered the pastors and delegates will be hard to excel in years to come. Both pastor and people did their very best to meet every need of their guests and to add comfort to their stay.

The reports made by the various pastors and the delegates representing the charges, revealed an improved Leadership and a better lay cooperation. The total district program was planned with the New Church Organization and Function in mind. It was planned to impart Local Church Information; to encourage and stimulate greater Lay Inspiration and to set up a challenge in the local church for larger participation in the total Local Church program.

In making his rounds, the Superintendent discovered that many of the Pastors as well as Lay members needed the proper resource materials for organizing and perfecting the new church program; and in order to be of the greatest assistance to the preachers and Local Church Officials; the Superintendent suggested that a book store be set up and a special staff to operate the store during the District Conference. The Superintendent placed an order with the Methodist Publishing House, New York, for \$250.47, which included New Methodist Hymnals, Disciplines, full supply of all published Quarterly Conference Report blanks, Membership records, and all the necessary material covering the total program of the Board of Christian Education in the Local Church. Also the material for the Local Board of Missions and Church Extension. The Book store which was managed by the Rev. M. L. McKenney sold for \$151.53, losses \$3.53, total cash reported \$148.00. The unsold books, by special request were taken around to two other District Conferences. Easton District Conference, held at St. Michaels, Md. sold for

\$46.00, the Dover District Conference, Chestertown, Md., sold for \$30.00, other sales on the district following the District Conferences \$7.00—making a grand total of book sales to inform the local churches, \$231.00. The unsold materials were returned. The Superintendent and his District Staff in planning for the book store, worked on the philosophy of Mohammed—"Go to the mountain if the mountain will not come to us."

#### Religious Educational Activities

The Charges holding Vacation Church Schools as reported to the District Superintendent are as follows: White Temple, Salisbury, enrollment 103, Marion Station, Oriole 54, Crisfield, Shiloh 40, and Withams, Va. 54, giving a grand total enrolled in the Vacation Church Schools in the District, which is far too few—295.

#### District-Wide-Debt-Liquidation Contest Rally

On November 10, 1942, at Pocomoke City, Mt. Zion Methodist Church—the district staged a new type of District Activity. The recommendation made by our Resident Bishop, A. P. Shaw, at the Jurisdictional Council Meeting of the Baltimore Area, August 4-7th, 1942, Bennett College, Greensboro, North Carolina, gave the Superintendent the impetus to experiment with the District debt situation, after learning that so many of our churches were under heavy mortgages and "burdens too grievous to be borne" some carrying loans with our Home Mission Board, in most instances back several years in interest money.

Therefore, as one of the District Goals or objectives we launched what we called "A DISTRICT-WIDE-DEBT-LIQUIDATION CONTEST RALLY." Which first of all was to become a challenge to those carrying loans with the Board, and secondly, the drive to include those churches that were financing their own project—then, thirdly, those who did not have debts but needed to create some for church and parsonage improvements.

In order to stimulate the Debt-Liquidation Contest, the Superintendent wrote the Home Board requesting the service of Dr. J. T. Fletcher, who works in the Debt raising section of the Mission Board department. We planned a schedule of itinerancy of the charges to be visited. He came, took the schedule and went into those charges and worked and preached and offered suggestions and solicited funds for the pastor and people on their debts. His service meant much to some of the charges that were despondent and almost at the point of giving up; letting the church and debts all go with the wind.

It was due to much of the type of service Dr. J. T. Fletcher rendered on the Salisbury District, that the following Nine Charges reported \$1961.06 on the night of the contest; Dames Quarter, Greenwood, Nanticoke, Marion Station, Quantico, Upper Hill, Keller, Wattsville, Pocomoke City.

The Keller Charge of which the Rev. G. N. Jones is pastor, was the first charge to liquidate their debt with the Board. A debt that had been standing for some years. The Charge winning first prize—Nanticoke, Second—Marion Station, and third—Upper Hill. Useful materials for church organizations were given as prizes.

The evening was graced by the presence of our own Bishop Shaw. He gave us a most helpful message. A message that many laymen are still discussing. The effect of the message has had telling results in many of our charges. It is the purpose of the District to continue this program until every debt has been canceled, and the necessary improvements made on churches and parsonages and paid for. We hope by so doing the "muzzle will be removed from the ox" and better support paid to the pastors for their services.

Many of our laymen are beginning to realize, that if they are ever to be in a position to command the kind of leadership that they think will best meet their church and community needs—they must make the sacrifice.

#### District-Wide Evangelistic Campaign

A District-Wide Campaign in Evangelism was staged to take place beginning January 24th, 1943. The Superintendent got in touch with Dr. J. W. Golden, Field Secretary of Evangelism of the Central Jurisdiction Commission on Evangelism, to secure his services to conduct the campaign. To begin with, we knew in order to reach many of our pastors and key layman in our charges, it would be necessary to break up our district in larger sub-district groups, rather than to plan visiting all nine of the regular groups.

We were able to get Dr. Golden. A schedule of itinerancy was set up because of the Gas situation as follows; Jan. 24th, Oriole—Venton Church, Jan. 25th, Manokin—Wesley Church, Jan. 26, Leemont—Metropolitan Church, Jan. 27th, Withams—Mt. Zion Church, Jan. 28th and 29th, Pocomoke—Mt. Zion Church, Jan. 30th and 31st, White Temple, Salisbury. Because of pressing office duties, having employed a new secretary who needed some little office experience in taking care of office correspondence, made it necessary for Dr. Golden to cut his time in serving our District, three days.

At some of the points stormy weather prevented us from holding meetings, but those who were privileged to attend were very much impressed with the introduction of a new method of soul winning. The services were very informing and most challenging to the Christian Church.

Had we not been greatly affected by the Gas situation, the District would have made the labors of Dr. Golden more central, and had the pastors and the key officials attend one central point. But the condition of the situation was otherwise.

#### The Second Annual District Missionary Institute

Tuesday, December 15, 1942 the District Missionary Institute was held at John Wesley Methodist Church, Salisbury, Md. The attendance was large and the program uniforming and uplifting. Address by Dr. E. C. Hallman, Pastor of Centenary Methodist Church, Laurel, Delaware. Theme "The Christian Mission Must Go On." The Rev. W. H. Mears was present and discussed the Literature to be studied, if Board of Missions in the Local Church is to function. The noontide Inspirational address was delivered by Dr. H. P. Fox, pastor of Asbury Methodist Church, Salisbury, Md. Other guest speakers: Dr. F. H. Butler and Rev. F. D. Jones.

A special committee met and formulated for the year the District Missionary program.

### Woman's Society of Christian Service on the District

The District Woman's Society of Christian Service has done much in promoting the Women's work of the District in the local churches. At least 95% of the churches on the Salisbury District have their women organized in a society. Many of the pastors were somewhat suspicious concerning the intrinsic value of the Woman's Society of Christian Service in the local church in raising finances for the various causes as the old Ladies Aid did. Both pastor and local church members are realizing the great strength of the Woman's Organization in the local church. In most instances the women are still the pillars in the church while men are the shams.

December 4th and 5th, 1942, the Second Annual Meeting of the Woman's Society of Christian Service was held at John Wesley Methodist Church, Salisbury, Md. Rev. J. W. Elbert, Host. The meeting was largely attended and the sessions most inspiring.

### District Efficiency Conference

Tuesday, March 30th, 1943, the Third Annual Efficiency Conference was held at Mt. Zion Methodist Church, Mt. Vernon Charge, better known as "Polk's Road." The conference started off in spiritual high gear. The Rev. J. W. Handy, Jr. conducted the devotions. The Keynote address was by Rev. W. A. Harewood, one of the honor pastors in charge efficiency and leadership. He reported 100% in all conference askings and also the Rev. L. H. Jones, pastor of Snow Hill Circuit.

Our guest speakers were Rev. J. W. Parker, who addressed us on the subject "What should be the Attitude and Interest of the Supply Pastor toward Raising the Full Apportionment of Conference Claimants?" The noontide address was delivered by Dr. Tilghman Smith of Princess Anne, Md. His address was most helpful—Subject "The Essential Needs of the Minister if He is to be Efficient in His Task." We shall never forget some of the things he said. "The preacher must have the heart of a shepherd and the soul of a prophet."

The following District Superintendents were present and brought inspiring greetings from their districts; Drs. L. H. McArthur, W. C. Thompson, D. H. Hargis and J. W. Jewett.

The District Board of Lay Activities rendered a very excellent program. Brother C. T. Ward, District Lay Leader, presided. Their program consisted of two SYMPOSIUMS—"THE RELATIONSHIP OF THE PASTOR IN THE RECONSTRUCTION OF A SPIRITUAL CHURCH." (1) My Procedure if I were a Pastor—Prof. H. S. Wilson. (2) My Procedure if I were a Pastor, was to have been discussed by Mrs. M. A. Stewart, but she was unable to be present.

"THE RESPONSIBILITY of the Pastor in the reconstruction of a better Financial System in the Local Church." Brother Bertram Holden being absent—brother B. T. Hall was drafted to speak upon the subject and did honor to the subject and the occasion.

## Report of Charges

**COTTAGE GROVE.** This charge was interrupted during the early part of the conference year by the removal of the Rev. A. E. Martin, who was released by the Bishop to accept Chaplaincy service in the United States Army—release became effective July 20th, 1942; serving two months and 15 days after being reappointed to the charge for his third year. An Accepted Supply, Rev. S. D. Holland was appointed to serve this people till conference. This charge has great possibilities. They need a resident pastor, to live on the ground and take care of their practically new parsonage. The pastor reports: Conversions 3; Ministerial Support \$758; General and Annual Conference Benevolence \$47; Other Items \$25; Paid on Old Debts \$53; The interior of one of the churches beautified at a cost of \$140. Rev. S. D. Holland, pastor.

**CRISFIELD (SHILOH).** This charge at the beginning of the year was well pleased with their pastor, Rev. L. E. Jordan. Three months the pastor served these good people; after which ill health and other personal worries invaded his body and mind, making it necessary for his release at his own request. His release by the Bishop became effective August 3rd, 1942.

The Rev. J. R. Shockley, the present pastor, was requested by the superintendent to supply the charge in connection with his work at St. Andrews, Upper Hill, until the Bishop appointed someone else. This the pastor did, so acceptably until in a very few weeks, his services were requested, to become their full time pastor. He was appointed by the Bishop to take charge of the pulpit Sept. 6th, 1942. Under the leadership of this young, well trained, energetic and most active leader, with a bride in the parsonage, Shiloh says she has what she wants. Both pastor and people are happy. This is one of our Honor Roll Charges. Conversions 1; Ministerial Support in full \$1,551; General and Annual Conference Benevolence in full \$250; Other Items in full \$125; The total church is organized and most active; Paid off old debt \$863. The church is free of debt. Improvements \$410; The return of the Pastor has been requested. Rev. J. R. Shockley, Pastor.

**DAMES QUARTER.** A great year for this charge has been realized under their present pastor, who has tried to take care of every interest of the church. The churches have been organized and the future speaks bright for both pastor and people. Old debts paid off and the Loan with the Home Board being taken care of. The pastor's return has been requested. The pastor reports: Conversions 10; Accessions 10; Ministerial Support advanced over last year \$1,117; General and Annual Conference Benevolence \$116; Other Items \$81; Paid on Old Debts \$511; Improvements on churches and parsonage \$174. Rev. A. F. Winder, Pastor.

**DEALS ISLAND.** Another good year for this charge in spite of a migratory section. The people are away most of the year, yet they think of their church. The membership is small, yet it has potential possibilities, with the large number of young people still on the Island. The W. S. of C. S. is active and raised this year \$405. Paint is already in hand for painting the exterior of the church. Conversions 1; Ministerial Support, advanced over last year \$1,041; General and Annual Conference Benevolence \$52; Other Items \$29; Paid on Old Debts \$33; Church and parsonage improvements \$425. Rev. W. J. Mills, Pastor.

**FRUITLAND.** This charge has not fully realized its possibilities, opportunities, moral, social, financial and spiritual strength. It is located in an industrial center, that operates practically the whole year round. This charge is able to give a more adequate support to those who minister to their souls. The pastor has worked hard, both he and wife are self-sacrificing with a large family to provide for. He is giving special attention to the New Church program and seeking to set it in action. He reports: Conversions 23; Accessions —; Ministerial Support advanced over last year \$—; General and Annual Conference Benevolence \$—; Other Items \$—; Old Debts—Mortgage on Friendship Church paid \$—; Church and Parsonage improvements \$317. Rev. H. E. Anderson, Pastor.

**GIRDLETREE.** This charge sends a report far in advance of last year. The pastor is closing out his fifth year among his friends and kindred. The pastor has suffered some ill health this year, yet this is the best report during his five years christian service in the charge. This is a strong Three Point Circuit. It has even greater possibilities for development. This is a day for the Rural Districts and churches. The harvest truly is great, but laborers are few. The pastor reports Conversions 2; Accessions 4; Ministerial Support \$1,346; General and Annual Conference Benevolence \$152; Other Items \$82; Paid on Old Debts \$186; Paid on improvements, new windows put in church \$57; Other improvements \$551. Rev. C. T. Covington, Pastor.

**GREENWOOD.** Has made progress this year over last year along all lines. The people and pastor are mutual in their desires to live together; his return has been requested. Love and harmony prevails in the charge. Conversions 3; Accessions 2; Ministerial Support increased over last year \$1,043; General and Annual Conference Benevolence \$106; Other Items \$86; Paid on old debt with Home Board \$155; Paid for improvements \$130. Rev. J. W. Hayman, Pastor.

**HOPEWELL** has had a fair year in spite of the illness of the pastor for several weeks, a part of which was spent in the hospital in Crisfield. Having in the charge active laymen, the charge suffered no ill effect in promotion of the work. The work went forward and aided in making possible this report. Accessions to the church 2; Ministerial Support \$1073; General and Annual Conference Benevolence \$89; Other Items \$42; Paid on old debts \$580; Paid on property improvement \$140. Rev. E. Z. Heath, Pastor.

**HORNTOWN.** This charge continues to go forward under the present spiritual leader. With a little more effort this charge would have been in the 100% class. All causes advanced over last year. The pastor is singing "Forever here my rest shall be." And the people are singing "We are in no way, weary nor tired listening to the Gospel, preached with conviction and power." A unanimous vote for the pastor's return was taken at the fourth quarter. The charge reports: Conversions 2; Accessions 11; Ministerial Support advanced over last year \$1,289; General and Annual Conference Benevolence \$147; Other Items \$102; Improvement of churches and parsonage \$250. Rev. E. H. White, Pastor.

**KELLER** is becoming one of our most conspicuous charges on the district, since being served by its present pastor, who has only given part

time. It was the first charge under its hard working, conscientious, self sacrificing leader, to satisfy its Loan with the Home Mission Board. Both pastor and people deserve great credit for having led the way and brought stimulation to many other churches on the district to "Go and do likewise." The return of the pastor has been requested. Plans are on to erect a new parsonage near the Highway, beside New Hope Church. The charge needs a full time resident pastor. The pastor reports: Conversions 6; Ministerial Support advanced \$1,143; General and Annual Conference Benevolence \$109; Other Items \$88; Paid on old debt \$543; Church free of debt. Improvements made at a cost of \$150. Rev. G. N. Jones, Pastor.

KINGSTON. This charge has suffered many hardships this year. Yet the people have tried to hold head up. For three years and six months and fifteen days, the Rev. C. L. Jones served as the pastor of this charge. Long and continued ill health forced him to surrender his pulpit October 18th, 1942. The bishop granted the release. Though too young to be retired, yet he wishes to assume at this conference the retired relationship. It is the wish of the superintendent that the Board of Stewards do what they can to help Rev. Jones, who is most worthy. From Nov. 1st to Dec. 6th, 1942, the Kingston Charge was supplied by a Local Preacher of the Girdletree Charge, Brother E. J. Johnson, who rendered most excellent service. Dec. 6th the present pastor, Rev. William H. Bass of Little Rock, Arkansas, was appointed by the Bishop to serve this charge. The congregations were so elated over the possibilities with a young well trained leader, they spared no pains in setting the parsonage in order at quite a cost and sacrifice, but to date the pastor has not found it convenient to move in the parsonage. At present the pastor has in connection with his pastoral duties, a job with the USO-YMCA Club, 1300 Chestnut St., Portsmouth, Va., returning on Saturday or Sunday to serve his churches. The people feel that they are entitled to the services of a full time pastor. In spite of handicaps the charge makes the following report: Accessions 2; Ministerial Support \$1,258; Pastor's salary increased; General and Annual Conference Benevolence \$136; Other Items \$63; Old Debts \$375; Repairs on churches and parsonage \$627. Rev. Wm. H. Bass, Pastor.

LEEMONT. This charge has great potential possibilities, her strength in kingdom building, church and community service is beginning to be realized under the leadership of the present pastor. This charge is one of the strongest of our Virginia appointments. The two churches have an opportunity to minister to hundreds of our people. The parsonage has been electrified and plans are on to do other work in beautifying the property. June 16th to 18th, 1942 the Methodist Youth Fellowship Assembly was highly entertained at Metropolitan Church of this charge. The pastor is shouting high, this is one of the greatest years of all his ministry. He is serving an Honor Roll Charge, with every conference asking raised in full; Listen to his report: Conversions 4; Accessions 14; Ministerial Support in full \$1,431; General and Annual Conference Benevolence \$277; Other Items \$126; Repairs on churches and parsonage \$235; Paid on Old Debt \$1,000. The churches are well organized and active. Rev. J. R. Purnell, Pastor.

MANOKIN. The present pastor reports that this is his best year in four. It is a three point circuit. Being true and faithful to his Christian task and



responsibility, this pastor has a record of never missing or disappointing a congregation on the Circuit regardless of weather conditions. A favorable consideration of being appointed to another field will be greatly appreciated. At present efforts are on to convert an abandoned school building, by the help of the Home Mission Board, into a house of worship at Revels Neck. Already the Board has had Dr. J. T. Fletcher, their representative, on the ground looking over the project. The pastor reports Conversions 8; Accessions 10; Ministerial Support \$975; General and Annual Conference Benevolence \$60; Other Items \$32; Improvements—Repair of churches and parsonage \$250. Rev. W. A. Johnson, Pastor.

**MARION STATION.** Many trials and heartaches have faced this charge this year. January 28th, 1943, the charge sustained the loss of their beloved pastor, Rev. T. W. Cooper, though retired, yet he was courageous and faithful to his task up till the last. He maintained a religious zeal for the Cause of Christ-Conviction, determination and courage were among the dominant characteristics of his personality. He was serving his ninth year when he received his eternal summons to retire from his earthly labors and rest for evermore. The congregations of the charge desiring to pay the widow the unpaid balance on salary, the Local Preachers on the charge, under the supervision of the district superintendent and the Crisfield Group over which the Rev. J. R. Shockley presides, have seen to having the work go on, after conferring with the Bishop. The widow has worked hard with the people of the charge, to make possible a good report. The charge reports: Conversions 29; Accessions 5; Total Ministerial Support \$1,031; General and Annual Conference Benevolence \$138; Other Items \$94; Paid on old debts \$577; Church and parsonage improvements \$33. This charge needs a pastor possessing three outstanding characteristics—Pastor, Preacher and a good church Administrator. The charge has the possibilities to become a strong rural appointment.

**MT. VERNON.** This charge is still marching forward under the leadership of their present pastor. Both pastor and people are satisfied to continue housekeeping together another year. A unanimous vote requesting the return of the pastor by the congregations was voluntarily done at the fourth quarter. The Third Annual Efficiency Conference was held in this Charge at Mt. Zion church March 30th, the attendance was large at each session and the church was crowded to overflow during the evening, in witness to the special program of the Minister's Wives Association. The hospitality tendered us by the pastor and the good people of this charge will be hard to duplicate. The pastor reports: Conversions 12; No Accessions; Ministerial Support \$1,026; General and Annual Conference Benevolence \$115; Other Items \$100; Paid on old debts \$388; for repairs on churches and parsonage \$600; Plans are on for beautifying one of the churches. Rev. R. T. Crowell, Pastor.

**NANTICOKE.** Another great year has been realized in this charge. The pastor is completing his eighth year. Both pastor and people are contented to go on for another year housekeeping together. The church is well organized. This charge held first place in the District-Wide-Debt Liquidation Contest Rally. The Loan from the Home Mission Board is being met promptly when due. The pastor reports: Conversions 8; Accessions 5; Paid



for Ministerial Support \$1,135; General and Annual Conference Benevolence \$96; Other Items \$38; Paid on old debts \$1,125; Paid for improvements \$370; The Pastor has had 100 folding chairs donated to his church for his annex. Debt greatly reduced. Church attendance greatly increased. Rev. M. C. Anderson, Pastor.

OAKVILLE. This charge reports some advance over last year. The pastor is seeking to perfect his church organizations according to the New legislation. This charge still has possibilities. No Conversions; No Accessions; Ministerial Support \$742; General and Annual Conference Benevolence \$12; Other Items \$9; Paid on old debts \$100; Paid for improvements \$455. Rev. A. C. Whittington, Pastor.

ORIOLE. This charge is well organized among both adults, youth and children. The pastor is young and active. The total membership is pleased with their pastor and the pastor with the members. This pastor seeks to develop an integrated program, taking in the total community. He is a good pastor, a powerful and thoughtful preacher, a good financier and church organizer. He was the district choice for delivering the Pray Day sermon February 11th, 1943, at Princess Anne College. The charge reports 50% increase in Church attendance, 90% in financial giving. This is the best years work in the history of the charge. The young people are organized and active. The parsonage has been renovated on the outside, porch screened, roof shingled. Money in hand to do repair work at Venton church as soon as a carpenter can be secured. The return of the pastor has been requested. Conversions 33; Accessions 27; Ministerial support \$1,142; General and Annual Conference Benevolence \$161; Other items \$183; Repair on church and parsonage \$775; Paid on old debts \$100. Rev. J. W. Handy, Jr., Pastor.

PARSONSBURG. This charge is a three point circuit, covering from six to eight miles the farthest church, yet in spite of the distance, the pastor has endeavored to make his rounds on time. The pastor reports that two churches have been repaired. At Pullets, a hall has been purchased for a community house. Curtis at Bishop, Md. rebuilt last year, and is requesting some help from the Home Board. Conversions 17, no accessions; Ministerial Support \$1,084; General and Annual Conference Benevolence \$167; other causes \$77; Raised for trustees \$1,045. Rev. Jose Angulo, Pastor.

POCOMOKE CITY. This charge has had a great year under its new pastor. At the beginning of the conference year the congregation revealed an inclination to sit down and rest awhile. But with a leader keen to sense the situation, being tactful and pleasing in personality, he won a victory, that at first suggested a defeat. Proceeding along Christian and spiritual lines of reconstruction, with faith in God, himself and his people, integrating himself and church program into the life of the community, the pastor and church have moved forward in spite of. We have made this pastor the General Chairman of our District Missionary Extension Program. He counsels with the migrant workers, preaches and plans preaching schedules for other men of our district to serve the migrants, who in most cases are "strangers within our gates." The pastor reports: Conversions 4; accessions 4; Ministerial Support in full and some more \$1,908; General and

Annual Conference Benevolence \$293; other items \$125; Paid to Christian Social Relations \$89; Red Cross \$75; Other community needs \$29; Paid on old debts \$174; Church and parsonage improvements \$151; Raised on future construction of church \$489. Rev. R. C. Hughes, Pastor. This charge 100% charge.

PRINCESS ANNE. This charge is still making history under its present dynamic leadership. May 19th, 1942 the District Stewards meeting was well entertained in this charge. An informational, inspirational, and spiritual time was experienced. October 6th to 8th of the same year the Third Annual District Conference was held in this charge. Both pastor and people in both of these district events merit the very highest commendation and praise for their generous hospitality. The officials and pastor excavated the ground under the church and converted it into a dining room. It is also used for meetings of organizations, study groups, recreation and fellowship suppers. The pastors return has been requested. He is married to the people and the people to him. Conversions 18; accessions 10; Ministerial Support \$1,670; General and Annual Conference Benevolence increased over last year \$132; other items \$88; paid on old debts \$600; repairs on church and parsonage \$1,200. Rev. W. L. D. Lyght, Pastor.

QUANTICO. Growth is revealed in this charge over last year. The pastor is quiet, unassuming, earnest and faithful to his task. He serves a three point circuit. He has realized to give a more satisfactory service, he should be relieved from further pastoral responsibility and oversight of the St. Marks Methodist Church located at Rockawalkin. The pastor reports: Conversions 5; accessions 2; Ministerial Support \$1,466; General and Annual Conference Benevolence \$151; other items \$87; paid on loan with Board and on the mortgage of twelve years standing on the Hebron and Rockawalkin parsonage \$989; And the property at Hebron back in hands of the trustees. Repairs on churches and parsonage \$341. The W. S. of C. S. is most active in this charge, they raised for all purposes \$503, the report of the three societies. Rev. W. R. Price is the Pastor.

SALISBURY (JOHN WESLEY). This charge reports a successful year under the present leadership. Both pastor and people have worked hard to maintain the religious reputation of christian leadership, loyalty, community and civic interest, that has been built up through the years, by the oldest Negro congregation in the City of Salisbury. This charge still has enthusiasm and religious zeal. She still has a mind to work. Dec. 4th and 5th, the Woman's Society of Christian Service was very wonderfully and most hospitably entertained in this charge. Tuesday, Dec. 15th the Second Annual District Missionary Institute was held in this charge also. Just a few weeks ago, the congregation like David of old became restless and dissatisfied with the heavy mortgage hanging over the house of God and thereby crushing the very spiritual life out of the church. The pastor and Mr. James Stewart and other officials resolved to do something about it. The drive terminated with having raised on mortgage including the interest \$1,289.44. The charge reports: Conversions 2; accessions 2; Ministerial Support \$1,373; General and Annual Conference Benevolence, advanced over last year \$201; other items \$105; other old debts \$371. Rev. J. W. Elbert, Pastor.

**SALISBURY (WHITE TEMPLE).** This charge, so strategically located has a prospect that far surpasses any charge on the district of becoming one of our most outstanding appointments. Because of the constant shifting of the colored population, from the Eastern Section of the city to the Western Section. The present leadership has sensed the great opportunity as well as the grave responsibility of the church to minister to the Moral, Social, Recreational, and Spiritual lives of the people. This charge is completely organized and functioning under the New Church Legislation. The Methodist Men's organization or Brotherhood and the Methodist Youth Fellowship and the Woman's Society of Christian Service are all active. Crowds of young people attend this service. The superintendent asked one of the young people why it was they joined this church, the reply was, "the pastor and his wife give you something to do in the church." What a great challenge to many of our churches, that are having difficulty in young people attending the church. The pastor is closing his seventh years work in this charge. Both pastor and people are happy, his return has been requested. Early in Spring a Vacation Church School Workers Conference was conducted by our Conference Executive Secretary, Dr. F. J. Handy, preparatory to the vacation period. The minister's wife of this charge is a great leader among the young people as well as the older. The pastor reports: Conversions 4; accessions 6; Ministerial Support \$1,154; General and Annual Conference Benevolence \$158; other items \$109; paid on old debts \$270. Rev. M. W. Clark, Pastor.

**SNOW HILL.** This charge has had wonderful success this year under its most dynamic and enthusiastic leader. He is alert to every church, civic, and community need. This charge has a young peoples choir, many of whom were inspired to join the church after christian interest had been shown them during the Vacation Church session. Truly this pastor and his wife accepted the command of Jesus as a great challenge to their calling. They have gone into the highways and hedges and compelled the youth, by their pleasing personalities to come and join the church. The church is well organized, the attendance is increasing at every service. As an expression of love and appreciation the officials and members tendered the pastor and wife a reception on the evening of April 21st. The interior of the church has been very beautifully decorated and plans on to paint the outside. A new heating plant has been installed. Both pastor and people are happy. The return of the pastor is requested. This charge is an honor roll charge with every asking in full. He reports: Conversions 7; accessions 26; Ministerial Support in full \$1,719; General and Annual Conference Benevolence is reported by pastor in full \$300; other items \$159; paid on old debts \$236; paid for parsonage and church improvement \$302. With a very active Woman's Society of Christian Service. Rev. W. A. Harewood, Pastor.

**SNOW HILL CIRCUIT.** This charge has been resurrected in spirit and cooperation in the interest of the kingdom. The pastor has brought victory in the very face of defeat. The membership has grown from six to fifty-eight. Plans are on to build a new church, already the Home Mission Board has had a man on the ground to study the possibilities. Nehemiah has made his survey, and hopes to be able to begin building the walls very soon. The church has been organized and the pastor and his wife are endeavoring to

keep them active. The return of the pastor has been requested. The pastor reports: Conversions 8; accessions 1; Ministerial Support in full \$597; General and Annual Conference in full \$63; other items in full \$41; paid on old debts \$50; church improvements \$30; grand total raised for the year from all sources including the trustees \$1,298. The church has \$500 in the bank to start building new church. Rev. L. H. Jones, Pastor. This charge 100% in all claims.

STOCKTON. This charge has made some little progress over last year. The church has been organized and the organizations are active. The pastor has endeavored to care for all of the church interests. He reports the erection of a beautiful garage. Conversions 1; accessions 7; Ministerial Support \$1156; General and Annual Conference Benevolence \$86; other items \$25; paid on old debts \$215; church and parsonage improvements \$160. Rev. A. L. Scriber, Pastor.

STOCKTON CT. This charge still goes forward under their present leader who closes out his twentieth year of faithful service. The people are still singing "We are Satisfied," send our pastor back to serve us another year. The pastor and people are endeavoring to save the old parsonage site that has been carrying a mortgage of less than \$300. for some few years. Efforts are on to cancel the debt. The pastor reports conversions 2, accessions 1, Ministerial support \$471, general and annual conference Benevolence \$20, other items \$14, Church and parsonage improvements \$346, new roof put on Shiloh Church. Paid on old debt \$30. Rev. R. J. Williams, pastor.

UNION ASBURY and LIBERIA. Another year of remarkable achievement for this charge under a leadership that knows no defeat. This pastor has brought this congregation out of the valley of despondency and lost hope into spirit of optimism and self confidence. For many years a tremendous church debt has blighted and killed the zeal and ambitious spirit of these people. But with a Gospel of hope, faith and love—the congregation has wrought well. This church specializes in Debt liquidation. The pastor reports, conversions 5, accessions 6, General and Annual Conference \$203, Ministerial support \$1644, other items \$114, old debts \$1500, improvement to churches and parsonage \$475. Present indebtedness \$900. The pastor's return has been requested. Rev. O. W. Jones, pastor.

UNIONVILLE. This pastor has had a great year. His church is well organized. A strong active Methodist Youth Fellowship and church school. The pastor and his wife have labored hard to make their church and community one of the best in the district. They love their members and are well loved by the members. The pastor reports conversions 2, accessions 9, Ministerial support \$1364, General and Annual Conference Benevolence \$99, other items \$79, paid on old debts \$485, raised for all purposes \$3,064.42. Rev. M. L. McKenney, pastor.

UPPER HILL. This charge has been among the charges that have had some change in pastors during the conference year. After the Rev. J. R. Shockley had been appointed to Crisfield (Shiloh) the people willingly accepted the present pastor to serve the remainder of the year out. But the charge has been so pleased with their present pastor—that they have voted his return for another year. He was appointed to serve these people Sept. 6th, 1942. Conversions —, accessions 1, ministerial support \$816, General

and Annual Conference Benevolence \$61, other items \$41, raised on mortgage debt \$578. A special effort is on to wipe out the total debt with the Mission Board. Cost of improvements \$113, Rev. J. H. Nutter, Pastor.

WACHAPREAGUE. A new man was sent to pastor this charge last year. In spite of the fact, he is not living on the work—yet the charge has wrought well. The people like the pastor and the pastor is in love with the people. His return has been requested for another year. The pastor has worked hard in bringing this appointment into its own. The church is responding nicely to the new organizations set up in the churches. The pastor reports: conversions 1, accessions 3, ministerial support \$783, General and Annual Conference Benevolence, advance over last year \$23, other items \$36, a cement walk at one of the Churches and other improvements at a cost of \$250, and the same paid for. Much of the cement work was done by the pastor himself. The church roof at Burton's has been fixed and some money in hand for decorating the church inside. Rev. J. S. Collins, Pastor.

WATTSVILLE. This charge has had another great year under their hard working pastor and wife. The church is well organized—three choirs and all robed. There are crowds of people in this community. The pastor has a large crowd to whom he preaches every Sunday. The people are pleased with having their pastor and wife return—salary has been increased. The people respond to leadership. This charge has suffered the loss of some very strong and most prominent laymen, such as brothers Beecham, Copes and Conway. The pastor reports, conversions 5, accessions 5, ministerial support in full \$1551, General and Annual Conference Benevolence, in full \$227, other items in full \$125, paid on old debts \$375, total raised for all purposes \$3252. Rev. I. R. Elzey—Pastor.

WETIPQUIN continues to advance under their present pastor—harmony and Christian love and Fellowship prevails throughout the charge. The people and pastor are both happy. The churches are organized and functioning. The church at Jesterville has been renovated—interior decorated and outside painted. The pastor reports—conversions 7, accessions 12, ministerial support \$1339, General and Annual Conference Benevolences \$67, other items \$80, repairs on churches and parsonage \$720, paid on debt \$25. The cost of renovating church at Jesterville was raised by W. S. C. S. Rev. Alexander Reid—Pastor.

WHITE HAVEN is another charge that has great possibilities—the charge has been served very acceptably by one of our retired ministers. In spite of poor health this year, the pastor has wrought well. He has no desire of accepting work another year—but will “come apart and rest awhile.” The pastor is worthy of the greatest commendation for his wonderful services rendered in this charge. He reports conversions 15, a great revival was held here. Received as preparatory members 15, ministerial support \$898, General and Annual Conference Benevolence \$92, other items \$55. Rev. I. D. Pitts—Pastor.

WITHAMS. This charge reports having had another good year. The pastor is a hard worker. He has endeavored to make advance over last year. He reports conversions 2, ministerial support \$1318, General and Annual Conference Benevolence \$116, other items \$96, repairs on churches and parsonage \$231, one church painted. Parsonage renovated, and painted—

W. S. of C. S. and Methodist Youth Organized and active. Rev. R. A. F. Graham—Pastor.

### WILMINGTON DISTRICT

Bishop Alexander Preston Shaw, our resident Bishop, Members and Friends of the Conference: With a heart of sincere gratitude and thanksgiving to our Heavenly Father we present this our second Annual Report of some things attempted and some things done on the Wilmington District.

#### Our District Territory

Our District Territory has problems and opportunities more or less peculiar to itself because of our location and of the unusual types of things going on here among us. There are thousands upon thousands of Negro peoples of every kind and caliber pouring into our laps from everywhere. The people are thronging into our Industrial Centers like Chester, Pa., Wilmington, Dela., Camden, N. J. and Elkton, Md. Several new housing units have been erected and others are in process of erection within our Church Parishes. These new-comers are rightfully expecting and receiving Pastoral attention from our Churches. Other portions of our District Territory are on the Seashore where there is a partial Blackout every night in certain restricted Areas. But the people are facing those situations heroically, and rendering Yeoman services for the Kingdom of God wherever they are.

#### Sick and Bereaved

Our Ministerial ranks have not been broken by death this Conference year. However there have been a few deaths in certain families and among near relatives. They all have our heartfelt sympathy. Rev. C. B. White our Pastor at Quinton and Springtown charge lost his wife in an automobile accident during this Conference year. Her Funeral services were conducted

at Allen A. M. E. Church in Philadelphia. The District Superintendent delivered the Eulogy; several of the Pastors in the Conference were present and took part in the services.

Rev. J. W. Parker our Pastor at Middletown, Delaware was in a train wreck near Wilmington one night, and was taken to the Hospital for treatment. He was among others who were badly injured. The headlines in the Wilmington Dailies created some excitement that aroused the friends of brother Parker very much. Many phone calls were made to inquire of brother Parker's condition, and to know how serious it was. But he did not remain in the Hospital long enough for the brothers to get there with their expression of sadness and of sorrow. He was in his Pulpit within a few days thereafter preaching with more force than before.

The Revs. W. E. Waters, T. E. Randall, A. L. Martin and T. B. H. Coleman, who are not now active in the Itinerant Ministry, who are in our territory may be sometimes up and sometimes down in Physical Health, but they still possess spirits that are ever aglow when they reflect over lives well spent in the Gospel Ministry. Mrs. A. B. Arnold wife of our Pastor of Grace, Darby has been sick in Pennsylvania University Hospital. Mrs. F. C. Kershaw, Mrs. J. W. Parker and Mrs. W. H. Johns have suffered slight illness during the year.

#### Our Appreciation

One of the most touching and beautiful occasions we ever witnessed took place around Christmas time. Rev. T. B. H. Coleman was given a birthday party celebrating his 100th Birthday. Some hymns were sung, short addresses were delivered, and a modest purse was made up by the several Districts of the Conference and presented out of appreciation of the life and services of Rev. T. B. H. Coleman. The Stewards of Ezion Methodist Church where the occasion took place gave a purse aside from that given by the Districts.

#### District Meetings

The District Stewards Meeting was assembled at Ferry Avenue Church, Camden, N. J. The Pastor Rev. C. B. Miles and his good people spared no pains to make things pleasant and inviting to us as their friends. Members of the Woman's Society of Christian Service and members of the Board of Lay Activities were on hand to plan the Program of Religious Activities for the year.

Following the District Stewards Meeting in May, we were called to the Young People's Assembly which met in June at Pleasantville, N. J. Rev. B. B. Carson was the congenial pastor host. It was indeed inspiring to meet that promising group of youth with minds alert and determined purposes to do the best things in life and for life.

Our next District Meeting was the District Conference which met in October at Cape May, N. J., Rev. J. I. Peaco, Pastor. The people at Cape May charge know how to make it pleasant for their guests. The sessions of the Conference at Cape May were highly spiritual. The spirit of the



Lord often came down upon the people in copious showers like unto the day of Pentecost. Brother J. J. Seabrook the Director of Morgan Christian Center of Baltimore, Md. was one of our guest speakers at the Conference.

The Annual Meeting of the Woman's Society of Christian Service was held at Salem, N. J. Rev. H. A. Bailey and his fine spirited people made us feel very happy while we remained in their City of Peace. Mrs. J. E. Maddox and her splendid staff had planned a great meeting which was remarkable from beginning to end.

The District Missionary Institute through the direction and guidance of Rev. E. C. Kincaide was a standard Institute—many of the Pastors were present and complied with the request to make certain reports. Mrs. E. J. Nichols, District Secretary Woman's Society of Christian Service, co-operated with us in making the Institute greatly helpful. Aside from the other planned work Mrs. Mary Whitten and Dr. Olliver J. Collins delivered addresses assigned on appropriate subjects. The Institute was the guest group of the W. S. C. S. of Ezion Church.

The monthly Preacher's Meetings are sources of information, inspiration and Christian Fellowship. We find it very pleasant for brothers to dwell together in love and in peace. The Ministers Wives Association meet together with the Pastors and add much by their discussion and furnish many helpful features to our gatherings.

The Efficiency Conference which was held at Ferry Avenue, Camden, this year, March 18th, eclipsed all previous meetings of its kind among us. The types of addresses, the subjects discussed and the personnel of the attendance lifted the whole and the entire setting far above any other meeting of its kind previously held. The crowning feature of the day was the outstanding masterly address of our Resident Bishop A. P. Shaw. The Bishop spoke at night to a vast audience that filled the Camden Church to overflow. This audience was augmented by a Methodist Brotherhood Organization of 150 members of Port Norris, N. J. Rev. J. E. Bishop, pastor. The people went away that night with new ideas of a practical life, so-essential for days like these. The District Ministers Wives Association brought informal greetings and made a presentation as a token of love and esteem to Mrs. A. P. Shaw at the Ferry Avenue Parsonage.

Other guest speakers at the Efficiency Conference were Dr. D. W. Henry of Tindley Temple and H. C. Leonard of the Board of Home Missions and Church Extension. District Superintendents L. H. McArthur, D. H. Hargis, J. W. Jewett and O. H. Spence were welcome guests and prominent speakers at most District gatherings. The Pastors and Laymen of other Districts found welcome among us at any and all times.

#### Ministerial Support

Several of the charges are in much sympathy with their Ministers during these times when the cost of living is beyond the reach of so many Ministers, and it is yet climbing higher. Many charges have decided to share with the Ministers the increase of wages which the laity now enjoy. Some of the charges are paying their Pastors more this year and will pay still more for the next Conference Year. These charges are Asbury, Atlantic

City, Hamilton Memorial, Atlantic City, Bridgeton, N. J., Buttonwood and Christine, Camden, N. J., Cape May and Swainton, St. Daniels, Chester, Siloam, Chester, Delaware City, Dela., Elkton, Md., Middletown, Dela., New Castle, Dela., Newport, Dela., Odessa and Port Penn, Pleasantville, N. J., Port Norris, N. J., Quinton and Springtown, N. J., Salem, N. J., Ezion, Wilmington, Haven and Mt. Carmel, Wilmington. In other words twenty-one charges of the thirty one charges on the District are now paying more salaries to their Pastors or will pay more next year than they did two years ago.

#### District Organizations

We endeavor to do some cultivation and Educational work through our District Church Organizations by relating them to the kindred Organizations in the local Churches. According to the Pastors reports to the District Superintendent there are now in the District 30 Organizations of Women's Societies of Christian Service. There are twenty-one Boards of Lay Activities, there are 23 charges operating by the Boards of Christian Education according to the Discipline of 1940. There are 22 Youth Fellowship Organizations. Rev. L. S. Moore is President of our District Young People's Assembly and Set-Up. Mrs. J. E. Maddox is President of the District Woman's Society of Christian Service. Mrs. Ella Bailey is the District Lay Leader. Miss Nettie Callis and Mr. Hannibal Cooper are the Associates.

#### General and Conference Benevolence

The Conference Benevolence Budget was given to us to be apportioned to the various charges on the District. This we endeavor to do as authorized by the Annual Conference. The Pastors and the Laity with a very few exceptions have striven hard to raise their apportionments in full. Those who fail have the satisfaction, we hope, of having done their best. However we are duty bound to give honor to whom honor is rightfully due. The following charges according to our record have raised the Benevolence Budget together with the other Items in full and will be entitled to a special Certificate of reward for District Service. According to reports as we have checked them the following charges have collected their full Benevolence Budget and that of other Items as follows: Asbury, Atlantic City, N. J., Rev. W. J. Helm, Pastor, Members added 12, Budget \$5863. Bridgeton, W. G. Matthews, Pastor, Budget \$1559, 17 members added to the Church, burnt Mortgage on Parsonage. Delair, Rev. C. S. Sprigg, Pastor, Budget \$2043, 3 members added to the Church. Delaware City, Rev. S. G. Fullman, Pastor, Budget \$1757, members added 2. Ezion, E. H. Crampton, Pastor, Budget \$11205, members added 54. Fordsville, Rev. J. H. Blackiston, Pastor, Budget \$—, members added 33. Grace and Darby, B. A. Arnold, Pastor, Budget \$2168, members added 24. Haven, W. A. Mulley, Pastor, Budget \$3300, members added 2. This Charge free from long standing debt—mortgage burnt. Mt. Carmel, Rev. J. T. Ayers, Pastor, Budget \$1573 aside from the amount paid on new Mt. Carmel, members added 81. Mt. Joy, Rev. J. H. Russum, Pastor, Budget \$2932, members added 12. New Castle, Rev. H. T. Johnson, Budget \$3000, members added 2. Newport, Rev. D. S. Quillin, Pastor, Bud-

get \$2527, members added 2. Odessa and Port Penn, W. R. Hazzard, Pastor, Budget \$2043, members added 25. Port Norris, J. E. Bishop, Pastor, Budget \$2178, members added 16. Salem, H. A. Bailey, Pastor, Budget \$3211, members added 12. Siloam, W. H. Johns, Pastor, Budget \$4009, members added 19. St. Daniels, L. S. Moore, Pastor, Budget \$12804, members added 36.

Eighteen charges of the 31 are reporting their World Service and Finance Budget raised in full. Activities of other charges that are not reporting asking in full but several of them have done most excellent work along many lines. Buttonwood and Christiana, Rev. Milton Jackson, Pastor, have done some repair work on the Church building and have made considerable advance in Benevolence collection.

Grenloch and Rhodes, changed Pastors during the year, Rev. I. H. Thompson took charge when Brother Randolph Fisher withdrew. The charge is making a good report. Lawnside Church gave them Rhode Chapel in fee simple. Cape May and Swainton, Rev. J. I. Peaco has enjoyed one of the most successful years known there for many years. The Church at Cape May has paid \$2233 on the Mortgage and has reduced the indebtedness to \$2836. The long time intricate puzzle and problem have been worked out. The Board of Home Missions and Church Extension rendered great service in this effort through their staff member of Finance and Debt Raising Dept., Dr. J. T. F. Fletcher.

Elkton continues to grow and prosper in the fine leadership of their Pastor, Rev. D. M. Collins. A new Pipe Organ was bought and paid for this year, salary was increased \$400. It is truly wonderful! Peace must be there. Lawnside, Rev. F. O. T. Laws, Pastor is going their upward way, new heights gaining every day. Merchantville, Rev. J. L. Taylor, Pastor. Brother Taylor went to this charge 12 years ago when they were in need of a hard worker and a good Gospel Preacher. He has done well. Merchantville still offers a splendid opportunity for Yeoman service.

Middletown, Rev. J. W. Parker, Pastor. This charge has enjoyed one of the most prosperous years under the leadership of brother Parker. Renovation of the Parsonage with modern bath and toilet, money is in hand to put new roof on the Church. All salaries paid in full and increase of salary for next year. Many things are done. Mount Holly and Burlington, Rev. C. E. Kincade, Pastor. Some splendid services have been rendered. There have been increases and progress along many lines of Christian Activities.

Ocean City, Rev. I. H. Thompson, Pastor. This appointment moves on in the even tenure of her ways. It is a Seashore appointment where we hope to take care of the religious needs of all our people who go to Ocean City either to work or for a vacation.

Pleasantville, Rev. B. B. Carson, Pastor. This charge is near the Seashore. The Pastor's family can enjoy the Ozones from the Ocean in a beautiful and well appointed Parsonage and at the same time do a splendid service for a responsive people. Rev. Carson has fitted nicely into the situation.

Quinton and Springtown, Rev. C. B. White, Pastor. Some of our most sacrificial people in the District are found in this charge. The Pastor and

people work well together and will make a splendid report at this Conference. Woodbury and Jericho, Rev. J. J. Whittington, Pastor. The people and Pastor have majored largely in paying off Church debts and clarifying and straightening out their Parsonage deed. Camden, C. B. Miles, Pastor, has come very nearly raising all apportionments. Budget \$3453.

#### District Parsonage Property

The District Parsonage was purchased in Wilmington 13 months ago and at that time was occupied by the District Superintendent. It is a great asset as we see it to our District and to the Delaware Conference. The District Trustees in the beginning adopted a system by which the property may be paid for within five years. In accord with that system adopted the charges have reported this year \$1725.50. Other receipts are brought to this session of the Conference and will be reported at the next Annual Conference session.

#### Christian Education

The cause of Christian Education still has the front of the stage in the Wilmington District. Aside from Annual Youth Assembly held at Pleasantville, group meetings have been held at Atlantic City, N. J., Salem, St. Daniels and Ezion charges. All of these gatherings have been under the general supervision of Dr. F. J. Handy, the Conference Executive Secretary of Christian Education.

#### Evangelism and Revivals

Some such services have been conducted in all the charges. A special Evangelistic Effort was made however in January, which was District wide in its influence, but not in actual participation. We were greatly blessed by the services of Dr. J. W. Golden our Area Evangelist who spent around two weeks with us at certain strategic points and directed very successfully the whole plan of soul saving and religious and Church recruiting Campaign. Our efforts centered mostly around Wilmington and vicinity. Our Goal for the year was an additional increase of 500 members to the Churches. We were told at one of the Efficiency Conferences in Maryland that there is now a rationing of sinners, we are not reporting 500 as we desired but our charges have had points enough to add 408 members to our total district membership. We thank our Heavenly Father for those 408 full members.

#### New Mount Carmel Church, Wilmington, Del.

You will allow me to close this report by presenting to the Conference your own child. We say your child because it was by an S.O.S. call by Bishop Shaw that the entire Conference co-operated to make the new Mt. Carmel a Conference project. The old Mt. Carmel building was a very modest structure located on East 11th Street, where they have worshipped for many years. An opportunity came and was seized upon to purchase from the Peninsula Conference of the Methodist Church a new site for Mt. Carmel congregation. The history of how we went about securing and purchasing this new project is too large and tedious to relate now. We

were in competition with the other denomination and even with our denomination in securing this plant. Our resident Bishop took the lead and the generalship in all important steps. The leading white Methodists of Wilmington furnished fine co-operation.

The purchase price of the Mt. Carmel Plant was reduced to us \$18500. The property is worth not less than \$60,000 so the business men tell us. It is one of the best equipped church properties that the Delaware Conference has below Philadelphia. The Church building is well equipped with good pews, tables for Christian Educational Dept., Pipe Organ and Pianos, heating plant etc. It has a Parsonage of nine rooms and a garage at the disposal of the Pastor.

The Old Mt. Carmel Building was vacated on Sept. 20, 1942 when the Pastor, Rev. J. T. Ayers and the District Superintendent marched before that heroic, faithful loyal group into the new structure which has been named Mt. Carmel Community Methodist Church. Rev. A. W. McBride former Pastor of Old Mt. Carmel preached the last sermon in that Church. Dr. D. W. Henry preached the first sermon to us in the new structure. Rev. J. T. Ayers announced the first hymn, Bishop A. P. Shaw came on Monday night Sept. 21st and preached as never before to a capacity house. Among the many others who assisted in the opening services were District Superintendents L. H. McArthur and J. W. Jewett.

#### The Financial Angle

The Old Mount Carmel was sold for \$7000. This amount was applied or is being applied on the debts of the new Church. Old Mt. Carmel was indebted to the Board of Home Mission and Church Extension to something over \$5000. The Board settled for \$5000. The balance of the \$7000 is applied on the present debt on the New Mt. Carmel. With the amount raised by the Church membership and friends, by the charges in the Delaware Conference and from sale of property the debt is now reduced from \$18,500 to around \$13,000—Taxes, insurance, Attorneys fee are all taken care of up to date.

The Pastor, Rev. J. T. Ayers deserves credit and thanks for allowing himself to be used by the Bishop, by the District Superintendent. The District Superintendent was required to give personal and close supervision of every important step throughout the year up until this session of the Conference. He has endeavored to do as he was told to do.

We have come to the close of the Conference Year with the satisfaction of having done our best. The Ministry and the Laity have striven together to disseminate love and good will among a people whose hearts at times are bruised and broken. With the dim lights in our hands we have turned them toward the dark paths of the bewildered travelers on the way to hope of a greater brilliancy. Our fondest ambitions have been and are to connect up in some way with human fellowships that we may have some small part at least in soothing the sorrowing, mellowing the hearts of the raging and raving tyrants and hastening the peace of God to a troubled world.

**REPORT OF THE EXECUTIVE SECRETARY**

Christian Education is the way out of a confused tragic world to a better and more meaningful way of life; it is not an end in itself but an efficient and positive means toward that end; it identifies itself with the home, the Church, the Community and the State; and builds its faith on the belief of the religious educability of the individual and his desire, willingness and ability to respond intelligently to the highest conceivable ideals; but to this is also added, as a necessary factor in the religious educational process, the unshaken confidence that the power of God can, will and must overshadow and rest upon him, if the ends towards which he strives, namely, a growing Christian Character, is ever to be realized. We must stake our all on this foundation and proceed cautiously but nevertheless confidently, as though our ends were already achieved.

The following projects have received very special emphasis throughout the year.

1. Daily Vacation Church Schools
2. Leadership Training
3. Coaching Conferences
4. Accredited Teachers

5. Visual Education
6. Institutes and Assemblies
7. Morgan State College Christian Center (The Wesley Foundation).

#### Daily Vacation Church Schools

In order to prepare our teachers for better work at the Daily Vacation Church School, I conducted group Institutes in the month of May, 1942, throughout the Conference.

The Philadelphia and Wilmington Districts were combined with an Institute at Tindley Temple, Philadelphia. The Dover, Easton and Salisbury Districts held their Institutes at White's Temple, Salisbury, Md.

The program of these Institutes emphasized Teaching Methods, Daily Schedules. The Literature for the Children and Worship.

This year \$300 were allocated for this work by the Conference Board, by which, a number of Church Schools, especially in Rural Districts, were aided.

The supervision of Children's Work in the Conference has been assigned to Mrs. D. L. Ridout, the efficient Conference Director and her very able assistants, the District Directors. Each one of whom has rendered exceptionally fine service.

#### Leadership Training

No Educational process can be considered adequate without emphasis on the training of the leaders. On all the Districts, Training Classes have been held for the Leaders in the Local Churches; training and enrichment courses for Methodist Youth provided by our Church, have been pursued; and in order that this training become systematic and general throughout the Conference, Rev. Henry Nichols as Conference Director of Youth and Rev. H. A. Bailey as Conference Director of Leadership. Education have been selected in cooperation with the Several District Directors of Youth, they have all worked together, thus no area in this entire field is neglected; but all our Church, large or small, have the opportunity of preparing leaders to carry forward the work of Christian Education.

Similarly the work of Adult Education has received direction and guidance under the leadership of the Conference Director of Adults, Rev. R. C. Hughes and the District Adult Directors. Detailed reports of each Conference Director may be seen in our Year Book.

#### Coaching Conferences

In order to meet the new situation growing out of the Rationing situation and difficulty of travel, I also readjusted the Leadership Training program into group Coaching Conferences: I prepared a list of over 50 fundamental questions covering in general the entire field of Christian Education, and then invited the members of the District Staff, District Superintendents and Pastors to meet me at some central place on each District to discuss and interpret the problems raised by these questions. The conclusions of these discussions formed the basis of information relayed to each

church on the Districts; thus again the entire field of Christian Education was opened up to each Layman and Preacher and their responsibility in carrying it forward made apparent, something of the scope and character of this Enterprise may be seen in the following brief details.

**DOVER DISTRICT**—Conferences were held at Bridgeville, Seaford, Laurel and Lewes, Delaware. The District Superintendent, Rev. L. H. MacArthur giving guidance and direction.

**EASTON DISTRICT**—At Easton: There the District Superintendent, Dr. D. H. Hargis divided his District into several central points to which other churches sent delegates to study the plans outlined to them by him and his District Staff. 18 young people enrolled in the Home Study Courses provided by our church.

**WILMINGTON DISTRICT**—Three Conferences were held on this District, two at the home of Dr. Thompson, District Superintendent, and the other at St. Daniel's Church, conducted by Mrs. Lucy Wricks, the Director of Children of the District.

**PHILADELPHIA DISTRICT**—Most of the work of this class is conducted by the Youth themselves through monthly meetings at the several churches in Philadelphia. The Superintendent, Dr. J. W. Jewett, also conducted several meetings in his home dealing with the Institute and other Christian Educational programs.

**SALISBURY DISTRICT**—Brother O. H. Spence, the District Superintendent called together his staff twice at Salisbury, Md. and outlined plans for an Institute to be held at Princess Anne College, Md. for 10 days in June. This Youth Fellowship assembly is to take the place of all other District Youth gatherings and promises to be one of the most intensive pieces of work to be done in the Conference. All of the teachers are to be accredited and some of whom have already begun this work.

#### Accredited Teachers

Great emphasis is placed across the church on accrediting our teachers; the enterprise of Religious teaching is the most serious which the church faces, and those who are to teach others are remiss in their responsibilities if they are not willing to make adequate preparation. We have within our Conference about 20 persons who have either completed their courses as Accredited Teachers or are in the process of completion. I can but earnestly hope that more of our Ministers and Laymen will seize this great opportunity of continued study; one of the essential prerequisites of a real leader. The scope of the Courses covering the First and Second Series is comprehensive enough to meet the needs of every one.

#### Visual Education

This is one of the latest developments in the entire field of Christian Education. Our office is equipped with the newest Kodachrome machine and the most modern Da-lite Screen. This service is available to all, without cost. Attempts are made to present the actual living pictures of church Schools in operation. The special colored pictures of the work of the Central

Jurisdiction are beautifully and artistically done effective; Worship services are also shown and other aspects of the work of Christian Education brought home through visualization in the most effective and realistic manner.

#### Morgan State College Christian Center

One of the most unusual opportunities for Christian service is offered to us through co-operation with the Morgan Christian Center at Baltimore.

Scores of young people at this State College need but the touch of the Christian leaders in both of our Conferences, Delaware and Washington, to awaken in them the smouldering flame of religious accountability. No amount of purely scientific education should nor can permanently atrophy their spiritual sensibilities or check the out reach of their souls toward God. It is one of the supreme challenges and responsibilities of our Conference Board of Christian Education. The Secretaries and the Director of the Center to work harmoniously together for the formation of these spiritual dreams which lie hidden in the bosom of all young people.

#### Institutes and Assemblies

I have attended during the year all of the Young Peoples Institutes and most of the District and Efficiency Conferences in the interest of our work, besides a number of preaching engagements and other educational meetings. The most interesting of which is the work of the Youth Caravans. The only one in the entire Central Jurisdiction. The young people themselves after a week of intensive training spend 6 weeks at several churches throughout the Conference interpreting and explaining the total program of the church. This is one of our most constructive and creative pieces of work being done during the year. Sincerely I hope that this phase of the work will be increasingly utilized.

I feel that Christian Education throughout the Conference is gradually molding itself into a substantial and very worthwhile pattern. It offers one of the most alluring, fascinating and profitable enterprises into which the church is engaged.

I hail with a peculiar feeling of satisfaction and pardonable pride the part I have been permitted to share with the District Superintendents, Pastors and other workers in bringing to pass this desired end.

For six years, by your help, I have come to see the realizations of my own fondest dreams; my ideal has been that of a Ministry with the Educational emphasis and the work of Christian Education within the Conference lends itself to that dream as well as gives unparalleled opportunity for that kind of specialized service toward its realization.

I have not reserved to my own good, throughout these years, any physical energy which I may have possessed, though traveling thousands of miles by rail, automobile and river, I have never missed one appointment on account of illness nor suffered bodily injury or harm of any kind from any cause, by which token I reverently claim the literal verification of the ancient sacred prophecy "the power of the Most High Shall overshadow Thee."



Neither have I reserved to myself whatever acumen of mind. I may have perchance possessed these years of exacting study, unrelenting toil and beautiful sacrifices, nor have I kept back what ever richness of spiritual experiences accumulated through the years but rather gladly joyously and enthusiastically have placed at the feet of our youth this endowment of body, mind and spirit. And now at this session I stand before the bar of the Conference fearless, unperturbed, unafraid and extremely happy with the unshaken confidence that I have striven to do God's will.

### REPORT OF THE COMMISSION ON WORLD SERVICE AND FINANCE

Bishop Shaw, Ministers, Lay Leaders and Friends: Your Commission on World Service and Finance submits to you its Second Annual Report of its activities.

Owing to the fact that at the last session of our Annual Conference, Rev. O. H. Spence, the tireless chairman of the commission, was elevated to the rank of District Superintendent, it became necessary to reorganize the Commission on World Service and Finance during the conference year. The budget accepted by the conference at our last session was \$42,913. The treasurer's report will reveal how well we met that goal.

The Annual Conference Treasurer has issued periodic statements relative to the General and Annual Conference Benevolent Remittances from Local Church Treasurers. It has been gratifying to witness the response made by many of the Local Church treasurers to the appeal for regular monthly remittances. The Commission on World Service and Finance thanks you for your fine spirit of cooperation and at the same time anxiously awaits a similar response from all of our Local Church Treasurers. With one hundred per cent cooperation, our World Service and Finance department of the church will work with a greater degree of efficiency.

The commission has not taken the responsibility of estimating and apportioning the charges of the various districts the amount necessary to give adequate support to our District Superintendents. (see paragraph 840-841) This work is still being done through the District Stewards Meetings of the various Districts.

#### Combination of World Service With The Annual Conference Benevolences

The plan for combining World Service and the Annual Conference Benevolence in one benevolence budget remains a matter of experimentation. The General Conference will decide the merits of this method.

(a) The General Conference Benevolence is disbursed to eleven boards:

(b) The Annual Conference Benevolences: These embrace all the legitimate needs of the Annual Conference Boards. The Districts and Charges are apportioned a sufficient amount to meet these interests. For instance, Friendship Home, has acquired property adjoining its plant this year. We consider it one of our vital interests therefore we have approved an allotment of \$600 to help meet its increased financial responsibility.

#### Commission Organization and Function

The labors of the commission are shared by thirteen members who work through the following committees:

1. The Committee on Budgets; which contacts various boards.
2. The Committee on Cooperation; which attends District Stewards meetings to assist in making apportionments. Dover Dist. Rev. J. L. Sawyer. Easton Dist. E. S. Jewett. Philadelphia Dist. W. H. Barnes. Salisbury Dist. H. H. Elzey. Wilmington Dist. N. N. Graves. Inasmuch as Gammon Theological Seminary is a fine Training center for the Methodist ministry and receives scholarships from several other conferences, the Commission recommends to the Conference that the sum of \$300.00 be included in the Budget for the establishment of a scholarship fund for Gammon.

3. The Committee on Percentages.
4. The Committee on Bonding and Banking.
5. The Auditing Committee: which audits all the treasurers' books forty days after the adjournment of the Annual Conference.

#### Scope of the Commission's Activities

The commission's annual budget must include:

- (1) The support of the General and Annual Conference Benevolences.
- (2) The General Administration Fund of which, sixty-three percent goes to General Conference and Commissions, two percent to the World Council of Churches, twenty percent to the Federal Council of Churches, and fifteen percent to the Commission on Public Information.
- (3) The Episcopal Fund.

#### Uniform Fiscal Year

Whereas, "The fiscal year for the Commission on World Service and Finance and for the Boards and Agencies related to it shall be from June 1, to May 31"—Paragraph 831, Discipline of the Methodist Church.

And whereas, The adoption of the said uniform financial and statistical year by all Annual Conferences would be advantageous to the conferences and to the church as a whole.

(a) By having financial and statistical reports throughout the entire church covering the same period of time.

(b) By having a parallel period for all apportionments in both churches and conferences.

(c) By having a uniform period in which to pay all apportionments.

(d) By giving the Conference Treasurer and Statistician ample time to prepare their reports.

(e) By the promotion of the work for various causes in a more efficient manner.

Be it resolved that the Delaware Annual Conference will change to the fiscal year of June 1 to May 31.

#### Vote of Thanks

Whereas, Dr. J. R. Waters has rendered so many years of faithful service in building up our endowment funds for Conference Claimants;

Be it resolved that the conference will give him a rising vote of thanks for his unflagging enthusiasm and service.

#### Elimination of Treasurers

Whereas, the Commission on World Service and Finance is obligated to require the treasurers of all Boards, Societies and Institutions to be bonded in Companies approved by the Annual Conference Committee on Audit: (paragraph 839).

And whereas the centralization of our process of conference debt paying will result in economy of finances for bonding purposes, and greater convenience for the auditing committee:

And whereas W. H. Staten is treasurer for both the Board of Lay Activities and the Board of Home Missions and Church Aid, of the conference:

And whereas the conference trustees have an order drawn on the church aid funds when in need of finances:

Be it resolved that W. H. Staten will function as the treasurer of the Trustees of the conference in addition to his present position.

**Discipline of the Methodist Church, Paragraphs 832-841, Financial Plan**

832. "There shall be in each Annual Conference a Commission on World Service and Finance composed of five Ministers and six Lay Members nominated by the District Superintendents and elected by the Annual Conference next succeeding the General Conference. They shall serve for four years, beginning with the adjournment of that Annual Conference. No member or employee of any Conference or Connectional Board shall be eligible. The chairman of each Conference Board or Commission, or some person appointed by it shall have opportunity to represent the claims of his Board or Commission before the Annual Conference Commission on World Service and Finance. \* \* \*"

**PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE**

We cannot see faith, love, service. We see the result of these. It, therefore, became necessary for groups dealing with the intangibles to declare their message and program from time to time. Our point of view, not only represents that of the Delaware Conference Board of Education, but of the Board of Education of the Methodist Church, under whose direction we have been working for eleven years.

**Our Message and Program**

As leaders in Christian Education our message is the Christian message as a whole. Our program in the broad sense is the program of the Church. In the perisphere of the New York World's Fair, and in the Futurama of the General Motors Building, America got an airman's view of the world of tomorrow. It was a world of roomy, cozy homes and mechanized farms, super-highways and bustling, happy people, spotless power plants and merchants of plenty.

Now, four years later, America is a land of trailer camps and congestion, unpainted houses, dirty trains, weary people, camouflaged industries and merchants without merchandise. **BUT CURIOUSLY ENOUGH, THE WAR ALSO HAS BROUGHT THE WORLD OF TOMORROW CLOSER.**

This fact has awakened the Christian Church to the imperative need of maintaining Christian fellowship transcending all divisions of nation, race, or class. It has brought Christians to the place where we must unite in efforts to discover and support the bases of a just and enduring peace based upon friendship for all people, equality of opportunity for all, and a world federation for the peaceful solution of international problems.

We recognize that Jesus Christ must have central place in our program. Our task is none other than to win men, women, children everywhere into the faith of the Son of God, helping them to develop an intelligent understanding of what it means to be a Christian and live a consecrated life.

**Our Work This Year**

During the year now ending your board of education has endeavored to translate this message and program into life and service by expending money (to the extent of \$3400.00), and much thought as well as time. How well this has been done is indicated by the reports of our staff workers appearing in this Year Book. Many difficulties confronted us this year. Gas rationing forced us to give up many gatherings. The need of our country for the youth in the armed forces and defense plants of the nation greatly disrupted our youth work. War conditions have our children somewhat confused and bewildered. In spite of all this we have tried to maintain our standard of efficiency, for in the language of a great leader "When the world is at its worst the church must be at its best."

**The Christian Worker**

"The Unordained Christian Worker" is the interesting title of a recording by Dr. Stuntz. It has been broadcast from time to time over six stations in the State of Michigan. The Year Book this year is dedicated to the lay-



worker in our local churches. It is doubtful whether we have recognized the importance of layworkers as we should. When we consider the limited time they can give to Christian education and the fine job they are doing in Christian Service we honor ourselves by giving recognition to them in this manner.

The time has come when the Delaware Conference should be thinking about part-time and even full time workers in Christian education. Post-war problems in America will call for skilled workers motivated by Christian principles. Relief, rehabilitation, and race-relations will require Christian trained leaders. Forward looking churches and Annual Conferences are beginning to see the need of and are asking for trained part-time and full time directors of religious education, pastor's assistants, leaders of youth, parish workers and deaconesses. Young people, especially women, should be thinking of a career in this field. Where can we get these unordained Christian Workers? The Conference Board of Education feels that Morgan College Christian Center is our opportunity. We believe the Center should not only give religious guidance, fellowship, and recreation to the students and the Morgan Community, but it should also have a department or Chair of Religious Education offering training to all young people who have become aware of careers open to them in this field. It is our plan to only confer with the Board of Education of the Washington Conference with the hope that this need may be met at an early date.

#### Action Taken at Meetings

The Board holds two meetings annually, the annual meeting in May and the semi-annual meeting in March. At our May meeting our staff workers were urged to give special attention to the organization of local church boards of education, and to help churches where local boards of education exist in name only, to really function. We gave special attention to Vacation Bible Schools, making free grants-in-aid to help defray the expenses of such schools. We are prepared to do the same for Vacation Schools next summer.

At the semi-annual meeting held in Wilmington Feb. 10, it was agreed that the Board of Education ask this Conference to pass a resolution requesting each charge in the Delaware Conference to designate 50 per cent of the Race Relation offering each year to Morgan Christian Center, and the other 50 per cent to Bennett and Morristown Colleges. It was further agreed that the Delaware Conference recommend similar action on the part of the Washington Conference.

In order that we might maintain a closer contact with the Morgan Christian Center it was agreed that the director of the Center shall be a member of the Delaware Conference Board of Education.

At a recent Executive meeting it was the consensus of opinion that we should strive, now and always, to maintain a high standard of efficiency on the part of all our staff members and workers. This is very important because it is through these staff workers that the message and program of this Board of Education is to be executed.

We the members of the DELAWARE CONFERENCE COMMISSION ON EVANGELISM desire to make the following observation and recommendations.

1. It is well known that there are persons both in the church and out of it, who have no experimental knowledge of God as a kind and loving Father. They are beset by many doubts because of their lack of this experience. The result is confusion or indifference.

2. It is our task to instruct them of Him as a God with whom they can become fully acquainted.

3. We regret the gradual decline of the old fashioned "Class and Prayer" meetings which offered such splendid opportunities for the expression of personal experiences; making the meeting rich in fellowship and spiritual encouragement. We are conscious of a need of these or similar means of grace for the sharing of these Christian experiences.

4. It is the desire of all Christian workers to see men and women truly converted and saved from their sins. To achieve this our ministry must take the lead in preaching and teaching a deeper consciousness of sin and its consequences.

5. It is well for us to stress Religious Education as an undergirding of these means.

6. We sense the need of such agencies as preaching missions, Group Conferences, Retreats, Personal Evangelism, The Upper Room, Tidings and the excellent services of the Christian Advocate.

7. We recommend that all persons, committed to the work of Evangelism seek to recapture the burning passion, spiritual enthusiasm and revitalization of our lives and continue heartily in every effort to win men to God.

8. We feel that it is needful to keep before our congregations the all important evangelistic note in every sermon. That classes be organized for religious instruction of children and beginners in the Christian faith and that special attention be given by our Pastors to the Youth Fellowship meetings. We recommend that all special seasons and special days be utilized with a view to bringing men and women into closer relationship with God.

#### REPORT OF THE STATE OF THE CHURCH

We do not assert for this report originality either of mode or matter, but excerpts of contemporary thought. It is the outcome of pondering facts, records and reports, official and authoritative. We trust it is ample enough to form the basis of discussion.

Churchmen need their opinions brought sharply to focus, that we may reach joint conclusions that may bring us together for united action beyond denominational lines.

"In times like these, it is well that we see in perspective the work entrusted to our care . . . In the swift pace of war-tensioned life, this perspective may be the most useful function of our annual meeting."

"No perspective is adequate unless we take a square look at our present condition . . . The very fact of the war is a major tragedy. Discerning non-Christians will not fail to see the meaning of the so-called Christian nations engaged in a death struggle—the very nations from within whose borders the modern missionary movement has sprung and developed."

No perspective is complete without a look at the future. The first



requirement here is that we should understand the revolutionary character of the present conflict. We know the Nazi program is an assault upon the Christian conception of life, a drive for the very souls of people.

Christianity must do its work in the matrix of whatever order exists in the world it confronts.

"Certainly we are challenged with the necessity of reality in our christian experience, of genuineness in our Christian fellowship, of new emphasis upon spiritual foundations and the necessity of making democracy work. These at least are required if a new house—God's house—is to be built upon the wreck of the present so-called civilization. This is why we say that we are on the eve of the greatest opportunity for the expansion of Christianity that we have ever known. To think of Christianity in the post-war world in any other terms than global strategy would simply be foolish and futile . . . The leaders of the world mission of the church know this. Word comes to us from every land of conferences, of research and resultant findings, of books and pamphlets, of addresses and lectures, of attempts to create and organize public opinion in order that the Church might expand its thinking, its outlook, and its activities until it becomes a vital force in the remaking of the world."

"In the post-war world, the problems of united planning, further co-operation, and Church unity on the part of the Christian forces will increasingly press upon us. Right now, as never before, the weakness of the Protestant position as a world force lies in its disunity. As this is increasingly realized and especially as the churches come to view their post-war tasks, we will perforce engage in more united enterprises, and this is as it should be."

### Negro Work

Dr. Edgar Love in his annual report to the Board of Home Missions and Church Extension, says:

"The Department of Negro Work has tried to do its share in this total task. It is not easy for people who have built a white world (consciously or unconsciously for white people) to know what it means to live on the periphery of that world. It is not easy for people who have all the "freedoms" they fight to preserve to understand the reactions of others who live side by side with them but are denied in the main those freedoms and still are called upon to fight and die for them (not yet possessing them).

Our missionary needs fall in two categories—

(1) Missionary support for ministers and workers. We have discovered that the majority of Negro churches are greatly in need of renovation and repair. Perhaps one-third of these are practically unusable in inclement and cold weather. Especially is this true in rural areas. Unless a substantial aid in Church Extension is given soon they will be beyond repair. In our urban centers, where thousands of Negroes have migrated for work in War Industries, new church buildings are needed to adequately house these people and administer to their needs.

The average salary for Negro preachers in all of the nineteen Conferences is \$503.00, running from a low of \$205.00 in the Florida Conference, to a high of \$954.00 in the Washington Conference. With such meager support it is impossible to obtain the type of leadership needed for the promotion of the work and the uplifting of the people.

"The weakest link in the chain of our church life appears to be the lack of effective leadership of children and youth . . . Especially is this true in our Negro group. There are large areas in which only preaching services are held in the churches. There are other large areas wholly untouched by the Church or Christian influences . . . To meet the needs so apparent we believe Daily Vacation Bible Schools should be established where competent directors and leaders for these can be found. Already such schools are being held . . . To encourage local leadership to take over this type of work we believe our Board should indicate these schools and subsidize them for a period until local leadership and local organizations can be educated in their responsibility for such work."

Training for Leadership in "SCHOOLS OF PRACTICAL METHODS," for inadequately prepared ministers, is vital and should be expanded. 350 ministers attend each year these schools.

To secure efficient, consecrated social workers, we believe it is necessary to endeavor to discover young women in our colleges and universities who would be willing to make home missions their life's work, specializing in social work. In order to encourage such individuals, scholarships might well be offered to them for this type of training.

In the field of home missions the need for an advance is obvious. The church must immediately meet this challenge . . . As a service to the souls of our people, we must check provincialism and increase the devotion of Methodists to the redemption of people beyond themselves and their neighborhoods.

Mankind is getting an education for World-mindedness in the hard, relentless school of bitter experiences, calculated to release us from our "low-vaulted past."

The worship of God is seen to be one with the service of Man: Not a white man, or a red man, or a yellow man, or a black man—Just Man! The aim is the ennobling of humanity.

Today we are able to think of the missionary task as the co-operative endeavor of idealists of all nations to produce through the motive of a religion of love, an exalted and friendly human society.

Knowledge of social conditions and their effect on human behavior is preparatory to any scheme of social salvation. Neither the Church nor the State can be goals, or ends. God and humanity, that is the balance.

Education for world-mindedness involves education against deep-seated prejudices. The veil of obscurity must be lifted. Prejudices are not born, they are taught.

Christ taught his followers that the Gospel was for men everywhere—that his way of life knew no barrier of race, color, or country. It is the essence of the Christian Faith that it must be propagated in the hearts of men in order that it may live.

1942 will be remembered for its definite trend to religious comity, bold clear steps taken toward understanding and mutuality by Jews, Protestants, and Catholics. As least we know we have a common foe. This foe is set for the destruction of all religion. Christ lives! There is no fear in His heart, nor in the hearts of His true followers. We are Christians!

## REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON TEMPERANCE

To the Bishop and Members of the Delaware Annual Conference:

We your committee on Temperance beg to submit the following report. Whereas we are painfully conscious as we look around us of the growing need of calling the attention of our Christian forces to an awakening of their sense of duty and obligations; to fight with all power and might the rapid spread and advance of the use of intoxicating drinks, the use of narcotics and cigarettes especially among our young folk, both men and women. Not only young adults, but our youth of tender age. All too often these youth find the beginning of this devastating habit in the social glass, the cocktail, the abundant free supply of cigarettes served in our so-called Christian Homes, presented with the remark "it will not harm."

One needs only to traverse the streets of some sections of our cities to see how much harm is being done. Dance halls are crowded with the flower of our group. Young folks who should be in our Christian schools and Colleges are benumbing their brain, wrecking their health, flinging to the winds their morals, degrading and wrecking themselves in drink and dissipation.

And again our streets, public conveyances and places of disrepute are too often filled with our young men, many of whom have been reared in Christian homes, yet here we find them reeling through the streets or through the trains, on buses or other public conveyances. These are scenes or facts more or less familiar to every one here present. What are we going to do about it? Shall we as members of a great church, a church that stands for the highest and best in every life, shall we close our eyes and say there is nothing we can do about it? Oh, no, there is something the church as a whole and we as individuals can do and must do. We can do something. We must do something.

1. As a church we can preach and teach and live the gospel of clean lives of temperance and of sobriety.

2. We can use our votes at the ballot box to see that we have clean officials who will not tolerate these dens of degradation and dissipation which drag our youth down to a drunkards grave.

3. We can put more stress upon the quarterly lessons on Temperance found in our Church Schools literature.

4. We can elect to our Public School Boards men and women who will include in the School curricular text books on the deleterious effects of alcohol, tobacco and narcotics. Lessons which will make such imprint upon young life as will compel them to abstain from the use of all such destroyers of life, health and morals.

5. In the interest of our men and boys now in the service fighting for the Four Freedoms, giving their lives to make Democracy Safe and to make this a better world in which to live. We can do our bit to have removed from near our camps those places where this bad intoxicating drink is so liberally dispersed, so easily obtained and is with subtle but sure results, making drunkards, rather than soldiers of our boys.

**BE IT RESOLVED:** That we as the committee request our ministers to preach a sermon on Temperance at least once a quarter.

That we request our Church School Leaders to present plays, pictures, posters and movies as often as possible, as a means of educating our youth. That Temperance Society be organized in the Church School and pledges taken. That pins or insignias be given and worn as a symbol of membership. That rewards be given for essays on Temperance. That scrap books be made of clippings from newspapers, that statements, mottoes, etc. be included on the regular Church Bulletin from time to time. Posters to be hung in Class Rooms.

If the Christian Churches, Church Schools, Young People's meetings, will do some if not all the things we have suggested, we prophesy a change in the near future in our youth who are today fast approaching adult-hood.

The Committee urges serious consideration and earnest prayer on the behalf of the members both ministerial and lay on this all important cause, to the end that this degrading monster may be stamped out and the day soon dawn in which we shall see blossoming out a new day of clean living, and the return of complete Prohibition.

# Obituary

## THOMAS WILLIAM COOPER

The Rev. Thomas William Cooper, the son of the late Henry and Eliza Cooper, was born in Clarke County, Va. in 1859 and departed this life January 28, 1943.

During the Civil War he and his mother went to Shippensburg, Pa. to live after the death of his father who was a soldier.

Brother Cooper attended the state school for soldiers' orphans in Buck County, Pa. and, having completed the course, attended Hampton Institute where he graduated with honor at the age of eighteen. For twenty-four years he taught in the public schools of Maryland and Delaware. In 1901 he joined the Delaware Conference and served the following charges successfully and acceptably: Seaford, Del. 8 years; Royal Oak, Md. 7 years; Lawsonia, Md. 5 years; Newman Memorial, Brooklyn, N. Y. 5 years; East New Market, Md. 3 years; Oxford, Md. 3 years; Thirkield, Jersey City, N. J. 2 years and Marion Station where he was serving his ninth year when the great reaper Death thrust in his sickle and he went to his heavenly reward.

During the forty-one years of his ministry, he satisfactorily served on the Conference Board of Stewards, the Conference and district boards of ministerial training, as agent for the Methodist Book Concern, and on various committees.

Brother Cooper was an inspiring, powerful and convincing preacher. His loyalty and devotion to the program of the church were outstanding; he was held in high esteem by the people whom he served and the brethren with whom he labored.

He was married to Miss Maggie Turner. Mrs. Cooper died when he was serving at Seaford. He later met and was happily married to Miss Adelle Neal of Phoebus, Va. and to this union one son was born, Neal Cooper. Mrs. Cooper was a helpmeet in the strictest sense of the word. So loyal was she that nothing but death could have separated them.

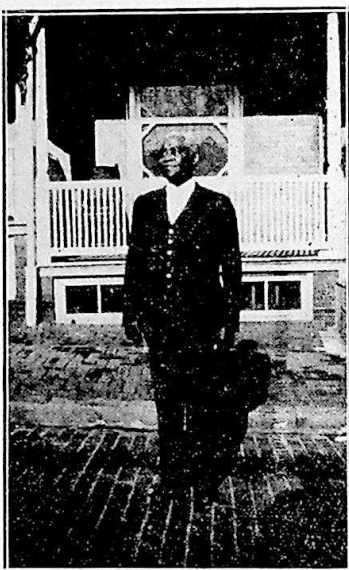

To you, JESSE THOMAS WALLACE, Husband, Father, Christian, Minister and Friend you leave full our urn with all of its sacred memories. And notwithstanding all that you have suffered, notwithstanding all the pain, weariness, anxiety, and sorrow that necessarily entered into your life, we would end our record with a devout Thanksgiving to God, the Great Author of your faith and for all that which belonged to your life and being—for

your joy and sorrow, your health and sickness, for your success and disappointments, for your life and death—because we believe that all is meant for good.

# Rules of Order

## OF THE DELAWARE ANNUAL CONFERENCE.

Rule I. The President shall decide all questions of order, subject to an appeal to the Conference; but in case of such appeal, the question shall be taken without debate.

Rule II. He shall appoint all committees not otherwise specially ordered by the Conference.

Rule III. On assigning the floor to any member of Conference, he shall distinctly announce the name of the member to whom he assigns it.

Rule IV. All motions or resolutions introduced by any member shall be presented in writing, if the President, Secretary, or any two members request it.

Rule V. When a motion or resolution is moved and seconded, or a report is presented, and is read by the Secretary, or stated by the President, it shall be deemed in possession of the Conference; but any motion or resolution may be withdrawn by the mover, with the consent of Conference, at any time before amendment or decision.

Rule VI. The motion to adjourn, to lay on the table, to take from the table, or for the previous question, shall be taken without debate.

Rule VII. No new motion or resolution shall be entertained until the one under consideration has been disposed of, which may be done by adoption or rejection, unless one of the following motions shall intervene, which shall have precedence in the order in which they are here placed, namely: (1) To fix the time to which the Conference shall adjourn. (2) To adjourn. (3) To lay on the table. (4) For the previous question. (5) To postpone to a given time. (6) To refer to a committee. (7) Substitute. (8) Amendment. (9) To postpone indefinitely.

Rule VIII. A substitute or amendment may be amended.

Rule IX. When any member is about to speak in debate, or to deliver any matter to the Conference, he shall rise and respectfully address the President.

Rule X. No member shall be interrupted when speaking, except by the President to call him to order when he departs from the question, or uses personalities or disrespectful language; but any member may call the attention of the President to the subject when he deems a speaker out of order, and any member may explain if he thinks himself misrepresented.

Rule XI. No person shall speak more than twice on the same question, nor more than fifteen minutes at one time, without leave of the Conference; nor shall any person speak more than once until every member choosing to speak shall have spoken.

Rule XII. When any motion or resolution shall have been acted upon by the Conference it shall be in order for any member who voted with the prevailing side to move a reconsideration; but a motion to reconsider a non-debatable motion shall be decided without debate.

Rule XIII. No member shall absent himself from the service of the Conference without leave, unless he is sick or unable to attend.

Rule XIV. No member shall be allowed to vote on any question who is not within the bar at the time when such question is put by the President, except by leave of the Conference, when such member has been necessarily absent.

Rule XV. Every member who is within the bar at the time the question is put shall give his vote, unless the Conference, for special reasons excuse him.

Rule XVI. It shall be in order for any member to call for the yeas and nays in any question before the Conference; and, if the call be sustained by twenty-five members present the vote thereon shall be taken by yeas and nays.

Rule XVII. It shall be in order to move that the question shall be taken without further debate, on any measure pending before the Conference, except in cases where character or Conference relations are involved; and if sustained by a two-thirds vote, the question shall be so taken; nevertheless, it shall be in order under this rule to move to recommit, to divide or to lay on the table after the previous question has been ordered.

Rule XVIII. The motion to adjourn shall be taken without debate, and shall always be in order, except (1) when a member has the floor; (2) when a question is actually put, or vote is being taken; (3) when a question is pending on sustaining the demand for the previous question; (4) when the previous question has been called and sustained, and action under it is still pending; (5) when a motion to adjourn has been negatived, and no business or debate has intervened; and (6) when a motion to fix the time to which the Conference shall adjourn is pending or shall be made.
