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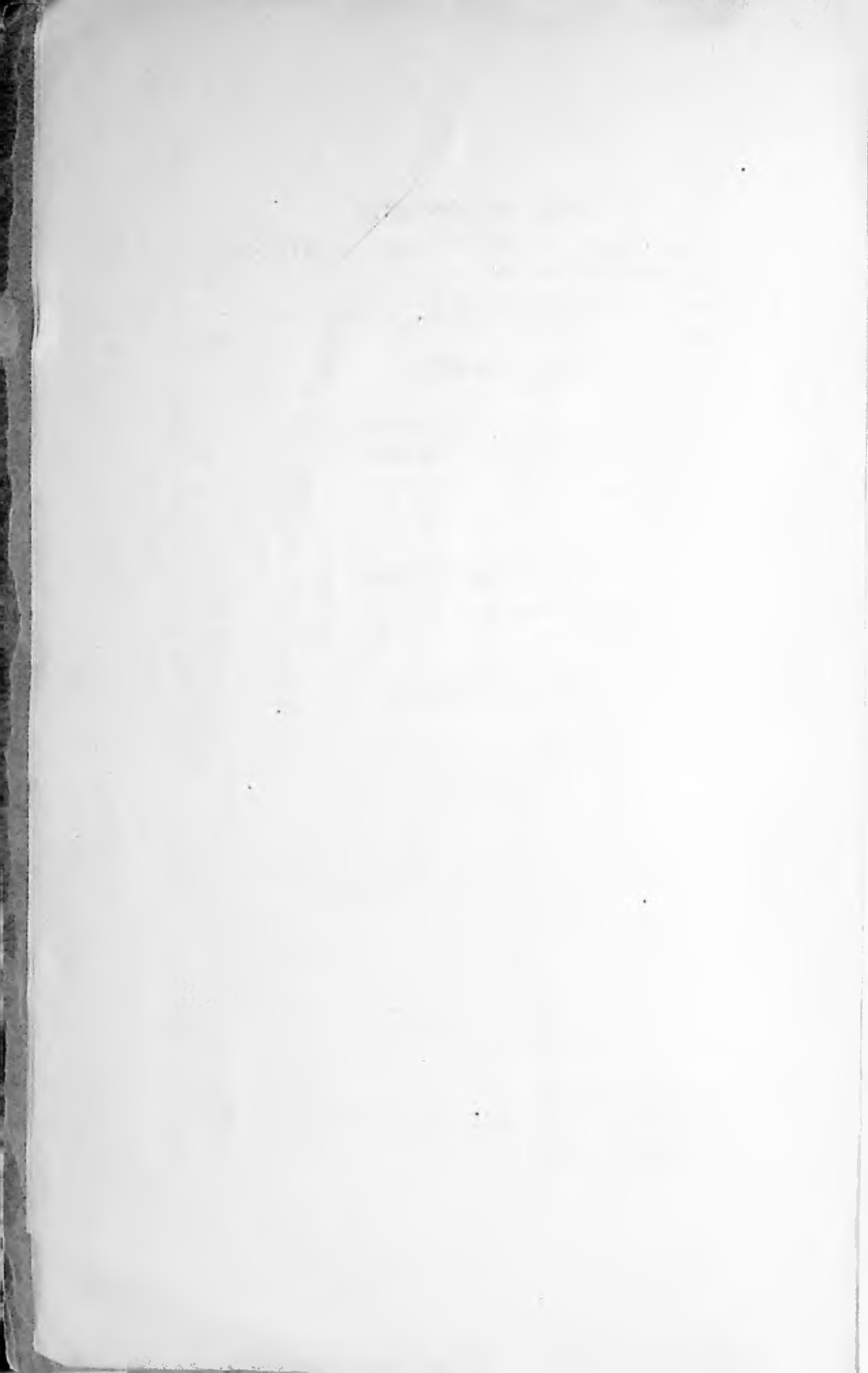

Sessions of the Virginia Annual Conference

(NOTE.—Six Conferences were held in Virginia before the Methodist Episcopal Church in the United States was organized, and five of them were held within the territory of the Virginia Annual Conference. But they were not, strictly speaking, Virginia Annual Conferences. Hence these Conferences do not appear among the sessions enumerated below. The Annual Conferences began to number their sessions, respectively, from their first meeting after the organization of the Methodist Episcopal Church as an independent ecclesiastical body, December, 1784. In conformity with this rule, the sessions of the Virginia Annual Conference are numbered from the meeting held at Mason's, Brunswick County, Virginia, May, 1785. Since then sessions thereof have been held in regular succession year after year, within the geographical limits assigned it by the General Conference of 1796, except as to the years 1791 and 1841, when changes in the time of the year of the meeting of the Conference made it necessary to hold two sessions in each of these calendar years, making one hundred and five sessions in one hundred and three years.)

JOURNAL OF PROCEEDINGS, 1918

First Day

Wednesday, December 4, 1918

Opening.—The Virginia Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, convened in its one hundred and thirty-sixth annual session at First Church, Charlottesville, Va., on Wednesday, December 4, 1918, at 9 A. M., Bishop E. R. Hendrix in the chair; Bishop James Cannon, Jr., also being present.

Devotional exercises were conducted by Bishop Hendrix, including the administration of the Sacrament of the Lord's Supper, in which latter service he was assisted by Bishop Cannon and presiding elders.

Organization.—The Secretary of the last Conference, Bernard F. Lipscomb, called the roll of members of the Conference, and 177 clerical and twenty-two lay members answered to their names.

B. F. Lipscomb was elected Secretary, and F. L. Wells, B. M. Beckham and R. M. White, Assistant Secretaries.

Commends President Wilson.—The following resolutions in commendation of President Woodrow Wilson were read by G. C. Kelly, and adopted. (See Appendix III.)

Hour for Meeting.—On motion, the Conference decided to assemble daily at 9:30 A. M. and adjourn at 1 P. M.

Bar of Conference.—The entire lower floor of the church was reserved for the members of the Conference.

To Nominate Committees.—J. C. Reed, S. C. Hatcher and J. W. Gee were appointed a committee to nominate the Committee on Conference Relations and also the Committees on Examination for the ensuing quadrennium.

The Norfolk District 100 Per Cent. Efficient.—The following telegram from T. S. Southgate, of Norfolk, was read to the Conference:
Bishop E. R. Hendrix, Charlottesville, Va.:

Just a line to say the work of the Norfolk District was completed late tonight with a wonderful record, for 100 per cent. efficiency follows. Five thousand added to pastors' support, every assessment of every nature paid in full, all charges no longer asking mission support, and sixteen thousand five hundred raised for missionary specials above the assessment. Thus Norfolk District redeems her pledge made one year ago at Lynchburg to be the first city district in all Southern Methodism to thus discharge its obligations. When our faithful, modest elder makes his report on Wednesday, please beg the other eight districts to strive to emulate this record of Norfolk and Eastern Shore.

The Conference Organ.—R. P. Lumpkin presented a paper with reference to the Conference organ, and, on motion, a special committee of one preacher and one layman from each district was ordered, to whom this and other like papers should be referred.

School and College Curricula.—The following paper with reference to courses of instruction in our schools was offered by R. M. Maxey and others and was adopted by the Conference. (See appendix III.)

Papers Referred.—Resolutions from the Charlottesville and Farmville District Conferences, regarding the Conference organ, were presented and referred to special committee on that subject.

Limiting Discussion.—W. J. Twilley presented a paper calling for the limit of debate during the session of the Conference, which paper was amended and adopted.

Twilley Resolutions.

Whereas, this session of the Virginia Conference is being held three weeks later than usual, thereby probably thrusting the preachers and their families that move, into the rigors of winter; and

Whereas, holding the Conference under existing conditions is both burdensome and expensive; therefore, be it

RESOLVED: First—That members of this body addressing the Conference be limited to five minutes, and that no speaker be allowed to make more than two addresses on the same subject.

Second—That the Presiding Elders, in reporting their districts, be confined to five minutes.

Whereas, the growth of the Conference, the scarcity of domestic help and the greatly advanced cost of living are rendering it more and more difficult to secure entertainment for the Conference in private homes; therefore,

RESOLVED, That the Committee on Conference Entertainment be, and they are hereby, instructed to select hereafter for our Conference sessions only those places that will furnish adequate hotel and boarding-house accommodation for the Conference and to provide for the expense of such entertainment by laying upon the Conference an assessment equivalent to 3 per cent. of the salaries paid pastors the previous year.

Dr. Reed made a touching response to the gift and address of Judge Christian.

In Behalf of Armenians.—Dr. Riggs, of Stamboul, Asia Minor, was introduced and addressed the Conference in behalf of the suffering Armenians.

Bishop Cannon Presides.—Bishop Cannon in the chair.

Bishop Hendrix resumed the chair.

Sunday-School Anniversary.—On motion, it was ordered that the Sunday-school anniversary be held on Friday evening at 8 o'clock.

Committee on Conference Relations.—The Committee on Nominations presented the following names of persons to compose the Committee on Conference Relations, which were approved by the Conference: H. J. Brown, W. B. Jett, C. H. Williams, H. J. Paylor, G. E. Booker, J. J. Bradford, L. T. Williams, R. M. Chandler, W. G. Burch and W. G. Boggs.

Constitutional Questions Voted On.—The following constitutional questions were voted on, with results as indicated:

"Shall lay members be eligible to all Conferences, boards and lay offices of the church without regard to sex?" Affirmative, 169; negative, 14.

"Shall the Apostles' Creed, as it occurs in the Discipline, Chapter XXIII., Section IV., Paragraph 750 and elsewhere, be so amended as to substitute for the words 'holy Catholic Church' the words 'Christ's holy Church?'" Affirmative, 67; negative, 125.

The question, will the Annual Conference approve of the change in Article 23 of the Articles of Religion proposed by the General Conferences of 1914 and 1918, which change is as follows: Strike out the article as it appears in the Discipline of 1914 and in previous Disciplines, and in lieu thereof insert the following:

"XXIII. Of the duty of Christians to the civil authority.—It is the duty of all Christians, and especially of all Christian ministers, to observe and obey the laws of the governing or supreme authority of the country of which they are citizens or subjects or in which they reside, and to use all laudable means to encourage and enjoin obedience to the powers that be." Total number of votes cast, 160—ayes, 160; noes, none.

Committee on Temperance, Etc.—On motion, a Committee on Temperance and other Social Reforms was ordered to be composed of those members of the Conference who are members of the Executive Committee of the Anti-Saloon League of Virginia, viz: W. A. Christian, R. H. Bennett, S. C. Hatcher, E. T. Dadmun, T. McN. Simpson, J. S. Peters, W. H. Vincent and George P. Adams.

More Papers Referred.—Communication from E. O. Watson, secretary of the War Work Commission of our Church, was received and referred to the Committee on War Work of this Conference.

Communication from the chancellor of Emory University was read to the Conference.

Notices were then given and Conference adjourned, with benediction by Bishop Hendrix.

Second Day

Thursday, December 5, 1918

Conference met at 9:30 o'clock A. M., Bishop Hendrix in the chair.

Devotional exercises were conducted by H. A. Boaz, secretary of the Board of Church Extension of our Church.

Minutes of yesterday's session were read and approved.

Delegates Reported Present.—A number of lay and clerical members who have arrived since the roll was called reported their names to the Secretary. Further calling of the roll was dispensed with.

Memorial Service Ordered.—On motion of James T. Moore and others, a memorial service for the boys from Virginia, and especially the sons of ministers of this Conference, who have laid down their lives in defense of the world's liberty was ordered for Friday at 12 o'clock; an address to be made by Bishop Hendrix or by some one designated by him.

Commission on College Curricula.—A paper offered by E. H. Rowe, looking to the appointment of a commission on the subject of college curricula, was laid on the table.

Hour for League Report.—On motion of J. H. Moss, the report of the Epworth League Board was made the order of the day for Saturday from 11:30 o'clock to 12 o'clock.

Hall Fund.—The report of the trustees of the Hall Fund was presented by B. F. Lipscomb and adopted. The report is as follows:

The trustees of the Hall Fund beg leave to report that they have in hand the sum of \$166.40, and they ask authority to pay over the same to the treasurer of the Conference Fund.

Centenary of Missions (Addresses).—Bishop Hendrix addressed the Conference at some length with reference to the Centenary of Missions, to the consideration of which today's session is devoted. He was followed by W. B. Beauchamp, secretary of the Layman's Missionary Movement of our Church; Bishop Cannon, J. T. Myers, missionary to Japan; H. A. Boaz, secretary of the Board of Church Extension, and by E. H. Rawlings, foreign mission secretary.

Committee on Centenary Movement.—Bishop Hendrix announced the Conference committee on the Centenary Movement as follows:

Time for Report on Temperance, Etc.—On motion of S. C. Hatcher and others, it was ordered that Saturday night at 8 o'clock be set apart as the time for hearing the report of the Committee on Temperance and Other Social Reforms, and Bishop Cannon and Mr. E. H. Cherrington were requested to address the Conference at that time.

Notices were given and then the Conference adjourned to meet at 3 P. M.

AFTERNOON SESSION.

Conference met at 3 o'clock P. M.

Devotional exercises were conducted by W. W. Royal.

Centenary of Missions (Addresses).—E. H. Rawlings addressed the Conference upon the "Ministry of Intercession" in connection with the Centenary Movement, which is still under consideration; W. B. Beauchamp appealed for united prayer in behalf of the Missionary Centenary, and pledge-cards were distributed for signatures; R. H. Bennett spoke on

"Stewardship." He was followed by T. S. Southgate, Conference lay leader, who addressed his remarks particularly to business men; Bishop Hendrix spoke of the need of preachers at home and abroad; W. B. Beauchamp enforced tithing as a Christian duty.

Notices were given and then the Conference adjourned.

EVENING SESSION.

Conference convened at 8 P. M., Bishop Hendrix in the chair.

Centenary of Missions.—The exercises were conducted by W. B. Beauchamp, the evening being given to the further consideration of the Centenary Movement.

Illustrated Lecture.—Dr. Earl Taylor, of the Methodist Episcopal Church, gave a very interesting illustrated lecture on the work that is done by his church and ours in foreign lands.

Virginia Conference Allotment.—Bishop Hendrix put to the Conference this question: "Will the Conference accept its allotted share of the \$35,000,000 to be raised by our Church within five years for the Centenary Missionary Fund, said share being \$2,600,416.10?"

Acceptance of the Allotment.—J. C. Reed moved that we do accept it joyfully. The motion was seconded by E. A. Kellam in a brief but earnest and eloquent address, and it was adopted unanimously.

After singing very heartily the "L. M. Doxology," the Conference adjourned.

Third Day

Friday, December 6, 1918

Conference opened at 9:30 A. M., Bishop E. R. Hendrix in the chair. Devotional exercises were conducted by J. C. Reed.

Minutes of the previous session were read, amended and approved.

Continue Name of Bishop James Cannon, Jr., on Roll.—On motion of B. F. Lipscomb, authority was granted to continue the name of Bishop James Cannon, Jr., on the roll of the Conference.

APPENDIX II.—MEMOIRS

Rev. John William Sewell Robins

John William Sewell Robins, son of John Stokley and Drucilla Bevans Robins, was born June 23, 1853, in Accomac County, Va. His parents were devoted Christians. He was reared in a pious atmosphere. It is not strange, therefore, that two of their sons should enter the ministry. Rev. Wilbur F. Robins, the elder son, was for many years a member of the Virginia Conference. He died October 15, 1895. Sewell Robins, as all his friends loved to call him, was descended, on his mother's side, from a long line of ministers. There were fifteen preachers in the immediate family. Rev. Henry A. White, a pioneer preacher on the Eastern Shore, was Mrs. Robins' great uncle, and her grandfather was also a Methodist preacher.

He was converted at the age of fourteen, and at once joined the church. He soon felt his call to the ministry. In 1871 the writer was appointed to the Atlantic Circuit, Accomac County, Va. Sewell Robins was the first person to meet and greet him. He guided him to his father's home, where a wholehearted welcome awaited him and his family. There began a friendship that day that grew in strength and tenderness through all the intervening years. He was often my companion on my round of appointments and assisted me much in the work of the church. He was a sweet singer, and, though only seventeen years of age, he was a valuable help in revival work.

He realized his lack of proper preparation for the ministry, but not until he reached his majority was he able to begin that preparation. In 1874 he attended Randolph-Macon College. Home duties then claimed him. In the meanwhile he had been licensed to preach, and, on his return home, he exercised his gifts on the Atlantic Circuit. In 1876 he attended college another session, assisting during the summer of 1877 on the South Norfolk Circuit. November 16, 1877, he was received on trial in the Virginia Conference and appointed to Belle Haven, where he remained one year. He thereafter served the following charges in the order named: Dorchester Mission and South Dorchester, one year each; Wicomico and Rappahannock, two years each; Newsoms, one year; Camden and Southampton, two years; Hertford, three years; Whitestone and Bethany, four years; Martinsville, two years; Lawrenceville, Lamberts Point, Chase City and White-stone, three years each; Irvington and Kilmarnock, one year. At the last session of the Conference, held in Lynchburg, November, 1917, he was assigned to West Point. He entered upon his new work with joy. He preached only one time. On Sunday morning, December 16, 1917, at 6 o'clock, his gentle spirit went home to God. His last words were: "Oh, I did want to preach this morning so much!" Thus passed to his reward one of the most faithful and beloved members of the Virginia Conference.

He was an excellent preacher. His soul was aflame with the love of God and with a passion for souls. He was a true evangelist. Under his faithful and tender preaching many were brought to repentance and salvation. He had the love that thinketh no evil and speaketh no evil. Modest, gentle, sympathetic and deeply pious, his life was a continual benediction to others.

He was happily married November 28, 1879, to Miss Elizabeth Northeri, of Norfolk County, Va. For thirty-eight years she was his true helper in the work of the ministry. They were blessed with three children—Carroll Ray Robins, a son, died at the age of eighteen; two daughters (Lena), Mrs. C. T. Womack and (Evelyn) Mrs. David G. McGavock, both of Martinsville, Va., remain, with their mother, to mourn the loss of an affectionate, wise and tender husband and father.

The funeral services were held Monday afternoon, December 17, 1917, in the church at West Point and were conducted by Rev. William E. Grant. The remains were then taken to the home of his daughter, Mrs. C. T. Womack, Martinsville, Va. On Wednesday, December 19, another service was held in the church at Martinsville at the request of the membership, which he had so faithfully served, and was conducted by the pastor, Rev. William R. Proctor. The sacred remains then were laid to rest in Oakwood Cemetery, in Martinsville.

We miss his smiling face and hearty handclasp at this session of our Conference. We mourn our loss; we rejoice in his gain. We know where to find him. He will be awaiting us on the other shore.

Rev. William W. Lear

The subject of this appreciation, William Wilkinson Lear, first opened his eyes to the light of this world December 5, 1844, in New Kent County, Va., and closed them to the same February 1, 1918, at Culpeper, Va. He served his own generation well by the will of God, and fell on sleep and was laid unto his fathers.

The son of the late Rev. Joseph Lear, of the Virginia Conference, and Miss Susan Wilkinson, he had a splendid inheritance on both sides of the family. His education was had at public and private schools until 1861, when he entered Randolph-Macon College at Boydton. The next year he matriculated at Roanoke College, but left before the close of the session to enlist in the Confederate Army, where he served until the close of the war, escaping injury, except a slight wound in the head received in the battle at Spotsylvania Courthouse.

From the time of his conversion, which took place while he was a student at Roanoke College, he felt impressed with the thought of preaching the gospel. After the close of the Civil War he hesitated to make application to the Virginia Conference for membership, feeling that he was deficient in intellectual preparation. He taught school and did other work in order to be able financially to re-enter college to prepare himself more thoroughly for the work of the ministry. For this purpose he matriculated at Randolph-Macon College as a ministerial student in the fall of 1872. Here he made diligent effort, and, being naturally of superior mind, made splendid progress as a student.

He joined the Virginia Conference at its session held in Danville, November, 1875, and served a number of circuits and stations, going from Centenary, Richmond, to the presiding eldership of the Charlottesville District in 1905. His last charge was Culpeper, an appointment with which he was greatly pleased.

On October 17, 1876, he was married to Miss May Nolley, the daughter of the late Rev. George W. Nolley, of the Virginia Conference. He was very fortunate in this choice, for in her he found a helpmeet indeed. She was naturally bright and cheerful, and being a person of great tact she was a great help to him, most especially in his pastoral work. She, with their four children—Professor J. Merritt Lear, of the State Normal Female School at Farmville, Va.; Professor John E. Lear, of the University

of North Carolina; Mrs. William Russell Young, of Dinwiddie County, Va., and Mrs. John W. Broadus, of Bowling Green, Va.—survive him. He was proud of his children, and he had a reason to be. His children are proud of him, and they could not help being. Some years ago his alma mater conferred upon him the honorary degree of Doctor of Divinity, a compliment well bestowed. He was a member of the board of trustees of the Randolph-Macon system of schools, and also a member of the executive committee of the Woman's College. These institutions will miss his wise counsel.

As a preacher, he was far beyond the average. The preparation of his sermons was thorough. They were usually finished products. He studied God's word with great profit, and brought forth out of this treasure things new and old. He had in his sermons many apples of gold in pictures of silver, always a word fitly spoken.

I don't know that he ever wrote a line of poetry in verse, but his prose composition was full of poetry. As was said of another, he lived lyrics and epics. This we gather also from his sermons, many of which contain gems of rarest beauty. When he finished reading the memoir of his friend, Paul Bradley, Bishop Galloway, who was presiding at the Conference, remarked to some one near him, "That is a gem."

When God created W. W. Lear, he made a successor to John the Baptist as far as courage to tell the truth, the whole truth, to every man concerned. He was not afraid of the face of man. He never ceased to be a soldier. When he laid down his arms at Appomattox he continued the war against the world, the flesh and the devil. If conscious dependence upon the Almighty is the spirit of independence towards man, then he consciously depended upon God. Not that he did not consult his friends or appreciate their counsel, but he could not submit for a moment even to those in authority when his own judgment said *no*.

He preached the whole Gospel, and, though he sometimes had to use the law, the thunders of Sinai, in order to conquer the enemies of his Lord, he always ministered in the greatest tenderness to the wounded and prisoners, taking them to Mercy Hospital, treating them with the comforting balm of the Gospel, and placing them under the loving care of the Great Physician.

He knew God called him to preach, and he took his message from God's word, and always sought the direction of the Holy Spirit in its study.

When his first appointment was announced as Spotsylvania Circuit, then one of our weakest charges, he looked toward his work like Asbury looked toward America when coming as a missionary, and, no doubt, asked the same or similar questions: "Whither am I going, and for what purpose? To gain honor? No; not if I know my own heart. To get money? No; I am going to live to God and bring others so to do," and he did. He labored as earnestly and faithfully as if the charge had been paying him a liberal salary for his work.

His style was very engaging and pleasing. It was not developed for the sake of having a fine style, though he was not indifferent to such things, but it had been developed by developing a fine soul, the whole of which was poured out in his preaching. He used no artificial devices or tricks of declamation. He preached like he walked, naturally, with a firm tread and constant stride toward the goal which he wished to reach.

He loved to make sermons. He never lost his fondness for sermonizing. After he had been in the ministry for years he preached mostly new sermons. When he was finishing his third year as pastor of Bedford City Church he told me that he had not preached twelve old sermons in three years. Possibly no other minister among us who has almost reached his threescore and ten can say as much.

Dr. Royall, a schoolmate, wrote of him: "I never heard him preach more than once or twice, but I have no difficulty in making a mental picture, so to speak, of his sermons. His mind was so full of pure and

worthy thoughts and so well stocked with classic English, so devoid of everything tawdry, that it is easy to think his printed word and spoken practically the same."

As to his character, he was a man of invincible integrity. His character was without a flaw and his reputation for purity of life and uprightness among his brethren was never questioned. He never played fast and loose. Everybody knew where he stood, which side he was on. He did his own thinking of the subjects of the day, reaching conclusions; he had convictions and the courage of them.

His schoolmate and friend, Rev. J. M. Burton, wrote of him on the occasion of his death: "The plain, simple, straightforward, manly young man, hating pretense of every kind, that we knew at college, came among us, old in body, but still young in spirit, serving with all his strength the cause he loved so well. He told me how glad he was to be our pastor, and he meant every word of it." Had he not meant it, he never would have said it.

A casual acquaintance did not reveal to you the real man. One had to know him to appreciate, and hence to love him. It was true he did not make an exhibition of his heart by wearing it upon his sleeve, but underneath the coat was as big and noble a heart as ever man possessed. Studied from any angle, he presents a man of superior mind, heart and character, leaving evidences everywhere that the great gifts with which he was endowed had been thoroughly cultivated and used for the cause of God and humanity. He did not live long enough to be retired, and in a season of waiting for the summons to "come up higher," like mother, "the stream of his existence lost itself in the sands of time." He still stood in the front rank, with mental and spiritual powers unabated, and ceased to live and labor at the same time. He died with the harness on. He buckled it on forty-four years before and had not laid it off for an hour. Brother Burton closed what he wrote of him in these words: "A brave, true, strong Christian has left us. We grieve, but the home folks up yonder are glad, because he has won the victory and is safe."

I miss him today, and shall do so until I answer the last roll call here and pass on to where he is, and as he said of our mutual friend, Paul Bradley: "I know where he is, and in the coming years, when my own work is done, I shall look him up, and once more we shall talk heart to heart and our friendship will be unbroken."

"We live in deeds, not years; in thoughts, not breaths;
In feelings, not in figures on a dial—
We should count time by heart-throbs. He most lives
Who thinks most, feels the noblest, acts the best.
Life is but an end, that end
Beginning midst and end to all things—God."

Rev. Henry Chapman Bowles

Henry Chapman Bowles was the son of Benjamin and Jane Bowles, and was born in Bedford County, Va., on November 21, 1831. Nearly eighty-seven years afterwards—on the 6th of August, 1918—while sitting in the shade of the trees in the yard of his daughter, whose home is Stella, Va., at 5:30 in the afternoon, he suddenly left his earthly tabernacle to be forever with the Lord.

The days of his years on earth were rich in self-sacrifice for, and in loving unselfish devotion towards, his wife and children, and in works of mercy and truth for others as he lived and proclaimed the ever-blessed and eternal Gospel of the Son of God.

Born of Christian parents and reared in a Christian home, his childhood impressions at the family altar led him in early life to accept Jesus Christ as his own personal Saviour, and later to dedicate his life to the Christian ministry. Securing what education he could at the common schools of his day, and completing his course with a session at Emory and Henry, he was admitted on trial into the Virginia Conference in the year 1860.

The charges which he served were confined chiefly to the Counties of Patrick, Franklin, Henry and Halifax, in his own native State, and the many years in which he was compelled to remain in the supernumerary and superannuate relations—due to a broken-down constitution which developed while a Confederate soldier—was one of the greatest crosses of his life, for preaching the Gospel was the work which his heart yearned to do.

His most congenial work was in the pulpit, and he considered it a great privilege to labor for the Master in this sacred calling. For him, the call to preach was clear and unmistakable. Often, in the great fight that for so many years he put up against the infirmities of disease, he would appear to be perfectly unconscious of his weakness, and would preach with all the earnestness and energy of a young man. His sermons were prepared with great care, for, while making no pretensions to oratory, he felt that the truth which he proclaimed deserved to be clothed in the best language of which he was capable, having implicit faith, that the simple story of the Gospel, faithfully presented, possessed the power to accomplish its mission.

He never indulged in any language even remotely akin to slang. Nor did he often find it necessary to impress upon the hearts of his hearers the truth by the use of strong adjectives. He was a close Bible student, and his sermons were enriched by the use of Scriptural passages with which his mind was abundantly stored. His apt use of the Scriptures to impress the message he proclaimed indicated a mind and heart that dwelt in close union with the Holy Spirit. And, as a result, everywhere that he went God honored his ministry with the conversion of the unsaved and the spiritual development of the redeemed.

He was deeply interested in all the welfare of his church. The *Richmond Advocate* was always read with keen pleasure. Another chief delight was to attend the annual Conference. In private, as well as in public, he ever enjoyed proclaiming the doctrines of his church and defending her position. In the field of debate he possessed the ability and poise to present his views clearly and convincingly. He read only the best books, but the Bible was his constant companion. The central fact of his life was vital Christian faith in the atoning Blood of the Lord Jesus Christ. His religious feeling was deep and genuine. Its best expression was found in the beautiful hymns which he delighted to sing.

His marriage to Miss Sue C. Cobbs, daughter of John R. and Drucilla Cobbs, of Patrick County, Va., took place on the 27th of October, 1869. Besides his widow, who survives him, there are the following children: Mrs. J. R. Robinson, Brother W. H. Bowles, the Associate Lay Leader of the Danville District, and Mrs. H. A. Hardie, all of Rocky Mount, Va.; Mrs. A. A. Anthony, of Stella, Va., and Mr. A. B. Bowles, of Lynchburg, Va. His wife and children bear testimony to his beautiful life in the home. His unselfish nature found its sweetest expression in deeds of tender regard for his bosom companion who, for practically a half-century, shared the sunshine and the shadows of his life. It was not always possible for him to provide those comforts of life which his considerate soul felt that she needed, for the charges which they served barely gave them the necessities of life; yet, when the pinches of poverty were even at their keenest there was that same loving solicitude in her behalf. Of course for his children his heart's desire and prayer to God was that they might seek the Saviour in early life and serve Him actively and faithfully until death.

His last years were spent in one supreme effort to impress upon his family and loved ones, as well as all others with whom he came in personal touch, the importance of working righteousness, of having a holy regard for the Sabbath, of realizing the fullest possible meaning of prayer, and the spiritual necessity of regularly reading the Word of God.

With absolutely no fear for the life beyond the grave, as will best be seen in the following poem which he wrote about three years before his death, he fell asleep in Jesus to await the resurrection morn:

"My latest sun is sinking fast,
My race is nearly run;"
The crisis near will soon be past,
And Heaven, I trust, be won.

O God, help me to watch and pray,
That all sin I may slun,
And walk with Thee from day to day
'Till all life's work is done.

Lead me, O lead me, every hour
In the path that Christ trod;
'Twill save me from the Tempter's power,
'Twill help me walk with God.

And when the victor's prize I've won
I'll rise to heights sublime,
Far, far above the dazzling sun,
To Heaven the Christly clime.

O precious home—home of the blest,
The home through Jesus given,
Where weary souls forever rest:
My Father's home—Heaven!

Louis Cabe Shearer descended from a long line of staunch Methodists. He was born July 17, 1868, in Appomattox County, Va. His parents were James E. and Mary J. Shearer.

He was converted at the age of fourteen, and joined the church under the ministry of Rev. Travis J. Taylor, of blessed memory. The Holy Spirit had impressed upon his young heart and mind in early childhood that he was called of God to preach the Gospel. His way seemingly having been closed by adverse circumstances, he endeavored to evade the sacred call. At the age of twenty the call became so clear and so urgent that he could resist no longer, and he began at once to prepare himself for the Gospel ministry. In 1890 he entered Randolph-Macon College and spent three years in prosecuting his studies. In 1891 he was licensed to preach by the Quarterly Conference of Appomattox Circuit.

After leaving college he taught school for two years in order to repay the money he had borrowed for his education. While engaged in teaching he continued his studies for the ministry and preached as he had opportunity.

He was received on trial into the Virginia Conference November, 1895, and was appointed to West Street, Petersburg. His next appointment was Trinity, Lynchburg, remaining two years. In 1898 he was appointed as a student to Randolph-Macon College. While thus pursuing his studies

at college he was employed by the Presiding Elder to take charge of the work at Hasker Memorial, Richmond. This charge he served most efficiently for two years; 1900 he served West Point. Then Grace Church, Newport News, for four years; Madison Heights, four years; Chesterfield and Churchland, two years each, and Central Bedford Circuit, three years. Soon after entering on his third year on Central Bedford he was stricken December 26, 1916, with paralysis, from which he only partially recovered. At the last session of the Virginia Conference he was given the relation of a superannuate. He hoped that a year's rest would enable him to take up his work again, but God had ordered it otherwise, and, on September 6, 1918, God took him to Himself.

Louis Cabe Shearer was a fine type of a Christian gentleman and minister. He was greatly handicapped all his life by a feeble constitution. This prevented him from accomplishing his heart's desire—taking a course at Vanderbilt University, which he felt would better equip him for the work of the ministry. During 1900 it became necessary for him to undergo a very serious surgical operation. He was a great sufferer from physical weakness. Those who met him and saw his smiling face never knew that they were in the presence of a heroic spirit, a real martyr to physical infirmity; yet under these trying conditions he did his work cheerfully and gladly. Lying for days in bed during the week, yet when the Sabbath came he was found in his place, preaching the Word of God. Sometimes so great was his weakness that he would sit while he preached. Though faint, he was still pursuing. Dignified and quiet, tender and true, he won friends wherever he labored. His preaching was characterized by clearness and earnestness. He edified the saints, and sinners were brought to know Jesus Christ as their Saviour.

He was most fortunate in the choice of a wife. On April 29, 1903, he married Miss Daisy Virginia Bell, daughter of E. L. Bell, of Lynchburg, Va. She was indeed a helpmeet. Her presence strengthened and cheered him in his work. God gave them two children—Virginia and Louis Cabe, Jr. They, with their mother, sorrow for the departure of a husband and father, who has entered into the mansions of the blest and awaits their coming.

"Life's labor done, as sinks the day,

Rev. Edgar Poe Parham

Edgar Poe Parham was born in Sussex County, Va., May 14, 1856, and died in Petersburg, Va., November 5, 1918, in the sixty-third year of his age. His father was a useful and honored local preacher—Rev. G. W. S. Parham—and his mother was, previous to marriage, Miss Mary J. Hunt, of Sussex County. Edgar was reared in the midst of godly influences, and the parental home was often the welcome resting-place of the preachers as they went about their work. His father's library was filled with choice volumes, religious and miscellaneous, and the son read with avidity and discrimination, thus supplementing the school advantages of the times and of the neighborhood. Though college and seminary were not accessible to him, he acquired a respectable degree of learning which he used effectively through the subsequent years.

In 1875, at the age of nineteen, he consecrated himself to Christ at Concord Church in a revival meeting conducted by Rev. Joseph H. Riddick. Even before his conversion he had leanings toward the Gospel ministry as

a life vocation, and the matter assumed definite shape in his mind soon thereafter. He decided to give himself to the work of the itinerancy, and making such preparation as the circumstances allowed, he received license to preach from the Quarterly Conference of his home circuit October 9, 1880, his license being signed by Rev. E. P. Wilson, who was then president elder of the Petersburg District. In the summer of 1882, while yet a local preacher, he was employed as junior preacher on the Middlesex Circuit, Rev. D. G. C. Butts being his senior in charge. In November, 1882, at the Conference in Portsmouth, presided over by Bishop George F. Pierce, he was admitted on trial into the traveling connection and appointed to Chatham Circuit. In 1883, at the Conference in Richmond, he was ordained deacon by Bishop H. H. Kavanaugh, and sent to West Charlotte Circuit, where he remained two years. For the next two years he served the Montross Circuit. He was ordained to the eldership by Bishop J. C. Granbery at the Conference in Norfolk in November, 1886, and then served successively the following charges: 1887-'88, West Lancaster; 1889, King William; 1890-'93, Goochland; 1894, Cartersville, 1895-'96, Buckingham; 1897-1900, Hycó; 1900-'01, Dorchester, Md. In 1903, after a year of service at Blandford, Petersburg, he felt constrained on account of his health to retire to the superannuate list, but after two years of recuperation he re-entered the effective ministry in 1905, serving thereafter the following charges: 1905, Spotsylvania; 1906, Urbanna; 1907-'08, King and Queen; 1909-'10, York; 1911-'13, King George. In May, 1913, his health having again failed, he was relieved of pastoral responsibilities and, at the Annual Conference of that year, he was again granted the superannuate relation, which he held to the end of life.

Brother Parham entered into marriage relations on the 11th of August, 1889, with Miss Fannie S. Dunaway, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Raleigh Dunaway, of Lancaster County, Va., to whose affectionate and intelligent companionship he owed no little of his subsequent happiness and usefulness. Of this marriage two sons were born—Bernard D. Parham, now with the expeditionary forces in France, and Edgar P. Parham, Jr., now connected with the Federal Reserve Bank in Richmond.

His last illness began suddenly on Sunday, October 27, just after luncheon, and the malady was thought at first to be acute indigestion, from which he seemed to be recovering. But, on Tuesday following, he was taken with severe pain in the region of the heart, and by the physician's advice was removed to the hospital in Petersburg for further treatment. From this attack he appeared to rally to such an extent that he was preparing to return home on Tuesday, November 5, the very day of his decease. About 8 o'clock that morning, after bathing his face, he ate breakfast with enjoyment and then lay down. To the attendant who entered the room a little later he seemed to be resting quietly, but a few minutes afterwards, when she returned to arrange the room, the vital spark had fled, and the patient had entered upon the rest "that remaineth to the people of God."

The mortal remains of our deceased comrade were buried in Blandford Cemetery, Petersburg, the service of the church being conducted by Rev. Lloyd T. Williams, pastor of Market Street Church, and Rev. Richard B. Scott, of City Point, and the pallbearers being chosen from among the ministers of the community. Among the floral offerings at the funeral was a beautiful cross of flowers, a tribute from his brethren of the ministry.

Brother Parham is survived by his devoted wife, the two affectionate sons already mentioned, and two sisters—Mrs. Willie Epps, of Norfolk, Va., and Mrs. May P. Reives, of Richmond. Beyond the immediate circle he had a host of loving friends who sincerely mourn his departure.

Our departed brother was a man of energy, piety and usefulness. Besides preaching for many years as a pastor, he preached frequently during the years of his superannuation, as opportunity offered and the needs of

the churches required. Not a few of his brethren in the ministry will recall with grateful appreciation the service that he rendered them and their churches by filling various pulpits during the sickness or absence of pastors. His preaching was plain, Scriptural, evangelical and profitable to the careful and intelligent hearer. The spirit of devoutness that he manifested was a means of grace to many. His willingness to serve was an inspiration to his brethren.

He had also a special gift in the use of the pen. First and last he did a remarkable amount of writing for the press, contributing to our church papers, the daily press and occasionally to the *Methodist Review*. He was a diligent and valued reporter of the Annual Conference proceedings for many years as a correspondent of the daily newspapers. For a year or more past he had conducted a monthly religious paper, *The Southside Methodist*, manifesting decided editorial ability as well as a most commendable spirit. As a writer for the press, he was known far beyond the limits of his own Conference and State.

Thus has passed from our ranks an affectionate husband and father, a faithful Christian, a godly and useful preacher and writer, a cherished comrade. We expect to greet him again "in the dawning of the morning, when the mists have rolled away."

APPENDIX III.—REPORTS

Board of Missions

Report No. 1

The coming of the hundredth anniversary of American Methodist Missions, the close of a world war disclosing needs and opening up opportunities at home and abroad unparalleled in human history, the material prosperity of our people and their liberality as expressed in their remarkable response to repeated and unprecedented calls for money in the various war drives, the sudden emancipation of the General Board of Missions from the burden of debt, the place of America in the leadership of allied democracies of the world, the place of the Virginia Conference in the van of the advanced movements of our church—these are the factors of a mighty providential conjuncture, calling us to a missionary devotion and endeavor for the centenary year 1919 such as our Conference has never anything like equaled.

1. The General Conference directed that for two years, in relation to all other claims and claimants the centenary movement should have full right of way in the Church. Shall we not, as presiding elders, pastors, laymen and all good women, all who love the Church and earnestly wait for the coming of the Kingdom of God, obey that order of the chief governing body of the Church, in all the letter and spirit of it, by making the centenary plans the first thing in our churches for the eighteen months yet remaining of the two centenary years covered by the General Conference?

2. We may raise the thirty-five million proposed and greatly stir the Church at home in the centenary celebration, but the movement could prove a pitiful failure if the interest generated at home is not gathered up and conveyed to the rising Church abroad. Let us, therefore, definitely and unceasingly pray that the interest of the centenary, in all the power of a mighty Pentecost of spiritual revival and advance, may be transmitted to all our mission fields.

3. We must send to our various fields 300 missionaries in the next five years, thirty going out under the General Board of Missions in 1919. We call upon our best and best-qualified young men looking to entrance into this body, or already admitted, to render the best possible service to the centenary celebration by offering their lives to this noble service.

4. The allotment of the two million and a half dollars has already been heartily accepted by the Conference. Shall we not make it a point of high privilege in Sunday schools, Epworth Leagues, Mission Societies—in all our organizations for the big drive for pledges—to give ourselves with such skill and enthusiasm to the task that we shall everywhere exceed our local allotments and shall reach a grand total for the Conference of three million dollars?

Report No. 2

The Board of Missions, by unanimous action, submits the following resolutions for adoption by the Conference:

Whereas, the Woman's Missionary Society, by virtue of the powers vested in it by the General Conference, has had committed to it the cultivation of the juvenile missionary interests of our Church, exclusive of the Sunday school; and, whereas the preoccupation of much of the territory of the Virginia Conference by the Rosebud Missionary Society, which for a number of years has been engaged in fostering the missionary spirit of the children of our Conference, has necessarily restricted the work of the Woman's Missionary Society, and in some cases has resulted in the duplication and overlapping of the work of these two societies; and, whereas the work of the Rosebud Missionary Society is of necessity limited to our own Conference territory, thereby increasing the proportionate cost of maintenance and cultivation to an exceptional degree; and, whereas such duplication and overlapping of work and excessive expenditures do not make for the highest efficiency; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, That a committee of five be appointed by the Presiding Bishop of this Conference, whose duty it shall be to confer with the Board of Managers of the Rosebud Missionary Society or a representative committee of the same, and a representative committee of the Woman's Missionary Society of the Virginia Conference, with the view of bringing about, if practicable, a more effective and economical handling of the juvenile missionary work of our Conference, said committee to report to this Conference at its next annual session its findings, with recommendations.

2. Any necessary expenses of the aforementioned committee incurred in the discharge of its duties shall be borne by the Board of Missions.

During the year I have had five meetings unavoidably canceled for the following causes: coal shortage, pastor attending funeral of mother in Florida, pastor's plans failed, and Board of Health closed two meetings on account of influenza. In figuring on an average of meetings I did hold, I find that if I had held these services my report would have been equal to and some respects better than last year. Many of the meetings held were remarkably good, and numbers were blessed. Quite a number of soldiers were definitely saved in different places. In the services I work for a real awakening among the Church members as well as for conversion of sinners.

Mrs. Oakey has rendered valuable service in every revival. I have given reports in *Richmond Christian Advocate* and *The Methodist* of my work during the year.

I have preached for the brethren in Danville and vicinity when they were sick or absent, conducted funerals and assisted in the United War Work Fund when not engaged in meetings. The hearty co-operation of the brethren in my work is greatly appreciated.

The Board of Managers of the Rosebud Missionary Society desires to advise the Virginia Annual Conference that it greatly deplors certain statements published during the past few months by the Secretary and Treasurer of the Rosebuds, Bro. Frank L. Kerns.

These statements, which have reflected on the standing of honored and beloved members of our Conference and members of our Woman's Missionary Society, were made and published without the knowledge or consent of the Board of Managers of the Rosebuds, its Executive Committee or any of the officers of the organization other than the Secretary-Treasurer himself.

We deeply regret to report that, in our judgment, the statements published have come from a good and consecrated man, who, under mental and perhaps physical strain, has made charges totally unwarranted, and which could not possibly have come, under normal conditions, from so gentle and considerate a man as Uncle Larry.

The Board of Managers of the Rosebuds will seek to promptly take such steps as may appear wise to safeguard the great work committed to their charge, a work which has been so signally blessed in the past and which offers a splendid field for constructive effort in the future.

While we do not feel that the men and women against whom these charges have been made need any vindication at our hands, we nevertheless respectfully ask the Virginia Annual Conference to enter this statement in their records in testimony of the fact that both the Rosebud Board of Managers and our Annual Conference count each of them worthy of our highest esteem, our fullest confidence and our greatest respect.

A STATEMENT

In regard to the Rosebud Question, made by the Committee of the Woman's Missionary Society of the Virginia Conference. Read by Mrs. Lee Britt.

Mr. F. L. Kerns, secretary and treasurer of the Rosebud Missionary Society, in an article published in the Baltimore and Richmond *Christian Advocate* of September 19, 1918, referring to two letters, one written by the president of the Woman's Missionary Society of the Virginia Conference, and the other by a committee appointed by the Executive Committee of the Woman's Missionary Society, asks, after reference to the contents of these letters: "What is that to Thee?" and, we wish to answer this question briefly and clearly.

First, we wish to say that, as far as we know, there has never been any harsh criticism of the board of managers of the Rosebud Missionary Society as a board, or of its individual members as such, and no comment on the work of the Rosebud Missionary Society, except a statement of facts made with the hope that such changes could be made as would tend to greater efficiency and economy in the conduct of the children's missionary work of the State.

It is essential that the officers of this organization shall study and know the missionary activities of the conference, so as to be prepared to strengthen the weak points, encourage and stimulate where needed and, in every way, build up the missionary work committed to them.

There are a few facts, all matters of record, and, doubtless, well known that we wish to state. From the organization of the Woman's Foreign Missionary Society in 1878, efforts have been made, successfully, in other Conferences to organize the young people and children into missionary societies, but in Virginia the Rosebuds came into existence about the same time the Woman's Foreign Missionary Society was organized, and, as the Rosebuds were organizing the children, while the women were getting their work established, very little effort was made to do anything about organizing the young people and children in the earlier years of the work. Up to 1910 there were two missionary organizations—the Foreign Missionary Society and the Home Mission Society—working with women and children of Southern Methodism. Both organizations had a number of children's organizations.

In May, 1910, by action of the General Conference, these two organizations were united into one known as the Woman's Missionary Council, and from this time, as never before, the urgent necessity for training the young life of the church and giving to them a world vision, also the responsibility resting upon them to answer calls made for workers for the home and foreign lands was stressed. Vice-presidents were elected in all adult auxiliaries, whose duty it was to organize the young people and children into missionary societies, and these women were urged to recognize the responsibility resting upon them to give missionary training to the young people and children.

On November 4, 1913, the Woman's Foreign Missionary Society and the Home Mission Society of the Virginia Conference were united into one organization, the Woman's Missionary Society of the Virginia Conference, thus greatly strengthening the work. Officers were elected, as required by the Council, and to the two vice-presidents elected at this time was given the duty of working with the young people and children, thus giving prominence to these lines of work.

At the first annual meeting of the Woman's Missionary Society, held in Lynchburg, in May, 1914, in an Institute on Methods of work for children, the question was asked, "What is the policy of the Juniors to the Rosebuds?" (Minutes 1914, page 27.) For some years the fact had been realized that there was an overlap of the work for children in our conference. There was much discussion in regard to the above question. The overlap of work was stated. Attention was called to the fact that where

there was a Rosebud Society it was impossible to organize a Junior Society, that the children of the Rosebud Society were confining all of their study and gifts to one field, that was to Mexico, and that it was very confusing to have so many organizations after children, and that pastors of charges, where there were Rosebuds, did not approve of having another junior missionary society, saying that one was enough, and we agreed with them, that one was enough if that one was given adequate missionary training. After the discussion, on motion, a committee, consisting of the president of the Woman's Missionary Society and two corresponding secretaries was appointed to confer with the Rosebuds and see if some plan could not be formed to prevent the overlapping of reports.

Never, to our knowledge, was there a suggestion of disbanding or injuring the Rosebuds, though this was not the first time that the attention of the annual meeting had been called to the overlapping of work. As chairman of this committee, the president of the Woman's Missionary Society, before the Virginia Conference met in annual session in Portsmouth, in November, 1914, wrote to the president of the board of managers of the Rosebud Society asking that he arrange a conference with his board, or a committee from his board, and the committee from the Woman's Missionary Society. This request was not granted. We considered our request a reasonable one, but as it was not granted we felt that it would be useless to ask for another Conference. The officers then began a closer study of the Rosebud organization, the expense of administration, its educational program and the Rosebud page in the *Advocate*. The women did not know that the Virginia board of missions was looking into the same question until in July, 1917, the president of the board of Missions asked for a joint conference of the Executive Committee of the Woman's Missionary Society and a committee from the board. We were glad to comply with the request, and when the Conference was held we were ready to give some of the facts we had gathered from our study.

The president of the Board of Missions asked for committees from the Board of Missions, the Rosebud board and the Woman's Missionary Society to meet for a joint conference on July 31, 1917, in the Y. M. C. A. building, Richmond, Va. The Rosebud board did not send a committee as requested. The matter was discussed at some length, and the committee from the Woman's Missionary Society was requested to formulate and present to the Executive Committee of the Board of Missions the plans and suggestions made at this conference. The plans were formulated as follows:

The Executive Committee of the Board of Missions:

Gentlemen,—Your committee, appointed by the joint committee of the Board of Missions and the Woman's Missionary Society which met on July 31, 1917, in Richmond, at the request of the General Board of Missions, to consider matters relating to the work of the Rosebuds of our conference, presents the following report for your consideration:

In making this report and the request therein, your committee wishes to emphasize the fact that neither the Woman's Missionary Society nor the committee would do anything to disrupt the Rosebud work, nor injure it in any way. We believe that the change in management could be made without detriment to the work.

Your committee has carefully considered the matter of the expense incurred by the Rosebud board in projecting the work of the Rosebuds, and the relation of this work to the Woman's Missionary Society, and we respectfully request that the Rosebud work be placed under the care and become a part of the Woman's Missionary Society for the following reasons:

(1) The General Board has called our attention to the amount required for the running expenses of the Rosebud board, and by reference to the minutes of the Virginia Conference we find that the expenses of the Rosebud board have been over 43 per cent. of the receipts for the past five years; in other words, it has taken \$14,715.04 to collect and expend \$33,411.33.

(2) As long as the work of the Rosebuds is carried on under a separate board this large expense must continue. The Woman's Missionary Council is furnishing all programs, helps, mite boxes, pins and, in fact, all literature and helps necessary for the missionary work with the young people and juniors of all conferences of Southern Methodism, except the Virginia Conference. The Virginia Conference is the only conference having a separate organization for the children of the church. This literature would be furnished in such quantities as might be needed by the council without extra expense to our conference.

(3) There is much talk in regard to the overlapping of missionary effort, as the Sunday School, Epworth League and Junior Missionary Society are all trying for the children of the same age, and in our conference the Rosebuds are trying for these children also, and by uniting the Rosebuds and the Junior Missionary Society one organization would be eliminated.

(4) The discipline gives to the women the missionary education of the children and young people of the church, and as the women are doing much of the Rosebud work the union of all work for children could be easily effected.

Should the request of this committee be granted, the Woman's Missionary Society promises:

(1) To preserve the name "Rosebud," and will give it to all Junior Missionary Societies of the Virginia Conference. Every effort will be made to keep up the interest in the work, preserving as far as possible the history of the attainments of the past.

(2) If the Board of Missions will agree, the Woman's Missionary Council will assume the support of the work now being done, undertaken and supported by the Rosebuds. The name Instituto Laurens will also be kept, applying as it does to the school in Monterey, Mexico, should the board allow the council to assume the support of the school.

(3) The Woman's Missionary Society will continue the column in the *Advocate*, provided satisfactory arrangements can be made with the *Advocate* to do so.

(4) All Rosebud Societies will be supplied regularly with literature, helps, mite boxes and such material as may be necessary for the successful prosecution of the work.

Your committee believes the Rosebud work will not be injured by this change, and that the work will be enlarged, and the interest of the children further stimulated by the consciousness that they are a part of the great band of children of the Southern Methodist Church working for the extension of the Master's kingdom.

The following are the receipts and disbursements for the past five years in the Rosebud work. The balance from year to year is not included in the amounts given:

In further consideration and discussion of the report, the following amendments were made:

Section 2, under promises, was amended to read:

The "Instituto Laurens," at Monterey, Mexico, shall continue in its present relation to the General Board of Missions, and shall be known always as the child of the Rosebuds, and the minimum amount allowed out of the income of the society to the "Instituto Laurens" shall be \$5,000 per year. At a later meeting held in Lynchburg, in November, 1917, the report was further amended by leaving out the words "at the request of the General Board of Missions" and "The General Board has called," used in the reasons for request, as it was shown that an unintentional error had been made in the interpretation of the words "at the request of the general secretaries of the Board of Missions at Nashville."

Please notice that the committee says: "Your committee wishes to emphasize the fact that neither the Woman's Missionary Society nor the committee would do anything to disrupt the Rosebud work, nor injure it in any way." The request has never been made to disorganize the work of the Rosebuds, and we believe that the change in management could be made, and that the growth of the work would not be interrupted, as it is not the work of the Rosebuds, but the separate board under which they are working that will be affected. We believe that in many places the Rosebud leaders would not object to the change, and this belief is based on a letter received from one of the Conference officers, in which she says: "I get letters almost every week from leaders of the Rosebud Missionary Society asking that they may have literature, so as to give fifteen minutes to the junior work in their Rosebud meetings. Must I keep on sending to these unless they organize as juniors?"

The Virginia Conference is the only one having a separate board for the children's work, and in view of the great needs at this time, we feel that some plan should be made to place this work under an existing board for the sake of economy. We know that as long as a separate board exists there must be this large expense for home cultivation. It takes money to keep up interest, money spent in attractive literature for the children, if this work is to grow.

The literature furnished by the council for the Junior work is excellent, and this would be furnished in quantities needed without extra charge to the conference, thus saving much. We feel that this literature has a decided educational value, and that the children of our conference should not be deprived of its use.

The school at Monterey would continue under the Board of Missions, and would be supported by the Rosebuds as in the past, and the amount expended would be larger than that allowed any year during the past five. The amount expended would not be less than \$5,000 per year, while the largest amount allowed by the Rosebud board in the past five years is \$4,885, and that was in 1913, and the next amount is \$3,655 in 1912, and each year since 1913 has been less than \$3,500, and this amount could be credited, as at present, on the Virginia assessment.

The criticism of Mr. F. L. Kerns in regard to the letter written by the president of the Woman's Missionary Society to the district secretaries is without justification or excuse.

We wish to say again that it is not the work being done by the Rosebud organization that is to be disturbed by the proposed change, simply doing away with a board.

Do you believe the Rosebuds are working simply because they are under a separate board? We do not. Would they not be as loyal to the cause of missions if they were under the Woman's Missionary Society as are all of the other children of the Southern Methodist Church? Would these children not receive better missionary instruction, as they would be taught that the world, both at home and abroad, is the field for missionary ac-

tivity? Certainly, the conference **has** endorsed the splendid work done by the Rosebuds in the past, and we **believe** will continue to do so, although they may no longer be under a **separate** board.

We have been unable to **find** any **permission** granted by the conference for the organization of a **permanent** **separate** board for the Rosebuds, but we have found just an **endorsement** from year to year, and should the desired change be made we would **ask** for a continuation of this endorsement.

In this day of conservation and **efficiency**, is it not a lack of efficiency and good business judgment to **continue** spending 43 per cent. of the yearly receipts for home cultivation?

Certainly money would be **conserved** and greater efficiency result from having the children under **one** organization. Is there any other than a sentimental reason for **continuing** **this** separate board?

Many of us cling to the old ways and methods of doing things, but can the Church allow this expense when there is such an overlapping of work and when there would be no **injury** to the work by the change?

The women in many cases are **doing** the work. Then, why not give up the Rosebud board, for that is all that is asked, and allow the women to do all of the work, for the sake of **efficiency**?

We believe money will be **saved** for missions, the children will be given a world vision, and will be taught the needs of other fields than Mexico, and overlapping of missionary effort will be stopped as far as the children of the Rosebud and **Junior Societies** are concerned.

Board of Lay Activities

Another year of golden opportunity has come and gone. A year filled with the militant and heroic **calculated** to deeply stir the souls of the most indifferent and phlegmatic. Yes, the war of arms is over, but the war of righteous reconstruction has just begun.

The only reason yet advanced for **the** entrance of our own beloved country into the awful chasm of war on **foreign** shores was for the preservation of the ideals of civilization, **liberty** and democracy. Six months after the adoption and ratification of these **ideals** which crystalized into war the world was given a mighty **shock** in the precipitate fall of the Russian dynasty, and thus democracy was **given** its first opportunity to demonstrate its efficiency or its **right** to **live**. The result was an ignominious failure culminating in utter chaos, **the** unrestrained mob bowing to selfishness, murder and greed. **What**, then, was the answer? Was it true that the ideals upon which this **nation** of ours was built and upon which for four hundred years we have **solidly** **stood**, were wrong or a failure? Out of that searching question which would not down came the answer—viz: That the ideal of liberty and democracy *per se* was a failure, but when builded upon and guided by **education** and religion became the only system in the world under which people **should** be expected to live.

At the moment of the **reaching** of that conclusion the Church of God received the shock of its **existence** in the inevitable test of responsibility

thrust upon her. The government has done its work—it has wiped autocracy from the earth—it can do no more. The world involuntarily turns to the Church with the obvious but unspoken searching question. Is the Church equal to the task? Is it ready to receive the gauntlet thus thrown down?

If there be those who have doubted or questioned the propriety of the great centenary movement now just about ready to shape itself, surely the answer for them will be found in a consideration of the above facts surrounding the Church today.

Your Board rejoices in the fact that the Church has determined to thus put its power to the test in adopting and undertaking an adequately worth-while program. The centenary movement started before this challenge to the Church came so direct, and in this fact we know it was born of God and for such a day as this.

We call upon every layman in Virginia to rally to the support of the plans of the centenary and to assume his just share of responsibility for the success of same.

Speaking definitely of the work of the year, we beg to report that under the never-to-be-forgotten inspiration of the work of the Eastern Shore District during 1917-'18 the Conference will recall the request of representatives of the Norfolk District to assume the responsibility of endeavoring to become the first so-called city district in the Conference to undertake the result of 100 per cent. efficiency on the four vital points of Church conduct—viz: (1) ministerial support, (2) payment of all assessments in full, (3) the elimination of mission board support, (4) a larger return and broader conception of missionary obligation.

There is no member of this Conference that does not realize that under standards which have existed for fifty years past that this is a heroic task, but just in proportion to the degree of labor and sacrifice employed, so is the measure of our rejoicing today as we reflect upon the complete success of every single item.

It is fitting here to say that not one of the four ideals would have been made possible without the labor, sympathy and hearty co-operation of a godly consecrated elder and many pastors, together with an energized and resourceful district leader. The record is as follows:

(1) *A Just Ministerial Support.*—The increase made this year on the district is \$4,750, or 14 per cent., bringing the total to \$38,703, with twenty-seven pastors, equaling an average for each of \$1,433, thus far eclipsing the record of the record year of even the Eastern Shore District, which for 1917-18 was \$1,133. This amount of \$1,433 is \$453 greater than the average of the entire Conference.

(2) *Payment of All Assessments.*—This goal was fully met to the last dollar. Last year eleven charges failed to reach their assessment and several had not in fifty years. This simply shows that it can be done with all charges on every district.

(3) *The Elimination of Mission Board Support.*—Last year, and for all time so long as we know, seven charges were allowed by your Conference Board of Missions \$1,300 in supplementing the salaries of the pastors.

This year at the Fourth Quarterly Conference each of these charges formally requested their elder not to ask for this support for them in future.

(4) *A Broader Conception of Missionary Obligation.*—This great fundamental principle of the Church has been stressed in season and out, with the result that, notwithstanding the increased out-go provided for in the three objects above explained, the district has been led to develop wonderfully in this regard. With every missionary assessment paid in full there has been raised \$16,750 for special objects in addition thereto.

Thus, fellow-members of the Conference, another mile-stone of progress has been passed, and the honor, good faith and integrity of the Church has again been vindicated. The lesson is, this record can be duplicated in any of the eight remaining districts in our State. Co-operation of the pastor, determination and pride on the part of the elder, backed by the consecrated and intelligent business effort and system of the District Leader, is all that is required.

For the remaining eight districts the record of stewardship is splendid, and shows the immense amount of hard work of a constructive nature done by elders and leaders, notably among them is the Richmond District, with \$20,000 for missions and all charges paying out in full except three. Likewise, the Farmville District, splendid increase in the ministerial support, large missionary offering, the largest in the history of the district. Rapahannock comes with \$20,000 for missions and fourteen more charges paid in full than last year, and of each of the districts not mentioned, every item shows in excess of that of last year.

In all the work, the plodding labors of the missionary secretary have been most potential, and while it is difficult to forecast the exact missionary totals for the year, it is safe to say that it will not be less than \$300,000, an increase of nearly 25 per cent. over last year, which was regarded as phenomenal. It will be the purpose of your Board to continue to seek the special development of district by district until we can help to present the whole Conference in a few years on a 100 per cent. basis in these respects.

We are rejoiced to report that requests have come from two districts for positions in this 100 per cent. honor class for the coming year—viz: Portsmouth and Charlottesville.

A concluding resolution by your Board urgently requests all laymen to consider the question of their pastors' support at the first quarterly Conference of the new year, and in all justice satisfy themselves that the amount so fixed shall be fair and adequate, consistent with the abnormal costs of living by which we are now surrounded.

Baughan, at a nominal salary, to give attention to those two places.

Your Commission desires to say that these camp pastors have been active, energetic and proficient, and the results that have followed their energetic and untiring work will commend itself to the Virginia Conference and to the Christian people and all others who have seen or known of their incessant and eager zeal in the work of their Master and the salvation of souls.

The assessment, put upon this Conference by the General Board of Church Extension, for next year is \$18,346. This is an increase over last year of \$1,126. But, as we this year complete the payment of the \$10,000 promised the Washington Representative Church, we now drop the assessment of \$4,000 that we have been making for the benefit of that Church. The sum total of your assessment is thereby decreased \$2,874.

The Board elected the following members to attend the meeting of the general board at its annual session next May: E. Frank Story and W. B. Jett; alternate, C. W. Hardwicke.

The Loan Fund of our Conference is growing. When the amount set apart this year is added we will have \$20,000 in that fund. While this is creditable, it ought to be but a good beginning.

As the Loan Fund Department of our Church Extension Board is paying an annuity interest ranging from 5 per cent. to 9 per cent., it offers an attractive investment to the living and a permanent investment to the dead. Get literature on this and other subjects pertaining to church extension from the General Board, Louisville, Ky.

When you contemplate building a Sunday-school building or a church, write to Rev. J. A. Baylor, 1115 Fourth Avenue, Louisville, Ky., and he will furnish architectural plans that will be helpful to you.

The General Board is now carefully studying and planning an insurance department. This was authorized by the General Conference, and they hope to perfect it soon.

As the District Conference should be a grand rallying place for all interests of the Church, we ask that time commensurate with its importance be given this subject at these Conferences.

Board of Education

Report of the President

The report of the Secretary of Education will present for your action the resolutions required by the legislation of the recent General Conference. That Conference took action to strengthen our educational institutions so as to enable the Church to do its full part in the rebuilding processes that must go on after the war. It planned for the coming quadrennium a general campaign to raise \$10,000,000 for our two universities and \$13,000,000 for our schools and colleges. But as precedence is given to the centenary movement and the superannuate endowment movement, these educational campaigns are to be postponed until the last two years of the quadrennium; but an exception is made where campaigns had already begun, as, for example, in the case of the movement for endowment of Blackstone College and for raising the hundred thousand dollars as a scholarship fund for Randolph-Macon College. These campaigns can go on until they are brought to a conclusion. Blackstone must have its hundred thousand for endowment if it is to do its work. Randolph-Macon has been promised thirty thousand dollars of the hundred thousand by the General Board of Education, and nearly ten thousand dollars has been raised from the Eastern Shore District. The war situation prevented further prosecution of the campaign.

You will be asked to take definite action to provide for the religious education of Methodist students in State institutions. The correspondence school under the official management of Dr. R. H. Bennett has proved its worth. It has been strengthened by division, one school to be at Emory University and the other at Southern Methodist University.

Never before was the need for educated men in the ministry more keenly felt. May the untiring labors of those of the Department of Ministerial Supply and Training arouse the Church to the necessity of providing ample funds for educating its ministry and to a searching of heart as to whether it has done its part in presenting to its young people the call to active service in the Master's vineyard. But with world fields ripe for the harvest, the churches must have more laborers or must distribute them more wisely or Christianity will lose its greatest, its supreme, opportunity.

It was stated in many quarters that after the war the old liberal arts colleges would find themselves without students and discredited, and would have to make their curriculum more practical. Certainly the worth of all education has been proved, but never in the history of the world has Mars paid such a tribute of respect to Minerva (witness the establishment of the S. A. T. C.). The institutions that cultivated and trained the spirit of man rather than his hand, the institutions that produced the Balfours, the Clemenceaus and Viviannis, the Lloyd Georges and the Wilsons have been crowned with a veritable crown of glory. And these are the kind of institutions that the Church has persistently confined itself to fostering—the institutions that produced men of noble minds rather than men of skilled hands. The Prussians used to be fond of saying that

their seven weeks' war in 1866 was won by the superiority of the Prussian over the Austrian schools. In this war, Oxford and Toronto and Princeton have proved their superiority to Berlin and Heidelberg. These produced specialists, those produced men.

It would be one of the tragedies of the war if the Church of the children of light should fail to read the lesson of the war which men who had the winning of the war—men who were expected to be men of blood and iron—have read so clearly.

Fifty years ago the Virginia Conference met in this place. Educationally, we had nothing to build on but traditions and faith. Randolph-Macon had just been moved to Ashland and had opened its doors with forty students. Now your statistical report shows that your schools have property worth \$2,000,000 and that your students number 2,000. If we learn the lessons of this war as our fathers learned the lesson of theirs, and build on our material foundation with the faith and courage they builded, what will fifty years produce in results to the Master's kingdom?

Report of Board of Education

Your Board presents the following resolutions:

(1) The schools and colleges of our Church within the bounds of Virginia Conference continue to grow and prosper. There are no better schools in this country in the grade of work which they do than Randolph-Macon College, Randolph-Macon Woman's College, Blackstone College for Girls, Randolph-Macon Academy at Bedford City, Randolph-Macon Institute and Ferrum Training School. We urge our people to examine the great advantages offered by these institutions, which are not only fully equal to any other institutions in educational standards, but which emphasize the vital importance of moral and spiritual culture. Our pastors and laymen are urged to look out for the choice young men and women of our homes and churches and secure them as students for our own Church school.

(2) The General Conference, at Atlanta, ordered a commission, composed of two or three members nominated by the Board of Education of each Annual Conference in the State and elected by the Annual Conferences to serve at least four years, for the purpose of providing for the religious education of Methodist students in the schools maintained by the State. We nominate Dr. Gilby C. Kelly, Dr. Dice R. Anderson and Dr. J. L. Jarman as Commissioners for the Virginia Conference.

(3) The Board of Education calls special attention to the regulation of the General Conference requiring all under-graduates to take the Conference course of study with the correspondence school.

(4) The General Conference sought to correlate the forward movement for education with the centenary movement and the superannuate endowment movement. The plan provides that the centenary movement shall have right of way for two years, but that local campaigns now under way shall be completed. There are two campaigns now in progress in our Conference. The campaign for \$100,000 for scholarships for Randolph-

Macon College, and \$100,000 for building, equipment and endowment of Blackstone College for Girls. We commend these campaigns to our people as worthy of their most generous support.

(5) The inadequate number of men entering the ministry gives us grave concern. We urge our preachers to preach on the claims of the ministry and to follow this up with private handiwork. Let us also have an efficient observance of decision, or vocation day, in every Sunday school.

(6) The amount collected for ministerial training is to be paid to the Treasurer of the Conference Board of Education, by whom 20 per cent. of the same shall be forwarded to the Department of Ministerial Supply and Training of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, at Atlanta, and the remaining 80 per cent. shall be used by the Conference Board of Education to assist in the training of young men for the ministry of our Church in accordance with the regulations fixed by the Board.

(7) The Treasurer of the Annual Conference is hereby instructed to pay out of the Annual Conference Funds to the Treasurer of the Conference Board of Education \$150 for the expenses of the Conference commissioners and the expenses of the Board of Education for the coming year.

(8) We recommend the confirmation of George E. Booker and Robert C. Watts as trustees of Randolph-Macon College.

(9) We request the Presiding Bishop to appoint S. C. Hatcher as Conference Secretary of Education and as vice-president, secretary and treasurer of Randolph-Macon College, Ashland, Va.; E. H. Rowe, as president of the Southern Seminary, Buena Vista, Va.; W. A. Christian, as president of Blackstone College for Girls; W. J. Young and W. A. Smart, as professors in the Candler School of Theology, Atlanta, Ga.; B. M. Beckham, as principal of Ferrum Training School, and Walter C. Gum and Jessie H. Hobbs, as students at Emory University.

Educational Statistics

The educational statistics for the year ending June, 1918, are as follows:

Sunday School Board

It is the duty of this Board to promote all the interests of the Sunday schools of the Conference, but the success or failure of the work depends ultimately on the pastors, superintendents and Sunday-school workers putting into execution the suggestions made by the Church, through the General and the Conference Boards.

Therefore, we most earnestly urge the pastors, superintendents and district officers to not only read the paragraphs in the new discipline on Sunday schools, but to also study the same and carry out the provisions thereof.

In order to prepare for definite work, each school should have at least three departments or classes, namely: elementary department, or class for all pupils under twelve years of age; secondary department, or class for those from twelve to eighteen years of age; an advanced department, or class for all over eighteen years of age. Large schools should, of course, subdivide these departments so far as possible. There should be a cradle roll and home department in every school, and all the classes in the secondary and advanced departments should be organized and registered as Wesley Bible classes.

The Sunday-school council, composed of the officers and teachers of the school, should meet monthly, or at least have a minimum of ten regular monthly meetings during the year. On the circuits, the officers and teachers of all the schools should meet quarterly, and we suggest that the fifth Sundays, all day or afternoon, be used for this meeting.

There should be organized at least two training classes on each charge, one composed of those who should be preparing for service to meet at the Sunday-school hour, and one for present officers and teachers. If these classes cannot be organized, then at least ten persons on each charge should be persuaded to take the course as individual students.

An effective district organization should be maintained in each district, with a minimum of three officers, namely: district superintendent, who shall be the executive officer and also promote especially the teacher training; an elementary superintendent and a superintendent of missionary education. Other officers may be a superintendent of young people's-adult department, and a superintendent of the intermediate-senior department. These officers shall report to this Board, including financial report, quarterly through the Conference Sunday-school superintendent.

This Board will return to the district superintendent of each district 20 per cent. of the sum raised on Sunday-School Day in that district, each section of Rappahannock District to receive its per centage from the amount sent in from the schools of the respective sections, provided the Conference makes adequate provision for the work, and, also provided, the three officers named above are maintained, that the officers make the quarterly report, arrange for a district institute annually.

A district school of one week's duration should be held in each district annually for the training of teachers and Sunday-school leaders.

We expect to hold a Conference school for all Sunday-school workers each year at Randolph-Macon College, Ashland, in June, beginning next June, 1919, for the purpose of instruction, conferences and inspirational meetings on Sunday-school work. Pastors, superintendents and other officers, teachers, Wesley Bible class representatives and all other Sunday-school workers should attend this Conference school.

We accept our allotment of \$50,000 a year for the next five years, the same to be raised through the Sunday schools for missions, and urge every pastor to appoint at once the Sunday-school committee or a missionary superintendent in each of his schools.

The fourth Sunday in May should be observed as Sunday-School Day, and each school should contribute that day, as a minimum, an amount equal to 10 cents for every pupil on roll.

We have elected Mr. J. H. Montgomery Conference Sunday-school superintendent, and respectfully request the Bishop to appoint him to this work. Miss Ethel Smither has been elected elementary superintendent, and we will establish a central office for the transaction of the business of the Board in Richmond.

That we may be prepared at least in a measure to carry out the very necessary work committed to our hands, we request the Conference to grant us the small direct appropriation of \$7,000.

Epworth League Board

Your committee begs leave to submit the following report:

We rejoice that there are indications of the continued growth of the League, both in numbers and influence, and yet we realize that there are many difficulties in organizing and keeping alive this right arm of the Church, and we cannot but feel that preachers and people are not fully awake to the need of the League for successful work among our young people. In the Virginia Conference the growth of the League has not been spectacular, but for the last five years has been like some placid stream moving on with ever-increasing breadth and power.

At the League conference, which met at Blackstone last June, one hundred and three senior and twenty-four junior Leagues were reported, making a total increase of twenty-five since the last report.

The Virginia Conference Leagues raised last year over fifteen hundred dollars, of which more than nine hundred was applied to the African special. The pledge for Africa for the new year was fifteen hundred dollars, and efforts are being made to raise three thousand. In addition, the League is earnestly and definitely praying for twenty-five volunteers at our next Conference. These summer conferences of the League have been intensely spiritual, and eighty-five choice young men and young women have volunteered for the ministry, for the mission field or for teaching in our mountain schools.

We are glad that the General Conference is laying more stress upon the League, and is enacting such legislation as will put it before the Church in the position which it ought to hold. We call attention to the fact that the General Conference has made the central office no longer dependent on the voluntary contributions of individual chapters; but has put the League upon the same financial footing as the other great interests of the Church. The General Conference has also set apart the second Sunday of May to be observed as Anniversary Day, and, where there is no League, as Young People's Day, with a view to the organization of a League.

Resolved 1. That we urge all preachers, where conditions are at all favorable, to make an honest effort to organize and superintend a League in accordance with the law of our Church.

Resolved 2. That we earnestly ask our preachers to observe the second Sunday of May as Anniversary Day, or Young People's Day, as the General Conference has directed.

Resolved 3. That our preachers who can do so, and especially the members of the Board, preachers and laymen, be urged to attend the summer conferences of the League.

Resolved 4. That our presiding elders be requested to give a prominent place to the League in the District Conferences and due recognition to the speakers who may be sent there to represent the League.

Resolved 5. That the Virginia Conference, recognizing the value of the League as one of the great agencies in the training and development of our young people, be requested to allow as much time as it can spare for the discussion of its report, or, if possible, a night for a League anniversary.

Bible Society Board

The American Bible Society, in co-operation with the British and the Scotch Bible Societies, has undertaken to supply the world with the Word of God, and for the last four years has met the demands of the soldiers of the allied armies, printing the Bible in eighty-one languages and distributing 15,000,000 volumes of the Holy Scripture. The American Bible Society during last year issued and distributed 4,004,813 volumes for our own army and navy alone, besides doing other work. We have tried to meet these large demands upon us. We need your co-operation and your help.

Again! We have no other agency or organization through which we express our interest in printing and distributing the Bible. This, therefore, is our Society. It belongs to us and we belong to it.

We are face to face with greater opportunities to uplift and save the world for Christ with the Word of Life than ever before. We are looking to Christian people to furnish the means with which to meet these increased needs. Resolved, therefore:

(1) That we, as a Conference, will pledge ourselves to endeavor to increase our contributions to this important work during the coming year and also to take the collection for the Bible Society as early in the year as practicable.

(2) That we will send our contributions for the Bible Society through our own agency, represented by Dr. M. B. Porter, Richmond, Va., including the amount collected during the year 1917-18.

(3) That we request the Conference to direct that half of the money collected during the past year for the Bible Society be appropriated to the army and navy work and the other half to the regular work.

Publishing Interests

Your committee has had before it the exhibit of the publishing agents for the fiscal year ending February 28, 1918. We note, with gratification, that the total sales for the fiscal year by the Nashville house and branches have been \$1,156,874.74, an increase over last year of \$15,394.24. The total assets are \$1,084,082.75. The net profits the fiscal year from the Nashville house and the two branches have been \$128,427.19. Of this amount, the Richmond house is credited with \$16,313.31, a larger sum than the Dallas house by over \$3,000.

Considering the high cost of material and production, the exhibit is all the more gratifying.

We note with regret that three of our periodicals have been issued at a loss of \$11,438.87, divided as follows: *Methodist Review*, \$1,826.83; *Christian Advocate*, \$9,005.64; the *Epicorth Era*, \$606.40. We are glad the *Epicorth Era* bids fair to meet the cost of publication the coming year. Realizing how essential all our periodicals and publications are to the success of the work of our great Church, especially in these days of reconstruction, we urge that our preachers and laymen make a greater effort to give to them a large circulation. We recommend that Rev. J. S. Hunter be appointed as field agent of our publishing house.

Temperance and Social Service

To those who know the liquor business and how strongly it has fastened its hold on the appetites of men, how powerful it is through its vast revenues and how deeply it was entrenched in the political life of the nation, the accomplishments of the last decade in temperance reform constitute a modern miracle.

Under the splendid leadership of the Anti-Saloon League of Virginia and the Anti-Saloon League of America, we have heard the death knell of the intoxicating beverage traffic in our State, and by Federal enactment the bell has also tolled for the retirement of this body-destroying, mind-robbing and soul-damning business from our nation on July 1, 1919. After this date the manufacture and sale of intoxicating beverages will cease until our army demobilizes. Should this not be accomplished before February 1, 1920, the doom of the liquor is forever sealed in America. Fourteen States have ratified the constitutional amendment, and a sufficient number of States will vote in January, 1919, to assure a three-fourths' majority ratification. Then twelve months is permitted for the closing out of the intoxicating liquor business, which brings us to February 1, 1920, as the day of final triumph.

Our causes for thanksgiving at this session of the Conference are very great. No longer are our boys giving their lives on gory battle-fields. No longer does the specter of hunger haunt us. The possibilities for reconstruction are unmeasured. The Gospel of Christ has a larger hold on the hearts of men than ever before. Great are these causes, but the greatest

single cause for thanksgiving today in that the first battles for national prohibition have been won, for, while untold thousands of our noble sons fell as vicarious sacrifices at the hand of the enemy, to purchase a glorious freedom for the world, several times that number have been falling every year victims to the nefarious traffic in intoxicating beverages.

The best things are kept by giving, and every good gospel goes. We started in our temperance work with the community as a unit, then the State, and then the nation, and now the Macedonian call has come from the nations of the earth for us to come over and help them in their awful battle for freedom from this accursed thing. This call was so loud and unmistakable that the same organization through which we have fought our community, State and national battle is to conduct the campaign for world-wide prohibition.

This is a missionary vision of vast importance, for we are impotent with our small resources and limited number of men to cope with this agency of the devil, fired by greed and furnished with unlimited resources. More harm can be done to China by the liquor business unrestrained in one year than our missionaries can cure in ten. So, with our passion to save the world, we must pave the way for the missionary of the Cross by the liberation of mankind from the fetters of alcohol.

There is a monster in our midst, of which, if we are wise, we will do well to be warned—the monster apathy. In a great reform, the work is so hard that men are tempted to rest after their first achievements, and, while they sleep, the enemy sows tares. Our temperance people must not relax their effort for law enforcement in our State. They must also cooperate for the making of a Federal law, which will have teeth so sharp that the offenders will fear its consequences. The world must have in the United States a demonstration of the great and permanent benefits of temperance. Our preachers and people must continue in this warfare and never count the battle won until the whole world shall be free.

We offer the following resolutions for adoption:

Resolved: 1. That we give our most hearty endorsement to the Anti-Saloon League of America as the most efficient agency that the Church of God has for the abolition of the liquor traffic, and we approve of a closer relation between the Anti-Saloon League of Virginia and this organization.

2. We rejoice to know that there has been launched by the Anti-Saloon League of America a movement for an international League, and we invite the Anti-Saloon League of America to send representatives into our churches, in order that our people may be informed concerning the possibilities of this work and catch this larger vision. We pledge to them our prayers, co-operation and support.

3. That we have witnessed, with a great deal of gratification, the beneficent effects of prohibition in our State, reducing the number of arrests and commitments to penitentiary, jails and poorhouses.

4. That the enforcement of our law, under the splendid leadership of Rev. J. S. Peters, is to be commended in the highest terms, and we pledge him our sympathy, support and co-operation in his arduous tasks. And we further record our disapproval and attempt for the vicious attacks

being made upon him by individuals, newspapers and corporations in the discharge of his duties.

5. That while the Anti-Saloon League of Virginia regrets the loss of her former matchless leader and superintendent, Bishop James Cannon, from our midst, we rejoice that his mantle has fallen on a broad-minded, trained and untiring worker in this cause—the Rev. David Hepburn—and we assure him that he will have our cordial co-operation and sympathy.

6. That we request the Presiding Bishop to appoint Rev. J. S. Peters as Commissioner of Prohibition for Virginia.

Social Reform

We have had before us a statement from the Commission on Temperance and Social Service, appointed at the session of the General Conference held in Atlanta, Ga., in May, 1918.

The General Conference ordered that each Annual Conference organize a quadrennial Board of Temperance and Social Service, composed of one layman from each district and an equal number of traveling preachers members of the Annual Conference. The General Conference declared that the Church of God is definitely appointed to interpret Jesus Christ and His Gospel to each successive generation and to labor to the end that all things be brought in subjection to Him, and that the problems of industrial readjustment and social redemption constitute a challenge to assert the lordship of Jesus Christ in the social as well as the individual life, and to interpret the Gospel of the age in social as well as individual terms.

The General Conference adopted the social creed of the Federal Council of the Churches of Christ in America and instructed that this creed be published in our Book of Discipline. It also ordered that each Sunday school be organized for a definite program of social service.

In view of this action, we submit the following resolutions:

Resolved: 1. That each Sunday school have a definite program for social service, and that each of the higher and adult classes give a portion of the year to the study of the graded literature series dealing with social service problems and work.

2. That in constituting the Social Service Committee, provided for in the Discipline of the Church by the Church Conference, a representative of each of the organized agencies of the local church be a member *ex officio* of the Social Service Committee.

3. That we have heard, with a great deal of pleasure, of the determination of the Temperance and Social Service Commission to hold a summer conference at Lake Junaluska, N. C., during the month of August, 1919, and we recommend that the chairmen and secretary of the Conference Board of Temperance and Social Service be sent as delegates to this conference and that steps be taken to provide for their necessary expenses.

Report of Committee of the Advocate

We, your committee, appointed to purchase and operating the Baltimore after prayerful and careful consideration to make the following report:

Resolved: (1) That the Virginia Conference purchase outright from its present owner, or owners, the Baltimore Richmond Christian Advocate for the sum of \$16,400.

(2) That the name of the paper be the Richmond Christian Advocate.

(3) That the Board of Conference Commission on Finance be, and it is, hereby instructed to lay an assessment on the Conference of \$25,000 to be distributed over a period of five consecutive years, out of which fund shall be paid the purchase price of the paper, the remainder to be used for the maintenance of the paper, at the discretion of the Board of Managers, hereinafter provided for, the details of purchase and all other matters pertaining to the same to be left to the said Board of Managers.

(4) That we recommend that Rev. Graham H. Lambeth be elected as editor of the paper for a period of four years, subject to the appointing power of the Bishop, and that his salary be fixed at \$4,000 per annum, and that subsequent elections of an editor or editors be made by the Conference, on the nomination of the Board of Managers, their salaries to be fixed by said Board of Managers; other employees to be employed by the board.

(5) We recommend that the paper be in charge of a Board of Managers, composed of four preachers and four laymen (which Board shall be trustees for the Conference), to be elected by the Conference on the nomination of this committee; subsequent elections by the Conference on nomination of the Board of Managers.

The Board of Managers to be as follows:

R. P. Lumpkin and J. P. Pettyjohn, to be elected for the term of five years.

R. H. Potts and C. E. Wilson, to be elected for the term of four years.

J. B. Winn and J. T. Catlin, for the term of three years.

T. A. Smoot and J. Lee Davis, for the term of two years.

At the expiration of their several terms, the Conference shall elect their successors for a term of five years; provide that in case of a vacancy for other cause than the expiration of a term, said vacancy shall be filled for the remainder of the term at the next session of the Conference, as hereinbefore provided.

(6) No editor or employee of the paper shall be eligible to membership on the board, and should any member thereof become either editor or employee, his membership shall cease with such employment and the Conference shall fill the vacancy.

(7) The Board shall have power to remove from office, at any time, the editor or editors or any other employee of the Board who may prove to be incompetent by virtue of any moral, mental or physical disability.

(8) The Board shall make a full report of its acts and the precise status, financial and otherwise, of the paper to each and every session of the Conference.

(9) The Board shall have power to enact for their own government, or for the best interest of the paper, any by-laws not in conflict with this paper.

(10) The Virginia Conference reserves the right to dissolve this Board and to inaugurate a different plan for the management of the paper, or to amend this plan, whenever, in its judgment, such a proceeding becomes necessary to the prosperity of the paper and the interest of the Church.

(11) The Board shall meet at such place as it sees fit as soon after the adjournment of Conference as practicable, but not later than January 1, 1919, for the purpose of organization and such other business as may be necessary. (Signed)

You will be proud of the fact that your institution was well represented in the camp, on the seas and in the trenches during the great world war. Some fifteen of our boys (a large majority of them volunteers) enlisted in one or other of the branches of the United States Government service. Most of these are now on their way home, or soon will be. But the name of one of them appears on the missing list, and his fate is yet unknown, while another, whose remains lie buried "somewhere in France," has joined the heroic band of those who laid down their lives for the cause of freedom and righteousness.

You will be glad to know that again we are able to present a clean bill of health. In this particular we have always been specially favored of God. During the late epidemic of influenza we took the precaution of closing our gates against visitors, and even the influenza respected the restrictions. None of our children were affected. During the whole five or six weeks, only one boy had a bad cold, which, however, was not of such a character as called for the services of the doctor.

In the summer we enjoyed the advantage of a series of religious services conducted by Rev. A. L. Franklin, and a number of children (new-comers) made profession of faith in Christ.

During the past twelve months we have been instrumental in restoring a number of families, which, without the advantage given by the orphanage, would necessarily have been scattered throughout the land.

During the same period also, we have sent out into the world a larger number of grown boys and girls than usual, all of them able to take care of themselves. Gratifying features in connection with our "ex"-boys and girls are the receipt from time to time of letters breathing gratitude for the benefits of the orphanage and frequent visits to their old home.

The typewriting and stenography department has turned out six girls this year, and the printing department, one boy.

The *Guardian*, under the able, voluntary editorship of Rev. Graham H. Lambeth, D. D., continues to be popular. The orphanage received a handsome profit from this monthly last year.

The printing department, which was made possible by a thousand-dollar gift from Court Street Church, whose membership has given us also an annual special of \$500 for the past two years, is doing good work and amply justifying our expectations. The orphanage treasury will be richer by over \$1,000 profits as a part of the result of this year's work.

The farm is doing about as well as usual.

Mrs. S. E. Sale, of Richmond, a tried and true friend of the orphanage

from its beginning, bequeathed us a house and lot on Church Hill, Richmond.

We have received from the executors of the late Mrs. Elizabeth Norman, of Norfolk, a legacy of \$5,000, and have been advised of three other legacies, one of \$2,000 and two of \$500 each, which our treasurer will receive in due course of time.

An attempt has been made to raise, by means of Liberty Bonds and War Savings Stamps, an endowment fund, but our success has been meager thus far, considering the worthiness of the object.

We have in hand Liberty Bonds amounting to \$850; War Savings Stamps, \$650, with several Liberty Bonds promised, but not yet turned over to us.

In spite of rigid economy, our expenses have increased over those last year. Our books show disbursements for the past twelve months amounting to \$29,882.12, exclusive of \$400 interest on money borrowed from the banks during the year.

Our receipts for support during the year amounted to \$35,124.88, exclusive of \$5,000 legacy, \$500 for printing plant and \$1,000 for endowment fund; a total of \$42,224.88.

We desire to place on record our most grateful thanks to the preachers and laymen, laywomen and children of our Conference and all others who, by their prayers and practical Christ-like regard for the helpless children under our care, have brought about so magnificent a result.

We respectfully request our Presiding Bishop to appoint A. B. Sharpe, superintendent of Virginia Conference Orphanage; John D. Hosier, assistant superintendent of Virginia Conference Orphanage; Rev. J. Wiley Bledsoe, field agent for the Board of Trustees.

We recommend that the editor of our Conference Annual be requested to arrange for a column in the 1918-1919 edition to be designated "Orphanage Special."

Whereas, the servant problem, the high cost of living and the apartment houses are making it more difficult each year to obtain entertainment in private homes, no matter how hospitable their owners may be; and

Whereas, it is becoming increasingly apparent that the Virginia Conference must make provision for its entertainment; therefore, be it

RESOLVED (1), That the Committee on Conference Entertainment be, and they are hereby, instructed to select hereafter for the sessions of Conference only those places that can furnish adequate hotel and boarding-house accommodation, and to provide for expenses of such entertainment by laying upon the Conference an assessment amounting to \$8,700.

(2) That we urge upon the charges that they pay the traveling expenses to and from Conference of their pastors.

(3) That these provisions shall not be understood as interfering with the hospitality of any person who may desire to entertain a member or members of the Conference.

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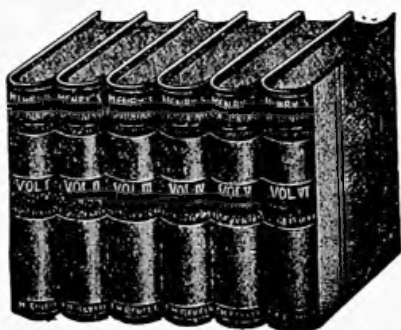
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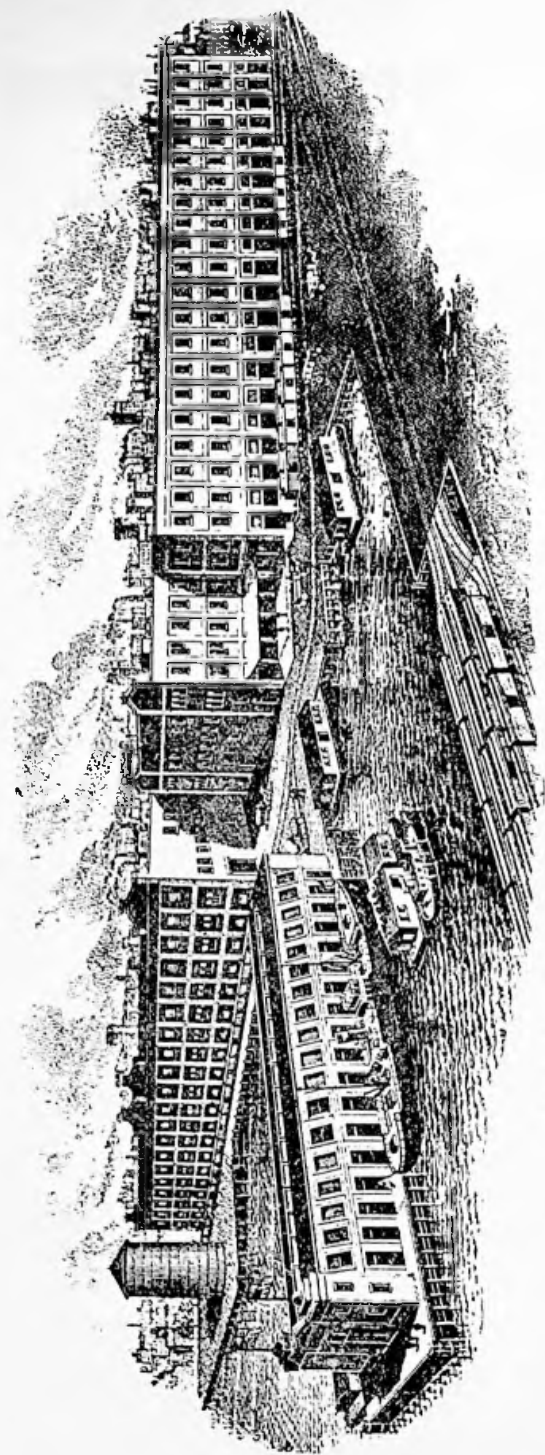
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
