GOVERNMENT OF THE PHILADELPHIA ANNUAL CONFERENCE.

I. OF THE DUTIES OF THE PRESIDENT.

1. The President shall see that all the business appertaining to the Conference shall be brought forward and conducted in a proper manner, according to the provisions of the Discipline, and the rules of the Conference.

2. He shall preserve order in all the proceedings—and in debate shall keep the speakers to the question, and call them to order when they wander from the point, or from the rules of order, or use any improper language.

3. He shall decide all questions of order; nevertheless, any two members may appeal from his decision to the Conference, and in such case the appeal shall be decided without debate.

4. He shall appoint all committees, unless otherwise directed by the Conference, in which case the appointment shall be made by ballot or nomination, at the discretion of the Conference; no member thereof being permitted to nominate more than one person for the same committee.

5. When two or more members arise and address the President at the same time, he shall decide which of them is entitled to the floor.

II. THE DUTIES OF THE SECRETARY.

1. The Secretary shall keep a fair and correct record of the proceedings of the Conference, to be ready at the commencement of each session thereof, subject to correction by the Conference.

2. He shall carefully preserve the journals and papers of the Conference placed in his custody, and shall not permit any person but a member to examine the same, nor shall he allow a member to make a transcript from either without the permission of the Conference, and he shall also produce the journals and papers at the next annual session of the Conference.

2. He shall also, after the close of the Conference, make an appendix at the end of the journal, in which he shall record all documents which shall be ordered by the Conference to be so recorded, (the motion on which shall be taken without debate,) and the documents so recorded shall be referred to on the Journal of Conference.

III. THE DUTIES AND PRIVILEGES OF MEMBERS.

1. Every member who would speak shall rise in his place and respectfully address the President, refraining from all personalities or indecorous language; but no member shall speak more than once to the same question (except to explain) until every member choosing shall have spoken, nor longer than fifteen minutes without permission of the Conference.

2. When a member shall be called to order by the President or any member, he shall take his seat until the question be decided by the President; nevertheless he shall be allowed an appeal to the Conference, which shall decide without debate.

3. Any member may call for the division of a question, which shall be granted when in the judgment of the President the sense will admit of it, and every member present shall vote on all questions unless excused by the Conference.

IV. QUESTIONS TO BE TAKEN WITHOUT DEBATE.

- 1. A motion to simply adjourn.
- 2. A motion to lie on the table.

V. PROMISCUOUS RULES.

1. A motion to adjourn shall be always in order.

2. When a question has been decided, any member who may have voted in the majority on said question may move for a reconsideration thereof.

3. When the reading of a paper is called for, and the same is objected to by a member, the question shall be determined by a vote of Conference.

4. When a motion is made and seconded, and entertained by the President, it shall be deemed to be in the possession of the Conference, but may be withdrawn at any time by the mover, with the consent of the seconder, before a decision had thereon, or an amendment thereto be entertained by the President.

5. It shall be in order any time during the discussion of a proposition before the Conference (except during the examination of character) to move that the question shall be taken without further debate, and, if sustained by a majority of the members present, it shall be immediately put and decided.

6. No motion shall be entertained unless seconded, and all motions and resolutions shall be reduced to writing, if desired by the President or Secretary, or any member of Conference.

7. No matter of business, other than that which pertains to the ordinary business of the Conference, shall be read by the Secretary, until the subject of it is stated by the introducer.

8. In discussion upon a report of a committee, the Chairman of the committee whose report is under consideration, or such member of the Committee as the committee may agree upon, shall be entitled to the last speech upon the question.

DAILY PROCEEDINGS.

The airpaints of the Truck Society and the Sunday School Colon of the M. C. Church, were received, and reterred to the Committee on those subjects. The

FIRST DAY.

WEDNESDAY MORNING.

The Conference assembled in Union M. E. Church, Philadelphia, on Wednesday morning, March 15, 1865, at 9 o'clock, Bishop D. W. Clark, D. D., presiding. The session was opened by the Bishop by reading the 90th Psalm. The 707th Hymn was then sung, and the Bishop led in prayer. The 705th Hymn was sung, followed by prayer by T. J. Thompson and J. Castle.

The Roll was then called, when 148 members answered to their names.

R. H. Pattison was elected Secretary, and G. W. Lybrand and A. M. Wiggins Assistant Secretaries.

Pursuant to the order of the last Conference, the Presiding Elders reported a list of nominations for the Standing Committees, which were confirmed. (See Standing Committees.)

The names of the Lay Stewards were announced. (See Conference Officers.)

J. F. Chaplain and T. C. Murphy offered a preamble and resolutions expressive of the sense of the Conference on the death of Governor Wm. Cannon, of Delaware, late a Lay Steward of this body; which were adopted by a rising vote. (See Resolutions.)

The Rules of the last Conference were adopted for the present session.

The President was requested to appoint a committee of five on the State of the Country. (See Special Committees.)

A. Rittenhouse was appointed to receive the funds collected for the improvement of the Ministers' Burial Ground, at Mount Moriah Cemetery.

The Annual Missionary Sermon was made the order for Monday, at 10 A. M.

The Conference resolved to meet daily at 9 A. M., and adjourn at 12 M.

The Committee appointed at the last Conference to report a plan for dividing the Conference, presented their report, which was made the order of the day for Thursday morning, immediately after the reading of the journal. The lay members of the committee were invited to participate in the discussion.

The report of the President of Dickinson College was presented, and referred to the Committee on Education.

T. J. Quigley moved that the Sacrament of the Lord's Supper be administered on Monday morning, which was adopted.

The reports and exhibits of the Book Concerns at New York and Cincinnati were received and filed.

The circulars of the Tract Society, and the Sunday School Union of the M. E. Church, were received, and referred to the Committees on those subjects. The President submitted, for consideration, the action of the General Conference on changes in the General Rules, which was made the order for Tuesday morning at 10 o'clock.

A draft was ordered on the Chartered Fund for \$25.

The report of the Visiting Committee to the Wesleyan Female College was presented, and referred to the Committee on Education.

H. B. Ridgeway, of New York Conference, and Col. Jacquess, of Illinois Conference, were introduced to the Conference.

The Stewards were authorized to receive and disburse the dividend from the Centenary Fund.

The 7th Question was taken up. (See Disciplinary Questions.)

The President announced that M. Sorin has been transferred to the Missouri Conference.

The relations of the following brethren were changed from Superannuated to Supernumerary:—

D. Titlow, J. Hubbard, C. Schock, R. E. Kemp, R. W. Todd, R. M. Greenbank, J. B. Ayars and C. Karsner.

The name of W. T. Quinn was entered on the minutes as withdrawn from the ministry and membership of the M. E. Church.

The deaths of William Smith and James Webb were announced as having occurred during the past year.

Adjourned, with singing of the doxology, and the benediction by W. Cooper.

SECOND DAY.

THURSDAY MORNING.

Religious exercises by C. Cooke.

The calling of the Roll was dispensed with for the remainder of the session.

A letter from William Quinn, the oldest member of the Conference, was received, and referred to the Board of Stewards.

On mction of T. J. Quigley, the following question of law was referred to the Presiding Bishop:

"Who has the right to decide whether instruments of music shall be used in our Churches, to accompany the singing during public worship?"

The recommendation of John Shilling, a local preacher from Easton district, for Deacon's orders, was presented, and he was elected.

The report of the Committee on Division of the Conference was taken up, when T. J. Thompson moved the adoption of the first resolution. H. E. Gilroy moved to lay the subject on the table, which was lost. Pending the consideration of this subject, the hour of 10 o'clock having arrived, the call of the Stewards was made and generally responded to by the members of the Conference.

The report of the Committee on Division of the Conference was again taken up, when a division of the question being called for, the Conference proceeded to the consideration of the first part of the first resolution offered by the Committee, to wit: "That in accordance with the power granted by the last General Conference, the Presiding Bishop concurring, this Conference be divided into two Annual Conferences at the present session."

The motion to adopt this resolution was lost.

The remainder of the report was laid on the table.

Adjourned, with the benediction by W. Kenney.

THIRD DAY.

FRIDAY MORNING.

Religious exercises by A. Atwood.

The report of the visitors to Dickinson Seminary at Williamsport was presented and referrred to the Committee on Education.

On motion of J. Hand, the names of those absent at the calling of the roll on Wednesday morning were called, when 26 members answered to their names.

The report of the Treasurer of the Centenary Fund was presented and filed.

An invitation to visit the Eclectic Medical College was received and accepted.

A. Wallace presented the parchment of Isaac T. Adkins, a local preacher on Snow Hill district, who has withdrawn from the church.

The 11th Question was taken up; when the Conference proceeded to the examination of characters of effective Elders.

The North Philadelphia District being under consideration, J. Neill asked and received a supernumary relation, with an appointment.

The South Philadelphia District was called, when F. Moore asked and received a superannuated relation. A. Cather, C. Walters, and W. L. Boswell asked a supernumerary relation, without appointment, which was granted.

When the Easton District was under consideration, T. S. Williams and W. H. Formosa asked a supernumerary relation, without appointment, which was granted.

- A. Wallace, P. E. of Snow Hill District, announced the triumphant death of A. Freed, on the 28th of February, 1865.
- J. Mason, P. E. of Wilmington District, announced that J. B. Dennison died in great peace, July 20th, 1864.
- T. C. Murphy informed the Conference that the Committee of Correspondence had received a fraternal letter from J. T. Gracey. The Committee of Correspondence was continued.

The Chair announced that J. T. Gracey had been transferred to the India Mission-Conference.

The report of the President of the Wesleyan Female College was received and referred to the Committee on Education.

G. D. Carrow offered a resolution expressive of the sympathy of the Conference with our brethren who are chaplains in the National service; which was adopted. (See Resolutions.)

On motion of P. Coombe, it was

Resolved, That T. J. Thompson, F. Hodgson, T. C. Murphy, J. F. Meredith, S. M. Cooper, and W. E. England, be and are hereby appointed a Committee to prepare a plan of organization for a Conference Church Extension Society, in accordance with the action of the last General Conference.

An invitation to the members of the Conference to visit the Pennsylvania Institution for the Instruction of the Blind, on next Tuesday evening, was read and accepted.

The Conference resolved to meet to-morrow morning at 8% o'clock.

B. T. String and N. B. Durrell, were substituted for J. O'Neill and E. I. D. Pepper, in the Committee on Publication of the Minutes. Adjourned, with the benediction by T. A. Fernley.

FOURTH DAY.

SATURDAY MORNING.

Religious exercises by G. D. Carrow.

On motion of J. B. Quigg, it was

Resolved, That preachers in charge of circuits and stations be required to report debts remaining on churches and parsonages; and that the Secretary be requested to prepare the blanks for General Statistics, so that "debt remaining" shall follow "probable value" of churches and parsonages.

J. Cunningham presented a communication from the "West River Classical Institute," which was referred to the Committee on Education.

The 5th Question was taken up. (See Disciplinary Questions.)

The recommendations of local Deacons for Elders orders, were received and acted upon. (See Disciplinary Questions.)

The 3d question was taken up, when Bishop Janes took the chair, and addressed in an impressive and appropriate manner, the candidates for election to Deacon's orders.

The following questions, in addition to those prescribed by the Discipline, were by order of the Conference, proposed to the candidates for admission.

1. Are you loyal to the Government? Answered unanimously in the affirmative.

2. Is it your opinion that a Minister of the Methodist Episcopal Church can honorably or consistently change his church relations, without a corresponding change of views on doctrine and discipline? Answered by all in the negative.

The Conference then proceeded to their admission and election.

W. P. Howell was continued on trial, at his own request.

T. S. Hodson was discontinued, at his own request.

Under the special provision of the Discipline, in the case of Chaplains, Jos. R. T. Gray. was elected to Deacon's and Elder's orders.

A communication from the Trustees of the Education Fund, nominating Thomas Hare and Chas. Scott, one of whom to be chosen to fill the vacancy caused by the expiration of the term of J. M. Maris, was received and laid upon the table.

Bro. P. Philips, of Cincinnati, being called upon by the Chair, sung several beautiful pieces from his new work, entitled "Musical Leaves."

Adjourned, with the benediction by Bishop Janes.

SABBATH SERVICES.

At the Union M. E. Church, Bishop Clark preached and ordained the candidates for Elder's orders. The ordination of Deacons was held in the Front St. M. E. Church, after a sermon by Bishop Janes. The pulpits of our churches in the city and vicinity, with many of those of sister churches, were acceptably filled by the members of the Conference.

FIFTH DAY. MONDAY MORNING.

Religious exercises.

The 4th Question was taken up. (See Disciplinary Questions.)

The 2d Question was considered. (See Disciplinary Questions.)

The chair presented the certificates of the ordinations of Deacons and Elders, which were placed on file.

On account of the indisposition of G. D. Carrow, the preaching of the Missionary sermon was postponed, and made the order for Wednesday morning, at 10 o'clock.

An invitation to visit the House of Refuge was received and accepted.

The consideration of the 7th Question was resumed.

G. Barton was made supernumerary, with an appointment.

J. Turner and D. Lambdin were placed upon the list of effective Elders.

W. W. Wythes received a supernumerary relation, without an appointment.

Joseph Smith asked and was granted a withdrawal from the ministry and membership of the M. E. Church.

The relation of R. M. Greenbank was changed from supernumerary to superannuated.

A letter was received from M. Sorin, addressed to the Conference; and the Secretary was instructed to make a suitable reply.

The 1st Question was taken up. (See Disciplinary Questions.)

- J. E. Smith offered a preamble and resolutions expressive of sympathy with Mrs. Frazer, the only surviving child of Bishop George; which were adopted; and a collection taken for her benefit, amounting to about \$300.
- P. Coombe offered a resolution providing for the appointment of a committee, to arrange for the celebration of the centenary of Methodism; which was adopted. (See Resolutions.)
- H. Colclazer offered a resolution requesting those preachers who may be stationed on the Peninsula, to render such aid and counsel to our colored members as they may need; which was adopted. (See Resolutions.)
- J. B. McCullough offered a resolution directing that hereafter the appropriations to necessitous cases shall be *prospective*, instead of retrospective; which was referred to the Board of Stewards.

On motion, an invitation was extended to G. H. Stuart, Esq., President of the Christian Commission, to address the Conference at 11½ A. M., to-morrow.

Adjourned, with singing the doxology, and the benediction by J. B. Ayars.

SIXTH DAY.

TUESDAY MORNING.

Religious exercises by J. Ruth.

Dr. Jos. Parrish was invited to address the Conference in behalf of the Sanitary Commission, after the address of G. H. Stuart, Esq., this morning.

The report of the Committee on Sunday Schools was received and adopted.

A. Atwood was elected Conference Vice-President of the Sunday School Union.

P. Coombe and C. Cooke offered a preamble and resolutions, expressing the sympathy of the Conference with D. W. Bartine, in the death of his son-in-law, Brother Benj. R. Thaw; which were unanimously adopted.

On motion of A. Wallace, the Conference recognised the ordination of John R. Beck, a local Elder from the Methodist Protestant Church, Bro. Beck appearing before the Conference, and assuming our ordination yows.

The report of the Committee on Education was presented, discussed, and adopted.

The following visiting brethren were introduced to the Conference: W. L. Harris, D.D., Assistant Missionary Secretary; Dr. Kidder, of the Garrett Biblical Institute; Jas. Curns, of the East Baltimore; Henry C. Westwood, of the Baltimore; J. S. Inskip, G. R. Crooks, and J. A. Roche, of the New York East Conference; and Hon. M. F. Odell, of Brooklyn, N. Y.

The Conference proceeded to the consideration of the changes in the General Rules proposed by the General Conference.

The first resolution was read, namely :-

Resolved, That the second restrictive rule be amended by striking out the last two words of the rule, namely, "two delegates," and inserting in their place the following, namely, "one delegate;" so that it may read, "Provided, also, that no Conference shall be denied the privilege of one delegate."

The Conference concurred in this resolution, by a vote of yeas 161, nays none. The second resolution of the General Conference was then taken up, namely:—

1. "Resolved, by the delegates of the several Annual Conferences in General Conference assembled, that we recommend the amendment of the General Rule on slavery, so that it read—

'Slaveholding: buying or selling slaves.'

2. "Resolved, That we recommend the suspension of the Fourth Restrictive Rule, for the purpose set forth in the foregoing resolutions."

It was moved and seconded that this Conference concur in these resolutions; on which the yeas and nays were demanded.

C. Cooke and F. Hodgson gave their reasons for voting in the negative. The subject was laid on the table for the present.

The address of G. H. Stuart, Esq., was made the order for to-morrow at 9½ o'clock.

Adjourned, with the benediction by H. M. Johnson.

SEVENTH DAY.

WEDNESDAY MORNING.

Religious Exercises by W. McCombs.

The Chair presented the following answer to the question of law herctofore submitted:

Law Question.—"Who has the right to decide whether instruments of music shall be used in our churches, to accompany the singing, during public worship?"

Answer.—I find no specific provision of law determining who has the right to decide whether instruments of music shall be used in our churches; but all the analogies of the case indicate that the Trustees have such a right, they being, by virtue of their office, entitled to the possession and control, for legitimate ends, of the temporalities of the church, including its real and personal estate.

George H. Stuart, Esq., President of the Christian Commission, addressed the Conference on the work of that institution. At the close of his remarks, the fol-

lowing was unanimously adopted:

Resolved, That we express our thanks to George H. Stuart, Esq., for his able, eloquent and impressive address; and we pledge ourselves to renew our efforts in behalf of the noble institution which he so ably represents.

Mr. Stuart exhibited to the Conference a massive gold pen, made in California, and to be presented to the President of the United States; and kindly allowed Bishop Clark to use it in signing his name to the paper respecting the decease of Gov. Cannon.

Rev. Dr. Curry, Editor of the Christian Advocate and Journal, Rev. Dr. Brewster, of the Wesleyan connection in St. John's, N. B., and Chaplain Rammel, of the U. S. Army, were introduced to the Conference.

The vote directing the administration of the Sacrament of the Lord's Supper, in connection with the Missionary sermon, was reconsidered and the motion withdrawn.

The order of the day being called for, the Annual Missionary Sermon was delivered by G. D. Carrow, from Luke xix. 13: "Occupy till I come."

The introductory services were conducted by J. A. Roche and A. Cookman.

J. F. Chaplain offered the following resolutions, which were adopted:

Resolved, That we have listened with profound interest and profit to the Annual Missionary Sermon which has just been delivered before the Conference by Rev. G. D. Carrow.

Resolved, That we respectfully and earnestly request a copy of it for publication.

Resolved, That a committee be appointed to attend to the entire matter. The Stewards' Report was made the order for to-morrow at 10 o'clock.

W. H. Elliott asked and received a supernumerary relation, without appointment.

On motion of J. F. Crouch, it was

Resolved, That a collection be taken to-morrow morning, amounting to fifty dollars, to pay the expenses incurred in printing and sending out the slips for the statistics, and in the purchase of stationery for the Conference.

Adjourned, with the benediction by Thomas H. Stockton, D.D.

EIGHTH DAY.

THURSDAY MORNING.

Religious exercises by W. C. Robinson.

The relation of Jonathan Turner was changed to supernumerary, with appointment.

The report of the Committee on Church Extension Society was received and adopted.

C. F. Turner was appointed to receive all sums collected for Church Extension, and hold them until next Conference.

The 1st Question was taken up. (See Disciplinary Questions)

The report of the Committee on Missions was received and laid on the table for the present.

Bishop Clark announced the death of Rev. Wm. L. Thornton, late delegate from the British Wesleyan Conference to the General Conference of the M. E. Church. J. P. Durbin offered appropriate resolutions of respect and condolence, which were adopted. (See Resolutions.)

The Conference resolved to meet at 3 o'clock this afternoon, and at 7½ o'clock this evening.

The Conference was then addressed by Dr. Joseph Parrish, in behalf of the U.S. Sanitary Commission. At the close of his address, on motion of T.A. Fernley, it was Resolved, that we hereby tender our thanks to our brother, Dr. Parrish, for his interesting and able address, and that we will do what we can for the assistance of the U.S. Sanitary Commission.

The report of the Stewards was read and adopted, and the funds in their hands distributed. (See Stewards' Report.)

A. Phillips, Esq., one of the Lay Stewards, addressed the Conference in behalf of the claims of the worn-out preachers, and their widows and orphans.

The thanks of the Conference were unanimously voted to the lay and ministerial members of the Board of Stewards.

T. C. Murphy offered the following resolution, which was adopted:

Resolved, That Bishop Clark be requested to appoint a member of this body, and an alternate, to preach a sermon on the relation of the ministry of Sabbath Schools, on the second evening after the commencement of our next Conference.

The Secretary repeated the statistics for the past year. (See Statistical Tables.)

The publication of the reports of members enlisted in the national service from our congregations, was deferred until next year.

Adjourned, with benediction by T. J. Quigley.

THURSDAY AFTERNOON.

Conference met at 3 P. M. Religious exercises by T. C. Murphy.

The report of the Committee on Missions was adopted.

On motion of W. L. Gray, the Conference, by vote, consented to the sale of the M. E. Church at Mana Furnace, and the appropriation of the proceeds to the erection of a church at Lehighton.

T. C. Murphy offered a resolution endorsing the Christian and ministerial standing of A. Cather, now in the service of the Sanitary Commission, which was adopted.

A. Wallace offered a resolution providing for the appointment of a committee of three to assist in securing a home and proper care for the family of Brother Freed deceased. The resolution was adopted, and A. Wallace, A. Manship and J. W. Jackson appointed said committee.

The memoirs of William Smith, James Webb, John B. Dennison, Abraham Freed and Governor Wm. Cannon, were read and adopted.

The Chair announced the Committees ordered to be appointed. (See Special Committees.)

The parchment of Henry A. Mains, a local preacher, who has withdrawn from the M. E. Church, were presented by D. W. Bartine and filed.

J. P. Durbin offered a paper endorsing the action of the General Conference of 1860 and 1864, on the subject of lay representation, which was laid on the table.

The Conference ordered the usual draft on the Treasurer of the Union M. E. Church for \$114, the interest of the Kelly legacy, in favor of the Hummelstown Mission.

The resolution of concurrence with the action of the General Conference, in the proposed change in the rule on slavery, was taken up, and adopted by a vote of yeas 196, nays 9.

The report of the Trustees of the Ministers' Burial Lot, at Mt. Moriah Cemetery, was presented and adopted.

The term of service of S. W. Thomas and J. Alcorn, Esqs., as Trustees of the Burial Lot having expired, the Conference proceeded to ballot, when they were reelected.

The report of the Committee on the Bible Cause, and that of the Committee on the Tract Cause, were read and adopted.

The Conference proceeded to ballot for one Trustee of the Education Fund. The tellers were allowed to report at the evening session.

Adjourned until 71 o'clock this evening. Benediction by P. Coombe.

THURSDAY EVENING.

Religious exercises by S. W. Thomas.

The tellers reported that Thomas Hare had been duly elected a Trustee of the Education Fund.

The Finance Committee presented their report, which was adopted, and the usual disposition made of the funds in their hands.

T. B. Miller offered a resolution requiring receipts for Conference collections paid to local societies, to be procured and handed to the Finance Committee, which was adopted. (See Resolutions.)

Several members, by leave, recorded their votes on the proposed change of rule on slavery.

The report of the Committee appointed at the last Conference in relation to the establishment of a Book Depository in Philadelphia, was read and adopted. A Committee of four ministers and five laymen was appointed to endeavor to secure the accomplishment of this object. (See Special Committees.)

F. Hodgson presented a memorial from laymen of Philadelphia, in reference to the organization of our smaller societies into circuits, which was referred to a committee of five ministers and five laymen. (See Special Committees.)

W. L. Gray offered resolutions commending the church enterprise at Mahanoy City to the liberality of our people, which were adopted.

Reports were presented from the majority and minority of the Committee on the State of the Country, which were read. The minority report was laid on the table. The report of the majority was adopted. (See Report.)

St. George's Church, Philadelphia, was fixed as the place of the next annual session.

The Committee on Temperance presented their report, which was adopted.

The reports of the Committees on Missionary Statistics and Post Offices were read and adopted.

G. W. Lybrand moved that the Secretary of the Philadelphia Conference Missionary Society be requested to forward to New York, for publication, the names of Life Patrons, Life Directors and Life Members of the Parent Society, constituted within our bounds, which was adopted.

The Conference fixed the time for taking the annual collections.

The resolution of last session, providing for the preparation of memoirs of deceased preachers, was adopted for the coming year.

The Secretaries were instructed to publish in the printed Minutes the plan for the collection of statistics, and the preachers were required to hand in their reports on the second day of the session.

A collection was taken for the sexton, amounting to \$90.

The Book Agents were, by resolution, requested to publish our Ritual in a cheap form for general distribution.

The resolutions passed at the last Conference, for the collection of statistical reports of the members who have enlisted in the U.S. service from our churches and congregations during the present war, were again offered and adopted.

A. Manship and J. Neill offered resolutions approving the reorganization of the City Home Mission, which were adopted. (See Resolutions.)

W. L. Gray offered a resolution expressing the high estimation entertained by the Conference of the character and services of Bishop Clark. It was unanimously adopted.

T. C. Murphy, H. M. Johnson and J. W. Jackson were appointed a committee to prepare a tabular form of blanks, for the report of the numbers enlisted in the national service, and distribute the same among the preachers.

A. Atwood offered a paper approving of the action of the Legislature of Pennsylvania, against running the passenger cars on the Sabbath, which was adopted.

The thanks of the Conference were voted to those Railroad Companies which have reduced their fares to the members of the Conference at its present session, and the Committee who arranged for the same, also to the families who have entertained the preachers, and the Trustees of the Union M. E. Church.

The journal was read and approved, and after devotional exercises, conducted by P. Coombe, the appointments for the coming year were announced by Bishop Clark, and the Conference adjourned sine die, with the benediction by the Presiding Bishop.

REPORTS AND RESOLUTIONS.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF STEWARDS,

FOR THE YEAR ENDING MARCH, 1865.

The Board of Stewards, in presenting to the Conference, and through it to the Church within its bounds, their Annual Report, would express their gratitude to God, for his goodness to the objects of their care during the past year, and would especially offer thanksgiving to Him for inspiring the hearts of his people with a noble liberality in behalf of those, who, in the order of his Providence, have been left to the care of the Church, and are now largely dependent upon the funds of this Conference for support.

Notwithstanding the unusual severity of the winter, and the loss that must have been sustained in the Conference collections in consequence of stormy Sabbaths, the Board are happy to state that the large increase in this fund reported last Spring has been more than equalled by that of the past year,

The exact sum received from the Districts, as will be seen in the following tables, is \$7787.73, or an increase over any preceding year of \$970.06. This, with the interest on the Centenary and Chartered Funds, has given the Board for distribution at the present Session of the Conference an aggregate of \$8277.79, or a net increase over last year (after deducting a dividend from the book concern, not given the present year,) of \$566.12.

But while there has been a very encouraging increase in this collection, the Board are sorry to state that there has been a still larger increase, comparatively, in our list of claimants. For, after all that have been removed from that list by death, by improved circumstances, or otherwise, they still find on it no less than fifty-six names, or an increase of three over the number reported last year, all of which are representatives of large and dependent families, that will be likely to need special assistance from the Conference funds for some years to come.

The moneys placed at the disposal of the Board, have been distributed with care among the several claimants, according to the best information had in regard to their comparative necessities.

In this distribution mistakes have doubtless been made, and many, both among the Preachers and the laity, will no doubt think, as they look at special cases, that they could have done better. And so they might for some; but in doing it for these they would have injured others to an equal amount. The present Board have only to say that with the light they had, and under all the circumstances involved, they have done the best they could: and they would express the hope that both ministers and people will give at least a quiet acquiescence in their decisions, if they cannot wholly approve.

Impressed with the conviction that a considerable increase in this fund is yet needed, and that the Church, in its liberality, will respond to every reasonable demand made in behalf of its necessitous Ministers, and the families of those who

have fallen in its service, the Board have taken the liberty to increase the assessments for the coming year above 20 per cent over those of last year. Some will find it impossible to reach the amounts named for them by the Stewards, but it is to be hoped that others will be able to go considerably beyond the assessments, so that the aggregate brought up to the Conference at its next session, will be not less than ten thousand dollars.

The Board, in conclusion, after thanking both Ministers and people for the generous interest they have taken in this fund in the past, would respectfully present for adoption by the Conference, the following Resolutions, viz:—

Resolved, 1st. That we recommend the collection for our necessitous Conference claimants, as one having the strongest claims upon the sympathy and benevolence of our people, and that we will use our utmost efforts to raise the amounts apportioned to our respective charges.

Resolved, 2d. That we recognize the plan, adopted by this Conference two years since, of raising in the Public Congregation by a single effort the amount apportioned to our respective charges, as the only one that will produce the desired result, and would therefore earnestly recommend its continuance in the future.

Resolved, 3d. That Preachers in charge of Circuits and Stations, shall be required to report their collections for Conference claimants on the second day of the next session of our Conference, stating at the time both the amount apportioned and the amount collected,—said collections to be in United States or other bankable funds and in notes of as large a denomination as possible.

Resolved, 4th. That, inasmuch as the Discipline, as revised by the last General Conference, contemplates the making of appropriations to Conference claimants prospectively, or for the coming year, and, inasmuch as it is important to the Board of Stewards that they be notified of all the claims likely to come before them at an early period in the session, it shall be made the duty of all recognized claimants on the funds of the Conference, hereafter, as well as of those proposing to change their relation who will need a claim, to give notice of the fact, in writing, on the second day of the next session, immediately after the call of the Stewards shall have been made.

Resolved 5th. That the collection for Conference claimants, whenever practicable, be taken in the months of October and November.

MEMOIRS.

Rev. WILLIAM SMITH

Of the Philadelphia Annual Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, died June 7th, 1864, aged thirty-one years.

Brother Smith was converted when fourteen years of age, and became a member of Mount Pleasant M. E. Church on Radnor Circuit.

In the Sabbath School he began his labor in the vineyard of Christ.

Upon his removal to Bridesburg, Philadelphia, a wider field for usefulness was opened before him. He became Superintendent of the Sabbath School, was authorized to exhort and appointed a Class Leader. In 1856 he was licensed to preach, and also recommended as a suitable person to be received into the travelling connexion.

In the following spring of 1856 he was received on trial in the Philadelphia Annual Conference and appointed to Newton Circuit. In 1857, on Springfield Circuit. In 1858 he was stationed at the Falls of Schuylkill; 1859, at Cressona; 1860, at Cornwall; 1861, at St. Clair; and 1862—63, at Mount Lebanon. During his second year on this charge, his health declined, and he was superannuated at the ensuing Conference.

His decline was rapid. He suffered occasionally very much, but always with patience and cheerfulness. He said to his wife "I am willing to suffer the will of the Lord since I can work no more for him; or if it be his will to take me, I am ready to depart and be with Christ."

He spoke often of the kindness of the people of his last charge, and expressed a desire to see them. He said to his wife, tell them the Gospel he had preached to them, sustained him in the last conflict. To Rev. William M. Ridgway he said, "My faith is unshaken, and I shall regard death as rather a pleasing dispensation." To his weeping friends he said, "I know you think it hard to see me suffer so, but I would not exchange places with any of you. Just think, one moment suffering here in pain, and the next in a world where I shall suffer no more. I feel that I am moving on. The waters are deep, but they do not overflow me. There is a firm bottom." On the Doctor telling him he would not have many more hard struggles, he said, "Ah! that is good news, Doctor; I have been making preparation for this these many years." Then to his wife he said, "do not think of me as lying in the grave, but think of me as being happy in glory—and I want you to be happy too—and I will keep looking out for you to come." Many will call him blessed at the coming of the Master and the gathering of the harvest.

Gov. WILLIAM CANNON.

One of the lay stewards of the Philadelphia Conference, died at his residence in Bridgeville, Del., March 1st, 1865. Born March 15th, 1809, he was at his death nearly fifty-six years of age. His parents were Methodists—his father an exhorter, his mother a most earnest and consistent Christian. Often was she known to shout

in the meetings with her little son in her arms. The seeds of character which ripened to such maturity in the religious life of our departed brother, were doubtless sown in this pious home. In August, 1825, in his seventeenth year, he gave his heart to God at a Camp Meeting in Russell's woods, in Sussex County, Delaware. Before his twentieth year, he was a class leader and exhorter, for many years recording steward, and for several years lay steward of the Conference. By the blessing of God on his industry and perseverance, he became a living proof of the truth recorded by Solomon, "Seest thou a man diligent in business, he shall stand before Kings; he shall not stand before mean men." Religion gave tone to his entire character and conduct. Wealth was given him, and he always used it as a wise and liberal steward of God. Honors were conferred on him, and he bore them modestly and with Christian simplicity of spirit. In his official relations to the Church and to the country, and in all his secular business by which his earnest life was crowded, he deported himself as a consistent and exemplary Christian. Respected by community, beloved by all who knew him, he won his way to extensive usefulness. A fearless friend of freedom, and earnestly identified with every enterprise which tended to promote the welfare of man, he has left his name on the brightest page of the history of his State, and he has gone to the brighter world where his name is on more glorious record. "I would rather have religion," said he, "than the wealth of Astor." "I am established on the Rock of Ages." "Religion is everything." "I am going to a mansion prepared for me." These were some of his dying utterances. He often said "sweet Jesus." After a most affecting interview with his family from whom he was about to be separated, he quoted-"The chamber where the good man meets his fate, is privileged beyond the common walks of virtuous life. Quite on the verge of Heaven." In the death of Gov. Cannon, we mourn the loss of a Christian, patriot and brother beloved in the Lord.

Rev. JOHN BARRIS DENNISON

Died July 20th, 1864, aged 34. He was the oldest son of William and Mary Ann Dennison, and was born in Cecil County, Maryland, December 26th, 1829. Carefully trained in early life in the knowledge of Divine things, his riper years were solemnly consecrated to God. At the age of sixteen he sought and found Christ as a personal and present Saviour. His experience is another exemplification of the truth, that childhood blessed with proper religious culture will ensure adult piety. From the hour of his conversion he entered upon a career of Christ-like service in the work of saving men. Soon after this he removed to Baltimore and united with Caroline Street charge, where he maintained a steady Christian deportment. At twenty, he returned to Cecil County, and was soon after selected Superintendent of Principio Sunday School. The fruit of his labors in this place is still seen. A conscious call to the work of the ministry manifested itself so visibly, that during the same year he received license to exhort and to preach. A vacancy occurring on North East Circuit, he was sent to fill it, and for about four months he did so with acceptability. In 1851, he was appointed by the Presiding Elder to Fulton Circuit, Pa., where he labored with great success. Two churches were erected during the year. In 1852, he was received on trial in the Philadelphia Conference, and appointed to Delaware City Circuit, Delaware, which included the village of St.

Georges. His subsequent appointments were, 1853, Strasburg; 1854, Kelley Mission; 1855, Safe Harbor; 1856-57, Cochranville; 1858-59, Oxford; 1860-61, Pottstown; 1862-63, Lebanon; 1864, St. George's, Delaware.

His appointment to this charge was eminently satisfactory to the people, and he entered upon the work with large promise of usefulness. By a strange coincidence he ended his ministry where as a member of the Conference he had commenced it, and the church which in his youthful zeal and faithfulness he had labored to erect, was to be the scene of his last ministrations, and of his own obsequies. He was taken sick of bilious fever, which soon merged into a typhoid form.

His physician did not consider him dangerously ill, nor did his friends or himself think that death would ensue; but when asked how he felt on the subject, he replied, "I can trust my Heavenly Father." When asked by his wife, "do you feel happy!" he said "O yes my dear, I have not a cloud or a doubt to darken mysky; all is bright, don't trouble yourself about that." And then he gave her some advice in case he should die. When she spoke of being very desolate and lonely without him, he replied, "Trust in Jesus, it will all be right." When it became apparent that he would die, and he was apprised of the fact, he calmly replied, "I am ready; the Lord's will be done." Our departed brother was fully consecrated to Christ. He was a man of God, and a good minister of the Lord Jesus. Christ's cause was his cause. Christ's work, his work. He loved the Church, and was constantly employed in doing good. He was popular and successful. Many will rise up in the great day and call him blessed.

His preaching was earnest, pathetic, and at times exceedingly powerful. He was baptised with the Holy Ghost, and with fire, and became the vehicle for the transmission of the soul saving light and heat, as the Lord always caused him to triumph, and made manifest by him the savor of his knowledge in every place.

Rev. ABRAHAM FREED,

By the will of God, closed his labors, and his life, on the 28th day of February, 1865, at Bridgeville, Delaware, aged 48 years.

He was born near Pottstown, Pennsylvania, on the 8th day of January, 1817, and from his earliest youth, was remarkable for more than ordinary seriousness and gravity of character, induced, no doubt, by convictions of the exceeding sinfulness of sin, and the necessity of spiritual regeneration; and by his habitually devout deportment, was marked as one that feared God.

Throughout the period of his youth, and of his early manhood, the early inclinations of his heart, grew with his growth, and matured with his strength—prompted him to humble prayer for help and grace to work out his own salvation. Contending with the usual doubts and difficulties, it was not until the year 1840 that he obtained from God indubitable evidence that he was born from above. This event occurred during his residence in Marietta, Pa.

An early life of such sincere seriousness, followed by a new spiritual life of zeal and devotion, combined with his peculiar amiability, commended him to the confidence of the church, and soon brought him successively into the positions of class leader, exhorter, and local preacher.

In 1843, he was admitted on trial in the Philadelphia Annual Conference, as a travelling preacher. He loved the Itinerancy, and was never known to crave any particular appointment, or to complain of any direction the church may have given to his labors.

His first Circuit was Kent, Md., 1844, Nottingham; 1845 Cecil; 1846, Denton; 1847, Stoddartsville; 1848, Tremont; 1849, Lehman's Chapel; 1850-51, Attleborough; 1852-53 Springfield; 1854-55, Pottstown; 1856-57, Annamessex; 1858-59, Church Creek; 1860-62, Lewes; 1862-63, Annamessex, again; and in 1864, Seaford—where, owing to exposure to the severity of the weather, he was taken sick, and in a few days, just before the session of the present Conference, breathed his last in great peace. A devoted wife and six children, bereaved of the care and counsel of a pious husband, and father, mourn his removal. His fellow laborers, and the people, wherever he was known, feel a sense of keen sorrow, as they think of him as no more among the living.

As a preacher, brother Freed was earnest, deep, and powerful. He studied assiduously to "show himself approved before God and man, and rightly dividing the word of truth." He had a systematic mind, well stored with varied information. His congregations were interested, and savingly edified, by his expositions, and close application of the word to the heart and conscience. He was a faithful pastor; following the directions of the book of discipline, and fulfilling in every point, the round of duties it enjoins.

In our National troubles he never failed to show his loyalty to the Government, and his love for the Union. This cost him friends, and support; but life itself could not have induced him to compromise with wrong.

He was led to hope his illness would be but temporary, that his work would not terminate so soon; but God saw best, and took him home.

In weariness and pain be talked much of the sufficiency of Christ, and the preciousness of his sustaining grace. Blameless in life and conversation, pure in heart, he had no fear, no doubt. He "walked with God." Among the last expressions that fell from his lips, were the strains of the familiar stanzas.

"My happy soul would stay, In such a frame as this; And sit and sing herself away To everlasting bliss."

Rev. JAMES WEBB

Died on the 8th of October, 1864, near Kennett Square, Chester Co., Penna., in the 35th year of his age. In early life, under the ministration of the word by Rev. A. Manship, he was awakened. Discovering the exceeding sinfulness of sin and its awful consequences, he resolved to meet the requirements of duty, and turning unto God, he was accepted. Appreciating this act of divine goodness, he could not consent to remain inactive in the Lord's vineyard, and sought to do good as he had opportunity.

Combining the pure principles of Christianity with an amiable disposition and warm heart, he was well qualified for usefulness. The purity and depth of his piety was ever unquestioned by those who knew him. After years of devotion to God he became impressed that it was his duty to "preach the word." A similar

impression resting upon the Church, led to the enlargement of his sphere of usefulness, and he was licensed as an exhorter. In the year 1858 he was appointed by the Presiding Elder to Zion Circuit, Cecil Co., Md. Meeting with discouragements, he began to doubt the genuineness of his call to the ministry, and at the end of his term he returned to his former vocation. After much prayerful consideration, becoming confirmed in his conviction, he consented to again enter the itinerancy. He was admitted to Philadelphia Annual Conference in 1860, the brethren who recommended him requesting that he should be returned to them; but he was appointed to Richmond Circuit, Northampton Co., Pa., where he labored with great acceptability and success for two years. His next appointment was Naglesville Mission; there he entered upon his work with diligence and zeal, success following. During this year he was married to Miss R. R. Rumford, an excellent Christian lady of Wilmington, Del. While earth was brightening, a change was approaching. The following year it became evident to himself and his numerous friends that he must give up the work he loved so well; at the following session of the Conference he sought and was granted a superannuated relation. Rest did not bring a return of health, -that fatal but flattering disease, consumption, could not be arrested. His work was done. "In manhood's middle day" he calmly and sweetly fell asleep in Christ, leaving as a precious legacy to mourning friends the example of a holy life, the comfort of a triumphant death.

"Oh, may we all like him believe,
And keep the faith and win the prize!
Father, prepare, and then receive
Our hallowed spirits to the skies,
To chant with all our friends above,
Thy glorious, everlasting love."

EDUCATION REPORT.

The Committee on Education respectfully report that they have received communications from the President of Dickinson College; from the Committee appointed to attend the commencement exercises of Dickinson Seminary; from the President of the Wesleyan Female College; and from the Committee appointed by this Conference to attend the Annual examinations. We have also received a communication from the Rev. R. G. Chaney, Principal of the West River Classical Institute. From these several papers, your Committee select such points of interest as in their judgment should be brought to the notice of the Conference.

The Report of the Treasurer of the Education Fund, \$40,225.24 invested, \$87.77 un-invested, and \$52.91 interest, has been referred to us. Your Committee present the following abstract from Dr. Johnson's Report.—"The number of Students during the year ending June last, was, in the College Class, 93—which was an increase of 11 on the year previous; and in the Grammar School 34—which was a decrease of 8, on the year previous." "Our former patronage from Delaware and Maryland, is returning quite freely." "It is known to this Conference that the President of the College, under the direction of the Board of Trustees, has been devoting special labor, the last few years, to try to correct erroneous impressions among our people, in regard to collegiate education, and to cultivate a conviction of its importance, and of the proper mode of endowing a College. We had hoped, a year ago, to reach a point, early in Summer, when it would be proper to put an agent into the field to

solicit subscriptions for that object, and make collections. Events, however, will not always move according to any man's programme. We were still baffled, and did not reach the point aimed at, in that regard, till mid-winter. We regard it as providential, that just when we were casting about, with much solicitude, for a proper person to take the office of Endowment Agent, it came to our knowledge that the Rev. Pennel Coombe could probably be had for that work."

"The College has suffered a sad bereavement in the recent death of Professor

Wilson, a man of thorough scholarship, and an efficient College Officer."

The Report from the President of the Wesleyan Female College, represents that School in a prosperous condition. The income of the past year, paid the current expenses, including interest, and left a small surplus which was applied to the reduction of the debt.

There is a gratifying increase in the number of pupils, and their cheerful obedience has made the government of the school easy and pleasant. The Visiting Committee, Dr. Cooke, and Bro. Curtis, report favorably upon the general success of the school.

The Visiting Committee to Williamsport Dickinson Seminary, consisting of T. A. Fernley, T. C. Murphy, and R. H. Pattison, report favorably upon what they witnessed of the examinations, and the general facilities for a thorough education.

The West River Classical Institute is situated in Owensville, West River, twelve miles below Annapolis city, and accessible by steamboat, in a few hours, from Baltimore, Washington, Easton, Cambridge, and St. Michaels.

Your Committee cannot pass over in silence, the fact that one of our colleagues, the late Hon. William Cannon, Governor of the State of Delaware, has passed from a field of usefulness, in the Church and State—to his rest in heaven. While we regret the void occasioned by his death, we bow in submission to the high behest of Him, without whose notice not even a sparrow falls to the ground.

Your Committee present the following Resolutions for the consideration of the Conference:

- 1. Resolved, That the cause of Christian Education is one of the great benevolent enterprises of the Church, and with the Missionary and Bible causes ought to be recognised as an indispensable auxiliary to the work of the Ministry, and as such should share more liberally in the contributions of the Church.
- 2. That the complete endowment of Dickinson College is one of the first wants of our Church, in this section of the work; and that we appreciate the labors of Dr. Johnson, President of the College, in successfully initiating the movement.
- 3. That we approve of the appointment of an endowment agent for Dickinson College, and that the presiding Bishop be requested to appoint our brother, Pennel Coombe, to that position, and that we pledge him our co-operation.
- 4. That we appeal to the Christian conscience of our wealthy members and friends, for liberal donations and bequests, towards the endowment of our literary institutions believing that these will be among the most blessed of all their benevolent appropriations.
- 5. That each Pastor is expected to preach to his congregations on Christian Education, and to direct the minds of parents to the importance of educating their children, and of encouraging our own Institutions.

(See Discipline, page 224.)

6. That we request from the several Circuits and Stations at least ten cents per member, for the Educational collection, and that the apportionment to each charge be inserted in the published Minutes, and that ten per cent. of the amount realized be applied to the beneficiary fund for the aid of young men preparing for the ministry.

7. That after ten per cent. of the Educational collections is set apart for the beneficiary fund, as directed in the foregoing resolution, the remainder shall be equally

divided between Dickinson College and the Wesleyan Female College.

8. That to secure the interest and concurrence of our members, in raising the Educational collection, the Presiding Elders are requested to see that a committee be appointed at the first Quarterly Conference of each charge, whose duty it shall be to co-operate with the Pastor in devising such means as in their judgment will secure success.

9. That we especially recommend to our people the Grammar School, at Carlisle, as the best place to prepare their sons for college.

10. That we have learned with pleasure, that a Commercial School is established in connection with Dickinson College, and that we recommend it to our people.

11. That we rejoice in the prosperity of the Wesleyan Female College,—that we offer our congratulations to the President and Faculty, and hereby express our hope in the success of the measures in progress for the payment of \$10,000,—the entire amount of its floating debt.

12. That we will promote the interests of the Wesleyan Female College by encouraging our members and friends to send their daughters to it, and by presenting its claims, when the subject of education is brought before our congregations.

13. That the Education Collection be taken in the months of September or October.

14. That the Committee on Education for the next Conference shall consist of two Preachers, and two Laymen, from each district; and that the Presiding Bishop be requested to appoint the lay members at the present session; and that the Committee, on assembling, have authority to fill the places of absentees.

15. That we will observe the annual concert of prayer for Colleges, held on the last Thursday in February, by holding public services in our churches, on which occasions voluntary offerings may be given in aid of the Beneficiary Fund, for the

assistance of young men preparing for the ministry.

16. That the Education Committee be instructed to counsel and act, as may be judged expedient, in concert with the President of Dickinson College, and the endowment agent, in reference to all its financial interests.

17. That in view of the expiration of the terms of service of J. Cunningham and P. Coombe—as Trustees of the Wesleyan Female College—that they be, and are hereby re-appointed.

18. That each Preacher in charge report the amount of his Education collection, at the same time he reports his Missionary collection.

19. That the Presiding Bishop be requested to appoint Visiting Committees to Dickinson College, Wesleyan Female College, the West River Classical Institute, Maryland, and the Williamsport Dickinson Seminary.

REPORT OF TRACT COMMITTEE.

Your Committee on the Tract Cause, have carefully considered the subject presented to them, and would respectfully submit the following resolutions for your adoption:—

Resolved, 1st. That we have been deeply impressed with the vital importance of Tract Distribution as an agency in the accomplishment of good, and we believe that never was the opportunity greater for the dissemination of religious knowledge by this means than is now offered, especially among those who have gone forth with their lives in their hands in defence of their country.

Resolved, 2d. That we have noticed with unmingled pleasure the evidences of improvement in the condition of the Depository. The resources of the Society at the present time are \$12,000. Liabilities, \$4,665. Net worth, \$7,334. Increase over last year, \$4,600. The sales, \$18,381. The profit, \$3,700. And we are no less gratified to find that our agent has been unremitting in his endeavors to advance the objects intrusted to him.

Resolved, 3d. Inasmuch as the Board of Managers are desirous for the continuance of the agency, we recommend the re-appointment of the Rev. J. Flannery for the ensuing year.

Resolved, 4th. That we call the attention of our ministers and people to the liberal per centage in Tracts and Tract Publications, proposed by the Philadelphia Conference Tract Society, to be obtained, if desired, for local distribution.

Resolved, 5th. That six laymen, one from each district, to act as a part of the Tract Committee, be appointed to serve at the next session of the Conference.

Resolved, 6th. That in view of the great importance of the Tract Enterprise, and the success with which it has been crowned during the past year, we commend it to the sympathy and liberal support of our people, and that we will cheerfully cooperate with the agent in his labors among us.

Resolved, 7th. That we recommend to the Managers to place the Depository on a broader basis, so that it may become a centre of interest and source of power to the whole Church within our borders.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON BIBLE CAUSE.

The Committee on the Bible Cause beg leave to report,

That the following facts in regard to the operations of the Bible Society, during the past year, are greatly encouraging to all who love the word of God, and long for its universal diffusion.

1st. That the Society has authorized the electrotyping of the Scriptures in Arabic, which will put them within the reach of the 120,000,000 of the human race who use that language.

2d. That the Society has appropriated to the following places and objects the vast number of copies of the sacred volume appended.

To the Army and Navy, Hospitals, Gunboats, and returned Prisoners of War, 280,854; to the South, for troops and people, 61,660; to Prisoners of War, 22,648; Southern Refugees, 570; to the Freed People, 24,783; to Sabbath Schools, 6,160; to Sailors and Boatmen, 6,007; Miscellaneous, 19,543. The United States Christian

Commission have received grants for distribution in the Army and Navy, amounting to 227,035 volumes.

Your Committee beg leave, respectfully, to offer to the Conference the following resolutions:—

1st. That we heartily approve of the resolution in regard to the electrotyping of the Scriptures in Arabic.

2d. That we render hearty thanks to Almighty God that He has given to the American Bible Society the means and the disposition to meet so liberally the large demands upon them from our own and from foreign lands.

3d. That we still have entire confidence in the American Bible Society and its auxiliaries; that we welcome their agents into our several fields of labor, and that we will urge our people to contribute liberally to their funds and to co-operate heartily in their labors.

4th. That we specially recommend that our people participate largely and fully in the meetings and labors of the Auxiliary Bible Societies in our several counties and towns, and that we will encourage these local societies by paying our collections into their treasuries.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON TEMPERANCE.

The Committee on Temperance beg leave to report the following resolutions:—
Resolved, That, as the word of God declares the use of intoxicating liquors as a
beverage to be sinful, and as the discipline of the M. E. Church requires her members
to abstain from such use of them, we earnestly and affectionately urge upon our
members and friends the duty of entire abstinence.

Resolved, That while we consider the church in her organized capacity to be the great conservator of public morals, we will co-operate in all prudent measures for the suppression of intemperance, and do hereby urge upon our members the adoption of the same course.

Resolved, That we hereby recommend the formation of Total Abstinence Societies, whenever it is practicable, in all departments of our work.

Resolved, That as a part of the work of our ministry, we will present, during the year, at least one sermon on the subject of temperance in all of our congregations.

SUNDAY SCHOOL REPORT.

The Committee on Sunday Schools, present the following as their report:—
Regarding the Sunday-School as inferior to no other agency, the public ministry
of the Word excepted, in promoting the spread of the Redeemer's Kingdom, we present the following resolutions for adoption:

Resolved, 1. That the facts set forth in the statistical circular from our Corresponding Secretary are cause of profound gratitude to God, and ample encouragement to the Church to persevere in well-doing.

Resolved, 2. That while there is so much cause for rejoicing, there is great reason for humiliation in the fact, that the number of conversions is less than in the preceding year, by more than a thousand!

Resolved, 3. That in inquiring for the cause of this decrease, with the view of applying a remedy, it is respectfully suggested that too little importance is fre-

quently attached to the conversion of children, both by the ministry and members of the Church.

Resolved, 4. That, with the hope of greater success in the future, our Book Agents are requested to re-issue the "Teachers' Journal," with the improvements suggested by Dr. Wise, if it can be done at a cost of 50 cents or less, per annum.

Resolved, 5. That it is encouraging to know the Sunday-School Advocate has an average circulation of nearly 260,000 copies, and we indulge the hope and will suit the action to the desire, that in a few years it will reach at least half-a-million.

Resolved, 6. That we respectfully suggest to our Book Agents the expediency of publishing a greater number of books, adapted to the wants of the youth of from 15 to 20 years of age—not dry doctrinal disquisitions on the one hand, nor little stories suited to children on the other.

Resolved, 7. That while we rejoice in the good accomplished by the Sunday School institution, it becomes us to inquire what can be done to render our Schools more efficient as an agency for saving souls, and building up the Church.

Resolved, 8. That in the prosecution of this inquiry we recommend the holding of District Sunday-School Conventions, each Presiding Elder being, ex-officio, the President, with authority to call and fix the time and place of holding the first, the Convention, when met, to determine when and where the next shall be held; and every Sunday School under the patronage of our Church, within the District, being entitled to send as many delegates as it pleases.

Resolved, 9. That the disciplinary rules on the subject of Sunday-Schools, be carried out, as far as practicable in all our Circuits and Stations.

REPORT ON BRANCH BOOK CONCERN AT PHILADELPHIA.

The Committee appointed at the last session of the Conference to confer with the Book Agents and Book Committee, with reference to the most judicious method of securing the establishment of a branch of the Book Concern, or Book Depository in the City of Philadelphia, respectfully report:

In our correspondence with the Book Agents at New York, they referred us to the General Conference, which was then about to convene in Philadelphia, and frankly admitted that, if harmony of action could be secured, "a Depository might be well sustained, and prove a source of convenience and profit."

During the session of the General Conference, the Committee conferred with our Conference delegation, and presented, through them, a memorial to that body, in which the subject was stated and argued.

On the thirteenth day of May, the General Conference adopted the following resolution:

"Resolved, That the Book Agents at New York be instructed to establish a Book Depository in the City of Philadelphia, if, in their judgment, it can be done without loss to the Concern, and under such conditions as shall be entirely satisfactory to them."

The Book Agents now proposse, that, if, by the centenary offering, or in any other manner, a suitable building be provided, that they will unite with us in such a way as to make the thing a complete success.

We herewith present the letters of the Book Agents and a copy of the memorial presented to the General Conference.

Resolved, That we still insist on the establishment of a suitable Book Depository in a proper business site in the City of Philadelphia.

Resolved, That we appeal to the liberality of Philadelphia Methodists to provide the means for this purpose, as one of the great present wants of the Church in our midst.

Resolved, That if the Depository is to be established by Philadelphia capital, it ought to be under Philadelphia control.

Resolved, That a Committee of nine, four ministers and five laymen, be appointed to use their utmost efforts to press this matter to a speedy, successful issue.

REPORT ON THE STATE OF THE COUNTRY.

Having upon previous occasions, as a Conference, fully expressed our views of duty in reference to the state of the country, we would now, disclaiming all interest in merely partisan politics, re-affirm our past declarations of unswerving loyalty to the Union of these States; declaring that, in our judgment, the triumph of our army and navy is just cause for devout thanksgiving to Almighty God; and, believing that the rebellion is virtually crushed, and desiring that the war may speedily end, we earnestly supplicate the Divine influence to incline the hearts of the rebels in arms to submission to the constitutional authority of the land; that the useless, wasteful effusion of their blood in a hopeless struggle may cease.

And resolve—1. That the amendment to the Constitution of the United States, submitted to the legislative bodies of the States, having for its purpose the extirpation of slavery by positive law, meets with our heartiest approval.

- 2. That we congratulate the people of Maryland that, by the adoption of her new Constitution and the concurrence of her Legislature in the amendment of the Constitution of the United States, she has forever freed herself from the great sin of American slavery.
- 3. That, as Christian men and ministers, we rejoice in the elevation of the down-trodden and oppressed to the rights of universal humanity; and that we sympathize with, and shall commend to the support of our people, all laudable efforts for their education and elevation.
- 4. That we commend the National Freedman's Association as an instrumentality in the hands of the people for this purpose.
- 5. That, believing the loyal people of the South, who have in the past held to our form of church government, will, in the new state of affairs that the rebellion has in the providence of God brought about, look to our Church for a home, we greatly approve the action of our church authorities in the early occupation of this new field of labor, and shall devoutly supplicate the Lord of the harvest to send forth more laborers into his vineyard.
- 6. That we cordially commend the U. S. Sanitary and Christian Commissions as the great means, in the hands of the people, in carrying Christian sympathy and physical comfort to our sick and wounded soldiers. And, in connection with these,

we commend to public liberality, all institutions and associations having for their object the relief of the sorrow and suffering arising from this war, even among our enemies, believing that, in the fulfilment of the Divine command, "If thine enemy hunger, feed him; if he thirst, give him drink: for in so doing thou shalt heap coals of fire on his head," we pursue the course best calculated to secure a permanent peace to our beloved country.

MT. MORIAH CEMETERY.

The Trustees of Preacher's Burial Lot in Mount Moriah Cemetery, beg leave to report that the instructions of the last Conference have been carried out to the extent of their ability. A beautiful hedge of selected Arbor-Vita encloses the lot. They will, by three years growth, command more than the expense of plants and planting, which is two hundred dollars. Large granite posts and iron gates, carriage-ways and foot-paths laid out in the most approved manner, choice evergreens, plants and flowers, will soon adorn that too long neglected spot, where repose the remains of persons representing fourteen Ministers' families.

The purpose of this Board is to place about the lot an iron fence, firmly fixed in granite posts, at the earliest practicable moment.

The charter has been changed so as to conform to law and only waits the signature of his honor, the Judge of the Court. This charter provides that the office of Trustee shall terminate on the part of one minister and one layman each year, and their places be filled by the vote of the Conference.

To accomplish the design set forth in this paper we shall require three thousand dollars. It was expected that this would have been collected by the Preachers in charge. You were appealed to by circular, the apportionment of each respective charge stated, and your obligation to meet your previous pledges and promises made to the donors of that beautiful enclosure, were affectionately urged; but few however responded. The whole amount reported is inadequate, and your Board will wait for more prompt and liberal action. On your return, if not continued in your present charge, leave a statement of what your apportionment is, so that there be no delay. We trust that the full three thousand dollars will be in our hands by the 1st of July.

A grateful people have made Gettysburg a grand centre of fond memories, above the resting place of noble warriors. A beautiful monumental pile bears inscriptions that tell of great deeds, and daring for right, justice and humanity. In the modest "God's Acre," which commands our special attention, sleep the remains of as valorous men as ever drew a blade. In the thickest of the spiritual combat, their words of cheer and noble bearing, inspired their comrades for further conquest, and their dying shout of victory lingers among us. Let us pay a just tribute to their memory.

DEATH OF REV. W. L. THORNTON, A.M.

Resolved, That the Philadelphia Annual Conference has heard, with profound regret, of the recent and sudden death of Rev. W. L. Thornton, A.M., late delegate from the British Wesleyan connexion to the General Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church.

Resolved, That we will ever cherish a lively remembrance of his dignified and Christian conduct, and of his earnest and evangelical ministry among us, during his late visit to our General Conference.

Resolved, That we request our delegates to the British Conference, at its next session, to present the preceding resolutions to said Conference, as a testimonial of our sympathy with them in the great loss they have sustained in the death of Mr. Thornton.

MAHANOY CITY M. E. CHURCH.

Whereas, The first M. E. Church, of Mahanoy City, a flourishing town in the Schuylkill Co. Coal Region, has met with a serious disaster in the fall of the new Church edifice, which was being erected by them; and

Whereas, There is a pressing want of a new church in that growing town, at once, and Methodism must needs suffer serious loss in case it is not erected; and

Whereas, It is evident that the amount needed to erect the building cannot be wholly raised in that place; therefore

Resolved, That we commend this church to the liberality of our people, and that the Missionary laboring in that charge be authorized to solicit contributions in the upper part of the Conference from the members and friends of our church generally wherever practicable.

CENTENARY OF METHODISM.

Resolved, That the Bishop be requested to appoint one minister and one layman from each District to consider and report to the next Annual Conference a plan for Conference action in regard to the Centenary of Methodism, and appoint a member of this body to preach a Centenary Sermon before the Conference, at its next session.

HOME MISSION.

Resolved, 1. That we learn with pleasure that the Home Missionary work in this city, under the auspices of our church, is about to be resumed.

Resolved, 2. That we do most cordially commend this enterprise to the sympathy and liberal support of our members and friends.

Resolved, 3. That this Conference will in all suitable ways render the missionary or missionaries, who may be appointed to the superintendency of this work, all the assistance in our power, so as to guarantee success.

Resolved, 4. That a committee of ten, equally divided between ministers and laymen, be appointed at this Conference, to as ist in the re-organization and sustenance of this important department of Missionary labor.

RESOLUTION OF THANKS,

Resolved, That the thanks of this body are due and are hereby tendered to our brethren, the Conference Stewards, both ministers and laymen, for the faithful and satisfactory manner in which they have performed their onerous duties at the present session.

MEMOIRS OF DECEASED PREACHERS.

Resolved, That in the event of any Preacher dying during the year, the Presiding Elder be requested to prepare, or appoint some one to prepare, a memoir, to be read at the next Annual Conference.

RELATION TO SOLDIERS.

Whereas, There now exists a fearful struggle for the maintenance of the Federal government against treason and rebellion; and

Whereas, The history of this great struggle will be written and published to the world; and

Whereas, It is all important that the history of the M. E. Church in its connection with this struggle be correctly and fully written; therefore,

Resolved, 1. That the members of this Conference be requested to furnish to the Secretary at the next session, a correct statement of the numbers of the members of our Churches and congregations who have entered the United States service to put down the wicked rebellion now afflicting our country; and what number of them have held official positions in our army and navy, with their respective rank, and what numbers of them have been wounded, killed, or died in the service of their country.

Resolved, 2. That these returns be printed in the published minutes of the Conference.

Resolved, 3. That the Bishops of the M. E. Church be requested to present the above resolutions to the several Annual Conferences of the Church for their concurrence.

THANKS TO THE PENNSYLVANIA LEGISLATURE.

Whereas, Many persons in this city have for some years been using all their influence to have the street cars run on the Holy Sabbath; and

Whereas, The subject has recently been brought before the Legislature of this State, and the allowance of running cars on God's Holy Day, has been refused by large majorities in both Houses; therefore

Resolved, That we highly approve their action, and sincerely hope that all future legislation of that honorable body in relation to this subject will take the same course in thus nobly protecting the moral interests of community.

STATISTICS.

Resolved, That the Conference Secretaries be requested to pub'ish in the Annual Minutes, the plan, as furnished by slips, for the collection of all our statistics for the coming conference year, and that the preachers be required to hand in their reports on the second day of the session, and that delinquents be reported hereafter in open conference.

PREACHERS IN CHARGE.

Resolved, That Preachers in charge of Circuits and Stations be requested to report debts remaining on churches and parsonages, and that the Secretary be requested to prepare the blanks for general statistics, so that "debt remaining" shall follow "probable value" of churches and parsonages.

BISHOP D. W. CLARK, D. D.

Whereas, The President of this Conference, Bishop Clark, has been among us in his official capacity, for the first time, and has so discharged the delicate and responsible duties of President of this Conference, as to command our entire satisfaction; therefore

Resolved, That we tender to him our thanks, and cordially invite him to return to us, in the same capacity, whenever in the distribution of the Episcopal work it may fall to his lot.

OUR COLORED PEOPLE.

Whereas, Our colored people, within our bounds, have been generally organized into Circuits and Districts, in accordance with the recommendation of this Conference at its last session, and

Whereas, They may need the counsel and assistance of their old Pastors, therefore Resolved, That the Preachers laboring on the eastern shore of Maryland and Virginia, and within the State of Delaware, be requested and advised to render our colored people all needful aid in the way of counsel and advice, in their efforts to perfect their organization.

ON THE DECEASE OF GOVERNOR CANNON.

Whereas, Our brother, William Cannon, Governor of Delaware, and one of the lay stewards of this Conference, has been called by the Head of the Church to vacate the sphere of usefulness, which he so efficiently occupied in the church on earth, in full hope, through the atoning blood of our Lord Jesus Christ, of a higher sphere of duty and honor in the church above,

Resolved, That as one of the officers of this body, a suitable memoir of our brother should appear in the published Minutes, and we hereby call for the preparation of such a paper according to the method pursued in the case of deceased ministers.

Resolved, That an attested copy of these proceedings, together with the proposed memoir, be forwarded to the widow of the deceased, with an expression of our Christian sympathy.

CHAPLAINS IN THE ARMY.

Resolved, That we have heard the testimonials to the high character and efficient labor of our absent brethren, Chaplains S. L. Gracey, W. O'Neill, J. C. Gregg, W. Hammond, W. T. Tull, J. T. Van Burkalow, and G. G. Rakestraw;—that we recognize the presence of our brethren, Chaplains, E. J. Way, T. L. Poulson, T. Snowden Thomas, C. J. Crouch, T. Kirkpatrick, W. B. Gregg, and J. S. Lame, with great pleasure, and that we have heard the thrilling statements of some of these brethren with regard to the success of their ministry, in the army of our country, with unspeakable satisfaction.

CONFERENCE COLLECTIONS.

Resolved, That the preachers who may pay either Bible or Sunday School money during the interval of Conference, to general or local societies, be required to procure from the Treasurers of said Societies receipts, to be handed to the Finance Committee at the next Conference.


