# DAILY PROCEEDINGS.

## FIRST DAY.

### WEDNESDAY MORNING.

The Conference met in St. George's M. E. Church, Philadelphia, on Wednesday morning, March 14, 1866, at 9 o'clock; Bishop Edward R. Ames, D.D., in the Chair.

The Session was opened by religious exercises, conducted by C. Cooke; consisting of reading the 100th Psalm, singing the 707th hymn, and prayer.

The Roll was called by the Secretary of the last Conference, when 134 members answered to their names.

R. H. Pattison was elected Secretary, and G. W. Lybrand and A. M. Wiggins Assistant Secretaries.

The Chair announced the transfer of B. H. Nadal to this Conference, from the Baltimore Conference, by Bishop Scott.

The usual Standing Committees were appointed. (*See Committees.*)

A motion was made to adopt the rules of the last Conference; when C. Cooke moved to amend so as not to require members to vote on questions other than the regular course of the Discipline. The amendment was laid on the table, and the rules of the last Conference adopted.

The Conference resolved to meet daily at 9 A.M., and adjourn at 12 M.

A draft was ordered on the Treasurer of the Chartered Fund, in favor of the Board of Stewards, for \$30.

T. C. Murphy offered a resolution providing for holding a Conference Sunday School Anniversary at our next session, which was referred to the Committee on Sunday Schools.

The annual circular of the Sunday School Union of the M. E. Church was received, and referred to the same Committee.

H. M. Johnson presented the Annual Report of the President of Dickinson College, which was referred to the Committee on Education.

A circular from the Central Centenary Committee was received, and referred to the Centenary Committee.

The 7th Question was taken up. (*See Disciplinary Questions.*)

W. H. Elliott's relation was changed to effective.

The Bishop announced the transfer of W. W. Wythes to the Erie Conference.

The 8th Question was taken up. (*See Disciplinary Questions.*)

I. T. Cooper, H. Sutton, and T. E. Bell were made Supernumeraries, without appointment.

The cases of W. Hammond and George Barton were referred to the Board of Stewards.

On motion of W. Cooper, it was made a standing rule of the Conference that the Presiding Elders shall nominate the Standing Committees on the morning of the first day of each Session.

The 2d Question, "Who remain on trial?" was taken up. (*See Disciplinary Questions.*) The Committee of Examination reported favorably, and the members of the first year's class were continued on trial.

The Bishop announced the transfer of John Warthman to the Holston Conference.

The 4th Question was taken up: "Who are the Deacons?" (*See Disciplinary Questions.*) The Committee reported favorably, and the characters of the members of the Class were passed.

C. P. Masden, having been unable to appear before the Committee, was allowed to pass on the third and fourth years' course at the next session.

J. A. Cooper asked and was granted a location.

The 5th Question of the Minutes was taken up. (*See Disciplinary Questions.*)

The Committee of Examination reported favorably, and the following brethren were elected to Elders' orders: C. J. Little, J. Todd, N. D. McComas, W. Swindells, and D. W. Gordon.

G. D. Carrow and T. J. Quigley presented a preamble and resolutions on the state of the country, which were adopted. (*See Resolutions.*)

H. E. Gilroy offered a resolution, which was adopted, providing that the several Committees of Examination shall meet the classes to be examined, hereafter, on the evening of Monday immediately preceding the session of the Conference.

The Conference proceeded to the examination of the character of effective Elders; when J. Mason, P. E. of North Philadelphia District, reported the state of the work on his District. The characters of the preachers of that District were then examined and passed. Complaints being made against H. F. Hurn, his case was referred for trial to a Court, consisting of J. F. Chaplain, Allen John, W. Kenney, V. Gray, T. J. Quigley, L. D. McClintock, John Ruth, J. Aspril, F. B. Harvey, W. Urie, E. G. Irwin, W. W. McMichael, and W. C. Robinson. P. Coombe was appointed President of the Court; F. Hodgson was appointed to represent the Conference on the trial.

Bishop Wayman, of the African M. E. Church, was introduced to the Conference.

The transfer, by Bishop Thomson, of J. Welch, to the Mississippi Mission Conference, was announced to the Conference.

A form of organization for a Conference Church Extension Society was presented by the Chair, and referred to the Committee on Church Extension.

The Conference adjourned, with the benediction by W. Cooper.

## SECOND DAY.

### THURSDAY MORNING.

Religious exercises by W. McCombs.

The names of the members absent at roll-call on Wednesday morning were called.

Dr. Curry, Editor of the Christian Advocate; J. S. Smart, of the Detroit Confer-

ence, Agent of the Central Centenary Committee; and Samuel Dunn, a Methodist minister from England, were introduced to the Conference.

J. P. Durbin, H. M. Johnson, and J. A. Wright and J. M. Maris, Esqs., were added to the Centenary Committee.

T. J. Quigley offered resolutions providing for the division of the Conference at the present session. On motion of J. Cunningham, they were laid on the table. After some conversation, the vote was reconsidered, and the resolutions were withdrawn for the present.

S. L. Gracey was elected Assistant Secretary.

A communication was received from the Ladies' Centenary Association of Philadelphia, respecting the establishment of a Female Seminary in this city; which was referred to the Centenary Committee.

The Stewards made their call for collections, which was generously responded to by the members of the Conference.

The Report of the Treasurer of the Centenary Fund was presented, authorizing the Conference to draw on him for \$482.10. The Stewards were directed to draw for the amount.

The characters of the effective Elders of Reading District were examined and passed, with the exception of J. Pastorfield, whose case was referred to a Court for trial, consisting of J. D. Curtis, President; H. R. Calloway, J. W. Jackson, J. Y. Ashton, G. Quigley, H. Colclazer, W. Rink, J. Hand, C. I. Thompson, G. Cummins, S. W. Kurtz, W. E. England, J. B. Quigg, and S. Irwin. W. Cooper and V. Smith were appointed to represent the interests of the Church in the case.

The names of the effective Elders of the South Philadelphia and Easton Districts were called, and their characters passed.

J. A. Massey and A. T. Scott asked and were granted a Supernumerary relation, without appointment.

S. Patterson, owing to ill health, asked and was granted a Superannuated relation.

A communication was received from the President of the Wesleyan Female College, which was referred to the Committee on Education.

The Conference resolved to meet at 7½ o'clock this evening, to hear a sermon by T. C. Murphy, on the relation of Sunday Schools to the Church, as appointed by the Conference at its last session. C. Cooke was appointed to preside at the evening session.

Adjourned, with the benediction by J. P. Durbin.

#### EVENING SESSION.

C. Cooke occupied the Chair. T. A. Fernley opened the exercises by reading the 206th hymn, which was sung, and followed with prayer. Portions of the 78th Psalm, and the 5th chapter of 1 Peter, were read, and the 629th hymn sung. T. C. Murphy then preached an able and thorough sermon, from John xxi. 15, on "The relation of the Sunday School to the Church." The 215th hymn was sung, and followed by prayer by T. J. Thompson.

Adjourned, with benediction by T. J. Thompson.

#### THIRD DAY.

#### FRIDAY MORNING.

Religious exercises by C. J. Crouch.

W. Cooper presented the report of the Committee on Church Extension, which was laid on the table for the present.

A. T. Scott moved that the following question be referred to the Chair: "Do an affirmative answer to the questions on page 82 of the Discipline.—'Are you going on to perfection?—Do you expect to be made perfect in love in this life?—Are you groaning after it?'—commit the person so answering to the acceptance of that special theory of sanctification which declares that, ordinarily, those who are born of God are not cleansed from all sin until they have sought distinctly and separately for that blessing?"

On motion of J. Mason, the paper was laid on the table.

The 4th Question was taken up. The name of J. W. Weston was called, the Examining Committee reported, and his character passed.

J. Cunningham offered the following Resolution, which was adopted:

*Resolved*, That the Philadelphia Conference of the M. E. Church, now in session, do hereby consent to the sale of the property known as the Parsonage of Oxford Circuit, the proceeds to be devoted to buying or building another property for the same purpose; and the Trustees of said property be directed to make the usual title to the purchaser.

The characters of the Effective Elders of Snow Hill District were examined and passed.

W. F. Talbot, at his own request, was made Supernumerary without appointment.

C. I. Thompson presented a letter from J. T. Gracey, Missionary to India, which was read and filed, and the Committee of Correspondence was continued and instructed to convey to Bro. Gracey the paternal greetings of the Conference.

The Report of the Church Extension Committee was taken up, S. Y. Monroe, Secretary of the Church Extension Society, addressed the Conference, after which the resolutions reported by the Committee, were adopted. (*See Resolutions.*)

The remainder of the Report was recommitted with instructions to nominate officers for the Conference Auxiliary Society.

J. B. Quigg offered a resolution respecting the rule for donating the Church Extension Fund, which was referred to the same Committee.

The hour of 11 A. M., on Tuesday, was fixed for hearing Dr. Strong and others, from New York, on the subject of Lay Representation.

The Effective Elders of Wilmington District were called, and their characters examined and passed.

E. J. Way, at his own request, was made Supernumerary without appointment.

T. C. Murphy presented a communication from the Quarterly Conference of Pitts-grove Charge, New Jersey Conference, requesting the restoration of the parchment of Charles P. Whitecar, late a local deacon within the bounds of this Conference. The communication was referred to a Special Committee, consisting of T. C. Murphy, J. D. Curtis and H. E. Gilroy.

Dr. Curry, Editor of the Christian Advocate, addressed the Conference.

T. A. Fernley and E. I. D. Pepper offered resolutions returning the thanks of the Conference to T. C. Murphy for his sermon on "the relation of the Sabbath School to the Church," and requesting a copy of the sermon for publication, which were adopted.

M. D. Kurtz moved the appointment of a Committee to collect the Military Statistics, which was carried. (*See Committees.*)

J. E. Kessler was appointed to receive the funds collected for the improvement of the Ministers' Burial Lot in Mount Moriah Cemetery.

Adjourned, with benediction by S. Duun.



## FOURTH DAY.

## SATURDAY MORNING.

Religious exercises by J. D. Curtis.

The Chair appointed the usual Examining and Visiting Committees. (*See Committees.*)

W. Trickett was made Supernumerary without appointment, at his own request.

P. Coombs presented the finding of the court in the case of H. F. Hurn, as follows:

*Resolved*, That Rev. H. F. Hurn, having made a full, frank and penitent statement of his case, in which he admits the general charge, we hereby conclude, after a full hearing, that we most strongly reprobate the evil of which he has been guilty, and that he be reproved at the bar of this court, by the President.

*Resolved*, That in view of all the palliating circumstances in the case, the penitent confession he has made, his pledge to abstain from this evil in all future time, the Christian deportment of our brother for the last seven months, and our entire confidence in the genuineness of his present Christian character, we now order that his character pass. Signed, P. Coombe, Chairman, S. L. Gracey, Secretary. The paper was placed on file.

The recommendations of Local Preachers for Deacon's and Elder's orders were received and acted on. (*See Disciplinary Questions.*)

The 3d Question was taken up, when the class of the second year was called forward, and after being addressed in an appropriate manner by Bishop Ames, were severally admitted and elected to orders. (*See Disciplinary Questions.*)

A. Jump was continued on trial at his own request.

T. J. Thompson announced the decease of Samuel Conner.

The Centenary Committee reported a programme of exercises for the Centenary exercises on Monday next, which was adopted.

On motion of T. A. Fernley, the Bishop was requested to appoint a Visiting Committee to Fairmount Female College.

Adjourned, with benediction by Bishop Thomson.

## FIFTH DAY.

## MONDAY MORNING.

Religious exercises by D. W. Bartine.

T. C. Murphy, from the Committee on the Restoration of the Credentials of Chas.

P. Whitecar, asked leave to withdraw the application, which was granted.

Bishop Ames presented the usual certificates of the ordinations yesterday.

G. D. Carrow presented the report of the Committee appointed at the last session to consider a memorial on the subject of the restoration of the circuit system in cities, with resolutions that any change is inexpedient at the present time. The report was adopted.

The Report of the Centenary Committee was presented, and laid on the table for the present.

The Committee on the Bible Cause presented their Report, which was adopted, after an address by Dr. Holdich, Secretary of the American Bible Society.

Bishop Ames transferred G. G. Markham, a deacon in the Baltimore Conference,



to this Conference. Upon proper representations, he was elected to elder's orders. Bishop Ames then re-transferred him to the Baltimore Conference.

The Committee on Church Extension reported a list of officers for the Conference Auxiliary Society, which was adopted. (*See Conference Officers.*)

The Report, as a whole, was adopted.

J. J. Pearce and F. Illman, located elders of the Wyoming Conference, were re-admitted into the travelling connection in this Conference.

At 10½ A. M. the religious exercises appropriate to the Centenary Sermon were commenced, conducted by A. John, C. Cooke, A. Atwood, W. Cooper and T. J. Thompson. J. Castle then preached the Conference Centenary Sermon, from Deut. vi. 7. The Sermon was able and eloquent, and was heard with deep interest by a crowded audience.

It was resolved to hold an evening session at the Union M. E. Church this evening, at 7½ o'clock, to hear addresses on the Centenary of our Church; and the Conference adjourned, with benediction by J. Cunningham.

#### EVENING SESSION.

The Conference met in the M. E. Union Church, Bishop Ames in the Chair. Addresses were delivered by F. Moore, J. P. Durbin, J. W. Jackson and Bishop Ames, with a few remarks by S. Dunn, of England, and Bishop Janes. The Conference then adjourned, with benediction by Bishop Scott.

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### SIXTH DAY.

#### TUESDAY MORNING.

Religious exercises by R. H. Pattison.

The Report of the Visiting Committee to Dickinson Seminary was presented, and referred to the Committee on Education.

The relation of A. Cather was changed from supernumerary to effective.

D. W. Bartine offered resolutions tendering to the New Jersey Conference an invitation to meet this Conference in a re-union love-feast, at Union Church, on Wednesday afternoon next. The resolutions were adopted, and D. W. Bartine, J. Cunningham, A. Wallace, T. A. Fernley, W. J. Paxson and E. I. D. Pepper were appointed a Committee to carry them into effect.

G. D. Carrow offered resolutions tendering the thanks of the Conference to J. Castle for his Centenary Sermon delivered yesterday, and requesting a copy for publication, which were unanimously adopted.

The Report of the Treasurer of the Education Fund was presented, and referred to the Committee on Education.

C. Heiskell was re-elected a Trustee of the Education Fund.

On motion of J. Mason, the Conference recognized S. S. Grove, from the Methodist Episcopal Church in Canada, as a deacon in this Conference.

J. Porter, Book Agent, addressed the Conference on the publishing interests of the Church.

J. L. Houston was granted a supernumerary relation, without appointment.

Jonathan Turner's character was passed, and he was made supernumerary, without appointment.

W. Kenney asked and received the same relation.

C. F. Sheppard was located at his own request.  
 Dr. Strong, of New York, Dr. Porter, T. T. Tasker, J. P. Durbin, Schureman Halstead, and others, addressed the Conference on the subject of Lay Representation.  
 Adjourned, with benediction by G. Hughes, of New Jersey Conference.

## SEVENTH DAY.

## WEDNESDAY MORNING.

Religious exercises by W. J. Paxson.

The Report of the Committee on Book Depository at Philadelphia was presented and filed.

W. L. Gray offered a resolution, giving the consent of the Conference to the sale of the M. E. Church property at New Castle, Schuylkill Co., Pa., which was adopted.

The Centenary Report was taken up, when W. Cooper moved to amend by directing the appropriation of fifty thousand dollars, out of the first unspecified funds contributed, applicable to local objects, to be invested securely as a fund, the interest of which shall be applied to the relief of the superannuated or worn out preachers, their widows and children. G. D. Carrow offered, as a substitute, the following:

*Resolved*, That the Report of the Centenary Committee of this Conference be so amended as to appropriate the sum of \$50,000 towards the foundation of a school for the education of the children of members of the Conference whose parents have not sufficient means to give them a suitable education.

The whole subject was referred back to the Committee.

The Stewards' Report was read and adopted, and the funds in their hands distributed.

J. D. Curtis presented the finding of the court in the case of J. Pastorfield, suspending him from the ministry for one year. The report was filed.

D. W. Bartine presented the resolutions of the New Jersey Conference, accepting the invitation to meet this Conference in a re-union love-feast this afternoon.

The Report of the Committee on Missions was presented and adopted.

S. Townsend was granted a Supernumerary relation, without appointment.

The business of the Conference having prevented the delivery of the Conference Missionary Sermon, by J. B. McCullough, at the request of F. Hodgson, he was appointed to preach the sermon at our next session.

Adjourned to meet at Union Church at 3 P. M.

Benediction by Dr. W. Butler.

## AFTERNOON SESSION.

Conference met at 3 o'clock at the M. E. Union Church. The members of the New Jersey Conference, with Bishop Scott at their head, having entered and been assigned to seats, the religious exercises were opened with singing and prayer by T. J. Thompson. Bishop Ames then welcomed the visiting brethren in an appropriate address, which was responded to by Bishop Scott; after which most interesting remarks were made by several brethren, sacred songs were sung with great spirit, and a precious baptism of the Holy Ghost descended upon the vast assembly. At 5 P. M. the Conference adjourned, with benediction by Bishop Scott.

## EIGHTH DAY.

## THURSDAY MORNING.

Religious exercises by F. Hodgson.

The Statistics of the Conference at this session were reported by the Secretary.

The Report of the Committee on Sunday Schools was presented and adopted. (*See Reports.*)

W. Kenney was elected Conference Vice-President of the Sunday School Union of the M. E. Church.

The Bishop was requested to appoint one minister and one layman from each District, as a Sunday School Committee.

The Report of the Committee on the Tract cause was presented and adopted. (*See Reports.*)

The Report of the Trustees of the Ministers' Burial Lot at Mount Moriah Cemetery, was presented and adopted. J. Neill and Burton J. Kollock were re-elected Trustees.

The 1st Question was taken up, and seven brethren were received on trial. (*See Disciplinary Questions.*)

The Committee on Temperance presented their Report. Adjourned to meet at 7½ o'clock this evening. Benediction by Rev. Dr. Kennard, of the Baptist Church.

## EVENING SESSION.

Religious exercises by J. Ruth.

The Bishop announced the appointment of the Sunday School Committee of ministers and laymen ordered by the Conference; also a Committee on City Missions. (*See Committees.*)

The Report of the Committee on Temperance was presented and adopted. (*See Reports.*)

The Finance Committee presented their Report, which was adopted; and the usual disposition made of the funds in their hands.

T. C. Murphy offered resolutions providing for the appointment of a Committee to arrange the times for holding the anniversaries of our next session, and recommending the Managers of the several Conference Societies to assign topics to the speakers who may be selected.

The Centenary Report was again presented by A. Atwood, amended, and adopted.

On motion of W. McCombs, the following resolution was adopted:

"Resolved, That in the resolutions passed by the Conference on Wednesday morning, concerning the Methodist Church House to be purchased in this city, the authorization to reckon certain donations as 'centenary donations,' is understood to apply only to those heretofore made, and that it was not intended to authorize the agent to solicit *centenary contributions*, as such, for that object during the ensuing year."

A. Atwood, J. P. Durbin and H. M. Johnson, were appointed to nominate the Conference Centenary Committee.

Adjourned, with benediction by T. Myers, of Baltimore Conference.

## NINTH DAY.

## FRIDAY MORNING.

Religious exercises by J. Cunningham.

The Committee on Military Statistics presented their Report. The Committee was continued to the next Conference, with instructions to prosecute their work to completion.

Locust Street M. E. Church, Harrisburg, Pa., was selected as the place for holding our next conference.

The Conference dispensed with the publication of amount of debts remaining on Churches and Parsonages, owing to the incompleteness of the reports received.

The Memoirs of William Barnes, Daniel Lambdin and Samuel J. A. Conner, were read and adopted.

R. W. Jones was granted a location, at his own request.

The 1st Question was taken up, and three brethren were received on trial. (*See Disciplinary Questions.*)

J. P. Durbin, from the Committee to nominate the Centenary Committee of this Conference, as required by the plan of the Central Centenary Committee, reported the names of R. H. Pattison, J. Mason and A. Atwood, Ministers; and J. Whiteman, James Long and J. M. Maris, Laymen. The nominations were confirmed; and it was directed that the same brethren should constitute the Committee called for in item 8th of the Centenary Report.

Resolutions were adopted expressing the respect and affection of the Conference for T. S. Thomas and A. Longacre, who are transferred to other Conferences.

A collection was taken for the Sexton, amounting to \$111.61, also one for the Sexton of Union Church, amounting to \$15.25.

J. Cunningham made a statement of the circumstances of S. Patterson, who has been afflicted by paralysis, and asked for the sum of \$1200, to aid in procuring for him a home. The whole sum required, was subscribed in a brief period, by the Conference and audience.

The Conference Stewards were elected. (*See Conference Officers.*)

The Report of the Committee on Education was presented and adopted.

H. M. Johnson offered two resolutions on the same subject, which were adopted. (*See Reports, &c.*)

The Committee to fix the times for holding the Anniversaries at our next Conference made their report, which were adopted.

J. Cunningham offered two resolutions, commending the Freedmen's Relief Association to the confidence of our people, which were adopted.

The usual resolutions of thanks were adopted.

The Bishop announced the names of the lay members of the Committee on Education. (*See Committees.*)

The Secretary was instructed to have slips for the Conference Statistics printed, and circulated among the members of the Conference.

The appointments were announced by Bishop Ames, and the Conference adjourned, the doxology was sung, and the benediction pronounced by the Bishop.

## REPORTS AND RESOLUTIONS.

### REPORT OF THE BOARD OF STEWARDS, FOR THE YEAR ENDING MARCH, 1866.

The Board of Stewards, in presenting to the Conference their Annual Report, take great pleasure in informing the brethren and the Churches under their care that, notwithstanding the numerous calls made upon the benevolence of our people, and the objections made from time to time by individuals who seem to have doubts as to the wisdom of the Board in the distribution of these funds, this collection is steadily growing in favor with the membership of our Church generally, and this year foots up the handsome sum of \$8990.72, making, with the interest of the Centenary and Chartered Funds, a total for distribution of \$9502.82, or an increase over any former year of \$1225. For this gratifying result they would devoutly thank God, who is giving to his people both the disposition and the ability to grant to those worthy men who have worn themselves out or broken down in the service of the Church, that aid which they so greatly need and so richly deserve. And on behalf of these worthy recipients of this Fund, they would also return thanks, both to the Pastors and people, for their diligence in gathering together these moneys, and the laudable disposition they have manifested in almost every charge to come up to the assessment made by the Board.

The Stewards, after the most patient examination of each case presented, and a careful comparison of the wants of the several claimants, have reached the results indicated in the following table on "Distribution of Funds."

That mistakes have been made in this distribution, and that complaints will be urged both by preachers and people, that justice has not been done in all cases, they have no doubt; but they can conscientiously say, that with the light they had, they have done the best they could, and none will regret it more than themselves, if any have been overlooked or improperly dealt with.

A few claims made by brethren in the effective ranks for deficiencies in their salaries have been entirely dismissed, not because these claimants were not really necessitous, but because the Board felt that their too frequent grants to this class of claimants were only encouraging indolence on the part of ministers and indifference on the part of members in relation to ministerial support, taking from the needy claimants, for whom this fund is specially intended, that which with proper effort might be raised in the circuits and stations where such deficiencies exist.

As the Board increased the aggregate assessment of the charges last year about twenty per cent., they have not thought it advisable to make any further increase the present year, except in certain appointments which they thought able, on account of improved circumstances, to do more.

The aggregate of the assessment this year, as will be seen, is \$9240, though they think that *ten thousand dollars* is the least sum that the Conference, in view of the number and necessities of its claimants, ought to raise.

In conclusion, the Stewards would respectfully present, for adoption by the Conference, the following resolutions, viz:—

*Resolved*, 1, That we recommend the collection for our necessitous Conference Claimants, as one having the strongest claims upon the sympathy and benevolence of our people, and that we will use our utmost efforts to raise the amounts apportioned to our respective charges.

*Resolved*, 2, That we recognize the plan adopted by this Conference a few years since, of raising in the public congregation, by a single effort, the amount apportioned to our respective charges, as the only one that will produce the desired result, and would therefore earnestly recommend its continuance in the future.

*Resolved*, 3, That Preachers in charge of circuits and stations shall be required to report their collections for Conference claimants on the second day of the next session of our Conference, stating at the time both the amount apportioned and the amount collected: said collections to be in United States or other bankable funds, and in notes of as large a denomination as possible.

*Resolved*, 4, That inasmuch as it is important to the Board of Stewards that they be notified of all the claims likely to come before them at an early period in the session, it shall be made the duty of all recognized claimants on the funds of the Conference, as well as of those proposing to change their relation who will need a claim, to give notice of the fact in writing, on the second day of the next session, immediately after the call of the Stewards shall have been made.

*Resolved, 5,* That it is the sense of this Conference that, in the distribution of the work from time to time, no appointments should be made that do not promise at an early period to be self-sustaining, and that where it is found necessary to keep up those that are otherwise, the proper authorities should see to it, that the deficiencies in the preachers' salaries shall be made up out of the missionary funds rather than from those under the control of the Board of Stewards.

*Resolved, 6,* That the collection for Conference claimants, whenever practicable, shall be taken in the months of October and November.

## MEMOIRS.

## REV. WILLIAM BARNES,

By the will of God, closed his labors and his life after a sudden illness, in Philadelphia, on November 25th, 1865.

He was born in Tyrone County, near Cookstown, Ireland, about the year 1795. His parents were both religious. His father was a Presbyterian, and his mother a member of the Church of England, and also of the Methodist Society. Early in life he emigrated to this country. He was converted to God in his nineteenth year, in the city of Baltimore, and soon after commenced the work of the ministry. He entered the travelling connection in the Baltimore Conference in 1817, having been previously employed by the Presiding Elder. He travelled about eight years in the Baltimore Conference, when, by the division of the Conference, he became a member of the Pittsburg Conference, but was transferred in the spring of the same year to the Philadelphia Conference. His several fields of labor were as follows: In 1817, Calvert, Md.; 1818, Rockingham; 1819, Bedford, Pa.; 1820, Bottetourt, Va.; 1821, Uniontown and Brownsville, Pa.; 1822, Connelsville, Pa.; 1823 and 1824, Wheeling, Va.; 1825, St. George's, Philadelphia. In 1825, he was left without an appointment, at his own request, on account of affliction. In the spring of 1827, he was transferred to the Pittsburg Conference, but not being desirous of the change, he was subsequently re-transferred to the Philadelphia Conference. In 1828 and 1829, he was appointed to Lewistown, Del.; 1830, Snow Hill, Md.; 1831, Elkton, Md.; 1832, Queen Ann's, Md.; 1833 and 1834, Dover, Del.; 1835 and 1835, Salem, Phila.; 1837 and 1838, St. Paul's, Phila.; 1839 and 1840, Harrisburg, Pa.; 1841 and 1842, Pottsville, Pa.; 1843 and 1844, Eighth Street, Phila.; 1845, Wharton Street, Phila.; 1846, Western Church, Phila.; 1847 and 1848, Columbia, Pa.; 1849 and 1850, Easton, Pa.; 1851 and 1852, Manayunk, Pa.; 1853 and 1854, Sanctuary, Phila.; 1855, Asbury, West Phila.; 1856, Nazareth, Phila.; 1857 and 1858, Columbia, Pa.; 1859 and 1860, Union, Wilmington, Del.; 1861 and 1862, Salem, Phila.; 1863 and 1864, Emory, Phila.; and 1865, Bristol, Pa.

At the time of his death, he bore the honored distinction of being the oldest effective member of the Philadelphia Conference.

In the enjoyment of his usually vigorous health, in company with his son, he visited Philadelphia, to attend to some important business. On his way to the steamboat, returning to his home in Bristol, his son observing that he faltered in his step, remarked to him, "Father, you are sick." His answer was, "No, I am not sick." Proceeding a short distance, his son perceiving that he was ill, had him immediately conveyed in a carriage to the residence of his friend, Hon. J. W. Quiggle, where he received immediate medical aid, and every kindness that could be bestowed. While in the carriage he became insensible, but during the first five hours of his illness, there were occasional intervals of consciousness, during which he answered several questions, but at times seemed anxious to speak, but could not articulate. He seemed mentally engaged in his loved employ of preaching the Gospel, passing with his right hand through all the gestures customary with him, while engaged in his earnest pulpit ministrations, but though his lips moved rapidly, not a sound was uttered. After this, he traced in form, as on paper, and in his own peculiar style, the outline of a discourse, finishing with a peculiar gesture. To the question, "Are you afraid to die," he promptly and emphatically replied, "No." His last words were, "I want to go home," which were interpreted by his friends as referring to his home in Bristol. His illness was of eleven hours duration, the last six of which he lay totally unconscious, except for a few moments, seeming as in a deep slumber. The precise moment of his death was scarcely discernible, so gentle was his transition from earth to heaven. His disease was pronounced by his physician to be "pressure of blood upon the brain produced by the sudden breaking of a small blood vessel."

Thus suddenly has passed from our midst our venerated and beloved brother, Barnes, who, for brilliancy of intellect, power of pulpit ministration, purity of motive, guilelessness of conversation, warmth of social nature and devotion to his work, his country and his God, was justly distinguished as a Prince in God's Israel. In the removal of our brother, his family have lost a most devoted husband and

father, and the Church one of her most gifted and faithful ministers, who, for nearly fifty years, stood forth in the originality of his genius, as a noble champion of Methodism and Protestant Christianity.

His death seemed a fitting close of his life. Full of years and covered with honors, spared the anguish of continued sickness, and even the pains of dying, we look upon his death as involving almost a translation. Like one of old, "He walked with God, and was not, for God took him."

The funeral services were held in the Union Church, in Philadelphia, November 30th, 1865, when that spacious edifice was crowded to its utmost capacity, by the brethren and friends of the deceased, who gathered together from the various city and adjacent churches, to pay the last tribute of respect to one they loved and honored. The devotional services were conducted by a number of the more intimate friends of the deceased, while the vast audience were impressively addressed by Rev. Dr. Castle, Rev. Dr. Goddard, of the Protestant Episcopal Church, who was with him in his illness, Rev. Bishop Simpson, and Rev. Dr. Schon, who bore a feeling tribute "to the man of God in the coffin, who had been the instrument under God, in the days of his youth, in bringing him to Jesus."

A pleasing incident in connection with the funeral services, was the conversion of one of the daughters of the deceased, thus giving joy in the midst of sorrow; joy, not only in the church below, but joy in the church above; joy in which the glorified father no doubt participated.

His remains were deposited with suitable religious services in the vault of the Asbury M. E. Church, West Philadelphia.

Servant of God, well done!  
Thy glorious warfare's past,  
The battle's fought, the race is won,  
And thou art crowned at last.

#### REV. DANIEL LAMBDIN.

Rev. Daniel Lambdin, the only son of Daniel and Margaret Lambdin, was born in Kent County, Delaware, August 5th, 1794, and died April 4th, 1865, aged 70 years 7 months and 29 days. His parents were Methodists, and were contemporary with the founders of Methodism in Delaware, under the influence of whose teaching and example he grew up a moral and industrious young man, and received such an English education as the schools in the County were able, at that time, to furnish. His disposition was kind and genial, his temper amiable; but in the Autumn of 1819, he realized that he must be born again; and at a religious meeting held at a private house in the neighborhood, after earnestly seeking all night, he was converted about the dawn of the morning. He joined the Methodist Episcopal Church, at his father's house, and such was his pious life and promise of usefulness that he soon occupied the relation of class leader, exhorter and Local preacher. He was received on trial in the Philadelphia Conference, in the Spring of 1823, and acceptably filled the following appointments consecutively: Queen Ann's, Caroline, Cambridge, Dorchester, Dover, Milford, Snow Hill, Lewistown, Salisbury, Dorchester and Cambridge, a second time Princess Ann, Presiding Elder of Easton District, Presiding Elder of Wilmington District, each four years, Talbot, Greensborough, Church Hill, Fred-erica and Smyrna Circuits. In 1855 he became supernumerary on Camden Circuit, and continued thus, with but little abatement of labor, till 1865, when he was again made effective, and appointed to Willow Grove Circuit, where he spent one Sabbath, his last Sabbath on earth, April 21, 1865, having been 32 years in the effective and 10 years in a supernumerary relation, making a ministry of 42 years in the Philadelphia Conference.

Brother Lambdin's preaching was plain, sound and fervent; the Bible and the standard authors of Methodism were the sources whence he gathered material for his sermon, and while preaching the word, he sometimes received abundant baptisms of the Holy Spirit, and the audience would strongly realize the presence of the glory of God. The death of our dear brother was mysterious and very sudden. He appeared to be in his usual health and cheerfulness, and about 3 P.M. on the 4th of April, 1865, while in the act of obtaining a glass of water, he fell senseless and speechless; a motion of the hand to the region of the heart, seemed to indicate the locality

of his distress ; the best medical attendance was immediately secured, but all efforts to revive him failed, and he died in two hours from the time of the attack. Appropriate funeral services were held in the Methodist Episcopal Church in Camden, conducted by Rev. I. T. Cooper, D. D., J. W. Hammersley, and the Presiding Elder of Easton District, T. J. Thompson, after which he was borne to the Methodist Episcopal Cemetery in Camden, and laid beside the companion of his youth, loved and revered by his family, and honored by the community among whom he had lived. "Blessed are the dead who die in the Lord."

#### REV. SAMUEL J. A. CONNER.

The subject of this brief tribute, was born in Annessex, Somerset Co., Md., on the 20th of February, 1841, and died in Seaford, Del., April 14th, 1865, aged a little over 24 years. He was converted to God while attending school at Dickinson Seminary, Williamsport, Pa., in 1857, and connected himself immediately with the Methodist Episcopal Church. He received license to exhort in the year 1859, and became a local preacher in 1863. He was employed this year as junior preacher on Lewes Circuit, where his ministry and general character was held in high estimation. He was received on trial in the Philadelphia Conference, in the Spring of 1864, and served the Church that year, with fidelity and success, on Seaford Circuit.

He attended the Conference in March, 1865, and was continued on trial. After receiving his appointment to Smyrna Circuit, he returned to Seaford and was taken ill. His disease proved to be small pox, and terminated fatally. All the care and attention possible was bestowed on him, but it pleased God to call him thus early and unexpectedly away from the labors he loved on earth, to the rest and companionship of the saints in light. He was a young man of the brightest promise, a devout Christian, an able preacher, and intelligent gentleman.

The Church cannot but lament his loss. His fellow laborers sincerely mourn what seems to them to be his untimely death, and the Christian parents, who from his infancy gave him to God, have suffered deep bereavement : But we remember "He doeth all things well," and will say in our sorrow, "blessed be the name of the Lord."

#### REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON THE BIBLE CAUSE.

*Whereas*, This is the fiftieth year of the existence of the American Bible Society, and that it will celebrate the same as its jubilee year ; and, *Whereas*, the said Society will characterize its jubilee by the the three following special particulars, viz :

- I. The re-supplying of the whole *South* with the Holy Scriptures ;
- II. The electrotyping of the Scriptures in the Arabic language ;
- III. The publication of the *revision* of the Spanish Bible ; and

*Whereas*, the present year ushers in the centenary of Methodism in this country,

*Resolved*, 1st. That it is with praise and thanksgiving to Almighty God, that we recognize the success that has crowned past efforts in the dissemination of the Holy Scriptures.

*Resolved*, 2d. That we hail with pleasure, the great and increasing opportunities for the wide spread distribution of the word of God.

*Resolved*, 3d. That we rejoice with the American Bible Society in this its jubilee year, and are highly gratified at its noble and benevolent purposes as aforesaid.

*Resolved*, 4th. That our confidence in the American Bible Society, and its auxiliaries is unabated ; and that we will, as heretofore, cordially and practically cooperate with their agents.

*Resolved* 5th. That as this is the centenary of Methodism, and which will be distinguished by an increase in the benevolent contributions of the church, we will endeavor to enlarge the collections for the Bible Cause.

#### ON THE STATE OF THE COUNTRY.

*Whereas*, A great war, however just the cause and imperative the necessity, is an unspeakable calamity ; and

*Whereas*, a "civil war" is of all others most to be deprecated ; and

*Whereas*, We, as ministers of the Gospel in the Methodist Episcopal Church, are as deeply concerned in all that relates to our country's welfare, as can be any other class of our fellow-citizens ; therefore

*Resolved, 1st.* That we greatly rejoice at the return of peace to our country, as the result of the overthrow of the rebellion, and the signal maintenance of the authority of the general Government.

*Resolved, 2d.* That we are devoutly thankful to Almighty God for the compensation we have received for the things we have suffered by the abolition of slavery, as the result of the combined causes of a patriotic war and a Constitutional Amendment.

*Resolved 3d.* That no words of ours can adequately express the sorrow we feel at the untimely death of the late President Lincoln, or our sense of horror at the crime of his assassination.

*Resolved, 4th.* That not as political partisans, but as American citizens, we will ever use our influence in every prudent way to strengthen the basis of our free institutions, that, in the language of the lamented dead, "Government of the people, for the people, by the people, may not perish from the earth."

#### COMMITTEES OF EXAMINATION.

*Resolved,* That the several classes in the course of study, be required hereafter to meet on the Monday evening previous to the session of Conference, and that the Chairman of each Committee on examination shall give due notice of the hour and place of meeting.

#### REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON EDUCATION.

The Committee on Education, having carefully examined all the documents laid before them, viz: the Reports of the respective Presidents of Dickinson and Wesleyan Female College; the Exhibit of the Financial Affairs of Dickinson College; a Tract on the proposed modification of the course of studies in that institution; the Report of the Treasurer of the Educational Fund; a communication from West River Classical Institute, and the Reports of the several Visiting Committees to Dickinson College, Wesleyan Female College, and Dickinson Seminary, and also having conferred with the Centenary Committee, in order to secure harmony of action in certain specific recommendations, would respectfully offer the following resolutions for your adoption:

*Resolved, 1st.* That the interests of the Church and the safety of the country alike demand the Christian education of our youth of both sexes.

*Resolved, 2d.* That the oft-repeated pledges of support made by this Conference to the Institutions at Carlisle and Wilmington, as well as the record of their noble deeds, and promise of greater usefulness, bind us to a renewal of vigorous efforts for their relief and establishment upon a permanent basis.

*Resolved, 3d.* That we hail this "Centenary of American Methodism" as the auspicious time for effecting an ample endowment of the one Institution, and discharging the entire indebtedness of the other, and that we urge our friends to keep these objects steadily in view in their Centenary contributions, so that at least \$100,000 shall be raised for Dickinson College, and \$30,000 for Wesleyan Female College.

*Resolved, 4th.* That in view of the anticipated liberality of our people both to the general Educational Fund and their specific objects, we will suspend for this year the usual Conference Education Collection.

*Resolved, 5th.* That it is expedient that each Pastor preach on the subject of Education, urging our people not only to give their hearty support to the cause, but in doing this to patronize their own literary institution.

*Resolved, 6th.* That the proposed "modification of the course of studies" in Dickinson College is demanded by the constantly developing resources of the country, and the relation of our church to the industrial pursuits of the age; and we especially approve this "modification" as meeting the want of a more thorough Biblical training for young men called of God to the holy ministry.

*Resolved, 7th.* That we are profoundly thankful to the Great Head of the Church for setting this seal of approval upon both the Collegiate Institutions under our control during the past year, as shown in the conversion of a large number of young men in Dickinson, and a still larger number of young ladies in the Wesleyan.

*Resolved, 8th.* That we will not only observe the "Annual Concert of Prayer for Colleges" on the last Thursday in February, but we will "not sin against the Lord in ceasing to pray," that the cause of education may yet more signally receive



the endorsement of Heaven, in making all seminaries of learning nurseries of the Church.

*Resolved, 9th.* That in accordance with the action of last year, the Committee on Education for the next Conference shall consist of two ministers and two laymen from each District, the Presiding Bishop being requested to appoint the Lay Members at the present session, and this Committee shall be empowered to fill the places of absentees at the time of organization.

*Resolved, 10th.* That Robert H. Pattison and John F. Chaplain be elected members of the Board of Trustees of Wesleyan Female College, to fill the vacancy occurring by the expiration of their present term of service.

*Resolved, 11th.* That we extend a cordial invitation to the Presidents of Dickinson and Wesleyan Female College, to visit us in our several charges during the ensuing year, whenever convenient to them, that they may lay before our people such educational facts as may serve the general cause, and promote the interests of their respective institutions.

*Resolved, 12th.* That the present Educational Committee be continued during the year, with authority to meet at the call of the Chairman, or any three members of the Committee, and take such measures as shall seem to them advisable, to carry out the wishes of the Conference in the matters committed to them; and that any expenses incurred be paid out of the collections received.

*Resolved, 13th.* That as it is desirable to have harmony of action in the several patronizing Conferences in the endowment of Dickinson College, we therefore invite the Agent of the College for the two Baltimore Conferences, to visit our bounds whenever it is deemed necessary, for consultation, co-operation, and unity of effort.

#### REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON SUNDAY SCHOOLS.

The Committee on Sunday Schools beg leave to say: The Sunday School being one of the most important interests of the Church, and is so regarded by both ministers and people; and as experience has taught us that what is well attended to prospers, and that which is neglected fails to be successful; it behooves us all to use all the means within our reach to give greater efficiency to these nurseries of piety in the Church. If we, as pastors, desire the success of the Sabbath Schools in our circuits and stations, and we cannot for a moment doubt the fact, we must be in them every Sabbath, if practicable, and make ourselves familiar with all the officers and teachers, and so speak to all the children as to make them feel that we love and care for them, as an interesting part of our pastoral charge. In our opinion, a mere word and bow will not give interest and life to this most vital portion of the Church. The success of our sermons depends greatly upon the interest we feel in the people to whom we deliver them, and it is precisely so in all we say and do for the good of the children of our Sabbath School. Personal and warm attention on the part of the pastor, will build up and cause to flourish any school, no matter how discouraging its condition at the beginning; therefore,

*Resolved, 1st.* That we will be in the school, as far as practical, every Sabbath day, to aid by cheering words and a cheerful countenance both teachers and children.

*Resolved, 2d.* That we will endeavor to induce all the children on Sabbath morning to attend church, by giving them a part of the service, as far as practicable, and thus causing them to feel that they are an important portion of the congregation. This we can do by allowing them to sing one of their Sunday School hymns immediately after the close of the sermon.

*Resolved, 3d.* That besides having the general supervision of the Sabbath School interests throughout the Conference during the year, the Conference Vice-President of the Sunday School Union, and the District Committee that may be appointed, are hereby instructed to make arrangements for the holding a Sunday School Anniversary on the second evening of the session of 1867.

*Resolved, 4th.* That we recommend the Sunday School Journal for teachers and young people, and the Sunday School Advocate to all our schools, as worthy their patronage.

*Resolved, 5th.* That we earnestly request the attention of our brethren to the provision made by our discipline, page 226, section 21, and also to chapter 2d, section 17th, page 97.

*Resolved, 6th.* That we cordially approve the holding of Sunday School Teacher's



## REPORT OF THE CENTENARY COMMITTEE.

The Committee appointed to prepare a plan for the appropriate celebration of the Centenary Year of American Methodism, beg leave to report:—

1. They recommend that a sermon adapted to the occasion be preached during the month of October, 1866, in every one of our charges.

2. That assemblies for prayer, praise and the hearing of pertinent addresses, be held during the afternoon and evening of the same day on which the sermon is preached, and that arrangements for such assemblies be made by the duly appointed local authorities of the church.

3. That collections and subscriptions be taken in all our congregations, and that donations so secured be devoted to such objects of Christian liberality as shall be designated by the Philadelphia Annual Conference, with subordination to the directions of the plan of the General Centenary Committee of the Methodist Episcopal Church of America.

4. It is earnestly recommended that diligent effort be made to procure a thank-offering, according to the ability which God giveth, from every member of our beloved branch of the militant Church of God; and that we affectionately solicit donations from all the members of our congregations, who are so deeply interested, for time and eternity, in the public ministrations of the M. E. Church.

5. Whilst we shall rely chiefly on the contributions of the members of our churches and congregations to make this year gloriously memorable in the annals of Methodism and of common Christianity, we will heartily welcome all contributions of our fellow Christians, who may feel it a pleasure to thus testify their unfeigned faith in the catholicity of the Church of Christ.

6. It is recommended that the local Centenary Committee, in every charge hereinafter provided for, co-operate with the officers and teachers of the Sunday Schools in the effort to secure contributions from all our children; such contributions to be applied as indicated by the General Centenary Committee of the Church.

7. That it shall be the duty of each Presiding Elder to have a committee appointed at the first Quarterly Meeting Conference for the year, of which committee the Preacher in charge shall be chairman, to carry out the provisions of this report. It is further recommended that said committee appoint a secretary, who shall record in a book, to be provided for that purpose, the names of donors and the amounts respectively contributed; also, that they elect a treasurer who shall have charge of all centennial money raised in the circuit or station.

8. That this Conference appoint a Central Committee in Philadelphia, to be composed of an equal number of ministers and laymen, to which Committee the local Centenary Committees shall report the names of donors in their respective circuits or stations, and also transmit all moneys collected by them on or before the 1st day of January, 1867. It is further recommended that the aforesaid Conference Central Committee provide suitable books for the use of the local committees; also that the said Central Committee make a record of all names of donors within the limits of the Conference, and of the amounts contributed by such donors; and such record, with all moneys forwarded to said Committee, shall be reported to the next Annual Conference.

9. That we approve of the formation of the "Ladies' Centenary Society of Philadelphia" in behalf of Female Education, and we recommend the ladies within the bounds of the Conference to form associations to aid any or all of the objects endorsed by the Conference.

10. Your Committee further report that, while they recognize the General Centenary Connectional Fund as the general object of interest throughout the Church, and commend it as such to both Preachers and people, and ask for it a generous support, yet we particularly commend to our Preachers and people the cause of Education under the care of our own Conference as the chief object of our local Centenary donations; therefore, to enable us the more readily and the more certainly to make our contributions for this cause—

1. Resolved, That said contributions be marked SPECIFIC FOR CONFERENCE EDUCATION.

2. Resolved, That the aggregate amount of these specific donations for Conference Education shall be distributed as follows, viz.: Ten-nineteenths towards the endowment of Dickinson College, to the extent of \$100,000; two-thirds of the remainder

towards founding a *Female Seminary in Philadelphia*, to the extent of \$50,000; and the remaining portion for relief of *Wesleyan Female College* in Wilmington, Del., to the extent of \$30,000, and no more.

3. *Resolved*, That all *unspecified* funds be equally divided between the Centenary Educational Fund and the local funds of the Conference.

4. *Resolved*, That one-half of these *unspecified* funds which shall come to this Conference shall be distributed as follows, viz.: To Dickinson College, to the Seminary to be founded in Philadelphia, and to the College in Wilmington, so that the whole amount given to said College in Wilmington shall not exceed \$3,000, distribution to be made on the basis heretofore adopted in Resolution No. 2.

5. *Resolved*, If any portion of the *unspecified* funds coming to this Conference shall still remain unappropriated, they shall be retained in the hands of the Central Committee in Philadelphia until the session of this Conference in 1867, and shall be reported to the Conference by the Treasurer of the said Central Committee, to be disposed of as the Conference may direct.

6. *Resolved*, That all funds realized for the endowment of Dickinson College be vested in the Education Board of the Philadelphia Annual Conference, and the interest thereof be paid over from time to time to the Trustees of said College to meet its current expenditures, so long as the said College remains under the control of the Methodist Episcopal Church, and no longer.

7. *Resolved*, That the action of the Conference in the arrangements for the Centenary Celebration is not intended to take away individual liberty to dispose of individual donations within the general limits prescribed by the general Centenary Committee.

8. *Resolved*, That we recommend our people to make specific donations to the Mission House in New York to the extent of three thousand dollars.

#### REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON TEMPERANCE.

*Whereas*, the giant evil intemperance still exerts a fearful power in our land, leading our youth of both sexes from the paths of virtue and piety, and frequently proving the overthrow of those who, by reason of talents, piety and position, give promise of great usefulness to the church and the world: and,

*Whereas*, there is no vice which so boldly sets all laws, human and divine, at defiance, or so successfully antagonizes the efforts of the Christian Church, or swallow up in one dark and dreadful vortex, so much of hope and happiness as intemperance; and,

*Whereas*, it becomes us as Christian Ministers, the van-guard of the Church, not only to give our consent to, but to lead in, all the great moral movements of the day, both by precept and example; therefore,

*Resolved*, 1st. That we re-affirm our unflinching interest in the cause of temperance, as an essential part of Christian morals.

*Resolved*, 2d. That our Discipline, in forbidding drunkenness, buying or selling spirituous liquors, or drinking them, unless in cases of extreme necessity, and in allowing the use of wine only medicinally, or sacramentally, prohibits the manufacture, sale, or use, as a beverage, of all intoxicating drinks, whether spirituous, vinous, malt, or otherwise; and constitutes the M. E. Church one of the strictest Temperance organizations in the land, and that we will calmly, but firmly, enforce our rules on this subject.

*Resolved*, 3d. That the fashionable moderate drinking practiced at bridal parties, social gatherings and elsewhere, is the first and fatal step towards drunkenness; and it is our duty as Ministers of Christ to discountenance and condemn such practices, being of decided opinion that safety is to be found only in "Total Abstinence" from all that intoxicates.

*Resolved*, 4th. We deeply deplore the existence upon our statute books of laws legalizing the liquor traffic, and considering them a blot in our legislation, and a disgrace to a Christian community, we will continue our efforts for their repeal, and the prohibition of the accursed traffic.

*Resolved*, 5th. That while we acknowledge it to be the duty and privilege of the Church to lead in this great work of Temperance Reformation, we hail as efficient auxiliaries and co-laborers the various Temperance organizations of the land, believing

them to be natural outgrowths of the Christian church, and remembering the thousands led to the house of God and the cross of Christ through their instrumentality, we bid them "God speed."

*Resolved*, 6th. That availing ourselves of the arrangements of our Book Concern to facilitate this work, we will organize Juvenile Temperance Societies through our Sabbath-schools or otherwise, and thus train up the children to habits of sobriety.

*Resolved*, 7th. That we hereby pledge ourselves to an honest, hearty, and continued support and advocacy of the great Temperance cause, by preaching and lecturing upon the subject as time and opportunity offer, co-operating in all proper ways with distinctively Temperance organizations, believing that, next to the religion of our Lord Jesus Christ, it is pre-eminently the need and the work of the age, having an undying faith in its ultimate success as an essential part of our holy Christianity.

*Resolved*, 8th. That we hereby recommend the National Temperance Advocate, and the Youth's Temperance Banner, to the patronage of our people.

#### RESOLUTIONS OF THE COMMITTEE ON FINANCE.

1st. To require the preachers to return their collections to the Committee who may be appointed at our next session, by the third day of Conference, in as large notes as possible, and in no case to bring pennies.

2d. That in every case, the money shall be neatly put up in packages, and plainly labeled, with the amount, circuit or station, district, and pastor's name. By so doing, the Committee will be saved much trouble.

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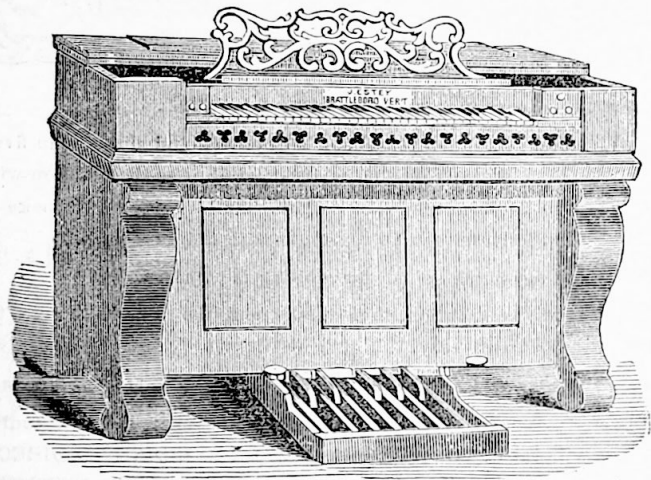
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
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
