

December, 1783. In conformity with this rule, the sessions of the Virginia, Annual Conferences are numbered from the meeting hold at Minson's, Brunawick County, Virginia, May, 1785. Since then sessions thereof have been held in regular succession, year after year, within the geographical limits assigned it by the General Conference of 1736, escept as to the years 1791 and 1341, when changes in the time of the year of the meeting of the Conference made is necessary to hold two essions in each of these calendar years, making one hundred and thirty-eight sessions in one hundred and thirtysity years.)

## JOURNAL OF PROCEEDINGS, 1920

## First Day

#### Thursday, November 4, 1920

R. Hendrix in the chair. Bishop James Cannon, Jr., also, was present.

Roll Call.—The Secretary of the last Conference, B. F. Lipscomb, called the roll of members of the Conference, and 200 clerical and forty-one lay members answered to their names.

**Organization.**—B. F. Lipscomb was elected Secretary of the Conference, and F. L. Wells and R. M. White, Assistant Secretaries.

Hour for Meeting.—The hours of the Conference were determined upon as follows: Convene at 9.30 a. m., and adjourn at 1.00 p. m.

Committee on Nomination.—On motion, J. E. Hearn, R. H. Marks and J. W. Gee were elected a committee to nominate the Committee on Conference Relations.

Distribution of Entertainment Funds.—In view of some disorder caused by the distribution of funds to cover cost of meals for the members of the Conference, it was voted to request the Conference Committee on Entertainment to provide a more adequate plan for future sessions of the Conference.

Committee on Memoirs.—On motion of J. T. Whitley, Geo. E. Booker, S. C. Hatcher and B. M. Beckham were appointed the Committee on Memoirs.

Communications Referred.—Communications were received and referred, as follows:

The devotional services were conducted by W. A. Christian.

Minutes of yesterday's session were read and approved.

Call of Roll again.-The roll of the Conference was again called, and the presence of additional members noted.

Suriday School and Missionary Secretaries Asked to Publish Reports.—A resolution was offered by L. G. Crutchfield, signed by himself and others, calling upon the Sunday School and Missionary Secretaries and Conference Evangelists to have inserted in the Conference Annual brief reports of their work. More Addresses in the Interest of the Educational Movement.—The program of the Educational Movement was continued with addresses by Dr. E. H. Rawlings, Secretary of Foreign Missions; Dr. W. J. Young, of Emory University; and Dr. R. H. Bennett, of the Life Service Department of the Educational Movement.

Adjournment.—The usual notices were then given, and after singing Doxology, the Conference adjourned with benediction by B. F. Lipscomb.

#### Friday, November 5, 1920

#### EVENING SESSION

**Opening.**—The Conference met in regular session at 8.00 p. m. with Bishop Hendrix in the chair. After singing "All Hail the Power of Jesus' Name," Bishop Hendrix led the Conference in prayer.

Address in the Interest of the Educational Movement by Bishop Cannon.—The educational program was continued with an address by Bishop James Cannon, Jr.

Board of Education, Report No. 1.—S. C. Hatcher submitted Report No. 1 from the Board of Education, which, on motion, was adopted. (See Appendix III.)

Stereoptican Views and Lecture thereon by R. H. Bennett.—A series of stereoptican views were then shown, together with a lecture of explanation by R. H. Bennett, setting forth the different educational institutions of the Church.

Adjournment.-The Conference then adjourned.

## Third Day

#### Saturday, November 6, 1920

**Opening.**—The Conference opened at 9.30 a. m. with Bishop E. R. Hendrix in the chair.

Devotional services were conducted by G. H. Lambeth.

Minutes of the yesterday afternoon and evening sessions were read and approved.

Report of Preachers' Relief Society.—J. T. Whitley submitted the report from the Preachers' Relief Society, and placed in nomination the following brethren as Directors of this Society, who were duly elected by the Conference, viz: J. C. Hour for Meeting of the Brotherhood.—On motion, Monday, 12.00 m. to 12.30 p. m., was fixed as period for recess in order to permit a meeting of the Conference Brotherhood. This action was then reconsidered and 11.00 to 11.30 a. m. Monday was made the time for meeting of the Brotherhood.

Preaching Appointments Announced.—II. C. Pfeiffer, Chairman of the Committee on Public Worship, read the appointments for preaching Sunday, and also submitted the following nominations for the next session: Opening sermon, J. T. Routten; Alternate, L. T. Williams.

Near East Relief.—H. C. Pfeiffer offered the following resolutions, which were adopted:

Resolved, First. In view of the fact that our fellow Christians of the Near East have suffered unspeakably at the hands of the Kurds and Turks;

Second. In view of the fact that there are 100,000 Christian Armenian girls and young women immured in Turkish harems;

Third. In view of the fact that there are 250,000 helpless little children, without food, shelter or hope, in these stricken countries; recognizing that our Master gave a large part of his time to physical ministry; therefore be it

Resolved, First. That we, the servants of Him who said "Inasmuch as ye have done it unto one of the least of these my brethren, ye have done it unto me" express our approval of the proposed campaign for funds to be devoted to the physical relief of said sufferers.

Second. That we, the Methodist ministers of the Virginia Conference, go on record as indorsing the work of Near East Relief as worthy of the generous support of Christian people.

Third. That we carry out the program outlined by the State Committee, namely: Giving one service to Near East Relief this year, at time suggested by said Committee.

Fourth. That we will commend the cause to the sympathetic co-operation of every organization in our churches.

Survey of Rural Church Situation.—Lee G. Crutchfield offered the following resolution which was adopted:

*Resolved*, That the Board of Missions of the Virginia Conference be requested to make a special survey of the rural church situation in this Conference, and to report its findings to the next session.

Resolved, First. That this Conference hereby place itself on record as earnestly discountenancing this failure of these brethren to do the work required by the Discipline;

Second. That the chairmen of these Committees be requested to communicate during the year with those who are to appear before these Committees at Conference, and to urge these brethren to have their courses of study completed for Conference; also that our Presiding Elders be requested to co-operate toward this end.

Third. That the Committees be, and they are hereby instructed, to accept no light excuses from undergraduates for failing to complete these required courses of study.

Agreement as to Order of Day.—By common consent it was agreed to rearrange the orders of the day for this morning's session, as follows: 11.00 a. m., Sunday School Report, and 12.00 m., Conference Brotherhood.

Characters of More Preachers Passed.—Minute Question No. 17: "Are all the preachers blameless in their life and official administration?"was again called. The names of the preachers on the Norfolk District were then called, and after reports had been made on their work, their characters were passed.

J. C. Reed Presides.-J. C. Reed was called to the chair by the presiding Bishop.

Sunday School Report.—J. P. Jones submitted report from the Sunday School Board. Addresses on the Sunday School work were made by H. L. Weston, J. C. Robertson and Miss Ethel Smither. J. P. Jones presented Third Rank Banner to Miss Smither, Conference Elementary Superintendent, to indicate the rank of our Conference in its elementary work.

Time Extended.—The time limit having expired, on motion, the time was extended to permit a further discussion of the Sunday School Report. J. W. Shackford addressed the Conference on the general training work of the Church. On further motion, the time limit for this report was limited to five minutes. J. H. Montgomery made a few remarks, and presented certificates covering reading courses taken by Sunday Schools of several charges in the Conference. The report was then adopted. (See Appendix III.)

Meeting of Brotherhood.—According to previous order, the Conference then took a recess for the meeting of the Conference Brotherhood.

Conference Reconvenes: Adjournment.—On completion of the Brotherhood business, J. C. Reed called the Conference again to order, and, on motion, the Conference adjourned with the benediction by J. C. Reed.

## Sixth Day

#### Tuesday, November 9, 1920

#### MORNING SESSION

Opening.—The Conference opened at 9.30 a. m., Bishop Hendrix in the chair.

Devotional services were conducted by S. J. Brown.

Minutes of yesterday's session were read and approved.

Correction of an Oversight.—In view of an oversight in failing to appoint a Committee on Memoirs, the Secretary was authorized to insert the names of this Committee in the minutes of the first day's session.

Report on Conference Relations Reconsidered.—On motion the report of the Committee on Conference Relations was reconsidered, and with the omission of the name of F. E. H. McLean from the list of supernumeraries, the report was then adopted.

Names Referred to Conference Relations Committee.—R. O. Payne, J. R. Sturgis, W. E. Grant, W. P. Province and W. E. Abernethy were referred to the Committee on Conference Relations for the superannuate relation.

Characters of More Preachers Passed.—Minute Question No. 17: "Are all the preachers blameless in their life and official administration?" was again called. The names of preachers on Petersburg, Portsmouth and Newport News, Rappahannock and Richmond Districts were called and reports on their work made, after which their characters were passed.

**Restoration of Credentials to Local Dencon.**—J. P. H. Crismond, local deacon, who had voluntarily surrendered his credentials, made application for their restoration, and on favorable recommendation in due form, the restoration was granted.

Another Admitted on Trial.—Minute Question No. 1: "Who are admitted on trial?" was again called, and John Rouzie Saunders, having passed the required examinations and being duly recommended, was admitted on trial into the traveling connection.

**Report of Lay Activities.**—T. S. Southgate read the report of the Board of Lay Activities, which was adopted. (See Appendix III.)

Education Report No. 2.—S. C. Hatcher submitted Report No. 2 from the Board of Education. An amendment to that report was offered by E. H. Rowe, calling for a special commission on spiritual education.

Order of Day Deferred.—The time having arrived, according to previous order, for consideration of the Epworth League Report, on motion, this order was deferred until the completion of the report from the Board of Education. On motion, the amendment offered by E. H. Rowe was laid on the table.

**D. R. Anderson Addresses Conference.**—D. R. Anderson, President Randolph-Macon Woman's College, was then introduced and addressed the body regarding the educational work of our Conference, after which, the Report of the Board of Education was adopted. (See Appendix III.)

# APPENDIX II.-MEMOIRS

## William P. Jordan

#### BY GEORGE E. BOOKER

The subject of this sketch was born in Sunsbury, Gates County, North Carolina, September 3, 1847. He was the son of the Rev. Costen Jordan of the same county, and Elizabeth Anne Pell of Edenton, North Carolina.

At the age of sixteen he was converted and connected himself with the Methodist Episcopal Church, South. In 1867 he was licensed to preach by the Rev. Henry B. Cowles and shortly thereafter was admitted on trial into the Virginia Annual Conference of which he remained a member for nearly fifty years.

In 1876 he was united in marriage with Miss Alice Moore of Sussex County, Virginia, whose fidelity and devotion to him and the Master's service was an abiding inspiration. Their union was blessed with two sons, Wallace Pell and Carl Moore, whose close and diligent application to their chosen pursuit has won for them a place among Norfolk's most esteemed and successful business men.

Brother Jordan's first appointment was Bertie Circuit where he served as Junior Preacher under the Rev. R. N. Crooks whose Apostolic spirit and unselfish devotion to duty made a deep and lasting impression upon the mind and heart of the young itinerant. In the course of his ministry he was assigned to many responsible fields of labor, and enjoyed that measure of success which comes from complete consecration and the exercise of indefatigable energy and peculiar gifts. He was twice stationed at Chase City, Virginia, where he was greatly

He was twice stationed at Chase City, Virginia, where he was greatly beloved not only by his own congregation but by all the denominations in the town.

The evidences of his pure and godly life among the people of that community abide to this day, and there are many who will always hold him in grateful and affectionate remembrance.

In November, 1899, after thirty years of uninterrupted and assiduous service, Brother Jordan found himself compelled to retire on account of failing health. He sought recuperation and rest and was considerably benefited as the years went on, but was never able to re-enter the itinerant ranks. Upon retirement he went to live with his sons in Park Place, Norfolk, and as soon as his health would allow he offered himself for service in the Park Place Methodist Church where he was elected teacher of a Bible class for men. As teacher of this class Brother Jordan found a sphere for the use of his pulpit powers which rest had renewed and quickened, and in this congenial realm he rendered some of his most effective service. He did not confine himself however to the work of teacher, but visited from house to house and carried words of counsel, cheer and sympathy to all with whom he was brought into association and contact. As a regular attendant upon the services of Park Place Church his pastors found in him a sympathetic and appreciative hearer as well as a sincere and faithful friend who was willing to co-operate with them in all their efforts to advance the Master's kingdom. In seeking to pay a tribute of deference and affection to the memory of our lamented brother it is indeed an easy and pleasing task, for his many noble qualities of mind and heart stand out conspicuously and challenge our admiration and gratitude.

By nature he was modest and retiring. He had no taste or desire for the brilliant realm, the lofty seat, the sensational arena or the pretentious congregation. He preferred to meet his tasks and responsibilities in the quiet and unobtrusive sphere where the applause of the multitude would not incite to egotism and vanity, and the criticism of an unfriendly world would not prove a source of opposition and discouragement. In anticipating the noble and exalted sentiment of Christina Rossetti he could have said to his Lord:

> "Give me the lowest place; not that I dare Ask for that lowest place; but Thou hast died That I might live and share Thy glory by Thy side. Give me the lowest place; or if for me, That lowest place too high, make one more low, Where I may sit and see my God and love Thee so."

In speaking of Brother Jordan's meek and quiet spirit I would not have you lose sight of the strong and vigorous elements of manhood for which he was distinguished. He possessed a moral courage which did not fail to assume any responsibility, a singleness of purpose which could not be deflected from the path of rectitude and an indomitable will which no obstacles could daunt. He manifested a lively interest in all matters of Church and State and whenever the opportunity presented itself he openly and aggressively identified himself with the cause of righteousness and truth, and declared his convictions in no uncertain terms.

Brother Jordan in early life acquired the habits and tastes of a student and throughout his entire career he sought that information and culture which he knew to be essential to the highest measure of success. His vivid imagination, retentive memory, superior judgment and sound practical sense served him well and contributed in no small degree to his efficiency and worth.

His ability and gifts as a preacher have been finely portrayed by Dr. J. J. Lafferty in the Virginia Conference sketches of 1891. As a preacher, his biographer declares: "He is a close student, a deep thinker and a fluent speaker. Being well versed in the Scriptures and deeply read in works of Methodist theology, his sermons often abound, not only in facts and figures which whirl like grape and canister, but in gems of thought like 'apples of gold in pictures of silver.' His illustrations are so original, striking and pertinent that they often appear to be 'polished after the similitude of a palace,' fitting in the body of the discourse like the stone blocks in the temple of Solomon. His deep earnestness and ardent spirit show plainly that there is a chain twisted about his own heart, while the other end of it is linked fast to the throne of God."

Several years ago it was my privilege to visit Scotland, the land of romance and story. In my desire to see its places of historic association and interest as well as its sacred and venerated shrines, I went to Melrose Abbey, still beautiful and glorious in its ruins. As I had intended, I reached this once splendid enthedral at the twilight hour when the queenly moon was throwing her silvery lustre upon the enchanted spot. As I stood there, filled with admiration and with reverence, I remembered that Sir Walter Scott had said:

> "If thou would view fair Melrose aright, Go visit it by the pale moonlight; For the gay beams of lightsome day, Gild but to flout the ruins gray."

So also it was true that to see our beloved friend and brother aright. one must visit him in the quiet precincts of his home where the soft light of domestic tranquillity and happiness revealed his true nature. It was there that I found him to be gentle and kind, sympathetic and affectionate, meditative and prayerful, and diffusing the fragrance of a pure and holy life.

His end came rather unexpectedly, but I am sure he was thoroughly prepared and ready for the summons. At midnight on December 5, 1919, he complained of a severe pain in the region of the heart, and before medical aid could be obtained, his spirit had winged its mystic flight to fairer worlds on high.

His funeral service was conducted from Park Place Methodist Church by the writer who was assisted in the service by the following ministers: Revs. J. T. Whitley, D.D., Frank L. Wells, D.D., John J. Bradford, and the Rev. Dr. Sparks W. Melton, pastor of the Freemason Street Baptist Church in this city. A large concourse of sorrowing friends was present to attest the love and esteem in which he was held. The remains were interred in beautiful Forest Lawn Cemetery to await the trumpet of the Archangel, and the Master's call to the largest and fullest reward.

> "There sweet be thy rest, till He bid thee arise, To hail Him in triumph, descending the skies.'

### William R. Proctor

William R. Proctor, the son of Rev. J. H. Proctor, an honored and glorified member of this Conference, was born September 9, 1867, and died at Asheville, N. C., April 22, 1920.

A purer or more stainless soul it has never been my privilege to know.

"He had a principle within

Of jealous, Godly fear, A sensibility of sin,

A pain to feel it near."

He was not capable of doing anything that was small or selfish or mean. Even deeds that were regarded by others as being justifiable or excusable, he could not get the consent of his conscience to perform, and his conscience, enlightened and ennobled by the Spirit of God, was his guide, and he never swerved a hair's breadth from the path it marked out for him to tread. I do not for a moment doubt that there was ever any other thought in his mind than this: "I have kept the faith."

Early in his life as an itinerant preacher, his father died, leaving the widowed mother and younger sisters to his care; a trust that he regarded as sacred and holy, and one that he cherished with the utmost fidelity until he saw the mortal remains of every member of his family laid beneath the sod. Nothing more beautiful in the way of unselfish filial devotion has ever come under my observation than his love for his mother. She took the place of friend, lover, sweetheart, wife, in his heart, and he never married, but poured out all the wealth of his heart's devotion upon his mother, until in age and feebleness extreme she passed to her reward. But as long as she lived, he supplied her every need, he cheered her hours of loneliness, he watched over her as tenderly and lovingly as ever she watched over him when he was a helpless babe.

He was a most excellent preacher, and was appointed to a number of stations in towns and cities, never, I think, having served on a rural charge. He had a large and well selected library, and prepared his sermons with care and conscience, and brought into his pulpit the "beaten

oil of the sanctuary." The hungry sheep who looked up to him as a shepherd were always fed, and went away from the places where he preached the Gospel stronger and better because they had heard him preach.

Until his failing health made it impossible, he was also a diligent and faithful pastor, and carried the aroma of a holy life, and yet a cheerful one, into the homes of the members of his congregation.

Few men I have known have had that winsomeness of manner, and personal magnetism, which, coupled with his singular purity of soul, served to awaken the undying love and loyalty of all who knew him. His last appointment was in the town of Martinsville, where his life was as ointment poured forth, and where he was admired and loved by people of every church in the town, and by those not members of any church. His congregation regularly paid his salary in full for months after he gave up his work, and this they kept up to the day of his death, and counted it a privilege.

He was in much doubt at the last session of this Conference as to the wisdom of taking an appointment, but finally yielded to the entreaties of his people and was returned to Martinsville for his third year. Very soon after Conference, however, his health, already seriously impaired, began rapidly to fail, and he sought the advice of the best medical skill, and was sent to Asheville, N. C., with the hope that the climatic conditions there might stay the progress of his disease. But God willed it otherwise. He took his bed as soon as he went there, and never left it until God took him home to rest. With the exception of an occasional visit from the laymen of his congregation, he was in the midst of strangers, and had no familiar face in which to look, but he was faithful unto death. Almost the last message that came from his dying bed was that which he committed to one of the members of his church: "Tell my people that the truths of the Gospel I have preached to them are my all-sufficiency in this hour, and I need and care for nothing more."

A number of the laymen of his church took his mortal remains to Petersburg, Va., where they were laid to rest by the side of those of his loved ones in old Blandford Cemetery to await the resurrection of the just, but Proctor, my college-mate, my contemporary in the ministry, my fellowworker for Ferrum School, my friend and brother, went home to be with God for all eternity.

## Charles Henry Boggs

At three o'clock on the morning of June 6, 1920, in his home at Highland Park, after an illness of three weeks, the soul of Charles Henry Boggs separated from its vesture of clay, and joined the company of apostles, martyrs and just men made perfect. Thus passed from earth one of the noblest and best men that ever adorned the doctrine of Christ. He was born in the town of Greencastle, Pa., December 27, 1830. His

He was born in the town of Greencastle, Pa., December 27, 1830. His father was Dr. John Boggs, a physician, a man widely known and loved for his intellectual and moral worth; his mother, Isabelle Craig Allison, a woman of great strength and beauty of character.

His early education was received in his native town, and when sufficiently advanced, he was sent to West Jersey Collegiate School. On finishing the course there, he entered Pennsylvania College, and afterward came to Manchester, Va., where his brother, Rev. Frank J. Boggs, of sainted memory, was stationed. In accordance with the expressed wish of his father, he commenced the study of medicine, reading in the office of Dr. William R. Weisiger. Soon after this, the church and community were stirred with a great religious awakening, and he was among the number who entered upon a new life. With his conversion, came the unescapable conviction that he must preach, so he abandoned the study of medicine, and at the age of eighteen, began to qualify himself for the ministry. He was directed in his studies by his brother, Dr. Nelson Head, and Rev. G. W. Langhorne.

In 1851, the quarterly Conference of High Street, Petersburg, licensed him to preach, and that fall he was admitted on trial in the Virginia Conference at Alexandria, Va., and was sent to Lexington Circuit. Appo-mattox was his next field, then Goochland, and then King William. Here he married Miss Octavia Campbell, of Westmoreland County, Virginia, a woman of unusual intellect and Christian character, and while reared in an atmosphere of wealth and culture, she entered into the life of an itinerant with such complete consecration that her long life was a benediction to her husband, her children and the community in which they resided. In 1857 he transferred to the Western Virginia Conference and traveled Monroe Circuit one year.

Then came the war, and contrary to the wishes and importunities of friends and kindred in the North, he cast his lot with the South, and was commissioned Chaplain in the Ninth Virginia Cavalry, serving faithfully until the close of the war, when he located on his farm in King William, where he preached every Sabbath, and gave a home to the ministers placed in charge of King William.

In 1879 he moved to Missouri, connecting himself with the South Missouri Conference, and four years later he returned to the Virginia Conference and was stationed on Buckingham Circuit. Afterward he served Cumberland, Sussex, Cartersville, Hanover, Bowling Green, Greene, Batesville, Norfolk Circuit, and Highland Park, his last charge. At the Conference of 1898 he asked for superannuation and continued to live at Highland Park until God took him home.

Brother Boggs' home was a miniature of Heaven. He commanded his household after him, but his sceptre was a rod of love. His children have honored him by leading useful and consecrated lives. One of his daughters, Mrs. Thomas Flippen, is an elect lady in our Church; Miss Elizabeth has lived with and cared for him in his declining years with a devotion that passes description; his son, Rev. W. G. Boggs, is an honored and beloved member of this Conference.

Brother Boggs lived a long and useful life, without spot or blemish and full of "The beauty of the Lord," a Christian gentleman by inheritance and culture; he lived among us after the fashion of the highest ideals of manhood-courteous, modest, refined in every feeling, and gentle in every expression of his personality.

As a pastor, he gave his life to the flock over which the Conference appointed him shepherd, entering like a beam of sunshine in homes and hearts, advising and counseling, comforting and consoling all who needed his kindly ministration. He was so human that to him the little children could tell their secrets and make him their companion; young men took him into their confidence and poured out the secrets of their failures and their triumphs; busy men of affairs discussed their problems, and the old and troubled sought of him comfort and strength. Goldsmith's description of the Village Pastor was fulfilled in the life of this under-shepherd :

"---In his duty prompt to every call. He watched and wept, he prayed and felt for all,

And as a bird each fond endearment tries

To tempt its new-fledged offspring to the skies,

He tried each art, reproved each dull delay,

Allured to brighter worlds, and led the way."

Brother Boggs was of the type of men who made the Methodist ministry a great power in this country. Preaching was his master passion, and

the Cross of Christ his master message. So faithfully, so clearly and so earnestly did he present the claims of the Gospel that in every pastorate the life of the church was deepened and quickened, and multitudes were brought to know Christ in the pardon of their sins. He was so zealous in telling the story of the Savior's love that (though he served charges for the most part with too many organized churches for the strength of an ordinary man) he literally carried the Gospel to all the people by seeking all possible places to preach where men could be reached. While stationed on Cumberland Circuit, he conducted a great revival at Oak Forest in the school-house reaching alike the old and young, and it was in this meeting that the writer first saw the Savior. He saw Him in all His tenderness. in all His agony, in all His love for sinners, he saw Him in the face of Brother Boggs, and as he bade him, he came and bowed at His feet, and felt the cleansing of the precious blood and received peace. Brother Boggs' hand was gently laid on his head that night in benediction and often in the heat and stress of life, when tempted and tried, has he felt it since. Oh, the multitudes that could testify to his ministry of helpfulness!

"The path of the just is as a shining light that shineth more and more unto the perfect day." The crowning years of our brother's life were the years that we sometimes think of as the years of retirement, the years in which we cannot work. Brother Boggs did not travel during the last nineteen years of his life. He was in the superannuate relation, but he wrought as a master workman and built into the community in which he lived the ideals that make earth like Heaven. This aged man of medium height, compactly built, with dark blue eyes, snowy white head and beard, leaning on his long staff, with which he always walked, was known and loved by every citizen, irrespective of race or condition. He watched for the new-comers, and was the first to make them welcome; he sought out the poor, carrying to them substantial relief; he went into the homes of mourning, giving beauty for ashes, and whether in their joys or sorrows, the man that was always sought for was Brother Boggs, the Community Pastor. When on June, the 6th, it was known that "he was not, for God had taken him," a shadow fell on Highland Park, deeper perhaps than any shadow that had ever been cast on that community, and the people mourned, for their friend was gone. They bore his body to the church that he had served for many years, where a sweet, touching service was conducted by Rev. L. T. Williams, assisted by Rev. C. O. Tuttle, Rev. D. T. Merritt and Rev. Roscoe M. White. The Bible class, one hundred strong, which he had taught, acted as honorary pall-bearers, and his body was laid to rest in beautiful Hollywood.

"Were everyone to whom in life he'd done an act of loving favor to bring today a bud to put upon his grave, he'd sweetly rest beneath a wilderness of roses." But—

"He needs no wreath or marble sheen To keep his blessed memory green; In hearts that love and trust, 'twill bide, Until time's latest eventide."

## John W. Eure

Rev. John Walter Eure was born in Gates County, North Carolina, November 25, 1859. He was the son of Henry Thomas and Ava Miranda Eure.

He made a profession of religion in the eighteenth year of his age and united with the Methodist Episcopal Church, South. At the age of twentyfour, he became agitated on the subject of a call to the ministry. He was convinced that it was his duty to preach, but he was cognizant of his limitations, his meagre educational qualifications and of the time he must necessarily spend in preparation and training. These things caused him to hesitate and reflect, but the hesitation was only for a brief period, for with that invincible determination for which he was ever distinguished, he surmounted all barriers and went forth to realize his ideals and to accomplish his purposes.

In a short while he entered Randolph-Macon College, where he prosecuted his studies with fidelity and diligence, and from which in 1900 he graduated with the degree of Bachelor of Arts.

It was during his career at college that I first met Mr. Eure, and from that time to the day of his death we were close and intimate friends. Indeed he was the friend of all the students with whom he was associated. There was something about him that challenged admiration and invited confidence. To know him was to love him, and so fond of him did we all become that we addressed him affectionately by his christian name, which is quite unusual among college students. John Eure was a name as familiar as a household word, and one that commanded universal respect and esteem. His influence among the student body was of the most exalted type, and many a fellow student will remember him as the one who introduced him to his Savior and Lord.

Mr. Eure was not only a true and loyal friend, but he was one of the most perfect gentlemen I ever met. His cordial spirit, inherent civility and polished manners, made him a welcome guest in any home. He charmed childhood by his playfulness, won the esteem of the gentler sex by his genuine deference and chivalrous courtesy, and men of every class and condition in life acknowledged and admired his courage, his nobility, his sincerity and his magnanimity. In 1902 he entered the Virginia Conference, and was assigned to

In 1902 he entered the Virginia Conference, and was assigned to Matoaca, where he remained four years. His work there was not confined to his own church and congregation, but extended to the whole community. So great was his interest in the young people who were so situated that they could not attend the public schools that he established for them a night school and instructed them in the ordinary branches of an English education. In addition to this, he provided the means by which others were permitted to attend college. He had the spirit of a philanthropist and if he was less useful than many with whose benevolent and charitable deeds we are quite familiar, it must be attributed to his restricted opportunities and limited means.

For two years, Mr. Eure was agent for the Baltimore and Richmond *Christian Advocate*, and representative of the Randolph-Macon Alumni Fund. These two positions he filled at one and the same time with marked success.

On October 14, 1908, he was united in marriage with Miss Addie Taylor daughter of the Rev. T. J. Taylor, of precious memory, a young lady of splendid attainments and charming personality. They seemed essential to each other in that they combined and supplied the qualities which were needed for their complete happiness and success. To them might be fittingly applied Shakespeare's apostrophe, to a typical union:

"Himself half part of a blessed man,

Left to be finished by such as she;

And she a fair divided excellence,

Whose fullness of perfection is in him;

Ah I two such silvered currents when they join

Do glorify the banks that bound them in."

In the providence of God they were blessed with three children, Elizabeth Campbell, Margaret Lee and John Walter, Junior. These children, sweet, lovable and attractive, brought glad sunshine to their hearts and new happiness to their home. At the Conference of 1908, Mr. Eure was appointed to the East Dinwiddle Circuit. From the time he arrived to the day of his departure his ministry was abundant in labors. Every church felt the impetus of the forward movement which he launched, and responded in a splendid way to his carnest and irresistible appeals. The new church at Carson, Va., is a monument to his consecrated energy and zeal.

From East Dinwiddie he was sent to Denny Street, Richmond, where he had a host of friends and did a most excellent work. Here, too, he was instrumental in crecting a beautiful and attractive church edifice, which is an ornament to that section of the city and a credit to the denomination it represents.

After spending perhaps the most successful quadrenium of his ministry at Denny Street, Brother Eure was read out for Madison Heights, where he spent three years. Here he found many obstacles to development and progress, but with that genius for overcoming difficulties which always characterized him, he threw himself unreservedly into his work and saw unnistakable evidences of brighter and better things. His ministry among the children of that charge was crowned with remarkable success. As a speaker to children he had peculiar gifts and knew instinctively how to arrest their attention and to win their affections. It was this coveted and happy faculty which made him instrumental in leading so many of them to Him who said, "Suffer the little children to come unto me, and forbid them not, for of such is the kingdom of Heaven."

At the last session of our Conference, Mr. Eure was announced as Industrial Secretary of the Central Y. M. C. A. in the city of Norfolk. It was there that death found him engaged in his loved employ but ready for the summons to higher labors and grander rewards.

In my efforts to mention the excellencies and graces which Mr. Eure possessed, I shall not indulge in any encomium or endeavor to pronounce any eulogy. In all my ministry I have never known an individual who deserved a eulogy more, but who needed one less. His character, which was as transparent as a crystal streamlet, was one of rare symmetry. In the sunshine of happiness and in the shadow of sorrow, when elated by triumph and oppressed by defeat, when criticized and when commended, in the vigor of health or in the agony of disease, he always presented a perfect model of pure, noble and lofty manhood.

He was singularly free from those petty jealousies and prejudices which characterize the man of small calibre and which soil and degrade the soul. His interest in and love for his fellowmen was true and genuine. He had a conscience void of offense toward God and toward man. I can truly say of him what the poet has said of the Eastern maiden:

> "A spirit as pure as hers Is always pure, even when it errs, As sunshine broken in the rill, Though turned astray is sunshine still."

As a preacher, Mr. Eure was earnest and faithful, determined to sacrifice nothing for public favor, to shun no duty, to shrink from no responsibility, and to declare the whole counsel of God. His tender and touching appeals in evangelistic services, seconded by the influence of the Holy Spirit, not infrequently found a ready and hearty response. Unlike many ministers of today, he did not need an evangelistic singer, or a professional chorister to conduct his services of song. He was himself a gitted singer, with deep, rich voice, full of tenderness and pathos, and often reached many whose stoical attitude rendered them insensible to the most eloquent pulpit appeals.

As a pastor he was systematic and diligent. He visited from house to house, cared for the sick and needy, and manifested a special interest in the neglected, the abandoned and the unfortunate. "The short and simple annals of the poor" ever found his ear attentive. Their early traditions, their homely thoughts, and their sturdy sentiments he appreciated and cherished. In all his intercourse with them he was considerate, gentle and sympathetic. If he found in his congregation or even in the community in which he lived a person suffering from some lingering and wasting disease, he immediately went to work to provide the means and measures of relief. Many victims of pulmonary tuberculosis and other dread maladies have found their way to the sanitarium through his influence and instrumentality. Kind words, generous deeds and genial smiles marked the sunshine of his everyday life. So devoted was he to the welfare of his fellowman that he frequently sacrificed ense and comfort for their sake. One had only to enter his great heart and to dwell amid his affections to know the wealth of his strong and noble nature. He was one of the most unselfish men that I ever knew. It was as true of him as it was of the one of whom it was originally spoken, that:

"Love took up the harp of life, and smote on all the chords with might,

Smote the chord of self, which trembling passed in music out of sight." To adequately estimate the life and labors of our lamented friend and brother is indeed an impossible task. It will take the light of Eternity to reveal all that he accomplished.

The illness which resulted in his death covered only a few short weeks. He hoped to recover for the sake of his work and his loved ones, but he was thoroughly resigned.

Among the uncrowned knights who sacrificed themselves to make the world safe for Democracy, was Lieutenant Kenneth Garnett. He made an exceptional record in school and university, being at once a brilliant scholar and a splendid athlete. He went forth to stem the bloody tide which rolled in from the bloody Rhine. As he led his men forth one beautiful September morning, he realized that his gas mask was not working. Knowing that death or paralysis awaited him, he cried out: "Trust in Jesus, men, it is an easy way to die." So implicit and so complete was our brother's trust in Jesus that when Death came he greeted him as a friendly messenger and accompanied him with expectant heart and triumphant soul to our Father's house of many mansions. To such as he was—

"There is no death;

What seems so is 'transition; This life of mortal breath, Is but the suburb of the life elysian, Whose portal we call death."

## Henry Edward Johnson, D.D.

On the fly leaf of his Bible, interlined with interpretative suggestions, is found the birth date of Henry Edward Johnson, March 27, 1837. Thus began in the county of Cork, Ireland, a life which for its usefulness, originality, versatility and virility has had few peers. When he was three years old, his parents came to Virginia, where he grew up on a farm. His early education was very limited, only one-hall day in his youth was spent in the school room. At the age of seventeen, he was converted in Clay Street Chapel, Richmond, Va., and united with the Methodist Church. In 1857 he entered the Virginia Conference in the class with Drs. Lafferty, Lambeth, Sledd and others. In 1866, being stationed within the territory ceded to the Baltimore Conference, he accepted a transfer to that body, and some years later, desiring to avail himself of the educational facilities afforded by a permanent residence in Baltimore, he took charge of an independent Methodist church in that city, where he spent twelve years. At the end of that time, having accomplished his purpose, and wishing to re-enter the itinerant work, he visited his old Conference, but found it so crowded that he did not apply. He continued his work in Baltimore for two years longer, and then, on the invitation of several prominent ministers of the M. E. Church, he entered the Eric Conference, and was for six years stationed in Pennsylvania. Here the health of his wife failed, and her physicians advised an immediate return to a milder climate. He came back to the birth-place of his devoted wife, but she lived only a few months. A chapter could be written on his heroic struggle to provide the comforts and treatment she needed in those months. He spent his days cutting wood and his nights in bringing it to Richmond to secure from its sale medicine and nourishment for her whom he loved with all the passion of his strong nature.

Dr. Johnson was re-admitted to the Virginia Conference at the session held at Norfolk, 1802, and he continued to his death to be a loyal, masterworkman in our midst, filling important appointments in Richmond, Norfolk, Suffolk and Charlottesville. At the session of the Conference held in Richmond last year, completely broken in health, as his brethren thought, he still pleaded for an appointment, and was assigned to Hopewell and City Point, but he soon had to retire to Crozet, where he had served two successful pastorates. Here during the last months of his life, he spent his waking hours in study, working to the very last weeks of his earthly sojourn. On September 23, 1020, this busy, tired man fell asleep, and on Sunday afternoon, September 26th, the writer, assisted by Dr. B. F. Lipscomb, conducted the funeral services in the town of his adoption, attended by a large concourse of sorrowing friends. A prominent lawyer, who had traveled a long distance to be present at the service, said that one text fitted the occasion, "A prince and a great man has fallen."

Dr. Johnson was thrice married, his first wife was Miss Mattie J. Cooke, of Chesterfield: afterward he was married to Mrs. Mary D. Farish of Powhatan, and his last marriage was to Miss Kate R. Wayland of Crozet, who survives him.

The accomplishments of the eighty-four years of his life were marvellous. As a builder, he erected thirty-two churches and parsonages; as a pastor, he gave minute and detailed attention to every department of his work, visiting from house to house, instructing children, counseling the youth, and comforting the aged and infirm. As a student, he mastered his mother tongue, all branches of theology, was well versed in literature and kept abreast of modern thought. As a preacher, he had no superior and few equals in our Conference. The arrangement of his sermons was orderly and elimatic; the style clear and appealing, his illustrations fresh and illuminating, his appeals irresistible. He never triffed with small issues, but gave all his powers to unfolding the great themes of the Gospel. He was a doctrinal preacher, and put the old truths of the Gospel in such clear light that they blazed in on the soul of his hearers. He was a revivalist, avoiding all clap-trap and sensationalism, depending on the truth when clearly presented to convince the intellect, stir the emotion and move the will, and with this mighty weapon, thousands of sinners were driven to the foot of the Cross and brought into the Kingdom. Dr. Johnson was a man of uncompromising convictions. He never trimmed on any question, nor had any reservations. Those who dealt

Dr Johnson was a man of uncompromising convictions. He never trimmed on any question, nor had any reservations. Those who dealt with him knew where he stood. He never took counsel of the winds, but threw his life with all of its power into any cause that he thought to be right. This strong characteristic won for him the admiration of all who knew him as"One who never turned his back but marched breast forward, Never doubted clouds would break,

Never dreamed, though right were worsted, wrong would triumph, Held we fall to rise, are baffled to fight better, sleep to wake."

While he did many things, a resume of his life will show that all that he did was auxiliary to his Master's business. His recreation was found in physical work and business, and from building a house to planning a corporation, he had few superiors. Every dollar accumulated by this useful man was used for the promotion of the cause of the Kingdom. Education, church extension, and young ministers seeking an education were the recipients of his liberality. Almost the last act of his life was to pen the following note to the writer, which is prized above jewels, as it shows the spirit of the man: "I promised to help young—again this session. Place to his credit S—. I expect to leave in a few hours. I want you to serve at my funeral. Jesus was never more precious. Lovingly, H. E. Johnson."

Truly, "A prince and a great man has fallen." It is well for us to stop and pay a tribute to his genius, ability and consecration. Many of his sons in the ministry will miss him. May they honor him by imitating his splendid virtues.

# APPENDIX III—REPORTS

## Board of Missions

## Report No. 1

Your Conference Board of Missions has entered into hearty co-operation with the Centenary Commission in the proposed study and development of the rural churches.

During the past several months, Dr. R. H. Ruff, working under direction of the Commission, has been making surveys of selected circuits within the bounds of the Virginia Conference, with the understanding that two or three circuits would be chosen, to be known, for the want of a better term, as Demonstration Stations in Rural Church Work.

With the consent of the Presiding Elders of the two districts, and with the consent of the charges involved, the Board of Missions has decided to undertake this work immediately in Albemarle Circuit, on the Charlottesville District, and in Mathews Circuit, on the Rappahannock District.

We respectfully request the presiding Bishop to appoint Boyd E. Hudson to the Albemarle Circuit and J. M. Kline to the Mathews Circuit.

A Committee has been appointed by the Board of Missions to make a study of this rural church program as related to the mountain section of our Conference, and to present to the Board at its mid-year session, or to the Executive Committee of the Board at some other time, its findings concerning the possibilities of Patrick County as a field for a demonstration station.

## Report No. 2

It must be evident to all that we face nothing less than a new Church and a new world. It is but expressing a truism when we say that the whole world presents new conditions and is entering upon a new era, the final goal of which no prophet can forecast. It is equally true that the Christian Church has been shocked out of its traditional routine and lifted to a higher vision and a more daring conception of its mission and responsibility. To ignore these facts is to miss the significance of the hour and squander its opportunity.

The Centenary is an outstanding factor in the statement just made. It interpreted and forecast the new awakening and broader vision of the

Church by its spirit and results. Grateful as we must be for that which has been accomplished, we would be false to the true meaning if we should allow ourselves to be lulled into satisfaction and fail of its higher purpose and possibilities by even a temporary slackening of our energies. The Centenary should be to us not a foreground of fulfilled ideals, but a background against which to project the larger and more enduring plans of a Church which has come to a new self-realization in this world's greatest hour of need.

(1) We call attention especially to the opening of the new mission fields in Europe—Belgium, Poland and Czecho-Slovakia. The opening in the Slav World is the outstanding opportunity for religious service in Europe. Czecho-Slovakia seems to present the open door to the entire Slav World in a religious program. The unusual results of the first year's work in Europe ought to prove an inspiration to our entire Church.

(2) In all our mission fields, in the Orient and in Latin-America, the enlargement of buildings and the building of new plants, churches, schools and hospitals has given heart to our workers and increased immensely our facilities for service. In addition to the enlargement of the equipment, we have now rounded out the one hundred additional missionaries which the Centenary planned to send this year throughout the bounds of our mission fields. The Centenary has lifted the morale of our entire mission force.

(3) In the home field the Centenary has enabled us both in city and country to undertake something of an adequate program to meet conditions as they are today. We call attention especially to the definite undertaking for rural work. The future of our Church depends upon the efficiency with which we are able to carry on our work in the rural territory. We have therefore brought in men who have special training to gather the data and to help us plan a program that will meet the rural conditions of church work. This special program for the rural church is meeting with the heartiest commendation of our leaders everywhere.

(4) We cannot undertake in a brief report, such as we must submit, to give full account of the spiritual values which have come to the Church, and through our Church to many other Protestant Churches in the ongoing of the Centenary program. We call attention to the report which will be attached, giving the results of the year's work in the bounds of the Virginia Conference as to conversions, family altars and stewardship, and those who have offered themselves for life service. The evangelistic program which was carried on across our entire Church, under God, has brought wonderful blessings to our people, and many have come into the Church through profession of faith. In all probability, this year will show the largest increase of membership with which we have been blessed in many years.

(5) In order to carry on the vast program of the Centenary in the foreign field and in the home field as set forth in the askings, it will be essential to collect 1,000,000 subscriptions which were made in the financial drive. The entire undertaking of enlarged work is based upon the pledges that have been made. We are therefore asking that this Conference, along with the other Conferences of our Church, shall unite in a continued and systematic way to collect every pledge which was made in every church in the bounds of this Conference.

(6) We shall request the Conference to fix a certain week, as has been done in all of the Conferences held up to this time, which shall be known as Collection Week throughout the bounds of this Conference, when by special plans we shall undertake to complete the collection in every church in every charge of two (2) full payments of every pledge that has been made. It is essential in order to meet all of the askings of the Centenary to collect and have in hand by the 1st of January forty per cent. (40%) of the entire amount subscribed. May we therefore ask that our Conference, which has so magnificently responded to the entire program of the Centenary, carry on until we have completed successfully every item for which we are responsible in this vast undertaking.

The Board of Missions hereby transmits to the Conference the report of Mr. T. S. Southgate, who has served faithfully and successfully as Director of Evangelism, according to the standard plan for following up the Centenary program:

Early in the year the ten Presiding Elders, with the ten District Lay Leaders as associates, were asked to serve as District Directors, which request was promptly and cordially acceded to.

## Board of Lay Activity

If men are to allow themselves to be affected and influenced solely by local environment and circumstance, rest assured there will be no difficulty in finding enough to make pessimists of us all; but, to the contrary, in a militant, heroic day like the present, there are unmistakable evidences all about us that reveal to our hearts and consciousness the fact that God reigns, and is leading His Church step by step and day by day.

We believe the effort of twelve years past to develop Lay Activity among men and women was Providential and intended largely to assist in helping the Church to meet crises then unborn, such, for instance, as the present state of our national and international life.

Beginning with 1918 the world has been and is today insistently declaring that the Church alone is the only medium capable of saving a sorely stricken world. The only organization whose ideals, purposes and teachings are of sufficient power and strength to kindle again the spark of hope in the breasts of those who are surrounded by hopelessness and despair, and make possible their reconstruction here and their eternal safety hereafter.

While all this is true, there comes continuously the vital accompanying question: Is the Church equal to the task; is the Church sufficiently stirred to accept this solemn responsibility before unrealized, at least in any such manner as at present so insistently apparent?

Thank God for one answer already made and given back to the world, viz: the offering of the great Centenary and all involved therein. This movement, born of God for another purpose, but snatched by Him and vitalized into a living, pulsating answer—an answer which today is evidenced in the actual sending of hundreds of men and women to all countries to carry this message of hope and of redemption to those who are overwhelmed with despair.

Indeed, it was the aggressive leadership of your Church, the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, which blazed out the way and dared to give the world the assurance that it could be done, which assurance radiated inspiration to all the Evangelical faiths, sufficient to inspire them to do likewise, until today your \$50,000,000 has grown to \$750,000,000, thus at least making the answer of the Church to the world, in fact at least, a respectable and assuring one.

Thus it must be said that this, the greatest single financial undertaking of the Church was endorsed and launched under the auspices of the Laymen's Movement, and would hardly have been carried to the successful conclusion which we can record today except as a result of the development of the business layman who was charged with so large a part of the actual solicitation, always by and with the sympathy, help, and leadership of the faithful ministry.

At this point it seems fitting to inform the Conference the exact record of the Centenary payments to date, as follows:

Thus it will be seen as result of constant agitation, organized effort. and loyal support of a majority of pastors, it is demonstrated that our people meant exactly what they said and did when promising to support to the end this, the greatest single undertaking of our Church. May we all be faithful to the last dollar.

As to the future, your Board records the following observations and recommendations for submission, and it is hoped for adoption by the Conference:

(1) Industrious, constant, and faithful follow-up work on the part of pastors and laymen in the matter of the third quota of Centenary payments, that there may be truly "no shrinkage but an increase." (2) That we endorse the great educational program for our Church as

outlined, and pledge our support and co-operation when it is considered by the General Commission safe and conservative to launch same.

(3) Efficiency and earnestness of purpose must be the motto of the Church now in this new day of responsibility; and, to that end, we urge with all possible emphasis that every charge fix as its minimum ideal for the coming year the four great points of 100 per cent Efficiency, which we have for years been stressing, viz:

 (a) More adequate ministerial support.
 (b) Payments of all assessments in full, with no compromise of the Lord's debts.

(c) The elimination of Mission Board support.
 (d) A broader conception of the missionary obligation.

(4) We plead for cordial co-operation and energized support on the part of all pastors and laymen; the elimination of factionalism, believing that the responsibilities of the hour cry out for a united heart and hand as we face the duties and obligations of the future.

(5) Your Board rejoices in the splendid results achieved by our pastors and elders in the special evangelistical work of the year and the small part the Lay Organization was permitted to have in same-a detailed report of which is made in a separate paper.

(6) Our conviction is strong that one of the vital needs of the Church today is co-ordinated organization; we believe in it; no great corporation can succeed without it; we plead for more co-operative team work. We believe in our Connectional Leaders and endorse their active and able administration of the foreign policies and undertakings in behalf of the new work so recently inaugurated in Europe.

(7) We hereby acknowledge the faithful and efficient work of the Minute Men of our Conference; their aid in behalf of the Centenary and, since, in assisting in collections, has been invaluable. We endorse and commend the untiring efforts of their leader, J. F. Rawls, in the organization work which he has so well done.

(8) It is clearly evident that everything is inadequate to save the world from its impending disaster, save the Gospel applied to every department of life. The Army of the Sword has done its part toward freeing the nations of the world from some of its material bondage; but its most galling shackles can only be broken by the Army of the Cross.

Ours is a glorious Cause; one worth dying for-better still, worth living for. Let us carry our broadened visions and glowing hearts back to our spheres of labor, determined that we shall do our part of the task in the bringing in of the Kingdom of God in its fullness.

## Board of Church Extension

We are quite sure that never before in the history of the Virginia Conference was there so much activity in the construction of churches and parsonages, as is going on at the present time. Your Board reviewed with gratitude to Almighty God and delight in our own hearts the increased interest of our people in this very important department of our Church Work. Larger and better temples of worship are being erected and dedicated to Him, who gave Himself for man. More comfortable homes are being provided for the ministers and their families and to this noble work the laymen are giving their thought and sacrifices as never before.

There were twenty-one applications for donations and loans from churches and four from parsonages, representing in the aggregate \$68,-550, but infinitely more significant is the fact that these same applications represent an investment for churches and parsonages amounting to \$268,520.00, and this from the most needy section of our Conference. This does not include the larger and independent church building enterprises, such as is being projected in Norfolk, Richmond, Petersburg, Charlottesville and other places, which we are sure would run the sum total of church activities to an amount exceeding \$1,000,000.

Pitiable indeed appears the small amount placed at our disposal for these most needy places. We regret our inability to meet every demand

and contribute the full amounts requested, but the impossibility is apparent. We present the following financial table:

## Board of Education

## Report No. 1

I. WHEREAS, the General Conference in its prophetic consideration of the two great responsibilities of the Church recommended that there be two Church-wide movements in the present quadrennium, one for missions and one for Christian Education, in the following resolution:

We recommend that the right of way be given to the Centenary Movement in the first two years and to the educational campaign during the second two years of the quadrennium and that during these two periods as far as possible the full power of the Church be delivered in these respective campaigns. And,

II. WHEREAS, the need of our Conference Educational Institutions for additional funds is imperative. And,

III. INASMUCH as the tragic events of the past few years have taught us that education without Christ is a mockery, and therefore, if America is to be true to its mission, education must be Christian. And,

IV. WHEREAS, our denomination is now short 800 preachers and is calling for hundreds of missionaries and trained workers not now available and inasmuch as we recognize our responsibility for recruiting and training young men and women for this work if our Church is to grow and serve. And,

V. INASMUCH as we feel, therefore, our responsibility jointly with the other Conferences to focus our attention this year upon all the processes of Christian Education in the home, the Church, and the school. Be it Resolved, First. That this Conference co-operate most heartily in the plans of the Education Commission's five-fold objective in carrying out the instructions of the General Conference.

Second. That we take all proper steps to fix the attention of all our people upon the fundamental place of Christian Education in the life and mission of our Church and that to this end we urge pastors to preach and teach, and laymen to lend their influence in every possible way.

Third. That we call upon our people for their prayers in behalf of the presidents and faculties and trustees of our schools, for our young people in attendance upon them, praying especially that the right young men and young women may be led to give their lives as preachers, missionaries and trained workers, and that these schools may supplement the work of home and church in leading the young people of this generation to the acknowledgment of Christ as their Lord and Master in whatsoever work they may choose.

Work they may choose. Fourth. That we appoint a Conference Educational Commission to be made up as follows: H. C. Pfeiffer, S. T. Senter, T. S. Southgate, J. P. Jones and W. A. Wright, for the purpose of co-operating with the Connectional Educational Commission and for putting in operation the necessary plans for securing the support of all our churches for this Movement.

Fifth. That we assume as the quota for this Conference the sum of \$1,978,000, and authorize the Conference Educational Commission, with the help of Presiding Elders, to divide this amount equitably among the Churches of the Conference.

Sixth. That we request the appointment of a Conference Educational Secretary to be the full-time executive of the Conference Educational Commission and that we pledge such Secretary, when appointed, our full loyalty and support.

Seventh. That we call upon our Churches to co-operate in a manner worthy of the impelling need of our Christian Education Program in arousing every member to an appreciation of his or her responsibility, and in giving fullest financial support in the collections to be taken next spring.

## Report No. 2

(1) The attendance in our schools and colleges this year is the largest in their history, many having been turned away from the Methodist Schools in Virginia. This condition makes it necessary that immediate action be taken for the relief of congested conditions, and for better equipment, in order that our people may take advantage of the opportunitics offered by these institutions.

(2) We call on our people everywhere to pray for our schools and colleges, and urge the heads of the institutions to make their chapel services and the college church services contribute in the largest way possible to the bringing of young men and young women to a decision for life service, and that in every pulpit in our Conference, the claims of the christian ministry be presented, and that this be followed by personal work.

(3) That the Treasurer of the Annual Conference is hereby instructed to pay out of the Annual Conference Fund to the Treasurer of the Conference Board of Education, \$150 for the expenses of the Board of Education for the coming year.

(4) We request the presiding Bishop to appoint S. C. Hatcher as Vice-President, and Secretary-Treasurer of Randolph-Macon College, Ashland, Va.; E. H. Rowe as President of Southern Seminary, Buena Vista, Va.; W. A. Christian as President of Blackstone College for Girls; W. J. Young and W. A. Smart as Professors in the Candler School of Theology, Emory University, Ga.; James Cannon III, as Professor in Trinity College, Durham, N. C.; B. M. Beckham as Principal of Ferrum Training School, Ferrum, Va.; E. L. Peerman as student in the Hartford School of Religious Pedagogy, and B. B. Bland as student in Randolph-Macon College.

The paper of Rev. E. H. Rowe, referred to the Board of Education, was fully considered, and the following action was taken:

We recognize the importance of the conditions stated in the paper referred to this Board by the Conference, but in view of the fact that agencies of the Church are working on these problems, we respectfully report that action at this time is not considered necessary.

## Report on Religious Education of Students in State Schools

At the last session of the Conference your commission to provide for the religious Education of Methodist students in schools maintained by the State presented a report on conditions at William and Mary College and the University of Virginia as they concern the Virginia Conference.

The increase this year in the number of Methodist students makes it more apparent than ever that we have a responsibility at these seats of learning that we cannot neglect without suffering reproach in our denominational consciousness and immeasurable loss as a church.

We are advised that there are at present approximately 150 students from Methodist homes at William and Mary College and 400 at the University of Virginia. To sum up, there are 550 students at these two seats who have enrolled themselves as Methodists, either by profession or affiliation. These two educational communities assembled by the State without any cost to the Church present inviting and fertile fields which we may freely enter for patriotic, social, and religious service and where we may hope to realize the largest returns from the least expenditure.

To present something concrete, we herein embody items in the report of Rev. Lee G. Crutchfield, pastor at Williamsburg, to the Commission:

The pastor teaches a class of men students in the Sunday School composed this year of about thirty-five members. There is a Ladies' class, chiefly women students, taught by a Methodist professor, R. M. Crawford. The pastor attends college chapel at least once a week. He attends from time to time the weekly meetings of the college Literary Society and is always gladly welcome. He takes a real interest in the college athletics. He visits the rooms of the students, especially when asked to do so by letter or otherwise. He has a number of personal friends among the students and endeavors to get them to come to him for advice as often as they wish. The pastor and his wife have entertained a group of students at the parsonage a number of times. This has been an especially helpful form of contact. For seven or eight weeks last spring the pastor taught a mission study class, meeting weekly at the college. There are two ministerial students in the college.

The pastor at Williamsburg has wrought well, but is prevented by the inadequacy of our church plant there from doing the full service that the situation calls for. The most pressing of the material needs are a pipe organ and an annex to the church building that will provide for Departmental Sunday School work and social life.

We recommend that the Church Extension Board encourage the brethren at Williamsburg to go forward in equipping their church for this important service by assuring them of its support to the measure that may be required.

Your Commission acknowledges with appreciation the prompt appropriation by the Mission Board last year of \$1,250 to the support of the pastor at Williamsburg, and recommend the renewal of the same appropriation for the ensuing year.

From a report from Dr. J. K. Jolliff, pastor of First Methodist Church, Charlottesville, we quote the following:

We are especially well placed in our work among the students at this time, having Dr. Smithey, of the School of Education, and associate professor, Snavely, together with professors Allison and Graham of the subfaculty actively engaged in the work of teaching a University Bible Class with a good membership—approximately seventy or eighty present. And also a graduate student, Mr. B. G. Childs, one of the brightest men at the University in recent years. He is the teacher of the Wesley Bible Class and the teacher training class.

In our report of last year we recommended, as soon as the right man could be secured and provision made for his support, that a pastor be appointed by the Bishop who should give his whole time to caring for the religious life of the students of the University of Virginia. The Board of Missions has signified its readiness to provide fifty per cent. of this salary, but the lack of church facilities at Charlottesville makes it well nigh impossible to use such a pastor effectively at this time. We rejoice to report that the prospect of the realization of a representative church there is assuring and our recommendation of a student pastor stands good when that shall be accomplished.

In addition to the proposed pastoral agency your Commission purposes during the ensuing year to investigate the possibility and wisdom of providing a chair of religious instruction at the University to be occupied by a representative of the church, who should also be charged with the care of the spiritual life of students.

## Sunday School Board

In submitting our report, we are pleased to state that we have enjoyed the most successful year in the history of the Sunday School work of the Conference. Our people are realizing that the Sunday School is a religious

educational institution which offers a great opportunity for real constructive service and that it requires definite and careful preparation on the part of the workers to render this service.

During the year we have conducted nine district schools and a conference school for training leaders. In addition we have held six study conferences, fifty-one local training classes have been organized, twenty individual students enrolled and forty-five of our people attended the Lake Junaluska Training School. Through all these efforts, we enlisted 3,020 persons in training work and 2,317 credits were awarded. This represents a gain of 1,612 credits over last year. We are glad to call your attention to the fact that 502 of these credits were awarded to Blackstone College students. In addition to the work being done at Blackstone where ninety-nine girls have enrolled this year, a class has been organized at Randolph-Macon Men's College with thirty-eight enrolled.

The effort to have every officer and teacher read at least one book during the year on Sunday School work is meeting with success. Two hundred schools that have reported on this matter indicate that 705 officers and teachers have done this, and seventeen schools report a book read by every officer and teacher; therefore, these schools will be awarded Honor Certificates, or blue or gold scals. Tucker's Hill School Westmoreland Circuit gets the first gold scal certificate which means that every officer and teacher has read at least three books.

Our Conference School for training leaders was very successful, every district in the Conference being represented and some credits went to every district. We regret that so few of the pastors and superintendents took advantage of this opportunity to come in touch with some of our foremost Sunday School leaders. We trust this will not be true another year. We appeal to pastors and superintendents to take full advantage of the opportunities of both the Conference and District Schools in order that they may influence others to do so and also prepare themselves for the very best service possible in this great work. The insistent call is for better trained workers and while our Conference is making splendid progress in trying to meet this need, our success or failure largely depends on the attitude of those in the lead in the local work.

Our Conference officers have come in touch with workers from 350 schools during the year and our volunteer district officers have reached 164 schools.

The summary of the statistics of the work has been placed in your hands that you may see just what has been accomplished and we will only call attention here to a few items.

We note that West Brunswick Circuit led the Conference on Sunday School Day collection with an offering of \$215.95 and that Petersburg District again leads all the other districts, Richmond District is second, but Rappahannock District deserves special mention because every charge observed the Day and only one charge failed on the Norfolk District. Thirty-seven charges raised more than \$50, six more than \$100 and one more than \$200. The names of these charges will be published in the Advocate.

Norfolk District led in increase in enrollment which was 2,629. But Petersburg District has the honor of reporting the largest number --727-additions to the church through the Sunday School.

The Sunday School enrollment now is 117,890, an increase of 8,399 over the previous year; 5,668 pupils joined the church during the year and this was an increase of 1,226. The Schools raised for all purposes \$222,111, which represents an increase of \$61,941 over the previous year.

A careful study of two districts has revealed the fact that we are greatly in need of better equipment, closer attention to the condition of the building and grounds, and better social activities for our young people. This study also indicates that the average attendance is entirely too low and too large a number of the church members are not members of the school. These conditions, we are led to believe, are very general and we call on every worker interested in the future of the church to assist in correcting them.

Because of a general desire for a Standard of Efficiency, we have decided while waiting for a workable general standard, to put out a Conference Standard of Efficiency and trust our schools will make the fullest use of it.

We have set before our district workers some very definite objectives which we hope will be attained and thereby place each district on our Honor Roll by next Conference.

We appeal to our leaders to assist us in having every officer and teacher study and take the examination on the following books during the year: Organization and Administration of the Sunday School; The Teacher; The Pupil; and Training the Devotional Life. Every pastor, superintendent, officer and teacher would be in a position to do much more effective work in the school after a study of the above named books which have been prepared by some of our leading Sunday School workers.

We desire to call attention to injury done the work by the neglect of the appearance of the church property and appeal for your support in the effort to have this kept in more attractive condition, especially for the good impression that will be made thereby on our young people. This is a good work for organized classes, or a group especially appointed for the work.

In order to call attention to the spiritual and physical needs of childhood, we have agreed to co-operate with other church leaders and other organizations in what is to be called Children's Week, to be held next spring. This is a real opportunity for every one who is interested in the welfare of childhood to do something for that cause. We request our pastors and Sunday School leaders to give their earnest support to this movement.

We again appeal to our pastors and church leaders to get in touch with our office when planning for a new building or for remodeling the present church or Sunday School building in order that we may render all assistance possible in making provision for the needs of the modern Sunday School. This is of great importance to the future of the work.

We wish to commend to all of our circuit charges the circuit Sunday School Organization with a regular quarterly meeting. This has resulted in so much good to a number of our circuits that have been trying this co-operation that we are confident such an organization would result in great good to the work on any circuit.

In promoting the study of the Bible and religious education, we are sure it would be well for our Sunday School Leaders to co-operate with the local high school instructors in carrying out the offer of the State Department of Public Instruction to give credit for Bible study done in the Sunday School and home as outlined in a Syllabus prepared by a committee appointed by the State Department of Public Instruction. You can secure a copy of the Syllabus on request.

We wish to express our gratitude to pastors and Sunday School workers for the loyal support given us in placing the Sunday School work of our Conference in the very fore-front of the whole church and for the liberal Sunday School Day offering which has enabled us to do work that otherwise necessarily would have had to be left undone.

We commend the faithful work of our district Sunday School officers and urge you to give them all assistance possible in their splendid efforts.

We appeal for your loyal support and co-operation in the following program:

(1) A successful District Institute on every district.

(2) The study of the four books mentioned above by all officers and teachers.

(3) In enlarging our training work and having every charge represented at the Conference School for Training leaders. In this connection, we desire to organize the training work on some districts to continue throughout the winter months.

(4) Bringing every school possible up to the standard of efficiency.

(5) Organizing circuit Sunday Schools in a charge organization with a meeting at least quarterly.

(6) The observance of Children's Week.

(7) The observance of three special occasions by every school. They are: Sunday School Day, Decision Day, and Promotion Day.

(S) Putting and keeping the church property in the most attractive condition possible.

We request the presiding Bishop to appoint J. H. Montgomery Conference Superintendent of Sunday Schools. Miss Ethel Smither has been elected Elementary Superintendent.

# Epworth League Board

The statistical reports of the annual Conferences show a substantial growth in the Epworth League. There are now 3,478 Leagues and 119,331 members.

It is worthy of note that this growth has taken place while the Church and Sunday School show a very considerable net loss for the year 1919.

All departments of the Lengue are better organized, and the new plan of supporting it has opened a wide field for development. The Missionary Special has reached the sum of \$54,102, and is growing yearly.

It would be difficult to say too much of the young people's organization in the Virginia Conference, and the splendid work it is doing.

In the year 1914 the League pledged \$500 for the Africa Special. Last year it raised over \$3,500, and this year it pledged \$5,000.

The summer conferences are remarkable for their spiritual power, and many of our choicest young people are being led by the League to devote themselves to life service in the cause of the Master.

A few years ago the League was practically dead in the Norfolk District. Its growth can be seen by the fact that two years ago ten Leagues were reported, last year sixteen, and this year twenty-one, five Leagues having been organized at some of the strongest churches; and we now have a fine City Union, which is doing excellent work.

In these days when the Church is doing larger things in the foreign field, and the call is most urgent for laborers, the finest young men and young women are coming from the League to this work.

We offer the following resolutions:

Resolved (1) That we commend the League to the more careful consideration of the preachers, and urge that Leagues be organized wherever possible.

Resolved (2) That League Anniversary Day be celebrated in all the churches, in accordance with the enactments of the General Conference.

Resolved (3) That the Annual Conference give us time at its ensuing sessions for the presentation of a more elaborate program of the League work.

## Temperance and Social Reform

The Board of Temperance and Social Reform of Virginia Conference desires to express its gratification at the progress made in the banishment of the drink evil from our land, and to call attention to some other reforms which need careful consideration and action.

#### BENEFITS OF PROHIBITION

Prohibition in the United States is gloriously succeeding. Since the passing of the eighteenth amendment to our national Constitution, we have shown to the world that neither government nor business is dependent on the saloon for success, but that the saloon has been a serious menace to both. In the passage of the eighteenth amendment and the Volstead enforcement act, perhaps the greatest piece of social service work the world ever saw was enacted. It has been emptying jails, workhouses and penitentiaries; and the work of the Salvation Army among the bums down town has almost ceased to be since the saloon has ceased to function in the manufacture of the bum element of society. Federal Prohibition Commissioner Kramer has been quoted as saying that "with two more years of the Volstead law, drinking will become a lost art."

Since prohibition came into effect, crimes and arrests all over the land have been reduced from twenty-five to seventy-five per cent.; alcoholic wards in hospitals are being closed for lack of patrons; rescue missions are caring for but a small percentage of their former attendants; charity cases have slumped, and savings accounts have been greatly boosted.

We have removed the recruiting station of the drink habit. So long as the saloons were in existence, their continued business depended on the filling of the gaps in the long lines of drunkards by fresh recruits from the fair boys of our American homes. Now, thank God, with the saloon menace removed, our boys can go from the Atlantic to the Pacific and from the Lakes to the Gulf without having to "look upon the wine when it is red." So when the present generation of drunkards has passed out, there will be no more to take their places, and we shall have a sober nation. For these blessed prospects we are profoundly grateful.

## INFLUENCE ON OTHER NATIONS

In this master stroke of national prohibition by constitutional amendment, the United States has taken leadership of the world. At the International Congress Against Alcoholism held in Washington in September, thirty-eight countries were represented. High official men, representing their governments, came from practically all over the world with congratulations and words of praise for American prohibition, and with

expressions of a strong desire and determination to follow our leading, if we make good. The eyes of the world are upon the United States, watching to see the results of her experiment with a national prohibition policy. The social leaders of the world are praying and hoping that our country may not fail in this great step; but that she may maintain her dry policy, prove its benefits, and give heart and encouragement in the great fight for a dry world. Our responsibility is great, our opportunity glorious!

We are happy to note the progress of the World League Against Alcoholism, organized in Washington, D. C., June 6, 1919, there being, in this short time, twenty-one countries and twenty-nine organizations cooperating in the pact. We rejoice also in the steps taken by the League of Nations for the protection of that part of Africa subjected to its control from the curse of the liquor traffic. The outlook for a dry world continues to brighten.

#### A NOTE OF WARNING

In the midst of all the brightness of the outlook, we feel it our duty to sound a note of solemn warning that the fight is by no means ended. We are perhaps in the most critical period of our long and hard struggle for freedom from the evils of strong drink. The liquor interests are doing all in their power to get the Volstead Code so amended as to permit the manufacture and sale of beer and wine. This can be done by Congress in the simple act of changing the definition of intoxicating liquor, as the Supreme Court of the United States has ruled that Congress has power to define intoxicants. We are told that ninety per cent. of the alcoholie beverages consumed in the United States before national prohibition went into effect were malt beverages. Therefore the restoration of the beer and wine traffic in the United States would mean the restoration of at least ninety per cent. of the liquor traffic as it was before the eighteenth amendment was written. It would simply throw overboard our entire prohibition policy, and would retard the progress of world-wide prohibition for many years.

What we need is the exertion of our utmost powers to create in every community such a sentiment as will compel the maintenance of the eighteenth amendment and the enforcement of the Volstead law as it stands today. We, therefore, call upon all our people to watch and work and pray that the great victory won shall in nowise be lost.

#### OTHER SOCIAL PROBLEMS

There are other social problems threatening the social fabric today which need attention and solution; such as the modern dance, gambling, the immigration problem, the problem of relationship between the white and colored races, etc. These problems, if solved, must be solved largely by the Church and the application of the teachings of Jesus Christ.

We believe that the modern dance, growing more and more corrupt, is a serious menace to the Church, to Christianity, and to the highest ideals of human society. And while devotees of the dance are calling

upon the Methodist Church to lower her standards and give sanction to the worldly dance, she ought the more zealously to stand by her ideals and the purity of the young people of today. This is no time to let down the bars of safety, or to connive at threatening evils.

We believe also that the many chance devices that are springing up all over our land are educating our people toward the sin of gambling, and should be discouraged in every legitimate way.

We are also convinced that the annual incoming of thousands of non-Christian people to our shores and scattering over our land presents another problem serious in character and tremendous in magnitude. Unless something greater and more definite is done to Christianize these pagan hordes, our country must rapidly become paganized, while we are exerting our energies to convert the world beyond the sea.

Once more, the differences between the white and the colored population of our land furnish a problem of continual menace to Church and State, the solution of which lies, we believe, in the exertion of spiritual forces and in the application of the Golden Rule.

In view of these problems confronting us, we offer the following recommendations:

(1) That, with gratitude for the benefits of prohibition already achieved in the United States, we pledge ourselves for the support of our existing national Constitution and the enforcement of the Volstead law as it stands today, and that we are most emphatically opposed to any change in existing laws that will permit the manufacture and sale of beer and wine.

(2) That we again endorse the wise and splendid work of the Anti-Saloon League, and pledge it our continued support and hearty cooperation.

(3) That we rejoice in the progress of the World League Against Alcoholism, and offer our co-operation for a dry world.

(4) That we protest against the modern dance as a degenerating practice, and call upon our Methodist people to abstain from participation therein.

(5) That we do all in our power to discourage and abolish all forms of gambling, and all games of chance that lead in that direction, and further, that we urge our next Legislature to repeal the statute passed at the last Legislature permitting gambling by wheel of fortune for articles instead of money.

(6) That we call upon our local churches to so organize their forces that the foreigners in every community may receive the invitation of the Gospel of Christ.

(7) That we recognize and endorse the work of the Inter-racial Commission of which Dr. R. E. Blackwell is Chairman, and that we stand ready to co-operate with this organization and its leader for a better understanding between the white and colored population of Virginia.

(S) We hereby assure the present Prohibition Commissioner, Hon. Harry B. Smith, who is a member of this body, that we will give him our hearty co-operation in the enforcement of prohibition law.

# Board of Managers of the Advocate Publishing Company

The Board of Managers of the Advocate Publishing Company begs leave to submit the following report for the year ending November 1, 1920:

Conditions could not have been much worse for the publication of the Advocate than your Board has been forced to face for the past year. The paper market has been chaotic, with prices continuing to soar; paper has cost us for this year \$1,751.06 more than last year. The situation does not seem to improve, and it is not at all unlikely that paper will cost still more the coming year. Printing cost more for this year than last by \$2,230.45. Other items of expense have increased also, but in lesser degree. The result in the publishing field has been that in recent months 1,200 weekly and 300 daily publications have been forced to suspend, and those that remained in the field have been compelled to increase their subscription price or to decrease the size of the periodicals. On July 1st the Advocate was forced to raise its price from \$2.00 to \$2.50, which still barely covers the cost of production. We are glad to say that very few subscribers uttered any protest against this increase, but we have noted the discontinuance of a number, presumably owing to the increase in subscription price.

To offset these uncertain and difficult conditions, one of two courses of action is necessary: Either the ministers of the Conference must give more active support to the Advocate or the Conference itself must give a small subsidy to the running expenses of the paper. We regret to state that the vast majority of our ministers seem to take but little interest in the welfare of the paper. If all were as active as the pastors on the Eastern Shore and the Petersburg Districts, with isolated individuals here and there on other districts, the prosperity of the Advocate would be greatly enhanced. We have added during the year 1,465 new names to our mailing list, and our circulation now is 8,350 copies each week. In comparison with several of our Conference papers this is a poor showing. Indeed, the Richmond Christian Advocate, the organ of the greatest Conference in Southern Methodism, enjoys, with one or two exceptions, the smallest circulation.

We would recommend, therefore, that this Conference take some definite action pledging its pastors to active co-operation with the *Advocate* in the securing of new subscribers and renewals in the effort to increase the circulation of the paper.

We would respectfully call attention of the Conference to the large number of subscribers who are forgetful of their obligation to the *Advocate* and fail to pay their subscription promptly, in many cases failing to pay at all, and necessitating the cutting off of their names at a dead loss to the paper. We would urge our preachers to exhort their members to discharge this obligation faithfully and promptly.

We suggest that the Conference confirm the re-election of Rev. T. A. Smoot, D. D., and Mr. Lee Davis, as members of the *Advocate* Board of Managers, and that Mr. S. D. Scott be confirmed as a member of the Board to fill the unexpired term of Mr. J. P. Pettyjohn, resigned.

We commend to our people the periodicals of our Church and urge their circulation.

Rev. H. H. Smith, of our Conference, has been issuing a number of valuable pamphlets dealing with the doctrines and policy of the Church, and other religious subjects; these have reached a circulation of 225,000 in the last fifteen years. ## Virginia Conference Orphanage

In 1900 the Virginia Assembly granted a charter to the Trustees of the Virginia Conference Orphanage, of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, "for the purpose of maintaining and educating white orphan children of Methodist parentage, and such other children as may be selected by the Trustees."

To train up a child in the way he should go means the saving of a soul from death, the covering of a multitude of sins, and the making of a man or woman for coming generations.

Under this charter and in accordance with the above statement, your orphanage has been operating for the past more-than-eighteen years, and now possesses a plant free from debt, and a reputation second to none in the State for the quality and character of work for destitute children.

It is no secret to the membership of this Annual Conference that our orphanage and the best interests of the children living there are very dear to the heart of every clerical and lay member of our branch of the Methodist brother- and sisterhood. As a matter of fact, such success

as the institution has made has been entirely due to the sympathetic prayers and practical interest of the choicest spirits among our number, multiplied and blessed by the God of the fatherless and widowed.

We are pleased to report that last year was no exception to our past history, in that improvement over previous years has been obtained.

During the year we have been able to make considerable progress along the line of vocational training. The printing plant is in good working

order, and is well equipped for its size. We are training both boys and girls in this art, placing them in self-supporting positions at good salaries as they complete their time with us, and incidentally making some profit on the work we turn out. To mention the fact that we are constantly turning away work for lack of larger equipment is but another way of pointing out another fact, viz., that the work done by the children is satisfactory to our many customers.

Our thanks are due and are hereby sincerely extended to the many friends of the orphanage who so generously responded to our appeal for funds with which to purchase a Linograph machine, which is installed and doing excellent work.

We desire also to cordially thank the many consecrated ladies of our churches, in the main members of the Women's Missionary, Ladies' Aid and Sunday School Societies, who so generously participated in the linen shower for our benefit in the spring.

The health of the children is good. We regret to have to report the second case of death in the history of the orphanage, a case of spinal meningitis, which carried away a small boy who had been an inmate for only a few weeks.

The name of Henry C. Pfeiffer who was elected a Trustee at the annual meeting of the Board in May is respectfully presented to the Conference for confirmation.

The presiding Bishop is respectfully requested to appoint J. W. Bledsoe, D. D., as Orphanage Agent; J. D. Hosier, Assistant Superintendent; and A. B. Sharpe, Superintendent.

Auditing Committee.

The unusual increase of assets, as shown above, is due chiefly to the merging of The Conditional Trust Fund into the regular fund, the assets transferred being as follows: Loans secured by deed of trust, \$4,300; cash balance on hand, \$479.82; total, \$4,779.82. The Conditional Trust Fund was created in 1916 by Rev. Henry E. Johnson, D. D., a member of the Virginia Conference, who gave \$3,000.00, subject to certain conditions. To this he added, January 5, 1920, \$1,000.00 more, subject to the same conditions. The interest on this endowment has been accumulating, and none of it has been spent. The death of Dr. Johnson on the 23rd of September last, terminated the conditions annexed to the gift, and allowed the entire fund to be merged into the regular fund of the Society.

In this connection it should be recorded to the credit of Dr. Johnson's generosity, that he contributed, on the first of April, 1920, \$1,000.00 to the Society's regular fund, subject to an annuity payable to his wife during her life-time. This makes \$5,000.00, besides interest, contributed to the funds of the Society by our generous and honored Brother who has lately passed to his eternal reward.

Capt, E. V. White, a member of the Board of Directors of this Society, who died February 28, 1919, left in his will a bequest of \$5,000 to the Society, but as the estate has not yet been settled, the bequest is not yet available. It is expected that this sum, or the greater part of it, will be added to our assets in the early future.

### Conference Board of Finance

[Appropriations to Conference claimants were announced by the Secretary of the Board, for list of which see report of payment by the Conference Treasurer.—Editor.]

#### Report of the Conference Commission on Finance

The Commission reports the election of Rev. C. A. Tucker as one of its members in place of Rev. W. R. Proctor, deceased.

A paper was before the Commission offered by Lucius Gregory and others, asking for an assessment of approximately \$14,000, for the purpose of presenting the preachers of the Conference at the time of super-annuation, with the income from this assessment, which it is estimated would yield about \$2,000 in each case. After careful consideration it was decided in view of this large assessment to recommend that the assessment for First Aid for superannuates be increased from \$1,500 to \$6,000 for this year, with the hope that it may be possible to increase this amount in the not distant future until the amount of \$2,000, in each case, has been reached; this fund to be disbursed by the Conference Board of Finance. We make this recommendation.


