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
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



FIRST DAY—WEDNESDAY, APRIL 13, 1955

OPENING: The Delaware Annual Conference of the Methodist Church opened its Ninety-Third Session at Tindley Temple Methodist Church, Philadelphia, Pa., Dr. N. W. Moore, Jr., host pastor; Bishop E. A. Love, D.D., presiding officer.

THE HOLY COMMUNION. Following the ritual order for the Communion Service, Bishop Love delivered a timely message, then, assisted by the five Superintendents of the Conference and the host pastor, the Holy Communion was administered to the congregation. The Communion offering amounted to \$243.00.

OPENING BUSINESS SESSION

The Conference was called to order by Bishop Love, Resident Bishop of the Baltimore Area. Roll call was by cards filled out by ministerial and lay members.

CONFERENCE PERSONNEL. The name of F. D. Arnold was added to the list of Assistant Secretaries in the place of W. R. Hazzard.

F. D. ARNOLD was elected reporter to the Press, Mrs. C. B. White was elected Organist for the sessions. R. B. Thompson was elected Precentor. W. H. Johns was elected Postmaster. G. W. Reports of District Superintendents

DOVER DISTRICT

Bishop Love, Ministers and Laymen of the Delaware Conference:

"The best of all is, God is with us," so whispered John Wesley as he came down to the end of a well-spent life. And today, we of the Dover District, ministers and laymen alike, feel that God has been with us. It is He who has helped us on our way and to Him is due the glory and praise for all we have been able to do.

We have had one marriage in our ministerial ranks, Brother David Lewis, of the Seaford Circuit charge.

Brothers M. V. Hyland, W. G. Brown and Sister Rachel Brown have suffered illness during the year. All have completely recovered, except Sister Brown. Those among our ministers' wives who have been ill during the year are: Mrs. W. C. R. Mills, Mrs. C. W. Bagwell, Mrs. E. W. Dean and Mrs. T. L. Ross. Only Mrs. Dean and Mrs. Ross have not as yet made complete recovery.

Two of our ministers have died: Brother R. A. Bolden passed to his reward while pastor of the Cheswold charge and Brother G. B. Coleman (retired) also died.

DISTRICT ACTIVITIES

Our district activities have been many and they have all been invaluable sources of fellowship and inspiration in pressing forward the work of the district. In each emphasis and each meeting a vital contribution has been made to the life and program of the church. Time does not permit us to enumerate the various activities and programs in which we have been engaged, suffice it to say that no phase of the work of the church has been neglected or treated in an indifferent manner. The total program of the church has been faithfully advanced.

THE CHARGES

Bridgeville, C. E. Kiah, Pastor, continues to do excellent work with a very efficient pastor. Conversions 19, accessions 19. New church furnishings have been purchased—church attendance has increased—the church conducted its largest Vacation Church School this past year. Total contributions, \$5,359.

Bridgeville Circuit, H. T. Moody, pastor. The pastor does his work well. All apportionments are fully met. Conversions 38, accessions 22. One church has been completely remodeled—new heating system installed. The second church is now being remodeled. Total amount raised, \$9,616.

Chestertown, C. H. Molock, pastor. Another good year's work is reported here. All apportionments are fully paid. Conversions 46, accessions 14. Both churches have undergone repairs on the interior and exterior. The parsonage has also been renovated. Raised for all causes, \$10,562.

Cheswold, David Nickerson, pastor. Brother R. A. Bolden was assigned here, but before his work could be organized for the year he was stricken and died. The present pastor entered the scene late in the year and has done well under the circumstances in which he has worked. An unresponsiveness here to the benevolent program of the church renders a pastor's work difficult. The resources are here, but co-operation in meeting apportionment obligations is not easily gained. Conversions 6, accessions 3. Total contributions \$4,817.

Clarksville, T. L. Ross. pastor, is a charge with great possibilities and much good work could be done were the Clarksville people as co-operative as the Selbyville congregation. The pastor has done his best to bring good results. Conversions 4, accessions 22. The amount raised exceeds that of the previous year. Total contributions \$3,921.

Coleman, Roland Grant, pastor, reasserted itself last year and presented a good report, but the present year's work falls somewhat below expectations. The pastor has worked hard under some difficult circumstances. Conversions 2, accessions 4. Total raised \$5,552.

Crumpton, C. R. Bryant, pastor. The pastor has proved to be a good leader. Conversions 2, accessions 2. Two churches report interior improvements. An addition of one room has been made to the parsonage. Contributions total \$5,136.

Delmar, M. V. Hyland, pastor, recovers its former spirit of co-operation and makes an excellent report. The pastor has led the people to fully meet most all requirements. Conversions 14, accessions 8. Plans are afoot for a complete renovation of the parsonage and community hall. Total raised \$8,634.

Dover, W. E. Marks, pastor, continues its tradition of meeting all financial obligations in full. It holds the distinction of having what is perhaps the best organized church school in the district. The closely graded lessons have recently been instituted. Conversions 6, accessions 11. Funds are now being collected for erecting a community center. Total raised \$10,556.

Fairlee, Mrs. Grace Watts, pastor. Accessions 4. The pastor has striven faithfully to fulfill all obligations, and if this year's results are unequal to the past year, it is not because the pastor has failed to discharge her responsibility. The pastor has signified her intention to retire from the active work of the ministry at this session of the conference. An additional room has been built at one church and a new heating system installed. The interior of the community hall has been refinished. Total raised, \$4,669.

Galena, Mrs. Rachel Brown, pastor. The pastor is at this time ill, and the superintendent could obtain only a partial report on which to base an evaluation of the work done. Total reported \$1,702.

Harrington, Thaddeus Hackett, pastor, has improved upon its work and presents a better report than that of the previous year. Conversions 1, accessions 1. The pastor's salary has been increased. Improvements have been made in the church, parsonage and church hall. Raised for all causes, \$4,036.

Laurel, C. W. Bagwell, pastor, has experienced a successful year. Conversions 4, accessions 4. All apportionments have been raised in full. A \$200.00 advance was made in the pastor's salary. Pastor and people are happy together. Total contributions \$5,744.

Lewes, E. L. Maddox, pastor, continues to succeed. Conversions 12, accessions 7. All apportionments are met in full. Both churches have installed Hammond organs. The interior of the Lewes church has been beautifully remodeled and the Israel church has been renovated both on the interior and exterior. Total raised: \$7,462.

Lincoln, J. O. Lockman, pastor. Conversions 6, accessions 8. The pastor in his twenty-fifth year succeeds, as usual, in leading the people to a full report on all items. A new bath has been installed in the parsonage and it has also been provided with new furnishings. Total contributions, \$563.

Mardela, L. R. Jones, pastor, presents a better report than that of the previous year. Conversions 26, accessions 8. Increases are noted in all benevolences. The community hall has been renovated and equipped with modern conveniences—repairs have been made on the church. Total raised \$6,268.

Milford, Randolph Fisher, pastor, continues to make progress. Conversions 6, accessions 6. The pastor's salary has been increased by \$200.00. New furnishings were purchased for the parsonage, church attendance was increased. Total contributions \$5.740.

Millsboro, C. D. Brown, pastor. A charge which two years ago scarcely paid one-third of its claims, this year pays its full apportionment on all claims. Conversions 26, accessions 8. The pastor's salary was increased. The church which burned last year has been replaced by a better structure. Total raised \$7,350.

Nassau, J. O. Griffin, pastor, presents a good year's work. Conversions 10, accessions 10. The Rehoboth church has made extensive improvements on the interior. The Nassau church has had its mortgage paid. The pastor has done an excellent work. All claims are met in full. Total raised, \$10,410.

Newark, J. W. Mickle, pastor, exceeds its work of a year ago. The congregation at Newark, with the help from the National Board of Missions, will retire the debt on the church. Total raised, \$3,446.

North Berlin, W. G. Brown, pastor, surpasses its previous years work by a wide margin. All claims have been almost met in full. Conversions 13, accessions 16. The pastor's salary was increased by \$200.00. Some improvements have been made in the parsonage. The pastor gives good leadership. Contributions total \$7,032.

Pomona, C. C. Thomas, pastor, improves in its total work done. Contributions for benevolences have increased. Conversions 4, accessions 4. Rearrangement of the church school building has made possible separate class rooms for the church school. Total contributions \$5,050.

Port Deposit, E. W. Dean, pastor, has a small but very loyal and earnest membership, and they invariably make a good contribution to the cause of

the church. Accessions 2. Total raised \$1,798.

Rock Hall, G. B. Wilson, pastor, reports a successful year. Conversions 8, accessions 25. All apportionments are fully met. The parsonage has been renovated and new parsonage furnishings have been installed. Improvements have been made in the church property. Total raised \$7,710.

Sassafras, Mrs. Ophelia James, pastor, again meets fully its apportionments. Conversions 4, accessions 6. New furnishings have been bought for the parsonage. Funds are being raised to remodel one of the churches. Contributions total \$3,059.

Seaford, A. J. Dredden, pastor. Conversions 15, accessions 5. The charge has done well in making extended improvements on the church and parsonage. Attention needs now to be turned to the total program of the church, if the charge is to realize its possibilities. Total raised, \$6,014.

Seaford Circuit, David Lewes, pastor. Conversions 3, accessions 2. Better co-operation here would produce far more favorable results than are evident in the report from the charge. The pastor has done his best but accomplishments have not equalled expectations. Total raised \$1,205.

Sharptown, D. S. Quillen, pastor, has met all its financial obligations. Conversions 24, accessions 19. Proper emphasis has been given to all phases of the church program. Total raised \$5.098.

Smyrna, J. J. Webster, pastor. Conversions 1, accessions 4. Constructive work is being done by this small congregation. The people, however.

have not done all they had hoped to do this year. Total raised, \$2,184.

South Berlin, C. P. Spencer, pastor. Conversions 18, accessions 2.

Some points of growth have been attained during the year. Pastor and people still believe that there are possibilities which have not as yet been realized. Contributions total \$3,877.

Still Pond, P. R. Hilton, pastor. Conversions 4, accessions 5. The pastor has been diligent in service and some progressive work has been done. Total raised \$4,565.

Townsend, W. C. R. Mills, pastor, Conversions 17, accessions 19. There are indications of some progressive work being done. The youth work has prospered greatly. Two of the churches have made interior improvements. The parsonage has received new interior decorations. Total raised \$4,049.

We have presented in brief outline the work of the Dover District for the year now closing. Reports from our charges indicate that in all our major requirements, substantial gains have been achieved. These gains are indicative of the spirit of loyalty and devotion to a cause which characterizes the ministers and laymen of the district. Some of pastors and congregations consistently meet all financial obligations year after year, and they no less consistently and regularly add to the membership of the church.

We have registered a gain over last year of more than seven percent in charges paying all their general and annual conference benevolences; a similar increase is noted also in the number of charges which have met the full budgetary askings. Giving for conference claimants has increased more than thirteen percent over the previous year, and a similar gain is registered in the giving for the promotion advance fund. We report two hundred five conversions and two hundred seventy-four accessions. This represents an increase of forty-eight over 1954.

The youth emphasis and the "Four Nights for God" have been responsible for many of the increases in our membership. The church attendance campaign was also of great value in awakening increased interest and rekindling spiritual fires which long had burned low in the hearts of many of our people.

We express our very deep appreciation to our pastors and their wives and the many laymen of the district for the hearty spirit of co-operation and devotion shown in the work which has been done. We have labored together harmoniously and with brotherly love. We are thankful to have been associated with such fine spirited people.

We come to the close of this conference year with regrets that we have not done more for God. But we are thankful that we have been privileged to work in the interest of such a great cause. And we pray that God will bless our feeble efforts and cause them to redound to His glory and honor. As we turn our attention to the work which yet remains before us, we pray for His sustaining grace and power to help us in meeting the challenge which lies before us.

And, "Now to Him who by the power at work within us is able to do far more abundantly than all that we ask or think, to Him be glory in the church and in Christ Jesus to all generations, forever and ever. Amen."

EASTON DISTRICT

Bishop Love, Ministers, and Laymen:

We make this our first annual report for the Easton District to the Ninety-Third Session of the Delaware Conference with a sense of Christian humility and deep gratitude to our Heavenly Father for His mercy, guidance, protection, and other benefits to us.

Sick and Bereaved

God has wonderfully blessed our district this year. Yet our hearts are sad because of the passing of the Reverend Hosea Angulo, Mr. Joseph Chester, president of our District Board of Trustees, and Mrs. Robert S. Townsend. Death has also come to a brother of Rev. Edward Jackson, a sister of Rev. Noble Henry, the mother of Mrs. Martin Stafford, the husband of Mrs. Thelma Alford, and a brother of Mrs. Lutetia J. Lawrence.

The following persons have been ill during the year: Reverends Gurly Henry, C. H. Cottingham, J. I. Bivens, J. F. Henry, and Mrs. Emmons N. Foster.

Mid-Year Changes

The Rev. O. W. Jones, pastor of St. Mark church in Montclair, New Jersey, died during the summer of this conference year. On account of his death, the Bishop made the following changes: Rev. Hooker D. Davis was appointed to Hamilton Memorial church, Atlantic City, N. J. The Rev. Frederick D. Arnold of Preston, Maryland, succeeded him at White Temple in Salisbury. The Rev. Emmons N. Foster of Crapo and Golden Hill was appointed to supply the Preston charge, and Rev. Mrs. Hester Opher was appointed to supply the latter charge. Rev. Hayward Green was transferred to the new Methodist church in Durham, N. C. He was succeeded on the Stevensville charge by the Rev. C. E. Jordon of Denton. The Rev. Martin Stafford was assigned to the Denton circuit. The Rev. W. A. Harewood, who had served five and one-half years as district superintendent of the Easton district, was appointed to the vacant pulpit of the St. Mark church in Montclair. In this shakeup your humble servant landed as superintendent of the Easton district.

My predecessor left the district in good working condition. He had held the District Stewards' Meeting, the District Youth Fellowship Assembly, the first quarterly conference in each charge, and preached in most of the churches before the new appointments became effective on Sunday, September 12, 1954. Our orientation was facilitated by the unprecedented cooperation of Rev. Harewood who did his uttermost to make our adjustment on the Easton district as easy as possible.

I am grateful to Bishop Love who entrusted me with this unique office and responsibility in the Methodist Church.

In co-operation with the pastors and the Quarterly Conferences, we have persistently endeavored to promote all the interests of the church within the bounds of the Easton district.

Evangelism ---

We have urged the committees on membership and evangelism in the thirty-four pastoral charges to use dedicated persons and every approved method of evangelism to cultivate personal religion, to share spiritual experiences, and to bring all men into living active fellowship with God through Jesus Christ as divine Saviour and through the regenerating power of the Holy Spirit; to gather them into the fellowship of the church; to lead them to express their Christian discipleship in every area of human life that the Kingdom of God may be realized.

The District Committee on Evangelism recommended: That every pastor secure the materials which have been prepared by the General Board of Evangelism for the promotion of church attendance and the cultivation of interest among the unevangelized; that every church make a complete survey of the local community and keep a permanent record of the findings; and that the District Committee on Evangelism work cooperatively with the district superintendent and the youth director in the promotion of a district-wide evangelistic crusade for Christ with a major youth emphasis.

These goals were accepted. Pastors are preaching the gospel, ministers and laymen are recruiting disciples for Christ through personal and visitation evangelism, and the church school instructors are "teaching for a verdict." Only two pastoral charges reported no conversions.

Missionary Institute

The annual District Missionary Institute was held at Scotts Methodist church in Trappe, Md., on March 3rd for promotional and educational purposes in the interest of the Board of Missions and Church Extension. We diffused missionary information, distributed missionary literature, circulated the general missionary periodical, and used missionary visual education materials to implement the cause of missions. Seeing the local church as an integral part of the world parish has become a new rewarding experience for some attendants at our missionary meetings.

Every charge presented an offering in response to the Bishops' Appeal for Korea. Fifty percent of our churches raised the askings for World Service and Conference Benevolences in full. All churches have been urged to receive offerings for missions on fourth Sundays. We are determined to do more to promote the Kingdom of God throughout the world by enlisting the active support of every member of the church in a study of the needs of the world, in definite missionary service, and in regular contributions to the cause of missions.

Christian Education

Every pastoral charge has at least one church school superintendent and teacher for the promotion of Christian education. The progress of some church schools has been retarded by the adults' absenteeism, parental delinquency and lack of interest in the spiritual life of growing persons, a shortage of teachers and adult workers with youth, and inadequate space and facilities for educational work.

Approximately one hundred twenty-five youth from the charges attended the Youth Missionary Rally at Waugh church in Cambridge on November 26th. Five hundred scholars attended the Christian Workers' Schools in Cambridge, Centreville, and Easton during the months of January and February. Plans are now in the making for a Vacation Church School in every parish and a forward program for the new conference year.

Christian Stewardship

We, with the secretary of Stewardship and the Board of Lay Activities, have worked assiduously and untiringly to the end that "stewardship shall be the practical expression of one's experience of God." More than four hundred years ago William Tyndale wrote these words: "Faith is a living thing, mighty in working, valiant, and strong, ever doing, ever fruitful; so that it is impossible that he who is endued therewith should not work always good works without ceasing. He asketh not whether good works are to be done or not, but hath done them already, ere mention be made of them; and is always doing, for such is his nature." This stewardship life is becoming more evident in the churches of the Easton district. More preachers and laymen have already become tithers and systematic givers.

We recommend four ways of promoting stewardship in the local church: Preach the Gospel with the Spirit and power. Teach stewardship to growing persons. Make the giving of offerings an integral part of the worship service. Practice stewardship regularly.

The Charges

AIREYS continues to make a vital contribution to the spiritual and social life of the community. This charge was handicapped by the unemployment of many members and the pastor's brief illness. Rev. Van B. Wright has completed his fourteenth year as preacher in charge. Under prevailing conditions they have wrought well. Conversions, 6; accessions, 6; raised \$105.00 for World Service and Conference Benevolences, and a total of \$3,372.00 for all purposes.

BECKWITH maintains a previous good record in spite of the damage caused by hurricane Hazel. Improvements have been made in the parsonage. Conversions, 1; accessions, 0; paid \$40.00 for World Service and Conference Benevolences, and raised \$1,496 for all purposes. R. C. Whittington, pastor.

CAMBRIDGE, with J. R. Shockley, pastor, surpassed the good record of last year. A parish house has been built at a cost of \$18,720.00. Conversions, 16; accessions, 11; paid \$735.00 for World Service and Conference Benevolences. Raised \$13,526.00 for all purposes.

CAMBRIDGE CIRCUIT reports a very successful year. The St. Luke church has installed a new heating system, a new pulpit and altar, and painted the interior of the church. The Rock church added a new roof to its edifice. The parsonage has been renovated. Conversions, 3; accessions, 1; paid \$262.00 for World Service and Conference Benevolences, and raised \$5,996.00 for all purposes. Noble Henry, pastor.

CARMICHAELS had another good year. Improvements have been made in the parsonage and churches. New hymnals and two used pianos have been purchased. The revival and church attendance crusade strengthened this charge with increased attendance, eleven conversions and five accessions. Paid the World Service and Conference Benevolences in full, \$205.00, and raisd \$4,292.00 for all purposes. Robert S. Caldwell, pastor.

CENTREVILLE. Although the pastor was ill several weeks during the conference year, this charge reports the World Service and Conference Benevolences paid in full, \$225.00. Raised \$3,497.00 for all purposes. J. F. Henry, pastor.

CENTREVILLE CIRCUIT has done well under the circumstances. The pastor, Rev. Gurley Henry, has been a patient at the Henryton State Hospital since the month of May. James Nichols from Ridgely finished the year. Conversions, 8; accessions, 1; paid \$108.00 for World Service and Conference Benevolences. Raised \$1,523.00 for all purposes.

CHAPEL has been most successful this year. The charge requests the pastor's return. The minimum salary for the ensuing conference year is \$1,500.00, an increase of \$300.00, plus \$200.00 for travel and other expenses. Conversions, 7; accessions, 21; paid \$100.00 for World Service and Conference Benevolences, and raised \$3,035.00 for all purposes. All askings were paid in full. M. D. Brooks, pastor.

CHURCH CREEK has made some local improvements. The parsonage has a new roof and a new stove. St. Paul and Vaughn churches have been painted. Conversions, 1; accessions, 0; paid \$25.00 for World Service and Conference Benevolences; raised \$3,320 for all purposes. Samuel E. Armstrong, pastor.

CHURCH HILL appreciates the services of its new pastor. Some improvements have been made in the parsonage. The salary was increased \$50.00. Conversions, 16; accessions, 10; paid \$192.00 for World Service and Conference Benevolences, and raised \$4,879.00 for all purposes. Edward Jackson, pastor.

CORDOVA has concluded another successful year. Richard Asbury has liquidated the debt on the parish hall and painted the interior of the church. New Mt. Zion has equipped the parish hall with electric lights and a gas range. Conversions, 6; accessions, 6; paid \$155.00 for World Service and Conference Benevolences, and raised \$4,302.00 for all purposes. Frank Farrare, pastor.

CRAPO AND GOLDEN HILL began the year under the leadership of Rev. E. N. Foster. Since September 12th, the Rev. Mrs. Hester Opher has been the successful pastor of this charge. The Ebenezer church has a new roof. Conversions, 1; accessions, 4; paid \$125.00 for World Service and Conference Benevolences, and raised \$3,075.00 for all purposes. A sum of \$100.00 was added to the ministerial support. Mrs. Hester Opher, pastor.

DENTON and THOMASTOWN warmly received Martin Stafford as their pastor after C. E. Jordon had been appointed to the Stevensville charge. Improvements have been made in the parsonage and churches. Conversions, 12; accessions, 2; paid \$135.00 for World Service and Conference Benevolences, and raised \$4,021.00 for all purposes. Increased the ministerial support \$200.00.

EAST NEW MARKET and THOMPSONTOWN. After a lingering illness, the pastor's loyal and faithful wife, Anna, was called from labor to her reward on Tuesday, April 5th. Conversions, 1; accessions, 0; raised \$125.00 for World Service and Conference Benevolences, and \$4,203.00 for all purposes. Robert S. Townsend, pastor.

EASTON had another good year. The church school department has been renovated, and other improvements have been made. The pastor's salary has been increased \$200.00. Two youth—James Roberts and Walter Hazzard—have been licensed to exhort. Conversions, 3; accessions, 4; raised \$456.00 for World Service and Conference Benevolences, and \$7,033.00 for all purposes. Augustus Chancy, pastor.

EASTON CIRCUIT reports victory along all lines. A new oil burner heating system has been installed in the church. TRAPPE is one of the best organized and fastest growing stations on the Easton district. The charge reports 12 conversions, 12 accessions; \$285.00 raised for World Service and Conference Benevolences, and \$7,218.00 for all purposes. The pastor's salary was increased \$100.00. Improvements have been made in the church, and a new bathroom has been equipped in the parsonage. Harvey T. Hall, pastor.

VIENNA and REIDS GROVE maintain a good record. The three churches report 6 conversions, 7 accessions, \$240.00 paid for World Service and Conference Benevolences, and \$5,068.00 raised for all purposes. Rev. A. A. McDowell has completed his twenty first year as preacher in charge of this parish.

WILLISTON has excelled the good report of last year. Conversions, 3; accessions, 1; paid \$75.00 for World Service and Conference Benevolences; raised \$1,872.00 for all purposes. N. C. Stanley is the happy pastor.

WITTMAN and SHERWOOD make a fair report under the circumstances. The pastor is recovering from a recent illness. Conversions, 3; accessions, 3; paid \$45.00 for World Service and Conference Benevolences; raised \$3,313.00 for all purposes. I. B. Bivens, pastor.

Final Statement

We are grateful to the Rev. Howard A. Bailey for his contribution to our church school program, to the Rev. J. E. Licorish for helping to promote the cause of Missions, to the Rev. Mrs. Clarissa Walker and Dr. J. W. Golden for conducting coaching conferences in evangelism on the Easton district.

Again we express our sincere thanks to the faithful pastors and loyal laymen who acknowledged the needs of the world and the Church, and like

The church is growing. The exterior part of the bulding has been painted and also the Community House along with many other improvements. Raised for Benevolences \$288. Raised for all purposes \$13,223. Accessions 21.

Spring Lake, N. J., George Outen, Minister—This is a Summer appointment and serves the public during the months of June, July and August. The pastor is able to interest a large number of students who come there to work during the summer. They have some very well-planned social functions that attract attention.

St. Matthews Mission, Brooklyn, N. Y., Mrs. M. L. Slade, Minister—The Mission is active and is attracting the attention of many people. It is located in the section of the city where we do not have a church. They have a comfortable building in which to worship. The leaders are loyal Methodists. Benevolences \$34.00. Raised for other causes \$3400.

Trinity, White Plains, N. Y., T. M. Booth, Minister—This church is becoming one of the outstanding churches in the city. It has the name of having the best choir. The program of the church is excellently executed. The pastor is a civic leader. Raised for Benevolences \$358. Raised for all purposes \$16,160. Accessions 45.

Total Benevolences Raised \$22,191. Total raised for all purposes \$501,471. Total Accessions 1241.

I am happy to say that my contacts with the churches have been most enjoyable. It has been to each church the required number of times to hold the Quarterly Conferences and have also preached as often as possible. It has been a real pleasure to get to know the members of the church better. Most of the churches are using the official form for their reports. The attendance to the Quarterly Conferences has improved, but there is still room for improvement in all the churches. It would help each church greatly if every official attended the Quarterly Conferences because this is the only real contact with the conference programme they have.

The District Secretaries of Evangelism, Missions and Stewardship are a big help in the District Programmes. The District Lay Leader, Roy L. Cordery and Mrs. Margaret Trader, President of the Woman's Society of Christian ervice are very faithful. The District up't. greatly appreciates the many kindnesses expressed to him and wife by the ministers, their wives as well as by the laymen in the church during the year just passed. Will you pray that our district may become conscious to the value of Stewardship and Missionary Work?

Report of the Superintendent

"The peace of God, which passeth all understanding, keep your hearts and minds in the knowledge and love of God, and of His Son Jesus Christ our Lord; and the blessing of God Almighty, the Father, the Son, and the Holy Spirit, be among you, and remain with you always. Amen."

Bishop Love, Ministers, and Laymen:

With humble gratitude to Almighty God, I am now making my first report as a cabinet member to the Annual Conference.

We are thankful to our Heavenly Father for His guiding Spirit through the past months, and for giving me both physical and spiritual strength to do the work that was assigned to me at the beginning of the year.

The response to leadership on the part of both ministers and laymen has been beautiful. They have responded to every cause in such a manner that success was spelled out in words that can not be misunderstood by the most indifferent. It was necessary to increase the apportionments for World Service and Conference Benevolences by as much as one-third more than last year, but not one charge raised a voice of resentment against this increase, and I am very happy to say that several charges have raised their apportionment in full. It is gratifying to note the faith of both laymen and ministers in the time of real crisis.

Sick and Bereaved

Several ministers and their families have been on the sick list this year: The Revs. J. S. Collins and L. H. Jones, and Mrs. S. P. Sanders, Mrs. S. E. Parker, and Mrs. L. H. Purnell. Brother Grover N. Jones and Brother L. H. Jones lost a brother, and Mrs. Ada Coffey lost a sister.

District Activities

District meetings have been well attended and most helpful and informational as well as inspiring. These included the following: Meeting of the District Staff on Christian Education last May 6th; District Stewards' Meeting May 12th at John Wesley Church, Salisbury; Youth Assembly at Maryland State College, June 15-18; Christian Workers' School at Wattsville, Va., Salisbury, and Pocomoke City; the District Conference at Wattsville; Youth Missionary Rally at Pocomoke City; Missionary Institute at Fruitland and the Efficiency Conference at Princess Anne, Metropolitan Church.

Other very profitable meetings were: Pastors Seminars in January and February. Twelve youth attended the Conference Youth Assembly at Morgan State College, Baltimore in August. Twenty four charges held Vacation Church Schools, with a total enrollment of 996 children. Mrs. C. A. Elder deserves every commendation for her leadership in the field of children's work.

The Rev. G. T. Jackson is proving himself a veritable Moses in the work of evangelism. He is achieving nobly both in his local church and on the district level. Many are being saved through visitation envangelism.

The Woman's Society of Christian Service has made rapid strides during the year, under the leadership of Mrs. Lenora D. Robbins, president. The lay activities are growing steadily through Methodist Men's groups. Thirty one charges are organized in mens groups. The district lay leader, William H. Hayman, and his associates, Benjamin T. Hall, Roy Pinkett, Andrew Evans, and Lora Taylor, are giving time and money to the extension of this work.

The ministers wives are to be commended for another great year. This loyal group of women deserve much praise from the Conference and the Board of Conference Claimants for their sacrificial service in behalf of our pension fund. They responded in such a manner that their reports will show the magnitude of their accomplishment.

Report of Charges

Cottage Grove (R. T. Wallace, pastor). This pastor's motto is, "Get things done." Conversions, 24; accessions, 24. The Commission on Education is functioning in each church. Two well organized Sunday Schools show that this charge has taken on new life. Raised for all purposes, \$2,947. The pastor's return is requested.

Crisfield: Shiloh (R. L. Parker, pastor). A hard working pastor and a loyal people have been hard hit by no seafood market, hence no money, with people out of work. In the face of all handicaps, a commendable report is made. Conversions, 9; accessions, 9. The pastor discovered that it was not good to be alone, so "took unto himself a wife." The request is to let Parker remained parked. Total raised, \$5,982.

Crisfield: Union Asbury and Liberia (Ernest J. Johnson, pastor). This charge was similarly handicapped as Crisfield was during the year. However because the pastor organized his forces at the beginning of the year, an encouraging report is the result. The parsonage has been painted, and some renovations have been made on the interior. Conversions, 8; accessions, 8. Raised for all purposes, \$4,016.

Dames Quarter (I. H. White, pastor). This is a two-point charge, walking together but not agreeing. The pastor has worked hard to bring the charge up, and in a measure has been successful. A new parsonage has been built at a cost exceeding \$5,000. Conversions, 5; accessions, 3. Raised for all purposes, \$4,605.

Deal Island (H. W. Spencer). This pastor has tried to measure up to last year, but working conditions have prevented. In spite of handicaps, a good report is made. Conversions, 5; accessions, 5. Total raised, \$3,167.

Fruitland (S. E. Parker, pastor). This is one of our strong charges, with a strong pastor. For the sixth year he makes a full report, in spite of handicaps. He is completing his theological training at Lincoln University, while during the year his helpmate underwent major surgery. Conversions, 18; accessions, 20. Total raised, \$5,100. The pastor's return is requested.

Girdletree (L. H. Purnell, pastor). This faithful pastor has a faithful following in his loyal people. He is completing his seventh year, with another full report. This is one of the few charges having Sunday night services—and with a full church. The Holy Spirit is ever present with these people. Conversions, 10; accessions, 10. Total raised, \$6,395. Improvements have been made in both churches. The pastor's return is requested.

Greenwood (R. A. F. Graham, pastor). This charge has made fine progress under its new leadership. All organizations have been revived, and Brother Graham is enjoying one of the best years of his ministry. Conversions, 6; accessions, 6. Raised for all causes, \$2,551.

Hopewell (G. N. Jones, pastor). This is a very loyal people, willing to carry on the program of the Methodist Church, when rightly informed. This pastor is closing his fifth successful year. Conversions, 12; accessions, 6; raised for all purposes, \$4,669.

Horntown (E. H. White, pastor). For 17 years, this pastor has given faithful and loyal service to this, his only pastoral appointment. He is an untiring worker, never too busy to give a helping hand to anyone. This warrior comes to this conference asking to be relieved of the responsibilities of active duty. He has wrought well, and the people have loyally supported him. Conversions, 15; accessions, 15. Raised for all purposes, \$4,402.

Keller (L. C. Waters, pastor). This is a small group of people, with an absentee pastor. The charge's inability to support a full-time pastor creates this condition. However, some good work has been done. Conversions, 2; accessions, none. Raised for all purposes, \$1,429.

Leemont (H. E. Anderson, pastor). For the sixth year, this pastor makes a full report. The charge is fully organized in all departments, and is functioning according to the program of the Methodist Church. Programs all are of the highest order. Physical improvements have been made in the parsonage property. Conversions, 16; accessions, 16. Raised for all causes, \$5,944.

Manokin (J. W. Hayman, pastor). This is a three-point charge with two of the churches not wanting to go anywhere. Because of this, the charge has been held down. Centennial Church has worked hard to bring up the conference askings, but the load was too heavy for this small group. The pastor has been faithful, in the face of odds. Conversions, 3; accessions, none; raised for all purposes, \$1,948.

Marion Station (G. W. Taylor, pastor). This is a strong charge, but would be stronger if some of the leaders had wider vision. The pastor has worked with some degree of success to bring about a deeper loyalty in the hearts of the officials. The storm has been very heavy at times, but the charge has the largest number of tithers on the District. Conversions, 14; accessions, 17. Raised for all purposes, \$6,785.

Marumsco and Kingston (Alexander Reid, pastor). This pastor is one of our best trained men in a rural area, with one of the best programs of any charge. People and pastor work together, hence another year's work well done. Conversions, 6; accessions, 18. Raised for all purposes, \$5,017.

Mount Vernon (F. R. Richardson). This pastor works hard to succeed, but never quite realizes his ambition. His report at Mt. Vernon will show that some good work has been done. The parsonage has been shingled, interior painted and roof on the hall at Saint Paul re-shingled. Conversions, 25; accessions, 2. Raised for all causes. \$2.742.

Nanticoke (G. O. Commodore). This charge feels that they have the right person "in the right place." Salary was increased \$200 at the beginning of the year. The parsonage has been completely renovated, with running water, bath, and modern kitchen installed. Regular attendance has increased 25%, and the spiritual condition is very good. Conversions, 6; accessions, 6; total raised, \$6,270.

Oakville (Clarence E. Handy, pastor). A perfectly new preacher who pledged total cooperation with superintendent and people has brought wonders to this charge. Church attendance has increased 70% over previous years, and conference collections 90%. The people are saying, "Let us keep Handy." Conversions, 35; accessions, 25. Raised for all purposes, \$3,347.

Oriole and Venton (Mrs. G. V. Bell, pastor). This is a two-point charge with problems too difficult for a woman pastor to handle. The church at Oriole with a small membership could not assume a large share of the conference askings. The church at Venton has a much larger membership, with greater potentialities than her sister church, but is unwilling to assume its obligation. Raised for all causes, \$3,384.

Parsonsburg (R. W. Dennis). This pastor and people have repeated their last year's record. All causes are paid in full. This has become a habit with them. At the beginning of the year, the pastor informed the people of the increases asked of them, and they set out to raise them with success. Conversions, 2; accessions, 1. Raised for all causes, \$4,513.

Pocomoke (S. P. Sanders). This is one of our strong charges, and has possibilities for doing great things. A fair year's work has been done, but results would have been better if the leadership of the church had taken advantage of early planning. Mrs. Sanders was in the hospital for a long period. We are thankful to our Heavenly Father that she is greatly improved. Conversions, 2; accessions, 1. Raised for all purposes, \$4,891.

Princess Anne (C. D. Gerald). Plans for a successful year were made at the beginning of the year. A committee, led by the pastor, secured more than \$6,000 in pledges for remodeling of the church caused by the damage of "Hurricane Hazel." Pastor Gerald knows how to get things done. Conversions, 7; accessions, 8; raised for all causes, \$4,789.

Quantico (J. W. Pruitt). This is one of the hard charges not realizing that they are hurting themselves by constantly fighting the pastor and the program of the church. There are great possibilities in this charge. Pastor and people have decided to separate without court action. The pastor has achieved some results through hard work. Conversions, 10; accessions, 15; total raised, \$5,292.

Salisbury, John Wesley (C. A. Elder, pastor). For the seventh year, this pastor makes a full report. The work on this charge is done systematically, the people are trained to make regular contributions to the causes of the church, and no quartettes or suppers are needed to get the work done. The pastor plans his work well. Conversions, 4; accessions, 12. The parsonage has been redecorated and new gas range installed. Raised for all causes, \$7,638.

Salisbury, White Temple (F. D. Arnold, pastor). This charge had a change of pastors in the middle of the year, but the work was not in the least retarded, as is often the case. The pastor quickly adjusted himself to the new situation, and things began to happen. The parsonage has been partially renovated and refurnished. Conversions, 20; accessions, 20. Raised for all causes, \$6,225—a full report.

Shiloh and Hutts Chapel (J. S. Collins, pastor). This charge took on new life at the coming of its new pastor, and has grown to the extent that the best report in history is made. All conference askings have been met and the pastor's salary advanced \$100 for the coming year. Total raised, \$3,386. The pastor's return is requested.

Snow Hill (G. T. Jackson, pastor). A progressive pastor leading a progressive people. This charge has conquered through faith. When places of employment were closed and the outlook was hopeless, the pastor formed prayer circles Sunday nights. The people were revived; the church attendance was increased, and a 100% year's work was done. Conversions, 4; accessions, 11. Raised for all causes, \$6,078.

Spence Chapel (Mrs. Jessica Hickman, pastor). At the beginning of the conference year, we were not sure what was best for this charge, large sums of money having been spent in an effort to develop the work, with little results. The adults, save four or five members, were gone. Mrs. Hickman has been able to hold a large number of children to the church, but a large number of them are of Baptist background. The pastor feels that this is a challenge, and is determined to meet it. At the Fourth Quarterly Conference, several adults of the community pledged to help save this church to the Delaware Conference. Pastor Hickman is to be commended for her undaunted spirit, and we solicit prayers and money in her behalf. Accessions, 2; conversions, 2. Total raised, \$512.

Stockton (Mrs. A. W. Coffey, pastor). This charge was hit very hard by unemployment, but, like a good leader, the pastor stayed on the job and led her people to victory. Two young people's organizations have been perfected. The evangelistic effort did much to quicken the spiritual life of the church. Conversions, 7; accessions, 3; total raised, \$4,168.

Unionville (C. W. Cannon, pastor). This pastor brings another good report to conference. The pastor has brought in unchurched people to help bring St. James to equal strength with Trinity Church. He is leading and the people are following. The shepherd takes good care of his flock. Conversions, 62; accessions, 32; total raised, \$4,274. The people are saying, "Return the Cannons."

Upper Hill (W. C. Thomas, pastor). This charge has had its problems the last few years; this year being no exception. Brother Thomas, a good man, but because of being unable to have his family with him in the parsonage, he has been handicapped in his work. The people were very loyal to him, and put forth every effort to have a good report. Conversions, none; accessions, 20; total raised, \$3.914.

Wachapreague (Omar Jones). This charge, under the leadership of Brother Jones, has reached a high point in its local benevolent givings. This is the pastor's second year in the active ministry, but to see him in action, one would not think so. He has proven worthy of every consideration. Conversions, 5; accessions, 5; total raised, \$3,157.

Wattsville (E. A. Hughes, pastor). Pastor Hughes and his good people have done it again! This charge entertained the District Conference most satisfactorily, with the result that new life came to the charge. Fifty-one souls knelt at the altar to the call of God; 26 were new converts; six were from other denominations. Extensive repairs have been made in both churches and the parsonage. Conversions, 26; accessions, 21; total raised, \$6,008.

Wetipquin (W. A. Nichols, pastor). This pastor is one of the hard workers of the District. He boasts of the fact that only two of his 16 years in the ministry has he been short of a 100% report. He laid his plans and worked the same in order to have a full report, but conditions were against him. Conversions, none; accessions, 2; total raised \$6,834.

White Haven (Alexander Boggs, pastor). Brother Boggs has served his charge well, but the response to his leadership has not been too good. The charge is capable of doing better work. A revival is sorely needed in the official family of the charge. Conversions, 1; accessions, 3; total raised, \$3,351.

Withams (R. T. Crosswell, pastor). This is one of our leading charges, with a pastor who believes in doing big things. This pastor wrought well for seven years. One-half acre of land has been added to the church property, and both churches have been painted, with renovations, all expenses paid. Conversions, 29; accessions, 10. Raised for all purposes, \$8,099.

The School of Missions

The Woman's Society of the Delaware Conference held its Mission School on the Salisbury District at Maryland State College in June. This was one that the leaders will long be proud of. This school of missions was highly informative and very inspiring. To many it was a "Mount of Transfiguration." Like Peter of old, many exclaimed, "did not our hearts burn while we tarried at the school." The night that the women presented the pageant pentacost really came. Too much cannot be said by way of commendation about those persons who had charge of the planning for the school of missions.

District Parsonage

The District Parsonage is being completely modernized, with garage attached to the front side. The house was moved back 12 feet giving opportunity for front patio and back lawn.

In Conclusion

There were 399 conversions, 277 accessions and 11 charges paid World Service and Conference Benevolences in full. The total raised for this cause was \$6,574. The increased enrollment in M. Y. F. is 155. The total average church attendance during the crusade was 2,814. The total average church school attendance was 1,482. 27 charges paid the pastor's expense fund and 6 charges increased the pastor's salary for the next conference year.

Words are inadequate to express gratitude to Rev. Howard Bailey and his staff for untiring support in our educational work. May I also express appreciation to the ministers, their wives and laymen for their

loval support in our work this year.

I have come to the end of this conference year with a deeper appreciation for our churches and their problems. This is one of the rewarding features of the district superintendency. In this position, too, one has the opportunity to see the entire program of the church in its true perspective—and with an increasing sense of responsibility.

On Monday, February 21, 1955, the mother of Mrs. Eunice Mears was laid to rest. Mrs. Ruth Williams, wife of the Rev. D. L. Williams, lost her father, and Mrs. J. H. Russum, wife of the Rev. J. H. Russum was among those who passed. Those who lived and died in the Lord, may we cherish their memories; seek to become benefactors by their good examples and emulate their Christian virtues.

District Parsonage

District parsonage is free of debt and in good living condition.

District Activities

Coming in as we did to assume the full responsibility of a District Superintendent, was indeed a very big order which proved to be very taxing in trying to supervise the district and take care of my local church. God has been with us, and the ministerial and lay cooperation one would not desire better. We feel very grateful to them for their support. We have endeavored to take care as far as possible all district interests and activities.

From the District Stewards' Meeting held at Ezion Methodist Church, Tuesday, May 11, 1954, our Monthly Preachers' Meetings with staggered rotation and location, our six sub-District Groups: Chester, Wilmington, Camden, the Seashore, Salem and the New Castle group—all have been active with some however, more active than others in promoting the work of the

district, carrying on such group meetings as Youth and Young Adult Assemblies, Rallies and Contests, Musicals and group programs which have given inspiration and determination to many weak congregations to become a more loyal and stronger church or congregation. Quarterly Meetings of the Woman's Society of Christian Service have proven to be quite stimulating and attractive. Also the Annual Lay Retreat held at St. Daniel's Chester was most helpful this year. The Annual Missionary Institute which was held Tuesday, November 16, 1954, at Mt. Joy, Wilmington, revealed quite a growth in number in attendance and interest. Our guest speaker was Rev. A. V. Harbin, Jr., Missionary to Japan. He delivered two inspiring and challenging messages: "The World and the Missionary Challenge" and "The Place of Missions in World Redemption." The Week of Dedication has become more meaningful within the district and local church.

Church Extension-Dunleith Project

Coleman Memorial Methodist Church held its Corner Stone Laying on Sunday March 20, 1955. A very happy and enthusiastic crowd assembled outside the building for a brief Order of Worship and brief Message by the acting Superintendent. A representative of the Board of National Missions in the person of Rev. D. R. Fletcher was present and participated in the religious ceremony. Sunday, April 3, 1955 at 3:30 P. M. the pastor, Rev. D. L. Williams and congregation moved in the new Coleman Memorial Church for their first worship service. The new project has great possibilities. With the pastor and people striving to maintain their proper Christion relationships, with faith in God and themselves and courage to face the future unafraid, this new project under its enthusiastic and dynamic leadership will go places.

District Mortgage Liquidations

The Buttonwood Church near New Castle, Rev. S. L. Wilkins, pastor, held their mortgage burning, Sunday, January 30, 1955 at 3:30 P. M. at which time the Rev. D. R. Fletcher and Rev. O. H. Spence were present and shared in the ceremony. Haven Methodist Church, Wilmington, Rev. M. L. McKenney, pastor, held its mortgage burning on Sunday November 3, 1954 at 3:30 P. M. The congregations of both churches rejoiced in realizing their long dreams of achievement.

Stewardship of Possessions

The director in this field of Christian Stewardship is Mr. Carl Still of Lawnside, N. J. who promises to become a great asset to the district in educating the people to church loyalty and christian liberality. His future plans will be to aid in setting up Stewardship committees and study groups.

HAMILTON MEMORIAL—This charge was slightly interrupted when its pastor who has served so acceptably both in the church and community for 10 years was appointed to the Easton District. The new minister however, came, he saw and in the building project that had already been initiated, tackled the job most heroically. Conversions 11. Accessions 13. Paid on debts \$5355. Improvements, Community Center. Total raised \$11097. Rec. H. D. Davis, pastor.

COLEMAN MEMORIAL—This pastor is serving his second year, during which time a new church has been built. The Corner Stone has been laid and the congregation is now worshipping in the edifice. Conversions 14;

WOODBURY—This charge has been very fortunate in having such a powerful young minister and family serve them. He, with the people have done a great job. He is loved by his people. His return is desired. Conversions 8; Accessions 4; paid on debts \$745. Improvements, installation of new water heater and oil burner. Total raised for all causes \$4163. Rev. J. L. Williams, pastor.

Summation of District Achievements

Total number of Conversions 261; Accessions 373; Amount paid on debt \$107,331. Total number of charges which have made improvements this year 28. Grand total raised for all causes \$262,150.00.

Bishop Love, we have realized once and for all time that trying to hold two jobs—Pastor in charge and District Superintendent, is too much responsibility for one man. While we cherish the opportunity to serve and cooperate with your wishes, nevertheless, the task was too great to carry on with any degree of success. It is an expression of the attractive appeals with most telling results by Mrs. Eunice Mears who labored hard to keep up the moral and spiritual morale of the district that there be no let down because of the loss we sustained.

We thank you, Bishop Love, for the privilege of serving in this dual capacity. Though hard and taxing, yet we found pleasure in serving my God and my people. Therefore, it is with sincere gratitude to Almighty God and the Bishop for permitting us to cast our lot in such pleasant places that I finally offer this report.

REPORT OF THE AREA ADMINISTRATIVE SECRETARY

Bishop Love and Members of the Conference:

The office of a bishop of The Methodist Church is one of great responsibility and trust. The many demands made upon the physical and mental energies of our bishops are generally too great for any of our bishops to meet without administrative assistance. Only those who have had the opportunity of being close to our bishops and of looking intimately at them in their work can fully appreciate the magnitude of their task and the multitudinous duties they are required to perform.

It is for this reason that many of the bishops of our church have chosen administrative assistants. These "area secretaries," as we have called them the past twelve years or so, are especially needed to assist our bishops of the Central Jurisdiction in their work, because of the tremendous expanse of our episcopal areas—in each case covering several—or many—states of our country.

My position in the Baltimore Area is that of administrative assistant to our resident bishop. I am grateful to Bishop Love for his confidence in me as manifested in his choosing me to assist him in carrying out the arduous duties of his office.

For the past fifteen years I have worked with Bishop Love—for twelve years when he was with the Board of Missions—in pastors schools, city institutes and in other activities of the church. I say in deep sincerity that there is no man in the Central Jurisdiction more worthy than he of the position to which he has been elected. An able administrator, one well versed in Methodist history, tradition, polity and law; a profound student of human nature, and one possessed with an innate sense of goodness and justice, he is eminently fitted for the high and holy office of a bishop in The Methodist Church.

It is a tremendous challenge and privilege to be associated with him, to represent him on occasions when he cannot himself be present, and to help lighten his administrative duties.

During Bishop Love's two and a half month absence from the office last Fall, responsibilities of the office were delegated to me. Fortunately, only one problem arose requiring the episcopal attention of Bishop Matthew W. Clair, who had oversight of the Delaware and Washington Conferences during this period. This was the tentative appointment of Dr. O. H. Spence to the Wilmington District following the death of the Reverend W. H. Mears, pending Bishop Love's return.

Stewardship Emphasis

As Area Director of Stewardship, I have been able to meet with the District Directors in each of the four annual conferences, viz., the Delaware Conference in Wilmington, Delaware, on May 29; the North Carolina Conference at Bennett College, Greensboro, North Carolina, on July 3; the

Washington Conference on October 22 in Baltimore; the East Tennessee Conference at Morristown College, Morristown, Tennessee, on February 13, 1955.

Of course, mere conferences are not enough. It is hoped that these District Directors will do a good work in Stewardship Education until the people of our churches all become "good stewards of Jesus Christ."

We must work toward the goal of having a Stewardship Committee and a Stewardship Director in each local church. Let us remember that Christian Stewardship is a continuing program of the church—based on the Scriptural standard of giving.

The District Superintendents have given competent and faithful leadership in this field.

The Messenger

The Baltimore Area Messenger, our monthly paper, continues to be our chief promotional effort. Despite the high standing of our paper throughout the country and among the leaders of the church, we still lack the whole-hearted support of the conferences of the Area in this project.

We pointed out editorially in our current issue that many metropolitan newspapers which carry a large volume of advertising matter are operating in the red today. It is to be expected normally that any publication issued for promotional purposes, with no paid advertisements, can be self-supporting only to the extent that paid subscriptions and individual sales are sufficient to take care of operating expenses. If we could double our income of the past year, we would almost reach this goal.

We are now planning our first intensive subscription campaign—with 3,000 as our goal.

We are suggesting Sunday, June 26th, as MESSENGER DAY in every church in the Baltimore Area—on which day we hope that each charge in the Area will report a minimum of five subscriptions. Our Campaign material will be sent to pastors within the next two weeks.

Conclusion

The program of The Methodist Church is one which calls for the employment of the resources of all our leaders in its successful execution. The details are worked out by the various agencies of our church, and the program is promoted by our bishops, district superintendents, pastors and leading laymen. The bishop's office, therefore, is the first link in this long chain of avenues through which Methodism speaks to the local church congregation.

I pledge continued devotion to the work assigned to my hands—and on behalf of the Area office I thank all of you again for your support of our program and for helping to make possible the fellowship which we all enjoy in Jesus Christ our Lord.

CONFERENCE MISSIONARY SECRETARY

Bishop Love, and Members of the Conference:

Permit me to express my sincere thanks for the opportunity that has been afforded me through the office of Conference Missionary Secretary. The Board of Missions in selecting me for this task, chose one who pleaded ignorance regarding the scope and depth of this field of labor. Since serving in this position, my eyes have been opened and I have become sensitive to the tremendous and essential responsibilities of this Board. Further enlightenment has been gained by attending the Jurisdictional meeting of conference missionary secretaries and Conference Board chairmen held in New Orleans, La.; the Baltimore Area Planning Conference on Missions at Baltimore, Md.; Follow-up Conference on Missions, Baltimore, Md.; Convocation on Urban Life at Columbus, Ohio; the Seminar on the Rural Church, Boston University, Boston, Mass.; and the series of Conferences on World Missions at Silver Bay, Lake George, New York. Another source of meaningful insights has been the frank discussions with the personnel-leadership of the Division of National Missions. They have made us aware without hesitation and with certain conviction of the immediate job which must be done and the future imperatives which must be faced if the church is to accomplish its mission.

Please pardon me if at times I seem over anxious and determined to suggest changes in the practices under which we have been nurtured. I am fully aware that my attitude in these matters might be misinterpreted, but I

am convinced that such is the risk that those who assume leadership must accept. I am aware, too, that many of us resent change . . . however, it is inevitable that changes will come.

I cannot dare at this time try to give my full concern regarding missions in our Conference. The job is an extensive and difficult one. It is sufficient for the present that we muster enough support to gain a realistic picture of the Conference needs. If we hope to survive the modern pressures and increasing competition we must leave the beaten paths and blaze new horizons. The metropolitan axis of New York-Philadelphia yet presents the greatest missionary opportunity in North America, especially among people of color. In many places the Negro is leaping over the artificial boundaries of neighborhoods and is wending his way into areas heretofore considered exclusive. The Church must follow its people and plan to meet their needs. The Church must be prepared to adjust to an ever changing society and is obligated to develop leadership that will be able to make the essential adjustments in facilities, personnel, program and attitudes if it is to creatively wrestle with our complex social order.

I am not aware that any Methodist Conference in the New York-Philadelphia axis has devised an urban strategy to meet the demands and needs of this community. In fact, each Conference seems to be making its own way . . . any way . . . as religiously isolated institutions . . . without any creative effort to face together our common problems. We seem to be more concerned about maintaining our historic Annual Conferences, institutions and practices than we are about mustering our collective strength and resources to deter the secular and materialistic inundation that threaten our area of service.

The City Societies of the Methodist Church within our Conference area must soon awaken to the breach which exists between their practices and the disciplinary basis for their functional and administrative work (par. 1218-1227). Only a united Methodist approach can successfully provide the solution of the many faceted problems of the metropolitan areas and creatively subdue the growing paganism in the urban centers. The local churches, regardless of imaginative boundaries, must develop closer fellowship and a united program to meet the needs of the people . . . who ever they might be. (Special assistance has been forth coming to certain Delaware Conference churches by city societies . . . but I can see no overall urban strategy in these cases).

I must commend the Board of Missions of the Methodist Church for being alert to the changes which are taking place and for the patience which it has exercised in seeking to awaken us to our responsibility. Thanks to the Board for pointing out to us the prescribed courses gained by their experience. We should make a determined effort to understand them and put them to worthy use.

Rethinking the kind of ministry offered through our institutions and recognizing their short comings we should be willing to revamp our services to secure our children against being kidnapped by other religious groups... often by our default; we should be anxious to modify our static approach in order to meet their needs. We must soon recognize a shift from the preaching centered ministry to a service centered church... from a pastor

centered ministry to a lay centered church. Ministries other than the accepted pattern must yet be taken into full account by us if we are desirous of adequately serving our age.

The ADVANCE was envisioned to meet expanding missionary demands. It is a continuing stewardship emphasis . . . challenging individuals and groups to accept their share of the nurturing responsibility through the Church at home and abroad.

Because funds received for WORLD SERVICE are inadequate to support the current and expanding missionary program of the Church it is important that the Advance movement experience success... less many of the present church enterprises would have to be curtailed and many new opportunities left unattended. The Promotional Advance Fund is the channel through which we plan to quicken and expand our conference missionary endeavors (par. 758-763; 149:3).

The District Missionary Secretaries are to be commended for the successful efforts they have made in presenting and interpreting the program of missions to their respective districts. The District Missionary Institute is becoming more effective as a channel for education and cultivation. Two institutes were held on the Philadelphia District this year, one on the New York end and the other in the Philadelphia area. This idea proved helpful in reaching a larger number of individuals. It also proved to be more economical for the local churches sending representatives to the district institute.

The district secretaries are determined with the assistance of the District Superintendents to reach every local church through sub-district organizations and programs in order to lay a stronger foundation for missions.

Recommendations

A. National Missions and Church Extensions

- 1. We recommend that the Board of Missions of the Delaware Annual Conference subscribe to the policies and procedures of the printed manuals of the Section of National Missions and the Section of Church Extension of the Methodist Church and seek to implement them in the administration of its work.
- 2. We recommend that the conference missionary secretary be assigned to make a conference-wide study of the charges having received maintenance funds for five years or more with the intent of telling the story of missions in the Delaware Conference.
- 3. We recommend that the Committee on Urban Life study the implications of the Convocation on Urban Life for the Delaware Conference; and in the light of its findings said committee shall make suitable recommendations toward creating a positive urban strategy in cooperation with other Methodist churches within the bounds of our Conference.
- 4. We recommend that the Commission on Town and Country Work shall make a comprehensive study within our conference bounds to determine the realistic needs of the churches to the end that improved services might be made available to the Methodist constituency.

5. We further recommend that the district superintendents of the Delaware Annual Conference be authorized, in agreement with the respective City Society or City Societies within the territory of the Conference, to assess the local churches of their respective districts for the financial support of the work of the societies. (Par. 1217-1227, par. 704).

B. Literature

- 1. We recommend that a conference-wide WORLD OUTLOOK Campaign Committee be created to foster an intensive drive for subscriptions; that November be selected as WORLD OUTLOOK MONTH; that the fourth Sunday in November shall end the drive; furthermore, that each member of the local commission on missions shall be requested and encouraged to subscribe to World Outlook; that the District Missionary Secretaries shall have oversight of this drive.
- 2. That the Conference Board of Missions shall make a copy of CHRISTIAN WORLD FACTS available to each pastor.
- 3. That we comply with the request of the Joint Committee on Education and Cultivation in assigning each District Missionary Secretary with the responsibility of collecting \$1.00 (25c per year) from each pastor for supplementing the publishing of the PASTOR'S JOURNAL.
- 4. That each pastor make available the news column "New in the World of Religion" to local newspapers; that "Missionary News Service" and "Parish Abroad" letters be used by local churches.
 - 5. That we plan to increase the use and sale of the annual study books.

C. Training

- 1. We recommend that the district superintendents, conference missionary secretary and the district missionary secretaries meet one month following the Annual Conference Session to set up a conference-wide program on missionary education and cultivation.
- 2. That following the above meeting each district secretary shall call together the chairmen of LOCAL COMMISSIONS ON MISSIONS from the churches of his district or sub-district basis in a COACHING CONFERENCE at which shall be set forth the tasks, the resources and opportunities for missionary education and cultivation.
- 3. That a class in MISSIONS be included in the curriculum of the Leadership Training Schools of the Conference.
- 4. That wherever possible WORKSHOPS ON MISSIONS be encouraged and promoted by the district missionary secretaries.
- 5. That wherever necessary because of limited local leadership, several churches shall unite to promote a SCHOOL OF MISSIONS.
- 6. That each district secretary shall inquire of each pastor regarding the date and time of the SCHOOL OF MISSIONS and assist the local pastor in securing leadership and information for its promotion.
- 7. That the DISTRICT MISSIONARY INSTITUTES shall be held annually.
- 8. That the district missionary secretaries shall be requested to adjust their schedules so as to be able to attend the Silver Bay Conference on World Missions each year during the month of July; that chairmen of Commission on Missions be encouraged to attend the Silver Bay Conference.

1. We recommend that each district be encouraged to purchase and make available missionary visual aid materials.

2. That the idea of a FILM LIBRARY be explored by the superintendents and missionary secretaries.

REPORT OF THE COMMISSION ON CHRISTIAN VOCATIONS

Bishop Love and Members of the Conference, it is a real joy to report that the hearts of young men and young women are increasingly being touched by the need to give themselves to Christian Vocations. From many sources there come reports to us that our youth are hearing and are responding to the call to give themselves to God's service.

Our Commission has a growing list of such commitments. We have been handicapped during the past year due to a lack of funds. We were not able to have a meeting of the Commission for this reason. Hence the work has been largely that of cooperation with other agencies such as the Youth Assembly, the district and local churches, etc. From these sources we have received names of youth who have made commitments.

Now that some funds are available we shall have a meeting early in the conference year and plan a Vocation Conference to which we shall invite our youth for the purpose of assisting them in becoming acquainted with the needs and the challenge of Christian Vocations.

We hope also to seek to have each District organization to present the opportunities which the church offers our youth for Christian Service. We shall likewise seek to have each local church to be aware of its possibilities in this area. A number of churches have had career conferences, at which time the young people have had opportunities to become aware of the fields of service.

Since we began the work of the Commission four years ago we have seen a number of the young people well in the process of their preparation for their life's work and a few have entered upon their vocations. This is encouraging indeed.

REPORT OF THE EXECUTIVE SECRETARY

Bishop Love and Members of the Conference, it is a real joy to have the privilege to report to you the work which has been accomplished in the field of Christian Education during the year. This report in the very nature of the case is only partial. It is impossible to determine what has been done when we work with growing persons. At best our standards of measurement are of necessity very inadequate.

We recognize our responsibilities for helping persons grow in their Christian experiences through the teaching-learning process. We look upon our task as being far more than mere telling persons what is the Christian way of life. We feel that we must create situations in which persons may have opportunities to experience through actual living, those activities which

will result in Christian thinking, feeling and conduct. It is to this basic will result in Christian thinking, concept of our task that we who constitute the workers in Christian educaconcept of our task that we have the concern is that persons shall grow in Christlikeness. We trust that this report will show progress toward this goal.

Work With the Conference Staffs—It has been a most rewarding experience for me to work with the staff of Children's Workers. Two times a year the council meets and plans its work and evaluates its program. Under the leadership of Mrs. Emma W. Strother, the work with children has made wonderful progress. The report of the Director gives a picture of the increases in the effectiveness and extent of this phase of our work.

It is most inspiring to meet with the Youth Council under the leadership of Carlton Parker, the Conference President and Rev. Henry H. Nichols the veteran Conference Director. When one observes the manner in which these young people accept their responsibility for giving leadership to the youth of the conference, he is greatly encouraged. After sharing in one of these council meetings one is assured of the future leadership of the church. The Director's report gives a good picture of the splendid work being done with youth.

The Christian Education of Adults is planned under the leadership of the Adult Council, composed of the Conference Staff and the Conference Council of the Young Adult Fellowship. Rev. R. C. Hughes is the Director and Mrs. Cora N. Selby, Conference President of the Y. A. F. Adult work is moving forward under their leadership as their report reveals.

During the past year great strides have been made in the field of Recreation. Mr. James C. Hardcastle, together with an ever increasing number of other persons who are being skilled in this field, have done much to help our churches become aware of the possibilities in this area.

Without the loyalty, devotion and skill of these members of our staff it would be impossible to carry on the work committed to us.

Work with the District Staffs—It was my privilege, together with some members of the Conference Staff, to meet with each District Superintendent and his staff to plan the district program of Christian Education. In these staff meetings goals for the district were set up and programs by which they could be reached were built. These plans consisted of work with Children, Youth, Adult and Church School Administration. Working with these cooperative District Superintendents has been a most rewarding experience. An Executive Secretary could not hope for more understanding

and cooperative fellow-workers than the members of our district staffs. Work with the Cabinet: Bishop Love and the members of the Cabinet have been more than anxious to assure the success of our work this year. When we were in financial difficulty early in the conference year it was the Cabinet who made funds available that we could carry on during the summer. This same interest has been sustained in respect to all of our work. The confidence in our program on the part of the cabinet has been most en-

Work With The Local Churches: One of the most rewarding opportunities of one who has a conference wide responsibility is to get in to a local church situation and work with those who are working at the "grass roots" in Christian Education. An increasing number of pastors and lay workers are calling upon me for such service as interpreting Christian education through the sermon, meeting with church schools, followed by evaluation sessions with workers; meeting with Commissions on education and workers conferences, addressing formal conferences with pastors and workers. Many of the local church opportunities come as a result of working with groups on the subdistrict and district levels.

Pastors Seminar On Family Counseling: We are happy to present to pastors, through the cooperation of the General Board of Education, a seminar on Family Counseling. Forty one pastors came to Morgan College during the week of the Youth Assembly and were led by two representatives from the General Board of Education, Revs. Theadore Palvadis and Francis Stewart. According to the expressions of many of the pastors it was a most helpful experience. It is our hope to have similar help for pastors and lay workers with youth as an integral part of the Assembly program this summer.

Leadership Education: As in past years, our program has provided for leadership education for all pastors who have leadership responsibility for Christian education on all levels. Our fifteen Christian Worker's Schools were well attended. The fifteen deans and some one hundred instructor are rendering a great service to our local churches through these schools.

The Baltimore Area Leadership School held for the first time la summer at Bennett College, Greensboro, N. C. was a great success. Ou. conference had an enrollment of 26 persons representing all five districts and all phases of our work. Mrs. Emma W. Strother, Rev. Henry H. Nichols, Mr. James Hardcastle and the Executive Secretary served as members of the faculty. Rev. Levi B. Miller, Executive Secretary of the Washington Conference, served as Dean. The school will be held June 28-July 5, 1955 at the same place. We also participated in a Workshop and Laboratory School both of which were held at Pennington, N. J.

I was also privileged to spend one month in Nashville, Tenn. to attend a Seminar for 25 selected Executive Secretaries from all over the country. This was an opportunity for me to take a fresh look at my task and to evaluate all that we are trying to do as well as become acquainted with some of the new trends in Christian Education. All in all it was a most profitable experience. I was also sent by the General Board of Education to serve on the faculty of the Atlantic Coast Area Leadership School. It was my privilege also to serve as a leader in the first United Christian Youth Movement Camp to be held in this area. It was held at Camp Pe-Co-Meth, Centerville, Md. To have been associated with five youth from our conference and sixty youth and their leaders from fifteen denominations was a real experience in Chris-



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tian brotherhood and interracial fellowship. To this list should also be added the Inter-Conference Adult Convocation held in cooperation with the Washington Conference, at Morgan State College, Baltimore, Md.

National Conference on Family Life: Through the cooperation of the Conference Committee on Family Life, the District Superintendents and Pastors were successful in getting 21 delegates to attend the National Conference on Family Life held in Cleveland, Ohio in October. These delegates are doing a wonderful job in sharing their experiences through many local church and subdistrict contacts. Perhaps the most effective of which were the programs presented at the additional night of the 15 Christian Worker's Schools. Through these occasions the message of Cleveland reached more than 1400 persons. We are proud of this project.

Cooperation With Other Boards And Agencies: Perhaps nothing has been more encouraging this year than the fine fellowship with other agencies of our conference. The Christian Witness Mission held in cooperation with the Board of Evangelism, the enlisting of youth in Christian service in cooperation with the Commission on Christian Vocations: Ministerial training and scholarships in cooperation with the Board of Ministerial Training and Qualifications; and leadership education. In all of these the fine spirit of fellowship has been most helpful.

Recommendations:

In the light of needs to which our Christian Education forces address themselves, I offer the following recommendations:

- 1. That we give full financial support to all of the askings which support the work of Christian Education. With special emphasis on Fourth Sunday offerings in the Church School for World Service; Church School Rally Day, Methodist Student Day and Race Relations Day.
- 2. That we continue to seek for a conference owned center where we can more adequately provide for the needs of our children and youth in the area of camp, institute and assembly work.
- 3. That we make available every opportunity for Pastors and other adult workers with youth, to increase their skill in guiding the youth of our churches and communities.
- 4. That every effort be made to have closer cooperation on the part of our churches with the public schools and other agencies which have such a large stake in the guidance and welfare of our children and youth.

Conclusion: As I reflect over the work of the year I am reassured of the growing appreciation of Christian Education in our conference. I am grateful for the opportunity which the conference has given me for another year of service. To my wife, who serves as our faithful office secretary, as well as a most understanding companion, both at home and in the office, I owe much more than can be expressed in words. To Him who gives strength for the task I shall be ever grateful.

Organization

Any church regardless of its size can use this plan. Many reports show that this new plan of our official board has strengthened the local churches both large and small. I believe we should take advantage of every opportunity to stress our local church set up.

Lay speaking is a disciplinary measure and I sincerely believe that it would solve our local church problem if we would certify key laymen as lay speakers, and use them to inform and inspire the local work of the church. The layman if trained can take much of the strain from the pastor. Every local church should have one or more lay speakers. Let us make this a must the ensuing year.

If we had one hundred or more lay speakers well versed on important subjects as sound church financing, christian stewardship, adequate support of the ministry, men and boy's work and many other phases of our church life; our local churches would go forward with leaps and bounds.

Men and Boys' Work

Our men and boys work went over with a bang last year and we were able to increase our Methodist Men's groups. Last year we sent twenty-eight delegates to Purdue University, where we held a Church wide Methodist Men's Conference and seventeen hundred men were present. I believe this experience will mean much to the men of our Conference and we are planning to go back in 1957.

The fellowship was grand and it was a success financially. I could go on and on but there are others who would like to tell their story. Thanks for listening.

The Easton District tells her story: We began our years work with a Seminar, the study courses being presented in the order suggested by the Woman's Division. The District Departmental Secretaries presented their work in various forms assisted by the local women. Our quarterly meetings rotate on a sub-district basis, that all women of the district may be privileged to study and worship with us. At two of our meetings a period of questions and answers was given. Our newly elected officers are doing a fine job. The meetings are well attended and the interest and fellowship are great. If our district continues to grow, as it surely will, it will be instrumental in the realization of the Kingdom of God here on earth.

The Salisbury District is bubbling over to tell her story. She writes: We are happy to say that the work is steadily improving all over the district. We can report three new societies, and many other improving in membership and finance. One of the outstanding features for encouragement during the year has been the presence of our District Superintendent and wife at each of our quarterly meetings. In July our meeting was well attended. Leadership Training was presented and the program for the year. In October hurricane Hazel prevented our meeting from being a success. A few of our members courageously braved the storm. In December, we presented Miss Eva K. Logue, A Medical Missionary from India. She presented costumes and work of Art. In her address she told us of the great need in India. She presented a picture on 16mm. film that truly touched the hearts of all members present and I feel more pictures will help us see the need and we will be able to do more for Missions. We were thrilled and overjoyed at the

splendid attendance. Miss Logue was presented a corsage of American Beauty roses. We did not know prior to this presentation that roses meant so much to the people of India. At our March meeting Children, Youth, Literature and Publications was stressed with charts and skits. We had twenty-three charges represented at this meeting. We are truly growing on the district in many ways. We are beginning to know each other and work together more closely. We feel such programs as this will enrich our spiritual growth. Thanks for listening.

The Wilmington District speaks in tones loud and clear: We have had a very fruitful year. Human Rights Day was celebrated on the district with interracial programs. The speakers discussed civic and community, religious, educational and political points. We have had three district meetings. Three of our societies have received jurisdiction recognition for their study classes. We have on Society 100% (every member of the church is a member of the Woman's Society of Christian Service.) Several societies had the sacrificial Breakfast Palm Sunday morning. We used "Prayer The Tie That Binds." It was beautiful and gave us food for thought. Pray that we will study more to show ourselves approved unto God, workmen that needeth not be ashamed.

The Philadelphia story is one of success spiritually, financially and socially. Listen: Our aim this year, to help each woman become more aware that she is a missionary in her own local church, and community in which she lives and works is the mission field. As we face the beginning of each year we realize the need of getting together and spending a day planning the work for the year. It is a high spiritual experience in our life as well as a fellowship. If Jesus called His disciples together from the noise of the crowd to teach them the things He would have them do to further the Kingdom, we accept his plan and feel that he would have us do likewise. Our activities include the following: Officers training day for all of the More than one hundred attended. We have stressed the importance of each local church sending at least one person to the school of missions. Last year we had sixty to attend. We started our work in September by having our Educational Seminar. All approved study courses are presented. We were privileged to have Mrs. Stanley W. Clemes, a returned Missionary from India to present the course India, Pakistan and Ceylon. In December, The Workshop "The Woman's Society of Christian Service" was conducted by our Conference Promotion Secretary. Conference Officers presented demonstrations of Officers and various committees in action. Our December meeting is always a happy one because each local secretary has the opportunity to present gifts for the special Missionary projects in and around Philadelphia. In March our meeting theme was "Youth Our Concern." We were happy to have Miss Helen Johnson, Youth Secretary of the Woman's Division as the specialist for the day. Youth attended and participated in the demonstration. A few of the local societies went out on Halloween with "Trick or Treat" and received funds for U. N. I. C. E. F. Several societies make yearly visits to the U. N. organized Pinkett Tabernacle this year. The women are anxious to work and have invited the District Officers in for a training period.

This is a long story, but a true one. You have been listening to Mrs. Elsie Briddell, from the Dover District: Mrs. Thelma Alford, Easton District: Mrs. Lenora Robins, Salisbury District: Mrs. Edith Prideaux, Wilmington District and Mrs. Margaret Trader of the Philadelphia District. Five wise virgins who have kept their lamps filled with oil from a drum that never runs dry. If all of us will keep our chimneys clean, our wicks trimmed, and our lamps filled with clean oil, The Kingdom of God will be realized.

The issue for civilization is life or death.

Communism still threatens the eradication of all christian forces in the world.

As a result of these and many other problems conronting the people, the American people are confused, perplexed, vacillating, frustrated and insecure. They need the assurance, comfort and guidance of religion to live peaceful lives.

David E. Lilienthal, chairman of the U. S. Atomic Energy Commission voiced the conviction which needs echo everywhere: "If we live with faith, I deeply believe that these great discoveries of our time can be made to better the lot of mankind and further the Kingdom of God." America needs a rebirth of the Spirit of God if she is to help build a better world.

THE REPORT OF THE BOARD OF TEMPERANCE

As we think of the Church and the social situation in its relation to the problem of beverage alcohol and other narcotics, we must confess we have a hard work to do. There is much opposition; but the Church throughout her history has been confronted with difficult tasks; therefore, it is well to keep in mind the exhortation of the Apostle: "Be not weary in well doing."

Our General Board of Temperance has developed an extensive library of materials in the form of dramatizations, temperance films, posters, pamphlets and books to meet the needs of our generation. Let us use educational strategies to mould public opinion for personal abstinence.

In view of the fact that the liquor people now spend more than \$250,000,000 a year to shove their products into American homes through every advertising medium available with much beamed to our Youth, and since alcohol is a major factor in holiday fatalities and is increasingly responsible for disintegration of the home as witnessed by social service records and has become a formidable obstacle to the good life, our churches must be vigorous in their opposition.

We commend our own Board of Temperance for its vigilant activity. Your Committee make the following recommendations:

I. Each pastor, in conjunction with the Temperance Committee promote a vigorous program of Temperance Education.

- II. The organization of a Temperance Committee in each Church in the Conference.
- III. Observance of World Temperance Sunday.
- IV. Each Pastor preach a sermon on Temperance.
- V. Observance of Committment Sunday.

REPORT OF THE DIRECTRESS OF THE GOLDEN CROSS SOCIETY

Bishop Love and Members of the Conference:

It is with much joy that I make this report concerning my work as Directress of the Golden Cross Society.

I accepted this appointment three years ago, to raise funds and to work with the Board of Hospitals and Homes, that we have done most harmoniously, with a lofty hope that soon our hope for a Home for the Aged of the Delaware Conference will be a reality.

The Golden Cross has a three-fold plan for raising funds:

- (a) ENROLLMENT—Members who will make Annual Contributions, thus assuring a fixed income.
- (b) The Delaware Conference Building Fund Drive; pledges to be paid to Conference Treasurer, annually, semi-annually or quarterly.
 - (c) Annual Golden Cross Drive; the main fund raising project in the churches of the Delaware Conference. Annual Enrollment fee \$1.

Golden Cross Day is observed in all churches of the conference on the second Sunday in November of each year. We trust by now each church has a local director who sees the observance is placed on the church calender, distributes envelopes and Golden Cross pins to all members who enroll, and immediately sends offering to the Conference Treasurer. The District director is in charge of all local directors and a part of the over all planning group.

I find it most vital to inform the ministers on the work of the Golden Cross Society, for the interest of the ministers determines the response of the church to the program. Please remember the Home for the aged of the Delaware Conference will be for the Laymen as well as the Ministers.

It is no news to any of us that the vast population of older persons are rising in our midst. Perhaps the extent of this increase, now and in the future, may not be fully appreciated. Since the turn of the century our population has doubled but the number of persons over 65 has quadrupled. Today there are approximately 13 million persons 65 years of age and over. By 1980, in only 25 years, we will have almost ½ times that number. If the total population increases as expected in 1980 one of every 7 persons living will be 65 years of age or over and 2 of every 3 will be 45 or over. In other words, in 25 short years we may expect to have some 90 million persons who are 45 or over, of which 32 million will be 65 and over. This means that we shall have ½ times as many persons over 45 years of age than the total number employed at the present time.

The Social Service part of our program has aroused a most vital interest in the work of the Golden Cross in our churches. It is a wonderfully rewarding service exemplifying the words of our Lord—"I was hungry and you gave me food, a stranger and you took me in, naked and you clothed me, sick and you visited me."

I wish to thank Bishop Love, our District Superintendents, Ministers and Laymen, for the support given the Golden Cross this year.

BOARD OF HOSPITAL AND HOMES

I. Personnel

The Conference Board of Hospitals and Homes shall be composed of at least one ministerial and one lay member from each of the districts of the conference, the conference directress or director of the Golden Cross Society (Paragraph 1569), the conference lay leader, conference president of the Woman's Society of Christian Service and, at least three of the conference trustees, together with any member of the General Board of Hospitals and Homes, administrators of hospitals or homes and a staff member of the Board of Missions in the bounds of the Conference; with the district super intendents as ex-officio members.

Nine members of this group shall constitute a quorum and serve as an executive committee for a larger group.

II. Auxiliary on Districts for Promotional Purposes

There shall be on each District a promotional Council consisting of the following persons: District Director of Golden Cross, District Lay Leader, District Members of Board of Hospitals and Homes, District President of W. S. of C. S., District Steward, local Church directors of Golden Cross, President of Methodist Men and other interested persons as may be recommended by the District Directors of Golden Cross, and approved by the Chairman or Vice Chairman of the Conference Board of Hospitals and Homes, and Conference Director of Golden Cross, under whose direction the Council is.

III. Financial Plan

 A more intensive financial campaign for funds for a conference home for the aged shall be launched at this 1954 session of the Delaware Conference, and that it be spearheaded and revived by the office of Bishop Love, from time to time, as it may seem necessary and that the Golden Cross enrollment shall be \$1.00 per member.

- 2. That the district superintendents shall be called upon to stress repeatedly the urgent necessity for the fund, and request that all the pastors, lay leaders, district stewards, presidents of the Woman's Society of Christian Service and Methodist Men endeavor to enlist all members of the local Church to support the Golden Cross Drive.
- 3. That as a supplement to the Golden Cross enrollment of \$1.00 each, requests shall be made for donations to this cause of \$5.00 to \$100.00 or more, from individuals, who may be properly solicited to quickly raise sufficient funds for a down payment on such property as may be selected by the Conference Boards of Hospitals and Homes together with the Conference Trustees in accordance with the advice of the General Board of Hospitals and Homes, being represented by one or more of its staff members, provided such location be in accordance with the state and city regulations.

IV. Authorization

The Conference Board of Hospitals and Homes and the Conference Trustees, with a legitimate quorum being present and voting—as mentioned previously, or when constituted according to the decision of this 1954 session of the Delaware Conference shall be authorized to select what they consider to be a suitable site and building for a Delaware Conference Home for the Aged and negotiate a contract of agreement of sale, anywhere within the bounds of the Delaware Conference—as soon as they are assured that funds in the treasury of Delaware Conference are sufficient to make such a transaction feasible—provided such action be in strict accordance with the advice of two or more staff members of the General Board of Hospitals and Homes; and also provided a qualified attorney be employed to properly handle the sale in accordance with the zoning, title search and all other matters required by the Methodist Discipline and the laws and regulations by the state or city. The district superintendents shall serve as ex-officio advisors and supervise in accordance with the provisions of the Discipline.

V. The United Fund

We recommend that the Golden Cross Society fund and the allowance for the promotional work of the Conference Board of Hospitals and Homes shall be one and the same fund; and that it be called "The Golden Cross Home for the Aged Fund"; and that a definite percentage of the combined fund, as the conference shall determine, upon the recommendation of its Commission on World Service and Finance, shall be designated for the promotion of world of the Conference Board Hospitals and Homes, beginning with six hundred dollars for the current year as operational budget. We urgently request that the District Superintendents urge the charges to raise and send in to the Conference Treasurer early in the Conference year, that the promotional work may proceed as needed.

14TH ANNUAL REPORT OF THE DELAWARE CONFERENCE COMMISSION ON WORLD SERVICE AND FINANCE 1955-56

Bishop Edgar A. Love, Ministers and Laymen of the Conference:

The 14th Annual Report of the Delaware Conference Commission on World Service and Finance is happy to greet you. Prayerfully, we ask your cooperation and indulgence.

The Commission held its Budget Asking Meeting at What-Coat Methodist Church, Dover, Delaware, March 16th for purpose of reviewing Conference givings up to that time, and to accept the Budget Askings for the next year. Recommendations for adjustments were made when and where, in our opinion, it favored Conference advancement. A meeting was held January 26th at the same church for the purpose of complying with the Conference order to have the books of the former Conference Treasurer audited.

March 1, 2, 3, the Commission, assisted by a cross-section of Conference Personnel, under the direction of Granger and Faw, Certified Public Accountants, Salisbury, Md. met at the John Wesley Methodist church of that city. There we made a review of the books mentioned above. Copies of the report of this work have been distributed at this session of the Conference.

The several meetings were held only after advising and consultation with Bishop Love concerning the desire of Commission to conform to the wishes of the Conference.

Recommendations

ONE. The Commission recommends that the Golden Cross Societ. Hospital and Homes be combined and granted a \$600 operation budget, the permission to solicit individual gifts in addition to the budget.

TWO. The Commission recommends that the Treasurer or some representative of that office visit each District Stewards Meeting and give explanations to Pastors and Laymen in making first payments to the Total Budget and to receive money for the District Superintendents' Fund.

THREE. We recommend that Conference Minute Money be apportioned to the churches by Districts.

FOUR. The Commission recommends that a fund of \$250 be appropriated for Conference Budget Promotional work, to be done by the Commission, and that \$50 of same be apportioned to each District. This work is to be done in close co-operation with the Treasurer and the District Superintendents.

FIVE. The Commission recommends that all Boards and Commissions that do not have their books audited by a Certified Public Accountant, and who receive money from the Conference Treasurer, send their reports of such audits duly signed by the auditors who do the auditing.

SIX. The Commission recommends that late reports coming to the Treasurer be so printed in the minutes, and that at the discretion of the Treasurer, moneys may be accepted at the seat of the Conference in session, but the delayed reports be not included in the Treasurer's Annual Report to the Conference then in session.

SEVEN. We recommend that the Minimum salaries be: (a) Married Pastors, \$1700; (b) Single Pastors, \$1400 per year, and distribution be made of the Minimum Salary Fund as in previous years.

EIGHT. That all suggested Rally Day amounts be sent in among the first payments to the Treasurer, or not later than Rally Day Week.

NINE. That all money requested from the Promotional Fund be done in writing, even though verbal explanations may be made concerning such askings.

TEN. We recommend that each Board, Commission or Agency submit an itemized account to the World Service and Finance Commission along with the request for increased askings. That all treasurers' books be turned over to the Commission for auditing within thirty (30) days after the Annual Meeting of the Conference.

ELEVEN. That the Commission on World Service and Finance secure an Auditor in close proximity to area in which the treasurer lives.

TWELVE. A Resolution was passed by the Commission that the request from the Pension Board for a fund of \$80,000 yearly be apportioned to the districts for a period of four years or until \$320,000.00 has been raised for the Reserve Pension Fund, be granted.

THIRTEEN. That no Board or Agency receive more than the regular percentages indicate of money's sent in, with the exception of the Publicity Fund and the District Superintendents' Salary and Expense Fund, which funds are to have priority and are to be paid in full.

ADMINISTRATION OF ADVANCE & PROMOTIONAL FUNDS IN THE DELAWARE CONFERENCE

1. All projects, Advance and Promotional, within the Annual Conference, for which funds are solicited, shall be approved by the Conference Board of Missions (Discipline Par. 760, Sec. 1).

2. The funds shall be administered by the Conference Board of Missions or, should the conference request it, by the Board of National

Missions. (Discipline Par. 760, Sec. 2, Par. 1299, Sec. 4).

3. Funds administered by the Conference Board will require a Trust Agreement and Mortgage for sums of \$500.00 or more. The same will be true if administered by the Board of National Missions. (The Board of National Missions will not require a lien for sums less than \$500.00, unless specifically requested to do so by the Annual Conference Board of Missions).

4. Should the Conference Board administer the funds, a competent attorney shall decide when the Trust Agreements, if required, are legally

satisfactory. (In some conferences this service is volunteered).

All records shall be kept in fire proof box by the Conference Board of Trustees.

- 6. Postponement of liens shall be granted by the Conference Board of Trustees, on recommendation of the Conference Board of Missions, or its Executive Committee, whenever requested by a local church to make a loan.
- 7. The Conference Board of Missions shall determine the conditions under which its funds will be administered. Among these are:
 - (1) Church must present a sound financial picture showing how, with the Conference aid, the project can be completed, or put into a usable condition.
 - (2) Except in the cases where Advance Funds have been secured for a specific project, the local church must show that the work could not be done without outside assistance.
 - (3) The Conference Board may require that its funds be administered as the church raises and administers its own funds.

- 8. When churches have been given priority ratings, one project shall be completed, before another is undertaken. However, the Conference Board reserves the right to review the priority ratings and rate another one, should some other project qualify first. (Alternative—after the churches have been approved for specific amounts, the funds shall be administered on a pro-rata basis).
- 9. Churches seeking help should come under one of the following and from the promotional funds should receive assistance in this order:
 - New congregations—provided the District Committee on Church Location has approved.
 - (2) Small congregations seeking larger quarters in strategic situations.
 - (3) Church overburdened with debt.
 - (4) Emergencies shall receive such attention and priority as the situation may, in the judgment of the Conference Board of Missions, require.
- 10. Nothing in the above is to prevent the Conference Board from using promotional funds for the purchase of a lot, or lots, when such location has been approved by the District Committee on Church Location. The title of such lots shall be held by the Conference Board of Trustees until such time as, in the judgment of the Conference Board it shall be turned over to the local trustees.
- 11. Funds shall not be used for items that are considered current expense items, such as painting, repairs on windows, fuel, etc., Insurance, except in cases where the Conference Board of Trustees hold title.
- 12. A priority list, in cooperation with the Bishop and his cabinet shall be prepared for Promotional Funds. In cases of Advance items, a priority shall be prepared, unless Advance Funds shall be secured for a specific project.
- 13. A list of all approved promotional and Advance projects shall be furnished to the Conference Advance Committee. This list shall show:
 - (1) The amount approved.
 - (2) Whether it is an Advance item or Promotional.
 - (3) In addition, the Advance Committee shall be kept informed of all funds administered and all projects completed for its use in promotions.

Resolved: To achieve the Christian end of racial integration within the church, we sincerely urge our Conference to take the following steps:

1. The encouragement of fellowship with our fellow Methodists of the various Conferences whose churches are geographically within the bounds of the Delaware Conference.

CONFERENCE HISTORY PROGRESS REPORT

Bishop Love and Members of the Ninety-Third Session of the Delaware Conference, The Methodist Church:

After scrutinizing the volumes of books Conference Journals and literary work of the late Dr. F. J. Handy, I have concluded that more essential data must be secured through intensive research before an accurate history of the Delaware Conference can be ascertained and written. I, therefore, make four recommendations.

Firstly, that each local church be requested to write its history, have the same approved by the Quarterly Conference and present a copy of this official document or record to the Editor-in-Chief of the Delaware Conference History.

Secondly, That the District Superintendents encourage the pastors and churches to acquire and send historical data to the editor of the proposed history.

Thirdly, That a portion of the funds for the publication of the Delaware Conference history be used for research.

Fourthly, That the Editor-in-Chief be duly authorized to direct an intensive research for accurate historical data throughout the Delaware Conference.

If these recommendations are accepted the editors will meet and fix specific plans for the Conference-wide research.

MEMORIAL TO THE GENERAL CONFERENCE OF THE METHODIST CHURCH, 1956 SESSION

WHEREAS, the procedure indicated in Par. 538 of the 1952 Discipline of the Methodist Church for the transfer of a local church from the jurisdiction of which it is a part to another jurisdiction in which it is located geographically is extremely cumbersome;

WHEREAS, the maintenance by a local church of membership in a jurisdiction in which it is not located geographically, against its own wishes

and against the wishes of the Annual Conference in which it is located geographically and the Annual Conference of which it is part, may be the cause of economic and administrative hardship and serve as a barrier to the full expression of Christian Brotherhood;

WHEREAS, it is difficult to think of a legitimate reason for withholding, by other Annual Conferences, by the Jurisidictional Conferences, or by the General Conference, of permission for such a transfer when the local church, the Annual Conference in which it is located geographically and the Annual Conference of which it is part all desire it;

AND WHEREAS, the cumbersomeness of the present legislation can be mitigated without destroying its purely permissive character and without dictating policy where either the local church, the Annual Conference in which is located geographically or the Annual Conference of which is it part do not desire a transfer:

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED: That (c) and (d) be deleted from

Par. 538, and that the paragraph be amended to read as follows:

"Par. 538. Any local church shall be transferred from the jurisdiction of which it is part to another in which it is located geographically upon completion of both the following actions: (a) approval by the membership and the Quarterly Conference of said church; (b) and approval by both the Annual Conference of which the church has been a part and the Annual Conference to which transfer is desired. Such transfer shall be effected when both of the required actions have been certified to the Council of Bishops by the secretaries of the two Conferences involved, whereupon the Council of Bishops shall issue a declaration that the transfer has been duly effected.

Rules of Order

OF THE DELAWARE ANNUAL CONFERENCE

- Rule I. The President shall decide all questions of order, subject to an appeal to the Conference; but in case of such appeal, the question shall be taken without debate.
- Rule II. He shall appoint all committees not otherwise specially ordered by the Conference.
- Rule III. On assigning the floor to any member of Conference, he shall distinctly announce the name of the member to whom he assigns it.
- Rule IV. All motions or resolutions introduced by any member shall be presented in writing, if the President, Secretary, or any two members request it.
- Rule V. When a motion or resolution is moved and seconded, or a report is presented, and is read by the Secretary, or stated by the President, it shall be deemed in possession of the Conference; but any motion or resolution may be withdrawn by the mover, with the consent of Conference, at any time before amendment or decision.

Rule VI. The motion to adjourn, to lay on the table, to take from the table, or for the previous question, shall be taken without debate.

Rule VII. No new motion, or resolution shall be entertained until the one under consideration has been disposed of, which may be done by adoption or rejection, unless one of the following motions shall intervene, which shall have precedence in the order in which they are here placed, namely:

(1) To fix the time to which the Conference shall adjourn.

(2) To adjourn.

(3) To lay on the table.

(4) For the previous question.

(5) To postpone

(3) To lay on the table. (4) For the previous question. (5) To postpone to a given time. (6) To refer to a committee. (7) Substitute. (8) Amendment. (9) To postpone indefinitely.

Rule VIII. A substitute or amendment may be amended.

Rule IX. When any member is about to speak in debate, or to deliver any matter to the Conference, he shall rise and respectfully address the President.

Rule X. No member shall be interrupted when speaking, except by the President to call him to order when he departs from the question, or uses personalities or disrespectful language; but any member may call the attention of the President to the subject when he deems a speaker out of order, and any member may explain if he thinks himself misrepresented.

Rule XI. No person shall speak more than twice on the same question, nor more than fifteen minutes at one time, without leave of the Conference; nor shall any person speak more than once until every member choosing to speak shall have spoken.

Rule XII. When any motion or resolution shall have been acted upon by the Conference it shall be in order for any member who voted with the prevailing side to move a reconsideration; but a motion to reconsider a non-debatable motion shall be decided without debate.

Rule XIII. No member shall absent himself from the service of the Conference without leave, unless he is sick or unable to attend.

Rule XIV. No member shall be allowed to vote on any question who is not within the bar at the time when such question is put by the President, except by leave of the Conference, when such member has been necessarily absent.

Rule XV. Every member who is within the bar at the time the question is put shall give his vote, unless the Conference, for special reasons excuse him.

Rule XVI. It shall be in order for any member to call for the yeas and nays in any question before the Conference; and, if the call be sustained by twenty-five members present the vote thereon shall be taken by yeas and nays.

Rule XVII. It shall be in order to move that the question shall be taken without further debate, on any measure pending before the Conference, except in cases where character or Conference relations are involved; and is sustained by a two-third vote, the question shall be so taken; nevertheless, it shall be in order under this rule to move to recommit, to divide or to lay on the table after the previous question has been ordered.

Rule XVIII. The motion to adjourn shall be taken without debate, and shall always be in order, except (1) when a member has the floor; (2) when a question is actually put, or vote is being taken; (3) when a question is pending on sustaining the demand for the previous question; (4) when the previous question has been called and sustained, and action under it is still pending; (5) when a motion to adjourn has been negatived, and no business or debate has intervened; and (6) when a motion to fix the time to which the Conference shall adjourn is pending or shall be made.

BY-LAWS OF THE BALTIMORE AREA OF THE METHODIST CHURCH

ARTICLE I

NAME

This organization shall be called the Baltimore Area of The Methodist Church

ARTICLE II

OBJECT

Object of the Baltimore Area shall be to provide administrative oversight for the four Annual Conferences comprising the Area: Delaware, East Tennessee, North Carolina and Washington. This shall be a non-profit organization.

ARTICLE III

MEMBERSHIP

The voting members shall be the Bishop of the Baltimore Area, Area Secretary, District Superintendents of the several Annual Conferences, and the following officers of each Annual Conference: the Conference lay leader, the Conference president of the Woman's Society of Christian Service, the Conference executive Secretary of Christian Education, the Conference president of the Methodist Youth Fellowship, the Conference Missionary Secretary, the Conference Secretary of Evangelism; one pastor from each District in each of the Conferences elected by the District; presidents of colleges and Wesley Foundations within the bounds of the Area

Non-Voting members—any pastor or layman in attendance has the privilege of the floor

ARTICLE IV

OFFICERS

The officers of the Baltimore Area shall be: President, the presiding Bishop of the Area; two Vice Presidents, one of whom shall be a woman; a recording secretary and a treasurer. These officers other than the president shall be elected quadrennially and shall hold office until their successors are elected. All elective officers shall be chosen by ballot.

Duties of officers shall be those commonly associated with office. The recording secretary shall keep an accurate record of the proceedings of the meetings and circulate them in mimeographed form to the members. The treasurer shall receive all monies for the expense of the Area and pay all bills incident to meetings and make an itemized report to the presiding bishop after each meeting and deposit such balance as may be in hand with the Area office.

ARTICLE V

COMMITTEES

Executive Committee: The District Superintendents of the several Conferences shall constitute the Executive Committee of the Baltimore Area and function for it ad interim.

Committees: Standing Committees of the Baltimore Area shall be: Education, Missions, Finance, Membership and Evangelism, Credentials, Courtesy and Program, and such other committees as may be found necessary. All others shall be appointed by the Resident Bishop, subject to approval by the Baltimore Area.

ARTICLE VI

MEETING

The Baltimore Area shall meet at least twice during a quadrennium, such meetings to be known as the Baltimore Area Council, the first meeting being within the fiscal year following the General Conference of The Methodist Church, subsequent meetings to be determined by the Resident Bishop.

ARTICLE VII

FINANCIAL SUPPORT

The budget for the support of the Baltimore Area shall be determined by the Bishop and submitted proportionately to the several Annual Conferences, subject to their approval.

ARTICLE VIII

THE AREA PAPER

There shall be published monthly an Area journal to be called the Baltimore Area Messenger, edited by the Area Secretary and such associates as he may select.

ARTICLE IX

LOCATION

The offices of the Baltimore Area shall be in the City of Baltimore, Md.

ARTICLE X

AMENDMENTS

These by-laws may be amended at any regular meeting of the Baltimore Area by two-thirds majority of those present and voting; provided, however, that such amendments be submitted in duplicate at least two days before being acted upon.



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
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
